#4 PILOTS HOST #12 WASHINGTON, OREGON

THIS WEEK: Portland hosts Northwest rivals #12 Washington on Saturday, and Oregon on Sunday, closing out the non-conference schedule.

ABOUT #12 WASHINGTON:The Huskies (5-3-2), came home from a trip through Texas with a 1-1 tie at #3 Texas, and a 2-1 overtime loss at #7 Texas A&M.

Kim Taylor scored the lone Husky goal at Texas, and Dana Dibble scored at A&M. Melissa Bennett leads the team with four goals and 10 assists, while Taylor adds five goals and one assist. Hope Solo has an 0.77 goals against average.

Portland is 17-5-1 all-time against the Huskies, including 1-0 and 2-0 wins last season over Washington.

ABOUT OREGON:The Ducks fell to 1-5-1 after a 3-0 home loss Sunday to North Carolina. Amanda Orand leads the team with two goals and an assist, and four players have one goal. Sara Peters has allowed 14 goals and faced 99 shots, with a 2.04 GAA.

Portland is 7-3-2 all-time against the Ducks, and have won the last four meetings by a combined 9-0 score.

LAST WEEKEND'S RESULTS

#4 Portland 2, Oregon State 1: Portland improved to 7-2-1 Sunday with a 2-1 win at Oregon State, improving to 21-1-0 all-time against the Beavers.

Erin Misaki's first career multi-goal game led the Pilots to the win, one day after Portland played #1 North Carolina to a double-overtime scoreless tie.

Misaki put Portland ahead 1-0 in the 65th minute, knocking in a rebound of Emily Patterson's shot. After OSU tied the match in the 75th minute, the Pilots notched the game-winner four minutes later when Christine Sinclair fed Misaki with a lead pass.

#4 Portland 0, #1 North Carolina 0 (2ot): #4 Portland did nearly everything but put the ball in the net Saturday, taking home a 0-0 double-overtime draw with #1 North Carolina. In front of the fifth-largest Merlo Field crowd ever (4,140), the Pilots outshot the Tar Heels 17-10 in a game largely played in the middle three-fifths of the pitch. Portland's record moved to 7-2-1, while North Carolina stands at 7-0-2.

Portland, now 0-7-1 all-time against North Carolina, put up three shots in the second overtime period, but Erin Misaki's shot from the top of the box was less than a foot wide left midway through the period, Wanda

Rozwadowska's 5-foot header sailed over the cross-bar with 1:20 left to play, and Christine Sinclair's sliding bullet from less than two yards out skimmed past the left post with less than a ball's clearance.

The Pilots outshot the Tar Heels 6-1 in the two overtime periods, and 11-9 in regulation. Portland forced six shots on goal, but Tar Heel keeper Aly Winget made three diving stops among her six saves. Portland keeper Lauren Arase had two saves for her fourth shutout of the season, and the Pilot defense was outstanding for the team's sixth shutout.

The most serious Tar Heel scoring opportunity - other than three corner kicks - was a well-struck free kick by Catherine Reddick at 86:45, some 30 yards from goal. Reddick's blistering shot, however, was at least 10 feet over the Portland goal.

The 0-0 result was North Carolina's first scoreless draw since a 0-0 result against Notre Dame in 1994, and only the fourth draw for the program since the 1990 season.

The last meeting between the two teams was a 2-1 UNC win in the semifinals of the 2001 NCAA Women's College Cup.

Collectively, Charles' men's and women's teams have won 12 conference championships (losing only 34 league games) and earned 18 NCAA playoff berths (including eight Final Four appearances) in a combined 29 seasons. Charles owns four Far West Region Coach of the Year and six conference Coach of the Year awards. Nineteen Pilots have earned All-America status during Charles' tenure.

Charles ranks third among active NCAA Division I women's soccer coach in all-time winning percentage (.798), and fourth among all women's Division I soccer coaches.

RARE TIE ON MERLO: In Portland's 12-plus seasons of play on Merlo Field, the Pilots have only sustained four ties after last weekend's 0-0 battle with North Carolina.

The Pilots tied California 0-0 in 1990 - the year Merlo Field opened - knotted UConn 3-3 in 1995, and played Wisconsin to a 0-0 tie in 1999.

In 13-plus seasons under Clive Charles, the Pilots have had only 12 ties.

SINCLAIR MOVES INTO CAREER TOP 10: An assist Sunday at Oregon State improved Christine Sinclair's career points standings.

Sinclair now has 71 career points (10th), is fourth all-time in points per game (2.29), seventh in goals (31), and fourth in goals per game (1.00).

RANKINGS: Portland's tie with former #1 North Carolina did little to Portland's poll standing, but dropped the Tar Heels to #2.

The Pilots stayed at #4 (Soccer Times) and #5 (NSCAA), and moved up to #4 in Soccer America and Soccer Buzz. The Pilots are the #3 team in the West Region in each poll.

CHARLES GIVEN LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT

AWARD: The WUSA honored Portland head coach Clive Charles with a Lifetime Achievement Award at the WUSA Gala on Thursday, September 19, part of the WUSA All-Star weekend in Portland.

The head coach of both the men and women's soccer programs at the University of Portland, Charles, 50, was the head coach of the U.S. men's Olympic team that finished fourth at the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games. In 16 seasons as head coach of the Pilot men's team, and 13 seasons with the women, Charles has amassed a 406-134-41 record in a combined 29 seasons, and is one of just five coaches in NCAA history to win more than 400 college soccer games.

In addition, Charles has served U.S. Soccer in a number of coaching capacities throughout the years. From 1995 to 1998, he was an assistant coach for the U.S. men's national team under Steve Sampson, including World Cup France '98. Charles was also the

head coach of the U.S. Under-20 women's national team from 1993 to 1995.

"The WUSA All-Star Weekend is a true celebration of the players and coaches in women's soccer," said WUSA Commissioner Tony DiCicco. "The efforts of soccer leaders like Clive and Michelle played an important role in making the United States an elite country in the sport of women's soccer. In addition, Clive and Michelle were instrumental in the WUSA becoming a reality."

A FLAIR FOR THE DRAMATIC: Christine Sinclair was named offensive MVP of the NIKE Portland Invitational, keeping alive her streak of being all-tournament or MVP of every collegiate tournament in which she's played.

Sinclair scored both Portland goals - including an overtime "golden goal" game-winner - against CS Fullerton. She added two more goals in a 4-0 win over #7 Nebraska. Sinclair then assisted on Wanda Rozwadowska's goal against Denver.

WELCOME BACK, HERE'S YOUR AWARD: It didn't take Christine Sinclair long to get reacquainted with her Pilot teammates after missing the entire preseason and first two games while playing for Canada in the U-19 World Championships.

Sinclair scored two goals in Portland's wins over Clemson and Notre Dame, including the game-winner in the win over the Irish., and was named West Coast Conference Player of the Week, her fourth career WCC P.O.W. award.

PILOTS WIN NIKE PORTLAND INVITATIONAL:

Portland scored two goals in the first 13 minutes Sunday, going on to a 2-0 win over Denver to win the NIKE Portland Invitational. The #6 Pilots (5-2-0) won their fifth straight game, and third in as many days after beating #7 Nebraska 4-0 on Saturday, and 2-1 in overtime over CS Fullerton on Friday.

Earlier Sunday, #16 Washington and CS Fullerton played to a 1-1 double overtime tie.

Portland's Christine Sinclair (offensive) and Lauren Orlandos (defensive) were named tournament Outstanding Players, leading Portland to its first title in its own tourney since 1998, and fifth overall.

SUNDAY - #6 PORTLAND 2, DENVER 0: Wanda Rozwadowska's goal at 7:30 gave Portland some breathing room in their third game in three days, and just over five minutes later, Lindsey Huie's first career goal put the Pilots comfortably ahead 2-0.

remainder of the game, and goalie Cristin Shea made six pedestrian saves for her second shutout of the season. Portland outshot Denver 8-3 in the first half, 11-8 in the game.

Sinclair nearly put the Pilots ahead in the opening minutes, but the shot clanged off the right post just 5:34 into the game. Sinclair figured in the game-winner two minutes later, though, sending Rozwadowska wide with a leading pass. Rozwadowska scored her second goal in as many days, slotting the ball from nine yards out.

Betsy Barr, playing with a mask after suffering a broken nose Saturday against Nebraska, left a ball at the top of the box for Huie, who also slotted her shot under the Denver keeper.

The Pilots continued to control the contest for the remainder of the game, though Denver attempted several long-range shots in the second half.

#16 WASHINGTON 1, CS FULLERTON 1 (2ot): The Huskies outshot Fullerton 24-5, but could only convert a first-half penalty kick against the Titans. Melissa Bennett knocked in the PK at 14:03 after a Washington player was shoved from behind in the box in the run of play.

Erica Jacalone tied the score at 68:21, heading in a cross that appeared to have been deflected by Washington keeper, Hope Solo.

Washington held a 20-5 shot advantage through regulation - 8-0 in the first half - while Fullerton's Karen Bardsley made 12 saves to keep the score tied.

FRIDAY - #6 PORTLAND 2, CS FULLERTON 1 (ot): Kandace Wilson's goal with 1:48 remaining in regulation dashed Portland's hopes of a shutout, sending the match into overtime, but Sinclair's second goal of the game with less than three minutes to play in the extra period ended the game.

Portland, which outshot the Titans 23-4, had a 1-0 lead at 70:40 when Canadian compatriots Wanda Rozwadowska and Sinclair connected for a goal. Rozwadowska, a second half substitute, collected the ball at the top of the box, dribbled slightly to her right, and layed the ball off for Sinclair. Sinclair then angled her shot to the far post, easily beating the Titan defense.

After a wave of substitutions over the next 13 minutes, Fullerton tied the contest when Kellie Cox sprung Wilson with a through ball to the right of the goal. Wilson beat Portland's interior defenders to the ball, and sent her shot far post past a sprawling Cristin Shea.

Sinclair nearly ended the game less than two minutes into overtime, but Fullerton keeper Karen Bardsley snuffed the attempt at the last second after Sinclair had

broken free on a breakaway. Bardsley was busy all afternoon, making 12 saves.

DENVER 1, #16 WASHINGTON 0: Erica Izard and Angie Portincaso provided stellar defense, supporting the Pioneers in the upset of the Huskies. Izard made eight saves in the shutout win, while Portincaso was instrumental in slowing down the Washington offense.

Offensively, Denver counter-attacked throughout the game, finally capitalizing at 57:40 when Camile Flenniken's through ball to Katie Antongiovanni left the Denver striker along on the right side of the box. Antongiovanni then struck a low scooting shot to the far left post, slotting the ball past Washington keeper Hope Solo.

Washington outshot Denver 16-13, and had a 6-1 advantage in corner kicks.

#6 PILOTS BEAT #13 NEBRASKA 4-0: Christine Sinclair scored a pair of first-half goals Saturday as #6 Portland beat #13 Nebraska. The Pilots (4-2-0) have outscored Nebraska (2-2-1), 11-0 in the last three meetings between the two teams. Sinclair has scored four goals in the past two days.

Sinclair's first goal at 29:17, off assists from Erin Misaki and Rozwadowska, opened up a game largely being played end-to-end to that point. The goal opened up the Pilot attack, and 14 minutes later, Sinclair capitalized on Nebraska's gambling defense, stealing the ball from Husker keeper some 16 yards from goal, and sending the ball into an open net from the right side of the box.

Rebekah Patrick's first career goal put Portland up at 53:48, after Erin Misaki's through ball left the Montana freshman with just the keeper to beat. Patrick slotted her 10-yard shot to the left of Nebraska's goalie. Rozwadowska then capped the scoring at 81:03 with her first career goal. Colleen Salisbury's cross was headed to Rozwadowska inside the box, and Rozwadowska easily settled the ball, and banged it home from six yards.

Portland outshot Nebraska 15-7, 7-3 in the second half, and Lauren Arase made four routine saves for her second shutout of the season.

The Pilots, which beat Nebraska 3-0 and 4-0 last season, return to action on Sunday at 2:15 p.m. against Denver, following CS Fullerton vs. Washington, in the NIKE Portland Invitational.

SINCLAIR, ORLANDOS EARN KUDOS: Sophomore forward Christine Sinclair and senior defender Lauren Orlando were named to the Soccer Buzz Elite 12 preseason all-America team. Sinclair was the consensus national Freshman of the Year in 2001 and a first-team all-America, while Orlando was named to several all-America teams.

NATIONAL TEAM DUTY CALLS SINCLAIR: Sophomore forward Christine Sinclair missed Portland's opening two contests while competing for Canada at the 2002 FIFA U-19 Women's World Championship. Sinclair was named the tournament's winner of both the Golden Boot (top scorer - 10 goals), and Golden Ball (Most Valuable Player).

Canada lost 1-0 to the United States in a thrilling double-overtime championship battle.

BARR SOLID FOR U.S. U-21 SQUAD: Senior midfielder Betsy Barr was a key component of the U.S.

U-21 women's team which won a fourth consecutive Nordic Cup championship. Barr started in a 1-0 tourney-opening win over Finland, then came off the bench in a 1-0 loss to Denmark, and a 4-0 win over Greece. She did not play in the United States' 3-1 championship win over Germany.

PILOTS HOLD #2 SPOT IN WCC POLL: Coming off their first-ever national title in 2001, the Santa Clara women's soccer team was a unanimous choice by the other seven league coaches to repeat as WCC champs. The Broncos are fresh off a 23-2-0 season and their fifth trip to the national semifinals in six seasons. SCU will be without four-time all-american Danielle Slaton on defense, but return 2001 WCC Player of the Year and Hermann Award candidate Aly Wagner.

Last year, Portland made its third appearance in the College Cup in the last four seasons. The Pilots, picked second in the preseason poll, return nine of their 11 starters from last year's team, led by all-American forward Christine Sinclair.

2001 SEASON IN REVIEW

TAR HEELS SEND PILOTS HOME: Portland's defense bent, scrambled and chased for 90 minutes, but in the end #1 North Carolina's depth overcame the Pilots in a 2-1 NCAA Women's College Cup semifinal. The Pilots finished their season 20-4-0, finishing the season tied with the 1995 team for most wins in a season. UNC's unbeaten record improved to 24-0-0.

Trailing 2-0 after UNC reserve Elizabeth Ball's goal at 58:28, the Pilots closed within 2-1 just over 11 minutes later when Lisa Casagrande ran under a flick-on and beat UNC keeper Jenni Branam to the near post.

The Pilots increased their pressure after the goal, and had three corner kicks in the final 13 minutes, but were unable to convert those chances.

North Carolina jumped out to a 1-0 lead just 14:08 into the match when Anne Remy punched in a centering pass from Anne Morrell, after Alyssa Ramsey drove the ball to the endline before knocking the ball to Morrell.

The first five minutes of the game saw both teams

squander excellent scoring chances. A scrambling ball in front of the Portland net was finally pounced on by Portland keeper, Cristin Shea, just three minutes into the match.

Portland responded less than 90 seconds later, as the Pilots caught the Tar Heels out of position, but Betsy Barr's shot from inside the box was cleared off the line. Shortly later, the Pilots again had the Tar Heels scrambling in their own box, but Christine Sinclair couldn't get a clean shot on goal.

UNC outshot Portland 18-6 in the game, forcing Shea to make eight saves. Portland freshman Christine Sinclair, the West Coast Conference Freshman of the Year and the first Pilot selected first-team all-America as a freshman, was held to three shots, missing wide on two occasions.

Portland's efforts were hindered by a pair of injuries to workhorses Erin Misaki and Betsy Barr, and later to defensive stalwart Lauren Orlandos. Misaki rolled her healing ankle just five minutes into the match and struggled with her touch for the remainder of the match; Barr took a knee to the thigh less than 15 minutes into the match, and had to leave for treatment.

Orlandos, a second-team all-American for the second straight year, was knocked for a loop late in the second half, then was knocked to the ground just seconds before Ball's game-winning goal. Orlandos also had to leave the game briefly for an evaluation, but later returned.

SINCLAIR TOPS SOCCER AMERICA MVP TEAM:

Portland forward Christine Sinclair was the lone freshman named to Soccer America magazine's 11-player MVP team. Sinclair, the third-leading scorer in the nation (23 goals-8 assists), was one of four West Coast Conference players among the 11-player squad, including Santa Clara's Aly Wagner and Danielle Slaton, and Saint Mary's keeper Ruth Montgomery.

Sinclair was also named the Soccer Buzz West Region Freshman of the Year, and was joined on the West Region first-team by Lauren Orlandos.

Betsy Barr and Erin Misaki were second-team honorees, while Kristen Rogers joined Sinclair on the West Region all-Freshman team.

ORLANDOS, SINCLAIR NAB NATIONAL

HONORS: Portland freshman forward Christine Sinclair added to her list of accomplishments Thursday, as she was named a first-team 2001 NSCAA/adidas All-American. Sinclair was already named West Coast Conference Freshman of the Year, and is the leading freshman scorer in the country with 23 goals and eight

assists. Junior defender Lauren Orlandos repeated as a second-team all-American, after earning the same honors as a sophomore.

SINCLAIR IS TOP FROSH SCORER IN PORTLAND

HISTORY: Christine Sinclair needed only 24 games to put her name with Portland's elite all-time players, and is now on top of the all-time freshman scoring list with the world's best player.

Sinclair has 54 points (23g-8a) after notching two scores against Texas A&M. Tiffeny Milbrett had 50 points as a freshman in 1990 (18g-14a), and Shannon MacMillan had 48 in 1992 (19g-10a).

Sinclair's 23 goals are the new Portland rookie record, and her eight assists are seventh. Fellow freshman Kristen Moore is eighth on the rookie assists list with eight.

WCC COACHES TAB SINCLAIR FOR TOP FROSH

HONOR: Christine Sinclair's list of honors grew by two, as the Pilot striker was named West Coast Conference Freshman of the Year and first-team all-WCC.

Portland juniors Lauren Orlandos, Erin Misaki and Betsy Barr joined Sinclair on the first-team, sophomore Imani Dorsey was a second-team pick, while Brooke O'Hanley, Lindsay Smart and Lauren Arase were honorable mention.

League champion Santa Clara's Aly Wagner was named Player of the Year and Danielle Slaton was Defender of the Year. Coach of the Year honors were split by Paul Ratcliffe of Saint Mary's, and Santa Clara's Jerry Smith.

Sinclair is the fifth Pilot player named WCC Freshman of the Year, following Shannon MacMillan (1992), Justi Baumgardt (1993), Holly Pierce (1994), and Michelle French (1995).

Portland's eight all-WCC picks this year pushes Portland's total to 75 since the league started women's all-WCC teams in 1992. The Pilots have had 38 first-team picks in that span.

Misaki earned her third-straight first-team honor, while Orlandos repeated on the first team. Barr was a second-team pick in her freshman and sophomore seasons, while Dorsey was also a second-team pick as a freshman.

Smart also got her third all-WCC honor, after being first-team as a freshman and honorable mention as a sophomore. O'Hanley was an honorable mention pick as a freshman.
