Take I-65 south to Exit 193 (US 231). Take US 231 south to US 52 (approx. 12 miles to a red flashing light). Turn left on US 52 (approx. five miles, veer right onto ramp for Purdue/West Lafayette Northwestern Avenue). On Northwestern Avenue, proceed to second stop light and turn right onto Cherry Lane. Golf complex will be on your right.

From the South

Devon Brouse

Head Coach
12th Season

Devon Brouse has been the head coach and director of golf operations for the Boilermaker men's and women's golf teams since returning to his alma mater in 1998. Brouse graduated from Purdue in 1971 with a B.S. in agronomy.

Since his return, Brouse has led Purdue to the forefront of collegiate golf. His women's teams have captured four Big Ten Championships and have finished in the top 10 in each of the last four NCAA Championships, including a school- and conference-best NCAA runner-up finish in 2007. In 2009, Brouse coached senior Maria Hernandez to the NCAA individual championship, a first for Purdue and for the Big Ten. Brouse has won four Big Ten Coach of the Year honors, including two consecutive, and was named NGCA and Golfweek's National Coach of the Year in 2006. Under Brouse's guidance, the women's team has advanced to the NCAA Championships every year since 2000, a feat accomplished by only four Division I programs (Arizona State, Duke, Purdue and USC).

Last season, the Boilermakers won five tournaments, including a second-consecutive Big Ten title, finished second at the NCAA Central Regional and

10th at the NCAA Championships. After winning the NCAA individual title, Hernandez was named the Honda Sports Award as the top collegiate women's golfer, the PING/NGCA National Player of the Year and the Big Ten Suzy Favor Female Athlete of the Year.

After earning a 21-stroke victory at the 2008 Big Ten Championships, the Boilermakers followed up their conference title with a second-place finish at the NCAA Central Regional Championships in Austin, Texas. Purdue carried that momentum into the NCAA Championships in Albuquerque, N.M., capturing fourth place as a team. For the season, the Boilermakers finished first or second in seven of the 11 events in which they competed.

The 2007-08 season was a year of record-breaking performances as the Boilermaker women recorded four of the top five lowest team rounds in school history and 17 of the 28 best individual rounds. Additionally, Purdue was honored with the Big Ten Golfer of the Week Award a record-breaking five times.

Brouse's golfers continue to be among the best of the Big Ten Conference. Last season, Hernandez turned in the best 72-hole score in conference history, firing a 281 at the Big Ten Championships to

earn medalist honors, a first for Purdue women's golf. Hernandez was awarded Big Ten Player of the Year and the Mary Fossum Award for the second consecutive year. Maude-Aimee LeBlanc was named Big Ten Freshman of the Year and was the fourth straight Boilermaker to be so honored. Several of Brouse's golfers were recognized on a national level, as well. Hernandez was named first team All-American by both NGCA and Golfweek, junior Christel Boeljon was awarded second team All-America honors and LeBlanc received honorable mention All-America accolades. Brouse's players have earned nine All-American awards in the last seven years.

The 2006-07 season saw the women advance to the NCAA Championships for the eighth-straight year. The prior NCAA experience paid off as Brouse led the women to a second place finish; a school and conference record. Boeljon tied for second, the highest individual finish ever for the women's program. The Boilermakers won four tournaments during the season and Hernandez became the first Purdue women's golfer to earn first team All-American honors.

In 2005-06, the Boilermakers finished in the top three in every tournament of the regular season, winning the Big Ten Championships and the NCAA West Regional Championships. Brouse led the women to a ninth place finish in the NCAA Championships, tying the previous best finish in school history. The team set a school record with six tournament victories that season. Brouse was awarded both the national Coach of the Year Award and the Labron Harris Sr. Award by the Golf Coaches Association of America. The Harris Award is presented to the college or high school coach and PGA professional whose support of the game through teaching, coaching and involvement in the community has helped ensure the continued growth of the game.

In 2003, Brouse and the women's team hosted the NCAA Women's Golf National Championship on Purdue's Kampen Course and finished 12th.

In just his second season in charge, Brouse led the women to their first Big Ten Championships title and did so in record-breaking fashion with a 72-hole team total score of 1,167. Following the Big Ten success, Brouse's team earned its first-ever NCAA qualification which resulted in a then-school best ninth place finish in the NCAA Championships.

While with Purdue, Brouse has coached six Big Ten Players of the Year (Lee Williamson, Maria Hernandez (three times), Stacy Orschell and On-narin Sattayabanphot) and six Big Ten Freshman of the Year honorees (Christel Boeljon, Kari Damron, Whitney Frykman, Stefanie Endstrasser, Maude-Aimee LeBlanc and Chris Mayson). The women's program has won four straight conference Golfer of

the Year awards and had a string of four consecutive Freshman of the Year awards.

In addition to his coaching duties for both the men's and women's golf teams at Purdue, Brouse is responsible for overseeing operations for the Birck Boilermaker Golf Complex. The 36-hole masterpiece features two distinctly challenging courses – the Ackerman Hills and Kampen layouts. The latter was the designed by the legendary Pete Dye and was the site for the 2008 NCAA Men's Championships and the 2003 NCAA Women's Championships. The complex features state-of-the-art practice facilities and ranks among the finest in college golf.

A class "A" member of the PGA, Brouse joined the University of North Carolina in 1973 as the golf director and superintendent of facilities following two years as assistant director of the Indianapolis municipal golf course system. In 1977, he became assistant coach to Mike McLeod and was named head coach on year later when McLeod retired.

Brouse immediately experienced success as North Carolina's head coach, leading the Tar Heels to a second-place finish in the ACC Tournament and a fifth-place showing at the NCAA Championships. Named the ACC Coach of the Year following the 1981, 1991 and 1995 seasons, Brouse led North Carolina to six ACC team championships (1981, 1983, 1984, 1986, 1995, 1996), 16 top-five conference finishes and 10 top-10 NCAA finishes, including second place in 1991 and third in 1993.

Brouse has been instrumental in the development of several individual players who achieved great success at both the collegiate and professional levels. Under his tutelage, Brouse has mentored 76 all-conference performers, two NCAA individual champions (Hernandez and John Inman), a Fred Haskins Award Winner (John Inman), a Ben Hogan Award Winner (Mark Wilson), two Palmer Cup participants (Max Harris and Lee Williamson) and two Walker Cup selections (Frank Fuhrer and Tom Scherrer).

Brouse has also coached 10 World Amateur selections (John Inman, Shiv Kapur, Maximo Kopp, Santiago Russi, Christel Boeljon, Myrte Eikenaar, Stefanie Endstrasser, Maria Hernandez, Thea Hoffmeister and Maude-Aimee LeBlanc).

In addition, Brouse also coached Patrick Moore, the leading money winner on the 2002 Buy.com Tour. Four of his pupils (Davis Love III, John Inman, Tom Scherrer and Mark Wilson) have won titles on the PGA Tour.

A native of Indianapolis, and a 1967 graduate of Decatur Central High School, Brouse was a member of Delta Tau Delta fraternity. He and his wife, Kathy, have two sons, Matt and Brent, a daughter, Ashley, and two grandsons, Scott and Tyler.

Johanna Josefsson is in her first year as assistant women's golf coach at Purdue. Josefsson played golf collegiately at Southern California and prior to joining the Boilermakers, served as the manager of player services for the Duramed FUTURES Tour since 2007.

Josefsson, who was born in Munkedal, Sweden, speaks five languages: Swedish, English, Norwegian, and French. She was a member of the Swedish national team for several years before earning a golf scholarship in the U.S.

Josefsson graduated from Southern Cal in 1999 with a bachelor's degree in American studies and ethnicity, and a minor in business administration. While competing for the Trojans, Josefsson was selected as the team's most valuable player in 1997 and was tabbed most improved as a freshman in 1996. She was named honorable mention All-Pac-10 in 1997

and won the individual medal at the 1998 Pioneer Electronic Bruin Classic. As a senior, Josefsson was also chosen as Southern Cal's student-athlete representative to the NCAA.

In 2006, Josefsson joined the Duramed FUTURES Tour as the marketing and communications coordinator. Prior to that she worked as a sales account executive for J. Lindeberg Corp., a golf fashion company and was an LPGA Tour assistant for the Golf Channel and FOX Sports West from 1997 to 1999.

Her duties include recruiting, coordinating team travel, player development, organizing team practices, scheduling and assisting with coordination and instruction at coach Brouse's golf schools and academies.

Q & A with Coach Josefsson

What were the factors that influenced your decision to coach at Purdue?

I believe intercollegiate athletics provides an important enhancement to the life and spirit of both student-athletes and the academic community, fostering character through discipline, team membership and the mutual respect expressed in fair play. As a collegiate golfer myself, I've known about Purdue's high-profile sports programs and the rich Boilermaker tradition, but the main reason I chose Purdue is because I've always wanted to coach a top-ranked team whose dedication to golf is as committed as my own. My goal is to win the NCAA Championship. Skilled coaches offer outstanding leadership by exemplifying standards of dedication and commitment that complement and enrich the academic mission. In my short tenure here at Purdue, Coach Brouse has taught me the importance of teamwork, the meaning of leadership and the necessity of earning your teammates' respect.

Greg Robertson is in his eighth season as Purdue's associate head golf coach.

In 2005, Robertson was honored with the Jan Strickland Assistant Coach of the Year Award. The prestigious award was presented by the Golf Coaches Association of America.

Robertson played collegiate golf at Oklahoma State University, where he graduated with a bachelor's degree in sports science in 1997.

After redshirting his freshman season, he played three seasons at Oklahoma State. During his four years in Stillwater, the Cowboys captured four conference crowns and won the 1995 NCAA Championship.

A native of Roswell, N.M., Robertson earned his degree from OSU, and then transferred to New Mexico, where he competed as a senior

and began work on a master's degree in sports administration.

From 1998 to 2000, Robertson competed professionally. In 2000, he played on the Canadian Tour and participated in the PGA's Nissan Open in Los Angeles, Calif.

In 2001, Robertson competed in several state tournaments before returning to Stillwater to serve as volunteer assistant for the Cowboys.

Robertson's duties include recruiting and instruction, while aiding in organizing team practices, scheduling and team travel. He also assists in budgeting and fundraising for both programs.

Q & A with Coach Robertson

What advantage do the Purdue golf facilities provide a student-athlete?

Part-time Assistant Coach
First Season

Maria Hernandez, the most accomplished golfer in Purdue women's golf history, is in her first season as a part-time assistant coach for the Boilermakers.

Last summer, the 2009 NCAA individual champion competed on the Duramed FUTURES Tour, an LPGA developmental tour, and this season has been assisting the Boilermakers when not participating in professional tournaments. Hernandez has competed in several LPGA events, including the Jamie Farr Owens Corning Classic, the Canadian Open and the 2009 U.S. Open in which she tied for 34th.

Hernandez graduated from Purdue University in 2009 with a degree in management. During her time as an undergrad, she broke multiple school and conference records and her crowning achievement was a one-stroke victory

at the NCAA Championships to become the first women's individual champion in school and conference history. In her final season, she won a second-straight Big Ten individual title while leading the Boilermakers to their third conference championship in four years.

As a senior, the Pamplona, Spain, native was named the Honda Sports Award winner, PING/NCAA National Player of the Year, Big Ten Player of the Year and the Big Ten Suzy Favor Female Athlete of the Year.

She finished her career with a school-record 13 tournament wins, including six in her final season and was a three-time winner of the Mary Fossum Award for the lowest stroke average in the Big Ten.

Birck Boilermaker Golf Complex



Purdue University features two 18-hole championship golf courses on its West Lafayette, Ind., campus. The courses are much different in character, but each promises a challenging test of golf.

The Ackerman Hills Course features a beautifully contoured layout over hilly, forested terrain with greens that are well-protected by trees and bunkers. The narrow fairways and numerous obstacles demand accurate shot-making.

The anchor of the Birck Boilermaker Golf Complex is the 7,450-yard, par-72 Kampen Course. It served as the site of the 2001 NCAA Women's Central Regional, 2003 NCAA Women's Championships, 2004 NCAA Men's Central Regional, 2008 NCAA Men's Championships and most recently the 2009 Big Ten Championships. Pete Dye, one of the most influential and creative golf course designers in the history of the sport, masterminded the redesign of the Kampen Course.

Anyone who has played Brickyard Crossing, Crooked Stick, PGA West or any of the dozens of courses that bear his stamp appreciates the special challenges Pete Dye presents to the golfer. The Kampen Course demands not only skilled shot-making but also an intellectual approach to the game. The combination of both courses on campus offers Purdue students one of the finest golf facilities in the United States.

A native of Indianapolis, Ind., Dye took turf management classes at Purdue during the 1950s and is known as much for his sensitivity to the environment as he is for his imaginative and creative course layouts.

The Birck Boilermaker Golf Complex is situated on the north side of the Purdue campus. It serves not only the Purdue golf teams, but also students, faculty, staff and the public. The complex provides the Purdue men's and women's golf teams with rewarding opportunities to play and practice on one of the region's most beautiful golf courses.

"This is one of the top facilities in college golf," says Devon Brouse, who is Purdue director of golf operations, in addition to coaching the men's and women's teams. "The tradition at Purdue should flourish with the commitment we have with these facilities."

"Nothing has ever been built that is comparable to this course," Dye says. "You walk

the Kampen Course and you feel like you're in another world."

The \$8 million renovation to the golf complex included a new clubhouse named in Dye's honor, new irrigation system, driving range and the Turfgrass Research and Diagnostic Center. The first comprehensive turfgrass research facility in the country, the center functions as a living laboratory for teaching and research activities in a variety of academic disciplines, including agronomy, entomology and forestry.

Consistent with Dye's commitment to environmentally sound golf, more than 6,800 trees have been planted on the Kampen Course. Alice's Oak Forest, named after Dye's wife, runs from tee to green on the ninth hole, and trees have been planted so densely that wildlife will flourish.

Kampen Course

Hole 1, Par 4, 392 Yards

Tee shot sets up left to right with a large, shallow bunker covering the right side of the driving area. There is a generous collar adjacent to the right side of the green.

Hole 2, Par 3, 165 Yards

Water runs along the entire right side of the green. An errant shot to the left will leave the player a difficult pitch from the adjacent bluegrass rough back toward the water.

Hole 3, Par 4, 482 Yards

A deep bunker runs along the right side of the fairway. A player avoiding the bunker that guards the right side of the fairway might find a blind shot from the left rough. The green opens right to left, and there is an ample bailout area to the right of the green.

Hole 4, Par 5, 534 Yards

This short par 5 sets up right to left, opposite of hole No. 3. The player will have strategic options for the second shot—lay up short on the upper plateau, or go for it and favor the left side of the green.

Hole 5, Par 3, 230 Yards

Due to a highly elevated tee, everything is in front of you on this long par 3. The view of the bog to the left of the green is magnificent.

Hole 6, Par 5, 600 Yards

Both the tee shot and the second shot set up left to right on this long par 5. Stay left throughout this hole. The bog runs along the right side.

Hole 7, Par 4, 365 Yards

This short par 4 with two fairways is split by a bunker running down the middle.



Hole No. 7 has a bunker running down the middle of its fairway.

Hole 8, Par 4, 406 Yards

Drive sets up left to right on this short par 4. There is plenty of room to play, however the tee shot must stay left of the massive waste bunker along the right side. The green opens right to left.

Hole 9, Par 4, 481 Yards

This long par 4 has little or no margin for error with waste bunkers on the left and a huge greenside bunker as you approach the clubhouse and the turn.

Hole 10, Par 5, 607 Yards

The back nine opens unmercifully with a very long par 5. A waste bunker guards the entire right side of the driving area. There is room to the right for your second shot. A bunker and water come into play to the left of the green.

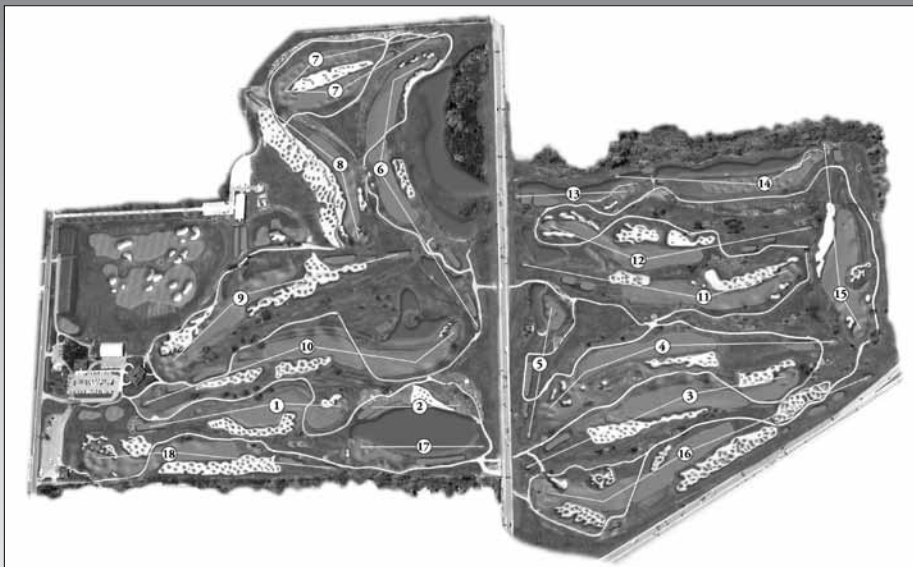


A par five, No. 6 wraps around a celery bog into a heavily guarded green.



Hole No. 9 is a par four with trouble along the left side of the fairway and right side of the green.

Kampen Course



The Kampen Course hosted the 2003 NCAA Women's Golf Championships and the 2008 NCAA Men's Championships.

Hole 11, Par 4, 483 Yards

There is a slight margin for error to the right on the tee shot. The green is one of only a few on this course that is guarded by bunkers on both sides.

Hole 12, Par 4, 477 Yards

A severe waste bunker lines the right side of this long par 4 with a beautiful view to the southwest. The green sets up right to left.

Hole 13, Par 3, 183 Yards

The picturesque green on this par 3 is completely guarded with water along the entire front and left sides.

Hole 14, Par 4, 385 Yards

This short par 4 plays right to left off the tee, with plenty of open room to the right. However, water lines the entire hole on the left side. The green opens right to left, with the fairway sloping into the green.

Hole 15, Par 4, 362 Yards

This short par 4 presents the golfer with an uphill tee shot. The fairway narrows substantially between the waste areas to the left and right. The green opens left to right with some room for error to the left.

Hole 16, Par 5, 608 Yards

This extremely long par 5 has a tee shot that sets up right to left and a second shot that sets up left to right. The large green is elevated with a deep bunker guarding the front.

Hole 17, Par 3, 206 Yards

This long par 3 has water lurking just to the right of the green, but has a generous landing area left of the green.

Hole 18, Par 4, 484 Yards

The final hole on the Kampen Course is also the most difficult. This very long par 4 sets up right to left from the tee. There is a large bunker guarding the left side of the driving area. Hitting the fairway is a must, as the approach shot to this green is by far the most difficult on the course.



The par-3 13th has water along the entire front and left side of the green.



No. 16 is a long par 5 with an elevated green that is protected by a deep bunker.

Tom Spurgeon Training Center

An undulating indoor putting green, a swing-analysis video computer system and multiple heated hitting bays are just three of the features of the \$3 million indoor golf training center at Purdue's Birck Boilermaker Golf Complex. The center was dedicated Oct. 1, 2005.

The 11,400-square-foot facility is named the Tom Spurgeon Golf Training Center, after lead donor Tom Spurgeon.

Athletics Director Morgan Burke says the indoor training center is the "jewel in the crown" of Purdue's 36-hole Birck Boilermaker Golf Complex. The Kampen and Ackerman Hills courses have undergone more than \$12 million in improvements since 1996.

Other areas of the facility include team locker rooms, a lounge, coaches' offices, a pro shop and a classroom. The architectural design is similar to the clubhouse and other facilities at the complex. The center is open to the public when not in use by Purdue golf teams.

Head men's and women's golf coach Devon Brouse says the facility is a great help in training and teaching.

"From a technology standpoint, this takes us right



to the forefront of college golf," Brouse said. "We already have outstanding golf courses, and this facility only complements those."

The state-of-the-art computerized video swing analysis lab helps players work on perfecting their swings.

"We want to seize the momentum of

strong finishes in the recent NCAA national golf championships and keep attracting the best student-athletes here," Brouse said.





Boilermaker Practice Facility



The Boilermaker golf teams practice in a 15-acre complex directly adjacent to the Kampen Course.

The practice area features a private driving range, complete with instructional equipment and more than 15,000 square feet of tee areas. The tees are composed of both bluegrass and bentgrass areas and are designed to enable the golfers to practice against any wind direction. The tees were renovated in the fall of 2004.

The tee area faces a range with target greens, giving the golfers a multitude of distances to hone skills with the scoring clubs.

A \$250,000 short game practice area on the back side of the driving range that was completed in 2009 gives the Purdue golf teams even more options for practice. Two greens and four bunkers is a private area to work on their short game. Wedge shots up to 110 yards can be hit to the chipping green.

"The whole practice complex makes a nice impression on a recruit," says coach Devon Brouse. "It's an opportunity, obviously, for our players to get their work done individually, or whatever they need to do. We've got lots of short-game practice areas, and we've got a great amount of green space. This area, along with the indoor facilities, puts us right up with the very best facilities in the country."

On May 22, 2009, Purdue senior Maria Hernandez shot a final round 71 to win Purdue's first individual NCAA Championship in women's golf. The three-time Big Ten Player of the Year finished with a 289 (74-72-72-71, +1) and led her team to a 10th place finish at the 2009 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championships in Owings Mills, Md.

Hernandez came into the tournament as the seventh-ranked individual in women's college golf, but after winning or tying for first in five tournaments on the season, was considered a top candidate for national player of the year. The two-time Big Ten Championships medalist solidified her resume with collegiate golf's ultimate prize, the NCAA individual title.

Hernandez finished one-over par for the tournament with a four-round total of 289, just one stroke ahead of Southern California freshman Jennifer Song. Hernandez had a seven-foot putt for birdie on her finishing hole, No. 9, but went just right of the cup. The tap-in gave Hernandez a 71, her lowest round of the tournament. She trailed Song by one stroke, but USC's top player still had four holes to play. Song held the lead coming into No. 18, but her approach shot plugged in the front bunker and she three-putted to give Hernandez the victory.

Hernandez was later named the Honda Sports Award winner, PING/NGCA National Player of the Year and the Big Ten Suzy Favor Female Athlete of the Year. She finished her career with a school-record 13 tournament wins, including six in 2008-09, and was a three-time winner of the Mary Fossum Award for the lowest stroke average in the Big Ten. In addition to her accolades on the course, Hernandez also was a three-time Academic All-Big Ten honoree.

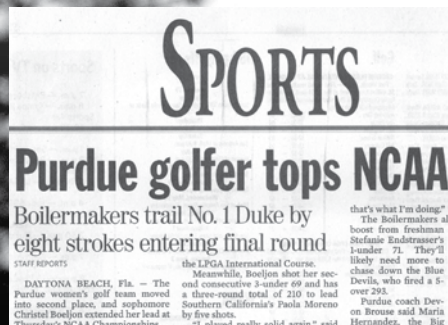
NCAA championships

Purdue has enjoyed tremendous success in the NCAA Championships under head coach Devon Brouse. The women's team has advanced to the NCAA Championships 10 straight times, a feat accomplished by only three other Division I programs (Arizona State, Duke and Southern California).

The Boilermakers fired a 297 in the final round of the 2007 NCAA Championships in Daytona Beach, Fla., to finish as national runners-up. The second-place finish is the highest in school history for Purdue and the best ever by a Big Ten team. The Boilermakers were led by sophomore Christel Boeljon, who held the lead going into the final round and finished tied for second place with a four-round total of 286..

In 2008, the Boilermakers moved up six spots on the final day of the tournament to finish fourth at the NCAA Championships in Albuquerque, N.M.

The 2009 NCAA Championships were historic as Maria Hernandez won the first women's golf individual national title in school and conference history and helped Purdue to a 10th place finish. It was the Boilermakers' fifth top-10 finish in the last 10 years.

BIG TEN championships

The Boilermakers have dominated the Big Ten Conference in the Devon Brouse era. Purdue has won four Big Ten Championships, with the first title coming in coach Brouse's second season at the helm. The Boilermakers won again in 2006, 2008 and 2009.

Last season, Purdue repeated as conference tournament champions and Maria Hernandez and Maude-Aimee LeBlanc shared individual medalist honors. The finish garnered Brouse his fourth Big Ten Coach of the Year award and Hernandez her third Big Ten Player of the Year and Mary Fossum Awards.

In 2008, the Boilers won their third team title and Hernandez became Purdue women's golf's first individual conference tournament champion.

The 2006 season saw the Boilermakers finish no worse than third in every tournament of the regular season, including winning a school-record six tournament titles. One of those victories was the Big Ten Championship and another was an NCAA West Regional title.

In 2000, Purdue shattered the Big Ten record for tournament, firing a four-round 1,167 breaking the previous low of 1,196 by 32 strokes.



first-class travel

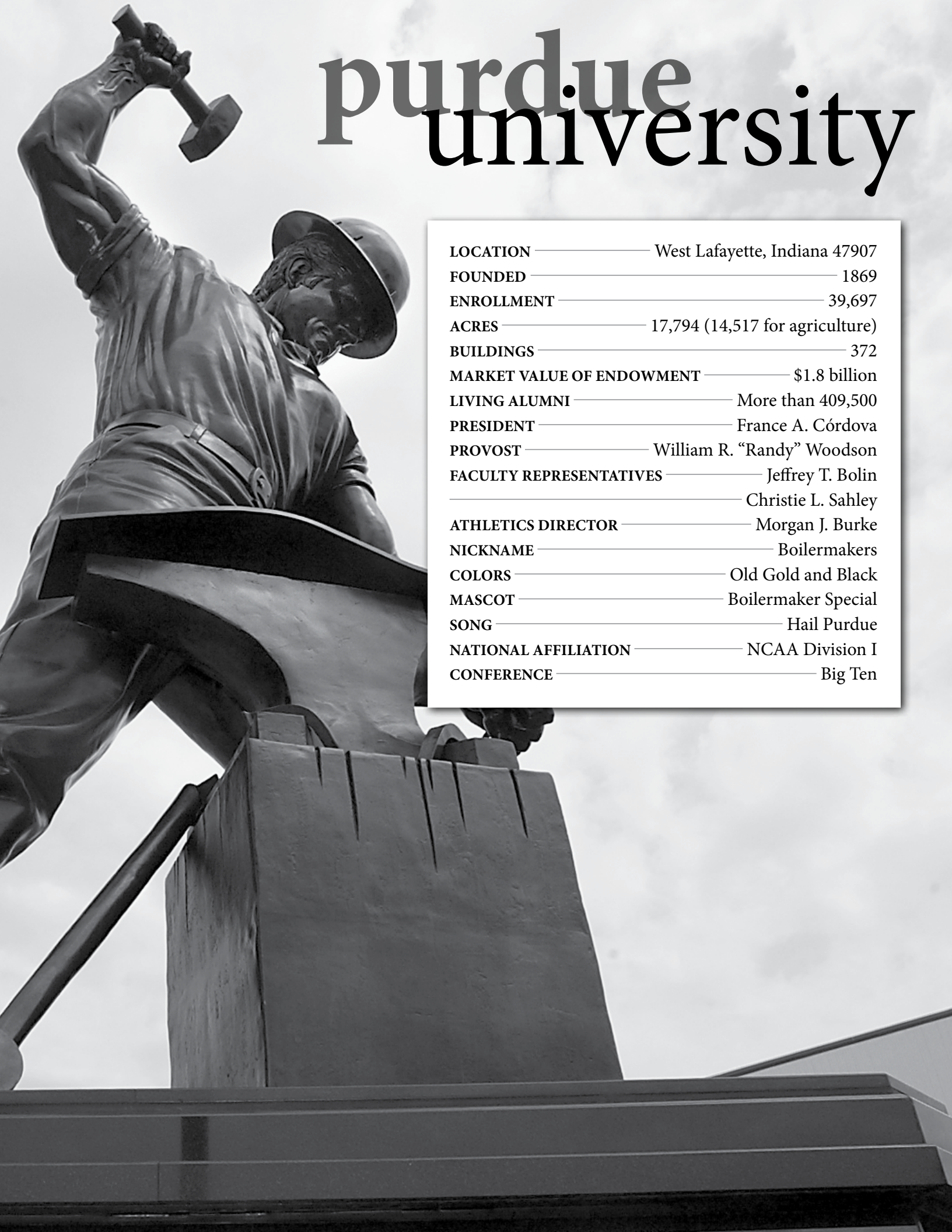


The Purdue women's golf team travels in style to some of the most prestigious golf tournaments in the United States. In addition, the Boilermakers host a tournament in Puerto Rico that attracts some of the best teams in the nation.

One of the most distinguished tournaments in collegiate golf, the Lady Puerto Rico Classic is held at the Trump International Golf Club. While in Puerto Rico, the team stays at the luxurious Gran Melia Golf Resort.

When traveling, Purdue goes first class. The Boilermakers periodically fly to tournaments aboard one of the university's planes, minimizing the travel time and the amount of class time that is missed. When flying on the university planes, the team departs from the Purdue airport, which is located on campus and is less than five minutes from the golf course.

Boasting more than 409,500 living alumni, Purdue University graduates have been to the moon, to the highest levels of business and government, and to Sweden to receive the Nobel Prize.

The Indiana link in a nationwide chain of 68 land-grant colleges and universities, Purdue owes its origin to the Morrill Act signed by Abraham Lincoln in 1862 to promote establishment of schools to teach agriculture and the “mechanic arts.”

An act of generosity by Lafayette businessman John Purdue secured the college for Lafayette. Purdue pledged money and land for the school. In return, the institution was named for him, and he remained a trustee until his death in 1876.

Classes began in 1874 with a total of 39 students and six faculty members. Since then, enrollment has grown to over 74,000 on five campuses and a faculty and staff totaling more than 19,100. A record 40,090 students were enrolled at Purdue’s main campus in West Lafayette, Ind., in 2008.

Since its inception in 1869, Purdue has attained widespread fame for the quality of learning, research and engagement in a number of fields. Building upon historical strengths in engineering and agriculture, the West Lafayette campus currently offers more than 5,800 courses in more than 500 undergraduate majors and specializations in the colleges/schools of Agriculture; Consumer and Family Sciences; Education; Engineering; Liberal Arts; Management; Pharmacy, Nursing, and Health Sciences; Science; Technology; and Veterinary Medicine. Programs of graduate study and research leading to advanced degrees fall under the jurisdiction of the Graduate School.

Purdue is included on The Princeton Review’s 100 “Best Value Colleges” list for 2009.

In addition to charting new paths through its instruction, Purdue also pushes back the frontiers of research, from unraveling the molecular structure of viruses to designing a self-supporting food system for space colonies to genetically engineering crops and plants for feeding an ever-increasing global population.

As one of the 25 largest colleges and universities in the United States, Purdue leaves its mark on the world – and beyond – on a daily basis. Long known as the “mother of astronauts,” the University boasts 22 graduates – 20 men and two women – who have been selected to participate in the NASA space program. From the 1960s to today, from the Mercury Program to today’s fleet of space shuttles, Purdue alumni have flown on more than one-third of all manned U.S. space flights. Neil Armstrong, the first person to walk on the moon, and Gene Cernan, the last person to leave it, both call Purdue alma mater. In addition to the astronauts, scores of scientists, engineers and other personnel who help support the space program have graduated from Purdue. The only other non-military institution that has more alumni who have become astronauts is the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

From the steam era to the space age, Purdue has forged a proud tradition of education, research and service to the state, the United

spirit & tradition

From nicknames to mascots to school colors, Purdue boasts a rich and storied athletics tradition. Details on the genesis of Purdue's history of spirit follows.

BOILERMAKERS

The year was 1891, and a little-known school that prided itself on educating men and women for productive, utilitarian careers was just beginning to experience success in football. DePauw, Wabash and Butler were the football powers of Indiana in those days. Purdue was late to the game, fielding its first team in 1887 and losing its only game to Butler 48 to 6.

By 1891, Purdue had hired two coaches from eastern power Princeton and was on the verge of an era of total domination of opponents. In the 1891 season opener, Purdue traveled to Wabash College in nearby Crawfordsville. Besides coming away with a 44-0 victory, the Purdue "eleven," as football teams were known back then, headed back to West Lafayette with a new nickname.

In the 1890s, hometown newspapers were considerably more protective of college teams than they are today. After the 44-0 drubbing, one Crawfordsville newspaper lashed out at the "Herculean wearers of the black and old gold." Beneath the headline "Slaughter of Innocents," the paper told of the injustice visited upon the "light though plucky" Wabash squad.

"Wabash Snowed Completely Under by the Burly Boiler Makers From Purdue" proclaimed another headline on the same story in the Daily Argus-News.

By the next week, the Lafayette papers were returning the taunts: "As

defeated their eleven. The Crawfordsville papers have not yet gotten over it. The only recourse they have is to claim that we beat their 'scientific' men by brute force. Our players are characterized as 'coal heavers,' 'boiler makers' and 'stevedores,'" wrote a reporter for the Lafayette Sunday Times of Nov. 1, 1891.

The nickname stemmed from the nature of a Purdue education. As a land-grant institution, the college since its founding in 1869 had schooled the sons and daughters of the working class for work that was considered beneath the high-born who attended liberal arts colleges such as Wabash.

That same fall of 1891, Purdue had acquired a working railroad engine to mount in a newly established locomotive laboratory. It was one more step in the development of Purdue as one of the world's leaders in engineering teaching and research. For athletic adversaries and their boosters, this specialty in engineering education — and the other concentration at the founding of the institution, agriculture — served as fodder for name-calling.

Over the years, Purdue teams had been called grangers, pumpkin-shuckers, railsplitters, cornfield sailors, blacksmiths, foundry hands and, finally, boilermakers. That last one stuck.

OLD GOLD AND BLACK

Members of Purdue's first football team in 1887 felt that the squad should be distinguished by certain colors, and since Princeton was at the time the most successful gridiron unit, its colors were considered. Though actually orange and black, the Princeton colors were known by many as yellow and black. Purdue gridders opted for old gold over yellow, kept the black, and began flying the

speed, strength & conditioning



An effective speed, strength and conditioning program is essential to success in athletics today. Purdue's program is specialized for each sport and has two primary goals: performance enhancement — to enable the student-athlete to better perform in her sport by developing greater speed, strength, explosive power, agility and work capacity (conditioning) and injury prevention — to reduce the likelihood of injury by better conditioning the body to withstand the rigors of sport. This is achieved through effective use of core strength exercises to provide muscular balance as well as plyometric exercises and conditioning drills to ensure the fitness of athletes, allowing them to perform at a high level over the course of their competitions. The developmental process occurs over an effective year-round, sport-specific speed, strength and conditioning program.

The Purdue speed, strength and conditioning program addresses those specific concerns by providing an effective training environment for Purdue athletics' greatest assets, its student-

athletes. The environment is created by the speed, strength and conditioning staff in conjunction with each sport coach to develop a sport-specific training program to enhance those physical characteristics necessary to compete and excel in the Big Ten and national competition.

Paramount in creating a training environment that will breed physical excellence is Purdue's qualified and highly motivated staff, which provides daily "hands-on" instruction in the techniques, skills and mental approach necessary to allow all student-athletes to excel in their physical training. The positive interaction between the student-athletes and speed, strength and conditioning coaches ensures that highly motivated athletes will receive the best experience possible and allow them to achieve their goals for themselves and their teams.



distinguished alumni

Long known as the “mother of astronauts” and a world leader in engineering, science and agricultural education and research, Purdue University also sends its sons and daughters to make a difference around the world and at home in business, government and even entertainment.

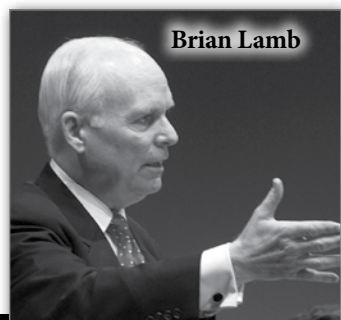
Of the more than 409,500 living Purdue alumni, 44 percent reside in Indiana. More than 19,000 call California home, and more than 12,000 reside in Texas; the Hawaiian Islands are home to 747, while 363 live in Alaska.

Purdue graduates are pioneers and achievers in occupations as diverse as being elected to the Australian Parliament, serving as director of the National Science Foundation and heading up Disney Studios. Others have become underwater explorers, traveled the country and world as relief workers with American Red Cross, founded support groups for cancer survivors and operated the largest duckling farm in the United States.

Nearly two-dozen members of the astronaut corps studied at Purdue. Notable among them are Neil Armstrong, Class of 1955, and Eugene Cernan, Class of 1956. Armstrong made history in 1969 as the first man to land a craft and step on the moon; Cernan was the last to leave it in 1972.

lafayette- west lafayette

West Lafayette, the location of Purdue University's main campus, is the twin city of Lafayette, the county seat of Tippecanoe County. On the banks of the Wabash River, surrounded by rich, green farmlands, the cities are located 60 miles northwest of Indianapolis and 120 miles southeast of Chicago.

With a population of more than 160,000, Tippecanoe County is one of the largest communities in northwestern Indiana, accessible from Interstate 65; U.S. Highways 52 and 231; and State Roads 25, 26, 38 and 43. Major bus lines and Amtrak trains stop daily. The Purdue Airport opened in 1930 as the first university-owned airport in the nation.

Lafayette-West Lafayette is a regional hub for restaurants, shops, museums and entertainment. The community offers three movie theaters with 25 screens, daily and weekly newspapers, 13 radio stations, a television station and cable system, 150 churches of all major denominations, an art museum, a historical museum, 2,100 acres of public parks and more than 30 miles of trails.

Nearby points of historic and scenic interest include Fort Ouiatenon, a fur-trading post established in 1717 listed on the National Register of Historic Places; Battle Ground, where William Henry Harrison fought the Battle of Tippecanoe; and the Museum at Prophetstown and Prophetstown State Park, dedicated to the preservation of Woodland Native American agricultural and environmental heritage.

Lafayette also is home to the Long Center for the Performing Arts, Clegg Botanical Garden and Columbian Park Zoo. Located on the eastern side of the Wabash River, Lafayette shares the 13-mile long Wabash Heritage Trail with West Lafayette. Nearby Battle Ground, located northwest of West Lafayette, boasts Wolf Park, where people can see live wolves, coyotes and foxes in their natural habitat.

Not only are there places to go in Lafayette-West Lafayette, but there also are plenty of things to do. The area serves as host to numerous community events throughout the year, including the Taste of Tippecanoe, 'Round the Fountain Art Fair, Dancing in the Streets, Global Fest, Feast of the Hunters' Moon, Christmas Parade, Gus Macker 3-on-3 Basketball Tournament, Colt World Series and Trails of Tippecanoe Bike Tour.

West Lafayette has experienced a recent renaissance of sorts in an area called "the levee," located just across the John T. Myers Pedestrian Bridge from Riehle Plaza and downtown Lafayette. More than \$100 million worth of construction has gone into developing Wabash Landing. The result is numerous restaurants, shops and apartments that have made the location a focal point for locals and students alike.

A diverse mixture of night spots, shopping centers, art museums and restaurants give Lafayette-West Lafayette a distinct and unique flavor. Boasting the convenience of a modern city and friendly "down-home" residents, Lafayette-West Lafayette is one of America's most-livable communities.

Located in the heart of the Midwest, Indiana is welcoming to a variety of people because of its rich history, cultural opportunities and fertile landscape, not to mention its place as one of the major sports metropolises and industrial centers in the nation and world.

In the northwest corner of the state, one can traverse Indiana's 41-mile Lake Michigan waterfront. This area, which boasts the Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore, is good for work and play. It is home to industries that turn out iron, steel, oil, automobile parts and accessories, truck and bus bodies, aircraft engines and pharmaceuticals. Indiana gives to the world from factory to field. The state is a leader in agriculture, with corn as its main crop.

Beneath much of Indiana's rich soil is limestone. A large amount of the building limestone used in the U.S. is quarried in Indiana.

Those looking for a little adventure in Indiana can access more than 1.1 million acres of land available for outdoor recreation. Some of that land can be found in southern Indiana, where Wyandotte Cave, one of the largest caverns in the U.S., is located.

One can work and play in Indiana. But when it comes to sports spectating, Indiana is second to none. Everything starts in Indianapolis, home of the NFL Colts, NBA Pacers and WNBA Fever. The Indians, a Triple-A baseball team, play at Victory Field, while Indianapolis also is home to the Indiana Ice hockey team. During the summer, the city plays host to the Indianapolis Tennis Championships, a precursor to the U.S. Open. The summer starts with the Indianapolis 500, followed by the U.S. Grand Prix Formula One and draws to a close with the Brickyard 400, car races run at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

Indianapolis has hosted one women's basketball and six men's basketball NCAA Final Fours. The women's finals return in 2011. Additionally the city has conducted at least one Olympic Trials each year since 1984, including those for swimming and diving, synchronized swimming, track and field and wrestling.

Lucas Oil Stadium, the new home of the Colts, will be the site of Super Bowl XLVI in 2012.

Whatever your pleasure is, you are sure to find it somewhere in the state of Indiana.
