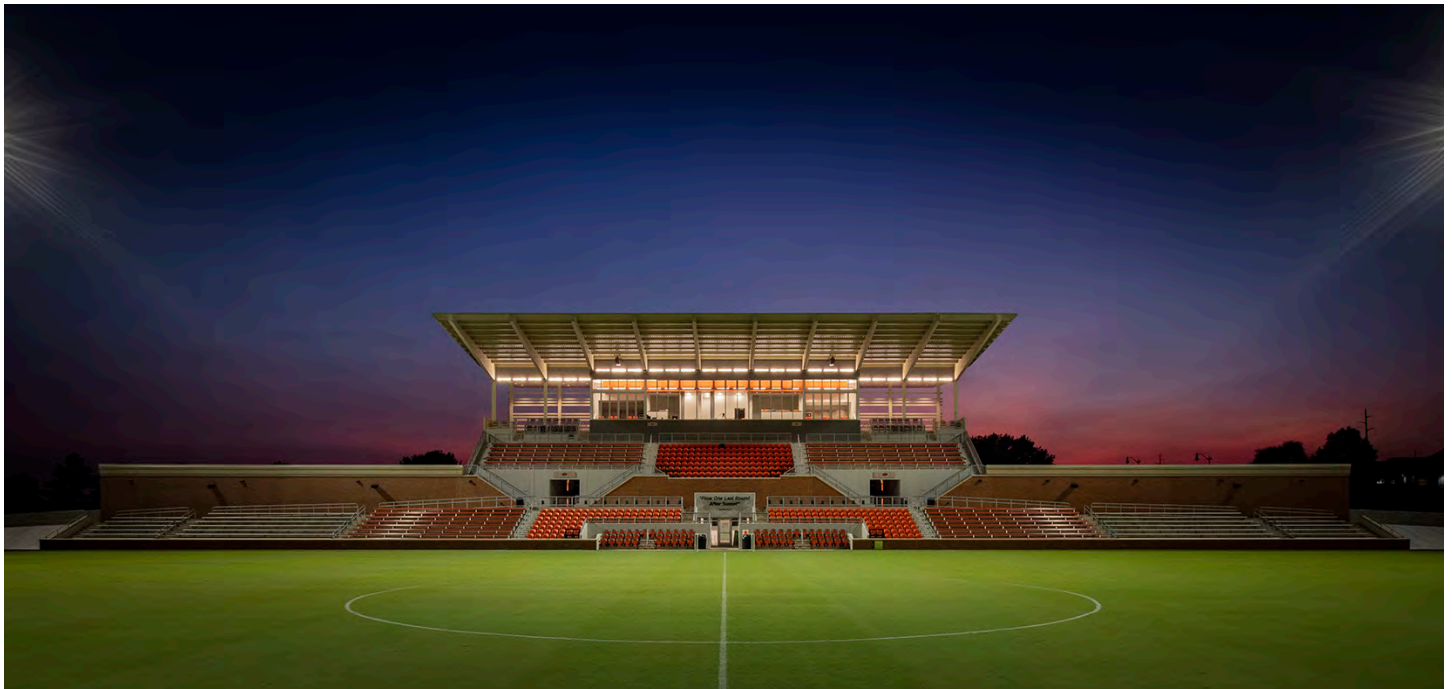

All members of the media may enter Neal Patterson Stadium via the west entrances one hour prior to the game. Credentialed members will receive a wristband prior to entering the complex.

PARKING

Parking is available in the lots to the south and west of Patterson Stadium. Parking is first-come, first-served.

PHOTOGRAPHER ACCESS

Photographers will be limited to the area on the east side of the field of Neal Patterson Stadium.

PRESS SERVICES

Power and internet access will be available to media members in the pressbox at Patterson Stadium. Statistics will be available at the conclusion of the game. Please contact the OSU Athletics Communications office for any specific needs.

INTERVIEW REQUESTS

Coaches and players will be available for interviews via Zoom throughout the season on Wednesdays at 3 p.m.. Specific player requests for interviews should be made through Wade McWhorter in the Athletics Communications office at least 48 hours in advance. Due to NCAA legislation, the only time to meet with the players on a one-on-one basis will be during that week's designated interview time; no player interviews will be given during practice.

BIG 12 CONFERENCE

THE BIG 12 CONFERENCE

The Big 12 celebrates its 25th anniversary in 2020-21 as one of the nation's premier athletic conferences under the direction of ninth-year commissioner Bob Bowlsby.

TCU and West Virginia joined the league on July 1, 2012 and became the Big 12's first additions since inception, joining Baylor, Iowa State, Kansas, Kansas State, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas and Texas Tech.

With 10 members, the Big 12 remains as the only autonomy conference to determine its championships in all sports directly on the field of play with a full round-robin schedule. The Conference's hard work ethic and strong values have translated to enormous success in its first 22 years. Since it began competition in 1996-97, the league can boast of 63 NCAA team titles and 689 individual national championships.

The Big 12 has been at the forefront in college athletics reform, specifically with student-athlete welfare issues to include cost of attendance, student-athlete time demands and strengthening its policy for concussion diagnosis and management. In 2014-15, the Big 12 introduced and hosted three "State of Collegiate Athletics" forums to examine the issues facing college athletics. Two were conducted in Washington, D.C and one in New York City. Panelists included respected authorities from intercollegiate athletics, university leadership and sports journalism. The third forum featured a special session comprised of student-athletes. The Big 12 continued the "State of Collegiate Athletics" forums with Dallas serving as the host site for three events and one staged in Atlanta.

The award-winning Big 12 Champions for Life, an initiative of the Conference, begins its sixth year in 2020-21. It features student-athletes, selected by league institutions, in a series of public service announcements highlighting the positive impact an athletics scholarship has had on their lives leading to stories of personal growth and success.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or within the community, the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

In its short history, the Big 12 has over 700 Academic All-America recipients, averaging about 20 each season. Big 12 student-athletes have shown commitment to their studies by earning numerous individual academic recognitions. Fifteen times in the past 16 years a league athlete has garnered the top academic honor for their respective sport, including Bianca St. Georges (West Virginia) for soccer in 2018-19 and Brittany Brewer (Texas Tech) for women's basketball in 2019-20.

Competitive excellence, scholarship and sportsmanship are all equal components of the Big 12 philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and Academic All-Big 12 squads are recognized for each sport at the end of their respective seasons. At the end of each academic year, the Conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete of the Year and Big 12 Sportsman of the Year awards.

Institutions can also nominate student-athletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships. A total of 461 scholars have received over \$3.5 million in postgraduate financial aid through the first 24 years of the program.

The Big 12 sponsors 23 sports. Men's squads include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, equestrian, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming & diving, tennis and volleyball.

Big 12 institutions create a league that encompasses five states and nearly 38 million people. Nearly 5,000 student-athletes from across the United States and around the World compete annually in the sports sponsored by the Conference.

The Conference currently conducts postseason championships for 22 of its 23 sports with the Football Championship Game returning in 2017 after a six-year absence. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition.

The Conference office is headquartered in Irving, Texas.

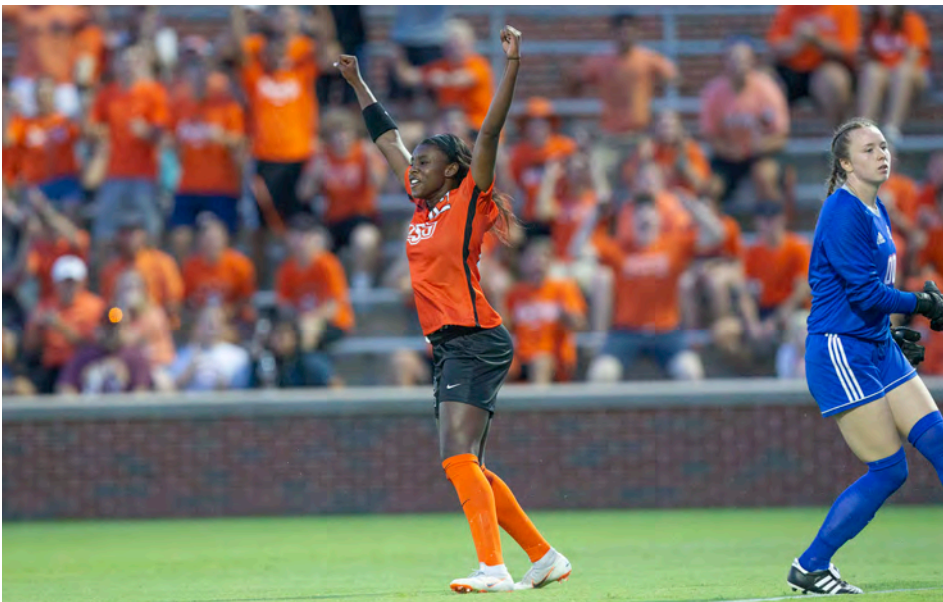

COLIN CARMICHAEL

**HEAD COACH
25TH SEASON AT OSU
(SOUTH ALABAMA, '93)**

If you are looking for a blueprint of how to build a collegiate soccer program into a national contender, Oklahoma State head coach Colin Carmichael would be a good place to start.

Carmichael has been at OSU since the inception of the women's soccer program in the fall of 1996, and he continues to help lead Cowgirl soccer to new heights and a spot among the nation's elite.

OSU is in the midst of the most successful stretch of seasons in program history, and as the program enters its 25th season in 2020, the Cowgirls are looking to continue their progress in what will mark Carmichael's 16th year as head coach.

Carmichael, who served as OSU's co-head coach with Karen Hancock during the 2005 and 2006 seasons, is 206-84-41 during his 15-year tenure as the Cowgirls' head coach, compiling a winning percentage of .684. He has led the Cowgirls to 11 appearances in the NCAA Women's Soccer Championship, including six straight from 2006-11, and after advancing to the second round of the NCAA tourney four-straight years, the Cowgirls made back-to-back trips to the Elite Eight in 2010 and 2011.

The Cowgirls have also been a dominant force in the Big 12 Conference under Carmichael, capturing six league titles, including four in a row from 2008-11. OSU won the regular season title in 2008, captured the Big 12 Soccer Championship title in 2009 and 2010 and claimed another regular season championship in 2011. The Cowgirls were crowned regular season conference champions again in 2017 and again in 2019.

In 2019, Carmichael earned Big 12 Coach of the Year honors for a conference-record sixth time, and he and his staff were also honored as the United Soccer Coaches South Region Staff of the Year after the Cowgirls for the second time in three seasons after OSU posted a 16-3-3 record and captured the Big 12 regular season championship by going 7-1-1 in league play.

Carmichael notched his 200th career win as OSU's head coach with the Cowgirls' 2-0 win at Texas on Oct. 11, 2019. Other highlights from the '19 season include:

- Kim Rodriguez became the fifth All-American in program history;
- The Cowgirls had five All-Big 12 honorees, the second-highest total in program history, including three first teamers;
- The 16 wins tied for the fifth most in a season in OSU history, and the Cowgirls were undefeated at home (10-0-1);
- OSU finished the season ranked as high as 13th in the final national polls.

The 2017 season saw OSU tie a program record with eight conference wins as they finished 8-1-0 in Big 12 play to earn the league crown. The Cowgirls advanced to the second round of the NCAA Women's Soccer Championship for the first time since 2011 and finished with a 16-4-3 record. They led the Big 12 in goals and points while ranking second in assists, and the program also claimed the fourth All-American in its history in Haley Woodard, a junior forward who became the second-straight Cowgirl to earn Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year honors.

OSU overcame numerous injuries to key players in 2014 and bounced back from an 0-6-0 start to the season to earn an NCAA tourney bid. The Cowgirls finished second league play at

5-2-1 and placed four players on the All-Big 12 team.

In 2013, OSU earned its eighth NCAA Tournament berth after a strong late-season run that saw the Cowgirls advance to the finals of the Big 12 Soccer Championship, their fourth appearance in the conference tourney title game under Carmichael.

The 2011 campaign ranks as the best in program history as OSU won a school record 22 games, highlighted by a record 21-game unbeaten streak. During that span, the Cowgirls were 19-0-2 and had a stretch in which they notched 15 consecutive wins.

The run to the Big 12 championship saw OSU finish 6-0-2 in league play. After falling in the title game of the conference tourney, the Cowgirls reeled off three-straight wins in the NCAA Championship before falling to top-ranked and eventual national champion Stanford.

Carmichael earned Big 12 Coach of the Year honors for the fourth time in 2011, and the Cowgirls saw a program-record seven players earn All-Big 12 status, including Melinda Mercado being named the league's Defensive Player of the Year for the second-straight year.

Mercado was part of a senior class that went 75-14-10 (.808) during their careers, placing them as the fourth-winningest senior class in the NCAA in 2011, and she was also one of two Cowgirls to earn All-American honors, along with AD Franch.

The year culminated with OSU finishing fifth in the final national rankings for the second-straight year.

The 2010 season saw OSU set a school record for wins as they finished 20-4-2, which also earned the Cowgirls their

highest-ever final ranking in the national polls at No. 5 in the NSCAA poll.

In a year that saw OSU tie a school record with a 13-game unbeaten streak and lead the Big 12 in goals and goals against average, Carmichael was named the 2010 Big 12 Conference Co-Coach of the Year and the NSCAA/Mondo Central Region Coach of the Year.

OSU led the Big 12 with five all-conference performers in 2010, including four first teamers, and a pair of Cowgirls — AD Franch and Melinda Mercado — earned All-America status.

In 2009, the Cowgirls peaked at just the right time. Carmichael's squad ended the season on a 10-game unbeaten streak, with eight wins and two ties. During that stretch, OSU claimed the second Big 12 Soccer Championship title in school history and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

After ending the regular season with five-straight wins, OSU entered the '09 Big 12 tourney as the fifth seed. The Cowgirls proceeded to knock off Nebraska, top-seeded Missouri and second-seeded Texas A&M en route to the title. OSU had lost to each of those teams during the regular season.

In the opening round of the NCAA Women's Soccer Championship, OSU battled USC to a scoreless draw but advanced by winning a penalty-kick shootout for the first time in school history. The Cowgirls were also forced into a shootout against 11th-ranked Santa Clara but failed to advance, ending their season with a 15-7-2 record.

OSU led the Big 12 in 2009 with three All-Big 12 First Team selections, including record-setting goalkeeper AD Franch, who

was also named a Freshman All-American.

The 2008 season was record setting on a number of levels. The Cowgirls finished 18-1-4, setting a school record for wins, and claimed the program's first-ever Big 12 Conference regular season championship.

The Cowgirls finished 13th in the final national polls after being ranked as high as No. 7 during the regular season. OSU's .870 winning percentage ranked sixth in the country.

OSU's offensive attack was among the nation's best as the Cowgirls led the NCAA in scoring offense at 3.22 goals per game and finished third nationally with 74 goals. The Cowgirls set single-season school records for goals and points.

Carmichael was named the 2008 Big 12 Conference Coach of the Year and also claimed 2008 Central Regional Coach of the Year honors. A program record six Cowgirls were honored with Big 12 postseason awards, including first-team all-conference performers Kasey Langdon and Yolanda Odenyo, who was also named the Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year.

In 2007, OSU finished the season with a 14-6-3 record, the 14 wins marking the third-highest total in program history. Along the way, OSU defeated four teams ranked in the Top 10, including a win over No. 9 San Diego in the first round of the NCAA Tournament and a landmark win against Notre Dame in which the Cowgirls snapped the Fighting Irish's 43-game home unbeaten streak.

Further signs of just how far the program continues to climb are evidenced by the fact that OSU started and finished the season in the national rankings for the first time in school history. The Cowgirls ended the season ranked No. 17 by Soccer Buzz Magazine and 23rd in both the NSCAA/adidas and SoccerTimes.com polls.

OSU also set a program home attendance record with 10,222 fans, an average of 929 fans per game at the Cowgirl Soccer Complex.

Carmichael served as an assistant coach at OSU until he was elevated to associate head coach in 2003 and co-head coach in 2005. In the four seasons following his promotion, the Cowgirls compiled a 54-20-11 record, captured a Big 12 Tournament title, finished second in the Big 12 regular season standings and made the first two trips to the NCAA Tournament in school history.

In 2006, Carmichael helped lead the Cowgirls to their best finish in school history as they went 17-3-3 and finished second in the Big 12 with an 8-1-1 conference mark. OSU earned its highest-ever national ranking as they climbed to as high as No.

7 in the NSCAA polls, and the squad advanced to the NCAA Tournament and defeated UNC-Greensboro for the school's first-ever tournament win.

Carmichael and Hancock were rewarded for their outstanding 2006 campaign by earning the Central Region Coach of the Year award. Soccer Buzz named the coaching tandem runner-up for National Coach of the Year behind North Carolina's Anson Dorrance.

One of the biggest reasons for the program's recent success is the influx of talent that has come to Stillwater as a result of Carmichael's excellent recruiting skills. The Cowgirls continue to bring in some of the top-ranked classes in the Central Region, and in 2005, OSU had the 11th-ranked recruiting class in the nation.

Carmichael's knack for recruiting overseas has been at the forefront of most of those outstanding classes. In 2005, he landed the second-rated international recruit in German native Angelika Feldbacher, and in 2006, top-rated international recruit, Annika Niemeier, signed to play in Stillwater.

Carmichael, a native of Airdrie, Scotland, also helped bring in Swedish native Yolanda Odenyo, who became the first OSU player to earn first-team All-American honors in 2006.

Carmichael also worked on the coaching staff of the Region III Olympic Development team for 15 years. The ODP has seen numerous players go on to play soccer at the collegiate level as well as with the U.S. National Team.

In the spring of 2001, Carmichael was recognized as the U.S. Soccer Association's Region III Coach of the Year and was a finalist for the National Coach of the Year honor.

In 1991, while Carmichael was still an active player at USA, he began his coaching career at St. Paul's Episcopal High School in Mobile, Ala. After his graduation in 1993, he was hired on as an assistant coach at USA, where he assisted with the men's program and also helped to establish the women's program.

While at USA, Carmichael earned a marketing degree, and he received his Master's in physical education in 1996. He currently holds a U.S. Soccer Federation "A" License and a National Soccer Coaches Association of America "Premier" License.

Carmichael resides in Stillwater with his wife, Stacie, and their children, Maggie and Ean.

Justin Elkington enters his 12th year on the Oklahoma State coaching staff after having been named an assistant in July 2009. He was elevated to the Cowgirls' associate head coach in July 2012.

Since Elkington's arrival in Stillwater, OSU has compiled a 147-68-28 record (.663) and continued to establish itself as a national power by making eight appearances in the NCAA Women's Soccer Championship. In two of those years, the Cowgirls advanced to the Elite Eight of the tourney and finished No. 5 in the final national rankings.

The Cowgirls have also captured five Big 12 Conference championships since Elkington's arrival, claiming regular season crowns in 2011, 2017 and 2019 and tournament titles in 2009 and 2010.

In 2012, Elkington was named the NSCAA Women's College Assistant Coach of the Year for the Midwest Region after helping guide OSU to a school-record 22 wins. In 2017 and 2019, the OSU coaching staff was honored as the United Soccer Coaches South Region Staff of the Year.

A native of Lincoln, England, Elkington spent 10 years as the head coach of the Broken Arrow Soccer Club prior to joining the Cowgirls. While there, he coached and helped develop such future OSU standouts as Siera Strawser, Katie Richardson, Allyson Leggett and Sarah Brown.

"Joining the coaching staff at Oklahoma State gave me an opportunity to coach at a higher level and at a program which has established itself as one of the top collegiate soccer programs in the country," Elkington said. "I'm very familiar with the program's status and its history, and the long-term vision of the program is on par with my own ambition — to coach and win at the highest level."

Elkington had an immediate impact in his first season in Stillwater, helping the Cowgirls to a 15-7-2 mark and a Big 12 Conference tournament championship. OSU also advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the fourth-straight year. In 2010, OSU enjoyed its most successful season ever with 20 wins, another Big 12 Conference championship and an NCAA Tournament run to the Elite Eight.

Among Elkington's duties at OSU is goalkeeper coach, and he was instrumental in the development of record-setting goalie AD Franch, helping her develop into a three-time All-American and four-time All-Big 12 First Team selection. He also helped Cowgirl Michela Ongaro earn a spot on the 2013 Big 12 All-Newcomer Team as a freshman, and she went on to a career that saw her rank among OSU's all-time leaders in saves, shutouts and goals against average. Another Elkington pupil, Rosa Medina, also finished her career among the Cowgirls' all-time leaders in several statistical categories.



Elkington, who turned the Hurricane Futbol Club into one of the premier youth soccer clubs in the region, was named the 2008 Youth Girls Soccer Coach of the Year by the Oklahoma Soccer Association. He has also spent time as a coach in the Oklahoma Olympic Development Program.

"Justin is a tremendous addition to our coaching staff," said OSU head coach Colin Carmichael. "He is a top-class coach and has received the highest level of coaching licenses available in the United States. His dedication to continuing his coaching education has made him one of the most qualified coaches around, and we are fortunate to have him on our staff... His knowledge and ability to teach the game of soccer should help us to build upon our recent success and continue to compete on the national level."

A 1997 graduate of Oral Roberts University, Elkington was a four-year letterman for the Golden Eagles' soccer team. He graduated with a bachelor of science degree in mass media communications, public relations and advertising.

Elkington was a captain of a national championship state soccer team in his native England and also played professional soccer for the Tulsa Roughnecks.

Elkington holds several national licenses from the United States Soccer Federation, including an "A" License, a "Director of Coaching Diploma," a "National Youth License" and a "Goal Keeping License."

He also holds a "Premier Diploma" and a Regional "Goal Keeper Diploma" from the National Soccer Coaching Association of America.



Elkington and his wife, Deana, were married in August of 2008, and have a daughter, Jade.

KAREN HANCOCK

**ASSISTANT COACH
25TH SEASON AT OSU
(TULSA, '90)**

Since becoming the first head coach in Oklahoma State soccer history over two decades ago and spending the last 11 as an assistant coach, Karen Hancock has helped build the Cowgirl soccer program into a force in the Big 12 Conference and on the national scene.

Oklahoma State hired Hancock on Feb. 1, 1996, to begin a new era in the long tradition of sports at OSU, and she piloted the Cowgirls to a 10-7-2 record in their inaugural campaign.

Following the season, OSU received recognition as one of the top 10 first-year soccer programs in the nation. The Cowgirls competed with 31 other Division I schools in 1996 to earn this honor from Soccer Buzz Magazine.

Hancock spent the next 10 seasons as OSU's head coach. She guided the Cowgirls to an 110-89-19 record and helped lead the program into the national spotlight as represented by the Cowgirls' first ever NCAA Tournament win in 2006. OSU finished the year with a school-record 17 wins and climbed as high as No. 7 in the national polls. Their 8-1-1 Big 12 regular season mark placed them second in the conference. Hancock also registered her 100th win at Oklahoma State with a 1-0 home victory over Kansas on Sept. 22, 2006.

Hancock, along with co-head coach Colin Carmichael, earned Big 12 Coach of the Year honors and Central Region Coach of the Year accolades in 2006. The pair was also runner-up for National Coach of the Year honors. Hancock was also the Big 12 Co-Coach of the Year in 2002.

In 2017, Hancock was part of an OSU coaching staff that was honored as the United Soccer Coaches South Region

Staff of the Year after the Cowgirls claimed the Big 12 regular season championship and finished with 16 wins.

Hancock played collegiate soccer at the University of Tulsa, where she was a four-year starter between 1987 and 1990. She served as the team captain for three seasons and was named TU's Most Inspirational Player in 1989 and 1990. Also in 1990, Hancock was awarded the Best Defensive Player of the Year Award.

Upon graduating from TU, Hancock began her coaching career at Bishop Kelley High School in Tulsa, Okla. She left Bishop Kelley in 1991 to become the assistant coach at Arkansas-Little Rock, and in 1994, she left UALR and accepted the head coaching job at the South Alabama.

Starting the women's soccer program from scratch at South Alabama, she was able to amass a record of 21-13-2 in the program's first two years. USA compiled a record of 11-6 in its first season of competition under Hancock. The second year was even better as the Jaguars went 10-7-2 and were recognized as the eighth best team in the Central Region.

A native of Tulsa, Okla., Coach Hancock earned a B.S. degree in speech pathology from the University of Tulsa in 1990 and a master's degree in secondary education from Arkansas-Little Rock in 1994. She holds a USSF "B" Coaching License.

The former Karen Horstman and her husband, the late Will Hancock, have a daughter, Andrea, who was born on November 16, 2000.

2019 REVIEW

2019 SEASON IN REVIEW

Oklahoma State celebrated another championship season in 2019 and achieved numerous milestones and accolades along the way.

The Cowgirls opened the season with a 4-0-1 mark, including an impressive win over Saint Louis. They took that mark to Happy Valley and a showdown with No. 6 Penn State and served notice as a team to be reckoned with by knocking off the Nittany Lions, 2-1, in double overtime as Kim Rodriguez' golden goal clinched the upset for OSU.

OSU went undefeated in its next three games to secure a 7-0-2 mark heading into Big 12 Conference play.

The opening weekend of league action saw the Cowgirls travel to the Lone Star State, where they dropped a 1-0 contest at Texas Tech in their Big 12 opener. OSU looked like it would end the road trip winless before a clutch goal in the 88th minute by Ally Jackson at TCU helped the visitors pick up a point with a 1-1 draw.

Following the opening weekend, the Cowgirls would get on a roll that would propel them to the conference crown as they reeled off seven consecutive victories.

The first of those came in an impressive 5-2 drubbing of 21st-ranked Kansas. A week later, the Cowgirls picked up a 2-0 win at Texas, a victory that marked the 200th of Colin Carmichael's head coaching career.

Up next, the Cowgirls achieved a program first as they defeated West Virginia for the first time in program history, traveling to Morgantown and winning 2-1.

A 3-1 triumph over Bedlam-rival Oklahoma on Oct. 25 sent OSU into the final game of the regular season atop the Big 12 standings, and the Cowgirls would secure the trophy with a 3-0 rout of Baylor to finish the league slate 7-1-1. The title marked OSU's second in the last three seasons.

OSU entered the postseason with a 14-1-3 record and picked up its 15th win by defeating OU, 2-1, in the opening round of the Big 12 Championship in Kansas City. In the semifinals, Kansas dashed the Cowgirls' hopes of another trophy as bested Carmichael's squad 2-1 in double overtime.

With a top-15 national ranking, OSU was awarded a No. 3 national seed in the NCAA Women's Soccer Championship. The Cowgirls hosted South Dakota State in the opening round of the NCAA tourney and emerged a 1-0 winner, securing an undefeated season on their home field at 10-0-1.

With the win, OSU advanced to face No. 21 Santa Clara in the second round of the NAAs in Los Angeles. Playing a man down over the final 70 minutes following a red card, the Cowgirls battled mightily but came up on the short end of a 3-1 score to end their season.

- Oklahoma State finished the 2019 season with a 16-3-3 record.

- OSU captured the seventh Big 12 Conference championship in program history, winning the regular season title with a 7-1-1 mark. The Cowgirls opened league play 0-1-1 before reeling off seven consecutive wins to claim the crown. It marked the program's fourth regular season championship and second in the last three years.

- The Cowgirls earned the 12th bid to the NCAA Women's Soccer Championship in program history and advanced to the second round for the ninth time.

- OSU went 10-0-1 at Neal Patterson Stadium, marking the seventh time in program history the Cowgirls finished a season undefeated on their home field. Seven of their wins at home came via shutout, and they did not allow a goal in their first five home matches.

- The Cowgirls posted an eight-game winning streak during one stretch, OSU's longest win streak since 2011 and the fifth-longest winning streak in program history.

- OSU was ranked in the national polls for the final 12 weeks



of 2019, peaking at No. 9 on Nov. 5. The Cowgirls were ranked as high as No. 13 in the final polls by *TopDrawerSoccer.com* and were also ranked 19th by the United Soccer Coaches.

- The Cowgirls' 16 wins tied for the fifth most in a season in program history.

- OSU's 2-1 double overtime win over No. 6 Penn State marked just the fifth time in program history the Cowgirls have beaten a top-10 ranked team on the road.

- Defender Kim Rodriguez was named to the United Soccer Coaches All-America Second Team. She became just the fifth Cowgirl in program history to earn All-American status.

- OSU collected its most all-conference selections since 2011 — and its second most all time — as five Cowgirls garnered All-Big 12 honors.

- Kim Rodriguez and Grace Yochum were named to the All-Big 12 First Team, while Olyvia Dowell, Jaci Jones and Charmé Morgan earned All-Big 12 Second Team honors.

- Olyvia Dowell was named to the Big 12 All-Freshman Team.

- Colin Carmichael was named the Big 12 Coach of the Year for a record sixth time.

- OSU had four players named to the United Soccer Coaches All-Midwest Region Team, the most all-region selections for the Cowgirls since 2011. Kim Rodriguez was named to the All-Midwest Region First Team, Charmé Morgan and Grace Yochum were second-team honorees and Jaci Jones earned third-team accolades. It marked the second consecutive year that Rodriguez earned all-region honors.

- Kim Rodriguez was named to the *TopDrawerSoccer.com* Postseason Women's National Top 100, coming in at No. 60 in the rankings.

- Olyvia Dowell was No. 53 on the *TopDrawerSoccer.com* Postseason Women's Freshmen Top 100 rankings.

- OSU collected numerous weekly honors from various entities in 2019:

- Jaci Jones recorded 12 assists, a total that led the Big 12 and ranked 10th nationally. It also tied for the fifth-best single-season total in program history.

- Jaci Jones finished her career with 24 assists, which ranks fourth on OSU's all-time list.

- Grace Yochum led the Cowgirls with 11 goals, the most ever by an OSU sophomore.

- Grace Yochum became just the 12th player in OSU history to record a hat trick when she tallied three goals at Iowa State.

- Dani Greenlee finished her career ranked fourth all time at OSU in goals against average at 0.88, and her 99 saves ranks seventh on the Cowgirls' career list.

- Colin Carmichael reached a milestone with his 200th career win on Oct. 11 with OSU's 2-0 victory at Texas.

- Hannah Webb was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-America Third Team. The junior defender is the seventh student-athlete in program history to be named an Academic All-American by CoSIDA.

- Jaci Jones earn Scholar All-West Region Second Team honors from the United Soccer Coaches.

- OSU had 12 student-athletes named to the Academic All-Big 12 Team Soccer Team, with each achieving first-team status. Earning Academic All-Big 12 First Team honors were Madeline Blasko, Dani Greenlee, Elise Hawn, Camy Huddleston, Ally Jackson, Jaci Jones, Julia Lenhardt, Kirsten Siragusa, Hannah Warner, Hannah Webb, Grace Yochum and Barbara Zágonyi.

Midfielder Yolanda Odenyo is one of the most decorated players in Oklahoma State soccer history and became Cowgirl soccer's first All-American in 2006. Odenyo would go on to earn All-America status in each of her final three seasons in an OSU uniform.

In 2006, Odenyo was named a first-team All-American by both the NSCAA/adidas and *Soccer Buzz Magazine* after leading OSU to its highest-ever national ranking (No. 7) and a school-record 17 wins, including the first NCAA Tournament victory in Cowgirl soccer history. She was also named the 2006 Big 12 Conference Co-Player of the Year and the Central Region Player of the Year after recording five goals and eight assists.

As a junior in 2007, Odenyo was named a second-team All-American by *Soccer Buzz* after finishing the season with seven goals and three assists. *Soccer Buzz* also named her one of its 14 player of the year finalists.

Odenyo capped her career with the best season ever by a Cowgirl in 2008. She set OSU single-season records with 16 goals and 37 points, both of which also led the Big 12. She also set a school record by scoring goals in seven consecutive games and was named the Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year.

Following her senior season, Odenyo was named an All-American by four different outlets, including earning a spot on the first team of three of those. She was a finalist for two player of the year awards and was one of 15 semifinalists for the Hermann Trophy, given to the nation's top collegiate player.

Goalkeeper AD Franch was a three-time All-American for the Cowgirls, earning multiple honors in 2010, 2011 and 2012.

Franch rewrote the OSU soccer record books during her four seasons in Stillwater. Her 38 career shutouts are a program best and rank 22nd in NCAA history, while her 8,064:02 in goal is also the most by a Cowgirl and 15th all time in the NCAA. She also finished with 325 career saves and a 0.69 goals against average.

Franch capped her career with a senior season that included six shutouts and 79 saves as she became the first Cowgirl in history to be a two-time NSCAA first-team All-American. She was also named to the *Soccer America* MVPs Second Team.

As a junior in 2011, Franch recorded an OSU single-season record 12 shutouts en route to a pair of first-team All-America honors from the NSCAA and *Soccer America*. With her in goal, the Cowgirls led the NCAA in shutouts and goals against average, and she ranked second nationally in GAA (0.35) and shutout percentage (0.92).

Franch earned multiple All-America honors for the first time as a sophomore in 2010 as she was named to the NSCAA/Performance Subaru All-America Second Team and was also honored as a member of the *TopDrawerSoccer.com* Team of the Season First Team and with a spot on the *Soccer America* MVPs First Team. She led the Big 12 with nine shutouts and ranked second in goals against average (0.73) and save percentage (.826).

Defender Melinda Mercado anchored some of the NCAA's top defenses during her Oklahoma State career and finished as a two-time All-American.

As a senior in 2011, Mercado helped lead a defense that led the NCAA in goals against average (0.337) and shutouts (18) as the Cowgirls recorded a school-record 22 wins and advanced to their second-straight NCAA Elite Eight. For her efforts, she was named a first-team All-American by the NSCAA.

OSU was one of the NCAA's top defensive teams in 2010 in large part due to Mercado, and she was named to the NSCAA All-America Second Team and earned a spot on the *TopDrawerSoccer.com* Team of the Season Third Team.

From her center back spot, Mercado led an OSU defensive unit that led the Big 12 Conference in goals against average at 0.79. The Cowgirls also ranked second in goals allowed (21) and shutouts (10).

Mercado was named the Big 12 Conference Defensive Player of the Year and was a first-team all-conference pick. She also captured Defensive MVP honors at the Big 12 Soccer Championship for the second consecutive year. Additionally, she was named to the NSCAA All-Central Region First Team.

With Mercado anchoring the defense, OSU earned a No. 5 national ranking in the final polls after the Cowgirls advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Women's Soccer Championship, captured their third-straight conference title and recorded a program-record 20 wins.

Woodard became the fourth All-American in program history when she earned United Soccer Coaches third team honors following her junior season in 2017.

Woodard's All-America campaign saw her lead the Cowgirls with eight goals while also adding three assists as she helped OSU to a 16-4-3 record, a Big 12 regular season championship and an appearance in the second round of the NCAA Women's Soccer Championship.

Named the Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year and an All-Big 12 First Team selection, Woodard led the Big 12 with four goals and nine points in conference-only games.

Kim Rodriguez became the fifth All-American in OSU soccer history in 2019 when she was named to the United Soccer Coaches All-America Second Team.

As a junior in 2019, Rodriguez scored three goals and tallied seven assists in 20 games, and she anchored a defense that posted 10 shutouts and allowed just 18 goals in 15 games.

Rodriguez' play helped OSU capture the 2019 Big 12 regular season championship and earn a No. 3 national seed in the NCAA Women's Soccer Championship, where it advanced to the second round.

A member of Mexico's National Team, Rodriguez was a unanimous selection to the All-Big 12 First Team, and she was named to the *TopDrawerSoccer.com* Postseason Women's National Top 100, coming in at No. 60 in the rankings.

NATIONAL TEAMS

A number of Oklahoma State standouts have gone on to represent their respective countries as members of national teams, including two Cowgirls — AD Franch and Courtney Dike — who have been on FIFA World Cup rosters.

Franch has been a member of the United States Women's National Team since 2012 and earned her first-career cap in 2019 at the SheBelieves Cup. The former Cowgirl All-American was on the roster of the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup champion U.S. squad.

Dike was the first-ever Oklahoma State player to appear in the World Cup when she earned two caps for Nigeria in 2015, including starting against the eventual champion United States team. Dike was a four-time All-Big 12 Conference forward for the Cowgirls from 2013-16.

Coumba Sow was a starting midfielder for the Switzerland National Team at the 2019 Algarve Cup. Sow was part of the OSU program in 2016 and 2017, scoring three goals in 23 games for the Cowgirls' 2017 Big 12 Conference championship squad.

Current Cowgirl and All-Big 12 defender Kim Rodriguez received her first call up to the Mexico National Team in Feb. 2019; she started for Mexico at the 2019 Cyprus Women's Cup and again in the 2019 Pan American Games in Peru.

Other OSU players who have competed for national teams include 2003 Cowgirl goalie Kathrin Lehmann (Switzerland) and 2019 incoming freshman forward Peyton Vincze (Wales).



COWGIRLS IN THE PROS

In January 2013, AD Franch became Oklahoma State's highest-ever professional draft pick when the Cowgirls' All-American goalie was selected in the first round of the National Women's Soccer League with the sixth overall pick by the Western New York Flash. In 2012, Melinda Mercado was a third-round draft choice of the Boston Breakers in the WPS Draft, while Kasey Langdon was a sixth-round pick of the Atlanta Beat in the 2010 WPS Draft. Franch and Mercado both spent time in the NWSL in its inaugural season in 2013.

Joining the list of Cowgirls in the professional ranks in 2017 was former OSU All-Big 12 midfielder Allie Stephenson, who competed for IK Myran Damer in Finland, while Anna Beffer signed with France's AS Pierrots Vauban in 2018. Coumba Sow has played professionally in her native Switzerland and is now a member of Paris FC Féminines, while Laurene Tresfield is also playing professionally in France with HAC Féminines.

During her rookie season in 2013, Franch started every game in goal and led the Flash to the NWSL regular season title, and they advanced to the championship game of the playoffs. She was named to the NWSL Second XI team and finished second in the league's Rookie of the Year and Goalkeeper of the Year voting after recording six shutouts and a league-leading 82 saves.

Franch, who also spent a year playing in Norway for Avaldsnes, has established herself as the NWSL's top goalie over the last four seasons with the Portland Thorns. She was named the NWSL Goalkeeper of the Year and was a NWSL Best XI selection in both 2017 and 2018, setting a league record with 11 shutouts and helping lead the Thorns to the NWSL title in 2017.

NEAL PATTERSON STADIUM

Neal Patterson Stadium was officially dedicated on Aug. 19, 2018, prior to the Oklahoma State-Oklahoma match. The Cowgirls were 2-1 victors in the contest as an OSU women's soccer record crowd of 4,122 fans was in attendance. Kim Rodriguez scored the first-ever goal in the stadium when she converted a penalty kick in the 15th minute.

A \$20 million project, Neal Patterson Stadium is a showcase for Cowgirl Soccer and one of the top soccer facilities in the collegiate ranks. It is named for its major benefactor and Oklahoma State alumnus, the late Neal Patterson.

Patterson, who passed away during the summer of 2017, grew up near his family's farm in Manchester, Okla. He earned a bachelor's degree in finance and a master's degree in business from Oklahoma State. He was one of five entrepreneurs who founded Sporting Club, which in 2006 purchased the Sporting KC Major League Soccer franchise. He was also chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Cerner Corporation, a company he co-founded with two colleagues in 1979. Today, Cerner is the world's largest publicly traded health information technology company with \$4.8 billion in revenues in 2016 and approximately 24,000 associates worldwide. FORTUNE recently named Cerner one of the world's most admired companies.

"When you provide an education to someone with intelligence, work ethic, determination and big dreams, you occasionally create a force that changes the world," said Mike Holder, OSU's Director of Athletics. "Neal Patterson did that in the health care industry, and our goal is to use his investment in OSU soccer to attract bright, determined, big dreamers from around the world to our soccer team.

"We have been blessed to have an abundance of successful and generous people that have helped transform our athletic department," he added. "Our hope is that Neal's gift will motivate someone else to make a difference on our campus. His name on the stadium is our way of saying thank you and inspiring that next great donor."

The new facility includes club seats, plaza and upper bowl gathering areas and a north end zone terrace area and seating designed specifically for OSU students. Team facilities include locker rooms, meeting areas, kitchen facilities, sports medicine areas and equipment rooms. The stadium can accommodate 2,500 fans in permanent seats.

The west side of the stadium includes 346 reserved chairback seats and 810 reserved bleacher-back seats. There are 552 general admission seats.

The north end zone includes bleacher seating for more than 500 and includes a patio, a building and a concourse area that can host more than 125 for gatherings.

Atop the west side of the stadium are two club levels with a capacity of 80 and two suites with a capacity of 20 guests each. A new press box sits atop the stadium. The west side is anchored by a club area at field level that can host more than 100 and serve as a player lounge and nutrition area on non-game days.

Other unique aspects of Patterson Stadium include:

- A large roof that covers much of the seating areas, providing shade and a soccer-specific feel like that in many international venues;
- Home and visitor bench areas with chairback seating built into the stadium;
- A 26 feet by 40 feet high-definition video scoreboard in the southeast corner of the facility.

"A facility of this magnitude is a game changer for our program," said OSU head soccer coach Colin Carmichael. "It helps the current student-athletes to be in one of the nicest facilities in the country. Our fans are going to have a much better game day experience. We want it to be a real family atmosphere.

"We have always had a good student following," he added. "But we want to enhance their experience, which will make for a better atmosphere. And of course this will affect recruiting.

"Every recruit wants to know that how serious a school is about their sport. This is a huge statement from our administration."

Oklahoma State University



The story of Oklahoma State University began on Christmas Eve, 1890, at the McKennon Opera House in Oklahoma's territorial capital of Guthrie when Territorial Governor George W. Steele signed legislation establishing an Oklahoma Agricultural and Mechanical College (OAMC) in Payne County. OAMC's first students assembled for class on December 14, 1891, even though there were no buildings, no books, and no curriculum. The college's first students attended classes in the Stillwater Congregational Church. The original campus consisted of 200 acres of prairie that were donated by four local homesteaders. The

college's first six graduates received their diplomas in 1896.

Visitors to the OSU campus often marvel at its beauty and consistency of architecture. Much of the credit goes to legendary president, Henry G. Bennett, who served from 1928-1951. Dr. Bennett's 25-year campus master plan envisioned some of the university's most famous and beautiful structures, including the Edmon Low Library and the OSU Student Union. Under the direction of OSU President Burns Hargis, a new campus master plan is guiding unprecedented construction that

is making OSU more competitive in academics and athletics. Starting in the fall of 2008, OSU has opened the Multimodal Transportation Terminal, the North Classroom Building, the west end zone of Boone Pickens Stadium, refurbished Old Central, the Donald W. Reynolds Architecture Building, an upgraded Murray Hall, the Henry Bellmon Research Center, an updated and expanded Student Union, the Greenwood Tennis Center, the north wing to the College of Human Sciences building, an upgraded Atherton Hotel in the Student Union, the innovative University Commons residential complex and dining facility,

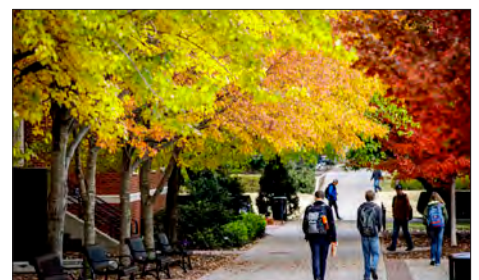
the crescent-shaped business building, and the world-class ENDEAVOR facility for interdisciplinary research. In October 2019, OSU opened the magnificent McKnight Center for the Performing Arts with the New York Philharmonic. The next major facility opening will be the top-tier O'Brate Stadium for baseball. Hall of Fame Avenue on the north and University Avenue on the south, as well as core north-south artery Monroe Street, have all been significantly upgraded, and the university continues to update its campus landscape plan, including the addition of a Welcome Plaza south-east of the Student Union.

OSU grew quite rapidly following World War II. The post-war years were marked by a huge enrollment surge and the thriving "Veteran's Village" on the northwest edge of campus as veterans and their families moved into surplus military housing provided by the college. The mid-1940s also were a golden era for athletics at Oklahoma A&M. In a 90-day period in early 1945, OAMC teams won the Cotton Bowl, the NCAA championship in wrestling, and the NCAA championship in basketball. In 2016, the undefeated 1945 football team was retroactively awarded the national championship trophy by the American Football Coaches Association. In 1946, the wrestling and basketball teams repeated as national champions, and the football team won the Sugar Bowl.

Coaches and players from that era are now sports legends. Coach Henry Iba set a national standard in basketball and Edward Gallagher took OAMC wrestling teams to international prominence.

People often ask when OSU made the transition from college to university. By the 1950s the college had grown substantially and in 1957 OAMC became The Oklahoma State University for Agriculture and Applied Science. During the next three decades, OSU would build academic programs to match its new status. Enrollment more than doubled from 10,385 in 1957 to more than 23,000 in the 1980s. OSU became a statewide university system, adding branches in Okmulgee in 1946 and Oklahoma City in 1961. OSU merged with the Oklahoma College of Osteopathic Medicine in 1988, and OSU-Tulsa was born in 1999.

Today, OSU has 35,000 students across five campuses and a presence in every Oklahoma county through its extension offices and experiment stations. From six graduates in 1896, to 5,000 annually today, the small college on the prairie has grown and prospered far beyond the dreams of its founders. OSU teaching, research and graduates are making a bigger impact on the lives of people around the world than ever before. It's a great time to be a Cowboy!

University President Burns Hargis

Burns Hargis was named the 18th President of Oklahoma State University and the OSU System in December 2007 and took office March 10, 2008. Hargis oversees one of the nation's most comprehensive land-grant university systems with more than 35,000 students, 7,000 employees, and campuses located in Stillwater, Tulsa, Oklahoma City and Okmulgee.

As president, Hargis has enthusiastically united the broad OSU community of students, employees, alumni and donors behind his bold vision of a modern land-grant university that cuts across disciplines to better prepare students for success. The results have been historic.

He has guided OSU to record enrollment and record fundraising, with pledges and cash surpassing the \$1 billion Branding Success campaign goal nearly two years ahead of schedule. In total, OSU has raised more than \$2 billion in private support

and added more than 81,000 new donors during Hargis' time as president.

OSU's giving has focused on student scholarships, faculty and other vital resources and programs. Hargis also is overseeing a construction boom that is transforming the OSU campus to be more competitive in academics and athletics. Most recently, the crescent-shaped business building and spectacular McKnight Center for the Performing Arts are new campus icons. Guided by Hargis' vision, the OSU campus has never looked more beautiful.

Hargis and his wife, First Cowgirl Ann, are active across campus, interacting regularly with OSU's diverse student body. Strong proponents of wellness, they have led OSU's initiative as America's Healthiest Campus. They also have taken OSU's story of success to alumni around the world.

He is past chairman of the Big 12 Conference Board of Directors and represents the conference as a member of the NCAA Division I Board of Directors and the NCAA Board of Governors.

Before being named OSU President, Hargis had a long and distinguished legal and business career, with active civic and philanthropic leadership across many fronts. He also is familiar to many Oklahomans through the political perspective and wit he provided on the award-winning television program "Flashpoint".

Prior to coming to OSU, he was Vice Chairman of Bank of Oklahoma, N.A. Before joining Bank of Oklahoma in 1997, Hargis practiced law in Oklahoma City for 28 years, most recently with the firm of McAfee & Taft. He is a former president of the Oklahoma County Bar Association, former president of the Oklahoma Bar Foundation, and is a Fellow of the American Bar Foundation.

Hargis served as vice-chairman of the Oklahoma State Election Board, the Oklahoma Constitutional Revision Commission, and served as Chairman of the Oklahoma Commission for Human Services. Hargis was a candidate for the Republican nomination for Governor of Oklahoma in 1990.

A firm believer in the power of imagination and collaboration, Hargis was the first chair of the Oklahoma Creativity Project. He has served and chaired many boards, including the Board of Regents for the Oklahoma Agricultural and Mechanical Colleges of Oklahoma State University.

Hargis received the state's highest honor when he was inducted into the Oklahoma Hall of Fame in 2009. Hargis and his wife, Ann, have two children and three grandchildren.





Athletic Director Mike Holder

Athletics Director
16th Year | Oklahoma State, 1970

Mike Holder won eight NCAA team titles as head men's golf coach at Oklahoma State from 1973-2005, but what he's done for his alma mater while serving as athletic director since then is perhaps even more remarkable, especially in the realm of facilities and fundraising.

Facilities

When Holder took over as athletic director on September 16, 2005, he set out an audacious facilities master plan that has produced perhaps the most impressive collection of facilities in America.

The facilities renaissance was actually set into motion during Holder's coaching days when he was a central figure in bringing Karsten Creek Golf Course into existence. The home of Cowboy and Cowgirl golf is widely recognized among the very best public courses in the nation and hosted the NCAA Championships in 2003, 2011 and 2018, along with several men's and women's NCAA regionals.

Holder's first major facilities move as athletic director came with a total overhaul of Boone Pickens Stadium that was completed in 2009. With Holder serving as athletic director, both the north and the west sides of the stadium were brought to their current form and the stadium is now recognized as one of the finest in college football.

Built from the ground up during Holder's tenure as athletic director are the Sherman Smith Indoor Training Center, the Michael and Anne Greenwood Tennis Center, Neal Patterson Stadium and O'Brate Stadium. Each of those facilities ranks among the elite within their respective sports.

Opened in 2013, the 94,000-square foot Sherman Smith Center is the primary practice home for Cowboy football, but serves nearly every OSU team. The Greenwood Tennis Center was recognized by the USTA as the nation's top facility in 2016 and was selected to host the 2020 NCAA Championships. Neal Patterson Stadium opened in 2018 and is a showcase for Cowgirl soccer.

Set to open in 2021, O'Brate Stadium may very well be the best college baseball-only facility in the country. It features 3,500 permanent seats, 11 suites and 400 premium seats in dedicated club and suite areas. It has state-of-the-art accommodations for the team as well.

Fundraising

Any discussion about fundraising at Oklahoma State must start with Holder's close friend, Boone Pickens, who gave more than \$600 million to his alma mater. Holder's vision for athletic facilities inspired Pickens to give \$165 million toward the project in 2006, marking the largest donation in the history of college athletics.

At Holder's urging, OSU Athletics has placed an emphasis on scholarship endowments. The "Leave A Legacy" endowment drive has seen Oklahoma State climb from dead last in the Big 12 to the top with gifts and commitments of approximately \$61 million. As recently as 2009, OSU's endowment stood at just \$2.1 million.

Perhaps Holder's adept fundraising stems from his "fund-giving". He and his wife, Robbie, illustrated their commitment to Oklahoma State when they donated \$500,000 for the first fully endowed scholarship for Cowboy football. The scholarship is named for former OSU player, the late Vernon Grant. The Holders' lifetime giving to OSU surpasses \$2.5 million, including \$1 million for an entrepreneurship super chair at OSU in the Spears School of Business.

"Robbie and I made the gift to the college of business because of (OSU donors) Malone and Amy Mitchell," Holder said at the announcement. "Having two degrees in business was the icing on the cake. I would like to see the new program nationally recognized and make a difference in the lives of young people."

Malone and Amy Mitchell had made a \$57.2 million gift to OSU, split evenly between athletics and academics, on the day the Holders announced their \$1 million gift.

Success in Competition

Oklahoma State has won six NCAA team titles under Holder's watch and entering the 2020-21 academic year, 11 different OSU programs have combined to win 55 conference titles with Holder in the athletic director's chair. Locally, OSU has won the all-sports Bedlam Series over in-state rival Oklahoma in six of the past seven years.

Holder has presided over the best sustained era in Cowboy football history. The Pokes won the Big 12 Conference title outright in 2011 and have appeared in 14 straight bowl games, with four appearances in New Year's Six contests since 2010. In that same time span, the Cowboys have averaged 9.3 wins per season and rank 12th nationally with 93 wins.

Background in Golf

During his tenure as OSU men's golf coach, Holder's successes included not only his team's results on the course, but his players' performances in the classroom and beyond.

In 2000, Holder's Cowboy golf team claimed the national championship, marking the eighth time his squad carried home the NCAA trophy. And while high national finishes are the norm at Oklahoma State, the accomplishments of his teams never stopped at the 18th hole.

Holder took over his OSU coaching post on July 1, 1973, and during his tenure, his teams set student-athlete standards that were unequaled. While he coached 112 All-America selections, including 38 first-team choices, and has numer-

ous former players competing on the PGA Tour, overseas and on mini-tours, Holder saw to it that his players also excelled in the classroom. During his tenure, OSU produced three Ben Hogan Award winners, which was based on academic and athletic excellence nationwide. Kevin Wentworth earned the honor in 1990, Trip Kuehne claimed the prestigious award in 1995 and Hunter Mahan was named the 2003 recipient. Kuehne was OSU's outstanding male graduate in 1995 as well.

Holder is one of five coaches in NCAA history, regardless of sport, to win a national championship in four different decades. Three times Holder coached the Cowboys to the national team title the same year an OSU individual also claimed medalist honors (1978, 1987 and 2000). Along the way, he claimed 25 conference championships. His 21 Big Eight championships were the second most by a head coach in any sport, trailing only Kansas basketball coach Phog Allen.

As a student-athlete, Holder was the 1970 Big Eight medalist and led OSU to the conference team title. He was a third-team All-American as a junior and a senior and an honorable mention All-American as a sophomore.

Personal

A graduate of Ardmore HS, Holder earned his degree in marketing from Oklahoma State in 1970 and completed work on his MBA at OSU in 1973. His wife, Robbie, graduated as salutatorian from Jasper High School in 1966, and attended the University of Houston where they met at the All-American Intercollegiate golf tournament in 1968.

Very few athletic departments produce the kind of consistent success found at Oklahoma State. OSU boasts NCAA team championships in five different sports – wrestling (34 titles), men's golf (11 titles), men's cross country (four titles), men's basketball (two titles) and baseball (one title). Additionally, OSU football and equestrian have been recognized as national champions by other organizations, with football honored as the American Football Coaches Association national champion in 1945 and equestrian winning four team national titles as recognized by the National Collegiate Equestrian Association.

OSU has won 52 NCAA team championships - a mark that ranks fourth among all Division I schools. That same success translates on the conference level, where Oklahoma State has amassed 317 team conference championships entering the 2020-21 academic year. A team-by-team look at OSU athletics:

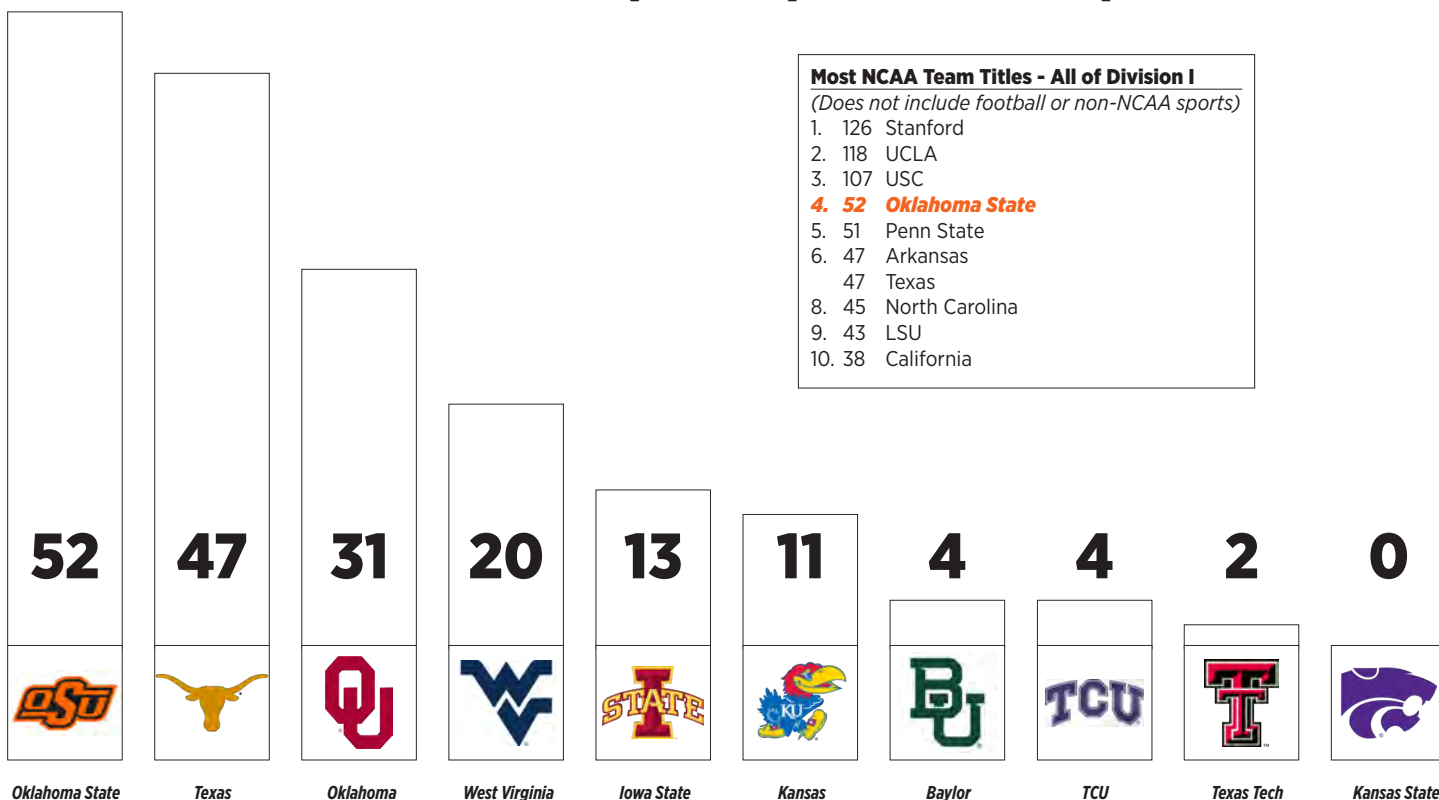

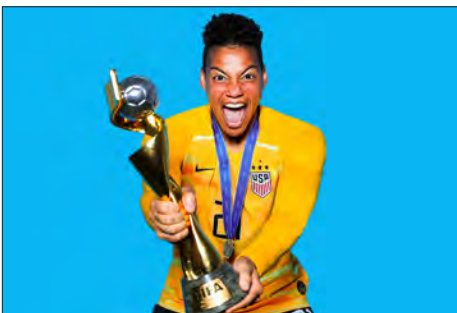

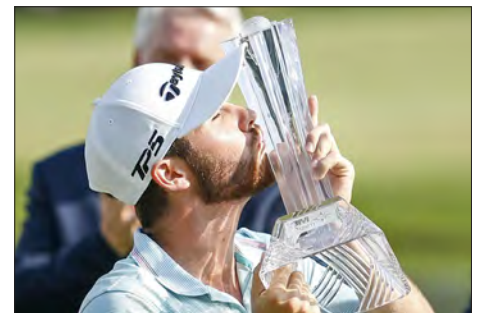

Oklahoma State Spirit

The Cowboy Trail

Dating back to the 1890s, Oklahoma A&M sports teams had been referred to as Agriculturists or Aggies, the Farmers, and officially but unpopularly, the Tigers. But by 1924, Charles Saulsberry, sports editor of the *Oklahoma City Times*, and other writers who regularly covered college events, had begun to refer to Stillwater's teams as the A&M Cowboys. Reporters' constant search of colorful synonyms started sprinkling Cowpokes, Pokes, Waddies, Cowpunchers and Punchers in conversation. "Cowboys" had a Southwestern flavor and flair that fit like a favorite pair of boots.

The Athletic Council authorized athletics director Edward C. Gallagher to have 2,000 balloons printed, "Oklahoma Aggies—Ride 'Em Cowboy" for sale at football games in 1926.

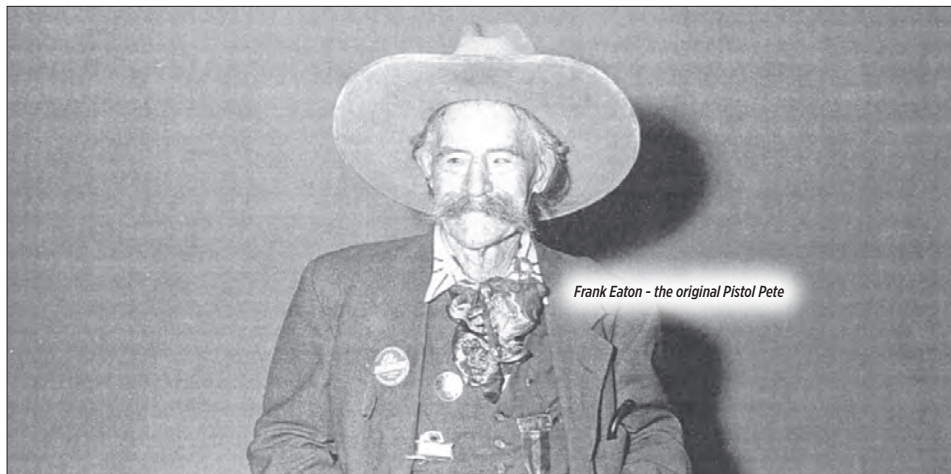
Pistol Pete

(excerpt from text written by Lance Millis)

Around 1923, when Oklahoma A&M College was searching for a new mascot to replace its tiger (copied along with the school's orange and black colors, from university founders who hailed from Princeton), a group of students saw Frank Eaton leading the Armistice Day Parade. He was approached to see if he would be interested in being the model for the new mascot, and he agreed. A likeness was drawn and began to be used on sweatshirts, stickers, etc., and a tradition was born.

That caricature was the basis for what is used today as the official Oklahoma State University mascot. For 35 years, the crusty old cowboy was a living symbol of OSU, representing the colorful past of the area. As such, he would attend OSU athletic events, building dedications, etc., and sign autographs, pose for photographs and reminisce about the Old West with anyone who would listen.

To this day, his likeness is a visible reminder of the Old West to literally millions of people yearly as a symbol of colleges whose mascots pay homage to the cowboy. Each year, OSU students tryout for

Pistol Pete. A panel of former "Petes" judge the tryouts and select the two best candidates based on an interview, a mime, and posing as mascot in different "game situations." The two who are selected split the approximately 500 appearances annually. These appearances include all athletic events, pep rallies, business openings, weddings, birthday parties, and public school events.

Frank Eaton - Before Pistol Pete

"My boy, may an old man's curse rest upon you, if you do not try to avenge your father..You must never stop until they are all accounted for!" These words, according to one of Eaton's many stories, were spoken by a family friend following the brutal murder of his father, and guided the formative years of Frank's life.

Born in 1860, in Hartford, Connecticut, Frank moved with his family to Kansas shortly after the close of the Civil War. When Frank was eight years old, his father, a former Union soldier, was shot and killed by a group of lawless former Confederates. Frank was a witness to the murder and each of the murderers' faces was imprinted in his memory.

After being challenged to avenge his father's death by Mose Beaman, (the family friend), Frank set out to learn how to handle guns. Mose gave

him a gun and holster, and taught him how to handle and shoot guns. Frank quickly learned to "shoot a snake's head off with either hand". During the next few years, Frank's days were spent helping his mother with chores and practicing shooting. With each passing year, he became faster and more accurate with his guns.

When Frank was 15,

he learned of the location of one of his father's killers. After deciding it was almost time to set out on his mission, Frank wanted to make sure his shooting skills were good enough. He decided to visit Fort Gibson, a cavalry fort, to try to learn more about handling a gun. There he competed with the cavalry's best marksmen, beating them each time. After many competitions, the fort's commanding officer, Colonel Copinger gave Frank a marksmanship badge and a new name. From that day forward, Frank would be known as Pistol Pete.

Bullet

The Oklahoma State University Cowboys have many symbols of their western heritage, but none is more appropriate than their mascot, Bullet. The Spirit Rider program debuted in 1984 with the first few Spirit Riders providing their own horse to serve as mascot for the OSU Cowboys.

However, in 1988, Stars Parr Money was donated to the OSU Athletic Department to be used specifically as the mascot. Since that time, Bullet has delighted crowds with his traditional sprint across the football field following every Cowboy touchdown. The heart of the Cowboy Spirit Rider Program, Bullet is not only seen at Boone Pickens Stadium and other OSU football games, he's made appearances at local elementary schools, parades, rodeos and other special events, including the opening ceremonies of the Oklahoma State Special Olympics.

The tradition of the Spirit Rider can be attributed to the late Eddy Finley, who wanted to promote school spirit the "cowboy way," on horseback. Since that time, additional support has come for the Spirit Rider and Bullet, much of it due to Finley's hard work. A horse trailer, custom-tooled saddle and uniform dress for the Spirit Rider and ground crew have been donated to OSU. In honor of the Spirit Rider and its tradition, Jim Hamilton sculpted the Spirit Rider bronze statue that sits just south of the Greenwood Tennis Center.
