Pat Bailey was named Oregon State's interim head coach on Sept. 6, 2018 after 11 years as an assistant and associate head coach.

In 11 years with the Beavers, Bailey has helped the program to the 2018 national championship, three trips to Omaha and nine overall postseason appearances.

He joined the program as an assistant coach in 2008 and was promoted to associate head coach in October 2013.

Oregon State has posted a winning record in each of Bailey's 11 seasons, and in the last two seasons alone, has posted a 111-18-1 overall record (.858).

He is a two-time national championship coach after guiding George Fox to an NCAA Division III title in 2004.

Bailey coached the Bruins for 12 seasons, amassing a 353-158 record, winning six conference championships. He was named the National Coach of the Year in 2004 and was selected as the Northwest Conference's Coach of the Year eight times.

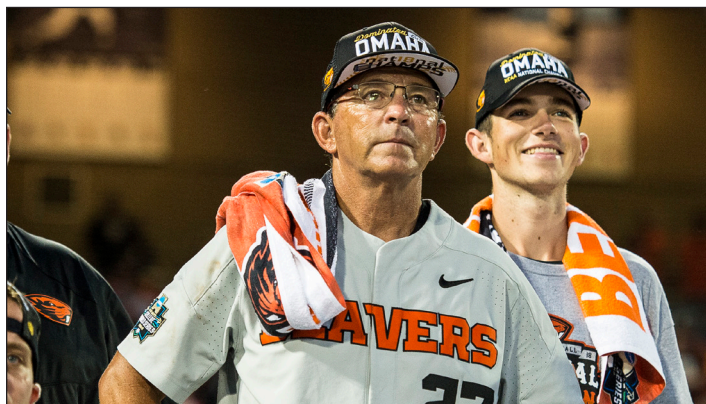
- Oregon State is 460-187-2 (.710) in Bailey's 11 seasons in Corvallis. Overall, he has coached at the collegiate level for 23 seasons, tallying a 813-345-2 (.702) record.

- The Beavers have recorded six 40-win seasons during Bailey's tenure. Oregon State won a school-record 56 games in 2017, and followed that up with a 55-victory year in 2018 en route to the national title.

- Oregon State has posted winning percentages of at least .600 in all but two of his seasons. Additionally, the Beavers have finished with a winning percentage of at least .800 three times - 2013 (.800), 2017 (.903) and 2018 (.816).

- In 2012, Bailey was a recipient of the American Baseball Coaches Association (ABCA) Ethics in Coaching Award. The award is given annually to one or two coaches who "represent the highest standards in sportsmanship, integrity, character and ethics."

- Bailey has helped oversee the team's academic efforts.
- In addition to the on field success, the Beavers have been recognized for their work in the classroom, both nationally and within the Pac-12 Conference.
- Oregon State is one of just 15 teams nationally - and the



only club from the Pac-12 to earn the American Baseball Coaches Association (ABCA) Academic Excellence Award in the three years - 2016, 2017, 2018 - it has been in existence.

- The Beavers have led the Pac-12 in each of the last two years with 16 student-athletes named Pac-12 Conference All-Academic each year. Five players have been named first-team over that two-year stretch.

- Jack Anderson became the fourth player in school history to earn first-team all-academic honors in three consecutive seasons. He was also named the 2018 Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year, following Max Engelbrekt, who was recognized in 2017.

- Jake Thompson, who majored in economics, was named an Academic All-American in 2017, becoming the first Beaver to be recognized since Mitch Canham in 2007.

- The Oregon State offense had arguably its best season in school history in 2018, with Bailey playing a pivotal role in mentoring the team's hitters. The Beavers batted .321 as a team, set a school-record for doubles (151), home runs (67) and runs scored (518).

- Adley Rutschman became the first Beaver with 100 or more hits, totaling a Pac-12-best 102 in 2018. He also hit .408 on the year, just the sixth player in school history to finish at .400 or better. He ranks third all-time.

- Rutschman also set the Oregon State single-season record with 83 runs batted in.

- Trevor Larnach hit 19 home runs, the second-most ever by a Beaver. He was the first Oregon State player with 14 or more in a season since 1982.

- Bailey has overseen the team's outfielders since joining the program prior to the 2008 season. During his tenure, three outfielders have been named All-Americans, most recently Trevor Larnach in 2018. Jeff Hendrix earned the recognition in 2015, while Michael Conforto, currently with the New York Mets, became the first Beaver to be named an All-American in three different seasons - 2012, 2013 and 2014.

- At least one outfielder has been named an All-Pac-10 or All-Pac-12 selection in every season but one - 2011 - during Bailey's tenure. That includes 2014 when Hendrix, Conforto and Dylan Davis were all named First-Team. It was the first time in a decade that a

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Pac-12 team featured an entire outfield that was named first team.

- Conforto was one of the most successful players in Oregon State history, and became the first player in school history to be named the conference's Player of the Year in back-to-back seasons - 2013 and 2014. He had also been named the league's Freshman of the Year in 2012, additionally becoming the first Beaver to ever be named an All-American as a true freshman.

- Conforto was drafted 10th overall in 2014, at the time the highest selection in Oregon State history.

- Nine outfielders have been selected by MLB clubs since 2008, with five coming in the top-10 rounds. Daniel Robertson, who was taken in the 33rd round in 2008, spent four seasons at the Major League level from 2014-17, playing for Texas, the Los Angeles Angels of Anaheim, Seattle and Cleveland.

Bailey came to Oregon State prior to the 2008 season after spending 12 seasons at George Fox, winning a Division III national title with the Bruins in 2004.

Bailey compiled a 353-158 record - he is the winningest coach in school history - and earned National Coach of the Year honors after that 2004 national title. He was an eight-time Northwest Conference Coach of the Year honoree.

During Bailey's tenure, the Bruins won or shared eight Northwest Conference titles. George Fox advanced to the NCAA tournament six times and to the NAIA playoffs twice before moving to the NCAA.

- In 2004, Bailey's team became the first George Fox squad in any sport to win an NCAA national championship. The Bruins went 40-10 overall, setting a new single-season record for wins and tying the record for best winning percentage at .800.

- After tying for the 2004 NWC title, George Fox earned an at-large bid to the NCAA tournament. The Bruins swept through four games at the NCAA West Regional in Orange, Calif., and then posted a 5-1 record at the Division III World Series in Appleton, Wis., beating Eastern Connecticut State 6-3 in the championship game.

- Seven of Bailey's George Fox players signed professional contracts, including five members of the national championship team. His players earned 10 All-America honors and four Academic All-America honors.

- Bailey's Bruins ended the 2000 season ranked 26th per Collegiate Baseball. George Fox also ended 2003 ranked 14th before being ranked No. 1 after winning the title the following season. The Bruins were No. 30 in 2005 and 23rd in 2006.

Prior to his tenure at George Fox, Bailey served as the head coach at West Linn High School from 1985-91 and 1993-95. He moved to West Linn after guiding the Willamette High School program from 1978-84. He went 223-134 (.625) between the two spots.

Bailey also spent one season as an assistant coach at the University of Portland, in 1992.

Bailey earned his business education degree from the University of Idaho in 1978 and his master of education degree in educational administration from Oregon in 1983. Bailey earned two letters in baseball at Idaho and was the team captain.

Bailey graduated in 1974 from Moscow (Idaho) High School, where he played football, basketball and baseball, being named the baseball team's Most Valuable Player.

Bailey and his wife, Susan, have two children: son Alex, who played baseball for George Fox in 2003, and is married to Lucy; and daughter Ann. His daughter, Ann, is married to Collin Schneider and they have two children, Adlai and Evey. They are the owners of the Tried and True Coffee Shop in Corvallis.

RYAN GIPSON

Former infielder and 2006 national champion Ryan Gipson is in his first season as an assistant coach with Oregon State after joining the program in October 2018.

Gipson came back to Oregon State after four seasons as the head coach at Linn-Benton Community College, where, in 2018, he led the Roadrunners to a 42-4 overall record and 29-1 mark in conference play.

LBCC was 119-58 (.672) in his four seasons as head coach, including a 72-16 (.818) mark the past two years.

Gipson lettered for the Beavers in 2005 and 2006, helping guide Oregon State to back-to-back trips to Omaha, including a national championship.

He played in 79 career games, starting 66, and batted .270 with 10 doubles, a home run and 36 runs batted in.

In 2005, he led the then-Pac-10 with a .500 on-base percentage and was named All-Pacific-10 Conference Honorable Mention. He batted .330 that season, collecting six doubles, a triple and 22 RBI while stealing nine bases. The Beavers made their first of three consecutive trips to Omaha that season.

A Central Point, Ore., native, he played for Shasta Community College prior to his career at Oregon State. He hit .358 as a sophomore and .344 as a sophomore.

Gipson served as an undergraduate coach for Oregon State in 2011 and 2012, then spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Dixie State in Utah. He graduated from Oregon State in 2006 with a bachelors of science in sociology.

Gipson is married to the former Ali Martin and the couple has two children, a daughter named Elliot, and a son, Parker.

ANDY JENKINS

Assistant Coach • 7th Year

Former Oregon State infielder Andy Jenkins is in his seventh season on the Oregon State staff as an assistant coach with the Beavers in 2019. He helped guide the program to its third national championship in 2018.

Jenkins played two seasons at Oregon State, helping guide the Beavers to the 2005 College World Series. He played professional baseball for the Florida Marlins and Texas Rangers organizations before returning to Corvallis as an undergraduate assistant coach in 2012.

- Cadyn Grenier was named the Pac-12's Defensive Player of the Year in 2018, giving the Beavers three straight selections, following Logan Ice (2016) and Nick Madrigal (2017).

- Madrigal, Grenier and catcher Adley Rutschman were all named First-Team Pac-12 and earned All-American honors. Grenier was also named the Brooks Wallace Award recipient as the nation's top shortstop.

- Jenkins, who oversees the team's infield and catchers, saw three of the team's infielders named Pac-12 First Team in 2017 - Nick Madrigal, KJ Harrison and Cadyn Grenier. Madrigal was named the Pac-12 Player of the Year and its Defensive Player of the Year. Madrigal is just the second player in the conference to earn both honors in the same year over the last two decades.

- Two Oregon State players under Jenkins' tutelage - Logan Ice and Nick Madrigal - earned major Pac-12 Conference honors in 2016. Ice was named the Defensive Player of the Year, while Madrigal was named the Freshman of the Year.

- Madrigal's selection gave the Beavers two consecutive Freshman of the Year honors as he joined KJ Harrison, who won it in 2015.

- Ice was named a finalist for the Johnny Bench Award in 2016. The honor is given annually to the nation's top collegiate catcher. Rutschman was named a semifinalist in 2018.

- Ice was charged with just one passed ball in 2016, and threw out nearly 45 percent of basestealers attempting against him.

- Oregon State's catchers have thrown out at least 50 percent of opposing basestealers in four of Jenkins' six seasons as an assistant coach. The Beavers are the only team in the Pac-12 Conference who have accomplished that feat.

- The Beavers have allowed only 127 stolen bases over that stretch, an average of less than 22 per season. They've thrown out 139 - an average of nearly 24 a season - for a 52.2 percentage.

- Oregon State's fielding percentage has been at .972 or better in each of Jenkins' six seasons. The 2014 Beavers finished with a school-record mark of .979, which was equaled by the 2018 team, which led the Pac-12 with 52 double plays.

- Since 2013, the Beavers have also turned 293 double plays, one of the top totals in the Pac-12.

- In the past four seasons, since 2014, OSU has committed just 24 passed balls. Ice, the team's starter for three years during that stretch, was charged with only four.

- Ice, who was a second-round selection by Cleveland in the 2016 MLB Draft, ended his Oregon State career with a .996 fielding percentage and threw out 49-of-101 (48.5 percent) of opposing basestealers.

Jenkins lettered for the Beavers in 2004 and 2005, helping guide the team to its first visit to the College World Series in more than 50 years his junior season.

Jenkins, a native of Salem, Ore., was also the most prolific Beaver offensively during the team's postseason run. He batted .459 - leading the team by more than 100 points - and tallied two home runs, two doubles and 13 RBI while slugging .784.

His .388 average as a senior in 2005 still stands as the 10th-best figure in team history. He also had 56 runs batted in that season.

He ended his two-year Oregon State career having played in 98 games, batting .343 with 12 home runs, 15 doubles, 86 RBI and 41 walks while striking out just 44 in more than 340 at bats. His .343 career average is just shy of being in the top 10 for a career at Oregon State.

After his Oregon State career, Jenkins was selected in the 11th round of the 2005 MLB First-Year Player Draft by Florida. He played

six seasons in the Minor Leagues with Florida and Texas, reaching the Triple-A level in 2009 and 2010. His six-year career saw him tally 2,341 plate appearances and he batted .268 with 32 home runs, 116 doubles, eight triples and 277 RBI.

Jenkins came to Oregon State after a two-year career at Mt. Hood Community College where he batted .358 as a sophomore, and as a freshman, was named first-team all-league at catcher.

Jenkins graduated from Oregon State with a degree in psychology in 2012. He is a native of Salem, Ore., and married the former Jessica McGee in January 2013. They have two children, Blakely Drew and Presley.

NATE YESKIE

Assistant Coach • 11th Year

Nate Yeskie, the 2017 Assistant Coach of the Year by D1Baseball.com and the Pitching Coach of the Year per Collegiate Baseball, is in his 11th season with the program in 2019, a year after helping the team to its third national championship.

Yeskie has presided over and guided a pitching staff that has been one of the most dominant in the Pac-12 Conference and nationally since he joined the Oregon State program in 2009.

- In 2018, starter Luke Heimlich was named the National Pitcher of the Year and Kevin Abel was selected as the Freshman of the Year. Heimlich led the nation with 16 wins and was second with 159 strikeouts. Abel went 8-1 with a 2.88 ERA and became the first pitcher to ever win four games at the College World Series.

- As a team, the Beavers posted a 3.27 ERA in 2018, good for 12th nationally, and 596 strikeouts, which set a single-season record at Oregon State. The staff posted eight shutouts, which led the Pac-12 and third nationally.

- Oregon State set a school-record with a 1.93 earned run average in 2017, which also led the nation. The Beavers were also tops nationally in shutouts (14), hits per nine innings (6.27) and WHIP (0.98).

- Nine different pitchers have been named All-Americans during his tenure, including eight since the 2013 season. Most recently, in 2018, Heimlich, Bryce Fehmel and Jake Mulholland were all named All-Americans by at least one publication.

- Oregon State pitchers have been named Freshman All-Americans 10 times, including Mulholland and Brandon Eisert in 2017.

- The Beavers have tossed 85 shutouts since 2009, an average of better than eight per season.

- He was named to the nation's top pitching coach by Collegiate Baseball after the 2013 season. His staff posted a 2.28 ERA and 12 shutouts in helping the Beavers to a school-record 52 wins and a berth in the College World Series.

- Oregon State's pitchers have been drafted a total of 28 times during his tenure, with 16 coming in the top nine rounds.

- Five of those drafted, Matt Boyd, Josh Osich, Jace Fry, Andrew Moore and Sam Gaviglio have pitched at the Major League level.

- Oregon State has appeared in the postseason in nine of his 10 seasons as pitching coach.

- In 2014, Jace Fry threw a no-hitter for the Beavers, one of three under Yeskie. Most recently, in 2015, Drew Rasmussen threw the first perfect game in Oregon State's history, defeating Washington State. In 2010, Osich out-dueled fellow future Major Leaguer Trevor Bauer in a no-hitter at UCLA.

- Oregon State shut out UCLA to end the 2016 season, the first time in school history the Beavers shut out the same team in three consecutive games.

- Four pitchers have pitched for Team USA during his tenure: Moore, Rasmussen, Boyd and Dan Child.

Yeskie served as the pitching coach at his alma mater, UNLV, from 2005 to 2007. During his tenure with the Runnin' Rebels, Yeskie mentored eight players who earned either an All-Conference or All-Tournament Team selection.

Prior to returning to UNLV as a coach, Yeskie spent five seasons

in the Minnesota Twins Minor League system, reaching as high as Double-A New Britain. He finished with a 27-24 record and 4.91 earned run average over the five seasons. Yeskie went 11-7 with Fort Wayne of the Midwest League in 1997, recording 111 strikeouts in 165 1/3 innings of work. In 2000, his last season, the La Crosse, Wis., native went 4-1 in 21 appearances.

During his time in professional baseball, Yeskie worked with MLB veterans Bert Blyleven, Mel Stottlemyre, Jr., and former pitching coach Billy Connors, who once held the position of Director of Player Personnel with the New York Yankees.

Yeskie came to the Twins organization after being drafted in the ninth round of the 1996 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft. Minnesota selected the right-hander after he finished his UNLV career with a 22-12 mark, including 16 complete games.

A three-year letterwinner, his 147 strikeouts in 1995 still stand as UNLV's single-season record. The mark was also fifth-best nationally that season, and coupled with his nine complete games - which led the Big West Conference - earned him First-Team All-Big West and First-Team All-Region honors.

Yeskie married the former Brittney Belshe, a former Oregon State volleyball player, in January 2012. The couple resides in Corvallis, and have a daughter, AJ.

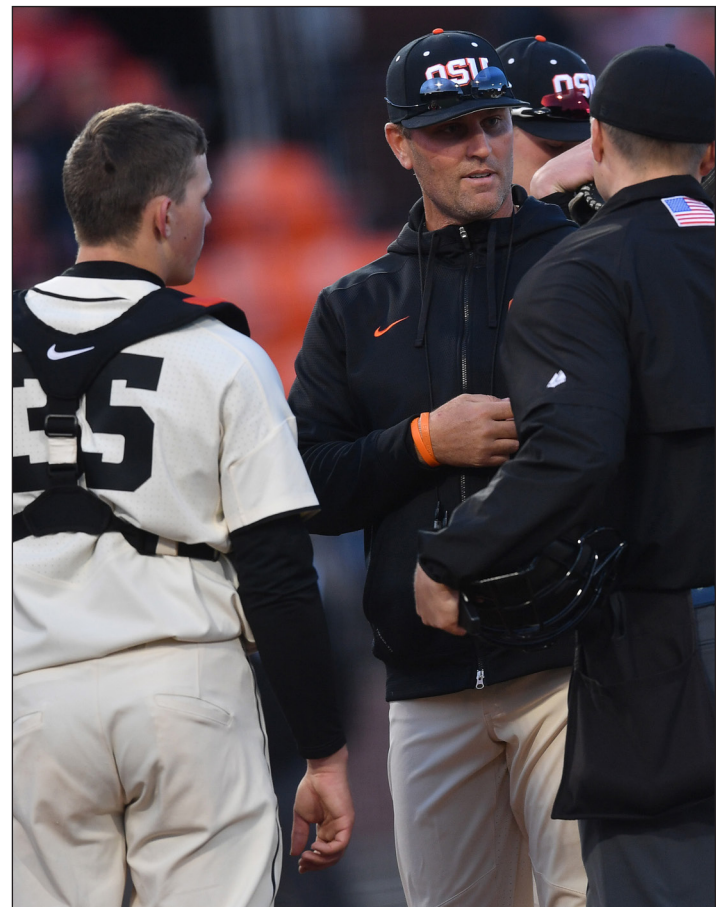

RON NORTHCUTT

Director of Operations
13th Year

Ron Northcutt is in his 13th season as Director of Baseball Operations and 16th overall with the Oregon State baseball program. Prior to his tenure as Director of Baseball Operations, Northcutt served as a pitching coach for four seasons.

As Director of Operations, Northcutt plays a large role in the team's travel, camp operations and any day-to-day needs of the Oregon State baseball team.

Northcutt came to Oregon State in 1994 and served as the team's pitching coach through the 1998 season. While overseeing the staff, his pitchers led the Pac-10 North Division in earned run average in 1996 and 1997. While with OSU, Northcutt tutored Mark Newell, who was a third-team All-American selection by Baseball America in 1997, as well as Andrew Checketts, who earned NCBWA All-America second team honors in 1998. From 1995, Northcutt's first season with the Beavers, through 1998, the Beavers saw six pitchers earned All-Pac-10 Northern Division honors.

Additionally, eight pitchers were selected by Major League clubs in the First-Year Player Draft during Northcutt's tenure.

Prior to coming to Corvallis, Northcutt served as an assistant coach under Pat Casey at George Fox. He began his coaching career as a freshman coach and varsity assistant at his alma mater, Newberg High, in Newberg, Ore.

After playing at Newberg, Northcutt went on to play for Clackamas Community College, where he earned all-league honors, and the University of Portland. A native of Los Gatos, Calif., Northcutt and his wife, Linnea, have two sons, Ben, 24, and Jack, 21.



JAKE RODRIGUEZ

Asst. Coord. of Camps

Jake Rodriguez is in his third year as assistant coordinator of camps after spending two seasons as an undergraduate assistant coach with the Beavers.

Rodriguez played three seasons for OSU, from 2011-13, helping the club to three consecutive postseason appearances, two Super Regional berths and a trip to the 2013 College World Series.



TYLER GRAHAM

Director of Player Dev.

Tyler Graham, an Oregon State alum and former Major League outfielder, is in his third year as director of player development after two seasons as an undergraduate assistant coach.

Graham, a nine-year veteran in professional baseball, made his MLB debut with the Arizona Diamondbacks in 2012. He played in 10 games for the Diamondbacks that season.

Graham finished his professional career with 267 stolen bases and a .272 average with 22 home runs and 218 runs batted in.

He lettered for Oregon State from 2003-06, and helped guide the Beavers to a national championship his senior season. OSU also won back-to-back Pac-10 titles, in 2005 and 2006.

Graham played in 151 games for the Beavers, and batted .317 with 10 doubles, two triples, one home run and 51 RBI. He also swiped 39 bases, which ranks him tied for ninth in Oregon State history.

Graham, a native of Great Falls, Mont., was selected in the 19th round of the 2006 MLB Draft by the San Francisco Giants after his career at OSU, where he was named all-conference honorable mention in 2005.



RYAN GORTON

Undergraduate Asst.

Former Oregon State infielder, catcher and pitcher Ryan Gorton is in his second season as an undergraduate assistant coach with the Beavers.

Gorton returned to Corvallis after four seasons in the Oakland Athletics' organization after being selected in the 31st round of the MLB First-Year Player Draft in 2012. He began his professional career as a position player but moved to the mound permanently in 2015. A native of Tigard, Ore., he ended his career with a 2-2 record and 4.59 earned run average in 23 appearances, all of which came in relief.

Gorton lettered at Oregon State from 2009-12, where he saw action in the infield, behind the plate and on the mound. He batted .281 in 61 games, adding five doubles and 21 runs batted in.

He appeared in 46 games on the mound, including six starts, and tallied a 6-3 record with a 4.41 ERA. He threw a total of 87 2/3 innings, striking out 65.

The Tigard High School alum lettered four years in baseball, three in football and two in basketball.



PARKER BERBERET

Undergraduate Asst.

Former Oregon State catcher Parker Berberet is in his first season as an undergraduate assistant coach with the Beavers.

Berberet returns to Corvallis after a seven-year stint in professional baseball, first as a catcher, then transitioning to pitching. He played in 369 games, all in the Milwaukee Brewers organization, reaching as high as Triple-A in Colorado Springs. Berberet batted .246 during his career, tallying 62 doubles, five triples and 21 home runs. He made a move to the mound in 2017, posting a 2-4 record and 3.83 in 26 appearances, all in relief.

Berberet, a native of Long Beach, Calif., was taken in the 25th round of the 2011 MLB First-Year Player Draft by Milwaukee.

He came to Oregon State in 2010 after two seasons at Cypress College. Berberet batted .281 as a junior, collecting 10 doubles, two home runs and 34 RBI. A year later, in 2011, he batted .259 with 12 doubles, two triples, five home runs and 39 RBI.

Berberet was a 2009 Southern California All-American at Cypress, where he batted .411 with nine home runs as a sophomore. He hit .357 as a freshman.



BILL ROWE

Undergraduate Asst.

Bill Rowe, a member of the 2006 national championship team, is in his second season as an undergraduate assistant coach with the Beavers.

Rowe returned to Corvallis after spending the last decade in the movie and TV business. He spent the past six years working as an On Set Greensman for the show "Grimm" in Portland. He has also served as a baseball advisor for the "Twilight" movie in addition to "Calvin Marshall" where he was also an actor. Rowe was also an On Set Prop Wrangler for the "White Knuckles" music video by the band OK Go. During his career, he has worked with Francis Ford Coppola, Val Kilmer and Steve Zahn, among others.

Rowe, a native of Ashland, Ore., played one season for the Beavers, where he batted .341 with six home runs, 22 doubles and 56 runs batted in. He was selected to the All-College World Series team and batted .419 with four doubles, one home run and 18 RBI over 13 postseason games. The 18 RBI are the most ever by an Oregon State player in a single postseason.

He played one season in the Milwaukee Brewers organization, batting .279 with two home runs and 23 RBI in 2006 for Helena of the Pioneer League.



DR. EDWARD RAY

University President

16th Year at Oregon State

Queens College, '66

Dr. Edward J. Ray became Oregon State University's President on July 31, 2003. Under his leadership, OSU completed its first major capital campaign in 2014, which raised \$1.14 billion and included contributions from more than 106,000 donors. The Campaign for OSU helped to build or renovate 28 OSU buildings, endow 79 new faculty positions; and create more than 600 new scholarship and fellowship funds for 3,200 students. The campaign provided funding for key facilities including the Lois Bates Acheson Veterinary Teaching Hospital, the Hallie Ford Center for Healthy Children and Families, The Linus Pauling Science Center, the International Living Learning Center, the College of Business's Austin Hall, Furman Hall for the College of Education, the Graduate Studies Center at the OSU-Cascades Campus and four new cultural centers.

Dr. Ray expanded the dual-enrollment program to all 17 of the state's community colleges, making it easier for students to complete four-year degrees. He has led efforts to foster a more seamless P-20 system, working with area school superintendents and higher education leaders in Oregon to enhance the student experience. Dr. Ray helped to usher in a new era of partnership and cooperation among Oregon's public universities. On campuses in Corvallis and Bend, through online degree programs that are top-ranked nationally, and through educational programs in Portland and communities across Oregon, Dr. Ray has led OSU in making remarkable impacts in teaching, research, and outreach and engagement.

Dr. Ray serves or has served on boards of the NCAA, American Council on Education, the Association of American Colleges and Universities and the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities. His leadership in higher education has been recognized with the CASE District VIII Leadership Award (2013), an honorary doctorate from the University of Portland (2014), and the Oregon History Makers Medal (2018) presented by the Oregon Historical Society.

An active member of the Oregon community, Dr. Ray also serves as board chair of Special Olympics Oregon.

While a member of the economics faculty at Ohio State from 1970-2003, Dr. Ray served as economics department chair from 1976 to 1992. He served as associate provost then senior vice provost and chief information officer from 1992-1998, and executive vice president and provost from 1998-2003.

His research interests include the history of protectionism in the United States, the determinants of U.S. foreign direct investment and foreign direct investment in the United States, the structure of tariff and non-tariff trade barriers in the United States and abroad, and the adoption of Social Security and the Federal Income Tax. His work has been published in *The American Economic Review*, *The Journal of Political Economy*, *The Quarterly Journal of Economics*, *The Review of Economic Studies*, *The Review of Economics and Statistics*, and other leading journals. His book, *U. S. Protectionism and the World Debt Crisis*, was published by Quorum Press in 1989.

Dr. Ray received his undergraduate degree in mathematics from Queens College (CUNY) in June 1966, graduating cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa. He earned his master's and Ph.D. in economics from Stanford University in 1969 and June 1971.

Dr. Ray's wife Beth passed away in March 2014. He has three children and three grandchildren.

OREGON STATE UNIVERSITY

Oregon State is an international public research university located in Corvallis, one of the safest, smartest, greenest small cities in the nation.

Founded in 1868, Oregon State is the state's Land Grant university and is one of only two universities in the U.S. to have Sea Grant, Space Grant and Sun Grant designations as well.

- The Princeton Review placed Oregon State in the top 125 colleges in the western U.S.
- Forbes ranked Oregon State as the number 4 best college town.
- U.S. News & World Report named Oregon State among the "Best Global Universities" (Top 2 percent in the world).
- U.S. News & World Report ranked Oregon State's Ecampus in the top 10 for online bachelor's degree programs.

RESEARCH

Oregon State University earned \$336 million in external research funding in 2016, a second consecutive year of record-breaking growth and an increase of more than 60 percent over the past decade. Oregon State is one of only two land, sea, space and sun grant institutions in the U.S. and is the only university in Oregon to have earned both Carnegie Classifications for Highest Research Activity and Community Engagement. It is the state's largest comprehensive public university, preeminent for both scholarly achievement and the direct impact of applied development, fulfilling the land-grant mission to serve the public good.

The OSU Research Agenda, integrated with the university's Strategic Plan, guides faculty inquiry in three signature areas:

- Advancing the Science of Sustainable Earth Ecosystems
- Improving Human Health and Wellness
- Promoting Economic Growth and Social Progress

Oregon State's researchers are top-ranked in their fields, hold leadership positions in international and national professional organizations and have earned prestigious honors.





SCOTT BARNES

VP/Director of Athletics

2nd Year at Oregon State

Fresno State, 1986

“Scott (Barnes) has demonstrated, everywhere he’s been, that he is committed to helping student-athletes be among the very best at whatever they chose to do academically and on the field. It was clear to me as we moved forward the person we needed to lead us where we aspire to go is Scott Barnes. He is a proven performer in exciting fans and alumni.”

That statement was delivered by Oregon State University President Dr. Ed Ray as he officially introduced Barnes as the Beavers’ Vice President and Director of Athletics on Dec. 22, 2016.

In Barnes’ relatively short tenure, OSU Athletics has already made significant strides academically and athletically. A school-record 149 student-athletes were selected to the Pac-12 Conference Academic teams in 2016-17, the department registered a record cumulative GPA in the spring (2017), the Valley Football Center officially opened and the popular Fan Experience Committee was created. In addition, he has increased the emphasis on fundraising and developing a sustainable business model that will ensure Beaver Athletics continues to progress and thrive, and debuted the BUILD THE DAM Strategic Plan to guide the program forward for future years.

In addition, Barnes has made numerous strategic hires with the Beavers’ intercollegiate programs, including head football coach Jonathan Smith, head men’s soccer coach Terry Boss, head women’s rowing coach Kate Maxim, and head track and field/cross country coach Louie Quintana.

“We are building for stability and sustainability in all of our programs, and to create a vision that excites and inspires all of Beaver Nation,” Barnes said.

As part of the overall university administration, Barnes serves on several key committees and represents OSU at the Pac-12 Conference and NCAA levels. The two-time Far West Region Athletic Director of the Year recently spent five years on the NCAA Men’s Basketball Committee (Chair for 2014-15). As of Feb. 1, 2018, he serves on the following Pac-12 committees: the Nomination Committee, the Director’s Revenue Share Committee, the Men’s Basketball Strategic Planning Committee, the Global Strategic Planning Ad Hoc Committee, and the Men’s Basketball Tournament Subcommittee. In addition, he is a faculty member on the Lead 1 Athletic Directors Association and in January 2018 he was one of four Director of Athletics in the country to visit Asia on a Nike sponsored trip.



Barnes has spent nearly three decades in athletics administration, and is approaching 20 years as an athletics director. He arrived back to his native Pacific Northwest from the University of Pittsburgh, where he served as the Panthers’ Director of Athletics for nearly two years. Pittsburgh achieved high success academically and athletically that included bowl trips, conference titles and record academic achievements.

Prior to Pitt, Barnes headed the Utah State University athletics program from 2008-15 as Director of Athletics and was promoted to Vice President in 2012. While at Utah State, the Aggies experienced unprecedented success that included multiple bowl trips in football, 20 league titles and a successful transition to the Mountain West Conference.

Barnes has also served as the Director of Athletics at Eastern Washington University and Humboldt State University. In addition, he has held various athletics roles at the University of The Pacific, the University of San Diego, Iowa State University and the University of Washington. He also has experience in corporate business and professional basketball.

The Spokane native graduated from Fresno State with a bachelor’s degree in 1986 and a master’s degree in athletics administration and physical education in 1993. A basketball letterman under coach Boyd Grant, he helped the Bulldogs advance to two NCAA Tournaments and two NITs. Barnes was a second-team all-conference player as a senior before playing professionally in Germany.

He and his wife, Jody, have two children: Daughter, Milanna, and son, Isaac, a member of the Beaver men’s basketball team. In addition, the family dog is appropriately named Benny (OSU’s mascot is Benny Beaver).

Barnes’ accomplishments as the Vice President and Director of Athletics at Oregon State:

- Led search that yielded head coaches Jonathan Smith (football), Kate Maxim (women’s rowing), Louie Quintana (track and field/cross country), Terry Boss (men’s soccer) and Matt Kagan (women’s soccer).
- The baseball team won the 2018 College World Series title.
- Ten teams participated in postseason for the 2017-18 academic year.
- OSU’s student-athlete population continues to set school records for cumulative GPAs.
- Developed Strategic and Facilities Master Plans.
- Oversaw final fundraising in the \$42 million Valley Football Center project.
- Led revamp of Our Beaver Nation; the fundraising arm for Athletics within the OSU Foundation.
- Spearheaded OSU’s first Fan Experience Committee to improve all aspects of the game-day experience at Gill Coliseum, Reser Stadium, Goss Stadium at Coleman Field, the Whyte Track and Field Center and the OSU Softball Complex.
- Developed a business model to ensure OSU Athletics’ continues to provide student-athletes with the best experiences possible through personnel, facilities, and academic support.

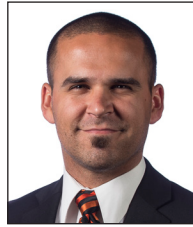

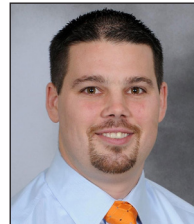
