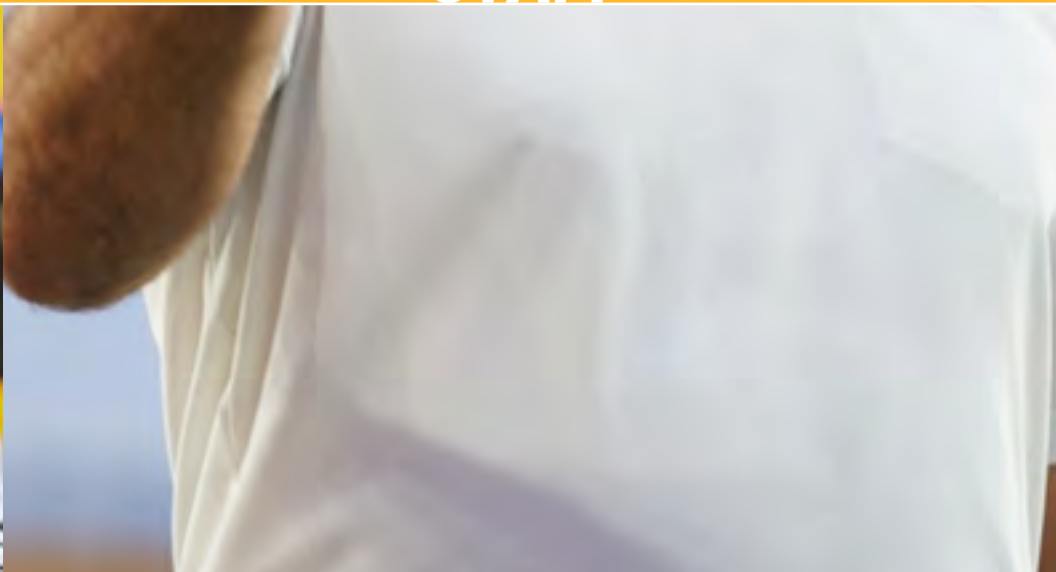

PAT NARDUZZI

HEAD COACH

Like the region it calls home, Pitt football under Pat Narduzzi has proven to be rugged, relentless and on the rise.

Upon his hiring on December 26, 2014, Narduzzi pledged his Panthers would “play with a tough, blue-collar mentality—and how else would you want it in the City of Pittsburgh?”

Promise kept.

The seventh-year head coach has made an emphatic imprint on Pitt football. His vision for the Panthers—on and off the field—continues to bear fruit with each passing season.

College football was played under unprecedented circumstances in 2020. Even in the face of those obstacles, the Panthers displayed their hallmark resiliency under Narduzzi. The end result was a fifth winning regular season in six years and an array of national individual accolades added to Pitt’s rich heritage.

Narduzzi has engrained toughness and tenacity into program’s culture. His passionate approach has spurred Pitt’s rise as an ACC contender. Moreover, he is committed—in both word and deed—to his student-athletes’ long-term growth. That last point was made evident when Narduzzi and his wife, Donna, made a six-figure financial gift to the Pitt Football Championship Fund, which serves the program in such key areas as student-athlete development, facility improvement, technology and recruiting.

“I take great pride in wearing that Pitt Script on my chest each day as the University of Pittsburgh’s head football coach,” Narduzzi said. “This is an outstanding place with so many amazing people. Donna and I feel incredibly blessed to call Pitt our home.”

Narduzzi’s tenure has witnessed many milestone moments and achievements. Among them:

- From 2015-20, Narduzzi directed Pitt to 29 victories in ACC play, the conference’s third-highest win total during that span. The Panthers trailed only Clemson (46) and Miami (32).
- Narduzzi has coached four first team All-Americans at Pitt, including three who earned consensus status. In 2020, defensive ends Patrick Jones II and Rashad Weaver were consensus All-Americans. Pitt was one of only four programs nationwide to have multiple consensus honorees last season, joining Alabama, Ohio State and Notre Dame.
- Arriving at Pitt without a single FBS scholarship offer, Jimmy Morrissey became a three-time All-ACC center and the 2020 recipient of the Burlsworth Trophy, annually presented to the most outstanding player in college football who began his career as a walk-on.
- Six Pitt products—Jones, Morrissey, Weaver, safety Damar Hamlin, cornerback Jason Pinnoch and defensive tackle Jaylen Twyman—were selected in the 2021 NFL Draft, the most of any program in the ACC and tied for eighth nationally.
- Narduzzi’s Panthers have a well-earned reputation as a dangerous opponent for highly ranked foes. In 2019, Pitt scored a 35-34 triumph over UCF, which visited Heinz Field riding a 27-game non-bowl winning streak. The winning touchdown—a gadget-play pass caught by quarterback Kenny Pickett—has been immortalized as the “Pitt Special.”
- In 2017, Pitt closed the season with a 24-14 victory over No. 2 Miami, which entered the game undefeated and on the cusp of the College Football Playoff. In 2016, the Panthers defeated two teams that finished in the top 5 of the final CFP rankings. Pitt gave No. 2 Clemson—that year’s national champion—its only loss (43-42) and kept No. 5 Penn State out of the playoff field by defeating the Nittany Lions, 42-39.
- In 2020, Pitt earned an NCAA Public Recognition Award for achieving an Academic Progress Rate (APR) score that ranked in the top 10% of all football programs. The Panthers’ multi-year 988 APR set a Pitt football program record and was 24 points higher than the national average. In 2018, the Panthers received the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Academic Achievement Award after scoring a perfect single-year 1,000 APR.
- Under Narduzzi’s influence, the football program also strives to make an impact off the field and annually leads Pitt Athletics with the most community service hours.

Narduzzi arrived at Pitt following eight highly successful years as the defensive coordinator at Michigan State under former head coach Mark Dantonio. During that time the Spartans achieved five Top 25 finishes and Narduzzi's defense proved instrumental in that success. Michigan State was the only team to rank in the nation's top 10 in total defense and rushing defense each season from 2011-14.

In 2014, the Spartans finished with the No. 5 national ranking and 11-2 record following a stirring 42-41 victory over Baylor in the AT&T Cotton Bowl. Narduzzi's defense shut out the Bears in the fourth quarter, opening the door for 21 unanswered points by Michigan State.

Michigan State boasted the nation's top rushing defense in 2014, yielding just 88.5 yards per game. The Spartans finished third nationally with 34 turnovers gained and eighth in total defense, holding opponents to just 315.8 yards per contest.

In 2013, Michigan State finished No. 3 in the country following a Big Ten title and 24-20 victory over No. 5 Stanford in the Rose Bowl. In the wake of that season, Narduzzi was named the recipient of the prestigious Broyles Award, annually presented to the country's top assistant coach.

Narduzzi tutored an impressive list of decorated defensive players at Michigan State, including first team All-Americans in cornerback Darqueze Dennard, safety Kurtis Drummond, linebacker Greg Jones and defensive tackle Jerel Worthy.

Dennard was a unanimous All-American in 2013, becoming the first Michigan State cornerback to earn that distinction. He also was the school's first winner of the Jim Thorpe Award, given annually to college football's top defensive back. Dennard was a first-round NFL Draft pick of the Cincinnati Bengals in 2014, the first Spartans defensive back taken in the initial round since 1961. In the 2015 draft, another Narduzzi pupil, Michigan State cornerback Trae Waynes, was a first-round pick of the Minnesota Vikings.

Narduzzi coached 19 first-team All-Big Ten selections. Four players won the conference's top individual awards under his watch, including two Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year honorees (Dennard in 2013 and Drummond in 2014). Shilique Calhoun was the Big Ten Defensive Lineman of the Year in 2013 while Greg Jones was the overall Defensive Player of the Year in 2009.

Prior to Michigan State, Narduzzi spent three years (2004-06) as defensive coordinator under Dantonio at Cincinnati, helping the Bearcats to a pair of bowl invitations.

In 2003, Narduzzi was the defensive coordinator at Miami of Ohio under the late Terry Hoepfner. The RedHawks stormed to a 13-1 record that season, capturing the Mid-American Conference (MAC) championship and defeating nationally ranked Louisville in the GMAC Bowl to finish No. 10 in the Associated Press poll. While quarterback Ben Roethlisberger headlined Miami's offense, Narduzzi's stout unit topped the MAC in rushing defense (19th nationally), scoring defense (22nd nationally) and pass efficiency defense (34th nationally).

Narduzzi served as linebackers coach at Northern Illinois for three seasons (2000-02). NIU won a pair of MAC divisional titles during his tenure and in 2002 had the league's top rushing defense.

From 1993-99, Narduzzi coached at his alma mater, Rhode Island, serving as the Rams' defensive coordinator his final two seasons. He began his coaching career at Miami of Ohio, working as a graduate assistant in 1990 and 1991, before earning his first full-time position as receivers coach for the 1992 season.

Narduzzi was an All-Ohio performer at Youngstown's Ursuline High School, leading the Irish to the Steel Valley championship and state playoffs as a senior in 1984. He was a starting linebacker under his father, the late Bill Narduzzi, as a freshman at Youngstown State University in 1985 before transferring to Rhode Island, where he became a three-year starter for the Rams from 1987-89.

Bill Narduzzi was head coach at YSU from 1975-85. He led the Penguins to two NCAA Division II playoff appearances, including the national championship game in 1979, and twice was named the Ohio Valley Conference (OVC) Coach of the Year. (One of Bill's first coaching posts was as a freshman line coach at Pitt in 1962.)

Narduzzi completed his bachelor's degree in physical education at Rhode Island in 1990 and later earned a master's degree in sports studies at Miami of Ohio in 1992.

He and his wife, Donna, have four children: Arianna, Christina, Patrick and Isabella.

Entering his fifth season on Pat Narduzzi's Pitt staff, Charlie Partridge is a tremendous asset with his experience as an FBS head coach, accomplished assistant and renowned recruiter. Reflective of his invaluable contributions, Partridge was elevated to assistant head coach by Narduzzi prior to the 2018 season.

Partridge's positional focus is the defensive front, a unit that played at a dominant level the past two seasons. In addition to high production—an amazing 67% of Pitt's FBS-best 97 sacks over 2019-20 came from the defensive line—Partridge's players have also been highly decorated.

In 2020, Pitt boasted the country's top defensive end duo in Patrick Jones II and Rashad Weaver. Both players earned consensus All-America honors. It was the first time since 1977 that Pitt had two defensive players earn consensus status in the same season. Jones and Weaver each played in the prestigious Senior Bowl all-star game. Additionally, defensive tackle Calijah Kancey was named a Freshman All-American by three different selectors.

Partridge himself garnered postseason accolades when FootballScoop named him the 2020 Defensive Line Coach of the Year.

In 2019, tackle Jaylen Twyman was named a second team All-American by six different outlets after compiling a team-high 10.5 sacks. Twyman became the first interior defensive lineman to lead Pitt in sacks since Aaron Donald (11) in 2013.

Jones (Minnesota Vikings), Weaver (Tennessee Titans) and Twyman (Vikings) were each selected in the 2021 NFL Draft.

This is Partridge's second tour at Pitt. He originally served under head coaches Walt Harris and Dave Wannstedt from 2003-07. Partridge returned to Pittsburgh after serving the prior three seasons (2014-16) as head coach at Florida Atlantic University. Inheriting a program in need of a complete rebuild, on and off the field, he signed three of the finest recruiting classes in FAU history.

Partridge spent the 2013 season at Arkansas, where he served as assistant head coach and oversaw the defensive line. Under his watch, defensive ends Trey Flowers and Chris Smith were All-SEC performers.

Partridge was instrumental in one of the best five-year runs in Wisconsin history from 2008-12. Initially serving as defensive line and specialist coach, he was elevated to associate head coach and co-defensive coordinator for his final two seasons. The Badgers won three consecutive Big Ten titles from 2010-12, earning Rose Bowl berths each season.

Partridge oversaw an outstanding Wisconsin defensive front. His most accomplished pupil was defensive end J.J. Watt, a 2010 All-American and winner of the Lott IMPACT Trophy as the national defensive player of the year.

During Partridge's initial Pitt tenure, he worked with the defensive line for four seasons and the linebackers in his final campaign. He also served as the Panthers' special teams coordinator in 2006-07. In 2007, Pitt ranked fifth in the nation in total defense, yielding just 297.7 yards per game. The Panthers closed that season with one of the most celebrated victories—and defensive performances—in school history: a 13-9 upset of West Virginia that shattered the Mountaineers' national title hopes.

Under the guidance of Partridge and defensive coordinator Paul Rhoads in 2007, middle linebacker Scott McKillop led the nation in tackles (12.6 per game), earning All-America status and unanimous first-team All-Big East honors. Another Partridge protégé, defensive end Joe Clermond, led the Big East in tackles for loss (16.5) in 2006.

Partridge served four seasons (1998-2001) at Iowa State in administrative and coaching roles. In 2002, Partridge was hired by Eastern Illinois University as defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator. EIU advanced to the NCAA I-AA playoffs that year and shared the Ohio Valley Conference (OVC) championship.

Partridge was an NSCA All-America defensive lineman for Drake University. His collegiate coaching career began at his alma mater as a Drake graduate assistant during the 1996 and 1997 seasons. Partridge and his wife, Julie, have two daughters, Alexa and Kylee.



MARK WHIPPLE

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR / QUARTERBACKS

Regarded as one of football's finest offensive minds, Mark Whipple enters his third season as Pitt's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Whipple owns four decades of experience and championship rings at both the NFL and collegiate levels.

Under Whipple's guidance, Kenny Pickett has established himself among the most productive quarterbacks in Pitt history, ranking third all-time in total offense (8,552) and fifth in passing yards (7,984). Entering the 2021 season, Pickett is poised to eclipse leader Alex Van Pelt (1989-92) in both categories (11,267 pass yards and 11,148 total yards).

In 2020, Pickett became the first Pitt quarterback to twice throw for 400 yards in a game and was named to the Johnny Unitas Award Top 15. In 2019, Pickett threw for 3,098 yards, fourth all-time at Pitt, and was named Quick Lane Bowl MVP, passing for 361 yards and three TDs.

Pitt's wideouts have thrived in Whipple's offense. Jordan Addison was a Freshman All-American in 2020 after catching 60 passes for 666 yards and four scores. In 2019, Maurice Ffrench had a school-record 96 catches, surpassing Larry Fitzgerald's mark of 92 set in 2003. Ffrench led the nation with 8.7 receptions per contest.

From 2014-18, Whipple was head coach at Massachusetts, his second tour at UMass. The Minutemen finished among the country's top 20 passing teams in three of his five years. In 2018, they ranked 14th nationally in passing yards, while All-America wideout Andy Isabella led the nation in receiving yards (1,698) and was drafted by the Arizona Cardinals.

Whipple oversaw the greatest season in UMass history, the 1998 national championship campaign, during which the Minutemen won a school-record 12 games and defeated top-ranked Georgia Southern, 55-43, for the NCAA I-AA (now FCS) title. Whipple was honored as the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Division I-AA Coach of the Year.

Whipple concluded his Massachusetts tenure as the winningest coach in school history with 65 victories and claimed three Atlantic 10 titles and three NCAA playoff berths. In addition to his two stints at UMass, he also led the programs at Brown (1994-97) and New Haven (1988-93). Whipple compiled a 137-102 record over 21 seasons as a head coach.

At Brown, his alma mater, Whipple revitalized the football program's fortunes while rewriting the offensive record books. The Bears set Ivy League records for total offense (483.6 avg.) and passing yards (334.6) per league game in 1997.

Sports Illustrated lauded his 1993 New Haven team as having the "Best Offense in College Football" after averaging 52.5 points and 557.6 yards per game. In 1992, the Chargers led all NCAA divisions in scoring (50.5 avg.) and total offense (587.7). New Haven went a combined 23-2 overall during those two years, including a perfect regular season record.

Whipple had three coaching appointments in the NFL. His initial stint was as quarterbacks coach with the Pittsburgh Steelers under Bill Cowher from 2004-06. Under Whipple's mentorship in 2004, Ben Roethlisberger broke Dan Marino's NFL rookie quarterback records for completion percentage (66.4) and passer rating (98.1), and was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year. In 2005, Roethlisberger became the youngest starting quarterback in NFL history to win a Super Bowl, a 21-10 victory over the Seattle Seahawks.

Whipple served as the Cleveland Browns' quarterbacks coach under Pat Shurmur in 2011 and 2012. He additionally was an offensive assistant on Andy Reid's Philadelphia staff in 2008, helping the Eagles to the NFC Championship Game.

Following his Eagles stint, Whipple was the assistant head coach, offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Miami in 2009 and 2010. In each of those seasons, the Hurricanes eclipsed 5,000 yards in total offense.

A 1979 graduate of Brown with a bachelor's degree in political science, Whipple was a two-sport standout for the Bears. In football, he was a two-year starting quarterback. He also was a four-year letterman and starting shortstop for the Brown baseball team. Whipple was inducted into Brown's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996.

He and his wife, Brenda, have two sons, Spencer and Austin. Spencer, a former walk-on quarterback at Pitt, worked as a football graduate assistant for the Panthers (2012-13) and now is an assistant wide receivers coach with the Arizona Cardinals.

Under the direction of Randy Bates, Pitt has fielded one of college football's most aggressive and productive defenses the past two seasons. The Panthers ranked among the nation's top 20 units in both 2020 and 2019 in fewest yards allowed.

This past season, Pitt led the country in total sacks (tied with 46) and tackles for loss (a school-record 111). The Panthers also boasted lofty national rankings in rushing defense (third, 93.5 yards per game), passes intercepted (ninth, 14 total), turnovers gained (13th, 20 total) and total defense (20th, 339.5 yards per game).

Pitt could lay claim to college football's finest defensive end tandem in 2020. Patrick Jones II and Rashad Weaver were both consensus All-Americans—the first time since 1977 the Panthers had two defensive players earn consensus status in the same season.

Bates himself received national recognition at season's end when he was named the Assistant Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA). The prestigious award is annually presented to an assistant coach who distinguishes himself through on-field performance and community impact.

Pitt's exceptional defensive play was a continuation from 2019, when the Panthers ranked first in sacks per game (3.92), 12th in rushing defense (108.5 yards per game) and 15th in total defense (312.9 yards per game).

Pitt collected 97 sacks over the 2019-20 seasons, the highest total in the nation over that span and the Panthers' highest two-year total since 1986-87 (104).

Bates arrived in Pittsburgh in 2018 after spending the prior 12 seasons (2006-17) coaching linebackers at Northwestern. His accomplished pupils included back-to-back All-America linebackers. Anthony Walker Jr., now a member of the Indianapolis Colts, was a consensus All-Big Ten selection who earned All-America accolades from Associated Press and *Sports Illustrated*.

Additionally, Bates oversaw the development of Paddy Fisher, a 2017 Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) Freshman All-American and the Big Ten Network's Defensive Freshman of the Year.

Prior to Northwestern, Bates spent six seasons at Louisiana Tech (2000-05). He coached nearly every defensive positional group while with the Bulldogs before ascending to defensive coordinator for his final season.

Under Bates' orchestration in 2005, the Louisiana Tech defense forced a whopping 31 turnovers to lead the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) and rank ninth nationally. The Bulldogs surrendered their fewest points since 1994 and finished among the WAC's top three teams in rushing defense, pass defense, total defense and scoring defense.

Among the standouts under Bates at Louisiana Tech were three defensive backs who played in the NFL: safety Bobby Gray (Chicago Bears), cornerback Jerron Wishom (Green Bay Packers) and cornerback Tramon Williams, who as a member of the Packers won a Super Bowl and earned a Pro Bowl invitation.

Before Louisiana Tech, Bates was the linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator at Kent State for two seasons (1998-99). While with the Golden Flashes, he coached future NFL Defensive Player of the Year James Harrison.

Bates coached the linebackers at New Hampshire from 1992-97, mentoring three players who finished among the top 10 career tacklers in program history. The Wildcats claimed three Yankee Conference Northern Division titles during his tenure.

Bates' additional coaching stops include Navy (1989-91), St. Joseph's (Ind.) College (1984-88), Miami (Ohio) (1983) and Muskingum College (1982).

A retired Naval Lieutenant, Bates received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Ohio State in 1983. He also earned a master's degree in education from Miami University in 1985.

Bates and his wife, Tracey, have three daughters: Samantha, Alexandra and Olivia.

Andre Powell enters his seventh season as Pitt's special teams coordinator and running backs coach. His impact on both areas of responsibility has been nothing short of exceptional.

Under Powell, the Panthers have a well-earned reputation for producing punishing, downhill runners. A list of his recent standouts—including James Conner, Qadree Ollison and Darrin Hall—serves as a vivid illustration of Pitt's excellence at the position.

In 2018, Pitt had two 1,000-yard rushers in a season for the first time ever. Ollison (1,213) and Hall (1,144) both reached the milestone and were named All-ACC. For Ollison (who now plays for the Atlanta Falcons), it was his second 1,000-yard season under Powell. In 2015, he was the ACC Offensive Rookie of the Year after rushing for 1,121 yards.

Conner was a 2016 first-team All-ACC selection after rambling for 1,092 yards and 16 touchdowns. He concluded his college career as the ACC's all-time leader with 56 total TDs. A 2018 Pro Bowler with the Pittsburgh Steelers, Conner now plays for the Arizona Cardinals.

Pitt has featured dynamic special teams under Powell's direction. In 2020, Kirk Christodoulou was a Pro Football Focus All-American and Ray Guy Award semifinalist after averaging a career-high 44.7 yards per punt.

Qadree Henderson finished his career (2015-17) with a Pitt-record seven kick returns for touchdowns. The 2016 NCAA statistical champion in kickoff return TDs (a school-record three) and combined kick return yards (1,166), Henderson earned consensus All-America honors, becoming the first player in Pitt history to earn that stature as a return specialist.

In 2018, Maurice Ffrench ranked second nationally in kickoff return TDs (two) and seventh in kick return average (27.4), earning Phil Steele All-America recognition.

Pitt's two most prolific placekickers were mentored by Powell. Chris Blewitt (2013-16) concluded his career as Pitt's all-time kick scoring leader (363 points). Blewitt's most memorable kick was a 48-yard field goal with six seconds left that lifted the Panthers past eventual national champion Clemson, 43-42, in 2016.

Alex Kessman (2017-20) ranks second in kick scoring with 341 points. He set Pitt records for career field goals (69) and longest field goal (58 yards). Kessman additionally set marks for 50-yard field goals in a career (12) and season (four in 2018 and 2020). His 66.7% success rate from that long range (12 of 18) set an NCAA record, eclipsing Arizona's Max Zendejas (60.9% from 1982-85).

Prior to Pitt, Powell spent four seasons at Maryland (2011-14), where he coached the running backs and, in his final three seasons, served as special teams coordinator. Maryland's Brad Craddock was selected the 2014 winner of the Lou Groza Award.

Powell coached at Clemson from 2007-10, overseeing the running backs each season and coordinating the special teams his last three. He mentored Clemson great C.J. Spiller, a 2009 unanimous All-American and ACC Player of the Year. Spiller concluded his Clemson career with 7,588 all-purpose yards, the second most in FBS history. His seven kickoff return TDs set an NCAA record, while his eight total kick return TDs (including one punt) tied the national mark. He was a first-round NFL Draft pick of the Buffalo Bills in 2010.

Powell coached running backs at North Carolina from 2001-06. He was the Tar Heels' special teams coordinator his final three seasons in Chapel Hill.

At Virginia from 1996-2000, Powell coached the running backs (1996 and 2000) and receivers (1997-99). Among his pupils were future NFL players Tiki Barber, Germaine Crowell, Thomas Jones, Charles Kirby, Pat Washington and Terrence Wilkins.

Powell first worked with Pat Narduzzi on the football staff at Rhode Island during the 1993-94 seasons. Powell's additional coaching stops include Indiana (1989), South Carolina (1990), Army (1991 and 1995) and Virginia Military Institute (1992).

Powell is a 1989 graduate of Indiana, where he lettered twice as a fullback and helped pave the way for 1,000-yard rusher Anthony Thompson. He played on a pair of bowl teams for the Hoosiers (1986 All-American Bowl and 1988 Peach Bowl).

Powell and his wife, Joann, have two daughters, Alayna and Mikala, and a son, Andre II.



DAVE BORBELY

OFFENSIVE LINE

Dave Borbely enters his fourth year as Pitt's offensive line coach. Owing a long and productive history of developing outstanding offensive linemen, Borbely's influence has been evident during his tenure with the Panthers.

Under Borbely's watch, Jimmy Morrissey developed into one of the most accomplished centers in recent Pitt history. Morrissey was a three-time All-ACC performer and the 2020 recipient of the Bursworth Trophy, annually presented to the most outstanding player in college football who began his career as a walk-on.

Morrissey was selected by the Las Vegas Raiders in the 2021 NFL Draft.

Pitt offensive linemen have earned seven total All-ACC citations over the past three years. In addition to Morrissey, guard Bryce Hargrove, tackle Stefano Millin and guard Mike Herndon have also been honored.

Borbely's 2018 offensive front paved the way for two 1,000-yard rushers (Qadree Ollison and Darrin Hall)—the first time in Pitt history that feat was achieved in the same season. The Panthers' 3,191 total rushing yards in 2018 rank fourth all-time in school annals. Pitt was selected a semifinalist for the 2018 Joe Moore Award given to the nation's top offensive line.

Prior to Pitt, Borbely spent two seasons at Maryland. In 2016, his offensive front helped the Terps produce 2,594 rushing yards, only the seventh time in program history—and first since 2003—the Terps surpassed 2,500 yards on the ground. Maryland also rushed for 26 touchdowns in 2016, its most since the 2007 campaign.

Borbely served two coaching tours at Virginia (2006-09 and 2015). While with the Cavs he oversaw the development of All-America tackle Eugene Monroe, who won the 2008 Jacobs Blocking Trophy, annually presented to the ACC's top blocker. Monroe was the eighth overall selection in the 2009 NFL Draft, taken by the Jacksonville Jaguars.

From 2010-13, Borbely coached the offensive line at Louisville. The Cardinals' 2012 team went 11-2, won the Big East championship and rolled past No. 3 Florida, 33-23, in the Sugar Bowl to finish 13th in the final polls. In 2013, Louisville's potent offense averaged 460.8 yards per contest en route to a 12-1 mark. The Cardinals capped that season with a 36-9 drubbing of Miami in the Russell Athletic Bowl and earned a No. 15 final ranking.

Borbely had a four-year tenure at Colorado (2002-05), during which the Buffs won three Big 12 North titles. Among the players he developed was All-Big 12 center Mark Fenton, a finalist for the Rimington Award.

Prior to Colorado, Borbely spent four seasons coaching the offensive line at Notre Dame (1998-2001). The Irish annually fielded a potent rushing game behind Borbely's front and advanced to two New Year's Day bowl games (1999 Gator Bowl and 2001 Fiesta Bowl).

From 1995-97, Borbely coached the offensive line at Stanford, molding a pair of NFL Draft picks in guard Brad Badger and tackle Nathan Parks.

Borbely's additional offensive line appointments include Colorado State-Pueblo (during the ThunderWolves' 2014 NCAA Division II national title season), Tulane (1992-94), Temple (1989-91) and Rice (1986-88).

He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Evansville (1981-82) before serving as a freshman defensive line coach in the Ivy League at Penn (1983). Borbely's first major-college appointment came as a graduate assistant at Tennessee (1984-85) under Johnny Majors, the legendary former Pitt head coach.

A native of Hammond, Ind., Borbely is a 1981 graduate of DePauw University with a bachelor's degree in history. He earned his master's degree in secondary education from the University of Evansville in 1983.

Borbely and his wife, Bev, have three children: daughter Laura and sons Joseph and Brian. They have two granddaughters, Avery and Addilyn.

Vital to the success of Pitt's nationally ranked defense has been an outstanding secondary coached by Archie Collins.

Pitt led the ACC and ranked ninth in the country with 14 interceptions during the 2020 season. Each of those interceptions was made by Collins' defensive backs. Despite playing an abbreviated season, it was the Panthers' highest interception total in eight years.

Safety Damar Hamlin, who led Pitt in tackles (67) and pass breakups (seven), was an All-ACC honoree. Hamlin played in the Senior Bowl, making an acrobatic interception in the prestigious all-star game.

Two members of Pitt's secondary were selected in the 2021 NFL Draft: Hamlin (Buffalo Bills) and cornerback Jason Pinnock (New York Jets). Additionally, safety Paris Ford signed a free-agent contract with the Los Angeles Rams.

Collins previously oversaw the development of All-ACC corner Dane Jackson, who was drafted by the Buffalo Bills in 2020 and impressed during his rookie NFL campaign.

Prior to Pitt, Collins spent five seasons at Central Michigan (2013-17). Serving as defensive pass game coordinator in 2017, his influence helped the Chippewas lead the Mid-American Conference (MAC) in interceptions (19), fewest passing yards allowed (185.5 yards per game) and pass efficiency defense (108.8 rating). On a national scale, CMU ranked sixth nationally in pass efficiency defense, seventh in interceptions and 20th in passing defense. FootballScoop named Collins a finalist for its 2017 Defensive Back Coach of the Year award.

Two of Collins' Central Michigan defensive backs, cornerback Amari Coleman and safety Josh Cox, were 2017 All-MAC honorees. Coleman was a first-team selection for the second consecutive season and finished his collegiate career with three interceptions returned for touchdowns. Cox intercepted six passes as a senior to finish seventh in the nation (0.5 INTs per game).

Additionally, corner Sean Bunting had five interceptions during that 2017 season. Bunting was a second-round selection by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the 2019 NFL Draft.

During Collins' tenure, Central Michigan ranked among the nation's top 25 in passing defense three times: 2017, 2015 (No. 24, 193.0 avg.) and 2013 (No. 20, 203.9 avg.). In 2016, CMU finished eighth nationally with four defensive touchdowns—all pick-sixes by Collins' defensive backs.

Also under his watch at CMU was Kavon Frazier, an All-MAC safety in 2015 who now plays for the Cincinnati Bengals.

Collins was also highly productive on the recruiting trail at Central Michigan. In 2015, he was named the MAC's Recruiter of the Year by Scout.com.

Prior to Central Michigan, the Detroit native was a defensive graduate assistant from 2010-12 at Michigan State, his alma mater. It was during this coaching assistantship that he first met Pat Narduzzi, who was the Spartans' defensive coordinator at the time.

In addition to contributing to one of college football's elite defensive units, Collins worked daily with future NFL defensive backs Darqueze Dennard, Kurtis Drummond and Trae Waynes. Collins also helped with the special teams during his time in East Lansing.

Collins' additional experience includes nine years coaching high school football in the Detroit Public School League. He worked at three PSL schools (Cass Tech, Mackenzie and Southeastern), producing nine all-state performers and 28 all-city honorees.

A safety at Michigan State, Collins finished his career as a two-year letterman (1996-97) for the Spartans.

He graduated from Michigan State in 1998 with a bachelor's degree in finance. Collins went on to earn a master's degree in kinesiology and coaching from MSU in 2011.

He and his wife, Brandi, have three children: son Archie IV and daughters Amber and BellaRose.

Ryan Manalac, a former collegiate standout linebacker at Cincinnati who most recently was the defensive coordinator at Bucknell, was named Pitt's new linebackers coach in January by Coach Pat Narduzzi.

Manalac's arrival at Pitt serves as a reunion with Narduzzi. The pair previously worked together when Narduzzi was defensive coordinator at Cincinnati and Michigan State.

Manalac spent the past two years at Bucknell, which had its 2020 season cancelled due to the pandemic. In 2019, Bucknell's defense ranked among the very best in Patriot League play, finishing first in sacks (32), turnovers gained (14) and defensive touchdowns (four). The Bison ranked second in total defense (319.7 avg.) and rushing defense (96.3 avg.).

Manalac's unit produced six total defensive TDs to lead the Football Championship Subdivision. The Bison's 37 overall sacks ranked fifth nationally.

He also coached the Bucknell linebackers and had three players named to Phil Steele's All-Patriot League team, including first-team selection Simeon Page, who paced the Bison in sacks (nine) and tackles for loss (12.5).

Manalac was the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Ohio Dominican University during the 2017 and 2018 seasons. During that two-year span, ODU surrendered just 15.9 points per game in conference play, the lowest average in the Great Midwest Athletic Conference.

Ten Ohio Dominican defensive players earned first team all-conference under his watch. Linebacker Ross Thompson was named the G-MAC Defensive Player of the Year after compiling a school-record 110 tackles. Thompson finished his career as ODU's all-time tackles leader with 294 stops.

Manalac earned his first full-time coaching appointment in 2016 at Valparaiso, overseeing the linebackers.

At Michigan State from 2011-15, Manalac served as a graduate assistant on both sides of the ball and also worked with special teams, recruiting and video. During his tenure, the Spartans achieved four Top 10 finishes, four bowl victories, two Big Ten championships and a berth in the 2015 College Football Playoff.

Manalac worked directly under Narduzzi with Michigan State's defense during the 2012 and 2014 seasons. At the conclusion of each of those campaigns, the Spartans ranked among college football's finest defensive units.

The 2014 team won the Rose Bowl and finished with an 11-2 record behind a defense that led the nation in fewest rushing yards allowed (88.5 avg.) and finished eighth in fewest total yards allowed (315.8 avg.).

Initially a walk-on at Cincinnati, Manalac would earn a scholarship and four letters for the Bearcats. He compiled nearly 200 tackles during his career and was a starting linebacker his final two seasons. As a senior, he collected a team-high 82 stops to help Cincinnati win the 2008 Big East title and advance to the Orange Bowl.

Manalac, who was honored with Cincinnati's prestigious C-Club Strothman Award for academic and athletic excellence, went on to sign with the Buffalo Bills.

A native of Pickerington, Ohio, Manalac and his wife, Carly, have two children: daughter Bailey and son Lewis. He earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from Cincinnati (2008) and additionally owns a master's degree in kinesiology from Michigan State (2012).

Brennan Marion, considered one of college football's top young assistants, was named Pitt's new wide receivers coach by Pat Narduzzi in February. A graduate of nearby Greensburg Salem High School, Marion returns to his native Western Pennsylvania after spending the 2020 season as wide receivers coach at Hawaii.

Marion has coached three different positions on the offensive side of the ball and owns three years of coordinator experience.

At Hawaii, Marion oversaw the development of All-Mountain West receiver Calvin Turner, who was named the 2020 New Mexico Bowl's Most Outstanding Offensive Player after compiling 252 all-purpose yards and scoring two TDs in a 28-14 win over Houston.

In 2019, Marion was offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at William & Mary, where he dramatically improved the Tribe's production in every major statistical category. W&M nearly doubled its scoring average while its total offensive output improved by almost 100 yards per contest. The Tribe's improvement was even more impressive considering Marion's starting quarterback, leading receiver and three of his top four rushers were true freshmen. QB Hollis Mathis, a product of Penn Hills, shattered W&M's true freshman school records for total offense (1,522), passing yards (976) and rushing touchdowns (eight). Receiver Kane Everson became a Phil Steele Freshman All-American.

Marion's first Division I coaching appointment came at Howard University, where he enjoyed two exceptional seasons (2017-18) as the Bison's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Howard boasted a highly potent offense in 2018, ranking fourth nationally in yards per completion (17.27 avg.), 15th in total yards (470.8 avg.), 16th in passing offense (278.0 avg.) and 21st in scoring offense (33.6 avg.). The Bison led the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) in each of those categories.

The Bison had seven first-team All-MEAC performers on offense, including the league's 2018 Offensive Player of the Year (quarterback Caylin Newton) and Rookie of the Year (running back Dedrick Parson). Wide receiver Jequez Ezzard was named a BOXTOROW All-American after leading the country in yards per catch (26.3).

Marion's "Go-Go" offense sparked Howard to a 7-4 record in 2017, including a shocking 43-40 win at heavily favored UNLV in the opener (labeled as "the biggest upset in modern college football history"). The Bison had won just three games over the prior two years.

In 2016, Marion coached the running backs at Oklahoma Baptist University. Under his guidance, Isaiah Mallory rushed for a school-record 1,083 yards en route to first team All-National Christian College Athletic Association (NCCAA) honors. During the 2015 season, Marion was an offensive quality control assistant at Arizona State.

Marion has earned prestigious invitations to the NFL Quarterback Coaching Summit and American Football Coaches Association's (AFCA) 35 Under 35 Leadership Institute.

Prior to joining the collegiate ranks, Marion orchestrated two impressive turnarounds as a high school head coach. In 2014, he led Pennsylvania's Waynesboro Area—which went 0-10 the year before—to the Mid-Penn Colonial Division title and its first winning season in 22 years. In 2013, Marion guided St. Patrick-St. Vincent (Calif.) to the North Coast Section Division IV playoffs following a 1-9 season prior to his arrival.

Marion was a record-setting receiver at Tulsa. In two seasons with the Golden Hurricane (2007-08), he compiled 2,356 yards on 82 receptions with 19 touchdowns. He was a two-time All-Conference USA selection and the 2007 C-USA Newcomer of the Year. Marion set NCAA records for yards per catch in a season (31.9 in 2007) and career (28.7).

Following his accomplished collegiate playing career, Marion signed free agent contracts with the Miami Dolphins as well as the Canadian Football League's Montreal Alouettes.

Marion was a four-year letterman in three different sports (football, basketball and track) at Greensburg Salem. He played receiver and defensive back under Golden Lions head coach George Kermer and was an All-Keystone Conference honoree.

Marion is a 2009 graduate of Tulsa with a bachelor's degree in organizational studies. He has two children, Mariah and Brennan.



TIM SALEM

TIGHT ENDS

Having spent more than three decades in collegiate coaching, Tim Salem boasts experience that is both extensive and diverse. Salem has served as offensive coordinator at four different schools and coached four different positions on that side of the ball.

Entering his seventh season as Pitt's tight ends coach, Salem's broad perspective is a great asset on the field and in recruiting.

Under Salem's watch, Scott Orndoff enjoyed one of the most productive seasons ever by a Pitt tight end in 2016, compiling 35 catches for 579 yards (16.5 avg.) and five touchdowns. Orndoff played in the East-West Shrine Game and signed with the Cincinnati Bengals.

Salem also tutored tight end J.P. Holtz, who posted career production as a senior en route to 2015 All-ACC honors. Holtz has spent the past five seasons in the NFL, playing the last two with the Chicago Bears.

Additionally, Matt Flanagan was an NFL signee of Washington and the Jacksonville Jaguars, while Nakia Griffin-Stewart is currently with the New York Giants.

Prior to Pitt, Salem spent three seasons at Illinois (2012-14) as special teams coordinator. He also coached the running backs in 2012 and 2013. Salem's units helped Illinois earn an invitation to the 2014 Heart of Dallas Bowl. Punter Justin DuVernois was a 2014 All-Big Ten honoree after averaging 44.0 yards per punt to rank second in the conference.

In 2013, V'Angelo Bentley led the Big Ten and ranked seventh nationally in punt returns with a 15.8-yard average. Bentley also became the first player in Illinois history to score touchdowns on both punt and kickoff returns in the same season.

At UCF from 2004-11, Salem coached some of the most productive and decorated players in school history. In 2007, running back Kevin Smith was a consensus All-American after leading the nation in rushing yards (2,567) and rushing touchdowns (29). Smith's rushing total that season remains the third highest in FBS history, trailing only Oklahoma State's Barry Sanders (2,628 in 1988) and Wisconsin's Melvin Gordon (2,587 in 2014).

With Salem at the controls of the offense in 2007, UCF claimed its first Conference USA championship. The Knights won 10 games, setting school records for points (502), touchdowns (62) and rushing yards (3,287) in the process.

Overseeing UCF's special teams, Salem mentored three of the country's most explosive kick returners. Rannell Hall (2011), Quincy McDuffie (2010) and Joe Burnett (2008) were all first-team All-Conference USA return men and ranked in the nation's top 10 in kickoff return average. McDuffie, in fact, was second nationally with a 32.2-yard average in 2010.

In 2003, Salem was the offensive coordinator, quarterbacks coach and kicking coach at Eastern Michigan, where he worked with placekicker Andrew Wellock, a Lou Groza Award finalist.

From 1997-2000, Salem was the quarterbacks coach at Ohio State. He added the Buckeyes' wide receivers to his positional responsibilities in 2000. In 1998, Joe Germaine was the Big Ten Player of the Year, throwing for 3,330 yards and 25 touchdowns in leading the Buckeyes to an 11-1 record and No. 2 final ranking.

From 1991-96, Salem worked at Purdue where he initially served as quarterbacks coach and then, in his final three years, offensive coordinator. The Boilermakers led the Big Ten in rushing in 1995.

Salem's other coaching stops include Colorado State (1989-90) and Phoenix College (1987-88). A 1985 graduate of Arizona State, he began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater for two seasons. Salem began his collegiate playing career at Minnesota, where he broke the Big Ten record for consecutive pass completions in 1980, before transferring to Arizona State for the 1983-84 seasons.

Salem comes from a family of coaches. His father, Joe, was head coach at South Dakota (1966-74), Northern Arizona (1975-78) and Minnesota (1979-83). Tim's brother, Brad Salem, is a longtime college coach, most recently serving as offensive coordinator at Michigan State. His grandfather, Nusier Salem, was an accomplished high school coach and South Dakota Sports Hall of Fame inductee.

Salem and his wife, Wendy, have two sons, Taylor and Landan, and a daughter, Kylan. Landan is director of football recruiting operations at the University of Memphis.

Cory Sanders, who arrived at Pitt in 2018 owning both head coach and defensive coordinator experience, enters his fourth season overseeing the Panthers' safeties.

Under Sanders' watch, Damar Hamlin was an All-ACC performer in 2020 after leading the Panthers in tackles (67) and pass breakups (seven). Hamlin played in the prestigious Senior Bowl, distinguishing himself with a highlight-reel interception, and was selected by the Buffalo Bills in the 2021 NFL Draft.

As a team in 2020, Pitt led the ACC and ranked ninth in the country with 14 interceptions. Sanders' safeties were responsible for eight of those picks.

In 2019, safety Paris Ford garnered first-team All-ACC and third-team Phil Steele All-America accolades. Ford signed a free-agent contract with the Los Angeles Rams.

As the defensive backs coach at Western Michigan in 2017, Sanders oversaw the development of two All-Mid-American Conference (MAC) cornerbacks, Darius Phillips and Sam Beal. Phillips, who played in the Senior Bowl, is now a member of the Cincinnati Bengals, while Beal plays for the New York Giants.

Prior to WMU, Sanders was part of shaping an NCAA Division II program at the University of West Florida, which played its inaugural season in 2016. He was named the program's first defensive coordinator in December 2014 and was instrumental in building a foundation for the Argonauts' opening campaign 18 months later.

UWF went 5-6 in 2016, the most victories for a first-year Division II program in a decade. Sanders' aggressive defense ranked 11th nationally in quarterback sacks (3.6 sacks per game) and 26th in tackles for loss (8.2 TFLs per game), while Argonauts safety Trent Archie was named the Gulf South Conference Defensive Freshman of the Year.

Prior to West Florida, Sanders spent five seasons (2010-14) on the football staff at Division II Saint Joseph's (Ind.) College, his alma mater. The team's defensive coordinator his initial year, Sanders was promoted to head coach for the 2011 season and rebuilt the Pumas into a contender in the Great Lakes Valley Conference (GLVC).

The team achieved runner-up finishes in the GLVC in each of his final two seasons, while featuring a nationally ranked defense. The Pumas also set a school record for single-season total offense (4,594 yards) during his tenure and produced 36 All-GLVC performers.

Sanders initial coaching appointments came at North Central College (2007) and Elmhurst College (2008-09). He coached the defensive backs at both Illinois institutions.

Sanders himself was an outstanding collegiate defensive back. He was a four-time all-conference honoree at Saint Joseph's and elected a Pumas team captain three times. Sanders was an instrumental performer for two conference championship teams and finished his career fifth in school history with 30.5 TFLs.

Sanders is a 2007 graduate of Saint Joseph's with a bachelor's degree in business administration. He is engaged to Jessica Rose.

A native of Youngstown, Ohio, Stacchiotti joined Pitt from the National Football League, where he was the assistant strength and conditioning coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

As part of the Buccaneers staff in 2019, Stacchiotti helped oversee the physical development of three Pro Bowlers: outside linebacker Shaq Barrett (who led the NFL with 19.5 sacks) and wide receivers Mike Evans and Chris Godwin. Additionally, Bucs starting safety Jordan Whitehead, a former Pitt standout, was a beneficiary of Stacchiotti’s training.

Prior to Tampa Bay, Stacchiotti served on the football strength and conditioning staffs at Mississippi State (2018), Cincinnati (2017) and Colorado State (2015-16). His initial collegiate appointment was as a strength and conditioning intern at Mississippi State in 2015.

Stacchiotti additionally worked as a strength coach in the Ohio prep ranks at Girard High School and Ursuline High School, Narduzzi’s alma mater.

LaSala is an important member of Pitt's sport administration team, providing valuable insight and direction that impacts each of the Panthers' athletic programs. He additionally was a key author of *The Strategic Plan for Pitt Athletics*.

LaSala is one of the athletic department's longest tenured staff members, joining the Panthers in 1997 as director of football operations. He was named an assistant athletic director in 2000, serving in that capacity until his promotion to associate athletic director in 2016.

LaSala has handled a wide variety of responsibilities with the Pitt football program over the years, including team travel accommodations, youth summer camps, coaching clinics and preseason training camp arrangements as well as daily administration. He also serves as the football program's liaison to numerous campus offices and within the athletic department.

One of LaSala's most impactful contributions at Pitt is his daily work with student-athletes in preparing them for life after college. His efforts have made the football program one of Pitt's most active and enthusiastic teams when it comes to community service. In fact, the football team is annually lauded for logging the most community service hours in the Pitt Athletic Department.

LaSala has been an instrumental figure in the dramatic upgrades within Pitt's practice facility during the past five years. Those enhancements include a new team meeting room, locker room, athletic training room, players lounge and staff conference room. He has also been a creative influence in the various graphic displays that showcase the Panthers' rich football history.

LaSala has been a primary planner for Pitt's trips to 17 bowl games, including the Quick Lane Bowl (2019), Sun Bowl (2018 and 2008), Pinstripe Bowl (2016), Military Bowl (2015), Little Caesars Pizza Bowl (2013), BBVA Compass Bowl (2010-12), Meineke Car Care Bowl (2009), Fiesta Bowl (2004), Continental Tire Bowl (2003), Insight Bowl (2002 and 2000), Tangerine Bowl (2001) and Liberty Bowl (1997).

LaSala was a member of the Beaver County Sports Hall of Fame 2014 induction class. He was highly integral in this regard for Pitt's trip to the 2019 Quick Lane Bowl, a 34-30 win over Eastern Michigan.

Ford arrived in Pittsburgh with extensive operations experience and familiarity with the Atlantic Coast Conference. Prior to his appointment with the Panthers, he served on the football staff at Wake Forest for four years (2015-18).

During the 2018 season, Ford was the Demon Deacons' associate director of football operations. His initial three years, he was an operations and video assistant.

During Ford's tenure in Winston-Salem, the Deacs won three consecutive bowl games, including a 37-34 victory over Memphis in the 2018 Birmingham Bowl.

Prior to Wake Forest, Ford was an operations and video assistant at Rutgers during the 2013 and 2014 seasons. He was also a four-year student assistant with the Scarlet Knights, working in the video and recruiting offices as an undergraduate.

Ford graduated from Rutgers in 2013 with a bachelor's degree in communications. He earned a master's degree in liberal studies from Wake Forest in 2018.

A native of Piscataway, N.J., Ford attended Piscataway High School and was a football letterman for the Chiefs.



BOB JUNKO

DIRECTOR OF PLAYER DEVELOPMENT / HIGH SCHOOL RELATIONS

Widely known and respected throughout the tri-state area, Bob Junko has spent nearly 30 years representing the Pitt football program in many important capacities on and off the field.

After 38 years in the coaching ranks, Junko moved to the administrative side of college football in 2007. Serving as Pitt's director of player development and high school relations since 2013, Junko's tremendous football acumen and contacts are invaluable for the Panthers.

A past honoree on the Rivals Top 25 Recruiters list, Junko is especially instrumental with Pitt's annual recruiting efforts and alumni outreach programs.

The 2021 season marks the 25th of Junko's second tour with the Panthers. He initially coached at Pitt from 1982-85, serving as defensive coordinator under head coach Foge Fazio. Junko returned in 1997 as defensive tackles coach under Walt Harris and also served the program as assistant head coach.

In his first stint with the Panthers, the 1982 team received a Cotton Bowl bid and finished ninth in the country. The 1983 Panthers earned a Fiesta Bowl berth and ranked 19th in the final polls.

Among the standouts on those defenses were tackle Bill Maas, defensive end Chris Doleman and defensive backs Tim Lewis and Tom Flynn, all of whom went on to careers in the NFL. Doleman was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2012.

Junko's Pitt tenure has been accomplished as well as lengthy. In total, he has been part of 19 bowl teams and worked with 15 first team All-Americans.

Prior to returning to Pittsburgh, Junko was the defensive coordinator at Kent State from 1995-96. Junko also served as the associate head coach and defensive coordinator for seven years at Akron (1988-94). He held similar positions at Northwestern, TCU and Tulsa, his alma mater.

As a collegian, Junko starred at Tulsa as an inside linebacker and was an Honorable Mention All-American in 1967. He was named to the All-Missouri Valley Conference team twice and served as Tulsa's captain.

Junko earned a bachelor's degree in history education in 1968 and his master's in educational administration in 1970 at Tulsa. He has been inducted into the University of Tulsa Sports Hall of Fame, Trinity High School Athletic Hall of Fame and the Washington-Greene County Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame.

In 2015, Junko was named an Honorary Letterwinner by the Pitt Varsity Letter Club.

Hanks and his wife, Tracy, have two daughters, Clare and Aerin.

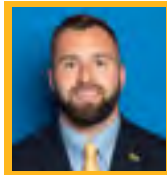

RATING SYSTEMS

To settle countless arguments, *Sports Illustrated* in 1967 researched the first and only complete and wholly accurate list ever compiled of college football's mythical national champions. Every recognized authority that ever presumed to name a No. 1 was included:

Associated Press (1936-current): poll of sportswriters and broadcasters.

Parke H. Davis Ratings (1889-1935): chosen by Davis, a player at Princeton in 1889 and a former coach at Wisconsin, Amherst and Lafayette, and first published in the 1934 *Spalding's Football Guide*.

Dickinson System (1924-40): chosen by University of Illinois economics professor Frank G. Dickinson; based on system that awarded various point totals for wins over teams with winning or non-winning records.

Dunkel System (1929-current): a power index rating system devised by Dick Dunkel and syndicated to newspapers around the nation.

Football Writers Association of America (1954-current): chosen by a panel representing membership.

Helms First Interstate Bank Athletic Foundation (1889-1982): originally founded in 1936 as Helms Athletic Foundation and changed in the early 1970s to Citizens Savings Athletic Foundation before the most recent name was adopted in 1981.

Illustrated Football Annual (1924-41): an "azzi ratem" system published in this highly regarded magazine by William F. Boand.

Litkenhous System (1934-1984): a "difference-by-score" method syndicated by Fred Litkenhouse and his brother Edward.

National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame (1959-1995): chosen annually by committee representing membership.

The Football Thesaurus (1927-58): system devised by Duke Houlgate and published in book of same title.

United Press International (1950-1995): poll of 35 college coaches. (Became the *USA TODAY* coaches poll.)

Williamson System (1932-63): system of syndicated power ratings chosen by Paul Williamson, a geologist and member of the Sugar Bowl committee.

The Bowl Championship Series (BCS) (1998-2013): Determined a national champion by matching the country's two top-rated teams in the BCS Standings against each other in a title game.

College Football Playoff: For the eighth consecutive season, the Football Bowl Subdivision will utilize a four-team playoff format to determine the national champion. A selection committee will choose the four playoff teams based on their performance during the regular season, including strength of schedule, head-to-head results, championships won and other factors. The teams will be seeded so that #1 will play #4 in one semifinal and #2 will meet #3 in the other. This year's semifinal games will be played at the Cotton Bowl and Orange Bowl on December 31, 2021. The College Football Playoff National Championship will be played on January 10, 2022, at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis.

While Dorsett is Pitt's lone winner of the Heisman, the Panthers have had eight total players finish in the top five in the final balloting. Pitt players have also finished in the top 10 of the Heisman voting 14 times.

PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

JIMBO COVERT became Pitt's ninth Pro Football Hall of Fame inductee when he was called to Canton as part of the special 20-member Centennial Class of 2020 commemorating the NFL's 100th season. The sixth-overall pick in the 1983 draft by the Chicago Bears, Covert quickly established himself as one of the league's top offensive tackles, earning consensus All-Rookie recognition. He spearheaded a Bears' attack that led the NFL in rushing yards in four consecutive seasons (1983-86), with running back Walter Payton calling Covert, "the best offensive tackle in the NFL." He was a vital part of Chicago's famed 1985 team that went 15-1 and demolished New England in Super Bowl XX, 46-10. A four-time All-Pro, Covert played eight decorated seasons in Chicago and was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1980s.

The fourth-overall pick of the 1985 draft by the Minnesota Vikings, **CHRIS DOLEMAN** played 15 seasons in the NFL and holds status as one of the most productive pass rushers of all time. A defensive end and outside linebacker, Doleman was an eight-time Pro Bowler, earning six berths as a member of the Vikings and one each as a member of the Atlanta Falcons and San Francisco 49ers. He was a first team All-Pro three times and was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1990s. Upon his retirement in 1999, Doleman's 150.5 career sacks ranked fourth in league history. He received his enshrinement in 2012.

MIKE DITKA became the first tight end elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame when he received enshrinement in 1988. Chicago's No. 1 draft pick in 1961, Ditka would play 12 professional seasons, including six with the Bears (1961-66), two with the Philadelphia Eagles (1967-68) and four with the Dallas Cowboys (1969-72). The 1961 NFL Rookie of the Year, he earned All-NFL in each of his first four seasons and was a Pro Bowler his first five years. He was part of Chicago's 1963 NFL title team and the Cowboys' 1971 squad that won Super Bowl VI. Ditka then spent 11 seasons as Chicago's head coach (winning Super Bowl XX) and spent three seasons as head coach of the New Orleans Saints.

When **TONY DORSETT** retired from the NFL after 12 seasons (1977-88), he was the league's second all-time leading rusher with 12,739 yards. He became the first player to win the Heisman Trophy, a collegiate national championship and a Super Bowl, and receive Hall of Fame enshrinement on both the college and pro levels. Taken by the Dallas Cowboys with the second overall pick in 1977, Dorsett topped 1,000 rushing yards in eight of his first nine seasons — the lone exception being the strike-shortened 1982 campaign which, ironically, saw him earn the NFC rushing title. He played in two Super Bowls (helping Dallas to victory in Super Bowl XII) and four Pro Bowls. Dorsett received his "Canton Call" in 1994.

A third-round draft choice of Washington in 1981, **RUSS GRIMM** went on to start 11 seasons at guard for the Redskins (1981-91). Grimm was an original member of Washington's famed "Hogs" offensive line, which included another Pitt great, Mark May. The dominating offensive front helped lead the Redskins to four Super Bowl appearances, including victories in Super Bowls XVII, XXII and XXVI. It was following Washington's victory in Super Bowl XXVI that Grimm announced his retirement. He was voted to four Pro Bowls (1983-86) and was named to the 1980s All-Decade Team. Grimm received his induction in 2010.

A 1981 second-round draft pick by New Orleans, **RICKEY JACKSON** spent 15 seasons in the NFL (1981-95) as one of the most disruptive defenders in the game. Upon his retirement, he ranked third all-time in sacks (128), second in fumble recoveries (28) and fourth in forced fumbles (41). Jackson made six trips to the Pro Bowl and was first team All-Pro four times. He helped elevate the Saints from doormat to contender as the franchise never finished below .500 during Jackson's final seven years in New Orleans. His final two seasons were played in San Francisco as he helped the 49ers to a 49-26 victory over San Diego in Super Bowl XXIX. Jackson was a member of the 2010 Pro Football Hall of Fame class.

When he finished his legendary 17-year career with the Miami Dolphins, **DAN MARINO** was by far the most prolific passer in NFL history. Upon his 1999 retirement, Marino held an incredible 25 NFL regular-season records and was the career leader in passing attempts (8,358), completions (4,967), yardage (61,361) and touchdowns (420). The Dolphins' first-round pick in 1983, Marino earned NFL Rookie of the Year. In 1984, he became the first 5,000-yard passer in league history; he tallied 13 3,000-yard passing seasons in total. Marino also was one of the NFL's winningest quarterbacks, earning 147 regular-season victories. A nine-time Pro Bowler and eight-time All-Pro, Marino was enshrined in Canton in 2005.

A third-round draft selection of New England in 1995, **CURTIS MARTIN** spent three years with the Patriots (1995-97) before joining the New York Jets (1998-2006). At the time of his retirement, he ranked fourth all-time among NFL rushers with an astonishing 14,101 yards. Martin became only the second player in NFL history to begin his career with 10 consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons. In 2004, he was the NFL rushing champion with 1,697 yards. Martin was named a Pro Bowler five times and All-Pro three times. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2012.

JOE SCHMIDT became the gold standard for NFL middle linebackers during his 13-year career (1953-65) with the Detroit Lions. A seventh-round draft pick, Schmidt earned All-Pro 10 times, played in 10 Pro Bowl games (tied for the most all-time by a Lions player) and was named to the 1950s All-Decade Team. His teammates voted him Detroit's MVP four times. He served as team captain for nine seasons and totaled 24 career interceptions. The Lions won two NFL titles during Schmidt's career. He later coached the team for six seasons, leading Detroit to its only playoff appearance of the 1970s. Schmidt was inducted in 1973.

LARRY FITZGERALD

WIDE RECEIVER | 2002-03

- Named the 2003 Walter Camp Player of the Year, becoming the first sophomore to earn that prestigious honor, and also won the Bletnikoff Award as the country's top receiver. Was a unanimous first-team All-American, becoming the first Pitt sophomore to be selected unanimously.
- Was the 2003 Heisman Trophy runner-up, finishing behind Oklahoma quarterback Jason White by just 128 points. Fitzgerald carried three voting regions, an unprecedented achievement for a sophomore. It was the highest Heisman finish by a wide receiver since Michigan's Desmond Howard won the award in 1991.
- Compiled 92 catches for 1,672 yards (18.2 avg.) and 22 touchdowns in 2003, leading the nation in receiving yards per game (128.62 avg.) and TD catches.
- In just 26 collegiate games, Fitzgerald totaled 161 catches for 2,677 yards (16.6 avg.) and a Pitt-record 34 touchdowns.
- His freshman season he had 69 catches for 1,005 yards (14.6 avg.) and 12 TDs. Fitzgerald was the first player in Pitt history to compile multiple 1,000-yard receiving seasons.
- Caught a touchdown in 18 consecutive games to set an NCAA record. In total, he set or tied four NCAA marks, eight Big East records and 11 Pitt marks.
- Was the third overall pick in the 2004 NFL Draft, going to the Arizona Cardinals, and has been selected to 11 Pro Bowls.
- Ranks second in NFL history in receiving yards (17,492) and receptions (1,432) and sixth in TD catches (121). Owns an active streak of 256 consecutive games with a catch, second all-time behind Jerry Rice (274).

DAN MARINO

QUARTERBACK | 1979-82

- While at Pitt from 1979-82, broke nearly every major passing record in school history, including career marks for passing yards (8,597) and completions (693).
- Thirty-nine years after his final collegiate season, still holds Pitt records for touchdown passes in a career (79) and season (37).
- Led Pitt to four consecutive Top 10 finishes, including a pair of No. 2 rankings.
- Enhanced his reputation for delivering in the clutch in the 1982 Sugar Bowl, when he threw a 33-yard touchdown pass to tight end John Brown with 35 seconds left to give Pitt a come-from-behind 24-20 victory over Georgia.
- Named a 1981 All-American and finished fourth in the Heisman Trophy balloting that year.
- A first-round draft pick of the Miami Dolphins in 1983, Marino went on to gain recognition as one of the greatest quarterbacks in NFL history with a record-breaking 17-year career.
- He retired following the 1999 season as the league's all-time leader in passing attempts (8,358), completions (4,967), yardage (61,361) and touchdowns (420).
- Was elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2002 and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2005.

TONY DORSETT

RUNNING BACK | 1973-76

- Winner of the 1976 Heisman Trophy, Maxwell Award and Walter Camp Award.
- Was selected an All-American in each of his four seasons (1973-76).
- First player in NCAA history to reach 6,000 career rushing yards. Including bowl games, rushed for 6,526 yards.
- His NCAA-recognized total (not including bowls) of 6,082 yards stood as the Division I record for 22 years (1976-98).
- Gained 100 or more yards 36 times, including 20 consecutive games.
- Remains Pitt's all-time leading scorer with 380 points.
- Holds Notre Dame opponent records for rushing yards against the Irish in a career (754) and game (303).
- Led Pitt to the 1976 national championship with a 12-0 record.
- In 1977, was the first-round pick of the Dallas Cowboys where he played 11 seasons (1977-87), including two Super Bowls and four Pro Bowls.
- Played his final year with the Denver Broncos (1988) and finished his career as the second all-time leading rusher in NFL history (12,739).
- Was elected into the College Football Hall of Fame and Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1994.

MARSHALL GOLDBERG

RUNNING BACK | 1936-38

- Earned back-to-back All-America honors as a halfback (1937) and fullback (1938).
- Member of the famed "Dream Backfield" at Pitt, considered one of college football's greatest back tandems ever.
- Was the runner-up for the Heisman Trophy in 1938 and placed third in the Heisman balloting in 1937.
- Led Pitt to national championships in 1936 and 1937 with a combined 17-1-2 record.
- Spent seven years in the NFL playing halfback for the Chicago Cardinals (1939-42, 1946-48).
- Member of the Cardinals' 1947 NFL championship team and had his No. 99 jersey retired by the franchise.
- Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1958.

JOE SCHMIDT

LINEBACKER | 1950-52

- Earned All-America honors as a senior linebacker in 1952.
- As both a collegian and professional, Schmidt was considered the era's prototype for linebacker play – instinctive, aggressive and smart.
- Played in 10 Pro Bowls during his 13-year career (1953-65) with the Detroit Lions, which included two NFL championships.
- Served as the Lions' head coach from 1967-72, leading Detroit to its only playoff appearance in the 1970s.
- Elected into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1973 and College Football Hall of Fame in 2000.

MARK MAY

OFFENSIVE TACKLE | 1977-80

- In 1980 was named a unanimous All-American and Pitt's first winner of the prestigious Outland Trophy.
- Did not give up a sack his final two collegiate seasons.
- Was Pitt's "go-to" player on third-and-short situations, earning him the nickname "May Day."
- Helped lead Pitt to a four-year record of 39-8-1, including four bowl games and three Top 10 finishes.
- Was selected by the Washington Redskins in the first round of the 1981 NFL Draft and was a standout member of the team's "Hogs" offensive line from 1981-90. Helped the Redskins to three Super Bowls (1982, 1983 and 1987), including world championships in '82 and '87. Finished his pro career with the San Diego Chargers (1991) and Arizona Cardinals (1992-93).
- Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2005.

JIMBO COVERT

OFFENSIVE TACKLE | 1978-82

- A fixture on Pitt's punishing offensive front from 1980-82, surrendering just three sacks during that span. As a senior, he did not give up a single sack.
- Was a two-time first team All-American, earning consensus status as a senior.
- Pitt went 31-5 during Covert's three years as a starting offensive tackle, finishing in the nation's Top 10 each season. The 1980 and 1981 teams each went 11-1 and finished as high as No. 2 in the national polls.
- Was chosen in the first round of the 1983 NFL Draft (sixth overall) by the Chicago Bears and was a consensus All-Rookie pick. He played eight seasons in Chicago (1983-90), earning All-Pro honors four times, two first-team All-NFL selections, two Pro Bowl invitations and was twice named the NFL Offensive Lineman of the Year (1985 and 1986).
- With Covert as a spearhead, the Bears led the NFL in rushing four consecutive years (1983-86). He was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1980s.
- Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2003 and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2020.

BILL FRALIC

OFFENSIVE TACKLE | 1981-84

- A three-time first team All-American, including unanimous status as a junior and senior.
- Became the first offensive lineman to twice finish in the top 10 of the Heisman Trophy balloting, placing sixth in 1984 and eighth in 1983.
- His collegiate career led to the creation of the "Pancake," a statistical barometer for each time Fralic put an opposing defensive lineman on his back.
- The second player taken overall in the 1985 NFL Draft, Fralic went on to an exceptional pro career from 1985-93, playing eight years with the Atlanta Falcons and his final season with the Detroit Lions. He was selected to the Pro Bowl four times and was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1980s.
- Was elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1998.

MIKE DITKA

END | 1958-60

- Was a unanimous All-American selection at end in 1960.
- Led Pitt in receiving three consecutive years and was also a standout defender and punter. He additionally played baseball and basketball at Pitt and was the intramural wrestling champion.
- In 1961, he was a first-round draft choice of the Chicago Bears and was a member of their 1963 NFL Championship team. He was also a member of the Dallas Cowboys when they won Super Bowl VI and earned All-Pro four times.
- Spent 11 seasons as the head coach of the Chicago Bears, leading them to victory in Super Bowl XX, and later coached the New Orleans Saints.
- Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1986 and Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1988.

Pitt's first bowl trip resembled a politician's whistle-stop tour — wherever Pitt was at luncheon during its trek west — it practiced. The routine was simple: deboard the train around 11:15; explore the day's town until noon; lunch at 12; walk lunch off, then practice; reboard the train. So it was that Pitt practiced in Dodge City, Albuquerque and Winslow, Arizona, on the way to Pasadena. The game had a sentimental storyline: the coach against his mentor. Panther Head Coach John B. "Jock" Sutherland had played for Stanford Coach Glenn "Pop" Warner when the latter was at Pitt. Amidst all that, the game, although close, was controlled by Stanford. Pitt grabbed a 6-0 third-quarter lead when Jimmy Hagan scooped up a Cardinal fumble and ran 20 yards for a touchdown. The extra point was missed. Stanford, which made several marches deep into Pitt territory, finally scored on an unusual play. On fourth-and-goal at the two, Stanford quarterback Biff Hoffman completed a pass to Bob Sims, but it was short of the goal line. Sims was hit and fumbled, but Frank Wilton picked up the loose ball and carried it in to tie the game. Hoffman's extra point won it, 7-6. Pitt, a slight favorite entering the game, mustered very little offense in its first of four Rose Bowl games.

If vintage football films give you the impression that the game of the 20s and 30s was run, run, and run again, think again. USC's Trojans bombed Pitt with an all-out passing attack. The game started on a bright note for "Jock" Sutherland's team when Toby Uansu rushed 68 yards on Pitt's first play. Pitt failed to score, then the walls caved in. Gaius Shaver connected with Henry Edelson for a 55-yard touchdown. Later in the quarter, Shaver hit Ernest Pinckert for a 28-yard score, capitalizing on a Pitt fumble. Another fumble led to USC's third touchdown, a short run which opened the score to 19-0. Two Jesses set up the Trojans' next score when Jesse Mortensen and Jesse Hill teamed for a 51-yard pass play. Russell Saunders helped convert a USC interception into a 33-0 lead with his 13-yard scoring run. Pitt finally broke through in the third quarter when Uansu threw a 28-yard pass to William Wallinichus. Southern Cal sandwiched two more long touchdown passes (38 and 62 yards) around a Tom Parkinson-to-Paul Collins 36-yard TD pass for Pitt to arrive at the final score. In all, the Trojans scored the most points against Pitt since 1903. It would be Sutherland's second-worst margin of defeat in his 15 seasons at Pitt; the worst would come three years later, also against USC in the Rose Bowl.

John B. "Jock" Sutherland tried a new play after two Rose Bowl losses, taking his team to Tucson to practice for a win. Instead, Sutherland suffered the worst loss in his Pitt career. It was the first time since 1928 that the Panthers were shut out in a defeat. With 83,000 in attendance, Pitt stayed close until the fourth quarter before collapsing. USC's Homer Griffith threw, and later caught, a touchdown pass as the Trojans built a 14-0 lead through three quarters. After Irvine Warburton scored to make the score 21-0, Pitt fumbled the kickoff, and Warburton scored again shortly thereafter. A blocked punt set up the final touchdown. Several Panthers were singled out by the crowd with standing ovations: Ted Dailey, Joe Skladany, Charles Hartwig and Warren Heller, who rushed for 63 yards in the final game of his brilliant Pitt career.

"Jock" Sutherland was intent on winning the Rose Bowl in his fourth try. To that end, Pitt spent two weeks working out on the west coast, for Sutherland was not going to accept 0-4 in Rose Bowl play. His tactics worked, and captain Bobby LaRue led Pitt to a 21-0 victory. LaRue's running set up the first touchdown of the game, which, fittingly, he scored. LaRue's 50-yard run in the third quarter, which would have gone 75 yards for the touchdown if not for a diving tackle, set up Frank Patrick's touchdown. Pitt led, 14-0, after three quarters. The defense added a late touchdown, returning an interception. So elated was Sutherland that he substituted every player who made the trip, so each could forever relate the experience of playing in a Rose Bowl victory. After four tries, the coach had finally overcome one of the few obstacles in his remarkable career.

SUGAR BOWL • JAN. 2, 1956

New Orleans, La., Tulane Stadium

Pitt's Ray DiPasquale intercepted a pass to squelch a fourth quarter threat by Tech. In the final moments, Pitt made a furious attempt to tie the game. The Panthers were on Tech's 5-yard line when time ran out.

Tech converted an early interception into a 7-0 lead. Pitt was stopped on a goal-line stand at the start of the second quarter, and Tech increased its lead with a halfback-option TD pass. Pitt quarterback Corny Salvatera hit Dick Bowen with a 36-yard TD pass before the half, and Pitt trailed, 14-7. Bowen's fumble on the second-half kickoff set up the clinching touchdown. Pitt pulled to within seven on Salvatera's sneak, but could draw no closer.

Pitt struck first, with Dorsett scoring two plays after Tom Perko recovered Arizona State quarterback Danny White's fumble on the first play of the game. But the Sun Devils, playing on their own field, proved too tough. Woody Green scored four plays after Dorsett's touchdown to tie the game. Arizona State scored three touchdowns in 6:04 of the fourth quarter, and although Pitt blocked all three extra points, the game ended one-sided after being tied at halftime. Dorsett rushed for 100 yards, but Pitt turned the ball over seven times. Both quarterbacks, White and Pitt's Billy Daniels, threw three interceptions.

SUN BOWL • DEC. 26, 1975

A player rushing for 100 yards is impressive. Two players on the same team is remarkable. Three is unheard of, but that is how Pitt beat Kansas. Elliott Walker (11 carries for 123 yards, 11.2 average) got the ball rolling with a 60-yard touchdown run in the first quarter. Tony Dorsett (27-142) scored two touchdowns in the second quarter. Pitt had nearly 300 rushing yards at the intermission. Quarterback Robert Haygood ran the veer offense to perfection, rushing for 101 yards (14 carries) when he wasn't busy pitching out to Dorsett. Haygood also connected with Gordon Jones for a touchdown after Walker scored his second of the game. Jones set up his own touchdown with a 63-yard kickoff return. With eight wins, Pitt had its best season since 1963. Dorsett rushed for 1,686 yards on the season, matching his 1973 total.

The many remarkable accomplishments that Tony Dorsett achieved in his four years at Pitt were punctuated by his role in this win, one that gave Pitt its first national championship in 39 years. Dorsett, quarterback Matt Cavanaugh and a marauding defense just would not be denied. Cavanaugh, named the game's MVP, scored from six yards out to give Pitt a 7-0 lead. The celebration of that touchdown became an iconic *Sports Illustrated* cover that can be seen at several sites around Pitt's campus. The photo headline simply read: "PITT IS IT!" Gordon Jones turned a short pass into a 59-yard touchdown excursion in the second quarter. Dorsett's 10-yard TD late in the half cemented the win. He was far from through, however. After gaining 65 yards in the first half, the Heisman Trophy winner exploded in the second to finish with a Sugar Bowl-record 202 yards rushing, including 67 on one run that set up one of Carson Long's two second-half field goals. The defense created six turnovers and limited the Bulldogs to 181 yards. Pitt defenders actually caught more Georgia passes than did Georgia receivers (four interceptions, compared to three completions in 22 attempts). Vince Dooley, Georgia's head coach, said this about the 12-0 Panthers: "They proved today they are the best in the country. They have amazing balance; they are the best defensive team we've seen. I think that is obvious. They are also the best offensive team we've faced." Pitt coach Johnny Majors, who completed his four-year stint at Pitt with a 33-13-1 record (after a combined 13-29 mark in the previous four years) was named Coach of the Year for the second time at Pitt.

Three scoring tosses went to fullback Elliott Walker, who joined Tony Dorsett as the second Pitt back ever to rush for 1,000 yards in a season. Gordon Jones scored the other TD on one of his 10 receptions for 163 yards. Cavanaugh threw for 211 yards and two touchdowns in the first half alone. Clemson's vaunted passing combination of Steve Fuller-to-Jerry Butler was rendered ineffective by a Pitt secondary which swooped in for four interceptions, two by senior safety Bob Jury. Cavanaugh, a 1977 All-American, missed part of the season after suffering a broken wrist against Notre Dame in the first game of the year. "I shudder to think what he could have done had he stayed healthy," said Coach Jackie Sherrill, who finished his first year at Pitt with a 9-2-1 mark.

The Panthers saved their worst performance of the season for this bowl outing with North Carolina State. The Wolfpack, led by star running back Ted Brown, rolled up a 23-3 fourth quarter lead before Pitt quarterback Rick Trocano tried to bring the Panthers back. An 18-play drive featured four fourth-down conversions, the last of which resulted in a Freddie Jacobs touchdown. Pitt moved to State's 34-yard line with five minutes remaining, but an interception settled the issue. Trocano was intercepted twice more before the game ended, but he also led Pitt to the game's final touchdown. "Execution on our part was our biggest problem," Coach Jackie Sherrill said. "We didn't play well...and the turnovers hurt us." Pitt finished 8-4.

The Wildcats, coached by former Pitt radio commentator Tony Mason, threatened often but did not score a touchdown until the game's waning moments. Junior cornerback Terry White intercepted two passes. One set up the second of three Mark Schubert field goals; the other allowed Pitt to run out the clock. Two of Schubert's kicks were from 46 yards out. Pitt's only touchdown came after a 12-play drive, with Marino hitting Benjie Pryor from 12 yards out. The last three plays of the drive: Marino to Mike Dombrowski for 34 yards, Marino to Ralph Still for 24 yards, and the touchdown.

Rick Trocano and Dan Marino split time at quarterback; each threw a touchdown pass and Trocano added a short TD run. Although Rogers gained 113 yards, his two fumbles were more of a factor in the game than his rushing output. Tom Flynn recovered Rogers' fumble on the first play of the game, leading to Trocano's score. Randy McMillan scored two touchdowns as Pitt rolled to a 37-3 lead. The defense was led by Rickey Jackson, who made 19 tackles (14 solos). Pitt finished the season 11-1.

Coach Jackie Sherrill disdained the potential 50-yard field goal attempt. "With five minutes to go I said we were not here to tie, we were here to win," Sherrill said. Dan Marino wanted to throw a short pass to a running back to get the first down, but a Georgia blitz left tight end John Brown in single coverage down the middle. Marino was right on target for the touchdown, his third of the game. The Panther defense limited Herschel Walker to 84 yards on 25 carries.

Joe McCall lost one at the SMU one-yard line, but Mustang QB Lance McIlhenny returned the favor with a fumble at the Pitt seven. Eric Schubert's missed field goal attempt left the game scoreless at the half. Marino completed five straight short passes to set up Schubert's 43-yard kick, which gave Pitt its only points. SMU's "Pony Express" backfield (Eric Dickerson and Craig James) led an 80-yard drive, which McIlhenny capped off with a nine-yard run. Pitt's last chance ended when a Marino pass was tipped and intercepted in the end zone.

Wilson fell on Joe McCall's fumble in the end zone to tie the score early in the fourth quarter. Ohio State's Keith Byars scored his second touchdown by returning the ensuing kickoff 99 yards. Congemi was six-for-six on Pitt's next touchdown drive, which culminated with an 11-yard pass to Dwight Collins. Congemi, who completed 19-of-27 in the second half, had his conversion pass broken up, and Pitt trailed, 21-20. A 17-play drive later in the quarter ended with Snuffy Everett's 37-yard field goal to put the Panthers on top. Quarterback Mike Tomczak led Ohio State back, ending an 89-yard drive with a 39-yard bomb to Thad Jemison, who scored with 39 seconds remaining. Head Coach Foge Fazio's Panthers drove to the Buckeye 24, but could get no further.

Despite late heroics from Larry Wanke, Pitt was grounded in this aerial circus, as Texas quarterback Brett Stafford and split end Tony Jones set Bluebonnet Bowl records. The New Year's Eve crowd was treated to an action-packed game from the start. Stafford connected with Jones for a 77-yard touchdown on the first play from scrimmage. Pitt retaliated quickly: Billy Owens returned the kickoff 45 yards, Billy Osborn hit Reggie Williams for 45 more yards on a trick play; then Craig Heyward tied the score with a four-yard burst. Six plays later, the Longhorns took the lead for good as Stafford hit Jones on a short pass that he broke for a 60-yard touchdown. Stafford finished the first quarter with 202 yards passing on the way to a 368-yard night. Jones set records for receiving yards and longest reception. Wanke replaced Darnell Dickerson early in the third quarter after Dickerson suffered a knee injury. Wanke completed 8-of-20 passes for 172 yards and three touchdowns, including two late in the fourth quarter that cut the Longhorns' lead to five. Heyward rushed for 136 yards, winning his personal battle with Texas star Eric Metcalf, who finished with 95 yards rushing. Heyward ended the season with 1,791 yards, the second-best in Pitt history. Pitt finished the year at 8-4, their most successful season since 1983.

JOHN HANCOCK BOWL • DEC. 30, 1989

It was a day of firsts for the Panthers. Paul Hackett, named head coach moments before kickoff, won his first game as a head coach. It also was Pitt's first bowl win since the Panthers' 24-20 Sugar Bowl victory over Georgia in 1982. Van Pelt, who completed 20-of-40 passes and threw two touchdowns, rallied the Panthers from a 28-24 deficit, when he connected with Henry Tuten on a 44-yard touchdown strike with just 2:19 remaining in the game, giving Pitt a 31-28 lead. Tailback Curvin Richards rushed for 156 yards on 23 carries and scored the first points of the game with a 12-yard TD. Texas A&M countered with a nine-yard touchdown run by quarterback Lance Pavlas, tying the score at 7-7 to end the first quarter. With the score tied at 10 late in the first half, Van Pelt threw an eight-yard touchdown pass to Ronald Redmon, giving Pitt a 17-10 halftime lead. Flanker Olanda Truitt completed his freshman season in stellar fashion, catching four passes for 124 yards, including a key 59-yard reception that set up Redmon's score. Carne Smith finished the game with 10 tackles and Barry Threats had a game-ending interception, which ended Texas A&M's final drive and secured the Panthers' victory. The Hancock Bowl win marked the end of another decade in Pitt football history and the dawn of the Hackett coaching era. The Panthers finished the 1989 season with an 8-3-1 record.

AXA/EQUITABLE LIBERTY BOWL • DEC. 31, 1997

It was the Panthers' first-ever appearance in the Liberty Bowl and their first bowl game since a 31-28 victory over Texas A&M in the 1989 John Hancock Bowl. Pitt threatened early, driving to the Golden Eagles' 13 on its initial series, but failed to score any points. Southern Miss responded with a pair of touchdown drives for a 14-0 second-quarter lead. The Panther offense, held in check for most of the game, had its lone shining moment when quarterback Pete Gonzalez connected with Jake Hoffart on an 89-yard pass-and-run touchdown as Pitt trailed 14-7 at halftime. Hoffart, who finished with five catches for 121 yards, set a Liberty Bowl record with his touchdown catch. The Panthers, however, would come no closer. USM's defense returned a fumble and two interceptions for touchdowns in the second half to roll to its first victory ever over Pitt.

The Panthers struck on their very first possession of the game when John Turman hit a streaking Antonio Bryant for a 72-yard touchdown and 7-0 lead. The Cyclones, however, responded with 27 unanswered points, including 20 in the second period. Pitt pulled within 27-14 when Rod Rutherford snuck in from two yards out. Bryant then made a brilliant diving catch for a 44-yard touchdown and the Panthers trailed 27-20 with 2:05 left in the third. The Panthers' momentum was slowed when Iowa State's JaMain Billups returned a punt 72 yards for a score early in the fourth. Kevan Barlow, who finished with 114 rushing yards, bulled in from the three to make it 34-29 at the 9:45 mark. But the Panthers could draw no closer. The contest marked the first football game ever played in Bank One Ballpark, home of Major League Baseball's Arizona Diamondbacks.

Hobbled by an ankle injury, Antonio Bryant went on to earn Most Valuable Player honors after catching seven passes for 101 yards and two touchdowns. David Priestley put up MVP-like statistics himself, completing 18-of-32 passes for 271 yards and the two scoring strikes to Bryant. The duo propelled the Panthers to a 24-10 halftime lead. The Pitt defense held strong and limited Wolfpack quarterback Philip Rivers to just 189 yards through the air and sacked him four times. NC State closed to 27-19 in the fourth quarter but blitzing Lewis Moore quelled the threat when he sacked Rivers and forced a fumble. Tyre Young picked it up and ran 16 yards untouched for the clinching TD. Moore, who finished with seven tackles (all solo), including two for losses, was named Pitt's Defensive MVP.

Pitt achieved its finest season in two decades with a 38-13 triumph over Oregon State in the Insight Bowl. The win marked the Panthers' second consecutive postseason victory. A stifling defensive effort, efficient offense as well as a special teams gem keyed the result. Tied at 10 at halftime, OSU quarterback Derek Anderson was intercepted by Tez Morris, who returned the ball 36 yards to the Beavers' 23 early in the third quarter. Rod Rutherford completed a 22-yard pass to Larry Fitzgerald to the one before rushing up the middle for a 17-10 lead just three minutes into the second half. The Panthers broke open the contest later in the third when Shawn Robinson fumbled a punt at the Panthers' 34, ran wide to the right and sprinted down the sideline for a 66-yard touchdown. It was the first punt return for a TD in Pitt's bowl history. Pitt iced the game with a 44-yard touchdown drive climaxed by Brandon Miree's seven-yard burst. Miree, who earned the game's Offensive MVP honor, finished with 113 yards rushing on 20 carries (5.7 avg.). In contrast, OSU tailback Steven Jackson — who entered the game as the nation's fifth-leading rusher — was held to a season-low 34 yards.

Heisman Trophy runner-up Larry Fitzgerald saw his NCAA record touchdown streak end at 18 games, but the All-American still led the Panthers with five catches for 77 yards. Brandon Miree rushed for 110 yards and added four receptions, including one for a 17-yard touchdown. The scoring pass from Rod Rutherford was his 37th of the season, tying Dan Marino's school record set in 1981.

The Utes finished the 2004 season with a 12-0 record and ranked as high as fourth in the final polls. Pitt finished with an 8-4 mark and ranked No. 25. Pitt advanced into Utah territory three times in the first half but four sacks and a blocked field goal kept the Panthers off the scoreboard. The Panthers' lone score came on a beautiful over-the-shoulder grab by Greg Lee that went for a 31-yard touchdown with 4:28 left in the third quarter. Lee had seven receptions for 93 yards, while fellow wideout Joe DeSardo had nine catches for 109 yards.

BRUT SUN BOWL • DEC. 31, 2008

Unfortunately Pitt's offense was also bottled up, managing only 178 yards and never penetrating Oregon State's 36-yard line. The Panthers appeared poised to pull out another fourth-quarter comeback when T.J. Porter returned a punt 36 yards to the OSU 42 with 12:39 left in the game. A sack and forced fumble by the Beavers' Victor Butler, however, ended the threat. Pitt's final scoring opportunity came with 2:02 remaining when Conor Lee attempted a 57-yard field goal, but the kick fell just short of the crossbar. Linebackers Scott McKillop and Austin Ransom led Pitt with 11 tackles each. McKillop also had an interception in the end zone to end the first half. Greg Romeus was named the Jimmy Rogers Jr. Most Valuable Lineman after collecting four tackles and two sacks. Oregon State (9-4) placekicker Justin Kahut accounted for the lone points of the day on a 44-yard field goal with 2:18 left in the second quarter. It was the lowest scoring bowl game since 1959, a 0-0 tie between Air Force and TCU in the Cotton Bowl.

Freshman running back Dion Lewis was named the bowl's MVP after rushing for 159 yards and a touchdown against the nation's No. 6 overall defense. Lewis finished his spectacular debut season with a Pitt freshman-record 1,799 yards, surpassing Tony Dorsett's 1973 frosh total (1,686). Hutchins set Pitt records for single-season field goals (23) and kick scoring (115). His four field goals also set a Meineke Car Care Bowl record. Linebacker Max Gruder had a game-high 11 tackles, while defensive tackle Mick Williams had two sacks. Freshman linebacker Dan Mason, making a surprise start, had a key interception on the goal line late in the first half. As a unit, the Pitt defense limited the Tar Heels to just 264 total yards, including a mere 81 on the ground. It was Pitt's first postseason victory since the 2002 Insight Bowl. The win clinched a final national ranking of No. 15 in both polls for Pitt, its highest since 1982. The Tar Heels finished 8-5.

Pitt utilized a punishing running game and forced two Kentucky punting miscues to defeat the Wildcats, 27-10, in the BBVA Compass Bowl played at historic Legion Field in Birmingham, Ala. Andrew Taglianetti blocked a punt to set up Pitt's first touchdown late in the second quarter, giving the Panthers a 13-3 lead. Pitt then forced an incomplete pass on a Kentucky fake punt early in the third, setting up Tino Sunseri's 13-yard TD pass to Brock DeCicco that made it 20-3. The Wildcats countered with their only touchdown, a one-yard run by Moncell Allen later in the period that cut the deficit to 10. But the Panthers answered with a long drive that was capped by a two-yard touchdown run by Dion Lewis to seal the result. Lewis rushed for 105 yards and a TD to earn his second consecutive bowl MVP award. Defensively the Panthers held Kentucky well below its average of 33 points per game. Defensive backs Dom DeCicco and K'Wan Williams had nine tackles each. Pitt, playing the game under acting head coach Phil Bennett, finished 8-5, while the Wildcats fell to 6-7.

SMU led 21-0 after one period with quarterback J.J. McDermott throwing for one TD and rushing for another. The Mustangs' third score of the opening quarter, a two-yard run by Rishaad Wimbley, came after a Pitt fumble at its own 27. Placekicker Kevin Harper accounted for all of Pitt's points with a pair of field goals. The Panthers produced just 205 yards in offense on the day and gave up seven sacks. SMU managed 300 yards but was sparked by the passing combo of McDermott and receiver Darius Johnson, who had seven catches for 120 yards, including a 50-yard TD to open the game's scoring. Pitt was led by interim head coach Keith Patterson. The Panthers finished 6-7 on the year. SMU improved to 8-5. It was the first meeting between Pitt and SMU since the Jan. 1, 1983 Cotton Bowl (also won by the Mustangs, 7-3).

Bo Wallace threw three touchdown passes to lead Mississippi to a 38-17 victory over Pitt in the BBVA Compass Bowl, the first-ever meeting between the two schools. Wallace, the game's MVP, skillfully directed the Rebels' no-huddle, up-tempo attack. Ole Miss rolled up 23 first downs and 387 yards. Pitt was held to 266 yards, its second-lowest total of the season. Pitt's 1,000-yard rusher, Ray Graham, did not play due to a hamstring injury. Fielding a shuffled offensive line, the Panthers mustered just 81 rushing yards. Pitt (6-7) fell behind early after Tino Sunseri threw his first interception since September and Ole Miss capitalized with a TD pass less than five minutes into the game. The Rebels built leads of 14-0, 31-10 and, by the final period, 38-10. As a unit, Pitt's defense struggled to slow Ole Miss (7-6) down, but safety Jason Hendricks had an exceptional day, collecting 17 tackles, two TFLs and an interception.

Sparked by freshmen James Conner and Tyler Boyd, Pitt edged Mid-American Conference champ Bowling Green, 30-27, in Detroit. Conner rushed for 229 yards, while Boyd caught eight passes for 173 yards and also scored on a punt return. Conner broke Pitt's bowl rushing record held by Tony Dorsett (202 vs. Georgia in the Jan. 1, 1977, Sugar Bowl). Conner also played on defense as a pass rusher — drawing a key holding penalty on Bowling Green's final possession — and was named the game's MVP. Boyd broke Pitt's bowl record for receiving yards (surpassing Gordon Jones' 163 vs. Clemson in the Dec. 30, 1977, Gator Bowl) and had the Panthers' first punt return TD since 2006. A third freshman, Chris Blewitt, provided the winning points on a 39-yard field goal with 1:17 remaining. Chad Voytik, playing the entire second half in relief of injured Tom Savage, completed 5-of-9 passes for 108 yards and had a five-yard TD run. In his first Pitt appearance, Aaron Donald had a game-clinching sack in the final minute and was named the bowl's Most Valuable Lineman. With its first bowl win since 2010, Pitt finished 7-6 and dropped the Falcons to 10-4.

Pitt fell victim to a furious fourth-quarter rally in a 35-34 loss to Houston in the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl. The Panthers (6-7) held leads of 31-6 and 34-13 in the final period. Houston quarterback Greg Ward fueled the rally by throwing three touchdown passes in the final 3:41 — the last two after the Cougars (8-5) recovered onside kicks — and then completed the game-winning two-point conversion to cap the largest comeback in an FBS game in 2014 and largest ever in a bowl game that didn't go into overtime. Ward finished with 274 passing yards and also rushed for 92. The Panthers led by 21 points with 6:14 left when Chris Blewitt kicked a 29-yard field goal. Blewitt also had a career-long 52-yarder as time expired in the first half to give Pitt a 17-6 lead. The Panthers were under the direction of interim coach Joe Rudolph, who replaced the departing Paul Chryst.

Navy's record-setting quarterback Keenan Reynolds ran for three scores and threw for another to lead the Midshipmen to a 44-28 win over Pitt in the Military Bowl. Reynolds rushed for 144 yards, threw for 126 and even had a 47-yard reception on a trick play. Pitt began the game in exciting fashion as Quadree Henderson returned the opening kickoff 100 yards for a 7-0 lead. Navy responded with three unanswered touchdowns to seize a 21-7 halftime lead. The advantage swelled to 31-7 midway through the third quarter before the Panthers struck back. Pitt scored two touchdowns in 17 seconds — a four-yard catch by Quadree Ollison and 22-yard fumble return by Jordan Whitehead — to close to 31-21 entering the final quarter. After Navy scored another TD, Ollison ran for a 45-yard score to make it 38-28 with 9:35 left. That would be as close as Pitt would get as Reynolds iced the game with a nine-yard TD run on Navy's subsequent possession. The game was played before an overflow crowd of 36,352 in the Midshipmen's home stadium. Pitt completed Pat Narduzzi's inaugural season with an 8-5 record, its best mark since 2010. Navy finished 11-2 and earned a No. 18 ranking in the final polls.

Pitt closed the 2016 season on a sour note, dropping a 31-24 decision to Northwestern in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl. The Panthers were foiled by an effective Northwestern rushing attack led by Justin Jackson, who ran for 224 yards and three touchdowns. Failed red zone opportunities and untimely injuries also keyed the final result. Pitt penetrated the Wildcats' 20-yard line seven times but only cashed in on three of those possessions. The Panthers (8-5) also lost five starters to injuries during the game, including tailback James Conner late in the second quarter and quarterback Nathan Peterman in the third. Still, the Panthers claimed a 24-21 lead early in the final period when Ben DiNucci, who came on in relief of Peterman, passed to George Aston for a six-yard score. But Northwestern (7-6) would seize control for the balance of the game, turning a 4th-and-1 into a 21-yard play-action TD pass that made it 28-24 and then hitting a field goal for a seven-point lead. Pitt's final two possessions ended in interceptions, sealing the victory for the Wildcats.

In the first meeting between the two programs since 1932, Pitt dominated nearly every statistical category but fell to Stanford, 14-13. Making their fourth all-time Sun Bowl appearance, the Panthers (7-7) outgained the Cardinal by a 344-to-208 margin yet couldn't muster enough points to capitalize on the stellar defensive performance. Pitt didn't allow a Stanford first down until the second quarter. Alex Kessman's 29-yard field goal at 14:14 of the second period gave the Panthers a 3-0 lead. The Cardinal (9-4) responded with a 64-yard drive capped by Cameron Scarlett's one-yard TD run. With tailback Qadree Ollison sidelined due to an early injury, Darrin Hall carried the load for the Panthers' rushing attack and finished with 123 yards on 16 carries. Hall's six-yard scoring run with 2:32 left before intermission gave Pitt a 10-7 lead. Kessman increased the advantage to 13-7 with a 28-yard field goal in the third quarter. Stanford's decisive touchdown was a fortuitous one — Dewayne Hendrix forced a fumble from Cardinal QB K.J. Costello, but the ball flew right into the hands of Scarlett in the end zone. The subsequent extra point put Stanford ahead for good with 11:28 to play. Pitt's final serious threat ended with a missed 55-yard field goal.

Pat Narduzzi's first bowl win as a head coach was a thrilling and fitting way to end the Panthers' 2019 campaign. After Pitt had played eight one-score games during the regular season, Narduzzi's team yet again went down to the wire — this time with Eastern Michigan in the Quick Lane Bowl. The Panthers didn't lead until quarterback Kenny Pickett connected with receiver Taysir Mack in the end zone for a spectacular, one-handed catch that proved to be the winning TD with just 47 seconds remaining. The Panthers (8-5) earned their first postseason victory since 2013. The Eagles (6-7) jumped out to an early 10-0 lead before Alex Kessman put Pitt on the board with a 44-yard field goal. Then the Panthers found an offensive spark with a 96-yard TD from Pickett to Maurice Frenche — the longest passing play in Pitt history. EMU quickly responded with a 50-yard scoring pass from QB Mike Glass to Quian Williams and took a 20-17 lead into halftime. The teams traded scores in the second half in front of a Quick Lane Bowl record crowd of 34,765. The Eagles took a 30-27 advantage when Chad Ryland booted a 48-yard field goal with 6:00 to play. After consecutive three-and-outs, the stage was set for Pitt's dramatic 10-play, 91-yard drive that concluded with Mack's decisive touchdown. Pickett completed 27-of-39 passes for 361 yards and three scores to earn Most Valuable Player.

Gallagher has also completed terms on a wide range of community boards and committees, including the president's 12-person Commission on Enhancing National Cybersecurity in 2016. He currently serves as chair of the Commission on Economic and Community Engagement for the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities.

Gallagher holds a PhD in physics from Pitt and a bachelor's degree in physics and philosophy from Benedictine College in Kansas.

- The University of Pittsburgh has again been named the top public university in the Northeast, according to recent rankings by The Wall Street Journal/Times Higher Education. This is the fifth time in six years that Pitt has received the top spot in this nationally regarded ranking.
- U.S. News & World Report ranked Pitt among the nation's top 20 public colleges and universities in its 2021 Best Colleges rankings.
- In its reaccreditation report issued in September 2012, the Middle States Commission on Higher Education praised Pitt as its "world class research university" with an "unwavering commitment to excellence" and an "extraordinarily talented and beloved leadership team."
- Pitt students consistently win a significant number of prestigious national and international awards for academic achievement. Pitt undergraduates have claimed one Gates Cambridge Scholarship, two Churchill Scholarships, eight Rhodes Scholarships, nine Marshall Scholarships, nine Udall Scholarships, 12 Truman Scholarships, and an astounding 62 Goldwater Scholarships.
- In 2020, 15 Pitt students and alumni received U.S. Fulbright Scholarships, the most ever received in a single year in University history. This was the 10th time in 11 years that Pitt has been named among the nation's top producers of Fulbright award winners.
- Senior faculty members have been elected to such prestigious groups as the Health and Medicine Division of the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine; American Association for the Advancement of Science; American Society for Clinical Investigation; National Academy of Education; American Academy of Nursing; and National Academy of Sciences. And they have claimed some of the country's most prestigious awards, including the National Medal of Science, Lasker-DeBakey Clinical Medical Research Award, John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation "Genius Grant," and Andrew W. Mellon Foundation Distinguished Achievement Award.
- In the most recent QS World University Rankings (2022), a ranking of the world's top 1,300 universities, the University of Pittsburgh was ranked 41st in the United States and 163rd in the world. The QS World University Rankings by Subject 2021 gave the third spot in the world to Pitt's philosophy department.
- In the most recent QS World University Rankings (2020), a ranking of the world's top 1,000 universities, the University of Pittsburgh was ranked 37th in the United States and 140th in the world. The QS World University Rankings by Subject 2020 gave the third spot in the world to Pitt's philosophy department.
- In 2012, Pitt surpassed its goal to raise \$2 billion during its historic capital campaign. Thanks to generous gifts received from more than 189,000 donors, the University was able to create more than 1,600 new endowments, including more than 600 student scholarships and fellowships and more than 150 new faculty chairs and professorships.

The University of Pittsburgh's 2020-21 academic year will long be remembered for its unprecedented challenges. But, more importantly, those 12 months will also be recalled for the strong and unshakeable leadership displayed by Pitt people in the face of that adversity.

That certainly was the case for Pitt Athletics under the guidance of Heather Lyke. Now in her fifth year as Pitt's Director of Athletics, Lyke's leadership has provided a lighthouse in the storm and kept an unyielding focus on the well-being of Pitt's nearly 500 student-athletes.

That resolve produced a truly remarkable year for Pitt Athletics. Historic team successes, groundbreaking All-America performances and impactful efforts in the classroom and community stirred the pride of Pitt faithful everywhere.

This included the Panthers' volleyball team advancing to the NCAA Tournament's Elite Eight and men's soccer reaching the NCAA College Cup, both unprecedented achievements. Wrestling finished 11th in the country, while Pitt baseball enjoyed a breakthrough season, reaching as high as No. 14—its highest ranking ever—in the national polls.

Individual achievements were also prevalent. Football's Patrick Jones II and Rashad Weaver earned consensus All-America status, making Pitt one of just four programs nationwide to have multiple consensus honorees in 2020 (joining Alabama, Notre Dame and Ohio State).

Pitt Athletics had an impactful year off the field as well. The Panthers received the NCAA Team Works Community Service Competition Award for Division I, based on the number of service hours completed and the number of participating student-athletes.

In addition to galvanizing Panther supporters, the success also garnered attention from national observers. The influential *Sports Business Journal* named Lyke one of five nominees for 2021 Division I Athletic Director of the Year.

These achievements come as no surprise to those who have observed Lyke's time at Pitt. The first woman to hold the full-time director of athletics post at the University of Pittsburgh, her influence has been evident in the recruitment of nationally regarded head coaches, a strengthened focus on the total student-athlete experience and the establishment of a culture of comprehensive excellence.

Among the additional highlights of her tenure:

- In January 2020, she announced the launching of Pitt's Victory Heights initiative, a series of state-of-the-art athletics projects that will provide Pitt student-athletes with national-caliber competition, training and sports performance and medicine facilities. This includes a 3,500-seat arena for gymnastics, volleyball and wrestling; an eight-lane, 300-meter indoor track for the men's and women's programs as well as a band facility; and an athletic performance center that will serve 16 of Pitt's 19 intercollegiate athletics programs.
- The Victory Heights vision began with a \$16 million expansion of the Petersen Sports Complex completed this past year. This included a third-floor addition featuring coaches office suites and conference rooms; the P.J. Dick, Trumbull, Lindy Paving Team Meeting Room with theatre-style seating; and the Bill and Sissy Lieberman Student-Athlete Lounge that features a 14-foot video wall, outdoor patio and communal spaces.
- Lyke led a dynamic rebrand of Pitt's athletic marks and logos in 2019 that simultaneously evoked the Panthers' proud past while boldly anticipating the future. The rebrand continues to receive high praise not only among Pitt's faithful but also from national observers.

- In 2018, Lyke opened the doors to “Pitt Studios,” the department’s cutting-edge broadcast production facilities that helped launch the ACC Network. The facilities support the University’s first-ever broadcast and media studies curriculum.
- Former Pitt All-American Aaron Donald, who now stars for the Los Angeles Rams, made a seven-figure financial commitment to the Pitt Football Championship Fund, the largest donation ever by a Pitt football letterman to the program. In recognition of Donald’s momentous pledge, Lyke renamed the ground floor of Pitt’s Duratz Athletic Complex the “Aaron Donald Football Performance Center.”
- Lyke initiated the dawn of a new era in Pitt Athletics with the addition of women’s lacrosse as a varsity sport. The fully funded program will play its inaugural season as a member of the ACC against NCAA Division I competition in the 2021-22 academic year.
- Lyke has launched a number of diversity and inclusion initiatives for Pitt Athletics, including Panthers United, a committee of more than 45 student-athletes, coaches, administrators and campus partners that develops action items to foster a culture of inclusion. These include Pitt Athletics’ Voting Matters campaign and community service programming.
- Lyke enhanced the department’s vision and values—the “Bridges for Pitt Athletics”—to articulate the Panthers’ dedication to diversity and inclusion. The new bridge, titled POWERED BY DIVERSITY, reads “Pitt Athletics is fueled by diversity and united in our commitment to inclusion for all.”
- And under her watch, Pitt Athletics marshalled all of the resources of a major research institution, as well as the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center (UPMC), to ensure the safety of student-athletes and staff in the midst of the pandemic.

Lyke’s influence has not been limited to Pitt. She is an ACC representative on the NCAA Division I Council, a high-level group responsible for decision making that shapes the future for all of Division I Athletics. She has been on the front lines of vital NCAA legislation geared to help student-athletes navigate this climate and beyond.

Moreover, in July 2020, Lyke testified in front of the U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee on the negative impact of gambling on collegiate athletics. Her passionate and impressive testimony was punctuated by a call for Congress to prohibit such wagering for “student and student-athlete well-being; the integrity of amateur competition; and the compliance impact on all our institutions of higher education.”

Beyond Pitt, she also provides leadership on the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics’ (NACDA) Executive Committee and on the board of directors for LEAD1, Women Leaders for College Sports, the UPMC Hillman Cancer Center and P3R.

From 2013-17, Lyke served as vice president and director of athletics at Eastern Michigan University. Prior to EMU, she was a ranking athletic administrator at Ohio State for 15 years. Lyke additionally held posts at the University of Cincinnati and with the NCAA.

Lyke found the beginning of her professional path during her days as a scholarship student-athlete at the University of Michigan,

where she captained the Wolverines’ Big Ten champion softball team. She earned a bachelor’s degree in education from Michigan and a Juris Doctor from the University of Akron School of Law.

At Eastern Michigan, Lyke oversaw a department that sponsored 21 varsity sports with more than 550 student-athletes.

Eastern Michigan received the Excellence in Management Cup presented by Texas A&M’s Laboratory for the Study of Intercollegiate Athletics. The “EM Cup” annually recognizes the athletic department that best maximizes fiscal resources through championship victories. EMU ranked No. 1 out of 128 Football Bowl Subdivision schools for 2015-16.

EMU annually distinguished itself in the Mid-American Conference under Lyke’s watch. The Eagles captured 16 MAC team championships, garnered 17 MAC Coach of the Year awards and had nearly 400 MAC All-Academic honorees during her tenure. For the first time in school history, Eastern Michigan was honored with the MAC’s Cartwright Award for all-around athletic department excellence (2013-14) and the Jacoby Award for female athletic excellence (2014-15).

Lyke spearheaded numerous capital improvement projects for EMU Athletics. The highest profile was the installation of college football’s first gray Revolution Field Turf playing surface in 2014. Dubbed “The Factory” in honor of the region’s automobile industry history, the field was selected No. 2 among all colleges in a USA Today fan vote (behind only the University of Tennessee).

In 2014, Lyke became the first woman to chair the NCAA Men’s Lacrosse Committee. She additionally chaired the Mid-American Conference’s Cost of Attendance Task Force.

From 1998-2013, Lyke worked at Ohio State, where she was a member of the athletic department’s executive team and a lead figure in the development of the Buckeyes’ strategic plan. Lyke directly oversaw 10 of Ohio State’s 36 athletic programs and had oversight of all facets of the athletic councils involving budget, revenue generation, facilities and OSU’s golf course operations.

She additionally supervised the Buckeyes’ sport performance division. Lyke also developed Ohio State’s first student-athlete internship program, “Bucks Go Pro.”

During her Ohio State tenure, the Big Ten Network tapped her expertise as a color analyst for softball telecasts from 2009-13.

Lyke served at Cincinnati as the assistant athletic director for compliance as well as the senior woman administrator from 1996-98. She began her career at the NCAA as an intern in the enforcement and student-athlete reinstatement department from 1995-96.

Born and raised in Canton, Ohio, Lyke starred at GlenOak High School in volleyball, basketball and softball. She accepted a softball scholarship from Michigan, where she lettered four years as a first baseman and was an All-Academic Big Ten honoree. She was a two-time team captain and helped Michigan to the 1992 Big Ten championship.

FREDDIE FU, MD, is now in his 35th year as the head team physician and orthopaedic surgeon for the University of Pittsburgh athletic department. Dr. Fu has been the David Silver Professor and chair of the Department of Orthopaedic Surgery at the Pitt School of Medicine since 1997.

In the summer of 2014, Dr. Fu was honored in Europe, Japan, and across North America for his research and pioneering surgical techniques to treat sports-related injuries to the knee and shoulder and for his extensive scientific and clinical research in the biomechanics of such injuries. Dr. Fu was inducted to the American Orthopaedic Society for Sports Medicine Hall of Fame in July 2016. He is lauded especially for his scientific research and clinical expertise in treating the commonly injured anterior cruciate ligament (ACL), the main stabilizing ligament of the knee. Because of his reputation, Dr. Fu attracts both athletic and nonathletic patients from all over the globe and is frequently sought after as an expert by top national and international media covering sports, medicine and science.

Dr. Fu sees patients in his clinic at the recently renovated UPMC Freddie Fu Sports Medicine Center, renamed for Dr. Fu in 2018—one of the world's largest, most comprehensive facilities of its kind—located within the UPMC Rooney Sports Complex. Partly designed by Dr. Fu, the complex also houses the indoor and outdoor training facilities of the Pitt Panthers and the Pittsburgh Steelers.

VOLKER MUSAHL, MD, is professor and chief of the division of sports medicine at UPMC. He is a UPMC orthopaedic surgeon and co-head team physician for the Pitt Panthers football team. He sees patients at the UPMC Freddie Fu and the UPMC Lemieux Sports Medicine Centers as well as UPMC Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh. Additionally, he holds appointments as co-director of the Orthopaedic Robotics Laboratory and professor of Orthopedic Surgery, Bioengineering and Clinical Translational Science Institute. Dr. Musahl, who specializes in sports medicine, shoulder surgery, and knee ligament injuries, sees patients at the UPMC Rooney Sports Complex and Monroeville office. Dr. Musahl is a world-renowned knee surgeon and top 10 most published ACL doctor/researcher worldwide. While he also works as a team physician in other collegiate and high school sports, he and Elizabeth Herrman, DO, serve as the primary day-to-day Pitt football physicians.

ELIZABETH P. HERRMAN, DO, is a primary care sports medicine physician with UPMC Sports Medicine, certified in family medicine and sports medicine by the American Board of Family Medicine. She is an assistant professor at the University of Pittsburgh Department of Orthopaedic Surgery. Dr. Herrman's clinical emphasis is primary care sports medicine. She is trained in, and incorporates, non-surgical ultrasound procedures into her regular practice. She sees athletes and active individuals of all ages and was previously UPMC team physician for the collegiate athletes at Robert Morris University. Dr. Herrman currently serves as the co-head team physician for the University of Pittsburgh football team alongside Dr. Volker Musahl.

JEANNE DOPERAK, DO, a UPMC primary care sports medicine physician, sees patients at the UPMC Rooney Sports Complex and Greensburg and North Huntingdon satellite offices. She is a general physician for the athletic departments of both the University of Pittsburgh and Saint Vincent College as well as the University of Pittsburgh at Greensburg and several local high schools. Dr. Doperak is an assistant professor at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine. She is the primary care sports medicine fellowship director at UPMC St. Margaret. Dr. Fu named her associate head team physician for basketball and Olympic sports in 2014-15.

BRYSON LESNIAK, MD, is a UPMC orthopaedic surgeon and team physician for all of Pitt's athletics' teams except women's basketball and football. Dr. Lesniak is an associate professor in the Department of Orthopaedic Surgery at the Pitt School of Medicine. He previously practiced and taught at the University of Miami, where he served as the team physician for the Miami Marlins baseball franchise. Dr. Lesniak sees patients at the UPMC Rooney Sports Complex and South Hills offices in Bethel Park.

STEPHEN RABUCK, MD, is a UPMC orthopedic surgeon and clinical assistant professor in the department of orthopedic surgery. He is the associate head team physician for University of Pittsburgh women's basketball. Dr. Rabuck completed fellowship training at the UPMC Center for Sports Medicine from 2011-12. Additionally, he serves as a physician for U.S. Soccer, providing coverage to U.S. Soccer developmental teams. Dr. Rabuck specializes in sports medicine, shoulder and knee surgery, and sees patients at the UPMC Rooney Sports Complex and Monroeville offices.

UPMC SPORTS MEDICINE

More than 500 Pitt student-athletes receive medical care provided by UPMC Sports Medicine's athletic training program.

The University of Pittsburgh School of Health and Rehabilitation Sciences has a proud tradition of athletic training education. The undergraduate program is accredited by the National Athletic Trainers' Association (NATA), and the school also provides graduate education at the master's and doctoral levels.

Established in 1975, the athletic training program prepares students for a career in the multidisciplinary field of sports medicine. Upon completion of the athletic training education program, students are eligible to take the NATA-administered certification examination.

Pitt athletes receive treatment in two athletic training rooms. Each sport has a full-time certified athletic trainer or certified graduate assistant and student athletic trainers assigned to provide medical coverage during all practices and games. The staff is dedicated to providing all aspects of prevention, evaluation, management, and rehabilitation of injuries and illnesses.

The sports medicine staff also runs a sports medicine clinic at the UPMC Rooney Sports Complex at which all athletes can be evaluated by one of the sports medicine physicians. The South Side structure, which includes the UPMC Center for Sports Medicine, an indoor practice facility, and four outdoor practice fields, combines the resources of a major academic and clinical system with professional and collegiate sports team programs. This clinic provides athletes with an opportunity to be seen by specialists and provides student athletic trainers with an outstanding learning environment.

The UPMC Sports Medicine clinic for Pitt athletes is led by Dr. Freddie Fu, Pitt head team physician. Various team physicians include Drs. Volker Musahl, Elizabeth Herrman, Jeanne Doperak, Bryson Lesniak, and Stephen Rabuck.

The world-renowned UPMC Sports Medicine Concussion Program is also available to Pitt athletes. The program is led by neuropsychologist Dr. Michael Collins. In addition, a comprehensive staff of consulting specialists from throughout UPMC is part of the sports medicine team caring for all Pitt student-athletes.
