#### What's Ahead...

Richmond hosts Liberty for its One Love Game on Saturday. Founded in honor of UVA studentathlete Yeardley Love, whose life was cut short by an act of relationship violence, One Love is a national nonprofit that provides prevention education to young people about the importance of healthy relationships, empowering them to identify and avoid abuse. The Spiders are coming off a 21-11 loss to No. 17 Navy on Tuesday. Richmond opened the year with a 12-10 win over then-ranked No. 19 Penn State and a 15-8 win over Queens in its home opener. Liberty enters Saturday 1-2 after opening the season with losses against top-10 ranked teams. The Flames lost to Virginia (20-5) and North Carolina (23-1) but earned their first win over VCU (15-8).

#### Series History...

These two programs will meet for the 11th time in program history. The Spiders lead the all-time series 10-0, with the last meeting in 2024, when Richmond defeated Liberty 18-11. In the last meeting between these programs, Grace Muldoon and Alexis Morton led the team, netting four goals. Colleen Quinn collected four points on two goals and two assists, and Juliana Stanley also tallied four points on one goal and three assists.

#### **Last Time Out...**

The 2025 Richmond group, led by head coach Anne Harrington, is looking to regroup to get back into the win column after experiencing its first loss of the season on Tuesday. In a nationally ranked top-20 matchup, the University of Richmond's women's lacrosse team fell 21-11 to Navy at Robins Stadium. Senior Grace Muldoon led Richmond with four goals. Senior Colleen Quinn finished with four points on two goals and two assists. Junior Juliana Stanley netted two goals, and graduate student Whitney Liebler, junior Charlotte Edwards, and freshman Keating Hopkins each tallied a goal. Junior Alexis Morton finished with five points, recording five assists. In goal, sophomore Abby Francioli collected eight saves.

#### **Looking Back...**

Richmond is coming off back-to-back Atlantic 10 Championship titles, led by head coach Anne Harrington. Now in her fourth season, she finished the 2024 campaign at 13-6 and led the team to a trip to the NCAA Tournament for the second straight year. The Spiders started 2024 with four straight wins over Campbell, Old Dominion, William & Mary, and Liberty. During the 2024 season, Richmond experienced losses to ranked opponents: No. 17 Navy, No. 13/15 Virginia, and No. 11/12 James Madison. Although the Spiders ended the regular season with two losses to A-10 opponents, Richmond prevailed in the postseason. In the semifinals of the Atlantic 10 Championship, the Spiders defeated No. 3-seeded Davidson with a dominant win, 16-5. For the championship title, Richmond held on to defeat UMass, 14-13, at Duquesne's Rooney Field. With the win, the Spiders earned their seventh A-10 title.

#### **Chasing the Three-Peat...**

The Spiders enter this season ranked No. 1 in the Atlantic 10 Preseason Poll after receiving eight first-place votes and 118 points. Right behind them is UMass, tallying 112 points with three first-place votes in the Atlantic 10 Preseason Poll. In addition to being chosen as the preseason favorite, three Spiders were named to the preseason All-Conference team: senior Hannah Custer at defense, senior Colleen Quinn at attack, and senior Grace Muldoon at midfield. The last time Richmond won three straight conference titles was 2005, 2006, and 2007, when the Spiders were coached by Sue Murphy.

#### The Polls are in...

In week one of the Intercollegiate Women's Lacrosse Coaches Association poll, Richmond was voted No. 19 after beating Penn State in the season opener. In week two, the Spiders are ranked No. 20 in the IWLCA and USA Lacrosse Magazine poll.

#### Queen of the Midfield...

A key returner is senior midfielder Grace Muldoon. A true middie, Muldoon is dominant on all sides of the field. If Muldoon earns four more draw controls, she will have 100 career draw controls and is looking to climb the record books to enter the top 10 in the program records. Last season, she bolstered her resume with multiple accolades from her 2024 campaign. She enters this season as a USA Lacrosse Preseason All-America honoree and IL Women's Preseason Top Players at No. 49. Last season, Muldoon started all 19 games and finished the season with 59 points (37 goals, 22 assists), 34 ground balls, 20 caused turnovers, and 61 draw controls. Muldoon earned A-10 Midfielder of the Year, A-10 All-Conference Midfield First Team, A-10 Tournament Most Outstanding Player, A-10 All-Tournament Team, USA Lacrosse All-American Honorable Mention, and IWLCA South Region First Team honors.

#### **Defense Wins Championships...**

Richmond returns two powerhouse defenders: senior defender Hannah Custer and sophomore goalie Abby Francioli. A lockdown defender, Custer returns to Richmond's defensive unit. Last season, she started all 19 games and tallied 35 ground balls, 21 caused turnovers, and five draw controls. She also held the Atlantic 10 leader in goals per game, Kassidy Morris of UMass, to her only zero-point game of the season. Custer also returns this season as a second-year captain. Francioli returns in goal for the Spiders. The 2024 A-10 All-Rookie Team and A-10 All-Tournament Team member was a major contributor to the Spiders' success. Playing every game last season and moving into the starting lineup after the first conference game. Currently, Francioli is second in the A-10 in saves per game (9.00) and sixth in save percentage (.443).

#### Quinn in the Record Book...

A goal-scoring machine, senior Colleen Quinn is the only Spider on the team in the record books for career points. Currently, Quinn has 231 career points after a seven point game (four goals and three assists) in the season opener against Penn State, a five point game (three goals and two assists) in the home opener against Queens and tallying four points (two goals and two assists) against Navy. After the 2024 season, she finished ninth overall with 215 career points. Last season, she started all 19 games and was Richmond's scoring leader with 72 points (49 goals, 23 assists). In her sophomore year, she finished the season with 86 points (58 goals, 28 assists), and in her freshman year, Quinn finished with 57 points (33 goals, 24 assists). If Quinn tallies 85 more points, she will become the second Spider in program history to reach 300 career points. She capped the 2024 season by earning A-10 All-Conference Attack First Team, A-10 All-Tournament Team, and A-10 All-Academic Team honors. She also returns this season as a second-year captain.

#### New Faces...

Harrington added nine players to the class of 2028. On the defensive side, Reagan Quinn, Mira Kuttymartin, and goalie Maggie Mullen joined the backfield. In the midfield, the class includes Stella Axe, Chloe Conti, Nicole Kuhl and Keating Hopkins. Elizabeth Darcy and Anya Wardle join the offensive side. This class is talented athletically and academically, as six of these Spiders earned honors from USA Lacrosse Magazine. Axe was named an All-American, earned All-Academic Honors, and is a recipient of the Jackie Pitts Award. Conti and Wardle also earned All-American status, while Kuttymartin, Kuhl, and Mullen earned All-Academic Honors.

#### **Dipping into the Portal...**

Sophomore transfer CC Jacobs joins the midfield after playing in two games at Oregon. Against Rider, Jacobs made her collegiate debut and logged a caused turnover. Junior transfer Victoria Rankin, from San Diego State, also joins the midfield. With the Aztecs, Rankin appeared in seven games and collected 64 draw controls and scored two points (one goal and one assist).

#### Coach Glynn in the Women's Lacrosse League...

In December 2024, the Women's Lacrosse League announced its official roster for the inaugural 2025 Maybelline WLL Championship Series. Glynn was announced as one of the two goalies to play for the Boston Guard. The Championship Series, which took place Feb. 11-17 at the St. James in Springfield, Va., was played in the Olympic Sixes format. On Feb. 12, Glynn and the Guard lost to the Palms, 16-15, that night but earned its first win in team history against the Maryland Charm, 18-13, on Feb. 13. On Feb. 15, the Guard won 20-18 over the New York Charging to head to Championship Monday. On Monday, Glynn and the Guard won the first-ever WLL Championship title, beating the Charging 22-17.

# Anne Harrington

4th Season William & Mary, 2007

Anne Harrington was named head coach of Spider women's lacrosse in May 2022 after spending six years on the Spiders' staff, including the 2022 season as interim head coach. During her time at Richmond, the Spiders have recorded a 108-30 (.783 winning percentage) mark, which includes a 51-9 (.850) record in Atlantic 10 Conference play. She has been part of the program that has won four A-10 titles and made four NCAA Tournament appearances in 2018-2019 and 2023-2024. Last season, Harrington led the Spiders to their second consecutive NCAA Tournament after her squad earned the automatic bid by winning the Atlantic 10 championship title. She ended the 2024 campaign ranked as the No. 11 Division I women's lacrosse head coach in the country based on active win percentage.

In 2024, Harrington led the Spiders to a 13-6 finish after winning the program's second consecutive Atlantic 10 title and earning another automatic bid into the NCAA Tournament. The 2024 RVA Sports Awards Coach of the Year finalist claimed her fourth conference championship during her time at Richmond. Through her Spider years, Harrington has been part of more than half of the program's postseason successes, including conference championships and NCAA Tournament trips.

The 2024 postseason began with the Spiders as the No. 2 seed for the third consecutive year in the Atlantic 10 Championships. The Spiders fought through the conference tournament, defeating UMass once again in the championship game to claim the Atlantic 10 title for another year under Harrington's helm. Following the success in the conference tournament, Harrington led her squad to the first round of the NCAA Tournament, where the Spiders faced the No. 8 nationally ranked

program, Penn, in Philadelphia, Pa.

Many Spiders earned accolades during Harrington's 2024 season. Grace Muldoon claimed the Atlantic 10 Midfielder of the Year award, Atlantic 10 Most Outstanding Player award and USA Lacrosse All-American honors after strong performances in the conference tournament. Muldoon was listed on the All-Tournament team along with Charlotte Edwards, Colleen Quinn and Abby Francioli. The Atlantic 10 All-Conference First Team consisted of Grace Muldoon (midfield) and Colleen Quinn (attack). Maggie Jordan (midfield) and Hannah Custer (defense) were named to the Atlantic 10 All-Conference Second Team. Abby Francioli (goalkeeper) was named to the All-Conference Rookie Team after an impressive freshman campaign. Colleen Quinn and Becca Sturtz were recognized as Atlantic 10 All-Academic members.

Harrington led the Spiders to 17 victories in 2023, the most for the Spiders since 2019. Richmond finished the regular season ranked No. 14 in the Inside Lacrosse/IWLCA Division I poll. She led the Spiders to the No. 2 seed in the Atlantic 10 Conference Tournament, where the Spiders claimed the title for the third time in program history with Harrington on staff. Following her success in the conference postseason, Harrington marched her squad to Chapel Hill, N.C., where Richmond defeated Marquette in the program's first-ever NCAA Tournament victory.

Multiple Spiders earned accolades following the team's record-setting season. Lindsey Frank claimed the Atlantic 10 Most Outstanding Player award, All-Tournament Honors, First-Team All-Conference honors, USA Lacrosse Magazine All-American honors, IWLCA All-American honors and IWLCA All-Region honors. Another standout student-athlete in the 2023 season under Harrington was Arden Tierney. Tierney claimed Atlantic 10 Offensive Player of the Year honors, First-Team All-Conference honors, All-Academic honors, IWLCA All-Region honors, IWLCA All-American honors and CSC Academic All-District honors. Sophia DiCenso, the 2022 Midfielder of the Year, also flourished under Harrington's leadership as she claimed First-Team All-Conference honors, All-Tournament honors and All-Region Second-Team honors.

Harrington's Spiders shattered the record books in the 2023 season as they finished the year No. 1 in the nation for draw controls per game (18.71), No. 2 in scoring offense (16.52), No. 3 in points per game (24.00) and No. 3 in draw control percentage (.617). With 17 wins on the year, the 2023 group of Spiders matched the program's most wins in a season, achieved the most points in program history (504), scored the most goals in program history (347), achieved the most assists in program history (157), claimed the most draw controls in a single game (30). Along with these accomplishments, the group took home five Atlantic 10 Conference weekly awards.

The Spiders ended their year with positive numbers at home, on the road and at neutral sites. With a 6-2 record at Robins Stadium, this Richmond group highlighted their competition at home with a win over the No. 7/10 ranked Cavaliers of UVA in double overtime. On the road, Harrington led the Spiders to an 8-2 record, including significant conference wins against Davidson and Saint Joseph's. With a perfect 3-0 record on neutral fields, the Spiders won the Atlantic 10 Conference title on VCU's campus and earned their first NCAA Tournament victory in program history.

In 2019, the Spiders set a new program record with 17 wins while winning their second-straight Atlantic 10 Championship title with a 19-18 comeback in overtime over UMass. The team competed in its second-straight NCAA Tournament and fifth all-time, finishing the year at 17-4 overall. Five student-athletes earned first or second-team All-Conference honors, led by two-time Atlantic 10 Defensive Player of the Year Julie Ball, who became the first student-athlete in A-10 history to earn the honor more than once. The Spiders boasted one All-Rookie Team and three All-Academic Team honorees, while Ball also earned IWLCA Second-Team All-Region honors for the second-straight season.

In just her second season with the Spiders, the 2018 squad tied a program-best record of 16-4 overall, finished in a tie for first in the Atlantic 10 regular season, and won the 2018 A-10 Tournament title with a 12-11 overtime win over UMass. The squad advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2007, while eight student-athletes earned All-Conference honors, including A-10 Offensive Player of the Year Kim Egizi and A-10 Defensive Player of the Year Julie Ball. Egizi and Ball also earned IWLCA Second-Team All-Region honors for their efforts.

Harrington helped lead the 2017 squad to a 14-6 overall record and a runner-up finish at the Atlantic 10 Championship. Nine student-athletes earned All-Conference honors on the year, including A-10 Rookie of the Year Sam Geiersbach, and First-Team honorees Kim Egizi and goalie Megan Gianforte.

With Harrington's guidance, Gianforte became the first rookie to be named the conference's top goalie since 2006, compiling a .499 save percentage and a 9.48 goals-against average. Defender Leslie Espenschied was honored as a member of the A-10 Second Team.

A former student-athlete at William & Mary, Harrington played four seasons of lacrosse in the midfield for the Tribe before entering the coaching world.

A native of Alexandria, Virginia, Harrington joined the Spiders after spending two years as the Annual Giving Assistant at the University of Virginia for the Virginia Athletics Foundation.

Harrington began her coaching career in England, where she worked for two years as a high school teacher and head of lacrosse for the English Lacrosse Association.

Following her time abroad, she was the first assistant coach at Dickinson College in Pennsylvania for two seasons before taking the role of first assistant coach at the University of Connecticut for one season.

She graduated from William & Mary in 2007 with a degree in kinesiology before receiving her master's degree in education from UVA in 2014.
