What's On Tap...

No. 10 and top-seeded Richmond squares off with No. 2-seed High Point for the Atlantic 10 title and an automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament . . . Richmond makes its 11th-consecutive trip to a conference title game— an accomplishment that stands as the nation's longest active streak. . . The Spiders have made a conference championship game appearance every year of program existence excluding 2020 when one was not played due to the Covid-19 pandemic . . . Richmond is the only team to have ever made the NCAA Tournament in its first year of existence, and had to beat High Point to get there . . . The Spiders took down High Point, 8-7, in it's first-ever conference title game in 2014 (A-SUN) . . . Richmond's 2014 squad is the only in program history to have a losing record, but set the precedent for what to expect from the Spiders for years to come . . . With a win Saturday, Richmond will make its sixth trip to the NCAA Tournament.

Series History . . .

Richmond holds a 15-4 all-time record against High Point and has won the last seven consecutive meetings . . . This is the second time the Spiders and Panthers have met this season, with Richmond winning the first meeting, 11-6, on April 12 at Robins Stadium . . . Last year, the teams met in the Atlantic 10 championship semifinals, where Richmond came out on top, 11-10 . . . High Point is Richmond's most common opponent in its 12-season history.

The Spiders have notched victories over four nationally ranked opponents—No. 7 Virginia, No. 13 Georgetown, No. 19 UMass, and No. 17 Saint Joseph's—the most top-20 wins in a single season in program history . . . Spiders Advance to 11th Straight Conference Title Game with 14-4 Win Over UMass...

The No. 10 and top-seeded Spiders advanced to its nation-best 11th consecutive conference

championship game with a dominant 14–4 semifinal victory over No. 4 seed UMass on Thursday ... The Spiders came out firing, building a 7–0 first-quarter lead and taking a 10–2 advantage into halftime . . . Thirteen players recorded points and 12 scored goals in a balanced offensive performance . . . Richmond controlled nearly every facet of the game, going 18-for-19 on clears and winning the ground ball battle 29–22 . . . The Spiders dominated possession, winning 16-of-22 faceoffs behind the trio of Jared Chenoy (10-of-14), Anthony DiCenso (4-of-5), and Jack-

son Strickland (2-of-3)... Defensively, Richmond caused nine of UMass' 17 turnovers, with Hunter Smith and Mitchell Dunham forcing two each, while goalie Zach Vigue anchored the effort with 10 saves... The team also capitalized on extra-man opportunities, converting 3-of-6 with Leo Caine netting two man-up goals and Lukas Olsson adding another... Caine (2 goals, 1 assist), Max Merklinger (1 goal, 2 assists), Jack Ricciardi (1 goal, 2 assists), and Aidan O'Neil (1 goal, 2 assists) each tallied three points. Joe Sheridan, Olsson, and Gavin Creo (2 goals) each added two points, while Evan O'Neil, Lucas Slate, Daniel Picart, Henry Alpaugh, and Lucas Littlejohn all contributed a goal apiece. Jared Chenoy went 10-of-14 at the X and added an assist.

Spiders Crowned A-10 Regular Season Champions With 10-7 Win at #17 Saint Joseph's ...

Richmond completed an undefeated Atlantic 10 regular season last Friday, beating #17 Saint Joseph's 10-7 to secure the program's first outright A-10 regular season title . . . The win also marked Richmond's fourth over a ranked opponent this year—a single-season record . . . Lukas Olsson led the Spiders with a hat trick, while Joe Sheridan added two goals and an assist . . . Gavin Creo, Henry Alpaugh, Jack Ricciardi, Lucas Littlejohn, and Max Merklinger each scored once . . . Charlie Packard and Ricciardi added assists . . . Strong defense and dominant ground-ball play kept the Hawks in check . . . Richmond collected 41 ground balls to Saint Joseph's 18, led by Mitchell Dunham's seven and Jared Chenoy's six . . . Chenoy also went 11-for-12 on faceoffs.

#11/12 Spiders Blaze Past #18/19 UMass...

Richmond continued its conference run with a commanding 14-5 win over #18/19 UMass, securing at least a share of the Atlantic 10 regular season title and locking up the No. 1 seed for the A-10 Championship...The victory marks Richmond's third over a top-20 opponent this season — their most since 2017...The Spiders jumped out to a 3-0 lead in the first quarter, sparked by Joe Sheridan, who matched his career and season high with four goals...Richmond's defense stifled UMass, holding the Minutemen scoreless for nearly 20 minutes while rattling off six unanswered goals...UMass found brief momentum with two small scoring runs in the second half, but Richmond answered both with quick counterattacks to maintain control...Max Merklinger added a hat trick and an assist, while Lukas Olsson and Gavin Creo each scored twice. Additional goals came from Lucas Littlejohn (manup), Tommy Stull (man-down), and Lucas Slate...Goalie Zach Vigue made eight saves and now sits just three shy of the program's career saves record... Defensively, Jack Pilling led with three caused turnovers, and Richmond outshot UMass 41-22 while winning the ground ball battle, 29-22... Jared Chenoy returned to the lineup to win 5-of-6 faceoffs and collect five ground balls, helping the Spiders control possession throughout.

Dunham Earns Defensive Player of the Week Honors...

Dunham led Richmond's defense in an 11-6 win over High Point, anchoring the unit with six ground balls and five caused turnovers—matching his season high set earlier this year against Georgetown... He currently ranks fourth in the nation and first in the A-10 in caused turnovers per game (2.23) ... Thanks to Dunham's impact, the Spiders rank first nationally in clearing percentage (0.922), while also ranking third in the country and first in the conference in caused turnovers per game (11.46)... Richmond boasts the third-best scoring defense in the nation—and best in the A-10—allowing just 7.92 goals per game ... Dunham's 29 caused turnovers so far this season are tied for ninth all-time for the Spiders and his five caused turnovers from two separate occasions sit at eighth in the program's record book.

Spiders Down High Point On Senior Day To Remain Undefeated in Conference Action . . .

Richmond took sole possession of first place in the Atlantic 10 with an 11-6 win over High Point at Robins Stadium . . . The Spiders used a balanced offensive effort and a stifling defense to stay unbeaten in conference play and improve their all-time series lead over the Panthers to 15-4 . . . After a slow start, Richmond responded to an early High Point goal with a three-goal run and never looked back, leading 5-3 at halftime and extending the gap throughout the second half . . . Aidan O'Neil led the offense with two goals and two assists, while Gavin Creo, Lukas Olsson, and Lucas Littlejohn each scored twice . . . Despite winning just 7-of-21 faceoffs, Richmond controlled the game with its defensive intensity, forcing 13 of High Point's 20 turnovers and holding the Panthers to their second-lowest goal total of the season . . . Mitchell Dunham anchored the defense with six ground balls and five caused turnovers, while goalie Zach Vigue made seven saves . . . Richmond was nearly perfect on clears (22-of-23) and outshot High Point 43-25, sealing the Senior Day victory in dominant fashion.

<u>Littlejohn Secures Offensive Player of the Week Honors...</u>

Lucas Littlejohn was named this week's Under Armour Atlantic 10 Men's Lacrosse Offensive Player of the Week after his standout performance over the weekend... On Saturday, Littlejohn recorded his third consecutive game and fourth of the season with five or more points, scoring five goals and adding an assist in Richmond's 15-7 win over Hobart on the road... Littlejohn also led the Spiders in ground balls, picking up a career-high six while also adding a caused turnover.

Fast Start Boosts Spiders Past Hobart ...

Richmond came out fast and used a 5-0 run in the first quarter to pass Hobart on the road, 15-7 ... Goalie Zach Vigue earned the 36th victory of his career to become the winningest goalie in program history, surpassing Richmond's original standout goalie and All-American Benny Pugh (2014-17) ... Vigue tallied eight saves in the contest ... Now with 551 saves to his name, Vigue moves closer to the program record of 568, also held by Pugh .. . Aidan O'Neil (2 assists) and Lucas Littlejohn (1 assist) each tallied five goals to power the Richmond offense ... Littlejohn was lights out, scoring five times on six shots, while also scooping six ground balls to lead the team—a feat rare for an attackman ... Vigue, Anthony DiCenso and Tommy Stull each picked up four ground balls as well ... Richmond was prolific on ground balls, outgaining the Statesmen 37-23, holding a 23-7 advantage through the first half ... Leo Caine followed in scoring with two goals, and Joe Sheridan (assist), Gavin Creo (assist), and Henry Alpaugh netted a goal each ... Max Merklinger chipped in three assists, Jack Ricciardi had two, and Charlie Packard had one ... Richmond dominated possession from start to finish, thanks to DiCenso's going a career-best 11-of-20 at the faceoff dot ... Richmond was great through the midfield, going 18-of-19 on clears, while the Statesmen struggled to clear the ball, going just 12-of-1 ... The Statesmen turned the ball over 21 times to Richmond's 13, and the Spiders caused 12 of their turnovers, led by Mitchell Dunham, Jack Pilling, and Stull with two each.

Spiders Dominate St. Bonaventure in A-10 Opener . . .

Richmond dominated St. Bonaventure on both ends of the field, defeating the Bonnies 22-5 to open Atlantic 10 conference play . . . The Spiders controlled possession throughout the game, firing a program-record 68 shots in a 35-point performance . . . Richmond's scoring came from Ryan Spilman, Luke Meyer (2 goals), Evan Leonardo (1 assist), Xander Welty, Aidan O'Neil (2 goals), Joe Sheridan (3 goals, 1 assist), Henry Alpaugh, Leo Caine (1 assist), Jared Chenoy, Lukas Olsson, Lucas Littlejohn (3 goals, 3 assists), Porter Barnett, George Insley, and Max Merklinger (2 assists) . . . Daniel Picart and Aidan Wooley also contributed with assists . . . On defense, the Spiders stifled St. Bonaventure's offense, limiting the Bonnies to just 21 shots, with 13 on goal . . . Richmond was responsible for a program-record-tying 17 of their 25 turnovers . . . Close defensemen Hunter Smith and Mitchell Dunham, along with freshman short-stick defensive midfielder Matt Jacobsen, each caused three turnovers . . . The Spiders also dominated the ground ball battle 40-28, with Jacobsen, along with long-stick midfielders Tommy Stull and Brayden Penafeather-Stevenson, each collecting four.

Inside Lacrosse Names Pilling, Smith Midseason All-Americans . . .

Inside Lacrosse released its 2025 Nike Lacrosse Midseason Media All-Americans, naming University of Richmond short-stick defensive midfielder Jack Pilling and close defenseman Hunter Smith to the Second Team ... Pilling and Smith are key members of a Richmond defensive unit that has held opponents to just 7.60 goals per game this season ... As a result, the Spiders have four wins over ranked opponents for the first time in program history ... Thanks to Pilling and Smith, Richmond ranks second in the nation in clearing percentage (.912) and fourth in caused turnovers per game (11.20) ... Pilling has collected 22 ground balls, caused 16 turnovers, and scored one goal so far this season, while Smith has gathered 23 ground balls, caused 21 turnovers and added an assist.

#14 Spiders Secure Upset Victory At #13 Georgetown . . .

The No. 14 Spiders secured a 13-12 victory over No. 13 Georgetown, marking their first win over the Hoyas in program history and their first season with two wins over ranked opponents since 2022 . . . The Spiders were led by Aidan O'Neil (2 goals, 4 assists), Lucas Littlejohn (3 goals, 2 assists), Jack Ricciardi (3 goals), and Max Merklinger (2 goals), with Joe Sheridan, Gavin Creo, and Evan O'Neil each contributing a goal . . . Richmond pulled ahead with a strong second quarter, as O'Neil and Littlejohn connected for three of the Spiders' goals to lead by four at halftime . . . The Spiders maintained their lead throughout the second half to push Richmond's lead to as high as seven . . . However, Georgetown mounted a comeback in the fourth quarter, scoring the final four goals of the game and outshooting Richmond 10-4 . . . Despite the Hoyas' efforts, Richmond held on for the win, with Georgetown failing to capitalize on two last-minute shot attempts to tie the game . . . Richmond controlled the ground ball battle 41-31, and Mitchell Dunham led the defense with six ground balls and five caused turnovers.

Dunham Takes Home A-10 Defensive Player of the Week Honors ...

Graduate defenseman Mitchell Dunham was named the Under Armour Atlantic 10 Men's Lacrosse Defensive Player of the Week after his performance in the win over Georgetown...The Mount St. Mary's transfer and Hamilton, Ontario native led the Spiders defense in the 13-12 upset over No. 13 Georgetown to give Richmond its first season with two wins over ranked opponents since 2022... Dunham was a standout in the contest, recording a season-high six ground balls and five turnovers.

Spiders Fall Short in Double Overtime Thriller Against Duke . . .

The No. 14 Spiders used opportunistic and efficient scoring to battle No. 8 Duke to double overtime at Robins Stadium, but ultimately fell 13-12, with the deciding goal coming 15 seconds into the second overtime period ... Richmond's offense was led by Joe Sheridan and Lucas Littlejohn, each recording three goals and an assist, with all of Littlejohn's points coming in the last 11:43 of regulation . . . Lukas Olsson and Jared Chenoy each had two goals, Max Merklinger had a goal and an assist, Gavin Creo had a goal, and Aidan O'Neil and Henry Alpaugh both had assists . . . Duke jumped out to a 1-0 lead 82 seconds into the game before Richmond responded with one of its own just seven seconds later at 13:27 off the stick of Chenoy, who won the faceoff and scored his first of two goals in the game. Chenoy was prolific in the contest, winning 19-of-27 faceoffs and recorded another goal later in the fourth quarter . . . Duke added two more to make it 3-1 at 12:23, but the Spiders strung together a quick three-goal run between 6:58 and 5:25 to take a 4-3 lead—one of two leads they'd hold during the game . . . Duke tied the game again at 2:00 in the first, marking one of eight ties throughout the game . . . Both teams traded goals in the second quarter, with Duke scoring the first two before Richmond answered with two of its own . . . However, Duke then went on a four-goal run, extending its lead to 10-6 at 13:16 in the fourth . . . From there, Richmond put together another quick string of goals, scoring four between 11:33 and 7:22, including three in just 1:21 of game time ... Littlejohn capped the run with his first of three goals ... Duke scored again, but Littlejohn added two more back-to-back to give the Spiders a 12-11 lead with 2:52 left in regulation . . . However, Duke responded at 1:04 to send the game to overtime . . . Neither team scored in the first overtime, but Duke sealed the win 15 seconds into the second overtime period . . . Defensively, Zach Vigue made 10 saves, and six Spiders each recorded a caused turnover... Richmond won 19-of-27 faceoffs and was a perfect 14 of 14 on clears, compared to Duke's 16-of-22... Richmond also won the ground ball battle, outpacing the Blue Devils 30-25, and the Spiders took 10 more shots than their opponents (46 to Duke's 36) . . . However, the Blue Devils proved to be more opportunistic, with 23 of their shots on goal.

Chenoy Lands On Top Of The All-Times Lists ...

Faceoff specialist Jared Chenoy missed the first four games on 2025 due to injury and made his return against Cornell ... With his fifth faceoff win against Mercyhurst, Chenoy became Richmond's all-time leader in faceoffs won, surpassing the previous record of 541 ... He is also the first-ever faceoff specialist in Richmond history to win over 550 draws ... Chenoy, who missed the first four games of 2025 due to injury, made his return against Cornell, winning five faceoffs and recording an assist ... In the game against Mercyhurst, Chenoy won 8-of-11 faceoffs and collected a team-leading seven ground balls ... With his 10th ground ball against Duke, Chenoy broke the all-time program record for ground balls.

Merklinger Recognized As A-10 Offensive Player of the Week. . .

Senior attackman Max Merklinger was named Atlantic 10 Offensive Player of the Week... Merklinger took home the award after two standout performances in Richmond's pair of wins against Mercyhurst and UMBC... Against Mercyhurst, Merklinger tallied a career-high four points against the Lakers (3 goals, 1 assist), before following up that performance with a new career-high six points via five goals and an assist against the Retrievers.

Merklinger Sets Career High to Lead Spiders Past UMBC...

In their third game in just six days, the Spiders defeated UMBC 14-8... Max Merklinger led the way with a career-high six points (5 goals, 1 assist), while Lucas Littlejohn (3 goals, 1 assist) and Evan O'Neil (3 assists) followed... Aidan O'Neil, Joe Sheridan, Henry Alpaugh, and Leo Caine each contributed two points... Jack Pilling scored his first goal of the season, and Jared Chenoy added his first goal of the year as well after winning a faceoff... UMBC took an early lead, but Richmond responded with a 7-1 run, taking a 10-5 lead in the third quarter... UMBC cut the deficit to 10-7, but Richmond answered with four unanswered goals to secure the win... Richmond narrowly edged UMBC in faceoffs, 14-12, with Chenoy going 11-of-19... Tommy Stull led the team with six ground balls and two caused turnovers... Pilling and Connor Kelly also caused two turnovers each... In goal, Zach Vigue made five saves to secure the win.

Mercyhurst No Match For Spiders Tuesday Afternoon...

Richmond dominated Mercyhurst, 23-3, on Tuesday, marking the largest margin of victory in program history . . . Richmond's 35 total points (23 goals, 12 assists) tied for the sixth-most in a single game, with 18 players recording points . . . Freshman Porter Barnett led with five points (3G, 2A), while Leo Caine scored four goals, and Max Merklinger added three goals and an assist . . . Other scorers included Aidan O'Neil, Lucas Littlejohn, Joe Sheridan (2), Daniel Picart, Lukas Olsson, Ryan Spilman, Gavin Creo (2), Lucas Slate (A), Evan O'Neil, Brayden Penafeather-Stevenson, and Jack Dougherty (A) . . . Richmond fired 56 shots, the sixth-most in program history, and dominated faceoffs, winning 25-of-30 . . . Defensively, Zach Vigue started in goal with two saves, while Brody Murphy and Carson Quinn each saw time s well . . . The Spiders scooped 45 ground balls for the sixth-most in a game, with Chenoy and Anthony DiCenso each collecting seven . . . Richmond also caused 12 turnovers, led by Mitchell Dunham with three.

Vigue Added To Tewaaraton Award Watch List . . .

Zach Vigue has been added to the prestigious Tewaaraton Award Watch List . . . Vigue currently ranks fourth among NCAA Division I active leaders in minutes played with 3,174, eighth in saves with 583, and eighth in goals against average at 9.53 . . . His goalkeeping has been a key factor in Richmond's ranking of third in the nation in scoring defense, allowing just 7.86 goals per game . . . Additionally, the Spiders rank second in clearing percentage (.912) . . . The Apex, N.C. native is in the top five in every goalie category in program history, including saves (583, 1st), saves per game (9.88, 3rd), save percentage (.536, 5th), goals against average (9.52, 2nd), and wins (40, 1st).

Early Lead Not Enough As Big Red Eke Past Spiders, 12-11 ...

The Spiders jumped to a 6-1 lead in the first quarter against No. 3 Cornell, but the Big Red responded down the stretch, took their first lead of the game with 2:21 left to play, and ultimately handed Richmond its second loss of the season, 12-11, Sunday in front of a packed Robins Stadium crowd . . . The Spiders opened the game with a 6-1 lead in the first quarter, thanks to goals from six different scorers . . . Up 6-1, Richmond's offensive burst gave way to a quick need for more defense as the Big Red answered with three unanswered goals in the first four minutes of the second quarte . . . Richmond responded with a goal, but Cornell quickly added two more to make it a one-goal game at 7-6 with under five minutes left in the half . . . The Spiders then tallied another goal with 3:59 left in the half, pushing them to an 8-6 lead . . . However, the Big Red cut their deficit to one with a goal in the final five seconds of the half . . . Cornell scored the first goal of the second half, but the Spiders answered with two goals in the third quarter to take a two-goal lead with 15 minutes left to play . . . A Spider goal at 10:48 in the fourth put Richmond up 11-8, but Cornell responded with three unanswered goals between 8:49 and 5:35 of the fourth quarter, before delivering the game-winner at 2:21 to extend the Big Red's early-season win streak to 4-0 . . . Despite struggles at the faceoff dot (Richmond went 8-of-27), the Spiders' defense held strong, anchored by goalie Zach Vigue, who made 13 saves. With his second save of the game, Vigue reached 500 career saves, becoming just the second Spiders goalie to surpass that milestone . . . Richmond's middle-of-the-field defense continued to dominate, forcing the Big Red (17-of-21) into four turnovers on clears, while Richmond was perfect at 23-of-23 . . . The Spiders caused 12 of Cornell's 19 turnovers, led by Hunter Smith, Michael Farrell, and Brayden Penafeather-Stevenson, who each had two . . . Smith, tasked with guarding the nation's leader in goals per game and p

With three points in the game against Lehigh, junior attackman Aidan O'Neil surpassed 100 career points . . . The Centerville, Mass. native has now logged 81 goals and 50 assists through the first 46 games of his career . . . O'Neil's 134 career points put him at fifth on Richmond's all-time list . . . O'Neil became the fourth-fastest Spider in program history to reach the milestone, having done so in just 36 games . . . O'Neil has recorded at least a point in 44-of-47 games played so far in his career.

O'Neil recorded three points in the last 19 minutes, including two assists to Lucas Littlejohn, who also posted a three-point performance . . . Lukas Olsson added three points, while Max Merklinger and Daniel Picart contributed two each . . . The Spiders battled back after two separate 3-0 Lehigh runs, with Olsson goals breaking up both . . . Richmond pulled ahead late, and despite a late Lehigh goal with 35 seconds left, followed by a faceoff win and shot as time expired, the Spiders held on for the win . . . Lehigh won the faceoff battle, 15-20, and led in ground balls, 34-30, but the Mountain Hawks committed 17 turnovers, while Richmond had 11 . . . The Spiders caused seven Lehigh turnovers, with Connor Kelly leading the way with three caused turnovers and four ground balls, both career highs . . . Littlejohn, Vigue Earn Under Armour Atlantic 10 Men's Lacrosse Players of the Week . . .

Two University of Richmond men's lacrosse standouts were named Under Armour Atlantic 10 Men's Lacrosse Players of the Week, with graduate goalie Zach Vigue earning Defensive Player of the Week honors and sophomore attackman Lucas Littlejohn being recognized as Offensive Player of the Week following the Virginia game . . . Littlejohn set career highs with four goals, two assists, two caused turnovers, and two ground balls in Richmond's 13-10 win over #7 Virginia . . . Vigue recorded 14 saves, led the Spiders with a career-high seven ground balls, tallied a career-high two caused turnovers, and also registered the first point of his career with an assist in the victory.

All Phases Impress As Richmond Earns Road Upset Victory Over #7 Virginia . . .

From the opening whistle to the final horn, the Spiders dominated in the matchup against No. 7 Virginia, securing a 13-10 road upset under soaking conditions . . . The win marked just the second time in the program's 12-season history that Richmond defeated the

Cavaliers, and it was the first victory over a ranked opponent since 2022—the same year the Spiders achieved their first-ever win over Virginia . . . Richmond (2-1) came out strong, jumping to a 4-0 lead by 10:38 in the first quarter and maintaining momentum throughout the game . . . Eleven different Spiders recorded points in the team's first road win over the perennial powerhouse . . . Lucas Littlejohn had the game of his career as he led the Spiders with a career-high four goals, two assists, two ground balls and two caused turnovers . . . Gavin Creo and Max Merklinger each added two goals and an assist, Lukas Olsson added two goals, and Aidan O'Neil (assist), Joe Sheridan and Henry Alpaugh all scored . . . Daniel Picart, as well as

long-stick midfielders Brayden Penafeather-Stevenson and Tommy Stull, along with goalie Zach Vigue, were each credited with assists . . . Richmond's early 4-0 run was briefly interrupted by a goal from Virginia at 8:31 in the first quarter, but Richmond quickly responded to take a 6-2 lead into the second quarter . . . After a goal from Virginia in the second, the Spiders led 6-3 at halftime . . . The third quarter saw both teams trade goals, with Virginia pulling within two at 8-6 . . . Vigue made nine saves on 17 shots faced for a .889 save percentage in 53:44 of play in Richmond's first win of the season . . . He didn't allow a goal until 6:21 in the third quarter and conceded just one of the two goals scored against Richmond . . . The two goals allowed matched the program's lowest goal total, previously set against St. John's in 2024 . . . Vigue also led the Spiders in ground balls, recording five . . . This marks the second week in a row the Spiders have earned Defensive Player of the Week honors, with close defenseman Hunter Smith taking home the award last week.

Spiders Rain Down on Robert Morris For First Win of the Season . . .

Richmond dominated Robert Morris in rainy conditions during their 2025 home opener at Robins Stadium last Saturday, securing a commanding 17-2 victory . . . This marked Richmond's first win of the season, while the Spiders defense stifled Robert Morris (0-1), holding them to just two goals—a feat matching the program's lowest goal total allowed, set against St. John's in 2024 . . . Offensively, Richmond was led by a trio of players: Joe Sheridan,

Aidan O'Neil, and Henry Alpaugh, each recording four points. Sheridan (4 goals) and Alpaugh (3 goals, 1 assist) picked up their first points of the season, while O'Neil followed up his four-point performance from the Maryland game, contributing three goals and an assist . . . With his four-point performance, O'Neil now has 96 career points, tying for 10th place in the program's all-time record book . . . Other Spider goals came from Lucas Littlejohn, Evan O'Neil (assist), Daniel Picart, Jack Ricciardi (assist), Max Merklinger (2 assists), Leo Caine, and Lukas Olsson (assist). Gavin Creo and Lucas Slate also registered assists, contributing to Richmond's largest margin of victory since their 18-2 win over St. John's last season . . . In goal, starter Zach Vigue made nine saves before freshman Brody Murphy entered for the final 6:16 of play, recording three stops in his collegiate debut . . . Both goalies allowed one goal each . . . Several freshmen made their Spider debuts, including Porter Barnett, George Insley, Matt Jacobsen, Evan Leonardo, Harrison Voelzke, Kaleb Griffith, William Schneider, and Jacob Fusco, along with junior Stony Brook transfer Jack Dougherty . . . Brayden Penafeather-Stevenson tallied four caused turnovers, while Mitchell Dunham contributed three ground balls and three caused turnovers . . . Short-stick defensive midfielder Jack Pilling also made his presence felt, recording two ground balls and three caused turnovers . . . Anthony DiCenso (5-of-12) and Jackson Strickland (4-of-11) split face off duties throughout the game.

O'Neil, Smith Take Home Week One Under Armour Atlantic 10 Men's Lacrosse Player of the Week Honors . . .

Two Spiders were named week one Under Armour Atlantic 10 Men's Lacrosse Players of the Week ... Aidan O'Neil was named Offensive Player of the Week after scoring four goals in the season-opening loss to 2024 national runner-up and fifth-ranked Maryland, while Hunter Smith earned Defensive Player of the Week honors after collecting two ground balls and causing a turnover ... O'Neil led the Spiders offense, which outpaced the Terrapins 7-5 after halftime ... His four goals were the most he's scored in a game since netting five against St. Bonaventure on March 30, 2024 ... This marked the 18th time O'Neil has recorded a multi-point performance in his career ... On the other side of the field, Smith was assigned to guard Maryland's dodging attackman, who was held scoreless under his coverage.

Early Run Helps No. 5 Maryland Pass Spiders In Season Opener . . .

Maryland built an early 7-0 lead in the first half, capitalizing on seven of eight shots on goal landing . . . Richmond struggled to get on the board, with Aidan O'Neil scoring Richmond's first goal of the season at 13:57 in the third quarter . . . Despite a strong finish from Richmond, who outscored Maryland 5-1 in the fourth, the Terrapins maintained a commanding lead through much of the game . . . O'Neil recorded a hat trick and added a fourth goal late, while freshman Daniel Picart also scored in his collegiate debut . . . Maryland won the ground ball battle (26-19) and faceoffs (13-21), while Richmond was flawless in clears, going 16-for-16 . . . Several Spiders made their debuts, including Picart, Mount St. Mary's transfer Mitchell Dunham, Bucknell transfer Ethan Gyllenhaal, and freshmen Evan O'Neil and Luke Spitzer.

<u>Iron Sharpens Iron . . .</u>

As they say, "to be the best, you've got to play the best," and the Spiders have never taken the easy way out when it comes to scheduling, having played at least three ranked opponents each season, excluding 2016 when they played two ... Richmond is 9-33 all-time in program history against top 20 opponents ... Richmond's nine wins over ranked opponents have

come in 2022 (2 times) 2019 (2 times), 2018, 2017 (3 times) and 2016 ... The highest-ranked opponent Richmond has ever beaten came in 2022 when it knocked off No. 2 Virginia at Robins Stadium . . . The highest-ranked opponent the Spiders have defeated on the road has been No. 7 twice - North Carolina in 2017 and Duke in 2016 . . . Richmond will face seven opponents ranked or receiving votes in the preseason polls in 2025 in Maryalnd, Virginia, Lehigh, Cornell, UMBC, Duke, Georgetown and Saint Joseph's.

Spiders Three-Peat as Atlantic 10 Men's Lacrosse Preseason Favorites . . .

For the third consecutive year, the University of Richmond men's lacrosse team was picked to finish first in the Atlantic 10 Preseason Poll . . . Selected by the conference's six head coaches, the Spiders were ranked ahead of Saint Joseph's, High Point, Hobart (T-4), UMass (T-4), and St. Bonaventure . . . Richmond received three of the six first-place votes, while Saint Joseph's earned two and Hobart received one . . . In addition to being the preseason favorites, the Spiders had five players named to the Preseason All-Conference team: attackman Aidan O'Neil, short-stick defensive midfielder Jack Pilling, defenseman Hunter Smith, long-stick midfielder Tommy Stull, and goalie Zach Vigue.

<u>Pilling Earns Preseason All-America Honors From Inside Lacrosse...</u>

Short-stick defensive midfielder Jack Pilling has been named a Third Team Nike Lacrosse Preseason Men's DI Media All-American, as announced by Inside Lacrosse... Pilling, a junior, is one of just two Atlantic 10 men's lacrosse players to earn IL Preseason All-America honors, with Saint Joseph's defenseman Levi Verch receiving honorable mention recognition... Last season, Pilling played all 16 games and earned Inside Lacrosse All-American Honorable Mention honors... He scored two goals and recorded one assist while picking up 31 ground balls and causing 12 turnovers... In a win over High Point on April 13, Pilling recorded a career-high five caused turnovers, tying for eighth place on the program's single-game record list. Following that performance, he was named both Axia/Inside Lacrosse Player of the Week and Atlantic 10 Defensive Player of the Week... He was also ranked No. 14 on Inside Lacrosse's Top-20 Most Under-Appreciated Players list for 2025.

<u>Vigue Named USA Lacrosse Preseason All-America Honorable Mention...</u>

Zach Vigue has been named a USA Lacrosse Preseason All-America Honorable Mention . . . Last season, the Apex, N.C. na-tive was named Atlantic 10 Co-Goalkeeper of the Year and earned Inside Lacrosse All-American Honorable Mention honors . . . He started 15 games, recording 159 saves on 507 shots faced, with a career-high .556 save percentage . . . Vigue ranked third in the nation in goals against average (9.26) and played a key role in Richmond's defense, which was the third-best in the country, allowing just 9.38 goals per game . . . He finished 12th nationally and first in the A-10 in save percent-age, while also picking up 31 ground balls and causing three turnovers . . . Additionally, he was named an Inside Lacrosse Midseason All-American Honorable Mention and earned Atlantic 10 Defensive Player of the Week honors three times in 2024.

2024 At A Glance . . .

In 2024 the Spiders reached their tenth consecutive conference championship game . . . A Dalton Young, Lance Madonna, Zach Vigue, and Jack Pilling all earned All-American Honorable Mention honors . . . Young and Madonna were recognized as the Atlantic 10 Offensive Player and Midfielder of the Year, respectively, with Vigue earning the title of Co-Goalkeeper of the Year . . . Additionally, Jake Kapp (First Team), Hunter Smith (First Team), Jack Fabean (Second Team), Gavin Creo (Rookie Team), and Charlie Packard (Rookie Team) received All-Atlantic 10 honors . . . Richmond had one of its most potent offen-sive seasons ever in 2024, setting new program records with 671 shots and 218 goals . . . Their 415 shots on goal (2nd), .325 shooting percentage (2nd), and 123 assists (3rd) also ranked among the best in program history . . . The Spiders' offense ranked 12th in the nation and first in the Atlantic 10, averaging 13.63 goals per game . . . Their .325 shooting per-centage was 9th in the nation, while their 21.31 points per game placed them 14th nationally . . . Richmond also boasted the fifth-best scoring margin in the country, outscoring opponents by an average of 4.25 goals per game . . . Defensively, Richmond was among the nation's top teams . . . Goalie Zach Vigue set a career-high with a .556 save percentage, ranking 12th in the country and first in the A-10 . . . HEAD COACH

12th Season Duke, 2002

2024 marked Dan Chemotti's 11th season as the men's lacrosse head coach at the University of Richmond. Chemotti is the program's first-ever head coach and has guided the Spiders to unprecedented success.

The two-time Southern Conference Coach of the Year, Chemotti has guided the Spiders to five NCAA Tournament appearances (2023, 2022, 2019, 2018, 2014), in the first 10 years of program existence, including back-to-back seasons as Southern Conference Tournament champions (2019, 2018) and the inaugural Atlantic 10 Men's Lacrosse champions. Richmond has won four regular season league titles in its first ten years (no title awarded in 2020) and has been in the conference tournament championship game every season of program existence (2020 season impacted by COVID-19). Under Chemotti, the Spiders boast 11 All-Americans.

Chemotti has led Richmond to a 104-62 (.626) record as head coach, including eight years of 10 or more wins and the Spiders have won over 80 percent (49-12) of their conference games in program history. Chemotti and the Spiders earned the program's 100th victory on March 30, 2024 with a dominating 19-8 conference win at St. Bonaventure. The Spiders ranked ninth overall in both average and cumulative attendance at home games in 2024 — a testament to the on-field product Chemotti has created.

Chemotti's 2024 Spiders reached the conference championship game for the tenth-consecutive season as Dalton Young, Lance Madonna, Zach Vigue and Jack Pilling were all named All-American Honorable Mentions. Young and Madonna earned back-to-back Atlantic 10 Offensive Player and Midfielder of the Year, respectively, and goalie Zach Vigue was named the Atlantic 10 Co-Goalkeeper of the Year. Jake Kapp (First Team), Hunter Smith (First Team), Jack Fabean (Second Team), Gavin Creo (Rookie Team) and Charlie Packard (Rookie Team) all took home All-Atlantic 10 honors. Chemotti lead Richmond to one of its highest offensive output seasons in program history in 2024. The Spiders 671 shots and 218 goals in 2024 are the most-ever by a Richmond team, and its 415 (2nd) shots on goal, 325 (2nd) shot percentage and 123 (3rd) assists rank among the best ever by a Richmond offense. Richmond held the nation's fifth-best scoring margin, outscoring opponents by an average of 4.25 goals per game while the Spiders scoring offense ranked 12th in the nation and first in the Atlantic 10 at 13.63. Richmond's .325 shot percentage ranked ninth in the nation, while its 21.31 points per game ranked 14th. The Spiders defense also continued to present itself as one of the nation's best in 2024. Vigue posted a career-high .556 save percentage and was third in the country in goals against average at 9.26 en route to helping Richmond be third in scoring defense, holding opponents to just 9.38 goals per game. Vigue finished the season ranked 12th in the nation and first in the A-10 with a .556 save percentage. Richmond's man-down defense was also one of the best in the country in 2024, ranking eighth at 0.745. Richmond's only losses in 2024 came to teams ranked within the nation's top 15. Under Chemotti, Dalton Young was named the Atlantic 10's only Tewaaraton finalist and he and Kapp were claimed by a pair of Premiere Lacrosse League clubs with Young going to the Denver Outlaws and Kapp to the New York Atlas.

In 2023, Chemotti guided the Spiders to its fifth NCAA Tournament appearance and the first-ever Atlantic 10 title after taking down rival High Point, 15-8, in the title game at Robins Stadium. The win marked the third conference Chemotti has led Richmond to titles in (Atlantic Sun, Southern, Atlantic 10). Richmond went a perfect 9-0 at home for just the second time in program history and nine Spiders were named to All-Atlantic 10 teams including the Offensive (Dalton Young), Midfield (Lance Madonna) and Rookie (Aidan O'Neil) Players of the Year as well as four All-Rookie selections. Dalton Young and Lance Madonna were also named All-American Honorable Mentions by USA Lacrosse Magazine.

2022 saw Richmond win it's third SoCon title and name nine players to the All-Conference teams including three First Team selections. The Spiders finished the year ranked in the top 10 nationally in six categories and earned the program's first-ever win over in-state foe, No. 2 Virginia. The 17-13 win came as the highest-ranked victory in program history, surpassing a win over No. 6 Notre Dame in 2019.

Chemotti led Richmond to a share of the Southern Conference regular season title and the number one seed in the SoCon Tournament in 2021. The Spiders swept the postseason SoCon awards with Ryan Lanchbury (Offensive Player of the Year), Sean Menges (Defensve Player of the Year), Dalton Young (Freshman of the Year) and his own SoCon Coach of the Year award. The Spiders placed a SoCon record 11 players on the two All-Conference teams, including six named First Team All-Conference and five earning Second Team All-Conference accolades.

In the shortened 2020 season, the Spiders finished the year ranked No. 18 in the country with a 4-3 record. The Spiders' three losses all game to nationally ranked opponents in No. 4 Maryland, No. 6 Notre Dame and No. 13 Duke.

In 2019, the Spiders booked their third NCAA Tournament appearance in program history and second-straight by winning the SoCon Championship with a 15-7 victory over No. 11 High Point on the road. The Spiders dominated the Panthers in the championship game and goalkeeper Jack Rusbuldt was named the Most Outstanding Player after allowing 13 goals in the two SoCon games.

Richmond advanced to the NCAA Tournament with the automatic bid and played at No. 4 Duke in the first round. The Spiders gave the Blue Devils all It wanted, out-scoring Duke 4-0 in the fourth quarter before running out of time and falling by a 12-11 margin. Richmond finished the season ranked No. 18 in the country in the final polls.

Sophomores Ryan Lanchbury and Mitch Savoca earned All-America honors last season, becoming the third and fourth All-Americans in program history. Lanchbury set the Richmond single-season scoring record with 72 points and 52 goals. His 52 goals also set the SoCon single-season goal scoring record. He is currently sixth in the nation in goals and 14th in the country in points.

The Spiders placed five members on the First Team All-SoCon squad in 2019. Ryan Lanchbury, Teddy Hatfield, Mitch Savoca, Jason Reynolds and Sean Menges picked up the honors. The Spiders' five First Team All-SoCon selections ties the school record set in 2017, which is also the most in SoCon history, happening for the fourth time in the league's five-year history of men's lacrosse. Additionally, Richmond added to its SoCon-record of 21 First Team All-Conference selections in program history, nine more than the second place team in league history (Air Force, 12 selections).

In 2018, the Spiders won the SoCon regular season championship with an 11-6 overall record and a 6-1 mark in league play. Richmond was a perfect 9-0 at home at Robins Stadium last season, including winning the 2018 SoCon Tournament championship. The Spiders won the tournament title in impressive fashion as Teddy Hatfield scored the game-winning, overtime goal to defeat Jacksonville and send Richmond to its second NCAA Tournament in program history.

The Spiders had their name called in the NCAA Selection Show and made it out of the play-in game for the first time in program history. Richmond went on the road and battled No. 2 Albany in the first round.

The Spiders had six members named to the All-Conference team last year. Joining the First Team, is senior LSM Austin Cates, redshirt-senior attacker Mitch Goldberg, junior attacker Teddy Hatfield and freshman defenseman Jason Reynolds. Freshman midfielder Mitch Savoca is lone Spider representative on the Second Team but in addition, joins fellow newcomer Ryan Lanchbury on the All-Freshman Team.

2017 was a historic season for the Spiders, posting a program record 12 victories and reaching as high as No. 11 in the national polls. For the second straight year, Richmond knocked off a national power, taking down defending national champion UNC, 6-5, in Chapel Hill. In addition, two Spiders earned First Team All-American honors for the first time when Brendan Hynes and Benny Pugh were recognized. Pugh and Hynes also became the first Spiders to ever be drafted into the professional ranks, both being drafted in the Major League Lacrosse draft.

The Spiders saw success again in 2016, their second season in the Southern Conference, posting an 11-5 overall record and a 6-1 mark in conference play. After jumping out to a 4-1 start, the Spiders logged the biggest win in program history, taking down No. 9 Duke on the road, 12-10. The win and another victory over Jacksonville would give the 6-1 Spiders the best start in program history, propelling the team to a No. 18 ranking, the highest in program history.

Shortly after, Mitch Goldberg was named to the prestigious Tewaaraton Award Watch List. The team finished third nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 7.44 goals per game, and first in caused turnovers and clearing percentage for the second year in a row. Junior Brendan Hynes ranked second in the nation in caused turnovers, while junior Ryan Dennis ranked ninth nationally in the same category. Seven Spiders earned postseason honors, led by Hynes and senior Alex Hatem, who were named to the SoCon First Team.

In 2015, the Spiders finished 6-0 in the new league and boasted the nation's second-most stingy defense. The Spiders allowed just 7.44 goals per game, within less than half a goal per game from the nation's leader. Richmond also lead the country in clearing percentage and finished fourth in the country in scoring margin, winning on average by more than four goals per game.

The Spiders boasted the league's Defensive Player of the Year in Brendan Hynes, while goalie Benny Pugh was second nationally in both save percentage (.590) and goal-against average (7.42) for the year. On the offensive side, the second-year program scored 20-or-more goals three times, finished 15th nationally in scoring offense (11.75) and 11th in assists per game (7.25). Richmond earned its first national ranking for the season, appearing at No. 20 in a national poll. UR was among teams receiving votes for the majority of, and in the final poll of, the season. Richmond got above .500 after just two seasons, sitting at 17-16 overall in just two years as a varsity program.

Chemotti did what no other coach in the history of Division I lacrosse was able to accomplish; he took a first-year program to the NCAA Tournament in 2014. He followed that by taking the Spiders to an undefeated league season in the newly-formed Southern Conference in 2015.

After helping lead the Loyola University Maryland men's lacrosse team as offensive coordinator to the 2012 Division I National Championship in 2012, Chemotti was named head coach of the Richmond men's lacrosse team in October of 2012. He spent that school year recruiting and putting in place the tenets of the program which began play in the 2014 season, and it led to the young squad earning an Atlantic Sun Conference championship and berth into the newly-expanded NCAA Tournament

The Spiders jumped into their inaugural season by hosting No. 7 Virginia on February 8, 2014. Over 4,000 fans packed into Robins Stadium to see the beginning of a magical season. The Spiders did not come away with a win that day, but battled the Cavaliers to a 13-12 loss, which set the tone for things to come.

Despite losing the first five games of the season, the Spiders kept things positive, and finally broke through for a win against Vermont in Durham, North Carolina on March 8. That was the start of a run of four wins in eight games, including a pair of Atlantic Sun Conference games that propelled the young squad into the four-team Atlantic Sun Championship Tournament.

The Spiders beat both the top seed and host Mercer and second-seeded High Point, avenging two regular-season losses and stringing together back-to-back wins for the first time in team history, and the one time that it mattered, as they earned the league's automatic bid to the NCAA. That feat drew a trip to Colorado Springs and a road game at Air Force in the NCAA Tournament.

During his five seasons with the Greyhounds, Chemotti was a part of four NCAA Tournament berths and at least a share of three ECAC conference titles at Loyola. Chemotti also saw 30 players earn all-conference honors and 12 be named All-Americans during his time there.

Chemotti's powerful offense helped lead the Greyhounds to and 18-1 mark and their first-ever national championship in 2012. The Loyola offense ranked eighth in goals per game (12.05), ninth in EMO at .444% and fifth in turnovers per game at 12.84. A versatile and diverse offense, the Greyhounds saw eight players rack up 10 or more goals, three tally more than 20 and three reach the 50-goal barrier in 2012.

The offense of which Chemotti was the architect afforded Loyola players the ability to shoot quickly, whether in transition or settled offense, and garner a high volume of shots. Despite the high number of shots, Loyola's shot percentage did not drop. In fact, the Greyhounds' shot percentage rose from .249 in 2011 to .299 during the team's 18-1 run to the NCAA Championship.

Two members of Chemotti's offense, Sawyer and midfielder Davis Butts, earned All-ECAC First Team honors in 2012, and Lusby was named to the Second Team. Sawyer was a USILA Second Team All-American, and Lusby and Butts earned All-America Honorable Mention.

In 2010, a pair of Loyola attackers, Collin Finnerty and Cooper MacDonnell, were named to the All-ECAC First Team, and MacDonnell picked up ECAC Offensive Player of the Year honors and was named All-America Honorable Mention. In addition to those honors, Finnerty, MacDonnell and Matt Langan split ECAC Offensive Player of the Week honors five times, and freshman attacker Patrick Fanshaw earned ECAC Rookie of the Week laurels once.

During the 2009 season, Chemotti's attack produced three players with 30 or more total points - Shane Koppens (41), Cooper MacDonnell (38) and Collin Finnerty (37) - a mark not accomplished by a Loyola trio since 2003.

ing percentage, in the league.

The Greyhounds led the ECAC in goals per game (10.43), a category they finished 17th in all of NCAA Division I during 2009. Koppens led the conference in points per game (3.42) and finished his Loyola career 12th in the nation in the category.

In 2008, the Greyhounds captured the ECAC title behind an explosive offense that ranked second in goals per game and points per game (13.43), and first in shoot-

Under Chemotti's direction in 2008, Koppens was named ECAC Offensive Player of the Year after finishing as the league's top scorer. In Chemotti's three years calling the offense, nine offensive players have been awarded with post season All-ECAC honors (four first-team and five second-team).

In 2007 the Loyola offense ranked 17th nationally in team offense and finished the season with a .640 assist percentage.

A 2002 graduate of Duke University, Chemotti led the Blue Devils to back-to-back ACC Championships during his junior and senior seasons. During his career in Durham, N.C., the Blue Devils reached the NCAA Tournament all four years, advancing to the NCAA Quarterfinals three times. He was selected a team captain his senior year, and was awarded the school's Roy Skinner Award for Dedication and Sacrifice.

Following graduation, Chemotti worked as an assistant coach at Dartmouth College from 2002-2004, working primarily with the offense and the face-off men. In 2004, the Big Green's offense ranked third nationally in assist percentage and 15th nationally in team offense, and in 2003, Dartmouth's face-off percentage was good enough to finish ninth in the country. Chemotti then worked as an assistant at St. John's for two seasons, 2004-2006, before moving to Loyola for the 2006-2007 academic year.

In addition to coaching, Chemotti played lacrosse professionally as a midfielder for the New Jersey Pride and Washington Bayhawks of Major League Lacrosse. He was a member of the Pride from 2003-2008 and the Bayhawks in 2009. Serving as a two-way midfielder for the Pride and Bayhawks, Chemotti has amassed 54 points and 143 ground balls in 69 career games. Chemotti also played one season (2003) in the National Lacrosse League (NLL) for the New Jersey Storm.

Chemotti, a native of Syracuse, N.Y., played high school lacrosse for West Genesee in Syracuse, where he was named an All-American and the Central New York Player of the Year in his senior campaign. He led the Wildcats to a Class A New York State Championship his senior season and to a runner-up finish his junior season.
