What's Ahead...

Richmond will play its final regular-season game against the Duquesne Dukes on Saturday. The Spiders lead the all-time series, 21-6. If Richmond defeats Duquesne, the Spiders will capture the program's first outright regular-season championship since the program's inception in 1983.

Previous Meeting Against Duquesne...

Richmond defeated Duquesne 21-6 at Robins Stadium last April.

Leading the Spiders, Alexis Morton collected seven points and set a career high in assists with one goal and six assists. Colleen Quinn led the team in goals, netting five. Juliana Stanley scored four goals, and Grace Muldoon tallied four points on two goals and two assists. Charlotte Edwards added two goals, while Whitney Liebler and Megan Rice each recorded two points on one goal and one assist. Keating Hopkins and Elizabeth Darcy each scored a goal.

The Spiders led the Dukes in multiple categories. Richmond outshot Duquesne 35-15, held a 23-9 advantage in ground balls and led 20-10 in the draw circle.

Richmond established a dominant start, scoring 13 straight goals to take a 13-0 lead with 8:27 remaining in the second quarter. The Dukes scored their first goal at 7:05 in the frame, but Richmond responded with a goal to take a 14-1 lead into halftime.

To start the second half, the teams each scored three goals, and Richmond entered the fourth quarter with a 17-4 lead. In the final frame, the Spiders outscored the Dukes 4-2 to secure the 21-6 win.

Last Time Out...

Then-ranked No. 23 defeated Davidson 16-7 at Robins Stadium in the last home game of the season on Saturday afternoon. The Spiders earned their eighth straight conference win.

Alexis Morton led the team with 10 points on five goals and five assists with a 100% shooting percentage. Meghan Rode tallied five points on three goals and two assists. Bridget Lonsinger also tallied five points on two goals and three assists. Juliana Stanley, Charlotte Edwards, Emma Kroneberger, Rileigh Meyer and Stella Axe each tallied a goal. Lindsey Wright netted her first goal of the season. Anya Wardle tallied an assist.

Nine Spiders collected ground balls, and R. Meyer led the team, collecting five draw controls.

In goal, Abby Francioli earned the win, collecting four saves in 34:27 of play. Ally Gouveia collected four saves in 13:43 of play, and Maggie Mullen saw action in the cage.

Richmond led in multiple statistical categories, including an 8-0 advantage in saves, 15-9 in draw controls, 16 for 19 on clears, a 9-8 edge in ground balls and four-for-five in free-position shots.

The Spiders took a dominant start, scoring 12 straight unanswered goals in the first half for a 12-0 lead. At the start of the third quarter, the Wildcats scored back-to-back goals to cut the

deficit to 12-2. With another goal by the Spiders making it 13-2, Davidson scored three straight goals to end the third quarter at 13-5. In the final frame, Richmond outscored Davidson 3-2 to seal the 16-7 victory.

About The 2026 Squad . . .

- Richmond was picked as the favorite in the Atlantic 10 preseason poll.
- Richmond graduated nine seniors last season and returns 24 players from last year's roster.
- Coach Harrington signed three transfers and eight freshmen.
- Key returners include No. 14 Juliana Stanley (attack), No. 16 Reagan Quinn (defense), No. 21 Charlotte Edwards (attack), No. 23 Alexis Morton (attack), No. 25 Bridget Lonsinger (attack), No. 33 Keating Hopkins (midfield), No. 36 Victoria Rankin (midfield) and No. 40 Abby Francioli (goalie).
- In Week 3, the Spiders were ranked No. 25 in the IWLCA poll. In Week 5, Richmond was ranked No. 25 in both the IWLCA and ILWomen polls. In Week 7, the Spiders returned to the ILWomen Media Poll at No. 25. Richmond is the only Atlantic 10 program ranked this season.
- On March 24, 2026, the Spiders rank in the top 10 nationally in three categories: No. 6 in draw controls per game, No. 8 in assists per game and No. 8 in points per game. Richmond also ranks in the top 20 in six categories: No. 11 in scoring margin, No. 14 in scoring offense, No. 16 in draw controls per game, No. 17 in scoring defense and save percentage and No. 18 in shot percentage.
- On March 24, 2026, three Spiders rank in the top 20 nationally: Alexis Morton (No. 7 in points per game, No. 19 in assists per game), Abby Francioli (No. 19 in goals-against average) and Meghan Rode (No. 15 in draw controls per game, No. 19 in assists per game).
- In Week 8, the Spiders were ranked No. 23 in the ILWomen Media Poll and are receiving votes in the IWLCA poll.
- In Week 9, the Spiders were ranked No. 23 in the IWLCA and ILWomen polls.
- In Week 10, Richmond was ranked No. 23 in the ILWomen Media poll and No. 24 in the IWLCA poll.
- In the Week 11 polls, Richmond moved up one spot in the ILWomen poll to its highest ranking of the season at No. 22. In the IWLCA poll, the Spiders are ranked No. 24.
- As of April 20, Richmond is ranked in multiple top-10 stational categories among Division I teams. The Spiders rank No. 3 in draw control percentage (0.629), No. 5 in points per game (23.67), No. 6 in scoring margin (6.93), No. 6 in assists per game (8.47), No. 7 in shot percentage (0.498), No. 8 in draw controls per game (15.80) and No. 10 in scoring offense (15.20).

Preseason All-Atlantic 10...

Three Spiders were named to the preseason all-conference team: Alexis Morton at attack, Bridget Lonsinger at midfield and Reagan Quinn at defense.

Morton returns as Richmond's offensive playmaker, leading the Spiders in goals and assists. Last season, she totaled 76 points, second on the team, with 39 goals and 37 assists. She also tallied 14 ground balls, caused eight turnovers and collected one draw control.

Lonsinger returns to the midfield unit after earning Atlantic 10 All-Rookie Team honors last season. She totaled 21 points with 14 goals and seven assists, along with 29 draw controls, 23 ground balls and 10 caused turnovers.

Quinn returns to Richmond's defensive unit as a lockdown defender. She appeared in 17 games and made five starts last season, consistently disrupting opposing offenses. Quinn totaled nine caused turnovers, four ground balls and one draw control, continuing to establish herself as a reliable defensive playmaker.

MIDSEASON ALL-AMERICAN...

Inside Lacrosse Women announced its Nike Lacrosse Midseason Media All-Americans on April 1. Among the honorees was senior Alexis Morton.

Morton was named an honorable mention All-American for the first time in her career. Through 10 games, she has tallied 66 points on 38 goals and 28 assists. She has also collected four ground balls and caused five turnovers.

The Queen of Points...

Alexis Morton is one of two current Spiders in the record book. Morton is currently No. 2 all-time in career assists (107), No. 7 in career points (242) and is tied for No. 3 in single-season assists with Sam Geiersbach (37).

Against VCU, Morton tied the program's single-game record with 11 points and eight assists. She is only the fourth Spider in program history to reach 11 points in a game and just the second to record eight assists in a single game. The last Spider to reach 11 points was Kim Egizi against George Mason in 2018 and Rachel Ziemba against George Mason in 2021.

In Division I, Morton is ranked No. 5 in points per game (5.67), No. 20 in goals per game (3.33) and No. 22 in assists per game (2.33). In the A-10, Morton leads the league, averaging 5.67 points per game.

Last season, Morton totaled 76 points, second on the team, with 39 goals and 37 assists. In each of the last two seasons, Morton has tallied more than 65 points.

Between the Pipes...

Junior goalkeeper Abby Francioli is ranked No. 21 this season in Division I in saves percentage (0.477). In the A-10, she is No. 4 in goals against average (8.68) and No. 3 in save percentage (.477).

The Rode to Draw Controls . . .

Transfer Meghan Rode has taken center stage for the Spiders as a threat in the draw circle, currently with 207 career draw controls. Rode leads the A-10 in draw controls per game (8.80) and ranked No. 12 in Division I in draw controls per game (8.80) for the 2026 season.

Against La Salle, Rode became the third Spider to achieve 100 draw controls in a single season. She currently ranks No. 2 all-time in program history in single season draw controls (132).

Against George Washington, Rode set a program single-game record with 18 draw controls and reached a career milestone of 200 draw controls. Rode broke the previous record of 17, set in 2023 by Arden Tierney.

First Year Spiders...

Harrington added eight players to the class of 2029.

On the defensive side, Quinn Kennedy, Grace Hallahan and goalkeeper Ally Gouveia join the backfield. Ella Grimes, Cece Lesperance and Riley Marks make up the midfield. On attack, Shelby Manlove and Grace Holmes join the unit.

Three first-years were named USA Lacrosse All-Americans at the conclusion of their high school careers: Grace Hallahan, Ella Grimes and Quinn Kennedy. Ally Gouveia and Shelby Manlove were also named USA Lacrosse All-Americans and All-Academic honorees.

The Rookie Making an Impact...

Hallahan was selected to play in the New Balance All-America Game, representing Team North in July 2025. The game features the top high school lacrosse players in the country selected by Inside Lacrosse.

In August, Hallahan was named to the 2025 ILWomen Power 100 Freshmen Rankings at No. 44. This season, Hallahan has been a major contributor to the Spider defense, causing five turnovers and collecting four ground balls and five draw controls. In the win against then-No. 12 Virginia, Hallahan guarded ACC Midfielder of the Year Kate Gallica and held her to just one assist.

Seeing Double...

Harrington added transfer twins, Rileigh and Quinn Meyer, for their graduate year. Quinn Meyer completed a playing career at Lehigh and will play defense. Her sister Rileigh Meyer played for Georgetown and will run the midfield.

Player of the Week...

In week 3, Morton was named A-10 Offensive Player of the Week after tallying nine goals and six

assists across two games, collecting one ground ball. Morton recorded five goals and three assists in the Spiders' 16-11 victory at William & Mary before posting four goals and three assists in a narrow 15-14 overtime loss to No. 20/23 Duke.

In Week 5, Morton earned her second A-10 Offensive Player of the Week accolade after her historic performance in the 15-6 win over VCU.

In Week 8, Bridget Lonsinger was named Atlantic 10 Offensive Player of the Week. Lonsinger paced the Spiders offensively in a dominant 19-6 win over St. Bonaventure, on Saturday afternoon. Lonsinger led all players with a career-high seven points on four goals and three assists. Her four goals matched her career best, while her three assists marked a career-high as well.

In Week 9, Meghan Rode was named Atlantic 10 Offensive Player of the Week. Rode tallied 10 points across two matches last week, leading Richmond. She recorded eight points against USF, scoring two goals and adding six assists, including the eventual game-winner early in the fourth quarter. She added a pair of goals Saturday as Richmond cruised past La Salle, 20-2. Rode also collected 10 draw controls on the week.

New Year, New Assistant Coach...

Harrington announced the addition of assistant coach Taylor Paige in July 2025. Prior to Richmond, Paige spent three years on the staff at Virginia Tech, beginning in August 2023. With Paige's guidance in 2024, Hokie goalies tallied 158 saves and allowed one fewer goal per game than their opponents. Tech's shot-stoppers also saw an increase in save percentage compared to the 2023 season.

Paige has worked or played at six different schools in Virginia. Her knowledge as a goalkeeper coach helped players like Jocelyn Torres at Virginia Tech start every game in net for the Hokies during the 2024 campaign, finishing with a 9-9 record while recording a .427 save percentage on 427 shots faced and tallying 131 saves. A graduate keeper, Lilly Kannapell, also appeared in eight matches between the pipes, saving 27 shots with a final save percentage of .540. Torres and Kannapell helped Tech outscore its opponents from the commonwealth, 62-45.

During Paige's collegiate career, she was a four-year contributor at Mary Washington. In 2014, she recorded a 100% save percentage in a game during her first season as a starter, etching her name in the CAC record books.

A native of Charlottesville, Virginia, Paige was mentored by Julie Myers, a longtime coach at Virginia. Myers spent 28 seasons at Virginia, leading her team to the postseason every year except 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Paige was also mentored by Colleen Shearer, who coached at Virginia for 19 seasons, Bridgewater from 2016-17, James Madison from 2022-24 and Richmond from 2018-19. Paige and Shearer coached together at Bridgewater and overlapped at Virginia in 2021.

Combined, Shearer and Myers have won three national championships. Most recently, Shearer won a national championship with James Madison in 2018.

HEAD COACH - 5TH SEASON
WILLIAM & MARY, 2007

Anne Harrington was named head coach of Richmond women's lacrosse in May 2022 after six seasons on the Spiders' staff, including serving as interim head coach in 2022. During her time at Richmond, the Spiders have posted a 119-38 record, including a 58-12 mark in Atlantic 10 play, while winning four A-10 titles and making four NCAA Tournament appearances (2018-19, 2023-24). She finished the 2024 season ranked No. 11 nationally among active Division I head coaches in winning percentage.

In 2025, Harrington led the Spiders to an 11-8 finish, highlighted by the program's first win over No. 19 Penn State. Richmond's previous win over a nationally ranked opponent came in March 2023, when the Spiders defeated Virginia, 16-15, in overtime. Harrington coached Atlantic 10 Midfielder of the Year Grace Muldoon, who earned first-team all-conference and all-tournament honors. Colleen Quinn and Caroline Murphy were also named to the A-10 first team, while Hannah Custer earned second-team honors. Bridget Lonsinger and Keating Hopkins were selected to the A-10 all-rookie team.

Harrington guided Richmond to consecutive NCAA Tournament berths in 2023 and 2024, earning the automatic bid both seasons by winning the Atlantic 10 championship. In 2024, the Spiders went 13-6, claimed their second straight A-10 title and advanced to face No. 8 Penn in the first round. Muldoon was also named the A-10 Most Outstanding Player and a USA Lacrosse All-American, while Charlotte Edwards, Quinn and Abby Francioli joined her on the all-tournament team.

In 2023, Harrington led Richmond to 17 wins, matching the program's single-season record, and guided the Spiders to their first NCAA Tournament victory with a win over Marquette. Richmond finished the regular season ranked No. 14 in the Inside Lacrosse/IWLCA poll and led the nation in draw controls per game while ranking among the top teams nationally in scoring offense and points per game. Standouts included Lindsey Frank, the A-10 Most Outstanding Player, and Arden Tierney, the A-10 Offensive Player of the Year.

Harrington was also part of Richmond's postseason success prior to becoming head coach, helping the Spiders win the 2018 and 2019 A-10 titles and return to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2007.

A former midfielder at William & Mary, Harrington began her coaching career in England before assistant coaching stops at Dickinson and Connecticut. She earned her bachelor's degree in kinesiology from William & Mary in 2007 and a master's degree in education from Virginia in 2014.

In November 2025, Harrington and her husband welcomed their daughter, Sophia.

ASSISTANT COACH - 2ND SEASON BOSTON UNIVERSITY, 2013

Danielle Etrasco joined the Richmond women's lacrosse program in June 2024 as an assistant coach.

Etrasco enters her second season with the Spiders after helping Richmond finish 11-8 last season.

Prior to Richmond, she spent two years at Sacred Heart Academy as the head varsity lacrosse coach. Wrapping up a successful 2024 season with her team at Sacred Heart Academy in Hempstead, New York, the group earned the sportsmanship award and Etrasco was named coach of the year.

Prior to her two-year tenure at Sacred Heart Academy, Etrasco spent three seasons at Georgetown University as an assistant coach from 2016-19, where she helped lead the program to a Big East championship title in 2019, the first since 2010. The program went 33-

23 during her time in Washington, D.C. Through three seasons, she coached 16 All-Big East honorees, three IWLCA All-South Region players and one Big East Midfielder of the Year.

In 2019, Etrasco helped the Hoyas finish 12-9 as they advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2014 after beating Penn 13-12 in double overtime.

Before joining Georgetown's staff, Etrasco spent two years at Army West Point as an assistant coach from 2014-16. She aided the program's transition to the varsity level in her second season as her first year with the team was the final year at the club level.

Etrasco spent the 2013-14 academic year at Virginia Tech, where she served as an assistant under head coach Megan Burkner. While in Blacksburg, Virginia, Etrasco worked primarily with the Hokies' attack, helping produce an All-ACC first-team player and improving the team's scoring output from 177 goals in 2013 to 192 goals in 2014.

In her role at Virginia Tech, Etrasco also served as the team's student-athlete academic liaison and was responsible for developing practice plans, breaking down video and coordinating travel.

Before her time at Virginia Tech, Etrasco had a standout playing career as an attacker at Boston University. Along with serving as team captain as a junior and senior, Etrasco led the Terriers in scoring during her sophomore, junior and senior campaigns, including team bests of 79 points, 59 goals and 20 assists as a senior.

Additionally, she was named to the Tewaaraton Award Watch List in 2013 as one of the top college players in the nation.

A two-time IWLCA All-American, Etrasco earned IWLCA All-Northeast Region first-team and All-America East first-team honors in each of her final three seasons at Boston University.

In the summer of 2011, Etrasco was invited to join the United States National Team, eventually earning a spot on the 2013 World Cup squad. Etrasco won a gold medal with Team USA at the 2013 Federation of International Lacrosse World Cup in Oshawa, Ontario, totaling 17 goals and three assists in seven games during the tournament.

In 2017, she was selected as the 31st overall pick in the Women's Professional Lacrosse League draft, going to the Philadelphia Fire. She has also played in the United Women's Lacrosse League with the Boston Storm and Upstate Pride.

A native of Massapequa, New York, Etrasco also served in a coaching capacity with the Long Island Liberty Lacrosse program in Manhasset, New York, and at the Around the Crease lacrosse camp in Boston, Massachusetts.

Since the end of her playing career, she has begun her triathlon journey. In 2021, she competed in her first Ironman race and has continued competing since. Most recently, Etrasco competed at the Ironman 70.3 World Championships in Marbella, Spain, in November 2025.

Etrasco earned a Bachelor of Science in hospitality administration from Boston University in 2013. She also earned a master's degree in sports administration from Georgetown University.

ASSISTANT COACH - 1ST SEASON
MARY WASHINGTON, 2015

Taylor Paige enters her first season with Richmond, joining the staff in July 2025.

Prior to joining the Spiders, Paige spent three years on the staff at Virginia Tech, beginning in August 2023. With Paige's guidance in 2024, Hokie goalies tallied 158 saves and allowed one fewer goal per game than their opponents. Tech's shot-stoppers also saw an increase in save percentage compared to the 2023 season.

Sophomore Jocelyn Torres started every game in net for the Hokies during the 2024 campaign, finishing with a 9-9 record while recording a .427 save percentage on 427 shots faced and tallying 131 saves. Graduate keeper Lilly Kannapell also appeared in eight matches between the pipes, saving 27 shots with a final save percentage of .540. Torres and Kannapell helped Tech outscore its opponents from the commonwealth, 62-45.

Paige joined Tech after most recently serving as a lacrosse operations assistant at the University of Virginia for two seasons. She was a key member of a staff that saw the Cavaliers make two NCAA Tournament appearances.

Prior to working at Virginia, she spent three seasons as an assistant coach at Shenandoah University. The Hornets increased their conference win percentage each season Paige was on staff. Before the 2020 season was suspended, Shenandoah started 7-0 in nonconference play, outscoring opponents 113-57 while allowing an average of 8.14 goals per game.

Before joining the Hornets, Paige served as an assistant coach with a focus on goalies at Bridgewater College. From 2017-18, the Eagles had 10 All-ODAC selections, including two goaltenders.

During Paige's collegiate career, she was a four-year contributor at Mary Washington. In 2014, she recorded a 100% save percentage in a game during her first season as a starter, etching her name in the CAC record books.

A native of Charlottesville, Virginia, Paige was mentored by Julie Myers, a longtime coach at Virginia. Myers spent 28 seasons at Virginia, leading her team to the postseason every year except 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Paige was also mentored by Colleen Shearer, who coached at Virginia for 19 seasons, Bridgewater from 2016-17, James Madison from 2022-24 and Richmond from 2018-19. Paige and Shearer coached together at Bridgewater and overlapped at Virginia in 2021.

Combined, Shearer and Myers have won three national championships. Most recently, Shearer won a national championship with James Madison in 2018.

In addition to coaching, Paige serves on the coaches board for the IWLCA.

Most recently, Paige became engaged last August to her fiancée, Julia, a NICU nurse at UVA Health.

Paige earned a Bachelors in Business Administration from the University of Mary Washington in 2015. She also earned a master's degree in education and leadership from Shenandoah University.
