2004-05 SEASON SUMMARY

PURDUE SWIMMING & DIVING 2005/2006

October

Purdue's freshman-laden team from a season ago was now a year older, and what better way to test them than a season-opening triangular meet featuring nationally ranked opponents Arizona State and Notre Dame. The Boilermakers were not quite the underdogs, starting the season with a No. 25 ranking, while the Sun Devils came in ranked 21st and the Fighting Irish 23rd.

In what was somewhat of an upset, Purdue toppled its neighbors to the North by 39 points; however, Arizona State bested the Boilermakers by 33 points.

The meet gave the Old Gold and Black a small taste of what to expect at the NCAA Championships, with the ASU roster featuring experienced sprint freestyler Florencia Szigeti and diver Trisha Tumlinson. The Fighting Irish showcased 2004 All-American diver Meghan Perry-Eaton.

Purdue's Carrie McCambridge fared quite well against both Tumlinson and Perry-Eaton, taking first off the 1-meter springboard and second off the 3-meter. Tumlinson was third off both springboards, while Perry-Eaton was the winner off the 3-meter.

Szigeti took kindly to the Doris Z. Holloway Pool, winning the 100 and 200 free titles over Purdue sophomore Susan Hentschel; however, the Pac-10 champion could not outpace Tracy Duchac in the 50 free, losing 23.41 to 23.50.

The Boilermakers wrapped their opening weekend with the Indiana Intercollegiate, a meet that features many of Indiana's mid-major swimming and diving programs such as Ball State, Butler and Valparaiso. To no one's surprise, Purdue again dominated the co-ed invitational, capturing 11 of 12 events and scoring 840 points. Regular contributors such as McCambridge, Duchac and Hentschel all scored where expected, but youngsters such as Jenae Gill (100 back, 200 medley relay) and Carlene Takaki (100 fly, 200 medley relay) also recorded victories in multiple events as well.

November

By playing host to the NCAA Championships in March, Purdue was able to attract an all-star roster of teams to its inaugural Boilermaker Challenge. Competing against the 23rd-ranked Boilermakers were No. 3 Florida, No. 4 Texas, No. 9 UCLA, No. 11 Texas A&M, No. 14 Virginia, No. 17 Michigan and No. 18 Tennessee.

Purdue could not have had a better start to the meet, shocking all comers with a winning mark in the 200 freestyle relay of 1:33.25; however, the winning feeling would soon fade as the Boilermakers were forced to scrap for points wherever they could find them.

Purdue collected a number of top-eight and top-16 showings over the two-day, three-session meet, but those efforts could only place them as high as seventh in the eight-team field. The Boilermakers' final tally was 400 points, seven points behind sixth-place Virginia, but over 300 points behind the champion Gators.

The experience and knowledge of how to compete against the nation's best served Purdue well in its Big Ten opener against Northwestern. Instead of getting the close meet they expected, the Boilermakers routed the Wildcats, 188-112, in Evanston.

It was Purdue's dominance in the freestyle races that proved to be the difference. Erica Chandler won the 500 and 1,000 free, Susan Hentschel was victorious in the 100 and 200, and Tracy Duchac claimed the 50 free title. The Boilermakers, accordingly, also won the 200 and 400 freestyle relay crowns.

Divers Carrie McCambridge and Amanda Miller earned their first sweeps of the season, placing first and second off both the 1- and 3-meter springboards.

If the competition the Boilermakers received at Northwestern was considered a disappointment, then how does one define the lack of competitiveness at the North Carolina/Nike Cup Invitational.

On paper, the Chapel Hill, N.C.-based invite looked like one of the best mid-season meets, as it featured the 16th-ranked Tar Heels, plus Virginia Tech, Kansas, Clemson and Syracuse. However, the Boilermakers built an early lead on the first day, then won the team title three days and six sessions later by 146.5 points. All the points were scored by the swimmers, as diving coach Wenbo Chen sent all his student-athletes to the more-challenging Minnesota Invitational the same weekend.

Nearly every Boilermaker had a career-breaking meet at this invitational. Multiple relays from the 200 freestyle to the 400 medley all finished among the top 12 and in some cases, the Purdue 'B' and 'C' relays would outswim some program's 'A' relays. Not only were Boilermakers competing in the super finals of the sprint freestyles, but they also had significant representation in their tougher events like the 100 backstroke, 200 breaststroke and 100 butterfly.

January

Purdue began its new year on a positive note, beating up the eight-team field at the Florida International Invitational, scoring 539 points. En route to its third invitational championship of the season, the Boilermakers broke six pool records at the FIU Natatorium.

Freshman Jenae Gill had a breakout meet, winning the 100 back and with the 200 medley and freestyle teams. All three of her winning times were new pool records, which helped her earn a Big Ten Swimmer of the Week Certificate (1/4).

The Boilermakers continued their hot start with a thrashing of Big Ten Conference rival Michigan State, 168-75. Christine Leupold and Susan Hentschel led Purdue with three wins each, while Erica Chandler was close behind with two individual victories. Also making an impression were Rory Belk, who set a McCaffree Pool record in the 200 breast (2:19.40), and freshman Rachael Helman, who came from behind to win the 200 fly (2:10.57).

Following their beating of the Spartans, the Boilermakers were tagged with a No. 19 ranking by the College Swim Coaches Association of America; it was Purdue's highest ranking of the season. Unfortunately, the top-20 ranking would not last long. Indiana came to town and spoiled the party with a 157-141 triumph at the Boilermaker Aquatic Center. The losses to conference opponents would continue the following week, as Purdue dropped two of three duals at its annual Big Ten Quadrangular with No. 8 Wisconsin, Illinois and Minnesota.

Purdue easily toppled the Fighting Illini, 209-144, but were silenced by the Badgers, 210-143 and Golden Gophers, 192-161.

Big Ten Championships

After taking a small one-place dip in the standings last year, Purdue rebounded with a respectable fifth-place showing, scoring 399 points – an improvement of over 60 points. As expected, Purdue flexed its muscles in the sprint freestyle and diving events, but it also received much help from its swimmers in the breaststroke, butterfly and individual medley.

Sophomore Jennifer Merte led the Old Gold and Black in the IM with a pair of top-eight finishes. Merte was seventh in the 200 IM at 2:03.82 and sixth in the 400 IM with a mark of 4:19.84; both times were NCAA provisional marks. Merte also scored a point in the 200 fly, recording a 16th-place time of 2:05.81.

Purdue's showing in the breaststroke was a pleasant surprise, as three Boilermakers scored in each contest. The leader was freshman and NCAA qualifier Jennifer Lavers, who posted a pair of fifth-place times of 1:03.18 and 2:17.33. Another rookie, Shannon Grace, scored in both breaststroke consolation finals with a 1:03.92 in the 100 and a NCAA provisional cut of 2:17.85 in the 200. Senior Tracy Duchac, known more for her prowess in the freestyle, took it upon herself to learn a new stroke late in the season and placed ninth in the 100 breast at 1:03.54. Sophomore Rory Belk was a factor in the 200 breast, coming in ninth at 2:17.16. Belk also was 15th in the 200 IM with a mark of 2:06.15.

Carlene Takaki displayed her determined nature, coming back strong to score in the championship finals of the 200 butterfly, a day removed from being shut out in the 100 fly. Takaki finished just short of the medal stand with her fourth-place time of 2:01.17, which helped clinch her spot at the NCAA Championships.

Purdue was at its best in the sprint freestyles and its relay equivalents of the 200, 400 and 800 freestyle relays. Sophomore Susan Hentschel created the most damage, scoring as an individual in all three sprints, and as the anchor of all three varsity record-breaking relays. Hentschel's 200 and 400 relays both placed third with times of 1:31.09 and 3:20.55, while her 800 free relay came in fourth at 7:17.99. Competing as an individual, Hentschel left the pool at Counsilman Billingsley Aquatic Center holding the school's record in both the 50 (23.08) and 100 free (49.68). Leupold would later break Hentschel's 50 free record with her relay split of 22.83 during prelims of the NCAA Championships.

Scoring alongside Hentschel in the 50 free were Leupold in 10th and rookie Lauren Willis in 16th. In the 100 freestyle, Leupold posted a sixth-place time of 50.06, while Duchac and Seleskie contributed with strong placings in the consolation finals. Sophomore Katharine Telfer was a surprise scorer for Purdue in the 200, registering a 14th-place mark of 1:50.59, beating Hentschel by almost a second.

The diving competitions got a whole lot tougher for junior Carrie McCambridge and company with the reemergence of the Indiana diving empire, led by Cassandra Cardinell, Lindsay Weigle and Christina Loukas. The previous year, McCambridge dominated Big Tens by scoring victories off all three boards, while many of the Hoosiers were away training for the 2004 Olympic Games.

McCambridge had strong outings in all three disciplines, finishing as the runner-up to Loukas off the 1-meter (315.30) and taking seventh off the 3-meter (516.45). She also recorded a varsity record of 459.05 off the platform tower to place fifth.

Amanda Miller followed McCambridge with a 13th-place finish off the 1-meter and 10th-place marks off both the 3-meter and platform. Freshman Katie Berg, who missed most of the season with an injury, looked strong on the platform, placing 12th with a season-best score of 345.85.

NCAA Championships

Purdue impressed the hometown crowd at the Boilermaker Aquatic Center, finishing a program-best 17th place with 59 points scored. Of their eight competitors, five left with honorable mention All-America honors, while Carrie McCambridge earned All-America citations off all three diving boards.

McCambridge, who scored 43 points – the 11th-highest point total of any individual competitor, became Purdue's first All-American since Kim Fritsch placed among the top eight at the 1994 national meet. In one weekend, McCambridge also broke the school's record for most All-American titles won, a record that was shared by Fritsch and current Boilermaker assistant coach Darlene Renie (Warta). Fritsch won All-America titles in 1993 and 1994 in the 200 butterfly, as did Renie, who claimed her certificates in 1989 and 1990.

In the pool, Tracy Duchac, Susan Hentschel, Katie Seleskie and team captain Christine Leupold were named honorable mention All-Americans in both the 200 and 400 freestyle relays. These awards were especially gratifying for seniors Seleskie and Leupold, since both were making their NCAA Championships debuts.

The 200 free relay placed 12th in 1:31.96, and the 400 free relay was 14th at 3:22.36. Freshman Lauren Willis, who swam in the prelims of the 200 free relay, was also recognized as an honorable mention All-American.

In addition to Willis and the two seniors, sophomore Carlene Takaki and freshman Jennifer Lavers also made their NCAA debuts, competing in the breaststroke and butterfly races. The eight Boilermakers represented a program record for the most participants at an NCAA Championship.

There was good news and bad news for 25th-ranked Purdue in its season-opener at the Boilermaker Aquatic Center. The good news was a 169-130 win over 23rd-ranked and in-state rival Notre Dame. The bad news was a 166-133 loss to No. 21 Arizona State.

Purdue managed just four wins, including two by NCAA qualifier Tracy Duchac. The senior from Wisconsin Rapids, Wis., won the 50 freestyle with an NCAA provisional cut of 23.41 seconds and swam the second leg for the winning 400 free relay team (51.13). She also placed third in the 100 at 51.89.

Duchac topped ASU's Florencia Szigeti in the 50 free by .11 seconds, preventing the Sun Devil from sweeping the sprint freestyle races. Szigeti, who is the reigning Pac-10 champion in the 200 free, won three races, the 100 free and 200 free and the 400 medley relay.

Purdue sophomore Susan Hentschel swam well in both the 100 (51.74) and 200 (1:50.20), but could not overtake the ASU All-American, who clocked winning times of 50.75 and 1:49.13. Hentschel's 200 time was an NCAA provisional mark.

Junior and three-time Big Ten diving champion Carrie McCambridge also had her hands full with All-American competition, but managed a win off the 1-meter (308.20) and a second-place showing off the 3-meter (295.40).

In what would be a repeat of this year's NCAA Championship, McCambridge held her own against 2004 All-Americans Meghan Perry-Eaton of Notre Dame and Arizona State's Trisha Tumlinson. McCambridge and Perry-Eaton exchanged wins off the springboards, while Tumlinson settled for the bronze medal off both boards.

Boilermaker sophomore Amanda Miller, also a 2004 NCAA competitor, placed fifth off each springboard, scoring marks of 244.90 (1-meter) and 260.00 (3-meter).

Purdue secured a handful of top-three showings prior to winning the 400 free finale; Carlene Takaki won the 200 fly in 2:02.64, Erica Chandler was second in the 1,000 free at 10:10.83, and freshman Jennifer Lavers finished as the runner-up in the 100 breast at 1:04.74.

Featured on the victorious 400 free relay were team captain Christine Leupold, sophomore Kimbre Vogel, Duchac and Hentschel. Their winning time was clocked at 3:25.41, beating the ASU squad by nearly two seconds.

Almost every Boilermaker came home a winner from the Indiana Intercollegiates meet at the Boilermaker Aquatic Center. Purdue won 11 of 12 events, totaling 840 points.

Ball State was runner-up with 549 points, and were followed by Indianapolis (243), IUPUI (120), Butler (71), Valparaiso (71) and Vincennes (24).

Not only did Purdue win most of its events, it dominated them, often capturing the top three or four spots. After claiming the top two positions in the opening 200 medley relay, Boilermaker swimmers captured first and second in the 200 free, the top four spots in the 50 free and the top three in the 200 individual medley, 100 backstroke and 100 breaststroke.

The Boilermakers also swept the top five positions in the 100 free, while Carrie McCambridge and Amanda Miller stole first and second-place off the springboards. McCambridge's winning scores were 295.00 (1-meter) and 312.10 (3-meter).

The Boilermakers won the first seven races before being stopped in the 500 freestyle by Indianapolis' Ellie Miller, who touched first in 5:03.35.

Senior team captain Christine Leupold led the squad with a pair of individual victories in the 50 and 100 free, plus a win with the 200 free relay. Also winning

multiple events were freshman Jenae Gill, sophomore Carlene Takaki and junior Erica Chandler.

Gill and Takaki were joined on the winning 200 medley relay (1:48.04) by freshman Shannon Grace and senior Katie Seleskie. Leupold's victorious 200 free relay was comprised of Susan Hentschel, Tracy Duchac and Kimbre Vogel.

After placing second in the 100 breast race against Arizona State and Notre Dame, freshman Jennifer Lavers rebounded with a winning clip of 1:06.30.

Boosted by a victory in the 200 freestyle relay and a second-place effort from diver Carrie McCambridge off the 1-meter springboard, Purdue found itself in fourth place (152 points) after the opening session of the Boilermaker Challenge.

'Challenge' does not accurately describe the depth of this meet, which features three top-ten clubs in No. 3

Florida, No. 4 Texas and No. 9 UCLA, as well as No. 11 Texas A&M, No. 14 Virginia, No. 17 Michigan and No. 18 Tennessee. Purdue entered this meet ranked 23rd.

The Gator women led the eight-team pack with 197 points after day one's races, with the Aggies close behind with 191 points. UCLA sat in third with 156.5 points.

Texas (149.5), Michigan (143.5), Tennessee (128) and Virginia (122), were all behind the Boilermakers with two sessions left to compete.


The Boilermakers made a statement in their home pool, winning the meet-opening 200 free relay with a NCAA provisional mark of 1:33.25. The victorious quartet was comprised of Christine Leupold, Susan Hentschel, Kimbre Vogel and Tracy Duchac.

Purdue's 'B' cut was one of 22 recorded during the first session. Ten of those provisional standards were recorded in the 500 free, as was Michigan's Susan Gilliam's NCAA automatic qualifying mark of 4:45.02.

Five more NCAA 'B' marks were clocked in the 50 free, including Duchac's fifth-place showing of 23.44. Vogel and Leupold also scored big points in 50 free, tying for eighth at 23.80 seconds.

Elsewhere in the pool, Erica Chandler placed 16th in the 500 free at 4:57.59, and the 400 medley relay team of Brandy Keever, Shannon Grace, Jennifer Merte and Duchac placed 13th at 3:54.08.

McCambridge was the runner-up to Florida's Jessica Ranieri off the 1-meter, scoring a mark of 265.40 to Ranieri's 274.00. Amanda Miller placed ninth with a score of 233.90.

Sophomore Susan Hentschel emerged as one of Purdue's future stars while facing the nation's best at the Boilermaker Challenge. Through two sessions, Hentschel scored several top-four finishes, recorded three NCAA provisional marks and broke the varsity record in the 100 freestyle.

Despite Hentschel's heroics, the Boilermakers did not possess enough

depth in other events and finished seventh with 400 points. Florida won the team title with 748.5 points, and were followed by Texas A&M, Texas, UCLA, Michigan and Virginia. Tennessee finished last with 352.5 points.

Hentschel began her day with a third-place showing in the 200 free, finishing close behind NCAA Championship regulars Maureen Farrell of Florida and Michigan's Susan Gilliam. Farrell won the title in 1:48.46, Gilliam was the runner-up at 1:48.61, and Hentschel touched at 1:48.83.

All three marks were below the NCAA provisional standard of 1:50.83.

While the third-place showing was solid, Hentschel's anchor split in the 800 free relay was simply astonishing, moving the team from seventh to fourth place. Hentschel's 200 free split was timed at 1:37.32, which was considerably faster than that of opposing anchors: Leah Retrum (Florida - 1:38.73), Jenni Stratton (Texas A&M - 1:39.27) and Shannon Hackett (UCLA - 1:40.05).

Hentschel's top accomplishment of the night session was setting a varsity record in the 100 free of 49.99. Her mark broke the previous standard of 50.15 set by Gyonguyver Lakos in 2001.

Hentschel and Texas A&M's Danielle Townsend were neck and neck for the entire race, however, the Boilermaker was able to touch first by a mere .34 seconds. This summer, Townsend was a gold medalist in the 200 IM at the 2004 Summer National Championships, and was Big 12 runner-up in the 100 free last spring.

Hentschel closed the night anchoring the 400 free relay squad to a third-place and NCAA provisional mark of 3:24.68. Christine Leupold, Tracy Duchac and Kimbre Vogel teamed with Hentschel on the bronze-medal relay.

It was business as usual for the divers, as Amanda Miller won the platform title and Carrie McCambridge took runner-up honors off the 3-meter springboard. Miller's winning score was 381.25, a personal best for the sophomore from Centreville, Va.

McCambridge tallied 459.20 points off the springboard, losing out to U.S. Diving Senior National Team member Paige Thompson, who scored 487.00 points for the UCLA Bruins.

Top finishes were few and far between for the Old Gold and Black in the pool; however, freshman Jennifer Lavers placed eighth in the 100 breaststroke at 1:05.14, and sophomore Carlene Takaki finished in the same spot in the 200 butterfly at 2:04.47.

Purdue 188 – Northwestern 112

Head coach Cathy Wright-Eger said her team's freestylers, divers and relays would all have to contribute if they wanted to beat Northwestern. Not only did those groups contribute, they dominated, as the Boilermakers rolled over the Wildcats, 188-112.

Wright-Eger was expecting a closer meet from NU, which had just upset No. 21 Indiana the previous week. In the end, the veteran coach was still thankful for the convincing victory.

"Our goal was to go in and win big," said Wright-Eger. "I just did not want this meet to come down to the final few events."

Purdue won all five freestyle races, both relays (200 medley and 400 free), as well as the 200 individual medley and 100 butterfly titles.

Erica Chandler was first in the 1,000 (10:11.83) and 500 (4:58.08) free. Susan Hentschel added to her win totals in the 100 (51.05) free and 200 (1:49.95) free, and Tracy Duchac captured the 50 free title (23.93).

Duchac and Hentschel also were part of the winning 400 free relay, alongside Christine Leupold and Kimbre Vogel. Their winning time was clocked at 3:26.99.

Additionally, Hentschel scored runner-up points in the 50 free, while Duchac placed third in the 100 free. Yvonne Laaper scored big points with a second-place showing in the 1,000 behind Chandler, and a third-place finish in the 500.

NU rookie Andrea Hupman, who Wright-Eger believed would challenge Hentschel, finished second to the Boilermaker sophomore in the 100 and 200 free. Their 100 free showdown was extremely tight, with Hentschel winning by .09 seconds. Hupman was less of a threat in the 200, losing by nearly two seconds.

Wright-Eger was impressed with a number of her swimmers, in particular freshman Jenae Gill and sophomore Carlene Takaki.

Gill dominated the 100 back with a winning time of 57.23 and led Purdue's 200 'B' medley relay to a season-best time of 1:45.78. Not only did Gill's relay beat the Boilermaker 'A' squad, but it also topped the Wildcat quartet of Hupman, Jessie Bailis, Christy Olin and Marijana Surkovic by almost a second.

Takaki had a rough start, placing third in the 200 butterfly, but responded with a victory in the 100 at 56.67.


"Now that Carlene is one of our top swimmers, I think she sometimes feels the pressure to win," said Wright-Eger. "She came out nervous in the 200 fly, so we had to calm her down. But she showed what a great competitor she is by coming back to win the 100. Against the opponents we'll face down the road, she can't afford to back down."

Jen Merte also won for the Boilermakers, beating NU's Brielle Bovee in the 200 individual medley, 2:07.16 to 2:08.59.

Divers Carrie McCambridge and Amanda Miller had an easy afternoon, as last season's NCAA qualifiers finished first and second off both springboards. McCambridge won the 1-meter title with 288.45 points, and set a pool record off the 3-meter with 305.25 points.

The previous NU pool record was held by former Boilermaker Kara Hajek-Gustafson.

Miller's runner-up scores were 266.93 off the 1-meter and 271.28 off the 3-meter.

"We're very pleased to have swum this well, considering we haven't received much rest," said head coach Cathy Wright-Eger. "Our freshmen are acting like veterans; they warm up properly and develop an impressive race strategy. They should be proud of the way they competed."

A meet official told Wright-Eger and her Boilermakers that they "came to swim fast." And they did – recording dozens of personal and season bests along with a handful of NCAA provisional cuts.

The Boilermaker relays were responsible for most of the damage, scoring 212 points. All four of Purdue's relays in both the 200 freestyle and 400 medley finished among the top 12.

Purdue's victorious 200 free relay of Tracy Duchac, Christine Leupold, Kimbre Vogel and Susan Hentschel recorded a season-and then collegiate-best time of 1:31.85 seconds, beating the field by almost three seconds. Their previous season best of 1:33.25 was recorded Nov. 5 at the Boilermaker Challenge.

Purdue's 'B' and 'C' relays were almost as impressive, taking sixth and seventh. Both those relays defeated every second and third-tier relay, as well as Syracuse's and East Carolina's 'A' relays. Purdue's 'D' relay came in 12th, beating nine other teams.

Purdue scored even higher in the 400 medley relay, claiming first, fourth, seventh and ninth place. The Boilermaker 'A' team of Jenae Gill, Jennifer Lavers, Carlene Takaki and Hentschel was victorious with a season-best mark of 3:47.87.

In addition to its relay dominance, the Old Gold and Black controlled the 50 free from top to bottom, as all eight swimmers scored at least one point. Leupold, Duchac and Vogel were the team's top finishers, taking third through fifth places.

Leupold completed the sprint race with a lifetime best of 23.11, while Duchac (23.20) and Vogel (23.42) posted season bests. All three swam under the NCAA provisional standard of 23.56.

Before racing the 50 free, Leupold posted a career best and NCAA provisional mark of 2:03.61 in the 200 individual medley, which was good for second place. Purdue's Jennifer Merte, Rory Belk and Erica Chandler also scored in this event, placing sixth, 10th and 14th.

Yvonne Laaper and Katharine Telfer registered two of the team's biggest improvements. Laaper finished fifth in the 500 free finals after cutting four seconds off her prelim time (4:58.53 to 4:54.30). Telfer shaved off two seconds and finished 15th at 4:57.63.

Hentschel placed third in the 500 free's super final, completing the course in 4:54.95. Her prelim of 4:54.08 just missed the NCAA 'B' standard by .06 seconds.

Day Two: North Carolina Invitational

The 20th-ranked Boilermakers increased their point total and lead over No. 16 North Carolina during the second day of competition at the North Carolina/Nike Cup Invitational. Christine Leupold, Erica Chandler and Susan Hentschel highlighted Purdue's night, sweeping the top three spots in the 200 freestyle.

Leupold claimed the title with a time of 1:48.71. Chandler followed at 1:50.47 and Hentschel touched third at 1:51.63. Katharine Telfer and Lauren Willis also scored, placing 11th and 12th.

Riding on the strength of their relay teams and freestyle swimmers, the Boilermakers left Koury Natatorium in first place with 355 points.

Trailing No. 20 Purdue after the first day of competition were the 16th-ranked Tar Heels (214.5 points), followed by Virginia Tech (178.5), Kansas (161), Clemson (144), East Carolina (82), Syracuse (57) and FIU (0).

Purdue stands atop the leaderboard with 682.5 points, leading host UNC by 160 points (522.5). Kansas (393), Virginia Tech (384.5), Clemson (282), East Carolina (145) and Syracuse (142.5) round out the standings.

"We were fighting and scraping for points all night," said head coach Cathy Wright-Eger. "No one is giving up. Everyone has proven to be incredibly tough."

Wright-Eger was most impressed with her 100-yard stroke swimmers, three of whom reached the super finals. Following the first night of competition, Wright-Eger wasn't sure if her team possessed enough depth in the 100 backstroke, breast-stroke and butterfly, but the Boilermakers managed to prove their coach wrong.

Carlene Takaki recorded a fourth-place time of 55.46 in the 100 butterfly, which was a lifetime best.

"Carlene has experienced a 100 percent turnaround from where she was last weekend at Northwestern," said Wright-Eger. "Last week she was scared, this week she's angry about finishing fourth, she really wanted to win this race. Her responsiveness to these challenges has been encouraging."

Purdue had four swimmers score points in the 100 breast, led by freshman Jennifer Lavers' third-place showing of 1:03.32. Wright-Eger said Lavers took an extra half stroke near the wall, which may have cost her second place.

Jenae Gill finished fourth in the 100 back super finals at 57.03, but senior Brandy Keever posted the team's best time of 57.00, which made Wright-Eger take notice.

"I think Brandy is ready to make her move," said Wright-Eger. "She has really come on strong these last two days, and this experience will prepare her for the Big Ten Championships."

Purdue completed its night with a win in the 800 freestyle relay, finishing the course with a season-best time of 7:25.86. Hentschel, swimming in the anchor position, lifted the relay from second to first place with her 200 free split of 1:50.67.

Freshman Lauren Willis swam a 1:51.20 in place of Leupold on the relay, and Telfer, who had earlier experienced an asthma attack, swam a 1:52.55. Telfer was going to be scratched before convincing Wright-Eger she was ready to go.

No. 20 Purdue is coming home as North Carolina/Nike Cup Invitational champions after registering another day of dominating performances. Even without their divers, the Boilermakers still scored 950.5 points at the three-day meet on the strength of their relays and freestyle events.

Host and 16th-ranked North Carolina finished a disappointing second with 804 points, and were followed by Kansas (614), Virginia Tech (599), Clemson (458), East Carolina (292), Syracuse (209.5) and Florida International (3).

"We didn't even talk about winning this meet, so it's a big surprise that we won and an even bigger surprise that we won by so much," said head coach Cathy Wright-Eger. "All we wanted to do was reach the super finals, have all our relays score, and give our freshmen the experience of competing at a large meet."

Wright-Eger added that her team always took care of little things, which would help them perform better.

"They continually warmed up and warmed down, stayed hydrated, and basically made sure they took care of themselves," said Wright-Eger. "The pool was tough to breathe in, which was not fun for our asthma sufferers, but no one pan-

icked; they all remained focused on competing."

All the Boilermakers had their moments of glory this weekend, but Wright-Eger said Christine Leupold, Susan Hentschel, Jennifer Lavers and Carlene Takaki clearly stood out above the rest.

Team captain Leupold had the best weekend, reaching the super finals in four events (200 individual medley, 50, 100 and 200 freestyle), and scoring with all but one relay.

In her final session of the three-day competition, Leupold was the runner-up in the 100 free with a 50.17 and led the 400 free relay team to a first-place time of 3:22.75. Both of Leupold's marks were below the NCAA provisional standards.

Leupold was joined on the championship relay by Hentschel, Tracy Duchac and Katie Seleskie. Hentschel also posted an NCAA 'B' mark in the 100 free, finishing third at 50.28. Overall, Purdue had five people score in the 100 free, including Duchac, Seleskie and Kimbre Vogel.

Lavers, a super finalist in both breaststroke races, broke a few records with her fourth-place finish in the 200 breast. The freshman's NCAA 'B' time of 2:17.46 was a personal best and beat Rory Belk's freshman record of 2:17.56 set at last season's Big Ten Championships.

Wright-Eger was especially pleased with Lavers' mark since it was over a full second faster than her prelim of 2:18.52.

Takaki, a super finalist in the 100 fly, produced a second-place showing in the 200 fly with an NCAA 'B' mark of 2:00.51, which also is a personal record.

Purdue began its quest for the Nike Cup with Yvonne Laaper and Erica Chandler taking third and seventh in the 1,650 free. Laaper swam a lifetime best of 16:55.20, and Chandler completed the course in 17:05.19. Wright-Eger was proud of the way Chandler competed over the final two days, after getting off to a tough start during the first day of racing.

Katharine Telfer, Brandy Keever and Jenae Gill all scored in the 200 back, with Telfer leading the Boilermakers with a fourth-place time of 2:04.34. Keever and Gill finished 13th and 15th, but both experienced significant drop from their prelim times. Keever went from 2:07.15 to 2:04.51 and Gill went from 2:08.27 to 2:05.31.

Purdue showed some depth in the 200 breast, with freshman Shannon Grace and Belk both scoring, in addition to Lavers. Grace placed seventh with a personal record of 2:20.47 and Belk came in 11th at 2:22.30.

Wright-Eger credited their relay depth for the team's success, and in the 400 free relay it was no different, as the 'B' relay placed fourth and the 'C' team was seventh. The 'B' squad, which featured two freshmen (Jenae Gill and Lauren Willis) and two sophomores (Rachel Sitarz and Vogel), beat the 'A' relays of Clemson, Virginia Tech, Syracuse and East Carolina.

The Boilermakers started their new year on a high note, dominating the competition at the Florida International Invitational with six pool records. In addition to topping the host Golden Panthers, Purdue also beat teams from Penn, Tulane, Valparaiso and Oakland.

The FIU pool marks were recorded by Purdue's 200 medley and freestyle relay teams, and individually

by Carlene Takaki (100 butterfly -57.34), Jenae Gill (100 backstroke - 58.68), Erica Chandler (100 freestyle - 52.79), and Jennifer Merte (400 individual medley - 4:31.59).

Gill, who led the squad with three wins, teamed with Jennifer Lavers, Christine Leupold and Tracy Duchac to record the 200 medley relay's top mark of 1:48.78. In the 200 free relay (1:37.90), Gill was paired with Kimbre Vogel, Susan Hentschel and freshman Lauren Willis.

Vogel also won the 50 free (24.53) and was runner-up to Chandler in the 100 free. Willis won the 200 free in 1:54.03.

Purdue utilized its depth in several events to pull away from the field. In the 100 free, butterfly and backstroke events, the Boilermakers captured three of the top five spots, and finished with four of the top five places in the 50 free. Carrie McCambridge and Amanda Miller finished one-two off the 1-meter, scoring point totals of 283.29 and 278.68. In 3-meter competition, MSU's Danielle Williams edged Miller by less than two points.

No. 24 Indiana defeated 19th-ranked Purdue in their annual battle held at the Boilermaker Aquatic Center, 157 to 141. The Boilermakers won seven of 16 events, but it was not enough to prevent the Hoosiers from winning the annual dual for a fifth-straight year.

"To say I'm disappointed is a grave understatement," said head coach Cathy Wright-Eger. "We had the opportunity to win, but we let it slip through our hands; people who needed to step up did not.

"I warned my team that IU would come in swimming fast, and we just didn't respond. Whatever could have gone wrong, did."

The loss dropped Purdue's record to 3-2 (2-1 Big Ten), while IU improved to 6-2 (3-1 Big Ten).

After IU jumped out to an early 10-point lead, the Boilermakers responded in the 200 freestyle, capturing first and second places. Team captain Christine Leupold won her first of two races, touching the wall with an NCAA provisional time of 1:49.69. Susan Hentschel was the runner-up with another 'B' cut of 1:50.35.

Purdue took its biggest lead of the meet, 50-43, with a four-place sweep in the 100 breaststroke. The Boilermaker quartet was led by freshman Shannon Grace, who finished in 1:05.07. She was followed to the finish line by Jennifer Lavers (1:05.26), Rory Belk (1:05.40) and Morgan Goldthwaite (1:07.09).

Heading into the first break, Purdue held a 66-65 lead, thanks to a Tracy Duchac win in the 50 free (23.56), but the Boilermakers slipped in the second half.

Although the Old Gold and Black won half of the final eight events, it did not collect enough second and third-place points. Purdue wins came courtesy of Leupold (100 free - 51.42), Rory Belk (200 Breast - 2:20.01), Carrie McCambridge (3-meter; 303.00) and the 400 free relay, which won off an IU disqualification.

The winning 400 free relay time of 3:27.41 was recorded by Duchac, Katie Seleskie, Erica Chandler and Kimbre Vogel.

McCambridge came close to sweeping the diving events, but fell 1.45 points short of catching 1-meter champion Cassandra Cardinell (291.90). McCambridge slipped past IU's Christina Loukas for second by .07 points. IU's diving proved to be one of its top strengths, taking four of the top five places off the 1-meter and three of the top five places off the 3-meter.

Wright-Eger was satisfied with the performances of her victors, and was proud of walk-on Rachel Murphy's effort in the 100 fly, placing fourth with a season best time of 58.96.

The women's Magnificent Seven for NCAA's is now an Elite Eight with the addition of Carrie McCambridge to the championship roster. McCambridge joins a group consisting of Tracy Duchac, Susan Hentschel, Jennifer Lavers, Christine Leupold, Katie Seleskie, Carlene Takaki and Lauren Willis.

McCambridge finished second to Iowa's Nancilea Underwood, 560.30 to 546.10 in 3-meter competition. Underwood received the Zone's second allocation for winning, while McCambridge claimed the No. 4 spot with her varsity record-breaking point total.

"Carrie did real well," said diving coach Wenbo Chen. "I've been working her hard since Big Tens, trying to prepare her for this meet. And since she's competing at home, I can tell that she is more relaxed and comfortable."

Grabbing the No. 6 spot was Indiana's Cassandra Cardinell, who scored 512.45 points. Surprisingly, only two Hoosier divers finished among the top eight, after claiming four spots at February's Big Ten Championships.

Boilermaker Amanda Miller, a 2004 NCAA participant, was 15th with 433.95 points.

Day Two: Region C Diving Zones

As the divers pondered their chances of making it to nationals, all that's certain was that the final list of seven divers headed to NCAA's from the Region C Diving Zone wouldn't be determined for another 24 hours.

After the second day of springboard competition, there were only two allocations remaining on the women's side. Those who have clinched spots for nationals are Cassandra Cardinell (Indiana), Christina Loukas (Indiana), Carrie McCambridge (Purdue), Meghan Perry-Eaton (Notre Dame) and Nancilea Underwood (Iowa).

Loukas clinched her spot after winning off the 1-meter springboard at the Boilermaker Aquatic Center; however, the final order of qualifiers won't be known until the conclusion of day three's platform competition.

Loukas claimed the 1-meter crown with 614.50 points, beating Purdue's McCambridge (596.90) by almost 18 points. McCambridge secured her spot at NAAs after finishing as the runner-up off the 3-meter springboard.

2004 All-American Perry Eaton finished a strong third with 588.65 points, and was followed by Indiana's Cardinell (568.60) and Lisa Silvestri (545.15). Boilermaker Amanda Miller was seventh with a personal best of 532.35 points.

Miller, who qualified for last year's national championships, has to win off the platform in order to become a two-time NCAA qualifier.

IU will certainly challenge the Boilermakers off the tower. The Hoosier women, led by Cardinell, claimed five of the top-eight spots at Big Ten's.

Day Three: Region C Diving Zones

Indiana's Cassandra Cardinell won the platform tower competition during the final day of competition at the NCAA Region C Diving Zones, helping a few of her teammates advance with her to the national championships. Since Cardinell fared well off both springboards the two previous days, her win off the tower allowed fellow Hoosiers to move up the order of Zone qualifiers. The IU contingent at NAAs will be comprised of Cardinell, Christina Loukas and Penn State transfer Lisa Silvestri.

Cardinell's score of 524.05 off the tower moved Silvestri into the No. 3 spot of the 1-meter competition, and lifted Julie Broms of Ohio State into the third spot of the 3-meter. Cardinell won the competition Sunday by more than 70 points over runner-up Jessica Livingston of Minnesota (452.10). The Hoosier was fourth off the 1-meter and third off the 3-meter.

Carrie McCambridge of Purdue was third off the platform tower with 445.00 points. McCambridge qualified for NAAs after posting a runner-up finish off the 3-meter. Also joining McCambridge and the IU trio at NAAs are Iowa's Nancilea Underwood (3-meter champion) and Meghan Perry-Eaton of Notre Dame (third place; 1-meter). Boilermaker Amanda Miller needed to win the tower to advance to NAAs for a second straight year, but placed seventh with a career-best total of 414.00 points.

"Carrie is going to do very well this week," said Purdue diving coach Wenbo Chen. "This is her second time at NAAs, so I expect her to have a higher level of confidence, plus she's been training well since Big Tens."

McCambridge, an honorable mention All-American last year off the 3-meter, is anxious to compete again at nationals.

"I'm really excited to have made it out of this zone, because I think it's the most difficult of them all," said McCambridge. "I feel that I'm diving better now compared to this time last year. I know what to expect from this meet, and I'm comfortable with the pool and boards."


Chen concurred with McCambridge on Zone C's competitiveness.






