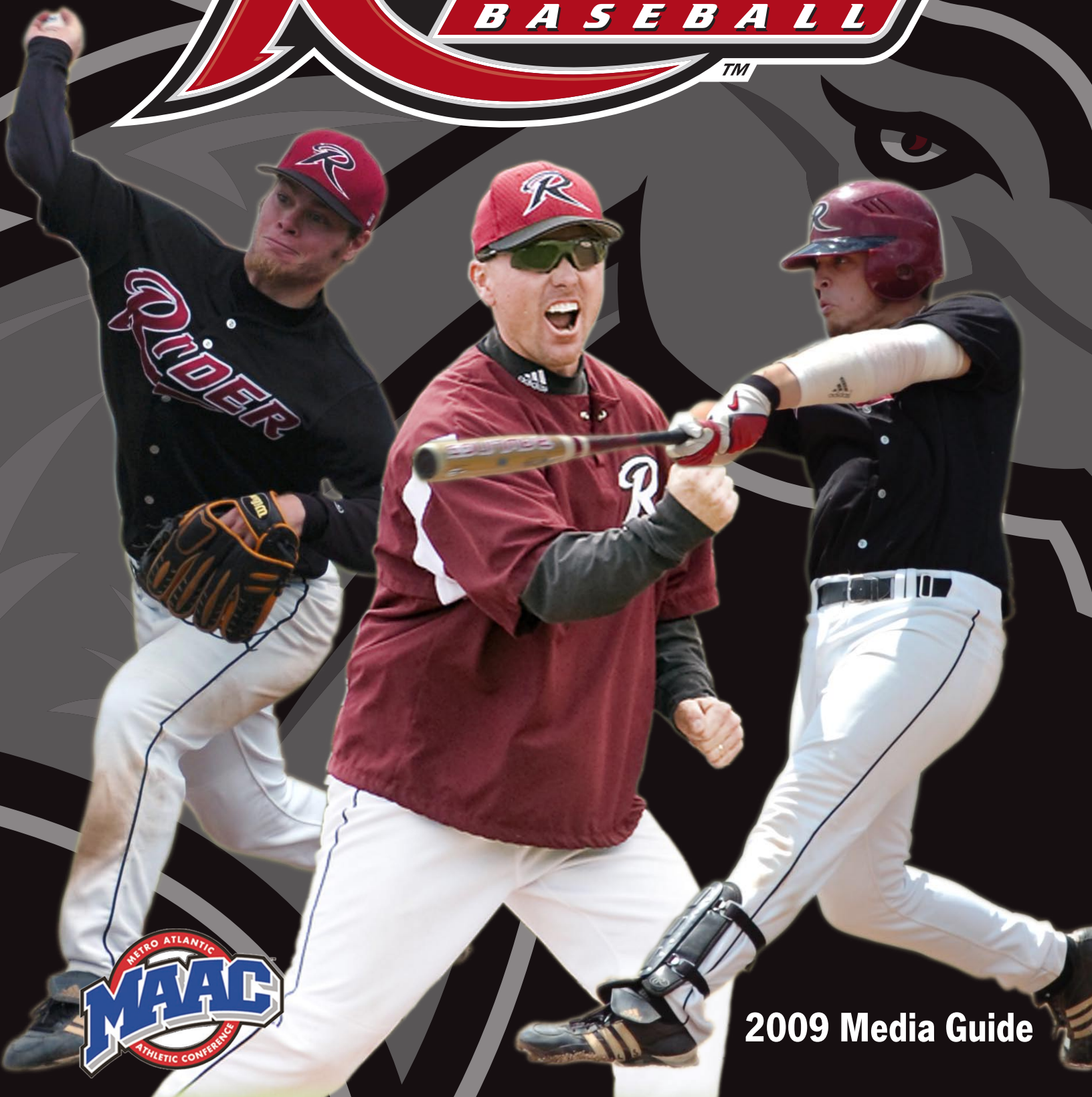



Directions to Rider

From New York and North Jersey:

From the New Jersey Turnpike: Take the NJ Turnpike South to Exit 7A (I-195 West). Follow I-195 West to the exit for I-295 North (Princeton). I-295 North will become I-95 South. Take Exit 7A off of I-95 South to U.S. Route 206 South (Trenton). Rider is a quarter mile on the right.

From U.S. Route 1 South: take the exit for I-95 South (sign says "To Pennsylvania"). Bear right at junction, following signs for I-95 South (Pennsylvania). Take exit 7A off of I-95 South to U.S. Route 206 South (Trenton). Rider is a quarter mile on the right.

From Pennsylvania:

Take I-95 North, straight over the Delaware River into New Jersey. Take Exit 7A off of I-95 to U.S. Route 206 South (Trenton). Rider is a quarter mile on the right.

From the Pennsylvania Turnpike: take the PA Turnpike east to Exit 28 (Philadelphia) and take U.S. Route 1 North to I-95 North. Continue on I-95 North, straight over the Delaware River into New Jersey. Take Exit 7A off of I-95 to U.S. Route 206 South (Trenton). Rider is a quarter mile on the right.

From the South:

Take I-295 North. I-295 North will become I-95 South. Continue on I-95 South and take Exit 7A off I-95 South to U.S. Route 206 South (Trenton). Rider is a quarter mile on the right.

From the East:

Take the Garden State Parkway to Exit 98 (I-195 West). Follow I-195 West to the exit for I-295 North (Princeton). I-295 North will become I-95 South. Take Exit 7A off of I-95 South to U.S. Route 206 South (Trenton). Rider is a quarter mile on the right.

Barry Davis

In just his fourth season at Rider University Barry Davis led the Broncs to the 2008 NCAA Tournament as champion of the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference.

Barry Davis was named the Rider head coach in July of 2004. In his first year he led Rider to a 21-win season, including a 14-13 record in the MAAC. In his second season, he was named the co-winner of the MAAC Baseball Coach of the Year award, leading the Broncs to a playoff berth and a third place finish in the MAAC.

In 2008 his team defeated the top seed, Canisius, and beat the third seed, Siena, two out of three games to win the MAAC tournament, held at Mercer County's Waterfront Park, and advance to the NCAA Tournament in Fullerton, California.

Prior to coming to Rider Davis was the head coach at Georgia Southwestern State University from 2001-2004.

The four-time NJCAA Division III National Coach of the Year at Gloucester County College, Davis has compiled 666 victories in his head coaching career with just 284 losses, including 95 wins at Rider and an 11-year stint at Gloucester CC where he won four National Junior College titles and eight Regional Championships.

Davis was 137-87 at Georgia Southwestern, winning the 2002 conference regular season and finishing with a National NAIA Ranking of fifth, earning Georgia Dugout Club NAIA Coach of the Year honors. Davis has sent 17 of his players on to the professional ranks, including Scott Knazek of the 2006 Rider squad.

Davis also coached the National Junior College Athletic Association all-star team in 1999 which defeated Team Canada.

A 1987 graduate of Bridgewater (VA) College, Davis has assisted at George Mason and Frostburg State. Davis was an All-Conference and All-State shortstop at Bridgewater, earning team MVP honors as a junior.

Davis is Rider's eighth baseball coach and just the third since 1960. He resides in Morrisville, PA with his wife, Rhonda and daughter, Amanda. His son, Derek attends Bridgewater College in Virginia.

Jaime Steward

Jaime Steward of Blackwood, a former pitcher in the Anaheim Angels organization, began his first season as an assistant coach at Rider in September.

“Jaime is an excellent addition to our staff,” said Rider head coach Barry Davis. “He has been successful at every level and has pitched for championship teams at the high school and college level.”

“I am very excited to be a part of the Rider Baseball Program,” said Steward. “Coach Davis is a proven winner, and I am looking forward to learning from him.”

Steward is a 1997 graduate of Gloucester Catholic High School and a 2001 graduate of Le Moyne College. At Le Moyne Steward graduated as the career leader in strikeouts and innings pitched, and was drafted in the 39th round by the Angels.

“As a former player in the MAAC, this is familiar territory for me,” Steward said.

The 2001 Le Moyne Athlete of the Year, Steward was the MAAC Pitcher of the Year in 1999, after earning MAAC Rookie of the Year honors in 1998. At Gloucester Catholic Steward earned All-State and honorable mention All-America honors as a senior, leading his team to a national ranking of fifth.

“I have high expectations for our pitching staff as we work toward defending our MAAC Championship,” Steward said.

After two years in the Angels’ organization Steward pitched for the Camden River Sharks and the Atlantic City Surf, and was selected as the starting pitcher in the 2005 Atlantic League South Division All-Star game. “That experience brings instant credibility to our pitching program,” Davis said. “I am looking forward to working with him this year.”



Jim Maher

Jim Maher was named a volunteer assistant coach in October 2006.

“As the final component to the staff, Jim gives us head coaching experience with the ability to coach all phases of the game,” said head coach Barry Davis. “We are excited about again having him on the staff.”

A physical education teacher at Hamilton West High School for ten years, Maher compiled a 204-71 record as the Hamilton West head baseball coach. He coached the Bordentown American Legion baseball team in the summer and compiled a 169-80 record.

Maher coached the Nottingham 13-year old Babe Ruth team to the Championship Game of the 2007 World Series, and again advanced to the World Series in 2008. At Hamilton West Maher coached former Rider pitcher and current Baltimore Oriole James Hoey.

“I’m looking forward to helping Coach Davis to the top of the MAAC,” said Maher. “I’ve seen how hard he’s worked with this program and am happy to be a part of it.”

His combined coaching record at Hamilton West, Florence High School and American Legion is 349-140 (.714 winning percentage). He won ten league championships, including the 2000 New Jersey State Title, and was an eight-time Coach of the Year selection.

Maher played for the 1978 Steinert High School Group IV State Championship team, and went on to play at Mercer Community College and Atlantic Christian College. Maher earned a master’s degree in Administration from the College of New Jersey in 1986, after receiving his undergraduate degree from Barton College in 1984.

With the return of only 23 letterwinners from the team that only advanced to the 2008 NCAA Tournament, the Rider University baseball team looks to be ready to defend its Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Title. "This is only the deepest team we've had, the best team we've had, the most experienced team we've had," said head coach Barry Davis, now in his fifth season at Rider.

The Broncs return seven members of the starting line up and every pitcher who threw more than nine innings from the team that won the MAAC Championship Tournament to advance to the NCAA Regional in Fullerton, California.

"We have the same goal as last year," Davis said, "to make the MAAC tournament. Sure, we want to be a bit more competitive, maybe win more than 13 MAAC games, and maybe win 30-some games instead of 29, but the main goal is to make the tournament."

The returnees will be led by the co-captains, a pair of utility players, outfielder/relief pitcher/infielder James Hayes and catcher/first baseman/designated hitter Sean Olson. Both Hayes and Olson were named to the 2009 Brooks Wallace Player of the Year Watch List.

Hayes received honorable mention on the CollegeBaseball-Insider.com 2009 Preseason All-America Team as a utility player. Last season Hayes was the MAAC Championship Tournament MVP as well as the New Jersey Player of the Year. He earned American Baseball Coaches Association Second Team All-East Region team as a relief pitcher.

"Hayes will play right field unless we need him in center on in the infield," Davis said. "He'll close again but he shouldn't have to pitch every day, and he proved last year that when he does pitch he can go more than just the ninth inning."

Like Hayes, Olson is a preseason All-MAAC selection this year. "Sean will bat third in the line up to begin the season, no matter where he plays in the field," Davis said. Olson earned First Team All-MAAC honors in 2008 for the second year in a row and was also a First Team All-NJCBA selection for the second straight year, leading the Broncs in home runs, RBI, total bases, slugging percentage and on base percentage. His RBI total was the most for a Bronc since 2002.

Other returning starters include sophomore Mason Heyne at third base, sophomore John Ralston at shortstop, sophomore infielder Steve Galella, junior Matt McCollum, junior catcher Eric Woodrow, and senior outfielder Maurice Williams.

Heyne was named a Freshman All-American last year and earned MAAC All-Tournament team honors. Named to the New Jersey All-Rookie team, Heyne batted .353 against MAAC pitchers, best on the team, with 30 hits in 23 conference games. Heyne batted .332, second highest on the team, with 63 hits in 51 starts. Heyne led the Broncs with 18 doubles and was second on the team in runs batted in with 44.

"Mason had an outstanding freshman year," Davis said. "He was one of the most consistent players we had in all phases of the game."

Ralston returns after starting 55 games at shortstop as a rookie. He collected two hits, five assists and scored two runs in the MAAC Championship Game.

Galella was a member of the NJCBA All-Rookie Team, collecting 53 hits in 53 starts at second base, and turned a team-high 35 double plays. This year he will share the second base duties with sophomore

A.J. Albee, and will see some time at first base with McCollum.

Albee played in 38 games as a rookie, mostly as a defensive replacement, but collected three hits and two RBI in his first collegiate start.

McCollum was named to the MAAC All-Tournament team last year for his bat and his glove at first base. "Matt will also play the outfield for us," Davis said.

Woodrow started 28 games behind the plate last year and Rider was 17-11 in those games. "Woodrow missed fall ball due to injuries but he is strong at catching, throwing, blocking, and at the plate he's a good two-strike hitter," Davis said. Woodrow batted .367 with two outs last year, second best on the team.

Freshmen backstops Austin Straub and local product Chris Pierfy (Nottingham) will also add depth behind the plate. A four-time All-League catcher, pitcher and outfielder at Fayetteville-Manlius (NY) High School, Straub compiled a .340 career batting average with 113 hits and 78 runs batted in. "He is versatile and can play other positions as well," Davis said.

Junior Garrett Rugg returns as a middle infielder with 69 games under his belt.

"With Olson, McCollum and Galella we have some options," Davis said. "We also have Ryan Murphy, who red-shirted last year, to give us some left-handed power off the bench or play first or third or outfield. That's a pretty solid infield, even though there are no seniors."

Williams returns to left field where he has collected 151 hits in 153 games. Williams was the team's Most Improved Player last year, finishing third on the team in batting average. "Mo had a good year last year," Davis said.

Junior outfielders Nick Wojnowski and Darron Lattomus will also fight for playing time with sophomore Karl Johnston and freshman Brandon Cotten.

Wojnowski batted .310 in MAAC games last year and is a veteran of 83 Rider games. "Wojo had a good fall season and is having good preseason workouts," Davis said. "He could see time at DH or right field. Johnston has a plus arm and plus speed, so we'll see what he can do out there. Lattomus gives us some depth in center and left."

Depth will certainly not be a problem for the Broncs this year. "We'll be using 14, 15 guys at different positions and offensively we can go that deep," Davis said. "We have depth. We can go two deep and in some positions three deep and not really lose a lot."

The pitching corps is also solid, with the return of 12 healthy and experienced arms. "We certainly have some experience on the mound," Davis said. "I think we're pretty strong. We have very few on the staff who haven't pitched for us. We've got lefties, righties, hard throwers and soft throwers, some guys with good change ups, some with good curve balls. We've got a nice variety of arms."

The staff will be led by senior Jimmer Kennedy, the 2008 Bob Koehler Award winner as the team's Most Valuable Pitcher. "Jimmer has improved his secondary pitches," Davis said, "to the point where they are out pitches. He certainly has the velocity. He's pitched for us since his freshman year and he's pitched in the conference championship tournament. He's been around."

Kennedy enters his senior year with a career mark of 17-15, 15th best ever at Rider, including 14 MAAC wins.

Rounding out the top four starters are junior Kris Brown, senior Derek Caldwell and sophomore Patrick Devlin. Brown owns a 5-3 record as a Bronc with two saves but all of his appearances have been in relief. Last year his E.R.A. was fourth best on the team. "Brown gets an opportunity to start this year," Davis said. "He has one of the better arms on the team. Teams don't hit very well against him. (opponents batted .206 against Brown last year), at least not in short increments. This year we'll see if we can get more innings out of him."

Caldwell was the winning pitcher in the 2008 MAAC Title Game, his first victory as a starter since 2005 after sitting out most of 2006 and all of 2007 while recovering from "Tommy John" surgery. He pitched in 15 games last season, starting 10, and Rider was 6-4 in the 10 games he started. "Caldwell showed flashes of really being something special last year," Davis said. "He threw a great game at Rutgers and at Wofford and pitched well in the conference tournament."

Devlin pitched 10 games in relief before making six starts as a rookie. He started and pitched six innings against Siena in a MAAC playoff game, leaving the game with a 5-2 lead. "Devlin improved a great deal," Davis said. "I didn't think he was very good to start the year and he ended up starting the championship game and came out with a three-run lead. That's a pretty good improvement."

Other key pitchers include seniors Mike Petrowski and Dan Sasso, sophomores Mike Thomas, Nate Eppley and Jeff Giordano, and juniors Ryan Miller and Brian Herman.

Petrowski started 14 games last year, including the MAAC tournament opening win over Canisius, and saved the MAAC Title Game. "I think this year Petrowski could be the first out of the pen," Davis said. "We want to use him more than once a week. He is more valuable to the team than that. He can pitch back to back days effectively so I think we can use him a lot. I think he showed that at last year's tournament. He came in and did the job."

Thomas was a member of the NJCBA All-Rookie Team, finishing second on the team in wins and shared the team lead with 22 appearances, 18 in relief.

Kennedy, Brown and either Caldwell or Devlin will be the weekend starters to begin the season. "Our bullpen is deep with potential starters if we need to make changes," Davis said.

The schedule begins with weekend trips in February to Maryland Eastern Shore and East Tennessee State, and March features trips to VMI, Charlotte and Gardner Webb in North Carolina. "A lot can change during these 15 games," Davis said.

The MAAC schedule begins March 21-22 at Niagara. The Broncs also play at Marist, Siena and Manhattan, while hosting Iona, Canisius, Fairfield and Saint Peter's. "Canisius is clearly the favorite to win the MAAC," Davis said. "They have good players and all of their pitching back after finishing first last year. We'll try to win every

series. If you do that you are in the playoffs. Our goals will be don't get swept, and sweep when you can."

For the second straight year Rider will host the four-team MAAC tournament at Waterfront Park, home of the AA Trenton Thunder. "Hosting for the first time last year, it was important to win that first game in front of a nice crowd," Davis said. "We played well against a good team. We were so relieved to get in the tournament, once we got in we relaxed and that allowed us to play well."

Rider didn't settle for just making the tournament, winning three of four games to win the MAAC Title and advance to the NCAA tournament. "I feel it is harder to make the tournament than to win the tournament," Davis said. "You have to play well all year to get in. Once you are in you only have to play well for three days."

Rider's enrollment of more than 5,800 consists of approximately 4,600 full- and part-time undergraduate and almost 1,200 graduate students studying on campuses in Lawrenceville and Princeton, New Jersey. The University is comprised of four academic units - the College of Business Administration; the College of Liberal Arts, Education, and Sciences; the College of Continuing Studies; and Westminster College of the Arts- and offers undergraduate programs in 60 areas and graduate programs in 17 specialties.

Ninety-six percent of Rider's 236 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees or the highest credential in their field. Rider's faculty are award-winning teachers and researchers dedicated to excellence in teaching, learning and scholarship and 12 have been named Fulbright Scholars. Rider's classes are small and interactive with a student-faculty ratio of 13:1. Rider's curricula balance theory and practice, and emphasize learning by doing through more than 1,000 student internships or field experiences, community service learning placements, and undergraduate research fellowships. Westminster's internationally acclaimed choirs perform with world-famous orchestras and conductors in the United States and abroad, further demonstrating Rider's commitment to experiential learning.

Rider is currently ranked in the top tier of northern regional universities under the designation of "Best Universities - Master's" by *U.S. News and World Report* and has been included in the last five editions of *The Princeton Review's* Best 351 Colleges, its list of the nation's top 10 percent of colleges and universities.

The University's many specialized accreditations attest to the quality of its academic programs. Rider is among the select business schools to have attained AACSB (Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business) accreditation and one of only two schools in New Jersey to hold the specialized AACSB accreditation in accounting. El-



ementary and secondary education programs and their applicable graduate programs on both campuses are accredited by the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE). The undergraduate and graduate music programs of Westminster Choir College are accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music (NASM). In addition, Rider's graduate counseling services program in the School of Education holds the Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Education Programs (CACREP) national accreditation. Rider University is regionally accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools.

Rider University is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division I for both men's and women's athletics. The University offers 20 varsity sports - 10 men's and 10 women's teams - 18 in the competitive Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) with field hockey in the Northeast Conference (NEC) and wrestling in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA).

ACADEMIC ENHANCEMENT

Areté

With the start of the 1990-91 academic school year, Rider University implemented its innovative Arete Program for all student athletes. Arete refers to the ancient Greek ideal of a balanced striving for excellence in all areas of life.

The purpose of the program, which has been detailed in both *The New York Times* and the *Times of Trenton* is to help student-athletes develop in all areas of their lives, not just on the playing fields or in the classroom.

The Arete Program endeavors to foster skills and habits that will benefit students throughout their lives. Rider faculty and staff join experts from the community at large in volunteering their time and insights to this innovative program.

Subjects of the seminars include time management, stress management, sports nutrition, substance abuse, communication skills, study skills, training techniques, HIV, etiquette/good manners, interview techniques, resume writing, and life after Rider.

STEP-Student Transitional Education Program

During the 1993-94 academic year, the Rider department of athletics developed STEP for varsity athletics. STEP provides individual and group tutoring as well as study tables that are mandatory for certain stu-

dent-athletes. STEP also coordinates progress reports and monitors the student-athletes' academic progress, while providing workshops on such topics as library skills, test taking and note taking. In 2003 Rider added its first full-time Academic Support Coordinator, Sonya Hurt.

Team Mentor

Through the mentor program, established in the fall of 1994, a Rider faculty member or administrator is paired with a varsity athletic team. The mentor is there for support, advice, and cheerleading, as well as other non-coaching duties. The mentor program opens communication lines between faculty/staff members and athletes, and gives the student-athlete another person in the Rider community to turn to for help or guidance.

Student Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC)

Comprised of one student-athlete from each of Rider's varsity teams, the Student Athlete Advisory Council meets monthly to discuss various student-welfare issues and to organize ways for student-athletes to become involved in the community. Through the Advisory Council, Rider student-athletes have organized toy drives and served meals to the needy at Thanksgiving.

Hall of Fame

15 former baseball players and two former baseball coaches are now among the 77 members of the Rider Athletics Hall of Fame.

Tom Petroff was inducted in 1990

"Coach" was also one of the six initial inductees into the Rider Athletics Hall of Fame in 1990. Coach Petroff is a member of the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame and guided Rider to the College World Series in 1967, where the Broncos finished fifth in the nation, the highest national finish of any Rider team in any sport. He is one of only five coaches to coach two different teams to the CWS, having also taken Northern Colorado in the 1970s.

Jack Madden '65 was inducted in 1990

Madden was one of the six initial inductees into the Rider Athletics Hall of Fame in 1990. A long-time referee in the National Basketball Association, Madden still holds the Rider record for pitching victories (20-5) and career strikeouts (220), and he graduated from Rider as the basketball career leader in points and rebounds.

Rich Giallella '70 was inducted in 1992

Giallella was the sophomore leadoff hitter and centerfielder on the 1967 Rider team that advanced to the College World Series. As a junior on the soccer team he scored a Rider-record 16 goals. Giallella was selected by the Philadelphia Phillies in the ninth round of the 1969 draft, and went on to earn MVP honors in the Carolina (AAA) league. The head coach of the 1992 Steinert High School team that won the New Jersey Group II Baseball Championship, Giallella is currently one of the top college basketball officials in the East.

Earl Lombardo '67 was inducted in 1993

As a freshman he tied the Rider record with five triples in 1964, and had a team-high 22 RBI and 50 total bases. He led the '65 team in RBI as a sophomore and the 1966 team in hits as a junior. He finished his Rider career second in hits, third in career batting average, third in runs scored, third in career home runs and fourth in career RBI. He was drafted by the Chicago Cubs and played one year professionally before entering the Army.

Leo Chester '57 was inducted in 1994

Still the Rider record holder for career pitching wins (26) and complete games (19). Chester compiled a 26-7 record for the Broncos in the 1950s and led his four Rider teams to a 53-22 combined record. A fine all-around athlete, Chester ranks tenth at Rider in career points scored on the basketball court with 1,332, a Rider record when he graduated in 1957. He also helped Rider win 20 basketball games as a senior, a first for Rider.

Ed Whited '86 was inducted in 1996

Whited still holds the Rider career records for hits (208), runs batted in (151), runs scored (141) and is tied for the home run title (33). A career .348 hitter, Whited was twice an All-ECC selection and earned second team All-East. Whited led the Broncos to their first three conference titles and three trips to the NCAA Regionals. Upon graduation, Whited played professionally for five seasons and reached the major leagues with the Atlanta Braves in 1989.

Jeff Kunkel was inducted in 1997

A three-year varsity performer and All-American shortstop for the Broncos, Jeff Kunkel went on to become the third player selected in the first round of the 1983 amateur baseball draft. A three-time All-East Coast Conference shortstop and a three-time All-New Jersey all-star, Kunkel still ranks fourth all-time at Rider in career batting average, and set the double play record as a Rider rookie. Kunkel played 10 year in the major leagues, eight with the Texas Rangers. In 1989 Kunkel batted .270 in 108 games with eight home runs.

Ken Kremer was inducted in 1998

A two-time All-America selection, Kremer was named the MVP of the NCAA Northeast Regional Tournament in 1987, leading Rider to the final 16 teams in the national tournament, one win away from the College World Series. In the NCAA Regional, Kremer batted .565 in five games with six home runs and nine RBI, while collecting a win and a save on the mound. In the 1987 ECC Tournament, Kremer was the Co-MVP with 4 home runs and 13 RBI in five games, collecting 6 RBI in the Title Game (13-6 score). For the 1987 season, Kremer batted .400 with 64 hits (then a Rider record), 56 RBI (still a Rider record), 51 runs scored (still Rider record) and 17 home runs (still a Rider record). In 1988 he broke his finger and only hit six home runs, but batted .479 to win the national batting title with 58 hits. His career batting average of .384 is a Rider record. Kremer signed a pro contract with the Milwaukee Brewers organization after his junior year.

Olimpio Pacchioli '51 was inducted in 1999

The first great Rider baseball player, Olimpio Pacchioli graduated as the Rider career leader in hits with 105, a record that stood for 23 years, and the Rider record for runs batted in with 81, a record that stood for 24 years. Named Rider's Most Outstanding Athlete in 1951, "Patch" was offered professional contracts after his junior season, but came back to Rider to earn his degree.

Upon graduation, Patch returned to his home of Martin's Creek, PA, to star in a semi-professional baseball league. He later went on to be president of the league, helping it flourish into an 11-team league that drew thousands of spectators to games. Now CEO

of the O.R. Pacchioli Insurance Agency, Patch has remained a close friend of Rider athletics through his support.

Puggy Malone '50 was inducted in 2000

George "Puggy" Malone played soccer from 1946-49, serving as captain, and was the leading scorer and most valuable player. He was named the outstanding male athlete in his graduating class and was selected to tryout for the 1948 Olympic Team, reaching the Eastern Finals. He played five years of professional ball for the Philadelphia American Soccer Club (1947-48 American Champions). In baseball, he was a captain, "MVP" and leading hitter who established a school mark with 22 stolen bases in 16 games (without getting thrown out). During one season, he stole home three times. He is a member of the Mercer County Soccer Hall of Fame.

John Wagner '67 was inducted in 2002

Wagner was an All-American soccer player who was also the captain and starting catcher on the Rider baseball team that placed fifth in the nation at the College World Series. Named the MVP of MAC Northern Division, Wagner was a defender who led Rider to five shutout victories in '66 and went on to play professional soccer. Wagner had earned honorable mention All-East as a junior on '65 soccer team and, after his junior year, was one of 75 players from the East invited to the Olympic tryout. He made the final 15 before going to the national tryout for the Olympics. After Rider Wagner became a renowned coach, earning New Jersey Coach of the Year honors while winning several New Jersey High School soccer titles at Hightstown High.

Bob Koehler was inducted in 2003

Bob Koehler was the horse that the 1967 Rider baseball team rode to the College World Series, where the Broncos finished fifth in the nation. An All-American pitcher with a 10-1 record, Koehler was drafted by the Washington Senators. Koehler used his pitching arm to play "A" level minor league baseball for just three weeks before being moved up to "AA", just two steps away from the major leagues.

Sonny Pittaro was inducted in 2005

The all-time winningest coach of any sport at Rider, Sonny Pittaro retired from Rider with 766 wins, nine conference championships, eight NCAA Regional appearances and 10 Coach of the Year awards, while sending 41 players on to the professional ranks. He served two three-year terms on the prestigious NCAA Baseball Committee, and served as president of the 7,000 member American Baseball Coaches Association. In January of 2005 he was inducted into the ABCA Hall of Fame at the National Convention in Nashville, TN.

Ed Horowitz '89 was inducted in 2006

The three-time East Coast Conference baseball Scholar Athlete of the Year, Horowitz helped Rider reach the Final 16 in the 1987 NCAA Tournament and was named to the NCAA Regional All-Tournament Team as a sophomore. Horowitz graduated second in career hits, career home runs, career runs scored, career batting average and career RBI, and held the record for doubles in a season and home runs in a season by a catcher. Rider won three ECC titles in his four years. Horowitz was the MVP of the 1988 and 1989 Rider teams and played several seasons in the Baltimore Orioles organization.

Bob O'Connor '84 was inducted in 2007

Bob O'Connor played either shortstop or second base in every Rider baseball game for three consecutive years before signing a professional contract with the San Francisco Giants in 1981. A two-time team MVP, O'Connor left as the Rider career leader in hits (132 in 104 games), batting average (.338) and RBI (93), and was second in career runs (93).

Kevin Barry '01 was inducted 2009

Kevin Barry reached the major leagues in 2006. He pitched in 19 major league games. He pitched 25 innings and struck out 19 and had a major league earned run average of 5.61 in 2006. Barry was drafted twice while at Rider, as a junior (15th round by Oakland) and again as a senior (14th round by Atlanta). He graduated with a 20-12 career record, fifth best ever at Rider. His 20 wins is tied for fourth highest ever at Rider. He set a single season Rider record with 91 strikeouts and a career record with 262 strikeouts. as a junior was named All-MAAC and All-New Jersey. He was named the MAAC South Pitcher of the Year in 2000 as a junior.

Jason Koehler '97 was inducted 2009

In his three seasons at Rider Jason Koehler set the Bronc career home run record of 33, which still stands today. Koehler set a Rider record with 17 homeruns in one season, finishing 19th in the nation in home runs per game. In three seasons, Koehler owned a career batting average of .314 with 161 hits in 147 games, 39 doubles and 117 runs batted in. Koehler earned All-America honors in 1995 and earned GTE CoSIDA Academic All-American honors in the 1995 season, the first Bronc to achieve that. Koehler also earned All-East Region, All-ECAC, All-NJ, and All-NEC honors in his junior year. In 1996, he was drafted in the 17th round by the Toronto Blue Jays and played for the St. Catherinas Stompers of the New York-Penn League.


