Pat Casey, considered one of the top coaches in the country, is in his 24th season at the helm of the Oregon State program in 2018.

One of the most influential sports figures in the state of Oregon and the Pacific Northwest, Casey has made Oregon State a national power.

- The Beavers have tallied a 49-10-1 record in 2018, winning 40 or more games for the ninth time during his tenure.

- Oregon State is the winningest NCAA Division I team since the start of the 2017 season, posting 105 victories. The Beavers are 105-16-1 (.865) during that stretch.

- Casey has taken Goss Stadium at Coleman Field's home-field advantage to a new level since '17. The Beavers are 58-6 (.906) in their last 64 games at Goss.

- The Beavers have advanced to their sixth College World Series during Casey's tenure.

- Oregon State finished the 2017 campaign with a school-record 56 wins. The team went 56-6 overall, and its .903 winning percentage tied for the fourth-best in NCAA Division I history.

- Casey guided Oregon State to its sixth-ever trip to the College World Series, and fifth since 2005.

- Oregon State set a Pac-12 record for the most wins ever in conference play, going 27-3. That surpassed the 1981 record previously held by Arizona State at 26 wins. OSU won the conference by six games, the largest margin in more than 30 years.

- Casey's squad was ranked as the consensus No. 1 team in the nation for 10 consecutive weeks to end the regular season. Oregon State began the year ranked in the top 10 and rose to No. 1 by at least one publication for 12 straight rankings. OSU is the only team to ever be ranked for 10 straight weeks or more in the 58-year history of the Collegiate Baseball rankings.

- He was named the 2017 Pac-12 Coach of the Year and the National Coach of the Year by the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association (NCBWA).

- Casey became the 16th active coach with 1,000 or more wins at four-year schools when he reached the milestone May 12 at Oregon. Not only did he reach the milestone that night, but the Beavers won their fifth conference crown since 2005.

- Casey is 894-456-6 in his 24 seasons at Oregon State, recording a .662 winning percentage.

- All-time, as a collegiate head coach, Casey's teams have gone 1,065-570-7 (.650). He went 171-114-1 (.600) in seven seasons at Division III George Fox.

- Casey's 894 wins at Oregon State ranks seventh all-time in Pac-12 Conference history.

- Since coming to Oregon State prior to the 1995 season, Casey's teams have advanced to the NCAA postseason 12 times, including a school-record seven straight appearances from 2009-2015.

- The Beavers became just the fifth program in NCAA history to win back-to-back NCAA titles when Oregon State defeated North Carolina in 2006 and 2007.

- In winning the 2006 title, Oregon State became the first "North-

ern" school to win an NCAA Championship in decades.

- Casey has been honored nationally multiple times, being named the National Coach of the Year in 2006, 2007 and 2017 and the Co-Coach of the Year in 2005.

- He was selected as the Pac-10's Coach of the Year in 2005, 2006 and 2011 and the Pac-12 Coach of the Year in 2013 and 2017.

- Prior to the 2010 season, Casey was named the top collegiate coach of the previous decade by Baseball America. The voting was done by fellow collegiate coaches. Oregon State was named the No. 2 program of the decade, just behind Texas.

- Also in 2010, he and his wife, Susan, were recipients of the Nell and John Wooden Coaching Achievement Award. The honor goes to a head coach and his spouse for their dedication to success on the field and in making an impact on the lives of their players.

- Oregon State players have been named an All-American a total of 28 times during his tenure, including six in 2018. Michael Conforto became the first Oregon State player to be named an All-American three times when earned the honor in 2012, 2013 and 2014.

- Six other players - Dallas Buck, Jonah Nickerson, Andrew Moore, Luke Heimlich, Nick Madrigal and Jake Mulholland - have been named an All-American in two different seasons.

- Twenty players who competed under Casey have made an appearance at the Major League level, including a school-record 11 during the 2017 season. In 2017, the Beavers had nearly 30 former players compete at the professional level.

- Two former Beavers - Jacoby Ellsbury in 2007 and 2011 and Andrew Susac in 2014 - have won World Series titles. A third former Beaver, Michael Conforto, played in the 2015 series and became one of the youngest players to ever homer in the World Series. A little more than one year prior, Conforto had finished his Oregon State career as one of the top offensive players in school history.

- Oregon State players have been selected by MLB clubs in the draft a total of 116 times. Fifty-one of those 116 selections have come in the top nine rounds (44 percent).

- Oregon State players have been named the Pac-10/12's Most Valuable Player six times, the Defensive Player of the Year five times, the Freshman of the Year three times and the Pitcher of the Year three times.

- Casey has guided Oregon State to the College World Series six times - 2005, 2006, 2007, 2013, 2017 and 2018. His clubs have gone 15-10 (.600).

- In the postseason, Oregon State is 58-23 (.716) under Casey. His 58 wins represent better than 90 percent of the Beavers' 63 all-time.

- In 2013, the Beavers set a then school-record with 52 victories. Oregon State won its first of two consecutive Pac-12 titles, setting a conference record with 24 victories.

- Oregon State followed the 2013 season with a nearly as impressive 2014 campaign. The 2014 club won 45 games, and claimed the Pac-12 with a 23-7 record. The 47 conference victories in back-to-back seasons are easily a Pac-12 record.

- Since 2005, the first of a school-record 14 consecutive winning seasons, the Beavers have totaled 599 wins, the best mark in the conference. Oregon State has averaged better than 42 wins per season over that stretch, one of just two teams in the league to lay claim to more than 40 a year.

- In conference play, since 2005, the Beavers have won 294 games, or more than 21 per season. That easily leads the conference over that stretch.

- Casey has a winning record against all but two Pac-12 opponents.

- He is the winningest coach in Oregon State Athletics history. Casey surpassed Jack Riley on May 25, 2012 to earn that distinction.

- Oregon State has thrown four no-hitters since the 2007 season. Drew Rasmussen became the first pitcher in conference history to throw a perfect game in a league game on March 21, 2015 versus Washington State. He was the first pitcher from the conference to

throw a perfect game against any opponent in more than 40 years.

- Four years prior, Josh Osich no hit UCLA (April 30, 2011). He was the first pitcher to no hit a fellow conference school in nearly 20 seasons.
- In 2017 and 2018, Oregon State saw a school-record 16 players named to the Pac-12 All-Academic Team. Jack Anderson, KJ Harrison and Jake Thompson were named to the CoSIDA Academic All-District 8 First Team in 2017, followed by Anderson and Cadyn Grenier in 2018. Thompson later went on to become the sixth player in school history to be named an Academic All-American.

Casey has not only developed talent on the field and in the classroom, but he's helped make Goss Stadium at Coleman Field into one of the finest ballparks in the nation.

- Prior to the 2017 season, Goss Stadium was named the 10th toughest park to play in for opposing teams. It earned the distinction in a vote by the nation's coaches.
- In 1999, Casey spearheaded the expansion of Goss Stadium from Coleman Field. The stadium saw increased seating, improved locker rooms and a full press box.
- In 2009, Casey again spearheaded a further expansion of Goss Stadium. The stadium saw additional seating added down the first and third base lines, as well as the Omaha Room, the team's classroom and a trophy room, celebrating the program's history.
- In 2015, thanks to a generous donation from Jacoby Ellsbury, the Jacoby Ellsbury Clubhouse was constructed down the third base line. It is considered one of the top clubhouses in the nation.
- The team's players also enjoy the use of the Bert and Shirley Babb Players Lounge, located next to the Jacoby Ellsbury Clubhouse.

A look at the Beavers' five trips to Omaha under Casey.

- The 2017 team set a school-record with 56 wins and its .903 winning percentage tied for the fourth-best mark in NCAA Division I history. The club advanced to Omaha after going 5-0 in the first two rounds of the postseason. The Beavers posted two 23-game win streaks during the season and led the nation with a 1.93 ERA, which also set the school record.
- The 2013 Oregon State team set a school record with 52 victories, advancing to the College World Series after defeating Kansas State in the Corvallis Super Regional. The Beavers finished with a 2.28 earned run average that season, the second-lowest mark nationally.
- The 2007 club went 39-4 in non-conference games, including an incredible 11-1 record in the postseason. Oregon State trailed for just one inning in five games in Omaha. The Beavers won their last four games by at least six runs, the first team in CWS history to win four or more by at least six.
- The 2006 Beavers were the first team to ever face six elimination games. And Oregon State became the first team to win the World Series despite losing two games in Omaha - once before taking 2-of-3 from North Carolina to claim the crown. The 2006 club set what was then a school record with 50 victories.
- The 2005 Oregon State team won its first of two Pac-10 titles with a 19-5 record in league play. OSU won 46 games, a school record at the time. Casey won his first career postseason game that year, a 4-3 victory over Ohio State in the Corvallis Regional.

Casey came to OSU after seven seasons at George Fox College, a NAIA school in his hometown of Newberg, Ore. Under Casey, the Bruins went 171-113-1 (.602) overall and were 155-54-1 against NAIA competition; they won three District 2 titles, five Metro Valley Conference titles and two Cascade Conference titles.

During his time at George Fox, Casey was named Coach of the Year three times in District 2, four times in the Metro Valley Conference and twice in the Cascade Conference.

Casey earned his bachelor's degree in Interdisciplinary Studies from George Fox in 1990. He played for the University of Portland from 1978-80 and was a first-team All-NorPac Conference outfielder his final two seasons. He was a second-team All-Region selection in 1980. He also lettered in basketball one season.

After being drafted in the 10th round by the San Diego Padres in 1980, Casey played seven professional seasons. He reached Class AAA with the Calgary Cannons in 1985-86 and the Portland Beavers in 1987.

After concluding his professional playing career, Casey took over George Fox's baseball program; while coaching the baseball team, he also played basketball for the Bruins while completing his degree.

Casey, 57, was born in McMinnville, Ore. He graduated in 1977 from Newberg High, where he starred in football, basketball and baseball.

He and his wife, Susan, have four children - Jonathan (30), Brett (29), Ellie (25) and Joseph (19).

Oregon State associate head coach Pat Bailey is in his 11th season with the program in 2018.

Bailey joined the program as an assistant coach prior to the 2008 season, and has helped guide Oregon State to an NCAA postseason berth in seven of his nine seasons.

- The Beavers have averaged better than 41 wins per season during his tenure, and surpassed 40 seven times, including a school-record 56 in 2017.
- Bailey, who oversees the team's outfielders, has seen nine different players named All-Pac-12 First Team, including Michael Conforto, Dylan Davis and Jeff Hendrix, who were all honored at least twice during their careers. In 2017, Jack Anderson was recognized, followed by Trevor Larnach and Streven Kwan in 2018.
- Conforto became the first Oregon State player to be named Pac-12 Player of the Year in back-to-back seasons, in 2013 and 2014. In 2012, his first season in Corvallis, Conforto was named the Pac-12's Freshman of the Year.
- Conforto was drafted in the first round of the 2014 MLB Draft and advanced to the New York Mets' MLB roster in his first full season in the pros. He also became one of the youngest players to hit a home run in a World Series game.
- Conforto, along with Hendrix, were named All-America during their tenure at Oregon State. Conforto was the first true freshman in Oregon State history to be named an All-American.
- In 2014, Conforto, Davis and Hendrix were all named to the Pac-12 First Team. No other team had its entire outfield named first team in more than a decade.
- Daniel Robertson played in Bailey's outfield as a senior transfer in 2008. He was drafted in the 33rd round of the draft that season and has since seen action at the MLB level with the Texas Rangers, Seattle Mariners and Los Angeles Angels of Anaheim.

Bailey came to Oregon State prior to the 2008 season after spending 12 seasons at George Fox, winning a Division III national title with the Bruins in 2004.

Bailey compiled a 353-158 record - and is the winningest coach in school history - and earned National Coach of the Year honors after that 2004 national title. He was an eight-time Northwest Conference Coach of the Year honoree.

During Bailey's tenure, the Bruins won or shared eight Northwest Conference titles. George Fox advanced to the NCAA tournament six times and to the NAIA playoffs twice before moving to the NCAA.

Bailey is the winningest baseball coach in the school's history.

In 2004, Bailey's team became the first George Fox squad in any sport to win an NCAA national championship. The Bruins went 40-10 overall, setting a new single-season record for wins and tying the record for best winning percentage at .800.

After tying for the 2004 NWC title, George Fox earned an at-large bid to the NCAA tournament. The Bruins swept through four games at the NCAA West Regional in Orange, Calif., and then posted a 5-1 record at the Division III World Series in Appleton, Wis., beating Eastern Connecticut State 6-3 in the championship game.

Seven of Bailey's George Fox players signed professional contracts, including five members of the national championship team. His players earned 10 All-America honors and four Academic All-America honors.

Bailey earned his business education degree from the University of Idaho in 1978 and his master of education degree in educational administration from Oregon in 1983. Bailey earned two letters in baseball at Idaho and was the team captain.

Bailey graduated in 1974 from Moscow (Idaho) High School, where he played football, basketball and baseball, being named the baseball team's Most Valuable Player.

Bailey and his wife, Susan, have two children: son Alex, who played baseball for George Fox in 2003, and is married to Lucy; and daughter Ann. His daughter, Ann, is married to Collin Schneider and they have two children, Adlai and Evey. They are the owners of the Tried and True Coffee Shop in Corvallis.

Former Oregon State infielder Andy Jenkins is in his sixth season on the Oregon State staff as an assistant coach with the Beavers in 2018.

Jenkins played two seasons at Oregon State under head coach Pat Casey, helping guide the Beavers to the 2005 College World Series. He played professional baseball for the Florida Marlins and Texas Rangers organizations before returning to Corvallis as an undergraduate assistant coach in 2012.

- Cadyn Grenier was named the Pac-12's Defensive Player of the Year in 2018, giving the Beavers three straight, following Logan Ice (2016) and Nick Madrigal (2017). Madrigal, Grenier and catcher Adley Rutschman were all named First-Team Pac-12 and have earned All-American honors.

- Jenkins, who oversees the team's infield and catchers, saw three of the team's infielders named Pac-12 First Team in 2017 - Nick Madrigal, KJ Harrison and Cadyn Grenier. Madrigal was named the Pac-12 Player of the Year and its Defensive Player of the Year. Madrigal is just the second player in the conference to earn both honors in the same year over the last two decades.

- Two Oregon State players under Jenkins' tutelage - Logan Ice and Nick Madrigal - earned major Pac-12 Conference honors in 2016. Ice was named the Defensive Player of the Year, while Madrigal was named the Freshman of the Year.

- Madrigal's selection gave the Beavers two consecutive Freshman of the Year honors as he joined KJ Harrison, who won it in 2015.

- Ice was named a finalist for the Johnny Bench Award in 2016. The honor is given annually to the nation's top collegiate catcher.

- Ice was charged with just one passed ball in 2016, and threw out nearly 45 percent of basestealers attempting against him.

- Oregon State's catchers have thrown out at least 50 percent of opposing basestealers in four of Jenkins' five seasons as an assistant coach. The Beavers are the only team in the Pac-12 Conference who have accomplished that feat.

- The Beavers have allowed only 108 stolen bases over that stretch, an average of less than 22 per season. They've thrown out 122 - an average of nearly 25 a season - for a 53.8 percentage.

- Oregon State's fielding percentage has been at .972 or better in each of Jenkins' five seasons. The 2014 Beavers finished with a school-record mark of .979, committing just 50 errors in 59 games, and the 2017 Beavers finished at .978.

- Since 2013, the Beavers have also turned 241 double plays, one of the top totals in the Pac-12.

- In the past four seasons, since 2014, OSU has committed just 14 passed balls. Ice, the team's starter for three years during that stretch, was charged with only four.

- Ice, who was a second-round selection by Cleveland in the 2016 MLB Draft, ended his Oregon State career with a .996 fielding percentage and threw out 49-of-101 (48.5 percent) of opposing basestealers.

Jenkins lettered for the Beavers in 2004 and 2005, helping guide the team to its first visit to the College World Series in more than 50 years his junior season.

Jenkins, a native of Salem, Ore., was also the most prolific Beaver offensively during the team's postseason run. He batted .459 - leading the team by more than 100 points - and tallied two home runs, two doubles and 13 RBI while slugging .784.

His .388 average as a senior in 2005 still stands as the ninth-best figure in team history. He also had 56 runs batted in that season, which led the club and stands as the 10th-best mark in a season in school history.

He ended his two-year Oregon State career having played in 98 games, batting .343 with 12 home runs, 15 doubles, 86 RBI and 41 walks while striking out just 44 in more than 340 at bats. His .343 career average is just shy of being in the top 10 for a career at Oregon State.

After his Oregon State career, Jenkins was selected in the 11th round of the 2005 MLB First-Year Player Draft by Florida. He played six seasons in the Minor Leagues with Florida and Texas, reaching the Triple-A level in 2009 and 2010. His six-year career saw him tally 2,341 plate appearances and he batted .268 with 32 home runs, 116 doubles, eight triples and 277 RBI.

Jenkins came to Oregon State after a two-year career at Mt. Hood Community College where he batted .358 as a sophomore, and as a freshman, was named first-team all-league at catcher.

Jenkins graduated from Oregon State with a degree in psychology in 2012. He is a native of Salem, Ore., and married the former Jessica McGee in January 2013. The couple have one daughter, Blakely Drew Jenkins.

Nate Yeskie, the 2017 Assistant Coach of the Year by D1Baseball.com and the Pitching Coach of the Year per Collegiate Baseball, is in his 10th season with the program in 2018.

Yeskie has presided over and guided a pitching staff that has been one of the most dominant in the Pac-12 Conference and nationally since he joined the Oregon State program in 2009.

- Yeskie has tutored Luke Heimlich, the nation's leader with 16 wins who has set the OSU career and single-season records for strikeouts. Heimlich is in the top 10 in just about every major pitching category in school history, both career and single-season.

- Oregon State set a school-record with a 1.93 earned run average in 2017, which also led the nation. The Beavers were also tops nationally in shutouts (14), hits per nine innings (6.27) and WHIP (0.98).

- Nine pitchers have been named All-Americans during his tenure, including eight since the 2013 season. Most recently, in 2017, Luke Heimlich, Jake Thompson and Jake Mulholland were all named All-Americans by at least one publication.

- Oregon State pitchers have been named Freshman All-Americans nine times, including Mulholland and Brandon Eisert in 2017.

- The Beavers have tossed 77 shutouts since 2009, an average of nearly eight per season.

- He was named to the nation's top pitching coach by Collegiate Baseball after the 2013 season. His staff posted a 2.28 ERA and 12 shutouts in helping the Beavers to a school-record 52 wins and a berth in the College World Series.

- Oregon State's pitchers have been drafted a total of 28 times during his tenure, with 16 coming in the top nine rounds.

- Five of those drafted, Matt Boyd, Josh Osich, Jace Fry, Andrew Moore and Sam Gaviglio have pitched at the Major League level in 2017.

- Oregon State has appeared in the postseason in eight of his nine seasons as pitching coach.

- In 2014, Jace Fry threw a no-hitter for the Beavers, one of three under Yeskie. Most recently, in 2015, Drew Rasmussen threw the first perfect game in Oregon State's history, defeating Washington State. In 2010, Osich out-dueled fellow future Major Leaguer Trevor Bauer in a no-hitter at UCLA.

- Oregon State shut out UCLA to end the 2016 season, the first time in school history the Beavers shut out the same team in three consecutive games.

- Four pitchers have pitched for Team USA during his tenure: Moore, Rasmussen, Boyd and Dan Child.

Yeskie served as the pitching coach at his alma mater, UNLV, from 2005 to 2007. During his tenure with the Runnin' Rebels, Yeskie mentored eight players who earned either an All-Conference or All-Tournament Team selection.

Prior to returning to UNLV as a coach, Yeskie spent five seasons in the Minnesota Twins Minor League system, reaching as high as Double-A New Britain. He finished with a 27-24 record and 4.91 earned run average over the five seasons. Yeskie went 11-7 with Fort Wayne of the Midwest League in 1997, recording 111 strikeouts in 165 1/3 innings of work. In 2000, his last season, the La Crosse, Wis., native went 4-1 in 21 appearances.

During his time in professional baseball, Yeskie worked with MLB veterans Bert Blyleven, Mel Stottlemyre, Jr., and former pitching coach Billy Connors, who once held the position of Director of Player Personnel with the New York Yankees.

Yeskie came to the Twins organization after being drafted in the ninth round of the 1996 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft. Minnesota selected the right-hander after he finished his UNLV career with a 22-12 mark, including 16 complete games.

A three-year letterwinner, his 147 strikeouts in 1995 still stand as UNLV's single-season record. The mark was also fifth-best nationally that season, and coupled with his nine complete games – which led the Big West Conference – earned him First-Team All-Big West and First-Team All-Region honors.

Yeskie married the former Brittney Belshe, a former Oregon State volleyball player, in January 2012. The couple resides in Corvallis, and have a daughter, AJ.

13th Year

Ron Northcutt is in his 13th season as Director of Baseball Operations and 16th overall with the Oregon State baseball program. Prior to his tenure as Director of Baseball Operations, Northcutt served as a pitching coach for four seasons.

As Director of Operations, Northcutt plays a large role in the team's travel, camp operations and any day-to-day needs of the Oregon State baseball team.

Northcutt came to Oregon State in 1994 and served as the team's pitching coach through the 1998 season. While overseeing the staff, his pitchers led the Pac-10 North Division in earned run average in 1996 and 1997. While with OSU, Northcutt tutored Mark Newell, who was a third-team All-American selection by Baseball America in 1997, as well as Andrew Checketts, who earned NCBWA All-America second team honors in 1998. From 1995, Northcutt's first season with the Beavers, through 1998, the Beavers saw six pitchers earned All-Pac-10 Northern Division honors.

Additionally, eight pitchers were selected by Major League clubs in the First-Year Player Draft during Northcutt's tenure.

Prior to coming to Corvallis, Northcutt served as an assistant coach under Pat Casey at George Fox. He began his coaching career as a freshman coach and varsity assistant at his alma mater, Newberg High, in Newberg, Ore.

After playing at Newberg, Northcutt went on to play for Clackamas Community College, where he earned all-league honors, and the University of Portland. A native of Los Gatos, Calif., Northcutt and his wife, Linnea, have two sons, Ben, 24, and Jack, 21.



JAKE RODRIGUEZ

Asst. Coord. of Camps

Jake Rodriguez is in his second year as assistant coordinator of camps after spending two seasons as an undergraduate assistant coach with the Beavers.

Rodriguez played three seasons for OSU, from 2011-13, helping the club to three consecutive postseason appearances, two Super Regional berths and a trip to the 2013 College World Series.



TYLER GRAHAM

Director of Player Dev.

Tyler Graham, an Oregon State alum and former Major League outfielder, is in his second year as director of player development after two seasons as an undergraduate assistant coach.

Graham, a nine-year veteran in professional baseball, made his MLB debut with the Arizona Diamondbacks in 2012. He played in 10 games for the Diamondbacks that season.

Graham finished his professional career with 267 stolen bases and a .272 average with 22 home runs and 218 runs batted in.

He lettered for Oregon State from 2003-06, and helped guide the Beavers to a national championship his senior season. OSU also won back-to-back Pac-10 titles, in 2005 and 2006.

Graham played in 151 games for the Beavers, and batted .317 with 10 doubles, two triples, one home run and 51 RBI. He also swiped 39 bases, which ranks him tied for ninth in Oregon State history.

Graham, a native of Great Falls, Mont., was selected in the 19th round of the 2006 MLB Draft by the San Francisco Giants after his career at OSU, where he was named all-conference honorable mention in 2005.



RYAN ORTIZ

Undergraduate Asst.

Former Oregon State backstop Ryan Ortiz returned to Corvallis in 2017 and is in his second season as an undergraduate assistant coach with the Beavers.

Ortiz is back with Oregon State after spending seven seasons in the Oakland Athletics and Cleveland Indians organizations, where he played at the Triple-A level in both 2013 and 2014.

Ortiz, a native of San Pedro, Calif., lettered at Oregon State from 2007-09. With the Beavers, he played in 115 games, starting 103, where he batted .348 with 33 doubles, two triples, 10 home runs and 100 runs batted in. He also amassed 68 walks to 65 strikeouts.

He was an all-Pac-10 selection in both 2008 and 2009 before being selected in the sixth round of the 2009 MLB First-Year Player Draft by the Athletics. Ortiz was the first OSU player taken by Oakland in nearly 30 seasons.

Ortiz came to Oregon State from San Diego's St. Augustine High School. In 2009, he was named a second-team Pac-10 All-Academic selection, a year after being named honorable mention.



RYAN GORTON

Undergraduate Asst.

Former Oregon State infielder, catcher and pitcher Ryan Gorton is in his first season as an undergraduate assistant coach with the Beavers.

Gorton returns to Corvallis after four seasons in the Oakland Athletics' organization after being selected in the 31st round of the MLB First-Year Player Draft in 2012. He began his professional career as a position player but moved to the mound permanently in 2015. A native of Tigard, Ore., he ended his career with a 2-2 record and 4.59 earned run average in 23 appearances, all of which came in relief.

Gorton lettered at Oregon State from 2009-12, where he saw action in the infield, behind the plate and on the mound. He batted .281 in 61 games, adding five doubles and 21 runs batted in.

He appeared in 46 games on the mound, including six starts, and tallied a 6-3 record with a 4.41 ERA. He threw a total of 87 2/3 innings, striking out 65.

The Tigard High School alum lettered four years in baseball, three in football and two in basketball.



BILL ROWE

Bill Rowe, a member of the 2006 national championship team, is in his first season as an undergraduate assistant coach with the Beavers.

Rowe returns to Corvallis after spending the last decade in the movie and TV business. He spent the past six years working as an On Set Greensman for the show "Grimm" in Portland. He has also served as a baseball advisor for the "Twilight" movie in addition to "Calvin Marshall" where he was also an actor. Rowe was also an On Set Prop Wrangler for the "White Knuckles" music video by the band OK Go. During his career, he has worked with Francis Ford Coppola, Val Kilmer and Steve Zahn, among others.

Rowe, a native of Ashland, Ore., played one season for the Beavers, where he batted .341 with six home runs, 22 doubles and 56 runs batted in. The 18 RBI are the most ever by an Oregon State player in a single postseason.

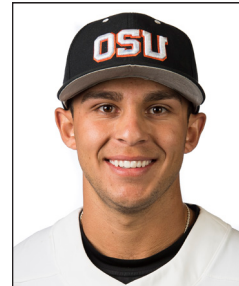
