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Opening Drive

Northwestern State opens the season with the first of two Thursday night home games that will bookend the 2025 season. The Demons will also host Stephen F. Austin on Nov. 20 to close the regular season.

NSU's last Thursday-night home opener came in 2015, a 34-20 loss to No. 19 Southeastern. That game was also the last time the Demons opened a fall season at home regardless of the day of the week.

NSU is 4-5 over the past 25 seasons on Thursday-night season openers.

The Demons are searching for their first season-opening win of any kind, on any day of the week since a 23-17 road victory at Missouri State in 2013.

Young and hungry

The core of Blaine McCorkle's plan to rebuild Northwestern State's football program started from the ground floor.

Part of that process includes an emphasis on high school recruiting and their development over four, or sometimes more, years in Natchitoches. The makeup of the 2025 roster is a direct reflection of that development mindset.

The 2025 Demon football team is among the youngest in all of FCS football with 68.7 percent of the roster comprised of either freshmen or sophomore players. There are 20 true freshmen and 29 redshirt freshmen on the roster, making up half of the team's full roster.

The largest class on the roster, the group of redshirt freshmen with 29 total players, are just two shy the same amount of total upperclassmen on the team (31). Of the 29 redshirt freshmen on the roster this year, 27 of them spent the 2024 season at NSU.

New season, new QB1

When the Demons take the field tonight to open the 2025 season, it will mark the fifth straight season a different starting quarterback has taken the first snap of the season.

Although projected starter, redshirt freshman **Abram Johnston**, started three games in 2024 he was not the opening day starter, that distinction went to **JT Fayard** when the Demons started the 2024 season at Tulsa.

The last Demon quarterback to start consecutive season openers was **Kaleb Fletcher**, who started a pair of openers within one calendar year - the postponed 2020 season that was played in the spring of 2021 and the 2021 fall opener a few months later.

Fletcher and **Shelton Eppler**, NSU single-season and career passing yards and touchdowns leader, combined to start four straight season openers from 2018-21.

Started from the bottom, now we here

The two head coaches in tonight's matchup share more in common than just the fact that each are in their second seasons with their current teams.

Both Blaine McCorkle and Cedric Thomas got their coaching starts back in 2002 when they were both members of the UT Martin staff. McCorkle served as the receivers coach and Thomas coached the running backs.

They cut their coaching teeth with the Skyhawks under Sam McCorkle, Blaine's father, for one season together before Blaine moved on to Sewanee in 2003 and Thomas to Mississippi Delta CC in 2004.

Coaching consistency

Much like the roster and the amount of turnover from year to year, a football coaching staff often sees that same type of turnover year to year. That however is not the case for Blaine McCorkle in his second year at NSU.

The Demons return nine staff members from the 2024 season, the majority of which have worked with McCorkle since his days at Belhaven before coming to NSU.

Both coordinators **Matt Conner** (defense) and **Carson Stewart** (offense), assistant head coach and quarterbacks coach **Norman Joseph**, receivers coach **Maurice Stewart**, linebackers coach **Justin Williamson**, offensive line coach **Cade Camp**, offensive line graduate assistant **Kendrioun Boatman**, defensive backs graduate assistant **TJ Hersey**, director of football operations **Dan Korn** and former special teams graduate assistant/current director of equipment **Andrew Norton** all worked on the NSU football staff a year ago.

Thursday throwdowns

Thursday-night games are not unfamiliar for Northwestern State.

For the fourth time since 2018, the Demons open the season on a Thursday night (at Texas A&M, 2018; at UT Martin, 2019; at Tulsa, 2024) when they face Alcorn State.

The Demons played two Thursday-night games in 2024 (Tulsa and South Alabama) for the first time since 2019. In 2025 they will make it back-to-back seasons with a pair of Thursday-night games for the first time since 2018-19. In both of those seasons, the opener and the regular season finale were played on Thursday night.

This year both the season opener and finale against Stephen F. Austin on Nov. 20 are set to be played on Thursday nights. Both will take place in Turpin Stadium.

Preseason honors for Magee and Sears

A pair of Northwestern State defenders earned some love this preseason with spots on the Phil Steele Preseason All-Southland team.

Cornerback **Caesar Magee III** was chosen to the first team while linebacker **Danny Sears** earned a second-team spot.

Magee III, in his first year playing corner, led the Demons in interceptions in 2024 with three. He had a two-pick game with eight tackles against McNeese for a career-best performance. Magee III tied for third on the team with 63 tackles a year ago, despite missing two games, and had eight PBUs and 11 total passes defended, good enough to lead the SLC at 1.1 per game and rank 23rd nationally.

Sears had a career-best 52 tackles in eight games after missing four games due to an injury. He had a pair of double-figure tackling games with a best 13 in the season finale against HCU.

Home state products bolster roster

Northwestern State's 2024 roster features 66 players from Louisiana, hailing from 37 different hometowns within the Pelican State.

New Orleans produced six members of the 2025 Demon roster while Baton Rouge and Shreveport each had four players on the team. Other Louisiana cities represented more than once on the 2025 Demon roster are Alexandria (3), Bossier City (3), Covington (3), Monroe (3), Natchitoches (3), New Iberia (3), Hammond (2), Lafayette (2), Lake Charles (2), Mandeville (2), New Roads (2), and Prairieville (2).

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BLAINE McCORKLE

HEAD COACH » SECOND SEASON

Blaine McCorkle was named Northwestern State's 16th head football coach on Nov. 28, 2023, following in the footsteps of his father, Sam, a former head coach at West Alabama and at UT Martin.

McCorkle came to Natchitoches after a successful six-season run as the head coach at Belhaven University in Jackson, Mississippi. In that time, McCorkle turned the Blazers into a conference champion that earned the school's first NCAA Division III playoff berth.

McCorkle led Belhaven to the outright 2023 USA South Conference championship — the first such title in program history. Belhaven went 9-2 in 2023, capping a three-year run in which the Blazers posted a 24-7 mark under McCorkle.

In McCorkle's first three seasons laying the foundation at Belhaven, the Blazers won seven total games — including a 3-2 mark in the pandemic-affected 2021 spring season. That marked the first winning season for Belhaven since 2012.

That success came after McCorkle inherited a Belhaven program that had not won more than three games in a season since 2013.

At Belhaven, McCorkle coached 47 all-conference athletes, 10 all-region selections and All-Americans Kendrioun Boatman (offensive line) and Carlton Brown (defensive line). Belhaven running back Kolbe Blunt was named a 2023 semifinalist for the Gagliardi Trophy, awarded to Division III's most outstanding player.

McCorkle has coached at six FCS schools — Delaware, Richmond, Liberty, Tennessee Tech, Chattanooga and UT Martin — and has spent 18 of his 26 coaching seasons at FCS schools.

Most of McCorkle's time as an assistant came as an offensive line coach, including a nine-season run alongside head coach Danny Rocco at Delaware, Richmond and Liberty.

During that time, McCorkle was part of five conference championship teams (2007, 2009, 2010, 2012, 2015) and three teams that reached the FCS Playoffs (2014, 2015, 2016).

In 2017, McCorkle tutored a pair of All-CAA offensive linemen at Delaware, helping the Blue Hens go 7-4 — the most wins for the perennial power in four seasons.

Before following Rocco to Delaware, McCorkle was part of a Richmond staff that led the Spiders to the second round of the FCS Playoffs and a season-ending No. 16 national ranking. A season later, the Spiders reached the national semifinals and finished the season ranked No. 3. Richmond's playoff success continued in 2016, reaching the quarterfinals ahead of a No. 8 ranking.

Specifically, McCorkle's offensive lines at Richmond were dominant. In his first season (2012), the Spiders ranked third nationally in fewest sacks allowed (5). In 2013, the Spiders' line helped Richmond set almost every school season passing record. In 2014, Richmond allowed the fewest sacks in the Coastal Athletic Association and 11th-fewest nationally.

Five of his Richmond linemen — Austin Gund, Nick Ritcher, Jacob Ruby, Thomas Evans and Alex Light — all played in the NFL after their time with the Spiders.

Ritcher was a first-team AP and American Football Coaches Association All-American who was named the Touchdown Club Division I Offensive Line-man of the Year in Virginia.

Austin Gund, currently the assistant offensive line coach with the Buffalo Bills, was a three-time All-CAA selection who was a second-team All-American. Thomas Evans followed Ritcher as the Touchdown Club award winner,



earned All-CAA honors and now competes in the World's Strongest Man competitions.

Jacob Ruby, a two-time All-CAA selection under McCorkle, has played more than 100 games in the Canadian Football League and has earned CFL All-Star honors.

During his second stint at Liberty from 2009-11, McCorkle helped guard Malcolm Boyd earn third-team All-American honors from the Associated Press in 2011 while helping Liberty build the Big South's top passing offense in terms of yards and efficiency while ranking second in total offense (426.5 yards per game) and scoring (35.9 points).

That followed a 2010 season in which McCorkle's charges Alex Stadler and Justin Vargas earned first-team All-Big South honors. Those two helped quarterback Mike Brown lead the NCAA in total offense (346.36 yards per game). Liberty's offensive line under McCorkle that season ranked fifth nationally in fewest sacks allowed (0.64 per game) and fewest tackles for loss per game (4.18). Offensively, Liberty averaged 459.91 yards per game, second nationally.

In his first season back at Liberty, McCorkle's offensive line helped the Flames lead the nation in scoring at 36.36 points per game. Liberty's 31 rushing touchdowns were fourth nationally while it ranked second nationally in red-zone efficiency (92 percent).

At Liberty in 2007, McCorkle served as a strength and conditioning and offensive assistant, helping craft an offense that set a school record with 469 points. Liberty's 42.6 points per game average ranked them third nationally. The 32 rushing touchdowns set a school single-season record and helped start a run of four straight Big South Conference championships for the Flames.

Under McCorkle, left tackle Stephen Sene earned first-team All-Big South honors, competed in the Hula Bowl and signed a free-agent contract with the New England Patriots.

A 2000 LSU graduate with a degree in education, McCorkle's journey brings him full circle to Louisiana where he began his coaching career as a student assistant with the Tigers in 1999, working with the offensive line and coordinating the defensive and special teams scout units.

That fall followed a four-year career as a long snapper at LSU where McCorkle was part of three bowl teams, including one that broke a seven-year bowl drought for the Tigers and perhaps foreshadowed what was to come in his coaching career.

McCorkle is married to the former Gina Lucido and is the father of four children, Gracie, Emma, Audrey and Sammy.



NORMAN JOSEPH

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH/QUARTERBACKS

After more than three decades, Norman Joseph is back at Northwestern State for his second stint on the Demon coaching staff.

Joseph is a coaching veteran with a career marked by record-setting offenses, play-calling innovations and quarterback development. He has a special history in Louisiana, having coached at four colleges in the state — Northwestern State, ULM, Louisiana Tech and Louisiana College. Notably, in Louisiana, Joseph coached three quarterbacks who later earned Super Bowl rings.

Joseph spent the 2023 season as the offensive coordinator at Stetson University in DeLand, Florida, following a two-year run as the head coach and assistant athletic director at McGill-Toolen Catholic High School in Mobile, Alabama.

Under Joseph, Stetson's offense led the Pioneer Football League and ranked 32nd nationally in passing yardage (241.3 yards per game). Joseph's offensive scheme also allowed a young bench to finish third in the conference in total offense.

A season before heading to McGill-Toolen, Joseph celebrated a state championship as Catholic-Baton Rouge's offensive coordinator, winning the title on NSU's Turpin Stadium turf.

Joseph spent the 2018-19 seasons at Southeastern University in Lakeland, Florida, helping lead the Fire to a conference title in 2018.

That sojourn to Florida followed 11 years of coaching in Mississippi, including a nine-season run as the head coach at Mississippi College from 2005-13.

Joseph's best season at Mississippi College came in 2009 when the Choctaws went 9-3 and posted a 7-1 mark in the American Southwest Conference, capturing the school's first ASC championship since 1997.

Led by Gagliardi Trophy finalist quarterback Adam Shaffer, Mississippi College defeated Huntington in the first round of the Division III playoffs.

That season, Mississippi College produced three D3Football.com All-Americans — tight end Renard Ellis, offensive lineman Josh Lankford and linebacker Quartez Ashmore. Additionally, Joseph was named the ASC Coach of the Year and American Football Coaches Association Regional Coach of the Year.

Two seasons earlier, the Choctaws' Shaffer-led offense set school records for scoring offense, total yards, first downs, passing yards, pass completions, pass attempts, touchdown passes and overall touchdowns. Shaffer threw for 3,500 yards — ranking third nationally.

In Joseph's first season in Clinton, Shaffer set the school's freshman records for passing yards, completions and touchdowns and established a school single-game record with seven touchdown passes against Belhaven.

Throughout his nine seasons at Mississippi College, Joseph tutored six All-Americans, including wide receiver Jake Allen, who spent time with the Cleveland Browns and Green Bay Packers of the NFL.

Joseph returned to the head coaching ranks in 2004 at then-Louisiana College, leading the Wildcats to a 5-5 mark. In his lone season in Pineville, Joseph's team established 38 team and 41 individual records and ranked seventh nationally in passing yards, 15th in total offense and 28th in scoring offense.

That followed offensive coordinator stops at Midwestern State University (2003) and San Jose State (2001-02).

At Midwestern State, Joseph's offense led the Lone Star Conference in rushing yards and allowed the fewest sacks in the league. MSU's 5.3 yards per carry average set a school record.

At San Jose State, Joseph embraced the West Coast offense. It was during that time that Joseph's Spartan offense set a NCAA Division I record for combined total offense in a game (1,640 yards of combined total offense in a win against the University of Nevada) — a record that remained intact from 2001 to 2016.

Joseph's first head coaching stop in his career came at then-Belhaven College where he was the school's first head coach.

While building the Blazers' program, his first two years saw Belhaven become the only NAIA coach in the nation with a 1,000-yard rusher and a 1,000-yard receiver in back-to-back seasons.

His 1999 Belhaven team spent six consecutive weeks ranked in the NAIA Top 25 and produced 20 all-conference players, evenly split between the first and second teams.

In his three seasons at Belhaven, Joseph produced a 16-15 mark, including a 10-9 conference record.

During the 1994-1996 seasons, Joseph served as the offensive coordinator at the University of Southern Mississippi. In 1996 his Golden Eagle offense ranked second in the conference in scoring and led the nation in turnover margin. He also coached a quarterback to a #4 NCAA ranking in passing efficiency. He helped USM go 20-13 over his three years with most of the losses against nationally ranked SEC and ACC teams.

Prior to USM, he was the offensive coordinator at then-Northeast Louisiana University.

His NLU offense became the first NCAA offense in history to produce a 2,000-yard passer, two 1,000-yard rushers and a 1,000-yard receiver in one year. In 1993, Irving Spikes rushed for a still-standing school-record 1,563 yards. He helped NLU to four straight winning seasons ranking #1 in the conference in scoring, passing and total offense. His offense ranked eighth in the country in scoring offense in 1992 and third in the country in 1993. NLU won conference championships in 1990 and 1992 and received FCS playoff berths in 1990, 1992 and 1993.

In Joseph's first stop at Northwestern State, he spent two seasons (1988-89) as the passing game and recruiting coordinator, helping the Demons capture the 1988 Southland Conference championship and a #8 national ranking. The Demons led the Southland in scoring, total offense and rushing offense during his first NSU tenure.

In 1987, he was the passing and recruiting coordinator at Louisiana Tech after a nine-season stint as a position coach at NLU from 1978-1986. He also served as a volunteer coach at Vanderbilt University in 1977.

A Churchman All-American at Mississippi State University, Joseph is a 1977 MSU graduate who earned his master's degree in education from NLU in 1979.

Joseph and his wife, Jane, are the parents of three daughters — Elizabeth, Grace Anne and Sara Catherine.



CARSON STEWART

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

After serving as offensive coordinator for head coach Blaine McCorkle at Belhaven, Carson Stewart returns to that role in his second year on the Northwestern State staff.

In his first season with the Demons, Stewart coached the team's receivers and watched Myles Kitt-Denton develop into a field-stretching, big-play threat who had four touchdown receptions of at least 60 yards.

Before arriving in Natchitoches, Stewart spent his final three seasons as the Blazers' offensive coordinator, helping rebuild the Belhaven program and delivering the school's first outright conference championship and Division III playoff berth in 2023.

Led by Gagliardi Trophy semifinalist Kolbe Blunt and All-American offensive lineman Kendrioun Boatman, the Blazers rushed for 270.5 yards per game, a top-five mark nationally, while averaging 35.8 points per game. The Belhaven rushing attack averaged 6.1 yards per carry while Belhaven averaged 6.7 yards per play as an offense.

Joining Blunt and Boatman on the D3Football.com All-Region III team was guard David Turner.

Belhaven's and Stewart's success came after delivering a school-record 38 points per game in 2022. That season, the Blazers tied single-game school records for points (70) and touchdowns (10) in a win against LaGrange.

Those marks came two weeks after Belhaven produced school single-game records in total offense (702 yards) and rushing yards (492).

Belhaven's record-setting 2022 season came after a 2021 campaign in which four Blazers earned first-team All-American Southwest Conference honors and a pair being named to the D3Football.com's All-Region III Team.

Quarterback Mayowa Asagunla, running back Brad Foley and offensive linemen Botaman and Turner were first-team all-conference picks from Stewart's offense while Cole McAlpin and Blunt were second-team picks. Foley earned first-team All-Region III honors that season.

After spending two seasons as a graduate assistant at Belhaven, Stewart coached the Blazers' quarterbacks, including Asagunla, whose 67-percent completion percentage led the American Southwest Conference in the Spring 2021 season, earning him all-conference honors.

As a graduate assistant at Belhaven, Stewart coached wide receivers, helping Mario Asagunla and Joey Walden earn all-conference honors. Walden currently plays professionally in Germany for the Langenfeld Longhorns.

Before arriving at Belhaven, Stewart coached three seasons at Fort Hill High School in Cumberland, Maryland. With Stewart on staff, the Sentinels reached three straight Maryland Class 1A state championship games, winning a pair of state titles. At Fort Hill, Stewart coached various positions on both sides of the ball.

Stewart comes from a football coaching family, including his cousin, Chad Wilt, who coaches rush ends and is the co-special teams coordinator at Michigan State, and his uncles, Steve Wilt, an assistant coach at the University of Saint Francis and Randy Stewart, who coaches at Chestnut Ridge High School in Pennsylvania.



MATT CONNER

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

In his first season as Northwestern State's defensive coordinator, Matt Conner's unit belied its collective experience and began laying the foundation for a return to greatness.

Included in that group were linebacker Blake Gotcher and defensive end Chancellor Owens, both of whom earned All-American honors. Gotcher, the nation's leading tackler with 162, was named to a trio of All-American teams — The Associated Press, Phil Steele and STATS Perform — while becoming a finalist for the Buck Buchanan Award, which is given to the nation's top FCS defensive player.

Owens, meanwhile, earned Freshman All-American honors from Sports Illustrated after leading the Demons with 10.5 tackles for loss. Conner's time as the Demons' defensive coordinator, extends his relationship with head coach Blaine McCorkle that dates to 2018.

Conner capped a seven-year run at Belhaven — the final three as defensive coordinator — with a USA South Conference championship and a Division III Playoff berth — both program firsts.

Conner's defense ranked third overall in the USA South in 2023, allowing 279.4 yards per game, while standing second in passing yards allowed per game at 180.4.

Led by Defensive Player of the Year and All-American Carlton Brown, the Blazers placed four defenders on the All-USA South First Team. Brown, who had 13 tackles for loss and 6.5 sacks, was joined on that unit by linebacker Wyatt Beck, cornerback Dee Gray and safety Josiah Raymond. Brown collected first-team All-Region III honors while Gray (10 pass breakups, two interceptions) was named third-team All-Region III.

The Blazers' defensive unit was dominant all year in 2022, helping Belhaven to an 8-2 finish. Connor Fordham was named the USA South Defensive Player of the Year after recording nearly 100 tackles to lead Conner's group. The unit held opponents to just 15 points per game and just three yards per rushing attempt.

Five defensive players earned All-USA South honors following the campaign.

Under Conner in 2021, the Belhaven defense continued to be among the best in the American Southwest Conference led by six All-ASC recognitions. Additionally, Brown was named the ASC Defensive Lineman of the Year and an AFCA Division III All-American on the Second Team defense. Brown was the Blazers' first All-American in the NCAA era.

During the spring of 2021, Conner assumed the role of defensive coordinator and played a crucial part in leading the Belhaven defense to a highly successful season, one of the best in recent years. The 2021 campaign ended with six defensive players receiving all-conference honors, including first-team All-ASC defensive lineman Demetrius Brokenberry, second-team All-ASC defensive lineman Colton Strain, and second-team All-ASC/D3Football.com All-Region defensive lineman Carlton Brown.

A native of Oxford, Mississippi, Conner played two seasons as an offensive lineman at Itawamba Community College where he was a part of one of the nation's most productive junior college offenses during the 2007 and 2008 seasons. After competing at Itawamba, Conner played at Delta State University.



TYSON WACHENHEIM

SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

The son of a longtime football coach, Tyson Wachenheim's latest stop on his football journey brings him to Northwestern State as the Demons' special teams coordinator.

Wachenheim joined Blaine McCorkle's staff in December after two seasons at Towson where he coached the Tigers' tight ends.

Under Wachenheim's instruction, Carter Runyon twice earned All-American honors from The Associated Press as well as All-CAA acclaim.

In two seasons, Runyon caught 88 passes for 1,051 yards and nine touchdowns.

Wachenheim spent the 2022 season at Belhaven, coaching tight ends under McCorkle.

Wachenheim was part of an offensive staff that put together the No. 4 rushing attack in the country and the No. 12 red-zone offense nationally.

Wachenheim spent two seasons at Indiana as a graduate assistant, working with quarterbacks and wide receivers.

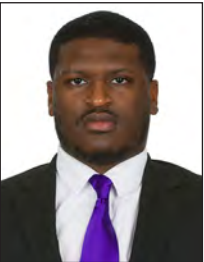
He was part of a Hoosiers staff that helped Indiana deliver a signature win against nationally ranked Penn State in 2020 while working with eventual first-round NFL Draft pick Michael Penix.

Showcasing his versatility, Wachenheim worked with the defense during his graduate assistantship at Georgia Tech for three seasons.

Wachenheim began his coaching career as the tight ends coach at VMI where he coached first-team All-Southern Conference tight end Ryan Swingle.

A 2015 Christopher Newport graduate in American studies, Wachenheim earned his master's degree in building construction and facilities management from Georgia Tech in December 2019.

Wachenheim and his wife, Amanda, have a son, Elliott.



ISAAC BAILS

DEFENSIVE LINE

Isaac Bails is in his first season on the Northwestern State staff, working with the defensive line.

Bails, however, is far from unfamiliar with Natchitoches, especially Turpin Stadium.

After two seasons as an assistant defensive line coach at North Texas, Bails returns to where he helped Catholic High School to a 2020 state championship.

While at North Texas, Bails assisted with the development and implementation of in-game adjustments while also participating in defensive game preparation and film analysis.

Bails spent the 2022 season at Birmingham Southern College, coaching the defensive line, which placed its entire unit on the all-conference team.

BSC went 7-3 in his lone season there with its defense recording 19 sacks.

Bails' one season in Birmingham came after starting his coaching career with two seasons at Catholic.

With the Bears, Bails helped lead the team to the 2020 Division I state championship, which came at Northwestern's Turpin Stadium.

In two seasons at Catholic, Bails helped the Bears post a 20-3 overall record and a pair of district championships.

A former Delta State defensive end, Bails was a team captain and a Mississippi High School Super 22 selection as well as an all-district and all-state honoree at Ripley High School.

Bails earned his undergraduate degree in health, physical education and recreation in 2017 from Delta State.



CADE CAMP

OFFENSIVE LINE

Cade Camp's return to the Southland Conference gave the young coach a chance to being laying the foundation for Northwestern State's offensive line.

A first-team All-Southland Conference selection as a senior at Central Arkansas, Camp enters his second season as the Demons' offensive line coach with a year of experience under his belt at the FCS level.

Camp spent the 2023 season at Midwestern State where his offensive line paved the way for the No. 19 rushing attack in Division II, averaging 204.3 yards per game. They also surrendered the 6th fewest sacks/game in the nation (0.7).

That followed a 2022 season in which Camp coached the offensive line at Arkansas Tech, helping the Wonder Boys rank 12th nationally in rush yards per carry (5.44) and 24th in rush yards per game (205.7). The Wonder Boys allowed the 11th-fewest sacks in Division II with 11 and ranked fifth nationally in fourth-down conversions at 72 percent (18-for-25).

Camp spent the 2020 season at Arkansas State, coaching the Red Wolves' offensive line as Arkansas State led the Sun Belt Conference in total offense (470.1 yards per game) and ranked second in FBS in passing yards per game (364.4). Following that season, Camp stayed with head coach Blake Anderson, moving to Utah State.

At Utah State, Camp helped the Aggies fashion the largest turnaround in FBS history, taking a one-win team in 2020 to 11 wins and the Mountain West Conference and Los Angeles Bowl championships in 2021. Utah State ended the season as the nation's No. 24 team.

A product of Allen High School, who helped the Eagles win the 2012 Class 5A UIL state championship, Camp made 25 career starts at Central Arkansas, earning first-team All-Southland honors in 2017 as the Bears captured the SLC championship.



TYLAN MARTIN

RUNNING BACKS

Tylan Martin enters his first season on Northwestern State's coaching staff with a large amount of Southland Conference experience.

Martin, the Demons' first-year running backs coach, spent the past four seasons at Nicholls as the Colonels' running backs coach and special teams co-coordinator, helping the Colonels win the 2023 Southland

Conference championship.

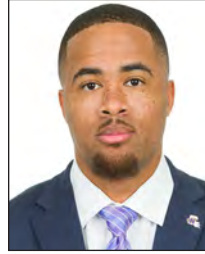
Martin coached four first-team All-Southland Conference selections, the 2023 Southland Conference Player of the Year (Collin Guggenheim) and the 2024 Southland Freshman of the Year (Miquele Brock).

Before jumping into the Southland, Martin spent three seasons coaching wide receivers and running backs at West Georgia where he tutored a pair of All-Gulf South selections.

Martin had a two-year stint at Millsaps where he coached a pair of all-conference honorable mention honorees. Martin began his coaching career as the wide receivers coach at East Central Community College where he helped the Warriors reach a pair of playoffs and win the 2015 C.H.A.M.P.S. Heart of Texas Bowl.

While at East Central, Martin helped Kabion Ento earn first-team all-state and first-team All-Region 23 honors. Ento eventually was part of the Green Bay Packers organization and the Canadian Football League's Montreal Alouettes.

Ento is one of three players Martin coached who have worked their way into professional football, joining running back/wide receiver Antonio Gibson (Washington Commanders, New England Patriots) and wide receiver John Hurst (Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Los Angeles Chargers).



MAURICE STEWART

RUNNING BACKS

In his second season on the Northwestern State coaching staff, Maurice Stewart returns to a familiar role — coaching wide receivers.

Stewart, who came to Natchitoches from Belhaven with head coach Blaine McCorkle, spent the 2024 season as the Demons' running backs coach.

His return to the wide receiver room brings him back to the final position he coached on McCorkle's Belhaven staff.

Stewart spent the 2023 season coaching wide receivers at Belhaven. In his lone season in that role, Stewart helped mold Jacobey James-Grace into a second-team all-conference selection after James Grace averaged 17.9 yards per catch and tallied five touchdown grabs.

Stewart spent the 2021 and 2022 seasons as Belhaven's defensive graduate assistant, helping 11 players notch All-American Southwest Conference honors in that time frame.

Prior to returning to his alma mater, Stewart spent two seasons at Millsaps College, coaching wide receivers and serving as the Majors' video coordinator.

A standout defensive back at Belhaven from 2015-18, Stewart tallied 114 career tackles in 37 games.



KENDRICK VAN ACKEREN

DEFENSIVE BACKS

A youthful coach who quickly has climbed the ranks in his profession, Kendrick Van Akeren is in his first season at Northwestern State, coaching defensive backs.

Van Akeren spent the past two seasons as the defensive coordinator at Arkansas Tech where he also coached defensive backs and linebackers.

While with the Wonder Boys, Van Akeren coached six all-conference players in the 2024 season, three times as many all-conference honorees as Arkansas Tech had two years prior. Van Akeren also oversaw a defense that improved statistically in scoring defense (plus-12), total defense (138 fewer yards), third-down conversion rate (nine percent improvement), fourth-down conversion rate (18 percent improvement) and a seven-sack improvement.

In 2024, Van Akeren's defense ranked in the top 42 nationally in pass defense (6th), fourth-down conversion rate (T-19th), pass efficiency defense (26th), touchdowns allowed (T-27th) and total defense (42nd).

Van Akeren spent the 2022 season as the defensive back coach and co-special teams coordinator at Colorado State Pueblo where he coached Daniel Bone to an All-American selection. In addition to Bone, Van Akeren coached a pair of first-team All-Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference selections.

The ThunderWolves led the RMAC in interceptions (19), passing yards per game (202.3) and passing defense efficiency (113.8). CSU Pueblo ranked second in the nation in interceptions and was fourth in yards per completion allowed (9.79).

Prior to his season at CSU Pueblo, Van Akeren spent five seasons at Oregon State in a variety of positions, including the interim outside linebackers coach. During the 2021 season, Oregon State finished in the top three in the Pac-12 in scoring defense, yards allowed per game, passing yards allowed per game, rushing yards allowed per game and interceptions.



JUSTIN WILLIAMSON

LINEBACKERS

In his second season on the Northwestern State coaching staff, Justin Williamson brings a unique understanding of first-year head coach Blaine McCorkle.

Williamson played at Richmond during McCorkle's time on staff with the Spiders before Williamson joined the Belhaven staff as the special teams coordinator and linebackers coach in 2023. He will serve in the

same role at Northwestern State.

In his lone season at Belhaven, Williamson tutored first-team All-USA South Conference linebacker Wyatt Beck, who recorded 49 tackles (11.5 for loss) and two sacks as the Blazers collected the program's first conference championship.

Williamson also coached first-team all-conference and all-region punter Andrew Norton, who averaged nearly 43 yards per boot and had four 50-yard or longer punts, including a career-long 68-yarder in a win against Lyon College.

Ahead of coming to Belhaven, Williamson spent two seasons as the defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator at Bridgewater College, a Division III program in Bridgewater, Virginia.

Under Williamson, the Eagles went 9-1 in 2022 and led the Old Dominion Athletic Conference with 31 sacks. In two seasons at Bridgewater, Williamson coached three ODAC all-conference honorees.

Williamson began his coaching career at Norfolk State, spending four seasons with the Spartans — the final three as the defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator. He started his Norfolk State career as the tight ends coach in 2017.

As a player, Williamson was a third-team All-CAA selection as a senior defensive lineman after recording nine tackles for loss and seven sacks for the Spiders.

He and his wife, Marquenette, are expecting their first child in late July.



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JAMES T. GENOVESE

Northwestern State President

Northwestern State University President James Genovese is a native of Opelousas who previously served as an associate justice on the Louisiana Supreme Court. He was named NSU's 21st president on July 18, 2024.

Genovese graduated from the Academy of the Immaculate Conception in Opelousas in 1967 and earned a Bachelor of Arts degree from Northwestern State University in 1971. He received a juris doctorate from Loyola University in New Orleans in 1974 with honors in property law.

Genovese practiced law in Acadiana from 1974-1995 and was past president, vice president and secretary-treasurer of the

St. Landry Parish Bar Association. He is a member of the Louisiana Bar Association, Colorado Bar Association and American Bar Association. He is admitted to the bar in all state and federal courts in Louisiana, including the United States Supreme Court.

Genovese's judicial career began as a judge ad hoc of the Opelousas City Court from 1975-1989. He was elected district judge of the 27th Judicial District Court for St. Landry Parish in 1995 and served as district judge through 2004, whereupon he was elected to the Louisiana Third Circuit Court of Appeal. He served on the appellate court from 2005-2016. He was elected Associate Justice of the Louisiana Supreme Court, commencing January 1, 2017.

Genovese has been a panelist, speaker and lecturer at conferences and continuing education seminars on topics such as professionalism, ethics, summary judgment, writs, appeals, practices and procedures of the Louisiana Third Circuit Court of Appeal.

He served on the Louisiana Supreme Court's Judicial Council Appellate Court Work Point Values Working Group and the Trial Court Committee to Review the Need for Judgeships and as chairman of its Long-Term Subcommittee. He was the Supreme Court's appointee to the Juvenile Justice Reform Act Implementation Commission. He is a board member of the Supreme Court of Louisiana Historical Society.

As an undergraduate at NSU, Genovese was a four-year letterman in tennis at No. 1 Singles and Doubles. He was named to Who's Who Among Universities and Colleges, Who's Who Among Greek Fraternities and Sororities of America and Outstanding College Athletes of America. He was also president of Tau Kappa Epsilon Fraternity and involved with Interfraternity Council, Student Government Association and intramurals. Genovese was inducted into the Long Purple Line, NSU's alumni hall of distinction, in 2018.

Genovese is married to Martha Anne Janes, who also attended Northwestern State, and is the father of four daughters, Celeste, Stephanie, Adrienne and Sarah, and a stepdaughter, Elizabeth. He is the grandfather of four.

KEVIN BOSTIAN

Director of Athletics

Kevin Bostian took control of the Northwestern State athletic department in February 2022, three weeks after being named NSU's new Director of Athletics.

Regarded as a team builder with an innate ability to raise funds, Bostian came to Natchitoches after nearly two years at UNC Greensboro, serving as the Spartans' executive associate athletic director for development.

While at UNCG, the 43-year-old Bostian had the athletic department on pace for its highest fundraising year in school history. In his final full year at UNCG, the athletic department raised \$1.8 million in funds, surpassing its goal by 50 percent.

Throughout his nearly two-decade long career in college athletic administration, Bostian has consistently surpassed his goals and currently has UNCG on pace for its highest fundraising year in school history in the 2022 fiscal year. In his first year with the Spartans, UNCG athletics raised \$1.8 million in funds for the department, surpassing their goal by 50 percent.

He also oversaw the UNCG athletics ticketing, marketing and promotions and athletics communications offices and was the sports administrator for the UNCG men's basketball team, which won the Southern Conference regular-season and tournament championships and reached the NCAA Tournament.

In addition to his role in the external operations department, Bostian served as the interim athletic director at UNCG from September 2021 through earlier this month.

Before coming to UNCG, Bostian was a major gifts officer at his alma mater, North Carolina State. As the officer in charge of gifts of more than \$50,000, Bostian secured nearly \$2.5 million in gifts in his 25 months with The Wolfpack Club.

Prior to his arrival at NC State, Bostian spent almost four years as Georgia Southern's senior associate athletic director and executive director of the athletic foundation where he increased the athletic department's revenue three straight years and helped cultivate a record number of donors four straight years. While at Georgia Southern, Bostian secured the second-largest cash gift in the department's history and helped GSU push its athletic revenue to \$3.909 million during the 2017 fiscal year.

A veteran of mid-major college athletics, Bostian spent more than three years at Tennessee Tech as its associate athletic director for development, serving as the department's chief fundraiser. Bostian secured the largest gift in Tennessee Tech athletics history, maintained a portfolio of more than 200 donors and increased total donor revenue by 80 percent, total number of donors by more than 77 percent and total number of major gifts by 58 percent.

Bostian spent nearly seven years at East Tennessee State in Johnson City, Tennessee, starting as a marketing, promotions, merchandise and licensing coordinator before moving into the director of corporate sales, marketing and regional athletic advancement position. He then spent three years as ETSU's assistant athletic director of corporate development and regional athletic advancement.

In his time as the assistant athletic director, Bostian increased corporate sponsorship cash revenue and total revenue all three years and overall boosted cash revenue by 69 percent and total revenue by 47.6 percent. He developed, implemented and solicited donors on a capital campaign for a new weight room and a phase of the baseball stadium project at ETSU.

Bostian began his athletic administration career as a marketing specialist at South Alabama and spent a year as the sports marketing coordinator at the Gwinnett County Sports Commission in metro Atlanta.

A 2000 magna cum laude graduate of North Carolina State in business management, Bostian earned his master's of business administration and master's of sports administration from Ohio University in 2002.

He and his wife, Megan, have three children, Ayla, Zoe and Piper.

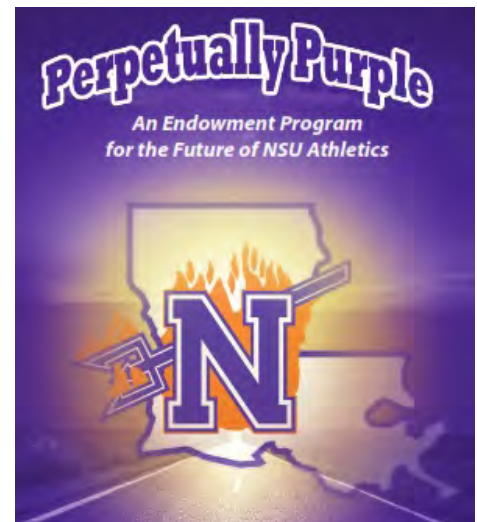
