Coaching Staff



HERB HILGEMAN

Head Coach

Herb Hilgeman begins his thirty-first season as Rhodes' head basketball coach in 2006-07. In addition to his coaching duties, he also serves as assistant athletic director. During his tenure as head coach, Hilgeman's teams have been ranked nationally in the NCAA Division III Top 25 for 14 of the last 28 years.

In his 30 years at Rhodes, Hilgeman has become the all-time winningest basketball coach in the school's history. He has a career record of 436-298, a .594 winning percentage. He ranks in the top 40 among Division III head coaches in winning percentage and career victories.

Under Hilgeman's direction, Rhodes men's basketball has been ranked as high as fourth in the nation, first in scoring margin, second in scoring offense, third in win-loss percentage, and sixth in free throw percentage. In 1997-98, Rhodes led the nation in field goal percentage defense. The 1992-93 team finished the season with a 21-6 record and advanced to the second round of the NCAA tournament, following a first round

win in Mallory-Hyde Gymnasium with a 71-62 defeat of Virginia Wesleyan. During the 1991-92 season, the Lynx thrilled fans with a school record 20-game winning streak, a season high streak in Division III.

Hilgeman reached a milestone as a coach during the 2002-03 season—his 400th career victory in a 105-80 win against Maryville University. He is the first head coach to record 400 wins in Rhodes College history.

Hilgeman also has been recognized by peers for his coaching successes, having been named the South Region Coach-of-the-Year twice, the Collegiate Athletic Conference (CAC) Coach-of-the-Year in 1990-91, and the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAC) Coach-of-the-Year in 1992-93.

A native of Southgate, Kentucky, Hilgeman graduated from Miami University (Ohio) in 1972 with a B.S. in Education. A four year letterman in basketball, he participated in the 1969-70 NIT Tournament and in the 1970-71 NCAA Tournament. He then served for two years as a basketball and baseball coach at Highlands High School in Ft. Thomas, Kentucky, before moving to Centre College in 1975 as an assistant basketball coach and head track coach. A year later, he accepted his present position at Rhodes, and in 1978 received his Master's degree in Education from Memphis State University.

Coach Hilgeman and his wife Beth reside in Cordova, Tennessee. They have four children: Michelle, Mary, David, and Charlie

Rob Sabau enters his fourth year as a member of the men's basketball coaching staff in 2006-07. A native of Auburn, Alabama, Sabau graduated from Millsaps College in 1998 with a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration. During his basketball career at Millsaps, Sabau was a member of two SCAC championship teams as well as two teams that qualified for the NCAA tournament.

Prior to his arrival at Rhodes, Sabau was a high school basketball coach in Mississippi for three years, first at Woodland Hills Academy in Jackson, then at Manchester Academy in Yazoo City. His 2000-01 Manchester Academy boy's teams compiled a 25-6 record, won the conference championship, and was the class 3A state championship runner-up.

LEE QUALLS
Assistant Coach

Lee Qualls enters his eighth season as a Lynx assistant coach. A Memphis native, Qualls was a four-year starter, First Team All-Conference, First Team All-Suburban, and Most Valuable Player in basketball at Ramsey High School in Ramsey, New Jersey. Qualls attended the College of William & Mary on a football scholarship and received a Bachelor of Business Administration degree in 1983. He received a Master's of Business Administration from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill in 1988.

In addition to contributing to individual player instruction and game management, Qualls also will assist the Lynx recruiting efforts. Qualls brings a unique coaching perspective to the program, including his corporate experiences in international marketing.



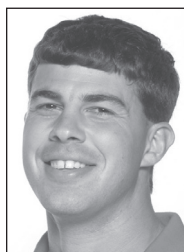

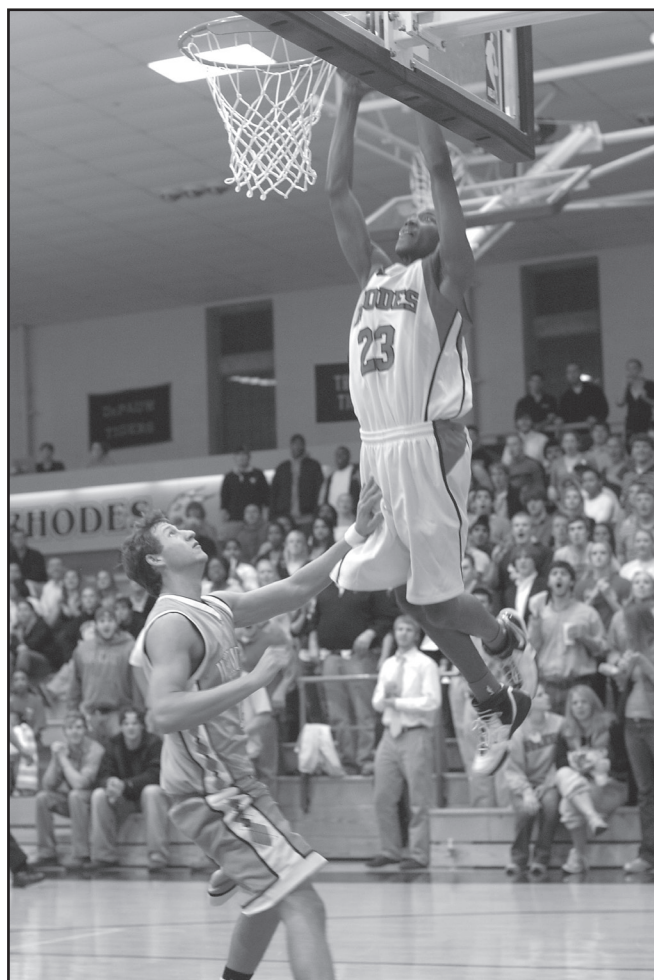

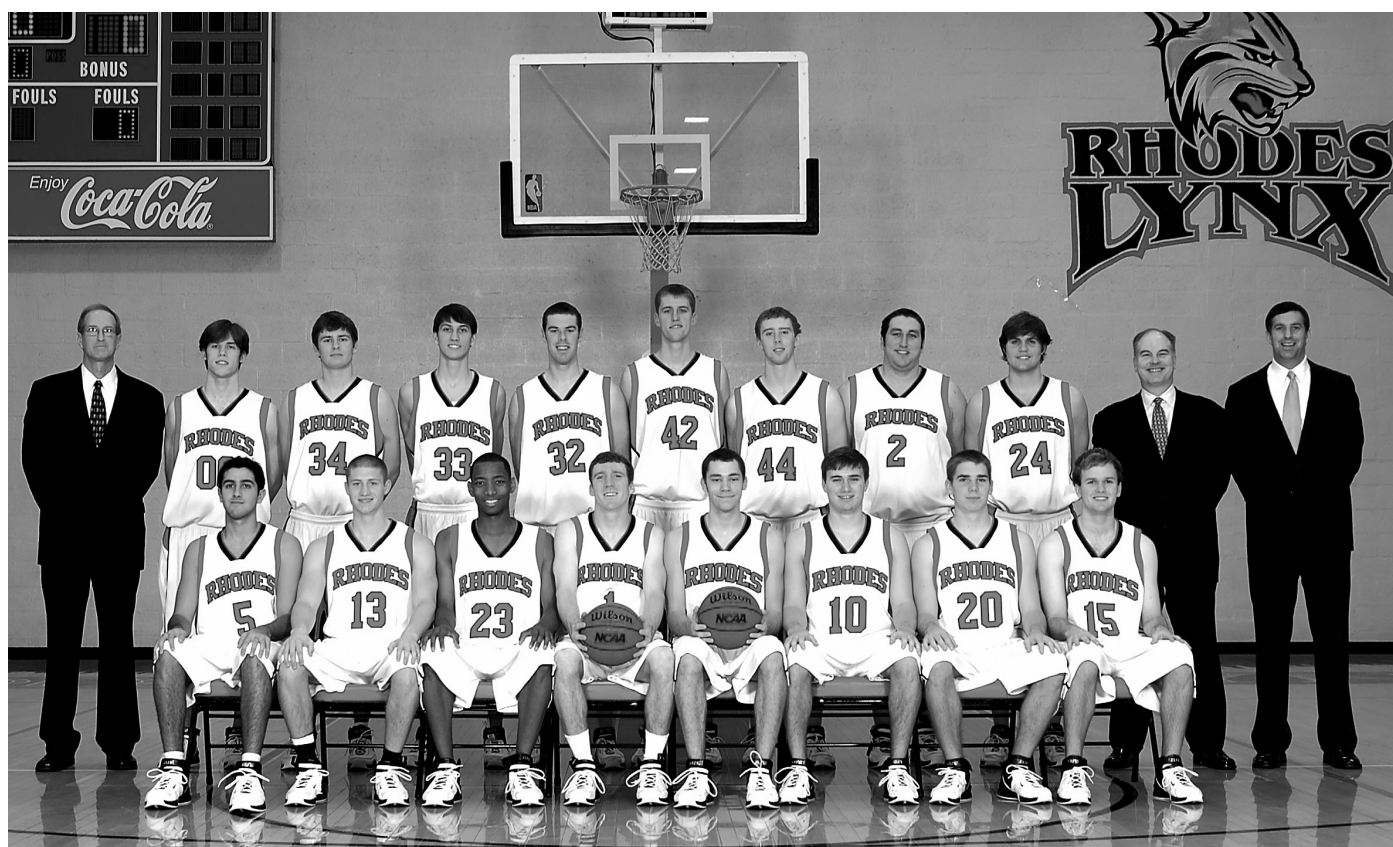


Sophomore Cory Smith dunks over a Westminster opponent opening night of the Rhodes Tip-Off Classic

JOEY DALY

Forward—Senior

Picayune, Mississippi

The lone senior on this year's squad, Joey Daly enters his senior season after a solid junior campaign in which he led the Lynx in rebounding. In addition to a strong interior defensive presence, Joey has a versatile offensive game, both around the basket and from 3-point range. Joey is coming back from a season ending knee injury last year and looks to have a strong senior campaign.

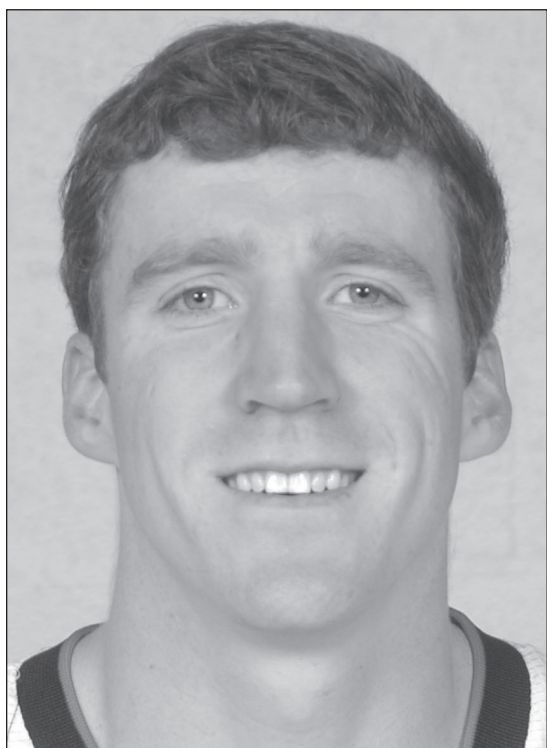
Daly had an outstanding high school career at Picayune High. He led his team to the Semi-Finals of the Mississippi State Play-offs, garnering Regional MVP honors. He was also selected to participate in the Mississippi North/South Senior All-Star game. During his senior season, Daly averaged 15 points and 12.6 rebounds per game.



JOE THOMPSON

Guard—Junior

Nashville, Tennessee



Joe Thompson returns to Rhodes after a solid sophomore season in which he started at point guard. Thompson will be called upon to continue his solid play at the point as well as be one of the team leaders. Joe is a very athletic guard who plays excellent defense and is capable of scoring in bunches.

Joe's Father Ryan teams compiled a 91-12 record during his four seasons, including a State Championship his junior year. Thompson was twice named to the All-Region and the Region Tournament Team. Joe was also named the Region Tournament MVP his senior year. Thompson averaged 14 points per game, 6 assists, and 2 steals per game his senior season.



JUSTIN LONG

Forward—Junior
Little Rock, Arkansas

Justin Long returns to the Lynx after a very solid sophomore season. Justin's tough defense and rebounding ability will help bolster the Rhodes' inside game. Justin also has the ability to step outside and hit the three-pointer. Long will be a starter at the forward position this year and will be counted on to provide leadership to the younger players.

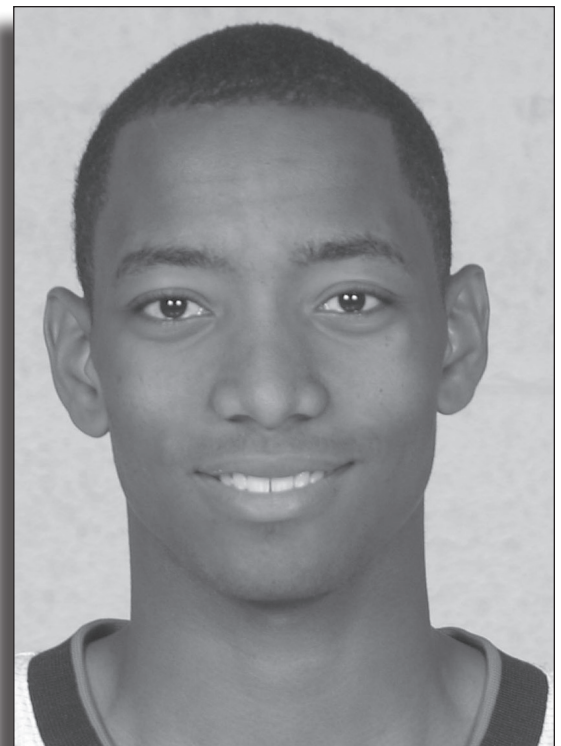
During his four years at Pulaski Academy, the Bruins compiled a 120-7 overall record, including back-to-back State Championships his sophomore and junior seasons. Long was a 2 time all conference selection. After his senior year, Justin was given All-Region honors, the Bruin Award, and the Best Defensive Player award. Justin averaged 14 points and seven rebounds per game.

Smith was named to the Commercial Appeal Best of Preps team and was selected to participate in the Memphis Senior All-Star game held in the FedEx Forum.



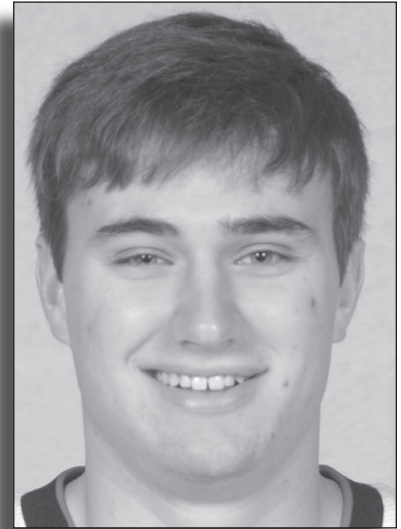

Dean completed his career at Homewood as a member of the winningest class in the school's history. 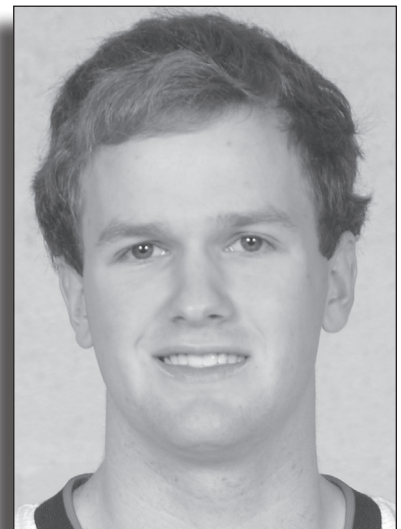


PEARSON WEEMS

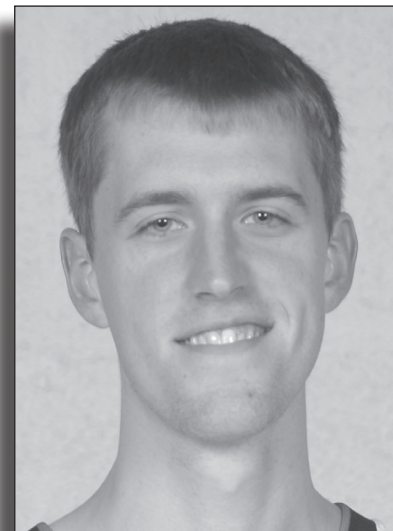

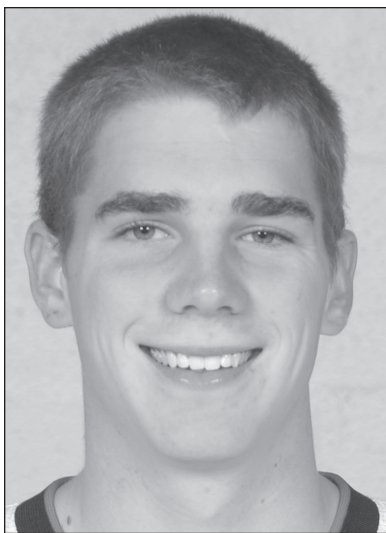
ANDYSHEA SABERIOON

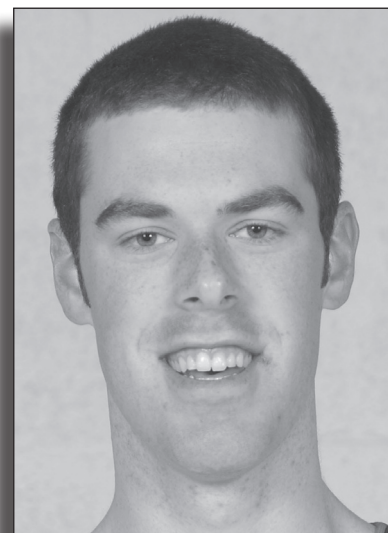
LARRY CUNNINGHAM, JR.
