# 2005 NSU MEN'S SOCCER MEDIA GUIDE

## OVERVIEW

The Sports Information Department provides a variety of services to the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics and the news media. Sports information duties include keeping accurate statistical data of each athletic event and providing publications for each team such as media guides, game programs, schedule posters, schedule cards and press releases. The department has won numerous awards for its media guides in recent years.

In addition, the Sports Information Department organizes game-day operations and provides information to the local and national news media and to the student-athletes' hometowns. A member of the NSU sports information staff will be present at home games and will travel with NSU teams for road contests.

## ATHLETICS WEB SITE

The Sports Information Department maintains, creates and manages all editorial, statistical and biographical content for the official NSU Athletics Web site. The NSU Athletics Web site can be accessed on the Internet at <http://nsuathletics.nova.edu>. The NSU Athletics Web site also provides cutting-edge multimedia features such as live audio broadcasts of select NSU athletic events and functions as well as live statistical information during select home games. A complete audio broadcast schedule, as well as archived broadcasts of past events, can be viewed on the NSU Athletics Web site through the following link: <http://nsuathletics.nova.edu/statistics/liveaudio.cfm>.

## KNIGHTLINE

The Sports Information Department also publishes *KNIGHTLINE*, a free, weekly NSU Department of Athletics email newsletter that can be subscribed to on the official NSU Athletics Web site. *KNIGHTLINE* provides NSU fans with interesting, informative and timely weekly headlines; player/coach features; game recaps; game previews; information on upcoming special events and promotions; and many other newsworthy items. *KNIGHTLINE* also selects a "Player of the Week" to honor student-athletes whose performances have been pivotal to the success of their respective teams.

## CREDENTIALS

Members of the working press, electronic media and other news agencies can request credentials to cover NSU athletic events by calling the NSU Sports Information Department at least 24 hours prior to game time. Accredited photographers and Electronic News Gathering (ENG) crews may shoot from designated areas at all events.

## STATISTICS/MEDIA SERVICES

Media guides, programs, fact sheets and cumulative statistics will be furnished to the working media prior to game time. Complete statistical information will be available to the media at the conclusion of all NSU home athletic events. Telephones and a fax machine are available for use in the athletics offices. Please contact a member of the sports information staff to request use of this service.

## INTERVIEWS

All one-on-one interviews with Nova Southeastern University players and coaches should be scheduled through the NSU Sports Information Department. Please provide at least 24 hours advance notice to allow interview arrangements to be made. Interviews at the conclusion of all home games will be held after a brief cooling-off period. Any requests for visiting team interviews should be made through the visiting team's sports information representative. If one is not present, the NSU sports information staff will assist with visiting team interview needs.

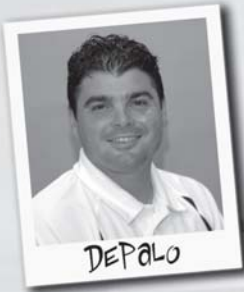

Since taking over the program in December of 1998, DePalo has become the winningest coach in NSU men's soccer history, with an overall record of 78-35-10. In addition, DePalo's career-winning percentage of 67.5 percent ranks him in the top-25 among active NCAA Division II coaches.

In 2004, DePalo's NSU team posted a 15-4-1 record, matching the program record for most victories in a season. The team also moved as high as ninth in the NSCAA/adidas national poll during the 2004 campaign. It was the second consecutive season that NSU ranked as high as ninth in the national poll, the highest ever ranking for the program at the NCAA Division II level. NSU was also ranked second in the South Region, marking the highest regional ranking in program history.

Among the highlights of the 2004 season was a 3-2 win over defending NCAA National Champion Lynn University, as well as NSU's first-ever conference tournament final appearance. The Knights finished the regular season as SSC runner-up in just their first year of full competition within the conference.

Individually, junior midfielder Matthew Parry was named an NSCAA/adidas Second Team All-American, becoming the first player in program history to earn All-American status in NCAA competition. Junior forward Adam Ludden was named the 2004 Sunshine State Conference Player of the Year. NSU led all SSC schools with a total of eight All-Conference team selections in 2004. Ludden became DePalo's third conference (NAIA and NCAA) Player of the Year award winner.

In 2002, NSU's 1-0 home shutout of Flagler College (11/09/02) was coach DePalo's 51st career win, making him the winningest coach in NSU men's soccer history. DePalo surpassed Thomas Rongen who held a 50-35-6 record from 1991–1995.

During the 2000 and 2001 seasons, the Knights finished nationally ranked in the final NSCAA poll (21st in 2000, and 19th in 2001). During his first two seasons, DePalo helped guide the squad to back-to-back Regional Championships. He has also led the Knights to two consecutive NAIA National Tournament appearances, which were only the second and third such appearances in the 21-year history of the program. For his efforts, DePalo was named Florida Sun Conference Coach of the Year in 2001, and Region XIV Coach of the Year in 2000.

Formerly an assistant coach at Embry-Riddle University in Daytona Beach, DePalo was instrumental in helping the team capture the 1998 Florida Sun Conference Championship, en route to appearing in the NAIA Southeast Regional Final.

Born and raised in Milan, Italy, DePalo attended perennial NCAA Division II soccer power Franklin Pierce in New

Hampshire. While there, he helped lead the Ravens to back-to-back NCAA tournament appearances in 1993 and 1994.

Upon graduating from Franklin Pierce in 1995, with a degree in International Business, he signed with the Connecticut Wolves of the USL. While with Connecticut, he appeared in the 1995 U.S. Open Cup Tournament. After two years with the Wolves, DePalo spent time with the Canton Invaders and Tampa Bay Terror of the NPSL, as well as the Albany Alleycats and New Hampshire Phantoms of the USL.

Additionally, DePalo is heavily involved in the community as a coach for the Weston Soccer Club U-14 boys. He has also been involved as a coach and director for 13 years with Soccer Extreme Inc., a soccer school based in Connecticut.

DePalo currently holds a USSF "A" License, as well as an Advanced National License from the NSCAA.

He resides in Weston, Fla., with his wife, Kathryn, and five-year-old daughter, Bianca.

ASSISTANT COACH • SEVENTH SEASON AT NSU

Leo Vega returns for his seventh year on the NSU men's soccer coaching staff. He is mainly responsible for match day tactical analysis.

Vega has an extensive playing and coaching background. He began his playing career in 1974 with Danubio FC of Uruguay. After one season, he spent two additional years with world-renowned Club Atletico Penarol. He then closed out his playing career by captaining two other Uruguayan clubs (Alto Peru and Club Atletico Rentistas).

Since moving to South Florida, he has been a fixture on the local scene, winning the prestigious Superclubs U-19, and the Gold Coast Soccer Championship with numerous clubs.

He is a devout supporter of Argentine super club River Plate of Buenos Aires, Argentina.



## DAVE SIMEONE

ASSISTANT COACH • FIRST SEASON AT NSU

Dave Simeone was named an assistant coach for the men's soccer team in June 2005. He is currently serving as the Technical Director at Weston Soccer Club in Weston, Fla., and has a wealth of knowledge and experience in the coaching ranks with the U.S. Women's National Team and various youth organizations in Texas and Florida.

Prior to coming to Weston, Simeone was the National Staff Coach for the U.S. Women's National Team Program from 1999–2004. His responsibilities with the National Team included player development ranking from the U.S. Senior and Youth National Teams to club soccer.

Simeone has also served as the director of coaching and player development for both the North Texas State Soccer Association and the South Texas Youth Soccer Association. While with these organizations, he developed curriculum for state coaching programs to develop staff and influence recreational and competitive player development.

He began his coaching career in 1983 as an assistant coach with Midwestern State University, moving from a graduate assistant to a full-time assistant. He then became head men's and women's soccer coach at Huntingdon College. Simeone was also an assistant coach with the Orlando Lions of the American Professional Soccer League. He helped in coordinating youth development services and programming, as well.

Simeone holds a USSF "A" Coaching License and a National Youth License, as well as an NSCAA-National Diploma.

## 2005 NSU MEN'S SOCCER OUTLOOK

The 2005 NSU men's soccer team will feature a total of seven new faces that will join the 16 returning players from last year's 15-4-1 team. Among the returners are 2004 NSCAA/adidas Second Team All-American Matthew Parry and 2004 SSC Player of the Year Adam Ludden, both of whom will be entering their senior seasons with the Knights. Also entering their senior seasons will be midfielders Secquay Gordon and Gabe Ocampo.

A season after finishing as conference runner-up in the regular season and in the SSC Tournament, head coach Giuseppe DePalo's side was ranked third behind defending SSC Tournament Champion Lynn University and second-place Rollins College, who won the 2004 SSC regular season title.

"If we stay healthy throughout the 2005 season, we have a real opportunity to be where we want to be by the end of the year," DePalo said. "We are optimistic that we can be as good as last year, if not better. Our goals are the same as every year, and we hope that we can win the league and advance to the NCAA Tournament."

## 2004 SEASON IN REVIEW

The NSU men's soccer team enjoyed one of the most successful seasons in program history in 2004, tying the program record for most wins in a season with a 15-4-1 mark for the second time in three seasons. Among the highlights of the 2004 season were a 3-2 win over defending NCAA Division II National Champion Lynn University and road victories over NCAA Tournament qualifiers Franklin Pierce University and the University of Central Arkansas.

NSU began the season with five straight victories, including the key wins over Franklin Pierce and Central Arkansas. After a pair of losses, the Knights went the next eight games without a loss. This included a program record-tying seven-game winning streak.

The Knights, competing for the first time in the Sunshine State Conference, made conference foes well aware that they were a force to be reckoned with, finishing as regular season runner-up with a 5-2-1 record in the SSC. NSU then posted wins over the University of Tampa and Barry University en route to the SSC Tournament Final, eventually falling 2-1 to champion Lynn University.

NSU was ranked as high as ninth nationally, matching the highest ranking in NSU men's soccer history, and finished the year ranked 15th in the NSCAA/adidas national poll. In addition, the Knights finished the season ranked second in the extremely competitive NCAA South Region, narrowly missing out on a spot in the NCAA National Tournament.

As a result of the success of the 2004 team, many individuals on the NSU men's soccer team received recognition for their play. Junior midfielder **Matthew Parry** was named to the NSCAA/adidas All-America Second Team, becoming the first NCAA All-American in men's soccer history. Parry was also a First Team All-South Region selection, along with **Adam Ludden**, while **Lorcan Cronin** was named to the All-South Region Second Team.

Ludden became the first NSU student-athlete to be named a conference player of the year. He was named SSC Player of the Year following a career season that saw him set personal career-highs in goals (18), assists (3), points (39) and game-winning goals (6).

In all, NSU led all conference schools with a total of eight student-athletes named to the 2004 All-Sunshine State Conference Men's Soccer Team (three First Team: Ludden, Parry and **Tom Gillette**; three Second Team: Cronin, **Joseph Clancy** and **Rasmus Jespersen**; and two Honorable Mention: **Andrew Morris** and **Jarod Rennick**).

Ludden and Gillette were also honored for their efforts in the classroom. Both were selected for the NSCAA/adidas Scholar All-Region teams, as well as the CoSIDA Academic All-District III Second Team. Ludden was a first team Scholar All-Region selection, while Gillette was an honorable mention selection for the second straight year.

Currently one of the most competitive and respected conferences in NCAA Division II, the Sunshine State Conference (SSC) was founded in 1975. SSC schools captured four national championships in 2004–05 and have earned a total of 61 national championships overall.

The Sunshine State Conference has developed from a basketball organization into the NCAA Division II "Conference of National Champions." Since its inception, the conference has grown steadily in sports played, membership and national prominence.

Sunshine State Conference teams have won NCAA Division II national championships in baseball, men's basketball, men's and women's golf, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's tennis and volleyball.

The SSC sponsors championships in 14 sports for men and women: baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's golf, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's tennis, women's rowing and volleyball.

Nova Southeastern University was officially granted membership status in the Sunshine State Conference in August 2002. Other SSC members—all in Florida—are Barry University (Miami Shores), Eckerd College (St. Petersburg), Florida Tech (Melbourne), Florida Southern College (Lakeland), Lynn University (Boca Raton), Rollins College (Winter Park), Saint Leo University (Saint Leo) and the University of Tampa (Tampa).

Numerous All-Americans, Academic All-Americans and future professional athletes have attended conference institutions. The SSC is respected for its academic foresight, setting standards that were later adopted by the NCAA.

## NATIONAL COLLEGIATE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) is the organization through which the nation's colleges and universities speak and act on athletic matters at the national level. It is a voluntary association of approximately 1,200 institutions, conferences, organizations and individuals devoted to the sound administration of intercollegiate athletics.

Through the NCAA, member colleges consider any athletics problem that crosses regional or conference lines and has become national in character. The association strives to maintain intercollegiate athletics as an integral part of the educational program and the athlete as an integral part of the student body. The NCAA also stands for good conduct in intercollegiate athletics and serves as the colleges' national athletics accrediting agency.

The NCAA has grown dramatically in the past 50 years, with more than 600 new members since 1950.

**NCAA DIVISION II**

Division II institutions have to sponsor at least four sports for men and four for women, with two team sports for each gender, and each playing season represented by each gender. There are contest and participant minimums for each sport, as well as scheduling criteria—football and men's and women's basketball teams must play at least 50 percent of their games against Division II or I-A or I-AA opponents.

For sports other than football and basketball, there are no scheduling requirements. There are no attendance requirements or arena game requirements for basketball. There are maximum financial aid awards for each sport that a Division II school must not exceed. Division II teams usually feature a number of local or in-state student-athletes. Many Division II student-athletes pay for school through a combination of scholarship money, grants, student loans and employment earnings. Division II athletics programs are financed in the institution's budget like other academic departments on campus. Traditional rivalries with regional institutions dominate schedules of many Division II athletics programs.

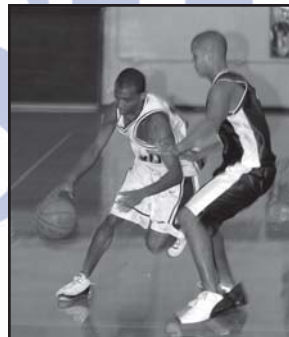

**MICHAEL MOMINEY**

Michael Mominey was promoted to director of intercollegiate athletics at Nova Southeastern University on July 1, 2003, after serving in the capacity of interim director since January 2, 2002. He has led the NSU Department of Athletics into a historic and defining era, as NSU began its first year of competition in NCAA Division II in 2002 and in the Sunshine State Conference in 2004. In addition to leading the athletic program during its transition into the NCAA, Mominey has added three intercollegiate programs during his tenure (women's rowing, women's tennis and men's cross country) while the student-athlete population increased from 160 in 2002 to over 230 projected this academic year. The departmental grade point average for all student-athletes since January of 2002 has consistently been above 3.0 for five consecutive semesters, with the 2005 winter semester GPA reaching an all-time high at 3.2.

Mominey has been instrumental in the design, development, planning and programming for the soon-to-be completed University Center (May 2006). The more than 300,000-square-foot facility will serve as a home for the intercollegiate athletic program, student recreation and wellness programs and a performing arts program. This venue will serve as the home to the men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball programs. Also included in the building will be a sports medicine and rehab center, a weight room/fitness room, team specific locker rooms, a student-athlete lounge, The Student Union, a cafeteria and a performing arts theater with rehearsal rooms.

"We have been very fortunate to have had the success with our program at such early stages of our membership in the NCAA and the Sunshine State Conference. We have great support from our administration, which has allowed us to progress so quickly, always maintaining the ideals of developing the student-athlete" said Mominey. "I look forward to continuing to challenge our student-athletes, coaches and staff members to be the best they can be in hopes of building the traditions that serve as the foundation of a well-respected and nationally recognized athletic program. This year will continue to be an exciting and history-making era for NSU and our athletic program."

Mominey is a member of the Orange Bowl Committee (elected November 2004), and serves on various committees throughout the community and on campus. He is also on the Sunshine State Conference marketing and officials committees and is the Division II representative on the NIKE Baseball Advisory Board.

With more than 10 years of experience in athletic administration in the professional, collegiate and scholastic ranks, Mominey served as the athletic director at Chaminade-Madonna College Preparatory in Hollywood, Fla., from 1996–2000. He also served as the assistant director of athletics at St. Thomas University from 1992–1996.

Prior to relocating to South Florida, Mominey was the assistant to player development and scouting for the Cleveland Indians Baseball Club from 1990–1992 and worked as an associate scout for the Tribe from 1993–1996. While working in the front office of the major league club, he was directly involved in the day-to-day operations of the scouting and player development departments under current Major League general managers John Hart (Texas Rangers) and Dan O'Dowd (Colorado Rockies).

Mominey is also the head coach of NSU's nationally ranked baseball program, where he was originally employed at NSU on August 1, 2000. The baseball program posted a 32-21 record in 2005. The team was ranked as high as 15th in the NCAA Division II national poll. The baseball team has been consistently ranked in the top 10 in the South Region for the past four seasons, finishing as high as 5th in two of the four years of NCAA play, narrowly missing out on a bid to the NCAA Division II tournament in each of those two years.

Mominey graduated from St. Thomas University in 1994 with a master's degree in sports administration and from Bowling Green University (OH) in 1990 with a bachelor's degree in education/sport management.

He resides in Davie, Fla., with his wife, Denise, and children Tyler and Alexa.

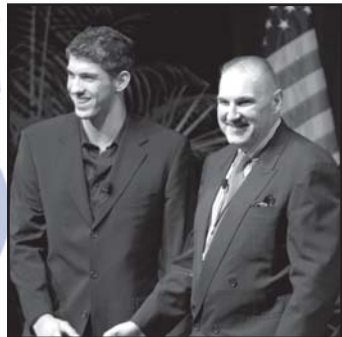

A former member of the National Association of Academic Advisers for Athletics (N4A), Cavanaugh chaired that organization's Committee on Student-Athlete Concerns for four years, beginning in 1993.

He has published and spoken widely on the personal development of collegiate student-athletes. His research areas include the study of consciousness, as well as human performance factors, especially as they relate to highly skilled activities such as athletics and music.

A musician himself, Cavanaugh is an arranger, conductor, pianist and composer, regularly writing for collegiate bands, choral groups and professional symphony orchestras. He has recently conducted and recorded with the Bohuslav Martinu Philharmonic Orchestra in the Czech Republic.

On campus, Cavanaugh is the host of the popular "Life 101" series, which brings noteworthy people to NSU for the purpose of sharing their insights and experiences with the university community. A popular master of ceremonies, he also hosts the annual Student Life Achievement Awards, at which the university recognizes campus-wide excellence and service.

## NSU DEPARTMENT OF ATHLETICS ♦ ATHLETICS HISTORY

## TIMELINE

- 1980 To boost the limited undergraduate enrollment at its Davie Campus, the NSU President, Abe Fischler, and the Board of Trustees looked to try something new, build a sports program. Nova University had a graduate school enrollment of about 7,000 students, with nontraditional, field-based programs scattered in 22 states, offering limited graduate and undergraduate degree programs on campus.
- 1981 Charles "Sonny" Hansley is named director of athletics of the first-ever athletic department at Nova University.
- Fall 1982 Nova University finds a nickname. Mike Turpek, formerly the director of athletics at the University School, comes up with "Knights" and wins an ocean cruise. The contest to come up with the school's nickname was open to the general public. Eight people in the area submitted the name "Knights", but Turpek was chosen the winner after his name was pulled out of a hat.
- 1982-83 The first year of competition in the athletic department begins with men's basketball. Under head coach Sonny Hansley, basketball begins as an independent program, not affiliated with any conference.
- Fall 1984 Nova University becomes a member of the National Little College Athletic Association (NLCAA).
- 1984-85 Nova University adds men's soccer, women's volleyball and men's and women's cross country.
- Fall 1985 Nova University joins the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). Undergraduate enrollment at this time is 222.
- Nov. 6, 1986 Nova University's men's soccer team beats Berry (Georgia) 1-0, capturing the 1986 District 25 Championship.
- Fall 1986 Dag Cohen (Fr., Borgholm, Sweden), a midfielder for Nova University's men's soccer team, is named an All-American by the National Soccer Coaches Association. Cohen is the first Nova athlete, in any sport, to be so honored.
- Fall 1987 Nova University adds baseball, women's tennis and men's golf as the undergraduate population increases to 1,000 students.
- May 7, 1988 Nova University's baseball team advances to the championship of the NAIA District 25 State Tournament, after defeating Flagler College 17-15 in the semifinals.
- Fall 1988 Nova University's volleyball team captures its third consecutive District 25 Volleyball Championship and finishes the year with an 18-6 record. Senior Margie Avila was named District 25 MVP. Also, Nova University hosts the NAIA 30th Annual National Soccer Championships. Men's soccer head coach Hal Henderson is inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame for his meritorious service to the association.
- 1989 Mark Cavanaugh, Ph.D., is appointed as the faculty athletic representative for Nova Athletics.
- 1990-91 Nova University joins with seven other NAIA schools (Flagler College, Webber College, St. Thomas University, Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, Palm Beach Atlantic College, Warner Southern College and Florida Memorial College) to form the FIAC (Florida Intercollegiate Athletic Conference). Nova has an undergraduate population of more than 3,200 students. Men's soccer wins its first-ever FIAC championship, earning a berth in the District 25 Tournament for the sixth straight year.
- 1992 FIAC is changed to the Florida Sun Conference (FSC). Nova University is now a member of District 7 and has a new president, Stephen Feldman, Ph.D.
- 1993 Nova adds softball as its fourth intercollegiate women's sport.
- 1994 Nova University and Southeastern University of the Health Sciences merge to form Nova Southeastern University. NSU has a new president, Ovid Lewis, Ph.D.
- 1995 The NSU Athletic Department begins exploring possible NCAA membership, behind newly-appointed director of athletics, Corey Johnson.
- 1998 Ray Ferrero, Jr., is named president of Nova Southeastern University.
- January 2002 Michael Mominney is named interim director of athletics for NSU.
- August 2002 NSU is granted full membership in the NCAA Division II. NSU also begins provisional membership in the Sunshine State Conference (to last three seasons), joining eight other institutions (Barry University, Eckerd College, Florida Institute of Technology, Florida Southern College, Lynn University, Rollins College, Saint Leo University and the University of Tampa).
- May 2003 NSU baseball pitcher Kyle Ruwe becomes the athletic program's first NCAA All-American, as he is named to the ABCA/Rawlings All-American Second Team.
- July 2003 Michael Mominney is promoted to director of athletics at NSU and adds women's rowing, while reinstating men's cross country and women's tennis.

# 2005 NSU MEN'S SOCCER MEDIA GUIDE

- April 21, 2004 Groundbreaking takes place for the state-of-the-art 366,000-square-foot University Center. Its 5,000-seat arena will be the home venue for the NSU men's and women's basketball teams and the women's volleyball team.
- May 2004 NSU's Jennifer Rembe of the women's rowing team becomes NSU's first female NCAA All-American, as the Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association names the 6 seat to the First Team.
- The NSU women's rowing team qualifies for the NCAA Division II Rowing Nationals in its first year of competition. The varsity 8+ boat defeats Barry University to capture the Petite Final and finish fourth in the final national rankings.
- August 2004 NSU is approved for advancement in its third and final year of provisional membership by the SSC. NSU athletic teams are now eligible to compete for SSC championships and awards.
- November 2004 NSU men's soccer player Adam Ludden becomes the first NSU athlete to be named as an SSC Player of the Year.
- Dec. 13, 2004 NSU men's soccer player Matthew Parry is named NCAA Second Team All-American by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America.
- March 2005 NSU women's basketball head coach Marilyn Rule becomes the first NSU head coach to be named SSC Coach of the Year.
- April 2005 The NSU men's golf team captures the first SSC Championship in program history, with a 16-stroke victory at the SSC Men's Golf Championship.
- May 2005 The NSU women's rowing team becomes the first SSC school to finish as high as third in the nation, while competing in the 2005 NCAA Division II Nationals in Sacramento, Calif. NSU posted a second place finish by its varsity 8+ boat and a fourth place finish by its varsity 4+ boat to finish just one point behind defending national champion Mercyhurst.
- Women's rower Katrena Bonilla is named NCAA First Team All-American by the CRCA.
- NSU men's golfer Martin Styf is named SSC Freshman of the Year.
- June 2005 Pitcher Derek Antelo became the first NSU baseball player to be selected in the top-10 rounds of the Major League Baseball Draft. Antelo is chosen by the Pittsburgh Pirates in the 10th round of the June 2005 MLB Draft. After posting a perfect 11-0 season on the hill, Antelo was named the SSC Pitcher of the Year, South Region Pitcher of the Year and an NCAA First Team All-American by the ABCA.

**NSU SOCCER COMPLEX**

The NSU Soccer Complex consists of one practice field and one game field. The game field is home for both the men's and women's soccer teams. Both fields come equipped with lights that allow for night practices and games. The game field features state-of-the-art grandstand seating with capacity for 1,000 spectators. The stadium-style seating is the newest addition to the complex, which was built prior to the 2000 season. The U.S. Women's National Soccer Team and several MLS teams, including the Miami Fusion, have all used the NSU soccer complex as their training site. The Orange Bowl Committee has entered into an agreement to use the NSU Soccer Complex as the official training site for one of its participants, beginning with the 2003 FedEx Orange Bowl. Most recently, the 2004 National Champion University of Southern California used NSU's Soccer Complex to prepare for the BCS National Championship game.

**NSU BASEBALL COMPLEX**

The NSU Baseball Complex is considered by many to be one of the finest baseball facilities in South Florida. This fully-lit complex features an immaculate playing field with two outdoor batting cages. Prior to the 2001 season, NSU added a fully functional press box and grandstand seating that accommodates 500 people. The NSU Baseball Complex is the site of The Frontier Independent Baseball League's annual player combine and Major League Baseball pre-draft tryouts.

**A.D. GRIFFIN SPORTS COMPLEX**

The A.D. Griffin Sports Complex is home to the NSU softball team. This complex features two practice fields and one game field. All fields are equipped with lights that allow for night practices and games. The main game field overlooks NSU's Health Professions Division Building. In 2003, NSU added grandstand seating to fit up to 250 spectators. Located in the middle of the three fields is the press box area. The A.D. Griffin Sports Complex was named in honor of A.D. Griffin, Sr.

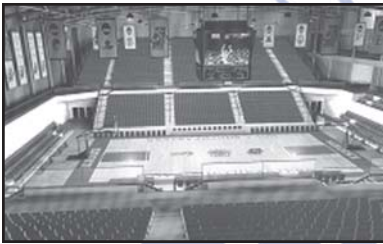
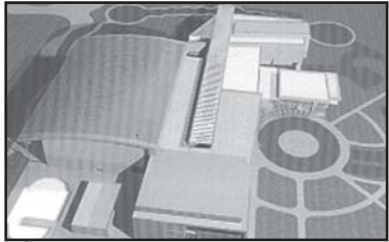
**GEORGE MAYER GYMNASIUM AND UNIVERSITY SCHOOL GYMNASIUM**

Volleyball and basketball games and practices are held in the George Mayer Gymnasium and in the University School Gymnasium. The George Mayer Gymnasium (capacity: 1,000) is located on Broward Community College's Central Campus in Davie, Fla. Indoor athletic events take place at BCC unless the gym is occupied by BCC athletic teams. When BCC's gym is unavailable, events take place in the University School Gymnasium, which is located on NSU's main campus in Davie.

## UNIVERSITY CENTER

NSU's state-of-the-art University Center is currently under construction, with a projected completion during the 2005–06 school year. The multipurpose facility will be the centerpiece of the main campus and will redefine NSU's relationship with students, faculty and staff members, and the South Florida community. The center will feature a student union, a wellness and fitness center, a performing arts venue and a convocation center/sports arena—the second largest of its kind in Broward County.

A community-wide venue, the University Center will combine NCAA Division II and recreational athletics, as well as serve as a place to enjoy the fine arts. The University Center will allow students, faculty members, and the community to attend sporting events, concerts and lectures. It will also serve as a host to local, national and international conferences. Nova Southeastern University's men's and women's basketball teams, as well as the women's volleyball team, will call the University Center their home court. Each of the 13 NSU intercollegiate sports teams will have team-specific locker rooms. NSU's Certified Athletic Training staff will also base its sports medicine services in the state-of-the-art facility.



## MIAMI DOLPHINS TRAINING FACILITY

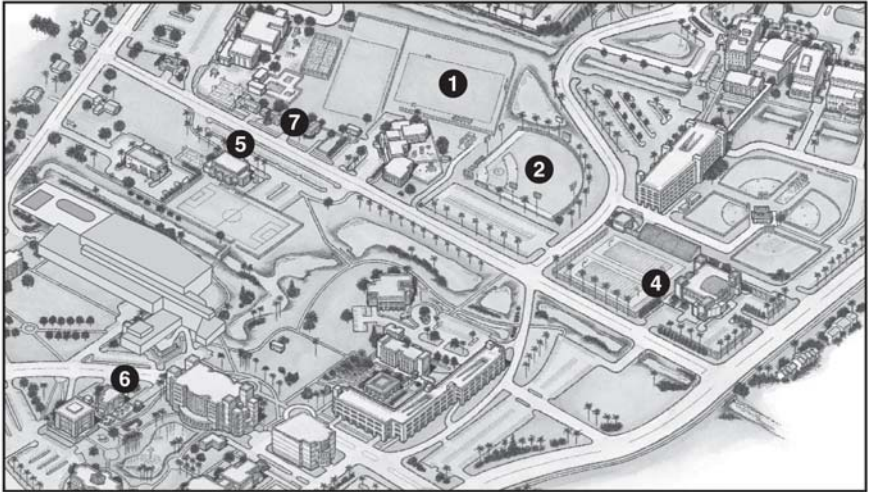
The Miami Dolphins Training Facility is located on the Nova Southeastern University main campus. Bow string trusses and a profile reminiscent of classic athletic facilities define this state-of-the-art training facility for the Miami Dolphins football team. It includes one of the largest weight rooms in the NFL, training rooms, locker rooms, a therapy swimming pool, a cold plunge pool, whirlpools, numerous administrative offices and a practice field. It also has a bleacher building that can accommodate 2,000 spectators. The 56,000-square-foot facility is frequently used as a prototype for other professional football teams.

**The Academic Program**

Nova Southeastern University's Farquhar College of Arts and Sciences offers a compelling undergraduate curriculum in athletic training. The dedicated faculty and staff members become excellent role models for athletic training students, while providing athletic training service to an NCAA Division II athletics program. The athletic training curriculum balances class instruction and clinical experience, preparing students to meet all requirements for the National Athletic Trainers' Association Board of Certification examination, contingent on program accreditation. ## LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

The 2004–05 school year marked several milestones for Nova Southeastern University. The Department of Athletics had another extremely successful year on the fields, courts and water, while competing in its third year as a member of the NCAA. NSU also finished its final year of provisional membership status in the Sunshine State Conference, which is one of the most respected conferences, both academically and athletically, in the country. The NSU women's rowing team took part in the NCAA Division II Rowing Championships for the second time in program history, finishing third in the nation overall. The men's golf team captured their first Sunshine State Conference Championship ever in April 2005.

In fall 2004, construction began for the new 366,000-square-foot University Center. This multiuse facility will be the centerpiece of NSU's 300-acre main campus and will serve as the home to our sports teams. The 5,500-seat convocation center/sports arena at the University Center will be the second largest of its kind in Broward County and will allow us to host special events, concerts and lectures, as well as local, national and international conferences. It will redefine the university's relationship with its students, administration, faculty and staff members, and the entire surrounding community.

The University Center, which is on track to be completed in May 2006, will also create a focal point for student life at NSU. The facility will serve as the new home to the university's student development and activities offices, career services, the student information center, card office, The Flight Deck Lounge, radio station and volunteer center. Its design incorporates a state-of-the-art health and fitness club, racquetball and squash courts, a gymnasium and a rock-climbing wall.

Our talented student-athletes balance NSU's rigorous academic demands with the vigorous environment of athletic training and competition. They embody the values of leadership, lifelong learning, and service to the community. The University Center will provide the student-athletes with the training facilities and space to continue to enhance these values.

Since I began my tenure as president of Nova Southeastern University eight years ago, I have remained steadfast in my goal: to continue to develop and refine quality education programs and prepare students for leadership positions and emerging challenges in the 21st century. Today, as the eighth largest independent, not-for-profit university in the United States, we are fulfilling that mission.

The student-athletes of Nova Southeastern University have shown great success in the classroom as well. The women's golf team posted the highest GPA of all NSU teams for the 2004–05 school year with a 3.5, while men's soccer and women's tennis finished with a combined 3.4 for the year. More than 90 student-athletes were named to the honor court, while 25 student-athletes were nominated for Academic All-American consideration. In addition, the overall grade point average for NSU student-athletes has been 3.0 or higher for the past five years.

Everyone associated with this university can take pride in the excellence we have achieved thus far, and look forward to an exciting future full of milestones. We will continue to seek and implement ways to better ourselves every day. And we will aim to surpass even our own high standards of excellence in academics, research, technology, athletics and community service.

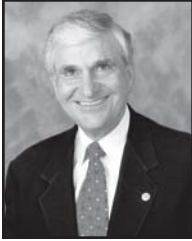

**GEORGE L. HANBURY II, PH.D.****EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT FOR ADMINISTRATION**

On September 1, 1998, George L. Hanbury II became the executive vice president for administration of Nova Southeastern University. Prior to his appointment as executive vice president, he had a career in municipal administration totaling more than 30 years, and was the chief executive officer (city manager), to Fort Lauderdale, Fla., and Portsmouth, Va., and Virginia Beach, Va. In addition, he was an assistant city manager in the cities of Norfolk and Virginia Beach.

Hanbury received his Ph.D. in public administration from Florida Atlantic University. He also holds a master's degree in public administration from Old Dominion University and a bachelor of science degree in business administration with a major in public administration from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University (Virginia Tech).

He has been certified through the Senior Executive Institute at the University of Virginia and was inducted into Pi Alpha Alpha, the national honor society for the field of public affairs and public administration.

**FRANK DE PIANO PH.D.****VICE PRESIDENT FOR ACADEMIC AFFAIRS**

Frank DePiano received his Ph.D. from the University of South Carolina in 1980. During his 25-plus years of academic experience, DePiano has participated in a number of national leadership roles including serving on the American Psychological Association's Board of Educational Affairs' Executive Committee, president of the Society of Psychological Hypnosis and chair of numerous accreditation site visits and national education task forces. Scholarly contributions include the publication of a book, book chapters and articles in referred journals. He has served as the editor-in-chief of three referred journals and as an editorial review board member for several journals. Currently, he serves as a book review editor for Haworth Press.

While at Nova Southeastern University, DePiano has served as the initial dean of the Center for Psychological Studies, the chair of the University Council of Deans, an associate dean in the recently formed College of Dental Medicine and the initial chair of the Criminal Justice Institute. He also participated in the launching of the day division undergraduate program. In working with the undergraduate program, DePiano assisted in the development of NSU Athletics and served as one of the inaugural coaches.

DePiano is now involved in developing the Academic Review at Nova Southeastern University, a rigorous degree review procedure that is intended to assist academic programs in attaining preeminence within their academic fields.

## NOVA SOUTHEASTERN UNIVERSITY ♦ OVERVIEW

**1960–1970**

When the first class of 17 graduate students enrolled in Nova University of Advanced Technology on Monday, September 25, 1967, the campus in Davie, Fla., still looked more like the abandoned naval airfield it had once been than like the campus of what aspired to be “the MIT of the South.” Only the Rosenthal Building had been completed. The shell of the Parker Building was under construction. The rest of the campus was barren, acre after acre of weeds and sand relieved here and there by some of the original tarmac.

With only one permanent building ready for occupancy on the 300-acre campus, after the formalities of registration and orientation, faculty members and students went to Rolling Hills Country Club for lunch. They then met in groups, based upon their areas of specialization. Science education students went back to Rosenthal; physics and chemistry students went to the university’s temporary laboratories in the 400 block of East Las Olas Boulevard; and oceanography students went to the houseboat laboratories at Southeast 15th Street.

Chartered by the state of Florida on December 4, 1964, by opening day 1967, Nova University boasted assets, contributions and pledges of \$10 million. A total of \$125,000 had been raised and paid to the federal government as an installment on what became the university's 300-acre campus. James Farquhar, the university's first chairman of the board, donated 100 acres adjacent to the campus—a gift valued in excess of \$500,000. Mr. and Mrs. W.C. Mather and the Bailey Foundation donated a 100-acre parcel of land in Hollywood valued at \$400,000. Ten acres at Port Everglades for the oceanographic laboratory were deeded to the university by the Broward County Commission.

The university represented a great hope for higher education in South Florida: an institution that would keep the best and the brightest at home and attract the most promising faculty members and students from around the country to a great seat of learning in a rapidly developing region of the United States. By stressing the importance of science and technology, it would provide the kind of leadership that was needed to help bring the United States into a competitive position in the conquest of space, the new frontier of the 1960s. Nova University would be in a position to provide fresh approaches to the process of teaching, learning and doing research. Nova could also serve as a catalyst in developing and implementing educational models that could be applied first to its neighboring schools, then nationwide.

University officials knew that from the opening day, all eyes would be focused on the faculty, the students and the campus. More time, energy and money had probably been invested in the first 17 students than had been spent on any other students in the United States. They had been selected from 250 applicants from all over the country. They were all doctoral students and had been given free tuition, as well as stipends of up to \$5,000 for living expenses. On top of that, it took 68 staff members, 17 faculty members and an annual budget of \$1.7 million to run the university that year.

**1970–1985**

In 1970, Nova University was given candidate status, and was later accredited (1971) by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS). Students continued to enroll and faculty members taught and engaged in research.

The economic model upon which the university was established committed it to an ongoing need for outside funding, research grants and private donations. On June 23, 1970, the board of trustees voted to enter into a federation with the New York Institute of Technology. Alexander Schure, president of NYIT, became chancellor of Nova University. Abraham S. Fischler became president. The university charter was amended and "of Advanced Technology" was dropped from its corporate name.

During the 15 years of the federation, the whole concept of Nova's student body, programs and campus changed. In addition to the students on the Davie campus, the university found student markets where it could, looking for ways to bring the campus to the student.

The university developed new programs and expanded beyond the limits of its campus and South Florida. Across the country, hundreds of adult, working professionals in school systems, government agencies and businesses were now able to earn advanced degrees without quitting their jobs and becoming full-time students. Few colleges and universities offered evening and weekend programs that fit their schedules. Nova had clearly found a market niche.

On campus, undergraduate evening programs began for adults, while the law school was opened in 1974. A host of master's degree programs in business, psychology and education continued to be developed.

In 1976, the university received a \$16-million gift from the estate of Leo Goodwin Sr., and began extensive campus and program expansion. Shortly after this, NSU dissolved its relationship with NYIT and began to create a board of trustees filled by South Florida community leaders, putting the stewardship of Nova back in the hands of its own local board.

### **1985 to Present**

The Nova University that emerged in 1985 was committed to incorporating new educational technologies, made possible by computers and telecommunications, into the teaching and learning process and into its delivery of education. A network of students online at their computers redefined what a classroom is. Communicating across time zones, linked to a professor who can be on campus or anywhere, students across the United States and even at international locations turn one-dimensional computer screens into fields for academic discussion.

In 1989, celebrating its 25th year, Nova University was enrolling more than 8,000 students and had nearly 25,000 graduates, with revenues of nearly \$70 million. Over the next five years, three new buildings were constructed and a campus-wide beautification campaign added landscaping that greatly changed the look of the campus.

In 1994, Nova University merged with Southeastern University of the Health Sciences to form Nova Southeastern University (NSU), adding the Colleges of Osteopathic Medicine, Pharmacy, Optometry and Allied Health to the university. The university continued its expansion of building projects and added new academic, clinical and community service programs.

By 1999, at the 35th anniversary, the university was enjoying an era of sustained growth, facilitated by a healthy infusion of endowment funds and a nearly 1,000-student increase in enrollment between fall 1998 and fall 1999. NSU's enrollment had increased approximately 42 percent; full-time members of the faculty, staff and administration expanded to almost 2,600; and minority representation among faculty and staff members and students continued to expand.

Since 2000, NSU has undergone dramatic growth in facility and building construction. The William and Norma Horvitz Administration Building is a 62,000-square-foot structure that houses the office of the president and numerous other administration departments for the university. The Alvin Sherman Library, Research, and Information Technology Center was completed in 2001 and is the largest public library in the state of Florida. The Carl DeSantis Building houses the H. Wayne Huizenga School of Business and Entrepreneurship and opened its doors in

2004. This \$33-million building is a 261,000-square-foot, five-story facility, which is also home to the Graduate School of Computer and Information Sciences. The current project on the board is the 366,000-square-foot University Center, scheduled for completion in 2006.

NSU is the largest independent institution of higher education in the Southeast and the eighth largest independent university nationally, with a fall 2004 enrollment of more than 25,000. It is the largest of the 67 independent institutions in Florida, with an operating budget of approximately \$355 million. To date, the institution has produced more than 79,000 alumni. Courses of study lead to associate's, bachelor's, master's, specialist and doctoral degrees. The university's programs are administered through academic centers that offer courses at the Fort Lauderdale campus, as well as at locations throughout Florida; across the nation; and at selected international sites in the Bahamas, Canada, the Dominican Republic, Greece, Jamaica, Mexico, Puerto Rico, the United Kingdom and Venezuela.
