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

THIS IS OLE MISS BASEBALL

Gameday at Swayze Field is truly unique and is heralded as one of the best experiences in college baseball. Ole Miss set a program record with an average attendance of 8,988 in 2019, slotting Swayze at No. 2 in the nation for the fourth straight year. Last season, the Rebels hosted their third NCAA Regional in the last four seasons, a feat only three other SEC programs accomplished in that span. In front of a combined 29,352 fans over three games, Ole Miss swept the 2019 Oxford Regional, defeating Clemson once and Jacksonville State twice by a combined score of 41-7.

The win in the regional finale was No. 40 for the Rebels, making them one of two teams in the SEC to win 40 in both 2018 and 2019.





DONNIE KESSINGER


Casey Stengel of New York Yankees and Mets fame served as the head coach of the Rebels in 1914 to kick off a long history of Rebel association with Major League Baseball.




THE ROAD TO OMAHA

The Ole Miss baseball team had a historic year in 2014, tying a school record in victories by going 48-21 (19-11 SEC). The Rebels won the SEC Western Division Championship, hosted an NCAA Regional, claimed a Super Regional and advanced all the way to the College World Series in Omaha, Nebraska. The trip to Omaha was the Rebels' fifth in program history and the first since 1972. Ole Miss made sure its presence was felt throughout the tournament, placing third to tie the best finish in Rebel Baseball history.


BASEBALL'S BIGGEST STAGE

Aaron Barrett (left) became the 13th Rebel to win a World Series ring during the 2020 season, giving Ole Miss three World Series champions in the previous four years and a player on two straight World Series rosters. Ole Miss is one of just three teams in the nation to have World Series Champions in both 2018 and 2019.



ALL-AMERICAN LEFTY

Doug Nikhazy emerged as one of the top freshman pitchers in college baseball in 2019, capturing the Saturday starter role for the Rebels and finishing with a 9-3 record and 3.31 ERA.

After breaking the Ole Miss freshman strikeout record, previously held by another Team USA lefty, Drew Pomeranz, the Collegiate National Team took notice.

Nikhazy also played for the Team USA U15 National Team before coming to Oxford, so when he donned the stars and stripes once again, he wasn't about to take the tremendous honor lightly.

"You know it's a once-in-a-lifetime experience; you never want to take anything for granted," Nikhazy said. "So when I played for Team USA when I was 15, I just wanted to absorb everything, because you know you're never going to get another opportunity like that again. This might be the peak of my career, I mean who knows? And then when I got the chance again, it was surreal. I said, 'Wow, I'm actually back in this jersey again.' I never thought I'd be in this situation again."



SEC BASEBALL

- Since its formation in 1933, the SEC has directed and organized interscholastic athletic competitions, conducted tournaments and prescribed eligibility rules for student-athletes. The Conference also facilitates and assists its member institutions in maintaining intercollegiate athletic programs compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports.
- The Southeastern Conference crowns champions in 21 sports
- The SEC's mission statement reflects the priorities of the league. "The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."
- A team from the SEC won the national championship for the 12th time as Vanderbilt claimed its second NCAA title. It was the conference's fifth national title in the last decade (2010-19) to go along with six national runner-up finishes and 26 overall College World Series appearances by nine different schools during that span. SEC teams have won 12 of the last 30 national championships,
- The SEC tied its record with four teams in the College World Series, comprising half of the CWS field. The SEC has now sent 65 teams to the College World Series since 1990.
- The SEC has had a team in the College World Series final in 11 of the last 12 years.
- For the third consecutive year, the SEC tied its own national record with six teams in the NCAA Super Regionals. Six SEC teams also reached the Super Regionals in 2004. No other conference had more than four representatives in the Super Regionals.
- The SEC led all conferences with its 10 selections to the NCAA Tournament.
- Total attendance for the SEC Tournament was 162,699, which set a record. Five sessions drew more than 10,000 fans.
- SEC combined for a 320-88 (.786) non-conference record, which was best among all conferences.
- Total home attendance for all 14 SEC teams passed the two million mark for the ninth consecutive season. The top-five national attendance leaders were all from the SEC (LSU, Mississippi State, Arkansas, Ole Miss and South Carolina).
- Thirteen SEC student-athletes were selected on the first day of the Major League Baseball Draft.
- Ninety-six baseball players formerly from Southeastern Conference universities were on 2019 Major League Baseball Opening Day rosters.





2018 SEC TOURNAMENT CHAMPIONSHIP

The third-base sideline was painted powder blue and red as Ole Miss met LSU in the 2018 SEC Tournament Championship Game in Hoover, Alabama. Rebel fans came in droves as 14,126 packed Hoover Metropolitan Stadium, the fourth-largest crowd in SEC Tournament history.

Even more followed along live on ESPN as Ole Miss dominated LSU, 9-1, to win the third SEC Tournament crown in program history and the second in the Mike Bianco Era.

The road wasn't easy for the Rebels, as their 2018 SEC Tournament Championship run started with a 9-3 loss to Auburn. Against Georgia in Game 2, a home run by L.J. Talley put Ole Miss in a 4-3 deficit going into the bottom of the 10th inning—but in the face of elimination, the Rebs stayed relentless.

Eventual SEC Tournament MVP Nick Fortes started the rally with a base hit to left. Thomas Dillard tied it up, driving Fortes home with a clutch double into the right field corner. Senior Tim Rowe delivered with two outs, sending Dillard home on a base hit up the middle to give Ole Miss a 5-4 victory.

The Rebels then exacted revenge with a 7-0 victory over Auburn behind a combined five-hit shutout by James McArthur, Max Cioffi and Austin Miller. Dillard, Jacob Adams and Chase Cockrell all homered in the win.

Ole Miss used another terrific effort by its pitching staff to down Texas A&M, 2-1. Jordan Fowler went six scoreless innings to earn the win, while Will Ethridge yielded just one run on two hits to take the save and send Ole Miss to the SEC Tournament title game.

In the finale, LSU scored the game's first run in the first inning, but after that, Houston Roth settled in, going 4.1 scoreless innings to set the tone. Will Stokes then took over with one out in the 5th and the tying run at the plate. The senior retired two of the Tigers' top hitters to escape the inning.

Ole Miss then leaned on its ace, Ryan Rolison. The eventual first-round MLB Draft pick took over in the 6th and struck out back-to-back Tigers to escape a two-on, one-out jam. The Rebel bats used that momentum to take over in the 7th. Fortes again sparked the rally with a single, and senior Will Golsan followed suit, singling to right to plate Fortes and Dillard. Rowe then homered to make it a 7-1 Rebel lead.

Rolison silenced LSU in the bottom half, before giving way to Greer Holston. In the ninth, Michael Fitzsimmons put the finishing touches on the title run, launching a two-out, pinch-hit home run to make it an insurmountable 9-1 advantage. Holston then closed the door, striking out the final two Tigers to cue a Rebel dogpile in Hoover.



OXFORD-UNIVERSITY STADIUM



OXFORD-UNIVERSITY STADIUM SWAYZE FIELD

Since its opening on April 22, 1989, Oxford-University Stadium/Swayze Field has become one of the nation's top venues for a weekend of college baseball. Following the \$18 million dollar renovations prior to the 2009 season and continued additions prior to the 2018 and 2019 seasons, gameday at Swayze Field continues to provide fans of college baseball one of the best experiences in the nation.

Along with serving as one of the best atmospheres in college baseball, Ole Miss packs some of the nation's largest baseball crowds into Oxford-University Stadium each weekend. Ole Miss Baseball has ranked top-five nationally in attendance each of the past 11 seasons. In 2019, the average crowd at Swayze reached 8,988 to rank second nationally and set a new program record. A total of 322,742 fans enjoyed baseball at Swayze during the 2018 season, also second in the country and first in program history.

The Rebels have won more than 70 percent of their home games throughout the past 31 seasons. The combination of winning baseball plus an electric fanbase makes Oxford-University Stadium/Swayze Field a bucket list item for any sports fan. A 2016 survey conducted by D1Baseball.com proved it as Division I baseball coaches ranked Swayze Field top-10 nationally in six different categories (see graphic right).

RAISING THE BAR OF COLLEGE BASEBALL FACILITIES

In February 2016, Ole Miss Athletics announced plans for a \$19 million baseball project that will enhance the student-athlete experience as well as the gameday atmosphere for Rebel fans. The project included the construction of the state-of-the-art Baseball Performance Center, dugout club and rooftop plaza on the first base side of the stadium.

Cooke Douglass Farr Lemons Architects (CDFL Sports) was chosen as the architect for the project. This was not be CDFL's first project on campus as the architectural group also worked on the expansion of Vaught-Hemingway Stadium, the lighting of the football outdoor practice fields as well as the design of the Olivia and Arching Manning Athletics Performance Center.

Ole Miss continues to upgrade facilities in order to fulfill the needs of its student-athletes. Members of the Ole Miss baseball team have experienced that first-hand in the new Baseball Performance Center at O-U Stadium. Behind a generous lead gift by Ed and Jan Trehern, the Baseball Performance Center features a new locker room, training room, weight room and players lounge. The O-U Stadium addition stands on the first base side of the facility, and with the construction, the Rebels made the move from the third base to the first-base dugout at Swayze Field.

As part of the \$1.5 million donation by the M-Club towards the Forward Together campaign, a rooftop plaza was completed above the performance center. The plaza is exclusive to baseball letterwinners, M-Club members and season ticket holders with seats in the newly created area. Already having the best atmosphere in college baseball,

O-U Stadium has seen the gameday experience reach new heights for Ole Miss fans. Similar to the field club going in Vaught-Hemingway Stadium and the courtside club in The Pavilion at Ole Miss, the dugout club has created an entirely new luxury space at O-U Stadium. The exclusive club has 330 seats and gives fans a look at the Rebels as they leave the clubhouse and head to the field. As part of the Dugout Club, four rows of box seats were added behind home plate, thus improving the best seats in the stadium and allowing fans closer access to the action.

The additional seating throughout the stadium increased from 10,323 to 11,477.

The Ole Miss baseball program attacks its strength and conditioning program with the same ferocity with which it takes on the field to compete in the nation's toughest baseball conference. Under the direction of third-year strength coach Zach Boone, the Rebel baseball program has taken that approach and excelled throughout the fall as Boone challenges each player with his own unique strategy.




From Olympic gold medalist to Super Bowl winner to World Series champion, Ole Miss Rebels can be found at the pinnacle of many sports.

Baseball hosted its own NCAA Regional for the ninth time in program history and punched its ticket to Super Regionals for the sixth time after defeating Jacksonville State in the title game.



Men's Basketball took the SEC by storm in head coach Kermit Davis' first season in Oxford, rising as high as No. 18 nationally and earning a No. 8 seed in the NCAA Tournament.



Men's Golf earned a bid to the NCAA Regional for the third straight season and the 12th time in program history, entering the regional ranked as the No. 9 seed in competition.



Soccer earned its second straight NCAA Tournament bid after finishing third in SEC play, the best conference finish since 2005. Ole Miss advanced to the Second Round after beating No. 25 Clemson.



Softball hosted an NCAA Regional and advanced to Super Regionals for the second time in three years after recording the highest SEC finish (fifth) and second-most wins (41) in program history.



Men's Tennis earned its 26th consecutive bid to the NCAA Tournament, while Tim Sandkaulen advanced to the second round of the NCAA Singles Championships.



Ole Miss won the 2018 SEC **Men's Cross Country** title, the first in program history. The Rebel men went on to finish 17th at the NCAA Championships and the women 22nd, making Ole Miss one of seven schools nationally to place both in the top 25 each year since 2016.



Women's Golf won the 2019 SEC Championship in thrilling fashion, needing playoff holes in its final three matches before prevailing over South Carolina. Ole Miss went on to qualify for the NCAA Championships for the second time in as many years, finishing tied for 13th overall.



Fresh off a pair of back-to-back 40-win seasons, the 2020 Rebel baseball squad is prepared to turn a lot of heads as they showcase a dynamic mix of returning veterans and first-year players.

This year's schedule features 32 games against teams that qualified for the 2019 NCAA Tournament and 16 against teams that advanced to last year's College World Series. The slate is highlighted by marquee matchups against Louisville, Southern Miss, ECU and Indiana, not to mention the gauntlet of league play in the SEC.

The Rebels will begin the season ranked as high as No. 18 (Perfect Game), but will get their first chance to demand nationwide respect very early in the season. On Feb. 14, Ole Miss welcomes the No. 1 ranked Louisville Cardinals to Swazey Field to kick off the season, and as preseason All-American Doug Nikhazy puts it bluntly, there is no time to dip your toes in the water and get a feel for the temperature. This team is doing a somersault, headfirst dive into the water when they welcome the top team in the nation to Oxford on opening weekend.

"We're starting out with the No. 1 team in the country," said head coach Mike Bianco, who enters his 20th season. "This place will be packed. It's the series that everyone will be watching throughout the country. At the end of the day, that's why you come to Ole Miss, because you want to play in the toughest conference against the best competition."

This team welcomed a large crop of freshmen and junior college transfers in the 2019 recruiting class that finished the cycle ranked No. 2 in the country (Baseball America) to step in and fill the vacancies left by Thomas Dillard, Grae Kessinger, Ryan Olenek and Cole Zabowski, among many others. This year's Rebels also return 14 players, however, and according to Bianco, this team's success will hinge upon the performances of those seasoned veterans.

"If the Anthony Servideo's, the Tyler Keenan's, the Kevin Graham's, the Tim Elko's are good, then this team is good," Bianco said.

The Rebel lineup will be spearheaded by Keenan, fresh off multiple preseason All-American nods, and Servideo, who are both expected to hold down the left side of the infield for the entirety of the 2020 season. Servideo started 60 games for the Rebels a season ago, mostly in right field, but the junior out of Jupiter, Florida, is a natural shortstop with the skillset to prove it. Unfortunately for him, the man in front of him, Kessinger, just happened to be named the best shortstop in the country a season ago.

"Servideo finally gets his chance to play shortstop," Bianco said. "We've said it for years, if he was at any other school in the SEC, he would have already been a shortstop for two years."

Nikhazy will likely be the first Rebel out of the dugout on Friday afternoon as he makes his trademarked sprint to the mound before taking on a daunting Louisville lineup. He finished the 2019 season leading the Ole Miss pitching staff in wins after assuming the Saturday starter role early in the year, and he's only improved over the offseason, according to Bianco.

He amassed a slew of freshman All-American honors last year and is now prepared to become one of the most dominant pitchers across the SEC this time around. Right in his wake is another Rebel returning after a stellar freshman year, Gunnar

Hoglund, who has refined his slider, increased his fastball velocity, and taken quite the leap from first year to second year.

Few teams around the country have one true ace, let alone two. Bianco thinks he's developed quite the 1-2 punch with Nikhazy and Hoglund highlighting the weekend rotation.

Beyond the two clear-cut favorites for starting weekend roles, freshman Derek Diamond out of Ramona, California, has really impressed the coaching staff this offseason and has entered himself into the conversation for a starting position.

"After Gunnar and Doug, and besides (Taylor) Broadway, whose skillset lends itself to a bullpen role, Derek was the most dominant pitcher this fall, and not a surprise," Bianco said. "He's a guy who came in with a lot of expectations, and he's proved he can be a guy that can not only pitch here, but pitch here now."

Freshmen Wes Burton and Drew McDaniel are two other potential candidates for starting roles within the Rebel pitching staff.

Senior Taylor Broadway, entering his second season at Ole Miss, made quite the strides over the offseason and was a force on the mound this fall. He didn't allow a single earned run during the fall season and looks to assume the job of Rebel closer.

"He's the guy we want with the ball at the end of the game," Bianco said. "With a little tweaking this fall, he's taken his game to another level."

The role of setting up Broadway will fall to the Ole Miss bullpen, whose resumé speaks for itself. The Rebels return relievers Austin Miller, who last year broke the single-season appearances record, Tyler Myers and Greer Holston, among others, all of whom will be called upon to work out of the bullpen.

Defensively, the Rebels have for years boasted notable catchers, and this year will be no exception. Bianco expects both sophomore Knox Loposer and freshman Hayden Dunhurst to see significant time behind the plate, as both have added value to the Rebel lineup, with Dunhurst providing the team with tremendous arm strength behind the plate and Loposer adding some pop to the lineup offensively.

One of Bianco's best lineups has the Rebel co-captain Tim Elko playing first base, but Graham, who played the position in 2019, as well as junior college transfer Ben Van Cleve can also fill the role.

Second base remains an open competition between sophomore Justin Bench and freshman Peyton Chatagnier.

"Either one of them could start opening day," Bianco said. "Both are outstanding, and it's just a really good battle going on there. I wouldn't be surprised if one of them starts at second and one of them starts in the outfield."

With Servideo and Keenan rounding out the infield, the diamond is mostly set, whereas the outfield is a different question entirely. With Dillard, Olenek and Servideo all departed or moved positions, no starting outfielder from 2019 remains on this year's squad. All three outfielders on opening day will be making their first starts at each respective position, but Bianco doesn't foresee any lack of production from year to year. In fact, quite the opposite.

Until opening day rolls around, the competition for a starting position will be wide open. Graham made the leap from infielder to outfielder over the offseason, and will vie for one of the open roles, as will freshmen Jerrion Ealy, Cade Sammons, John Rhys Plumlee, Chatagnier and junior college transfer Hayden Leatherwood. Also in the mix are freshmen Connor Walsh and Trey Lafleur. As of early February, it remains anyone's game with several worthy candidates, so don't be surprised to see Bianco experiment with many different pieces in the outfield this year.

The 2020 SEC Baseball Tournament, which will be held in Hoover, Alabama, at the Hoover Metropolitan Stadium for the 20th consecutive year, will begin on Tuesday, May 19. Seeds 5-12 will meet in a single-elimination format on the opening day of the tournament, followed by traditional double-elimination play Wednesday-Friday. The tournament will return to single elimination play on Saturday.

BRACKET ONE**2020 SEC BASEBALL TOURNAMENT**

The 12 teams are seeded 1-12 with the two divisional champions and top four seeds guaranteed opening-round byes, with the possibility of earning another bye later in the bracket. The tournament field will include the top teams from the SEC's Eastern and Western Divisions plus 10 at-large bids seeded 3-12 based on conference winning percentage.

A team from the SEC Tournament has advanced to 11 consecutive National Championship Series in Omaha, winning six NCAA titles during that span (LSU 2009; South Carolina 2010 and 2011; Vanderbilt 2014; Florida 2017; Vanderbilt 2019). More than 100 first-round picks in the Major League Baseball Draft have played in SEC Tournament since 1991.

Tickets for the 2020 SEC Baseball Tournament will go on sale in February.


The Rebels will returned to Hoover as the reigning SEC Tournament champion last year and nearly took home a second straight crown.

The long road back to the title game began on Day 1 of the tournament as the No. 7 seed Rebel edged Missouri, 2-1, to avoid elimination.

Ole Miss reeled off four wins in five days, including three against top-15 teams. All six games the Rebels played were decided by two runs or fewer as lights-out pitching and clutch hitting carried the boys in powder blue through to the championship game.

The underdog Rebels raced out to a 7-0 lead but eventually came up one out short, falling 11-10 to No. 1 seed and eventual national champion Vanderbilt.



Ole Miss named Mike Bianco head coach of the Rebel baseball program on June 7, 2000. Since then, Bianco has become the winningest coach in program history and one of the top coaches in Southeastern Conference history while establishing Ole Miss as one of the premier programs in college baseball.

In 19 seasons leading the program, Bianco has delivered 16 postseason appearances, including six Super Regional berths and a trip to the College World Series in 2014. He has racked up 751 victories, holding a 751-439-1 (.631) record. Those wins are the most in Rebel baseball history and rank third all-time among coaches in the SEC. He also stands as the winningest and longest-active coach in the SEC among the three major men's

sports of baseball, basketball and football. The Rebels have reached the 30-win plateau in each of Bianco's 19 seasons, including eight 40-win campaigns, proving that the Rebels don't rebuild under Bianco—they reload.

The Rebels posted three straight 40-win seasons from 2005-07 for the first time in school history and have hit the program record of 48 wins three times, most recently a 48-17 (.738) season in 2018, which came as the best win percentage by a Rebel team in the past 48 seasons.

To become the all-time winningest coach in Ole Miss history, Bianco passed Rebel legend Jake Gibbs with his 486th win on March 9, 2013, against Lipscomb in non-conference action. On March 6, 2016, he won his 600th game at Ole Miss to become just the ninth coach in SEC history to record at least 600 wins. On May 11, 2018, Bianco became just the fifth coach in history to record 700 wins with an SEC school, as well as earning his 800th career win with a victory over Auburn.

The Rebel skipper added multiple milestones in 2019, including notching his 300th win in SEC play as Ole Miss turned in a dominant 12-4 victory over Florida on April 5. When his Rebels defeated Texas A&M 13-3 on Friday, April 26, Bianco won his 739th game as the head coach in Oxford, moving him to third all-time in SEC history ahead of South Carolina's Ray Tanner.

The winning tradition has led to a wealth of success in the nation's strongest baseball conference. Under Bianco, the Rebels have won four SEC Western Division titles, two SEC Tournament titles and one SEC regular-season championship, coming in 2009. Ole Miss captured the SEC Tournament title in 2006 and again in 2018. The Rebels also won the SEC West crown in 2018, becoming just the second team in program history to win both a divisional and tournament title in the same season. The Rebels have finished .500 or above in conference play in 15 of Bianco's 19 seasons.

MLB REBS

The excellence on the field has not gone unnoticed over the past 19 seasons under Bianco. The Rebels have seen 114 Major League Baseball draft picks in that time, including a combined 15 in the past two seasons.

At least four Rebels have been selected in each of the past 16 seasons of the Bianco Era. Prior to Bianco's arrival, Ole Miss eclipsed four draftees just three times.


In the Bianco Era, Rebel pitchers have accounted for 65 selections in the MLB Draft, including a pair of first-rounders. Drew Pomeranz was selected fifth overall in 2010, becoming the highest-selected Rebel ever, part of a class that featured five Ole Miss pitchers taken in the top 100 picks. Ryan Rolison joined Pomeranz as a first-round selection in 2018 when he was taken 22nd overall by the Colorado Rockies.

Bianco has also tutored 18 catchers who have gone on to sign professional contracts. In 2018 and 2019, three Rebels were drafted as catchers in the top six rounds. Nick Fortes signed with the Miami Marlins after they chose him in the fourth round in 2018, while Thomas Dillard (5th Round - Milwaukee Brewers) and Cooper Johnson (6th Round - Detroit Tigers) were quickly taken off the board in 2019.

In his 27 years as either an assistant or head coach at Northwestern State, LSU, McNeese State and Ole Miss, Bianco has coached 154 players who have gone on to sign professional contracts. Among those 154 players, 31 have made Major League rosters, including 20 Rebels in the past 19 seasons.

T.J. Beam (New York Yankees) was the first player from the Bianco Era to be called up in 2006, followed by Seth Smith (Colorado) in 2007 and Matt Tolbert (Minnesota) in 2008. Chris Coghlan (Florida) was named the 2009 National League Rookie of the Year, while Matt Maloney (Cincinnati) made his MLB debut that same season. Alex Presley (Pittsburgh) became the sixth Bianco-coached Rebel to get the call to the majors in 2010.

Right-hander Lance Lynn (St. Louis), shortstop Zack Cozart (Cincinnati) and left-hander Drew Pomeranz (Colorado) became the next crop of player to make their Major League debuts, getting the call to the big leagues in 2011. Those call ups gave the Rebels eight players active in the Majors in the 2011 season, the second most of any Southeastern Conference team that season. Seven players appeared on Major League rosters in the 2013 season, including the call up of right-hander



Phillip Irwin (Pittsburgh) that year. Right-hander Aaron Barrett (Washington) made his Major League debut on March 31, 2014.

Matt Tracy was called up to the big leagues by the New York Yankees, April 11, 2015, and made his debut later that day. Just over one month later, another former Rebel pitcher made his Major League debut as David Goforth began pitching out of the bullpen for the Milwaukee Brewers. In 2016, Mike Mayers (St. Louis) became the 14th Bianco-coached Rebel to see his big league dream come true, earning a start for the Cardinals against the Los Angeles Dodgers on Sunday Night Baseball.

Johnny Bench Award winner Stuart Turner saw his dream come true when he made the Cincinnati Reds roster to start the 2017 season. Less than a month into the season, the Oakland Athletics called up Bobby Wahl as the next Rebel to make his MLB debut. Braxton Lee earned MLB Reb when he earned a spot on the 2018 Opening Day roster for the Miami Marlins. Two more Rebels added their names to the MLB ranks in 2019 as pitchers Chris Ellis (Kansas City) and Jacob Waguespack (Toronto) toed the rubber in the bigs.

AWARD-WINNING REBELS

On the field, Bianco has established a tradition of developing some of the nation's top players, as the Rebels have seen a combined 79 selections to All-America and Freshman All-America teams over the past 19 seasons. During the 2019 campaign, Grae Kessinger was named a First Team All-American, while Doug Nikhazy and Kevin Graham were both tabbed as Freshman All-Americans. The feat marked the fourth consecutive season that Ole Miss has produced at least two Freshman All-Americans, amounting to total of 10 in that span.

Ole Miss also became the first school to produce two different finalists for the Johnny Bench Award in consecutive seasons when Stuart Turner and Will Allen were named as finalists in 2013 and 2014, respectively. Turner claimed the award in 2013, becoming the first catcher in program history to be tabbed as the national catcher of the year. Nick Fortes carried on the tradition in 2018, earning a Johnny Bench Award semifinalist nod.

Grae Kessinger added to the award-winning tradition in 2019. The Rebel legacy was named the Brooks Wallace Award Winner, given annually to the nation's top shortstop.

The Rebels have totaled 63 All-SEC nods under Bianco. Most recently, Grae Kessinger was named to the All-SEC first team at shortstop. Cooper Johnson was tabbed second-team All-SEC, as well as to the SEC All-Defensive Team. Doug Nikhazy rounded out the selections, pulling a Freshman All-SEC nod.

Bianco's Rebels have brought home a number of awards from the league office as well, including Stephen Head's SEC Player of the Year laurel in 2004, Drew Pomeranz earning SEC Pitcher of the Year honors in 2010 and the Rebels' trio of SEC Freshman of the Year winners: Seth Smith in 2002, Head in 2003 and Jordan Henry in 2007.

Bianco has also coached five C Spire Ferriss Trophy winners, given annually to the best college baseball player in Mississippi. Head won it in 2004, followed by Brian Pettway in 2005, Scott Bittle in 2008, Pomeranz in 2010 and Auston Bousfield in 2014. The Rebels had two Ferriss Trophy finalists in 2019, Grae Kessinger and Tyler Keenan.

The Rebels have also celebrated great academic

success under Bianco. Five of his Rebels have been named CoSIDA Academic All-District. The SEC's First-Year Academic Honor Roll has included 67 Bianco-coached Rebels, while 202 student-athletes have been selected to the SEC Academic Honor Roll.

NATIONAL TREASURE

Bianco's on-field accomplishments have been recognized nationally, as the Rebel skipper was selected to serve as an assistant coach with the USA Baseball Collegiate National Team in the summer of 2013.

Ole Miss has a strong history with Team USA. Ten Rebels have competed internationally for USA Baseball in the Bianco Era. Seth Smith and Stephen



Head both competed for the 2003 edition of the Collegiate National Team. Zack Cozart made the national squad in 2006, and Cody Satterwhite and Lance Lynn kept that going in 2007.

Drew Pomeranz became the sixth Rebel to sport the American flag uniform in 2009, followed by Bobby Wahl in 2012 and Dallas Woolfolk in 2017. Parker Caracci carried on the tradition in 2018, earning a spot on the Team USA roster, where he posted a perfect 0.00 ERA with two saves and opposing batting average of .094 in 9.2 innings of work. Doug Nikhazy made it three straight seasons with a Rebel arm wearing the Stars and Stripes, earning a spot on the 24-man roster for the 2019 summer.

ELECTRIC ATMOSPHERE AT SWAYZE

The excitement on the field has spilled over into the stands, where Ole Miss baseball fans have taken notice and shown their appreciation. Attendance continues to rise under Bianco as Oxford-University Stadium has been established as one of the best atmospheres in college baseball.

Ole Miss has ranked among the nation's top 25 attendance leaders in all of Bianco's 19 seasons. That streak also includes 13 consecutive years ranked in the top five and a No. 2 average attendance ranking in each of the last four seasons.

The Rebels have taken that crowd support and turned it into a distinct home field advantage. Ole Miss has won 73 percent of its home games under Bianco, compiling a 483-176-1 record at Swayze Field.

In addition to the outstanding winning percentage, the demand for seats led to new renovations and additions at O-U Stadium/Swayze Field. Grilling areas, picnic pavilions and terraced seats were added beyond the wall in left field in the Oakes Pavilion. Beyond the right field wall, new terracing along with more grilling areas and picnic pavilions were built in the area heavily populated by Ole Miss students.

Additions to the grandstand including skyboxes and additional grandstand seating were completed in 2009 as O-U Stadium expanded to accommodate the standing room only crowds that have become a mainstay for the Rebels under the leadership of Bianco. Prior to the 2016 season, the Rebels added a new HD video board to the outfield that measures 30'x48' in size to enhance the game day experience.

The latest renovations to O-U Stadium will benefit both players and fans. A \$19 million project, completed right after the 2018 season, included a new Baseball Performance Center, a field level club, additional box seating, a rooftop plaza down the first base line and an expansion/realignment of the left field terrace, as well as an additional video board down the right field line to accommodate those enjoying the outfield seating.

The 2019 season marked the 14th consecutive season where more than 160,000 fans have come to Oxford to see Ole Miss in action and the 16th straight year with 120,000-plus entering the gates at Swayze Field. In each of the past four seasons, the Rebels have drawn more than 270,000. Attendance reached an all-time high in 2018 as the Rebels won 29 home games. Ole Miss finished second in the nation in total and average attendance, setting program records with 322,742 total attendees at an average of 8,965 per game. Rebel Nation bested that mark in 2019, filling Swayze Field at an average of 8,988 per game.

The 2018 season also brought five of the 10 the most-attended games in Swayze's history, including the single-game record of 12,152 as Ole Miss closed out a series victory over LSU. That series against the Tigers was the second-most-attended in program history with 32,075 total fans, trailing only the 33,070 who watched the Rebels sweep No. 6 East Carolina to open the 2017 campaign.

With the success on the field and support in the stands, Oxford has evolved into a top destination for fans of postseason baseball. Bianco and the Rebels hosted four straight NCAA Regionals and two Super Regionals from 2004-2007. Ole Miss posted the largest crowds for any NCAA Super Regional in 2005 and 2006 and posted the highest attendance of any NCAA Regional in 2006. The 2005 NCAA Regional in Oxford drew the second-largest crowd among all Regionals.

When the Rebels hosted again in 2009 at the newly renovated Oxford-University Stadium, new attendance marks were again set; Ole Miss hosted the then-largest crowd in school history as 10,323 fans came to see the Rebels take on Virginia in game two of the Super Regional. All-told, 29,646 fans came to the Super Regional, making it the most attended Super Regional of the season and the highest attendance for a Super Regional at an on-campus facility in NCAA history at the time.

In the 2014 NCAA Regional, the Rebels ranked second nationally with 49,314 fans packing the stadium for the six-game event as Ole Miss began

its run to the College World Series.

On Monday, June 13, 2005, the Rebels' Super Regional game against eventual national champion Texas was the third-most watched television broadcast of a college baseball game in the history of ESPN.

In total, the Rebels have hosted nine NCAA Regionals in the past 16 years, further evidence that under Mike Bianco, Ole Miss baseball has truly become a national name.

THE BIANCO ERA BEGINS

Since Bianco took the helm of the program 19 years ago, he has raised the bar for expectations at Ole Miss with each successive season.

After being picked to finish sixth in the SEC Western Division in his first season, the Rebels defied expectations, finishing second in the West with a 17-13 record and an overall record of 39-23-1. The 39 wins were then one shy of the school record for a single season, while the 17 conference wins tied the school record at the time.

Ole Miss rose in the national spotlight that season, breaking into the top 10 in the national rankings for the first time since the 1972 season. The Rebels closed out the year with a trip to the NCAA Regional in New Orleans as the No. 2 seed.

Four Rebels earned spots as All-SEC selections on either the first or second team, while outfielder Burney Hutchinson earned second team All-America honors from Baseball Weekly. It was the beginning of a steady climb to the top for Ole Miss.

The Rebels again found themselves in the national spotlight in the 2002 season as Ole Miss climbed as high as No. 6 in the national rankings following a series win at then-No. 2 Alabama. It was the highest national ranking for the Rebels since finishing the 1969 season ranked No. 6 by Collegiate Baseball. Ole Miss also saw its first SEC Freshman of the Year as outfielder Seth Smith earned the honor from the league.

The 2003 season again saw Ole Miss in the postseason as the Rebels earned a berth in the Houston Regional. Bianco's Rebels were led by a young but stout pitching staff, featuring five freshmen throwing more than 60 percent of the innings on the season. That young group led the SEC in ERA at 3.45 for the year, hit the 35-win mark for the third straight season on the way to the postseason. The appearance in the NCAA Regional was the second in three years for Bianco's program and only the fourth for Ole Miss since the 1977 season.

One member of that pitching staff, two-way player Stephen Head, then a sophomore, earned All-America honors for the second-straight season, becoming the school's third two-time All-American in 2004. He also was named Co-Player of the Year in the SEC and was selected as one of five finalists for the 2004 Golden Spikes Award, amateur baseball's most prestigious award. It was the first time a Rebel player had ever been a finalist for the award. Head also brought the first "Boo" Ferriss Award home to Oxford, given to the top baseball player in the state of Mississippi.

Ole Miss set the stage for the move to the next level in 2004 as the Rebels earned another berth in the postseason, marking the first time in program history that Ole Miss reached an NCAA Regional in back-to-back seasons. However, things were different this time around.

Instead of heading on the road for the postseason in 2004, the Rebels were selected as one of the 16 host sites for an NCAA Regional. It was the first time Ole Miss ever served as a Regional host, but it wouldn't be the last.

On the way to the postseason, Bianco's Rebels notched 18 wins in Southeastern Conference play on the way to an overall mark of 39-21. The Rebels were also ranked in all four major college baseball polls each week of the season, including eight total

weeks in the top 10 in at least one of the polls. Ole Miss was in the top 10 for six-straight weeks from March 22-April 26, moving as high as fourth nationally in the March 29 edition of the Collegiate Baseball rankings.

Stephen Head, then a sophomore, earned All-America honors for the second-straight season, becoming the school's third two-time All-American in 2004. He also was named Co-Player of the Year in the SEC and was selected as one of five finalists for the 2004 Golden Spikes Award, amateur baseball's most prestigious award. It was the first time a Rebel player had ever been a finalist for the award. Head also brought the first "Boo" Ferriss Award home to Oxford, given to the top baseball player in the state of Mississippi.

Not satisfied with the accomplishments of the previous season, Ole Miss added to its list of firsts in 2005. The Rebels hosted a second-straight NCAA Regional and advanced to an NCAA Super Regional for the first time, playing host to the eventual national champion Texas Longhorns. The Rebels broke the 40-win mark for the first time under Bianco, setting a school record at 48-20 on the season and claiming the SEC Western Division Championship.

Ole Miss also saw the second-straight Ferriss Trophy come to Oxford when Brian Pettway was named as the award's recipient as well as being named an All-American for the first time in his career. He joined Head, who became the program's first-ever three-time All-American when he earned the distinction again in 2005.

TITLE TIME IN OXFORD

Not to be content with the success of previous

years, Bianco's Rebels used the achievements of 2005 to springboard into the 2006 season.

The Rebels posted a 44-22 record, marking the first time in history that Ole Miss had turned in back-to-back 40-win seasons. Ole Miss also claimed the 2006 SEC Tournament Championship on the way to hosting its third-consecutive NCAA Regional as well as a second-straight Super Regional against the Miami Hurricanes.

The Rebels again had two players gain national recognition as Zack Cozart and Cody Satterwhite were named All-Americans and three Rebels gained All-SEC honors. With the conclusion of the 2006 season, Ole Miss found itself holding a spot as one of the top teams in the nation and atop the Southeastern Conference. The Rebels were the only team in the SEC to post a winning record in conference play each of the previous four seasons. Ole Miss also posted more wins in the SEC than any other program over the same time frame.

Ole Miss extended that streak in 2007 as the Rebels posted a fifth-straight winning season in SEC action, remaining the league's winningest program in a five-year span. The Rebels also set a new standard with a third consecutive 40-win season as Ole Miss advanced to the Tempe Super Regional and posted a 40-25 mark on the year. The Rebels became one of only two schools to have hosted an NCAA Regional each of the previous four years and one of only four schools to have advanced to Super Regional play three-straight years.

Several players pulled in honors in 2007 as Ole Miss added a third SEC Freshman of the Year in Jordan Henry and seven Rebels took slots on All-SEC teams. Cozart was named an All-SEC First Team



selection, while Henry, Lance Lynn and Cody Satterwhite were named to the second team. Henry also joined Nathan Baker and Zach Miller on the SEC All-Freshman team. The trio also pulled in Freshman All-America honors, marking the first time the Rebels earned the honor for three players in the same season.

The honors continued to come in for the Rebels in 2008 as Ole Miss advanced to a sixth-straight NCAA Regional, playing in Coral Gables at No. 1 Miami. The Rebels advanced to the championship game before falling to the top-ranked Hurricanes. Scott Bittle brought home the program's third Ferriss Award as the state of Mississippi's top collegiate player and also earned First Team All-America honors.

Ole Miss continued to pull in the accolades in 2009 as the Rebels claimed the SEC Regular-Season Championship for the first time since 1977 with a 20-10 record in conference play. The 20 wins set the school record for wins in SEC play and helped Ole Miss secure a seventh straight berth in the NCAA Tournament, hosting for the fifth time in Bianco's nine years. The Rebels advanced to an NCAA Super Regional for the fourth time in five seasons, becoming one of only six schools to advance to at least four Super Regionals in that time.

In 2010, the Rebels made an appearance in the postseason with an eighth consecutive berth, competing in an NCAA Regional at the University of Virginia. With the appearance, Ole Miss became one of only 12 schools nationally to advance to eight straight NCAA Tournaments. Left-hander Drew Pomeranz claimed SEC Pitcher of the Year honors, becoming the first Rebel to claim the award since its inception, and also garnered All-SEC and All-America honors. Right-hander Brett Huber also claimed postseason accolades as he was also named an All-SEC selection and earned Freshman All-America honors. Pomeranz became the highest draft pick in school history when he was taken fifth overall by the Cleveland Indians and led a group of five Rebels drafted in 2010. The left-hander also became the fourth Rebel to claim the Ferriss Trophy, giving Ole Miss more winners of the award than any other program in the state.

In 2011, the Rebels continued to bring in postseason accolades as Alex Yarbrough was named an All-SEC selection. Ole Miss also continued the trend of sending Rebels to the pros with six players selected in the 2011 MLB Draft.

The 2012 season saw the Rebels advance to the NCAA Tournament for the 10th time in the Bianco era as Ole Miss advanced to the championship at the College Station Regional hosted by Texas A&M. The Rebels defeated the eighth-ranked Aggies on the way to the program's sixth regional championship game in an eight-year span, a feat accomplished by only 15 teams nationally at the time. Yarbrough was tabbed as an All-SEC and All-America selection at the conclusion of the season and was one of six Rebels drafted in the 2012 MLB Draft.

Ole Miss made the NCAA Tournament in 2013 with a berth in the Raleigh Regional hosted by N.C. State after a 38-win season and advancing to the third day of play at the SEC Tournament. Stuart Turner and Bobby Wahl became All-SEC and All-America honorees, while Turner was named the winner of the Johnny Bench Award as the top collegiate catcher in the nation. Ole Miss also continued the trend of sending players to the professional ranks with five players drafted, marking the 10th con-

secutive season with at least five players taken in the MLB Draft.

REBELS RETURN TO OMAHA

The 2014 season will go down as one of the best in Ole Miss history. The Rebels advanced to the College World Series for the fifth time in program history and the first time since the 1972 season.

Ole Miss claimed the SEC Western Division title for the third time under Bianco's leadership, posting a 19-11 record before hosting an NCAA Regional for the sixth time during the head coach's watch. The Rebels blew through the Regional with a win over Jacksonville State and a pair of wins over Washington on the way to a fifth NCAA Super Regional in 10 seasons.

In the NCAA Super Regional, the Rebels traveled to face top-ranked Louisiana-Lafayette and rallied after losing the first game to claim the NCAA Super Regional with wins in game two and three to secure the program's berth in the College World Series.

In Omaha, the Rebels faced No. 1 seed Virginia, falling to the Cavaliers 2-1 in the opening-round game before picking up a dramatic walk-off win over Texas Tech and a 6-4 victory over TCU in elimination contests to set up another showdown against Virginia with a berth in the CWS Championship Series on the line. Ole Miss fell to the Cavaliers to end the season with a third-place finish, tying the best finish in the CWS by an Ole Miss team with the 1956 Rebels.

MAINTAINING EXCELLENCE

After advancing to the College World Series for the fifth time in program history during the 2014 season, Bianco had a young team with little experience take the field for the 2015 campaign. Gone from the team that made it to Omaha were 17 players, including eight that were selected in the 2014 MLB Draft. Three position players returned to the starting lineup along with a cast that was just getting its first taste of baseball at the highest collegiate level. To make things even more difficult, Ole Miss was faced with the nation's toughest schedule all season long. Despite the youthful team and the difficult schedule, the Rebels were relentless and determined to continue the program's excellence under Bianco. With five wins over teams ranked No. 1 in the country, including series wins over Florida and Vanderbilt, Ole Miss fought through the gauntlet to earn another postseason berth, the 13th during Bianco's tenure.

Leading the way throughout the season were All-SEC Second Team reliever Wyatt Short, Ferriss Trophy finalist Scott Weathersby, and senior slugger Sikes Orvis. Short recorded 10 saves in 2015, while Weathersby moved from the bullpen to a spot in the weekend rotation, willing to be called upon whenever his team needed him to lead the way. Orvis, a fan favorite and face of the program, finished his career as a Rebel by climbing into the Ole Miss top-10 career home runs list.

The experience that the Rebels gained in 2015 paid dividends in the 2016 season. Ole Miss got off to a hot start, winning 20 of its first 22 games, including a series win over No. 2 Louisville and a road win over eventual national champion Coastal Carolina. With 40 regular season wins, the Rebels tied a school record and eclipsed the victory mark for the sixth time under Bianco. Ole Miss finished with a 43-19 record and hosted an NCAA Regional for the seventh time in the last 13 years. J.B. Woodman became the 23rd All-American in program history, while also earning All-SEC honors alongside second

baseman Tate Blackman and catcher Henri Lartigue. A trio of Rebels collected Louisville Slugger Freshman All-America accolades in pitchers Brady Feigl, James McArthur and Andy Pagnozzi. Following the season, six Rebels were taken in the 2016 MLB Draft to mark the 12th-straight year at least four Ole Miss players were chosen.

Prior to the 2017 campaign, the Rebels brought in the nation's top-ranked recruiting class, the first No. 1 ranked recruiting class in the history of Ole Miss Athletics. The talented youth made an immediate impact on the diamond as three freshmen found themselves in the everyday lineup, while five more saw action on the mound. For only the second time in program history, as well as the second consecutive season, three Rebels earned Freshman All-America honors in pitchers Will Ethridge, Ryan Rolison and Houston Roth. The pitching staff was the strength of the 2017 squad, cracking the country's top 25 in six different categories; Ole Miss led the SEC and ranked third nationally in strikeout-to-walk ratio (3.21), while finishing ninth in the country with 1.22 walks and hits per inning (WHIP).

The 2018 campaign brought one of Bianco's best seasons to date. The Rebels won 48 games for the first time since heading to Omaha in 2014, were crowned SEC West Co-Champions, and went on to win the SEC Tournament Championship. Ole Miss opened the season with the best start to a year in program history, coming in at 17-1, as well as 20-2 at just before the halfway point. The Rebels entered postseason play tied for their highest ranking in

program history at No. 2, according to NCBWA. They were a consensus top-five team by the end of the year, and spent most of the season as one of the nation's best teams. One of the best years to date offensively made Ole Miss one of the most feared teams by opposing pitchers, and rightfully so. The Rebels ranked in the top-15 nationally in hits, doubles, runs scored, slugging percentage, home runs, and batting average. Every Rebel who started a game in 2018 recorded a home run, but no one contributed more to the offense than the hot bat of Ryan Olenek, who had a record year that saw the junior hit .350 with 83 hits in 61 games, including the third-longest hitting streak in program history at 23 games. After running through the SEC Tournament, capped by a 9-1 win over LSU in the conference title game, the Rebels hosted an NCAA Regional for the first time since 2016 after missing a year in 2017. After opening with a decisive victory over Saint Louis, the Rebels exited the tournament after two heartbreaking losses in one day to the nation's top hitting team, Tennessee Tech.

The success continued in 2019 as Ole Miss notched yet another 40-win season, finishing 41-27 after a tremendous SEC Tournament run, an NCAA Oxford Regional Championship and a berth in the Fayetteville Super Regional. The Rebels held a spot in the top 25 all season thanks to a powerful offense that finished in the top 25 nationally in hits, walks, runs scored and home runs. The 2019 squad set program records for walks drawn (351), fielding percentage (.978) and stolen bases (93) en route to a strong year. Ole Miss made a spec-



tacular run and nearly won it second straight SEC Tournament, falling one out short in a walk-off defeat to eventual NCAA Champion Vanderbilt. That run was enough for the Rebels to earn the No. 12 overall seed in the NCAA Tournament. Ole Miss hosted its ninth NCAA Regional under Bianco and swept at Swayze Field, winning three straight against Jacksonville State, Clemson and Jacksonville State once more to capture its 10th regional title and sixth Super Regional bid. The win sent the Rebels to Fayetteville for a Super Regional date with No. 5 seed Arkansas. The Rebels delivered an emphatic 13-5 victory in Game 2 at Baum-Walker Stadium but ultimately fell short of a trip to Omaha, dropping the finale to cap Bianco's 19th season.

TOP RECRUITER

Not only have fans and the media covering college baseball noticed Ole Miss' resurgence under Bianco, some of the top talent in the country is also taking a close look at the Rebels.

Fourteen of Bianco's 19 recruiting classes at Ole Miss have garnered top-20 national rankings, including nine that have placed in the top-10. His first recruiting class was rated as one of the nation's 10 best by both Collegiate Baseball and Baseball America, including a No. 6 ranking by Collegiate Baseball.

The 2003 recruiting class was ranked No. 10 by Collegiate Baseball, while the 2011 class was ranked third nationally by Collegiate Baseball and fifth by Baseball America. It marked the first top-5 recruiting class for Bianco at Ole Miss. In the fall of 2016, Rebel Baseball earned the No. 1 ranking in national recruiting rankings by both Baseball America and D1Baseball.com. The top ranking was the first No. 1 recruiting class in the history of not only the baseball program but all of Ole Miss athletics.

FOUNDATION OF SUCCESS

Bianco's winning ways can be traced back to his playing days. After spending two seasons at Indian River (Fla.) Community College, he played two seasons for Skip Bertman at perennial national-power LSU in 1988 and 1989. He was the starting catcher and team captain for the Tigers' 1989 team that finished third at the College World Series in Omaha, Nebraska. He homered in LSU's 6-3 win over Miami (Fla.) in the 1989 CWS to help advance the Tigers to the semifinals.

While working behind the plate for LSU, Bianco caught major league pitchers Ben McDonald, Russ Springer, Curtis Leskanic, John O'Donoghue, Chad Ogea and Paul Byrd.

His time behind the plate as a player would later benefit him as he served as LSU's pitching coach during three World Series championship teams in the 1990s. Bianco also worked with the pitchers during his three years as head coach at McNeese State, and continues to serve in that same capacity with the Rebels.

OMAHA EXPERIENCE

Following his playing career, he joined Jim Wells' (former head coach at Alabama) coaching staff at Northwestern State, where he served two seasons from 1991-1992 as a graduate assistant. He helped coach Northwestern State to a 1991 Southland Conference (SLC) championship and an appearance in the 1991 NCAA South I Regional.

He then returned to Baton Rouge where he joined Bertman's staff at LSU. In five seasons at LSU (1993-1997), the Tigers advanced to the College World Series four times and claimed three national championships. LSU also won three Southeastern Conference crowns and two SEC Tournament titles in that five-year span.

After the Tigers' 1997 College World Series title run, Bianco was named the head coach at McNeese State in July of that year.

BIANCO EARNS HEAD COACHING EXPERIENCE

After seven seasons as an assistant at Northwestern (La.) State and LSU, Bianco received his first head coaching opportunity, taking over the reins of McNeese State.

He quickly displayed his abilities to develop a competitive program. In his first season with the Cowboys in 1998, he engineered an 11-game

improvement from 1997, posting a 30-26 record - the first of three 30-win seasons. The 1998 season also saw the Cowboys rise to third in the conference standings and qualify for the SLC Tournament.

Following a 31-25 campaign in 1999, Bianco's 2000 team produced one of the most successful seasons in McNeese State history. The Cowboys finished 39-20, including winning a school-record 20 SLC games en route to claiming their first conference title since 1988, and making their third-ever appearance in the NCAA Regionals. In recognition, Bianco was named the SLC's Coach of the Year.

Bianco's 2000 McNeese State team raked in the individual postseason awards. Four Cowboys were named to the SLC's first team, including the conference's Hitter and Newcomer of the Year in Chris Williamson, and the SLC's Pitcher of the Year in Chris Howay.

Power hitting was the Cowboys' trademark under Bianco, as they hit 212 home runs in his three seasons, including a school-record 81 in 1999. His 2000 team batted .305 and set a new school standard for hits in a season with 600.

PERSONAL BACKGROUND

Bianco, 52, was born May 3, 1967, and is a native of Seminole, Florida. He is married to the former Camille Marquette, and the couple has five children: sons, Michael, Benjamin, Andrew and Samuel, and one daughter, Catherine.

Bianco was inducted into the Indian River Community College Hall of Fame in 2003. He was also named to the All-Alex Box Omaha Era Team by LSU in 2008. In 2010, Bianco was inducted into the Seminole High School Hall of Fame.

Carl Lafferty has spent 13 seasons as a full-time assistant coach at Ole Miss, including 10 as the team's recruiting coordinator, making him the longest-tenured assistant coach in the Southeastern Conference.

Since the 2010 season, Lafferty has served as the Rebels' recruiting coordinator, bringing in nationally ranked recruiting classes year after year. Nine of his recruiting classes have been ranked in the top 25, including six in the top 10 and four in the top five nationwide. Lafferty's 2016 class was ranked No. 1 in national recruiting rankings conducted by Baseball America and D1Baseball.com. The top ranking became the first No. 1-ranked recruiting class in the history of Ole Miss Athletics.

Lafferty's first class was ranked No. 8 by Baseball America, a group that led the Rebels to Omaha in 2014 for the first time since 1972. In 2011, Lafferty

helped haul in the first top-5 recruiting class of the Bianco era; the class was ranked third nationally by Collegiate Baseball and fifth by Baseball America. Ole Miss followed with another top-5 recruiting class in 2012, and the 2013 class ranked eighth to give the Rebels four straight top-10 classes.

Lafferty's success in putting together some of the nation's best classes has not gone unnoticed by his peers. In a 2016 survey conducted by D1Baseball.com, Division I baseball coaches named Lafferty as the fourth-best recruiting coordinator in the country.

More recently, his 17th-ranked recruiting class in 2017 helped produce a number of freshman who immediately contributed to one of the best years in program history in 2018. Freshmen Jordan Fowler and Tyler Keenan both made impacts and fulfilled major roles that went noticed around the country as both earned Freshman All-American status. Both Keenan and junior-college transfer Jacob Adams of the 2017 recruiting class stepped right up for starting roles in their inaugural seasons as Rebels and helped produce a record 48 wins. Fowler, who made nine starts in his first year, was the owner of Ole Miss's lowest ERA and highest number of wins as a starter, coming in at 7-0 with a 3.20 ERA to help him catch an All-American nod.

The 2018 class, also ranked in the top 25 nationally, produced another pair of freshman All-Americans in Doug Nikhazy and Kevin Graham. Graham was named a Freshman All-American by Collegiate Baseball after clubbing 10 home runs and slugging .507. Nikhazy was named to the SEC All-Freshman Team and a Freshman All-American by Perfect Game and Collegiate Baseball following an outstanding season on the mound. Nikhazy struck out 86, an Ole Miss freshman record, going 9-3 with a 3.31 ERA and grabbed two SEC Freshman of the Week nods along the way. Nikhazy's excellent freshman campaign earned him a spot on the USA Baseball Collegiate National Team for the summer.

In his time as a Rebel coach, Lafferty has developed 33 pitchers who have gone on to the professional ranks. In 2018, his impressive weekend rotation all departed in the 2018 MLB Draft, as Ryan Rolison, Brady Feigl, and James McArthur all heard the names called after a trio of tremendous years on the mound. Rolison was the first name off the board

after the southpaw was selected in the first round of the draft by the Colorado Rockies after a 10-4 season as the Rebel ace and Friday night starter. Feigl was next, heading in the fifth round to the Oakland Athletics, before McArthur continued the trend of Friday-Saturday-Sunday by being selected in the 12th round by the Philadelphia Phillies. Closer Parker Caracci was also selected in the 2018 Draft after a remarkable breakout season, but elected to return to Oxford for his junior season.

Caracci was drafted 16 rounds higher in 2019, again by the Toronto Blue Jays, one of four Rebel pitchers to be drafted. Ole Miss' Friday night starter, Will Ethridge, led the way, going in the fifth round to the Colorado Rockies. Caracci went in the 21st round, and Zack Phillips (Round 27 - Kansas City Royals) and Houston Roth (Round 29 - Baltimore Orioles) rounded out the group of four Rebel arms headed to the professional ranks.

Not only did Lafferty's efforts translate to the MLB Draft, but the Rebels continued on an excellent 2017 pitching staff with an equally strong class in 2018. Rolison and Feigl spearheaded an intense 1-2 punch on Friday and Saturday, combining to go 18-9 on the year, but the year's best story was the closer, Caracci, and his ability to stifle opposing batters at the end of games in his first year on the mound. The Rebel closer went 5-2 with 10 saves in 29 appearances last year, striking out an absurd 73 opposing batters in just 48.0 innings of work. Caracci was virtually unhittable as he ran up the gun in the mid to high-90s, and opponents managed just a .221 batting average against him.

Starting lefty David Parkinson was one of the more recent Ole Miss pitchers playing professionally after learning from Lafferty. After coming to Oxford as a junior college transfer, Parkinson worked with Lafferty to earn a spot in the weekend rotation midway through the 2016 season. One season later, he was the only Rebel to start in the rotation all 14 weekends of the season. The two strong seasons at Ole Miss allowed Parkinson's stock to rise as he was taken in the 12th round of the 2017 MLB Draft by the Philadelphia Phillies, the first Rebel off the board.

Wyatt Short and Chad Smith were 2016 MLB Draft selections coached by Lafferty. Short, an All-SEC closer in 2015, was chosen by the Chicago Cubs

and made 15 appearances without allowing an earned run to begin his professional career. Under the tutelage of Lafferty, Scott Weathersby worked his way up to a 10th round selection in the 2015 MLB Draft. Brady Bramlett (22nd round – Oakland) and Christian Trent (24th round – Milwaukee) were also drafted, with Bramlett deciding to return to the Rebels as the team's ace for the 2016 season.

In 2014, Lafferty helped guide Ole Miss to the College World Series for the first time since 1972. Following the memorable run to Omaha, nine Rebels were drafted including five pitchers who learned from Lafferty: Chris Ellis (3rd round – Los Angeles Angels), Josh Laxer (9th round – Detroit), Hawtin Buchanan (20th round – Seattle), Aaron Greenwood (28th round – Houston) and Christian Trent (29th round – Los Angeles Dodgers).

The assistant coach continued to add to the list of professional pitchers following the 2013 campaign when four of the five drafted players were pitchers, including third-round pick Mike Mayers, fifth-round pick Bobby Wahl as well as seniors Tanner Bailey and Brett Huber. Mayers made his MLB debut three years later, earning the start for the Cardinals on ESPN's Sunday Night Baseball.

The number of pitchers to go on to the professional ranks after playing under Lafferty grew following the 2012 season when Dylan Chavez (14th round – Boston) and R.J. Hively (19th round – Arizona) were both selected in the MLB Draft.

He added to his list of players to go on and play professional ball in 2011 with the selection of four pitchers and a catcher in the MLB Draft. David Go-

forth (7th round – Milwaukee), Austin Wright (8th round – Philadelphia), Miles Hamblin (12th round – Houston), Matt Crouse (24th round – Detroit) and Matt Tracy (24th round – New York Yankees) were all drafted and signed to play professionally.

Lafferty developed top pitching talent for the Rebels in 2010, guiding a pair of arms to All-America status. Junior southpaw Drew Pomeranz was named an All-America selection while right-hander Brett Huber was named a Freshman All-America selection. Both pitchers also garnered All-SEC honors. Pomeranz also went on to be named the SEC Pitcher of the Year, the first in the history of the award for Ole Miss. A finalist for the National Pitcher of the Year and the Golden Spikes Award, Pomeranz was taken by the Cleveland Indians with the fifth overall pick in the 2010 MLB Draft, becoming the highest drafted player in school history. He was one of four pitchers under Lafferty's tutelage to be drafted in 2010.

The trend continued in 2009 as the Rebels saw 11 players drafted, eight of whom worked under the direction of Lafferty. Six pitchers and two catchers were drafted in the 2009 season, including pitchers Scott Bittle (4th round - St. Louis), Nathan Baker (5th round - Pittsburgh), Brett Bukvich (18th round - Florida), Phillip Irwin (21st round - Pittsburgh), Aaron Barrett (27th round - Texas), Chris Corrigan (30th round - St. Louis), and catchers Brett Basham (50th round - San Diego) and Kyle Henson (39th round - San Francisco). The former catcher was also responsible for helping the Rebels claim the 2009 Southeastern Conference Championship.

In his first season as a full-time assistant, Lafferty tutored several players who went on to be drafted in the 2008 MLB Draft, including three pitchers taken in the first 75 picks - Lance Lynn (39), Cody Satterwhite (67) and Scott Bittle (75). Bittle earned first team All-America honors. Lafferty also worked with catcher Brett Basham, who earned SEC All-Defensive team honors and was drafted by the Chicago White Sox in the 16th round. Basham led the SEC in runners caught stealing and led all catchers in runners picked off. Lynn went on to help the St. Louis Cardinals claim the 2011 World Series in his rookie season in the Major Leagues.

Upon moving to a full-time position in 2008, Lafferty continued to work with the catchers, but also assumed duties assisting head coach Mike Bianco with the pitching staff before assuming duties as recruiting coordinator prior to the 2010 season.

In his first year back working on the field as a volunteer assistant in 2007, Lafferty worked with the outfielders and catchers, and assisted with the hitters.

Lafferty also served as the first base coach. In his time working with the outfielders, Lafferty helped develop Jordan Henry, the 2007 SEC Freshman of the Year selection and a Freshman All-America selection. He also worked with his brother, Justin, a ninth-round draft pick of the Detroit Tigers in the 2007 Major League Baseball Draft.

Lafferty returned to Ole Miss in 2004 to complete his degree after having spent several years playing professional baseball with the St. Louis Cardinals organization. Lafferty earned his Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice with a minor in Sociology from the University of Mississippi in 2004.

He was drafted by the Florida Marlins in the 20th round of the 2001 MLB Draft. After a short stint with the Marlins, Lafferty signed a professional contract with the St. Louis Cardinals. The catcher played two seasons (2002-03) with the Peoria Chiefs, a single-A affiliate of the Cardinals, and also played with the high-A affiliate, the Palm Beach Cardinals.

A native of Pine Bluff, Arkansas, he played for the Rebels from 1998-2001, finishing his career in the first year of the Bianco era. A four-time letterwinner, Lafferty hit .307 for his career with 104 RBI. He also notched 42 extra-base hits, including 16 home runs.

As a senior, Lafferty was named to the All-SEC second team, becoming the school's 92nd All-SEC honoree in program history. Lafferty also served as team captain that season.

Lafferty is married to the former Lauren Nelson of Baldwyn, Mississippi. The couple has three children, William Carl Lafferty IV, and twins, Henry and Drew.

Mike Clement is in his sixth season at Ole Miss, serving as the team's hitting coach and third base coach. Clement joined the Rebels' coaching staff prior to the 2015 season after spending two years at Kansas State University.

Under Clement, the Rebel offense has been established as one of the nation's best. In 2019, Ole Miss finished in the top 25 nationally in hits, walks, runs scored and home runs. The 2019 squad set program records for walks drawn (351), fielding percentage (.978) and stolen bases (93). Four players hit .310 or better on the year, and four players hit double-digit home runs: freshman Kevin Graham (10), Cole Zabowski (12), Thomas Dillard (14) and Tyler Keenan (15). Grae Kessinger had a spectacular year, earning First Team All-American and Brooks Wallace Award honors while hitting a team-best .330 with 18 doubles, seven home runs, 50 RBI and 67 runs scored, the fourth-most in program history. Cooper Johnson was tremendous

behind the plate as well, drawing Second Team All-SEC and SEC All-Defensive Team nods.

The 2018 season was undoubtedly Clement's best year to date at Ole Miss. The Rebels, under the guidance of their hitting coach, shattered a slew of school records, topped the conference in a number of batting categories and used an expansive offensive arsenal to give the SEC its only .300 team average at the plate in 2018. Eight of the starting nine players on this past year's team had batting averages over .300 by the end of the year, good for an even .300 average for the season. A relentless lineup carried the Rebels to a record 48 wins, and opposing pitchers found no weak spot in any spot throughout the Ole Miss batting order. The Rebels ranked in the SEC's top five in almost every major offensive category, including hits, batting average, runs scored, on base percentage and doubles.

One of the SEC's leading bats emerged in Ryan Olenek during the 2018 campaign, and under Clement's tutelage, the junior outfielder's production surged. Olenek at one point held the SEC's longest active hitting streak at 23 games, and topped a number of offensive categories for the Rebels. His .350 batting average led the pack by a good deal, and his 83 hits were the highest on the team. The right fielder also led the Rebels in doubles and had eight fewer strikeouts than any of his teammates.

Comparing the offensive numbers from 2017 to 2018 shows truly how remarkable the Rebel batting order turnaround was over the year. Clement helped raise the batting average .050 points, the slugging percentage .095 points, on-base percentage .053 points, and added 132 runs, 114 hits, 24 doubles, 24 home runs, 128 RBI and 210 total bases just over the course of one season, from the 2017 campaign to last year.

In Clement's third season, the 2017 Rebels finished in the top quarter of the SEC in doubles and home runs during conference play. Hitting 53 doubles and 26 homers throughout 30 conference games, Ole Miss ranked fourth in both categories. One of the Rebels' most consistent hitters was second baseman Tate Blackman, who continued the momentum from his sophomore campaign to hit over .300 again in 2017. In his final season as a Rebel, Blackman cracked the top 15 in the SEC in slugging percentage (.525) and on base percentage (.420). During the summer, he was taken in the 13th round of the 2017 MLB Draft by the Chicago White Sox.

For the third consecutive season, Clement helped an Ole Miss catcher improve dramatically at the plate. After Henri Lartigue led all SEC catchers in batting average in 2016, Nick Fortes used his bat to squeeze into the everyday lineup in 2017. With Clement advising Fortes and his approach, the sophomore hit .319 to lead the Rebels at the dish. A year later, with Fortes again behind the plate, the Rebel catcher was one of the team's leading bats, consistently hitting third with a .319 average for the second consecutive year. He was also one of the biggest home run threats in 2018, recording 11 home runs which was second only to Thomas Dillard's 13.

During the 2016 campaign, Clement's guidance led to breakout seasons from a trio of Rebels. J.B. Woodman turned in an All-American season, hitting .323 with 54 RBI and 14 homers to become the first Rebel to lead the Southeastern Conference in home runs since 1977. After spending the 2015 campaign as a backup catcher, Lartigue saw his draft stock rise due to his production at the plate; the switch-hitting catcher posted a team-high .353 batting average for the Red and Blue, a mark that was best among all SEC catchers and ranked ninth among conference hitters that led to first team All-SEC accolades. Woodman and Lartigue's offensive success led to them getting drafted in the second and seventh round, respectively, in the 2016 MLB Draft.

Following a disappointing freshman season, Blackman bounced back in 2016 with the help of Clement. Hitting at a .322 clip and leading the conference in sacrifice flies, Blackman earned second team All-SEC honors. The steady offense at the dish helped the Rebels go 43-19 in 2016, earning a NCAA Tournament bid as a host site for regional play. Ole Miss became just one of 11 teams to host a NCAA Regional for the seventh time in the last 13 years.

During his first year as the Rebels' hitting coach, Clement helped lead the Rebels to the postseason after facing the nation's toughest schedule during the regular season. Ole Miss broke out the bats in big games to go 7-6 against top-10 teams, including 5-4 versus teams ranked No. 1 in the country. Clement worked with youthful Ole Miss bats while also continuing to develop the production of Rebels with experience in the lineup. With the assistance of Clement's instruction, junior college transfer Connor Cloyd earned his way into a starting role, hitting .369 over 38 games played in 2015. Freshman

Will Golsan and sophomore Colby Bortles, two new starters in the Ole Miss infield, found success at the plate throughout the season as well. Golsan hit at a .290 clip in his first collegiate season, and Bortles proved he could produce in the middle of the order with a .281 average and 47 RBI.

Transitioning into his sophomore season, shortstop Errol Robinson maintained his production under Clement with a team-high 62 hits and a .297 average. In his first season at Ole Miss, Clement also saw Ole Miss senior slugger Sikes Orvis etch his name in the program record book. Orvis belted 16 home runs in his final season as a Rebel, the seventh-most in Ole Miss history, and added 17 doubles to help knock in a team-best 53 runs.

In two years as hitting coach at K-State, Clement made an immediate impact on the Wildcat offense, raising it to not only among the Big 12 Conference's best, but also near the top of the national leaderboard.

Named the K-State hitting coach in July of 2012, Clement led the Wildcat offense to the nation's second-best batting average in 2013 while the team went on to capture the Big 12 title, host and win its first NCAA Regional, and come within one victory of the program making its first trip to the College World Series. In addition to a high national ranking in batting average, the Wildcats were also ranked in the top 10 nationally in six other categories, finishing fifth in hits (705), triples (28) and sacrifice flies (40), eighth in triples per game (0.44) and on-base percentage (.406), and 10th in hit-by-pitch (96). The Wildcats paced the Big 12 in each of those categories in addition to RBI (368) and steals (99).

In 2014, the Wildcats were second among Big 12 teams in OBP (.385), third in runs per game

(5.8), and fourth in team batting average (.283). Nationally, K-State was 25th in OBP and tied for 18th in stolen bases.

Clement, a veteran coach with 11 years of experience at the Division I level and strong recruiting ties in the state of Texas, tutored a pair of All-Americans, seven All-Big 12 performers, and four MLB draft picks who went on to play professionally. Ross Kivett, the Big 12's Player of the Year in 2013, was one of seven hitters in Clement's first year that earned All-Big 12 honors, a group that included six first team selections. Kivett joined fellow All-Big 12 First Team selection Jared King as the two Wildcats who also garnered All-American accolades in 2013. King went on to be selected in the fifth round of the MLB Draft by the New York Mets, which was the first time he had been drafted.

Kivett was also drafted in 2013, in the 10th round by the Cleveland Indians, but he elected to return for his senior season. The outfielder and second baseman received All-Big 12 honors once again while he was one of three hitters under Clement's direction taken in the 2014 MLB Draft. Kivett was selected in the sixth round by the Detroit Tigers - the fourth hitter drafted in the sixth round or higher who had worked with Clement since 2006 - and Mitch Meyer and Austin Fisher were taken in the seventh and 13th round, respectively. In 10 years at the Division I level, Clement has had 26 players get selected in the MLB Draft.

Prior to coming to K-State, Clement was on the staff at Texas A&M for three years after spending the previous four seasons at UTSA, including the final three as the team's hitting coach. In addition to helping the Wildcats reach the Super Regional round in 2013, Clement has been a member of three other postseason teams, including a trip to the 2011 College World Series.

Texas A&M advanced to postseason play each year Clement was a part of the coaching staff. He helped guide the Aggies to both the Big 12 conference regular-season and postseason championship titles in 2011 on their way to a College World Series appearance. In 2010, Texas A&M won the Big 12 Championship and advanced to the championship game of the NCAA Coral Gables Regional, while the Aggies hosted a NCAA Regional in 2012.

Clement helped direct an Aggie offense in 2012 that led the Big 12 and ranked fourth nationally with 129 steals. Also, Clement coached the Texas A&M infielders that saw its 2011 squad decrease its errors by 23 from the previous year and finish in the top 25 nationally with a .975 fielding percentage.

During his time at UTSA from 2006-09, Clement helped the Roadrunners accumulate a 144-81 overall record - including an impressive 84-40 mark

in Southland Conference play - win two Southland Conference regular season titles, tutor 16 hitters that earned All-Southland Conference honors and set 30 offensive school records. Additionally, UTSA saw its team batting average jump 32 points from .285 the year before he took over the offense to .317 during his final season, a mark that still stands as the school record.

In his final year as the hitting coach in San Antonio, Clement steered an offense that rewrote the record books as he helped the Roadrunners win a school-record 39 games. Along the way, UTSA set new highs in five offensive categories, including home runs, hits and batting average. UTSA finished in the top 25 nationally in triples (11th; 25), slugging percentage (20th; .532) and home runs (21st; 89), while the 2009 squad also stole 79 bases to rank third in school history, the most since a school-record 92 in 1999.

Clement tutored just the second All-American in UTSA history in Michael Rockett. The outfielder, who was a four-time All-Southland Conference performer, was drafted in the 13th round of the 2009 MLB Draft by Detroit.

Prior to his stint at UTSA, Clement served as an assistant for one year at Kirkwood Junior College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Morningside College in Sioux City, Iowa, and then spent one year at Loyola High School in Los Angeles. He was also an assistant coach for the Orleans Cardinals in the prestigious Cape Cod Baseball League in the summers of 2005 and 2006, winning a Cape Cod Championship in 2005.

A former college catcher, Clement played two seasons at Kirkwood, helping the Eagles compile a 91-25 record. He finished his college career at Morningside, where he earned his bachelor's degree in physical education/secondary education in 2002. Following college, the Marshalltown, Iowa, native played professionally one season for the Canton Coyotes of the Frontier League.

Clement comes from a baseball background as his father, Brad, was a legendary head coach at Marshalltown (Iowa) High School, helping the Bobcats win three state championships before being inducted into the Iowa High School Hall of Fame. Clement's younger brother, Jeff, was drafted in the first round of the 2005 Major League Baseball Draft by the Seattle Mariners. The eight-year veteran spent time in the majors with Seattle and Pittsburgh before retiring prior to the start of the 2014 season.

Clement is married to the former Amanda Rosenberg of Kingwood, Texas. They have one son, Cooper.

Marc MacMillan, a four-year letterman for the Ole Miss baseball team during the 1990s, has spent four seasons as a volunteer assistant coach at Ole Miss, as well as two as the director of operations.

Along with serving as the team's first base coach, MacMillan works with the outfielders, assists in coaching the hitters and oversaw base running starting in 2018—a season that saw the Rebels finish fourth in the SEC in stolen bases, increasing their total from 38 in 2017 to 66 in 2018. The Rebels upped the ante in 2019, tying a program record with 93 stolen bases, a mark set during the 2014 run to the College World Series.

In four seasons, Ole Miss outfielders have recorded 51 assists under MacMillan's watch. During the 2017 campaign, he converted Thomas Dillard and Will Golsan into starting outfielders. Dillard came to campus as a highly-touted freshman catcher, and

Golsan spent his first two seasons as a starter on the right side of the Ole Miss infield. MacMillan also helped Ryan Olenek make a comfortable move from the corner outfield positions to center field, where he showcased more of his athleticism and speed. Olenek and Golsan led the Rebels with five outfield assists apiece.

Golsan was superb as the starting center fielder for Ole Miss in 2018. He made numerous spectacular plays while anchoring the Rebel outfield, making just two errors all season. Golsan also hit .304 and was named to the SEC and NCAA Oxford Regional All-Tournament teams. The Senior CLASS Award Candidate wrapped up a tremendous career as a Rebel and was selected in the 26th round by the Colorado Rockies in the 2018 MLB Draft.

Olenek turned in an incredible 2018 campaign as well. As the team's starting right fielder, Olenek hit a team-best .350 en route to first-team All-SEC honors. He finished the season as the toughest player to strike out in the conference, much thanks to a 23-game hitting streak—the second-longest in the SEC during the 2018 season and tied for the third-longest in program history. Under MacMillan's tutelage, Olenek was also named a C Spire Ferriss Trophy Finalist and was drafted in the 17th round by the San Francisco Giants but elected to return for his senior season.

In 2019, MacMillan helped to convert another infielder, Anthony Servideo, into an outstanding defensive outfielder. The athletic middle infielder transitioned quickly under MacMillan's guidance, starting a total of 40 games in the outfield as a sophomore, making numerous spectacular plays along the way, including a team-high four outfield assists. At season's end, Thomas Dillard was selected out of the Rebel outfield in the fifth round of the 2019 MLB Draft, becoming the fifth outfielder drafted under MacMillan's watch. Injuries also forced one of MacMillan's young prospects to be thrust into action early. Freshman Josh Hall impressed as he earned nine starts in the outfield and was 10-of-11 stealing bases along the way.

MacMillan's coaching made an immediate impact in his first season directing the outfielders. Ole Miss outfielders tallied 17 assists during the 2016 season, just one off the school record of 18 set in 2014. Of the 17 assists, 10 were outs at home to

prevent runs from scoring. Center fielder J.B. Woodman, a second team All-American, led the way with nine assists. Under MacMillan's guidance, Woodman earned a spot on the SEC All-Defense team before being selected in the second round of the Major League Baseball Draft by the Toronto Blue Jays.

Prior to being promoted to a coaching role, MacMillan spent two seasons as the Rebels' director of operations. In that role, he was responsible for the daily operations of the program including planning team travel/meals, working with the program's budget, dealing with equipment orders and acting as one of the program's liaisons to other members of the athletic department. MacMillan also directed the Diamond Girls, a group of female Ole Miss students who serve as the ambassadors for Ole Miss Baseball and assist in gameday operations, the Ernie LaBarge Bullpen Club and community service events throughout Lafayette County.

Before returning to Ole Miss, MacMillan was the associate head coach at the University of Arkansas - Pine Bluff. He spent three years at UAPB, working with the pitchers, infielders and base runners, while also coordinating the program's recruiting efforts plus strength and conditioning programs.

In 2013, MacMillan coached a pitching staff that led the conference in ERA, helping lead UAPB to the program's first SWAC Tournament appearance since the 2009 season. His recruiting classes stretched from coast-to-coast and aided UAPB's back-to-back Western Division titles in 2014 and 2015. MacMillan's recruits included Jordan Sechler, a 19th round



draft pick of the 2013 MLB Draft by the Atlanta Braves; Isias Alcantar, 2013 SWAC Player of the Year, first and second team All-SWAC selection, and 2014 34th round draft pick of the Tampa Bay Rays; Andre Davis, first team All-SWAC selection and 2015 7th round draft pick of the Kansas City Royals; and Kevin Walsh, first team All-SWAC and 2015 MLB 21st round draft pick of the Philadelphia Phillies.

Prior to his time at UAPB, MacMillan served as the recruiting coordinator and pitching coach at the University of Arkansas - Monticello for the 2010 season. Before his coaching stint at UAM, MacMillan served as the head coach at Crichton College. He also served as an associate scout for the Seattle Mariners and as head coach at Memphis University School.

MacMillan played for the Rebels from 1993-96 where he was a utility player under head coach and All-American Donnie Kessinger. He was a part of the 1995 NCAA Regional team that won 40 games and fell to Florida State in the Regional Championship game with a berth in the College World Series on the line.

He earned a degree in Business Administration from Ole Miss before going on to earn a Master's of Science in Sport Administration from Canisius College in Buffalo, New York.

MacMillan is married to the former Andrea Adams of Memphis, Tenn. They have one son, Tanner Loyd MacMillan.

Zach Boone, formerly at Illinois, Florida and West Virginia, joined the Ole Miss strength and conditioning staff in August 2017 and works primarily with the Rebel baseball and cheer programs.

In Boone's first season at Ole Miss, the Rebels went from the bottom to the top in the SEC hitting charts. Ole Miss improved its batting average by .047 points and ended the season with a league-best .300 team average. Ole Miss also clubbed 24 more home runs and scored 132 more runs from the 2017 to the 2018 regular season.

The first year with Boone leading the strength and conditioning program ended with 48 wins, SEC Western Division and SEC Tournament titles, as well as an NCAA Regional berth and No. 4 overall seed in the tournament.

Boone, a native of Fairmont, West Virginia, joins the program after a three-year stint at Illinois, where he was a part of the Big 10 Championship team that went 50-10 en route to hosting an NCAA Super Regional. He also worked alongside two MLB Draft First Round selections and had 11 overall picks in

his three seasons with the Illini. His time in Champaign also included working with the softball program, where he helped lead the team to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances in 2016 and 2017.

Prior to Illinois, Boone was a member of the staff at Florida, where he assisted with the 2014 SEC Champion baseball team. Last season, Creighton collected three first team All-Big East nods, one All-American and four MLB draftees, the program's most since 2006.

AN OXFORD TRADITION

Having fielded teams since the late 19th century, the University of Mississippi boasts a long and distinguished baseball history. While the Rebels have games recorded as early as 1893, what is commonly referred to as the "modern era" is considered to have started in 1947.

Through the years, Ole Miss has had a total of 20 coaches on record, six during the modern era, with Mike Bianco being the latest when he was named the Rebels' field skipper in June 2000.

Ole Miss has won 25 Southeastern Conference championships and has made 23 trips to the NCAA Tournament. In 2019, Ole Miss won its 10th NCAA Regional title. Five times, the Rebels have advanced to the College World Series in Omaha, Neb.

Through the years, Ole Miss student-athletes have been selected to 70 All-American teams, most recently First Team All-American Grae Kessinger, who in 2019 was also named the best shortstop in college baseball as he became the first Rebel to win the Brooks Wallace Award.

In 2003, Stephen Head became Ole Miss' first-ever National Freshman of the Year when he was selected as one of four National Freshman of the Year by Collegiate Baseball newspaper, and he was Ole Miss' first-ever finalist for the Golden Spikes Award, amateur baseball's most prestigious award, in 2004. Head went on to be the first three-time All-America at Ole Miss.

Drew Pomeranz was named a finalist for the Golden Spikes Award in 2010 and became the highest draft pick in school history with the fifth overall selection of Cleveland.

After the exciting postseason run in 2014, Will Allen, Austin Anderson and Auston Boufield received All-America Honors. J.B. Woodman became the 23rd Rebel to join the All-America ranks in 2016 by closer Parker Caracci in 2018.

Ole Miss has produced 197 players selected in the MLB Draft over the course of history, including 114 in the past 19 seasons under Bianco. Moreover, 49 Rebels have seen their dreams come true by playing in the big leagues at one point in their respective careers, including 20 in the past 19 seasons. Eight Rebels appeared on an

MLB roster in 2019, including two new MLB debuts. At season's end Aaron Barrett became the 13th Rebel to win a World Series ring with the Washington Nationals. Ole Miss has been represented on the roster of the last two World Series Champions and three of the last four.

The wealth of talent that has come through Oxford has helped to build one of the strongest fan bases in college baseball and one of the game's best atmospheres at Swayze Field. In 2019, Ole Miss once again broke its average attendance record, attracting 8,988 per game. Oxford-University Stadium has ranked second in the nation in average attendance in each of the last four seasons.

THE EARLY YEARS

The earliest game on record is a 6-3 loss to Mississippi A&M in Starkville during 1893. While the Rebels lost that first game, they did see their fair share of success during the program's early years.

Coach Ashford produced the first winning season in 1902, posting a 9-8 on-the-field ledger. Ole Miss would end up finishing the year 10-7 due to a win being

forfeited by Alabama.

J.W. McCall's 1910 squad posted an 11-3 record, and in 1914, Baseball Hall of Famer Casey Stengel coached Ole Miss in the spring. Stengel helped the team to a 13-9 finish.

In 1923, Pete Shields became the program's head coach and spent nine successful seasons at Ole Miss. His first team ended the season with a 15-game win streak to finish with an 18-3-1 mark. Shields would suffer just one sub-.500 year, a 2-8-1 ledger in 1928, as he compiled a 114-59-2 mark with the Rebels.

C.M. "Tad" Smith followed Shields as the head coach in 1932. Smith would coach the Rebels for a total of 16 seasons from 1932-1942 and from 1946-1950 as he led Ole Miss into the program's modern era.

In 1940, Sisler Johnson recorded the first no-hitter in school history during an 8-0 win over Mississippi College.

Goat Hale coached the 1943 team, going 2-10. Ole Miss didn't field teams in 1944 and 1945 due to World War II, and when the Rebels returned to the field in 1946, Smith was back as the head coach.

He would coach Ole Miss for the next five seasons to finish with a record of 107-143-4.

Charlie Conerly highlighted Smith's final seasons by becoming the first .400-hitter on record in school history, with a .451 average in 1948.

SWAYZE PUTS REBELS IN NATIONAL SPOTLIGHT

During Tom Swayze's 21 seasons at Ole Miss, the Rebels would emerge onto the national stage. Swayze would compile a 361-201-2 record from 1951-1971, winning four SEC championships and making three visits to Omaha.

Swayze's squads would suffer only three losing seasons and recorded 11 consecutive winning campaigns from 1954-1964.

The 1956 season would be the Rebels' breakout season under Swayze. Ole Miss would finish the regular season 18-5 overall and 13-3 in the SEC to tie Florida for the regular-season title. While the Gators would defeat the Rebels in an SEC playoff series, two games to none, Ole Miss still received a bid to the NCAA District III Playoffs.

Ole Miss would go 3-1 at the NCAA District III Playoffs, defeating Duke twice out of the loser's bracket to earn the school's first-ever trip to the College World Series.

In their first trip to Omaha, Ole Miss went 2-2 to finish third — the Rebels' best-ever showing in the World Series.

The 1956 campaign also saw the first no-hitter of the modern era when Cecil Burford blanked Vanderbilt 7-0. Also, second baseman Bernie Schreiber became the first Rebel to garner All-America honors.

Ole Miss would claim its first of four conference crowns under Swayze in 1959, capturing the SEC Western Division title and defeating Georgia Tech two games to one in the SEC Championship Series.

The Rebels repeated as SEC champs in 1960, rolling to a 22-3 record, which was highlighted by a school-record 17-game winning streak.

Ole Miss would again win SEC titles in 1964 and 1969. The Rebels also played for the conference title in 1967, losing to Auburn in the SEC Championship series.

Following the Rebels' conference titles in 1964 and 1969, Ole Miss earned a berth in the NCAA District III Playoffs and advanced to the College World Series in both years.

Swayze would conclude his tenure with a 25-8 record in 1970 and a 16-21 mark in 1971.

During his 21 seasons with the Rebels, Swayze would be honored as the SEC's Coach of the Year four times, winning the award in 1959, 1960, 1964 and 1969.

In addition to Schreiber, Ole Miss would also have four All-Americans under Swayze: third baseman Jake Gibbs in 1960 and 1961, shortstop Donnie Kessinger in 1964, shortstop Jimmy Yawn in 1966 and third baseman Whitey Adams in 1970.

GIBBS LEADS REBELS BACK TO OMAHA

Following a Major League career with the New York Yankees from 1962-1971, former two-time All-America Jake Gibbs returned to Oxford to lead the Ole Miss baseball program in 1972.

He quickly reversed the Rebels' fortunes following a 16-21 ledger in 1971. In his first year, Gibbs guided Ole Miss to a 28-16 record, winning the fifth SEC championship in school history and leading the Rebels to their fourth visit to the College World Series.

Gibbs would also lead Ole Miss to its sixth SEC championship in 1977, when the Rebels hosted and won the inaugural SEC Tournament at old Swayze Field.

The 1977 team would also qualify for the NCAA Southern Regional, going 1-2 to finish the year with a 39-19 record for a then-school record for wins in a season.

Gibbs would coach the Rebels through the 1990 season and leave as the school's all-time winningest coach, compiling a 485-389-8 record. On April 25, 1992, Gibbs became the first Diamond Rebel to have his number retired; Ole Miss retired his No. 41 that he wore as coach of the Rebels.

REBELS GET NEW HOME

On February 19, 1989, Ole Miss opened its current home facility, Oxford-University Stadium/Swayze Field,

with a doubleheader sweep of Cumberland University. A crowd of 1,016 braved the bitter cold that day to be part of an historic day in the school's baseball history.

Ole Miss officially dedicated its new home later on April 22, 1989 as a sellout crowd of 2,967 watched the Rebels down Kentucky 4-3.

OLE MISS RETURNS TO THE POSTSEASON

After Gibbs stepped down following the 1990 campaign, another Ole Miss All-America and former Major Leaguer returned to lead the Rebels, as Don Kessinger was hired prior to the 1991 season.

Kessinger would spend six years as the Ole Miss skipper, leading the Rebels to four 30-win seasons. His 1995 team produced a then-school record for wins, going 40-22 and earning the school's first NCAA Regional bid since 1977.

Led by All-America performers David Dellucci and Jamey Price, Ole Miss finished on the verge of its first World Series appearance since 1972, placing second at the NCAA Atlantic I Regional behind host-Florida State.

Following the 1996 season, Kessinger resigned his head coaching position to take an administrative post within the athletic department. He finished with a six-year record of 185-153.

Pat Harrison, the head coach at Pepperdine University, was hired to replace Kessinger. Harrison would coach the Rebels from 1997-2000, recording three 30-win seasons and leading Ole Miss to an appearance in the 1999 NCAA Regionals in College Station, Texas. The 1999 squad went 34-28 and set a then-school record for SEC wins with 17. Harrison would resign following the 2000 season with a 116-107 record at Ole Miss.

A NEW ERA BEGINS

A new era began in Ole Miss baseball on June 7, 2000, when Mike Bianco was hired as the 20th head coach in the school's history, and the sixth of the modern era. A former player and assistant coach under the legendary Skip Bertman at LSU, Bianco came to Ole Miss after three successful years as the head coach at McNeese State, where he had six players drafted in the MLB Draft.

In his first season, Bianco led the Rebels to the NCAA Tournament for the eighth time in program history and the first time since the 1999 season. Since that NCAA Regional appearance in 2001, the Rebels have been to 16 NCAA Tournaments under Bianco's leadership for a total of 23 all-time.

Bianco has also led the Rebels back to a position of national prominence in his 19 seasons with team championships and individual accolades continuing to roll in for the Ole Miss program.


In his 19 seasons, Bianco has coached three SEC Freshman of the Year selections, the 2004 SEC Player of the Year and the 2010 SEC Pitcher of the Year.

Bianco also led the Rebels to the 2014 College World Series and the 2006 SEC Tournament Championship, the first for the program since 1977 when the Rebels claimed the inaugural event. He also coached Ole Miss to the regular season SEC Championship in 2009, the first overall baseball championship for the program since 1977. The Rebels had a tremendous 2018 campaign as

CASEY STENGEL — THE REBS' PROFESSOR

Casey Stengel is a man of teaching ability on the field and off the field ... A story in The Sporting News the other day, had a story on why Stengel is called "Professor." Says Stengel, "Nobody has written this, as yet. But I once was the baseball coach at the University of Mississippi. And I did mighty well. In fact, at the time I had ambitions to devote my career to coaching college baseball and basketball." He goes on to say in the article that it was back in 1914 when he hit only .272 and received an injury with Brooklyn. He states he felt insecure and the idea of going into coaching appealed to him. Said Stengel, "I got in touch with Bill Driver, my old baseball and football coach from Central High at Kansas City, who had the basketball and football job at Mississippi. I asked if he needed a coach and he answered, 'Yes, come on down.' So Stengel went down to Oxford, Miss., to become the Professor of Baseball- "in a very fine atmosphere in a grand old university." Says Stengel, "Maybe I should have stayed there, I did okay, had a fine team, and when I left they gave me a gold-headed cane. My sister has it in Kansas City. Maybe it belongs in the Cooperstown Museum. Yes, sir, when they call me the Professor, they ain't kidding. There's a good reason."

well, securing the SEC West title during the regular season in addition to the SEC Tournament championship, highlighting a 48-win season.

Under his tutelage, the Rebels have produced 52 All-SEC selections and 17 All-Americans, including the program's first three-time All-America selection in Stephen Head. Ole Miss has also produced 114 draft picks in 19 seasons under Bianco.





GOVERNOR'S CUP

MAYOR'S TROPHY/GOVERNOR'S CUP

Aside from their conference series, Ole Miss and Mississippi State have played in a neutral-site rivalry game each season since 1980. The series, led 20-18 by MSU over the past 38 years, began as the Mayor's Trophy game, but was changed to the Governor's Cup in 2007.

Started in 1980 by then Jackson Mayor Dale Danks Jr., the Mayor's Trophy game has been one of the most anticipated matchups of the college baseball season. In the first 25 editions the game drew an average of 4,887 fans per game. The 1995 contest drew a series record of 6,712 fans as the Rebels defeated the Bulldogs 5-4.

The Rebels drew even with the Bulldogs in the all-time series in 2005, tying it at 13 games each, as Ole Miss reeled off four straight wins in the series. Eleven of the 26 games in the Mayor's Trophy Series were decided by one run.

With a 1-0 win in 2006, the first shutout ever in the 27-year history of the series, the Rebels took the lead 14-13 in the non-conference contest between the teams.

That win gave Ole Miss the lead for the first and final time in the Mayor's Trophy all-time series.

Beginning in the 2007 season, the non-conference meeting between the two teams moved to Trustmark Park in Pearl, Miss., and began anew as the two teams now compete for the Governor's Cup.

As was the case with the Mayor's Trophy game, the two teams alternate serving as the designated home team. Ole Miss was the home team in the inaugural game on April 17, 2007. Ole Miss is the home team in the 2019 edition of the contest.

In 2015, the Rebels claimed the Governor's Cup in historic fashion. Behind seven scoreless innings by Governor's Cup MVP Scott Weathersby, the Rebels cruised to an 11-1 victory. The 10-run win was the largest margin of victory in the history of the Mayor's Trophy/Governor's Cup rivalry. In 2017, a record crowd of 8,536 watched the rivalry game.

OXFORD-UNIVERSITY STADIUM/SWAYZE FIELD

The 2019 season marked the Ole Miss Rebels' 31st season and 30th year of calling the friendly confines of Oxford-University Stadium/Swayze Field home.

Construction of the \$3.75 million stadium was completed in October, 1988, while landscaping and touch-up work was finished through the course of the 1989 season and through the summer months.

The stadium's first action saw the Rebels sweep a double-header from Cumberland University on a bitter cold day, February 19, 1989. Still, a crowd of 1,016 braved the elements to be a part of that historic day in the school's baseball history.

Ole Miss officially dedicated its new home on April 22, 1989, with a ceremony attended by many dignitaries, including Hall of Famer Whitey Ford and Ole Miss great Archie Manning. A sellout crowd of 2,967 attended and watched the Rebels down Kentucky, 4-3.

The ballpark has grown and undergone changes since its original opening date, including an \$18 million renovation project prior to the 2009 season and a \$19 million project scheduled to be completed in 2018. The latest project features an exclusive performance center for Ole Miss Baseball that features the following: a new locker room, weight room, training room, players lounge, team meeting room, indoor hitting cages and an indoor pitching tunnel.

A seating area was added beyond the right field fence in 1993, where hundreds of students have become accustomed to spending their sunny spring afternoons at the ballpark.

The outfield area has since undergone another transformation as a left field and right field lounge area was constructed during the 2000 season. The area, which is complete with picnic tables and barbecue stands was expanded again prior to the 2007 season.

In the fall of 2003, the Charles M. Merkel Hitting Complex, a 6,800-square-foot indoor hitting facility, was added to the ballpark, and the indoor batting tunnel underneath the first base stands has become an indoor pitching area.

Beginning with the 2006 season, the park received a new scoreboard which contains a large video board capable of showing highlights and replays throughout the course of the game. Then completed in front of the stadium was a new office suite to house the Rebel baseball coaching staff and support staff for the program.

The 2009 renovations to O-U Stadium added a new club suite level as well as a new press box down the third base line. The grandstands were also extended down both baselines with new box seats and grandstand seating.

On the third base side of the stadium, 2009 brought the Rebels a new locker room and lounge, as well as a brand new team room with theater style seating and audio-visual equipment. Also included was a new training room. Prior to the 2011 season, the Rebels installed a new HD video board and scoreboard to replace the one put in place for the 2006 season.

In February 2016, Ole Miss Athletics announced plans for a \$19 million baseball project to enhance the student-athlete experience as well as the gameday atmosphere for Rebel fans. After multiple phases of renovations, the project was

completed ahead of the 2019 season. The added dugout club and rooftop plaza, as well as the state-of-the-art baseball performance center, make Swayze Field one of the best facilities in all of college baseball for both fan experience and student-athlete amenities.

The addition of the Baseball Performance Center provides a new weight room exclusive to Ole Miss baseball and overlooking Swayze Field on one side and Bailey's Woods on the other. The Henry Ullrich Fueling Station, staffed by the Ole Miss Athletics nutrition staff is adjacent to the weight room, along with a players' lounge, complete with pool and ping-pong tables, TVs and gaming systems. Elsewhere on the top

floor of the facility is a new team meeting room with a projection system and theater-style seating.

The new locker room provides more space and amenities for the Rebel student-athletes and sits sandwiched between expanded equipment and training rooms. The training room features both hot and cold tubs to aid rehabilitation and recovery. Also on the lower level is the new hitting and pitching indoor facility, allowing the Rebels to work on their craft in all weather conditions. When the Rebels are ready to go, they walk past the fans in the Dugout Club, down to the first base dugout and out onto the field.

FEDEX STUDENT-ATHLETE SUCCESS CENTER

Since May 2007, Ole Miss student-athletes have benefitted tremendously from their first-class on-campus learning environment - the FedEx Student-Athlete Success Center.

FedEx Corporation announced on April 14, 2005, a \$2.5 million gift over five years to the University of Mississippi to create such an elite academic support center for student-athletes.

The center provides state-of-the-art computer facilities and space for study halls and tutoring for men and women student-athletes, as well as additional classrooms for all students.

"FedEx has always been a strong supporter of educational initiatives at all levels," said Mike Glenn, former executive vice president of marketing development and corporate communications. "This contribution to the University of Mississippi is an extension of

our commitment to helping improve the academic resources available to students, and student-athletes in particular."

Glenn said FedEx and Ole Miss are committed to providing a strong academic foundation to enable students to reach their full potential.

The money was used to renovate a portion of the Starnes Athletic Center—which formerly housed football locker rooms, a weight room and training facilities—next to Vaught-Hemingway Stadium on All-American Drive. The 22,500-square-foot building now houses the Office of Student-Athlete Academic Support, including offices, conference rooms, 20 large and small group tutoring rooms, a large study area, a multi-media classroom, computer lab and 150-seat high-tech auditorium. The project was completed in May 2007 with an approximate cost of \$5 million.

In accepting the FedEx gift, university officials said the new center provides an important link in the university's goal to compete at the highest level in every aspect of its intercollegiate programs.

"American public universities are the best in the world largely because of the generosity of American corporations," said then-UM Chancellor Robert Khayat. "FedEx sets the standard for philanthropy by which others are measured. In this case, Ole Miss student-athletes are the primary beneficiaries, but all our students will benefit and, as a result, our entire state benefits."

In addition to this gift to the University, FedEx supports several endowed scholarship programs, the Whitten Chair in Law, the Lott Leadership Institute, the William Winter Institute for Racial Reconciliation and William Faulkner's historic home, Rowan Oak.



OLIVIA AND ARCHIE MANNING ATHLETICS PERFORMANCE CENTER

Among the finest facilities in all of college athletics, the Olivia and Archie Manning Athletics Performance Center at Ole Miss is the crown jewel in the growing athletics compound surrounding Vaught-Hemingway Stadium.

Ole Miss named the facility in honor of the Mannings in 2013, recognizing their extraordinary contributions to the University of Mississippi.

The renovation and expansion of the Manning Center was made possible by gifts to the Forward Together Campaign. In partnership with Ole Miss Athletics, the Manning family and the family of Billy Van Devender made significant contributions to the campaign in order to honor Olivia and Archie in this special way.

Located beside the South End Zone of Vaught-Hemingway Stadium, the Rebels moved into the spectacular \$18 million multi-purpose structure in fall 2004. As part of the Forward Together campaign, a \$12.5 million renovation and expansion commenced in early 2013. The project was built in phases and completed in early 2014.

Among the upgrades was the construction of a full kitchen and dining hall that is part of the Ole Miss dining program and open to every student, faculty and staff member. The "Grill at 1810" provides a nutrition center for all Ole Miss student-athletes. The Roland and Sheryl


Burns Team Meeting Room was constructed on the north end of the facility lawn between the building and the south end zone of Vaught-Hemingway Stadium. It seats approximately 200, doubling the capacity of the previous team room, and the meeting area was outfitted with state-of-the-art audio/video equipment and coaching software. Adjacent to the team room is a new head coach's office, putting all of the staff on the same level in the renovated coaching suite.

In addition to the team room, a new front door and recruiting room was added on the site of the old team room and pays tribute to the contributions of Ben Williams and James Reed, Ole Miss' first two African-American football student-athletes. The Williams-Reed Football Foyer celebrates the rich tradition of Rebel football with recruits, alumni and fans with interactive

exhibits and memorable images from the program's history.

The existing weight room was expanded on the east side of the Manning Center, widening the area by 2,000 square feet. On the west side, the locker room was overhauled and enhanced to include new player lounges and renamed the Van Devender Family Foundation Locker Room. Also, the Mattingly Family Equipment Room has been renamed to honor the memory of the late Thomas J. Mattingly and his family. AECOM, CDL and Tipton & Associates were the architects of the renovations and expansions to the Manning Center.





HEALTH AND SPORTS PERFORMANCE

Ole Miss launched the unique and comprehensive Health and Sports Performance program in July 2012, which takes a holistic approach to providing optimal health care for the demands of elite student-athletes. Through a complete collaboration between all services provided in the Health and Sports Performance model, Ole Miss is ensured not only healthy student-athletes, but ones that can achieve peak performance. These services include strength and conditioning, athletic training, team physicians, physical therapy, massage therapy, sports psychologist and sports nutrition.

"Our team of Health and Sports Performance professionals strive to provide quality health and sports performance services based on the latest in health and strength training research," said Shannon Singletary, Senior Associate A.D. for Health and Sports Performance. "By doing this we hope to not only provide our student-athletes with a better chance of winning on the field but also give them an opportunity to lead a healthy lifestyle."

Ole Miss Health and Sports Performance has strong working relationships with student health services, local physicians and Baptist Memorial Hospital-North Mississippi, which is located just miles from the Oxford campus. The department also taps into its own University of Mississippi Medical Center in Jackson for world-class treatment from multiple specialties including orthopedics, neurology and cardiology.

The Rebels enjoy a partnership with a team of orthopedic surgeons that includes: Daniel Boyd, M.D.; Kure Luber, M.D. and

Cooper Terry, M.D., from Oxford Orthopedic and Sports Medicine, as well as William Geissler, M.D. and Bob McGuire, M.D., from the University of Mississippi Medical Center.

Jeff Dennis, M.D., also provides primary care services as a part of the Internal Medicine Associates of Oxford.

Ole Miss' athletic trainers begin treatment and rehabilitation as early as 6 a.m. and are available until the last student-athlete is finished with practice or competition. There are currently six athletic training facilities on campus with the two main athletic training rooms located in the Starnes Athletic Training Center and the Manning Center. In addition, there are four satellite athletic training rooms located in The Pavilion at Ole Miss, Tuohy Basketball Center, Gillom Sports Center and Oxford-University Stadium/Swayze Field.

The main athletic training rooms are stocked with equipment such as digital x-ray systems, stationary bikes, laser therapy equipment, therapeutic modalities, underwater treadmills and Biomed testing equipment. Each component is strategically designed to not only give the student-athletes

the best care but also aid in returning them to competition as quickly and safely as possible.

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

The mission of the Ole Miss Baseball Strength and Conditioning Program is to build injury resiliency and elevate physical performance through a sound and systematic year 'round training program. This is first accomplished by developing a level of general physical preparedness which gives the athletes a solid foundation of strength and endurance to be ready handle the demands of a long, competitive baseball season. It also is a prerequisite before moving on to more baseball/position specific training attributes such as speed-strength, power, acceleration, speed/agility, and shoulder, hip and thoracic spine mobility. A solid base of general physical preparedness in combination with a strength program tailored to the athlete's specific sport demands gives the Ole Miss baseball team the physical tools to compete at the highest level.

Along with the physical development of the athletes, the strength program is responsible for assisting in developing a winning culture. It carries over the head coach's message in between competitive seasons. This is done through difficult team building workouts where athletes must work together to overcome adversity—Omaha Challenge, demanding accountability, emphasizing attention to detail, and instilling discipline. Holding athletes

accountable for punctuality, being properly dressed to train, giving maximal effort and being a good teammate all go a long way in the development of a unified-winning team and in positively influencing athlete's lives for future success.

Assistant coordinator of strength and conditioning Zach Boone is in his third season working with the baseball team after arriving in Oxford from Illinois in the summer of 2017. Boone spent

three seasons leading the Illini baseball program's strength and conditioning where he was a part of the 2015 B1G Champion baseball team. Prior to that was he was at the University of Florida, where he assisted with the 2014 SEC Champion baseball team. Boone earned a Bachelor of Science in Physical Education/Teacher Education from West Virginia University in 2011. He also earned his Master of Science in Athletic Coaching Education from WVU two years later.

The mission of the FedEx Student-Athlete Success Center is to promote academic and personal achievement through quality developmental and need-based programs designed to empower and holistically develop student-athletes for life after collegiate athletics.

The staff provides resources, experience and knowledge empowering each student-athlete to reach his/her academic, career and personal potential. The FedEx staff pursues this mission by promoting academic success with integrity, strict adherence to university, SEC and NCAA rules, and a dedication to excellence.

Ole Miss has a long history of academic success among its baseball program, which includes eight Academic All-Americans, 67 selections to the Southeastern Conference's First Year Academic Honor Roll and 283 selections to the SEC Academic Honor Roll.

Last year, Ole Miss placed a total of 16 student-athletes on the SEC's First Year and Spring honor rolls.

Additionally, the Ole Miss baseball program graduated three players, Parker Caracci, Chase Cockrell and Connor Green in May 2019. The Rebels added another graduate, Ryan Olenek, in December 2019, in addition to eight graduates through the Rebel Reconnect program.

Under the direction of Assistant Athletics Director for Student-Athlete Development Jennifer Saxon, the program consists of these five vital components:

- **The Commitment to Academic Excellence** is promoted through a full range of services that include orientation, advising, tutoring, academic skills training and the recognition of academic excellence.
- **The Commitment to Athletic Excellence** is developed by the department's 10 women's and eight men's intercollegiate sports teams. The sponsorship is based on equity and compliance to all University, NCAA and Southeastern Conference rules and regulations.
- **The Commitment to Career Development** is a joint effort of the Ole Miss Athletics Department and Career Center. The goal is to prepare student-athletes for their transition out of sports and into the career development process. Career

development components of the program include special workshops and programs for student-athletes and a senior resume brochure.

• **The Commitment to Academic Excellence** is promoted through life skills and personal development seminars and sponsorship of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee.

• **The Commitment to Service** is promoted - in conjunction with the University Counseling Center - through many community service projects throughout the year. Ole Miss student-athletes are very involved in the community as the community service program continues to grow.

NCAA COMPLIANCE

BOOSTER

A representative of the institution's athletics interests (booster) is an individual, independent agency, corporate entity or other organization who is known to have been involved in promoting the institution's athletics programs, made financial contributions to the athletics department or booster organizations or provided benefits to enrolled student-athletes and/or their families. For example, you are a booster if you have donated to the QB Club, purchased season tickets or employed a student-athlete.

EXTRA BENEFIT?

An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or a booster to provide a student-athlete (or their family) a benefit that is not generally available to other University students or is not expressly authorized by the NCAA. Examples of extra benefits include tickets to sporting events/concerts, reduced cost housing, meals, discounts on services, use of a car, etc. Extra benefits will jeopardize a student-athlete's eligibility.


WHO IS A PROSPECT?

A prospect is a student who has started classes for the ninth grade or above (seventh grade for men's basketball), is attending prep school or junior college or who has withdrawn from a four-year college and plans to transfer. A prospect remains a prospect until they enroll and attend classes for a regular term (i.e. not summer) at the University. This means a prospect remains a prospect even after verbally committing or signing a National Letter of Intent.

WHAT IS INSTITUTIONAL CONTROL?

Institutional control of athletics is a fundamental requirement of NCAA legislation. A University is required to educate boosters on NCAA rules and regulations and monitor the athletics program for adherence to those rules. DR. GLENN BOYCE | CHANCELLOR



Dr. Glenn Boyce became the 18th Chancellor of the University of Mississippi on October 14, 2019, following his appointment by the Board of Trustees of the Mississippi Institutions of Higher Learning (IHL).

A first-generation college graduate, Boyce earned his bachelor's degree in education and a doctorate in education leadership from the University of Mississippi. His career spans more than 37 years across secondary and post-secondary education. Most recently, Boyce served as Commissioner of Higher Education for the State of Mississippi for three years before retiring in June 2018. In that position, Boyce led the state's university system, which includes four research and four regional universities, one academic health science center and the executive office.

As commissioner, Boyce oversaw a university system serving more than 95,000 students, nearly 28,000 faculty and staff, 1,666 buildings with 36.7 million square feet, and a \$4.5 billion operating budget. During his tenure, the university system set record enrollments, awarded record numbers of degrees, launched the statewide "Complete 2 Compete" program to increase the number of degree holders in Mississippi, prioritized the needs of business and industry and streamlined operations to increase efficiencies.

Previously, Boyce served as the IHL's associate commissioner for academic and student affairs. He joined IHL after serving as president of Holmes Community College for more than nine years.

The breadth of Boyce's education experience includes service on numerous state and regional education boards. He was a trustee for the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, the regional body for the accreditation of degree-granting higher education institutions

in the Southern states. He served on the board of directors of the Mississippi Commission on College Accreditation, the board responsible for ensuring that all academic degree-granting institutions statewide, including both public and private sectors, are held to a shared standard of accountability.

Additionally, Boyce served for years as co-chair of the Education Achievement Council, established by state law to ensure all levels of education, state leaders and the business community work collaboratively to increase educational attainment in the state.

Boyce and his wife, Emily, met while Ole Miss undergraduates and attended an Ole Miss basketball game on their first date. The Boyces are also Ole Miss parents as all three of their daughters — Brittany, Danielle and Madeline — hold a degree from the university. Brittany is a certified public accountant in Nashville, Danielle is sales director for a tech startup in San Francisco, and Madeline is a physician assistant in Jackson. Boyce enjoys golf, tennis, pickleball, snow skiing and family vacations in the mountains.

KEITH CARTER | VICE CHANCELLOR FOR INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS



Keith Carter, a former Rebel All-American basketball player and long-time senior staff member of the Ole Miss athletics department, was named Vice Chancellor for Intercollegiate Athletics on November 22, 2019 by University of Mississippi Chancellor Glenn Boyce.

Carter originally served in the role on a temporary basis, having the interim tag removed after receiving a unanimous recommendation from the members of a highly respected search committee.

Carter has served as Ole Miss Deputy A.D. for Development and Resource Acquisition since February 2018. He was the Chief Revenue Officer for the athletics department while overseeing the Foundation and serving as the sport administrator for baseball and men's basketball.

Carter joined the athletics department in September

2009 and served as Executive Director for the Ole Miss Athletics Foundation since June 2012. He received the 2016 Fundraiser of the Year Award from the National Association of Athletic Development Directors (NAADD).

Under Carter's guidance, the Foundation experienced its four highest years for donations, including a record \$45.6 million in cash contributions in 2015-16. During his tenure, commitments to the Forward Together capital campaign increased from \$62 to \$180.8 million in cash and pledges toward its goal of \$200 million.

Among the major gifts was a \$25 million gift from Jerry "Doc" Hollingsworth, which included \$10 million in cash, the largest gift in the history of the Ole Miss athletics department by a single individual or organization. Carter was also responsible for several other seven-figure gifts including a \$3.7 million anonymous gift, and a \$2 million gift to the re-name the basketball practice facility to the Tuohy Basketball Center. He worked with executive level staff to build the vision for facility growth through

the Forward Together campaign, which included plans for the \$96.5 million Pavilion at Ole Miss.

Carter joined the Ole Miss Athletics Foundation after spending the previous year with the UM Foundation, where he worked in donor relations and meeting the financial needs of the School of Business.

A four-year starter at Ole Miss, Carter helped the Rebels to a pair of Southeastern Conference Western Division titles in 1997 and 1998 and earned All-America honors after his senior season in 1999. The four-year starter received All-SEC first and second team honors in 1998 and 1999. He also won a gold medal as a member of the U.S. national team at the 1998 Goodwill Games. Carter played professional basketball in Italy from 2001 until 2008.

A native of Perryville, Arkansas, Carter lives in Oxford with his wife, Jill, and three children – Drew, Callie and Hayes.

MEDIA SERVICES AND GUIDELINES

The University of Mississippi appreciates your interest in the Ole Miss baseball program. The Athletics Communications office wants to serve the media members in the best way possible, and hopes the following guidelines are helpful to the media covering the Rebels during the 2020 season. The Athletics Communications staff looks forward to working with the media during the season. Please call the office (662-915-7522) if there are any questions or needs.

CREDENTIALS

Please contact the Athletics Communications Office for game credentials. Requests for credentials should be emailed to **Alex Sims** at apsims@olemiss.edu and will be limited to working members of the media. Credentials will be held at the will-call window located at the media entrance at the main gate of Oxford-University Stadium/Swayze Field.

Space problems in the indoor portion of the press box can occur because of limited seating. As a result, priority will be given to media representatives that cover Ole Miss Baseball on a regular basis. Credentials are non-transferable. Unauthorized use is strictly prohibited.

GOVERNOR'S CUP GAME CREDENTIALS

Credential requests for the Governor's Cup Game against Mississippi State should be directed to the Ole Miss Athletics Communications office for any media who do not regularly cover one of the two participating teams.

INTERVIEW POLICY

All interview requests — coaches and players — **MUST** be coordinated through the Athletics Communications office. During the week, head coach Mike Bianco and players will generally be available for interview before practice on non gamedays, unless arranged otherwise. Please email or text your player requests to **Alex Sims** (662.816.9610) by 5 p.m. of the day prior to interviews if possible. There will be no gameday player interviews until after the game.

All interview sessions (non gameday) will take place on the field near the third base dugout at Oxford-University Stadium. Postgame interviews will also take place down the third base line of Swayze Field approximately 10 minutes following the conclusion of each home game.

PRACTICE POLICY

Ole Miss baseball practices and walk-thrus are open to the public and the media unless otherwise noted.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

Both team locker rooms are **CLOSED** to the media following the game, by facility policy. Selected players will be brought to the media down the first base line following a 10-minute cooling off period. Ole Miss head coach Mike Bianco will address the media approximately 10 minutes after the game following player interviews. On some occasions, the selected players and coach may also be requested for radio interviews with the Ole Miss Radio Network or national television, and will meet those obligation for interviews first.

Visiting coach and player interviews will be coordinated through the visiting team's communications contact.

WORKING PRESS AREAS

The press box at Oxford-University Stadium is an enclosed structure down the third base line of the stadium with indoor and outdoor seating. The home and visiting radio booths are located behind home plate on the club level of the stadium. Additional media may be seated on the film deck behind home plate and directly below the broadcast booths. You must have a pass to enter the press box. It is equipped with a bathroom and is non-smoking.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Still photographers may shoot from the film deck behind home plate or inside the camera wells down both base lines. Photographers are not allowed to shoot from within the dugout area. Any photographer not following the guidelines may have his credentials revoked at any time. Credentials must be clearly and properly displayed at all times. To request a credential, please contact **Alex Sims** in the Ole Miss Athletics Communications office.

RADIO

Please contact the Athletics Communications Office for credentials. The visiting radio booth is behind home plate on the first base side of the plate. Space for a crew of four is allowed for each broadcasting medium. As required by the SEC, Ole Miss provides phone lines for visiting radio.

PARKING

The press parking area is located next to the main athletics building in a marked lot off Gertrude Ford Parkway parallel to Oxford-University Stadium/Swayze Field (see map below). The media entrance into the press parking area is off Gertrude Ford Parkway. Media members who request parking privileges in advance can use their season credential (if applicable) or their names placed on a media parking list which will be given to the traffic control personnel at the entrance approximately two hours prior to first pitch. Space is limited and is on a first-come, first-served basis in the lot.

Media parking passes are only applicable on gameday. Media members that attend practices, press conferences and other on-campus events during the week should

make arrangements with campus parking by visiting olemiss.edu/parking/media.html.

MEDIA SERVICES

Complete pregame notes with team and individual statistics and rosters are available in the press box. During and after the game, communications personnel will provide assistance along with final box scores following the game.

INTERNET ACCESS

The press area is equipped with secured wireless internet access for use by the media for sending stories and photographs. A limited number of ethernet lines are available in the press box.

AUDIO/VIDEO

Ole Miss offers free FTP downloads of game highlights and interviews with coaches and players for television stations to use during regularly scheduled news/sportscasts. To access the Ole Miss FTP site, please contact Seth Austin with Ole Miss Sports Productions at saauisin@olemiss.edu or 662-816-3436.

Press conferences, media opportunities, practices and any form of competition may not be broadcast live without prior consent of the athletics department. Content attained via FTP should be credited to Ole Miss Athletics.

EXTENSIVE COVERAGE ON ESPN'S FAMILY OF NETWORKS

The Rebels will have 10 games scheduled on ESPN's television platforms this season while at least an additional 36 games will be SEC Network+ events available to stream online and the WatchESPN app. As the SEC Network continues its TV and online coverage of college baseball, Ole Miss is excited to once again announce that all home games will be televised on SEC Network+.

More than 90 Southeastern Conference baseball games have been slated to air across ESPN networks (ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU, SEC Network), including 75 on SEC Network. Coverage of the conference sport on national television has quadrupled since SEC Network launched in 2014.

With the addition of SEC Network+, Ole Miss Baseball can be watched more than ever and nationwide. This season, there will be approximately 27 live home games on SEC Network+.

OLE MISS BASEBALL RADIO NETWORK

The excitement of Ole Miss Baseball can be heard on approximately 20 radio stations this season by tuning in to the Ole Miss Baseball Radio Network.

All Ole Miss games can be heard with a standard air time beginning 30 minutes prior to first pitch.

The Ole Miss IMG Sports Network will bring Rebel baseball broadcasts into homes in Mississippi as well as in the nearby states of Alabama, Arkansas, Louisiana and Tennessee. On some of the more powerful AM stations, the broadcasts carry into Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Missouri and Texas. In addition, every game can be heard worldwide over the internet at www.OleMissSports.com, while select games will be available on SiriusXM Satellite Radio.

"The Voice of the Rebels," David Kellum, returns for his 30th season handling the Ole Miss radio play-by-play call across the Rebels "big three" sports. The veteran broadcaster also serves as the play-by-play announcer for both Ole Miss football and men's basketball. In 1998, 2000, 2002, 2004, 2010, 2011, 2015 and 2017, Kellum was honored as the Mississippi Sportscaster of the Year, as voted on by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association members in the state. In August of 2006, he received the "Lindsey Nelson Outstanding Sportscaster" award from the All-American Football Foundation.

Kellum's first link with Ole Miss athletics was in 1978. As a 19-year-old freshman, he began broadcasting Rebel baseball and has handled the baseball play-by-play for the past 42 seasons.

He has also been the play-by-play announcer for women's basketball and a public address announcer at football and basketball games.

Kellum hosts RebTalk, the weekly coach's radio call-in show for men's basketball and football at Boure in Oxford. Baseball will be a featured sport with coaches and players as guests for select broadcasts this spring.

All-time Rebel great Brad Henderson will join Kellum in the booth for the 2020 season. Henderson starred on the field for Ole Miss from 1996-1999. He left the program with numerous all-time marks in the record book and still today stands atop several hitting categories.

The four-year letterman is the program's hit king with 298 career hits and also holds all-time school records for doubles (60), runs scored (198) and total bases (494). Hitting .371 during his career (sixth all-time), the Tupelo, Mississippi, native also cracks the top 10 with 40 home runs (fourth) and 160 RBI (seventh).

As a senior, Henderson earned All-America honorable mention accolades from the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association and was a first team All-SEC second baseman. He ripped a program-record 24 doubles that season. Following his college baseball days, Henderson was drafted by the Oakland Athletics in the 1999 MLB Draft.


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

