PILOTS FACE BRONCOS SUNDAY - FINAL SENIOR GAME

THIS WEEK: Portland hosts Santa Clara this Sunday in a match which has traditionally shown the way to the West Coast Conference title. Portland (six) and Santa Clara (four) are the only teams to own WCC trophies.

PILOTS ON TV: Sunday's game with Santa Clara will be broadcast live on ASCN - Action Sports Cable Network. Paul Swangard handles the play-by-play, while former Pilot great Jimmy Clarke provides expert analysis.



SENIORS PLAY FINAL REGULAR SEASON MATCH: Portland seniors Erin Misaki, Emily Patterson, Betsy Barr, Lauren Orlandos, Lauren Arase and Valerie Fletcher will play their final regular season game Sunday against Santa Clara.

The sextet of seniors has compiled a four-year record of 64-18-2 - 43 wins by shutout - made two NCAA semifinal appearances, won a WCC title (2000), and collected 10 all-America awards, nine all-WCC awards, two WCC Player of the Year honors, and one WCC all-Academic award.

ABOUT #7 SANTA CLARA: The defending NCAA champions split matches at Pepperdine (1-0 loss) and Loyola Marymount (1-0 win) last weekend, improving to 12-4-1 overall, 4-1-0 in WCC games. Lana Bowen's first goal of the season was the game-winner

vs. LMU. Megan Kakadelas is one of three players with seven goals, and adds seven assists for 21 total points. Kristi Candau has a team-high eight goals. Aly Wagner (7g-5a), is expected to play against Portland, in the middle of playing for the U.S. national team in the 2002 Women's World Cup qualifying tourney.

Alyssa Sobolik has played the bulk of the keeper minutes, and has allowed eight goals for a 0.74 goals against average against three shutouts.

Santa Clara has outscored opponents 42-14 - 13-2 in WCC games. Last year, Santa Clara beat Portland 2-1 at Buck Shaw Stadium.

BRONCOS-PILOTS SERIES LEADS TO WCC

TITLES: The annual Santa Clara-Portland series stands at 8-10-1 for the Broncos, and the two schools own every WCC title ever awarded.

Portland has won six WCC titles, while Santa Clara has the other four. The Pilots are 5-4-1 against the Broncos in WCC games.



LAST LINE OF DEFENSE: Senior defender Lauren Orlandos and the Pilot defense recorded two more shutouts last weekend, running the team's season total to 11. The Pilots have recorded 43 shutouts in Orlandos' four seasons.

Collectively, Charles' men's and women's teams have won 12 conference championships (losing only 36 league games) and earned 18 NCAA playoff berths (including eight Final Four appearances) in a combined 29 seasons. Charles owns four Far West Region Coach of the Year and six conference Coach of the Year awards. Nineteen Pilots have earned All-America status during Charles' tenure.

Charles ranks third among active NCAA Division I women's soccer coach in all-time winning percentage (.798), and fourth among all women's Division I soccer coaches.

NATIONAL TEAM DUTY CALLS SINCLAIR,

AGAIN: Sophomore forward Christine Sinclair will miss at least one of Portland's remaining four matches to compete for Canada in the 2002 World Cup Qualifying tournament, which is serving as both the women's championship of this region and as the qualifying tournament for the 2003 Women's World Cup.

Sinclair missed Portland's opening two contests of the 2002 season while competing for Canada at the 2002 FIFA U-19 Women's World Championship. Sinclair was named the tournament's winner of both the Golden Boot (top scorer - 10 goals), and Golden Ball (Most Valuable Player).

The two finalists at the 2002 Women's Gold Cup will automatically qualify for the 2003 Women's World Cup, while the winner of the tournament's third-place game will qualify for a Women's World Cup qualifying playoff against the third place team from Asia.

LAST WEEKEND'S RESULTS:

Portland 1, Saint Mary's 0: Lindsey Huie's second-half goal Sunday lifted Portland to a 1-0 win at Saint Mary's.

The Pilots, playing without Christine Sinclair (Canadian national team duty), improved to 14-3-1 overall, 4-1-0 in WCC games.

Neither team was able to put the ball in the net as the score remained 0-0 at halftime. The Pilots outshot the Gaels 6-0 in the first half.

At the 62:43 minute mark, Portland ended the scoreless tie when Lindsey Huie connected on a shot to the upper right corner on a double-assist from Emily Patterson and Kristen Rogers.

SMC goalkeeper Ruth Montgomery finished with 10 saves, while the Pilot's Lauren Arase recorded one save. The Gaels were outshot in today's contest 14-2.

Portland 3, San Francisco 0: Christine Sinclair scored two goals Friday, and Lindsey Huie added a goal and an assist as #4 Portland beat San Francisco 3-0. The win improved Portland's all-time record to 15-1-0 against the Dons.

Ultimately, the Pilots just had more weapons to choose from. The ones that got away included a Kristen Moore shot from the left side of the field to a sprinting Christine Sinclair who put the ball into the upper corner of the net in the 16th minute. Sinclair would score again just after halftime, taking off on a

breakaway, again from the left side. Her second goal came on an assist from Lindsey Huie in the 62nd.

The Dons came close to getting a goal of their own toward the end of the match when Meghan Daly nimbly made it through the center of the field and past several Pilots' defenders, positioning herself about five yards out from the goal for a direct shot. But Portland goalie Lauren Arase guessed right on the direction of the shot off Daly's left foot and made the save.

At that point the momentum shifted again to the Pilots. Lindsey Huie added a third goal when she took off from the middle of the field and headed straight for the goal, unassisted, kicking the ball just inches past Orantes in the 89th.

RANKINGS: Portland returned to the top five in all four national polls, ranking #4 in the Soccer Buzz and NSCAA polls, #5 in the Soccer America and Soccer Times polls.

In regional rankings, the Pilots are #2 (Soccer Buzz, NSCAA), and #3 (Soccer Times, Soccer America).

PILOTS AMONG NATION'S LEADERS IN COMBINED SOCCER RECORDS: Portland's 24-8-2 combined men's and women's soccer record this season is 11th in the country in terms of winning percentage.

Stanford leads the list at a combined 26-4-1 (.855), followed by UCLA (22-4-2, .821), and UConn (25-6-1, .797). The Pilots' soccer program is tied for third with 24 total wins (Penn State).

MERLO RECORD TAKES A DIP: Portland's all-time record on Merlo Field dropped to 112-15-3 (.873) with the loss to Pepperdine. The Pilots have now lost only four West Coast Conference home matches - 1998 vs. Santa Clara (0-1), 1999 vs. San Diego (0-1), 2001 vs. Saint Mary's (0-1), and 2002 vs. Pepperdine (0-2).

RARE TIE ON MERLO: In Portland's 12-plus seasons of play on Merlo Field, the Pilots have only sustained four ties after this season's earlier 0-0 battle with North Carolina.

The Pilots tied California 0-0 in 1990 - the year Merlo Field opened - knotted UConn 3-3 in 1995, and played Wisconsin to a 0-0 tie in 1999.

In 13-plus seasons under Clive Charles, the Pilots have had only 12 ties.

SINCLAIR MOVES INTO CAREER TOP 10: Christine Sinclair now has 88 career points (7th), is third all-time in points per game (2.26), sixth in goals (39), and third in goals per game (1.00). She's also tied for 25th with 10 assists.

She needs just 12 points to tie for fourth (100 points), and would be just the sixth player in UP history to total 100 points.

WCC OPENERS: Portland improved to 10-1 in all-time WCC opening games after beating Gonzaga 4-1. The lone WCC opening loss was a 1-0 setback to Saint Mary's last year. The Pilots are 10-0-0 when opening the WCC season against Gonzaga.

CHARLES GIVEN LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD: The WUSA honored Portland head coach Clive Charles with a Lifetime Achievement Award at the WUSA Gala on Thursday, September 19, part of the WUSA All-Star weekend in Portland.

The head coach of both the men and women's soccer programs at the University of Portland, Charles, 50, was the head coach of the U.S. men's Olympic team that finished fourth at the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games. In 16 seasons as head coach of the Pilot men's team, and 13 seasons with the women, Charles has amassed a 406-134-41 record in a combined 29 seasons, and is one of just five coaches in NCAA history to win more than 400 college soccer games.

In addition, Charles has served U.S. Soccer in a number of coaching capacities throughout the years.

From 1995 to 1998, he was an assistant coach for the U.S. men's national team under Steve Sampson, including World Cup France '98. Charles was also the head coach of the U.S. Under-20 women's national team from 1993 to 1995.

"The WUSA All-Star Weekend is a true celebration of the players and coaches in women's soccer," said WUSA Commissioner Tony DiCicco. "The efforts of soccer leaders like Clive and Michelle played an important role in making the United States an elite country in the sport of women's soccer. In addition, Clive and Michelle were instrumental in the WUSA becoming a reality."

A FLAIR FOR THE DRAMATIC: Christine Sinclair was named offensive MVP of the NIKE Portland Invitational, keeping alive her streak of being all-tournament or MVP of every collegiate tournament in which she's played.

Sinclair scored both Portland goals - including an overtime "golden goal" game-winner - against CS Fullerton. She added two more goals in a 4-0 win over #7 Nebraska. Sinclair then assisted on Wanda Rozwadowska's goal against Denver.

WELCOME BACK, HERE'S YOUR AWARD: It didn't take Christine Sinclair long to get reacquainted with her Pilot teammates after missing the entire preseason and first two games while playing for Canada in the U-19 World Championships.

Sinclair scored two goals in Portland's wins over Clemson and Notre Dame, including the game-winner in the win over the Irish., and was named West Coast Conference Player of the Week, her fourth career WCC P.O.W. award.

PILOTS WIN NIKE PORTLAND INVITATIONAL: Portland scored two goals in the first 13 minutes Sunday, going on to a 2-0 win over Denver to win the NIKE Portland Invitational. The #6 Pilots (5-2-0) won their fifth straight game, and third in as many days after beating #7 Nebraska 4-0 on Saturday, and 2-1 in overtime over CS Fullerton on Friday.

Earlier Sunday, #16 Washington and CS Fullerton played to a 1-1 double overtime tie.

Portland's Christine Sinclair (offensive) and Lauren

Orlandos (defensive) were named tournament Outstanding Players, leading Portland to its first title in its own tourney since 1998, and fifth overall.

SUNDAY - #6 PORTLAND 2, DENVER 0: Wanda Rozwadowska's goal at 7:30 gave Portland some breathing room in their third game in three days, and just over five minutes later, Lindsey Huie's first career goal put the Pilots comfortably ahead 2-0.

The Pilots played superb possession soccer for the remainder of the game, and goalie Cristin Shea made six pedestrian saves for her second shutout of the season. Portland outshot Denver 8-3 in the first half, 11-8 in the game.

Sinclair nearly put the Pilots ahead in the opening minutes, but the shot clanged off the right post just 5:34 into the game. Sinclair figured in the game-winner two minutes later, though, sending Rozwadowska wide with a leading pass.

Rozwadowska scored her second goal in as many days, slotting the ball from nine yards out.

Betsy Barr, playing with a mask after suffering a broken nose Saturday against Nebraska, left a ball at the top of the box for Huie, who also slotted her shot under the Denver keeper.

The Pilots continued to control the contest for the remainder of the game, though Denver attempted several long-range shots in the second half.

#16 WASHINGTON 1, CS FULLERTON 1 (2ot):

The Huskies outshot Fullerton 24-5, but could only convert a first-half penalty kick against the Titans. Melissa Bennett knocked in the PK at 14:03 after a Washington player was shoved from behind in the box in the run of play.

Erica Jacalone tied the score at 68:21, heading in a cross that appeared to have been deflected by Washington keeper, Hope Solo.

Washington held a 20-5 shot advantage through regulation - 8-0 in the first half - while Fullerton's Karen Bardsley made 12 saves to keep the score tied.

second goal of the game with less than three minutes to play in the extra period ended the game.

Portland, which outshot the Titans 23-4, had a 1-0 lead at 70:40 when Canadian compatriots Wanda Rozwadowska and Sinclair connected for a goal. Rozwadowska, a second half substitute, collected the ball at the top of the box, dribbled slightly to her right, and layed the ball off for Sinclair. Sinclair then angled her shot to the far post, easily beating the Titan defense.

After a wave of substitutions over the next 13 minutes, Fullerton tied the contest when Kellie Cox sprung Wilson with a through ball to the right of the goal. Wilson beat Portland's interior defenders to the ball, and sent her shot far post past a sprawling Cristin Shea.

Sinclair nearly ended the game less than two minutes into overtime, but Fullerton keeper Karen Bardsley snuffed the attempt at the last second after Sinclair had broken free on a breakaway. Bardsley was busy all afternoon, making 12 saves.

DENVER 1, #16 WASHINGTON 0: Erica Iazard and Angie Portincaso provided stellar defense, supporting the Pioneers in the upset of the Huskies. Iazard made eight saves in the shutout win, while Portincaso was instrumental in slowing down the Washington offense.

Offensively, Denver counter-attacked throughout the game, finally capitalizing at 57:40 when Camile Flenniken's through ball to Katie Antongiovanni left the Denver striker along on the right side of the box. Antongiovanni then struck a low scooting shot to the far left post, slotting the ball past Washington keeper Hope Solo.

Washington outshot Denver 16-13, and had a 6-1 advantage in corner kicks.

SINCLAIR, ORLANDOS EARN KUDOS: Sophomore forward Christine Sinclair and senior defender Lauren Orlandos were named to the Soccer Buzz Elite 12 preseason all-America team. Sinclair was the consensus national Freshman of the Year in 2001 and a first-team all-America, while Orlandos was named to several all-America teams.

BARR SOLID FOR U.S. U-21 SQUAD: Senior midfielder Betsy Barr was a key component of the U.S. U-21 women's team which won a fourth consecutive Nordic Cup championship. Barr started in a 1-0 tourney-opening win over Finland, then came off the bench in a 1-0 loss to Denmark, and a 4-0 win over Greece. She did not play in the United States' 3-1 championship win over Germany.

PILOTS HOLD #2 SPOT IN WCC POLL: Coming off their first-ever national title in 2001, the Santa Clara women's soccer team was a unanimous choice by the other seven league coaches to repeat as WCC champs. The Broncos are fresh off a 23-2-0 season and their fifth trip to the national semifinals in six seasons. SCU will be without four-time all-american Danielle Slaton on defense, but return 2001 WCC Player of the Year and Hermann Award candidate Aly Wagner.

Last year, Portland made its third appearance in the College Cup in the last four seasons. The Pilots, picked second in the preseason poll, return nine of their 11 starters from last year's team, led by all-American forward Christine Sinclair.
