What's On Tap ...

The Spiders hit the road Saturday for a Top 20 showdown in Durham, N.C. as they battle No. 10 Duke in their second game of the week ... The game marks the first of two-straight against top 10 opponents, joining No. 3 Georgetown next weekend at Robins Stadium.

Series History ...

Saturday's game marks the eighth meeting all-time between Richmond and Duke ... The Blue Devils are currently tied with Virginia as the non-conference program the Spiders have faced most in program history ... Richmond is 1-6 all-time against Duke, playing every year since 2016, including twice in 2019 (NCAA Tournament) ... The Spiders won the first-ever meeting between the teams in 2016 with a 12-10 decision in Durham but the Blue Devils have won six-straight in the series ... Two out of the last three meetings have been one-goal decisions, with the 2020 game ending in overtime 16-15 for the Blue Devils.

Spiders Earn National Ranking ...

The Spiders entered the national rankings for the second time this year and the first in-season ranking (preseason ranked) ... Richmond was tabbed No. 19 in the country in the USILA Coaches' Poll this week while receiving votes in both the Inside Lacrosse Media Poll and the Nike/US Lacrosse Poll ... The Spiders are 2-1 on the season with wins over Marist and Towson with their lone loss coming on the road at then No. 4 North Carolina.

Second 14-Goal Victory ...

The Spiders picked up their second-straight win and the second win of the year at home at Robins Stadium with a 17-3 victory over St. Bonaventure ... The Spiders scored the game's first eight goals less than 25 minutes into the game - all goals from **Ryan Lanchbury** and **Dalton Young** ... The Spiders extended their lead in the second half, running out to a 14-goal victory, their second 14-goal win of the year (18-4 vs. Marist).

Lanchbury and Young combined for 11 goals and 16 points in the victory ... The pair scored the Spiders' first six goals of the game and 10 out of their first 11 tallies on the afternoon ... Lanchbury's nine points ranks third all-time in program history and third all-time in his career ... He has posted two games with 12 points each in 2021 against Mercer and Bellarmine ... Young finished the day tying his career-high with six goals, five of which came in the opening half ... He has scored six goals in a game three times in his career with today's efforts joining two from 2021 (High Point, VMI) ... His effort moved his career goal total to 51 in just 21 career games ... He leads the team this year with 12 goals in four games.

Their play helped the Spiders set a new single-game record with 60 shots Tuesday, surpassing the previous mark of 57 set last year against VMI ... Defensively, the Spiders picked up 40 ground balls, the 10th highest total in a single game in program history.

Lanchbury's Brilliance ...

Graduate attack **Ryan Lanchbury** became the all-time leading point scorer last time out against St. Bonaventure, just one game after becoming the all-time leading goal scorer in program history ... He enters Saturday's game with 132 career goals and 234 career points, surpassing both of Teddy Hatfield's career records ... He is also the all-time leading goal scorer in Southern Conference history ... He ranks second all-time in career history in assists as well, trailing Hatfield's record by one (103) ... Lanchbury has accomplished these feats in just 58 games, compared to Hatfield's total of 66 games in his career.

Lanchbury was named to the Tewaaron Award Watch List earlier in February ... He also holds the first and third spots in single-season scoring history with 72 points in 2019 and 67 points in 2021 ... He owns the top three spots in points per game in a single season with 5.15 in 2021, 4.29 in 2020 and 4.24 in 2019 ... He also owns the top single-season marks with 52 goals (2019) and 39 assists (2021) ...

Lanchbury was named preseason Honorable Mention All-America by Inside Lacrosse this year ... He is one of just two chosen from the Southern Conference.

Crazy Towson Affair ...

The Spiders improved to 2-1 on the year Saturday, but needed theatrics to get the job down against Towson ... Richmond fell behind the Tigers 9-1 only 11:22 into the game but did not fold ... The Spiders rallied all the way back and won the game 16-15 in triple overtime at Towson ... The triple overtime victory marks just the second time in program history Richmond has played a three overtime game and the first since 2016 ... The Spiders are 2-0 all-time in such games, posting a 6-5 victory at Furman six years ago.

Sophomore midfielder **Lance Madonna** scored a career-high six goals in the victory while graduate midfielder **Luke Frankeny** added a season-best four goals ... Madonna's six goals are tied for second-most in a single game in program history and the first since teammate **Dalton Young** had six last season against High Point ... Prior to Saturday's game, he had scored only 12 career goals in his first 12 career games as a Spider.

Redshirt sophomore goalie **Devin Craven** was resilient in goal, bouncing back with a strong performance after allowing nine goals in the opening 15 minutes ... Craven limited the Tigers to only six goals in the final 56:44 of the game and scoreless in 11:44 of overtime play ... He finished with a career-high 21 saves, including two in the third overtime period ... His 21 saves rank second all-time in program history, just one save shy of Jack Rusbult's program-record off 22 set in 2020.

Offensive Outburst ...

The Spiders put on an offensive performance against Marist, out-scoring the Red Foxes by an 18-4 margin ... The 18 goals are the most for the Spiders this year and they generated a program-record 58 shots in the victory ... The 58 shots are a program-record, surpassing the previous record of 57 shots set last year against VMI ... The Spiders had nine different players score a goal in the win with **Ryan Lanchbury** and **Dalton Young** leading the way with four goals each.

Freshman Faceoff ...

Freshman faceoff specialist **Jared Chenoy** enjoyed a strong day at the office against Marist ... Chenoy was dominant in his efforts, winning 15 out of 18 faceoffs helping the Spiders hold a 20-of-25 edge at the dot ... Chenoy added a career-best eight ground balls while scoring his first career goal and his first career assist.

Defensive Performance ...

The Spiders limited Marist to a season-low four goals in the victory ... The Red Foxes were held to their lowest scoring output since February 19, 2019 against nationally ranked Army ... Redshirt sophomore goalie **Devin Craven** picked up his first career victory, playing 56:42 in goal and making 11 saves ... The Spiders defense was strong throughout, with redshirt freshman **Braden McClure** causing four turnovers and **Joe Gooley** adding three caused turnovers and four ground balls.

We Are Young ...

Junior attack **Dalton Young** was named the Southern Conference Freshman of the Year last season ... Young led the Spiders with 35 goals and added nine assists on the year, ranking second on the team with 44 points ... He added eight man-up goals for the Spiders ... He is averaging 2.4 goals per game through his first 19 games of his Spider Career.

Ninth Season ...

The 2022 season marks the ninth season in program history ... Richmond added men's lacrosse in the 2014 season as a member of the Atlantic Sun Conference and have been members of the Southern Conference since 2015 ... The Spiders have had success from the start, recording three NCAA Tournament appearances in program history, including one in their inaugural season of 2014 ... Richmond also made NCAA Tournament appearances in 2018 and 2019 ... The Spiders own a 74-48 (.603) record all-time, including a 37-9 mark (.804) in conference play ... Richmond has posted seven-straight winning seasons and five years with 10 or more wins ... Head coach **Dan Chemotti** has been at the helm since day one of the program for the Spiders.

Coming From The Mount ...

Transfer midfielder **Luke Frankeny** joined the Spiders as a graduate student after playing 45 games in his career with Mount St. Mary's ... Frankeny scored 79 goals in his career and tallied 94 career points ... He led the Mountaineers with 26 goals in 13 games in 2021, averaging 2.0 goals per game ... He was a Second Team All-Northeast Conference in 2019, scoring 27 goals in 16 games ... He was a preseason All-Southern Conference selection this spring ... He has already scored seven goals and dished out three assists in his first three games as a Spider ... He scored a career-high four goals last time out against Towson.

Lanchbury Drafted . . .

Graduate attack **Ryan Lanchbury** became the first Spider in program history to be drafted into the National Lacrosse League (NLL), selected with the No. 2 overall pick by the Georgia Swarm in the 2021 NLL Entry Draft ... Lanchbury returns for his sixth year (COVID-19 year) with the Spiders in 2022 and will be eligible to play for the Swarm starting in the 2022-23 season.

Blue & Orange to Red & Blue . . .

The Spiders dipped into the transfer market two more times this offseason, bringing in two from Syracuse in senior faceoff **Nate Garlow** and red-shirt sophomore midfielder **JT Stirpe** ... Garlow played in 10 games in his Orange career, including three games in 2021 ... Stirpe was a two-year member for Syracuse, playing in one game in 2021 against Holy Cross.

Let's Go Streaking . . .

Lanchbury has scored a point in 47-straight games, dating back to April 14, 2018 ... His 47-game point streak currently ranks 10th longest in the NCAA ... He has scored 213 points during his 47-game streak -- an average 4.5 points per game ... He has scored 119 goals and handed out 94 assists in this current run.

Lanchbury Picks Up Honors . . .

Graduate attack **Ryan Lanchbury** was named the Southern Conference Offensive Player of the Week for his efforts against Marist ... Lanchbury was also chosen as part of the USILA National Team of the Week as he scored four goals and added two assists for six points ... This marks the sixth weekly honor of Lanchbury's career, moving him into a tie for second all-time in league history with Asher Nolting (High Point) ... Former Spider Benny Pugh holds the league record with eight Player of the Week honors in his career.

Craven Honored . . .

Redshirt sophomore goalie **Devin Craven** was named the Southern Conference Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts in the Spiders' season opener against No. 4 North Carolina ... Craven made his first career start and posted a career-best 16 saves against the Tar Heels ... His 16 saves are tied for sixth-most in a single season and the most by a Spider making their first career start in program history ... Prior to the season opener, Craven had played in four career games, making nine saves in just under 30 minutes of action.

Craven becomes the fourth Spider goalie to earn SoCon Player of the Week honors in program history ... He joins the likes of Benny Pugh (nine times), Blake Goodman (two times) and Jack Rusbuldt (two times).

Spiders Drop Season Opener . . .

Richmond opened the 2022 season on the road at No. 4 North Carolina, dropping a 13-9 contest ... The Spiders rallied from an early four-goal deficit to take the lead in the second half before the Tar Heels came back to win the game ... Senior attack **Ryan Dunn** led six Spider scorers with his third career hat trick, notching three goals and

leading the team with five shots ... Junior **Dalton Young** added two goals and an assist while graduate attack **Ryan Lanchbury** dished out three assists ... Along the **Devin Craven's** night in goal (see above), senior defender **Jake Saunders** led the Spider defense with five caused turnovers on the day ... Freshman **Jared Chenoy** made his collegiate debut and won 8-of-22 faceoffs and picked up five ground balls.

Preseason All-SoCon and . . .

Richmond had four members named to the preseason All-Southern Conference in attack **Ryan Lanchbury**, attack **Dalton Young**, midfielder **Luke Frankeny** and defender **Ray Baran** ...

Lanchbury was an All-America selection after the season last spring and was the first Spider in program history named SoCon Offensive Player of the Year ... He ranked second in the SoCon in scoring with 67 points in 13 games, scoring 28 goals and dishing out 39 assists ... In SoCon play only, Lanchbury leads all scorers with 44 total points, 11 more than any other player, averaging 7.33 points per game in the six contests, which is a league record and more than a point better than any out player in league history.

Young became the first Spider in program history to be named SoCon Freshman of the Year last spring ... He led the Spiders with 35 goals last spring, ranking second in the league. Young was named Second Team All-SoCon and was a two-time SoCon Offensive Player of the Week and a two-time USILA National Team of the Week selection ... He has scored 24 of his 32 goals in league play, averaging 4.0 goals per game against SoCon opponents.

Frankeny earns preseason All-SoCon accolades in the midfield despite this being his first season in the league after transferring in from Mount St. Mary's ... He has scored 84 goals in his career with the Mountaineers, including leading the team with 26 goals last spring ... He tallied 27 goals in 2019 while earning Second Team All-Northeast Conference accolades.

Baran earns the honors after being named Second Team All-SoCon last spring ... Baran started all 13 games on defense and helped the Spiders to the lowest scoring output against in the league ... He caused 12 turnovers on the year and picked up 26 ground balls ... The 2019 SoCon All-Tournament selection, Baran has played in 37 career games, with 36 starts on defense the past three years.

The Spiders were picked second in the preseason SoCon poll, earning 22 votes, including two of the six first place votes ... High Point was picked as preseason favorites after winning the SoCon Tournament last spring, earning 24 votes and the remaining four first place tallies ... Jacksonville was third with 17 votes, followed by Mercer (12), VMI (10) and Hampton.

Defending Champs . . .

Richmond finished the 2021 regular season with a 5-1 record and shared the 2021 Southern Con-

ference regular season title with High Point ... The regular season title marked the fourth time in six seasons the Spiders have won at least a share of the title ... Richmond shared the regular season crown in 2017 and 2018 while winning it outright in 2015 ... The Spiders' four titles are the most in SoCon history while Air Force and High Point each have won three.

SoCon Dominance . . .

This season marks the eighth year Richmond is in the Southern Conference and Spiders have been the dominant team in the league since joining ... Richmond is 35-6 over the last seven years in SoCon play, winning at 85.4 percent ... The Spiders 35-6 record is seven wins more than their closest league rival during that span as High Point is 28-12 (.700) ... Air Force is second in the last five years with a 25-9 (.735) record ... Richmond has won the past two Southern Conference Tournament titles and has never finished below third place in the league standings.

Head Man In Charge . . .

Head coach **Dan Chemotti** is in his ninth season as the Spiders' head coach and the only head coach in program history ... Chemotti owns a 74-48 overall record in his career while only having one season under .500 ... He has led the Spiders to seven-straight winning records and five years with 10 or more wins ... He owns a 37-9 record all-time against Southern Conference foes and he is 65-21 in his career against teams not nationally ranked ... Chemotti picked up his second SoCon Coach of the Year accolade last season and his first since 2015 ... He led the Spiders to a share of the SoCon regular season title and the No. 1 seed in the tournament ... The Spiders were nationally ranked all regular season, peaking at No. 12 in the country and entered the SoCon tournament ranked 18th in the nation.

Archbell Added to Staff . . .

Veteran collegiate coach Jason Archbell was added to the Spiders' coaching staff as a volunteer assistant coach this offseason ... Archbell spent the past eight seasons as the head coach at Bowdoin College.

Archbell posted a 57-55 record in eight seasons at the helm of the Polar Bears ... In 2016, Bowdoin posted a 12-5 mark, earning the third seed for the NESCAC Tournament, and totaling the most wins for the program since 2012, as Archbell was named the conference coach of the year ... Nineteen athletes earned All-NESCAC, All-Region and All-American recognition during his tenure.

Prior to Bowdoin, Archbell was assistant coach at the University of Pennsylvania, where he served as a defensive assistant and recruiting coordinator ... The Quakers enjoyed one of their finest seasons in 2011, posting an 8-7 mark and reaching the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2006 ... In 2012 Penn played one of the most difficult schedules in Division I and, despite a losing record, earned wins versus ranked North Carolina and Harvard.

Dan Chemotti is in his ninth season as the men's lacrosse head coach at the University of Richmond in 2022. Chemotti is the program's first-ever head coach and has guided the Spiders to unprecedented success for such a young program.

The two-time Southern Conference Coach of the Year, Chemotti as guided the Spiders have three NCAA Tournament appearances (2019, 2018, 2014), in the first eight years of program existence, including back-to-back seasons as Southern conference Tournament champions (2019, 2018). Richmond has won four regular season league titles in its first eight years (no title awarded in 2020) and has been in the conference tournament championship game all six seasons (2020

season impacted by COVID-19). The Spiders are the only program in the country that has appeared in six-straight conference tournament games from 2014-2019.

Chemotti led Richmond to a share of the Southern Conference regular season title and the number one seed in the SoCon Tournament in 2021. The Spiders swept the postseason SoCon awards with Ryan Lanchbury (Offensive Player of the Year), Sean Menges (Defensive Player of the Year), Dalton Young (Freshman of the Year) and his own SoCon Coach of the Year award. The Spiders placed a SoCon record 11 players on the two All-Conference teams, including six named First Team All-Conference and five earning Second Team All-Conference accolades.

Chemotti has led Richmond to at 72-47 (.605) record as head coach, including five years off 10 or more wins. The Spiders have won 80.4 percent (37-9) of their conference games in program history and is an astounding 35-6 (85.4%) record in the seven years in the SoCon.

In the shortened 2020 season, the Spiders finished the year ranked No. 18 in the country with a 4-3 record. The Spiders' three losses all game to nationally ranked opponents in No. 4 Maryland, No. 6 Notre Dame and No. 13 Duke.

In 2019, the Spiders booked their third NCAA Tournament appearance in program history and second-straight by winning the SoCon Championship with a 15-7 victory over No. 11 High Point on the road. The Spiders dominated the Panthers in the championship game and goalkeeper Jack Rusbuldt was named the Most Outstanding Player after allowing 13 goals in the two SoCon games.

Richmond advanced to the NCAA Tournament with the automatic bid and played at No. 4 Duke in the first round. The Spiders gave the Blue Devils all it wanted, out-scoring Duke 4-0 in the fourth quarter before running out of time and falling by a 12-11 margin. Richmond finished the season ranked No. 18 in the country in the final polls.

Sophomores Ryan Lanchbury and Mitch Savoca earned All-America honors last season, becoming the third and fourth All-Americans in program history. Lanchbury set the Richmond single-season scoring record with 72 points and 52 goals. His 52 goals also set the SoCon single-season goal scoring record. He is currently sixth in the nation in goals and 14th in the country in points.

The Spiders placed five members on the First Team All-SoCon squad in 2019. Ryan Lanchbury, Teddy Hatfield, Mitch Savoca, Jason Reynolds and Sean Menges picked up the honors. The Spiders' five First Team All-SoCon selections ties the school record set in 2017, which is also the most in SoCon history, happening for the fourth time in the league's five-year history of men's lacrosse. Additionally, Richmond added to its SoCon-record of 21 First Team All-Conference selections in program history, nine more than the second place team in league history (Air Force, 12 selections).

In 2018, the Spiders won the SoCon regular season championship with an 11-6 overall record and a 6-1 mark in league play. Richmond was a perfect 9-0 at home at Robins Stadium last season, including winning the 2018 SoCon Tournament championship. The Spiders won the tournament title in impressive fashion as Teddy Hatfield scored the game-winning, overtime goal to defeat Jacksonville and send Richmond to its second NCAA Tournament in program history.

The Spiders had their name called in the NCAA Selection Show and made it out of the play-in game for the first time in program history. Richmond went on the road and battled No. 2 Albany in the first round.

The Spiders had six members named to the All-Conference team last year. Joining the First Team, is senior LSM Austin Cates, redshirt-senior attacker Mitch Goldberg, junior attacker Teddy Hatfield and freshman defenseman Jason Reynolds. Freshman midfielder Mitch Savoca is lone Spider representative on the Second Team but in addition, joins fellow newcomer Ryan Lanchbury on the All-Freshman Team.

2017 was a historic season for the Spiders, posting a program record 12 victories and reaching as high as No. 11 in the national polls. For the second straight year, Richmond knocked off a national power, taking down defending national champion UNC, 6-5, in Chapel Hill. In addition, two Spiders earned First Team All-American honors for the first time when Brendan Hynes and Benny Pugh were recognized. Pugh and Hynes also became the first Spiders to ever be drafted into the professional ranks, both being drafted in the Major League Lacrosse draft.

The Spiders saw success again in 2016, their second season in the Southern Conference, posting an 11-5 overall record and a 6-1 mark in conference play. After jumping out to a 4-1 start, the Spiders logged the biggest win in program history, taking down No. 9 Duke on the road, 12-10. The win and another victory over Jacksonville would give the 6-1 Spiders the best start in program history, propelling the team to a No. 18 ranking, the highest in program history.

Shortly after, Mitch Goldberg was named to the prestigious Tewaaraton Award Watch List. The team finished third nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 7.44 goals per game, and first in caused turnovers and clearing percentage for the second year in a row. Junior Brendan Hynes ranked second in the nation in scoring turnovers, while junior Ryan Dennis ranked ninth nationally in the same category. Seven Spiders earned postseason honors, led by Hynes and senior Alex Hatem, who were named to the SoCon First Team.

In 2015, the Spiders finished 6-0 in the new league and boasted the nation's second-most stingy defense. The Spiders allowed just 7.44 goals per game, within less than half a goal per game from the nation's leader. Richmond also lead the country in clearing percentage and finished fourth in the country in scoring margin, winning on average by more than four goals per game.

The Spiders boasted the league's Defensive Player of the Year in Brendan Hynes, while goalie Benny Pugh was second nationally in both save percentage (.590) and goal-against average (7.42) for the year. On the offensive side, the second-year program scored 20-or-more goals three times, finished 15th nationally in scoring offense (11.75) and 11th in assists per game (7.25). Richmond earned its first national ranking for the season, appearing at No. 20 in a national poll. UR was among teams receiving votes for the majority of, and in the final poll of, the season. Richmond got above .500 after just two seasons, sitting at 17-16 overall in just two years as a varsity program.

Chemotti did what no other coach in the history of Division I lacrosse was able to accomplish; he took a first-year program to the NCAA Tournament in 2014. He followed that by taking the Spiders to an undefeated league season in the newly-formed Southern Conference in 2015.

After helping lead the Loyola University Maryland men's lacrosse team as offensive coordinator to the 2012 Division I National Championship in 2012, Chemotti was named head coach of the Richmond men's lacrosse team in October of 2012. He spent that school year recruiting and putting in place the tenets of the program which began play in the 2014 season, and it led to the young squad earning an Atlantic Sun Conference championship and berth into the newly-expanded NCAA Tournament.

The Spiders jumped into their inaugural season by hosting No. 7 Virginia on February 8, 2014. Over 4,000 fans packed into Robins Stadium to see the beginning of a magical season. The Spiders did not come away with a win that day, but battled the Cavaliers to a 13-12 loss, which set the tone for things to come.

Despite losing the first five games of the season, the Spiders kept things positive, and finally broke through for a win against Vermont in Durham, North Carolina on March 8. That was the start of a run of four wins in eight games, including a pair of Atlantic Sun Conference games that propelled the young squad into the four-team Atlantic Sun Championship Tournament.

The Spiders beat both the top seed and host Mercer and second-seeded High Point, avenging two regular-season losses and stringing together back-to-back wins for the first time in team history, and the one time that it mattered, as they earned the league's automatic bid to the NCAA. That feat drew a trip to Colorado Springs and a road game at Air Force in the NCAA Tournament.

During his five seasons with the Greyhounds, Chemotti was a part of four NCAA Tournament berths and at least a share of three ECAC conference titles at Loyola. Chemotti also saw 30 players earn all-conference honors and 12 be named All-Americans during his time there.

Chemotti's powerful offense helped lead the Greyhounds to an 18-1 mark and their first-ever national championship in 2012. The Loyola offense ranked eighth in goals per game (12.05), ninth in EMO at .444% and fifth in turnovers per game at 12.84. A versatile and diverse offense, the Greyhounds saw eight players rack up 10 or more goals, three tally more than 20 and three reach the 50-goal barrier in 2012.

The offense of which Chemotti was the architect afforded Loyola players the ability to shoot quickly, whether in transition or settled offense, and garner a high volume of shots. Despite the high number of shots, Loyola's shot percentage did not drop. In fact, the Greyhounds' shot percentage rose from .249 in 2011 to .299 during the team's 18-1 run to the NCAA Championship.

Two members of Chemotti's offense, Sawyer and midfielder Davis Butts, earned All-ECAC First Team honors in 2012, and Lusby was named to the Second Team. Sawyer was a USILA Second Team All-American, and Lusby and Butts earned All-America Honorable Mention.

In 2010, a pair of Loyola attackers, Collin Finnerty and Cooper MacDonnell, were named to the All-ECAC First Team, and MacDonnell picked up ECAC Offensive Player of the Year honors and was named All-America Honorable Mention. In addition to those honors, Finnerty, MacDonnell and Matt Langan split ECAC Offensive Player of the Week honors five times, and freshman attacker Patrick Fanshaw earned ECAC Rookie of the Week laurels once.

During the 2009 season, Chemotti's attack produced three players with 30 or more total points - Shane Koppens (41), Cooper MacDonnell (38) and Collin Finnerty (37) - a mark not accomplished by a Loyola trio since 2003.

The Greyhounds led the ECAC in goals per game (10.43), a category they finished 17th in all of NCAA Division I during 2009. Koppens led the conference in points per game (3.42) and finished his Loyola career 12th in the nation in the category.

In 2008, the Greyhounds captured the ECAC title behind an explosive offense that ranked second in goals per game and points per game (13.43), and first in shooting percentage, in the league.

Under Chemotti's direction in 2008, Koppens was named ECAC Offensive Player of the Year after finishing as the league's top scorer. In Chemotti's three years calling the offense, nine offensive players have been awarded with post season All-ECAC honors (four first-team and five second-team).

In 2007 the Loyola offense ranked 17th nationally in team offense and finished the season with a .640 assist percentage.

A 2002 graduate of Duke University, Chemotti led the Blue Devils to back-to-back ACC Championships during his junior and senior seasons. During his career in Durham, N.C., the Blue Devils reached the NCAA Tournament all four years, advancing to the NCAA Quarterfinals three times. He was selected a team captain his senior year, and was awarded the school's Roy Skinner Award for Dedication and Sacrifice.

Following graduation, Chemotti worked as an assistant coach at Dartmouth College from 2002-2004, working primarily with the offense and the face-off men. In 2004, the Big Green's offense ranked third nationally in assist percentage and 15th nationally in team offense, and in 2003, Dartmouth's face-off percentage was good enough to finish ninth in the country. Chemotti then worked as an assistant at St. John's for two seasons, 2004-2006, before moving to Loyola for the 2006-2007 academic year.

In addition to coaching, Chemotti played lacrosse professionally as a midfielder for the New Jersey Pride and Washington Bayhawks of Major League Lacrosse. He was a member of the Pride from 2003-2008 and the Bayhawks in 2009. Serving as a two-way midfielder for the Pride and Bayhawks, Chemotti has amassed 54 points and 143 ground balls in 69 career games. Chemotti also played one season (2003) in the National Lacrosse League (NLL) for the New Jersey Storm.

Chemotti, a native of Syracuse, N.Y., played high school lacrosse for West Genesee in Syracuse, where he was named an All-American and the Central New York Player of the Year in his senior campaign. He led the Wildcats to a Class A New York State Championship his senior season and to a runner-up finish his junior season.
