Buckeyes Earn Share Of Title

The unbeaten Ohio State Buckeyes began sniffing roses after clinching a tie for the Big Ten football title Saturday, 34-7 over an inept Iowa offense.

The visiting Hawkeyes at least displayed some "balance," losing five fumbles and five interceptions. OSU's victory in the season's final home game before 87,835 Ohio Stadium fans gave the 10-0 Buckeyes the inside track for the Big Ten's Rose Bowl berth with a 7-0 league record.

Purdue's 24-21 victory Saturday over previous co-leader Michigan (now 6-1) assured the Buckeyes a tie for the conference title and gave OSU a dual chance for the Rose Bowl bid.

A Purdue victory over Indiana next Saturday would send Ohio State to Pasadena — regardless of the outcome of its game at Michigan. Winning, of course, would make OSU undisputed champion and Rose Bowl representative for the first time since the 1975 Buckeyes lost the '76 Rose Bowl to UCLA.

ODDLY, SATURDAY'S clinching victory came more because of Iowa's offensive ineptitude than Ohio State's offensive or defensive competence.

"Anybody know any funny stories they can tell me before I go downstairs and commit suicide?" asked Iowa Coach Hayden Fry, who had seen his Hawkeye offense turn the ball over to the Buckeyes five times inside the Iowa 25. "I don't believe I've ever seen an offense in my life that was nicer in giving the ball away.

"It's too bad. Our defense played one heck of a football game."

The Hawkeye defense did excel, restricting the explosive Buckeye offense to a meager 185 total yards. In fact, Ohio State's longest — and only — offensive drive of the day covered only 52 yards.

However, "The secret to holding down the yardage," said Fry, "is to give them the ball near the goal line so they don't have far to go."

The Buckeyes seldom had to travel any great distance, but even with good field position, their offense mostly sputtered. One reason was a rare off-day for usually sharp sophomore quarterback Art Schlichter.

"They had a good defense," said Schlichter in

reference to his 7-of-16 passing day. "And I threw some bad passes. It was a combination of the two."

THE SAME COULD realistically be said of Iowa's offensive woes. While the Haweyes were dropping handoffs, throwing bad passes and in general appearing inept, Ohio State's improving defense continued its reign of terror. Buckeye defenders made 14 tackles for losses, and allowed the Hawkeye offense virtually nothing until a desperation 40-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Pete Gales reached split end Keith Chappelle late in the fourth quarter.

Freshman linebacker Marcus Marek was the Buckeyes' top defender with two interceptions, a

fumble recovery and a blocked punt credited to the former Brookfield High star.

"Ohio State has a fine defense," said Fry. "They hit hard and they play well. But I could have intercepted some of those passes we were throwing. (Iowa starting quarterback) Phil Suess has been great all year, but he couldn't put his finger in his eye today."

IF THE HAWKEYES had a choice, they probably would have covered theirs. It was bad from the start.

Suess fumbled on the Hawkeyes' second series and recovered — something unusual from an Iowa standpoint. After the inevitable punt, OSU put together its 52-yard drive for the first touchdown of the game. Schlichter passes to Brad Dwelle and Gary Williams for 7 and 10 yards were the big plays of the drive. Schlichter carried the final yard himself to give OSU a 7-0 lead that just kept growing.

Suess fumbled again on the ensuing possession, and this time he lost it at his 25.

The Buckeye offense failed to click but a Vlade Janakievski field goal from 35 yards out still gave Ohio State a 10-0 lead.

TWO PLAYS LATER and another Hawkeye fumble — Suess did it, Ray Ellis recovered at the Iowa 14 — later, the Buckeyes once again had the ball. Again, the Buckeye offense fizzled and had to settle for a 29-yard field goal by Janakievski that gave OSU a 13-0 lead.

It didn't take nearly as long for Iowa to fumble after that field goal. Hawkeye kick returner Jeff Brown dropped the kickoff. Kicker Bob Atha recovered for Ohio State at the Iowa 24. Once again the OSU offense struggled and this time Janakievski's field goal try failed when holder Greg Castignola had trouble spotting the ball.

It didn't matter. Marek intercepted a Suess pass on the next Iowa series, and the Buckeyes had the ball deep in Hawkeye territory again, this time at the 36. Ohio State didn't waste this one. Ric Volley capped the 36-yard march with a 1-yard plunge.

Then — as if that wasn't enough — the Hawkeyes turned the ball over once again, this time on their second offensive play. Fullback Dean McKillip dropped the ball, and Mike Guess recovered.

THREE PLAYS LATER, Schlichter fired a 34-yard touchdown strike to Doug Donley. That ended the first-half scoring and, for that matter, any chance the Hawkeyes had of coming back.

In capital letters, the sign at the open end of Ohio Stadium told it all — "DEFENSE".

After Ohio State's 34-7 thrashing of Iowa Saturday before 87,835 Ohio Stadium fans, Buckeyes Coach Earle Bruce agreed.

"That was a great defensive performance out there today; I mean a great defensive performance," Bruce said. "I thought our defense played them off the field."

The Buckeye defense took the sputtering offense under its wing to assure the 10th win of an unexpected, unbeaten season.

"WE GOT GREAT field position from our defense," Bruce said. "On offense, we got the little plays, not the big plays. But the little plays led to touchdowns or field goals."

The big plays were reserved for the defense. Freshman linebacker Marcus Marek, junior safety Vince Skillings and junior middle guard Tim Sawicki — with a little help from their friends — made most of the notable ones.

Marek had two interceptions — one in the end zone that stopped one of Iowa's two scoring threats. Marek also caused and recovered a fumble, blocked a punt and led the team in tackles with 13.

Skillings returned an interception 49 yards in the fourth quarter, partially blocked a punt, and had 8 tackles. Sawicki, while uprooting many of the Hawkeyes' running plays, recorded 10 tackles, 3 of those for losses.

OF THE TRIO, Skillings seemed the most excited. He has a right to be. After all, Marek wasn't around last year and Sawicki played very little as the Buckeyes finished fourth in the final Big Ten standings. The defense often took a pounding.

"We're playing as a team this year," Skillings said of the turnaround. "I don't think the coaching is that much different. We were as prepared for games last year as we are this year."

"We just got tired of losing. We wanted to win and get the Buckeyes back up there where they belong — on top."

That's where they are in the Big Ten, thanks to Purdue's 24-21 upset of Michigan Saturday.

"I'M A LITTLE tense, a little excited," said Marek of next Saturday's matchup with the Wolverines. "I really don't know how to describe it."

He probably hopes that when it's over, he can say what he said Saturday: "I felt this was one of my better games."

For the offense, it was not a "better" game. But Bruce didn't seem annoyed.

"I don't think we were as crisp in the offensive line as we have been," he said. "There was no continuity in our offense, no continuity at all."

QUARTERBACK ART Schlichter said, "We weren't real sharp. I guess we were looking ahead. I think we'll be ready next week. We'll be intense; we'll be ready to play."

And on a day when he and his cohorts were struggling, Schlichter was happy to see the defense forcing 10 turnovers — 5 interceptions, 5 fumble recoveries.

It was, as Bruce said, a dominating performance. And that's what he was

looking for when he took over the head coaching job last spring.

"Basically, I know that success in the Big Ten is earned with a very, very sound defensive football team," Bruce said. "That's what we will try to build at Ohio State."

After the past few weekends — the Buckeyes have given up only 27 points in the most recent six games — it looks as if most of the ingredients are available to do what the sign says — in capital letters.

Ohio State Coach Earle Bruce will lead his undefeated Buckeyes into Michigan Stadium next Saturday, but at least part of his heart will be in Bloomington, Ind.

"I'm going to be cheering for Purdue next week," Bruce said. Purdue plays host Indiana, and a Boilermaker win would send the Buckeyes to the Rose Bowl no matter what happens in Ann Arbor, Mich.

All week, though, Bruce plans on keeping his mind — and those of his players — on Michigan.

"After tomorrow (Sunday), there will be no player interviews at all," he said. "Practice will be closed. We want to have complete concentration on this football game."

"It means a lot to us."

The Buckeyes will be favored, too, since they are 10-0. Michigan, after its

24-21 loss to Purdue Saturday is 8-2 overall and 6-1 in the Big Ten. However, Bruce, in his first year as head coach of the Buckeyes, expects no letdown by Ohio State.

"We are most certainly looking forward to playing against the Michigan team that came back so strongly against Purdue," he said. The Wolverines had trailed 24-6 before a last-quarter resurgence. "I don't think it (the loss) will take any edge off our preparations for the Michigan team."

"I would think Michigan would be difficult for Ohio State anytime we play."

The preliminaries are over. And, as Ohio State's Doug Donley said, "Now it's show time."

The show will be the Ohio State-Michigan football game Saturday (12:50 p.m., Ch. 6) at Ann Arbor, and, as usual, the stakes will be high.

Ohio State assured itself of at least a share of the Big Ten championship with its 34-7 victory over Iowa Saturday in Ohio Stadium. A victory over Michigan will give the Buckeyes a ticket to the Rose Bowl and an outright league title. Ohio State is 10-0 overall and Michigan is 8-2.

Ohio State still can lose to Michigan and gain a Rose Bowl berth. That would happen only if Purdue defeats Indiana, thus creating a three-way tie in the Big Ten and giving OSU the berth by virtue of its better overall record.

If Michigan defeats Ohio State and Purdue loses to Indiana, Michigan will go to the Rose Bowl because it defeated OSU in head-to-head competition. OSU did not play Purdue this season.

The Buckeyes, riding the crest of a 10-game unbeaten streak, were eager to talk about Michigan following Saturday's sacking of Iowa.

Middle guard Tim Sawicki, who along with Marcus Marek anchored the defense against Iowa, figures OSU is primed to break Michigan's three-game streak between the two teams.

"I feel better than ever before about our defense," Sawicki said. And he should.

Ohio State's defense was devastating in shutting down Iowa. The Hawkeyes finished with 229 total yards, but only 30 of those came in the first half when the full starting defense was in the game.

The defense was so dominating in the first half, Iowa could make only one first down. For the entire game, the defense recovered five fumbles and had five interceptions.

Sawicki was the leader in solo tackles with six and was second in participations to Marek with 10. Marek, who had 13 tackles, also recovered one fumble, intercepted two passes and blocked one punt.

The defense, which has been jelling all season but now seems to have peaked, definitely seems ready to tackle Michigan. In the last four games OSU has allowed only 14 points.

"This game is a classic and I feel good about it," Sawicki said. "I've been thinking about it for a long time. I knew it would just take time for our defense to play this way."

Most of the season the offense's efficiency has been equal to the defense's. But the Iowa game was an exception.

Ohio State picked up only 110 yards rushing and added a meager 75 yards passing as quarterback Art Schlichter had a sub-par game.

Schlichter, now the career OSU passing leader, was 7-of-16 for 58 yards. Thirty-three of those yards came on a touchdown toss to Donley.

All of OSU's scores were set up by the defense. The longest of the team's four TD drives consumed only 52 yards.

But the sputtering offense didn't appear to concern Bruce or his players.

After the Iowa game Bruce said: "I think so far we've (this season) played well and I just hope we can continue to move the football." He indicated that as long as the Buckeyes could move the ball the way they have all season he would be satisfied Saturday.

Although Schlichter admitted "I

wasn't real sharp" against Iowa, he and Donley both seem eager for their shot at Michigan. One of the reasons is that Schlichter and Donley have hooked up for five touchdown passes this season, giving OSU a genuine big-play threat.

This big-play possibility gives Ohio State something it has been lacking for years.

Schlichter said, "The big play will give Michigan something to think about. I just hope we can get the ball to our receivers."

Donley concurred. "They're going to have more to defend against. They can't just stack the line."

Michigan, too, will give Ohio State a lot to think about. For that reason Bruce has shut off all player interviews this week. "We'll have complete concentration on the football game," Bruce said.

According to some of the players the week will be one for tension, nervousness, intensity and pure psyching up.

"Tension mounts on Monday and by Thursday we get real nervous," Sawicki said. He quickly added, "But we're

overdue."

Marek, who as a freshman hasn't been through the ordeal, said "Like Coach Bruce said, this is pretty big. I know the intensity will be much higher, the whole thing is hard to imagine.

Donley said neither Michigan's loss to Purdue, nor OSU's past losses to Michigan will affect his thinking this week.

"I'm looking forward to the week in practice. I'll get a little nervous as the week goes on, but we'll be psyched and that will keep me going."

Donley, who said "if we execute we shouldn't have any trouble," was asked if OSU still has a few surprises it hasn't shown in its offense this season.

With a grin, he answered: "We'll show that Saturday."

Naturally, after all, Saturday is show time.

Bruce and Bucks deserve plaudits

For Ohio State's bewildering Buckeye football forces, life still is just a share of bowlies, if you can stomach a curdled metaphor with your Monday morning coffee.

Share-time with various other bowls, however, may be history for the Bucks now with everything suddenly coming up roses again after they availed themselves of the generosity of Iowa and Purdue over the weekend.

Clinching a Big Ten title much earlier than the wildest Scarlet and Gray dreamer envisioned thanks to the combination of their 34-7 throttling of Iowa in the home finale and Purdue's 24-21 ambush of Michigan, the Bucks remain masters of their own destiny, although they also have another route to Pasadena.

After distributing their football talents and their fans' money at the Orange, Sugar and Gator Bowls since last dropping in on the Rose Bowl after the 1975 campaign, the Bucks can return to California to test Charles White and awesome Southern Cal through the simple expedient of making Michigan their 11th victim Saturday in Ann Arbor on national television.

Failing that — and OSU has not beaten the Wolverines since a 21-14 nod at Ann Arbor in 1975 — the Buckeyes could still slip in the Rose Bowl's back door if Purdue continues doing them favors by beating Indiana. That would bring a three-way tie and the Big Ten bowl formula would send OSU packing to Pasadena.

Early betting is OSU has a better chance in Ann Arbor than Purdue has in Bloomington.

Who, you say, wants White and his 200-yards-a-game rushing average?

Earle Bruce and his Bucks want him, that's who.

They've got one game left to cement that claim, but off what they've done in 10 victories, they deserve the shot.

Speaking of shots, if Bruce isn't coach of the year, somebody should be. Shot.

Earle is not a boastful man, but he may be less surprised by his 10-0 team than the pundits around the nation who predicted mediocrity for his first OSU product when he stepped into the well-worn shoes of Woody Hayes.

Let me reinforce this by harkening to Earle's early words upon taking the OSU reins Jan. 12.

That was the day Bruce was asked his theories on Art Schlichter and throwing footballs and he responded, "The most important thing a coach can have is a team."

He added, "You win Big Ten titles with defense."

April 3, with spring practice near-

ing, Bruce said, "I'm ready now. Recruiting's over, now it's football, the fun part of it. Coaching, that's what it's all about. I think we'll throw more, but we all know you win with defense, running and a change of pace that will put the ball in the air."

April 25 he repeated, "Defense is so important..."

July 26 in Chicago he spoke of pressures and calmly advised, "I have no problem following Coach Hayes."

Aug. 16 with fall drills close, Earle concluded, "We need the big play man in the middle of the defense, plus some tacklers. If we're going to be good... someone has to come through."

They did. Tim Sawicki became the big play man in the middle, torturing Iowa's quarterback, Phil Seuss. Tackles Jerome Foster, Gary Dulin and the wounded Luther Henson responded admirably. Defense, indeed, has come full cycle.

Inspecting the Iowa wreckage as Bruce battened hatches for the wild windup, it was interesting to see how the defense, which was so shaky a year ago and suspect as the Bruce era dawned, suddenly became intimidating, devastating and virtually unyielding.

There was small alarm Saturday over a buttoned-down offense held to 185 yards, 110 fewer than the previous OSU season-low of 295 at Minnesota and far off the average 500 yards of the past four routs. Still, 34 points from 185 yards isn't shabby.

Making that development stand out larger than life is the fact OSU has not scored a touchdown in the last three games with Michigan. It's no time for the offense to be AWOL.

Schlichter, admitting he "was not real sharp" and that maybe some minds were on Michigan, promised, "We'll be all right next week. We want the Rose Bowl, but we want to go by beating Michigan. We want to know we earned it." He wants the front door to Pasadena, not the back.

There were some who hinted the Bucks didn't "earn" the Iowa victory, Hawk boss Hayden Fry among them. Fry felt his team played like "the Salvation Army" giving things away — five lost fumbles, five pass interceptions, two blocked punts.

Hayden overlooked the fact that OSU's vastly improved defense brought much of that grief to Iowa's backfield.

The much-maligned defense has allowed only five touchdowns in seven games since the 45-29 victory over Washington State.

It is a better team than anybody believed — and it's time Bruce gets some of the recognition, though he's willing to wait a week.
