

OHIO STATE'S FINEST FOOTBALL ERA

Although coaches and members of the 1971 Ohio State football team have no intention of permitting the streak of three straight Big Ten championships to be broken, Buckeye fans must sadly admit that Ohio State's finest football era ended with the graduation of 1970's seniors.

This remarkable class, Ohio State's finest ever, won two undisputed Big Ten championships and tied for a third during their three years of varsity competition. A National Championship was won in 1968 and only an upset loss to Michigan in 1969 and to Stanford in the Rose Bowl last year kept Ohio State from an unprecedented three consecutive national championships. Counting two freshmen games in 1967, this class won 29 of 31 games while at Ohio State.

Virtually every school record was either broken or challenged as this unusually gifted group rolled up 996 points to the opposition's 363 during 29 varsity games.

Individual and team honors rolled in each year. Six members of this class—Jim Stillwagon, Jack Tatum, John Brockington, Jan White, Mike Sensibaugh and Tim Anderson—won All-America honors from leading selection committees. Stillwagon and Tatum won All-America honors both as juniors and as seniors.

An unprecedented 13 members of this class were drafted by professional football teams, including four on the first round.

Attendance records toppled as Ohio State sold 1,500 standing room tickets each game the past two years.

Enthusiasm, dedication, speed and resourcefulness were trademarks of this talented class. It has carved a permanent niche in Ohio State's rich football history.

FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

"This will be the greenest team in my 21 years at Ohio State, but it will not be the team with the least ability because we have some fine football players. Our team had an excellent attitude in spring practice and we had good competition for positions." This is Coach Woody Hayes' appraisal of the 1971 Buckeye team.

Ohio State faces a stern rebuilding task after graduating its finest-ever senior class that won three consecutive Big Ten championships (one was shared) and compiled a glittering 27 won and two lost record.

The lack of experience is especially glaring on offense, where only two regulars, center Tom DeLeone and tackle John Hicks, return. An entire new backfield must be found, including someone to direct the attack.

Don Lamka was impressive in spring drills. Moved from defense, where he played as a reserve the past two years, Lamka quickly re-adjusted to the quarterback position he played in high school.

Lamka will have stiff competition from Greg Hare, the top passer on the squad; from Ross Moore, the best technician among the quarterbacks; and from Bill Boyle, a nifty runner, who was injured much of spring practice.

Talented Rick Galbos will start at tailback. He has an ideal blend of speed and power as he averaged 6.3 yards per carry in 30 attempts last year.

Depth at tailback will come from stubby Elmer Lippert and rangy Morris Bradshaw, both sophomores. Lippert is only 5-7 but hits with surprising power. Bradshaw is a speedster with break-away potential.

Tom Campana, the most experienced back on offense, will start at right halfback. This position demands blocking, running ability and pass catching, and Campana can do all three. Rick Gales and Mike Gaffney, both sophomores, will be backup men.

Powerful John Bledsoe will get the call at fullback. His two carries last year are two more than any other Buckeye fullback. Bledsoe broke away numerous long gainers in spring drills and indicated that he deserved to start. Behind him will be Randy Keith, who is a dependable athlete with good quickness. Galbos could be used at fullback in an emergency.

Ohio State's greatest depth is at split end, where there are no fewer than five good athletes. Dick Wakefield and Jimmie Harris have limited experience, but junior Tom Battista and sophomores Dave Hazel and Scott Jones have fine credentials.

Wakefield probably rates a slight nod. He has good moves, sure hands and the rare ability to catch a pass in a crowd. Harris is easily the fastest man on the squad. In the 100-yard dash, he was second in the Big Ten and third in the N.C.A.A. Battista, Hazel and Jones all played well in spring practice.

Coach Hayes and his staff would like to move one or two split ends to another position, but each seems to

be a natural at this spot and appears less effective at another position.

At tight end, sophomore Fred Pagac and junior Merv Teague will battle it out. Pagac is an unusually fine athlete who could help Ohio State at various spots. Strong, highly competitive and extremely coachable, Pagac might have an edge. Teague is a fine blocker and is the more experienced athlete.

John Hicks will be one of the top tackles in the Big Ten, while Rick Simon must battle Dan Scott on the other side. The popular Hicks, a starter on Ohio State's championship team last season, has the strength and confidence to be even better this year. Simon was one of the most improved members on the squad in spring drills and is ready to take over at left tackle. Scott, a sophomore, can be a standout if he keeps his weight down.

Graduation and illness have played havoc with the Buckeye guards. Talented Larry Graf is still waging a battle to overcome the effects of mononucleosis that sidelined him all of last year. If able, he will start at left guard.

Charles Bonica, who came on strong as a reserve last year, became a victim of mononucleosis toward the end of spring practice. With Graf a question physically, Bonica's good health now becomes vital.

With both starters uncertain, Tony Pitstick, who missed the entire 1970 season because of an injury, and sophomore Jim Kregel, must develop rapidly. Each played well in the spring and showed steady improvement.

Another outstanding athlete, Rick Middleton, was to be tried at guard, but he too succumbed to "mono" and the move never came about. Veteran Milan Vecanski has been moved from defense to bolster the guard positions. The key to Ohio State's effectiveness at the guards seems to be a proper blood count.

In Tom DeLeone, Ohio State has one of the top centers in college football. Team captain on offense, the talented DeLeone is an outstanding blocker with good speed and strength. Tom Nixon again will spell DeLeone.

Defensively, Ohio State has more experience than on offense, as five regulars are back.

The 1970 starter at closed side end, Ken Luttner, returns, but faces a tough battle from scrappy Mike Scannell. Luttner played well last year, but Scannell performed so well in the spring he may be a starter.

At the open side, Tom Marendt, a fine sophomore, will take over. He has the speed, body balance and desire to be a star. Rich Cappell, a dependable reserve last year, should be even better this season.

George Hasenohrl and Shad Williams, both regulars, return at the tackles. Each is strong against the run and is capable of putting relentless pressure on opponent passers. This duo should be equal to or better than any pair of defensive tackles in the Big Ten.

Tackle depth will come from Dan Cutillo, a sophomore, who impressed the Buckeye coaches with his spirited play in the spring. Middleton can help here too.

Kevin Fletcher will be a reliable middle guard. He was a reserve middle guard and linebacker last season. Glen Mason and Rocco Rich, both recovering from knee operations, will supply the depth.

Ohio State will have two topflight linebackers in veteran Stan White and sophomore Randy Gradishar. White came on brilliantly last year as a regular. A natural athlete, he led the team in tackles last season.

Gradishar was remarkable in spring practice. An intelligent athlete, he moves well and is a vicious tackler. He works hard and is eager to learn.

Vic Koegel is another fine linebacking hopeful. In fact, Buckeye coaches believe he will be hard to keep out of the regular lineup. Ken Dixon and Rick Ferko, both juniors, are other capable athletes who provide fine depth at the linebacking positions.

At the corner back, Ohio State will start Harry Howard. A good athlete and a fine tackler, Howard played well at this spot in the spring. Behind him will be Randy Cowman, a small but determined athlete.

In the deep defense, Ohio State will start John Hughes and Rick Seifert, both reserves in 1970, and Jeff Davis, a sophomore. Hughes will start at the closed side half-back, Davis at the open side and Seifert at safety.

Randy Whately will back up Seifert, while Carl Kern or Bob Kelly will spell Hughes. Howard is the most likely replacement for Davis. The staff figures to move someone to the defensive backfield to provide additional depth.

Gary Lago and Rick Gales will handle the punting, while talented Fred Schram will kick extra points and field goals.

With so many of last year's great players having graduated, Ohio State will not have the explosiveness as in the past three years. It will be harder to score this year and emphasis will be placed on sound execution and opportunist football. The personnel will be comprised chiefly of last year's reserves and of sophomores. Depth is a problem, and injuries to key players would be critical. Only at split end and at linebacking is there appreciable depth.

The running attack should be strong with good balance distributed among four backs. The passing game is being re-structured to provide a counter to the running attack. The Buckeye staff was pleased with the passing game in spring drills.

Defensively Ohio State should be strong, especially in the line and at linebacking. There are several individual standouts.

If the offense can keep consistent pressure on the opposition, Ohio State will not be an easy foe for anyone.

THE DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS—J. E. WEAVER

J. E. "Ed" Weaver was named Director of Athletics at The Ohio State University October 14, 1970, to replace the retiring Richard C. Larkins. Weaver had been with The Ohio State University or its alumni association in various administrative positions since 1946. He had served as Associate Director of Athletics since July, 1957.

Weaver was born in Marysville, Ohio and graduated from Central High School in Lima. He attended Ohio State University and received his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1933. As an undergraduate he played football and basketball. He headed the campus chapter of Phi Delta Theta fraternity in 1932, and served on the Council of Fraternity Presidents.

After graduating from college he became a salesman for a national jewelry firm and later was associated with a finance company as manager of its offices in Newark, New Jersey and in several Ohio cities.

During World War II he served 3½ years with the Counter Intelligence Corps.

Weaver returned to the campus in 1946 when he joined The Ohio State University Alumni Association as field secretary. In 1950 he was appointed assistant athletic director and director of ticket sales. This started a direct relationship with the Athletic Department. He held this position for three years, at which time he served as administrative assistant to the vice president in charge of business and finance.

In 1957, Weaver returned to the Athletic Department as associate director. He held this position until October of 1970, when he was named Director of Athletics.

Weaver, with experience in alumni work, athletic ticket sales, university administration, and athletic grant-in-aid programs, has an unusually fine background for the position as Director of Athletics.

As Associate Director, he attended Big Ten meetings and is familiar with the inner-workings of the Big Ten.

Weaver inherits an extensive 18-sport intercollegiate athletic program, a fine physical plant, except that the 50-year-old Ohio Stadium is visibly showing its age, and an operating budget that is straining to ward off the ravages of inflation.

As Director, Ed quickly sought and gained permission to add a tenth football game which will bolster the revenue. Negotiations are underway for a professional pre-season football game to be held in Ohio Stadium. Plans have been completed to install artificial turf both in the Stadium and on a practice field for the start of the 1971 season.

Ed and his wife, Jane, live at 2291 Farleigh Road. They have no children.

HUGH HINDMAN—ASSOC. DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Hugh Hindman started with the Ohio State athletic staff in April, 1963. He was an offensive line coach for seven years before being named associate athletic director in 1970.

Hindman is a native of Columbus and a graduate of Miami University.

Following graduation from Miami, he coached football three years at Grandview High and five seasons at North High, his alma mater. At North his teams won two city titles.

In 1958 he went to Ohio University

as offensive line coach and remained there for five years.

Among his many administrative duties, Hugh is in charge of the Ohio State Golf Course operation.

RICHARD DELANEY—ASST. DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Richard Delaney joined the Ohio State athletic staff in September, 1970. Among his duties is the supervision of the Ice Rink and director of the Summer Youth Program sponsored by Ohio State.

Delaney has a wide background of recreation work in Akron, Cleveland and Chicago.

A native of Akron, Delaney is a graduate of Western Reserve in 1954, where he starred in football and basketball. He obtained a Master's degree from Case Western Reserve in 1970.

After years of work in various recreation and youth programs, Delaney coached at Western Reserve as head basketball coach and football assistant.

JAMES JONES—ASST. DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

James Jones has been a member of the Ohio State faculty since 1965 and of the athletic department since 1967. He was named assistant athletic director in 1970.

His chief duties are to serve as athletic counselor to the student-athletes and to work with Dick Delaney in the administration of the grant-in-aid program.

Jones is a graduate of Kent State University in 1958. He taught mathematics and coached football and basketball one year in junior high and five years in senior high before going to Ball State University for a Master's degree in 1964.

He is completing work for his doctorate at Ohio State.

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH—W. W. "WOODY" HAYES



W. W. "Woody" Hayes

W. W. "Woody" Hayes is starting his 21st year as head football coach at The Ohio State University, longer than any other Buckeye football coach.

His record at Ohio State is 134 victories, 43 losses and seven ties, a winning percentage of .757, excluding ties. His 134 wins represent 29.1 per cent of the school's football victories since the sport was started in 1890.

When Hayes took over the football reins at Ohio State, the Buckeyes stood a distant third in the all-time Big Ten standings. Now, 20 years later, Ohio State is solidly on top in the all-time conference standings.

Consistency has been a trademark of Coach Hayes' Buckeye teams. Only twice, 1959 and 1966, have Ohio State teams lost more than three games a season. Four have gone undefeated through the regular season and three others have lost only one game. In all, Coach Hayes has guided Ohio State to seven Big Ten championships.

A tireless worker, a meticulous planner, a fluent speaker, and a gifted writer—all these could be used to describe the multi-talented Hayes.

He has no hobbies other than football, unless it would be an avid interest in history. A 1935 graduate of Denison, he majored in English and history. He holds an M.A. degree in education administration from The Ohio State University.

His entire coaching career has been within the state of Ohio. He began as an assistant football coach at Mingo Junction High School. His first head coaching job came at New Philadelphia High.

After a five-year stint in the Navy, his first opportunity as head coach in college came in 1946, at Denison University, his alma mater.

Three years at Denison and two at Miami University set the stage for his 1951 debut at Ohio State.

While at Ohio State, Hayes has reached the pinnacle of college coaching. He has been twice named "College Coach of the Year," and his Ohio State teams have won three National Championships, narrowly missing this honor on three other occasions. He is past president of the American College Football Coaches' Association. He has written two books on football, and each is considered a thorough and scholarly work.

Virtually every passing, pass receiving and rushing record at Ohio State has been set since Woody has been coach.

He has made four trips to Vietnam to discuss football with U.S. military personnel.

Woody and his wife, Anne, have a son, Steve, who is an attorney.

ASSISTANT FOOTBALL COACHES

ESCO SARKKINEN—Ends

Esco Sarkkinen has been a member of The Ohio State University football coaching staff since 1946. "Sark" is starting his 26th season as varsity end coach and is in charge of the scouting program.

Sarkkinen is an extremely valuable member of the Buckeye staff. His vast football knowledge, coupled with a keen analytical mind, plus years of experience, ideally suit him for coaching in the Big Ten. He is one of the most competent and most respected scouts of college football in the nation.

Sarkkinen has a working knowledge of proper techniques to be used in good end play. He played college football at Ohio State in 1937, '38 and '39, winning All-American honors with the 1939 championship team.

A firm believer in the coaching value of movies, "Sark" spends countless hours studying films, analyzing blocking techniques, fakes, footwork, body balance and the like, in order to evaluate his personnel. Buckeye ends are traditionally well-schooled in offensive and defensive techniques.

He and his wife, Freda, have a daughter, Sandra, and three grandchildren.

GEORGE HILL—Defense Coordinator



George Hill

George Hill became a member of the Buckeye football staff February 15, 1971, after an extensive 13-year coaching career at five schools. He serves as defense coordinator and coaches the linebackers at Ohio State.

Hill is a native of Bay Village, Ohio, where he graduated from high school in 1952. He served in the Navy from 1952 until 1955, after which he entered Denison University.

At Denison, he won four football letters, as a fullback and tackle.

Following graduation from college in 1958, Hill went to Bowling Green State University as a graduate assistant, where he coached the freshman line, while obtaining a Master's degree.

He spent the next year at Findlay College, where he was line coach in football as well as head baseball and wrestling coach.

In 1960 Hill went to Denison University, where he served as defense coordinator and line coach. In 1965 he went to Cornell University in the same capacity.

In 1966 Hill went to Duke University as defense coordinator and remained there for five years.

Hill and his wife, Cloyde, have a son, Gregory, and a daughter, Tammy.

GEORGE CHAUMP—Offensive Backfield



George Chaump

George Chaump joined the Ohio State University football coaching staff in March of 1968. He works with the offensive backfield, primarily with the Buckeye quarterbacks.

Chaump is a native of West Pittston, Pennsylvania. He attended Bloomsburg State College and graduated in 1958. While in college he played center and guard in football and also wrestled.

Following his college graduation he served as assistant football coach at William Penn High in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania for three years. In 1961 he was named head football coach at Shamokin High and became head coach at John Harris High in Harrisburg the following year.

Chaump's Harris High teams compiled a remarkable 58-won and four-lost record during the six-year period, 1962-1967. His teams won six straight Central Pennsylvania championships and in each of the six seasons, Chaump was voted "Coach of the Year."

His Harris teams had a 35-game winning streak intact when he departed for Ohio State. His 1967 team scored 479 points for a Pennsylvania high school record.

He is married to the former Constance Jacobs of Harrisburg. George and his wife have a daughter, Lynda.

EARLE BRUCE—Offensive Guards and Centers

Earle Bruce joined the Ohio State University football coaching staff July, 1966 after a remarkably successful high school coaching career. Bruce is in charge of the offensive guards and centers at Ohio State.

A native of Cumberland, Maryland, he enrolled at Ohio State University as a promising halfback. A knee injury during his sophomore year ended his college football career.

Bruce graduated from Ohio State in 1953 and started his coaching career as an assistant coach at Mansfield the same year.

His first head coaching job was at Salem, Ohio, in 1956. In four years at Salem his teams won 28 and lost nine. In 1960 he moved to Sandusky and was an immediate success. His Sandusky teams won 34, lost only three and tied three in four seasons. In 1964 he moved to Massillon and had two undefeated seasons and two state championships in as many years. Bruce ended his high school coaching with a string of 42 games without defeat.

Three times Bruce was chosen "Ohio High School Football Coach of the Year," 1960, 1963 and 1964.

Earle and his wife, Jean, have two daughters, Lynn and Michele.

RALPH STAUB—Offensive Ends and Tackles

Ralph Staub joined the Buckeye football staff January 15, 1970 as coach of the offensive ends and tackles. He brought with him a wealth of experience attained both at the high school and college level.

Staub is a native of Cincinnati. He attended the University of Cincinnati and was a standout end on the Bearcat powerhouses of 1949, '50 and '51. He was co-captain of the 1951 Cincinnati team, regarded by many as the school's best ever.

Staub holds the school record for career touchdown passes.

Following his graduation in 1952, Staub took his first position as head football coach at Deer Park High in Cincinnati. After one year, he spent two seasons as head mentor at Louisville, Ohio, High School. He returned to Cincinnati in 1955 at Greenhills High, serving nine years as football coach and athletic director.

His first college job came in 1964 as offensive line coach at the University of Cincinnati. He remained on the Bearcat staff until 1969, when he went to Northwestern as offensive line coach. The following year he joined the Ohio State staff.

Staub has an M.A. degree from Miami University. He and his wife, Jane, have four children, daughters Gale, Nancy and Carrie, and son, Danny.

RUDY HUBBARD—Offensive Backfield

Rudy Hubbard works with the running backs in the offensive backfield. He joined the Buckeye athletic staff in 1968 as a cadet coach.

Hubbard has a degree in Education and is prepared to teach, but has chosen to remain on the Buckeye staff as a full-time member.

Hubbard, a native of Hubbard, Ohio, was a halfback on the Ohio State football teams of 1965, '66 and '67. A knee injury and a subsequent operation prevented him from achieving his true potential until his senior year, 1967. That season he averaged 5.3 yards per carry and caught 13 passes. His 103 yards in 15 tries and two touchdowns against Michigan in 1967 was his top collegiate game.

In addition to working with the backs, Hubbard is used in recruiting. Coach Hayes and the Buckeye staff have been extremely pleased with the progress made by Hubbard and with the contribution he has made.

Hubbard, a bachelor, was an all-around athlete in high school, winning three letters each in football, basketball and track. At Ohio State he concentrated solely on football.

RICHARD WALKER—Defensive Backfield



Richard Walker

Richard Walker joined the Ohio State University football staff in July, 1969, as defensive backfield coach. His duties also involve a portion of the recruiting.

Walker is a 1955 graduate of John Carroll University. Following graduation, he entered the service and was discharged in the summer of 1957. He immediately began a highly successful coaching career that started as an assistant football coach at Cathedral Latin High in Cleveland in 1957. In 1960 he took his first head coaching position at Watterson High in Columbus where he was an instant success. In seven years at Watterson, his teams won 51, lost only 11 and tied three. His 1966 powerhouse was top-rated in Ohio.

Walker left Watterson High in 1967 to become defensive backfield coach at the University of Toledo, a position he held for two years. He then left Toledo to join the football staff at the Naval Academy in Annapolis. Walker was at Navy about four months when he responded to an emergency on the Buckeye staff as Lou Holtz left Ohio State to become head coach at William and Mary.

Walker and his wife, Eleanor, have three children, sons Brad and Tommy Joe, and daughter Kim.

CHARLES CLAUSEN—Defensive Line

Charles Clausen joined the Buckeye football staff in June, 1971, after having been at William and Mary College for three years. Clausen coaches the defensive line at Ohio State and helps in recruiting.

Clausen is a native of Iowa. His father, M. R. Clausen, is a former football coach and is the present director of athletics at the University of Arizona.

Charles Clausen is a graduate of the University of New Mexico. He was a linebacker in football and a heavyweight wrestler as an undergraduate.

Following graduation he coached in high school as a football assistant and head wrestling coach for one year at Gallup, New Mexico and for three years at Fremont, California. During this time he obtained a Master's degree from San Jose State.

In 1967 he was defense coordinator at New Mexico Military Institute and the following year went to William and Mary, where he remained until joining Ohio State in 1971.

JOHN MUMMEY—Freshman Coach

John Mummy was named head freshman football coach effective July 1, 1969. He replaced Glenn "Tiger" Ellison, who retired after spending six years on the Ohio State staff and 30 years of coaching at Middletown.

Mummy was a fullback and quarterback on the Ohio State football teams of 1960, '61 and '62. Moved to quarterback as a junior in 1961, Mummy averaged 5.7 yards per carry and in '62 he averaged 5.6 per try.

In 1964, Mummy taught in junior high school in Painesville, Ohio, and played semi-pro football in Cleveland. In 1965 he went to Northridge High School, Johnstown, Ohio, and coached football for two seasons. In 1967 he went to Painesville Harvey High where he coached for two years, winning 14 of 20 games.

Mummy is a native of Painesville, Ohio. He and his wife, Emily, have two children, sons Mark and Daryl.

FACTS ABOUT THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY

In 1870 the Ohio Legislature approved a plot of land on the Neil Farm to be the site of a new college. On Sept. 17, 1873, Ohio Agriculture and Mechanical College opened its doors. There were 24 students, educated and housed in a single building. In 1878 the Legislature changed the name to "The Ohio State University."

From this humble beginning, the University has enjoyed remarkable growth both in stature and in size. In addition to its extensive undergraduate program, Ohio State is a nationally recognized center for research and graduate work.

The Graduate School is the fastest growing segment of the University. Last year there were 7,280 graduate students and this number will reach 10,000 in a few years. Additionally there are 2,550 in the professional colleges.

The University offers approximately 5,000 courses in more than 250 programs of study. The teaching faculty numbers 3,500, 80 per cent of whom hold doctoral degrees.

The composition of The Ohio State University is complex. There are 16 colleges, ten schools, 18 academic faculties, 13 divisions and 80 departments. A Master's degree is offered by 96 study areas and 76 offer a Doctor of Philosophy.

There are ten undergraduate colleges and six professional colleges. The undergraduate colleges are: Administrative Science, Agriculture and Home Economics, The Arts, Biological Sciences, Education, Engineering, Humanities, Mathematics and Physical Sciences, Social and Behavioral Sciences, and University College.

The professional colleges are: Dentistry, Law, Medicine, Optometry, Pharmacy and Veterinary Medicine.

Ohio State has a Columbus campus of 3,290 acres. There are 300 buildings, including 27 residence halls. Ten of these house men, 14 are for women and three are co-educational. Currently 12,000 students can be accommodated in University owned residence halls.

The enrollment was about 13,500 prior to World War II. It has steadily risen to a record 41,000 on the Columbus campus last fall. There were 4,000 additional students at regional campuses in Mansfield, Lima, Marion, Newark and at the Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton.

The University Library has 2,245,957 volumes, making it one of the largest in the nation.

Plans have been announced for the University to build a \$25 million Transportation Research Center, largest of its kind in the world.

Even though the enrollment has reached a maximum figure, campus construction continues at a rapid pace. Much of the new building is west of the Olentangy River. In this area are 1,080 acres used for agricultural teaching and research, a 245-acre airport, two 18-hole golf courses and a new University College complex.

THE OHIO STADIUM PRESS BOX

The spacious Ohio Stadium press box has won the two top national awards given by the Football Writers Association of America; for "Outstanding Services" and a citation for "Superior Facilities."

The press box was completed in 1950. It is a giant, four-deck edifice, 60 yards long and 24 feet deep. It extends 12 feet above the 98-foot wall of the Stadium.

The press box proper constitutes the second deck. There are three rows of seats, each row elevated and separated by a wide aisle. The front row seats 60, the second 50 and the third row 34, for a capacity of 144.

Six glass enclosed booths, each six feet square, are located at the extreme ends of the second and third rows. Two booths are used by coaching staff members in communication with the player benches, one by the Stadium announcer, one by the press box announcer, and another by the timer and scoreboard operator. The sixth booth is available for radio.

The third deck houses 22 booths, each nine feet wide and eight feet deep. Radio is used in 15 of these booths, two are for game movies and five are used by the University administration.

The fourth deck is used for photography. It is 60 yards long and is uncovered, save for 10 canvas protected booths.

The first deck, located below the press section, contains a lunch-room, check rooms, storage rooms and rest rooms.

The total seating capacity is 300, 162 on the second deck and 138 on the third level. There is space for an additional 50 photographers on the roof.

THE OHIO STADIUM

After Ohio State University joined the Western Conference in 1913, old Ohio Field, with its 14,000 capacity, was unable to accommodate the crowds. World War I temporarily eased the demand for a new stadium, but in 1919 University athletic officials laid plans for a dream structure.

The Stadium campaign began in October, 1920. More than 13,000 people pledged gifts totaling \$1,083,000.

Construction began in August, 1921, and by September, 1922, the structure was virtually completed, a gigantic task finished in 13 months. The construction cost was \$1,341,000 and the original capacity was 66,210. A crowd of 71,385 watched the dedication game October 21, 1922.

The Ohio Stadium has unusual design. It is a double-decked, horseshoe-shaped structure, with towers on each of the two open ends. The circumference is one-third mile and the ground area is 10 acres. The Stadium is 725 feet long and 596 feet wide and the height is 98 feet.

There are 56 stairways, 12 ramps and 112 aisles feeding 81 exits. A capacity crowd can clear the Stadium in seven minutes.

Temporary field bleachers and south stands have added additional seats and minor changes have taken place within the Stadium itself to raise the capacity to 81,475.

A modern press box and two elevators have enhanced Ohio Stadium without materially changing its appearance or altering its architectural motif.

The latest addition is to the field itself with the installation of Astro-Turf for the 1971 season.
