PITT WEEKLY PRESS CONFERENCE

Coach Pat Narduzzi will conduct his game week preview press conferences on Mondays at noon. The conferences will be held at the UPMC Rooney Sports Complex. Video will be available later that day at YouTube.com/pittlivewire. A transcript will be posted on PittsburghPanthers.com.

ACC FOOTBALL COACHES TELECONFERENCE

Coach Narduzzi will be available for media questions via the ACC Football Teleconference every Wednesday during the season beginning Aug. 29 from 12:10 to 12:20 p.m. Contact the Pitt communications office for access to the call.

PITT PRACTICE COVERAGE

On designated days, the initial 30 minutes of Pitt football practice are open to the media for observation. Photographers are also free to shoot practice during this time. The duration of the workout is closed. Reporters should contact the communications office in advance for practice times and proper clearance. All practices will be held at the UPMC Rooney Sports Complex.

PITT WEEKLY INTERVIEWS

All interviews must be arranged through the communications office. Select players and assistant coaches are available for post-practice media sessions on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. In addition to his Monday press conferences, Coach Narduzzi will have a media briefing on Thursdays of game weeks. Please consult the communications office for exact times.

OBTAINING PITT MEDIA CREDENTIALS

Credentials for Pitt home games are issued to working media only and should be requested as early as possible due to space limitations and demand. All credential requests should be made online at www.sportssystem.com/pitt.

PITT GAME DAY MEDIA ENTRANCE

Press members must enter Heinz Field with their credentials through the designated entrance on the west side of the stadium on Allegheny Avenue. The media entrance is just past Gate A, directly across from the Carnegie Science Center. After checking in with security, take the elevator up to the fourth floor for access to the press box.

GAME DAY MEDIA WILL CALL

Credentials that cannot be mailed may be obtained on game day at media will call, located at the media entrance on the west side of the stadium on Allegheny Avenue. Media will call opens two hours before kickoff. A photo ID must be shown to receive credentials.

GAME DAY PHONES/WIRELESS SERVICE

The communications office supplies an adequate number of phones in the press box for general use by visiting reporters. Personal phone lines at assigned seats can be ordered by contacting the communications office and obtaining a phone line request form. Orders must be placed at least four days prior to game day. Wireless Internet service is available free of charge to media members in the Heinz Field press box.

HEINZ FIELD PHOTO ROOM

There is a photo room easily accessible from the field for covering photographers. Enter the tunnel located closest to the Pitt sideline in the closed (north) end of the stadium.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

The postgame press conference for Pitt home games will be held in the media compound, located conveniently off the administrative offices lobby by the press box elevator. Coach Pat Narduzzi and select Pitt players will attend the press conference. Pitt's locker room is closed to the media and the public. Opponent interviews will be held in a room connected to the visitor's locker room.



BILL HILLGROVE PAT BOSTICK LARRY RICHERT

The University of Pittsburgh and its multimedia rights holder IMG provide the Panthers with comprehensive radio coverage throughout the football season. Led by 50,000-watt flagship station Sportsradio 93.7 The Fan (KDKA-FM) in Pittsburgh, Pitt football games are broadcast on the Pitt IMG Sports Network, a loyal network of stations that spans the Commonwealth.

Football radio coverage on the Pitt IMG Sports Network includes:

- A three-hour pregame show (first hour on 93.7 The Fan and the last two on the entire Pitt IMG Sports Network).
- *Panther Reaction*, a call-in show on 93.7 The Fan following postgame coverage.
- *The Pat Narduzzi Show presented by the Dollar Energy Fund* on most Wednesdays from 6 to 7 p.m. Coach Narduzzi previews the upcoming game and takes questions from callers listening on many of the same Pitt IMG Sports Network affiliates that carry Panthers' game broadcasts.

Known to Pitt fans nationwide as the "Voice of the Panthers," Bill Hillgrove will handle football play-by-play duties for the 45th consecutive year. During an accomplished broadcasting career that spans five decades, Hillgrove has been behind the mic for some of the greatest moments in Pitt and Pittsburgh sports history.

Hillgrove was Pitt football's color analyst from 1970-73 before taking over as play-by-play man for the 1974 season. He has called play-by-play for Pitt basketball since 1969.

Hillgrove is a past recipient of the prestigious Chris Schenkel Award for excellence in college football broadcasting. In 1995 he was named the play-by-play announcer for the Pittsburgh Steelers and has called the action for four Super Bowls.

Pat Bostick makes his fulltime return to Pitt football radio broadcasts as color analyst this fall. The former Panthers quarterback previously served in that role from 2011-15 as well as select games during the 2017 season.

A three-year football letterman (2007-08, 2010), Bostick was under center for such memorable Pitt victories as the 13-9 upset of West Virginia in 2007 and 36-33 quadruple-overtime win at Notre Dame in 2008.

Bostick makes a tremendous impression on listeners with his keen insight and analysis. In addition to Pitt game days, he will continue to be a frequently heard voice talking college football on 93.7 The Fan's various shows.

A 2010 honors graduate of the University of Pittsburgh, Bostick earned his bachelor's degree in just three years before completing a second degree in 2011.

In addition to his broadcasting work, Bostick serves as associate athletic director for major gifts at Pitt.

For the sixth consecutive season, Pitt pregame coverage and in-game sideline reports will be provided by Larry Richert.

One of Pittsburgh's most recognized voices and faces, Richert has hosted the venerable *KDKA Morning News Show* (1020 AM) since 2001. His broadcasting career spans nearly four decades in both radio and television.

Richert is the Heinz Field public address announcer for Pittsburgh Steelers home games and narrates the Steelers' annual highlight films.

The 2013 season marked Richert's return to college football. During the latter 1980s, he produced Pitt football radio broadcasts for four seasons.

Richert is a tremendous ambassador for all things Pittsburgh, emceeding more than 100 benefits annually throughout the region. He is a past recipient of the Richard S. Caliguiri Award for exemplary community service.

The 2018 season marks the ninth for Pitt's partnership with Sportsradio 93.7 The Fan. Beyond game broadcasts, the station airs a wide array of programming focusing on the Panthers' sports scene throughout the year.

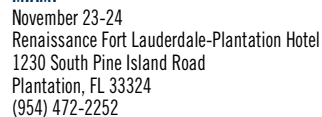

2018 PREVIEW



THE OFFENSE

QUARTERBACKS

Kenny Pickett became the first true freshman to start at quarterback for Pitt in 10 years when he took the opening snap against No. 2 Miami to close the 2017 regular season. Pickett did not disappoint in his starting debut, accounting for 253 yards and all three Pitt touchdowns in a 24-14 upset of the Hurricanes.

He played in four total games last season, completing 59% of his passes (39 of 66) for 509 yards with one TD and one interception. Pickett also showed his legs can be a weapon—he ran for two scores in the Miami win—providing the Panthers with an intriguing dual threat.

Pitt added experienced competition for Pickett when it signed junior-college transfer **Ricky Town**, who joined the Panthers in January and participated in spring drills. Town spent the 2017 season at Ventura College in California and completed 60% of his passes (93 of 155) for 1,160 yards and 12 touchdowns against five interceptions. Town will have two seasons of eligibility at Pitt.

The Panthers' 2018 recruiting class also included highly regarded freshman **Nick Patti**, who threw for nearly 4,600 yards and 43 touchdowns during his varsity career at New Jersey power St. Joseph Regional. Patti was rated one of the nation's top 20 pro-style quarterbacks by Rivals.

Providing additional depth at quarterback will be a pair of sophomores, **Jake Zilinskas** and JUCO signee **Tyler Zelinski**, who threw for 1,756 yards with 16 TDs and 11 INTs last season at Erie (N.Y.) Community College.

RUNNING BACKS

The Panthers return an experienced tailback tandem in seniors **Darrin Hall** and **Qadree Ollison**. The pair combined for 1,026 yards and 14 touchdowns on the ground last season.

Hall is coming off the most productive campaign of his career, pacing Pitt's rushing attack with 628 yards and nine TDs on 128 carries (4.9 avg.). He finished second in scoring with 60 points on a team-high 10 touchdowns.

Ollison, who in addition to tailback also contributed in an H-back role last season, netted 398 yards and five TDs on 90 carries (4.4 avg.). He is the only player on the Panthers' 2018 roster who can claim a 1,000-yard rushing season. In 2015, Ollison compiled 1,121 yards and was named the ACC Offensive Rookie of the Year.

Also competing for carries will be sophomore letterman **A.J. Davis** and redshirt freshman **Todd Sibley Jr.** Sophomore **Kyle Vreen** provides depth.

The lone running back in Pitt's 2018 recruiting class was a big one—decorated all-purpose standout **Mychale Salahuddin**, who was considered the No. 1 overall prospect in Washington D.C. Salahuddin rushed for 1,274 yards and 12 touchdowns as a senior at H.D. Woodson, averaging better than 10 yards per carry.

Bolstering Pitt's backfield will be the healthy return of senior fullback **George Aston**, who was limited to only two games last year due to injury. No mere blocking back, Aston was a highly productive starter in 2016 when he accounted for 10 touchdowns. Providing depth at fullback will be junior **Ryan Sliwoski**.

WIDE RECEIVERS

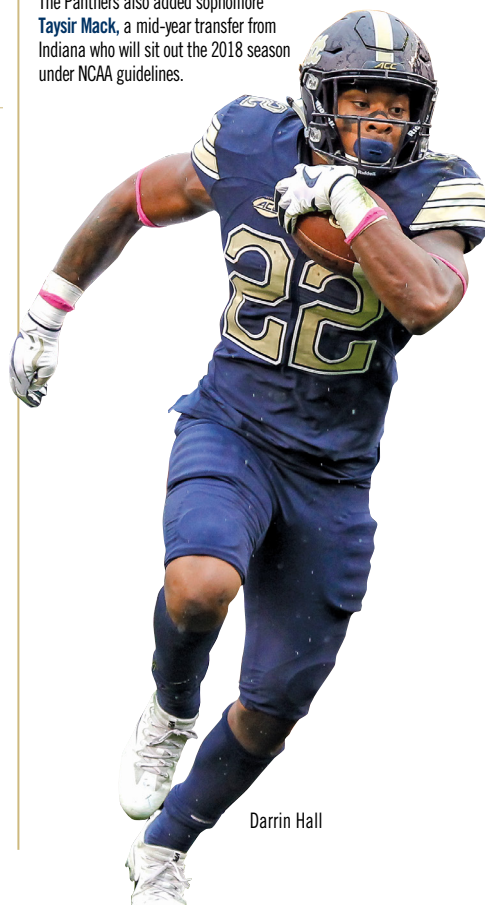
Both starting wideouts from last season, **Jester Weah** and **Quadree Henderson**, need to be replaced. The Panthers will reshape their receiving corps around five returning lettermen, including last season's top pass catcher.

Senior **Rafael Araujo-Lopes** led Pitt in receptions, totaling 43 for 531 yards (12.3 avg.) and two scores. Junior **Maurice French** also returns after finishing third on the team with 25 catches for 272 yards (10.9 avg.). Both players are smaller targets who produce by finding open spaces in the defense, not unlike the departed Henderson.

A viable candidate to replace Weah is rangy junior **Aaron Mathews**, who lettered each of the past two years. Mathews had 16 catches for 189 yards (11.8 avg.) as a top reserve last season. Mathews will be complemented by another junior letterman, **Tre Tipton**, who looks to bounce back after missing all of 2017 due to injury.

The receiving depth chart figures to be impacted by three promising prospects coming off freshman redshirts: **Darian Street**, **Michael Smith** and **Dontavious Butler-Jenkins**. Additional depth will come from senior special teams letterman **Kellen McAlone**, sophomore **Michael Vardzel** and redshirt frosh **Garrett Bickhart**.

Leading the newcomers at receiver is mid-year freshman enrollee **Shocky Jacques-Louis**, a highly recruited prospect out of Florida's Dunbar High School. Incoming freshman **Cameron O'Neil** arrives at Pitt following a decorated career at Alabama's Glenwood School. The Panthers also added sophomore **Taysir Mack**, a mid-year transfer from Indiana who will sit out the 2018 season under NCAA guidelines.

TIGHT ENDS

Sophomore **Tyler Sear** finds himself as perhaps the unit's elder statesman after just one season of college football. Sear was an immediate contributor as a true freshman last season, playing in nine games and starting the final two contests of the year.

Two players entering their first active collegiate seasons, redshirt freshmen **Grant Carrigan** and **Charles Reeves Jr.**, will also be viable contenders for a starting assignment. Junior special teams letterman **Jim Medure** moved from the defensive line to shore up depth.

The tight end position got an infusion of veteran competition in June when Pitt signed Arkansas graduate transfer **Will Gragg**, who arrives with two seasons of immediate eligibility. Gragg played in 10 games (catching five passes for 61 yards) for the Razorbacks last year.

OFFENSIVE LINE

The Panthers will need to retool their offensive front with the departures of three starters—guard **Alex Officer** and tackles **Brian O'Neill** and **Jaryd Jones-Smith**—from last year's unit.

Senior **Alex Bookser** should receive attention as one of the top linemen in the ACC. He also ranks as one of the most versatile.

Primarily a guard during his career, Bookser owns starting experience at tackle as well. His ability to contribute at both positions will be an invaluable asset for this year's offensive front.

In addition to Bookser, the Panthers' other returning tackle candidates are sophomore **Bryce Hargrove** and redshirt freshmen **Jerry Drake Jr.**, **Gabe Houy**, **Carson Van Lynn** and **Carter Warren**. Raising the level of experience and competition will be the addition of graduate transfer **Stefano Millin**, who made 30 starts on the offensive line at Kent State from 2015-17.

At guard, the Panthers welcome back a pair of senior lettermen: **Mike Herndon**, a grizzled veteran of both lines of scrimmage, and **Connor Dintino**, who has also worked at center during his career. They will compete with mid-year JUCO enrollee **Chase Brown** and sophomores **Brandon Ford** and **Justin Morgan**. Redshirt freshman **Kenny Rainey III** and true frosh **Jake Kradel**, who enrolled in January following an all-state career at nearby Butler Senior High, will provide depth.

At center, sophomore **Jimmy Morrissey** returns after starting every game in 2017. Redshirt freshman **Owen Drexel** will vie with junior-college transfer **Devon Davis** for the top backup role.

The Panthers also add one of Pennsylvania's top lineman prospects, freshman **Blake Zubovic**, who played offensive guard and tackle during his accomplished career at Belle Vernon Area.

THE DEFENSE

DEFENSIVE LINE

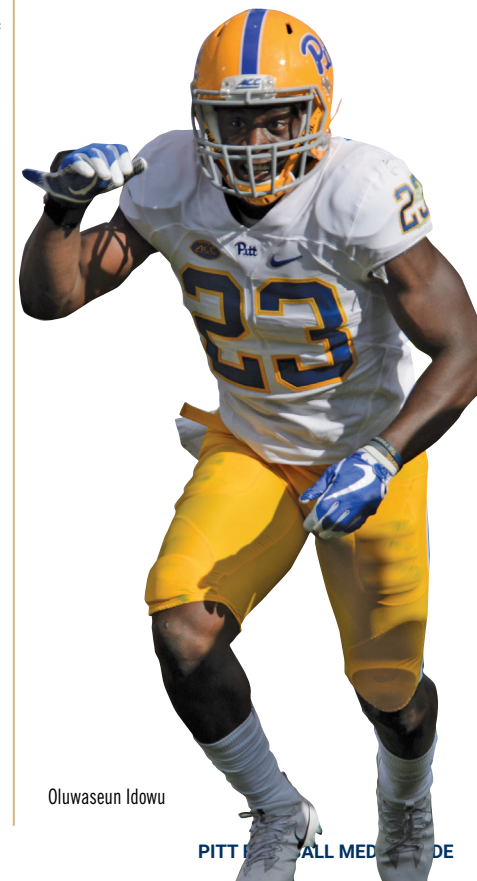
Youthful and untested a year ago, Pitt's defensive line figures to be one of the team's major strengths for 2018. The Panthers return all four starters up front and nine total lettermen.

Senior nose tackle **Shane Roy** anchors the interior after starting all 12 contests last season. Competing for time behind Roy will be sophomore letterman **Rashad Wheeler** and redshirt freshman **Jaylen Twyman**.

At defensive tackle, sophomore **Keyshon Camp** and junior **Amir Watts** will compete for the starting nod. Both were highly prominent players on the interior front a year ago. Redshirt freshmen **Deslin Alexandre** and **Brian Burgess** will also vie for time at tackle.

The Panthers return both experience and production at defensive end. Senior **Dewayne Hendrix**, healthy last season for the first time in his Pitt career, led the team in quarterback hurries (eight) and finished third in tackles for loss (five) and sacks (three). Senior **James Folston Jr.** seized a starting role the final month of the 2017 season and displayed disruptive ability. Sophomore **Rashad Weaver** also will be a major factor after finishing second in TFLs (six) and third in sacks (three) as a part-time starter. Sophomore letterman **Patrick Jones II** is poised for his biggest contributions to date.

Pitt will get a large influx of talent on the defensive front with the addition of seven freshmen. That total includes a trio of all-state performers from Western Pennsylvania: **Devin Danielson** (Thomas

Jefferson), **David Green** (Pittsburgh Central Catholic) and **Noah Palmer** (Thomas Jefferson). Pitt's defensive line "imports" are Ohio's **Tyler Bentley** (Lakota West), New Jersey's **Kaymar Mimes** (Long Branch), Maryland's **John Morgan** (DeMatha Catholic) and Italy native **Habakkuk Baldonado**, who came to the United States in 2017 and starred at Florida's Clearwater Academy International.

LINEBACKERS

Pitt's defense will be bolstered by a seasoned stable of linebackers. All three starters and six total lettermen are back for 2018.

Senior **Oluwaseun Idowu** enters his third season as the starter at Star linebacker. Idowu enjoyed a decorated 2017 season, earning All-ACC after leading the Panthers in tackles (94), TFLs (11.5) and sacks (five). Junior **Anthony McKee Jr.** and redshirt freshman **Cam Bright** will compete for the top backup role at Star.

Senior **Elijah Zeise** is the returning starter at Money linebacker. Following an injury-limited 2016 campaign, Zeise had his first full season on the defensive side of the ball and finished fourth on the squad with 49 tackles. He will compete with versatile junior **Saleem Brightwell**, who started at middle linebacker last season and ranked second on the team with 73 stops. Providing competitive depth will be redshirt freshmen **Kyle Nunn** and **Albert Tucker** as well as sophomore **Peyton Deri**.

The "Mike" position will be strengthened by the healthy return of senior **Quintin Wirginis**, who is coming off a redshirt. Wirginis was the top reserve in the middle during the 2015 and 2016 seasons. Sophomores **Chase Pine** and **Elias Reynolds** will push for significant time after lettering as reserves last year.

Pitt signed one linebacker in its 2018 recruiting class: **Wendell Davis**, an All-Virginia standout for Benedictine College Preparatory.



SECONDARY

Gone are All-ACC defensive backs Avonte Maddox and Jordan Whitehead to the NFL. Back are 11 lettermen, including seven players with starting experience.

Junior **Dane Jackson** is a returning starter at one cornerback position. Jackson tied for the team lead in interceptions (two) and was second in pass breakups (nine) last year. He will face experienced competition in senior **Phillipie Motley** and sophomore **Damarri Mathis**.

The Panthers will need to replace Maddox at the opposite corner. Chief candidates include sophomore letterman **Jason Pinnock** and redshirt freshman **Paris Ford**, a highly regarded 2017 recruit who enters his first active season. Also in the corner mix is redshirt freshman **Kollin Smith**, who doubles as a track athlete at Pitt.

Junior **Damar Hamlin** will man the free safety spot. Hamlin will be pushed by sophomore lettermen **Therran Coleman** and **Bricen Garner**. All three players have experience as starters in Pitt's secondary.

Competing to succeed Whitehead at strong safety are senior **Dennis Briggs**, sophomore **Phil Campbell III** and junior **Jazzee Stocker**. Briggs made four starts last year, while Campbell started the regular season finale against Miami. Junior letterman **Rimoni Dorsey**, a linebacker last season, provides depth.

Pitt's secondary welcomes four freshmen: Texas recruit **Erick Hallett** (Cy-Fair), Maryland product **Judson Tallandier** (DeMatha Catholic) and Florida natives **V'Lique Carter** (Oxbridge Academy) and **Marquis Williams** (Cardinal Gibbons).

SPECIAL TEAMS

Sophomore **Alex Kessman** is back at placekicker after leading the Panthers in scoring last season (67 points). Kessman converted 11-of-19 field goals (58%) and 34-of-34 PATs (100%). He displayed a booming leg, tying the Pitt record with a 56-yard field goal and also kicking a 55-yarder.

Kessman additionally served as a kickoff specialist and had 29 touchbacks on 58 kicks (50%) for the year.

Backing up Kessman will be redshirt freshman **Jake Scarton**, a former prep standout at Pennsylvania's Hickory High School.

Pitt will have a major void to fill at punter with the graduation of four-year starter Ryan Winslow, a 2017 All-ACC performer. Ready to assume those punting duties is redshirt freshman **Kirk Christodoulou**, a native of Australia and product of the renowned Prokirk Australia program.

Sophomore **Cal Adomitis** is back at long snapper. He handled both placekicks and punts as a true frosh last season. Sophomore **Brandon Ford** will serve as the reserve snapper.

Candidates in the return game include junior **Maurice Ffrench** and redshirt freshman **Paris Ford**.

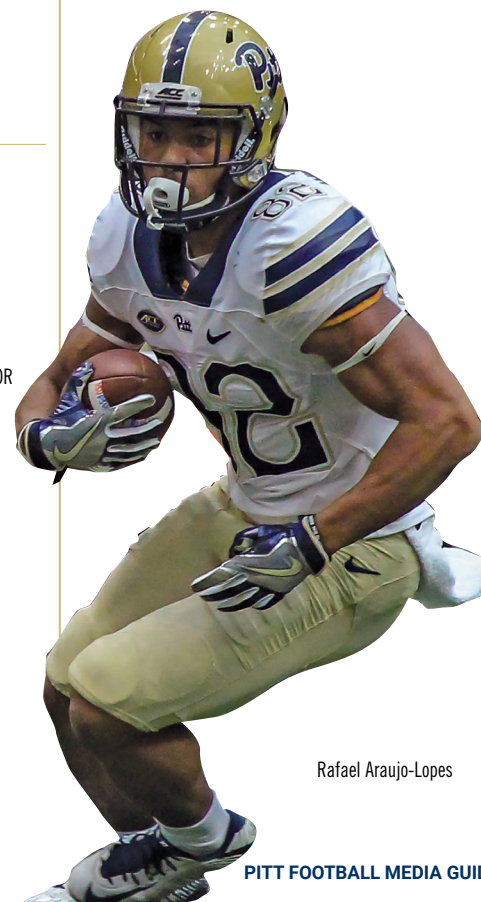

Family and football are Pat Narduzzi's life passions. The two have long been interwoven for Pitt's head coach. Narduzzi's wife, Donna, and their four children are a familiar sight in the Pitt football offices and at university events. This mirrors his own boyhood when he was a constant shadow for his father, longtime football coach Bill Narduzzi, in locker rooms and on the sidelines.

Those early experiences with his dad planted the seed for Narduzzi's coaching career. Moreover, it provided a vivid example of how he would one day handle a team of his own—like they were his own family.

“Coach Narduzzi always has an open door for us,” said Brian O’Neill, a two-time All-ACC offensive tackle who was selected by the Minnesota Vikings in the 2018 NFL Draft. “That’s well known throughout our team. If we need to talk, he’s there. It’s great to have a head coach you feel comfortable talking to about anything. It doesn’t have to be about football.”

Like a team made up of blood brothers, the Panthers have played with a passionate style that reflects their coach. Narduzzi has provided the fire for a program that, prior to his arrival, was frozen in a stretch of middling results. His relatively brief tenure has witnessed many milestone moments and achievements, including:

- The Panthers have won 21 games under his direction, the most victories by a Pitt head football coach in his initial three years since Jackie Sherrill (28 wins from 1977-79). Narduzzi is 2-0 against teams ranked among the nation's top two.
- Closing the 2017 season with a 24-14 victory over No. 2 Miami, the highest-ranked opponent the Panthers have ever defeated at home. Pitt snapped the nation's longest active winning streak at 15 games by beating the Hurricanes.
- Defeating two teams that finished in the top 5 of the final 2016 College Football Playoff rankings. The Panthers gave No. 2 Clemson—that year's eventual national champion—its only loss (43-42) and kept No. 5 Penn State out of the playoff field by defeating the Nittany Lions, 42-39.
- Twenty All-Atlantic Coast Conference Academic Football Team honorees the past three years, the second-highest total among conference schools. Pitt set a program record with nine players on the 2017 All-ACC Academic Football Team.
- Sending 24 of his former Pitt players into the NFL. The Panthers had five players selected in the 2017 NFL Draft and three more taken in 2018, marking Pitt's most draft selections over a two-year span since 2003-04.

In December 2017, Pitt Director of Athletics Heather Lyke announced a new seven-year contract for Narduzzi, ensuring his leadership of the Panthers through at least the 2024 season.

“We’re thrilled Pat Narduzzi is our head football coach,” Lyke said. “We are deeply committed to helping him, his staff and his student-athletes achieve at the highest levels in the ACC and nationally. Coach Narduzzi is a tireless worker, dynamic leader and passionate about building outstanding relationships with our student-athletes and everyone connected to our Pitt family. He and his staff are fully dedicated to building a national-caliber program the right way, on and off the field.”

“I am tremendously blessed to work with such great leadership at the University of Pittsburgh in Athletic Director Heather Lyke and Chancellor Patrick Gallagher,” Narduzzi said. “When I initially accepted the head coaching position at Pitt three years ago, I said we could achieve great things if we were all moving in the same direction. Thanks to Chancellor Gallagher and Heather, we are all definitely moving in the same direction with a shared vision for excellence on the field, in the classroom and in the community.”

Narduzzi was named the Panthers' head coach on Dec. 26, 2014. He arrived at Pitt following eight highly successful years as the defensive coordinator at Michigan State. Under his direction, the Spartans were the only team to rank in the nation's top 10 in total defense and rushing defense each season from 2011-14.

Working under two-time Big Ten Coach of the Year Mark Dantonio, Narduzzi helped Michigan State to five Top 25 finishes.

In 2014, the Spartans finished with a No. 5 national ranking and 11-2 record following a stirring 42-41 victory over Baylor in the AT&T Cotton Bowl. Narduzzi's defense shut out the high-scoring Bears in the fourth quarter, opening the door for 21 unanswered points by Michigan State.

Michigan State boasted the nation's top rushing defense in 2014, yielding just 88.5 yards per game. The Spartans finished third nationally with 34 turnovers gained and eighth in total defense, holding opponents to just 315.8 yards per contest.

In 2013, Michigan State finished No. 3 in the country following a Big Ten title and 24-20 victory over No. 5 Stanford in the Rose Bowl. In the wake of that championship season, Narduzzi was named the 2013 recipient of the prestigious Broyles Award, annually presented to the country's top assistant coach.

Narduzzi tutored an impressive list of decorated defensive players at Michigan State, including first team All-Americans in cornerback Darqueze Dennard, safety Kurtis Drummond, linebacker Greg Jones and defensive tackle Jerel Worthy.

Dennard was a unanimous All-American in 2013, becoming the first Michigan State cornerback to earn that distinction. He also was the school's first winner of the Jim Thorpe Award, given annually to college football's top defensive back.

Narduzzi coached 19 first-team All-Big Ten selections. Four players won the conference's top individual awards under his watch, including two Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year honorees (Dennard in 2013 and Drummond in 2014). Shilique Calhoun was the Big Ten Defensive Lineman of the Year in 2013 while Greg Jones was the overall Defensive Player of the Year in 2009.

In coming to Pittsburgh, Narduzzi was reunited with former Michigan State running back Le'Veon Bell, now a Pro Bowler with the neighboring Pittsburgh Steelers. Although Bell played on the opposite side of the ball, he faced Narduzzi's defense every day in practice in East Lansing from 2010-12. The fiery defensive coordinator made a strong impression on him.

“When I watched the way he acted with the defense, I could just always tell that our players loved him,” Bell said. “They loved playing for him. He is just an overall great guy. He is a player's coach. He is a guy who is always for his players. He loves his players. He always puts those guys first.”

Prior to Michigan State, Narduzzi spent three years (2004-06) as defensive coordinator under Dantonio at Cincinnati, helping the Bearcats to a pair of bowl invitations.

In 2003, Narduzzi was the defensive coordinator at Miami of Ohio under the late Terry Hoepfner. The RedHawks stormed to a 13-1 record that season, capturing the Mid-American Conference (MAC) championship and defeating nationally ranked Louisville in the GMAC Bowl to finish No. 10 in the Associated Press poll.

While quarterback Ben Roethlisberger headlined Miami's offense, Narduzzi's stout unit topped the MAC in rushing defense (19th nationally), scoring defense (22nd nationally) and pass efficiency defense (34th nationally).

Narduzzi served as linebackers coach at Northern Illinois for three seasons (2000-02). NIU won a pair of MAC divisional titles during his tenure and in 2002 had the league's top rushing defense.

From 1993-99, Narduzzi coached at his alma mater, Rhode Island, serving as the Rams' defensive coordinator his final two seasons. He began his coaching career at Miami of Ohio, working as a graduate assistant in 1990 and 1991, before earning his first full-time position as receivers coach for the 1992 season.

Narduzzi was an All-Ohio performer at Youngstown's Ursuline High School, leading the Irish to the Steel Valley championship and state playoffs as a senior in 1984. He was a starting linebacker under his father, the late Bill Narduzzi, as a freshman at Youngstown State University in 1985 before transferring to Rhode Island, where he became a three-year starter for the Rams from 1987-89.

Bill Narduzzi was head coach at YSU from 1975-85. He led the Penguins to two NCAA Division II playoff appearances, including the national championship game in 1979, and twice was named the Ohio Valley Conference (OVC) Coach of the Year. (One of Bill's first coaching posts was as a freshman line coach at Pitt in 1962.)

Pat Narduzzi completed his bachelor's degree in physical education at Rhode Island in 1990 and later earned a master's degree in sports studies at Miami of Ohio in 1992. He and his wife, Donna, have four children: Arianna, Christina, Patrick and Isabella.

Entering his second season on Pat Narduzzi's Pitt staff, Charlie Partridge is a tremendous asset with his experience as an FBS head coach, accomplished assistant and renowned recruiter. Reflective of his invaluable contributions, Partridge was elevated to assistant head coach by Narduzzi this offseason. Partridge's positional focus will remain on the Panthers' emerging defensive front.

This is Partridge's second tour at Pitt. He originally served under head coaches Walt Harris and Dave Wannstedt as an assistant from 2003-07. Partridge returned to Pittsburgh after serving the prior three seasons (2014-16) as head coach at Florida Atlantic University. Inheriting a program in need of a complete rebuild, he responded to the challenge by signing three of the finest recruiting classes in FAU history. His 2015 class was hailed as the best in Conference USA. The Owls also set new program standards for individual academic achievement and the highest team grade point average.

Partridge spent the 2013 season at Arkansas, where he served as assistant head coach and oversaw the defensive line. Under his watch, defensive ends Trey Flowers and Chris Smith were All-SEC performers. Partridge also contributed to the Razorbacks' special teams units that featured All-SEC kicker Zach Hocker and punter Sam Irwin-Hill, who ranked 15th nationally with a 44.3-yard average.

Partridge was instrumental in one of the best five-year runs in Wisconsin history from 2008-12. Initially serving as defensive line and specialist coach, he was elevated to associate head coach and co-defensive coordinator for his final two seasons. The Badgers won three consecutive Big Ten titles from 2010-12, earning Rose Bowl berths each season.

Partridge oversaw a physical, game-changing defensive front at Wisconsin. His most accomplished pupil was defensive end J.J. Watt, who was a 2010 All-American and winner of the Lott IMPACT Trophy as the national defensive player of the year. A first-round pick of the Houston Texans in 2011, Watt is now one of the NFL's elite players.

During Partridge's initial Pitt tenure, he worked with the defensive line for four seasons and the linebackers in his final campaign. He also served as the Panthers' special teams coordinator in 2006-07.

In 2007, Pitt ranked fifth in the nation in total defense, yielding just 297.7 yards per game. The Panthers closed that season with one of the most celebrated victories—and defensive performances—in school history: a 13-9 upset of West Virginia that shattered the Mountaineers' national title hopes.

Under the guidance of Partridge and defensive coordinator Paul Rhoads in 2007, first-year starting middle linebacker Scott McKillop led the nation in tackles (12.6 per game), earning All-America status and unanimous first-team All-Big East honors. Another Partridge protégé, defensive end Joe Clermond, led the Big East in tackles for loss (16.5) in 2006.

Pitt's special teams were highly productive under Partridge's guidance. In 2006, the Panthers led the Big East in net punting (37.5 avg.) and kickoff returns (24.1 yards avg.). During the 2007 campaign, Pitt topped the conference in field goal percentage (81.8%, 18-22) and PAT kicking (100%, 28-28), while ranking second in kickoff returns (22.9 avg.).

ESPN's 2006 College Football "Play of the Year" was actually a Pitt special teams gem—Darrelle Revis' 73-yard punt return for a touchdown against West Virginia.

Prior to Pitt, Partridge served four seasons (1998-2001) at Iowa State in administrative and coaching roles. He was a defensive graduate assistant in 1998-99, working with the outside linebackers. Following the 1999 season he earned a full-time appointment as the program's director of football operations.

In 2002, Partridge was hired by Eastern Illinois University as defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator. The Panthers advanced to the NCAA I-AA playoffs that year and shared the Ohio Valley Conference (OVC) championship.

Partridge was an NSCA All-America defensive lineman for Drake University. His collegiate coaching career began at his alma mater as a Drake graduate assistant during the 1996 and 1997 seasons.

Shawn Watson, who owns an extensive and accomplished record overseeing offenses on the collegiate level, enters his second season as Pitt's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

Watson previously served as offensive coordinator at Texas (2014-15), Louisville (2012-13), Nebraska (2007-10) and Colorado (2000-05). He also has head coaching experience on his resumé, serving in that capacity at his alma mater, Southern Illinois, from 1994-96.

During Watson's initial Pitt campaign, the Panthers had a true freshman see significant action at quarterback for the first time in a decade. When Kenny Pickett opened the game under center against the No. 2 Miami Hurricanes to close the regular season, he became the first true frosh QB to start at Pitt since 2007. Under Watson's guidance, Pickett would deliver one of the best freshman performances in all of college football last season, accounting for all three Pitt touchdowns in a 24-14 upset of Miami.

Watson joined the Panthers from Indiana, where he spent the 2016 season as an offensive quality control assistant before being named the Hoosiers' quarterback coach. His Pitt appointment served as a reunion with Narduzzi. The pair previously worked together on the late Randy Walker's staff at Miami (Ohio) from 1990-92.

Watson counts among his protégés New York Jets quarterback Teddy Bridgewater, who he coached for three seasons at Louisville (2011-13). Under Watson's guidance, Bridgewater became one of the nation's most dazzling players while the resurgent Cardinals went a combined 30-9 during that three-year span and claimed two Big East championships.

In 2013, Louisville went 12-1 as Bridgewater threw for 3,970 yards and 31 touchdowns with only four interceptions. He led the nation in completion percentage (71%) and was a finalist for the prestigious Manning Award. The Minnesota Vikings' first-round selection in the 2014 draft, Bridgewater went on to be named the Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Year.

Prior to Louisville, Watson spent five seasons (2006-10) at Nebraska. His work helped the Cornhuskers annually rank among the nation's most productive offenses.

In 2010, Nebraska ranked ninth nationally in rushing (247.6 avg.), while averaging more than 30 points per game. Nebraska's 2008 offense ranked 12th nationally in total yards (450.8 avg.), 15th in passing yards (281.0), 15th in pass efficiency (154.5 rating) and 17th in scoring (35.4 avg.). In 2007, Watson's initial season as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, Nebraska threw for a school-record 3,886 yards, ranking seventh in the nation in passing yards (323.8 avg.) and ninth in total offense (468.2 avg.).

Cornhuskers quarterback Joe Ganz set 23 school records under Watson's guidance, including single-season marks for total offense (3,826), passing yards (3,568), completions (285) and completion percentage (67.9%).

Watson coached at Colorado from 1999-2005, helping the Buffaloes claim four Big 12 North Division titles and a conference championship in 2001.

That 2001 Colorado team will forever be remembered for its 62-36 demolition of No. 2 Nebraska in the regular-season finale, followed by a thrilling 39-37 win over No. 3 Texas in the Big 12 title game to earn a Fiesta Bowl berth. Watson's offense ranked eighth nationally in rushing (228.5 avg.) and 20th in total yards (434.4 avg.).

Watson coached quarterbacks at Northwestern during the 1997 and 1998 seasons. His appointment in Evanston came after serving three years as head coach at Southern Illinois, where he coached 20 all-conference players. Watson himself was a safety at SIU (1979-80) and began his coaching career as a Salukis graduate assistant in 1982.

His additional coaching stops include Miami of Ohio (1987-93) and Illinois (1983-1986). Watson and his wife, Anita, have three children: daughter Amber and sons Aaron and Adam.

Randy Bates, a veteran of the collegiate coaching profession with nearly four decades of experience, enters his first season as Pitt's defensive coordinator.

Bates arrives in Pittsburgh after spending the past 12 seasons (2006-17) coaching linebackers at Northwestern. Bates' unit was instrumental in the Wildcats' 10-3 mark last season, which included a Music City Bowl win over Kentucky (24-23). Northwestern finished No. 17 in the final polls.

His accomplished pupils at Northwestern included back-to-back All-America linebackers. Anthony Walker Jr., now a member of the Indianapolis Colts, was a consensus All-Big Ten selection who earned All-America accolades from Associated Press and *Sports Illustrated*.

Additionally, Bates oversaw the development of Paddy Fisher, who was named a 2017 Freshman All-American by the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA). Fisher was honored as the Big Ten Network's Defensive Freshman of the Year.

Prior to his tenure with the Wildcats, Bates spent six seasons at Louisiana Tech (2000-05). He coached nearly every defensive positional group while with the Bulldogs before ascending to defensive coordinator for his final season. Under Bates' orchestration in 2005, the Louisiana Tech defense forced a whopping 31 turnovers to lead the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) and rank ninth nationally. The Bulldogs surrendered their fewest points since 1994 and finished among the WAC's top three teams in rushing defense, pass defense, total defense and scoring defense.

Among the standouts under Bates at Louisiana Tech were three defensive backs who played in the NFL: safety Bobby Gray (Chicago Bears), cornerback Jerron Wishom (Green Bay Packers) and Pro Bowl cornerback Tramon Williams, now a member of the Arizona Cardinals who concluded his 12th NFL campaign in 2017.

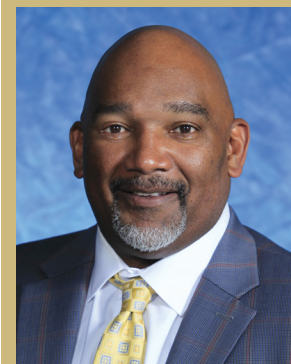
Before Louisiana Tech, Bates was the linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator at Kent State for two seasons (1998-99). While with the Golden Flashes, he coached future NFL Defensive Player of the Year James Harrison.

Bates coached the linebackers at New Hampshire from 1992-97, mentoring three players who finished among the top 10 career tacklers in program history. The Wildcats claimed three Yankee Conference Northern Division titles during his tenure.

Bates' additional coaching stops include Navy (1989-1991), St. Joseph's (Ind.) College (1984-1988), Miami (Ohio) (1983) and Muskingum College (1982).

A retired Naval Lieutenant, Bates received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Ohio State in 1983. He also earned a master's degree in education from Miami University in 1985.

Andre Powell enters his fourth season as Pitt's special teams coordinator and running backs coach. His impact on both areas of responsibility has been nothing short of exceptional.

Under Powell's influence, Quadree Henderson established himself as the most explosive kick returner in Pitt history. Henderson finished his collegiate career with a Pitt-record seven kick returns for touchdowns.

In 2016, Henderson was the NCAA statistical champion in kickoff return TDs (a school-record three) and combined kick return yards (1,166). Henderson earned consensus All-America honors, becoming the first player in Pitt history to earn that stature as a return specialist. He signed with the Pittsburgh Steelers in April.

The kicking game has been responsible for some of Pitt's biggest wins the past three years. Chris Blewitt, who concluded his career in 2016 as Pitt's all-time kick scoring leader (363 points), had four game-winning field goals during his final two seasons. His biggest came at Clemson in 2016, a 48-yarder with six seconds left that lifted Pitt past the eventual national champion Tigers, 43-42.

In the offensive backfield, Powell has coached two 1,000-yard rushers at Pitt. In 2016, James Conner rumbled for 1,092 yards and 16 touchdowns in earning first team All-ACC. Conner is now a member of the Pittsburgh Steelers. In 2015, Quadree Ollison was the ACC Offensive Rookie of the Year after rushing for 1,121 yards and 11 touchdowns. Ollison became just the fifth freshman in Pitt history to achieve a 1,000-yard rushing season.

Prior to Pitt, Powell spent four seasons at Maryland (2011-14), where he coached the running backs and, in his final three seasons, served as special teams coordinator. In ESPN's 2014 team efficiency rankings, the Terrapins' special teams were rated No. 11 in the country. Maryland's Brad Craddock was selected the 2014 winner of the prestigious Lou Groza Award, annually presented to college football's top placekicker.

In 2012, Maryland boasted a dynamic return game that featured freshman Stefan Diggs, who totaled 1,896 all-purpose yards, the second-highest season total in school history. Diggs earned All-ACC as a specialist after finishing second in the league with a 28.5-yard kickoff return average.

Powell coached at Clemson from 2007-10, overseeing the running backs each of his four seasons and coordinating the special teams his last three. Powell mentored all-time Clemson great C.J. Spiller, a 2009 unanimous All-American and ACC Player of the Year. During his decorated campaign, Spiller became the first running back in ACC history to compile 1,000 rushing yards and 500 receiving yards in the same season.

Spiller concluded his Clemson career with 7,588 all-purpose yards, the second most in FBS history. His seven kickoff return touchdowns set an NCAA record, while his eight total kick return TDs (including one punt) tied the national mark. Spiller was a first-round NFL Draft pick of the Buffalo Bills in 2010. Powell also tutored All-ACC running back James Davis, the second all-time leading rusher in Clemson history with 3,881 yards.

Powell coached running backs at North Carolina from 2001-06. He was the Tar Heels' special teams coordinator his final three seasons in Chapel Hill. UNC ranked seventh nationally in kickoff returns in 2005 (24.93 avg.) and 29th in 2006 (22.12 avg.). The '06 Tar Heels also ranked 14th in kickoff return yardage defense (17.46 avg.).

At Virginia from 1996-2000, Powell coached the running backs (1996 and 2000) and receivers (1997-99). Among his pupils were future NFL players Tiki Barber, Germaine Crowell, Thomas Jones, Charles Kirby, Pat Washington and Terrence Wilkins.

Powell first worked with Pat Narduzzi on the football staff at Rhode Island during the 1993 and 1994 seasons. Powell's additional coaching stops include Indiana (1989), South Carolina (1990), Army (1991 and 1995) and Virginia Military Institute (1992).

Powell is a 1989 graduate of Indiana, where he lettered twice as a fullback and helped pave the way for 1,000-yard rusher Anthony Thompson. He played on a pair of bowl teams for the Hoosiers (1986 All-American Bowl and 1988 Peach Bowl). Powell and his wife, Joann, have two daughters, Alayna and Mikala, and a son, Andre II.

Rob Harley enters his fourth season as linebackers coach at Pitt. Harley assumed the additional responsibilities of recruiting coordinator prior to the 2017 season.

Outside linebacker Oluwaseun Idowu has emerged as one of the most productive defenders in the ACC under Harley's watch. A former walk-on safety, Idowu had an outstanding 2017 season, leading the Panthers in tackles (94), TFLs (11.5) and sacks (five). He was named a second-team All-ACC selection by the media and is poised for even greater accolades in 2018.

In 2016, the Panthers' linebackers helped key a rush defense that finished 16th nationally, yielding just 119.6 yards per game. Middle linebacker Matt Galambos enjoyed the best production of his career over the 2015-16 seasons, achieving personal bests in every category under Harley's direction. Galambos signed a free-agent contract with the Pittsburgh Steelers. Another productive linebacker from that 2016 squad, Bam Bradley, was a rookie for the Baltimore Ravens last season.

In Harley's initial season at Pitt, he was instrumental in the development of outside linebacker Nicholas Grigsby, a 2015 All-ACC performer. Grigsby played for the AFC champion New England Patriots last year.

Harley joined Pitt after spending the 2014 season as the linebackers coach at FIU, where he helped the Golden Panthers rank among the most disruptive defenses in college football. FIU ranked first nationally in fumble recoveries (19), second in defensive touchdowns (six), fourth in turnovers gained (33), eighth in turnover margin (plus-11 overall; 0.92 margin per game) and 35th in total defense (363.8 yards per game).

Harley's Pitt appointment served as a reunion with Pat Narduzzi. Harley was a graduate assistant at Michigan State for two seasons (2012-13) when Narduzzi was the Spartans' defensive coordinator.

At Michigan State, Harley gained experience on both sides of the ball. In 2013, he worked with the linebackers and special teams, helping the Spartans to a 13-1 record, the Big Ten title and a 24-20 victory over Stanford in the Rose Bowl. Michigan State's defense yielded just 252.2 yards per game to rank second nationally.

In 2012, Harley worked with the Spartans' offense and special teams. Behind 1,793-yard rusher Le'Veon Bell, Michigan State earned a berth in the Buffalo Wild Wings Bowl, where it defeated TCU, 17-16.

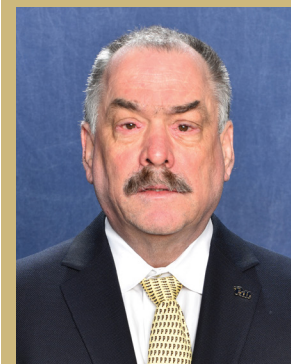

Dave Borbely, who owns a long and productive history of developing impact offensive linemen, was named Pitt's new offensive line coach by Pat Narduzzi in February.

Borbely (BOAR-bah-lee) has more than three decades of experience coaching offensive line play at the collegiate level. He owns 37 years of experience overall, including tenures at Notre Dame, Colorado, Virginia, Louisville, Stanford and, most recently, Maryland.

Borbely spent the past two seasons at Maryland. In 2016, his offensive front helped the Terps produce 2,594 rushing yards, only the seventh time in program history—and first since 2003—the Terps surpassed 2,500 yards on the ground. Maryland also rushed for 26 touchdowns in 2016, its most since the 2007 campaign.

Borbely is highly familiar with the Atlantic Coast Conference, serving two tours at Virginia (2006-09 and 2015). While with the Cavs, he oversaw the development of All-America tackle Eugene Monroe, who won the 2008 Jacobs Blocking Trophy, annually presented to the ACC's top blocker. Monroe was the eighth overall selection in the 2009 NFL Draft, taken by the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Borbely has collaborated with Pitt offensive coordinator Shawn Watson at two prior stops. They most recently served together on Charlie Strong's staff at Louisville. During the 2012 and 2013 seasons, the Cardinals achieved a combined 23-3 record, twice finishing in the nation's top 15.

Louisville's 2012 team went 11-2, won the Big East championship and rolled past No. 3 Florida, 33-23, in the Sugar Bowl to finish 13th in the final polls. In 2013, Louisville's potent offense averaged 460.8 yards per contest en route to a 12-1 mark. The Cardinals capped that season with a 36-9 drubbing of Miami in the Russell Athletic Bowl and earned a No. 15 final ranking.

Borbely and Watson also worked together at Colorado. During Borbely's four-year tenure (2002-05), the Buffs won three Big 12 North titles. Among the players he developed was All-Big 12 center Mark Fenton, a finalist for the prestigious Rimington Award.

Prior to Colorado, Borbely spent four seasons coaching the offensive line at Notre Dame (1998-2001). The Irish annually fielded a potent rushing game behind Borbely's front and advanced to two New Year's Day bowl games (1999 Gator Bowl and 2001 Fiesta Bowl).

From 1995-97, Borbely coached the offensive line at Stanford, molding a pair of NFL Draft picks in guard Brad Badger and tackle Nathan Parks.

Borbely's additional offensive line appointments include Colorado State-Pueblo (during the ThunderWolves' 2014 NCAA Division II national title season), Tulane (1992-94), Temple (1989-91) and Rice (1986-88).

He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Evansville (1981-82) before serving as a freshman defensive line coach in the Ivy League at Penn (1983). Borbely's first major-college appointment came as a graduate assistant at Tennessee (1984-85) under Johnny Majors, the legendary former Pitt head coach.

A native of Hammond, Ind., Borbely is a 1981 graduate of DePauw University with a bachelor's degree in history. He earned his master's degree in secondary education from the University of Evansville in 1983.

Borbely and his wife, Bev, have three children: daughter Laura and sons Joseph and Brian. They have one granddaughter, Avery.

SECONDARY

Archie Collins, who coordinated one of the nation's top pass defenses last season at Central Michigan University, was appointed to the Pitt assistant coaching staff in January by Pat Narduzzi. Collins will oversee the Panthers' secondary.

A Detroit native, Collins spent the past five seasons at Central Michigan (2013-17). Following four impact years working with the CMU secondary, he was elevated to defensive passing game coordinator for his final season with the Chippewas.

Collins' influence helped Central Michigan in 2017 lead the Mid-American Conference (MAC) in interceptions (19), fewest passing yards allowed (185.5 yards/game) and pass efficiency defense (108.8 rating). On a national scale, the Chippewas ranked sixth nationally in pass efficiency defense, seventh in interceptions and 20th in passing defense. FootballScoop named Collins a finalist for the 2017 Defensive Back Coach of the Year award.

At Central Michigan, two of Collins' defensive backs, cornerback Amari Coleman and safety Josh Cox, were 2017 All-MAC honorees. Coleman was a first-team selection for the second consecutive season and finished his collegiate career with three interceptions returned for touchdowns. Cox intercepted six passes as a senior to finish seventh in the nation (0.5 INTs/game).

Collins' ball-hawking secondary helped Central Michigan to an 8-5 record and runner-up finish in the MAC West Division with a 6-2 mark this past season. CMU played in the 2017 Idaho Potato Bowl, its fourth consecutive bowl appearance.

During Collins' tenure, Central Michigan ranked among the nation's top 25 in passing defense three times: 2017, 2015 (No. 24, 193.0 avg.) and 2013 (No. 20, 203.9 avg.). In 2016, CMU finished eighth nationally with four defensive touchdowns—all pick-sixes by Collins' defensive backs.

Among the other standouts under Collins' watch was Kaven Frazier, an All-MAC safety in 2015 who now plays for the Dallas Cowboys.

Collins was also highly productive on the recruiting trail at CMU. In 2015, he was named the MAC's Recruiter of the Year by Scout.com.

Prior to Central Michigan, Collins was a defensive graduate assistant from 2010-12 at Michigan State, his alma mater. It was during this coaching assistantship that he first met Pat Narduzzi, who was the Spartans' defensive coordinator at the time.

In addition to contributing to one of college football's elite defensive units, Collins worked daily with future NFL defensive backs Darqueze Dennard, Kurtis Drummond and Trae Waynes. Collins also helped with the special teams during his time in East Lansing.

Collins' additional experience includes nine years coaching high school football in the Detroit Public School League. He worked at three PSL schools (Cass Tech, Mackenzie and Southeastern), producing nine all-state performers and 28 all-city honorees.

A safety at Michigan State, Collins finished his career as a two-year letterman (1996-97) for the Spartans.

He graduated from Michigan State in 1998 with a bachelor's degree in finance. Collins went on to earn a master's degree in kinesiology and coaching from MSU in 2011. He and his wife, Brandi, have three children: son Archie IV and daughters Amber and BellaRose.

TIM SALEM

TIGHT ENDS

Having spent more than three decades in collegiate coaching, Tim Salem boasts experience that is not only extensive but also diverse. Salem has served as offensive coordinator at four different schools and coached four different positions on that side of the ball.

Entering his fourth season as Pitt's tight ends coach, Salem's broad perspective is a great asset for the Panthers on the field and in recruiting.

Under Salem's watch, Scott Orndoff enjoyed one of the most productive seasons ever by a Pitt tight end in 2016, compiling 35 catches for 579 yards (16.5 avg.) and five touchdowns. Orndoff played in the historic East-West Shrine Game and spent the 2017 season with the Cincinnati Bengals.

In his initial season at Pitt, Salem tutored tight end J.P. Holtz, who posted career production as a senior en route to 2015 All-ACC honors. Holtz was a member of the Cleveland Browns the past two years.

Prior to Pitt, Salem spent three seasons at Illinois (2012-14) as special teams coordinator. He also coached the running backs in 2012 and 2013. Salem's units helped Illinois earn an invitation to the 2014 Heart of Dallas Bowl. Punter Justin DuVernois earned All-Big Ten honors after averaging 44.0 yards per punt to rank second in the Big Ten and 18th nationally.

In 2013, V'Angelo Bentley led the Big Ten and ranked seventh nationally in punt returns with a 15.8-yard average. Bentley also became the first player in Illinois history to score touchdowns on both punt and kickoff returns in the same season.

At UCF from 2004-11, Salem coached some of the most productive and decorated players in school history. In 2007, running back Kevin Smith was a consensus All-American after leading the nation in rushing yards (2,567) and rushing touchdowns (29). Smith's rushing total that season remains the third highest in Bowl Subdivision history, trailing only Oklahoma State's Barry Sanders (2,628 in 1988) and Wisconsin's Melvin Gordon (2,587 in 2014).

UCF won its first Conference USA championship in 2007 with Salem at the controls of the offense. The Knights won 10 games, setting school records for points (502), touchdowns (62) and rushing yards (3,287) in the process.

Overseeing UCF's special teams, Salem mentored three of the country's most explosive kick returners. Rannell Hall (2011), Quincy McDuffie (2010) and Joe Burnett (2008) were all first-team All-Conference USA return men and ranked in the nation's top 10 in kickoff return average. McDuffie, in fact, was second nationally with a 32.2-yard average in 2010.

In 2003, Salem was the offensive coordinator, quarterbacks coach and kicking coach at Eastern Michigan. While at EMU, he worked with placekicker Andrew Wellock, who would go on to be a Lou Groza Award finalist.

From 1997-2000, Salem was the quarterbacks coach at Ohio State. He added the Buckeyes' wide receivers to his positional responsibilities in 2000. In 1998, Joe Germaine was the Big Ten Player of the Year, throwing for 3,330 yards and 25 touchdowns with only seven interceptions in leading the Buckeyes to an 11-1 record and No. 2 ranking in the final polls.

From 1991-96, Salem worked at Purdue where he initially served as quarterbacks coach and then, in his final three years, offensive coordinator. The Boilermakers led the Big Ten in rushing in 1995.

Salem's other coaching stops include Colorado State (1989-90) and Phoenix College (1987-88). A 1985 graduate of Arizona State, he began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater for two seasons. Salem began his collegiate playing career at Minnesota, where he broke the Big Ten record for consecutive pass completions in 1980, before transferring to Arizona State for the 1983-84 seasons.

Salem comes from a family of coaches. His father, Joe, served as head coach at South Dakota (1966-74), Northern Arizona (1975-78) and Minnesota (1979-83). Tim's brother, Brad Salem, is the quarterbacks coach at Michigan State.

SAFETIES

Cory Sanders, who oversaw the secondary at Western Michigan University last season and also has experience as a collegiate head coach, was named safeties coach at Pitt in February by Pat Narduzzi.

As the defensive backs coach at Western Michigan in 2017, Sanders oversaw the development of two All-Mid-American Conference (MAC) cornerbacks, Darius Phillips and Sam Beal. Phillips had two defensive returns for touchdowns last season (67-yard fumble and 43-yard interception) and played in the prestigious Senior Bowl before being drafted by the Cincinnati Bengals.

Prior to WMU, Sanders was part of shaping an NCAA Division II program at the University of West Florida, which played its inaugural season in 2016. He was named the program's first defensive coordinator in December 2014 and was instrumental in building a foundation for the Argonauts' opening campaign 18 months later.

UWF went 5-6 in 2016, the most victories for a first-year Division II program in a decade. Sanders' aggressive defense ranked 11th nationally in quarterback sacks (3.6 sacks/game) and 26th in tackles for loss (8.2 TFLs/game) that season, while Argonauts safety Trent Archie was named the Gulf South Conference Defensive Freshman of the Year.

Prior to West Florida, Sanders spent five seasons (2010-14) on the football staff at Division II Saint Joseph's (Ind.) College, his alma mater. The team's defensive coordinator his initial year, Sanders was promoted to head coach for the 2011 season and rebuilt the Pumas into a contender in the Great Lakes Valley Conference (GLVC).

The team achieved runner-up finishes in the GLVC in each of his final two seasons, while featuring a nationally ranked defense. The Pumas also set a school record for single-season total offense (4,594 yards) during his tenure and produced 36 All-GLVC performers.

Sanders' initial coaching appointments came at North Central College (2007) and Elmhurst College (2008-09). He coached the defensive backs at both Illinois institutions.

Sanders himself was an outstanding collegiate defensive back. He was a four-time all-conference honoree at Saint Joseph's and was elected a Pumas team captain three times. Sanders was an instrumental performer for two conference championship teams and finished his career fifth in school history with 30.5 TFLs.

Sanders is a 2007 graduate of Saint Joseph's with a bachelor's degree in business administration. He is engaged to Jessica Rose.

KEVIN SHERMAN

WIDE RECEIVERS

Kevin Sherman enters his fourth year as wide receivers coach at Pitt. A veteran teacher of the position, Sherman's lengthy list of pupils includes some of the most productive pass catchers in recent ACC history.

A reflection of Sherman's knack for developing impact receivers is Jester Weah, who signed with the Houston Texans this past spring. Weah entered the 2016 season with zero career catches but over his final two seasons became one of the ACC's top deep threats.

Over his junior and senior seasons, Weah had seven touchdown catches that covered 50-plus yards, the most by any receiver in the ACC over those two years. He set a Pitt career record by averaging 20.4 yards per reception.

Another big-play receiver under Sherman's watch was Quadree Henderson, who in 2016 joined the legendary Tony Dorsett as the only players in Pitt history to eclipse 2,000 all-purpose yards in a season. Henderson earned consensus All-America honors that year, becoming the first Pitt sophomore to earn consensus status since Larry Fitzgerald in 2003. Henderson signed with the Pittsburgh Steelers this past spring.

Former Pitt star Tyler Boyd was also a beneficiary of Sherman's mentorship in 2015, a season in which Boyd led the ACC and ranked seventh nationally in receptions per game (7.6 avg.). A second-round pick of Cincinnati, Boyd immediately impacted the Bengals' lineup and was one of the NFL's top rookie receivers in 2016.

Sherman joined Pat Narduzzi's Pitt staff after serving the prior two seasons as wide receivers coach at Purdue (2013-14). He arrived in Pittsburgh very familiar with the ACC, having also coached receivers at Virginia Tech (2006-12) and Wake Forest (2001-05).

At Virginia Tech, Sherman mentored two of the school's most prolific pass catchers in Jarrett Boykin and Danny Coale. The pair starred for the Hokies from 2008-11 before embarking on NFL careers. Boykin concluded his career as Virginia Tech's all-time leader in receptions (184) and receiving yards (2,884), while Coale finished second in each category (165 catches for 2,658 yards).

Sherman also coached 2008 NFL Draft picks Eddie Royal and Josh Morgan at Virginia Tech. A first-team All-ACC performer, Royal was a second-round pick of the Denver Broncos and was an NFL All-Rookie Team honoree. Morgan was a sixth-round pick of the San Francisco 49ers.

During Sherman's seven-year tenure in Blacksburg, Virginia Tech went bowling each season (including four BCS bids), captured three ACC titles and compiled a 70-25 record (.737).

Working at Wake Forest under Jim Grobe, Sherman coached All-ACC performers John Stone and Fabian Davis. Both went on to play in the NFL. Additionally, Jason Anderson set Wake Forest's career record by averaging 18.0 yards per reception from 2001-04.

Sherman also served as receivers coach under Grobe at Ohio University from 1997-2000. During that four-year period, the Bobcats shed years of losing and emerged as a Mid-American Conference title contender, going 21-11 in MAC play and 25-19 overall. Ohio's 8-3 record in 1997 marked the program's winningest campaign in 29 years.

Prior to Ohio, Sherman worked at Virginia Military Institute (VMI) from 1993-96. He served in multiple coaching capacities with the Keydets, including running backs, quarterbacks and receivers. Sherman coached one of the greatest players in VMI history, All-America running back Thomas Haskins, who became the all-time NCAA I-AA rushing leader with 5,349 yards. He additionally coached quarterback Al Lester, who threw for nearly 4,000 career yards.

A 1992 graduate of Ferrum (Va.) College, Sherman was named a football team captain and the Panthers' Most Valuable Player as a senior in 1990. After serving Ferrum as a student assistant in 1991, he moved to Methodist (N.C.) College, where he coached the receivers in 1992. In addition to his wealth of collegiate experience, Sherman also worked with the Denver Broncos as an NFL coaching intern during the summer of 2004.

HEAD STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH

One of Pat Narduzzi's first moves at Pitt was hiring Dave Andrews as head strength and conditioning coach.

That decision has continuously paid dividends as Pitt has displayed a renewed toughness and tenacity, resulting in 21 victories the past three seasons. The Panthers have achieved milestone wins over 2016 national champion Clemson, playoff contender Miami and historic rival Penn State. A vital element in those victories was the strength and conditioning preparation orchestrated by Andrews and his staff.

Described by Narduzzi as "a highly disciplined coach who instills toughness in our entire program," Andrews arrived at Pitt with strong credentials in both physical development and as a former player. He was a tight end on Ohio State's 2002 national championship team and has spent the past decade as a major-college strength coach.

He is a certified strength and conditioning coach by the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association (CSCCA) and USA Weightlifting (USAW) as a level one sports performance coach.

In 2014, Andrews was an assistant director of strength and conditioning at Notre Dame, which defeated LSU, 31-28, in the Music City Bowl.

Prior to Notre Dame, he spent two seasons as the associate head strength and conditioning coach at Illinois (2012-13). From 2005-11, Andrews served in various strength and conditioning capacities at the University of Cincinnati, including his final four years when he was the Bearcats' head Olympic strength and conditioning coach. Chris LaSala enters his 22nd season as a member of the University of Pittsburgh's football staff. In 2016, LaSala was promoted to associate athletic director for football administration.

LaSala has a well-earned reputation as one of the nation's finest football operations professionals. His responsibilities have expanded in recent years, both within the football program and overall athletic department.

In addition to his invaluable contributions to football, LaSala is an important member of Pitt's sport administration team and he played a key role in the development of *The Strategic Plan for Pitt Athletics* unveiled in 2016.

LaSala is one of the athletic department's longest tenured staff members, joining the Panthers in 1997 as director of football operations. He was named an assistant athletic director in 2000, serving in that capacity until his recent promotion.

LaSala has handled a wide variety of responsibilities with the Pitt football program over the years, including team travel accommodations, youth summer camps, coaching clinics and preseason training camp arrangements as well as daily administration. He also serves as the football program's liaison to numerous campus offices and within the athletic department.

One of LaSala's most impactful contributions at Pitt is his daily work with student-athletes in preparing them for life after college. His efforts have made the football program one of Pitt's most active and enthusiastic teams when it comes to community service. In fact, the football team was recently lauded for logging the most community service hours in the Pitt Athletic Department.

LaSala has been an instrumental figure in the dramatic upgrades within Pitt's practice facility during the past two years. During his tenure, the Eagles captured the 1994 Aloha Bowl and participated in the 1995 Kickoff Classic.

Before Boston College, LaSala spent four years at Temple in administration (1990-93) and ultimately was elevated to assistant athletic director. He initially joined Temple as a graduate assistant in 1988 and then returned to the Owls' football staff in 1990 as the administrative assistant.

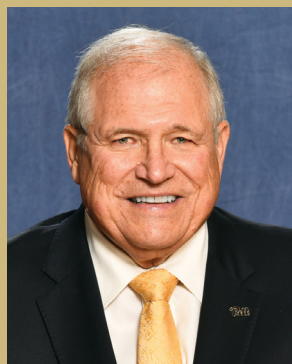

BOB JUNKO

Widely known and respected throughout the tri-state area, Bob Junko has spent 25 years representing the Pitt football program in many important capacities.

After spending nearly four decades in the coaching ranks, Junko moved to the administrative side of college football in 2007. Serving as Pitt's director of player development and high school relations since 2013, Junko's tremendous football acumen and contacts are invaluable for the Panthers.

A past honoree on the Rivals Top 25 Recruiters list, Junko is especially instrumental with Pitt's annual recruiting efforts and alumni outreach programs.

The 2018 season marks the 22nd year of Junko's second tour with the Panthers. He initially coached at Pitt from 1982-85, serving as defensive coordinator under head coach Foge Fazio. Junko returned in 1997 as defensive tackles coach under Walt Harris and also served the program as assistant head coach.

In his first stint with the Panthers, the 1982 team received a Cotton Bowl bid and finished ninth in the country. The 1983 Panthers earned a Fiesta Bowl berth and ranked 19th in the final polls.

Among the standouts on those defenses were tackle Bill Maas, defensive end Chris Doleman and defensive backs Tim Lewis and Tom Flynn, all of whom went on to careers in the NFL. Doleman was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2012.

Junko's Pitt tenure has been accomplished as well as lengthy. In total, he has been part of 17 bowl teams and worked with 13 first team All-Americans.

Prior to returning to Pittsburgh, Junko was the defensive coordinator at Kent State from 1995-96. Junko also served as the associate head coach and defensive coordinator for seven years at Akron (1988-94). He held similar positions at Northwestern, TCU and Tulsa, his alma mater.

As a collegian, Junko starred at Tulsa as an inside linebacker and was an Honorable Mention All-American in 1967. He was named to the All-Missouri Valley Conference team twice and served as Tulsa's captain.

Junko earned a bachelor's degree in history education in 1968 and his master's in educational administration in 1970 at Tulsa. He has been inducted into the University of Tulsa Sports Hall of Fame, Trinity High School Athletic Hall of Fame and the Washington-Greene County Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame.

OFFENSIVE QUALITY CONTROL



James Patton enters his second year as an offensive quality control assistant at Pitt. Patton joined the Panthers after being part of powerful offenses at Indiana (2013-16) and Oklahoma (2006-12) over the past decade.

Patton was the Hoosiers' tight ends and fullbacks coach his final three years in Bloomington. He initially served as special teams coordinator and assistant defensive line coach. Patton also had recruiting coordinator responsibilities at IU.

In 2015, Indiana became just the fourth team in FBS history to feature a 3,500-yard passer, two 1,000-yard rushers and one 1,000-yard receiver in a season. Oklahoma also accomplished this feat in 2008, when Patton was the Sooners' offensive line coach.

During his seven-season tenure at Oklahoma, Patton was part of five Big 12 championship teams. The Sooners compiled a 74-21 record (.779) from 2006-12, earning three Fiesta Bowl berths, a Cotton Bowl invitation and playing in the 2009 BCS title game.

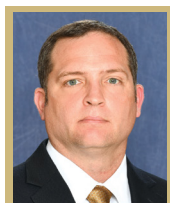

Prior to Pitt, Cooper spent seven years as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Butler University. His defenses annually ranked among the stingiest at the FCS level and keyed a highly successful period for the Bulldogs' program.

Butler won two Pioneer Football League (PFL) titles during Cooper's tenure. The 2013 team ranks as one of the finest in school history. Behind an opportunistic defensive unit that ranked among the nation's top 10 in forced turnovers and fumble recoveries, the Bulldogs earned their first-ever berth in the NCAA Division I Playoffs.

In 2009, Cooper was a defensive quality control assistant at Indiana. His IU appointment came after he had coached the secondary at Miami University from 2004-08, helping the RedHawks claim three MAC East Division championships.

Cooper began his Miami tenure in 2003 as a graduate assistant working under Pat Narduzzi, who was defensive coordinator.

That 2003 squad went 13-1, won the MAC championship and defeated nationally ranked Louisville in the GMAC Bowl to finish No. 10 in the Associated Press poll. The RedHawks that season topped the MAC in rushing defense (19th nationally), scoring defense (22nd nationally) and pass efficiency defense (34th nationally).

Cooper was the defensive coordinator at Carroll (Wis.) University in 2001 and 2002. He had positional oversight of the Pioneers' secondary and linebackers.

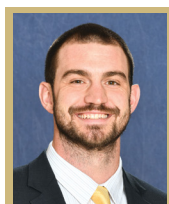
Cooper was a defensive graduate assistant at Connecticut in 2000, the Huskies' first year competing at the FBS (formerly I-A) level. He additionally was a defensive coaching assistant at Rhode Island in 1999 (when Narduzzi was the Rams' defensive coordinator) and served as an offensive graduate assistant working with the running backs at his alma mater, DePauw University, in 1997 and 1998.

A standout linebacker and team captain for DePauw, Cooper helped the Tigers to the 1996 Indiana Collegiate Athletic Conference (ICAC) championship.

Perish was ISU's Most Valuable Player as a senior in 2014, when he led the Sycamores to the NCAA playoffs for the first time in three decades. During that historic campaign, Perish rewrote the

school record book, setting new ISU single-season standards for total offense (3,309), passing yards (3,515), completion percentage (61.4), touchdown passes (21), passing attempts (528) and completions (324).

Perish threw for a school-record 407 yards in a first-round win over Eastern Kentucky, Indiana State's first playoff win since 1983.

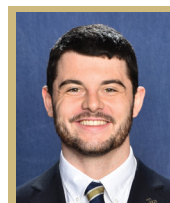
He finished as Indiana State's all-time leader in career passing yards (6,716) and placed second in career total offense (6,373).

Perish returned to his alma mater in 2016 as wide receivers coach. His pupils included All-Missouri Valley Football Conference (MVFC) performer Robert Tonyan, who set school records for touchdown catches in a season (10) and career (20). Tonyan was with the Green Bay Packers in 2017. He was promoted to an associate coach role for his final season in Champaign.

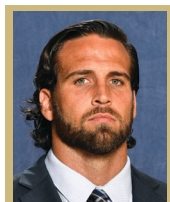

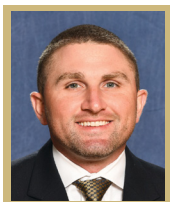
He also was a graduate assistant on Bowling Green's strength staff during the 2010 and 2011 seasons.

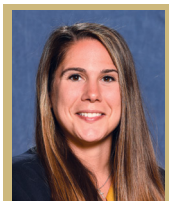

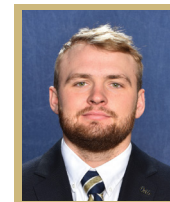

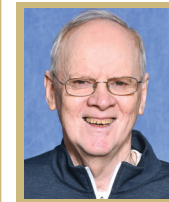

Pitt closed the 2017 season by stunning No. 2 Miami, which entered the game undefeated and entertaining College Football Playoff hopes...freshman quarterback Kenny Pickett was the catalyst in the 24-14 victory, accounting for all three Pitt touchdowns and totaling 253 yards in offense...Pickett, the first true frosh to start at QB for the Panthers since 2007 (Pat Bostick), completed 18-of-29 passes (62%) for 193 yards with zero interceptions and was Pitt's second-leading rusher with 60 yards on 13 carries (4.6 avg.)...Pickett's six-yard TD rush gave the Panthers (5-7, 3-5) a 10-7 lead right before intermission...late in the third quarter he connected with Quadree Ollison on a five-yard shovel pass to increase the advantage to 17-7...Pickett's final TD proved to be the clincher—a perfectly executed bootleg on fourth down that the freshman took for a 22-yard score and 24-7 Pitt lead with 2:54 to go...senior cornerback Avonte Maddox iced the upset when he strip-sacked Malik Rosier with 1:45 left...Pitt limited Miami (10-1, 7-1) to 232 total yards and just 45 on the ground...it was the second consecutive year Pitt knocked off an undefeated top-2 opponent...in 2016, Pitt defeated No. 3/2 Clemson, 43-42, in Death Valley...No. 2 Miami became the highest-ranked opponent the Panthers had ever beaten in Pittsburgh...previously, the highest-rated foe Pitt had defeated at home was No. 3 Fordham, 13-0, at Pitt Stadium on Nov. 8, 1941.

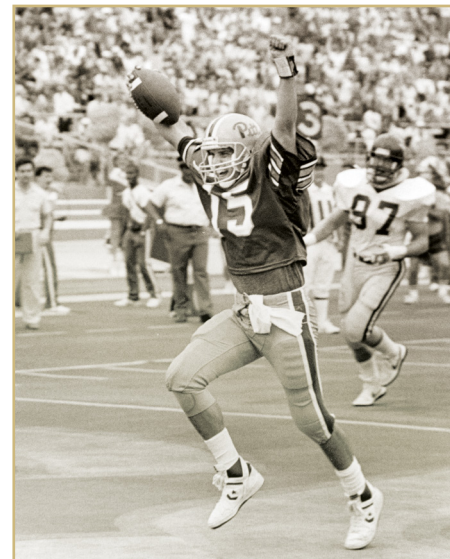

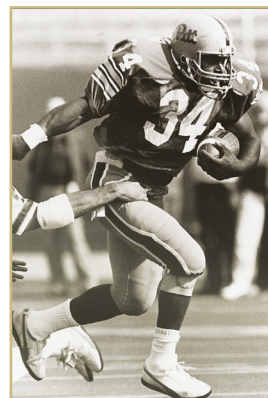

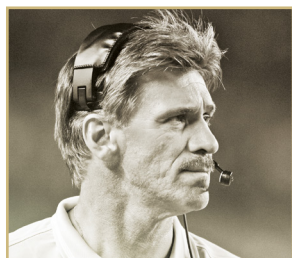
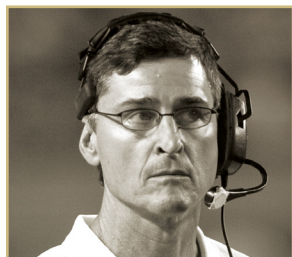

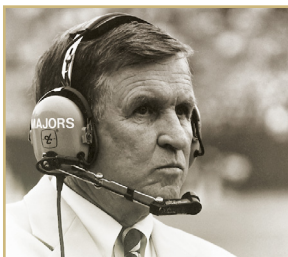

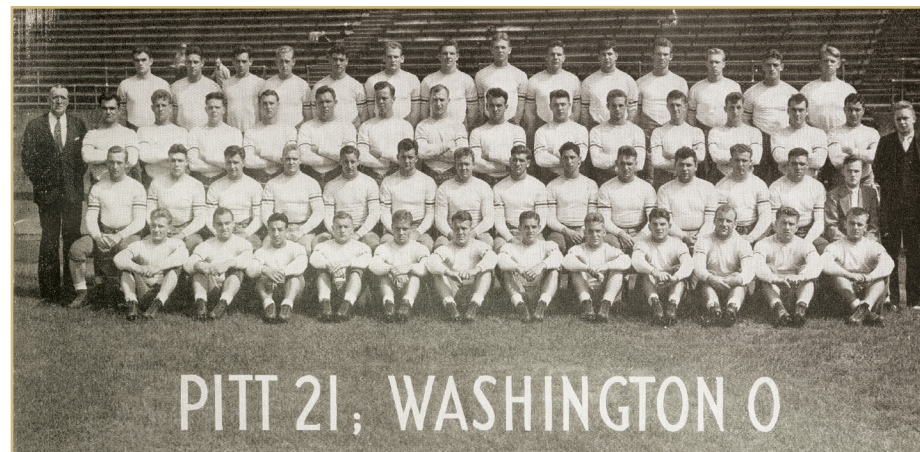

RATING SYSTEMS

To settle countless arguments, *Sports Illustrated* in 1967 researched the first and only complete and wholly accurate list ever compiled of college football's mythical national champions. Every recognized authority that ever presumed to name a No. 1 was included:

Associated Press (1936-current): poll of sportswriters and broadcasters.

Parke H. Davis Ratings (1889-1935): chosen by Davis, a player at Princeton in 1889 and a former coach at Wisconsin, Amherst and Lafayette, and first published in the 1934 *Spalding's Football Guide*.

Dickinson System (1924-40): chosen by University of Illinois economics professor Frank G. Dickinson; based on system that awarded various point totals for wins over teams with winning or non-winning records.

Dunkel System (1929-current): a power index rating system devised by Dick Dunkel and syndicated to newspapers around the nation.

Football Writers Association of America (1954-current): chosen by a panel representing membership.

Helms First Interstate Bank Athletic Foundation (1889-1982): originally founded in 1936 as Helms Athletic Foundation and changed in the early 1970s to Citizens Savings Athletic Foundation before the most recent name was adopted in 1981.

Illustrated Football Annual (1924-41): an "azzi ratem" system published in this highly regarded magazine by William F. Boand.

Litkenhous System (1934-1984): a "difference-by-score" method syndicated by Fred Litkenhouse and his brother Edward.

National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame (1959-1995): chosen annually by committee representing membership.

The Football Thesaurus (1927-58): system devised by Duke Houlgate and published in book of same title.

United Press International (1950-1995): poll of 35 college coaches. (Became the *USA TODAY* coaches poll.)

Williamson System (1932-63): system of syndicated power ratings chosen by Paul Williamson, a geologist and member of the Sugar Bowl committee.

The Bowl Championship Series (BCS) (1998-2013): Determined a national champion by matching the country's two top-rated teams in the BCS Standings against each other in a title game.

College Football Playoff: For the fifth consecutive season, the Football Bowl Subdivision will utilize a four-team playoff format to determine the national champion. A selection committee will choose the four playoff teams based on their performance during the regular season, including strength of schedule, head-to-head results, championships won and other factors. The teams will be seeded so that #1 will play #4 in one semifinal and #2 will meet #3 in the other. This year's semifinal games will be played at the Cotton Bowl and Orange Bowl on December 29, 2018. The College Football Playoff National Championship will be played on January 7, 2019, at Levi's Stadium in Santa Clara, Calif.

Legendary tailback Tony Dorsett was selected as the winner of the Heisman Trophy in 1976, the same season he led the Panthers to the national title with a 12-0 record. While Dorsett is Pitt's lone winner of the Heisman, the Panthers have had eight total players finish in the top five in the final balloting. Pitt players have finished in the top 10 of the Heisman voting 14 times.

PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

The fourth-overall pick of the 1985 draft by the Minnesota Vikings, **CHRIS DOLEMAN** played 15 seasons in the NFL and holds status as one of the most productive pass rushers of all time. A defensive end and outside linebacker, Doleman was an eight-time Pro Bowler, earning six berths as a member of the Vikings and one each as a member of the Atlanta Falcons and San Francisco 49ers. He was a first team All-Pro three times and was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1990s. Upon his retirement in 1999, Doleman's 150.5 career sacks ranked fourth in league history and he was tied for third with eight seasons in which he recorded 10 or more sacks. Doleman received his enshrinement in 2012.

MIKE DITKA became the first tight end elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame when he received enshrinement in 1988. Chicago's No. 1 draft pick in 1961, Ditka would play 12 professional seasons, including six with the Bears (1961-66), two with the Philadelphia Eagles (1967-68) and four with the Dallas Cowboys (1969-72). The 1961 NFL Rookie of the Year, he earned All-NFL in each of his first four seasons and was a Pro Bowler his first five years. He was part of Chicago's 1963 NFL title team and the Cowboys' 1971 squad that won Super Bowl VI. Ditka worked as an assistant coach at Dallas for nine seasons, spent 11 seasons as Chicago's head coach (winning Super Bowl XX) and spent three seasons as head coach of the New Orleans Saints.

When **TONY DORSETT** retired from the NFL after 12 seasons (1977-88), he was the league's second all-time leading rusher with 12,739 yards. He became the first player to win the Heisman Trophy, a collegiate national championship and a Super Bowl, and receive Hall of Fame enshrinement on both the college and pro levels. Taken by the Dallas Cowboys with the second overall pick of the 1977 draft, Dorsett rushed for more than 1,000 yards in eight of his first nine seasons—the lone exception being the strike-shortened 1982 campaign which, ironically, saw him earn the NFC rushing title. He played in two Super Bowls (helping Dallas to victory in Super Bowl XII) and four Pro Bowls. Dorsett received his "Canton Call" in 1994.

A third-round draft choice of Washington in 1981, **RUSS GRIMM** went on to start 11 seasons at guard for the Redskins (1981-91). Grimm was an original member of Washington's famed "Hogs" offensive line, which included another Pitt great, Mark May. The dominating offensive front helped lead the Redskins to four Super Bowl appearances, including victories in Super Bowls XVII, XXII and XXVI. It was following Washington's victory over Buffalo in Super Bowl XXVI that Grimm announced his retirement. He was voted to four consecutive Pro Bowls (1983-86) and was a first-team selection to the 1980s All-Decade Team. Grimm received his Canton induction in 2010.

A 1981 second-round draft pick by New Orleans, **RICKEY JACKSON** spent 15 seasons in the NFL (1981-95) as one of the most disruptive defenders in the game. Upon his retirement, he ranked third all-time in sacks (128), second in fumble recoveries (28) and fourth in forced fumbles (41). Jackson made six trips to the Pro Bowl and was first team All-Pro four times. He helped elevate the Saints from dormat to contender as the franchise never finished below .500 during Jackson's final seven years in New Orleans. His final two seasons were played in San Francisco as he helped the 49ers to a 49-26 victory over San Diego in Super Bowl XXIX. Jackson was a member of the 2010 Pro Football Hall of Fame class.

When he finished his legendary 17-year career with the Miami Dolphins, **DAN MARINO** was by far the most prolific passer in NFL history. Upon his 1999 retirement, Marino held an incredible 25 NFL regular-season records and was the career leader in passing attempts (8,358), completions (4,967), yardage (61,361) and touchdowns (420). The Dolphins' first-round pick in 1983, Marino earned NFL Rookie of the Year. In 1984 he became the first 5,000-yard passer in league history and would record 13 3,000-yard passing seasons in total. Marino also was one of the NFL's winningest quarterbacks, earning 147 regular-season victories. He was a nine-time Pro Bowler and eight-time All-Pro. Marino was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2005.

A third-round draft selection of New England in 1995, **CURTIS MARTIN** spent three years with the Patriots (1995-97) before joining the New York Jets (1998-2006). He finished his career with an astonishing 14,101 yards to rank fourth all-time among the NFL's career rushing leaders, trailing only Emmitt Smith (18,355), Walter Payton (16,726) and Barry Sanders (15,269). Martin became only the second player in NFL history to begin his career with 10 consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons. In 2004 he was the NFL rushing champion with 1,697 yards. Martin was named a Pro Bowler five times and All-Pro three times. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2012.

JOE SCHMIDT became the gold standard for NFL middle linebackers during his 13-year career (1953-65) with the Detroit Lions. A seventh-round draft pick, Schmidt would earn All-Pro 10 times, play in 10 Pro Bowl games (tied for the most all-time by a Lions player) and be named to the 1950s All-Decade Team. His teammates voted him Detroit's MVP four times. He served as team captain for nine seasons and totaled 24 career interceptions. The Lions won two NFL championships during Schmidt's career. He later coached the team for six seasons and led Detroit to its only playoff appearance of the 1970s. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1973.

LARRY FITZGERALD
WIDE RECEIVER | 2002-03

- Named the 2003 Walter Camp Player of the Year, becoming the first sophomore to earn that prestigious honor, and also won the Biletnikoff Award as the country's top receiver. Was a unanimous first-team All-American, becoming the first Pitt sophomore to be selected unanimously.
- Was the 2003 Heisman Trophy runner-up, finishing behind Oklahoma quarterback Jason White by just 128 points. Fitzgerald carried three voting regions, an unprecedented achievement for a sophomore. It was the highest Heisman finish by a wide receiver since Michigan's Desmond Howard won the award in 1991.
- Compiled 92 catches for 1,672 yards (18.2 avg.) and 22 touchdowns in 2003, leading the nation in receiving yards per game (128.62 avg.) and TD catches.
- In just 26 collegiate games, Fitzgerald totaled 161 catches for 2,677 yards (16.6 avg.) and a Pitt-record 34 touchdowns.
- His freshman season he had 69 catches for 1,005 yards (14.6 avg.) and 12 TDs. Fitzgerald was the first player in Pitt history to compile multiple 1,000-yard receiving seasons.
- Caught a touchdown in 18 consecutive games to set an NCAA record. In total, he set or tied four NCAA marks, eight Big East records and 11 Pitt marks.
- Was the third overall pick in the 2004 NFL Draft, going to the Arizona Cardinals, and has been selected to 11 Pro Bowls.
- In 2012, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 700 career receptions and joined Randy Moss as the only players in league history to reach 10,000 career receiving yards before the age of 30.

QUARTERBACK | 1979-82

- While at Pitt from 1979-82, broke nearly every major passing record in school history, including career marks for passing yards (8,597) and completions (693).
- Thirty-six years after his final collegiate season, still holds Pitt records for touchdown passes in a career (79) and season (37).
- Led Pitt to four consecutive Top 10 finishes, including a pair of No. 2 rankings.
- Enhanced his reputation for delivering in the clutch in the 1982 Sugar Bowl, when he threw a 33-yard touchdown pass to tight end John Brown with 35 seconds left to give Pitt a come-from-behind 24-20 victory over Georgia.
- Named a 1981 All-American and finished fourth in the Heisman Trophy balloting that year.
- A first-round draft pick of the Miami Dolphins in 1983, Marino went on to gain recognition as one of the greatest quarterbacks in NFL history with a record-breaking 17-year career.
- He retired following the 1999 season as the league's all-time leader in passing attempts (8,358), completions (4,967), yardage (61,361) and touchdowns (420).
- Was elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2002 and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2005.

TONY DORSETT
RUNNING BACK | 1973-76

- Winner of the 1976 Heisman Trophy, Maxwell Award and Walter Camp Award.
- Was selected an All-American in each of his four seasons (1973-76).
- First player in NCAA history to reach 6,000 career rushing yards. Including bowl games, rushed for 6,526 yards.
- His NCAA-recognized total (not including bowls) of 6,082 yards stood as the Division I record for 22 years (1976-98).
- Gained 100 or more yards 36 times, including 20 consecutive games.
- Remains Pitt's all-time leading scorer with 380 points.
- Holds Notre Dame opponent records for rushing yards against the Irish in a career (754) and game (303).
- Led Pitt to the 1976 national championship with a 12-0 record.
- In 1977, was the first-round pick of the Dallas Cowboys where he played 11 seasons (1977-87), including two Super Bowls and four Pro Bowls.
- Played his final year with the Denver Broncos (1988) and finished his career as the second all-time leading rusher in NFL history (12,739).
- Was elected into the College Football Hall of Fame and Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1994.

MARSHALL GOLDBERG
RUNNING BACK | 1936-38

- Earned back-to-back All-America honors as a halfback (1937) and fullback (1938).
- Member of the famed "Dream Backfield" at Pitt, considered one of college football's greatest back tandems ever.
- Was the runner-up for the Heisman Trophy in 1938 and placed third in the Heisman balloting in 1937.
- Led Pitt to national championships in 1936 and 1937 with a combined 17-1-2 record.
- Spent seven years in the NFL playing halfback for the Chicago Cardinals (1939-42, 1946-48).
- Member of the Cardinals' 1947 NFL championship team and had his No. 99 jersey retired by the franchise.
- Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1958.



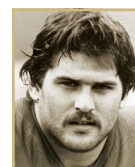

LINEBACKER | 1950-52

- Earned All-America honors as a senior linebacker in 1952.
- As both a collegian and professional, Schmidt was considered the era's prototype for linebacker play—instinctive, aggressive and smart.
- Played in 10 Pro Bowls during his 13-year career (1953-65) with the Detroit Lions, which included two NFL championships.
- Served as the Lions' head coach from 1967-72, leading Detroit to its only playoff appearance in the 1970s.
- Elected into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1973 and College Football Hall of Fame in 2000.

MARK MAY
OFFENSIVE TACKLE | 1977-80

- In 1980 was named a unanimous All-American and Pitt's first winner of the prestigious Outland Trophy.
- Did not give up a sack his final two collegiate seasons.
- Was Pitt's "go-to" player on third-and-short situations, earning him the nickname "May Day."
- Helped lead Pitt to a four-year record of 39-8-1, including four bowl games and three Top 10 finishes.
- Was selected by the Washington Redskins in the first round of the 1981 NFL Draft and was a standout member of the team's "Hogs" offensive line from 1981-90. Helped the Redskins to three Super Bowls (1982, 1983 and 1987), including world championships in '82 and '87. Finished his pro career with the San Diego Chargers (1991) and Arizona Cardinals (1992-93).
- Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2005.



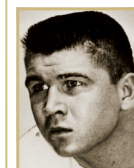

OFFENSIVE TACKLE | 1978-82

- A fixture on Pitt's punishing offensive front from 1980-82, surrendering just three sacks during that span. As a senior, he did not give up a single sack.
- Was a two-time first team All-American, earning consensus status as a senior.
- Pitt went 31-5 during Covert's three years as a starting offensive tackle, finishing in the nation's Top 10 each season. The 1980 and 1981 teams each went 11-1 and finished as high as No. 2 in the national polls.
- Was chosen in the first round of the 1983 NFL Draft (sixth overall) by the Chicago Bears and was a consensus All-Rookie pick. He played eight seasons in Chicago (1983-90), earning All-Pro honors four times, two first-team All-NFL selections, two Pro Bowl invitations and was twice named the NFL Offensive Lineman of the Year (1985 and 1986).
- With Covert as a spearhead, the Bears led the NFL in rushing four consecutive years (1983-86). He was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1980s.
- Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2003.



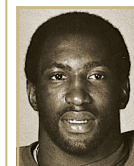

OFFENSIVE TACKLE | 1981-84

- A three-time first team All-American, including unanimous status as a junior and senior.
- Became the first offensive lineman to twice finish in the top 10 of the Heisman Trophy balloting, placing sixth in 1984 and eighth in 1983.
- His collegiate career led to the creation of the "Pancake," a statistical barometer for each time Fralic put an opposing defensive lineman on his back.
- The second player taken overall in the 1985 NFL Draft, Fralic went on to an exceptional pro career from 1985-93, playing eight years with the Atlanta Falcons and his final season with the Detroit Lions. He was selected to the Pro Bowl four times.
- Was elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1998.

END | 1958-60

- Was a unanimous All-America selection at end in 1960.
- Led Pitt in receiving three consecutive years and was also a standout defender and punter. He additionally played baseball and basketball at Pitt and was the intramural wrestling champion.
- In 1961 he was a first-round draft choice of the Chicago Bears and was a member of their 1963 NFL Championship team. He was also a member of the Dallas Cowboys when they won Super Bowl VI and earned All-Pro four times.
- Spent 11 seasons as the head coach of the Chicago Bears, leading them to victory in Super Bowl XX, and later coached the New Orleans Saints.
- Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1986 and Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1988.

DEFENSIVE END | 1977-80

- A three-time first team All-American and won the 1980 Lombardi Award, Maxwell Award and the Walter Camp Award.
- Finished second in the 1980 Heisman Trophy balloting, an unprecedented finish for a purely defensive player.
- Was the first-ever defensive player to win the Walter Camp Award.
- Named to Pitt's All-Time Team after just his sophomore year.
- Thirty-eight years following his final collegiate season, remains Pitt's all-time sack leader with 49.

- First-round selection by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1981 and played 11 years in the NFL.

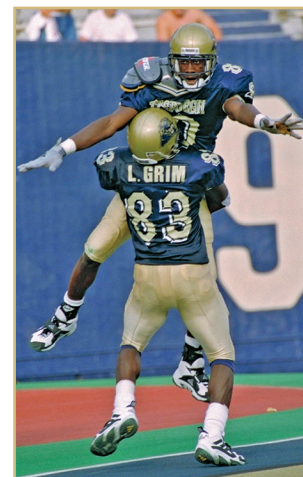

Pitt's first bowl trip resembled a politician's whistle-stop tour—wherever Pitt was at lunchtime during its trek west, it practiced. The routine was simple: deboard the train around 11:15; explore the day's town until noon; lunch at 12; walk lunch off, then practice; reboard the train. So it was that Pitt practiced in Dodge City, Albuquerque and Winslow, Arizona, on the way to Pasadena. The game had a sentimental storyline: the coach against his mentor. Panther Head Coach John B. "Jock" Sutherland had played for Stanford Coach Glenn "Pop" Warner when the latter was at Pitt. Amidst all that, the game, although close, was controlled by Stanford. Pitt grabbed a 6-0 third-quarter lead when Jimmy Hagan scooped up a Cardinal fumble and ran 20 yards for a touchdown. The extra point was missed. Stanford, which made several marches deep into Pitt territory, finally scored on an unusual play. On fourth-and-goal at the two, Stanford quarterback Biff Hoffman completed a pass to Bob Sims, but it was short of the goal line. Sims was hit and fumbled, but Frank Wilton picked up the loose ball and carried it in to tie the game. Hoffman's extra point won it, 7-6. Pitt, a slight favorite entering the game, mustered very little offense in its first four Rose Bowl games.

If vintage football films give you the impression that the game of the 20s and 30s was run, run, and run again, think again. USC's Trojans bombed Pitt with an all-out passing attack. The game started on a bright note for "Jock" Sutherland's team when Toby Uansa rushed 68 yards on Pitt's first play. Pitt failed to score, then the walls caved in. Gaius Shaver connected with Henry Edelson for a 55-yard touchdown. Later in the quarter, Shaver hit Ernest Pinckert for a 28-yard score, capitalizing on a Pitt fumble. Another fumble led to USC's third touchdown, a short run which opened the score to 19-0. Two Jesses set up the Trojans' next score when Jesse Mortensen and Jesse Hill teamed for a 51-yard pass play. Russell Saunders helped convert a USC interception into a 33-0 lead with his 13-yard scoring run. Pitt finally broke through in the third quarter when Uansa threw a 28-yard pass to William Wallinichus. Southern Cal sandwiched two more long touchdown passes (38 and 62 yards) around a Tom Parkinson-to-Paul Collins 36-yard TD pass for Pitt to arrive at the final score. In all, the Trojans scored the most points against Pitt since 1903. It would be Sutherland's second-worst margin of defeat in his 15 seasons at Pitt; the worst would come three years later, also against USC in the Rose Bowl.

Pitt's coach, John B. "Jock" Sutherland, would try a new play after two Rose Bowl losses, so he took the team to Tucson to practice for its first Rose Bowl win. Instead Sutherland suffered the worst loss in his Pitt career. It was the first time since 1928 that Pitt was shut out and actually lost the game; it had played four scoreless ties since a 6-0 loss to Carnegie Tech. With 83,000 in attendance, the Panthers stayed close until the fourth quarter before collapsing. USC's Homer Griffith threw, and later caught, a touchdown pass as the Trojans built a 14-0 lead through three quarters. After Irvine Warburton scored to make the score 21-0, Pitt fumbled the kickoff, and Warburton scored again shortly thereafter. A blocked punt set up the final touchdown. Several Panthers were singled out by the crowd with standing ovations: ends Ted Dailey and Joe Skladany, guard Charles Hartwig and back Warren Heller, who rushed for 63 yards in the final game of his brilliant Pitt career.

"Jock" Sutherland was intent on winning the Rose Bowl in his fourth try. To that end, Pitt spent two weeks working out on the west coast, for Sutherland was not going to accept 0-4 in Rose Bowl play. His tactics worked, and captain Bobby LaRue led Pitt to a 21-0 victory. LaRue's running set up the first touchdown of the game, which, fittingly, he scored. LaRue's 50-yard run in the third quarter, which would have gone 75 yards for the touchdown if not for a diving tackle, set up Frank Patrick's touchdown. Pitt led, 14-0, after three quarters. The defense added a late touchdown, returning an interception. So elated was Sutherland that he substituted every player who made the trip, so each could forever relate the experience of playing in a Rose Bowl victory. After four tries, the coach had finally overcome one of the few obstacles in his remarkable career.

A controversial pass interference penalty against Pitt's Bobby Grier, the first black man ever to play in the Sugar Bowl, put Georgia Tech on the doorstep for the game's only touchdown. Pitt, under new Head Coach John Michelosen—the first man in Pitt history to play and coach in bowl games (he was a quarterback on the 1936 Rose Bowl team)—had several chances to tie the game but hit a wall of futility. Grier's penalty gave Tech the ball on the 1, from where Wade Mitchell snuck in for the score. A fumble killed a first-quarter drive, then quarterback Corny Salvaterra was stopped on a fourth-and-goal just before halftime. Pitt's Ray DiPasquale intercepted a pass to squelch a fourth quarter threat by Tech. In the final moments, Pitt made a furious attempt to tie the game. The Panthers, who were penalized twice on the last drive, were on Tech's 5-yard line when time ran out.

Pitt was stopped on a goal-line stand at the start of the second quarter, and Tech increased its lead late in the quarter with a halfback-option TD pass. Pitt quarterback Corny Salvaterra hit Dick Bowen with a 36-yard scoring pass just before the half, and Pitt trailed, 14-7. Bowen's fumble on the second-half kickoff set up the clinching touchdown. Pitt pulled to within seven on Salvaterra's sneak, but could draw no closer.

A new era in Pitt football was ushered in with the Panthers' first bowl appearance in 17 years. Coach of the Year Johnny Majors had revived a struggling program and Pitt was 6-4-1 entering this game. Freshman Tony Dorsett was a big part of the turnaround, rushing for 1,686 yards. Pitt struck first, with Dorsett scoring two plays after Tom Perko recovered Arizona State quarterback Danny White's fumble on the first play of the game. But the Sun Devils, playing on their own field, proved too tough. Woody Green scored four plays after Dorsett's touchdown to tie the game. Arizona State scored three touchdowns in 6:04 of the fourth quarter, and although Pitt blocked all three extra points, the game ended one-sided after being tied at halftime. Dorsett rushed for 100 yards, but Pitt turned the ball over seven times. Both

quarterbacks, White and Pitt's Billy Daniels, threw three interceptions, but White completed 14-of-19 for 269 yards. Daniels was 7-of-20 for just 57 yards.

A player rushing for 100 yards is impressive. Two players on the same team is remarkable. Three is unheard of, but that is how Pitt knocked off Kansas. Elliott Walker (11 carries for 123 yards, 11.2 average) got the ball rolling with a 60-yard touchdown run in the first quarter. Tony Dorsett (27-142) scored two touchdowns in the second quarter. Pitt had nearly 300 rushing yards at the intermission. Quarterback Robert Haygood ran the veer offense to perfection, rushing for 101 yards (14 carries) when he wasn't busy pitching out to Dorsett. Haygood also connected with Gordon Jones for a touchdown after Walker scored his second of the game. Jones set up his own touchdown with a 63-yard kickoff return. With eight wins, Pitt had its best season since 1963. Dorsett rushed for 1,686 yards on the season, matching his 1973 total.

SUGAR BOWL • JAN. 1, 1977

The many remarkable accomplishments Tony Dorsett achieved in his four years at Pitt were punctuated by his role in this win, one that gave Pitt its first national championship in 39 years. Dorsett, quarterback Matt Cavanaugh and a marauding defense just would not be denied in the first indoor Sugar Bowl game. Cavanaugh, named the game's MVP, scored from six yards out to give Pitt a 7-0 lead. The celebration of that touchdown became a *Sports Illustrated* cover that can be seen at several sites around Pitt's campus. The photo headline simply read: "PITT IS IT!" Gordon Jones turned a short pass into a 59-yard touchdown excursion in the second quarter. Dorsett's 10-yard score late in the half cemented the victory. He was far from through, however. After gaining 65 yards in the first half, the Heisman Trophy winner exploded in the second to finish with a Sugar Bowl record 202 yards rushing, including 67 on one run that set up one of Carson Long's two second-half field goals. The defense created six turnovers and limited the Bulldogs to 181 yards. Pitt defenders actually caught more Georgia passes than did Georgia receivers (four interceptions, compared to three completions in 22 attempts). Vince Dooley, Georgia's head coach, said this about the 12-0 Panthers: "They proved today they are the best in the country. They have amazing balance; they are the best defensive team we've seen. I think that is obvious. They are also the best offensive team we've faced." Pitt coach Johnny Majors, who completed his four-year stint at Pitt with a 33-13-1 record

(after a combined 13-29 mark in the previous four years) was named Coach of the Year for the second time at Pitt.

GATOR BOWL • DEC. 30, 1977

Pitt set five Gator Bowl records for offensive proficiency in an astounding demolition of the highly regarded Clemson Tigers. Matt Cavanaugh completed 23-of-36 passes for 387 yards and four touchdowns as Pitt outgained Clemson, 566-268. Three scoring tosses went to fullback Elliott Walker, who joined Tony Dorsett as the second Pitt back ever to rush for 1,000 yards in a season. Gordon Jones scored the other TD on one of his 10 receptions for 163 yards. Cavanaugh threw for 211 yards and two touchdowns in the first half alone. Clemson's vaunted passing combination of Steve Fuller-to-Jerry Butler was rendered ineffective by a Pitt secondary which swooped in for four interceptions, two by senior safety Bob Jury. Cavanaugh, an All-American in 1977, missed part of the season after suffering a broken wrist against Notre Dame in the first game of the year. "I shudder to think what he could have done had he stayed healthy," said Panther Coach Jackie Sherrill, who finished his first year at Pitt with a 9-2-1 mark.

TANGERINE BOWL • DEC. 23, 1978

The Panthers saved their worst performance of the season for this bowl outing with North Carolina State. Primarily a running team in 1978, Pitt attempted to open it up on this night, throwing 48 passes. Four were intercepted, however. The Wolfpack, led by star running back Ted Brown, rolled up a 23-3 fourth quarter lead before Pitt quarterback Rick Trocano tried to bring the Panthers back. An 18-play drive featured four fourth-down conversions, the last of which resulted in a Freddie Jacobs touchdown. Pitt moved to State's 34-yard line with five minutes remaining, but an interception settled the issue. Trocano was intercepted twice more before the game ended, but he also led Pitt to the game's final touchdown. "Execution on our part was our biggest problem," Coach Jackie Sherrill said. "We didn't play well...and the turnovers hurt us." Pitt finished 8-4.

FIESTA BOWL • DEC. 25, 1979

Pitt finished the 1979 season with a 10-game winning streak, built in part around the arm of freshman quarterback Dan Marino. The Wildcats, coached by former Pitt radio commentator Tony Mason, threatened often but did not score a touchdown until the game's waning moments. Junior cornerback Terry White intercepted two passes. One set up the second of three Mark Schubert field goals; the other allowed Pitt to run out the clock. Two of Schubert's kicks were from 46 yards out. Pitt's only touchdown came after a 12-play drive, with Marino hitting Benjie Pryor from 12 yards out. The last three plays of the drive: Marino to Mike Dombrowski for 34 yards, Marino to Ralph Still for 24 yards, and the touchdown.

GATOR BOWL • DEC. 29, 1980

Pitt's defense wanted this game badly. Its leader for four years, Hugh Green, finished second in the Heisman Trophy voting behind South Carolina's George Rogers. Rick Trocano and Dan Marino split time at quarterback; each threw a touchdown pass and Trocano added a short TD run. Although Rogers gained 113 yards, his two fumbles were more of a factor in the game than his rushing output. Tom Flynn recovered Rogers' fumble on the first play of the game, leading to Trocano's score. Randy McMillan scored two touchdowns as Pitt rolled to a 37-3 lead. The defense was led by Rickey Jackson, who made 19 tackles (14 solos). Pitt finished the season 11-1.

Coach Jackie Sherrill disdained the potential 50-yard field goal attempt. "With five minutes to go I said we were not here to tie, we were here to win," Sherrill said. Dan Marino wanted to throw a short pass to a running back to get the first down, but a Georgia blitz left tight end John Brown in single coverage down the middle. Marino was right on target for the touchdown, his third of the game. The Panther defense limited Herschel Walker to 84 yards on 25 carries.

Joe McCall lost one at the SMU one-yard line, but Mustang QB Lance McIlhenny returned the favor with a fumble at the Pitt seven. Eric Schubert's missed field goal attempt left the game scoreless at the half. Marino completed five straight short passes to set up Schubert's 43-yard kick, which gave Pitt its only points. SMU's "Pony Express" backfield (Eric Dickerson and Craig James) led an 80-yard drive, which McIlhenny capped off with a nine-yard run. Pitt's last chance ended when a Marino pass was tipped and intercepted in the end zone.

Wilson fell on Joe McCall's fumble in the end zone to tie the score early in the fourth quarter. Ohio State's Keith Byars scored his second touchdown by returning the ensuing kickoff 99 yards. Congemi was six-for-six on Pitt's next touchdown drive, which culminated with an 11-yard pass to Dwight Collins. Congemi, who completed 19-of-27 in the second half, had his conversion pass broken up, and Pitt trailed, 21-20. A 17-play drive later in the quarter ended with Snuffy Everett's 37-yard field goal to put the Panthers on top. Quarterback Mike Tomczak led Ohio State back, ending an 89-yard drive with a 39-yard bomb to Thad Jemison, who scored with 39 seconds remaining. Head Coach Foge Fazio's Panthers drove to the Buckeye 24, but could get no further.

Despite late heroics from Larry Wanke, Pitt was grounded in this aerial circus, as Texas quarterback Brett Stafford and split end Tony Jones set Bluebonnet Bowl records. The New Year's Eve crowd was treated to an action-packed game from the start. Stafford connected with Jones for a 77-yard touchdown on the first play from scrimmage. Pitt retaliated quickly: Billy Owens returned the kickoff 45 yards, Billy Osborn hit Reggie Williams for 45 more yards on a trick play; then Craig Heyward tied the score with a four-yard burst. Six plays later, the Longhorns took the lead for good as Stafford hit Jones on a short pass that he broke for a 60-yard touchdown. Stafford finished the first quarter with 202 yards passing on the way to a 368-yard night. Jones set records for receiving yards and longest reception. Wanke replaced Darnell Dickerson early in the third quarter after Dickerson suffered a knee injury. Wanke completed 8-of-20 passes for 172 yards and three touchdowns, including two late in the fourth quarter that cut the Longhorns' lead to five. Heyward rushed for 136 yards, winning his personal battle with Texas star Eric Metcalf, who finished with 95 yards rushing. Heyward ended the season with 1,791 yards, the second-best in Pitt history. Pitt finished the year at 8-4, their most successful season since 1983.

JOHN HANCOCK BOWL • DEC. 30, 1989

Led by bowl MVP Alex Van Pelt's 354 yards passing, Pitt parlayed a John Hancock Bowl-record 530 yards in offense into a 31-28 come-from-behind victory over Texas A&M. It was a day of firsts for the Panthers. Paul Hackett, named head coach moments before kickoff, won his first game as a head coach. It also was Pitt's first bowl win since the Panthers' 24-20 Sugar Bowl victory over Georgia in 1982. Van Pelt, who completed 20-of-40 passes and threw for two touchdowns, rallied the Panthers from a 28-24 deficit, when he connected with Henry Tuten on a 44-yard touchdown strike with just 2:19 remaining in the game, giving Pitt a 31-28 lead. Tailback Curvin Richards rushed for 156 yards on 23 carries and scored the first points of the game with a 12-yard TD. Texas A&M countered with a nine-yard touchdown run by quarterback Lance Pavaas, tying the score at 7-7 to end the first quarter. With the score tied at 10 late in the first half, Van Pelt threw an eight-yard touchdown pass to Ronald Redmon, giving Pitt a 17-10 halftime lead. Flanker Olanda Truitt completed his freshman season in stellar fashion, catching four passes for 124 yards, including a key 59-yard reception that set up Redmon's score. Carnel Smith finished the game with 10 tackles and Barry Threats had a game-ending interception, which ended Texas

A&M's final drive and secured the Panthers' victory. The Hancock Bowl win marked the end of another decade in Pitt football history and the dawn of the Hackett coaching era. The Panthers finished the 1989 season with an 8-3-1 record.

AXA/EQUITABLE LIBERTY BOWL • DEC. 31, 1997

Playing its first postseason game in eight seasons, Pitt fell victim to an opportunistic Southern Mississippi defense and suffered a 41-7 defeat in the 1997 AXA/Equitable Liberty Bowl. It was the Panthers' first-ever appearance in the Liberty Bowl and their first bowl game since a 31-28 victory over Texas A&M in the 1989 John Hancock Bowl. Pitt threatened early, driving to the Golden Eagles' 13 on its initial series, but failed to score any points. Southern Miss responded with a pair of touchdown drives for a 14-0 second-quarter lead. The Panther offense, held in check for most of the game, had its lone shining moment when quarterback Pete Gonzalez connected with Jake Hoffart on an 89-yard pass-and-run touchdown as Pitt trailed 14-7 at halftime. Hoffart, who finished with five catches for 121 yards, set a Liberty Bowl record with his touchdown catch. The Panthers, however, would come no closer. The Panthers struck on their very first possession of the game when John Turman hit a streaking Antonio Bryant for a 72-yard touchdown and 7-0 lead. The Cyclones, however, responded with 27 unanswered points, including 20 in the second period. Pitt pulled within 27-14 when Rod Rutherford snuck in from two yards out. Bryant then made a brilliant diving catch for a 44-yard touchdown and the Panthers trailed 27-20 with 2:05 left in the third. The Panthers' momentum was slowed when Iowa State's JaMain Billups returned a punt 72 yards for a score early in the fourth. Kevan Barlow, who finished with 114 rushing yards, bulled in from the three to make it 34-29 at the 9:45 mark. But the Panthers could draw no closer. The contest marked the first football game ever played in Bank One Ballpark, home of Major League Baseball's Arizona Diamondbacks.

Pitt captured its first bowl victory since 1989 with a 34-19 win over NC State in the Visit Florida Tangerine Bowl. The victory gave the Panthers their strongest close to a season since 1980 by winning their final six games. Hobbled by an ankle injury, Antonio Bryant went on to earn Most Valuable Player honors after catching seven passes for 101 yards and two touchdowns. David Priestley put up MVP-like statistics himself, completing 18-of-32 passes for 271 yards and the two scoring strikes to Bryant. The duo propelled the Panthers to a 24-10 halftime lead. The Pitt defense held strong and limited Wolfpack quarterback Philip Rivers to just 189 yards through the air and sacked him four times. NC State closed to 27-19 in the fourth quarter but blitzing Lewis Moore quelled the threat when he sacked Rivers and forced a fumble. Tyre Young picked it up and ran 16 yards untouched for the clinching TD. Moore, who finished with seven tackles (all solo), including two for losses, was named Pitt's Defensive MVP.

Pitt achieved its finest season in two decades with a 38-13 triumph over Oregon State in the Insight Bowl. The Panthers finished 9-4, their winningest season since 1982, and secured a spot in the final national polls for the first time since 1989. The win marked the Panthers' second consecutive postseason victory. A stifling defensive effort, efficient offense as well as a special teams gem keyed the result. Tied at 10 at halftime, OSU quarterback Derek Anderson was intercepted by Tez Morris, who returned the ball 36 yards to the Beavers' 23 early in the third quarter. Rod Rutherford completed a 22-yard pass to Larry Fitzgerald to the one before rushing up the middle for a 17-10 lead just three minutes into the second half. The Panthers broke open the contest later in the third when Shawn Robinson fielded a punt at the Panthers' 34, ran wide to the right and sprinted down the sideline for a 66-yard touchdown. It was the first punt return for a TD in Pitt's bowl history. Pitt iced the game with a 44-yard touchdown drive climaxed by Brandon Miree's seven-yard burst. Miree, who earned the game's Offensive MVP honor, finished with 113 yards rushing on 20 carries (5.7 avg.). In contrast, OSU tailback Steven Jackson—who entered the game as the nation's fifth-leading rusher—was held to a season-low 34 yards.

A skillful and methodical opening drive that moved 69 yards to the Virginia one-yard line ultimately failed to produce any points, setting the tone in Pitt's 23-16 loss in the Continental Tire Bowl. Virginia scored the game's first touchdown four plays later and went on to win its second consecutive Continental Tire Bowl. Missed opportunities were the theme for Pitt, which finished 8-5 for the season, with a missed extra point, missed field goal, an interception and a lost fumble on a potential game-tying drive. Heisman Trophy runner-up Larry Fitzgerald saw his NCAA record touchdown streak end at 18 games, but the All-American still led the Panthers with five catches for 77 yards. Brandon Miree rushed for 110 yards and added four receptions, including one for a 17-yard touchdown. The scoring pass from Rod Rutherford was his 37th of the season, tying Dan Marino's school record set in 1981.

Making its first appearance in the Fiesta Bowl since the 1983 season, Pitt fell victim to a lethal Utah passing game and equally potent pass rush in a 35-7 defeat. The Utes finished the 2004 season with a 12-0 record and ranked as high as fourth in the final polls. Pitt finished with an 8-4 mark and ranked No. 25. Utah scored touchdowns on five of its first seven possessions, including all three in the third quarter. Pitt advanced into Utah territory three times in the first half but four sacks and a blocked field goal kept the Panthers off the scoreboard. The Panthers' lone score came on a beautiful over-the-shoulder grab by Greg Lee that went for a 31-yard touchdown with 4:28 left in the third quarter. Lee had seven receptions for 93 yards, while fellow wideout Joe DelSardo had nine catches for 109 yards.

Making its first bowl appearance since the 2004 season, Pitt failed to take advantage of a masterful defensive performance, failing to Oregon State, 3-0, in the Sun Bowl. The Panthers (9-4) held the Beavers to 273 yards and forced three turnovers. Unfortunately Pitt's offense was also bottled up, managing only 178 yards and never penetrating Oregon State's 36-yard line. The Panthers appeared poised to pull out another fourth-quarter comeback when T.J. Porter returned a punt 36 yards to the OSU 42 with 12:39 left in the game. A sack and forced fumble by the Beavers' Victor Butler, however, ended the threat. Pitt's final scoring opportunity came with 2:02 remaining when Conor Lee attempted a 57-yard field goal, but the kick fell just short of the crossbar. Linebackers Scott McKillop and Austin Ransom led Pitt with 11 tackles each. McKillop also had an interception in the end zone to end the first half. Greg Romeus was named the Jimmy Rogers Jr. Most Valuable Lineman after collecting four tackles and two sacks. Oregon State (9-4) placekicker Justin Kahut accounted for the lone points of the day on a 44-yard field goal with 2:18 left in the second quarter. It was the lowest scoring bowl game since 1959, a 0-0 tie between Air Force and TCU in the Cotton Bowl.

MEINEKE CAR CARE BOWL • DEC. 26, 2009

Dan Hutchins kicked four field goals, including a 33-yarder with 52 seconds left, to lift Pitt past North Carolina in the Meineke Car Care Bowl. The victory climaxed a 10-3 season for the Panthers, their winningest campaign since 1981. Freshman running back Dion Lewis was named the bowl's MVP after rushing for 159 yards and a touchdown against the nation's No. 6 overall defense. Lewis finished his spectacular debut season with a Pitt freshman-record 1,799 yards, surpassing Tony Dorsett's 1973 frosh total (1,686). Hutchins set Pitt records for single-season field goals (23) and kick scoring (115). His four field goals also set a Meineke Car Care Bowl record. Linebacker Max Gruder had a game-high 11 tackles, while defensive tackle Mick Williams had two sacks. Freshman linebacker Dan Mason, making a surprise start, had a key interception on the goal line late in the first half. As a unit, the Pitt defense limited the Tar Heels to just 264 total yards, including a mere 81 on the ground. It was Pitt's first postseason victory since the 2002 Insight Bowl. The win clinched a final national ranking of No. 15 in both polls for Pitt, its highest since 1982. The Tar Heels finished 8-5.

Andrew Taglianetti blocked a punt to set up Pitt's first touchdown late in the second quarter, giving the Panthers a 13-3 lead. Pitt then forced an incomplete pass on a Kentucky fake punt early in the third, setting up Tino Sunseri's 13-yard TD pass to Brock DeCicco that made it 20-3. The Wildcats countered with their only touchdown, a one-yard run by Moncell Allen later in the period that cut the deficit to 10. But the Panthers answered with a long drive that was capped by a two-yard touchdown run by Dion Lewis to seal the result. Lewis rushed for 105 yards and a TD to earn his second consecutive bowl MVP award. Defensively the Panthers held Kentucky well below its average of 33 points per game. Defensive backs Dom DeCicco and K'Wawn Williams had nine tackles each. Pitt, playing the game under acting head coach Phil Bennett, finished 8-5, while the Wildcats fell to 6-7.

The Mustangs' third score of the opening quarter, a two-yard run by Rishaad Wimbley, came after a Pitt fumble at its own 27. Placekicker Kevin Harper accounted for all of Pitt's points with a pair of field goals. The Panthers produced just 205 yards in offense on the day and gave up seven sacks. SMU managed 300 yards but was sparked by the passing combo of McDermott and receiver Darius Johnson, who had seven catches for 120 yards, including a 50-yard TD to open the game's scoring. Pitt was led by interim head coach Keith Patterson. The Panthers finished 6-7 on the year. SMU improved to 8-5. It was the first meeting between Pitt and SMU since the Jan. 1, 1983 Cotton Bowl (also won by the Mustangs, 7-3).

Pitt was held to 266 yards, its second-lowest total of the season. Pitt's 1,000-yard rusher, Ray Graham, did not play due to a hamstring injury. Fielding a shuffled offensive line, the Panthers mustered just 81 rushing yards. Pitt (6-7) fell behind early after Tino Sunseri threw his first interception since September and Ole Miss capitalized with a TD pass less than five minutes into the game. The Rebels built leads of 14-0, 31-10 and, by the final period, 38-10. As a unit, Pitt's defense struggled to slow Ole Miss (7-6) down, but safety Jason Hendricks had an exceptional day, collecting 17 tackles, two TFLs and an interception.

Sparked by freshmen James Conner and Tyler Boyd, Pitt edged Mid-American Conference champ Bowling Green, 30-27, in Detroit. Conner broke Pitt's bowl rushing record held by Tony Dorsett (202 vs. Georgia in the Jan. 1, 1977, Sugar Bowl). Conner also played on defense as a pass rusher—drawing a key holding penalty on Bowling Green's final possession—and was named the game's MVP. Boyd broke Pitt's bowl record for receiving yards (surpassing Gordon Jones' 163 vs. Clemson in the Dec. 30, 1977, Gator Bowl) and had the Panthers' first punt return TD since 2006. A third freshman, Chris Blewitt, provided the winning points on a 39-yard field goal with 1:17 remaining. Chad Voytk, playing the entire second half in relief of injured Tom Savage, completed 5-of-9 passes for 108 yards and had a five-yard TD run. In his final Pitt appearance, Aaron Donald had a game-clinching sack in the final minute and was named the bowl's Most Valuable Lineman. With its first bowl win since 2010, Pitt finished 7-6 and dropped the Falcons to 10-4.

LOCKHEED MARTIN ARMED FORCES BOWL • JAN. 2, 2015

Houston quarterback Greg Ward fueled the rally by throwing three touchdown passes in the final 3:41—the last two after the Cougars (8-5) recovered onside kicks—and then completed the game-winning two-point conversion to cap the largest comeback in an FBS game in 2014 and largest ever in a bowl game that didn't go into overtime. Ward finished with 274 passing yards and also rushed for 92. The Panthers led by 21 points with 6:14 left when Chris Blewitt kicked a 29-yard field goal. Blewitt also had a career-long 52-yarder as time expired in the first half to give Pitt a 17-6 lead. The Panthers were under the direction of interim coach Joe Rudolph, who replaced the departing Paul Chryst.

Navy's record-setting quarterback Keenan Reynolds ran for three scores and threw for another to lead the Midshipmen to a 44-28 win over Pitt in the Military Bowl. Pitt began the game in exciting fashion as Quadree Henderson returned the opening kickoff 100 yards for a 7-0 lead. Navy responded with three unanswered touchdowns to seize a 21-7 halftime lead. The advantage swelled to 31-7 midway through the third quarter before the Panthers struck back. Pitt scored two touchdowns in 17 seconds—a four-yard catch by Quadree Ollison and 22-yard fumble return by Jordan Whitehead—to close to 31-21 entering the final quarter. After Navy scored another TD, Ollison ran for a 45-yard score to make it 38-28 with 9:35 left. That would be as close as Pitt would get as Reynolds iced the game with a nine-yard TD run on Navy's subsequent possession. The game was played before an overflow crowd of 36,352 in the Midshipmen's home stadium. Pitt completed Pat Narduzzi's inaugural season with an 8-5 record, its best mark since 2010. Navy finished 11-2 and earned a No. 18 ranking in the final polls.

Pitt closed the 2016 season on a sour note, dropping a 31-24 decision to Northwestern in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl. Failed red zone opportunities and untimely injuries also keyed the final result. Pitt penetrated the Wildcats' 20-yard line seven times but only cashed in on three of those possessions. The Panthers (8-5) also lost five starters to injuries during the game, including tailback James Conner late in the second quarter and quarterback Nathan Peterman in the third. Still, the Panthers claimed a 24-21 lead early in the final period when Ben DiNucci, who came on in relief of Peterman, passed to George Aston for a six-yard score. But Northwestern (7-6) would seize control for the balance of the game, turning a 4th-and-1 into a 21-yard play-action TD pass that made it 28-24 and then hitting a field goal for a seven-point lead. Pitt's final two possessions ended in interceptions, sealing the victory for the Wildcats.

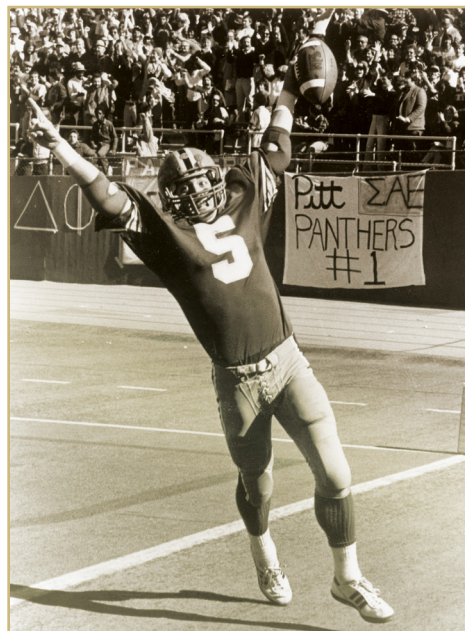

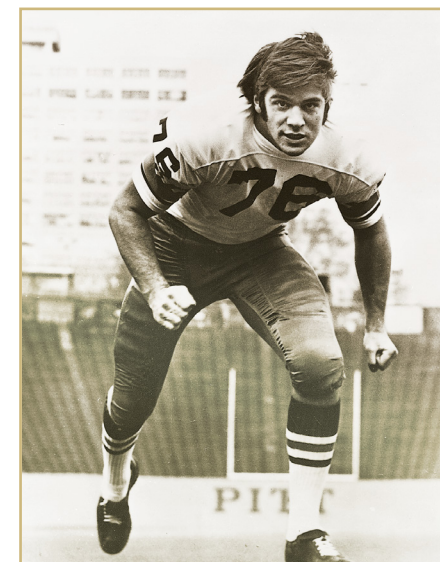

The University of Pittsburgh is a state-related university and a world leader in education, research and innovation. Pitt has an annual enrollment of more than 34,500 undergraduate and graduate students as well as more than 300,000 alumni around the world. Founded as the Pittsburgh Academy in 1787, the University is one of the oldest institutions of higher education in the nation and has a campus in Pittsburgh, Pa., as well as four regional campuses located throughout Western Pennsylvania.



A landmark listed in the National Register of Historic Places, the 535-foot-tall Cathedral of Learning at the University of Pittsburgh is the tallest academic building in the Western Hemisphere.



- The University's more than 13,700 employees, including more than 5,400 faculty members, served more than 34,500 students drawn from all 50 states, the District of Columbia, three U.S. territories, and 106 foreign countries through the programs of 16 undergraduate, graduate, and professional schools in the 2017-18 academic year.
- In a reaccreditation report issued in September 2012, the Middle States Commission on Higher Education praised Pitt as a "world class research university" with an "unwavering commitment to excellence" and an "extraordinarily talented and beloved leadership team."
- Pitt students consistently win a significant number of prestigious national awards for academic achievement. Since 1995, Pitt undergraduates have claimed one Gates Cambridge Scholarship, two Churchill Scholarships, four Rhodes Scholarships, six Truman Scholarships, six Marshall Scholarships, nine Udall Scholarships, and an astounding 48 Goldwater Scholarships.
- Pitt is among the nation's leading producers of student Fulbright grant winners, with nearly 300 Fulbright winners. Pitt also is among the nation's leading producers of Boren scholars, Whitaker International fellows, Critical Language scholars, and Humanity in Action fellows.
- Senior faculty members have been elected to such prestigious groups as the Health and Medicine Division of the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine; American Association for the Advancement of Science; American Society for Clinical Investigation; National Academy of Education; American Academy of Nursing; and National Academy of Sciences. And they have claimed some of the country's most prestigious awards, including the National Medal of Science, Lasker-DeBakey Clinical Medical Research Award, John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation "Genius Grant," and Andrew W. Mellon Foundation Distinguished Achievement Award for exemplary contributions to humanistic studies.
- In the 2017-18 academic year, faculty members were awarded the Passano Foundation Passano Award, the Friendship Award (the highest recognition bestowed by the People's Republic of China to foreign experts), the National Institutes of Health Director's New Innovator Award, a National Endowment for the Arts Creative Writing Fellowship, the Lenore Marshall Poetry Prize, the Paul Ehrlich and Ludwig Darmstaedter Prize, and the Distinguished Service Award from the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Faculty members also were named fellows of the National Academy of Inventors and the American Council of Polish Culture.
- Since the beginning of this century, Pitt alumni have received the Nobel Peace Prize, Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine, Pulitzer Prize for fiction, National Medal of Science, National Book Award, John Fritz Medal in engineering, Shaw Prize in Life Science and Medicine, Albany Medical Center Prize in Medicine and Biomedical Research, and many other high honors.
- In the most recent QS World University Rankings (2018), a ranking of the world's top 980 universities, the University of Pittsburgh was ranked 37th in the United States and 142nd in the world. The QS World University Rankings by Subject 2018 also gave the top spot in the world to Pitt's philosophy department.
- In 2012, Pitt surpassed its goal to raise \$2 billion during its historic capital campaign. Thanks to generous gifts received from more than 189,000 donors, the University was able to create more than 1,600 new endowments, including more than 600 student scholarships and fellowships and more than 150 new faculty chairs and professorships.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

The past year has witnessed a renewed energy surrounding Pitt Athletics. The Panthers are prowling again with an unmistakable strength of purpose.

The catalyst behind this energy is Heather Lyke, now in her second year as Pitt's director of athletics. Although her tenure has been brief, Lyke's impact has been considerable and impressive.

Her influence has been evident in the recruitment of nationally regarded head coaches, a strengthened focus on the total student-athlete experience and the establishment of a culture of comprehensive excellence.

At the conclusion of her first year at the university, Chancellor Patrick Gallagher announced a new six-year agreement that will ensure her leadership at Pitt through at least 2024. The move was not only a reward for Lyke's momentous first year, but also a reflection of the institution's long-term commitment to a championship future for Pitt Athletics.

"Heather is leading an ambitious charge to transform Pitt Athletics, and her success here is just beginning," said Chancellor Gallagher. "I am thrilled that she will continue to push our athletics programs to new heights—and spur positive change for our student-athletes and our university community—for years to come."

"I am grateful to Chancellor Gallagher and our Board of Trustees for their belief in me, our team and what we are building in Pitt Athletics," Lyke said. "Their support is invaluable and every member of our department knows our university is committed to helping us construct a championship culture with the right people. I want to thank our university leadership for their belief in our vision of what Pitt Athletics is capable of achieving—athletically, academically, within our campus community and in the City of Pittsburgh."

Since joining Pitt in March 2017, Lyke has recruited six new head coaches. This past offseason, she appointed Jeff Capel—who owns a championship pedigree as a former Duke player and coach under the iconic Mike Krzyzewski—as the new leader of the Pitt men's basketball program. She also named highly regarded Florida State associate head coach Lance White as Pitt's new women's basketball coach.

Lyke additionally hired four other coaches in her first year: women's soccer's Randy Waldrum, a two-time College Cup champion while at Notre Dame; wrestling's Keith Gavin, a former NCAA champion at Pitt; gymnastics' Samantha Snider, who led the Panthers back to NCAA Regional Championship competition for the first time in five years; and diving's Katie Hazelton, who previously distinguished herself in leading the Duke Diving Club to unprecedented success.

Lyke also solidified the future of Pitt's ascending football program by extending the contract of head coach Pat Narduzzi, who has directed the Panthers to signature wins over Clemson, Miami and Penn State during the past two seasons.

Beyond recruiting top coaching talents, Lyke has outlined an ambitious goal of achieving championship results in each of Pitt's 19 intercollegiate sports. Under her direction, the Panthers—staff and student-athletes alike—have adopted a daily mantra of striving for the "Gold Standard." This standard dictates that Pitt Athletics will strive to achieve excellence in each and every endeavor it undertakes.

Lyke has simultaneously worked to pay homage to the Panthers' rich history—the inaugural Pitt Athletics Hall of Fame class will receive induction in September—while also putting a bright spotlight on the achievements of Pitt's current student-athletes. The 2017-18 year of competition was celebrated at the first-ever Panthers'

Choice Awards, an ESPYs-style show that recognized Pitt student-athletes' achievements in academics, athletics and citizenship.

"It has been a tremendously rewarding and fun first year at Pitt," Lyke said. "But the best part is we are just getting started. As proud as we are about our history and tradition, Pitt's future can be even greater. We are highly motivated to usher in a new Golden Era for Pitt Athletics."

Lyke is the first woman to hold the full-time director of athletics post at the University of Pittsburgh. (The athletic director position at Pitt is more than a century old, dating back to 1911 when Charles S. Miller became the university's first A.D.) She arrived at Pitt already owning an exemplary 22-year record of increasingly high-level roles in collegiate athletics administration.

From 2013-17, Lyke served as vice president and director of athletics at Eastern Michigan University. Prior to EMU, she was a ranking athletic administrator at Ohio State for 15 years. Lyke additionally held posts at the University of Cincinnati and with the NCAA.

Lyke found the beginning of her professional path during her days as a scholarship student-athlete at the University of Michigan, where she captained the Wolverines' Big Ten champion softball team. She earned a bachelor's degree in education from Michigan and a Juris Doctor from the University of Akron School of Law.

At Eastern Michigan, Lyke oversaw a department that sponsored 21 varsity sports with more than 550 student-athletes. Her tenure witnessed high levels of achievement not only in the competitive arena but also academically and from a fundraising standpoint.

Eastern Michigan earned national recognition for athletic department efficiency and effectiveness when it received the Excellence in Management Cup presented by Texas A&M's Laboratory for the Study of Intercollegiate Athletics. The "EM Cup" annually recognizes the athletic department that best maximizes fiscal resources through championship victories. EMU ranked No. 1 out of 128 Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) schools for 2015-16.

As a member of one of the nation's most competitive athletic conferences, EMU annually distinguished itself in the Mid-American Conference under Lyke's watch. Under her direction, the Eagles captured 16 MAC team championships, garnered 17 MAC Coach of the Year awards and had nearly 400 MAC All-Academic honorees. For the first time in school history, Eastern Michigan was honored with the MAC's prestigious Cartwright Award for all-around athletic department excellence (2013-14) and the Jacoby Award for female athletic excellence (2014-15).

Under her watch, EMU's football program was revitalized on the field and in the stands. The 2016 Eagles achieved a 7-5 regular season and earned a berth in the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl, EMU's first postseason invitation in 29 years. Eastern Michigan had a 100% increase in total season ticket growth from 2014 to 2016.

With Lyke's unyielding emphasis on classroom performance, Eastern Michigan achieved a record 81% Graduation Success Rate (GSR) for 2015-16. During the 2016 fall semester, Eagles student-

athletes earned the highest term (3.238) and cumulative (3.266) grade point averages in the history of EMU Athletics.

From a fundraising perspective, Lyke conceived and implemented "Eagles Pride," the first annual fund in Eastern Michigan Athletics history. Providing financial support for all EMU teams, Lyke's vision for engagement produced record-breaking results with the highest number of donors and most cash received in program history. Lyke garnered the largest cash gift in the university's history (\$6 million) in 2017.

Lyke spearheaded numerous capital improvement projects for EMU Athletics. The highest profile was the installation of college football's first gray Revolution Field Turf playing surface in 2014. Dubbed "The Factory" in honor of the region's automobile industry history, the field was selected No. 2 among all colleges in a *USA Today* fan vote (behind only the University of Tennessee).

A reflection of her undergraduate studies in education, Lyke is enthusiastically dedicated to helping younger professionals in their growth and advancement. She is a frequent speaker and presenter at national conferences and serves on the Board of Directors of Women Leaders in College Athletics.

In 2014, Lyke became the first woman to chair the NCAA Men's Lacrosse Committee. She additionally chaired the Mid-American Conference's Cost of Attendance Task Force.

From 1998-2013, Lyke worked at Ohio State, where she was a member of the athletic department's executive team and a lead figure in the development of the Buckeyes' strategic plan. Lyke directly oversaw 10 of Ohio State's 36 athletic programs and had oversight of all facets of the athletic councils involving budget, revenue generation, facilities and OSU's golf course operations.

She additionally supervised the Buckeyes' sport performance division, which included the strength and conditioning coaches, athletic training staff and sports medicine staff. Lyke also developed Ohio State's first student-athlete internship program, "Bucks Go Pro."

During her Ohio State tenure, the Big Ten Network tapped her expertise as a color analyst for softball telecasts from 2009-13.

Prior to Ohio State, Lyke served at Cincinnati as the assistant athletic director for compliance as well as the senior woman administrator from 1996-98. She began her career at the NCAA as an intern in the enforcement and student-athlete reinstatement department from 1995-96.

Born and raised in Canton, Ohio, Lyke starred at GlenOak High School in volleyball, basketball and softball. She accepted a softball scholarship from Michigan, where she lettered four years as a first baseman and was an All-Academic Big Ten honoree. She was a two-time team captain and helped Michigan to the 1992 Big Ten championship.

Lyke and her husband, David Catalano, have three children: Elle, Sophie and Eli.

Below the heating system there is a four-inch layer of pea gravel which contains drain pipes that empty into a 22-inch collector pipe surrounding the perimeter of the field.

FedEx Great Hall: Located on the ground level of the East side of Heinz Field, the FedEx Great Hall is home to Pitt Panthers and Pittsburgh Steelers memorabilia, Hall of Fame artifacts, Pub 33, Quaker Steak & Lube, Primanti Brothers and Papa Duke's Gyros.

High School Murals: Throughout Heinz Field there are 60 murals from area high schools that have won a WPIAL or City League football championship.

WPIAL Champions at Heinz Field: Opened for the 2014 season, the display honors every WPIAL football champion since 2001, the first year of Heinz Field.



Scoreboard: The Heinz Field video board represents Daktronics' latest generation of 4.4 trillion color HD-16 LED displays and measures 27'x96'. The new technology nearly quadruples the resolution of the former Sony video display. The video board incorporates Daktronics' newest video technology with high density full-color Pure Pixel® resolution, incredibly wide-viewing angles and resolution enhancement with sub-pixel control. As with all Daktronics' LED video displays, the big screen has the capability to show a single, wide-screen image and can also be split into 24 individual images to show lineups, game statistics, out-of-town game information and much more. The active area of the display approaches 2,800 square feet. The northwest corner of the stadium also features a 35'x72' video board that was installed in 2014.

Heinz Ketchup Scoreboard Bottles Facts: The bottles are exact replicas—down to the embossed “57” on the bottle's neck—of the Heinz Ketchup 14-ounce glass bottle. Each bottle includes 8,000 pounds of fiberglass, 375 feet of neon tubing and 20,500 light-emitting diodes (LEDs). Each Heinz Ketchup Bottle measures 35 feet x 9 feet and each weighs 8,000 pounds, both totaling 16,000 pounds—the equivalent of 53 linemen who each weigh 300 pounds. If the Heinz Ketchup bottles were filled with Heinz Ketchup, they would contain 1,664,000 fluid ounces each. That is enough to give each person seated at Heinz Field at least one 14-ounce bottle of ketchup to take home. If both bottles were emptied, the entire football field would be covered in ¾ of an inch of ketchup. Approximately 4,500 footballs could fit into each scoreboard ketchup bottle.

South Plaza Expansion: An additional 2,633 seats were added to Heinz Field prior to the start of the 2015 season. The new seats are a mixture of general reserved seating, club seating and an additional five suites. The South Plaza also offers such premium concessions as Burgatory, “Mac N’at” and Papa John's Pizza.

FREDDIE FU, MD, is now in his 32nd year as the head team physician and orthopaedic surgeon for the University of Pittsburgh athletic department. Dr. Fu has been the David Silver Professor and chair of the Department of Orthopaedic Surgery at the Pitt School of Medicine since 1997.

In the summer of 2014, Dr. Fu was honored in Europe, in Japan and across North America for his research and pioneering surgical techniques to treat sports-related injuries to the knee and shoulder and for his extensive scientific and clinical research in the biomechanics of such injuries. Dr. Fu was inducted to the American Orthopaedic Society for Sports Medicine Hall of Fame in July 2016. He is lauded especially for his scientific research and clinical expertise in treating the commonly injured anterior cruciate ligament (ACL), the main stabilizing ligament of the knee. Because of his reputation, Dr. Fu attracts both athletic and nonathletic patients from all over the globe and is frequently sought after as an expert by top national and international media covering sports, medicine and science.

Dr. Fu sees patients in his clinic at the UPMC Center for Sports Medicine—one of the world's largest, most comprehensive facilities of its kind—located within the UPMC Rooney Sports Complex. Partly designed by Dr. Fu, the complex also houses the indoor and outdoor training facilities of the Pitt Panthers and the Pittsburgh Steelers.

VOLKER MUSAHL, MD, is Medical Director at UPMC Rooney Sports Complex and chief of the division of sports medicine at UPMC. He is a UPMC orthopaedic surgeon and co-head team physician for the Pitt Panthers football team. He serves as associate professor of orthopaedic surgery at the Pitt School of Medicine and of bioengineering at Pitt's Swanson School of Engineering. Additionally, he holds appointments as co-director of the Orthopaedic Robotics Laboratory and associate editor for the journal *Knee Surgery, Sports Traumatology, Arthroscopy*. Dr. Musahl, who specializes in sports medicine, shoulder surgery and knee ligament injuries, sees patients at the UPMC Rooney Sports Complex and Monroeville office. While he also works as a team physician in other collegiate and high school sports, he and Dr. Mares serve as the primary day-to-day Pitt football physicians.

AARON V. MARES, MD, specializes in the non-operative care of sports-related and musculoskeletal injuries, general medical conditions in the athlete, and sports injury prevention at the UPMC Rooney Sports Complex. Dr. Mares serves as the co-head team physician for the University of Pittsburgh football team and a medical consultant for several local high school teams. He is the associate medical director of the Pittsburgh Marathon and has served as a lead physician for many other running and extreme sporting events. Additionally, Dr. Mares is an assistant professor of orthopaedic surgery at the University of Pittsburgh. Dr. Mares is also trained in ultrasound guided non-operative procedures.

JEANNE DOPERAK, DO, a UPMC primary care sports medicine physician, sees patients at the UPMC Rooney Sports Complex and Monroeville and North Huntingdon satellite offices. She is a general physician for the athletic departments of both the University of Pittsburgh and Saint Vincent College. Dr. Doperak is an assistant professor at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine and Pitt softball team physician. She is the primary care sports medicine fellowship director at UPMC St. Margaret. Dr. Fu named her associate head team physician for basketball and Olympic sports in 2014-15.

BRYSON LESNIAK, MD, is a UPMC orthopaedic surgeon and team physician for the Pitt men's basketball and soccer teams. Dr. Lesniak is an associate professor in the Department of Orthopaedic Surgery at the Pitt School of Medicine. He previously practiced and taught at the University of Miami, where he served as the team physician for the Miami Marlins baseball franchise. Dr. Lesniak sees patients at the UPMC Rooney Sports Complex and South Hills offices in Bethel Park.

STEPHEN RABUCK, MD, is a UPMC orthopaedic surgeon and clinical assistant professor in the department of orthopaedic surgery. He is the associate head team physician for University of Pittsburgh women's basketball. Dr. Rabuck completed fellowship training at the UPMC Center for Sports Medicine from 2011-12. Additionally, he serves as a physician for U.S. Soccer, providing coverage to U.S. Soccer developmental teams. Dr. Rabuck specializes in sports medicine, shoulder and knee surgery, and sees patients at the UPMC Rooney Sports Complex and Monroeville offices.

UPMC SPORTS MEDICINE

More than 500 Pitt student-athletes receive medical care provided by UPMC Sports Medicine's athletic training program.

The University of Pittsburgh School of Health and Rehabilitation Sciences has a proud tradition of athletic training education. The undergraduate program is accredited by the National Athletic Trainers' Association (NATA), and the school also provides graduate education at the master's and doctoral levels.

Established in 1975, the athletic training program prepares students for a career in the multidisciplinary field of sports medicine. Upon completion of the athletic training education program, students are eligible to take the NATA-administered certification examination.

Pitt athletes receive treatment in two athletic training rooms. Each sport has a full-time certified athletic trainer or certified graduate assistant and student athletic trainers assigned to provide medical coverage during all practices and games. The staff is dedicated to providing all aspects of prevention, evaluation, management and rehabilitation of injuries and illnesses.

The sports medicine staff also runs a sports medicine clinic at the UPMC Rooney Sports Complex at which all athletes can be evaluated by one of the sports medicine physicians. The South Side structure, which includes the UPMC Center for Sports Medicine, an indoor practice facility, and four outdoor practice fields, combines the resources of a major academic and clinical system with professional and collegiate sports team programs. This clinic provides athletes with an opportunity to be seen by specialists and provides student athletic trainers with an outstanding learning environment.

The UPMC Sports Medicine clinic for Pitt athletes is led by Dr. Freddie Fu, Pitt head team physician. Various team physicians include Drs. Volker Musahl, Aaron Mares, Jeanne Doperak, Bryson Lesniak and Stephen Rabuck.

The world-renowned UPMC Sports Medicine Concussion Program is also available to Pitt athletes. The program is led by neuropsychologist Dr. Michael Collins. In addition, a comprehensive staff of consulting specialists from throughout UPMC is part of the sports medicine team caring for all Pitt student-athletes.
