CHRIS BICKELL '97 HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

Like the region it calls home, Pitt football under Pat Narduzzi has proven to be rugged, relentless and continuously rising.

Upon his hiring on December 26, 2014, Narduzzi pledged his Panthers would “play with a tough, blue-collar mentality—and how else would you want it in the City of Pittsburgh?”

Promise kept.

The 11th-year Chris Bickell '97 Head Football Coach has made an emphatic imprint on Pitt's program. His vision for the Panthers—on and off the field—continues to bear fruit in the form of ACC championships, All-Americans, NFL Draft picks and community impact.

- Narduzzi has compiled a 72-56 overall record as the Panthers' head coach. His 72 victories rank second all-time at Pitt, trailing only the legendary Jock Sutherland, who compiled 111 wins from 1924-38.

- From 2015-24, Narduzzi directed Pitt to 46 victories in ACC play, the conference's third-highest win total during that span, trailing only Clemson (71) and Miami (49).

- Narduzzi directed a historic 2021 campaign, when the Panthers stormed to 11 victories and claimed their first outright conference title with a 45-21 triumph over Wake Forest in the ACC Championship Game. Pitt earned a No. 13 ranking in the final 2021 polls, its highest finish since 1982.

- In 2022, Pitt finished 9-4, including a stirring 37-35 win over nationally ranked UCLA in the Sun Bowl, to finish No. 22 in the final polls. It marked the first time since 1979-83 that the Panthers earned Top 25 finishes in back-to-back years.

- Narduzzi has coached 10 first team All-Americans at Pitt. In 2024, linebacker Kyle Louis was named a first team All-American by The Sporting News, becoming the first Pitt sophomore defensive player to earn that distinction since the legendary Hugh Green in 1978.

- Under Narduzzi's watch, Pitt continues to produce high-level NFL prospects. Over the four NFL drafts from 2021-24, the Panthers' 17 picks were the second most of any ACC program (trailing only Clemson's 19).

- Six Pitt products—Kancey, offensive tackle Carter Warren, running back Israel Abanikanda, linebacker SirVocea Dennis and safeties Erick Hallett II and Brandon Hill—were selected in the 2023 NFL Draft, the most in the ACC (tied with Clemson) and fifth most nationally.

- Kancey was drafted in the first round by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, marking the second consecutive year Pitt produced a first-round pick. In the 2022 draft, quarterback Kenny Pickett was a first-round selection of the Pittsburgh Steelers—the first Pitt QB to be picked in the opening round since Dan Marino in 1983.

- Narduzzi's Panthers have a well-earned reputation as a dangerous opponent for highly ranked foes. In 2019, Pitt scored a 35-34 triumph over UCF, which visited Heinz Field riding a 27-game non-bowl winning streak. The winning touchdown—a gadget-play pass caught by quarterback Kenny Pickett—has been immortalized as the “Pitt Special.”

- In 2017, Pitt closed the season with a 24-14 victory over No. 2 Miami, which entered the game undefeated and on the cusp of the College Football Playoff.

- In 2016, the Panthers defeated two teams that finished in the top 5 of the final CFP rankings. Pitt gave No. 2 Clemson—that year's national champion—its only loss (43-42) and kept No. 5 Penn State out of the playoff field by defeating the Nittany Lions, 42-39.

- Pitt has also thrived off the field under Narduzzi's watch. During the 2021-22 academic year, Pitt led all college football programs in community service hours per Helper Helper.

- During Narduzzi's tenure, Pitt has two recipients of the Disney Spirit Award, presented to the most inspirational figure in college football: James Conner (2016) and Tre Tipton (2021). Additionally, Deslin Alexandre was honored as the Jason Witten Collegiate Man of the Year and the male collegiate recipient of the Coach Wooden Citizenship Cup for 2022.

- In 2020, Pitt earned an NCAA Public Recognition Award for achieving an Academic Progress Rate (APR) score that ranked in the top 10% of all football programs. The Panthers' multi-year 988 APR set a Pitt football program record and was 24 points higher than the national average.

Narduzzi has engrained toughness and tenacity into the program's culture. His passionate approach has spurred Pitt's rise in the ACC and nationally. Moreover, he is committed—in both word and deed—to his student-athletes' long-term growth.

That last point was vividly illustrated when Narduzzi and his wife, Donna, made a six-figure financial gift to the Pitt Football Championship Fund, which serves the program in such key areas as student-athlete development, facility improvement, technology and recruiting.

"I take great pride in wearing that Pitt Script on my chest each day as the University of Pittsburgh's head football coach," Narduzzi said. "This is an outstanding place with so many amazing people. Donna and I feel incredibly blessed to call Pitt our home."

Narduzzi arrived at Pitt following eight highly successful years as the defensive coordinator at Michigan State under former head coach Mark Dantonio. During that time, the Spartans achieved five Top 25 finishes and Narduzzi's defense proved instrumental in that success. Michigan State was the only team to rank in the nation's top 10 in total defense and rushing defense each season from 2011-14.

In 2014, the Spartans finished with a No. 5 national ranking and 11-2 record following a stirring 42-41 victory over Baylor in the AT&T Cotton Bowl. Michigan State boasted the nation's top rushing defense in 2014, yielding just 88.5 yards per game. The Spartans finished third nationally with 34 turnovers gained and eighth in total defense (315.8 yards per contest).

In 2013, Michigan State finished No. 3 in the country following a Big Ten title and 24-20 victory over No. 5 Stanford in the Rose Bowl. That season, Narduzzi was named the 2013 recipient of the prestigious Broyles Award, annually presented to the country's top assistant coach.

Narduzzi tutored an impressive list of decorated defensive players at Michigan State, including first team All-Americans in cornerback Darqueze Dennard, safety Kurtis Drummond, linebacker Greg Jones and defensive tackle Jerel Worthy.

Dennard was a unanimous All-American in 2013, becoming the first Michigan State cornerback to earn that distinction. He also was the school's first winner of the Jim Thorpe Award, given annually to college football's top defensive back. Dennard was a first-round NFL Draft pick of the Cincinnati Bengals in 2014. In the 2015 draft, another Narduzzi pupil, Michigan State cornerback Trae Waynes, was a first-round pick of the Minnesota Vikings.

Narduzzi coached 19 first-team All-Big Ten selections. Four players won the conference's top individual awards, including two Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year honorees (Dennard in 2013 and Drummond in 2014). Shilique Calhoun was the Big Ten Defensive Lineman of the Year in 2013, while Greg Jones was the overall Defensive Player of the Year in 2009.

Prior to Michigan State, Narduzzi spent three years (2004-06) as defensive coordinator under Dantonio at Cincinnati, helping the Bearcats to a pair of bowl invitations.

In 2003, Narduzzi was defensive coordinator at Miami of Ohio under the late Terry Hoeppner. The RedHawks stormed to a 13-1 record, capturing the Mid-American Conference (MAC) championship and defeating Louisville in the GMAC Bowl to finish No. 10 in the AP poll. While quarterback Ben Roethlisberger headlined Miami's offense, Narduzzi's unit topped the MAC in rushing defense (19th nationally), scoring defense (22nd) and pass efficiency defense (34th).

Narduzzi served as linebackers coach at Northern Illinois for three seasons (2000-02). NIU won a pair of MAC West titles during his tenure and in 2002 had the league's top rush defense.

From 1993-99, Narduzzi coached at his alma mater, Rhode Island, serving as the Rams' defensive coordinator his final two seasons. He began his coaching career at Miami of Ohio, working as a graduate assistant in 1990 and 1991, before earning his first full-time position as receivers coach for the 1992 season.

Narduzzi was an All-Ohio performer at Youngstown's Ursuline High School, leading the Irish to the Steel Valley title and state playoffs as a senior in 1984. He was a starting linebacker under his father, the late Bill Narduzzi, as a freshman at Youngstown State in 1985 before transferring to Rhode Island, where he became a three-year starter for the Rams from 1987-89.

Bill Narduzzi was head coach at YSU from 1975-85. He led the Penguins to the 1979 NCAA Division II national championship game, and twice was named the Ohio Valley Conference (OVC) Coach of the Year. (One of Bill's first posts was as a freshman line coach at Pitt in 1962.)

Narduzzi completed his bachelor's degree in physical education at Rhode Island in 1990 and later earned a master's degree in sports studies at Miami of Ohio in 1992.

Cory Sanders enters his eighth season working with Pitt's secondary and having positional oversight of the safeties. His role with the program expanded prior to the 2024 campaign as Pat Narduzzi promoted him to assistant head coach in June.

"From the day we hired Cory back in 2018, he has been an outstanding resource for our entire program," Narduzzi said. "This promotion reflects the deep impact he already makes on our players, coaches and staff. Cory is an excellent teacher and mentor who makes everyone around him better. He sees the larger picture in everything we do. Everyone in our building will benefit from his expanded role with our program."

Under Sanders' direction, the safeties have been an annual strength for Pitt's defense. Despite having to replace both starters for the 2023 season, he developed a highly productive duo in Donovan McMillon and Javon McIntyre.

In 2024, McMillon was named All-ACC (second team) after leading the Panthers in tackles for the second consecutive season, compiling 115 stops. He became the first Pitt player to record consecutive 100-tackle seasons since linebacker Scott McKillop (2007-08). McMillon went on to play in the Hula Bowl all-star game, as well as the East-West Shrine Bowl. McIntyre became only the second Pitt DB the last 20 years to have two seasons of at least 50 tackles and 3.5 TFL (2023-24), along with Jason Hendricks (2012-13).

McIntyre is back in 2025, the returning vet with the most Pitt experience on the defensive side of the ball (42 games).

During his tenure, Sanders has built an impressive Pitt safety pipeline to the pros that includes McMillon (Cleveland Browns), Erick Hallett II (Detroit Lions), Brandon Hill (Houston Texans) and Damar Hamlin (Buffalo Bills).

Prior to Pitt, Sanders was the defensive backs coach at Western Michigan (2017), where he developed a pair of NFL Draft selections in cornerbacks Darius Phillips and Sam Beal.

Sanders was part of shaping an NCAA Division II program from the ground up at the University of West Florida, which played its inaugural season in 2016. As the Argonauts' defensive coordinator, he directed a unit that ranked 11th nationally in quarterback sacks (3.6 sacks per game) and 26th in tackles for loss (8.2 TFLs per game). West Florida finished 5-6 that season, the most victories for a first-year Division II program in a decade.

Prior to West Florida, Sanders spent five seasons (2010-14) on the football staff at Division II Saint Joseph's (Ind.) College, his alma mater. The team's defensive coordinator his initial year, Sanders was promoted to head coach for the 2011 season and rebuilt the Pumas into a contender in the Great Lakes Valley Conference (GLVC).

The team achieved runner-up finishes in the GLVC in each of his final two seasons, while featuring a nationally ranked defense. The Pumas also set a school record for single-season total offense (4,594 yards) during his tenure and produced 36 All-GLVC performers.

Sanders initial coaching appointments came at North Central College (2007) and Elmhurst College (2008-09). He coached the defensive backs at both Illinois institutions.

Sanders himself was an outstanding collegiate defensive back. He was a four-time all-conference honoree at Saint Joseph's and elected a Pumas team captain three times. Sanders was an instrumental performer for two conference championship teams and finished his career fifth in school history with 30.5 TFLs.

Sanders is a 2007 graduate of Saint Joseph's with a bachelor's degree in business administration.

Calling him “one of college football’s most dynamic and aggressive offensive minds,” Pitt head football coach Pat Narduzzi announced the hiring of Kade Bell as the Panthers’ offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in December 2023.

In his first season with Pitt in 2024, Bell directed Pitt to a dramatic improvement in the passing game. The unit averaged 277.8 yards per game through the air in the regular season, which ranked 15th nationally and third in the ACC. He also helped redshirt freshman quarterback Eli Holstein establish himself as one of college football’s top newcomers in 2024, as he was named a semifinalist for the Shaan Alexander Freshman of the Year Award. On the season, Holstein completed 62% of his passes (180 of 291) for 2,228 yards and 17 touchdowns with seven interceptions. Holstein’s 17 TD passes tied with Alex Van Pelt (1989) for the most by a Pitt freshman.

Among all FBS freshmen, Holstein ranked third in passing yards per game (222.8 avg.) and total offense per game (255.6 avg.), while he was fifth in touchdown passes (17). Among Power 4 freshmen, he ranked first in passing yards and total offense per game and third in TD passes.

Bell earned his Pitt appointment after directing one of the country’s most explosive offenses at Western Carolina the three seasons prior to Pitt (2021-23).

In 2023, the Catamounts led the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) in total offense with an average of 504.1 yards per game. Additionally, WCU ranked third in passing offense (321.1 yards per game) and fourth in scoring (37.5 points per game).

Western Carolina paced the highly competitive Southern Conference in no fewer than eight offensive categories while setting school records for total yards (5,545) and passing touchdowns (33). Bell’s quarterback, Cole Gonzales, a finalist for the prestigious Walter Payton Award (most outstanding FCS offensive player), finished the regular season with an FCS-best 28 touchdown passes and sterling 166.40 efficiency rating (third in FCS).

In 52 career games as an offensive coordinator, Bell’s teams produced more than 500 yards 31 times (60%).

Prior to Western Carolina, Bell was the associate head coach and offensive coordinator at Tusculum University, where during the 2021 spring season his offense averaged 533.4 yards and 37.6 points per game en route to the South Atlantic Conference (SAC) title.

Bell worked for three seasons at Valdosta State (2016-18), elevating to offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. In his final season, the Blazers went 14-0 and claimed the NCAA Division II national championship. VSU averaged a national-best 52 points per game, breaking the NCAA Division II record for points in a season (728).

The Blazers led the nation in touchdown passes (50), yards per play (7.9), yards per rush (7.2) and points per play (an NCAA Division II-record 0.78). VSU’s average of 524 yards per game that season ranked fourth nationally.

Under Bell’s tutelage, quarterback Rogan Wells was the 2018 Gulf South Conference Offensive Player of the Year and a two-time runner-up for the Harlon Hill Trophy, presented to the most valuable NCAA Division II player. Wells threw for 3,078 yards and 38 touchdowns during the Blazers’ march to the 2018 title.

Bell’s additional experience includes one season (2019) at the University of South Florida as an offensive analyst.

Bell is the son of Kerwin Bell, the former Florida Gators quarterback and professional football player who is presently the head coach at Western Carolina. The elder Bell was also the head coach at Valdosta State (2016-18) and Jacksonville University (2007-15).

Kade was a four-year starting quarterback under his father at Jacksonville from 2011-15, producing 9,613 total yards and accounting for 93 touchdowns. He earned his bachelor’s degree in sports management from Jacksonville and also earned a master’s degree in public administration from Valdosta State in 2018.

Bell and his wife, Charlotte, have a daughter, Palmer, and a son, Beckett.

Under the coordination of Randy Bates, Pitt annually fields one of the nation's most aggressive and productive defenses.

The Panthers' trademarks have been a swarming pass rush and smothering run defense. Over the past six seasons (2019-24), Pitt has collected a combined 270.5 quarterback sacks, the highest total in the nation.

During that same span, the Panthers have finished in the nation's top 12 in rushing defense four times. Pitt fielded the ACC's top rushing defense four consecutive seasons from 2019-22. Bates' ball-hawking defense has also produced points on the scoreboard. Over the past four seasons (2021-24), the Panthers scored an ACC-best 16 defensive touchdowns, second nationally to only Ohio State (17).

During Bates' Pitt tenure, four defensive players have earned consensus All-America recognition, including linebacker Kyle Louis in 2024. Louis became the first sophomore defensive player at Pitt to earn First Team All-America since the legendary Hugh Green in 1978. He totaled 105 tackles, four interceptions, a forced fumble, 15.5 tackles for loss, 7.0 sacks, 27 pressures and nine QB hurries—a stat line that has only been recorded one other time in college football over the last decade.

In 2022, tackle Calijah Kancey was a unanimous All-American and additionally was selected the ACC Defensive Player of the Year. Kancey led the nation's interior defenders with 14.5 tackles for loss. He was selected in the first round of the 2023 NFL Draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. In 2020, the Panthers boasted college football's top defensive end duo in Patrick Jones II and Rashad Weaver. Both players were consensus All-Americans—the first time since 1977 that Pitt had two defensive players earn consensus status in the same season.

Additional Pitt defenders who earned national accolades under Bates include safety Erick Hallett II, a Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) second team All-American in 2022, and tackle Jaylen Twyman, a second-team All-America pick by six different selectors in 2019. Bates has also received prestigious recognition. He was named the 2020 Assistant Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA). The award is annually presented to an assistant coach who distinguishes himself through on-field performance and community impact.

Bates arrived in Pittsburgh in 2018 after spending the prior 12 seasons (2006-17) coaching linebackers at Northwestern. His accomplished pupils included back-to-back All-American linebackers, Anthony Walker Jr., now a member of the Miami Dolphins, was a consensus All-Big Ten selection who earned All-America accolades from Associated Press and Sports Illustrated. Additionally, Bates oversaw the development of Paddy Fisher, a 2017 FWAA Freshman All-American and the Big Ten Network's Defensive Freshman of the Year.

Prior to Northwestern, Bates spent six seasons at Louisiana Tech (2000-05). He coached nearly every defensive positional group while with the Bulldogs before ascending to defensive coordinator for his final season. Under Bates' orchestration in 2005, the Louisiana Tech defense forced a whopping 31 turnovers to lead the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) and rank ninth nationally. The Bulldogs surrendered their fewest points since 1994 and finished among the WAC's top three teams in rushing defense, pass defense, total defense and scoring defense.

Among the standouts under Bates at Louisiana Tech were three defensive backs who played in the NFL: safety Bobby Gray (Chicago Bears), cornerback Jerron WISHOM (Green Bay Packers) and cornerback Tramon Williams, who as a member of the Packers won a Super Bowl and earned a Pro Bowl invitation.

Before Louisiana Tech, Bates was the linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator at Kent State for two seasons (1998-99). While with the Golden Flashes, he coached future NFL Defensive Player of the Year James Harrison.

Bates coached the linebackers at New Hampshire from 1992-97, mentoring three players who finished among the top 10 career tacklers in program history. The Wildcats claimed three Yankee Conference Northern Division titles during his tenure.

Bates' additional coaching stops include Navy (1989-91), St. Joseph's (Ind.) College (1984-88), Miami (Ohio) (1983) and Muskingum College (1982). A retired Naval Lieutenant, Bates received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Ohio State in 1983. He also earned a master's degree in education from Miami University in 1985.

Additionally, he received recognition from SI.com, earning a spot on their second-team All-America Team, and was a Lou Groza Collegiate Place-Kicker Award Semifinalist. Sauls led the team in scoring with 107 points, achieved by converting 21 out of 24 field goals (87.5%) and all 44 extra points attempts. This exceptional performance earned him an invitation to the East-West Shrine Bowl and the 2025 NFL Combine. Sauls went on to be signed by the Pittsburgh Steelers as an undrafted rookie free agent.

On the offensive side, TE Gavin Bartholomew also had a standout season, earning Honorable Mention All-ACC honors. Under Bronowski's guidance, Bartholomew set personal bests in both receptions and touchdowns (tied). He also secured a spot at the prestigious Reese's Senior Bowl and was invited to the 2025 NFL Scouting Combine, en route to being selected by the Minnesota Vikings in the sixth round of the 2025 NFL Draft.

Bronowski spent the two seasons prior to Pitt at Miami as special teams coordinator and defensive assistant. His work in 2023 helped the RedHawks to an 11-3 overall record—including a 23-14 victory over Toledo in the MAC Championship Game—and invitation to the Cure Bowl. His special teams ranked first nationally in ESPN's 2023 efficiency ratings and finished the regular season leading the country with a 44.09 net punting average. The RedHawks finished second nationally in blocked kicks (six) and 14th in punt returns (12.46 avg.).

Under his tutelage, Graham Nicholson won the 2023 Lou Groza Award, annually presented to college football's top placekicker. A consensus All-American, Nicholson compiled a team-high 116 points, converting an impressive 96% of his field goal attempts (27 of 28).

Additionally, punter Alec Bevelhimer was a Ray Guy Award (nation's top punter) semifinalist, averaging a robust 45.0 yards per punt.

Bronowski earned some impressive accolades as well. He was named to the 247Sports All-Assistant Team, a 12-man roster of the best coordinators and position coaches from the 2023 season. He additionally was selected to participate in the prestigious American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) "35 Under 35" 2023 Coaches Leadership Institute.

Prior to Miami, Bronowski spent the 2021 season at Tennessee as special teams analyst. The Volunteers featured Velus Jones Jr., who led the SEC and ranked second nationally with a 15.1-yard punt return average and was named the SEC's Co-Special Teams Player of the Year. Jones is now a member of the Chicago Bears.

As a team, the 2021 Volunteers boasted national top-25 rankings in punt return defense (sixth), kickoff return average (12th), punt return average (14th) and net punting (21st).

In 2020, Bronowski was a special teams quality control assistant at UCF, where he worked with Alex Ward, a finalist for the Patrick Mannelly Award (nation's top long snapper), who is now a member of the Los Angeles Rams.

During the 2018-19 seasons, Bronowski was the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at nearby Robert Morris University. Under his guidance, the 2019 Colonials ranked 11th nationally in blocked punts (three), while leading the Northeast Conference in punt return defense, blocked punts and kickoff return defense in NEC play. Individually, he tutored All-America tight end Matthew Gonzalez and All-NEC placekicker Nick Bisceglia.

Bronowski began his coaching career at New Mexico, his alma mater. A quarterback during the 2013 season, he became a student assistant (2014-15) and then a graduate assistant (2016-17) for the Lobos. In addition to special teams, he also worked with the Lobos' quarterbacks and wide receivers.

New Mexico advanced to consecutive bowls (2015-16), winning the 2016 Gildan New Mexico Bowl over UTSA, the Lobos' first bowl victory in 10 years. During the 2017 campaign, New Mexico earned top-10 national rankings in punting average (second), kickoff return defense (fourth) and net punting (eighth).

Bronowski worked with future NFL standouts in placekicker Jason Sanders (Miami Dolphins) and Corey Bojorquez (Cleveland Browns) at New Mexico.

A native of College Station, Texas, Bronowski earned his bachelor's degree in liberal studies from New Mexico in 2016. He and his wife, Stacey, have two sons, Brody and Baker.



ARCHIE COLLINS

SECONDARY / CORNERBACKS

Vital to the success of Pitt's nationally ranked defense has been ball-hawking cornerbacks coached by Archie Collins.

Collins has coached 17 defensive backs who have gone on to the NFL. That number includes 2024 Las Vegas Raiders draft pick M.J. Devonshire and Super Bowl LIX champion A.J. Woods.

An All-ACC cornerback, Devonshire played in the prestigious East-West Shrine Bowl. He led the ACC in pass breakups (1.17 per game; 10 total) and interception return yards (115), while ranking second in interceptions (0.33 per game; four total) in 2023.

Woods also received an East-West Shrine Bowl invitation. He played in 59 games during his college career and was responsible for one of the most memorable plays in recent Pitt history: a 73-yard interception return against Wake Forest that spurred the Panthers to victory in the 2021 ACC Championship Game.

Damarri Mathis was another lockdown corner for Pitt's ACC champion squad, earning an invite to the Senior Bowl. Selected by the Denver Broncos in the 2022 NFL Draft, Mathis has been a prominent contributor his initial two professional seasons.

Collins' additional Pitt pupils in the NFL include Dane Jackson (Carolina Panthers) and Jason Pinnock (New York Giants).

Prior to Pitt, Collins spent five seasons at Central Michigan (2013-17). Serving as defensive pass game coordinator in 2017, his influence helped the Chippewas lead the Mid-American Conference in interceptions (19), turnovers gained (31), fewest passing yards allowed (185.5 yards per game) and pass efficiency defense (108.8 rating).

On a national scale, CMU ranked third in turnovers gained (No. 1 for regular season), sixth in pass efficiency defense, seventh in interceptions (No. 1 for regular season) and 20th in passing defense. FootballScoop named Collins a finalist for its 2017 Defensive Back Coach of the Year award.

Two of Collins' Central Michigan defensive backs, cornerback Amari Coleman and safety Josh Cox, were 2017 All-MAC honorees. Coleman was a first-team selection for the second consecutive season and finished his collegiate career with three interceptions returned for touchdowns. Cox intercepted six passes as a senior to finish seventh in the nation (0.5 INTs per game).

Under Collins' tutelage, Coleman and Cox both earned CMU's Defensive MVP award during their careers.

Additionally, corner Sean Bunting had five interceptions during that 2017 season. Bunting was a second-round selection by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the 2019 NFL Draft.

During Collins' tenure, Central Michigan ranked among the nation's top 25 in passing defense three times: 2017, 2015 (No. 24, 193.0 avg.) and 2013 (No. 20, 203.9 avg.). In 2016, CMU finished eighth nationally with four defensive touchdowns—all pick-sixes by Collins' defensive backs.

Also under his watch at CMU was Kavon Frazier, an All-MAC safety in 2015 who was drafted by the Dallas Cowboys. Collins was also highly productive on the recruiting trail at Central Michigan. In 2015, he was named the MAC's Recruiter of the Year by Scout.com.

In 2014, Collins participated in an NFL Coaching Fellowship with the Detroit Lions under head coach Jim Caldwell.

Prior to Central Michigan, the Detroit native was a defensive graduate assistant from 2010-12 at Michigan State, his alma mater. It was during this coaching assistantship that he first met Pat Narduzzi, who was the Spartans' defensive coordinator at the time.

In addition to contributing to one of college football's elite defensive units, Collins worked daily with future NFL defensive backs Darqueze Dennard, Kurtis Drummond and Trae Waynes. Collins also helped with the special teams during his time in East Lansing.

Collins spent nine years coaching high school football in the Detroit Public School League. He worked at three PSL schools (Cass Tech, Mackenzie and Southeastern), producing nine all-state performers and 28 all-city honorees.

A safety at Michigan State, Collins finished his career as a two-year letterman (1996-97) for the Spartans.

He graduated from Michigan State in 1998 with a bachelor's degree in finance. Collins went on to earn a master's degree in kinesiology and coaching from MSU in 2011.

He and his wife, Brandi, have three children: son Archie IV and daughters Amber and BellaRose.

TIM DAOUST

DEFENSIVE LINE

Tim Daoust, who boasts more than two decades of coaching experience in the college ranks, enters his second season as defensive line coach at Pitt.

Daoust (pronounced DOWST) played a pivotal role in helping the Panthers produce the ACC's second-best rushing defense (112.8) last season. The defense also collected the sixth-most sacks in the nation (40.5) and the second most in the conference.

Daoust arrived in Pittsburgh after spending the previous three seasons at East Carolina (2021-23), where he was special teams coordinator and also coached defensive ends and outside linebackers.

His Pitt appointment marked a return to the ACC. He previously worked at Syracuse for five seasons (2011-15), coaching the Orange's defensive line before elevating to assistant head coach and special teams coordinator.

While at East Carolina, Daoust's work was a major factor in the Pirates' increased production on the defensive side of the ball. The 2023 ECU defense finished 17th nationally in tackles for loss, averaging 7.0 per contest. The Pirates also boasted a top-30 rushing defense in each of the past two campaigns, ranking 18th in 2022 and 29th in 2023.

Daoust was the assistant head coach and oversaw the defensive line at Sam Houston State for two years (2019-20). His defensive front helped the Bearkats lead the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) in rush defense (69.9 yards per game), third-down defense (27.9%) and tackles for loss (10.9 per game) in 2019.

Daoust also had two stints at Western Michigan. He was defensive coordinator from 2017-18 after working with the defensive line (2006) and secondary (2007-09) during his initial tenure. His efforts helped the Broncos produce some of the best defenses in the Mid-American Conference.

He spent the 2016 season as defensive coordinator at Ball State, assisting with a complete rebuild as the Cardinals became the most-improved defense in the MAC that season.

During his Syracuse tenure, Daoust mentored two of Syracuse's most accomplished defensive linemen in recent memory: Chandler Jones, a first-round pick by the New England Patriots in 2012, and Jay Bromley, a third-round selection by the New York Giants in 2013.

Jones, a two-time first-team All-Big East selection, would earn four Pro Bowl nods in the NFL.

Syracuse earned a share of the 2012 Big East championship and defeated West Virginia, 38-14, in the Pinstripe Bowl. The 2013 Orange defeated Minnesota, 21-17, in the Texas Bowl.

Syracuse was the only team during the 2013 season to not allow a 100-yard rusher and earned top-25 national rankings in third-down defense (15th), sacks (18th), TFLs (18th) and rush defense (24th).

Daoust's additional coaching appointments include Central Michigan (defensive line, 2010) and Illinois State (cornerbacks, 2004). He held graduate assistantships at Northern Illinois (2002-03) and Cincinnati (2005), working with Pat Narduzzi at both stops.

A native of Toledo, Ohio, Daoust played football at Ohio's Wittenberg University from 1998-2001, collecting nearly 30 sacks as a defensive end and serving as a two-time team captain for the Tigers.

He earned his bachelor's degree in history from Wittenberg in 2001.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Jeremy Darveau enters his second season as offensive line coach at Pitt in 2025.

In his first season with the Panthers, Darveau's offensive line led the way for RB Desmond Reid to rush for a team-high 962 yards and five touchdowns on 183 carries (5.3 avg.) en route to second team All-American in the all-purpose category by no fewer than six outlets (Associated Press, CBS Sports, ESPN, Football Writers Association of America, Phil Steele and The Athletic). Additionally, Darveau saw OL Branson Taylor earn a trip to the 2025 NFL Combine and be selected by the Los Angeles Chargers in the sixth round of the 2025 NFL Draft.

While at Western Carolina the two seasons prior to Pitt (2022-23), his fronts proved vital for one of college football's most explosive offenses.

During his 16-year collegiate coaching career, Darveau has developed 13 All-Americans, 10 NFL offensive linemen and more than 35 all-conference players.

A former lineman himself, Darveau was a starting offensive tackle for a pair of nationally ranked Louisville teams (2004-05) that featured some of the best offenses in school history.

At Western Carolina, he oversaw the development of All-America offensive tackles Christian Coulter and Tyler Smith, both viable NFL Draft prospects. The 2023 Catawampus led the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) in total offense with an average of 504.1 yards per game. WCU led the Southern Conference in nearly every offensive category, including rushing yards per game (182.9 avg.) and rushing yards per carry (5.6 avg.). Darveau's offensive front gave up just seven sacks in conference play.

Prior to WCU, Darveau was the offensive line coach and run game coordinator at Southern Mississippi (2021). He held those same responsibilities during stints at Missouri State (2020) and USF (2019).

From 2015-18, Darveau oversaw the offensive line at NCAA Division II power Valdosta State. In his final season, the Blazers went 14-0 and claimed the NCAA Division II national championship.

VSU averaged a national-best 52 points per game in 2018, breaking the NCAA Division II record for points in a season (728). Additionally, the Blazers paced the nation in touchdown passes (50), yards per play (7.9), yards per rush (7.2) and points per play (an NCAA Division II-record 0.78). VSU's average of 524 yards per game that season ranked fourth nationally.

Under Darveau's tutelage, Jeremy King established himself as one of the most decorated offensive linemen in Valdosta State history. King was a first team All-American and runner-up for the prestigious Gene Upshaw Award, presented to the most outstanding NCAA Division II lineman.

Darveau spent the 2014 season in the Southeastern Conference as an offensive line assistant at Florida, where he worked with tackles D. J. Humphries, a first-round NFL Draft selection of the Arizona Cardinals, and Trent Brown, a former Pro Bowler who in 2019 became the highest-compensated offensive lineman in the NFL.

Darveau's first coaching appointment was at Southwest Minnesota State, where he served in a series of increasingly elevated roles with the Division II program from 2008-13. He served as an offensive graduate assistant for two seasons (2008-09) before earning a promotion to offensive line coach and run game coordinator (2010-12). He was elevated to offensive coordinator for the 2013 season and was integral in the Mustangs earning their first bowl invitation in program history.

During his tenure, Southwest Minnesota State set more than 40 school offensive records and seven Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference (NSIC) marks.

As an offensive tackle for Louisville, Darveau helped the Cardinals to a 20-4 record over his final two collegiate seasons.

In 2004, Louisville went 11-1, including a 44-40 Liberty Bowl victory over Boise State, to finish No. 6 in the final Associated Press poll. The Cardinals led the country in total offense that season, averaging 539 yards per game.

In 2005, Louisville went 9-3, earned a Gator Bowl invite and finished with a No. 19 ranking. The Cardinals averaged 482.1 yards that season, the ninth highest average in the country.

Darveau went on to play professionally with the Amsterdam Admirals in NFL Europe and the Tampa Bay Storm in the Arena Football League.

A native of Hilton Head Island, S.C., Darveau earned a bachelor's degree in sociology from Louisville (2005) and master's degree in business administration from Southwest Minnesota State (2010). He is married to the former Erin Lashley, who played softball at Ohio University. They have a son, Jackson.

LINDSEY LAMAR

RUNNING BACKS

Lindsey Lamar, a former collegiate standout at USF who played professionally in the Canadian Football League, enters his second season as running backs coach at Pitt.

In 2024, Lamar played a pivotal role in helping running back Desmond Reid achieve arguably the most significant breakout performance in college football. Last year, Reid amassed an impressive 966 rushing yards, 579 receiving yards, and 159 punt return yards, all while scoring a total of 10 touchdowns. His remarkable achievements were widely recognized, earning him All-American honors from at least six esteemed outlets, including the Associated Press, CBS Sports, ESPN, Football Writers Association of America, Phil Steele, and The Athletic.

Lamar joined the Panthers in January 2024 after spending the previous four years (2020-23) at Howard University. Serving as offensive coordinator in 2023, he helped the Bison to a second consecutive Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) championship and the program's first-ever berth in the Cricket Celebration Bowl.

Prior to Lamar's tenure, Howard had not claimed a MEAC football title since 1993.

Lamar additionally participated in two NFL coaching fellowships, working with the Pittsburgh Steelers and Green Bay Packers during the 2023 offseason.

Lamar's positional focus at Howard was on the wide receivers. Under his tutelage, Kasey Hawthorne (2023) and Antoine Murray (2022) earned first-team All-MEAC honors.

Prior to Howard, Lamar spent four years at his alma mater, USF, in varied capacities. During the 2015-16 seasons, he was an offensive graduate assistant for the Bulls. In 2017, he was named special assistant to head coach Charlie Strong before being promoted to offensive quality control analyst for the 2019 campaign.

Lamar was a four-year letterman at USF from 2009-12. As a sophomore in 2010, he set the USF record for kickoff return yards (903) and was named Big East Special Teams Player of the Year. Lamar averaged 26.6 yards per kick return that season, returning two for touchdowns (a school-record 100-yarder at Louisville and 94 yards vs. Syracuse).

Lamar was also a track standout at USF, winning the Big East indoor 60-meters championship and running a leg on the Bulls' school record-setting outdoor 400-meter relay team.

In 2013, he played professionally for the CFL's Hamilton Tiger-Cats. Making his CFL debut against the Toronto Argonauts, he had a 104-yard kickoff return touchdown on his very first touch.

A native of Tampa, Fla., Lamar graduated from USF in 2012 with a bachelor's degree in communication. He and his wife, Akema, have three daughters: Kalani, Kylee and Lindsay.

WIDE RECEIVERS

JJ Laster, whose pass catchers have helped fuel some of college football's most prolific offenses, enters his second season as wide receivers coach at Pitt.

In 2024, Laster helped WR Konata Mumpfield earn Honorable Mention All-ACC after compiling 52 receptions for 813 yards (15.6 avg.) and five touchdowns. Mumpfield also earned himself a trip to the East-West Shrine Bowl and the 2025 NFL Combine under Laster's guidance. Mumpfield went on to be selected by the Los Angeles Rams in the seventh round of the 2025 NFL Draft.

Laster joined the Pitt coaching staff from Old Dominion and spent three full seasons (2021-23) as wide receivers coach at Western Carolina, where he worked with new Pitt offensive coordinator Kade Bell.

In 2023, the Catamounts led the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) in total offense with an average of 504.1 yards per game. Additionally, WCU ranked third in passing offense (321.1 yards per game) and fourth in scoring (37.5 points per game).

Under Laster's tutelage at WCU, David White Jr. developed into a viable 2024 NFL Draft prospect and made strong impressions at the prestigious East-West Shrine Bowl and Hula Bowl all-star games. Moreover, Censer Lee was an All-Southern Conference performer, compiling 82 receptions for 1,426 yards (17.4 avg.) and 14 touchdowns over two seasons.

Prior to WCU, Laster served as running backs and tight ends coach at Gardner-Webb in 2019. He coached three All-Big South Conference players: running back Jaylin Cagle, who rushed for 930 yards and eight touchdowns; all-purpose dynamo Devon Harper, an FCS Freshman All-American who compiled 1,600 all-purpose yards; and tight end AJ Alexander, who was a major strength in the run and pass games for the Runnin' Bulldogs.

From 2016-18, Laster coached at Tusculum University. He initially oversaw the Pioneers' running backs for one season before shifting to wide receivers for his final two years. Laster also served as the program's recruiting coordinator.

Laster himself was an outstanding collegiate running back and return specialist at Jacksonville University (2008-11). He twice earned All-Pioneer Football League (PFL) honors, while compiling more than 2,400 scrimmage yards and scoring 21 touchdowns for his career.

In 2010, Laster paced the entire FCS with an average of 8.5 yards per rush, netting 810 yards on just 95 carries. He was part of two PFL championships (2008 and 2010) during his Jacksonville playing career.

Laster's coaching path began at Florida's Allen D. Nease High School, where he worked with the running backs (2012-13). He returned to Jacksonville University for the 2014-15 seasons as a defensive graduate assistant with a positional focus on the linebackers.

Laster earned two degrees from Jacksonville: a bachelor's in geography (2012) and master's in leadership and learning (2015).

He and his wife, Rodricka, have a son: Jesse James Laster III.

Ryan Manalac, a former standout collegiate linebacker at Cincinnati, enters his fifth season as Pitt's linebackers coach.

Manalac's arrival at Pitt served as a reunion with Pat Narduzzi. The pair previously worked together when Narduzzi was defensive coordinator at Cincinnati and Michigan State. Manalac's linebacker unit has been instrumental for a Pitt defense that annually ranks among the nation's stingiest. He has also produced some highly productive and decorated individual players.

Last season, Manalac helped guide linebacker Kyle Louis to arguably the nation's most versatile defensive campaign of the year. Louis became the first sophomore defensive player at Pitt to earn First Team All-America since the legendary Hugh Green in 1978. He totaled 105 tackles, four interceptions, a forced fumble, 15.5 tackles for loss, 7.0 sacks, 27 pressures and nine QB hurries—a stat line that has only been recorded one other time in college football over the last decade. Additionally, linebacker Rasheem Biles totaled 77 tackles, 14.5 tackles for loss, 5.5 sacks and an interception (returned for a touchdown) in the regular season, with his average of 1.3 TFLs per game ranking 10th nationally. Biles was selected All-ACC (second team by Associated Press and third team by conference voting panel).

Moreover, Manalac saw linebacker Brandon George earn a contract with the Kansas City Chiefs as an undrafted rookie free agent following the 2025 NFL Draft. In 2022, linebacker SirVocea Dennis had an impressive senior campaign, leading the team in tackles (94) and forced fumbles (tied with two), while ranking second in tackles for loss (12) and sacks (seven). Dennis earned first team All-ACC and was a third team Pro Football Focus All-American. A Senior Bowl invitee, he was selected by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the 2023 NFL Draft and enjoyed an impact rookie year for the NFC South champs.

Prior to Pitt, Manalac spent two years as defensive coordinator at Bucknell, which had its 2020 season cancelled due to the pandemic. In 2019, Bucknell's defense ranked among the very best in Patriot League play, finishing first in sacks (32), turnovers gained (14) and defensive touchdowns (four). The Bison ranked second in total defense (319.7 avg.) and rushing defense (96.3 avg.). Manalac's unit produced six total defensive TDs to lead the Football Championship Subdivision. The Bison's 37 overall sacks ranked fifth nationally.

He also coached the Bucknell linebackers and had three players named to Phil Steele's All-Patriot League team, including first-team selection Simeon Page, who paced the Bison in sacks (nine) and tackles for loss (12.5).

Manalac was the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Ohio Dominican University during the 2017 and 2018 seasons. During that two-year span, ODU surrendered just 15.9 points per game in conference play, the lowest average in the Great Midwest Athletic Conference. Ten Ohio Dominican defensive players earned first team all-conference under his watch. Linebacker Ross Thompson was named the G-MAC Defensive Player of the Year after compiling a school-record 110 tackles. Thompson finished his career as ODU's all-time tackles leader with 294 stops.

Manalac earned his first full-time coaching appointment in 2016 at Valparaiso, overseeing the linebackers.

At Michigan State from 2011-15, Manalac served as a graduate assistant on both sides of the ball and also worked with special teams, recruiting and video. During his tenure, the Spartans achieved four Top 10 finishes, four bowl victories, two Big Ten championships and a berth in the 2015 College Football Playoff. Manalac worked directly under Narduzzi with Michigan State's defense during the 2012 and 2014 seasons. At the conclusion of each of those campaigns, the Spartans ranked among college football's finest defensive units. The 2014 team won the Rose Bowl and finished with an 11-2 record behind a defense that led the nation in fewest rushing yards allowed (88.5 avg.) and finished eighth in fewest total yards allowed (315.8 avg.).

Initially a walk-on at Cincinnati, Manalac would earn a scholarship and four letters for the Bearcats. He compiled nearly 200 tackles during his career and was a starting linebacker his final two seasons. As a senior, he collected a team-high 82 stops to help Cincinnati win the 2008 Big East title and advance to the Orange Bowl. Manalac, who was honored with Cincinnati's prestigious C-Club Strothman Award for academic and athletic excellence, went on to sign with the Buffalo Bills.

A native of Pickerington, Ohio, Manalac and his wife, Carly, have two children: daughter Bailey and son Lewis. He earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from Cincinnati (2008) and additionally owns a master's degree in kinesiology from Michigan State (2012).



MICHAEL STACCHIOTTI

HEAD STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH

Michael Stacchiotti, described by Pat Narduzzi as a “passionate and highly disciplined professional,” enters his sixth year as Pitt’s head strength and conditioning coach.

Stacchiotti’s blueprint for the Panthers’ physical development has been a vital factor in many of the program’s greatest successes in recent years, including seven first team All-Americans, multiple Top 25 finishes and the 2021 ACC championship.

The road to gridiron greatness begins in “The Pitt Iron Works”—the football program’s state-of-the-art weight training facility—where Stacchiotti and his staff maximize the athletic potential of each player and positional group.

A native of Youngstown, Ohio, Stacchiotti (pronounced stack-e-ought-e) joined Pitt from the National Football League, where he was the assistant strength and conditioning coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

As part of the Buccaneers staff in 2019, Stacchiotti helped oversee the physical development of three Pro Bowlers: outside linebacker Shaq Barrett (who led the NFL with 19.5 sacks) and wide receivers Mike Evans and Chris Godwin. Additionally, Bucs starting safety Jordan Whitehead, a former Pitt standout, was a beneficiary of Stacchiotti’s training.

Prior to Tampa Bay, Stacchiotti served on the football strength and conditioning staffs at Mississippi State (2018), Cincinnati (2017) and Colorado State (2015-16). His initial collegiate appointment was as a strength and conditioning intern at Mississippi State in 2015.

Stacchiotti additionally worked as a strength coach in the Ohio prep ranks at Girard High School and Ursuline High School, Narduzzi’s alma mater.

Stacchiotti is a 2014 graduate of Baldwin Wallace University with a bachelor’s degree in exercise science and orthopedic assessment and treatment. He was a three-year football letterman at Baldwin Wallace, playing linebacker and fullback, and captained the team as a senior.

Stacchiotti additionally owns a master’s degree in adult education and training specialization.

Chris LaSala enters his 29th season as a member of the University of Pittsburgh's football staff. LaSala is in his 10th year as an associate athletic director for football administration.

In total, he has been part of 20 bowl teams and three conference championships, including the 2021 ACC champions. LaSala has personally worked with 18 first team All-Americans, 10 players who won prestigious national awards and seven NFL Draft first-round picks at Pitt.

Owning a well-earned reputation as one of the nation's finest football administrators, LaSala was appointed to the 2022 College Football Playoff Advisory Group, which provides insight and direction on the management and logistics of the CFP National Championship.

His influence at Pitt resonates throughout the entire athletic department. LaSala is an important member of Pitt's sport administration team, providing valuable insight and direction that impacts each of the Panthers' athletic programs. LaSala additionally was a key author of *The Strategic Plan for Pitt Athletics*.

One of Pitt's longest tenured administrators, LaSala joined the Panthers in 1997 as director of football operations. He was named an assistant athletic director in 2000, serving in that capacity until his promotion to associate athletic director in 2016.

LaSala has handled a wide variety of responsibilities with the Pitt football program over the years, including team travel accommodations, youth summer camps, coaching clinics and preseason training camp arrangements as well as daily administration. He also serves as the football program's liaison to numerous campus offices and within the athletic department.

One of LaSala's most impactful contributions at Pitt is his daily work with student-athletes in preparing them for life after college. His efforts have made the football program one of Pitt's most active and enthusiastic teams when it comes to community service. In 2021-22, Pitt led all college football programs in community service hours per Helper Helper.

LaSala has been a driving force behind the dramatic upgrades within Pitt's practice facility over the past several years. Those enhancements include a new team meeting room, locker room, athletic training room, player lounge and staff conference room. He has also been a creative influence for various graphic displays showcasing the Panthers' rich football history.

LaSala has been a primary planner for Pitt's trips to the Sun Bowl (2008, 2018 and 2022), Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl (2021), Quick Lane Bowl (2019), Pinstripe Bowl (2016), Military Bowl (2015), Armed Forces Bowl (2014), Little Caesars Pizza Bowl (2013), BBVA Compass Bowl (2010-12), Meineke Car Care Bowl (2009), Fiesta Bowl (2004), Continental Tire Bowl (2003), Insight Bowl (2000 and 2002), Tangerine Bowl (2001) and Liberty Bowl (1997).

LaSala was a member of the Beaver County Sports Hall of Fame 2014 induction class. He is a past recipient of the prestigious Chancellor's Award for Staff Excellence in service to the University of Pittsburgh. LaSala has also been recognized as an Outstanding Graduate of Temple University's sport and recreation management program.

LaSala's career in athletics began at Temple, where he served as a graduate assistant. He then came to the University of Pittsburgh as an athletic department intern in 1989.

Prior to his 1997 Pitt appointment, he served three years as the director of football operations at Boston College (1994-96), where he handled all football administrative duties, including overseeing the travel arrangements and organizing BC's youth camps. During his tenure, the Eagles captured the 1994 Aloha Bowl and participated in the 1995 Kickoff Classic.

Before Boston College, LaSala spent four years at Temple in administration (1990-93) and ultimately was elevated to assistant athletic director. He initially joined Temple as a graduate assistant in 1988 and returned to the Owls' staff in 1990 as the administrative assistant.

LaSala graduated from West Virginia in 1988 with a bachelor's degree in accounting. He earned his master's degree in sports administration from Temple in 1991. He is currently a leadership and development committee member for the Western Pennsylvania and West Virginia Chapter of The Leukemia and Lymphoma Society.

Acrisure Stadium hosted the largest crowd in Pittsburgh sports history as 70,622 fans witnessed the epic return of the Backyard Brawl on Sept. 1, 2022 after an 11-year hiatus. Pitt defeated West Virginia, 38-31.



RATING SYSTEMS

To settle arguments, *Sports Illustrated* in 1967 researched the first and only complete and wholly accurate list ever compiled of college football's mythical national champions. Every recognized authority that ever presumed to name a No. 1 was included:

Associated Press (1936-current): Poll of sportswriters and broadcasters from across the nation.

Parke H. Davis Ratings (1889-1935): Chosen by Davis, a player at Princeton in 1889 and a former coach at Wisconsin, Amherst and Lafayette, and first published in the 1934 Spalding's Football Guide.

Dickinson System (1924-40): Chosen by University of Illinois economics professor Frank G. Dickinson; based on system that awarded various point totals for wins over teams with winning or non-winning records.

Dunkel System (1929-current): A power index rating system devised by Dick Dunkel and syndicated to newspapers around the nation.

Football Writers Association of America (1954-current): Chosen by a panel representing membership.

Helms First Interstate Bank Athletic Foundation (1889-1982): Originally founded in 1936 as Helms Athletic Foundation and changed in the early 1970s to Citizens Savings Athletic Foundation before the most recent name was adopted in 1981.

Illustrated Football Annual (1924-41): An "azzi ratem" system published in this highly regarded magazine by William F. Board.

Litkenhous System (1934-1984): A "difference-by-score" method syndicated by Fred Litkenhouse and his brother Edward.

National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame (1959-1995): Chosen annually by committee representing membership.

The Football Thesaurus (1927-58): System devised by Duke Houghgate and published in book of same title.

United Press International (1950-1995): Poll of 35 college coaches that became the *USA TODAY* coaches poll.

Williamson System (1932-63): System of syndicated power ratings chosen by Paul Williamson, a geologist and member of the Sugar Bowl committee.

The Bowl Championship Series (BCS) (1998-2013): Determined a national champion by matching the country's two top-rated teams in the BCS Standings against each other in a title game.

College Football Playoff (2014-current): For the 11th consecutive season, the Football Bowl Subdivision will utilize a playoff format to determine the national champion. From 2014-23, a selection committee choose four playoff teams based on their performance during the regular season. For the second consecutive season, the College Football Playoff (CFP) will feature 12 teams competing for the national title, with the field comprised of the top five conference champions in the committee's final rankings and seven at-large teams. The four highest-ranked conference champions will be seeded 1-4 and receive a first-round bye. The remaining teams, including the fifth conference champion, will be seeded 5-12 based on their final ranking. The 2026 CFP National Championship Game will be played on Jan. 19 at Hard Rock Stadium in Miami, Fla.

Pitt's Aaron Donald, who went on to become a three-time NFL Defensive Player of the Year, was the most decorated defensive player in college football in 2013.

Pitt tailback Tony Dorsett was selected as the winner of the Heisman Trophy in 1976, the same season he led the Panthers to the national title with a 12-0 record. While Dorsett is Pitt's lone winner of the Heisman, the Panthers have had nine total top-five finishers in the final balloting.

Pitt players have also finished in the top 10 of the Heisman voting 15 times.

10 HALL OF FAMERS

PITT'S 10 PRO HALL OF FAMERS RANK FOURTH AMONG ALL COLLEGES

Pitt ranks fourth among all colleges with 10 Pro Football Hall of Famers. Cornerback Darrelle Revis, who received enshrinement in August 2023, is the most recent Panther to make his way to Canton.

Only five schools have produced at least 10 Pro Football Hall of Famers. In addition to Pitt, the others are Notre Dame (14), Southern California (14), Michigan (11) and Ohio State (10).

Pitt's Hall of Fame pipeline won't end anytime soon with highly accomplished players like Aaron Donald, Larry Fitzgerald, LeSean McCoy and Ruben Brown among others expecting a Canton call.

PITT IN THE PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

JIMBO COVERT was called to Canton as part of the special 20-member Centennial Class of 2020 commemorating the NFL's 100th season. The sixth-overall pick in 1983 by the Chicago Bears, Covert earned consensus All-Rookie recognition and spearheaded a Bears' attack that led the NFL in rushing yards in four consecutive seasons (1983-86), with Walter Payton calling Covert, "the best offensive tackle in the NFL." He was a vital part of Chicago's famed 1985 team that went 15-1 and demolished New England in Super Bowl XX, 46-10. A four-time All-Pro, Covert played eight seasons in Chicago and was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1980s.

The fourth-overall pick in 1985 by the Minnesota Vikings, **CHRIS DOLEMAN** played 15 seasons in the NFL and holds status as one of the most productive pass rushers of all time. Doleman was an eight-time Pro Bowler, earning six berths as a member of the Vikings and one each as a member of the Atlanta Falcons and San Francisco 49ers. He was a first team All-Pro three times and was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1990s. Upon his retirement in 1999, Doleman's 150.5 career sacks ranked fourth in league history. He was enshrined in 2012.

MIKE DITKA became the first tight end elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame when he received enshrinement in 1988. Chicago's No. 1 draft pick in 1961, Ditka had a 12-year career for the Bears (1961-66), Philadelphia Eagles (1967-68) and Dallas Cowboys (1969-72). The 1961 NFL Rookie of the Year, he was All-NFL each of his first four years and made the Pro Bowl his first five seasons. He was part of Chicago's 1963 NFL title team and the Cowboys' 1971 squad that won Super Bowl VI. Ditka then spent 11 seasons as Chicago's head coach (winning Super Bowl XX) and spent three seasons as head coach of the New Orleans Saints.

When **TONY DORSETT** retired from the NFL after 12 seasons (1977-88), he was the league's second all-time leading rusher with 12,739 yards. He became the first player to win the Heisman Trophy, a collegiate national championship and a Super Bowl, and make the Hall of Fame on both the college and pro levels. Taken by the Dallas Cowboys second overall in 1977, he topped 1,000 yards in eight of his first nine seasons and played in two Super Bowls (helping Dallas win Super Bowl XII) and four Pro Bowls. Dorsett received his "Canton Call" in 1994.

A third-round draft choice of Washington in 1981, **RUSS GRIMM** went on to start 11 seasons (1981-91) for the famed "Hogs," which included another Pitt great, Mark May. The dominating offensive front helped lead Washington to four Super Bowl appearances, including victories in Super Bowls XVII, XXII and XXVI. He was voted to four Pro Bowls (1983-86) and was named to the 1980s All-Decade Team. Grimm received his induction in 2010.

A 1981 second-round draft pick by New Orleans, **RICKY JACKSON** spent 15 seasons in the NFL (1981-95) as one of the most disruptive defenders in the game. Upon his retirement, he ranked third all-time in sacks (128), second in fumble recoveries (28) and fourth in forced fumbles (41). Jackson made six trips to the Pro Bowl and was first team All-Pro four times. He helped elevate the Saints from doormat to contender and his final two seasons were played in San Francisco as he helped the 49ers to a victory in Super Bowl XXIX. Jackson was called to Canton in 2010.

When he finished his legendary 17-year career with the Miami Dolphins, **DAN MARINO** was by far the most prolific passer in NFL history. Upon retirement, Marino held an incredible 25 NFL records and was the career leader in pass attempts (8,358), completions (4,967), yardage (61,361) and touchdowns (420). Miami's first-round pick in 1983, Marino earned NFL Rookie of the Year. He also was one of the NFL's winningest quarterbacks, earning 147 regular-season victories. A nine-time Pro Bowler and eight-time All-Pro, Marino was enshrined in Canton in 2005.

A third-round draft selection of New England in 1995, **CURTIS MARTIN** spent three years with the Patriots (1995-97) before joining the New York Jets (1998-2006). At the time of his retirement, he ranked fourth all-time among NFL rushers with an astonishing 14,101 yards. Martin was only the second player to begin his career with 10 consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons. In 2004, he was the NFL rushing champion with 1,697 yards. Martin was named to the Pro Bowl five times and All-Pro three times. He was inducted into Canton in 2012.

Dubbed "Revis Island" for his lockdown cornerback play, **DARRELLE REVIS** became Pitt's 10th Pro Football Hall of Fame member in the Class of 2023. Going 14th overall to the New York Jets in 2007, Revis played 11 NFL seasons, making seven Pro Bowls and earning All-Pro four times. When teams dared to challenge him, Revis made them pay, tallying 29 interceptions, defending 139 passes and recovering 12 fumbles. The Aliquippa native won Super Bowl XLIX with the New England Patriots and also played for Tampa Bay and Kansas City over his 145 career games.

JOE SCHMIDT became the gold standard for NFL middle linebackers during his 13-year career (1953-65) with the Detroit Lions. A seventh-round draft pick, Schmidt earned All-Pro 10 times, played in 10 Pro Bowls (tied for a Lions record) and was named to the 1950s All-Decade Team. He served as team captain for nine seasons and totaled 24 career interceptions. The Lions won two NFL titles during Schmidt's career. He later coached the team for six seasons, leading Detroit to its only playoff appearance of the 1970s. Schmidt was inducted in 1973.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

In 2024, Larry Fitzgerald became the 25th man associated with Pitt to be elected into the College Football Hall of Fame. Eligibility requirements for players: must be at least 10 years past graduation date and cannot presently be playing professional football.

In 2024, Pitt and NFL great Larry Fitzgerald was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame. Fitzgerald, a 2003 unanimous All-American for the Panthers, became the 25th man associated with the University of Pittsburgh to be selected by the National Football Foundation for enshrinement in the Hall of Fame in Atlanta.

WIDE RECEIVER | 2002-03

- Named the 2003 Walter Camp Player of the Year, becoming the first sophomore to earn that prestigious honor, and also won the Biletnikoff Award as the country's top receiver. Was a unanimous first-team All-American, becoming the first Pitt sophomore to be selected unanimously.
- Was the 2003 Heisman Trophy runner-up, finishing behind Oklahoma quarterback Jason White by just 128 points. Fitzgerald carried three voting regions, an unprecedented achievement for a sophomore. It was the highest Heisman finish by a wide receiver since Michigan's Desmond Howard won the award in 1991.
- Compiled 92 catches for 1,672 yards (18.2 avg.) and 22 touchdowns in 2003, leading the nation in receiving yards per game (128.62 avg.) and TD catches.
- In just 28 collegiate games, Fitzgerald totaled 161 catches for 2,677 yards (16.6 avg.) and a Pitt-record 34 touchdowns.
- His freshman season he had 69 catches for 1,005 yards (14.6 avg.) and 12 TDs. Fitzgerald was the first player in Pitt history to compile multiple 1,000-yard receiving seasons.
- Caught a touchdown in 18 consecutive games to set an NCAA record. In total, he set or tied four NCAA marks, eight Big East records and 11 Pitt marks.
- Was the third overall pick in the 2004 NFL Draft by Arizona and spent his entire 17-year career with the Cardinals.
- Named to the NFL 100 All-Time Team and made 11 Pro Bowl appearances. He ranks second in NFL history in receiving yards (17,492) and receptions (1,432).
- Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2024.

RUNNING BACK | 1936-38

- Earned back-to-back All-America honors as a halfback (1937) and fullback (1938).
- Member of the famed "Dream Backfield" at Pitt, considered one of college football's greatest back tandems ever.


- While at Pitt from 1979-82, broke nearly every major passing record in school history, including career marks for passing yards (8,597), completions (693) and touchdown passes (79).
- Led Pitt to four consecutive Top 10 finishes, including a pair of No. 2 rankings.
- Enhanced his reputation for delivering in the clutch in the 1982 Sugar Bowl, when he threw a 33-yard touchdown pass to tight end John Brown with 35 seconds left to give Pitt a come-from-behind 24-20 victory over Georgia.
- Named a 1981 All-American and finished fourth in the Heisman Trophy balloting that year.
- A first-round draft pick of the Miami Dolphins in 1983, Marino went on to gain recognition as one of the greatest quarterbacks in NFL history with a record-breaking 17-year career.
- He retired following the 1999 season as the league's all-time leader in passing attempts (8,358), completions (4,967), yardage (61,361) and touchdowns (420).
- Was elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2002 and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2005.

LINEBACKER | 1950-52


- Earned All-America honors as a senior linebacker in 1952.
- As both a collegian and professional, Schmidt was considered the era's prototype for linebacker play—instinctive, aggressive and smart.
- Played in 10 Pro Bowls during his 13-year career (1953-65) with the Detroit Lions, which included two NFL championships.
- Served as the Lions' head coach from 1967-72, leading Detroit to its only playoff appearance in the 1970s.
- Elected into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1973 and College Football Hall of Fame in 2000.

OFFENSIVE TACKLE | 1977-80

- In 1980 was named a unanimous All-American and Pitt's first winner of the prestigious Outland Trophy.
- Did not give up a sack his final two collegiate seasons.
- Was Pitt's "go-to" player on third-and-short situations, earning him the nickname "May Day."
- Helped lead Pitt to a four-year record of 39-8-1, including four bowl games and three Top 10 finishes.
- Was selected by Washington in the first round of the 1981 NFL Draft and was a standout member of the team's "Hogs" offensive line from 1981-90. Helped the franchise to three Super Bowls (1982, 1983 and 1987), including world championships in '82 and '87. Finished his pro career with the San Diego Chargers (1991) and Arizona Cardinals (1992-93).
- Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2005.


- A fixture on Pitt's punishing offensive front from 1980-82, surrendering just three sacks during that span. As a senior, he did not give up a single sack.
- A two-time first team All-American, earning consensus status as a senior.
- Pitt went 31-5 during Covert's three years as a starting offensive tackle, finishing in the nation's Top 10 each season. The 1980 and 1981 teams each went 11-1 and finished as high as No. 2 in the national polls.
- Was chosen in the first round of the 1983 NFL Draft (sixth overall) by the Chicago Bears and was a consensus All-Rookie pick. He played eight seasons in Chicago (1983-90), earning All-Pro honors four times, two first-team All-NFL selections, two Pro Bowl invitations and was twice named the NFL Offensive Lineman of the Year (1985 and 1986).
- With Covert as a spearhead, the Bears led the NFL in rushing four straight years (1983-86). He was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1980s.
- Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2003 and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2020.


- A three-time first team All-American, including unanimous status as a junior and senior.
- Became the first offensive lineman to twice finish in the top 10 of the Heisman Trophy balloting, placing sixth in 1984 and eighth in 1983.
- His collegiate career led to the creation of the "Pancake," a statistical barometer for each time Fralic put an opposing defensive lineman on his back.
- The second player taken overall in the 1985 NFL Draft, Fralic went on to an exceptional pro career from 1985-93, playing eight years with the Atlanta Falcons and his final season with the Detroit Lions. He was selected to the Pro Bowl four times and was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1980s.
- Was elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1998.

- Was a unanimous All-America selection at end in 1960.
- Led Pitt in receiving three consecutive years and was also a standout defender and punter. He additionally played baseball and basketball at Pitt and was the intramural wrestling champion.
- In 1961, he was a first-round draft choice of the Chicago Bears and was a member of their 1963 NFL Championship team. He was also a member of the Dallas Cowboys when they won Super Bowl VI and earned All-Pro four times.
- Spent 11 seasons as the head coach of the Chicago Bears, leading them to victory in Super Bowl XX, and later coached the New Orleans Saints.
- Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1986 and Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1988.

- A three-time first team All-American and won the 1980 Lombardi Award, Maxwell Award and the Walter Camp Award.
- Finished second in the 1980 Heisman Trophy balloting, an unprecedented finish for a purely defensive player.
- Was the first-ever defensive player to win the Walter Camp Award.
- Named to Pitt's All-Time Team after just his sophomore year.
- Remains Pitt's all-time sack leader with 49.
- Helped lead Pitt to a four-year record of 39-8-1, including four bowl games and three Top 10 finishes.
- First-round selection by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1981 and played 11 years in the NFL.
- Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1996.



Pitt's first bowl trip resembled a politician's whistle-stop tour—wherever Pitt was at luncheon during its trek west, it practiced. The routine was simple: deboard the train around 11:15; explore the day's town until noon; lunch at 12; walk lunch off, then practice; reboard the train. So it was that Pitt practiced in Dodge City, Albuquerque and Winslow, Arizona, on the way to Pasadena. The game had a sentimental storyline: the coach against his mentor. Panther Head Coach John B. "Jock" Sutherland had played for Stanford Coach Glenn "Pop" Warner when the latter was at Pitt. Amidst all that, the game, although close, was controlled by Stanford. Pitt grabbed a 6-0 third-quarter lead when Jimmy Hagan scooped up a Cardinal fumble and ran 20 yards for a touchdown. The extra point was missed. Stanford, which made several marches deep into Pitt territory, finally scored on an unusual play. On fourth-and-goal at the two, Stanford quarterback Biff Hoffman completed a pass to Bob Sims, but it was short of the goal line. Sims was hit and fumbled, but Frank Wilton picked up the loose ball and carried it in to tie the game. Hoffman's extra point won it, 7-6. Pitt, a slight favorite entering the game, mustered very little offense in its first of four Rose Bowl games.

If vintage football films give you the impression that the game of the 20s and 30s was run, run, and run again, think again. USC's Trojans bombed Pitt with an all-out passing attack. The game started on a bright note for "Jock" Sutherland's team when Toby Uansa rushed 68 yards on Pitt's first play. Pitt failed to score, then the walls caved in. Gaius Shaver connected with Henry Edelson for a 55-yard touchdown. Later in the quarter, Shaver hit Ernest Pinckert for a 28-yard score, capitalizing on a Pitt fumble. Another fumble led to USC's third touchdown, a short run which opened the score to 19-0. Two Juses set up the Trojans' next score when Jesse Mortensen and Jesse Hill teamed for a 51-yard pass play. Russell Saunders helped convert a USC interception into a 33-0 lead with his 13-yard scoring run. Pitt finally broke through in the third quarter when Uansa threw a 28-yard pass to William Walinchus. Southern Cal sandwiched two more long touchdown passes (38 and 62 yards) around a Tom Parkinson-to-Paul Collins 36-yard TD pass for Pitt to arrive at the final score. In all, the Trojans scored the most points against Pitt since 1903. It would be Sutherland's second-worst margin of defeat in his 15 seasons at Pitt; the worst would come three years later, also against USC in the Rose Bowl.

John B. "Jock" Sutherland tried a new ploy after two Rose Bowl losses, taking his team to Tucson to practice for a win. Instead, Sutherland suffered the worst loss in his Pitt career. It was the first time since 1928 that the Panthers were shut out in a defeat. With 83,000 in attendance, Pitt stayed close until the fourth quarter before collapsing. USC's Homer Griffith threw, and later caught, a touchdown pass as the Trojans built a 14-0 lead through three quarters. After Irvine Warburton scored to make the score 21-0, Pitt fumbled the kickoff, and Warburton scored again shortly thereafter. A blocked punt set up the final touchdown. Several Panthers were singled out by the crowd with standing ovations: Ted Dailey, Joe Skladany, Charles Hartwig and Warren Heller, who rushed for 63 yards in the final game of his brilliant Pitt career.

"Jock" Sutherland was intent on winning the Rose Bowl in his fourth try. To that end, Pitt spent two weeks working out on the west coast, for Sutherland was not going to accept 0-4 in Rose Bowl play. His tactics worked, and captain Bobby LaRue led Pitt to a 21-0 victory. LaRue's running set up the first touchdown of the game, which, fittingly, he scored. LaRue's 50-yard run in the third quarter, which would have gone 75 yards for the touchdown if not for a diving tackle, set up Frank Patrick's touchdown. Pitt led, 14-0, after three quarters. The defense added a late touchdown, returning an interception. So elated was Sutherland that he substituted every player who made the trip, so each could forever relate the experience of playing in a Rose Bowl victory. After four tries, the coach had finally overcome one of the few obstacles in his remarkable career.

A controversial pass interference penalty against Pitt's Bobby Grier, the first black man ever to play in the Sugar Bowl, put Georgia Tech on the doorstep for the game's only touchdown. Pitt, under new coach John Michelosen, had several chances to tie the game but hit a wall of futility. Grier's penalty gave Tech the ball on the 11, from where Wade Mitchell snuck in. A fumble killed a first-quarter drive, then quarterback Corny Salvaterra was stopped on a fourth-and-goal just before halftime. Pitt's Ray DiPasquale intercepted a pass to squelch a fourth quarter threat by Tech. In the final moments, Pitt made a furious attempt to tie the game. The Panthers were on Tech's 5-yard line when time ran out.

Tech converted an early interception into a 7-0 lead. Pitt was stopped on a goal-line stand at the start of the second quarter, and Tech increased its lead with a halfback-option TD pass. Pitt quarterback Corny Salvaterra hit Dick Bowen with a 36-yard TD pass before the half, and Pitt trailed, 14-7. Bowen's fumble on the second-half kickoff set up the clinching touchdown. Pitt pulled to within seven on Salvaterra's sneak, but could draw no closer.

A new era in Pitt football was ushered in with the Panthers' first bowl appearance in 17 years. Coach of the Year Johnny Majors had revived a struggling program and Pitt was 6-4-1 entering this game. Freshman Tony Dorsett was a big part of the turnaround, rushing for 1,686 yards. Pitt struck first, with Dorsett scoring two plays after Tom Perko recovered Arizona State quarterback Danny White's fumble on the first play of the game. But the Sun Devils, playing on their own field, proved too tough. Woody Green scored four plays after Dorsett's touchdown to tie the game. Arizona State scored three touchdowns in 6:04 of the fourth quarter, and although Pitt blocked all three extra points, the game ended one-sided after being tied at halftime. Dorsett rushed for 100 yards, but Pitt turned the ball over seven times. Both quarterbacks, White and Pitt's Billy Daniels, threw three interceptions.

SUN BOWL • DEC. 26, 1975

El Paso, Texas, Sun Bowl Stadium

A player rushing for 100 yards is impressive. Two players on the same team is remarkable. Three is unheard of, but that is how Pitt beat Kansas. Elliott Walker (11 carries for 123 yards, 11.2 average) got the ball rolling with a 60-yard touchdown run in the first quarter. Tony Dorsett (27-142) scored two touchdowns in the second quarter. Pitt had nearly 300 rushing yards at the intermission. Quarterback Robert Haygood ran the veer offense to perfection, rushing for 101 yards (14 carries) when he wasn't busy pitching out to Dorsett. Haygood also connected with Gordon Jones for a touchdown after Walker scored his second of the game. Jones set up his own touchdown with a 63-yard kickoff return. With eight wins, Pitt had its best season since 1963. Dorsett rushed for 1,686 yards on the season, matching his 1973 total.

The many remarkable accomplishments that Tony Dorsett achieved in his four years at Pitt were punctuated by his role in this win, one that gave Pitt its first national championship in 39 years. Dorsett, quarterback Matt Cavanaugh and a marauding defense just would not be denied. Cavanaugh, named the game's MVP, scored from six yards out to give Pitt a 7-0 lead. The celebration of that touchdown became an iconic Sports Illustrated cover that can be seen at several sites around Pitt's campus. The photo headline simply read: "PITT IS IT?" Gordon Jones turned a short pass into a 59-yard touchdown excursion in the second quarter, Dorsett's 10-yard TD late in the half cemented the win. He was far from through, however. After gaining 65 yards in the first half, the Heisman Trophy winner exploded in the second to finish with a Sugar Bowl-record 202 yards rushing, including 67 on one run that set up one of Carson Long's two second-half field goals. The defense created six turnovers and limited the Bulldogs to 181 yards. Pitt defenders actually caught more Georgia passes than did Georgia receivers (four interceptions, compared to three completions in 22 attempts). Vince Dooley, Georgia's head coach, said this about the 12-0 Panthers: "They proved today they are the best in the country. They have amazing balance; they are the best defensive team we've seen. I think that is obvious. They are also the best offensive team we've faced." Pitt coach Johnny Majors, who completed his four-year stint at Pitt with a 33-13-1 record (after a combined 13-29 mark in the previous four years) was named Coach of the Year for the second time at Pitt.

Pitt set five Gator Bowl records for offensive proficiency in a demolition of the highly regarded Clemson Tigers. Matt Cavanaugh completed 23-of-36 passes for 387 yards and four TDs as Pitt outgained Clemson, 566-268. Three scoring tosses went to fullback Elliott Walker, who joined Tony Dorsett as the second Pitt back ever to rush for 1,000 yards in a season. Gordon Jones scored the other TD on one of his 10 receptions for 163 yards. Cavanaugh threw for 211 yards and two touchdowns in the first half alone. Clemson's vaunted passing combination of Steve Fuller-to-Jerry Butler was rendered ineffective by a Pitt secondary which swooped in for four interceptions, two by senior safety Bob Jury. Cavanaugh, a 1977 All-American, missed part of the season after suffering a broken wrist against Notre Dame in the first game of the year. "I shudder to think what he could have done had he stayed healthy," said Coach Jackie Sherrill, who finished his first year at Pitt with a 9-2-1 mark.

TANGERINE BOWL • DEC. 23, 1978

The Panthers saved their worst performance of the season for this bowl outing with North Carolina State. Primarily a running team in 1978, Pitt attempted to open it up on this night, throwing 48 passes. Four were intercepted, however. The Wolfpack, led by star running back Ted Brown, rolled up a 23-3 fourth quarter lead before Pitt quarterback Rick Trocano tried to bring the Panthers back. An 18-play drive featured four fourth-down conversions, the last of which resulted in a Freddie Jacobs touchdown. Pitt moved to State's 34-yard line with five minutes remaining, but an interception settled the issue. Trocano was intercepted twice more before the game ended, but he also led Pitt to the game's final touchdown. "Execution on our part was our biggest problem," Coach Jackie Sherrill said. "We didn't play well...and the turnovers hurt us." Pitt finished 8-4.

Pitt finished the 1979 season with a 10-game winning streak, built in part around the arm of freshman quarterback Dan Marino. The Wildcats, coached by former Pitt radio commentator Tony Mason, threatened often but did not score a touchdown until the game's waning moments. Junior cornerback Terry White intercepted two passes. One set up the second of three Mark Schubert field goals; the other allowed Pitt to run out the clock. Two of Schubert's kicks were from 46 yards out. Pitt's only touchdown came after a 12-play drive, with Marino hitting Benjie Pryor from 12 yards out. The last three plays of the drive: Marino to Mike Dombrowski for 34 yards, Marino to Ralph Still for 24 yards, and the touchdown.

Rick Trocano and Dan Marino split time at quarterback; each threw a touchdown pass and Trocano added a short TD run. Although Rogers gained 113 yards, his two fumbles were more of a factor in the game than his rushing output. Tom Flynn recovered Rogers' fumble on the first play of the game, leading to Trocano's score. Randy McMillan scored two touchdowns as Pitt rolled to a 37-3 lead. The defense was led by Rickey Jackson, who made 19 tackles (14 solos). Pitt finished the season 11-1.

Coach Jackie Sherrill disdained the potential 50-yard field goal attempt. "With five minutes to go I said we were not here to tie, we were here to win," Sherrill said. Dan Marino wanted to throw a short pass to a running back to get the first down, but a Georgia blitz left tight end John Brown in single coverage down the middle. Marino was right on target for the touchdown, his third of the game. The Panther defense limited Herschel Walker to 84 yards on 25 carries.

Joe McCall lost one at the SMU one-yard line, but Mustang QB Lance McIlhenny returned the favor with a fumble at the Pitt seven. Eric Schubert's missed field goal attempt left the game scoreless at the half. Marino completed five straight short passes to set up Schubert's 43-yard kick, which gave Pitt its only points. SMU's "Pony Express" backfield (Eric Dickerson and Craig James) led an 80-yard drive, which McIlhenny capped off with a nine-yard run. Pitt's last chance ended when a Marino pass was tipped and intercepted in the end zone.

Wilson fell on Joe McCall's fumble in the end zone to tie the score early in the fourth quarter. Ohio State's Keith Byars scored his second touchdown by returning the ensuing kickoff 99 yards. Congemi was six-for-six on Pitt's next touchdown drive, which culminated with an 11-yard pass to Dwight Collins. Congemi, who completed 19-of-27 in the second half, had his conversion pass broken up, and Pitt trailed, 21-20. A 17-play drive later in the quarter ended with Snuffy Everett's 37-yard field goal to put the Panthers on top. Quarterback Mike Tomczak led Ohio State back, ending an 89-yard drive with a 39-yard bomb to Thad Jemison, who scored with 39 seconds remaining. Head Coach Foge Fazio's Panthers drove to the Buckeye 24, but could get no further.

Despite late heroics from Larry Wanke, Pitt was grounded in this aerial circus, as Texas quarterback Brett Stafford and split end Tony Jones set Bluebonnet Bowl records. The New Year's Eve crowd was treated to an action-packed game from the start. Stafford connected with Jones for a 77-yard touchdown on the first play from scrimmage. Pitt retaliated quickly: Billy Owens returned the kickoff 45 yards, Billy Osborn hit Reggie Williams for 45 more yards on a trick play; then Craig Heyward tied the score with a four-yard burst. Six plays later, the Longhorns took the lead for good as Stafford hit Jones on a short pass that he broke for a 60-yard touchdown. Stafford finished the first quarter with 202 yards passing on the way to a 368-yard night. Jones set records for receiving yards and longest reception. Wanke replaced Darnell Dickerson early in the third quarter after Dickerson suffered a knee injury. Wanke completed 8-of-20 passes for 172 yards and three touchdowns, though two late in the fourth quarter that cut the Longhorns' lead to five. Heyward rushed for 136 yards, winning his personal battle with Texas star Eric Metcalf, who finished with 95 yards rushing. Heyward ended the season with 1,791 yards, the second-best in Pitt history. Pitt finished the year at 8-4, their most successful season since 1983.

Led by bowl MVP Alex Van Pelt's 354 yards passing, Pitt parlayed a John Hancock Bowl-record 530 yards in offense into a 31-28 come-from-behind victory over Texas A&M. It was a day of firsts for the Panthers. Paul Hackett, named head coach moments before kickoff, won his first game as a head coach. It also was Pitt's first bowl win since the Panthers' 24-20 Sugar Bowl victory over Georgia in 1982. Van Pelt, who completed 20-of-40 passes and threw for two touchdowns, rallied the Panthers from a 28-24 deficit, when he connected with Henry Tuten on a 44-yard touchdown strike with just 2:19 remaining in the game, giving Pitt a 31-28 lead. Tailback Curvin Richards rushed for 156 yards on 23 carries and scored the first points of the game with a 12-yard TD. Texas A&M countered with a nine-yard touchdown run by quarterback Lance Pavlas, tying the score at 7-7 to end the first quarter. With the score tied at 10 late in the first half, Van Pelt threw an eight-yard touchdown pass to Ronald Redmon, giving Pitt a 17-10 halftime lead. Flanker Olanda Truit completed his freshman season in stellar fashion, catching four passes for 124 yards, including a key 59-yard reception that set up Redmon's score. Cornel Smith finished the game with 10 tackles and Barry Threats had a game-ending interception, which ended Texas A&M's final drive and secured the Panthers' victory. The Hancock Bowl win marked the end of another decade in Pitt football history and the dawn of the Hackett coaching era. The Panthers finished the 1989 season with an 8-3-1 record.

It was the Panthers' first-ever appearance in the Liberty Bowl and their first bowl game since a 31-28 victory over Texas A&M in the 1989 John Hancock Bowl. Pitt threatened early, driving to the Golden Eagles' 13 on its initial series, but failed to score any points. Southern Miss responded with a pair of touchdown drives for a 14-0 second-quarter lead. The Panther offense, held in check for most of the game, had its lone shining moment when quarterback Pete Gonzalez connected with Jake Hoffart on an 89-yard pass-and-run touchdown as Pitt trailed 14-7 at halftime. Hoffart, who finished with five catches for 121 yards, set a Liberty Bowl record with his touchdown catch. The Panthers, however, would come no closer. USM's defense returned a fumble and two interceptions for touchdowns in the second half to roll to its first victory ever over Pitt.

Making its second postseason appearance under Walt Harris, Pitt rolled up big offensive numbers but fell in a shootout to Iowa State, 37-29, in the Insight.com Bowl. The Panthers held statistical advantages in total offense (491 yards to 375), passing (347 to 308) and rushing (164 to 107). The Panthers struck on their very first possession of the game when John Turman hit a streaking Antonio Bryant for a 72-yard touchdown and 7-0 lead. The Cyclones, however, responded with 27 unanswered points, including 20 in the second period. Pitt pulled within 27-14 when Rod Rutherford snuck in from two yards out. Bryant then made a brilliant diving catch for a 44-yard touchdown and the Panthers trailed 27-20 with 2:05 left in the third. The Panthers' momentum was slowed when Iowa State's JaMain Billups returned a punt 72 yards for a score early in the fourth. Kevan Barlow, who finished with 114 rushing yards, bulled in from the three to make it 34-29 at the 9:45 mark. But the Panthers could draw no closer. The contest marked the first football game ever played in Bank One Ballpark, home of Major League Baseball's Arizona Diamondbacks.

Hobbled by an ankle injury, Antonio Bryant went on to earn Most Valuable Player honors after catching seven passes for 101 yards and two touchdowns. David Priestley put up MVP-like statistics himself, completing 18-of-32 passes for 271 yards and the two scoring strikes to Bryant. The duo propelled the Panthers to a 24-10 halftime lead. The Pitt defense held strong and limited Wolfpack quarterback Philip Rivers to just 189 yards through the air and sacked him four times. NC State closed to 27-19 in the fourth quarter but blitzing Lewis Moore quelled the threat when he sacked Rivers and forced a fumble. Tyre Young picked it up and ran 16 yards untouched for the clinching TD. Moore, who finished with seven tackles (all solo), including two for losses, was named Pitt's Defensive MVP.

Pitt achieved its finest season in two decades with a 38-13 triumph over Oregon State in the Insight Bowl. The Panthers finished 9-4, their winningest season since 1982, and secured a spot in the final national polls for the first time since 1989. The win marked the Panthers' second consecutive postseason victory. A stifling defensive effort, efficient offense as well as a special teams gem keyed the result. Tied at 10 at halftime, OSU quarterback Derek Anderson was intercepted by Tez Morris, who returned the ball 36 yards to the Beavers' 23 early in the third quarter. Rod Rutherford completed a 22-yard pass to Larry Fitzgerald to the one before rushing up the middle for a 17-10 lead just three minutes into the second half. The Panthers broke open the contest later in the third when Shawn Robinson fielded a punt at the Panthers' 34, ran wide to the right and sprinted down the sideline for a 66-yard touchdown. It was the first punt return for a TD in Pitt's bowl history. Pitt iced the game with a 44-yard touchdown drive climaxed by Brandon Miree's seven-yard burst. Miree, who earned the game's Offensive MVP honor, finished with 113 yards rushing on 20 carries (5.7 avg.). In contrast, OSU tailback Steven Jackson—who entered the game as the nation's fifth-leading rusher—was held to a season-low 34 yards.

Missed opportunities were the theme for Pitt, which finished 8-5 for the season, with a missed extra point, missed field goal, an interception and a lost fumble on a potential game-tying drive. Heisman Trophy runner-up Larry Fitzgerald saw his NCAA record touchdown streak end at 18 games, but the All-American still led the Panthers with five catches for 77 yards. Brandon Miree rushed for 110 yards and added four receptions, including one for a 17-yard touchdown. The scoring pass from Rod Rutherford was his 37th of the season, tying Dan Marino's school record set in 1981.

The Utes finished the 2004 season with a 12-0 record and ranked as high as fourth in the final polls. Pitt finished with an 8-4 mark and ranked No. 25. Utah scored touchdowns on five of its first seven possessions, including all three in the third quarter. Pitt advanced into Utah territory three times in the first half but four sacks and a blocked field goal kept the Panthers off the scoreboard. The Panthers' lone score came on a beautiful over-the-shoulder grab by Greg Lee that went for a 31-yard touchdown with 4:28 left in the third quarter. Lee had seven receptions for 93 yards, while fellow wideout Joe DelSardo had nine catches for 109 yards.

Unfortunately Pitt's offense was also bottled up, managing only 178 yards and never penetrating Oregon State's 36-yard line. The Panthers appeared poised to pull out another fourth-quarter comeback when T.J. Porter returned a punt 36 yards to the OSU 42 with 12:39 left in the game. A sack and forced fumble by the Beavers' Victor Butler, however, ended the threat. Pitt's final scoring opportunity came with 2:02 remaining when Conor Lee attempted a 57-yard field goal, but the kick fell just short of the crossbar. Linebackers Scott McKillop and Austin Ransom led Pitt with 11 tackles each. McKillop also had an interception in the end zone to end the first half. Greg Romeus was named the Jimmy Rogers Jr. Most Valuable Lineman after collecting four tackles and two sacks. Oregon State (9-4) placekicker Justin Kahut accounted for the lone points of the day on a 44-yard field goal with 2:18 left in the second quarter. It was the lowest scoring bowl game since 1959, a 0-0 tie between Air Force and TCU in the Cotton Bowl.

Freshman running back Dion Lewis was named the bowl's MVP after rushing for 159 yards and a touchdown against the nation's No. 6 overall defense. Lewis finished his spectacular debut season with a Pitt freshman-record 1,799 yards, surpassing Tony Dorsett's 1973 frosh total (1,686). Hutchins set Pitt records for single-season field goals (23) and kick scoring (115). His four field goals also set a Meineke Car Care Bowl record. Linebacker Max Gruder had a game-high 11 tackles, while defensive tackle Mick Williams had two sacks. Freshman linebacker Dan Mason, making a surprise start, had a key interception on the goal line late in the first half. As a unit, the Pitt defense limited the Tar Heels to just 264 total yards, including a mere 81 on the ground. It was Pitt's first postseason victory since the 2002 Insight Bowl. The win clinched a final national ranking of No. 15 in both polls for Pitt, its highest since 1982. The Tar Heels finished 8-5.

The Wildcats countered with their only touchdown, a one-yard run by Moncell Allen later in the period that cut the deficit to 10. But the Panthers answered with a long drive that was capped by a two-yard touchdown run by Dion Lewis to seal the result. Lewis rushed for 105 yards and a TD to earn his second consecutive bowl MVP award. Defensively the Panthers held Kentucky well below its average of 33 points per game. Defensive backs Dom DeCicco and K'Waun Williams had nine tackles each. Pitt, playing the game under acting head coach Phil Bennett, finished 8-5, while the Wildcats fell to 6-7.

The Mustangs' third score of the opening quarter, a two-yard run by Rishaad Wimbley, came after a Pitt fumble at its own 27. Placekicker Kevin Harper accounted for all of Pitt's points with a pair of field goals. The Panthers produced just 205 yards in offense on the day and gave up seven sacks. SMU managed 300 yards but was sparked by the passing combo of McDermott and receiver Darius Johnson, who had seven catches for 120 yards, including a 50-yard TD to open the game's scoring. Pitt was led by interim head coach Keith Patterson. The Panthers finished 6-7 on the year. SMU improved to 8-5. It was the first meeting between Pitt and SMU since the Jan. 1, 1983 Cotton Bowl (also won by the Mustangs, 7-3).

Fielding a shuffled offensive line, the Panthers mustered just 81 rushing yards. Pitt (6-7) fell behind early after Tino Sunseri threw his first interception since September and Ole Miss capitalized with a TD pass less than five minutes into the game. The Rebels built leads of 14-0, 31-10 and, by the final period, 38-10. As a unit, Pitt's defense struggled to slow Ole Miss (7-6) down, but safety Jason Hendricks had an exceptional day, collecting 17 tackles, two TFLs and an interception.

Conner broke Pitt's bowl rushing record held by Tony Dorsett (202 vs. Georgia in the Jan. 1, 1977, Sugar Bowl). Conner also played on defense as a pass rusher—drawing a key holding penalty on Bowling Green's final possession—and was named the game's MVP. Boyd broke Pitt's bowl record for receiving yards (surpassing Gordon Jones' 163 vs. Clemson in the Dec. 30, 1977, Gator Bowl) and had the Panthers' first punt return TD since 2006. A third freshman, Chris Blewitt, provided the winning points on a 39-yard field goal with 1:17 remaining. Chad Voytik, playing the entire second half in relief of injured Tom Savage, completed 5-of-9 passes for 108 yards and had a five-yard TD run. In his final Pitt appearance, Aaron Donald had a game-clinching sack in the final minute and was named the bowl's Most Valuable Lineman. With its first bowl win since 2010, Pitt finished 7-6 and dropped the Falcons to 10-4.

Houston quarterback Greg Ward fueled the rally by throwing three touchdown passes in the final 3:41—the last two after the Cougars (8-5) recovered onside kicks—and then completed the game-winning two-point conversion to cap the largest comeback in an FBS game in 2014 and largest ever in a bowl game that didn't go into overtime. Ward finished with 274 passing yards and also rushed for 92. The Panthers led by 21 points with 6:14 left when Chris Blewitt kicked a 29-yard field goal. Blewitt also had a career-long 52-yarder as time expired in the first half to give Pitt a 17-6 lead. The Panthers were under the direction of interim coach Joe Rudolph, who replaced the departing Paul Chryst.

Pitt began the game in exciting fashion as Quadree Henderson returned the opening kickoff 100 yards for a 7-0 lead. Navy responded with three unanswered touchdowns to seize a 21-7 halftime lead. The advantage swelled to 31-7 midway through the third quarter before the Panthers struck back. Pitt scored two touchdowns in 17 seconds—a four-yard catch by Qadree Ollison and 22-yard fumble return by Jordan Whitehead—to close to 31-21 entering the final quarter. After Navy scored another TD, Ollison ran for a 45-yard score to make it 38-28 with 9:35 left. That would be as close as Pitt would get as Reynolds iced the game with a nine-yard TD run on Navy's subsequent possession. The game was played before an overflow crowd of 36,352 in the Midshipmen's home stadium. Pitt completed Pat Narduzzi's inaugural season with an 8-5 record, its best mark since 2010. Navy finished 11-2 and earned a No. 18 ranking in the final polls.

Failed red zone opportunities and untimely injuries also keyed the final result. Pitt penetrated the Wildcats' 20-yard line seven times but only cashed in on three of those possessions. The Panthers (8-5) also lost five starters to injuries during the game, including tailback James Conner late in the second quarter and quarterback Nathan Peterman in the third. Still, the Panthers claimed a 24-21 lead early in the final period when Ben DiNucci, who came on in relief of Peterman, passed to George Aston for a six-yard score. But Northwestern (7-6) would seize control for the balance of the game, turning a 4th-and-1 into a 21-yard play-action TD pass that made it 28-24 and then hitting a field goal for a seven-point lead. Pitt's final two possessions ended in interceptions, sealing the victory for the Wildcats.

Pitt didn't allow a Stanford first down until the second quarter. Alex Kessman's 29-yard field goal at 14:14 of the second period gave the Panthers a 3-0 lead. The Cardinal (9-4) responded with a 64-yard drive capped by Cameron Scarlett's one-yard TD run. With tailback Qadree Ollison sidelined due to an early injury, Darrin Hall carried the load for the Panthers' rushing attack and finished with 123 yards on 16 carries. Hall's six-yard scoring run with 2:32 left before intermission gave Pitt a 10-7 lead. Kessman increased the advantage to 13-7 with a 28-yard field goal in the third quarter. Stanford's decisive touchdown was a fortuitous one—Dewayne Hendrix forced a fumble from Cardinal QB K.J. Costello, but the ball flew right into the hands of Scarlett in the end zone. The subsequent extra point put Stanford ahead for good with 11:28 to play. Pitt's final serious threat ended with a missed 55-yard field goal.

Pat Narduzzi's first bowl win as a head coach was a thrilling and fitting way to end the Panthers' 2019 campaign. After Pitt had played eight one-score games during the regular season, Narduzzi's team yet again went down to the wire—this time with Eastern Michigan in the Quick Lane Bowl. The Panthers didn't lead until quarterback Kenny Pickett connected with receiver Tayvis Mack in the end zone for a spectacular, one-handed catch that proved to be the winning TD with just 47 seconds remaining. The Panthers (8-5) earned their first postseason victory since 2013. The Eagles (6-7) jumped out to an early 10-0 lead before Alex Kessman put Pitt on the board with a 44-yard field goal. Then the Panthers found an offensive spark with a 96-yard TD from Pickett to Maurice F'French—the longest passing play in Pitt history. EMU quickly responded with a 50-yard scoring pass from QB Mike Glass to Quian Williams and took a 20-17 lead into halftime. The teams traded scores in the second half in front of a Quick Lane Bowl record crowd of 34,765. The Eagles took a 30-27 advantage when Chad Ryland booted a 48-yard field goal with 6:00 to play. After consecutive three-and-outs, the stage was set for Pitt's dramatic 10-play, 91-yard drive that concluded with Mack's decisive touchdown. Pickett completed 27-of-39 passes for 361 yards and three scores to earn Most Valuable Player.

Pitt's historic 2021 season concluded with a loss to Michigan State in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl. The Spartans rallied from an 11-point deficit in the final quarter to seize the win. Payton Thorne threw two fourth-quarter touchdown passes, including a 22-yarder to Jayden Reed that put Michigan State (11-2) up 24-21 with less than three minutes remaining. Pitt marched to the Spartans' 26-yard line with 36 seconds to play, but Cal Haladay's 78-yard interception return for a score sealed the result. Without the services of All-America quarterback Kenny Pickett, the Panthers (11-3) tapped Nick Patti as their starter. Patti accounted for Pitt's first score—a 16-yard scramble that made it 7-7 at the 7:57 mark of the opening period—but was injured as he dove for the end zone and would not return. Davis Beville, making just his third appearance of the season, came on in relief and completed 14-of-18 passes for 149 yards with a TD and INT. Beville threw his first career touchdown, a four-yarder to Jared Wayne, to give Pitt a 14-10 halftime lead. The advantage swelled to 21-10 early in the third period when John Morgan forced Thorne to fumble and Cam Bright returned it for a 26-yard TD. Unfortunately those would be the final points Pitt could muster, setting the stage for 21 unanswered points by the Spartans in the game's final 8:06.

On a windy El Paso day, Ben Sauls kicked five field goals, including a 47-yarder with four seconds left, to lift Pitt to a 37-35 win over No. 18 UCLA in the Tony the Tiger Sun Bowl. Pitt twice rallied in the second half—trailing 28-14 in the third quarter and then 35-34 with 34 seconds left—to claim victory. The 14-point second-half deficit was the largest Pitt (9-4) had ever overcome to win a bowl. It was Pitt's fifth consecutive victory on the season and came despite being down no fewer than seven regulars due to injury or participation decisions. Quarterback Nick Patti was the biggest supporting cast member to step up in the game. Making just the third start of his college career, Patti directed Pitt to 20 unanswered points and a 34-28 lead late in the fourth quarter. UCLA (9-4) reclaimed the lead with 34 seconds left with a 70-yard TD drive. But Patti, with no timeouts, led a final march—completing two passes for 35 yards and scrambling for 11—to set up the game-winning kick. Patti accounted for 297 total yards (225 passing and 72 rushing), while bowl MVP Rodney Hammond Jr. rushed for 94 yards and two TDs. Pitt's defense forced five crucial turnovers, including four interceptions.

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In what turned out to be a historic 2024 GameAbove Sports Bowl, the Toledo Rockets edged the Pitt Panthers 48-46 in a record-setting six-overtime thriller at Ford Field in Detroit, Mich. The contest became the longest bowl game in NCAA history...Toledo quarterback Tucker Gleason was instrumental, running for one overtime touchdown and throwing for four more, including the decisive two-point conversion to Junior Vandross III in the sixth overtime...Vandross earned MVP honors with 12 receptions for 194 yards and a touchdown...Pitt's offense was led by freshman quarterback Julian Dugger, who contributed two passing touchdowns and a rushing score...running back Desmond Reid added 169 rushing yards and a touchdown...despite outgaining Toledo 438-416 and controlling possession for over 36 minutes, Pitt couldn't capitalize on key opportunities...the loss concluded Pitt's season at 7-6, while Toledo improved to 8-5.

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
