Two-time National Champion Mitch Canham was named the 21st head coach in Oregon State baseball's history on June 13, 2019.

Canham, the Pat Casey Head Baseball Coach, was revered by Beaver Nation in four years as a student-athlete, and is one of the most popular players in school history. He was a 2007 All-American and guided the Beavers to three trips to Omaha, culminating in National Championships in 2006 and 2007.

- Canham and the Beavers advanced to their seventh consecutive NCAA postseason appearance in 2024. Oregon State ended the season with a 45-16 record, appearing in the team's ninth NCAA Super Regional.

- Canham mentored Travis Bazzana, who was selected No. 1 overall in the MLB Draft, the second such selection in the program's history. Bazzana was one of seven MLB Draft selections in 2024.

- Bazzana, who was a finalist for the Golden Spikes Award and Dick Howser Trophy, was named the Pac-12 Player of the Year. He was a unanimous First-Team All-American. He was one of five All-Americans for the Beavers in Canham's fifth season at the helm, being joined by Aiden May, Jacob Kmatz, Bridger Holmes and Gavin Turley.

- Canham guided OSU to its 22nd all-time NCAA appearance in 2023, winning two games at the Baton Rouge Regional.

- Oregon State went 41-20, reaching the 40-win plateau for the 11th time in school history, and the fifth with Canham as the head coach or as a player. The Beavers also went 18-12 in Pac-12 play, finishing second in the league.

- Bazzana was named an All-American, the seventh during Canham's era. Bazzana and Garret Forrester were both named All-Pac-12 First-Team selections.



- Canham guided Oregon State to a 48-18 record and trip to the NCAA Super Regionals in 2022, his second full season as the program's head coach. The Beavers finished 20-10 in Pac-12 play, second in the conference, and advanced to the inaugural Pac-12 Tournament title game.

- OSU hosted both an NCAA Regional and Super Regional. The Beavers won four games at the regional, and were just one run shy in the super from advancing to Omaha.

- Ten Beavers earned all-conference honors in 2022, seven of which were first-team selections. Four of those 10 honors - Justin Boyd, Ben Ferrer, Cooper Hjerpe and Jacob Melton - were named All-Americans.

- Hjerpe led the nation with an Oregon State single-season record 161 strikeouts. He was named the National Pitcher of the Year by multiple organizations.

- Melton, meanwhile, was named the Pac-12's Player of the Year. He batted .360 and tallied 22 doubles with 17 home runs in addition to tying the OSU single-season record with 83 runs batted in.

- Canham led Oregon State to a 37-24 record in his first full season at the helm of the program in 2021. The Beavers finished with a 16-14 record in Pac-12 play.

- Canham guided OSU to the Fort Worth Regional, where the Beavers advanced to the championship game. OSU went 3-2 in Texas, advancing to the winner-take-all game seven.

- Three Beavers earned all-league honors in 2021; Troy Claunch, Will Frisch and Jake Mulholland. Mulholland was named an All-American by the NCBWA and Frisch was a Freshman All-American by Collegiate Baseball.

Canham, a native of Richland, Wash., came back to the collegiate ranks after spending three-and-a-half seasons as a manager in the Seattle Mariners' organization.

- He led the Double-A Arkansas Travelers to a North Division First-Half Title in the Texas League after defeating Tulsa on June 9, just four days before becoming Oregon State's head coach. In nearly half a season at the Double-A level, Canham amassed a 42-22 record.

- Canham posted a .545 winning percentage at the professional level, going 264-220. He tallied winning seasons in three of the nearly four seasons, including 86 wins at Single-A Clinton in 2016.

- Canham followed his first managerial season by moving to high Single-A Modesto of the California League in 2017. In his first of two seasons with the Nuts, he led the club to a 74-68 record and California League Championship. He was also named the California League Manager of the Year.

- Ten players from the 2017 Modesto Nuts club have already reached the Major Leagues (as of May 2021).

- Canham served as MLBers Braden Bishop and Pablo Lopez's manager at Clinton as well. There, he also helped advance the careers of Major Leaguers Alex Jackson, Zack Littell, Luiz Gohara and Osmer



Morales.

Canham came to Oregon State from Lake Stevens, Wash., in 2004. He lettered three seasons for the Beavers - 2005-07 - and played in 183 games.

The Beavers won 46, 50 and 49 games, respectively, during his three on-the-field seasons, including 27 victories in the post-season. The 50 wins in 2006, at the time, marked an Oregon State single-season record.

- Canham batted .314 during his career, tallying 31 doubles, eight triples, 25 home runs and 152 runs batted in.

- The 152 RBI head into the 2021 season as the seventh-most in a career at Oregon State. The 25 home runs, meanwhile, rank ninth.

- He had an All-American season for the Beavers in 2007. He batted .326 as a redshirt junior, collecting 10 home runs and 59 RBI. He was also named an All-Pacific-10 Conference First-Team selection, a year after being named honorable mention.

- Canham was named the Most Outstanding Player of the 2005 Corvallis Regional and was selected to the All-College World Series Team in 2007.

- He opened his postseason career by batting .353 with three doubles and nine RBI in 2005, helping Oregon State to a 5-3 record and the program's first trip to Omaha since 1952.

- He followed that with a .289 batting average in 2006 and led the Beavers to their first of now three National Championships. Canham posted four doubles and 11 RBI in 13 games.

- Canham completed his career with a home run and six RBI in 2007 as the Beavers won their second title. Oregon State rolled to an 11-1 record en route to the championship.

As a business administration graduate, he excelled off the field while at OSU earning 2007 Academic All-America accolades and three-time membership on the Pac-10 Academic team. The five-time OSU Dean's List member was also a leader on Oregon State's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and was presented the Beavers' Glenn Klein Award for his community service contributions.

Following his senior season, the Pac-10 honored Canham as OSU's male recipient of the 2007 Tom Hansen Award, presented annually to the outstanding senior student-athlete based on exhibition of the greatest combination of performance, and achievement in scholarship, athletics and leadership.

Canham's contributions to local communities have continued during his professional career and include founding and serving as the CEO of BASE By Pros LLC, an organization that provides personalized baseball instruction and mentorship to kids across the country.

Following his stellar career at Oregon State, Canham was selected in the first round, 57th overall, by the San Diego Padres in the 2007 MLB First-Year Player Draft. He was the sixth first-round selection in Oregon State history.

He spent four seasons with the Padres' organization, reaching as high as Triple-A Portland. He also spent time with the Oakland Athletics, St. Louis Cardinals, Kansas City Royals and Washington Nationals' organizations before ending his professional playing career with the independent Lincoln Saltdogs in 2015.

Canham's business administration degree from Oregon State came in 2011. He and his wife, Marlis, have two children, Mack and Mya.

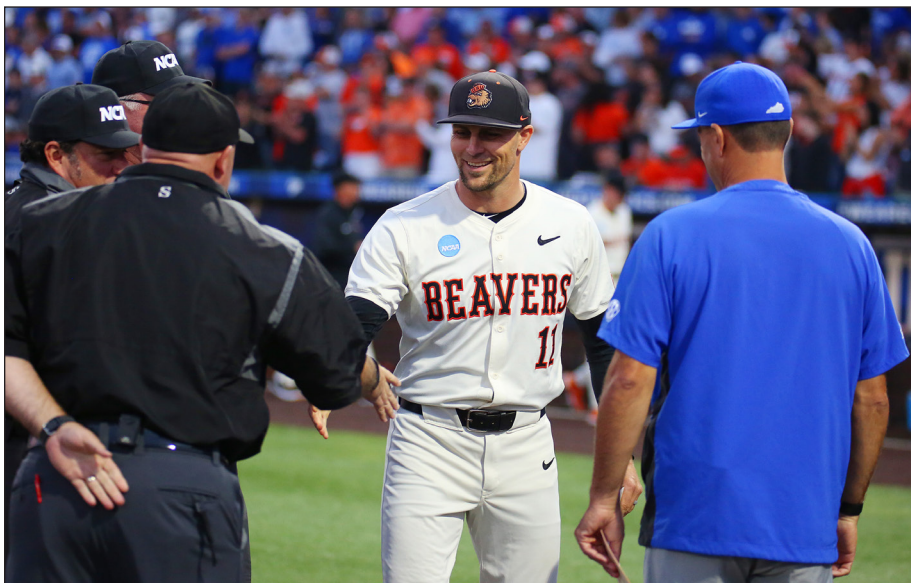

RICH DORMAN

Assistant Coach • 6th Year

Rich Dorman was appointed by Pat Casey Baseball Head Coach Mitch Canham as the team's pitching coach on August 9, 2019. Dorman came to Oregon State after three seasons as the pitching coach at Grand Canyon and eight years in the Seattle Mariners organization.

- In just five seasons at Oregon State, Dorman has coached seven All-Americans. He's overseen pitching staffs that included the National Pitcher of the Year, Cooper Hjerpe, who took the honor in 2022 after setting an Oregon State record with 161 strikeouts.

- Dorman mentored three All-Americans in 2024, seeing Aiden May, Jacob Kmatz and Bridger Holmes honored. May and Holmes earned the honor in their first and only seasons as Beavers while Kmatz completed his OSU career with 20 wins.

- The 2023 Beavers struck out 580 batters in 542 1/3 innings, and were among the best in the Pac-12 in fewest extra-base hits allowed. Oregon State was also one of the top pitching staffs in Pac-12 play, finishing with the No. 2 team ERA.

- In 2022, Dorman's staff, for the second consecutive season, set the program's single-season record with 628 strikeouts, surpassing 2021's 611.

- OSU finished second in the Pac-12 in team ERA (4.19) in 2022, issued the fewest walks (188) and gave up the second-fewest home runs (38).

- Oregon State led the Pac-12 with a 3.48 earned run average in 2021, which also placed the Beavers ninth nationally. Only 38 teams finished with a sub-4.00 ERA.

- Dorman's first season at Oregon State, 2020, was cut short due to the Covid-19 pandemic. But in just 14 games, he mentored a pitching staff that saw three first-time weekend starters, which included All-American Christian Chamberlain. The left-hander was taken in the fourth round of the draft by Kansas City after allowing just six hits with 34 strikeouts in 22 innings.

- Dorman's pitching staff at Grand Canyon posted a 4.16 earned run average in 2019, the second-best mark in the program's 14-year history at the Division I level. The Antelopes finished with a 3.02 ERA in conference play, which led the WAC and was the third-best mark in league play over a five-year stretch.

- The 2017 Antelopes, meanwhile, finished with a 3.57 ERA in conference play.

- Grand Canyon improved its win totals in each of his three seasons in Phoenix. GCU totaled 36 in 2019, up from 33 in 2018 and 29 in 2017. The Antelopes won 25 games in 2016 prior to his arrival.

- Grand Canyon was 57-18 in conference play in his three seasons and the club won 21-of-25 league series.

- Dorman mentored three pitchers who were drafted during his tenure at GCU. That includes right-handed pitcher Jake Wong, who was a third-round selection in 2018.

Dorman headed to Grand Canyon after eight seasons in the Minor League Baseball with the Seattle Mariners. He coached for four of those years at Single-A Everett (2009-10 and 2012-13). He also spent two years with the Arizona League Mariners (2014-15) and two one-year stints with Single-A Clinton (2011 and 2016). It was at Clinton in 2016 where he spent his first year on Canham's staff as the Lumberkings' pitching coach.

- Nine pitchers under Dorman's tutelage during his time with the Mariners have gone on to pitch at the MLB level. That includes Taijuan Walker, Pablo Lopez, Art Warren, Emilio Pagan, Freddy Peralta, Zach Littell and James Paxton.

- Everett's team ERA ranked in the upper half of the Northwest League in three of his four seasons. His staff posted a 3.22 ERA in 2010 and won a league title.

- Dorman's 2011 pitching staff at Clinton tallied 1,166 strikeouts, the second in the Single-A Midwest League.
- Upon returning to Clinton in 2016, Dorman's staff finished with a 3.12 ERA, good for second in the Midwest League. The team also posted a league-best 50 saves.

Dorman pitched in three games for Oregon State in 1999 before transferring to Western Baptist (now Corban) in 2000. He was taken in the 13th round of the MLB Draft that year by Tampa Bay; he was the first player ever selected out of Corban.

He pitched in the professional ranks for nine seasons, appearing in 217 games, with 128 starts. He was 52-43 with a 3.80 ERA.

Dorman spent two seasons at the Single-A level with the Rays' organization before pitching in Seattle's organization for five seasons, reaching as high as Triple-A Tacoma in 2005. He followed that with one year with the Florida Marlins organization before ending his career back with the Mariners in 2008, appearing with Double-A West Tennessee and Triple-A Tacoma. He ended his career with 60 games at the Triple-A level. Dorman has two children, Alexa Anne and Blake William.

RYAN GIPSON

Assistant Coach • 7th Year

Former infielder and 2006 national champion Ryan Gipson is in his sixth season as an assistant coach with Oregon State after joining the program in October 2018.

- The Oregon State alum helped mentor the second No. 1 pick in the MLB Draft - both in Gipson's tenure - in 2024 in Travis Bazzana. He was named a finalist for the Golden Spikes Award and Dick Howser Trophy while being selected an All-American and the Pac-12 Player of the Year.

- The Beavers set a program-record with 118 home runs in 2024, marking the second-most ever by a Pac-12 program. Bazzana tallied a program-record 28 while Gavin Turley had 19. Turley was also selected as an All-American in 2024.

- The Beavers batted .297 as a team, hit 128 doubles and 20 triples and tied the program's single-season record with 518 runs scored.

- Gipson helped the Beavers to their sixth consecutive postseason appearance in 2023, and OSU featured one of the most balanced offenses in the Pac-12. The Beavers led the league in stolen bases and walks, set the school's single-season record with 89 home runs and were among the league's best in batting average, doubles and runs scored.

- Five different position players have been named All-Americans during Gipson's tenure.

- Jacob Melton became one of just four players in OSU history to be named a First-Team All-American by at least six organizations. The Pac-12 Player of the Year, he belted 17 home runs with 22 doubles and tied the OSU single-season record with 83 runs batted in.

- Justin Boyd was also named an All-American and led the Pac-12 in batting average (.373) and stolen bases (24). Melton was close behind in both categories, batting .360 with 21 stolen bases.

- OSU batted .296 as a team in 2022, led the Pac-12 with a .407 on-base percentage 141 doubles and 83 stolen bases. The Beavers also led the nation by drawing 389 walks.

- Oregon State, in 2021, ranked in the top half of the Pac-12 for runs scored, batting average, hits, doubles, home runs, walks and on-base percentage.

- Troy Claunch was named All-Pac-12 in 2021, while Garret Forrester and Jacob Melton earned honorable mention honors.

- Oregon State was one of the top fielding teams in the Pac-12 Conference in 2019, ranking third with a .977 percentage. The Beavers committed just 49 errors in 57 games, turned 43 double plays and kept opposing basestealers to a less than 60 percent success rate.

Gipson came back to Oregon State after four seasons as the head coach at Linn-Benton Community College, where, in 2018, he led the Roadrunners to a 42-4 overall record and 29-1 mark in conference play.

LBCC was 119-58 (.672) in his four seasons as head coach, including a 72-16 (.818) mark his last two years.

Gipson lettered for the Beavers in 2005 and 2006, helping guide Oregon State to back-to-back trips to Omaha, including a national championship.

He played in 79 career games, starting 66, and batted .270 with 10 doubles, a home run and 36 runs batted in.

In 2005, he led the then-Pac-10 with a .500 on-base percentage and was named All-Pacific-10 Conference Honorable Mention. He batted .330 that season, collecting six doubles, a triple and 22 RBI while stealing nine bases. The Beavers made their first of three consecutive trips to Omaha that season.

A Central Point, Ore., native, he played for Shasta Community College prior to his career at Oregon State. He hit .358 as a sophomore and .344 as a sophomore.

Gipson served as an undergraduate coach for Oregon State in 2011 and 2012, then spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Dixie State in Utah. He graduated from Oregon State in 2006 with a bachelors of science in sociology.

Gipson is married to the former Ali Martin and the couple has two children, a daughter named Elliot, and a son, Parker.

Former Oregon State infielder and 2007 National Champion Joey Wong returned to Beaver Nation as an assistant coach in August 2023.

- Wong helped mentor second baseman Travis Bazzana, who was the second No. 1 overall pick in school history in 2024. Bazzana was a finalist for the Golden Spikes Award and Dick Howser Trophy and was named a unanimous First-Team All-American.

- Wong coached left side infielders Trent Caraway and Elijah Hainline in their first seasons in Corvallis. Caraway hit .339 as a freshman, adding five doubles and two home runs. Hainline, meanwhile, manned shortstop for most of the season and hit .280 with 16 doubles, 11 home runs and 45 runs batted in.

The Salem, Ore., native came back to Corvallis after two seasons at Seattle University where he coached first base and worked with the Redhawks' infielders.

Wong, prior to heading to Seattle, spent the 2020 and 2021 seasons as an undergraduate assistant coach with the Beavers. In 2021, the Beavers set a school record with a .982 fielding percentage and he also coached first base.

Wong returned to Corvallis after 10 seasons playing professionally. He spent time with the Colorado Rockies, Seattle Mariners and New York Mets organizations, appearing in 817 games, where he collected 119 doubles, 16 triples, 20 home runs and 254 RBI.

Wong played for Oregon State from 2007-09, helping the Beavers to a College World Series Championship as a freshman. He turned what could be called the most historic double play in program history in 2007 against Cal State Fullerton in Omaha.

He ended his OSU career in 2009 after playing in 175 games, totaling 20 doubles, five triples, six home runs and 80 RBI.

Wong, a native of Salem, Ore., was drafted in the 24th round in 2009 by Colorado.

He and his wife, Aubrie, have one daughter, Jett, and one son, Bo William.

RYAN GORTON

Director of Operations

Former Oregon State infielder, catcher and pitcher Ryan Gorton is in his fourth season as Oregon State's director of operations. He had previously served as an undergraduate assistant coach in 2018 and 2019.

Gorton returned to Corvallis after four seasons in the Oakland Athletics' organization after being selected in the 31st round of the MLB First-Year Player Draft in 2012. He began his professional career as a position player but moved to the mound permanently in 2015. A native of Tigard, Ore., he ended his career with a 2-2 record and 4.59 earned run average in 23 appearances, all of which came in relief.

Gorton lettered at Oregon State from 2009-12, where he saw action in the infield, behind the plate and on the mound. He batted .281 in 61 games, adding five doubles and 21 runs batted in.

He appeared in 46 games on the mound, including six starts, and tallied a 6-3 record with a 4.41 ERA. He threw a total of 87 2/3 innings, striking out 65.

The Tigard High School alum lettered four years in baseball, three in football and two in basketball.

Gorton and his wife, Laura, have four children: Cooper, Camden, Kenley and Cruz.



ZAK TAYLOR

Director of Beaver Baseball Development

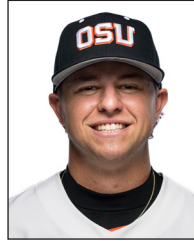
Zak Taylor, a former Oregon State infielder and 2018 National Champion, re-joined the program as Oregon State's Director of Beaver Baseball Development in August of 2023. The 2025 season marks his second in his return to Corvallis.

With Oregon State, Taylor is responsible for working with the team's alumni, OSU's camps as well as the mental skills aspect of baseball.

He returned to Oregon State after working as a mental performance trainer with ROKKE performance therapy.

Taylor, who graduated with a degree in psychology after the 2019 season, played in 141 games over four seasons for the Beavers, starting in 82. He batted .233 with 20 doubles, one triple, three home runs and 40 runs batted in.

The Sherwood, Ore., native drew a walk to open the ninth inning in game two of the 2018 College World Series Championship Series against Arkansas.



BRADY KASPER

Undergraduate Assistant

Former Oregon State outfielder Brady Kasper is in his first season as an undergraduate assistant coach in 2025.

Kasper, a native of Mission Viejo, Calif., lettered for the Beavers from 2021-24. He played in 117 games for Oregon State during that stretch, batting .279 with 14 doubles, three triples, 20 home runs and 80 runs batted in.

Kasper hit .304 as a junior in 2023, collecting six doubles, two triples and 12 home runs while driving in 41. He followed that with seven home runs and 33 RBI as a senior.

He came to Corvallis from Capistrano Valley High School where he was an All-League selection.

JAYATHI MURTHY

University President
2nd Year at Oregon State

Jayathi Y. Murthy, a national leader in higher education engineering teaching, research and service, began her service as Oregon State University's 16th president on Sept. 9, 2022.

As OSU's president, Murthy is committed to improving access to college for all learners; advancing student success, undergraduate graduation rates and inclusive excellence throughout the university; expanding OSU's strong research portfolio by investing in research infrastructure; and supporting faculty excellence in teaching, research and Extension and engagement programs.

Prior to joining Oregon State, Murthy served as the Ronald and Valerie Sugar Dean at the UCLA Henry Samueli School of Engineering and Applied Science since January 2016.

Murthy was the first woman dean at UCLA's engineering school.

During her tenure, she made expanding access to a UCLA engineering education a top priority by deepening relationships with local community colleges, increasing outreach to underrepresented minority groups and easing the transition for transfer students. She led the effort to establish Women in Engineering at UCLA – a program that supports the full participation of women in engineering. While at UCLA, she was active in helping raise more than \$330 million in philanthropy.

Under Murthy's leadership at UCLA, the engineering school focused on growth in areas critical to the 21st century, including engineering in medicine and biology; sustainable and resilient urban systems; artificial intelligence, machine learning and data science; cybersecurity and the future internet; robotics and cyberphysical systems; as well as advanced materials and manufacturing. She also has served as a distinguished professor in the school's mechanical and aerospace department.

Before joining UCLA, Murthy was chair of the mechanical engineering department at the University of Texas at Austin and held the Ernest Cockrell, Jr. Memorial Chair in Engineering from 2012-2015. Prior to that, Murthy was a mechanical engineering professor at Purdue University from 2001-2011 and served as a professor of mechanical engineering at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh from 1998 to 2001.

While at Purdue and University of Texas, Murthy served as the director of the Center for Prediction of Reliability, Integrity and Survivability of Microsystems (PRISM) from 2008 to 2014, a center of excellence supported by the National Nuclear Security Administration (NNSA).

Murthy began her career at Arizona State University, where she was an assistant professor of mechanical and aerospace engineering from 1984 to 1988. From 1988 to 1998, Murthy worked at New Hampshire-based Fluent, Inc., a developer and vendor of the world's most widely used computational fluid dynamics software. She led the development of algorithms and software that still form the core the company's products.

She has authored over 330 technical publications.

Murthy received a doctorate in mechanical engineering from the University of Minnesota, a master's degree in mechanical engineering from Washington State University and a bache-

lor's degree in mechanical engineering from the Indian Institute of Technology, Kanpur, where she was named a distinguished alumna in 2012.

She is a member of the National Academy of Engineering (NAE), foreign fellow of the Indian National Academy of Engineering (INAE), fellow of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers (ASME) and the NCAA Division I Board of Directors. Murthy is the recipient of many honors, including the ASME Electronics and Photonics Packaging Division Clock Award in 2012, the ASME Heat Transfer Memorial Award in 2016, the ASME Kate Gleason Award and the Linn-Benton NAACP Social Change Champion in 2023, and a Women of Influence Award from the Portland Business Journal in 2024.

Her research interests include nanoscale heat transfer, computational fluid dynamics, and simulations of fluid flow and heat transfer for industrial applications. Recently, her focus is on sub-micron thermal transport, multiscale multi-physics simulations of micro- and nano-electromechanical systems (MEMS and NEMS) and the uncertainty quantifications involved in those systems.

Murthy is married to Sanjay Mathur, an aerospace engineer who works at SparkCognition, a firm specializing in artificial intelligence systems and development.

SCOTT BARNES

VP/Director of Athletics
8th Year at Oregon State

Scott Barnes was named Vice President and Director of Athletics Dec. 22, 2016 by then Oregon State University President Dr. Ed Ray.

In 2023, Barnes completed a nearly two-year Completing Reser Stadium project, a \$161 million renovation that makes the Beavers' home a best-in-class football facility with year-round programs and facilities for all OSU students, faculty and staff.

Barnes also oversaw the expansion of the Whyte Track and Field Center, which added fan seating, a press box and restrooms. That came on the heels of a 20,000-square foot practice gymnastics facility, the largest in the Pac-12. Those two facility projects are a part of over \$23-million of completed improvements made to women's facilities stemming from the Oregon State Athletics Strategic Plan Barnes initiated in 2018.

In Barnes' tenure, OSU Athletics has made significant strides academically and athletically. Beaver student-athletes are among the leaders in the Pac-12 Conference for academic accomplishments, the Valley Football Center officially re-opened and the popular Fan Experience Committee was created. In addition, he has increased the emphasis on fundraising and developing a sustainable business model that will ensure Beaver Athletics continues to progress and thrive, and debuted the BUILD THE DAM Strategic Plan to guide the program forward for future years.

OSU is just one of two programs nationally, since 2018, to have its football team win 10 games, both its women's and men's basketball teams advance to the Elite 8, and see both its baseball and softball teams advance to their respective College World Series.

Oregon State, meanwhile, was the only program nationally to have first-round selections in the NFL, MLB and MLS Drafts in 2024.

Facilities has been at the forefront of Barnes' leadership at OSU. He has spearheaded facility projects that include a \$3.5 million refresh of the Sports Performance Center, completion of phase II of the Valley Football Center, a remodel of the men's and women's basketball locker rooms, the construction of Casey Corner at Goss Stadium at Coleman Field, and the remodel of Paul Lorenz Field (soccer), among other projects.

Barnes has made numerous strategic hires with the Beavers' intercollegiate programs, including head football coach Trent Bray, head men's soccer coach Greg Dalby, head women's rowing coach Michael Eichler, head track and field/cross country coach Louie Quintana, head baseball coach Mitch Canham, head women's soccer coach Caroline Kelly, volleyball head coach Lindsey Behonick and head wrestling coach Chris Pendleton.

"We are building for stability and sustainability in all of our programs, and to create a vision that excites and inspires all of Beaver Nation," Barnes said.

As part of the overall university administration, Barnes serves on several key committees and represents OSU at the Pac-12 Conference and NCAA levels. The two-time Far West Region Athletic Director the Year recently spent five years on the NCAA Men's Basketball Committee (Chair for 2014-15). As of July 1, 2024, he has served on the following Pac-12 and NCAA committees: the Executive Committee (2019-20 Chair), the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Oversight Committee, the Men's Basketball Committee, Football Oversight Committee, Lead 1 Board of Directors, the Administrative Subcommittee, Bowls Committee, Men's Basketball Tournament Committee, Men's Basketball Liaison, Television Committee, and Rose Bowl Management Committee. In addition, he served as a faculty member on the Lead 1 Athletic Directors Association and in January 2018 he was one of four Director of Athletics in the country to visit Asia on a Nike sponsored trip.

Barnes has spent over three decades in athletics administration, including more than 20 years as an athletics director. He arrived back to his native Pacific Northwest from the University of Pittsburgh, where he

served as the Panthers' Director of Athletics for nearly two years. Pittsburgh achieved high success academically and athletically that included bowl trips, conference titles and record academic achievements.

Prior to Pitt, Barnes headed the Utah State University athletics program from 2008-15 as Director of Athletics and was promoted to Vice President in 2012. While at Utah State, the Aggies experienced unprecedented success that included multiple bowl trips in football, 20 league titles and a successful transition to the Mountain West Conference.

Barnes has also served as the Director of Athletics at Eastern Washington University and Humboldt State University. In addition, he has held various athletics roles at the University of The Pacific, the University of San Diego, Iowa State University and the University of Washington. He also has experience in corporate business and professional basketball.

The Spokane native graduated from Fresno State with a bachelor's degree in 1986 and a master's degree in athletics administration and physical education in 1993. A basketball letterman under coach Boyd Grant, he helped the Bulldogs advance to two NCAA Tournaments and two NITs. Barnes was a second-team all-conference player as a senior before playing professionally in Germany.

He and his wife, Jody, have two children: Daughter, Milanna, and son, Isaac.

- Spearheaded the Completing Reser Stadium campaign, a project that has transformed the program's football stadium into a national best-in-class facility beginning with the 2023 season.
- The baseball team won the 2018 College World Series title.
- OSU's student-athlete population continues to set school records for cumulative grade point averages (GPAs).
- Developed Strategic and Facilities Master Plans.
- Oversaw final fundraising in the \$42 million Valley Football Center project.
- Spearheaded remodel and expansion of Goss Stadium at Coleman Field (2018-19), the Sports Performance Center (weight room), the Valley Football Center, the OSU Softball Complex (now Kelly Field), Paul Lorenz Field, the Whyte Track and Field Center and the 20,000-square foot gymnastics practice facility.
- Led revamp of Our Beaver Nation; the fundraising arm for Athletics within the OSU Foundation.
- Spearheaded OSU's first Fan Experience Committee to improve all aspects of the game-day experience at Gill Coliseum, Reser Stadium, Goss Stadium at Coleman Field, the Whyte Track and Field Center and the OSU Softball Complex.
- Developed a business model to ensure OSU Athletics' continues to provide student-athletes with the best experiences possible through personnel, facilities, and academic support.

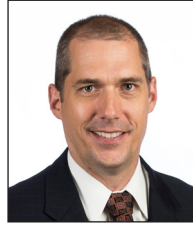
