Oklahoma Christian, 2000

- Boasts a 458-206 career record as a head coach and a 269-112 record at OSU.
- At OSU, has overseen 54 Academic All-Big 12 selections, two ITA Arthur Ashe Leadership & Sportsmanship Award Recipients, 12 All-American selections, 16 ITA Central Regional Champions, four ITA Rookie of the Year regional selections, three ITA Central Region Senior Players of the Year, two Big 12 Freshman of the Year selections, two Big 12 Newcomers of the Year and the 2015, 2021 and 2024 Big 12 Players of the Year.
- Guided OSU to a 29-1 record in 2024, spending 12 consecutive weeks atop the national rankings. The Cowgirls captured their first-ever ITA Indoor National Championship, along with Big 12 regular season and tournament titles.
- Led the Cowgirls to the program's best season yet in 2016, as OSU finished as national runner-up at the NCAA Championships.
- In 2017, led the Cowgirls to the program's second-straight Elite Eight and Big 12 regular season championship.
- Selected as the unanimous 2016 Big 12 Coach of the Year after sweeping the conference slate, 9-0, to lead the Cowgirls to the program's first Big 12 title in 13 years.
- After a 23-6 campaign, was named 2015 ITA Central Region Head Coach of the Year.
- Earned the USTA/ITA Campus and Community Outreach Award in 2010, as he was honored for his work in promoting tennis to the community.
- At Wichita State, was a three-time Missouri Valley Conference Coach of the Year (2006, 2007 and 2009).
- As the head coach of the Shockers, was named the 2007 ITA Central Region Coach of the Year and USTA/ITA Campus and Community Outreach Award.

In 15 years at the helm of the Oklahoma State women's tennis program, head coach Chris Young has transformed OSU into a national tennis power.

A native of Norman, Oklahoma, Young has compiled a career record of 458-206, while directing the OSU women and the men's and women's programs at both Wichita State and his alma mater, Oklahoma Christian. Young now holds a 269-112 record with the Cowgirls.

After spending five years as the director of tennis at Wichita State, Young returned to his home state where he competed as a collegian and began his coaching career before taking over the Cowgirl program.

During his time in Stillwater, Young has led the Cowgirls to unprecedented success, as shown by the team's 12-straight trips to the NCAA tournament, six trips to the NCAA Sweet 16 in the last nine years, an ITA Indoor National Championship, three Big 12 regular-season titles, a Big 12 Tournament title and a national runner-up finish to the 2016 season.

During Young's 15 years in Stillwater, he has overseen 54 Academic All-Big 12 selections, two ITA Arthur Ashe Leadership & Sportsmanship Award Recipients, 12 All-American selections, 16 ITA Regional Champions, four ITA Rookie of the Year regional selections, three ITA Central Region Senior Players of the Year, two Big 12 Freshman of the Year selections, two Big 12 Newcomers of the Year and the 2015, 2021 and 2024 Big 12 Players of the Year. Under Young, the Cowgirls have racked up seven 20 win or more seasons in the last 10 years.

Young was also instrumental in the fundraising and design of the state-of-the-art Michael and Anne Greenwood Tennis Center that would push OSU and Stillwater to the forefront of college tennis. Since the grand opening in 2014, both the OSU men's and women's programs have experienced exponential growth, and the facility has hosted several major events, including the 2024 NCAA Championships, the 2021 ITA Indoor National Championships, the 2022 ITA Central Region Championships and multiple Big 12 Championships.

Young and OSU reached new heights in 2024, finishing 29-1 while capturing the program's first ITA Indoor National Championship, along with Big 12 regular season and tournament titles. Last year's team broke program records for win percentage (.967), win streak (29) and wins over top-10 opponents (7), while producing three All-America selections, the Big 12 Player of the Year, Newcomer of the Year and Coach of the Year and nine All-Big 12 honorees.

2023 was another successful year for Young and the Cowgirls. OSU finished the season 16-8 and advanced to the second round of the Big 12 Tournament after an opening-round win over Texas Tech, while also capturing a win over Denver in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. Young saw three of his athletes claim four All-Big 12 nominations as Ayumi Miyamoto earned the honor in singles and doubles, while Raquel Gonzalez was awarded for doubles and Lucia Peyre in singles. Peyre was also named to the All-Big 12 Freshman team, and OSU produced five ITA Scholar Athletes and four Academic All-Big 12 selections.

In 2022, the Cowgirls recorded a 20-6 record while showcasing another successful run in the NCAA tournament by advancing to the sweet sixteen. Young led the team to his 400th career win and tacked on his second Big 12 Freshman of the Year in Mhai Sawangkaew. Young garnered a pair of ITA All-Americans, Lisa Marie Rioux and Ayumi Miyamoto, after helping lead them to the NCAA semi-finals in doubles.

In 2021 the Cowgirls posted an 11-12 record while navigating the challenges of competing during the COVID-19 pandemic. Young earned his 200th win as the OSU head coach and added his second Big 12 Player of the year and eighth ITA All-American to his resume in Bunyawit Thamchaiwat. Young helped lead Alana Wolfberg to a second-team All-Big 12 selection and a trip to the NCAA Individual Championships.

In 2020 the Cowgirls went 11-1 showing promise of another NCAA Tournament run, before the season was cut short due to the pandemic. Young added coaching two more All-Americans to his resume, with Lisa Marie Rioux and Ayumi Miyamoto earning the distinction.

In 2019, Young's Cowgirls posted a 21-8 overall record and hosted the first and second rounds of the NCAA Tournament for the fifth-straight season. The Pokes finished second in the Big 12 for the second year in a row thanks to an 8-1 record and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the eighth-straight year.

In 2018, Young's Cowgirls posted a 20-5 overall record. Despite only returning three letterwinners from a season prior, the Pokes finished second in a stacked Big 12 and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the seventh-straight year.

Young guided Cowgirls Vladica Babic and Sofia Blanco to the finals of the 2018 NCAA doubles draw, which also clinched the pair's first All-America recognition. Under Young's direction, the OSU tandem became the first OSU doubles team to be named All-Americans since 1991. Babic and Blanco were also named ITA All-Stars, while five Cowgirls received All-Big 12 accolades.

In his eighth year, Young led the Cowgirls to a 25-6 overall record and 8-1 mark in Big 12 play, good for the team's second consecutive Big 12 regular season conference title. OSU followed up its fourth Big 12 title match appearance in the last five years with its second-straight Elite Eight appearance, as the No. 9 seed Cowgirls dropped No. 8 Georgia Tech in a thrilling 4-3 victory to advance.

The 2017 season would bring Viktoriya Lushkova her third singles All-America recognition, as Young guided the Ukrainian standout to become the first player in school history to achieve such a feat. That season, Young

would also coach seven Cowgirls to an All-Big 12 team and four Pokes to appearances at the NCAA Individual Championships.

Young was named the unanimous Big 12 Coach of the Year after leading the Cowgirls to the best season in program history in 2016, claiming the 2016 Big 12 Championship and advancing to the national championship match for the first time ever. OSU turned in a 29-5 overall record, along with a perfect 9-0 mark in conference play to bring home the regular-season Big 12 title. The squad would storm through the Big 12 Championship, winning each of its three matches, 4-0, to take home the tournament title as well.

In the 2016 NCAA Tournament, Young and the host Cowgirls handled Albany and Tulsa to advance to their second-straight Sweet 16. OSU would knock off the likes of No. 5 Georgia, No. 4 Ohio State and No. 1 California on its way to the NCAA Finals, where they would meet powerhouse Stanford and fall just short, losing, 4-3.

The following week at the NCAA Singles Championship, Young coached junior Katarina Adamovic to a quarterfinal appearance and her first career All-American honor. In all, a combined seven Cowgirls finished the season in the ITA singles and doubles rankings, while the team earned its highest finish in school history at No. 8.

During the 2015 season, OSU's women's program rose to new heights, finishing the season 23-6. The Cowgirls took down 14 ranked opponents and notched 15 shutout wins. The stellar season earned the Cowgirls their fourth-straight trip to the NCAA championships and the privilege to host the first and second rounds for the first time on the OSU campus. A heroic showing by the Pokes advanced them to the Sweet 16, where they faced a tough Florida team and fell. Throughout the season, Young saw his squad rise to No. 8 in the ITA polls, the highest ranking in program history. He also saw Lushkova earn the highest singles ranking at No. 10. She paired up with Miami transfer Kelsey Laurente to become the nation's No. 3 doubles team at one point, also breaking a school rankings record.

That year, Lushkova and Katarina Adamovic were named All-Big 12 singles selections and the Lushkova/Laurente duo and Adamovic/Babic duos were named All-Big 12 doubles selections. Lushkova and Carla Tur-Mari were labeled as Academic All-Big 12 selections as well. Young earned accolades for himself as he was named the 2015 ITA Central Region Head Coach of the Year.

Under his direction in 2014, Oklahoma State saw its first women's tennis All-American since 1991 in Viktoriya Lushkova. In 2015, Lushkova repeated the honor, making her the first Cowgirl since the 1986 and 1987 seasons to earn two singles All-America honors. She is also just the second Cowgirl to accomplish the feat.

In 2014, he led the Pokes to a 15-8 campaign with a 7-2 record against Big 12 opponents. The Cowgirls produced 11 wins over ranked teams, including a huge 4-3 win over No. 14 Oklahoma. Young and his squad received the highest final ranking for the program since 2001, when it was named the No. 21 team in the nation. The Cowgirls went on to the NCAA Championships for the third year in a row, where they advanced to the Round of 32 after a dominating 4-0 win over South Florida.

Several of his players earned individual awards following the season. Lushkova was not only named All-American but also Big 12 Freshman of the Year, ITA Central Region Rookie of the Year and selected to the All-Big 12 singles and doubles team. Kanyapat Narattana joined Lushkova on the All-Big 12 doubles and Megan McCray was named to the singles team.

In 2013, Young coached the Cowgirls to a 16-9 overall record. The team notched 11 wins over ranked opponents, including a 5-2 victory over No. 12 Nebraska in San Diego, Calif., in March. Oklahoma State competed as the fifth seed in the Big 12 tournament after recording a 5-4 mark in conference play for the second straight year.

That year, Young's Cowgirls made the program's deepest run at the Big 12 Championship in 10 years with a 4-2 win over fourth-seeded TCU, and an exciting victory over top seed and 19th-ranked Baylor to send Oklahoma State to the conference championship for the first time since 2003; however, the Cowgirls fell, 4-0, to the No. 3 seed Texas in the Big 12 championship the next day.

The Cowgirls earned back-to-back NCAA tournament bids in 2012 and 2013, for the first time since the 1990 and 1991 seasons. In 2013, Young also coached the Cowgirl doubles team of Malika Rose and Narattana to an NCAA doubles tournament appearance.

Oklahoma State finished with an 11-10 record in Young's third season. The Cowgirl program saw its biggest win ever in 2012 when the team defeated No. 6 Texas for the fourth time in history. As a result, the Cowgirls received a No. 5 seeding and a spot in the quarterfinals of the Big 12 Championships, as well as a bid to the Tuscaloosa Regional in the NCAA Tournament. OSU fell in its first match of each tournament. Under Young's direction, Meghan Blevins was named ITA Central Region Rookie of the Year in 2012.

The 2011 Cowgirls finished the season with an 8-16 record; however, the team made it to the quarterfinals of the Big 12 Championship for the second straight year, edging out Missouri before eventually losing to top-seeded Baylor.

In his first year at OSU, Young led the Cowgirls to a 13-10 finish, their best in three years, and picked up his milestone 200th career coaching win.

Young's coaching prowess was evident as his 2010 Cowgirls reached the quarterfinals of the Big 12 Championship and received several individual accolades. His athletes earned a Big 12 Newcomer of the Year

award, a No. 4 singles Big 12 co-championship and a doubles spot on the all-conference team.

He also earned his second USTA/ITA Campus and Community Outreach Award in 2010, as he was honored for his work in promoting tennis to the community.

During his time in Wichita, Young led the women's squad to a 94-38 mark, including a 33-6 ledger in Missouri Valley Conference play. A three-time conference coach of the year selection, Young guided the Shockers to league crowns in 2006, 2007 and 2009. Those seasons also resulted in the first three NCAA Tournament appearances in school history.

Young took a program that had never held a national ranking or defeated a ranked opponent and transformed the Shockers into a squad that was ranked for 43-straight weeks and defeated more than 20 ranked opponents under his direction.

The 2008-09 campaign saw Young's squad post a 21-6 mark and capture its third league title in four seasons. Individually, his players won 65 of their 68 individual matches in MVC action.

The fruits of his off-court work began to show as well as the Shockers finished the year ranked in the top 10 nationally in attendance. The Shockers narrowly missed their third-straight conference title in 2008, finishing the year with a 16-8 mark and a runner-up finish at the MVC Tournament.

Young's third season at WSU proved to be one for the history books as his charges produced a school-record 27-3 mark and became the first MVC squad to win an NCAA Tournament match. The Shockers knocked off 25th-ranked South Carolina in the first round to secure the school's first NCAA victory. Additionally, the Shockers climbed to No. 16 in the national rankings, making them the highest ranked team in the history of the MVC.

Five Shockers earned all-conference honors, including Madina Rakhim, who finished the year with a 29-2 mark at the No. 1 singles position. The Shockers were dominant up and down their lineup, finishing with a 66-1 record in their individual conference matches.

For his efforts, Young was named the ITA Central Region Coach of the Year. The 2007 campaign also saw him earn the USTA/ITA National Award for Community Service.

The 2004-05 campaign, WSU's first under Young, resulted in immediate progress. The Shockers finished with a 13-13 mark, giving them their highest win total in seven years and providing an indicator of the program's bright future.

Young produced 17 all-conference singles players, nine all-league doubles performers. His squads also emphasized their work in the classroom with 16 Missouri Valley Conference Scholar-Athletes dotting his rosters.

From 2005-08, Young also steered the Shocker men's program and tallied a 58-38 record. His 2008 squad recorded 19 wins and achieved the program's highest ranking in 10 years. Individually, he coached nine all-conference singles players, two all-league doubles teams and produced two MVC Scholar-Athlete selections.

Prior to taking over the Shocker program, Young worked as the assistant men's and women's coach at Oklahoma Christian University, including a stint as the interim head coach for both programs in 2002.

He took charge of the women's program in 2003 before adding the OC men's head coaching position to his list of duties the following year. The 2003 season also resulted in a national championship on the men's side.

Young and his wife, Sarah, have two children, Braden and Kelsy.

Jaime Sanchez-Cañamares enters his sixth season as an associate head coach for the Cowgirls.

Last year, Sanchez-Cañamares helped OSU to one of its greatest seasons to date, winning its first ITA Indoor National Championship, along with Big 12 regular season and tournament titles. The Cowgirls also boasted three All-America selections, the Big 12 Player of the Year and nine All-Big 12 honorees.

In his fourth season with Oklahoma State, Sanchez-Cañamares helped guide the Cowgirls to 16-8 record, with wins at the Big 12 and NCAA Championships. Along with head coach Chris Young, he produced two All-Big 12 singles selections in Ayumi Miyamoto and Lucia Peyre, along with an All-Big 12 doubles team in Miyamoto and Raquel Gonzalez. He also saw Peyre be named to the All-Big 12 Freshman team.

In 2021-22, Sanchez-Cañamares was a part of a Cowgirl team that finished the year 20-6, capping the season with a trip to the Sweet 16. He coached the Big 12 Freshman of the Year in Mhai Sawangkaew, along with two ITA All-Americans in Lisa Marie Rioux and Ayumi Miyamoto.

During the 2020-21 season, Sanchez-Cañamares helped coach the Big 12 Player of the Year and ITA All-American, Bunyawi Thamchaiwat. Sanchez-Cañamares also helped Alana Wolfberg to a second-team All-Big 12 selection and a trip to the NCAA Individual Championships.

In 2019-20 he helped guide the Cowgirls to an 11-1 record before the season was cut short due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Sanchez-Cañamares also helped coach Ayumi Miyamoto and Lisa Marie Rioux to All-America status during the shortened campaign.

Sanchez-Cañamares spent the 2018-19 campaign as the assistant coach for the Nebraska women's tennis program after working in 2017-18 as an assistant at Florida State. While in Tallahassee, Sanchez-Cañamares helped the Seminoles to a 21-9 mark and a run to the NCAA Elite Eight, the first in program history.

As the volunteer assistant for OSU, Sanchez-Cañamares helped guide the Cowgirls to a 25-6 mark, a Big 12 title and a spot in the NCAA Elite Eight.

As a player, Sanchez-Cañamares competed at Fresno Pacific, Oklahoma Christian and Embry-Riddle, compiling a singles record of 70-14 and a doubles mark of 70-24. A four-time NAIA All-American, he helped Fresno Pacific and Oklahoma Christian to NAIA national titles in 2011 and 2012, respectively.

Additionally, he helped Embry-Riddle to national runner-up showings in 2014 and 2015.

Following college, Sanchez-Cañamares worked for Saviano High Performance Tennis as a private developmental coach for both professionals and some of the top junior players around the world, including Sloane Stephens, Eugenie Bouchard and Amanda Anisimova.

Sanchez-Cañamares earned his degree in business administration from Embry-Riddle in 2015, graduating summa cum laude while finishing with a 4.0 GPA. He and his wife, Veronica, have one two children, Emily and Oliver.

Oklahoma State women's tennis is coming off a historic campaign in 2024, staking claim to its first-ever ITA Indoor National Championship, first Big 12 regular season title since 2017 and first Big 12 tournament title since 2016. The Cowgirls won their first 29 matches to begin the season, setting a school record for longest win streak, spent 12 consecutive weeks atop the ITA national rankings and made their 12th consecutive appearance the NCAA Tournament.

Entering the year ranked No. 5 nationally, OSU was tested right away, opening its season with wins over No. 4 Michigan and No. 14 Ohio State at home. The Cowgirls followed that with another ranked win over No. 12 UCLA before beating Old Dominion to advance through ITA Kickoff Weekend. Returning home, Oklahoma State took down No. 6 Pepperdine before travelling to Seattle for the ITA Indoor National Championships. The Cowgirls opened with a dominant win over No. 14 Auburn before coming back to beat No. 10 Texas in a thriller. They then would defeat No. 2 Stanford for the first time in program history before outlasting No. 5 Michigan in a rematch of the season opener to claim the indoor national title, with Kristina Novak earning Most Outstanding Player honors.

Now ranked No. 1 for the first time in program history, OSU opened its outdoor season with its first true road match of the season, sweeping No. 25 Arizona State. The Cowgirls would follow that with a home win against No. 30 Princeton to close out their non-conference schedule. Wins over Kansas and Iowa State opened the Big 12 slate for Oklahoma State, followed by road wins over No. 24 Texas Tech and No. 37 BYU. OSU would then get sweeps over No. 65 TCU and No. 26 Baylor before besting No. 7 Texas for a second time and taking down No. 20 Oklahoma on the road, setting a program record for most consecutive wins to begin a season with 19. Wins over West Virginia, Cincinnati, Houston, UCF and Kansas State would round out an undefeated conference schedule and secure a regular season title for the Cowgirls, making them the top seed in the Big 12 Championships in Stillwater.

Oklahoma State was dominant on its way to the Big 12 title, beating No. 50 UCF, 4-1, before sweeping No. 25 Texas Tech and No. 7 Texas, marking a third win over the Longhorns in 2024. Kristina Novak was named the Big 12 Championship Most Outstanding Player and the All-Tournament teams were made up of only Cowgirls. The title cemented OSU as the top seed in the NCAA Tournament for the first time in program history. The Cowgirls opened with sweeps over Fairfield and No. 36 SMU, but would fall to No. 16 Tennessee in the Sweet 16, closing the door on a historic season.

As impressive as the team success were the individual accolades for the Cowgirls in 2024, as Ange Oby Kajuru became the first player in program history to be named an All-American in singles and doubles in the same season. She was also named the Big 12 Player of the Year and the ITA Most Improved Player. Anastasiya Komar joined Kajuru as a doubles All-American and was named the Big 12 Newcomer of the Year. Chris Young was named the Big 12 Coach of the Year for the second time in his career for a season in which he produced nine All-Big 12 selections, four Academic All-Big 12 honorees and two ITA Scholar Athletes.

The top-five matchup for the Cowgirls got off on the right foot with OSU claiming the doubles point. On Court two, Ayumi Miyamoto and Raquel Gonzalez made quick work of Michigan's Anna Ross and Reese Miller 6-1.

On Center Court, the sixth-ranked doubles pairing of Anastasiya Komar and Ange Oby Kajuru fell at the hands of Michigan's eighth-ranked duo, Jaedan Brown and Kari Miller, 3-6.

In the decisive match on Court 3, OSU's Safiya Carrington and Kristina Novak pulled through, putting away the Wolverines' Lily Jones and Piper Charney, 6-3.

The first match of singles play went the way of the Wolverines, as Piper Charney took down Raquel Gonzalez, 2-6, 3-6.

On Center Court, the crowd was brought to life as No. 13 Anastasiya Komar took down Michigan's No. 10 Kari Miller, 6-2, 6-4.

OSU's 53rd-ranked Lucia Peyre followed up the big win with one of her own, beating Jaeden Brown, 6-2, 6-2.

Michigan's 39th-ranked Julia Fliegner kept her team in the fight with a big win over No. 2 Ange Oby Kajuru, 4-6, 2-6.

With the outcome on the line, 60th-ranked Ayumi Miyamoto won it for the Cowgirls, taking down No. 47 Lily Jones in a thriller.

No. 62 Safiya Carrington battled with No. 94 Gala Mesochoritou but went unfinished due to the Cowgirl win.

The Cowgirls look to continue their great start this Sunday as they take on No. 14 Ohio State at the Greenwood Tennis Center.



Adamovic, Lushkova Led Cowgirls to NCAA Final

Oklahoma State beat 20 ranked opponents in 2015-16, including three top-five opponents during the NCAA Championships.

- After steamrolling through the Big 12 regular season with a perfect 9-0 record, the Cowgirls won the Big 12 Tournament in front of overflow crowds in Stillwater. In a twist of good fortune, the NCAA Championships were held at the University of Tulsa that year, which led to an already-ignited OSU fan base coming out in massive numbers to create an overwhelming home-court advantage for the Cowgirls.
- While in Tulsa, OSU played inspired tennis, claiming a 4-0 win over No. 5 Georgia, a 4-2 win over No. 4 Ohio State and a 4-3 win over top-ranked California before losing a 4-3 decision to No. 15 Stanford in a title match that went down to the very last point.
- All-Americans Katarina Adamovic and Viktoriya Lushkova were the top players for an OSU team that played with fiery emotion and a flair for the dramatic up and down the roster.
- Unheralded freshman Katarina Stresnakova had one of the most memorable matches of the tournament when she erased a 4-2 deficit in the third set to topple Ohio State's Ferny Angeles Paz at No. 5 singles to send the Cowgirls into the Final Four.



National Success

The Michael and Anne Greenwood Tennis Center, the second major project in Oklahoma State University's Athletic Village, was unveiled in January of 2014 with the indoor portion of the complex hosting its first varsity matches. The outdoor courts also opened during the spring semester of 2014.

The 50,000 square foot tennis center is located just north of Boone Pickens Stadium. The indoor facility houses six tennis courts, along with coaches' offices, locker rooms, and a sports medicine hub complete with a hydrotherapy center. The indoor facilities are able to seat at least 350 spectators.

The webcams inside the facility are another exciting feature, which allow OSU to live-stream matches onto the team's website.

The center includes 12 lighted outdoor tennis courts in two sets of six courts. The courts are set up to allow fan viewing of each match being played in both the indoor and outdoor venues.

After a tour of the Greenwood Tennis Center, a tweet by the United States Tennis Association pronounced OSU's new complex as one of the top two collegiate facilities in the country.

OSU women's head coach Chris Young said the Greenwood Tennis Center would give OSU the chance to host many tournaments. That dream has already come to fruition as the facility has hosted a number of prestigious tournaments since being dedicated, including the 2024 NCAA Tennis Championships.

In 2016, the Greenwood Tennis Center hosted its first Big 12 Championship, which the Cowgirls won in convincing fashion. Ultimately, Young hopes the facility can continue to host major events moving forward.

"Through every stage of building the facility we have been able to talk to those selection committees, we ask them what things they are looking for to make sure we are including things that are going to be the most important when hosting championship events," Young said.

Michael and Anne Greenwood provided the lead gift for the multi-faceted tennis project. The Greenwoods are OSU alumni who have supported the University in many ways. They began to follow OSU tennis when Anne's father, Joe Morris, started attending matches in the late 1970s and eventually led the family to become OSU tennis fans.

The Greenwoods went to the OSU tennis coaches and OSU Athletic Director Mike Holder and offered their support for the new facilities.

“Our OSU tennis coaches and players have had to practice and play in extreme heat, bitter cold and gale force winds,” Michael Greenwood said. “And whenever rain is involved, the teams have to leave Stillwater and find an indoor alternative or cancel the scheduled event.

“This has provided an unfair playing field for our dedicated student-athletes for over 40 years and we decided the time to correct this situation was long overdue.”

The Greenwoods said the tennis center is not about them, but about taking OSU tennis to the next level of greatness.

“When you look at the history of the program with its many conference championships over the years, the level of success is remarkable given the lack of facility infrastructure to support the program,” Anne Greenwood said. “We are already beginning to see the positive impact by the level of excitement being shown by players, coaches and fans that are part of OSU Tennis and its bright future.”

The Greenwoods explain their financial support of the new facilities is to show appreciation to the coaches and players have provided the foundation for OSU Tennis. However, in designing the complex, they have tried to make it as fan-friendly as possible to promote attendance.

“OSU Tennis has been a hidden gem in an obscure location,” the Greenwoods said. “The new tennis facilities are world class in a central location that will make attending a tennis match an enjoyable experience.

“We would encourage all students and alumni to come out and watch these amazing athletes represent OSU proudly and, along with us, live orange!”

Oklahoma State University President Kayse Shrum is in her fourth year leading the largest university system in Oklahoma.

A collegiate student-athlete herself, Dr. Shrum competed as a softball pitcher at Connors State College before continuing her education at Northeastern State University and the University of Arkansas. She then earned her doctorate of osteopathic medicine from the OSU College of Osteopathic Medicine.

Her husband, Darren, was also a collegiate student-athlete at the University of Central Arkansas, and the two make it a point to attend as many athletic events as possible in order to recognize the hard work and dedication of OSU student-athletes, coaches and staff.

Since taking office in July 2021, Shrum has forged a new chapter for OSU — boldly facing challenges like conference realignment and COVID-19 while positioning the university for future success by embarking on a strategic planning process. The systemwide We Are Land-Grant strategy guides OSU's future and is securing its position as the nation's premier land-grant university — with a focus on creating and discovering solutions to societal problems, providing students with a world-class education and sending them into the world after graduation well-equipped to handle the challenges before them.

Throughout Shrum's tenure, OSU has set multiple enrollment records. During the 2023 school year, OSU saw the highest undergraduate enrollment in school history, the largest first-time freshman class in school history while also becoming Oklahoma's largest university system. OSU has also set enrollment records for non-residents, Honors College, Spears School of Business, Native American, first-generation, online students and new graduate students.

OSU has maintained flat tuition and mandatory fees for three straight years, emphasizing student access, STEM education and workforce readiness. In December 2023, Shrum launched OSU Polytech, which builds on OSU's decades of experience in applied and technical learning to

directly address Oklahoma's high-tech workforce needs. Currently, over 3,700 students are enrolled in 60 polytechnic education programs in person and online across the system.

Her influence and forward-thinking approach have been instrumental in launching OSU's trans-disciplinary institutes, including the 2022 opening of the OSU Human Performance and Nutrition Research Institute, or HPNRI. The institute harnesses OSU's expertise in human performance and nutrition science, and is coupling it with advanced knowledge from OSU's elite strength and conditioning staff to deliver better health outcomes for all Oklahomans. One key area of HPNRI's focus is on athletic trainers across the state.

Shrum's leadership, professional and civic contributions have led to notable recognition and rewards. Her honors include:

Chad Weiberg assumed the role of Oklahoma State Vice President and Athletic Director in July of 2021 after having spent the previous four years as OSU's Deputy Athletic Director. In this role, Weiberg serves on President Kayse Shrum's leadership team that helps advance Oklahoma State's land grant mission and President Shrum's strategic initiatives for the institution.

The timing of his promotion to athletic director lined up with seismic shifts in national landscape of college sports. Realignment within the Big 12 Conference and the emergence of Name, Image and Likeness both occurred within a month of Weiberg's start date.

With that as the backdrop, in the modernized world of college athletics, Weiberg's OSU has been a force in competition. A sampling of Oklahoma State's accomplishments during his three years as athletic director:

- ▶ Oklahoma State won team national championships in equestrian (2022) and men's cross country (2023) and the women's tennis team won the 2024 ITA indoor national title.
- ▶ OSU won 15 Big 12 team conference championships across its 18 varsity sports.
- ▶ Oklahoma State finished in the top 25 of the Learfield Directors' Cup standings each year.
- ▶ Oklahoma State won the all-sports Phillips 66 Bedlam Series over in-state rival Oklahoma twice and tied the Bedlam Series once.
- ▶ The Cowboy Football team beat No. 5 Notre Dame in the 2021 Fiesta Bowl, had a winning record over Oklahoma and twice appeared in the Big 12 Championship Game.
- ▶ Oklahoma State produced 140 All-Americans, the highest three-year total in school history.

OSU's broad-based success reflects how the department has evolved in ways that produce a meaningful advantage. Some of key initiatives developed within OSU Athletics under Weiberg:

- ▶ The creation of a name, image and likeness department with a dedicated full-time director and assistant director.
- ▶ A partnership between OSU Athletics and the Spears School of Business to create the innovative Brand Squad, which pairs the best and brightest students in OSU's famed Spears

School of Business with student-athletes for the purpose of creating a personal brand and managing NIL opportunities, as well as coordinating with supporters establishing new collectives to provide NIL opportunities for OSU student-athletes.

- ▶ The creation of the POSSE STAR Fund to provide student-athletes financial rewards for achieving academic success in accordance with the Supreme Court ruling on Alston vs. NCAA.
- ▶ The creation of a student-athlete leadership and professional development program with a dedicated full-time director and assistant director to help best position student-athletes for success beyond sports.
- ▶ Numerous structural and cosmetic upgrades to Boone Pickens Stadium geared toward improving the fan experience.
- ▶ Launching of the OSU Athletics Vision Plan, which is highlighted by a new Human Performance and Innovation Complex and football center, upgrades to Boone Pickens Stadium and entirely new competition facilities for softball and indoor track and field, practice facilities for wrestling and men's and women's basketball and upgrades to Karsten Creek Golf Course, the Pedigo-Hull Equestrian Center and to Gallagher-Iba Arena.
- ▶ A partnership with Sport and Story to create OSU's own streaming service, OSU Max.

Weiberg has made three head coach hires, successfully recruiting Jacie Hoyt (women's basketball), Steve Lutz (men's basketball) and David Taylor (wrestling) to Stillwater.

Oklahoma State hosted NCAA Championship events in men's and women's cross country (2022), wrestling (2023) and men's and women's tennis (2024) under Weiberg, providing the Cowboys and Cowgirls with added visibility on the national level.

Also on the national level, Weiberg was on the College Football Playoff Future Format Athletic

Directors Focus Group and beginning in September of 2024, joins the NCAA Division I men's basketball committee for a five-year term.

In 2023-24, he served as chair of the Big 12 Athletic Directors.

Prior to his elevation to athletic director, Weiberg served as OSU's Deputy Athletic Director from 2017-21. In that role, Weiberg was the chief operating officer, second-in-command and responsible for the day-to-day operations of the athletics department. He served as Athletic Director Mike Holder's administrative liaison for football and men's basketball and was responsible for football scheduling.

During his time as Deputy AD, he played a significant role in successfully navigating OSU Athletics through the COVID pandemic. Notably, he developed a partnership with the Oklahoma State University Center for Health Sciences that helped produce the planning and resources to keep Cowboy and Cowgirl student-athletes healthy, safe and ready for competition.

Weiberg was a key figure in several important initiatives that benefited student-athletes and fans alike. A little more than one year after Weiberg's arrival, OSU added a director of counseling and sport psychology position within the athletic department to better serve the mental health of student-athletes.

He also played a key part in improving OSU's gameday experience. Highlights include the addition of one of the largest video boards at a college-only football stadium, the addition of alcohol sales at OSU athletic venues and expanded concession offerings.

Weiberg is a 1994 OSU graduate with a degree in business administration. He earned a master's in business administration from OSU in 2002. After earning his undergraduate degree, he served


as the director of corporate sales and donor relations for OSU Athletics until 1999. He served as senior director of field operations for the OSU Alumni Association from 1999-2002 before becoming the director of development for the OSU Foundation/College of Business Administration from 2002-03. He held a similar role for OSU Athletics from 2003-04 before moving to Kansas State.

At K-State, Weiberg served the KSU Foundation as Director of Corporate Relations for a year before becoming the Director of Major Gifts for K-State Athletics in 2005. Weiberg assumed the lead role for K-State Athletics' Ahearn Fund in 2009 and, for his team's efforts, was recognized as the National Fundraiser of the Year by the National Association of Athletic Development Directors in 2014. Weiberg was the Senior Associate Athletic Director for Development when he left K-State in 2015 to become Deputy Director of Athletics at Texas Tech University, a role in which he served for two years before returning to his alma mater in 2017.

College athletics have played a key role in Weiberg's life from an early age. His father, Mick, and brother, Brett were both college basketball head coaches and his brother, Jared, played basketball at OSU under Eddie Sutton for a year before moving into the role of team manager. Weiberg's uncle, Kevin, served as commissioner of the Big 12.

Weiberg and his wife, Jodi, have two children, Ella and Grant.




Oklahoma State and the Olympic Games

Oklahoma State has produced 119 Olympians all-time and entering the 2024 Paris Games, 34 earned a medal - 21 gold, five silver and eight bronze.

OSU has been represented at every Olympic Summer Games in which the United States has competed in since 1924.

Oklahoma State has produced at least one medalist in 19 of the last 20 Olympic Summer Games in which the United States has competed since 1932. The lone exception was in 1972, when the Henry Iba-coached Team USA men's basketball team chose to not accept silver medals following a controversial result against the Soviet Union in the gold medal game.

Included among Oklahoma State's Olympic gold medalists are a quartet of two-time winners - wrestlers Yojiro Uetake and John Smith, men's basketball star Bob Kurland and softball pitching ace Michele Smith.



- ▶ The Learfield Directors' Cup honors institutions and evaluates success in all sports, men's and women's. The Directors' Cup allows athletic departments to measure the success of each sports program evenly and does not weigh the success in one sport above the success in another.
- ▶ Because Oklahoma State does not sponsor women's volleyball and does not get credit for its performance in equestrian, it has only 17 sports eligible for Learfield Directors' Cup scoring, while most others count points from 19 sports. Operating with a two-sport handicap, Oklahoma State has still finished in the top 25 nationally the last four years and has finished in the top three of the Big 12 each of the last six years.






BIG 12 CONFERENCE

The Big 12 enters its 29th year as one of the nation's premier conferences in college athletics under the leadership of Commissioner Brett Yormark. Since joining the Conference in August 2022, Yormark has elevated the Big 12 to new heights, emphasizing marketing, brand building and instilling an innovative strategy that has resonated across the college athletics landscape.

Starting Aug. 2, 2024, the Conference is composed of 16 universities spanning 10 states and four time zones. The Big 12 members include Arizona, Arizona State, Baylor, BYU, UCF, Cincinnati, Colorado, Houston, Iowa State, Kansas, Kansas State, Oklahoma State, TCU, Texas Tech, Utah and West Virginia.

The Big 12 began play in 1996 and is the home of 87 team NCAA national championships, and 764 individual national champions. The Big 12 Conference office is located in Irving, Texas.



Big 12 Fast Facts

- The Big 12 sponsors 25 sports across the Fall, Winter and Spring seasons.
- Men's sports include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and wrestling.
- Women's sports include basketball, beach volleyball, cross country, equestrian, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, lacrosse, outdoor track & field, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming & diving, tennis and volleyball.
- The Conference currently conducts postseason championships for 24 of its 25 sports.

Oklahoma State is at the very forefront of the Name, Image and Likeness era of college sports and has the accolades to prove it.

OSU was the only Big 12 school recognized as a national finalist for Best Institutional Program at the inaugural NIL Awards at the INFLCR NIL Summit in 2022.

OSU's reputation as an NIL leader was earned not through hype, but through planning and then executing a strategy that placed maximizing NIL opportunities for student-athletes as the top priority.

A sampling of what NIL looks like at Oklahoma State:

▶ OSU Athletics partnered with the renowned Spears School of Business to form the best-in-class Brand Squad – a group of business students who help connect OSU students with NIL partners at no cost to the students.

▶ OSU Athletics appointed Barry Hinson as Associate Athletic Director for Name, Image and Likeness – a new position geared specifically toward identifying and promoting NIL opportunities for its student-athletes.

▶ OSU partnered with industry leader Altius Sports to provide a national perspective and guidance to OSU's NIL programming.

▶ OSU partnered with the Brandr Group, One Team and Fanatics to create group licensing opportunities for its student-athletes, such as selling jerseys and other merchandise co-branded with official OSU marks and the student-athletes' name, image and likeness.

▶ OSU was an early adopter in helping student-athletes with their individual brand-building efforts through the use of professional-quality photos and videos.

▶ OSU provides ongoing rules education to the nonprofit collective Pokes with a Purpose, which pairs OSU student-athletes with local charities in a way that enables the student-athletes to use their name, image and likeness to raise awareness and funds for causes of their choosing.

▶ OSU Athletics has a standing NIL committee that meets weekly to identify, discuss and pursue NIL opportunities and partnerships that benefit its student-athletes.

▶ While it is not directly tied to NIL, OSU launched the POSSE Star Fund to provide student-athletes with additional education-related benefits including direct financial support in the form of academic achievement awards, up to the legally established maximum of \$5,980 per year. In order to receive the full allotment, student-athletes must go through financial planning and education provided through a partnership between OSU Athletics and Simmons Bank.

Student-Athlete Leadership and Professional Development



Every athletic department has a goal of winning championships, which is something we know a thing or two about here at Oklahoma State. A quick glance to the rafters in Gallagher-Iba Arena illustrates that.

But in addition to banners, developing the next generation of leaders away from the field is a priority for OSU Athletic Director Chad Weiberg, and he made that clear with a key hire just weeks after taking the reins as athletic director in 2021.

Jawauna Harding re-joined the OSU Athletics family to head up our Student-Athlete Leadership and Professional Development office, which is charged with building initiatives and programming focused on the OSU ideal graduate competencies of professional preparedness, ethical leadership, engaged citizenship, and personal responsibility. Additionally, she oversees impact initiatives for OSU Athletics.

Her goal is to enhance the student-athlete experience and prepare them for life after OSU. Through one-on-one meetings, guest speakers, experiential learning and special events, each student-athlete gains access to professional development tools and job search support.

“OSU student-athletes possess valuable skills sought after by employers,” Harding explains. “They excel in teamwork, adaptability, and time management. They’ve been immersed in organizational leadership systems their entire careers. Companies should see the value in providing internships and jobs that help our athletes transition these skills into professional careers.”

To achieve this, Harding added two additional positions. Assistant Athletic Director Tia Harring, who previously oversaw marketing and fan engagement, now focuses on student-athlete leadership development and established GoPokes Connect, a mentorship program pairing student-athletes with alumni-athletes.

Career Coach Lerin Lynch, formerly of the Alumni Association, helps student-athletes build their professional toolbox. This includes résumé development, career coaching, and essential professional skills.

“Investing in the holistic well-being of our student-athletes is paramount,” Harding said. “Hiring Tia and Lerin strengthened our ability to better support student-athletes in their professional and leadership development.”

While the department empowers student-athletes through the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) and community engagement projects, Harding seeks to expand employment options for them.

“Student-athletes have unique skills and unique schedules,” Harding said. “Our next step is to find new, innovative ways to provide experiential learning for all our student-athletes.”

Oklahoma State student-athletes have access to Dr. Trevor Richardson, who leads a four-person team of trained mental health professionals dedicated to serving the needs of OSU student-athletes. Most schools have just one - if any - mental health professionals on full-time staff.


The team's approach to mental health is built through relationships and providing ongoing support.

"Around here, we like the old proverb of if you give a person a fish, you'll feed them once. If you teach them to fish, you'll feed them for a lifetime," Richardson said. "That's kind of how we approach mental health - we want to equip our people with knowledge and strategies they can use long into the future."

For Richardson, a two-time Oklahoma State graduate who joined the athletic department after more than 10 years on campus as part of OSU Counseling Services, being a mental health resource for OSU student-athletes is not just his profession, it's personal.

There is a misconception that seeking help in the area of mental health is a sign of weakness. Richardson said that is not the case.

"It's a sign of strength to ask for help in mental health because it shows you are secure in yourself," Richardson said. "This is about courage. People who take part in this process show courage and sometimes they view it as a sign of weakness because of what they've been conditioned to think. When you run from something that needs to be addressed, sooner or later it catches up with you. To sit down and take that big, scary, unpleasant thing on and talk with someone about it, that takes real courage."



Honoring Academic Success

The Oklahoma State Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award acknowledges the remarkable character and performance of one male and one female student-athlete. As the highest honor presented among OSU student-athletes, this award reflects exemplary performance in academic endeavors, athletic activities, and a commitment to community engagement. The award recognizes exceptional character of the student-athlete and a remarkable dedication to academic performance.

The award was initially presented in 1994 as the OSU Student-Athlete of the Year, but the title changed to OSU Scholar-Athlete of the Year in 2015.

Outstanding student-athletes are nominated for Academic All-District® recognition by communications directors and must have a minimum 3.50 GPA and meet high athletic standards. (25,000+ nominations annually). A select group of student-athletes advances to the national ballot where CSC members vote on Academic All-America teams. (approximately 2,000 selections annually).




Stillwater is centrally located between Oklahoma City and Tulsa, just an hour's drive away from the two largest metro areas in the state of Oklahoma.

Stillwater Regional Airport provides daily nonstop American Airlines flights to and from Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport. A single one-hour connecting flight to DFW is all that separates OSU from traveling to New York, Los Angeles, London, Tokyo, Sydney and more of the world's greatest destinations.

Additional direct service to and from Stillwater may also be coming.

Stillwater Regional's 7,400-foot main runway can easily accommodate aircraft such as the Boeing 737 and Airbus A320, simplifying team travel for OSU and any opponents making the trip to Cowboy Country.

Further improvements to Stillwater Regional's facilities include a proposed expansion to the airport's terminal that would triple its current size.

America's Greatest Homecoming



OSU's very first Homecoming was held as part of the Harvest Carnival in the fall of 1913, but it wasn't until seven years later that the OSU Alumni Association hosted its first official Homecoming celebration. On October 30, 1920, 90 Oklahoma A&M alumni returned to Stillwater for festivities including the Aggie football game plus a dance and a dinner hosted by Alumni Association President Monroe Otey.

Of the 90 alumni in attendance, 50 were from the Stillwater area and 40 were from out of state. It was also in the '20s the now-famous tradition of house decorations began when sororities started to decorate their doorways.



In 1930, the first ever Homecoming Parade, a mile long, made its way down Main Street. More than 17,000 alumni returned to Oklahoma A&M that year to renew old friendships and show their pride in the Orange and Black.

In 1942 and 1944, Homecoming was combined with Dads' and Mothers' days and sponsored by the YMCA, YWCA, Dads' and Mothers' Day Association and the Alumni Association. The combination was a result of World War II and impending gas rationing to occur. Even with the gas rationing and cutbacks on parade floats, decorations and visiting bands, the football game and reunion functions were still well attended.



Following the war in 1946, there was a record attendance of 20,000 alumni and the largest parade was held including more than 50 floats, six bands and other community entries. Over time, the size of the house decorations overtook those of parade floats. In 1966, vehicles were abandoned and onlookers tried a new experiment - they simply "walked around" to view the decorations. Three years later, house decorations began being judged and scored.

New events like the Sign Competition, Football Frenzy and Chili Cook-Off were added in recent decades. Since that time, the event has grown and today is recognized as "America's Greatest Homecoming Celebration," drawing more than 80,000 alumni back to campus each year.

CASE International (Council for Advancement and Support of Education) has recognized OSU's Homecoming as a Seal of Excellence recipient. This is the highest award given by CASE in the field of Alumni Relations. This prestigious award is given only to programs that serve as models for others. OSU was recognized for the widespread participation and outstanding organization of its Homecoming program.

Most recently, the Homecoming celebration has launched onto the world wide web with photo albums, video highlights and live streams of Walkaround and the Sea of Orange Parade.

In 2010, the OSU Alumni Association began fundraising for the \$3 million Homecoming and Student Programs Endowment as part of the \$1 billion Branding Success campaign. OSU is one of the only schools left in the nation with an event like Walkaround, and once fully funded, the endowment will ensure future generations of Cowboys will be able to experience "America's Greatest Homecoming Celebration" as we know it today.

OSU's Homecoming is presented by the OSU Alumni Association and is planned by the student-driven Homecoming Executive, Steering and Big committees. OSU's Homecoming is a longstanding, exciting and colorful tradition for both campus and community.

Oklahoma State Spirit

The Cowboys

Dating back to the 1890s, Oklahoma A&M sports teams had been referred to as Agriculturists or Aggies, the Farmers, and officially but unpopularly, the Tigers. But by 1924, Charles Saulsberry, sports editor of the *Oklahoma City Times*, and other writers who regularly covered college events, had begun to refer to Stillwater's teams as the A&M Cowboys. Reporters' constant search of colorful synonyms started sprinkling Cowpokes, Pokes, Waddies, Cowpunchers and Punchers in conversation. "Cowboys" had a Southwestern flavor and flair that fit like a favorite pair of boots.

The Athletic Council authorized athletics director Edward C. Gallagher to have 2,000 balloons printed, "Oklahoma Aggies—Ride 'Em Cowboy" for sale at football games in 1926.


Pistol Pete

Around 1923, when Oklahoma A&M College was searching for a new mascot to replace its tiger (copied along with the school's orange and black colors, from university founders who hailed from Princeton), a group of students saw Frank Eaton leading the Armistice Day Parade. He was approached to see if he would be interested in being the model for the new mascot, and he agreed. A likeness was drawn and began to be used on sweatshirts, stickers, etc., and a tradition was born.

That caricature was the basis for what is used today as the official Oklahoma State University mascot. For 35 years, the crusty old cowboy was a living symbol of OSU, representing the colorful past of the area. As such, he would attend OSU athletic events, building dedications, etc., and sign autographs, pose for photographs and reminisce about the Old West with anyone who would listen.

To this day, his likeness is a visible reminder of the Old West to literally millions of people yearly as a symbol of colleges whose mascots pay homage to the cowboy. Each year, OSU students tryout for

Pistol Pete. A panel of former "Petes" judge the tryouts and select the two best candidates based on an interview, a mime, and posing as mascot in different "game situations." The two who are selected split the approximately 500 appearances annually. These appearances include all athletic events, pep rallies, business openings, weddings, birthday parties, and public school events.

Frank Eaton - Before Pistol Pete

"My boy, may an old man's curse rest upon you, if you do not try to avenge your father...You must never stop until they are all accounted for!" These words, according to one of Eaton's many stories, were spoken by a family friend following the brutal murder of his father, and guided the formative years of Frank's life.

Born in 1860, in Hartford, Connecticut, Frank moved with his family to Kansas shortly after the close of the Civil War. When Frank was eight years old, his father, a former Union soldier, was shot and killed by a group of lawless former Confederates. Frank was a witness to the murder and each of the murderers' faces was imprinted in his memory.

After being challenged to avenge his father's death by Mose Beaman, (the family friend), Frank set out to learn how to handle guns. Mose gave

him a gun and holster, and taught him how to handle and shoot guns. Frank quickly learned to "shoot a snake's head off with either hand". During the next few years, Frank's days were spent helping his mother with chores and practicing shooting. With each passing year, he became faster and more accurate with his guns.

When Frank was 15, he learned of the location of one of his father's killers. After deciding it was almost time to set out on his mission, Frank wanted to make sure his shooting skills were good enough. He decided to visit Fort Gibson, a cavalry fort, to try to learn more about handling a gun. There he competed with the cavalry's best marksmen, beating them each time. After many competitions, the fort's commanding officer, Colonel Copinger gave Frank a marksmanship badge and a new name. From that day forward, Frank would be known as Pistol Pete.

Bullet

The Oklahoma State University Cowboys have many symbols of their western heritage, but none is more appropriate than their mascot, Bullet. The Spirit Rider program debuted in 1984 with the first few Spirit Riders providing their own horse to serve as mascot for the OSU Cowboys.

However, in 1988, Stars Parr Money was donated to the OSU Athletic Department to be used specifically as the mascot. Since that time, Bullet has delighted crowds with his traditional sprint across the football field following every Cowboy touchdown. The heart of the Cowboy Spirit Rider Program, Bullet is not only seen at Boone Pickens Stadium and other OSU football games, he's made appearances at local elementary schools, parades, rodeos and other special events, including the opening ceremonies of the Oklahoma State Special Olympics.

The tradition of the Spirit Rider can be attributed to the late Eddy Finley, who wanted to promote school spirit the "cowboy way," on horseback. Since that time, additional support has come for the Spirit Rider and Bullet, much of it due to Finley's hard work. A horse trailer, custom-tooled saddle and uniform dress for the Spirit Rider and ground crew have been donated to OSU. In honor of the Spirit Rider and its tradition, Jim Hamilton sculpted the Spirit Rider bronze statue that sits just south of the Greenwood Tennis Center.

The Waving Song

Victor Herbert was inadvertently responsible for a deeply entrenched facet of A&M athletic tradition, the waving song. His lyricist was speech instructor H.G. Seldy Seldombridge. In 1908, Seldombridge had gone to Columbia University to scout for a senior class play. While there, he heard In Old New York, the hit song from the operetta The Red Mill. Even New Yorkers were humming the song on city streets, and Seldombridge returned to Oklahoma humming it, too.

Shortly thereafter, he incorporated In Old New York into the closing number of a college follies show being rehearsed in Stillwater's Grand Opera House. But as he studied the stage decorated in orange and black for a campus scene, he realized that New York's praises were out of place for a southwestern college setting.

"Suddenly OAMC flashed to my mind," he explained in 1941. He asked the 30-voice choir to take a break, grabbed a piece of wrapping paper, hummed, and scribbled. In less than ten minutes he had the alternate lyrics that would enliven sports events long after opening night.

For that finale, a letterman representing each sport joined the chorus onstage. The students added their own memorable touch. They swayed and sang "OAMC! OAMC! We'll sing your praise tonight," as they waved to the audience in unison.

It almost raised the roof off the old building, noted Seldombridge, who left the campus in 1910. Exhilarated, the crowd surged to its feet and returned the rhythmic wave. It took two encores before the campus and community gathering was willing to relinquish the emotion of the moment.

"From that night on, you could frequently hear someone whistling the tune," he recalled, touched that OAMC's waving song was remembered as late as 1941.

The Waving Song tradition continues to this day with OSU fans rising to their feet and waving one arm in rhythm with the song after scores in football and following victories in other sports. Contrary to popular misconception, this tradition should not be referred to as "Waving the Wheat," which is the name of the two-armed wave adopted by University of Kansas fans.

OSU Athletics Vision Plan



Looking into the Future

Oklahoma State is strengthening its position within the national landscape of college athletics with the unveiling of the athletics facilities vision plan announced by Athletic Director Chad Weiberg.

The plan focuses on providing for the success of the student-athletes, improving the fan experience, and bolstering the University's ability to attract student-athletes across all programs through the creation of a unified and connected athletic village unrivaled in college sports.

Included in the plan are a new football operations center, a new wrestling training facility, a new softball stadium, an indoor track, a new training center for basketball, upgrades to the Pedigo-Hull Equestrian Center and to Karsten Creek Golf Course and repurposed areas in the west end zone of Boone Pickens Stadium and Gallagher-Iba Arena for student-athlete services that include a new academics center and spaces for mental health, leadership and career development.



The athletics vision plan comes at an estimated cost of approximately \$325 million. The implementation and order of construction will be determined as funding becomes available for each individual element.

“This is a time of conference realignment and unprecedented transformation in college athletics,” Weiberg said. “With a history that includes 52 NCAA titles, for us to continue to achieve championship results, now is not the time to pause or rest on past accomplishments, but to honor those accomplishments by pushing forward and building upon what has been started. This vision plan provides a road map for the next phase of an athletics village that will be unrivaled in collegiate sports.”

The plan is in its conceptual stages.

OSU Athletics Vision Plan

Human Performance Innovation Complex and Football Center

In December of 2022, Oklahoma State University announced its new Human Performance and Nutrition Research Institute with the goal of impacting every community in Oklahoma.

Due to available space and to maximize efficiencies, the institute headquarters will share a roof with the new operations home of Cowboy Football and will be located immediately adjacent to the existing practice fields and the Sherman E. Smith Training Center.

Sharing the same footprint will maximize efficiencies of key elements of the Human Performance And Nutrition Research Institute and Cowboy Football.

Vacated space in the west end zone of Boone Pickens Stadium creates tremendous benefits for student-athletes in every sport and accommodates an athletic department that has grown in recent years to include new areas dedicated to student-athlete success, mental and physical wellness, leadership and professional development.

While the institute itself is funded by the university, the Cowboy Football program will have its own space within the building paid for by athletics funds and private donations.

The 2009 upgrades to Boone Pickens Stadium played a significant role in OSU's rise to college football prominence. It also launched a larger mindset – one that Cowboy Football is truly capable of ascending to the highest level of the sport. This new facility provides an opportunity for OSU to reaffirm its commitment to being a national force moving forward.



Student-Athlete Success Center

The program areas currently occupied by OSU Football in the west end zone of Boone Pickens Stadium will be renovated following completion of Human Performance Innovation and Football Center. This includes both student-athlete and coaches/staff areas in the stadium which are currently located on the arena and lower club Levels.

The existing Student-Athlete Dining and Training Table would be expanded and renovated. Premium areas, including both club areas and seating and additional suites would be added, offering new seating types and amenities. Existing student-athlete support programs such as academic services, student athlete development and mental health could be relocated from Gallagher-Iba Arena to the stadium. Sports medicine, along with strength and conditioning could also be expanded and located in the west end zone, offering a central training and recovery space for all student-athletes.

In addition, offices and work areas for OSU Athletics creative teams, encompassing operations, graphic design, creative content and communications would be relocated to Boone Pickens Stadium.

Boone Pickens Stadium

Between 2003 and 2009, Lewis Field expanded and was officially rededicated as Boone Pickens Stadium on September 5, 2009. The expansion included adding nearly 4,000 club seats and 123 suites and connected the north and south by creating a continuous seating bowl in the west end zone. Over time the original seating on the north and south sides stadium bowl has required annual maintenance, resulting in increased repair costs, necessitating the replacement of the existing seating treads and risers. This need allowed OSU Athletics to plan the modernization and improvement of the fan experience in Boone Pickens Stadium.

Following the 2022 football season, work began on a two-year stadium project, beginning on the north side. That scope of work begins at the 200 level with the addition of a cross aisle to the existing seating treads and risers at the 300 level, expanding tread depths and new entrances. The project includes replacing benches, adding stadium seats in some sections, additional aisles, and adding handrails for safety. New intermediate aisles will be located between the existing entrances, reducing the amount of seating between aisles.

Following the 2023 football season, the south will be replaced in a similar fashion. The project includes new entrances at the lower 200 levels, replacing benches, adding stadium seats, additional aisles and adding handrails.

This renovation will keep the overall vision of Boone Pickens Stadium intact, marrying the north, west and south seating sections, and maintaining the existing 100, 200 and 300 level seating bowl levels.

Softball Stadium

The plan includes a new softball facility partially located on the former site of Allie P. Reynolds Stadium. The new home of Cowgirl Softball will provide modern amenities suitable for a premier collegiate softball program and will include championship caliber player-development areas. In addition, typical chairback seating, tailgating corrals, and family friendly areas to enhance the fan experience are planned.

Following the demolition of Allie P. Reynolds Stadium, the project will also create opportunities for additional parking for on-campus residents.

Indoor Track and Field

The men's and women's track and field programs support over 100 student-athletes. These athletes require year-round training and competition space. The vision plan proposes an indoor track and field facility south of the existing outdoor track and field complex. The proposed site is bordered by McElroy Road to the north, the Sherman E. Smith Training Center to the south, the Michael and Anne Greenwood Tennis Center to the west, and North Knoblock Street to the east.

This parcel of land is ideally sized for a full indoor track program. It will include a 200 meter banked track, indoor field event space, spectator seating, athletic training rooms, team meeting/theater spaces, locker rooms, player lounges, and offices for coaching staff.

In addition to strengthening training and development for the track and field programs, this new facility will act as a dynamic new recruiting tool for an already nationally prominent program.



Wrestling Practice Facility

Cowboy Wrestling is the most successful program in the history of the NCAA, regardless of sport. Entering the 2022-23 academic year, Oklahoma State wrestling had won 34 team national championships, 143 individual NCAA championships and had 475 All-Americans. The plan proposes an addition to the existing facility, which would support the ongoing success of OSU Wrestling.

While the program recently received an upgrade to its locker room, additional space is needed to sustain the success of the program.

This addition will increase the size of the wrestling room, allowing for additional mat space and championship-level team amenities. While the team will always compete inside the famous Gallagher-Iba Arena, the training facility will feature a dedicated space for spectators that will enhance recruiting and donor visits. This training facility will also house office and meeting spaces for the coaching staff.

OSU Athletics Vision Plan

Basketball Practice Facility

OSU's basketball programs have a rich history of success. Since the Cowboys' first game in 1908, OSU has won two national championships and appeared in six Final Fours. In the Big 12, only Kansas exceeds those totals. With 17 postseason appearances and three conference championships, the Cowgirls are continuing to build on an already-established tradition.

While having the benefit of utilizing the game court and backdrop of Gallagher-Iba Arena for practice can be an advantage for both programs, at times they are displaced during other athletic and campus events. A new practice facility is essential in helping both basketball programs continue to recruit, develop and train student-athletes to compete for championships.

The vision plan proposes an addition on the south side of the arena featuring two practice courts and other championship-caliber training spaces.



Pedigo-Hull Equestrian Center

Building off the historic 2021-22 season in which the program captured its eighth Big 12 Conference title and its first overall NCEA national championship, several updates to Pedigo-Hull Equestrian Center are planned.

Similar in size and scope to the Atherton Family Arena, an additional covered arena will be added to the Pedigo-Hull Equestrian Center.

Currently the primary practice arena, the Atherton Family Arena is a 135x270 square foot covered arena. The team also uses the Totusek Indoor Arena, a 100x200 foot climate-controlled facility. The Pedigo-Hull Equestrian Center consists of a saddling barn that includes coaches' offices, locker rooms, a tack room and an athletic training satellite office. It also has a 24-stall horse barn with outdoor runs and several paddocks and pastures. A new multi-purpose team building that includes a team lounge with study area and a fueling station was completed in 2021.

Karsten Creek Golf Course

Opened in 1994, Karsten Creek Golf Course was quickly named the "Best New Course" in the country by Golf Digest. The undulating fairways and challenging bunkers were originally created by renowned golf course designer Tom Fazio. Complementing the course are the clubhouse, three multi-level guest lodges, and a practice and teaching facility. While the course and related amenities have stood the test of time, renovations are needed to improve the facilities infrastructure, create a more challenging course, and enhance the skills of the student-athlete.

Course enhancement will include new irrigation, drainage, fairways, cart paths, and greens. Bunkers and tee boxes will be adjusted to increase the difficulty of play and advance the skills of the golfers. The practice facility will also be renovated to improve the tee boxes, landing zones, short game area and practice putting greens.

Originally constructed in 1997, the indoor practice facility will be upgraded to include state-of-the-art equipment.



Gallagher-Iba Arena Welcome Plaza

Since 1938, Gallagher-Iba Arena has been known as one of the great venues in collegiate athletics. Over time, however, the original east facade of the building has lost its unique prominence as the main gateway of the venue. This project seeks to revive this entrance, creating the welcome that OSU fans and athletes deserve. The plan also proposes adding premium parking and tailgating experiences to enhance the fan experience from the moment they arrive for an event.

The proposed Gallagher-Iba Welcome Plaza parking expansion will create approximately 250 new parking spaces nestled in a park-like setting.

In addition to creating parking, public plaza and walkway, fans will experience an arrival sequence similar to that of Boone Pickens Stadium. With new fan-focused offerings, OSU will have new opportunities to generate revenue.
