About Tonight's Opponent

Binghamton University, formerly known as the State University of New York at Binghamton, is the alma mater of Tony Kornheiser from the PTI (Pardon the Interruption) and Monday Night Football broadcasts. BU has over 14,000 students with 5,500 living on campus. The campus is located on a wooded hillside above the Susquehanna River. Binghamton has led the America East in attendance five straight years, averaging 3,645 fans per game last year, and hosted the America East tournament in 2005, 2006 and 2008. The Bearcats have the third best winning percentage in America East over the last seven years and went 12-4 in the conference in 2005-06 to finish in second place. Binghamton competed in the NIT in 2004. BU has 21 sports and has won 12 conference championships since 2003.

Meet the New Broncs

Rider has three new faces on the roster this year in Jermaine Jackson, Brandon Penn and Novar Gadson. Jackson led Reading High to a 30-1 season as the District 3 Champions, earning Berks County Player of the Year honors while graduating with 1,400 points. Penn was the Division D Player of the Year at Paul Robeson High, earning All-State honors after averaging 27 points per game. Gadson was an All-City and All-Public League selection at Bartram High last year, breaking Joe Bryant's career scoring record.

2009-10 Freshman Class

Sir Christian Williams, a senior at Cleveland (Ohio) Heights High School and Dara Nd-Ezuma, a senior at Life Center High School in Columbus, NJ, have signed national letters of intent to further their education and athletic careers at Rider University. Williams, a 6'4", 210 pound guard, was an All-Lake Erie League selection as a junior, averaging 10.5 points, 4.5 assists and 4.3 rebounds. As the starting point guard he led his team to a combined 35-12 record over the last two years in the top conference in Northeast Ohio. Nd-Ezuma is a 6'10" center who just began playing basketball a few years ago.

Afternoon Delight

The Broncs are 4-0 in afternoon games this season and have 10 more afternoon games on the regular season schedule.

From Big West to Big East

Rider is coming off an 85-72 win over Cal State Northridge of the Big West Conference and a 66-62 loss to Rutgers of the Big East.

The Thompsons: Ryan/Jason Comparison

In Jason Thompson's first two seasons at Rider he compiled 722 points, 447 rebounds, 98 assists and 45 steals, playing in 57 games. In Ryan Thompson's first two seasons at Rider, he compiled 737 points, 361 rebounds, 199 assists and 94 steals, playing in 63 games.

Cheesesteak and Pretzels, Anyone?

Seven members of the Rider basketball team hail from the Greater Philadelphia area. Novar Gadson attended John Bartram High School and Matt Griffin attended St. Joe Prep. The Mansell brothers attended Cheltenham High School and Mike Ringgold went to Roman Catholic. Brandon Penn attended Paul Robeson High and Ryan Thompson is from right across the river, growing up in Mt. Laurel.

Rider in 2008 MAAC Tournament

The Broncs suffered injuries to three starters in the first game of the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Championship tournament, but still managed to defeat the tenth seed, Canisius, 75-71, in the quarterfinals. In the semifinals, with two starters out and a third starter playing at less than 100 percent, Rider defeated the sixth seed, Marist, 76-71. In the finals, with two starters playing at less than 100 percent and a third starter, Second Team All-MAAC guard Ryan Thompson still on the side lines, Rider fell to the top seed and tournament host, Siena.

Rider in Conference Title Games

Rider reached the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Title Game last year for the second time in four years. It was the eighth conference Title Game for the Broncs in the last 25 years. Rider won the Northeast Conference Championship Game in 1993 and 1994, and lost the NEC Title Game in 1995 and 1996. The Broncs also won the East Coast Conference Championship Game in 1984, and lost the ECC Title Game in 1991.

Rider This Year

With four returning starters, the Broncs are picked by the conference coaches to finish third in the 10-team Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference, behind Siena and Fairfield.

Rider Last Year

The Broncs finished in a regular season tie for first place in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference with Siena. Rider and Siena played in the MAAC Title Game. Rider was selected to compete in the inaugural College Basketball Invitational, and lost at ODU 68-65.

Injury Report

Harris Mansell injured his elbow in the season opener at Saint Joseph's and missed the next game before returning for the next seven. He was shut down again for the NJIT contest Saturday and is not expected to play tonight. Starting point guard Justin Robinson underwent knee surgery November 5 and returned to action November 23 at Lafayette. Jermaine Jackson injured his knee the first week of November and returned to action November 29 against Cal State Northridge.

Riding Time

The Broncs were 21-1 last season when leading with five minutes left in the game. Rider was 18-4 when leading with 10 minutes left, and 20-4 when leading at half time.

Worst to First

The Broncs finished in tenth place in the MAAC in 2006, and tied for first place in 2008. Rider won eight regular season games in 2006, 15 in 2007 and 21 in 2008.

20 Wins

The Broncs compiled a 20-win season last year for the seventh time in the 79-year history of men's basketball at Rider. The 21 wins was the most ever in the regular season and the 23 wins overall is a new Rider record. In 1993-94 Rider won three conference playoff games to get to 21 wins overall.

Head Coach Tommy Dempsey

Tommy Dempsey, in just his second year as the Rider head coach, was named Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Coach of the Year and was also honored with the Peter A. Carlisimo Award as the Division I Metropolitan Basketball Writers Association Coach of the Year in 2008. Dempsey, who now owns the team record for wins in a season at three different colleges (Rider, Lackawanna College, Keystone College) took a team with eight wins in 2006 and led it to 16 wins in 2007 and to a program-best 23 wins in 2008. In five plus seasons as a college head coach Dempsey has compiled an overall record of 133-41 (.767). At Rider Dempsey has a head coaching record of 45-29 over the last two plus years, after serving one season as the interim head coach.

Last Time Out

Junior Ryan Thompson scored 19 points to lead Rider to victory over New Jersey Institute of Technology Saturday afternoon. Holding a 6-5 lead, Rider went on an 18-3 run, seven points by Thompson, to take a 24-8 lead mid-way through the first half and never looked back. Holding a 29-16 lead, Rider out-scored NJIT 11-3 over the final 5:12 of the first half, six points by sophomore Patrick Mansell to take a 40-19 lead at the half. Mansell finished with 11 points in 20 minutes off the bench. Rider senior Lamar Johnson added 13 points, while sophomore Mike Ringgold and sophomore Justin Robinson each added 11 points. Sophomore Matt Griffin compiled three points, six rebounds, three assists and a pair of steals. Rider out-rebounded NJIT 48-40, including eight rebounds by Ringgold.

Next Time Out

The Broncs host Drexel on Saturday, December 27 at 3pm. The game will be televised on CN8.

Rider on Neutral Court

The Broncs were 3-2 on neutral court last season, defeating Penn State, Canisius and Marist while losing by nine points to North Carolina State and by 13 points to Kansas State.

Rider vs. Binghamton

The Broncs have defeated the Bearcats in the only two meetings between the two teams. Rider won 79-65 here in Binghamton on December 2, 2006, and the Broncs won last year in Lawrenceville 81-73 on December 1, 2007. In last year's contest Lamar Johnson scored 13 points in the final six minutes during a 15-2 run to lead Rider to the come-from-behind win. Johnson finished with 16 points off the bench.

America East

UMBC won the America East last year, both the regular season and the championship tournament. Binghamton was fifth. Other America East teams include Hartford, Albany, Vermont, Boston U, New Hampshire, Stony Brook and Maine. The America East Tournament will be in Albany this year, the same weekend as the MAAC Tournament.

Comeback Kids

On November 20 Rider trailed at Lehigh by 13 points in the second half and came back to win by one point. On November 23 Rider trailed by 15 points with nine minutes left at Lafayette and came back to win by seven points. During the 2006-07 season Rider trailed by 21 points at Fairleigh Dickinson and won by two points. That same season Rider trailed Fairfield by 11 points with 7:10 left and won by one. Drexel led Rider by eight points with just 1:05 left and the Broncs won in overtime.

Thompson Time

Ryan Thompson scored seven points in an 18-3 run that gave the Broncs a 24-8 lead and Rider never looked back in 21-point win over NJIT. With Rider trailing by 11 points at half time and by 15 points with nine minutes left, Thompson took over the Lafayette game, leading Rider to a seven-point victory on the road. Thompson scored 22 of his game-high 25 points in the second half. At Lehigh, his driving lay-up while being fouled and his free throw with 11.8 seconds left gave Rider a 68-66 lead in the 69-68 win. Against Northridge, Thompson scored 22 of Rider's first 51 points as the Broncs built a 51-35 lead.

Binghamton This Year

The Bearcats are coming off an 86-80 loss to Manhattan on Saturday. In that game the score was tied with 5:00 left. D. J. Rivera and Dwayne Jackson combined for 40 points against the Jaspers. Binghamton lost 63-60 at Bucknell on December 9, ending a three-game winning streak.

Binghamton Last Year

The Bearcats lost to Vermont in the America East quarterfinals last season to finish 14-16. Binghamton won four of the final five games of the regular season before that loss to finish in fifth place (9-7).

Boss Bearcats

The Bearcats are coached for the second year by Kevin Broadus, who was an assistant at Georgetown for three years. One of his assistants is former Temple star Mark Macon, a three-time All-American who played six years in the NBA.

Monmouth Transfer Waiting in Wings

Jhamar Youngblood scored almost 700 points in two seasons at Monmouth and will have two more seasons to play at Rider, beginning in the fall of 2009. Youngblood was Monmouth's leading scorer last season (12.1 ppg), including 27 points at Seton Hall, 25 points at Saint Peter's and 20 points at Colgate. Youngblood was the Northeast Conference Rookie of the Year as a freshman after leading Elizabeth's St. Patrick's High School to a 90-10 three year record as the perennial New Jersey High School State Champion.

BracketBuster

On February 21 the Broncs are taking part in the seventh annual ESPNU Bracket Busters with a home game against a yet to be named opponent. This is Rider's fourth year in BracketBusters. Last year Rider won 73-72 at Cal State Northridge. Rider lost 92-79 at Northeastern in 2006 and lost to Murray State 58-51 in 2007.

Mid-Major Top 25 Battle

Cal State Northridge was ranked 25th in the CollegeInsider.com Preseason Poll. According to the latest poll, November 24, Rider is now 25th. Cal State Northridge has dropped out of the top 25 but is sixth among "Others Receiving Votes".



Hawks Win by 12

The Broncs lost to Saint Joseph's in the season opener at the Wachovia Center despite 19 points and six rebounds by junior Ryan Thompson. The host Hawks (1-0) broke a 30-30 halftime tie by out-scoring Rider (0-1) 12-2 over the first 3:30 of the second half, six points by 6'9" senior Ahmad Nivins, to take a 42-31 lead. Nivins, the Saint Joseph's leading returning scorer and rebounder, finished with a game-high 25 points and 13 rebounds. Trailing 58-42, Rider went on an 8-2 run to cut the lead to 60-50 with 5:30 left, but could get no closer. The Broncs out-rebounded Saint Joseph's 36-34. Rider jumped out to a 12-2 start in the first four minutes, four points by sophomore Mike Ringgold, who finished with 10 points and nine rebounds. Saint Joseph's led 28-23 before Rider out-scored the Hawks 7-2 over the final 5:26 of the first half, four points by Thompson, to tie the score at 30-30 at the half.



Broncs Better in Bethlehem

Lamar Johnson made six three-point field goals, finishing with a game-high 20 points, and Ryan Thompson made a lay-up and a foul shot with 11.8 seconds left to give Rider a 68-66 lead in the 69-68 come-from-behind win at Lehigh. Rider trailed by as many as 13 points (38-25) and trailed by 10 points (55-45) with 11:44 left to play. Johnson, starting in place of his injured roommate, Harris Mansell, blocked a potential game-tying three-point shot in the closing seconds. The miss was put in for a two-pointer at the buzzer for the final score.



Rider Defeats Lafayette

For the second straight game, Rider came back from a double-digit deficit in the second half to pull out a victory on the road. Junior Ryan Thompson scored 25 points, 22 in the second half, to lead Rider to victory at Lafayette. Trailing 67-52, Rider went on a 12-0 run, eight points by Thompson, to cut the lead to 69-64 with 5:35 left to play. Lafayette (2-2) led 76-68 before Rider out-scored the Leopards 15-0, six by Thompson, taking a 83-76 lead. A lay-up by Thompson with 1:30 left gave Rider a 77-76 lead; Rider's first lead since 21-18 mid-way through the first half. A steal and dunk by freshman Novar Gadson with 32 seconds remaining gave the Broncs a 79-76 lead. Gadson finished with 10 points, eight rebounds and two steals. Senior Harris Mansell, who injured the elbow on his right (shooting) arm in the first two minutes of the second half in the Saint Joseph's game November 14 and hadn't played since, started an compiled 20 points. Rider jumped out to a 10-2 lead, six points by Mansell on a pair of three-point field goals. The second three-pointer gave him 1,000 career points.

Broncs Beat Northridge

Junior Ryan Thompson compiled 25 points and nine rebounds to lead Rider to victory over Cal State Northridge in the home opener Saturday afternoon. Rider out-scored Northridge 10-4 to start the second half, seven by Thompson, to take a 51-35 lead with 16:00 remaining. Rider's biggest lead was 17, 60-43 with 10:57 remaining. Trailing 8-6, Rider out-scored Northridge 18-6, 11 points by Thompson, to take a 24-14 lead with 7:33 left in the first half. Rider led by as many as 12 points in the first half, 33-21, and 39-27, and Rider led 41-31 at intermission on 15 points by Thompson. Senior Harris Mansell added 14 points and six rebounds, and sophomore Mike Ringgold added 10 points, nine rebounds and four assists. Freshman Novar Gadson, the MAAC Rookie of the Week for his last two games, at Lehigh and Lafayette, added 10 points, seven rebounds, two blocks and two steals.





Battle of RUs

Despite a career-high 22 points from sophomore Mike Ringgold the Broncs lost to Rutgers in the Garden State Battle of the RUs at the Sovereign Bank Arena Wednesday evening. Rider led 60-57 with 2:07 remaining before Rutgers made three three-pointers for the victory. The Broncs trailed 53-52 before out-scoring Rutgers 8-4, four points by Ringgold, to take a 60-57 lead. Ringgold also had a game-high 12 rebounds. Junior Ryan Thompson compiled 15 points and six rebounds for Rider, while senior Harris Mansell added eight points and a career-high 11 rebounds. Freshman Novar Gadson, the two-time MAAC Rookie of the Week, played just five minutes in the first half due to foul trouble and finished with 10 points in 17 minutes of action. Rutgers led 16-15 before Rider went on a 15-4 run, six points by Mansell on a pair of three-point field goals, to take a 30-20 lead with 3:14 left in the first half, and Rider led 36-28 at half time.

Mansell Over Monmouth

Sophomore guard Patrick Mansell came in off the bench to score 12 points, nine in the second half, to lead Rider over cross-state rival Monmouth. Rider trailed 39-37 before going on a 12-2 run, six points by Mansell, to take a 49-41 lead in the 66-54 victory. Mansell made a career-high four three-point field goals. Older brother Harris Mansell added 10 points and eight rebounds.



Loss at La Salle

The Broncs lost at La Salle December 17 despite 19 points and five assists from Ryan Thompson and 16 points and nine rebounds from Mike Ringgold. Holding a 57-45 lead with 15 minutes left, La Salle went on a 10-4 run to take a 67-49 lead with 12 minutes left. La Salle shot 56 percent from the field and made 19 foul shots, including eight in the final 2:40, and out-rebounded Rider 46-31. The Broncs shot just 38 percent from the field and 65 percent from the foul line. A pair of Philadelphia natives also played well for Rider, freshman Novar Gadson compiled 14 points and five rebounds and sophomore Matt Griffin added a career-high 11 points along with four rebounds in 29 minutes of action off the bench.



Rider Wins MAAC Opener

Sophomore Mike Ringgold scored 20 points, his second straight 20-point game, to lead Rider to a Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference victory over Manhattan Sunday afternoon. Manhattan led 58-54 mid-way through the second half before Rider went on a 10-0 run, five points by senior Harris Mansell, to take a 64-58 lead with 6:41 remaining. Mansell finished with 14 points, six rebounds and four steals. Holding a 72-70 lead, Rider made all four of its foul shots in the final 15 seconds, two by sophomore Matt Griffin (Philadelphia, Pa./St. Joseph's Prep) and two by senior Lamar Johnson (Scranton, Pa./Scranton), to preserve the victory. Johnson finished with 16 points off the bench, making two three-pointers and all six of his foul shots.



Broncs Win by 21

Junior Ryan Thompson scored 19 points to lead Rider to victory over New Jersey Institute of Technology Saturday afternoon. New Jersey Championship

Rider is 2-1 against other teams from New Jersey this year, defeating Monmouth and NJIT after losing to Rutgers. Last season, with victories over Rutgers, NJIT, FDU, Monmouth and two vs. Saint Peter's the Broncs won the unofficial Division I New Jersey Championship. The only teams from New Jersey Rider did not play last year were Princeton and Seton Hall. Rider last played those two in 2002-03, defeating the Tigers while losing to the Pirates. This year Rider still has Saint Peter's home and away.

Great Wins in Rider Basketball History

On December 21, 2007 Rider **defeated Rutgers 61-57**, marking the first time in 13 games that RU defeated the other RU and the first time Rider defeated a Big East team. On November 23, 2007 Rider **defeated Penn State 82-73** in the Old Spice Classic. Penn State was picked to finish fourth in the Big Ten last year. On December 18, 1982 **Rider defeated South Carolina 63-56** in Columbia. The Gamecocks were 22-9 that year. On March 3, 1964 **Rider upset NYU 66-63**. Rider was a 30-point underdog. NYU had not lost in its seldom used home Alumni Gym since 1941, winning 57 straight games over a 23-year period before losing to Rider. On January 6, 1970 **Rider defeated St. Joseph's 79-73** in overtime. In March of 1984 **Rider defeated Bucknell 73-71** in overtime of the East Coast Conference Championship, sending Rider to its first NCAA tournament game against Richmond. March 9, 1993 **Rider defeated Wagner 65-64** in the Championship Game of the Northeast Conference Tournament. The game-winning shot, a coast-to-coast drive at the buzzer, sent the home crowd into a frenzy and was the play of the week on three different national television networks. December 28, 1997 **Rider defeated College of Charleston 65-58** in the first round of the Franklin Life Classic, marking the only time C of C did not play in the championship game of its own tournament.

Rider Grad in NBA, Number Retired

Jason Thompson '08, the 2008 Rider Athlete of the Year and the 2008 MAAC basketball Player of the Year, was the 12th player picked in the 2008 NBA draft and is currently playing for the Sacramento Kings. On January 4 his Rider uniform #1 will be retired. In his NBA debut, Thompson came in off the bench and compiled 18 points, making seven of 10 shots from the field and all four of his foul shots, grabbed 10 rebounds and blocked a shot in 22 minutes of action at Minnesota. A native of Mt. Laurel, NJ, Thompson made his Philadelphia homecoming a memorable one on November 3, when he compiled a team-high 17 points against the Sixers, making eight of 12 shots from the field, six rebounds and a team-high five assists in 30 minutes off the bench.

Graduated Jason Thompson

**Jason Thompson was the 2008 U.S. Basketball Writers Association District II Player of the Year, the MAAC Player of the Year and a First Team NABC All-District 3 selection.

**JT was the first player to score at least 30 points and grab 18 rebounds in a conference tournament game (32 and 18 vs. Marist in MAAC semi-finals) since Sherman Gay of Loyola Marymount in 2004. The last player to reach 32 and 18 was Corey Albano of Monmouth in 1997.

**The only other Division I player to record 32 and 18 in a game last season was Michael Beasley of Kansas State.

**JT had THREE games last season where he compiled over 20 points AND over 20 rebounds. According to ESPN.com research, which goes back 12 years, only four other players have had TWO such games in a season and NO ONE has had THREE in one season except for JT.

**JT was one of just 96 Division I players to EVER compile BOTH 2,000 points and 1,000 rebounds. The only New Jersey college players to ever accomplish that were Princeton's Bill Bradley '65 (2,503 points, 1,008 rebounds), and Phil Sellers '76 (2,399 and 1,111) and James Bailey '79 (2,034 and 1,074) from Rutgers. The only other MAAC player was Niagara's Juan Mendez '05 (2,210 and 1,533).

**JT set Rider single season records for points (694, old record was 665 in 1993), rebounds (412, old record was 328 in 1972), field goals (275, old record was 247 in 1980).

**JT set Rider career marks for rebounds (1171, old record was 874 in 1977), blocks (232) and games played (122).



Conference

This is Rider's 12th season in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference. Rider is 108-91 in conference play since joining the MAAC, including 1-0 this year and 13-5 last year. Rider finished the 1998 regular season 12-6 in the MAAC, good for second place in the conference that was ranked 12th according to the RPI index. Rider was 13-5 in 2001-02 and 2004-05, good for first place both years.

MAAC Opener

Rider began MAAC play December 7 with a win over Manhattan. The Broncs defeated Iona in the MAAC opener in 2006-07 and have now won four of their last six MAAC openers. Rider is 7-5 in its 12 MAAC openers. Last year the Broncs began MAAC play December 6, losing at Niagara.

Sophomore Mike Ringgold was a member of the MAAC All-Rookie Team last season.

MAAC Honors II

Novar Gadson was named the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Rookie of the Week for all games played November 17-23. Gadson compiled 27 points, nine rebounds and three assists while making ten of 17 field goal attempts in a pair of road victories. In Rider's 69-68 win at Lehigh Gadson compiled 17 points in 22 minutes of action. In Rider's 84-77 win at Lafayette Gadson's steal and dunk with 32 seconds remaining gave the Broncs a 79-76 lead. Gadson finished the Lafayette game with 10 points, eight rebounds and a pair of steals.

MAAC Honors III

Ryan Thompson was named the MAAC Player of the Week and Novar Gadson was named the MAAC Rookie of the Week for all games played the final week of November. The pair led Rider to an 85-72 victory over Cal State Northridge in Rider's only game last week. Thompson (Mt. Laurel/Lenape) compiled a game-high 25 points, a game-high nine rebounds, three steals and two assists. Gadson (Philadelphia, PA/John Bartram High) compiled 10 points and seven rebounds, a pair of blocks and two steals in 25 minutes of action.

MAAC Preseason Poll

The Broncs were picked to finish third in the 10-team Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference. Siena was picked to win the league, followed by Fairfield, Rider, Niagara, Loyola, Manhattan, Iona, Canisius, Saint Peter's and Marist.

Rider in Non-Conference Games

The Broncs are 5-3 in non-conference games this year. Rider finished the regular season 8-4 in non-conference games last year. Rider was 7-6 in non-conference games in 2006-07.

Rider Road Warriors

The Broncs are 2-2 on the road this year, losing at Saint Joseph's, winning at Lehigh and at Lafayette before losing at La Salle. Rider finished the regular season 9-5 in away games last season and was 3-2 on neutral court for a 12-7 record away from Alumni Gym. The Broncs were 7-9 on the road in 2006-07.

Filling the Stat Sheet

Last season Ryan Thompson ranked among the MAAC leaders in scoring (7th), rebounding (10th), field goal percentage (9th), three-point field goal percentage (6th), assists (9th), steals (5th) and free throw percentage (13th). In three of the first four games this season Thompson led Rider in scoring, rebounding and minutes.

Rider in Home Openers

The Broncs have now won 11 of their last 13 home openers, including an 85-72 win over Cal State Northridge this year to make it three in a row.

Ready for Prime Time Players

The MAAC Title Game was the tenth time Rider played on national television last season. Rider was 7-3 on national TV last year.

Mr. 1,000

Senior Harris Mansell wasted no time scoring his 1,000th career point, although it took an extra nine days. Mansell entered the season needing 16 for his "G" and scored 10 in the first half of the opener at Saint Joseph's. An elbow injury at the start of the second half put Mansell on the shelf for over a week. The night before the Lafayette game he said he could go and Sunday afternoon he made a pair of three-pointers in the first two minutes of the game for 1,000. Mansell finished with 20 points in the win at Lafayette and enters today game with 1,063 career points, 25th most ever at Rider.

Home Sweet Home-Rider in Broncs' Zoo

Rider has won 120 of its last 159 games in the Broncs' Zoo (.755), including 3-0 this year and 11-2 last year. The last time Rider won 11 home games was in 1995-96 when the Broncs also went 11-2, with the 11th win an NEC quarter-final win over St. Francis-PA. Rider was a best-ever 13-2 at home in 1993-94, with the 11th, 12th and 13th wins coming in the NEC playoffs. Rider was 7-5 at home in 2006-07 (Rider was 1-0 in the Sovereign Bank Arena that season). Rider finished 8-2 in Alumni Gym in 2005. Rider finished 8-2 in Alumni Gym in 2004. Rider finished 8-6 at home in 2003, 7-5 in Alumni Gym and 1-1 at the Sovereign Bank Arena. Rider was 9-1 in Alumni Gymnasium in 2002. Rider finished 10-2 in Alumni Gymnasium in 2001 and in 1998. Rider won 72 of 89 games (.809) in Alumni Gym, and 21 of 24 (.875) before losing two overtime home games in 2003, one in triple overtime.

Backcourt Captains

Senior guard Harris Mansell and sophomore guard Matt Griffin were named captains of the 2008-09 Rider squad.

Consecutive Road Wins

The Broncs won five consecutive road games last season, at Iona, Manhattan, Saint Peter's, Marist and at Siena, before losing at Fairfield. The last time Rider won five consecutive away games was during the 1973-74 season, when Rider won at Iona, at Dickinson, at Kutztown, at Lehigh and at Lafayette.

Home Away from Home, Trenton's Sovereign Bank Arena

The Broncs defeated Siena 84-78 in Mercer County's Sovereign Bank Arena in 2006-07 and will host Saint Peter's in the Sovereign Bank Arena this year. The SBA was the site of the 2003 MAAC Championship Tournament and the 2006 Women's NCAA Championship Tournament First and Second rounds. The Broncs lost their only game in the SBA in 2006 to Villanova. Rider was 0-1 in the SBA in 2004-2005, 1-2 in the SBA in 2003-2004, and is 4-12 lifetime in the SBA. In 2003-2004 the Broncs defeated Manhattan 57-56 on a buzzer-beating lay-up. The Broncs defeated Princeton in the SBA on December 18, 2002. Rider played three games in the SBA in 2001-2002 and defeated Delaware. Rider played the first-ever men's basketball game in the SBA against Rutgers.

Clair Bee. An accounting professor, founded Rider varsity sports in 1928-29 and coached football, basketball and baseball. Compiled a 53-7 three-year record in basketball before moving on to LIU, where he won National Championships. A member of the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame, Bee wrote the popular Chip Hilton books and invented the shot clock and the three-second rule.

Dick Kuchen '66. Graduated from Rider as the career leader in rebounds and was fifth in career scoring, made the winning fouls shots as Rider upset NYU. Was the head coach at Cal-Berkley and Yale.

Harry Gamble '52 Captained the last football team at Rider (1951) and went on to be President of the Philadelphia Eagles.

Jack Armstrong. An All-American pitcher for Rider in 1985 as a sophomore, went on to start the 1990 Major League All-Star game as a rookie pitcher for the World Champion Cincinnati Reds.

Jack Madden '65. Graduated from Rider as the career leader in points and rebounds in basketball and was 20-5 as a Bronc pitcher on the baseball team. Went on to enjoy a long career as an NBA referee, including 25 NBA championship series games.

Super Mario in Hall

Mario Porter became the latest basketball player to be inducted into the Rider Athletics Hall of Fame January 26, 2008. Porter was the MAAC Player of the Year in 2001-02, leading the Broncs to a first place finish as an honorable mention All-American. The first Rider player to compile both 1700 points and 700 rebounds before Jason Thompson, Porter continues to play professionally in Finland.

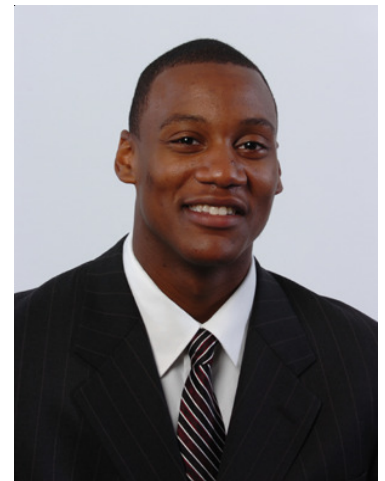
