THE PETERSEN EVENTS CENTER

Symbolic of a bold new era in the history of the University of Pittsburgh is the Petersen Events Center. A state-of-the-art convocation center and basketball arena that is located at the peak of the upper campus with a dramatic view of Oakland and the Cathedral of Learning.

The Petersen Events Center dramatically enhances the quality of student life at the University of Pittsburgh, providing the campus with a location for graduation ceremonies, modern recreation and fitness facilities, and a 12,508-seat arena for Panther basketball.

Among the Petersen Events Center Highlights:

THE BAIERL STUDENT RECREATION CENTER

The center boasts 40,000 square feet of student recreation space. Highlights include four racquetball courts and two squash courts, along with Cybex weight machines, a large free weight area, state-of-the-art aerobic area complete with treadmills and bikes, a Health Assessment Area, an aerobics classroom and martial arts practice room.

UNIQUE RESTAURANT ROW

The building has nine major concession areas with 66 total points of sale, featuring a five-store food court that will be open daily as well as on game day.

PETERSEN EVENTS CENTER TIMELINE

JANUARY 21, 1998 Gov. Tom Ridge announces at a news conference that \$53 million in state funds have been committed to the convocation center at Pittsburgh.

APRIL 25, 1998 State hires Apostolou Associates of Mount Washington and Rosser International of Atlanta to design the new arena which was to be built on a site atop Terrace Street next to Pitt Stadium.

MARCH 18, 1999 University of Pittsburgh trustees vote to raze Pitt Stadium after the 1999 football season to make way for the convocation center. Panthers football moves to Heinz Field.

JUNE 22, 1999 It is announced that John Petersen and his wife, Gertrude, have donated \$10 million to the project. It is the largest individual gift ever at the University of Pittsburgh.

NOVEMBER 13, 1999 Final football game is played at Pitt Stadium, a 37-27 victory against Notre Dame. Razing the old stadium begins immediately afterward.

JUNE 15, 2000 Official groundbreaking of the Petersen Events Center.

FEBRUARY 6, 2002 Pitt officials announce that Duquesne will be the opponent in the first men's basketball game.

MARCH 2, 2002 The final men's basketball game is played at Fitzgerald Field House, a 92-65 victory over West Virginia.

APRIL 27, 2002 The center opened for a preview so that graduating seniors could see the arena before leaving campus.

AUGUST 31, 2002 Pitt announces that the entire 2002-03 men's basketball season has become a sellout from season tickets.

OCTOBER 13, 2002 Counting Crows performs the first concert in the Petersen Events Center.

NOVEMBER 8, 2002 First women's basketball exhibition game: Pitt women vs. OGBM Legends.

NOVEMBER 9, 2002 First men's basketball exhibition game: Pitt vs. E.A. Sports All-Stars.

NOVEMBER 22, 2002 First women's game vs. Robert Morris.

NOVEMBER 23, 2002 First men's basketball game vs. Duquesne.

MARCH 18 AND 20, 2007 Pitt hosts first-ever NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament first and second rounds.

BUILDING A WINNER

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Pitt's strength and conditioning program is designed to improve athletic performance in all facets: strength and flexibility, speed and power, conditioning, agility, nutrition, and mental toughness. Each individual student-athlete receives personal instruction, individual attention and a strength and conditioning program based on need. Basketball strength and conditioning coordinator, Tim Beltz is on hand to provide personal instruction.

PHILOSOPHY

The Pitt strength and conditioning program is designed to provide Panthers basketball players with a coordinated step-by-step, year-round program with the goal of enhancing each student-athlete's ability and achieving maximum results.

WEIGHT ROOM AND EQUIPMENT

Located in the Baierl Basketball Center is Pitt's basketball weight room. Pitt's weight room is conveniently located between the locker room and athletic training room to provide easy access for student-athletes' use. The weight room is equipped with state-of-the-art equipment including several power lift Olympic platforms custom made to fit people seven-feet-tall, York Barbell DB Racks, Body Master, Hammer Strength, Elite Fitness System, Free Motion Fitness, PreCore

Treadmills, Step Mill, Schwinn Bikes, Versa Climber and Concept II Rower.

PROGRAM DESIGN, GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

- Increase strength and flexibility
- Develop/increase speed and power
- Increase overall condition
- Improve agility
- Improve position-specific skills
- Increase mental toughness through discipline and competitiveness
- Balance nutrition

ATHLETIC TRAINING & SPORTS MEDICINE

Working with the University of Pittsburgh women's basketball student-athletes in the area of sports medicine are athletic trainers Tony Salesi and Jill Conley and team physicians Dr. Freddie Fu and Dr. Christopher Harner. They provide Pitt women's basketball athletes the best in sports medicine and health care.

PROGRAM AND OBJECTIVES

The primary focus of Athletic Training Services is injury prevention, treatment and rehabilitation. The sports medicine team utilizes a multidisciplinary approach including athletic training, strength and conditioning, orthopedics, and nutrition, to name a few.

FACILITIES

Student-athletes receive treatment in three athletic training facilities: the Petersen Events Center, Duratz Athletic Complex, and Fitzgerald Field House. Located within the Baierl Basketball Center, the basketball athletic training room is situated adjacent to both the Panthers' locker room and weight room. The facility features a full-sized whirlpool, X-Ray capabilities, physician examination room, therapeutic modalities, rehabilitation equipment and is staffed by professionals who provide health care to student-athletes.

UPMC SPORTS PERFORMANCE COMPLEX

University of Pittsburgh student-athletes also have access to the UPMC Center for Sports Medicine. This clinic provides student-athletes the opportunity to be seen by various medical specialists who are able to combine the resources of a major academic institution and expert clinical services for professional and collegiate sports teams. Specialty areas include sports nutrition, physical therapy, and neuromuscular research, as well as X-Ray and magnetic resonance imaging capabilities. The clinic is under the direction of the David Silver Professor and Chairman of the Department of Orthopedic Surgery at the University of Pittsburgh, Dr. Freddie Fu.



HELPING OUT In The Community

Head Coach Agnus Berenato and the Panthers have made a commitment to help the Pittsburgh community and surrounding areas. The team participates in numerous events and functions throughout the year, trying to make a difference not only in Pittsburgh, but the entire nation.

The Panthers have held Women in Sports clinics prior to home basketball games, offering support and instruction to the future women of the sports and professional worlds.

Berenato is an advocate of the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation's Race For The Cure — a charity organization for the prevention and treatment of breast cancer. The Panthers have followed her lead, getting involved in the foundation and showing their support throughout the season. Berenato has been invited to be the keynote speaker at several local middle and high school events, and was recently honored by the Girl Scouts Trillium Council as the Sports and Fitness honoree at their Women and Girls of Distinction ceremony.

PANTHER ATHLETICS


A Tradition of Success

Pitt is successful in and dedicated to all 19 of its varsity sports and is committed to giving the student-athletes not only the best experience on the playing field but also in the classroom. The hard work and dedication of the Panthers' family is evident by the recent success of many of the athletic teams.


- Last year, the University of Pittsburgh had a school-record 302 student-athletes achieve a 3.0 grade point average (GPA) or above, including 19 with a perfect 4.0 GPA.
- The Pitt men's basketball team advanced to the NCAA Tournament for a school-record fifth consecutive season and 18th time in school history. Previously, Pitt appeared in three straight NCAA Tournaments from 1987-89.
- The Big East named 74 Pitt student-athletes as members of its All-Big East teams.
- In 2005-06, the Pitt Panthers achieved an unprecedented increase in network and broadcast exposure. Highlights from the year include: 27 radio broadcasts of women's basketball regular season and postseason competition; 22 Pitt Panther-related shows featured on FOX Sports Network and 25 satellite radio broadcasts of Pitt competitions.



In 2006, Pitt became one of only 15 schools nationwide to advance to the NCAA Tournament in each of the past five seasons (2001-06).




Pitt linebacker H.B. Blades is a two-time All-Big East First-Team member who is one of the nation's elite defenders again in 2006.



Six wrestlers earned NCAA berths for the second consecutive year. Justin Nestor (pictured) captured the EWL Conference title at 165 pounds and was one of two Panthers to record 100 career victories.



The Pitt gymnastics team earned a berth to the regional championships for the second year in a row. Four Panthers were named All-EAGL selections with Andrea Ariotta earning all-conference honors on each event and unanimous selection in the all-around.



In 2006, Kristen Brown earned an outright bid to the NCAA Swimming Championships due to her record-breaking performance in the 200 freestyle. She was also a member of the first relay team to qualify for NCAAs in almost 20 years.



Volleyball enjoyed its fourth straight winning season in 2005 with three players earning all-conference honors. Megan McGrane ranked fourth among NCAA Division I players with 2,424 career digs en route to an All-American honorable mention.



The men's cross country team earned its highest regional finish in 2005. The team was led by Sam Blair who finished ninth in the region and 12th in the conference.

Jim Negrych was named to the Collegiate Baseball/Louisville Slugger All-America Third Team, as well as Baseball America First Team in 2006.



Joey Scarf became Pitt's second All-Big East First Team honoree leading the Panthers with a .403 batting average in league play.



The women's track and field team captured its second consecutive title at The Big East Outdoor Championships. Pitt had nine NCAA qualifiers in 2006 and six All-American honorees.

THE BIG EAST

Best Conference In The Country

In 2006-07, the BIG EAST will be in its second year as the nation's largest Division I-A conference. The first year with 16 members was wrought with curiosity among those in the world of collegiate athletics and in the media, but the league thrived in its new alignment, enjoying significant success in the athletic arenas, on the playing fields and in the classroom.

The goals of the BIG EAST have remained constant throughout its history — to compete at the highest level and to do so with integrity and sportsmanship.

In men's basketball last year, BIG EAST squads secured a league-record eight NCAA bids. Seven BIG EAST women's basketball teams earned NCAA berths. In football, West Virginia garnered the attention of the college football world with its victory over Georgia in the Nokia Sugar Bowl. The Mountaineers were the BIG EAST's representative in the Bowl Championship Series.

In 2005-06, the BIG EAST welcomed five new members to increase its membership to 16: University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida. Some were ready to call the new BIG EAST alignment too unwieldy, but the league showed that there can be strength in numbers even when that number is a large one.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 34 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Milwaukee and Cincinnati. With its newest members, BIG EAST markets will contain almost one fourth of all television households in the U.S.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 25 national championships in six different sports and 124 student-athletes have won individual national titles.

In 2005-06, Providence College's Mary Cullen won the NCAA 5,000-meters crown. Also, the Villanova women's cross country team was named the NCAA's Silver Anniversary Cross Country Program. The Wildcats have won seven NCAA team titles since 1981. Former Wildcat standout Carole Zajac was named the top individual performer of the women's cross country era.

The BIG EAST has always been able to boast that some of its best students are also some of its best athletes. More than 350 student-athletes have earned Academic All-America honors. Last year, West Virginia's Joe Herber was named the *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-American of the Year in men's basketball.

The BIG EAST has continued its basketball success in the 21st century. In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA titles in the same season. With the Syracuse men and the UConn women grabbing NCAA crowns

the previous year, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in consecutive seasons. In fact, the BIG EAST has won five of the last seven women's basketball crowns and three of the last eight men's titles.

Moving proactively has been a consistent strategy for the conference that was formed in 1979. The BIG EAST has continually turned challenges into opportunities to become stronger.

In the spring of 2001, the BIG EAST added women's lacrosse and rowing to its growing list of sports. The inaugural women's golf championship was held in the spring of 2003.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse Universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven-school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad-based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. The BIG EAST Conference has enjoyed a leadership role nationally. Its student-athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably show a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization needs outstanding leadership. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Dave Gavitt, moved into the Commissioner's chair in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student-athletes. The conference has enjoyed long-standing relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC.

While BIG EAST basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden, attendance figures also are significant at BIG EAST soccer, women's basketball and baseball games.

More than 550 BIG EAST athletes have earned All-America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well-represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals in each of the last five summer Olympiads.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,500 athletes in 23 sports.

Pitt's main campus sits in the heart of Oakland and attracts a lively and interesting mix of people to the area throughout the day and evening. Its decorative landscape of architectural landmarks, museums and concert halls are juxtaposed with comfortable, friendly neighborhoods, traditional family businesses and national chains, giving the area a small-town feel in the midst of a larger urban scene.

■ Oakland caters to a variety of interests. Sitting across the street from the beautiful Cathedral of Learning are the Carnegie Museums, Library and Music Hall. The Carnegie Museum of Art receives international acclaim for its collection of American and European artwork and the many extraordinary exhibits that are on display every year. The Museum of Art also houses a cinema, bringing in numerous foreign films every month. The Museum of Natural History gives its visitors a chance to interact with the exhibits and is known for its impressive collection of dinosaur fossils. For those searching for entertainment or knowledge, Carnegie Music Hall is home to performances by world-renowned musicians and lecturers alike. The Carnegie Library has more than six million items and sponsors informative classes on computers and health issues.

■ For those who wish to escape the fast pace of city life but don't want to venture too far from home, 456-acre Schenley Park sits directly behind the Carnegie facilities. Schenley is the third-largest urban park in the country and offers a skating rink, baseball fields, soccer fields, tennis courts, a golf course and a Frisbee golf course. Walkers and runners are given a beautiful landscape to admire as they exercise at the Schenley Oval or throughout the park. Also inside the park is Phipps Conservatory and Botanical Gardens, one of the largest botanical conservatories in the United States. The glass conservatory is home to exotic plants from all over the world, recreating climates and natural surroundings. The conservatory also houses a spectacular butterfly room, in which hundreds of butterflies fly freely from plant to plant.





- Oakland is home base for the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center Health System. The system includes UPMC Presbyterian and Montefiore Hospitals, Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh, Western Psychiatric Institute and Clinic, UPMC Shadyside, Magee-Women's Hospital and numerous other medical facilities in Western Pennsylvania. This innovative health system was recently ranked by *U.S. News & World Report* as one of the top medical centers in the country. The University of Pittsburgh Cancer Institute's Hillman Cancer Center recently opened in North Oakland and has been the headquarters for cancer-based care in Pittsburgh.
- The variety of shops and restaurants in Oakland provide the public with thriving businesses, satisfying nearly every need and want. Scattered throughout Oakland are, among others, Chinese, Mexican, Indian, Italian, Thai, Japanese and Middle Eastern restaurants.
- Oakland's striking architecture is evident in St. Paul's Cathedral and Heinz Chapel. The towering structures keep a peaceful, nostalgic sense amid the buzzing urban life. As grand as the buildings are on the outside, the intimate detail used inside to create beautiful places of worship gives Oakland two settings that are among the most ideal to hold a wedding ceremony in Western Pennsylvania.
- One of the greatest moments in the history of professional baseball occurred in Oakland, where historic Forbes Field stood for over 60 years. Pittsburgh Pirates Hall-of-Famer Bill Mazeroski hit a dramatic game-seven home run to defeat the New York Yankees in the 1960 World Series. Forbes Field was razed at the beginning of the 1970s but the outfield wall where Mazeroski's home run was hit still stands. Home plate also remains in its original spot and is on display in Pitt's Posvar Hall.

Expectations are something Agnus Berenato does not shy away from. In fact, the fourth-year Pitt head coach creates her own expectations and encourages others to follow along.

After the 2005-06 season's success, those expectations are at an all-time high with the return of four starters from a team that won 22 games for just the second time in the program's 32-year history. In addition, the Panthers finished above .500 with a 9-7 Big East Conference record and secured a sixth-place finish — the Panthers' highest since 1995.

All of that success landed Pitt in the Women's National Invitation Tournament for just the fourth time in school history — something many had not predicted at the beginning of the season after being picked to finish 13th of 16 teams in the Big East Conference. The Panthers again surpassed expectations advancing to the semifinals of the WNIT with three victories.

For the first time since 1983, two Pitt players earned All-Big East honors when Mercedes Walker (First Team) and Mallorie Winn (Second Team) were announced on March 3 at the league's annual banquet.

Beginning in 2006-07, all of the Panthers' games, home and away, will be broadcast on the radio for the first time. Panther players are being honored by the Big East Conference and are being invited to participate in the USA Basketball National Team Trials. Berenato is not one to rest on her laurels, however.

"We're building a top-notch program here and everything that's happening is a step in that direction," Berenato said. "We want all of our players to strive to play on national teams and to be the best they can be on the court and in the classroom."

A subject of importance with Berenato is her devotion to the community and her work in Pittsburgh and surrounding areas is plentiful. In April of 2006, Berenato was named the Dapper Dan Sportswoman of the Year, a prestigious award in the city of Pittsburgh.

Berenato is an advocate of the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation's Race For The Cure — a charity organization for the prevention and treatment of breast cancer. In addition to her local involvement, Berenato agreed to join the committee for the National Coalition for Cancer Survivorship (NCCS), the oldest survivor-led advocacy organization working on behalf of this country's nearly 10 million cancer survivors and the millions more touched by the disease.

Berenato has been honored by the Girl Scouts Trillium Council as the Sports and Fitness honoree at their Women and Girls of Distinction ceremony, earned induction into the Camden County [N.J.] Sports Hall of Fame, has been listed as a Marquis Who's Who and was named a finalist for the prestigious ATHENA Award.

In the spring of 2004, Berenato received the "Native Son Award," an annual award presented by the Philadelphia Sports Writers Association to a native of the Philadelphia area who has achieved success in athletics.



Berenato has made a name for herself throughout the University of Pittsburgh and the community for her dynamic public speaking ability, and she has been invited to be the keynote speaker at several local middle and high school events and banquets. The Greensburg YWCA Sportswoman's Banquet, Mt. Alvernia commencement address, Homewood Elementary commencement speaker and YMCA of Greater Pittsburgh's Fall Retreat are just a few of the places at which she has spoken. Berenato has also been a speaker for women's mental health, the state of education and how to manage a business team. She also takes pride in speaking at the local Kiwanis, Lions, and Rotary Clubs in Western Pennsylvania.

On the court, her impact on the Panthers and the university as a whole has been immediate as well as the NCAA who awarded Pitt and the

Petersen Events Center the first and second rounds of the 2007 NCAA Championships — the first time in school history. Berenato, along with Pitt Athletic Director Jeff Long and Senior Associate Athletic Director Carol Sprague, were instrumental in the committee's selection of Pitt.

Under Berenato's guidance in 2004-05, the Panthers began to make significant strides in becoming that top-notch program worthy of hosting an event such as the NCAA Tournament. On the court, Walker became the first Pitt freshman in school history to nab All-Big East honors. Off the court, 10 of Berenato's players earned at least a 3.0 grade-point average to give the Panthers an All-America Academic Team nomination.

The success is a credit to Berenato's character and the fact that she practices what she preaches to her team. Her passion for women's basketball has helped make her players better students and better people. She has things to do, goals to achieve, and plans to see them through — the faster, the better.

Since joining Pitt from Georgia Tech prior to the 2003-04 season, Berenato has worked with her staff to make the Panthers a perennial postseason team like she did with the Yellow Jackets. The success has been apparent, jumping from six wins in her first year with the Panthers to 13 her second season, and 22 wins last year.

Among her accomplishments in her third campaign at Pitt:

- The Panthers won 10 games before January for the first time in the 32-year history of the program
- The Panthers won three straight Big East games and four straight Big East road games for the first time in over a decade.
- Pitt's Mercedes Walker and Mallorie Winn earned a total of six Weekly Honor Roll appearances, while Xenia Stewart was named Rookie of the Week earlier in the season.
- Pitt had a perfect 6-0 record in games decided by five points or less and won their first 10 games on the year by an average of 15 points.

In addition to the Panthers' accomplishments, Berenato reached a personal milestone as she collected her 300th career victory with an 85-81 win over Big East rival Georgetown in February of 2005.

Upon Berenato's hiring, University of Pittsburgh Chancellor Mark A. Nordenberg said, "We believe the University of Pittsburgh women's basketball program has unlimited potential, and in Agnus Berenato we have found the perfect person to make that potential a reality. Anyone who meets Agnus for the first time cannot help but be impressed with both her knowledge and enthusiasm. Certainly with over 200 career victories, her ability as a coach is obvious. Just as exciting, Agnus has demonstrated a record of commitment to academics and the complete development of her student-athletes. It will be exciting to watch our program grow, on and off the court, under her leadership."

Guiding Georgia Tech to the postseason in each of her final four years, including the 2003 NCAA Tournament, Berenato owned a 223-209 (.516) record with the Yellow Jackets. She mentored the team to its first postseason championship by capturing the 1992 National Women's Invitational Tournament, compiling a 20-13 overall record.

In her final season at Georgia Tech, the team finished 20-11 and advanced to the NCAA Tournament. The Yellow Jackets upset No. 22 Georgia, 65-61, en route to starting the season with an 11-1 record. Berenato's squad made it to the semifinals of the ACC Tournament before falling to Duke, eventual champion and Final Four participant. The Yellow Jackets also recorded a school-record 10-game winning streak. In five of her last seven seasons at Georgia Tech, Berenato led the Yellow Jackets to victories over top-15 opponents.

A two-time recipient of the Women's NCAA Division I Coach of the Year award in the state of Georgia by the Atlanta Tip-off Club, Berenato is a recognized recruiter as well as a successful coach. Her 2002 recruiting class was ranked among the top 15 in the nation by such publications as the *All-Star Girls Report*. Additionally, *Athlon* magazine ranked her 2001 class 13th nationally.

Berenato has coached 12 all-conference honorees, including Walker and Georgia Tech's Sonja Mallory, who was selected in the WNBA Draft, chosen 24th overall by the New York Liberty.

Berenato also served two years as an assistant coach at Georgia Tech (1986-87). She was responsible for recruiting and coaching Tech's frontcourt players. Before arriving at Georgia Tech, Berenato spent four years as the head women's

basketball coach at Rider University, compiling a 60-55 record. In her first season at Rider, Berenato guided the Broncs to their best record in school history with a 26-7 mark. Following that year, she was named New Jersey Coaches Association (NJCA) Coach of the Year for her efforts while Rider was named its Team of the Year.

While at Rider, Berenato was also the women's volleyball coach for four years, posting a 66-51 record, including a school-record 25-12 mark in 1983. She was inducted into the Rider Hall of Fame in February, 2002.

A 1980 graduate of Mount St. Mary's College in Emmitsburg, Md., Berenato earned her bachelor's degree in sociology and was a three-year starter on the basketball team. Playing for former NBA star and current ESPN analyst Fred Carter, she was a two-time captain for the Mountaineers and now serves on the college's Board of Trustees.

Berenato is currently a member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) and the Naismith Hall of Fame committee. In the past, she has been a member of the Kodak All-America Selection Committee, East Regional Championship Committee, the Atlanta Women's Network, Inc., the Georgia Women's Intersport Network, and Atlanta Women in Sports.

She also received the Jackie Joyner-Kersey Volunteer Award for exemplary volunteerism from the Jesse Draper Boys' and Girls' Club of Atlanta a few years ago. Additionally, she was selected by the Institute of International Sports as one of its Sports Ethics Fellows in 1996.

A native of Gloucester City, N.J., Berenato and her husband Jack have five children: Theresa Marie (23), Andrew (22), Joey (18), Clare (16) and Christina (13).

Jeff Williams is in his fourth year on the Pitt women's basketball staff and enters his first season as its Associate Head Coach under Head Coach Agnus Berenato. With nearly two decades of basketball coaching experience, Williams focuses on post players and assists in recruiting, preseason and postseason conditioning, scouting and community involvement.

"Agnus is not only a great colleague but also a great friend," Williams said. "It's a tremendous opportunity to work with her at the University of Pittsburgh and I'm honored to be able to serve



this program as associate head coach. We have the same goals for our program — to be a Top 20 team and compete for a national championship. With the leadership of Agnus and the great support of our administration, we are getting closer each day to making those goals a reality"

Williams' work with the Panthers was on display two seasons ago as he helped develop Mercedes Walker into one of the top scorers and rebounders in the Big East Conference as a freshman. Last season Walker continued to be a dominate force in the paint earning All-Big East honors, while then-newcomer Sylvie Tafen gained valuable skill and development deepening the bench. Williams was also instrumental in bringing in Pitt's most highly touted recruiting class over the past few years.

Before coming to Pitt, Williams spent two years on Berenato's Georgia Tech coaching staff. In 2002-03, Williams helped the Yellow Jackets to a 20-11 record and a berth in the NCAA Tournament. Additionally, for the second straight year, he helped bring in a nationally ranked recruiting class, including *Street & Smith's* All-Americans Stephanie Higgs and Kentrina Wilson. The prior year, the Yellow Jackets' class was ranked among the top 15 in the nation by a number of recruiting services and media outlets, including a No. 11 ranking by the *All-Star Girls Report*.

Williams has coached both men's and women's college basketball as well as professional basketball. Prior to Georgia Tech, he was the head coach for the Atlanta Justice where he helped lead the National Women's Basketball League squad to both the regular-season and playoff championships in 2001.

Before joining the Justice, Williams served the previous five years as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Howard University in Washington, D.C. At Howard, Williams helped lead the team to four league titles and three

NCAA Tournament appearances. His recruiting class during the 1997-98 season was ranked the nation's 12th best.

A 1987 graduate of Howard with a degree in therapeutic recreation, Williams also was an assistant coach for the men's teams at George Mason and South Carolina State.

One of the finest players in recent college women's basketball history, Shea Ralph enters her fourth season with the Pitt coaching staff. Ralph, a former standout at Connecticut, works primarily with the guards, is heavily involved with the team's strength and conditioning program, assists with individual workouts, scouting and is the academic liaison for the team.

"I feel so blessed to be part of this amazing program. We have a wonderful staff and team and we are all so excited for the upcoming season," Ralph said.

As a part of Berenato's staff at Pitt from the beginning, Ralph has been instrumental in the development of the guards, and the program as a whole. Last season, Ralph helped lead point guard Mallorie Winn to All-Big East Second Team honors as a junior.

"Shea is such a valuable asset to our program," head coach Agnus Berenato said. "Her experience as one of the most prolific players in recent history combined with her outstanding work ethic has translated into making Shea one of the great young coaches in our business and we are thrilled that she is on our staff."

Ralph graduated from UConn among the top 10 leaders in several categories, including scoring (1,678), assists (456), steals (252) and field-goal percentage (.579). A captain of the 2000 national championship team, Ralph was named the Most Valuable Player of the Final Four, leading the Huskies to a 71-52 win over Tennessee in the National Championship game. In addition to her MVP award, Ralph was a Naismith Player of the Year finalist. That same year, she earned first team Kodak and *Associated Press* All-America honors in addition to being named the Big East Player of the Year.

Ralph was also the *Sports Illustrated for Women* Player of the Year and the recipient of the Honda Award, a prestigious award given to the top



female collegiate athlete in each of 12 sports. In 2000-01, Ralph was listed as the Preseason Big East Player of the Year and *ESPN The Magazine* named her to the Preseason All-America First Team.

Basketball Writer's Association (USBWA) Freshman of the Year, *Sporting News* National Freshman of the Year and Newcomer of the Year by *Dick Vitale College Basketball* in 1996-97.

A 2001 graduate of Connecticut with a degree in exercise physiology, Ralph was drafted that summer by the WNBA's Utah Starzz but was unable to compete because of a knee injury. She later went on to make the NWBL's Springfield Spirit team before falling victim to injury again. Ralph then became an assistant coach for the Spirit in 2003 before joining Berenato's inaugural staff at Pittsburgh in the fall of 2003.

In high school at Terry Sanford High in Fayetteville, N.C., Ralph got her start in the spotlight early, earning National High School Player of the Year honors.

Ralph has also been a motivational speaker all over the country for the past four years and has worked numerous basketball camps for both collegiate and professional teams.

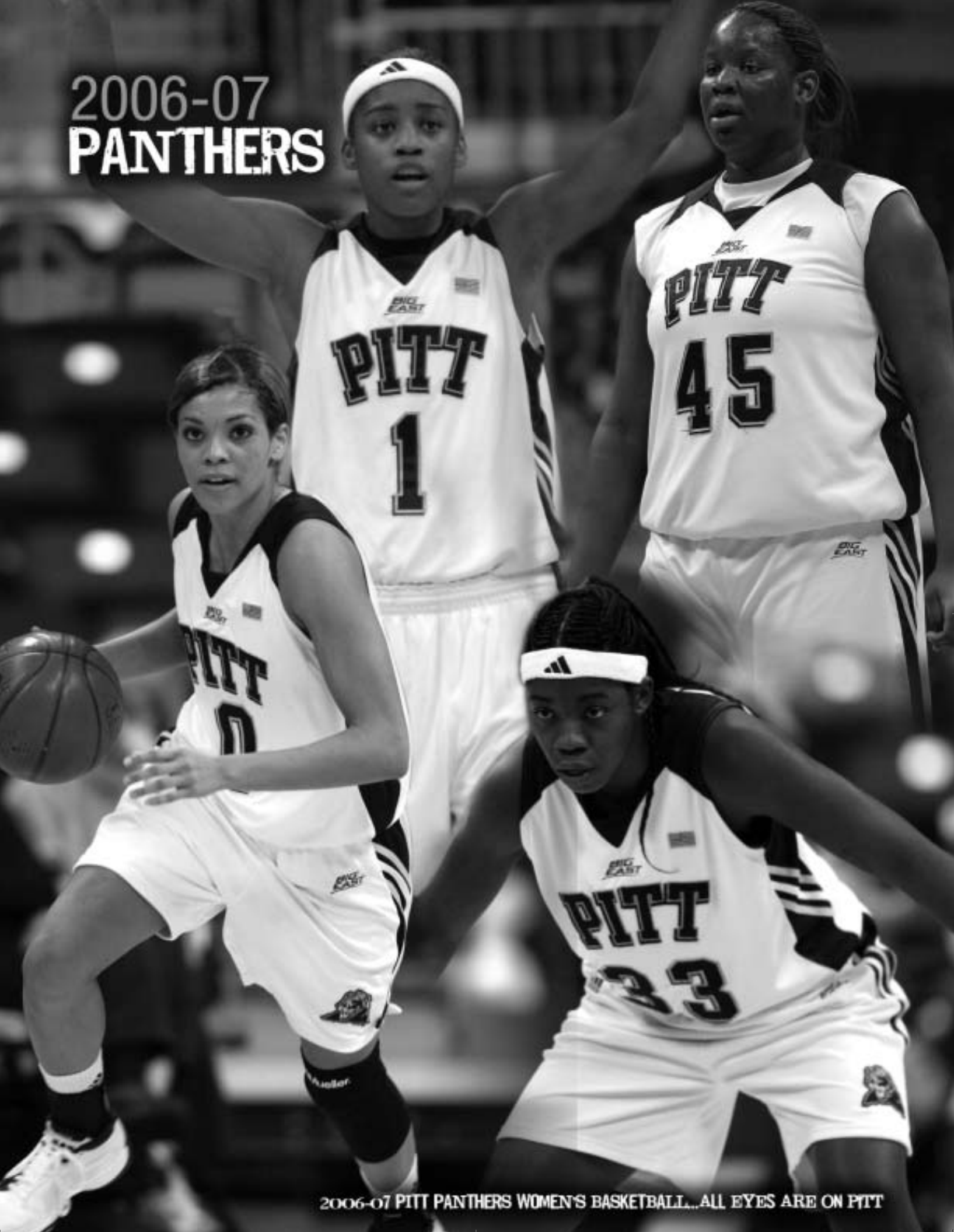

SEASON PREVIEW

The time is now. The preparation and the foundation of Pitt women's basketball have been built. It is now time for the Panthers to step up to the next level and achieve heights never reached by the Pitt program.

Last year was a landmark season for the Panthers; one to be proud of, but not one to hang your hat on, according to the 2006-07 team. This is a team that advanced to the WNIT Semifinals for the first time in school history and matched a school record with 22 wins. However, that season was only a beginning of what is yet to come for the Panthers.

"The staff and the team are coming off a wonderful and magical year," Head Coach Agnus Berenato said. "The team reaped what they sowed. Everyone made the decision to come here and change the program believing that they were going to be an impact player. The best reward is that we were able to have a successful season and not a losing season. As a team and

staff, we were able to celebrate a lot of awards. It doesn't matter if you are a finger, hand, head or a leg, we are all one body and I really believe that for this team."

One body indeed. How else would a team turn the corner on a 13-win season two years ago? Or how does a team connect on the court with three players in the starting lineup who have never worn a Pitt uniform prior to the start of the season? It's called 'team chemistry' and that is a Pitt strength under the guidance of Berenato.

Pitt will look to duplicate that chemistry this year, although it will have to do so without graduated forward Cheron Taylor, the heart and soul of last season's team.

"It will have to be one of the younger players that brings that presence to this team," Berenato said. "What Cheron brought is not going to be easily replaced."

Pitt was on the outside looking in at NCAA selection time last year. The decision provides the 2006-07 squad motivation, especially since Pitt will serve as host for the tournament's first and second rounds.

"We would like to play in the NCAA tournament," Berenato stated. "We are hosting the NCAA first and second rounds and it is a tremendous compliment to the women of Pittsburgh that a national tournament is coming to our home, but we don't want to be a gracious host. We want to be hosts who are also dancing at our party."

Pitt will face a tough schedule this season with Duke, Liberty, Penn State and Utah highlighting a difficult non-conference slate, before heading into an already tough 16-team BIG EAST field.

"We are thrilled with our schedule this season," Berenato said. "In order to be one of the top programs in the country, you have to play those types of teams. This schedule gives us that challenge. The Big East is always a tough conference and when you throw teams like Duke and Utah into the mix, the competition level is that much higher."

GUARDS

Senior point guard **MALLORIE WINN** is coming off a spectacular season and proved to be a clutch player for the Panthers, hitting numerous game-winners at the buzzer. For her efforts in the postseason, Winn was named to the All-WNIT team. As a junior, she averaged 35.5 minutes of action and shot just over 34 percent from behind the arc, while leading the team with 131 assists and 23 blocked shots on the season.

Junior **KARLYLE LIM** added depth behind Winn last season, playing in 28 games, making one start. She recorded 18 assists and 16 rebounds, while averaging seven minutes a game.

Joining the Panthers this season will be **JANIA SIMS, SOPHRONIA SALLARD** and **ASHLEIGH BRAXTON**. Sims is a true point guard from Newark, N.J., where she led Shabazz High to an unprecedented five straight Essex County Tournament titles. She also helped the team to a No. 8 ranking nationally by *USA Today* after a perfect 33-0 season. Sims averaged 11.8 points, 6.4 assists and 3.2 steals per game as a senior, earning All-Newark and All-Essex County First Team honors.

Braxton, a native of Woodbridge, Va., helped Forest Park High to a Virginia Group AAA championship as a sophomore in 2004 and back-to-back regional titles in 2004 and 2005. Braxton is also a two-time all-district and all-region honoree and was named *Potomac News* and *Manassas Journal-Messenger* All-Area the past two seasons.

Sallard, of Syracuse, N.Y., will have to sit out the 2006-07 season due to NCAA transfer rules after coming to Pitt from Kansas. As a freshman with the Jayhawks, she played in 15 games and averaged 1.8 points and 1.3 rebounds in limited action per game. Coming out of Nottingham High School, Sallard was listed by *Blue Star* as the 25th-ranked player in the nation and was named CNY Player of the Year in 2004 and 2005.

SEASON PREVIEW

“Guards have to be the coach on the court,” Berenato said. “Last year, Mallorie was busy with the ball as the eyes and ears on the court. She was a complement player to our posts and provided us with a one-two punch from the guard position. Karlyle is better mentally this season because she made a dedication in the summer to the team to get better. It will really be exciting to have both Jania and Mallorie on the court at the same time, while Ashley will help us with our outside game.”

FORWARDS

Sophomores **XENIA STEWART** and **SHAVONTE ZELLOUS** return after starting for Pitt in their freshman seasons. Stewart recorded 113 assists and grabbed 4.8 rebounds a game, while adding 9.7 points a game in her rookie campaign.

Zellous played in all 33 games and recorded 23 starts in her first season. She tallied 5.7 rebounds, averaged 7.7 points and was second on the team in blocked shots with 26.

Another returning letterwinner is senior forward **DANIELLE TAYLOR**, who played in 32 games for Pitt. Taylor paced the team from the charity stripe with an 80 percent clip and snatched 1.7 rebounds per game on the year.

“Any team that is good is going to be strong up the middle,” Berenato noted, “but you also need a surrounding core that is your gel-factor. The wings are hidden, but they are very much impact players.”

POSTS

This season the Panthers not only add depth to this position but they also add height and hustle to their post presence.

The last line of defense in the paint is your center and for the past two seasons, the Panthers have relied on one center to get the job done. And to say the least, that is what **MARCEDES WALKER** has provided. Walker led the team in scoring (16.8), rebounding (9.1) and steals (1.49). The All-BIG EAST first team selection also held a team-leading .493 shooting percentage and blocked 36 shots.

Sophomore **SYLVIE TAFEN** gained experience after playing in 26 games in her freshman debut. She recorded her first career double-double on Dec. 30 with 10 points and 10 rebounds against St. Bonaventure, while averaging 7.6 minutes per game last year.

Incoming freshman **SELENA NWUDE** is sure to be a presence in the paint due to her lengthy 6-foot-5 build. Hailing from Eleanor Roosevelt in Riverdale, Md., she will see action at the center position. Nwude was ranked second among centers by Scout.com and is a two-time all-county honoree. She was nominated for the D.C. Metropolitan Area Player of the Year as a senior and averaged 16 points, 12 rebounds and nine blocks a game.

“Our posts are the work horses,” Berenato noted. “They have the job of cleaning up any mistakes that the guards may make. Sylvie has become physically stronger and now all she has to do is put it all together to eliminate small mental errors. Selena is going to have a strong presence. She has the ability to change player’s shots because she is so big and she will help in putting back missed shots.”

With Pitt’s success on the court last season, they also took note of the success in the classroom and want to make sure that that aspect of being a student-athlete isn’t lost. One of the team’s biggest goals for this season is to graduate and keep their academics first, despite any of their other goals for the year.

“I am big on academics,” Berenato said. “On the road we make sure there is time for it just as we would at home. It is very important to me that these student-athletes be winners in the classroom as well as on the court.”

The goal is the NCAA Tournament for this young, but experienced squad. The path has been paved for Pitt history to be made at the Petersen Events Center in March. With the personnel and the drive of the 2006-07 Panthers, Berenato plans on dancing.

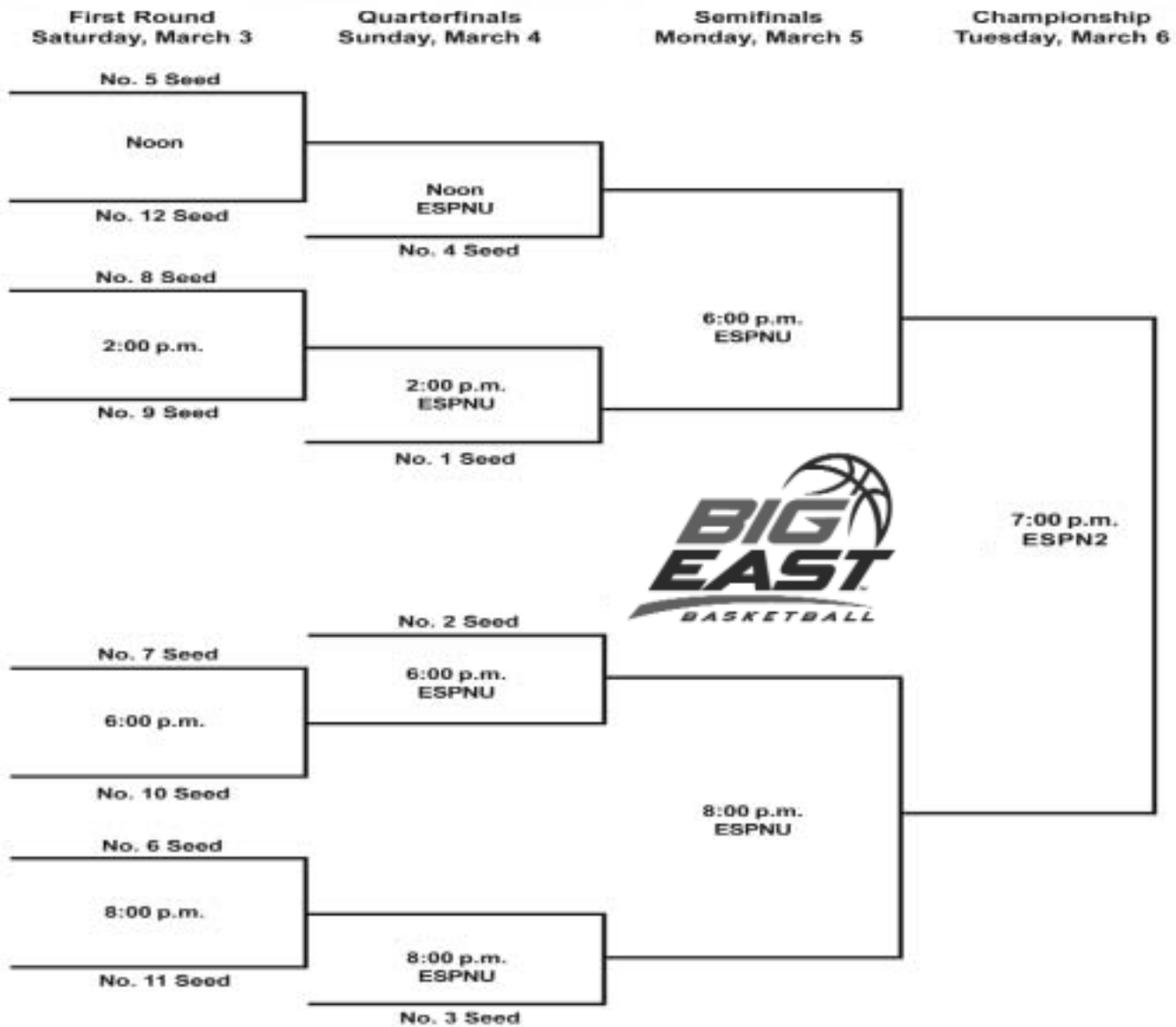

BURLINGTON, VT. – Sophomore Mercedes Walker led four players in double figures as Pitt won its season-opener, 76-49, and advanced to the championship game of the TD Banknorth Classic held at the University of Vermont.

Walker led all scorers with 26 points and grabbed eight rebounds. Also scoring in double figures were freshman Xenia Stewart with 16 points and eight rebounds, junior Mallorie Winn with 14 points and five assists and freshman Maddy Brown, who had 10 points.

The second half of the game started out slow as both teams scored a combined three points in the first four minutes of action. The crowd grew excited as Walker sent a pass over her shoulder that found senior Cheron Taylor cutting from the high post to the opposite block to give Pitt its first basket of the half and a 41-32 lead with 16:47 left to play.

Freshman Shavonte Zellous connected on a pair of free throws to extend Pitt's lead to 17, 51-34, with under 12 minutes remaining. The tempo of the game was slowed again as both teams entered the bonus ten minutes into the second period. William and Mary made 13 of its 20 opportunities from the charity stripe, while Pitt converted on 18 second-half chances.

At the 5:08 mark, Taylor grabbed one of her team-leading eight rebounds and drew a foul, sending her to the line for two to make it a 19-point game. Following a timeout the Panthers caused a Tribe turnover, where Walker led the break. Walker passed the ball ahead to Stewart, who dished back to Walker for the lay-up. Pitt went ahead 69-47 with 4:03 left to play.

The first half included four lead changes and three ties. Following a Pittsburgh timeout, the Panthers jumped up by four at 20-16 with baskets from Brown and Winn at the 9:32 mark. The Tribe's Lizzie Schiel connected on a three-pointer on the other end to cut Pitt's lead to one but the Panthers held on to the advantage. Brown's three-pointer near the end of the half gave Pitt a 38-30 lead at the break.

BURLINGTON, VT. – Pitt was led by its captains — senior Cheron Taylor, junior Mallorie Winn and sophomore Mercedes Walker — to the TD Banknorth Classic title with a 70-49 win over Vermont in front of a crowd of 1,048 fans at Patrick Gym on Vermont's campus. Winn was named the tournament MVP and was joined by Walker on the All-Tournament team.

Winn scored 18 points, dished out five assists and recorded five rebounds in the game, while Walker added 13 points and grabbed six boards. Taylor grabbed a game-high 14 rebounds and scored eight points in the contest.

Vermont opened the second half with a 14-4 run and cut Pitt's 16-point halftime lead in half by the 15:51 mark with a basket from Chrissy Battram.

Gaining momentum, Walker stole the ball from the Catamounts after a missed three-point attempt by Winn. Walker passed the ball back to Winn, who penetrated to draw a double-team and completed the give-and-go back to Walker for a 40-30 lead with 14:48 left to play.

A jumper from Alexis Castro would bring the Cats within seven, 40-33, but that was as close as Vermont would get as the Panthers would rally with a 12-0 run over the next three minutes of action.

At the 12:24 mark, Pitt went up 11 points after freshman Shavonte Zellous stole the ball from Vermont, allowing Winn to score a fast-break basket. Zellous finished the game with nine points, five rebounds and three assists.

Freshman Maddy Brown gave Pitt a 19-point lead after being fouled while attempting a shot from the left corner. Brown stepped to the line and connected on all three free throws for three of her 12 points.

A turnaround baseline jumper by Danielle Taylor at the 1:19 mark gave the Panthers their largest lead of the night at 22, 69-47.

Walker scored the first five points of the game on a lay-up, a free throw and a 10-foot jumper. Following two pull-up jumpers by Winn, Pitt was able to take an early 18-9 lead on the host Catamounts.

Stewart, making her third start, shot 7-of-10 from the field and 6-of-8 from the charity stripe, while grabbing five rebounds in the game.

As a team the Panthers shot 69 percent from behind the arc. In the first half, Pitt was a perfect 6-of-6 from downtown and both junior Mallorie Winn and freshman Maddy Brown were 3-of-4 on the three-ball for the evening.

PITTSBURGH – The Panthers' women's basketball team ended a five-game losing streak to crosstown rival Duquesne at the Petersen Events Center, downing the Dukes 82-69 to improve to 5-1 on the season.

Freshman Maddy Brown led four Pitt players in double figures with a season-best 21 points on 7-of-12 shooting. Brown connected on five of her eight three-point attempts and chipped in three rebounds and three assists in 27 minutes of action.

Center Mercedes Walker posted her first double-double of the season and the 10th of her career, pouring in 19 points to go along with 11 rebounds. Pitt led by just three at the half, 38-35, but pulled away in the second frame for the 13-point victory. It was Pitt's first win over Duquesne (2-3) since a 62-57 overtime victory on Jan. 1, 2000, at the Fitzgerald Field House.

The teams started out trading early baskets as the Dukes had a 5-4 advantage, but a 7-0 run by the Panthers over the next minute pushed Pitt in front. Duquesne came right back with a 12-2 run of its own, including two three-pointers by Aiga Bautre, who finished with 11 points. The back-and-forth affair continued as the Panthers scored the next 10 points to take a 23-17 lead.

An 8-2 run by Duquesne followed to tie it up at 25-25, but a three-pointer by Mallorie Winn with 4:41 to go in the first half gave the Panthers the lead it would not relinquish.

Loui Hall scored the first basket of the second half for the Dukes to cut the Pitt lead to one point but that's as close as the visitors would come. The Panthers scored the next nine points, getting five from Brown during the run. Another three-pointer by Brown pushed the lead into double digits at 50-39 and Pitt went up by as many as 21 with just over three minutes remaining.

Hall led the Dukes with 19 points on 7-of-10 shooting, and added seven rebounds. Winn finished with 13 points, six rebounds and a career-high seven assists in 35 minutes without a turnover, while Xenia Stewart tallied 12 points, seven rebounds and four assists in the win.

NOTES: The Dukes outshot the Panthers, hitting 48.2 percent of their shots against just 41.2 percent for Pitt...Pitt scored 23 points off of 17 Duquesne turnovers, while committing a school-record-low seven giveaways against the Dukes' defense...the Panthers hit 50 percent of their three-point attempts for the second time this season (9-of-13 for 69.2 percent vs. Akron)...Pitt is now 16-8 vs. Duquesne and 10-2 at home against the Dukes.

UNIVERSITY PARK, PA. – The Pitt women's basketball team lost for the first time away from the Petersen Events Center and for just the second time in seven games overall this season, dropping a 69-60 decision at Penn State.

The Panthers (5-2) trailed by only three points at halftime by a 28-25 count, but Penn State (2-3) got hot in the second half, hitting on 56.5 percent of its shots to pull away for the nine-point victory.

Junior guard Mallorie Winn had a career-high 22 points to lead all players, hitting 7 of her 12 field goal attempts, including 3-of-7 on three-pointers. Winn also made five of her six free-throw attempts as the only Pitt player to record double figures in scoring.

Sophomore Mercedes Walker and freshman Xenia Stewart had nine points apiece, while Stewart led the Panthers with seven rebounds.

Amanda Brown led three Nittany Lions in double figures with 17 points, followed by Kamela Gissendanner's 15 and Adrienne Squire's 14 points. Brown also led the Lady Lions with seven boards.

Penn State jumped on the Panthers early, scoring the game's first nine points before a lay-up by Walker put Pitt on the board over five minutes into the first half. That basket triggered an 8-2 run by the Panthers that cut the Lady Lion lead to three points at 11-8. Penn State went on a 9-2 run of its own to extend that lead to double digits but the Panthers kept clawing back with timely steals and perimeter shooting by Winn, closing the gap to one point at 26-25 on a jump shot by the Georgia Tech transfer.

The Nittany Lions opened the second half on a 14-4 run to make it a 13-point game at 42-29, but the Panthers didn't go away, chipping away at the Lady Lion lead until it was six points at 49-43. That was as close as the Panthers would get, however, as the teams traded baskets the rest of the way.

NOTES: Pitt shot 80 percent from the free-throw line (16-of-20), while the Lady Lions made 75 percent from the charity stripe (21-of-28)...the Panthers made just one-third of their shots from the field (20-of-60) and Penn State finished at 48.8 percent.

MOON TOWNSHIP, PA. – Halfway through the first frame of Pitt women's basketball game at Robert Morris, the host Colonials held a 13-6 advantage but things changed quickly and drastically as the Panthers scored 60 of the game's final 83 points for a 66-36 victory.

The Panthers (6-2) improved to 23-0 against Robert Morris (3-3), forcing 20 RMU turnovers and shooting 58.3 percent on three-pointers, the third time in eight games Pitt made at least half of its attempts from beyond the arc.

Freshman Maddy Brown led the Panthers with 16 points on 6-of-11 shooting, including a 3-of-5 performance on three-pointers. Brown also had five rebounds in just 24 minutes of action. Junior point guard Mallorie Winn made five of her eight field-goal attempts and all three of her 3-pointers for 15 points, two rebounds and three assists.

Also scoring in double-figures for the Panthers was freshman guard Shavonte Zellous, with 12 points, a team-high eight rebounds, as well as a team-best four assists, two blocks and two steals. All of those were season-bests for the redshirt.

After Pitt's Cheron Taylor opened the scoring just 11 seconds in, Robert Morris went on a 13-4 run to take a seven-point lead. DeSheyna Perry had nine of RMU's first 13 points and finished with a game-high 18 points.

An 8-0 run by the Panthers included a three-point play by Xenia Stewart and a three-pointer by Winn to give Pitt the lead again at 14-13. Another three-pointer by Perry put the Colonials back on top but Pitt responded again — this time with a 14-0 run, including seven straight points by Brown. Pitt closed the first half with a 10-point lead at 30-20.

The second half was more of the same as the Panthers started on a 17-6 run over the first 10 minutes and finished the second half by outscoring Robert Morris, 36-16, to account for the 30-point victory.

The Colonials' 36 points were the lowest allowed by Pitt in nearly five years — a 77-34 win over Maryland-Eastern Shore in December 2000.

NOTES: The Panthers' 6-2 start is their second consecutive, matching the team's second-best start of all-time...Pitt shot 57 percent from the floor in the first half and finished the game with a 44 percent clip...the Panthers held Robert Morris to just 14-of-53 shooting (26.4 percent) and 3-of-24 from beyond the 3-point line (12.5 percent).

PITTSBURGH – The Big East opener for the Pitt women's basketball team was a tale of two halves but an overpowering first-half display by the Panthers pushed them to a 67-55 victory over the Syracuse Orange at Petersen Events Center.

The Panthers (7-2, 1-0 Big East) never trailed in the game after scoring 21 of the first 25 points in the first 6:24. Syracuse (4-3, 0-1) would get as close as 10 points twice but never threatened the Pitt defense. It was Pitt's second consecutive Big East-opening victory over the Orange.

Pitt's top two scorers, sophomore Mercedes Walker and junior Mallorie Winn scored nearly half of the Panthers' 67 points, combining for 33 on 14-of-28 shooting. Winn had a team-high 17 points to go along with four rebounds and four assists, while Walker tallied 16 points and nine rebounds with three assists and two steals.

The nation's third-leading scorer, Syracuse's Vaida Sipaviciute, did pour in a game-high 22 points, but she had just four at halftime as the Panthers built a 43-23 lead.

Walker and Winn made their presence known during the opening 21-4 run, along with senior forward Cheron Taylor. Winn had nine of those 21 points, while Taylor scored six and Walker four, forcing two Syracuse timeouts. The Orange did cut it to 21-9 right after the second timeout but the Panthers kept coming with a 12-4 run to make it a 20-point game. Walker and Vika Sholokhova had four points apiece during that run. The teams traded baskets for the final five minutes of the half as Pitt kept its 20-point advantage.

That back-and-forth affair continued for the first 14 minutes of the second half as Pitt still had a 20-point lead with 6:10 remaining at 61-41. The Orange did close with a 14-6 run but the Panthers held on for the win.

Pitt dominated on the boards with a season-high 51 rebounds against the Orange's 30. Taylor had a game-high 10 boards to go along with eight points in 30 minutes of action. Freshmen Xenia Stewart and Shavonte Zellous combined for 12 points and 17 more rebounds as Pitt was able to control the tempo of the game with the advantage on the glass.

It was the second straight game in which Winn and Walker both tallied 20 or more points.

For Winn, the victory was extra special as she returned to her hometown of San Diego. Walker’s 20-point effort was also extra special, as it included her first career three-pointer towards the end of the contest.

The Panthers led from start to finish, scoring the game’s first eight points over the first three and a half minutes. Winn and Walker had baskets and Pitt got two field goals from freshman Xenia Stewart, who scored 17 points and pulled down seven rebounds.

The Aztecs (2-6) went on a 9-4 run to close the gap to three points at 12-9 with 12:23 remaining in the first half. That was the closest San Diego State would get, though, as Pitt scored eight of the next 10 points and built a 16-point halftime advantage at 36-20.

Winn had 16 of her 22 points in the first frame, including two three-pointers, while Walker poured in six points and had eight boards at the break. The second half was more of the same for Pitt as they kept the Aztecs at bay, leading by no less than 13 and finishing with a 22-point win. The double-double was Walker’s second of the season and 11th of her career, as she finished 8-of-18 from the field. She had half of Pitt’s season-best 12 steals as well.

Freshman Maddy Brown came off the bench to score seven points, pull down six rebounds (five offensive) and five assists in just 17 minutes of action. San Diego State was led by Michelle Strawberry, who had 16 points and five rebounds, and Desiree Johnson, who scored 10 before fouling out.

NOTES: Pitt outrebounded the Aztecs by a 45-27 count...the Panthers shot 44.6 percent from the field and made 5-of-9 shots on three-pointers...the win improves Pitt’s record to 3-5 in games played in the state of California.

PITTSBURGH – Four Pitt players scored in double figures as the Panthers' women's basketball team won its fifth straight game, a 68-55 decision over visiting St. Bonaventure at the Petersen Events Center.

The Panthers earned their 10th win before the turn of the calendar year for the first time in the 32-year history of the program by defeating the Bonnies (6-5). Sophomore center Mercedes Walker led all scorers with 18 points on 8-of-16 shooting, and added eight rebounds and a career-high-tying four blocks.

The Bonnies led by one point on three occasions in the first half, the last coming with 4:52 remaining on a free throw by Ashley Edwards to give St. Bonaventure a 25-24 advantage. Two free throws by Xenia Stewart and a lay-up by freshman Sylvie Tafen put the Panthers up three, igniting a 13-4 run to close the half for Pitt.

Tafen had eight points and seven rebounds at the break, already eclipsing her season high in both categories, and finished with her first career double-double with 10 points and 10 rebounds. The second half began as the first ended with Pitt making key baskets and forcing the Bonnies into bad shots. The Panthers scored 15 of the first 19 second-half points to complete a 28-8 run and build a 19-point lead.

St. Bonaventure was able to close the gap to 11 points on two occasions down the stretch but the Panthers' defense kept the Bonnies shooting from long distance. For the game, St. Bonaventure made just 5 of its Petersen Events Center-record 28 three-point attempts.

Stewart made six of her 11 shots and added four free throws for 16 points, eight rebounds, three assists and two of the Panthers' season-best nine blocks. Junior guard Mallorie Winn was also in double figures with 13 points, a career-high-tying seven rebounds, four assists and a block. Senior Cheron Taylor also had a solid game in the post with seven points, three steals and eight of Pitt's 52 rebounds.

NOTES: The Panthers finished their non-conference schedule with a 9-2 record, matching the team's best mark in 1999-2000...Pitt held the Bonnies to just 28.6 percent from the field and 17.9 percent from three-point territory...Pitt's five wins at the Petersen Events Center this season match the combined win total at home for the prior two seasons.

CHICAGO – Pitt's women's basketball team gave No. 11 DePaul and its 30-game home winning streak a scare but dropped a close 81-75 decision to the Blue Demons at the DePaul Athletic Center in Chicago.

The Panthers (10-3, 1-1 Big East) had their five-game winning streak snapped but stayed close to the Blue Demons (14-1, 1-1) the entire game, even leading by as many as five points in the second half.

The teams started on fire from the field as Pitt and DePaul traded baskets throughout the first half. Pitt led for the majority of the first frame but the Blue Demons used jump shots from Allie Quigley and the inside game of Khara Smith to take a three-point lead. With time running out, Pitt junior Mallorie Winn hit a running three-pointer at the buzzer to tie the contest at 47-47 heading into the break.

The Panthers were able to stop the potent Blue Demon offense for a period during the beginning of the second half but just couldn't keep Smith away from the basket and Quigley from hurting them from the outside.

Smith had a game-high 29 points on 12-of-19 shooting and added 14 rebounds in 36 minutes of action. Quigley made 11-of-23 shots, including two three-pointers, for 26 points and five assists.

Four Panthers ended up in double figures, led by sophomore Mercedes Walker and freshman Maddy Brown. Walker had 18 points and a team-high eight rebounds in a career-high 35 minutes of action, while Brown came off the bench to score 18 points, including four three-pointers.

PITTSBURGH – There was little doubt in any of Pitt’s players or coaches’ minds that Mallorie Winn was going to take the shot with the clock winding down and the game tied. Winn’s jumper with three seconds remaining rattled around the rim before falling through and giving Pitt a 66-64 win over visiting USF.

Winn had a team-high 21 points, including a 4-of-6 performance from the three-point line, but it was her shot from inside the free-throw line that was the difference.

“We practice that play a lot, either with 12 seconds left on the clock, or 10 seconds or five,” Winn said. “I didn’t have time to think about the shot. I just knew I had to go down the court and make one.”

The Panthers (11-3, 2-1 Big East) trailed by five at halftime but outscored the Bulls (11-4, 1-1) by seven in the second half to get the win. USF lost for the first time this season in 11 games when it had a halftime lead.

Sophomore center Mercedes Walker posted her third double-double of the season and the 12th of her career, with 19 points on 9-of-14 shooting, and 10 rebounds. Winn and Walker combined to score 40 of the Panthers’ 66 points. USF forward Jessica Dickson, the nation’s leading scorer, did tally a game-high 24 points but was forced into seven turnovers by the Pitt defense, namely freshman Xenia Stewart.

It was a very close game throughout, but neither team gained more than a four-point advantage until Dickson connected on a three-pointer to give the Bulls a 25-19 advantage with 3:05 remaining in the first half. The Panthers closed the gap to one point on a three-pointer by Winn and two free throws by Shavonte Zellous. Zellous finished with a season-best 10 rebounds.

USF had its biggest lead of the game a little under two minutes into the second half at 33-27 after a three-point play by Dickson but the Panthers chipped away until they tied it at 41-41 on a three-pointer by Maddy Brown. With 11:23 left in the contest, junior Danielle Taylor hit a jumper to give the Panthers a 45-43 lead. The Panthers were able to maintain the lead for the final minutes, pushing the advantage to five at 64-59 with 1:56 to go on a lay-up by Walker.

After Dickson made two free throws to cut the lead to three, Shantia Grace added three from the charity stripe in the final minute to tie the game with 17 seconds. The ball was inbounded to Winn, who brought the ball up the court the entire way and connected for the winning shot.

NOTES: The Panthers outrebounded the Bulls, 44-29, and connected on 43.1 percent of their shots, including a 50 percent clip from three-point land...the Panthers’ 11-3 record matches their best after 14 games since the 1980-81 season (12-2).

PITTSBURGH – Sophomore Mercedes Walker and junior Mallorie Winn combined for 44 points to lead Pitt to a 75-65 victory over Providence in front of 3,385 fans at the Petersen Events Center.

The Panthers (12-4, 3-2 Big East) won for the seventh time in eight home games and remained unbeaten in conference home games at 3-0 with the 10-point victory over the Friars (6-9, 1-3 Big East).

Marandola led the Friars with 14 points on 5-of-6 shooting, while Shauna Snyder poured in 13 points and Shantee Darrian added 11 in the loss. Pitt forced 22 Providence turnovers while recording a season-best 21 assists against just 13 giveaways.

Freshman Xenia Stewart played a game-high 37 minutes, scoring nine points with seven rebounds and a season-high nine assists. The nine helpers were the most by any Pitt player this season. Another of Pitt's newcomers, Maddy Brown, scored 11 points and had a season-best four steals.

MILWAUKEE, WIS. – Foul trouble kept the Pitt women's basketball team from making a run at host Marquette, and dropped a 71-62 decision at the Al McGuire Center in Milwaukee.

The Panthers (12-5, 3-3 Big East) trailed by only four points at halftime but picked up several early fouls in the second half and lost starters Cheron Taylor and Mallorie Winn with five apiece before it was over.

Marquette (12-4, 3-2 Big East) had four players in double figures, led by Jasmine McCullough's 14 points. As a team, the Golden Eagles shot 55 percent from the floor, the first time in 17 games this season Pitt allowed a team to shoot higher than 50 percent. Krystal Ellis had 13 points for the Golden Eagles, while Carolyn Kieger added 10 points and a game-high nine assists.

Sophomore center Mercedes Walker had a game-high 22 points for the Panthers on 9-of-16 shooting, and added 12 rebounds for her second consecutive double-double. Winn had 14 points, four rebounds and three assists before fouling out, while Xenia Stewart finished with 13 points, three rebounds and a team-best four assists.

Both teams were finding success from the floor in the early going, trading baskets throughout the first 10 minutes. After Ellis hit a free throw to finish a three-point play and put Marquette up 13-11 with 12:50 remaining in the first half, Pitt went on a 10-3 run over the next three minutes to take a five-point lead. Winn had two three-pointers during the run and eight of the 10 points.

Marquette countered with an 17-2 run, holding the Panthers scoreless for a stretch of over six minutes to regain a 10-point lead. Pitt was able to get late baskets from Walker and Stewart to close the gap to four at the break.

The Panthers closed it to one point on two occasions, the second on a tip-in by Walker with 18:48 left in the game. Another 8-0 run by the Golden Eagles over the next 3:33 made it tough for the Panthers to get back in the game and the closest they would get was four points with 11:21 left after a lay-up by Danielle Taylor.

The foul trouble kept Marquette at the free-throw line, making 27 trips in the second half and the Golden Eagles converted on 21 of them to finish with the nine-point victory.

PITTSBURGH – Pitt head women’s basketball coach Agnus Berenato is not a believer in moral victories, but considered the 65-54 loss to No. 5 Connecticut at the Petersen Events Center another step in the right direction.

Pitt (12-6, 3-4 Big East) trailed by just three at halftime and stayed close throughout most of the second half before falling by 11 points to the Huskies (17-2, 6-0 Big East). It was UConn’s 20th consecutive win over the Panthers, dating back to Feb. 24, 1993, but the winning margin was the smallest in that span.

“We didn’t lose this game from lack of effort,” Berenato said. “I give credit to Connecticut because they are a top-notch program. But I am proud of our team and our effort.”

The Panthers had a season-high 54 rebounds, including 31 on the offensive glass — the highest total in a single game by the Panthers in over a decade. Senior Cheron Taylor pulled down 10 offensive rebounds by halftime and finished with a season-high-tying 14 boards, while Mercedes Walker also posted a season-high total in rebounds with 15, scoring 12 points for a double-double.

Mel Thomas led the Huskies with 21 points on 6-of-9 shooting, including five three-pointers. Ann Strother added 14 points and five rebounds, while Brittany Hunter came off the bench to post 11 points, seven rebounds and four blocks.

A three-pointer by Maddy Brown just 3:53 into the game gave Pitt its last lead at 5-2. Strother countered with a three-pointer for UConn and another three-pointer by Thomas gave UConn its first lead at 8-5. The Panthers fought back to tie the game at 12-12 with 9:06 remaining in the first half but the Huskies regained the advantage and never lost it.

Down 26-23 at the break, Pitt battled to within two points three minutes into the second frame on a jumper by Xenia Stewart. UConn went on a 20-10 run over the next six and a half minutes to open up its largest lead at 12 points and the Panthers got no closer than seven the rest of the way.

Mallorie Winn scored all 11 of her points in the second half, coming off the bench for the first time this season. Freshman Shavonte Zellous also finished with 11 points, recording six rebounds and two blocks in 30 minutes of action.

NOTES: Pitt finished with a 25.7 percent conversion rate, making just 18-of-70 shots...UConn made 44 percent of its shots (22-of-50)...each team had 23 defensive rebounds but the Panthers outworked the Huskies on the offensive glass by a 31-9 margin...the win was Connecticut’s 33rd in the past 35 meetings between the schools, dating back to 1986.

VILLANOVA, PA. – In her return home to the Philadelphia area, sophomore Mercedes Walker scored 14 of her 17 points in the second half to lead Pitt to a comeback victory over host Villanova at The Pavilion.

Walker was 8-of-10 from the free-throw line in the second half and added three key baskets to finish with 17 points in just 17 minutes of action. Walker actually came off the bench for the first time in her 45-game career. She added six rebounds and a steal as Pitt erased a three-point halftime deficit.

Junior guard Mallorie Winn was also a big part of the Panthers’ comeback, scoring 14 of her game-high 20 points in the final 20 minutes. Winn also had a career-best nine rebounds in 38 minutes of action.

Pitt (13-6, 4-4 Big East) led for the early part of the first half, building a 12-8 lead with 10:31 remaining. A 12-2 run by the Wildcats (12-7, 3-5) pushed the host team into the lead, which it held for the remainder of the first half. Pitt closed to within one point on a jumper by Cheron Taylor with 2:48 to go but Villanova led 27-24 at the break.

The second half started out the same way as Walker made a free throw with 15:19 to go to cut the lead to one at 31-30 and Winn tied it with a jumper at 12:51. Villanova was able to regain the lead and had a 44-40 advantage with just over seven minutes remaining.

Pitt went on a 5-0 run to take its first lead since the first half but a three-pointer by Jenna Viani pushed the Wildcats back in front at 47-45 with 5:54 to go. Two baskets by Winn over the next minute traded the lead again and the teams battled back and forth until two free throws by Liad Suez-Karni gave Villanova a four-point lead with 3:04 to go.

Winn again came through for the Panthers with a lay-up at the 2:45 mark and the score remained that way until the final minute. Walker was able to get an offensive rebound and scored on the put-back and was fouled on the play. She made the free throw to give Pitt a 57-56 lead and two more free throws — one by Walker and Winn — gave the Panthers the three-point victory.

Pitt had the advantage in most statistical categories, including a school-record-tying seven turnovers. The Panthers also had seven giveaways in a win over Duquesne earlier this season, and marked the fourth time the team has had 10 turnovers or less in 2005-06.

PITTSBURGH – Four Panthers scored in double figures as the Pitt women's basketball team clinched a winning season for the first time since 1999-2000 with a 79-62 victory against Georgetown. Pitt improved to 14-6 overall and 5-4 in the Big East with the home win.

Mallorie Winn scored 16 of her 20 points in the second half as Pitt broke open a four-point halftime lead into a 17-point win. Winn also added six rebounds and a career-best nine assists against just one turnover in 38 minutes of action.

Georgetown (8-12, 1-8 Big East) stayed close throughout the first half and the first several minutes of the second half but couldn't keep up with the Panthers on the offensive glass. Pitt outrebounded the Hoyas, 45-27, with a 23-8 edge in offensive boards. Sophomore center Mercedes Walker came off the bench for the second straight game and recorded a double-double with 19 points and 11 rebounds. Walker was 8-of-15 from the field and now has 36 points in her past two games with just 44 minutes played.

Freshman Xenia Stewart added 14 points and five rebounds, while Shavonte Zellous played her best game of the season with a season-high-tying 12 points, seven rebounds, and a season-best seven assists to go along with a game-changing block on a 2-on-1 Georgetown break in the second half.

With 7:15 to go in the game and Pitt leading by 12, Zellous retreated as two Hoyas players passed the ball back and forth. Nikki Bozeman went up for a lay-up and was blocked by Zellous, who turned and got the rebound afterward and passed to Winn for a lay-up plus one on a free throw.

The Hoyas also had three players in double figures, led by Kieraah Marlow's double-double (17 points, 10 rebounds) and three blocks. Bethany LeSueur and Kristin Heidloff added 14 points apiece as Georgetown lost its sixth consecutive game.

The Hoyas scored the game's first four points and led for the first 10 minutes until a lay-up by Zellous tied the game at 11-11 with 9:56 to play. Winn followed with a lay-up 28 seconds later, sparking a 20-7 run by the Panthers. Georgetown closed the gap to four points at halftime, making it 33-29 on a three-pointer at the buzzer by Heidloff.

Georgetown pulled to within two with 17:03 remaining in the game on another three-pointer by Heidloff but another 20-7 run by the Panthers sealed the victory. The win pushed Pitt into a fifth-place tie in the Big East with DePaul and USF.

NOTES: The 14 victories surpass last year's final total of 13 wins, which is the team's highest total since 1999-2000 (16-13)...the fifth Big East win also matches last year's final total when the Panthers recorded a 5-11 mark...Pitt shot 45.6 percent (31-of-68), while holding the Hoyas to a 42.3 percent clip (22-of-52).

CINCINNATI, OHIO – For the second time this season, junior Mallorie Winn had the ball with the clock winding down and scored a game-winning bucket, hitting nothing but the net as time expired on a baseline jumper. Winn's basket gave Pitt a 64-63 win over host Cincinnati at the Fifth Third Arena.

The Panthers (15-6, 6-4 Big East) won their third straight Big East game, a feat they had not accomplished since February 1995. For Winn, it was her second last-second winner in less than a month after hitting a jumper with three seconds left to defeat visiting USF on Jan. 8.

The ball was inbounded to Winn off a screen underneath the Bearcats' hoop by Mercedes Walker with 2.1 seconds left and the Panthers trailing by one. Winn faked a shot, took one dribble and connected on the jumper as the horn sounded.

The Bearcats (14-6, 4-5) had erased a 17-point Panther lead in the second half to take the lead with 2:31 to go. Treasure Humphries connected on two free throws to give Cincinnati a 59-58 advantage. With 1:41 to go, senior Cheron Taylor scored on a putback to regain the lead for Pitt.

With a chance to increase the lead, the Bearcats' Shelly Bellman made a key steal and scored two of her game-high 20 points on a lay-up to put Cincinnati back on top, 61-60. Winn brought the ball down the length of the court and made a great bounce pass to Walker, who converted on the lay-up to continue the back-and-forth affair with just 41 seconds remaining on the clock.

Humphries came through again, making a running jumper in the paint, to give the Bearcats a 63-62 lead with 24 seconds left but the Panthers earned a key dual possession that set the stage for Winn with two seconds remaining.

The Panthers led by four at halftime, 30-26, and scored the first 11 points of the second half to take a 15-point lead. That lead was increased to 17 at 51-34 with 10:29 remaining, but a 25-7 run by the Bearcats over the next eight minutes put the victory in doubt.

Walker posted a double-double with 13 points and 12 rebounds, to go along with four blocks in 27 minutes of action. Freshman Maddy Brown came off the bench to provide a spark for the Panthers, scoring 11 of her 13 points in the first half. Brown finished with five rebounds in 29 minutes of action.

But it was Winn who came through in the clutch as she did against USF. She made seven of her 14 field-goal attempts and added six rebounds and six assists against just one turnover in 37 minutes.

NOTES: Pitt's six wins in the Big East this season are the most since going 7-9 in 1999-2000, surpassing last season's five conference wins...the Panthers shot 43.1 percent from the field, while holding the Bearcats to a 40.7 percent clip...Walker scored her 700th career point in the first half.

PITTSBURGH – The Pitt women’s basketball team pulled down a season-best 58 rebounds, including 31 on the offensive glass, but couldn’t make enough of its shots and dropped a 71-63 decision at home to Louisville.

The Panthers (15-7, 6-5 Big East) had their three-game winning streak snapped after being up by three at halftime — only the second time in 15 games this season that Pitt lost a game it led at the break. The Cardinals (15-6, 6-4) shot 46.4 percent from the field and made 17 free throws compared to the Panthers’ six for the difference in the game.

The Panthers’ domination on the boards wasn’t enough to counter Louisville making open shots throughout the second half. Senior Cheron Taylor had a career-best 18 rebounds to go along with eight points and two assists in 36 minutes of action for the Panthers.

Helping her out on the glass was freshman Xenia Stewart with her first career double-double. Stewart had a team-best 14 points to go along with 12 rebounds, 10 of which came on the offensive glass. Mercedes Walker recorded her fifth double-double in the past six games and eighth of the season with 13 points and 10 rebounds, including nine offensive boards.

Louisville started hot and went out to a 19-10 lead, thanks to nine points from Katie Olson, who finished with 16 on a perfect 7-of-7 performance from the field. The Panthers went on a 15-4 run, however, to take their first lead of the game at 25-23, with Stewart and Winn making key baskets. Pitt was able to hold on to the lead at the break with a three-point 34-31 advantage.

The Panthers pushed their lead to five points twice early in the second half, but a 12-4 run by the Cardinals pushed the game back in their favor at 45-42 after a lay-up plus one by Jazz Covington, who finished with 14 points, nine rebounds and two assists.

Pitt closed it to one twice, the second coming at 49-48 with 10:05 to go in the game on a lay-up by Winn. A 9-2 run by the Cardinals, however, ended any chance for the Panthers to get any closer or knot the score. Connie Neal scored 15 of her game-high 17 points in the second half and the Cardinals finished with the eight-point win.

Winn finished with 13 points, two rebounds and three assists for the Panthers, while guard Karlyle Lim played an inspired season-best 21 minutes with six points, four rebounds, three assists and solid defense.

NOTES: Pitt took a season-high 81 shots, but made just 28 for a 34.6 percent clip...the Panthers committed just 12 turnovers after coming into the game among the nation’s best at 13.6 per contest...the Cardinals had just eight turnovers with 20 assists on 26 field goals made.

TAMPA, FLA. – The Feb. 11 victory at USF for the Pitt women’s basketball team must have seemed like deja vu to the host Bulls. Back on Jan. 8, junior Mallorie Winn made a jumper with 3.1 seconds remaining to defeat the Bulls at the Petersen Events Center. This time, there was a little more time on the clock but Winn made her third game-winning shot in Big East play, this time from the top of the key with four seconds left to give Pitt a 60-58 win at the USF Sun Dome.

The Panthers trailed throughout most of the game and never led in the second half until Winn made her second game-winning basket in as many Saturdays. In both games against USF this season, the Bulls had a five-point halftime lead, this time up 35-30 after the first 20 minutes.

Winn had nine points and a game-high eight assists in 36 minutes of action, but it was the play of sophomore center Mercedes Walker that gave the Panthers a chance at the comeback win.

Walker scored a game-high 23 points on 11-of-19 shooting, and pulled down 16 rebounds for her fourth consecutive double-double and her ninth of the season, while playing just 29 minutes. Fourteen of her points came in the second half on seven field goals.

USF had its biggest second-half lead with 8:01 remaining at 55-46, but the Panthers scored 14 of the game’s final 17 points to earn the win. Two short jumpers by Walker got the run going for Pitt, cutting the lead to five with 7:02 remaining. After the nation’s leading scorer, USF’s Jessica Dickson, nailed an off-balance jumper to make it a seven-point game again, Walker connected on yet another shot to make it 57-52 with 3:48 to go.

Two free throws by freshman Xenia Stewart with 3:27 left made it a three-point game and Walker scored another two points on a lay-up with 2:49 to go to cut the USF lead to 57-56.

Walker continued her dominance down low with a great pass from Winn to tie the game on a lay-up with 51 seconds on the clock. And then Winn’s jumper with four seconds remaining continued the Panthers’ strong run on the road as of late.

The three straight Big East road wins are the first time Pitt accomplished that feat since the 1993-94 season, while matching its best season in over a decade with its 16th overall and seventh conference victory.

Stewart and Maddy Brown had eight points apiece for the Panthers, while USF’s Shantia Grace scored 14 of her 16 points for the Bulls in the first half before getting into foul trouble.

The Bulls shot just 23 percent in the second frame and finished the game at a 36 percent clip. Pitt was able to up its second-half shooting percentage to almost 45 percent and finished making 43 percent of its shots for the contest.

NOTES: Sophomore Karlyle Lim earned her first start in almost a year, replacing Shavonte Zellous in the starting five...Lim finished with five points on 2-of-2 shooting, including a key three-pointer in the second half.

PITTSBURGH – This time it was a pass by Mallorie Winn to freshman Shavonte Zellous that led to the Panthers' women's basketball team winning a 58-56 thriller over visiting Seton Hall at the Petersen Events Center.

Zellous hit a jumper with 1.2 seconds left to break a tie and lead the Panthers (17-7, 8-5 Big East) to their third last-second victory in the past 11 days and fourth of the season. It also marked just the seventh time in the program's 32-year history that the Panthers have won at least 17 games in a season.

Winn had made the Panthers' previous three game-winners and struggled offensively throughout the game, but made the key pass when she needed to, finishing with eight points and four assists.

It appeared that Pitt would be able to establish a big lead against the Pirates (6-18, 3-10 Big East) by scoring 11 of the game's first 13 points. After a timeout by Seton Hall, the Pirates went on a 17-8 run to tie the game at 19-19 with 7:32 remaining in the first half. Pitt was able to regain the lead on a jumper and two free throws by Zellous and held that lead into the break at 32-27.

The Panthers extended their advantage to 10 points on two occasions early in the second half, the second at 43-33 with 15:44 to go. The Pirates would not go away, however, and went on a 16-4 run over the next eight minutes to take their first lead of the game at 49-47. After two free throws by Cheron Taylor tied the game again with 7:23 left, Zellous pushed Pitt back in the lead with two free throws of her own less than a minute later.

Pitt held that two-point lead over the last six minutes until a jumper by Shantel Brown tied it at 56-56 with just 24 seconds remaining. Winn brought the ball up the court for Pitt and the Pirates put two players on her as she made her way toward the free-throw line. That was when she tossed a low pass over to Zellous, who provided the final fireworks with her jumper.

Zellous finished with a career-best 13 points and added eight rebounds and three assists in 35 minutes of action. Mercedes Walker scored 13 of her 17 points in the first half, and finished with seven rebounds and two blocks. Freshman Xenia Stewart was also in double figures with 11 points on 5-of-7 shooting.

Seton Hall got a game-high 18 points from Monique Blake, who also finished with seven rebounds and two blocks. Brown added 16 points, while Washington, Pa., native Amber Harris chipped in 10 points on 5-of-6 shooting.

NOTES: The game was broadcast nationally on College Sports Television (CSTV) with Ann Schatz (play-by-play) and Debbie Antonelli (color analyst) calling the action...Pitt outshot Seton Hall, 42 percent to 39 percent, and committed just 11 turnovers against the Pirates...Taylor finished with seven points and a game-high nine rebounds.

MORGANTOWN, W.VA. – En route to an 18th victory for just the fifth time in the program's 32-year history, the Pitt women's basketball ended a 10-game losing streak at the WVU Coliseum that dated back 25 years. Pitt downed the host Mountaineers, 62-58, to move into a third-place tie in the Big East.

The Panthers (18-7, 9-5) won for the sixth time in their last seven games, for the fourth consecutive time on the road, for the first time against WVU since the 2002-03 season and for the first time at the WVU Coliseum since Jan. 14, 1981.

The Panthers led by eight at halftime and by as many as 16 points early in the second half before the Mountaineers (12-12, 4-9) went on a 27-11 run to tie the game at 56-56 with just 1:40 to play. Two free throws by senior Cheron Taylor and four by freshman Shavonte Zellous in the last 100 seconds enabled Pitt to hold on for the four-point win.

Zellous scored 11 points with a perfect 9-of-9 performance from the free-throw line in the second half, giving her a 14-of-15 week from the charity stripe in the Panthers' two wins. The Panthers shot 83.3 percent from the free-throw line as a team, making 20 of their 24 attempts for their second-best conversion rate this season.

West Virginia outshot and outrebounded the Panthers, but only led for 1:10 in the early stages of the first half. Down 9-6, the Panthers regained the lead at 10-9 and extended it to eight points at 32-24 going into the break.

The Panthers opened the second half on a 13-5 run to make it a 45-29 game with 15:27 left but the Mountaineers chipped away at the lead until they tied it with less than two minutes remaining. Pitt was able to make 66.7 percent of its first-half field-goal attempts (12-of-18) but only converted seven of 26 attempts in the second half (26.9 percent). For the game, West Virginia shot 47.2 percent and had 31 rebounds to the Panthers' 29 but Pitt's ability to drain its free throws extended the team's most successful season in over a decade.

Junior guard Mallorie Winn had a game-high 18 points on 6-of-12 shooting, had two three-pointers, a perfect 4-of-4 day from the free-throw line, four rebounds, two assists, a block and two steals in 34 minutes of action. Sophomore center Mercedes Walker added 17 points and 12 rebounds for her 10th double-double of the season and the 19th of her career. She also tied a career high with four blocks and added two steals as well defensively.

West Virginia was led by Olayinka Sanni's 17 points on 8-of-15 shooting, and Chakhia Cole's 13 points, six rebounds and seven assists, but made just 4-of-9 free-throw attempts and turned the ball over 16 times leading to 21 Pitt points.

NOTES: The loss was West Virginia's fourth in a row...the Mountaineers outscored Pitt in the paint by a 34-14 margin...Pitt's Maddy Brown came off the bench to score eight points on 3-of-4 shooting, including two three-pointers.

Sophomore center Mercedes Walker did all she could for the Panthers (18-8, 9-6 Big East), scoring a game-high 24 points and adding 10 rebounds for her 11th double-double of the year and the 20th of her career.

NOTRE DAME, IND. – The Pitt women's basketball team didn't lose any ground, despite falling 72-65 in its regular-season finale to Notre Dame, finishing sixth in the Big East Conference. It is the highest finish for the Panthers since earning a No. 4 seed in the 1995 postseason conference tournament.

Pitt (18-9, 9-7 Big East) played "its best half of basketball", according to head coach Agnus Berenato, in the first half, taking a 41-31 lead into the break. The Panthers shot 55 percent from the floor in the first 20 minutes with a perfect 16 assists on 16 field goals made.

The Panthers trailed early by a count of 11-8 to the Fighting Irish (17-10, 8-8), who finished in 10th place in the Big East. The Panthers went on a 30-12 run, however, over the next 12 minutes to reverse a three-point deficit into a 15-point lead at 38-23. Freshman Xenia Stewart had seven of the Panthers' 16 assists at the break, while junior Danielle Taylor scored all 10 of her points off the bench to lead Pitt.

The Panthers had an 11-point advantage early in the second half at 44-33, but a 13-1 run by the Fighting Irish made it a new ballgame. The teams battled back and forth with two ties and six lead changes over the next several minutes. A lay-up by Cheron Taylor with 9:34 to go gave the Panthers their last lead at 55-54.

A 6-0 run by Notre Dame gave the Fighting Irish the lead for good and they finished it off with a seven-point win. Lindsay Schrader had a game-high 20 points on 8-of-13 shooting, and added a team-best nine rebounds, to lead four Fighting Irish players in double figures.

Pitt freshman Maddy Brown led the Panthers with 13 points off the bench, making four of her seven three-point attempts, in 23 minutes of action. Mercedes Walker registered her 12th double-double of the season and the 21st of her career with 12 points and a game-high and season-high-tying 18 rebounds. The 12-point effort extended her Big East-best double-figure scoring streak to 19 games.

Cheron Taylor finished with nine points and four rebounds, while Shavonte Zellous had eight points, six rebounds and four assists in 36 minutes of action. Junior guard Mallorie Winn finished with nine points, six rebounds and three assists.

Pitt finished in a four-place tie at 9-7 but owned the tiebreaker with a 3-1 record against USF, Villanova and Marquette — the other teams tied with that record.

NOTES: Notre Dame improved to 16-0 all-time against the Panthers...Pitt outrebounded Notre Dame, 44-38, but trailed in all other statistical categories.

BIG EAST FIRST ROUND - HARTFORD CIVIC CENTER (9,148)

HARTFORD, CONN. – For the first time in a decade, the Pitt women's basketball team didn't make a quick trip home after one game in the Big East Championship tournament. The Panthers downed Cincinnati, 77-62, to advance to the quarterfinals.

The Panthers (19-9, 9-7 Big East) shot 61.2 percent from the floor — the second-best shooting performance by a team in the 24-year history of the tournament, and took another step in securing a berth in the NCAA Championship tournament in a few weeks.

Pitt made 16 of 24 first-half shots, but didn't let up in the second half by making 14 of 25 to finish 30-of-49 in the game. The win ended a seven-game losing streak in the tournament, dating back to 1996, and gave the Panthers 19 victories in a season for just the fifth time in school history.

Four Panthers scored in double figures, led by sophomore center Mercedes Walker and junior guard Mallorie Winn with 21 points apiece. Walker made 9-of-11 shots from the field, added seven rebounds, an assist, two blocks and a steal as the Panthers built an early 25-10 lead and never looked back. Winn was 7-of-12 from the field with three three-pointers, two rebounds, a block, two steals and six assists.

Freshman Shavonte Zellous had her best effort of the season with 17 points on 7-of-9 shooting, six rebounds and three assists while playing 33 minutes. Junior Danielle Taylor also made it into double figures for the second straight game with a season-best-tying 10 points and three rebounds.

Cincinnati (17-11, 7-9 Big East) got a game-high 22 points from Shelly Bellman, who made six three-pointers to keep the Bearcats within striking distance. Michelle Jones and Treasure Humphries added 13 points apiece.

The teams traded early baskets as Walker scored the first eight points of the game for the Panthers. Cincinnati took its final lead of the game on a three-pointer by Bellman but Pitt went on a 19-2 run to take its biggest lead at 15 points.

Cincinnati got as close as six points at 29-23 with 3:52 remaining in the first frame on a pair of free throws by Humphries but Pitt closed the half out on an 8-4 run to take a 37-27 halftime advantage. Bellman kept the Bearcats in it in the second half, scoring nine consecutive points at one point, to close the gap to four at 42-38 but the Panthers wouldn't be denied and advanced to the quarterfinals for the first time since 1996.

NOTES: The Panthers held the Bearcats to just 38.6 percent shooting (22-of-57) for the evening...Walker had seven rebounds to give her 504 for her career, tying her for 13th on the Panthers' all-time list and making her just the 14th Pitt player to record 500 or more rebounds.

HARTFORD, CONN. – The Pitt women's basketball team must now wait and see where its next game will be — in the NCAA Championship for the first time in school history or a fourth trip to the WNIT — after a 69-46 loss to No. 15 DePaul on Sunday evening in the Big East Championship quarterfinals.

The Panthers (19-10) trailed 23-5 early in the contest but battled back to a nine-point halftime deficit at 29-20. An early three-point play in the second half by freshman Xenia Stewart made it a six-point game and momentum was on the Panthers' side but DePaul went on a 29-4 run over the next 11 minutes to close out any chance of a comeback.

Pitt struggled from the floor, one night after recording the second-highest field-goal percentage in a Big East tournament game. The Panthers made just 12-of-47 attempts for a 25.5 percent clip, their lowest of the season and the third time they shot worse than 30 percent in 29 contests. DePaul (25-5) was able to shoot 47 percent from the floor and scored 30 points off of a season-high 23 turnovers by the Panthers.

Junior guard Mallorie Winn led the Panthers with 12 points and tied a career high with nine rebounds against the Blue Demons. Winn also had two assists, a career-high-tying two blocks and a steal in 38 minutes. Also in double figures for the Panthers were freshmen Shavonte Zellous and Stewart with 11 points apiece. Zellous had five rebounds, two blocks and a steal, while Stewart made all seven of her free-throw attempts, three rebounds, three assists and two steals.

DePaul was led by Caprice Smith, with a game-high 17 points including four three-pointers, and Khara Smith's 16 points. As a team, DePaul made 10 of its 23 three-point attempts (43.5 percent), the most against the Panthers this year.

It was the Panthers' first berth in the Big East quarterfinals in a decade and appeared a bit fatigued after Saturday night's first-round 77-62 victory over 11th-seed Cincinnati.

NOTES: Sophomore center Mercedes Walker had her 20-game double-figure scoring-streak snapped...Walker finished with nine points and seven rebounds...DePaul's bench outscored Pitt's by a margin of 31-1 in the game.

PITTSBURGH – For just the fourth time in the program’s 32-year history, the Pitt women’s basketball team has won 20 games in a single season. The Panthers never trailed in a 64-57 victory at the Petersen Events Center over WNIT first-round opponent Delaware.

Pitt (20-10) won a postseason game for the first time since the 1994 NWIT and improved its overall record to 5-3 in four postseason appearances with the win over the Fightin’ Blue Hens (22-8).

Junior guard Mallorie Winn scored a team-high 17 points, 13 of which came in the first half, and finished with eight rebounds, three assists and a block in 39 minutes of action. Junior Danielle Taylor came off the bench to make 5-of-7 shots from the field, and finished with a season-best 12 points to go along with four rebounds.

Melissa Czorniewy led all scorers with 21 points for the Fightin’ Blue Hens, including 15 in the second half. Tyresa Smith passed the 1,000-point plateau in her career for Delaware and finished with a double-double, scoring 15 points and pulling down 13 rebounds.

The Panthers scored the game’s first five points on a lay-up by Mercedes Walker and a three-pointer by Winn and held the lead the rest of the way. Delaware cut it to one point on two occasions early at 5-4 and 7-6 but an 8-0 run by the Panthers, highlighted by three-pointers from Winn and Maddy Brown, pushed Pitt’s lead to nine.

That was the largest lead for the Panthers as Delaware battled to keep the game close for the final 33 minutes but couldn’t get it close enough. A lay-up by Chrissy Fisher pulled the Blue Hens within three early in the second half at 32-29, but two free throws by Xenia Stewart and a lay-up by Walker made it a seven-point game again. Fisher again nailed a key jumper to make it a two-point affair at 43-41 with 8:50 remaining but Winn and Taylor kept Delaware at a manageable distance.

Walker finished with nine points, 10 rebounds and four blocks, while freshman guard Shavonte Zellous scored 11 points for the Panthers, adding four rebounds, three assists and a season-best four blocks. Pitt had a season-high 10 rejections in the contest.

PITTSBURGH – It had been four years since a Pitt basketball game was played at Fitzgerald Field House, and with an 85-76 victory, the Panthers’ women’s basketball team made sure there wouldn’t be that long of a wait again.

The Panthers (21-10) won their WNIT second-round contest over Mississippi (17-14) at the Field House, advancing to the quarterfinals against Virginia.

Junior guard Mallorie Winn led four Panthers in double figures with a career-best 27 points, adding three rebounds and three assists against just one turnover in 39 minutes. Senior Cheron Taylor extended her playing career with just her second double-double of the season, scoring 15 points on 5-of-7 shooting from the field and pulling down 10 boards. Taylor also had a career-best four steals against the Rebels.

Also in double figures for Pitt were Mercedes Walker, with 15 points, five rebounds and two blocks, and freshman Shavonte Zellous, who posted her first career double-double with 11 points, 10 rebounds and tied a season-high with seven assists.

Mississippi did get 26 points, six rebounds and six assists from its top player, Armintie Price, but only led for a total of three minutes in the game as Pitt had its second-best offensive output of the year. The win was also the Panthers’ 21st, tying the second-highest victory total in school history. Pitt won 22 games back in 1980-81.

The game was a closely-contested one throughout the first half. After trading baskets for the first five minutes, Pitt went on a 7-2 run to take a 15-10 lead with 13:27 to go. Five different Panthers scored in the first seven minutes of the game, giving the Rebels fits defensively. Mississippi tied it twice more in the first frame at 19-19 and 21-21 but Pitt closed the half with a 39-35 advantage.

The Rebels battled back quickly in the second half, going on a 14-7 run over the first 5:10 to take their biggest lead at 49-46. A 6-0 run by the Panthers, highlighted by two Walker baskets, regained the lead for the Panthers and they would push that advantage to double-digits with 5:38 remaining before finishing with the nine-point win.

PITTSBURGH – Pitt senior Cheron Taylor has never experienced a season like this, and now only one other set of Pitt teammates can say they have as the Panthers' women's basketball team won its 22nd game of the year at the Fitzgerald Field House.

The Panthers (22-10) defeated visiting Virginia (20-12) by a count of 68-58 in the WNIT quarterfinals to tie the school record for most wins in a season. In the process, Pitt advanced to take on Big East rival Marquette (21-10) in the WNIT semifinals at the Al McGuire Center in Milwaukee.

The Cavaliers battled shooting woes throughout the evening and finished with just a 29 percent clip (20-of-69 from the field). Pitt was able to shoot 42.3 percent, overcoming 19 turnovers to get the victory and earn a rematch with the Golden Eagles. Marquette topped Pitt, 71-62, on Jan. 18 in Milwaukee.

Both teams had trouble at the start finding the net as Virginia had its only lead at 3-2 with 3:10 expired in the first half. A lay-up by Mercedes Walker with 16:23 to go in the first half sparked a 13-0 run by the Panthers over the next five-plus minutes. Walker had eight of her 16 points during the run, while Mallorie Winn chipped in four of her game-high 20 points.

Virginia countered with a 7-0 run of its own to cut the lead to five at 15-10 and eventually got to within two at 21-19 on two free throws by Takisha Granberry. Winn came back, however, with a three-pointer and a lay-up over the final three minutes as Pitt took a 28-19 lead into the break.

A 10-5 run to open the second half by the Panthers pushed the advantage to 14 points at 38-24 with 13:44 remaining but another 10-2 run by the Cavaliers closed that gap to six. Walker was too much inside, making key baskets and finding Taylor for two easy lay-ups to extend the lead once again. Virginia was as close as three points at 57-54 with 2:11 remaining but Pitt scored 11 of the final 15 points, including nine free throws, for the victory.

Winn was 6-of-12 from the field and made 7-of-8 free throws for her second straight 20-point effort, while adding seven rebounds and six assists in 38 minutes of action. Walker made 7-of-11 shots from the field and finished with 16 points, six rebounds, two assists and two steals, playing down the stretch with four fouls. Guard Shavonte Zellous was also in double figures for the Panthers with 11 points and eight rebounds with three blocks defensively.

NOTES: Pitt made 12 of its 26 second-half shots and made 16-of-23 second-half free throws...the Panthers had a 49-36 advantage on the boards with seven different Pitt players recording at least four rebounds...the Pitt-Marquette semifinal guarantees that the Big East will have a WNIT finalist for the second consecutive year.

MILWAUKEE, WISC. – It was a bittersweet ending for the Pitt women's basketball team, dropping a 77-64 decision to Marquette in the WNIT semifinals at the Al McGuire Center in Milwaukee.

The Panthers (22-11) fell behind early to the Golden Eagles (22-10), but battled to the last second before dropping the 13-point game to their Big East rivals. Marquette advanced to the championship game, where it lost to Kansas State.

Junior guard Mallorie Winn had a game-high 21 points and added five assists while playing all 40 minutes for the Panthers. The season ends with a near-berth in the NCAA Championships, a long run in the WNIT and a school-record-tying 22 victories — not bad for a team picked to not qualify for the Big East Championship (13th of 16 teams).

Sophomore center Mercedes Walker overcame a slow start to score 14 points on 6-of-12 shooting and also pulled down six rebounds, while freshmen Xenia Stewart, Shavonte Zellous and Maddy Brown combined to score 25 points, pull down 12 rebounds and record seven assists.

Marquette was led by Krystal Ellis with 18 points, and got 16 points off the bench from Svetlana Kovalenko. Also, forward Danielle Kamm recorded a double-double with 11 points and 10 rebounds.

NOTES: Pitt shot an impressive 45.8 percent from the floor (27-of-59), but managed just a 38.9 percent clip from the free-throw line (7-of-18)...the Golden Eagles shot 43.6 percent from the floor but upped that to an 84.6 percent clip at the free-throw line in 26 attempts...Marquette also outrebounded the Panthers, 39-29, in the contest.

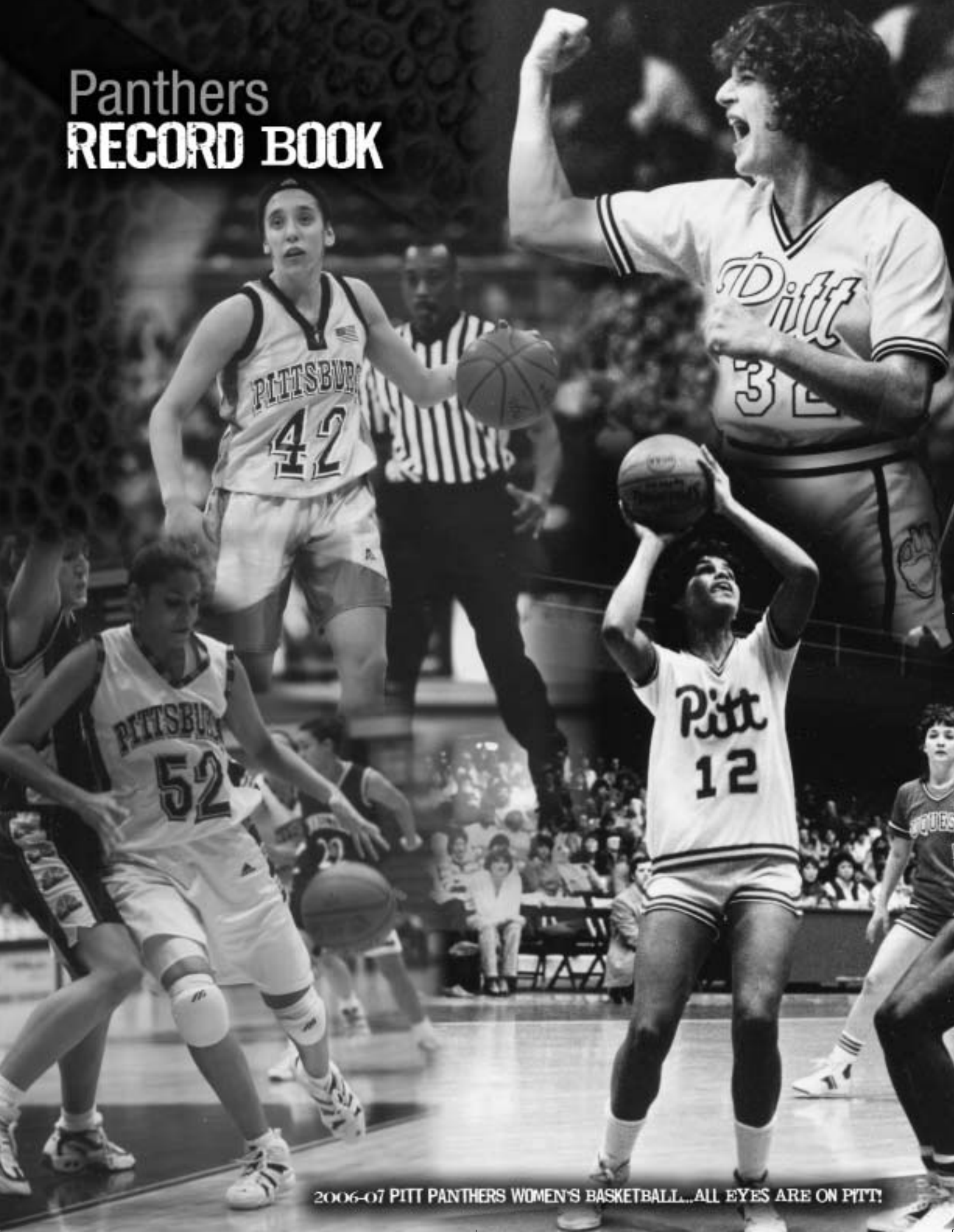

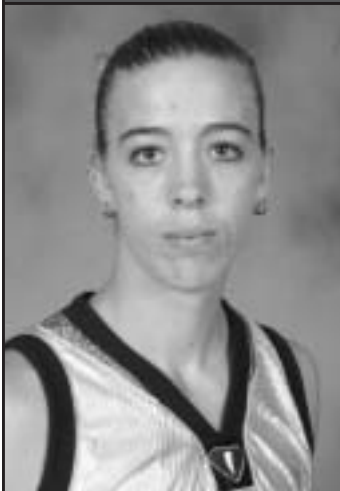

25 WAYS PITT CHANGED THE WORLD

IN LARGE WAYS AND SMALL, THROUGH QUIRKY DISCOVERIES AND BOLD INNOVATION, PITT AND ITS PEOPLE HAVE ALTERED WHO WE ARE, HOW WE LIVE AND THE WAY WE WATCH FOOTBALL.

DISCOVERING GAPING HOLES OF NOTHINGNESS

Black holes are everywhere in space, but Pittsburgh physicist Ezra Newman is credited with discovering a certain type of black hole called Kerr-Newman.

VLADIMIR ZWORYKIN, FATHER OF TELEVISION

After receiving his PhD at Pittsburgh, the Russian-born Zworykin (Arts and Sciences '26) went on to pioneer research in photo-electric cells, culminating in three major patents: the television camera tube, the kinescope television receiver and the first color television system.

THE FATHER OF SOCIAL SECURITY

Abraham Epstein (Arts and Sciences '30) came to the United States from Russia in 1904. After graduation, he helped pen Pennsylvania's first pension bill and is credited with mobilizing public opinion in favor of the 1935 Social Security Act, which forever redefined our government's relationship with senior citizens.

THE FIRST AMERICAN NOVEL

Pitt founder Hugh Henry Brackenridge studied at the College of New Jersey at Princeton in the 1770s. There he wrote *Father Bombo's Pilgrimage to Mecca* (with classmate Philip Freneau) which became the first prose fiction novel published in the New World.

FIRST FOOTBALL TEAM TO WEAR NUMBERS ON THEIR JERSEYS

In 1908, Pittsburgh became the first football team to wear numbers on its jerseys, revolutionizing the way the world watches football.



FIRST VOICE ACROSS THE ATLANTIC (WE THINK)

Early in the twentieth century, University of Pittsburgh engineering professor Reginald Fessenden set up two experimental radio transmitting stations — one in Brant Rock, Massachusetts, the other in Machrihanish, Scotland. Adam Stein, Jr. (Engineering 1903) was asked by Fessenden to help with the Brant Rock station. It was there in 1906 that Stein was heard in Scotland, giving directions to a sub-station in Plymouth, Mass. — thus marking the first time a voice (rather than Morse code) was heard across the Atlantic by wireless radio.

WORLD'S FIRST ACADEMIC SKYSCRAPER

When Chancellor John Bowman first approached the board in 1924 with his idea of a 52-story building (later scaled back to 42) in the middle of an empty field, he was told it was “nonsense.” But Bowman prevailed, and Pittsburgh's famous Cathedral of Learning went up despite enormous engineering challenges, a daunting fund-raising campaign and a Great Depression.

FIRST (AND, WE HOPE ONLY) ACADEMIC HALL BUILT OVER AN ACTIVE COAL MINE FIRE

Until the Cathedral was finished in 1937, Alumni Hall was the campus' main academic building. The chosen site, however, had a major flaw. An active underground fire from an abandoned coal seam meant that workers spent as much time filling in smoke pits as they did laying brick and mortar. Recently rechristened as Eberly Hall, the building has survived more than 80 years without incident.

DESEGREGATING THE SUGAR BOWL

Before Georgia Tech played the Panthers in the 1956 Sugar Bowl, the governor of Georgia let it be known that Pittsburgh's standout defensive back Bobby Grier, who was black, might consider staying at home rather than break the bowl's traditional color line. Acting Chancellor Charles Nutting sent a four-word reply; “No Grier, no game.” Grier did play, and Pittsburgh lost 7-0, thanks to a controversial penalty against — you guessed it — Bobby Grier.

THE GENETIC REVOLUTION C/O HERB BOYER

One of the prime movers behind the genetic engineering revolution has been Herb Boyer (Arts and Sciences '63, '60), a pioneer in the field of recombinant DNA. In the early 1970s, Boyer and a colleague took the DNA from a toad and added it to a bacterium — a.k.a. Gene splicing. Boyer also co-founded Genentech, which has become one of the largest, most profitable and most prolific biotechnology firms in the world.

JONAS SALK'S POLIO VACCINE

Before April 1955, Polio was terrifying the world. One vaccine later, and the universe changed. What's lesser known however, is the role that the other researchers played in the discovery, including Salk's chief scientific colleague Julius Younger. GSPH epidemiologist William Hammon's work on the gamma globulin protein also helped pave the way for Salk's discovery.

FIRST FEMALE OFFICIAL IN THE NBA

In 1997, the National Basketball Association became the first professional sport to break the gender barrier when Violet Palmer and Dee Kantner (Engineering '82) were named to the referee ranks.

WORLD'S BUSIEST TRANSPLANT CENTER

Thanks to the transplant pioneer Tom Starzl and many others, UPMC has done more transplants — and more types of transplants — than any other hospital in the world. On average, UPMC performs one transplant every 18 hours. Pittsburgh doctors performed the city's first kidney transplant (1964) and the state's first heart transplant (1968), just to name a few of its many transplant milestones.

25 WAYS PITT CHANGED THE WORLD

FIRST HEAVIER-THAN-AIR
FLYING CRAFT

In 1896, Pitt professor Samuel Langley launched his aerodrome from a houseboat moored in the Potomac River — the first heavier-than-air craft to achieve free flight. Langley's first manned aircraft, however, hit a snag on the launch catapult and crashed. The aborted flight happened on Dec. 8, 1903, just nine days before the Wright Brothers made history.

WORLD'S FASTEST COMPUTER

Thanks to the computational acrobatics made possible by the Pittsburgh Supercomputing Center (PSC), researchers now believe that the Earth's core is made of a solid iron crystal, 1,500 miles across. Pitt is a partner at PSC, which has the most powerful academically based system in the country. The PSC is the first facility of its kind to utilize the CRAY T3E, a massively parallel supercomputer that enables researchers to produce large-scale research models to develop better drugs, improve weather forecasting and provide better views of the heart and body structures.

BEST COLLECTORS OF
EXTRATERRESTRIALS

Scientists have recently contemplated the possibility that water may have once existed on Mars, thus offering the prospect of life on the Red Planet. Whatever we learn about Mars is due in no small part to Pitt geologist William Cassidy. Cassidy's team made many trips to Antarctica to ferret out meteorites — shards and stones from the moon and the planets — and eventually built one of the world's largest collections of specimens, providing fertile ground for research into the early universe.

WRITING THE FIRST CZECH

The former Czechoslovakia has had an active political past, but the country's roots owe a debt to Pittsburgh. The "Pittsburgh Pact," signed in Pittsburgh in 1918, formed the basis for a unified and independent Czech and Slovak state.

WORLD'S FASTEST
(AND HIGHEST AND FARTHEST
AND STRONGEST)

Besides Jesse Owens' gold medals in Nazi Germany's 1936 Olympics, another American stood out, too — Pitt's John Woodruff, winner of

the gold medal in the 800-meter dash. Other Pitt Olympians include Herb Douglas (bronze medal, long jump, 1948 London), Dick Rydze (silver medal, 10-meter diving, 1972 Munich), Roger Kingdom (gold medal, 110-meter hurdles, 1984 Los Angeles and 1988 Seoul) and Marisa Pedulla (fourth in women's judo, 1996 Atlanta). Other notables include Lee McRae, holder of the world record for the 55-meter sprint; and 15-time All-American track star Trecia-Kaye Smith, NCAA record-holder in the triple jump.

HAVEN FOR ONE OF THE
WORLD'S GREAT ART FORGERIES

University benefactor Helen Frick once bought a pair of sculptures called Angel of the Annunciation and The Virgin Mary, credited to a fourteenth-century Sieneese artist. The true artist, however, was an Italian Mason, Alceo Dossena. Two unscrupulous Italian dealers commissioned the artist's work, then resold them as newly found originals. So fine was Dossena's work that not one expert caught the deceit. It was Dossena himself who, feeling cheated out of money, blew the whistle in 1928. The forgeries remain lovingly on display in the Frick Fine Arts courtyard.

FIRST CAMPUS WITH A
FIBER-OPTIC NETWORK

In 1985, Pittsburgh was the first university to install a campus-wide fiber-optic network that could carry voice, data and video transmissions along the same cable. Although the original computer hardware has been retired, the fiber-optic lines remain in place, the perfect transition to the new millennium.

OUT OF THIS WORLD:
THE ALLEGHENY OBSERVATORY

The observatory, located in Pittsburgh's Riverview Park, was developed in part by Pitt professor Samuel Langley and Acting Chancellor John Brashear. Through the years, the observatory has been responsible for many astronomical discoveries — the first accurate pictures of sun spots, for instance, and the discovery that Saturn's rings weren't solid.

CAN YOU SAY
"CHILD DEVELOPMENT?"

Pitt's child development program, especially its real-world lab at Arsenal School, was a mecca for developmental studies. Benjamin Spock was there. So was Erik Erikson and Margaret McFarland. They all shared a revolutionary principle: Children were not mere studies of influence à la Freud, nor were they B.F. Skinner's obedient stimulus-response machines. Instead, children were — and are — endlessly fascinating, unique individuals. Among the crowd at Arsenal was a certain seminary student who studied child development there — the late Mister Fred Rogers.

BIGGEST READERSHIP
AMONG SIX-YEAR-OLDS

I CAN "C" CLEARLY NOW

Vitamin C has received more positive press than any other vitamin. It's used for everything from fighting scurvy to preventing the common cold. It was Pitt's chemistry professor Charles Glen King who identified and later synthesized the vitamin in Pitt's chemistry department.

BIRTH OF A NERF

In 1970, Fred Cox (Art and Sciences '62), then a kicker for the Minnesota Vikings, was approached by his friend John Mattox with an idea for a children's backyard kicking game. There was only one problem: What to use for a ball? Unbeknownst to Cox and Mattox, Parker Brothers had been trying for several years to produce a football to complement its hugely popular foam Nerf ball. A partnership began. Since the product was introduced in 1972, more than 50 million have been sold. Placed end to end, they would stretch from Pittsburgh to Tokyo.

ALL EYES ARE ON PITT

CHANCELLOR AND DISTINGUISHED SERVICE PROFESSOR OF LAW MARK A. NORDENBERG

Chancellor and Distinguished Service Professor of Law MARK A. NORDENBERG is Chief Executive Officer of the University of Pittsburgh, one of the nation's leading public research universities and one of the oldest institutions of higher learning west of the Allegheny Mountains.

Mark A. Nordenberg joined the law faculty of the University of Pittsburgh in 1977, with a nine-month appointment as a visiting assistant professor. He sometimes says that his greatest professional achievement is that he was invited to stay longer and has been given so many interesting assignments at Pitt. As a young professor, he was quickly promoted through the professorial ranks, and in 1994, he was elevated to the special faculty rank of Distinguished Service Professor of Law. His earlier administrative positions included service as Associate Dean, Interim Dean and Dean of the School of Law and Interim Provost of the University. The University's Board of Trustees elected him Interim Chancellor in 1995 and Chancellor in 1996.

Chancellor Nordenberg is an award-winning teacher. He was the initial recipient of the School of Law's Excellence-in-Teaching Award, which is now presented annually by the Law School's graduating class. He also was one of the first recipients of the Chancellor's Distinguished Teaching Award, which recognizes teaching excellence University-wide. His area of scholarly specialty can be broadly defined as civil litigation, and he has served as a member of both the U.S. Supreme Court's Advisory Committee on Civil Rules and the Pennsylvania Supreme Court's Civil Procedural Rules Committee.

Among many civic activities, Chancellor Nordenberg has served as co-chair of a legislative commission studying the problems of Pennsylvania's urban schools, chair of an oversight committee that developed an action plan for regional workforce development, chair of a record-setting United Way campaign, and chair of a committee examining issues of leadership and governance in the Pittsburgh Public Schools. He is founding Board chair or co-chair of the Pittsburgh Digital Greenhouse, the Pittsburgh Life Sciences Greenhouse, the Pittsburgh Robotics Foundry, and the Technology Collaborative. Among his many forms of recognition, Chancellor Nordenberg has been named Pittsburgh's Person of the Year by both *Vectors Pittsburgh* and *Pittsburgh* magazine.

This past year, Chancellor Nordenberg was honored with the 2006 Chief Executive Leadership Award from the Council for Advancement and Support of Education, District II. In accepting that award, he said that it really should be viewed as a special form of recognition for all that had been accomplished through the determined efforts of the "people of Pitt" — its faculty, staff, students, alumni and friends — over the course of recent years.

Through that team effort and under Chancellor Nordenberg's leadership, the University has

achieved new levels of quality and impact on virtually every front. To give just a few key examples, undergraduate applications have more than doubled, and the academic credentials of enrolled undergraduates have soared. Research expenditures also have risen dramatically — from about \$230 million to more than \$600 million annually, placing Pitt among the country's top universities in the size and quality of its research program.

However, many of the University's most important victories are the triumphs of high achieving individuals or the special forms of recognition and support won by programs of exceptional quality. Just in the past year, for example:

- Professor Thomas Starzl, Pitt's organ transplant pioneer, received the National Medal of Science, this country's top honor in science; Anil Gupta, distinguished professor of philosophy, was elected a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences; and Graham Hatful, chair of the department of biological sciences was awarded a \$2.1 million Howard Hughes Institute grant to support undergraduate research initiatives.
- Pitt undergraduates excelled in international and national competitions, with Justin Chalker winning a Rhodes Scholarship; Clayton Magill winning a Churchill Scholarship; Adam Idriess winning a Truman Scholarship; and both Margaret Bennewitz and Tanya Keenan winning Goldwater Scholarships. These very special awards not only are a tribute to the outstanding students who received them but also are a testament to the strength of Pitt's undergraduate programs and to its Honors College, in particular.
- Reflecting long-standing institutional strengths in international studies, all four of the University's area studies programs — Asian Studies, European Studies, Latin American Studies and Russian and East European Studies — as well as its International Business Center were re-designated National Resource Centers by the U.S. Department of Education.

During the past year, the University also continued to build physically, pushing forward with planned construction and renovation projects that have exceeded \$1 billion in value. Among the major projects completed in the past year were Pitt's third biomedical science tower, which will be home to more than 500 researchers and support staff and our newest hill-top residence hall, known as "Panther Hall," which will be home to more than 500 undergraduate students. The University also partnered in the creation of the recently-opened Schenley Plaza Park, which has been hailed as Oakland's "new town square."

Pitt's ongoing capital campaign has played a major role in fueling this broad-ranging institutional progress. As that campaign approached its billion

dollar total ahead of schedule, the University's Board of Trustees, at its annual meeting this summer, doubled its goal to \$2 billion. In commenting on that action, Chancellor Nordenberg stated, "As we continue our determined climb even higher in the ranks of the country's finest research universities, we are competing with stronger and better-funded institutions, even as we are moving through difficult economic times. By again doubling our campaign goal — this time to \$2 billion — we are signaling our intention to take full advantage of our existing momentum and to attract the resources we will need to capture Pitt's full potential."

Quite clearly, those ambitions include capturing Pitt's full potential in intercollegiate athletics. Since the mid-1990s, Pitt's football team has built a record characterized by winning records, regular bowl appearances, top 25 rankings, and positive national attention. Recent years also have brought outstanding performances in other sports, including both men's and women's basketball. Chancellor Nordenberg, who has been a strong supporter of Pitt athletics, both within the University and through his leadership of the Big East Conference, believes that even more exciting times lie ahead and looks forward to sharing them with other devoted Panther fans.

Born in Duluth, Minnesota, Chancellor Nordenberg first moved to this area as a high school senior when his father was transferred to Pittsburgh by U.S. Steel. He is a graduate of North Allegheny High School, Thiel College and the University of Wisconsin Law School. He has been married for thirty-five years to Nikki Pirillo Nordenberg, who earned her doctoral degree at Pitt and maintains an active counseling practice. The Nordensbergs have three adult children — Erin, Carl and Michael. The newest and youngest member of the family is their dog, Bear.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR JEFF LONG

JEFF LONG'S tenure at the University of Pittsburgh has coincided with an exciting new age for Pitt athletics. It's an age characterized by winning performances on the fields of play, high achievement in the classroom and bold initiatives in the areas of facilities, development and overall student-athlete welfare. "Pitt Pride" is at a high level, and for good reason.

With Long setting the pace, Pitt has established itself as one of the Big East Conference's — and the country's — upwardly mobile athletic programs.

Long was named Pitt's athletic director in May 2003. The initial three years of his tenure witnessed many significant milestones, achievements and initiatives designed to further enhance the Panthers' rising stature. Among them:

- In 2005, Pitt Athletics launched the "Quest for Excellence" campaign. The athletic department's "Quest" is focused on the enhancement of the Pitt student-athlete experience. It aims to increase endowed athletic scholarships, capital gifts for building and improvement projects and annual contributions for student-athlete scholarships. Just over one-third of the way into the campaign, nearly \$18 million has been raised to date.
- The unveiling of a sparkling new Olympic sports weight room in Fitzgerald Field House that greatly assists more than 300 student-athletes. Pitt also recently opened new training facilities for gymnastics and wrestling.
- The design of a new, yet familiar, uniform look — a block-style "PITT" logo that serves as the primary mark for each of the Panthers' 19 varsity teams. The logo is a nod to Pitt's historic tradition that maintains a style focused squarely on the future.
- A partnership with adidas that puts Pitt in an elite and exclusive group of schools nationwide. Each of the Panthers' 19 intercollegiate sports teams wear adidas shoes, uniforms and apparel, making Pitt one of the finest outfitted programs in the country.
- On the communications front, Long partnered Pitt with ISP Sports, a national leader in the collegiate sports marketing industry. Owning exclusive multi-media rights to Pitt Athletics, ISP is elevating the Panthers' program from local and regional markets to the national level. The monthly publication "Panther Eyes" was spawned from the ISP association and provides entertaining and insightful information for Pitt followers everywhere.
- Pitt continues to carry a high profile in one of the nation's largest media markets because of its radio partnership with Clear Channel Communications. Now entering its third year, the agreement has Pitt football and basketball simulcast on FM NewsTalk 104.7 (WPGF-FM) and Fox Sports Radio 970 (WBG-AM). With an

annually growing network of affiliates (more than doubled from two years ago), the Panthers enjoy unprecedented radio coverage. Significant expansion to pre- and postgame coverage for these sports has been a hit with the Panther Nation. Moreover, women's basketball games were carried by WBG-AM in 2005-06, marking the first time in the program's history it had a commercial flagship station.

- Also on the media front, Long helped initiate "Panthers Weekly," a popular television program produced by FSN Pittsburgh that shines the spotlight on Pitt's entire athletic scene.

The achievements have been impressive during the last three years. But, true to Long's style, Pitt is not resting in complacency. As a result, the future holds even more excitement.

Adding to the anticipation for this year is the fact that the University of Pittsburgh will serve as a host institution for the NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament for the first time ever. The event promises to be a boom for both the Pitt community and the Western Pennsylvania region as a whole.

Also, the Pitt athletic department continues to roll out various initiatives designed to enhance the total student — academically, athletically and socially. To achieve this end, Long and Pitt's Provost Office created the new position of career and life skills coordinator for student-athletes, which has greatly enhanced the athletic department's developmental and educational efforts.

In addition to his efforts on the Pitt front, Long is also very active on the Big East and national scene.

Long has emerged as a lead athletic director voice for the Big East as it relates to the Bowl Championship Series. The Big East remains a valued member of the BCS and, incidentally, the Panthers earned the league's automatic berth in 2004 and played in the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.

He was appointed to serve as one of the Big East Conference's representatives on the 49-member NCAA Division I Management Council, which plays a vital role in legislative issues and oversees cabinets responsible for academic affairs, eligibility, compliance, championships and competition.

Long additionally was named to the Executive Committee of the Division I-A Athletic Directors' Association, an influential organization dedicated to the welfare and future success of student-athletes.

In 2004 he was appointed to the NCAA's Sports Wagering Task Force, a group formed after a national study commissioned by the NCAA revealed a disturbing frequency of sports wagering among student-athletes.

Long's accomplishments and high aspirations during his time at Pitt are not surprising considering his outstanding professional and personal pedigree. He is cut from the mold of winners and has worked in many of the country's highest-profile conferences, including the Big 12, Big Ten, Big East and Atlantic Coast Conference.

Prior to his Pitt appointment, Long served as the

senior associate athletic director at the University of Oklahoma for two-and-a-half years. He oversaw all external affairs, including development, marketing/promotions, licensing, media relations, ticket operations, radio/television and SoonerVision productions. He additionally was the primary administrator for football and men's basketball and the sport supervisor for baseball, wrestling and men's and women's golf.

Prior to Oklahoma, Long was the athletic director at Eastern Kentucky University. He significantly improved Eastern Kentucky's athletic infrastructure during his two years with the completion of several facility projects and the formation of viable corporate partnerships and sponsorships.

Long also served a short tenure at Virginia Tech as associate athletic director prior to his Eastern Kentucky post.

The majority of Long's career in collegiate athletic administration, though, was spent at the University of Michigan. Hired by legendary coach and athletic director Bo Schembechler, Long elevated through a number of administrative posts at Michigan before ultimately reaching associate athletic director.

Long has also held football coaching and administrative positions at Rice University, Duke University and North Carolina State University.

A 1982 graduate of Ohio Wesleyan with a bachelor's degree in economics, Long earned seven varsity letters in football and baseball. He received his master's degree in education from Miami University (Ohio) in 1983 after serving as a graduate assistant football coach.

A native of Kettering, Ohio, Long is married to the former Fanny Gellrich of Ann Arbor, Mich. The couple has two children, Stephanie (12) and Christina (7).

Pitt boasts first-class academic facilities in the Hearst Academic Center for Student-Athletes and the Hilda M. Willis Center for Academic Support. Pitt student-athletes have numerous resources available to them. The Hearst Academic Center, staffed by a full-time academic counselor and graduate assistant, features a computer lab with 12 computers and a student reference library, giving the Panthers access to all of the features of Academic Support Services.

Director of Bands



Jack R. Anderson currently serves as Director of Bands at the University of Pittsburgh. His responsibilities include directing the Varsity Marching

Band, leading the Pep Bands at athletic events, and conducting the symphonic band. He has been a music educator in Pennsylvania for 36 years leading band programs in the Corry, Greenville and Keystone Oaks School Districts. He has been involved with the Pitt Band his whole life, beginning at the age of two when he accompanied his father (who was the Assistant Director of Bands) to his first Pitt Band camp. Jack served as an assistant director at Pitt for nine years, and in 1995 realized his life's dream by being named Director of Bands at the University.

In addition to these professional work experiences, Jack has been a guest conductor

and adjudicator for PMEA throughout Western Pennsylvania, and has traveled extensively throughout the United States and Canada with his bands.

Jack played in the Pitt Band in the late 60s and early 70s and holds an undergraduate degree from the University of Pittsburgh and a master's degree from Edinboro University of Pennsylvania.

Anderson is a member of many professional organizations including the Music Educators National Conference, Pennsylvania Music Educators Association, and the following honoraries: Omicron Delta Kappa, Kappa Kappa Psi, Tau Beta Sigma, Mu Kappa Upsilon and Iota Beta Kappa. He was chosen by the University of Pittsburgh Student Government Board as an "Outstanding Leader" on Pitt campus and in 2001 he was named the recipient of the Paula Crider Outstanding Band Director Award, which is presented annually to a college or university band director who has distinguished himself in the field of University bands. At their annual spring banquet in 2002, the Mon Valley chapter of the Panther Club honored Jack by presenting him with their "Special Recognition Award."

The 2006-07 University of Pittsburgh cheerleading and dance teams are entertaining, talented and motivating factors at Pittsburgh basketball games and athletic events. They are a colorful addition to the wide range of festivities surrounding a college athletic event.

The Pittsburgh cheerleaders have forged a reputation as one of the nation's best cheerleading units during the past decade. Since 1990, they have won several national championships, including three straight from 1992-94. In April 1994 they captured the Universal Cheerleaders' Association College Cheerleading Championship at Sea World in San Diego. The cheerleaders have enjoyed strong finishes at the National Collegiate Cheerleading Championships, including a 10th-place finish in

2005, fourth in 2004, sixth in 2003, seventh in 2002 and fifth in 2000.

In addition to their performances at Panther athletic events, the cheerleaders are active throughout the Pittsburgh community.

The Pittsburgh Cheerleaders have been coached for the past 24 years by Theresa Nuzzo, who also was a Pitt cheerleader herself. She is one of the founders of Elite Cheerleading, Inc., the original private cheer camp company in the United States. The organization annually instructs more than 20,000 cheerleaders in more than 40 states.

PITT DANCE TEAM

The University of Pittsburgh dance team has established a reputation as one of the top units in the country. In its last seven competitions, the

dance team has placed among the top 10 dance teams in the country, including a fifth-place finish in 1998 at the Collegiate Dance Championships held annually in Daytona Beach, Fla. The dance team was once again a finalist at the 2005 National Collegiate Dance Championships, placing fifth in the Challenge Cup.

PITT THE VARSITY WALK

On the University of Pittsburgh campus, between the Cathedral of Learning and Heinz Chapel, is a sidewalk known as the Varsity Walk. There, embedded in the stones, are the names of former Pitt athletes who have promoted the University through their athletic or academic achievements.

The Varsity Walk was conceived in 1950 as a way to honor athletes, and new members are added each year. The distinctive hand-carved stones were first presented as the Athletic Committee Award and the Charles C. Hartwig Award. The Athletic Committee recognized the best athlete from any sport. The Charles Hartwig Award was given to the senior athlete who promoted and sponsored the best interests of Pittsburgh athletics, in honor of the 1934 All-America tight end. In 1971 the awards were changed to the Panther and Blue-Gold awards, respectively.

The Panther Award is presented to the graduating senior athlete who has promoted Pittsburgh athletics through his/her outstanding athletic achievement. The Blue-Gold Award is given to the seniors who represents the student-athlete ideal based on academic scholarship, athletic achievement, leadership qualities and citizenship.

The awards were expanded to include females in 1975.

"The Pitt women's basketball program is definitely on its way up and to be a part of that is an exciting and rewarding opportunity," Clark said. "I know Coach Berenato will have the Panthers ready to play every game, and I want to put forth the same level of effort into our broadcasts."

Tuscano is the Pitt women's basketball academic coordinator and has helped the team reach new heights in the classroom including pacing the team to graduate four players in 2006, which includes current players Mallorie Winn (August, 2006) and Danielle Taylor (December, 2006). She served as Director of

Athletics for the Meyersdale Area School District and was head coach of the junior high's girls' basketball team from 1997-2004. A 1999 graduate of the University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown, Tuscano played four years for the Lady Cats' women's basketball team.

"Last season was certainly an exciting one and I was glad to be able to be a part of it as a member of the radio broadcast team," Tuscano said. "I look forward to working with Mike and Greg this season as we continue to reach new heights for Pitt women's basketball!"
