


**McCormick & Cherry on the northwest side of campus**

*The 2011 season will be Purdue's last at Lambert Field. The new northwest baseball facility is set to open for the 2012 home opener. The \$21 million baseball stadium, to be financed with athletics department funds, could eventually seat up to 2,500 spectators in the first phase of improvements to the Northwest Athletics Complex that includes the adjacent soccer facility. The intercollegiate baseball stadium will replace the existing 1,100-seat Lambert Field, which has been the team's home since 1965. Purdue will close out Lambert Field this year with an eight-game homestand from May 11-21, highlighted by Big Ten Conference series against Illinois and Iowa.*

# Doug Schreiber Head Coach Purdue Alumnus

Since Doug Schreiber was named Purdue's head baseball coach on May 29, 1998, the Boilermakers have become a major force in the Big Ten Conference and have made big strides on a national level.

Entering his 13th year as the head coach at Purdue, Schreiber has posted a 343-328 overall record and a 176-168 Big Ten mark through his first 12 seasons. His overall win total ranks second in Purdue history, while his conference victories stand alone in first. In 2007, Schreiber became the third head coach in Purdue baseball history to surpass the 500-games mark as the Boilermakers' head man. Dave Alexander, whom Schreiber played for from 1983 to 1986, owns the record for most games coached at Purdue with 792 over 14 seasons, while Joe Sexson guided the Boilermakers for 527 games over 18 years.


The 2010 season saw the Boilermakers post 33 victories, the program's most since 2000. Purdue navigated a hotly-contested Big Ten race that saw all six league tournament-qualifying teams finish within three games of first place. The Boilermakers reached the Big Ten Tourney for the eighth time under Schreiber, including six of the last seven seasons. Purdue eliminated Northwestern and Indiana from the 2010 tournament before bowing out. The Boilers have won at least one game at the Big Ten Tournament in seven of their eight appearances under Schreiber.

The 2010 Boilermakers posted new school records for hits (636) and runs per game (7.2) at the plate and led the Big Ten in strikeouts (435) and batting average against (.276) on the mound. Purdue went 15-6 at home and 9-2 in midweek action, compiling a 32-18 mark after opening the season 1-6.

Individually, Matt Bischoff was honored as a First Team All-Big Ten starting pitcher and newcomers Kevin Plawecki, Cameron Perkins and Brad Schreiber were recognized for standout freshman seasons. Bischoff led the Big Ten with 10 wins and 95 strikeouts and in the process became the first player in program history to be a four-time All-Big Ten honoree. He established new single-season and career strikeout marks in his final season as a Boilermaker. Bischoff and fellow pitcher Kevin Cahill were both selected in the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft.

Head coach Doug Schreiber was a four-year letterwinner at second base for the Boilers from 1983-86. He garnered Second Team All-Big Ten honors as a senior in 1986.

Plawecki led the team in RBIs (53), establishing a new Purdue freshman mark, while Perkins played in every game and led the squad in hits (74). Both were named Freshman All-Americans by Collegiate Baseball. Plawecki was also honored by the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association (NCBWA) and joined Brad Schreiber, a two-way performer at the plate and on the mound, on the Big Ten All-Freshman Team.

The 2008 campaign marked the third time in eight seasons that Schreiber's Boilermakers were on the verge of winning a Big Ten championship. Purdue finished second in the Big Ten regular season as the Boilers won a school-record 21 conference games. The Old Gold and Black also finished second at the Big Ten Tournament, losing a nail-biting 3-2 game to host Michigan in the championship round. Six Boilermakers were recognized by the league office with All-Big Ten honors at the end of the year, including first-team members Ben Wolgamot and Matt Bischoff, while Josh Lindblom became the second highest drafted player in Schreiber's tenure at Purdue when he was selected in the second round of the June MLB First-Year Player Draft.

The 2005 Boilermakers narrowly missed claiming its first conference title since 1909, finishing second in the conference and one game out of first place for the second time under Schreiber. Purdue continued its trend of playing one of the best schedules in the nation - one that was ranked as the toughest in the country through the spring break trip. After opening the season at Florida Atlantic, Purdue played Texas, the eventual national champion, and NCAA Super Regional qualifiers Mississippi and Rice.

In 2001, Schreiber and his Boilermakers were on the brink of winning the Big Ten Conference championship. The Boilermakers finished the Big Ten season in second place at 19-7, just half a game behind champion Ohio State and its 20-7 record. Purdue ended the season with a 32-24 mark and set a school record for most conference wins (19, eclipsed in 2008) and had the highest finish of any Purdue team since 1928. The Boilermakers had the top pitching staff and defense in the Big Ten in 2001, leading the conference with a team ERA of 3.67 in conference games and a .977 fielding percentage in all games. A staple of Schreiber baseball, the Boilermakers led the Big Ten in fielding three years in a row, from 2001 to 2003.

Purdue finished the 2000 season in third place in the Big Ten with a 17-11 record, which included a dominating 9-3 mark against the other top three teams in the conference. The Boilermakers had a four-game series sweep against then-league-leader and No. 25 Illinois, and finished the Big Ten regular season winning three out of four games at No. 25 and conference champion Minnesota. Purdue earned road wins at No. 6 Alabama, No. 16 East Carolina and No. 24 Notre Dame, helping the Boilers finish the year with an RPI

ranking of 45th in the country. That RPI ranking was the second-best in the Big Ten that season, just one spot behind conference champion Minnesota (44th). The Boilermakers ended the season with a 35-23 overall record and owned the top pitching staff in the Big Ten, with a team ERA of 4.12 in all games.

Two of Schreiber's 12 Purdue teams have been ranked in the Top 25 in the country. Baseball America ranked Purdue No. 25 in the nation after the Boilermakers opened the 2001 season with upset wins over No. 1 Rice and No. 24 Wake Forest while capturing the championship of the Coca-Cola Classic in Houston, Texas. It was the baseball program's first national ranking since 1993. Later that season, after posting a 13-game winning streak, the Boilermakers were ranked No. 29 by Collegiate Baseball. The 13-game streak was the nation's longest winning streak at that point in the season. The 2002 squad entered the season ranked No. 24 in the country by the NCBWA and No. 27 by Collegiate Baseball. It was the first time in school history that the baseball program started a season nationally ranked.

Schreiber believes in playing a challenging non-conference schedule each year against some of the nation's elite baseball programs. Since 2000, Purdue has faced national powers Alabama, Auburn, Baylor, Central Florida, Clemson, Coastal Carolina, East Carolina, Florida, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, Long Beach State, Louisiana-Lafayette, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Notre Dame, Oklahoma State, Rice, San Diego, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, UCLA, Vanderbilt and Wake Forest.

In 2001, Baseball America named Schreiber as one of the nation's top young Division I head coaches on the rise.

Schreiber has coached 48 All-Big Ten Conference selections, including 16 who were named to the conference's First Team, and has had players selected in the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft on 23 occasions. One of Schreiber's Boilermakers has led the Big Ten in hitting in four out of the last six years.

Prior to becoming the head coach at Purdue, Schreiber spent four seasons (1995-98) as the top assistant coach and recruiting coordinator under Pat Murphy at Arizona State University. Schreiber helped guide Arizona State to the College World Series and the national championship game in 1998. A year earlier, the Sun Devils finished as regional runners-up to Miami, and were two outs away from going to the College World Series. All four of Schreiber's recruiting classes at ASU were nationally ranked, including the 1995

class which was ranked No. 1 in the country and the 1996 class, which was tabbed the third best in the nation.

Before going to ASU, Schreiber served as an assistant coach for Murphy at the University of Notre Dame in 1994. That season, the Fighting Irish finished 46-16 and ended the season just two wins shy of Omaha, finishing as regional runners-up to Auburn.

Schreiber began his coaching career as a graduate assistant under Pat Quinn at Ball State University for two seasons (1991-92) and spent one year (1993) as an assistant at Butler University.

A native of LaPorte, Ind., Schreiber was a four-year starter (1983-86) at second base for the Boilermakers. During his career, Purdue posted a 120-112-2 mark and established a school-record 37 victories his senior season when he was a Second Team All-Big Ten selection. Schreiber still ranks among Purdue's career leaders in a variety of categories, including top-six ranking in four categories. Schreiber ranks first all-time in walks (132), fourth in runs scored (159), tied for third in games played (220) and tied for sixth in triples (9). He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in communications and has completed some course work towards a master's in education.

Schreiber played for the Adray Sound of the Detroit Adray Summer League in 1983, where he started in the infield alongside future Major Leaguers Barry Larkin (shortstop) and Jim Leyritz (third base). Schreiber also played for the Cotuit Kettleers of the prestigious Cape Cod League, helping the team win the league championship in the summer of 1985.

Born Aug. 25, 1963, Schreiber is the son of legendary LaPorte High School baseball coach Ken Schreiber, a three-time National Prep Coach of the Year who retired in 1998. The elder Schreiber guided LaPorte to an Indiana-record seven state championships, including the 1982 season when Doug was a senior co-captain and starting shortstop. Schreiber was also named the recipient of the prestigious L.V. Phillips Mental Attitude Award presented by the IHSAA following his team's state championship run.

Schreiber and his wife, the former Sarah Piper, reside in Lafayette.

## Ryan Sawyers Assistant Coach Recruiting Coordinator Pitchers/Defense West Virginia Wesleyan Alumnus

Ryan Sawyers returns for his fourth season on the Purdue coaching staff, joining the Boilermakers on a full-time basis in August 2008. Sawyers will work primarily as the pitching coach and will also assist with defense. In the summer of 2009 he was promoted to the position of Recruiting Coordinator for the Boilermakers. He previously served as the volunteer assistant during the 2004 season.

During the 2010 season the Boilermakers broke the record for strikeouts in a season with 435 which also led all Big Ten pitching staffs. The Boiler hurlers also finished the season with the Big Ten's best batting average against with opponents hitting .276 against Purdue throughout the entire season. Sawyers has seen three pitchers selected in the Major League Baseball Amateur Draft during his two seasons as pitching coach in West Lafayette. In that same period, the Boilermakers have claimed four Big Ten Conference Pitcher of the Week awards and one National Player of the Week award.

Also during the 2010 season, its 123rd overall, senior right-hander Matt Bischoff became Purdue's all-time strikeout king during an April game against Northwestern. The Decatur, Ind., native later broke the single-season strikeout record against those same Wildcats during the Big Ten Conference Tournament in Columbus, Ohio.

Sawyers came to Purdue with a Central Illinois Collegiate League (now the Prospect League) title in tow after leading the Springfield Sliders to the championship in 2008. He was the Sliders' head coach in their first season in the league and led the team to a CIGL-best 30-17 regular-season record. The Sliders won the first half, the regular season and the league championship. Sawyers was named Manager of the 2008 CIGL All-Star team which defeated the KIT All-Star Team in Huntingburg, Ind.

Prior to joining Schreiber's staff at Purdue and his summer appointment in the CIGL, he most recently served as an assistant at Garden City Community College in Garden City, Kan. During his three seasons (2005-08) with the Broncbusters he sent numerous players on to the Division I ranks and professional baseball, while also helping to lead them to a NJCAA Region VI runner-up finish in 2007. During Sawyers' time in Garden City players signed letters of intent with Purdue, Kansas, Florida Atlantic, Southeast Louisiana and Texas A&M Corpus Christi. Along with his pitching staff duties at Garden City, Sawyers coordinated recruiting, travel, fundraising, facility maintenance, strength and conditioning and academic monitoring. The Busters finished the 2008 academic year with the third best team GPA in the country.

He began his collegiate coaching career with a three-year stint at Shepherd University (2000-03) where the Rams won three consecutive division titles and finished runners-up at the 2002 NCAA II North Atlantic Regional. Under Sawyers' direction the Rams finished the season with the nation's 29th best ERA and led the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference in ERA in 2002 and 2003.

After Shepherd, Sawyers spent a season as an assistant at Allegany College of Maryland and has also served as the head coach for the Front Royal Cardinals in the Valley Baseball League and as the pitching coach for the Chillicothe Paints independent professional team in the Frontier League.

His collegiate playing career includes pitching two seasons at West Virginia Wesleyan College where he was named the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Pitcher of the Year in 1999 and led the team in strikeouts both years. He also helped pitch Allegany College of Maryland to a Junior College World Series appearance in 1997. At Allegany Sawyers played for Junior College Hall of Fame Coach Steve Bazarnic.

Sawyers, who holds a bachelor's degree from West Virginia Wesleyan College and a master's degree from West Virginia University, lives in Lafayette with his wife, Jaime, son, Brady, and daughter, Chelsea.

Jeff Duncan is in his second season on the coaching staff of the Purdue baseball program. He works with the hitters, outfielders, team defense and base running, as well as assists with recruiting,

Duncan's impact on the program in his first year as an assistant in West Lafayette was immediate. The 2010 Boilermakers set single-season school records for at bats (2,038), hits (636), runs per game (7.2) and total bases (950), while finishing second in school history in runs (411) and RBIs (368), third in home runs (56) and stolen bases (90), fourth in doubles (112) all while posting the third-highest team batting average (.312).


Along with head coach Doug Schreiber, Duncan help mentor 2010 *Collegiate Baseball* Freshman All-Americans Cameron Perkins and Kevin Plawecki. Plawecki also garnered second team Freshman All-America honors from the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association.

He joined the Boilermaker staff in 2010 after spending the 2009 season as an assistant at Auburn University. He has additional coaching experience as the Illinois Sparks' head coach in 2008 and eight years as an instructor at the Diamond Sports Academy in Mokena, Ill., from 2001-08.

Duncan spent nine years as a player in professional baseball within the New York Mets, San Diego Padres, Toronto Blue Jays and Los Angeles Dodgers organizations. He played two seasons in the Major Leagues with the New York Mets, spent six years at the Triple-A level or higher and was named to three different all-star teams during his professional career.

Collegiately, he started every game as a true freshman and was the runner up for the Big 12 Freshman of the Year at Iowa State in 1998. Duncan transferred to Arizona State as a sophomore and was named the top newcomer and All-Pac-10 in a vote by league coaches in 1999. In 2000, he helped ASU win the Pac-10 title and represented the Sun Devils on the Tempe All-Regional Team. He batted .360 during his college career and was a seventh-round selection by the Mets in the 2000 draft.

Duncan was also selected by the Chicago Cubs in the 1997 MLB Draft but opted to play college baseball. He completed his course work and earned his bachelor's degree from Arizona State in 2009.

## Tristan McIntyre Volunteer Assistant Coach Pitching Purdue Alumnus

Tristan McIntyre is in his first season on the Purdue coaching staff.

No stranger to the Boilermaker baseball program, McIntyre was a three year letter winner for the Boilermakers as a pitcher from 2003-2008. McIntyre was twice named Academic All-Big Ten. He graduated in 2008 with a degree in history.

McIntyre returns to Purdue after coaching this past summer in the Great Lakes Collegiate Summer League with the Lima Locos. Under McIntyre's direction, Locos' pitchers lead the GLCSL in strikeouts (341) and were second in opponent's batting average (.258).

Before his time with the Locos, McIntyre spent two years (2008-2010) as pitching coach and recruiting coordinator at Bluffton University. Under his guidance, the Beaver pitching staff broke two school records and had two pitchers named conference pitcher of the week, including one named NCBWA Honorable Mention Pitcher of the Week. The Beavers increased their win total by four games between the 2009 and 2010 seasons, falling one game short of the school record. In addition to his coaching duties, McIntyre earned his MBA while at Bluffton.

While playing baseball at Purdue, McIntyre was also involved with numerous youth programs in the Lafayette, Ind., area. In the summer of 2006, he served as pitching coach for American Legion Post 11 out of Lafayette. In the summer of 2008, McIntyre served as pitching coach for the Lafayette Colts travel baseball club who participated in the 2008 Colt World Series.
