## Team Notes

### Last Time Out

Junior Tosan Evbuomwan led the way for Princeton, finishing with a game-high 20 points on 8-for-13 shooting, along with a game-high 11 rebounds, and five assists. His five assists brought his total to 135 assists in 2021-22, moving him to No. 3 all-time on Princeton's single season assist list, and one spot ahead of Franklin C. Cappon-Edward C. Green '40 Head Coach Mitch Henderson, who had 131 assists in the 1997-78 season. Senior Jaelin Llewellyn added 18 points and four rebounds, while senior Ethan Wright finished with 15 points, and four rebounds.

The Tigers also brought their point total to 2316, which stands as the most points ever scored in a season by a Princeton team. The previous season-best was 2311 points, set in 1974-75.

### All-Tournament Team

Evbuomwan was voted to the Ivy Madness All-Tournament Team after averaging 20.5 points per game, on 18-for-31 shooting from the field (58.1%). He also averaged 8.5 rebounds, 5.5 assists, and had two blocks and two steals.

### Ivy Player of the Year

Evbuomwan, unanimously voted both Ivy League Player of the Year and First Team All-Ivy League, ended regular season play as the Ivy League leader in assists per game (5.0), and assist/turnover ratio (2.2). He ranks second in the conference in field goal percentage (53.7%), fourth in points (15.8), fifth in steals (1.4), and seventh in rebounds (6.5). Evbuomwan scored a career-high 27 points on 10-for-17 shooting at Cornell University on Friday, February 4, and has handed out a career-high eight assists on two occasions: Saturday, December 11 in the Tigers' win at Lafayette, and Friday, January 15, in Princeton's 76-74 win over Brown. He's had 16 games of five assists or more, and also grabbed a career-high 11 rebounds in Princeton's 81-75 victory at Yale on Saturday, February 19. He was named to the 2021 Asheville Championship All-Tournament Team, and his 124 assists so far in 2021-22 currently ranks No. 7 all-time for most assists in a season in school history. He is the third Ivy League Player of the Year coached by Mitch Henderson, joining Spencer Weisz '17, and Ian Hummer '13.

### All-Ivy Honorees

Llewellyn earned all-conference honors for the second time in his career, as he was named Second Team All-Ivy League in 2020. In the Tigers' win at the University of Pennsylvania on Saturday, March 6, he joined the 1,000-point club, and he ranks sixth in the Ivy League in points per game (15.8), seventh in assists (2.7), and eighth in three-point field goal percentage (39.6%). Against Harvard University, he scored a season-high 29 points on 10-for-18 shooting from the field, and 4-for-9 shooting from deep as he led the Tigers to a 74-67 victory. Llewellyn was honored as the Ivy League Player of the Week on Monday, November 15, 2021, named to the 2021 Asheville Championship All-Tournament Team, and to the Lou Henson Award Mid-Season Watch List. His 127 made three-pointers rank #16 all-time in school history, and his 50 made three-pointers in the 2021-22 season rank T-#20 for made threes in a season.

Wright earned Second Team All-Ivy League honors for the first time in his career. He's recorded five double doubles on the season, and ranks fourth in the conference in rebounds per game (6.9), third in field goal percentage (50.6%), fourth in three-point percentage (40.0%), sixth in points (14.6), and sixth in three-point field goals per game (2.3). On Saturday, November 28, he scored a career-high 29 points and grabbed 10 rebounds in the Tigers' win over Fairleigh Dickinson University. He also knocked down seven three-pointers against FDU, which ranks T-#3 all-time in program history for made three-pointers in a game. On Sunday, November 14, he pulled down a career-high 18 rebounds against the University of Minnesota. Wright was honored as the Ivy League Player of the Week on Monday, November 22, 2021, Monday, December 20, 2021, and Monday, February 7, 2022.

Named Academic All-Ivy League, Friberg ranks second in the conference in three-point field goals per game (2.6), and third in three-point percentage (40.0%). He's also averaged 9.5 points per game so far in 2021-22. In the Tigers' 93-70 win at Penn on Saturday, March 5, he scored a season-high 18 points on 6-for-10 shooting from the field, and 5-for-8 shooting from long range. Friberg's 70 made three-pointers in the 2021-22 season rank T-#10 all-time in school history for made three-pointers in a season, and he currently sits at #14 on the Tigers' list for career made three-pointers, with 41.

### All-Tournament Team

Evbuomwan was voted to the Ivy Madness All-Tournament Team after averaging 20.5 points per game, on 18-for-31 shooting from the field (58.1%). He also averaged 8.5 rebounds, 5.5 assists, and had two blocks and two steals.

### Princeton At The NIT

It will be Princeton's first appearance in the NIT since 2016, and the second appearance under Head Coach Mitch Henderson. In the Tigers' first appearance under Henderson, they came up just short against Virginia Tech in Blacksburg, Virginia, on Wednesday, March 16. Princeton also made the NIT in 2002, 2000, 1999, 1975, and 1972. The Tigers won the event in 1975, defeating Providence in the Championship Game at Madison Square Garden, 80-69.

### Tiger-Ram History

The Tigers and Rams have met on one other occasion, November 29, 2016, in Richmond Virginia. On that night, the Rams came out on top, 81-70.

### Caught The Coach

With 135 assists in the 2021-22 season, Evbuomwan moved up to No. 3 on the Tigers' all-time single season assist list, and passed Head Coach Mitch Henderson, whose 131 assists in the 1997-98 season now rank fifth all-time in school history.

## Historical Wins

Should the Tigers win their next game and bring their win total to 24, they'll tie third-most wins in a season in school history. The Tigers also won 24 games in 1990-91, and 1996-97. The program record for wins is 27, and was set in the 1997-98 season.

## Triple Double Watch

Should Evbuomwan, or any Tiger, record a triple double, it would be the first in program history since assists were first recorded in 1974-75.

## Power Five Wins

Since the 2017-18 season, the Tigers' four Power Five wins is the most of any Ivy League school; Oregon State 81-80 (Nov. 21, 2021), South Carolina 66-62 (Nov. 12, 2021), Arizona State 67-66 (Dec. 29, 2018), and USC 103-93 (Dec. 19, 2017).

## The most interesting man in March Madness is drawing NBA scouts to N.J.

To gauge the prospects of Tosan Evbuomwan, a 6-foot-7 forward who hailed from the basketball hinterland of Newcastle Upon Tyne in England, his coach, Ian Macleod, composed a brief email and sent it to several American universities in October 2018.

At 17, Evbuomwan possessed a 6-foot-10 wingspan, studied at The Royal Grammar School and received seven A's and one B, in English language, that period. Macleod included statistics — 23 points and 10 rebounds from the season opener — and a highlight reel set to R&B music. He also noted that Evbuomwan and his father, Isaac, had decided to contact only “establishments with excellent reputations for academics as well as basketball provision.”

Brett MacConnell, the associate coach at Princeton, opened the email, watched the video, reviewed it with head coach Mitch Henderson and replied to Macleod that afternoon.

“Has Tosan taken the SAT or ACT yet?” MacConnell asked. “We are very interested.”

Eight days later, MacConnell boarded a Norwegian Air flight at John F. Kennedy Airport around 11:30 p.m., flew across the Atlantic Ocean overnight, landed at Gatwick Airport and drove 150 miles north to Charnwood College in Loughborough.

It was MacConnell's first time driving on the left side of the road, and when he negotiated a narrow one-way street near his destination, he knocked the mirror off a parked car. He left his insurance and contact information before entering a gym with two team benches and 25 spectators spread across a few rows of bleachers. The hardwood floor featured painted lines for netball, and tattered tape marked basketball's 3-point arc.

Evbuomwan's length and athleticism checked out. But he didn't play particularly well against the league's best team, and with 46 seconds left in the first half, his squad trailed, 56-15.

MacConnell photographed the scoreboard.

“I'll never forget this,” he said.

The game got no closer. Afterward, MacConnell spoke with Evbuomwan.

“I thought it was over,” Evbuomwan said, “but he started talking about next steps. I listened carefully to make sure I was hearing him right, that they were still interested.”

Evbuomwan was an international curiosity then, but he is the cynosure of Princeton's offense now. The Tigers average 80.6 points per game — ranked eighth nationally, between Purdue and Duke, and on pace to be the most in program history. Evbuomwan leads the Ivy League in assists — five per game — as he feeds a rotation of six marksmen who shoot around 40 percent beyond the arc.

They are 22-5, regular-season champions, the top seed in the conference tournament and will square with Cornell Saturday morning in a semifinal. Once known for overwhelming opponents with well-timed back-door cuts at the end of the shot clock, the Princeton offense flows through Evbuomwan, who throws deft

passes and makes devil-may-care drives from the high post.

Teammates call him “Slow Mo” for his diligence in deciphering the best path to the basket, but his development has been rapid since picking up the game when he was 13 years old. He credits unique opportunities amid the pandemic — practicing daily with a professional team in Newcastle and three-on-three games in Tel Aviv — with his growth while the Ivy League canceled last season. As a freshman, he averaged 14 minutes and four points per game. On Tuesday, the junior was unanimously selected by coaches as the Ivy League Player of the Year.

“Thank goodness Tosan was introduced to the game when he was,” Henderson said. “I think if any earlier or any different situation, maybe he is not at Princeton.”

## Indescribable Loss

Evbuomwan grew up the youngest son of a doctor and a pilot in northeast England. His mother, Michelle, was born to a British mother and Nigerian father in the U.K., where she earned her commercial pilot’s license before moving to Nigeria, her father’s home country, after her mother died when she was 18.

In Nigeria, Michelle became the first female captain to pilot a plane, and her passenger list included Nelson Mandela, the late president of South Africa, when he toured the continent. She also led Red Cross relief flights during the Angolan War, where she flew in and out of combat areas. One day, she went in for a physical, and met Isaac Evbuomwan. They had mutual friends, started dating, and one year later, Isaac uprooted to train as a gynecologist in England. She followed him soon after, and they planned to live in the United States. She went so far as to earn an Airline Transport Pilot’s license, which enabled her to fly in the U.S. before getting married. But after starting a family, she stopped flying and settled in Newcastle.

Tosan was sporty. At 3, he dragged his uncle, Dele, a doctor, out of their house, ran around, returned breathless, re-hydrated and said, “I don’t know why I am so good.” At 5, he played lawn tennis, and represented the county at a showcase. He also demonstrated uncommon balance in soccer and, at 8, was invited into the Newcastle United Youth Academy, which many see as the path to playing soccer professionally in the soccer-centric society.

He was a midfielder, but his interest waned a few years later. He was approaching a point when he would be expected to spend one full day per week outside the academic setting to focus solely on soccer. When he was 11, he told his mother, who was battling breast cancer, that he no longer enjoyed playing soccer as much as he had, but he didn’t want to regret leaving it. That September, his father encouraged him to start the season, and if he felt the same later, he could step away. Finally, that February, Tosan and his family informed administrators Tosan was leaving the soccer academy.

“From our perspective, if he stopped enjoying it, there is no point,” Isaac said. “He was in the position every kid and family wants to be in, but he wanted to walk away from it.”

Evbuomwan diversified his athletics portfolio. As a runner, he competed in the 100 and 200 meters, as well as cross country. If anyone needed to find him, he was likely in the classroom or at a rugby match on school grounds. On Nov. 16, 2012, his mother died, and Isaac called the school’s headmaster. The family was afforded a private room, where Isaac informed his sons of their mother’s death.

“The loss was indescribable,” Isaac said.

He insisted on “carrying on the template” he had built with Michelle, but Evbuomwan soon pivoted to a new sport: basketball. Evbuomwan’s father picked up the game at 14, when it was introduced to his school in Nigeria, and played in England. They had a basketball hoop in their backyard, and Isaac had taken Tosan to some of his games. Evbuomwan showed little interest then, but now he and a friend approached Michael Davidson, the school’s deputy director of sports, about organizing a team.

Davidson never played basketball, but liked to widen his pupils’ skill base. He bought a rulebook, brought in a referee to explain the game and took his team to an interscholastic tournament. A club coach asked Davidson about where Evbuomwan played previously. Davidson explained that this was new to Tosan. Nonsense, Heath said. To him, it was clear Evbuomwan had been coached.

“He basically called me a liar,” Davidson said. “I pulled Tosan aside, and said, ‘Are you certain that you haven’t had any coaching?’”

Evbuomwan said he played “a bit in my backyard,” which was true, but once Evbuomwan started with Davidson, he played basketball on netball courts or baskets set up by soccer fields. He also negotiated with teachers to let him on court before school. He started showing up at 7 a.m. and still played other games after classes.

“He’d come to basketball practice with muddy knees from rugby,” Macleod said.

Evbuomwan could be hard to evaluate. When Alan Keane first saw him, he cut Evbuomwan from Great Britain’s U15 team. Two years later, Keane still wondered if Evbuomwan could shed his even-keeled manner and fight when necessary. Convinced he might, Keane chose Evbuomwan for the U18 team.

In the group play opener of the 2019 Euro Championships in Greece, Keane’s team lost to Turkey by 41 points and lost its star player to injury. Evbuomwan managed to score just two points. They needed to bounce back a day later against Serbia, which was led by Aleksej Pokusevski, now with the Oklahoma City Thunder.

Evbuomwan, who had committed to Princeton by then, stepped up, and it was his emotional intelligence that struck Keane. During a timeout, Evbuomwan addressed his teammates.

“He was giving confidence to people in a very authentic, powerful way without raising his voice, without being a dictator,” Keane said. “He was connecting in a way that had them believing we could do this.”

Great Britain won, 87-85, in overtime. Evbuomwan finished with 18 points and 10 rebounds.

“He’s going to be a hell of a pro,” Keane told Macleod.

## The Lid Came Off

When Mitch Henderson played for Princeton, the Tigers made history in the NCAA Tournament. It was 1996, and his team, coached by Pete Carril, faced UCLA, the defending national champions, in the first round. UCLA was scoring more than 78 points per game, and Princeton knew it needed to slow the tempo in order to have a chance at victory. They executed the game plan, weaving the ball on offense and trapping on defense to limit UCLA’s possessions. On Princeton’s final offensive play, freshman Gabe Lewullis beat his man back door. The Tigers won, 43-41. Henderson leapt in the air and pumped his fist.

Henderson, 46, returned to his alma mater as head coach in 2011. His teammate, Sydney Johnson, had led the Tigers to the NCAA Tournament the previous season before departing to coach Fairfield, and Henderson sought to keep the ball moving. He preached making the correct reads on cuts, but also wanted to quicken the pace. As recently as 2009, Princeton still was averaging 59 points per game, but Henderson's offenses have consistently scored in the 70s.

"We don't call that many plays," he said. "We work hard at: What do you see? What are you doing on this possession to help somebody else get a good shot?"

Henderson and his staff weren't quite sure where Evbuomwan would fit when he arrived in 2019. In workouts, he started out as a wing, and Henderson noted sound footwork, as well as his ability to shift defenders through subtle head fakes. In his first start, against Indiana at Assembly Hall, Evbuomwan acknowledged the environment was "nerve-racking." Teammate Richmond Aririguzoh, approached him near midcourt as they readied for tipoff, and said, "Whatever happens, I'll never judge you."

Evbuomwan scored 12 points in defeat, and six days later, he displayed uncommon poise against Arizona State at Jadwin Gymnasium. Down one with 30 seconds remaining, he drove from the high post to go up one. Arizona State won at the buzzer, but teammates and coaches took note of the import's composure. The Tigers finished 14-13 overall and 9-5 in the Ivy League for third place.

Then, the coronavirus coursed through New Jersey, and the Ivy League tournament was canceled. Classes moved online, and campus went quiet. To keep in touch with players, Henderson started a speaker series via Zoom. Golden State Warriors coach Steve Kerr and U.S. Senator Cory Booker popped in for a virtual visits with the team. Evbuowman, back in England, stayed up past midnight to participate.

When it became clear that Princeton's classes would be conducted virtually to start the fall semester in 2020, Princeton checked with the NCAA, and Evbuomwan was allowed to practice with the Newcastle Eagles, a professional team coached by Macleod in the British Basketball League. But he could not play in games. Each morning, he was matched up with Justin Gordon, a 6-6, 215-pound forward who had starred stateside with Wofford. Gordon, 27, called the sessions Evbuomwan's "redshirt year," and Evbuomwan attended every film session. With the time difference, he was five hours ahead of New Jersey, so after practice, he logged in for remote learning. To update Princeton's coaches on his progress, Evbuomwan sent video clips of his workouts.

"He lived six months as a pro," Macleod said.

When he returned to campus for the spring semester, Evbuowman impressed in workouts. He had also grown an inch. Desperate for game competition since the Ivy League canceled the entire 2020-21 season, he signed on to play for Great Britain's nascent three-on-three national team. To take the court in games for the first time since March 2020, he traveled to Tel Aviv last summer, where he spent less than a week honing his pivots and passing angles. In the fall, he dominated pickup games at Princeton, and early in the season, Keeshawn Kellman, a 6-9 forward, went in and out of the lineup with a string of injuries. Henderson worked Evbuomwan in more as a center. The team had shooters, and Evbuowman's versatility provided Henderson with a dynamic distributor.

"We've tended to play around a post here forever, but we've really never had anybody quite like him," Henderson said. "There's not a defense he doesn't see right through."

His decision-making was on display against Drexel in November. The game was tied, 79-79, with 8.6 seconds left in overtime when the ball came to Evbuomwan on the left elbow. He looked to pass first, waited for a teammate to cut behind him and then drove down to the left block. With his back to Drexel's Amari Williams, who played with Evbuomwan on England's U18 team, he pivoted and spun to get Williams in the air before making the game-winning lefty layup to finish with 27 points, a career high. NBA scouts took note soon after, and one, who evaluated him in person, said, "He's long, can really pass, defends and has a great IQ. That's going to get you looks and a chance."

The Tigers took off, winning 10 straight games. When Cornell led by 18, Princeton charged back to win on a 3-pointer at the buzzer by sophomore Matt Allocco. A month later, with the team's defense catching up with the offense, Princeton mauled Dartmouth, 85-40.

"The lid just came off," Henderson said.

Evbuowman knew how to seal a win. At Harvard, the Tigers trailed the Crimson by one point with nine seconds left, and Evbuomwan received the inbounds pass from the baseline out beyond the 3-point arc. The other four Tigers – two on each side — were hugged by defenders as Evbuomwan dribbled with his right hand, crossed over to his left, hesitated and continued left against Harvard's Mason Forbes, who stands 6-9. Evbuomwan lifted off his left foot in the lane and extended his left hand. His timing and length allowed him to finish the layup that clinched a share of the Ivy League championship. To Macleod, the most familiar part of the play was Evbuomwan's ballhandling – the cross hesitation – at the start.

"That's his move," Macleod said. "We have kids in our academy now that say, 'Oh, I do that Tosan move.'"

## Evbuomwan's Evolution

Last Saturday, Steve Donahue, the head coach at the University of Pennsylvania, awoke with Covid symptoms, and called his associate coach, Nat Graham, to inform him that an at-home test was positive. Graham coached the Quakers against Princeton at the Palestra that evening, and he was active on the sideline, particularly on possessions when Evbuomwan started the dribbling the ball by midcourt toward one of Penn's big men. Graham quickly threw up his hands.

"Help!" Graham said. "Help!"

Evbuomwan overwhelmed his counterparts. He wore a white headband beneath his blonde-tipped braids and whirled to the rim, taking a hard dribble right, twisting and then finishing with a soft lefty layup. If one spin did not gain separation from a defender, he spun twice to slip ahead. He shot over some Quakers and got underneath others. On one possession, he directed senior Drew Friberg, who had the hot hand, to an open spot on the floor, passed it to Friberg and watched him hit one of his five 3-pointers. Evbuomwan had 23 points, eight rebounds and seven assists. Princeton committed two turnovers and won, 93-70.

"I remember at the beginning of the year, hearing they're trying Tosan at the five a little bit," Graham said. "We were like, that's crazy. It's worked. It's very hard to guard. If you help at all, he hits somebody and they all shoot so well."

Out on the court, Evbuomwan, who wears No. 20 in memory of his mother's birthday, celebrated with teammates. It had been two years since an Ivy League trophy had been awarded, and Evbuomwan kissed the cup before draping a championship banner over his shoulders. It was Princeton's 28th league title, but Evbuomwan was new to such celebrations. His last came early in his youth at a regional event.

"Best feeling in the world," he said.

Back home, in Newcastle, it was past 1 a.m. His father, who remarried recently and has a 19-month-old daughter, celebrated. On Wednesday, he stopped by Jesmond Old Cemetery to visit his late wife's grave, which is topped by a black granite headstone engraved with pilot wings – the same pair that Evbuomwan has tattooed around his ribcage — and a tribute:

Gone From Our Lives

But Not From Our Hearts

Rest In Peace Darling

Infinite Love Isaac, Toju and Tosan

He updated her on the boys' progress.

"I'm sure she is buzzing," he said.

## Princeton men's basketball routs Penn to clinch outright Ivy League regular-season championship

PHILADELPHIA — Jaelin Llewellyn watched on television last March as other teams across the country got to lift championship trophies.

Even in a season that was anything but normal, those teams were, at least, given the opportunity to play.

In many ways, that has fueled Llewellyn and his teammates to Princeton's best campaign since the 2016-17 side went undefeated through the Ivy League.

Llewellyn scored 24 points to go over 1,000 for his career and the Tigers clinched the outright Ivy regular-season championship by scorching Penn, 93-70, on Saturday night at The Palestra.

"I've been thinking about this moment since the Cornell game two years ago," Llewellyn said. "I just imagined it and it's kind of surreal. I haven't even been able to process it. I know we still have more to do, but I'm definitely going to remember this one."

One net down, one more to cut.

Princeton (22-5, 12-2) won its seventh straight game and officially clinched the No. 1 seed for next weekend's Ivy Tournament. The Tigers also assured themselves of a berth in the NIT should they not be victorious in Cambridge, Mass.

"It's the best feeling in the world," said forward Tosan Evbuomwan, who finished with 23 points, eight rebounds and seven assists. "It's the goal we set at the beginning of the year and we accomplished it. Obviously, the job isn't finished, we've got another step to go in terms of this (coming) weekend. It's great to tick that one off and we're definitely going to celebrate that."

Princeton produced an offensive clinic inside The Cathedral of college basketball to put a bow on its 28th Ivy championship.

Drew Friberg made five 3s to help account for his 18 points and Matt Allocco added 12 as the Tigers shot 55.2%, had 13 assists to two turnovers and connected on 12 treys, one above their average, which ranks fifth nationally. Princeton busted the game open with a 17-4 run early in the second half to go up 67-48 with 12:24 remaining.

"They are a veteran group and they don't make many mistakes," said Penn associate head coach Nat Graham, who filled in for Steve Donahue after the head coach tested positive for COVID-19 earlier in the day. "Everything we tried to do differently defensively, it's like they found one thing that was wrong with it and took advantage of it. ... They post guys that struggle guarding in the post, if we switched they took advantage of that, every time we came off one of their shooters they seemed to find him."

Llewellyn needed 14 points to become the 36th player in program history to reach the milestone and got it on a basket with 4:25 remaining in the first half.

Most impressively, the senior from Mississauga, Ontario achieved the mark in 73 career games — he missed the first nine games of his freshman season with an injury and Princeton didn't play last year due to the pandemic — and has a career average of 13.8 points per game.

"It's kind of perfect," Llewellyn said. "It's just a testament that I've put in, that we've put in. It's an individual accolade, but I prefer the team win more. It's a good night for it."

Llewellyn is playing his best basketball at the right time. He is averaging 23 points on 50.9% from the field and 43.4% on 3s over the last three games.

"I refocused and doubled down on being as aggressive as I could," Llewellyn said. "Try not to take any plays off and I think it's been showing."

The best, Llewellyn added, is yet to come.

"We have so much more room to grow," he said. "We'll take this week to try and do that because we have a big one coming up."

## Princeton Tigers display stripes during win streak

*The Tigers have won nine straight games and hold first place in the Ivy League at 4-0. They look to extend the win streak to double digits at Dartmouth Saturday.*

Don't count out Mitch Henderson and the Princeton Tigers.

The Tigers have won nine straight and are a perfect 4-0 in Ivy League play. Several of these victories have come down to the final moments, including three decided by a single possession. Two of the wins came without star guard Jaelin Llewellyn, who leads the team in scoring at 15.9 points per game. It seems as though every game, someone different comes up with a historic moment.

After picking up wins over Drexel, Bucknell and Lafayette, Princeton made it four in a row with an 89-77 win over UMBC in mid-December. The Tigers held slight control throughout this close game, but it was neither Llewellyn nor Tosan Evboumwan who won the player of the night. It was fifth-year senior Elijah Barnes.

With a 73-71 lead, Barnes took the game into his own hands and scored four straight points. He then hit a dagger three to set a career-high of nine points.

"I got an opportunity and made the most out of it," Barnes said. "That's all anybody has to do. We have 19 guys, so any one of us can play. Anybody can do what I do."

Barnes wasn't a normal rotation player. Prior to this game, he had played more than 13 minutes just once, and it was in a 37-point blowout win a couple of years ago. In this game against UMBC, he made a big impact in a close game against a good team.

"I'm very proud of Elijah," Henderson said. "He hasn't been playing. He comes in and works every single day. Never says anything but support for his teammates. In fact, he's the best communicator about what's best for other guys on the team at that moment."

The Tigers took a five-game winning streak into the new year after a 100-59 win over D-III Kean on Dec. 21. They would not play again until Jan. 7 as its Ivy League opener was postponed due to COVID issues within the Harvard program.

Princeton's league game was against Columbia, who was picked last in the preseason poll. The Lions entered the game at 3-9, including a 38-point loss to UMBC - a team Princeton beat by 12.

Columbia gave Princeton a battle and ended a dominant first half on a 9-2 run to take a 45-33 lead at the break. The team, who was 200 spots lower than the Tigers on Ken Pomeroy, was on the way to pulling off a massive upset, but it didn't last.

The Tigers went on a 15-0 second-half run and got their to as much as 18 en route to beating the Lions 84-69. Princeton outscored Columbia by 27 in the second half.

"We got punched in the face, and I think we responded well," Ebuomwan said.

Evbuomwan picked up 22 points and six rebounds, but that was nothing new to him this season. He scored 27 against Drexel and is averaging 14.7 points per game, good for second-best on the team.

Next up was the Cornell Big Red, who had an excellent non-conference finishing 8-3. For this one, the Tigers were without Llewellyn because of an injury.

He stepped sophomore Matt Allocco, who made his first collegiate start. Once again it was not a pretty first half as the Tigers trailed 39-25 at the break. Cornell extended its lead to 47-29 at the first media timeout.

After that, the 3-pointers began to fall for Princeton.

Drew Friberg and Ethan Wright hit two quick triples to cut the Big Red lead back down to eight with 10 minutes remaining. Allocco hit another, followed by one from Ryan Langborg, as part of an 8-0 run to tie the game with three minutes left.

After the Tigers took the lead, Cornell hit a layup with six seconds left, to go up 70-69.

That was when Allocco put the game in his hands. As time expired, he threw up a three that dropped to give Princeton the 72-70 win on his birthday no less.

"I don't know what to tell ya," he said, "End of the buzzer, had to get it up. It went in, and that's all I can ask for. We got the win, that's all that matters."

Allocco's shot was featured on both March Madness' Twitter and Scott Van Pelt's "SportsCenter" as "The Best Thing (He) Saw Today."

The Tigers carried that momentum into an impressive victory against Brown in another game that went down to the final seconds.

It was close throughout, and Princeton took the lead because of some sharpshooting late. Evbuomwan ultimately made the game-winning defensive play. After a missed 3-point attempt by the Bears, Evbuomwan stopped Tamenang Choh from taking the game-tying shot under the basket as time expired.

Llewellyn returned on Martin Luther King Jr. Day after a two-game absence due to injury. He helped Princeton defeat rival Penn 74-64. The win moved the Tigers' win streak to nine and a perfect 11-0 at home.

Princeton will look to extend its stellar start on Saturday as it travels to face a pesky Dartmouth team in its first road game since Dec. 11.

With how deep this Tigers' squad is, one needs to remember them when filling out brackets in March. Not many teams can do it in multiple ways like them, and the Tigers have shown they can do it against big-time opponents. Prior to this current win streak, they beat both South Carolina and Oregon State and took Minnesota to double overtime.

The Tigers are primed to make their first trip to the Big Dance since 2017 and win their first tournament game since the '90s.

## After remarkable journey, Elijah Barnes knows it's better to give than receive

*The Princeton basketball senior and former Mater Dei Prep star spent last winter working in an Amazon warehouse and distributing thousands of donated children's books. Now he's helping the Tigers win.*

Elijah Barnes doesn't complain about playing time, or the amount of shots he gets, or the various demands of Division I basketball.

The Princeton University senior and former Mater Dei Prep standout sees the big picture. Because last year at this time, he was working the overnight shift in an Amazon warehouse.

"Really grinding and throwing boxes around from 7 p.m. to 5 in the morning," Barnes said. "It's definitely an experience I won't forget. I've worked hard my whole life, whether it's been in school or in sports. This was just a different way."

He's thinking of his old colleagues right about now, as the Christmas rush hits high gear.

"Seeing all the people who work in the warehouse overnight making sure everybody gets their packages on time, things people take for granted every day, it was good perspective," Barnes said.

Perspective. Barnes has it by the bucket-load. During his time at Old Nassau he's spent a summer teaching kids in Shanghai, he's tutored immigrants in English in Philadelphia, he's helped new citizens register to vote in Trenton, and he's marched on the front lines of racial justice rallies all over Monmouth County. In 2020, when the pandemic shut down Princeton's basketball program and closed its campus for what turned out to be nearly a year, he made the bold decision to defer his senior year until 2021-22.

So he didn't enroll in classes, took a job at Amazon, played pickup ball with friends and orchestrated a book drive that delivered 5,000 children's books to places that needed them.

All of that is why, when Barnes came off the bench to score nine points in 13 minutes during Princeton's 89-77 win over UMBC Dec. 13 — making all four of his field-goal attempts in the process — it was a performance with meaning way beyond the box score.

"He's a guiding force on our team: very mature, always consistent, always positive," said Princeton coach Mitch Henderson, whose squad is 9-3 and looking like Ivy League title contenders. "When he got an opportunity, he played great. I'm very happy for him and proud of him."

### Making the most of a year off

Barnes, who hails from Freehold, was the Shore Conference Player of the Year for Mater Dei Prep in 2017. At Princeton, the 6-foot-7 forward served as a role player. When the pandemic exploded, Princeton's juniors were faced with a choice, knowing the Ivy League might scrap the 2020-21 season: Stick around until graduation and then take their final year of eligibility elsewhere, or take a gap year and return in 2021-22.

"It wasn't a decision that came lightly to anybody," Henderson said. "I was fully supportive of whatever any of the guys decided."

Two players chose to graduate and transfer, two chose the gap year.

"I wanted to have a normal school year with my friends and have fun and play basketball with the people I've been with my entire time in college," Barnes said. "Princeton is my home and the guys on the team have become some of my best friends."

During the gap year Barnes, whose family moved to the Bayville section of Berkeley Township in Ocean County, got together for pickup runs with fellow local hoopers like Eric Carter (from Jackson, played at Delaware), Eli Cain (from Willingboro, played at DePaul), Noah Harris (from Manalapan, plays at Marist), Chris Smith (from Lakewood, played at Louisville) and Ben Roy (plays at Manasquan High School).

That and the Amazon gig kept Barnes in shape, but he wanted more. So he asked the Boys & Girls Clubs of Mercer County: What are your biggest needs? He learned that, due to the challenges of virtual schooling, kids were falling behind with literacy. So he put out a call for books on Instagram.

"Within five days I had maybe 15-20 storage bins full of children's books," he said. Barnes eventually oversaw the distribution of 5,000-plus between the Boys & Girls Clubs of Mercer and Monmouth counties and his old school district in Freehold.

"He's a thoughtful person," Henderson said. "He has intentions to make his mark in the community. We're fortunate because of it."

'He embodies what we're trying to be'

This fall Barnes returned to Princeton basketball as an elder statesman and a puzzle piece. He's appeared in seven games off the bench for the Tigers, averaging six minutes. His focus is on hustle plays — boxing out, blocking shots, setting screens — but his nine points vs. UMBC marked a career high against a Division I opponent.

"It was exciting to be out there," Barnes said. "It wasn't about myself; I was just making sure we could win the game. Seeing how happy my teammates were for me, it made me realize how much we all care about each other."

That camaraderie makes this "probably the best Princeton team I've been on," Barnes said.

Henderson is excited about this group's vibe, too.

"We're resilient and more mature," the coach said. "It's a really fun team to coach and Elijah's a big part of that. He embodies what we're trying to be."

Barnes has the world in his hands. He just turned 23 and will graduate in May with a history degree. He's considering careers in education or sports media. Before his collegiate days are up, he'd like to launch a free basketball clinic or mentorship program with some of his teammates.

Right now he's focused on doing the little things to keep Princeton rolling, but as Amazon delivery vans rumble through the neighborhood, he's reminded of former co-workers grinding it out in the warehouse. One of them has come to some of his games this season.

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In a way, his time slinging boxes mirrored his tenure with the Tigers.

"It's intense," Barnes said. "I appreciate everybody who works hard and doesn't get credit."

## Matt Allocco, Princeton men's basketball's big talker, ready to take on Ivy League

PRINCETON — If it were up to Matt Allocco, he would have himself introduced as Mush.

"It's short for Mush Mouth," Allocco said. "My dad used to call me that because I was always running my mouth."

It's actually an endearing nickname that has stuck with Allocco even as he moved on from a stellar high school career in Ohio to join the team at Princeton.

"It's a quality we appreciate," Tigers coach Mitch Henderson quipped as Allocco's was explaining its origins.

It sets the 6-foot-4 sophomore guard apart from his teammates, some of whom are more comfortable leading by example than vocally.

"We all have our strengths and weaknesses and that's one of mine and I think it can help the team," Allocco said. "Whatever I can do to help the team is what I'm going to try to do. That's what I'm good at, so I'm going to keep doing it."

What Allocco and his teammates are doing is working. Princeton is off to a 10-3 start, its best since the 2013-14 season, and is ranked among the top 30 nationally in 2-point FG%, 3-point FG%, effective FG% and 3-pointers made per game.

Almost all of them have said the team chemistry is best they've ever been a part of.

"The team, ever since I showed up on campus, has been unbelievable," Allocco said. "We're all best friends now. We can hang around each other and on the court we are great teammates. It's been easy to fit in."

That Allocco ended up in a college basketball uniform shouldn't come as any surprise if you knew anything about his family, also one with deep New Jersey roots.

His father, Greg, grew up in Berkley Heights and starred at Governor Livingston, and played at Susquehanna University. His older siblings, sister Carly and brother Chris, both played in college. He's related to the famous Frank Allocco, a New Providence legend, who played basketball and football at Notre Dame.

"I'm the youngest in my family," Allocco said. "...I got a ton of family around New Jersey. We're some big names historically. I kind of come from a basketball bloodline."

That's one of the things Henderson likes about him.

"It's in the blood," the coach said.

Allocco has carved out an important role on this team: come off the bench and provide stable ball handling and defense and knock down an open 3-pointer when it presents itself.

He's appeared in all 13 games, averaging 18.4 minutes. He had a big steal in a recent victory over UMBC that sparked a late 7-0 run to secure the victory.

It was the exact kind of play his coach is counting on him to make.

“We have an identity and we want to keep chopping at it and making it sharper,” Henderson said. “We’ve come a long way since we opened up against Rutgers-Camden. It feels like a really different team. That’s a really good thing. I wasn’t sure how this would go, but I’m very pleased with where we are. It’s just the beginning. Now the real stuff starts.”

The real stuff the coach is alluding to is Ivy League play.

Allocco hasn’t experienced it yet, but he’s ready.

“I’m excited to get into those environments,” he said. “We’ve come in with a mentality that we’re going to get a little better each day and I think we have. We compete and we have some focuses on active hands, running into gaps, staying in front of the ball and I think we’re only going to continue to improve.”

## Men's Basketball: The Star Forward from Newcastle

*Growing up in soccer country, Tosan Evbuomwan '23 found his talent on the court*

Tosan Evbuomwan '23 has been on a steady climb since taking up organized basketball late, at the age of 14.

He grew up more fixated athletically on traditional English pursuits, like soccer, in Newcastle, a few hours north of London. But he did have a basketball hoop at home. His father, Isaac, had played in Nigeria.

"It didn't get much use when I was younger ... but it was always there," said Evbuomwan, (pronounced Eh-WHOA-Ma). "When I started to pick it up, I was in the back garden using it all the time, rather than the soccer goal."

He gravitated to the Newcastle Eagles, the top club team in the area, but Evbuomwan and a friend had to push for their high school to start a basketball team. Though still learning, he made Great Britain's under-18 national team for the 2018 and 2019 European Championships. As he began to entertain playing professionally, he emailed Princeton's basketball program, which had never seen him play in person, for the chance to compete collegiately overseas.

"It's an unusual recruiting situation," said Princeton coach Mitch Henderson '98. "We got really lucky."

Evbuomwan came to Princeton unsure of how much he would contribute. "Especially when you're from the U.K., you tend to think everyone in America is so much better," he said. But the 6-foot-8 forward brought uncommon attributes. He retained the skills that enabled him to play point guard in a pinch for his club team the year before.

In a freshman year in which he made 19 starts, Evbuomwan averaged 3.9 points, 1.8 rebounds, and 0.9 assists per game, though his production tailed off in the final weeks. This year, he posted averages of 15.4 points, 6.1 rebounds, and 4.9 assists through the first 26 games. Henderson says that in his coaching tenure only T.J. Bray '14 was more efficient offensively.

"Tosan has a very unique disposition," said Henderson. "He's very calm. The guys call him Slow-Mo. ... He just sees things happening in slow motion. His vision is just incredible, as is his feel for the game."

Every aspect of Evbuomwan's game has grown since the COVID-19 pandemic ended the 2020 season. Gym access in Newcastle was difficult when the pandemic began, but Evbuomwan took advantage of every opportunity before returning to Princeton for the in-person spring 2021 semester, in which the team worked out together. He continued to develop last summer while playing for Great Britain's under-23 3x3 team in the Nations League Europe-America Conference.

Evbuomwan's dramatic growth and elevated stats have led Princeton into contention for the league's NCAA Tournament bid and put him in the conversation for Ivy League Player of the Year. At Harvard Feb. 27, he drove for a layup with less than five seconds remaining to clinch the win and earn Princeton at least a share of the Ivy League championship. The Tigers had a 21-5 overall record heading into the final week of the regular season.

## A 'brazen' Ethan Wright has key role for Princeton men's basketball

PRINCETON — Ethan Wright had been waiting 613 long days for this.

The Princeton men's basketball team finally played another competitive game in front of fans at Jadwin Gymnasium.

"It felt great just to be back with the guys and playing against somebody else in uniform," Wright said after he scored seven points in a 94-28 romp over Division III Rutgers-Camden in the season opener on Tuesday night. "I haven't done that in over 600 days. The last time I did that I was a sophomore and a lot has changed since then. It's incredible to be back in Jadwin."

Wright came out firing like it was still March of 2020 and the Tigers hadn't just had a season canceled. He hit his first three shots and got to break a sweat in a 13-minute run before Princeton (1-0) heads to Asheville, N.C., for a game against South Carolina on Friday.

Now a senior captain, the 6-4 guard from Newton Centre, Mass., will be counted on to do more than he ever has before. Wright flashed plenty of potential during a sophomore campaign in which he averaged 7.2 points and shot 36.3% from 3.

"It was definitely difficult watching every other team play last year and not being able to play, but I think we have grown up a lot," Wright said. "We have a strong senior class and I think we've become a lot better at leading and we kind of understand because we've had great leaders in the past what we kind of need to do now. I think we're ready to make the jump to being senior leaders and captains."

Wright said he tried to get in the gym as much as possible — maybe played a few games of horse against his mother Ellen who was an All-Ivy player at Princeton in the mid-1980s — and was able to be on campus in the spring with a handful of other players.

"I think we get along really well off the court and that helps us on the court," Wright said. "We were able to kind of mesh together."

Wright earned minutes as a sophomore by being a defensive stopper, and while he's going to show more of his offensive game this season, coach Mitch Henderson doesn't want him to forget what got him on the floor in the first place.

Henderson, put directly, wants him to be brazen.

"We measure things that are effort and he leads us in those contagious," the 11th-year coach said. "I want him to continue to do that and look people in the eye and be like 'why aren't you doing that.' That's what I think. He's going to make shots, but when you are brazen and play that way, it raises the level."

Wright is embracing his increased role both on the court and as a leader off it.

“Going back to my first two years, I had great upperclassmen ahead of me, so I could kind of talk less and kind of do my thing and look to them for what I was supposed to be doing,” Wright said. “Now there are a lot of guys who don’t know what they are doing all the time and they are looking to guys like me, Jaelin and Drew, so I think it has been harder for me to be more vocal, but it’s something I’m constantly working on. I think I’m getting better at it, but it’s definitely a shift being a senior now and having people look up to you.”

## 'Four-minute games': How Princeton keeps coming back when you least expect

PRINCETON – Matt Allocco slid through the locker room entrance doors at Jadwin Gym to meet with reporters. To recap: On his 21st birthday, he earned his first collegiate start in place of the injured Jaelin Llewellyn, scored 14 points and threw up a long three to beat the buzzer and steal Princeton an improbable victory, 72-70 over Cornell.

I asked him if it had been the best birthday he's ever had.

"Uh, now it is!" Allocco said.

The most impressive thing about Princeton's 18-point comeback is that it's almost no longer impressive. There's a pattern emerging in the Tigers' 2021-22 season that doesn't take much sleuthing to uncover.

Nov. 14: Princeton trails Minnesota by as many as 11 points in the Asheville Championship final. Llewellyn makes game-tying layups in the final seconds of both the second half and the first overtime before Minnesota pulls away to win 87-80.

Dec. 1: Princeton trails Hofstra by 16 at halftime on Hofstra's court. The Tigers piece together a huge run in the final 10 minutes to draw within one before losing 81-77.

Dec. 4: Princeton trails Drexel by 11 late in the first half. Tosan Evbuomwan and Ryan Langborg help the Tigers stay neck and neck throughout the second half, Langborg hits a 3-pointer to force overtime and Evbuomwan converts the game-winner in the final seconds for an 81-79 victory.

Jan. 7: Princeton trails Columbia by 12 at halftime, at home, in the Ivy League opener. Columbia, for what it's worth, was picked last in the Ivy preseason poll. Princeton storms back and outscores the Lions 51-24 in the second half for an 84-69 win.

Even though it ultimately lost to Minnesota and Hofstra, Princeton never lay down. Something clicked in the Drexel game, and the Tigers haven't lost since, stringing together seven consecutive wins and establishing early control of the Ivy League.

Princeton play-by-play announcer Derek Jones pointed out this amazing stat: The Tigers played 80 minutes of basketball against Columbia and Cornell, led for only 12:46 – including only 45 seconds on Saturday – and went 2-0.

"They (Cornell) were better than us. We stole that game," coach Mitch Henderson said in the most matter-of-fact tone. Because of course they did. No use in denying it.

Henderson said he knew the Tigers weren't out of the game once they cut the deficit to three.

"Actually at 64-61 with 4 ½ (minutes) left or whatever it was, I said, 'Look, we're gonna play a four-minute game,'" Henderson said. "Of course, they come right down the court and score."

But if that four-minute game quote sounds familiar, that's because it was the second straight day Henderson had to employ the tactic. "We didn't start the game with the intensity needed to execute," Henderson said after Friday's win over Columbia. "We just needed to break this thing into four-minute games and the first four minutes we were down two."

By compartmentalizing and choosing to see the whole contest in tiny chunks, no deficit is too big to overcome, at least not for Princeton.

For the mini-game starting at the 16-minute media timeout of the second half, the Tigers moved to a 1-3-1 zone that succeeded in cooling down some of Cornell's shooters. Drew Friberg, one of several Tigers capable of draining treys at any moment, was able to make two, and soon Princeton had the deficit down to 11 – sorry, I mean it won the four-minute game by seven.

"We said, 'A lot of time left. Let's keep after it,'" Allocco said. "We were playing four-minute games, so every media timeout is four minutes. So just keep chipping away. Four-minute games. And we did, and we made some big plays, hit some big shots and got stops when we needed them.

"We stay in the moment," he added. "We feel we're never out of it. I would like to start games a little better, you know. A couple in a row like that and we've escaped them. But it's a special group. We stay together, stay in the moment and things like that happen when you can do that."

That's what I keep coming back to: Imagine what Princeton could look like if it put together a complete 40-minute effort against a good opponent. Imagine the ceiling if the Tigers made more of their signature threes in the first 10 minutes of games to avoid falling into holes.

But Henderson and his players know better than to keep starting slow forever. And there may be a game, perhaps the Ivy League championship game or something even later in March, where Princeton will be outplayed for 25 or 30 minutes. The Tigers will know, then, what to do to fight back.

"I think it could" help late in the year, Allocco told me. "Coach has been saying, the league is going to come down to a few possessions."

## George Floyd protests: This NJ basketball player is walking the walk

He marched through his hometown of Freehold Tuesday, protesting the killing of George Floyd, holding a sign that read “am I next” and “my mom doesn’t want your thoughts and prayers.”

At 6-foot-7, Elijah Barnes is more visible than most. That’s the idea.

The Princeton University basketball player and former star at Mater Dei Prep is no stranger to social justice. He spent last summer in Shanghai, teaching kids academics and sports. He’s tutored immigrants in English in Philadelphia. He’s helped new citizens register to vote.

And he has a message for fellow athletes and others in the sports world — one that needs to be heard.

“If you’re going to talk about it,” Barnes said, “you’ve got to be about it.”

In the 10 days since Floyd was killed by a Minneapolis police officer, the social media accounts of teams, athletic departments, coaches and athletes — as well as many others outside of the sports world — have filled with statements and videos expressing solidarity. Barnes, meanwhile, has participated in two protests this week and is helping organize a third for Friday.

“If you’re posting on social media, posting a black square on your account, I respect what you’re trying to do, I respect that you want to be a part of it, but if you’re going to be a part of it I would like to see you sign a petition for George Floyd, donate money, walk around arm in arm with me,” he said. “If you’re not going to stand up outside of posting something on your social media, are you really making a difference?”

Barnes literally is walking the walk.

“We fully support Elijah in his activism,” Princeton head coach Mitch Henderson said. “Elijah is a strong leader both with our team and in his community here in New Jersey. Personally, I continue to learn a lot from Elijah about leadership and speaking up for what you believe in.”

### A stunning moment in D.C.

Barnes grew up in Freehold before recently moving to the Bayville section of Berkeley Township. His mother is white and his father is black, so when it comes to race in America, “I’ve seen both perspectives” he said.

As a 12-year-old he attended a youth police academy in Freehold.

“Growing up I wanted to be a police officer,” he said. “I really thought that was going to be my path. Right around that time Trayvon Martin got killed and once George Zimmerman got let free I realized that I’d be better off not being part of the system, but being part of the change around that system.”

After making a name for himself at Mater Dei Prep, leading the Seraphs to the Shore Conference Tournament title and earning All-Shore Player of the Year honors from the Asbury Park Press, he took up a history major and hoops at Princeton. Those twin passions merged this past academic year, when he wrote 28-page papers on race and sports. One focused on Boston Celtics legend Bill Russell, the other on boxers Jack Johnson and Muhammad Ali.

For his upcoming senior thesis, Barnes is focusing on the history of Boston sports stars of color and their often-fraught relationship with fans and media there.

"I've been really focused on athletes and their relationship to make change," said Barnes, who is considering attending law school after graduating next spring. "That's what I'm trying to live by as well, to use my platform as best as I can."

On Friday he had an epiphany while visiting a friend in Washington, D.C.

"I'd never seen the White House, so we walked out to the White House," Barnes said. "This was the first night of major protests around the country. I witnessed fireworks being set off in the streets and Secret Service members pepper-spraying people with their hands up. I saw exactly what was going on with my own eyes in the nation's capital. At that moment I realized, this (unrest) is a serious, serious issue. It's not just in Minneapolis.

"So when I got home I made sure I used my voice. I'm going in the streets for nonviolent protesting, teaching people that as a black man I'm not a threat. I'm not violent. All I want is to be seen as a person."

He took part in Monday's rally in Asbury Park, leaving before post-curfew confrontations broke out between police and protesters there. On Tuesday he hit the streets in Freehold, quite literally. At one point he laid down on the asphalt as a fellow protester drew a chalk line around him.

"I feel like we're opening a lot more eyes," he said. "I've been involved in protests and I've been involved with diversity talks in the past, but I've never seen white people around the nation be so disgusted by what they're viewing. I've never seen so many people who didn't look like me walking next to me when it came to these issues. It's amazing to see. It's maddening that it has to get to this point for people to open their eyes, but if this is what it takes, this is what it takes."

### **'College coaches have to do more'**

On Friday Barnes plans on heading back to Asbury Park to help out Scottie Lewis, a fellow Jersey hoops notable who is organizing a "Masked March" starting at Asbury Park Conventional Hall at 4 p.m. Lewis guided Ranney to the NJSIAA Tournament of Champions title in 2019 before starting for the University of Florida this past season. The event is billed as "masked" because Lewis wants all participants to cover their face due to the coronavirus pandemic.

Barnes said he's watched footage of violence from around the country over the past week and stresses the importance of protesting peacefully.

"I don't want to see anyone's business being burned down or stolen from," he said. "I think a lot of people who are doing the looting are not related to the protest. They're not walking with protesters, they don't have their hands up in solidarity, they don't have signs. They're driving into the nearest city and robbing a Gucci store. They're not with the people on the front lines who are being pepper sprayed."

The real protesters are sacrificing, he said, not profiting. In that spirit, he'd like to see more sports figures go beyond posting words; he'd like to see them engage in social justice causes. In the fall, he plans on being heavily involved in voter registration efforts and hopes others will join him.

"College coaches and these major sports franchises have an obligation to speak up and stand up for black men," he said. "You have the lives of young black men in your hands. You have an opportunity to give them an education, a good job, change their lives, get their families out of certain situations. My coaches have been adamant about reaching out to me and asking me what they can do to help. I really appreciate it. College coaches have to do more than just a press release."

On Friday Barnes will go well beyond words. His ultimate goal is to connect with Asbury Park police officers in a meaningful way.

"No one wants any trouble with the police," he said. "We would love if the police would march with us and not put their riot gear on at 8 o'clock. We'd love the solidarity to last into the night.

"I would love to meet their families, shake hands with their kids, talk to them, humanize myself. I'd love for there to be an open dialogue between us and police about how we can change what's happening in America."
