Credentials

Radio

Visiting radio stations will have access to a visitor's phone line at a charge of \$100.00 or on a reciprocal home-and-home agreement for the primary outlet of the visiting team. Other outlets will need clearance and must make special arrangements through the sports information office.

Parking

Free parking is available in lots directly behind Alumni Gymnasium on the Rider campus. There is no reserved parking, but public parking is near and sufficient.

Press Row

Press row is located on the baseline in front of the stage. Seating will be marked. All media representatives requiring a seat along press row must inform the sports information office in advance. If your name does not appear, see Bud Focht. Please do not sit in a seat with someone else's name on it.

Press Room

The press room is located in the Shapiro Conference Room on the second floor of the Student Recreation Center, the building adjacent to Alumni Gym. Pre-game notes and media guides from both teams are available in the press room. Telephone lines, electrical outlets and well as wireless Internet is available.

Directions to Rider

From New York and North Jersey:

From the New Jersey Turnpike: Take the NJ Turnpike South to Exit 7A (I-195 West). Follow I-195 West to the exit for I-295 North (Princeton). I-295 North will become I-95 South. Take Exit 7A off of I-95 South to U.S. Route 206 South (Trenton). Rider is a quarter mile on the right.

From U.S. Route 1 South: take the exit for I-95 South (sign says "To Pennsylvania"). Bear right at junction, following signs for I-95 South (Pennsylvania). Take exit 7A off of I-95 South to U.S. Route 206 South (Trenton). Rider is a quarter mile on the right.

From Pennsylvania:

Take I-95 North, straight over the Delaware River into New Jersey. Take Exit 7A off of I-95 to U.S. Route 206 South (Trenton). Rider is a quarter mile on the right.

From the Pennsylvania Turnpike: take the PA Turnpike east to Exit 28 (Philadelphia) and take U.S. Route 1 North to I-95 North. Continue on I-95 North, straight over the Delaware River into New Jersey. Take Exit 7A off of I-95 to U.S. Route 206 South (Trenton). Rider is a quarter mile on the right.

From the South:

Take I-295 North. I-295 North will become I-95 South. Continue on I-95 South and take Exit 7A off I-95 South to U.S. Route 206 South (Trenton). Rider is a quarter mile on the right.

From the East:

Take the Garden State Parkway to Exit 98 (I-195 West). Follow I-195 West to the exit for I-295 North (Princeton). I-295 North will become I-95 South. Take Exit 7A off of I-95 South to U.S. Route 206 South (Trenton). Rider is a quarter mile on the right.

Rider's enrollment of more than 5,800 consists of approximately 4,600 full- and part-time undergraduate and almost 1,200 graduate students studying on campuses in Lawrenceville and Princeton, New Jersey. The University is comprised of four academic units – the College of Business Administration; the College of Liberal Arts, Education, and Sciences; the College of Continuing Studies; and Westminster Choir College – and offers undergraduate programs in 60 areas and graduate programs in 17 specialties.

Ninety-two percent of Rider's 235 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees or the highest credential in their field. Rider's faculty are award-winning teachers and researchers dedicated to excellence in teaching, learning and scholarship and 12 have been named Fulbright Scholars. Rider's classes are small and interactive with a student-faculty ratio of 13:1. Rider's curricula balance theory and practice, and emphasize learning by doing through more than 1,000 student internships or field experiences, community service learning placements, and undergraduate research fellowships. Westminster's internationally acclaimed choirs perform with world-famous orchestras and conductors in the United States and abroad, further demonstrating Rider's commitment to experiential learning.

Rider is currently ranked in the top tier of northern regional universities under the designation of "Best Universities – Master's" by U.S. News and World Report and has been included in the last five editions of The Princeton Review's Best 351 Colleges, its list of the nation's top 10 percent of colleges and universities.

The University's many specialized accreditations attest to the quality of its academic programs. Rider is among the select busi-

ness schools to have attained AACSB (Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business) accreditation and one of only two schools in New Jersey to hold the specialized AACSB accreditation in accounting. Elementary and secondary education programs and their applicable graduate programs on both campuses are accredited by the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE). The undergraduate and graduate music programs of Westminster Choir College are accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music (NASM). In addition, Rider's graduate counseling services program in the School of Education holds the Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Education Programs (CACREP) national accreditation. Rider University is regionally accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools.

Rider University is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division I for both men's and women's athletics. The University offers 20 varsity sports – 10 men's and 10 women's teams – 18 in the competitive Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) with field hockey in the Northeast Conference (NEC) and wrestling in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA).



PRESIDENT MORDECHAI ROZANSKI

Mordechai Rozanski became Rider University's sixth president on August 1, 2003.

In his first three years at Rider, President Rozanski has undertaken an ambitious program of institution renewal that is leading the University to the next level of prominence and excellence. Last year, he oversaw completion of a comprehensive and highly participatory strategic planning process providing the framework for Rider's renewal. The plan builds on the University's 140-year legacy of distinguished achievements and is strengthening the institution's academic stature, student life, financial robustness and reputation.

President Rozanski envisions Rider as a leader in American higher education celebrated for educating talented students for citizenship, life and career success in a diverse and interdependent world. As part of this vision, Rider will achieve distinctiveness by focusing on students first, by cultivating leadership skills, by affirming teaching and learning that bridges the theoretical and the practical and by fostering a culture of academic excellence.

The most visible evidence of Rider's renewal is the \$28 million in facilities projects completed last fall with the opening of the new residence hall and the completion of the first two phases of the new Student Recreation Center (SRC). The residence hall, along with new three-story additions to adjoining Hill and Ziegler residence halls, provide 186 new beds and apartment-style suites for students. The 55,000 sq. ft. SRC houses a 3,600 sq. ft. fitness center, three multi-purpose playing courts, a 165-meter elevated jogging track, and student game room. The facility also includes offices and conference rooms for Rider's expanded intramural and club sports programs and camp and conference services, an atrium connecting the SRC to Alumni Gym, Rider's primary athletics facility, and a café and lounge area.

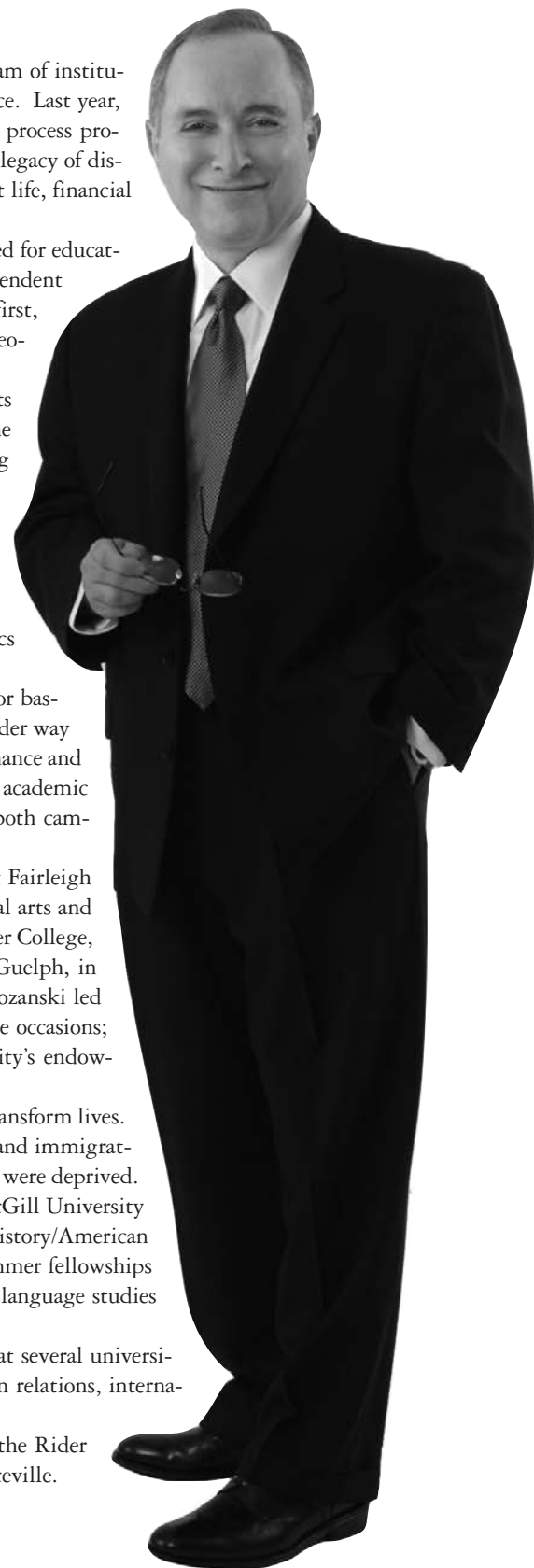
Planning is under way for the third phase of the SRC that will include a new arena for basketball, volleyball and wrestling as well as renovation of Alumni Gym. Plans are also under way for a new academic complex for Westminster Choir College, complete with large performance and rehearsal spaces, classrooms and practice rooms. These are in addition to a number of academic and student life enhancements that have been completed over the past three years on both campuses.

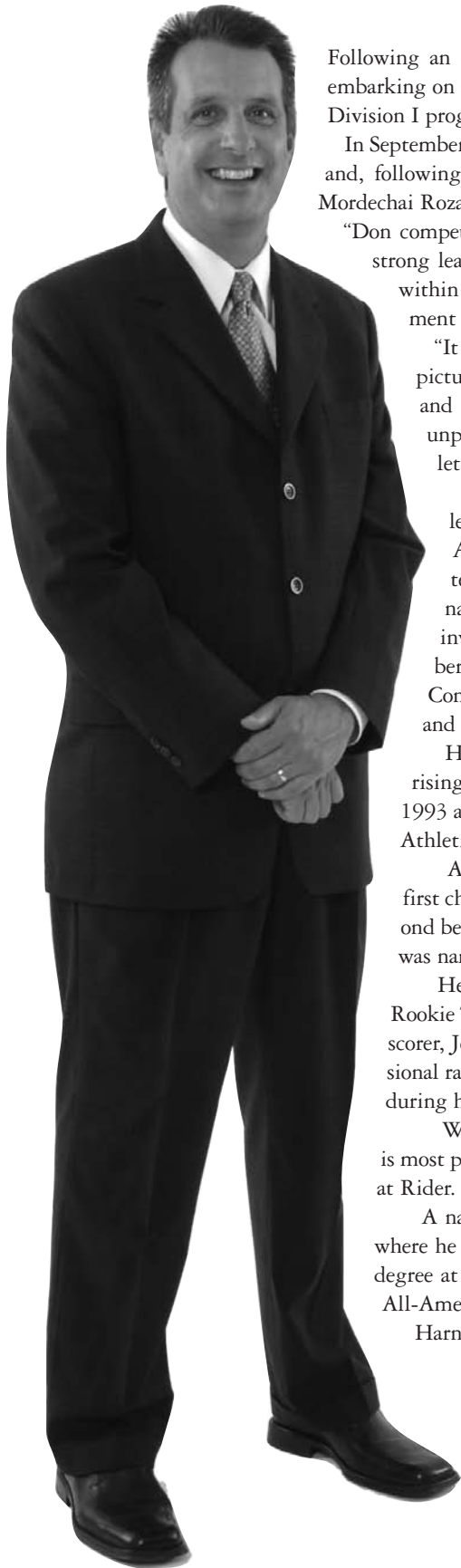
President Rozanski's 30-year record of higher education leadership includes service at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, New Jersey, from 1986 to 1991, first as dean of liberal arts and then as provost and vice president of academic affairs. He also served as provost of Wagner College, on Staten Island, New York, until his appointment as president of the University of Guelph, in Ontario, Canada, where he served from 1993 to 2003. During his tenure, President Rozanski led Guelph to national prominence as Canada's top-rated comprehensive university on three occasions; and two successful capital campaigns, exceeding \$100 million, increasing the university's endowment by 300 percent.

President Rozanski's life story evokes his philosophy that education has the power to transform lives. Born in Poland, the son of Holocaust survivors, his family fled to Israel, lived in France and immigrated to Montreal in 1953. His parents' greatest wish was for him to get the education they were deprived. He was the first in the family to complete elementary school and went on to study at McGill University in Montreal, earning a B.A. in Chinese history. He then earned a Ph.D. in Chinese history/American East Asian Relations at the University of Pennsylvania in 1974. He variously held summer fellowships at Columbia University and Stanford University and a year-long fellowship in Chinese language studies and research in Hong Kong.

President Rozanski held the rank of professor and taught Chinese and Asian history at several universities and colleges. He has published and lectured on Chinese history, Chinese-American relations, international education, higher education, and other related topics.

He and his wife Bonnie reside in Betta House, the President's residence adjacent to the Rider campus in Lawrenceville, N.J. Their son, Daniel, and his family live nearby in Lawrenceville.





Following an outstanding eight year career as Rider's head men's basketball coach, Don Harnum is embarking on a new challenge, leading the Rider department of athletics and the University's 20 NCAA Division I programs, 355 athletes and 63 administrators, coaches and support staff.

In September 2005, Harnum was named interim director of athletics upon the retirement of Curt Blake and, following a national search where more than 50 candidates applied for the position, President Mordechai Rozanski officially named Harnum Rider's new director of athletics in April 2006.

"Don competed for and earned the position," President Rozanski said. "He demonstrated vision and strong leadership qualities and was impressive in his understanding of the importance of athletics within Rider's strategic plan. I look forward to working with Don as he leads the athletics department during this exciting time of renewal for the University.

"It was difficult to leave the sidelines," Harnum said. "But having been a part of the bigger picture for the last year, I feel I can make a positive contribution to Rider, the athletics program, and most importantly, to the lives of our more than 350 student-athletes. This is a time of unprecedented growth at the University, and it is exciting to be a part of it as director of athletics."

Harnum coordinated several initiatives during his term as interim athletics director. He led the creation of the new Athletics Hall of Fame display, oversaw renovations to the Alumni Gym lobby, established a new post-game media protocol, improved Web site content and game note presentations, hired Rider's first-ever strength and conditioning coordinator and increased corporate sponsorships and donor support. Meanwhile, he has also been involved in the planning and design of a new Rider athletics arena and has served as a member of the Mercer Sports Organizing Committee when Rider and the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) hosted the 2006 NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Tournament First and Second Rounds at Trenton's Sovereign Bank Arena.

Harnum joined Rider's athletics department in 1989 as an assistant men's basketball coach rising steadily through the ranks since his arrival on campus. He became associate head coach in 1993 and head men's basketball coach in 1997 following the departure of Kevin Bannon, a Rider Athletics Hall of Fame coach.

As head coach, Harnum led the Broncos to two MAAC titles in his last four years and to the first championship game appearance in Rider's MAAC history. Rider basketball compiled the second best winning percentage in MAAC play during Harnum's eight seasons as head coach and he was named MAAC Coach of the Year in 2002.

He recruited and coached 2002 MAAC Player of the Year, Mario Porter, and recruited 13 All-Rookie Team members, including 2002 MAAC Rookie of the Year and eventual 2,000-point career scorer, Jerry Johnson. Porter and Johnson join several of Harnum's graduates playing in the professional ranks overseas. Harnum also guided his team to its first National Invitation Tournament bid during his inaugural year as head coach. Harnum compiled an overall record of 127-104.

While wins, championships and post-season awards are always great achievements, Harnum is most proud to have established a 100 percent graduation rate for seniors during his coaching years at Rider.

A native of Selingsgrove, Pa., Harnum received his master's degree at Trenton State College, where he was a graduate assistant coach and later an assistant coach. Harnum earned his bachelor's degree at Susquehanna University where he was a First Team All-America selection, an Academic All-American and an NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship recipient.

Harnum and his wife, Janet, have two children, Abigayle and Lucas.

TANK WAHLMANN '02

Tank Wahlmann '02 is a shining example of Rider's academic success. Wahlmann was on the MAAC All-Academic Team for three straight years (freshmen are not eligible) and when he graduated with a degree in finance, he carried a cumulative GPA of 3.6. "From the first day you step on campus it's evident that the coaches take a personal interest in not only bringing out your best on the court, but also in the classroom," said Wahlmann, now an analyst with Credit Suisse First Boston. "The program's formula for success is having student-athletes who work hard and don't cut corners, combined with the support of the coaches, administration and other faculty around campus."

When players commit to play at Rider University, they are asked to set two important goals - to work as hard as they can on the basketball court and to work equally as hard in the classroom. Judging by the Broncs' accomplishments, the players are more than living up to their promises.

100% Graduation Rate

- Over the last two decades, every Rider men's basketball player who has completed four years of eligibility has graduated.
- Both the coaching staff and the players take just as much pride in that perfect statistic as they do in their winning percentage.

Academic Success and Monitoring

- Under the direction of Coach Dempsey, the Rider men's basketball program has never had an academically ineligible player.
- At Rider University, the basketball coaching staff takes an active and vested interest in each player's academic affairs. The coaches sincerely believe that the success of the program begins with academic success. Because of this strong belief, the coaches take an active role in monitoring each student-athlete.

- Each assistant coach is directly responsible for monitoring three student-athletes. It is the assistant coach's responsibility to know exactly where his players stand in each class and to know when each assignment is due and when tests are approaching. This is done through constant communication with each of the players' professors and their academic advisor.
- Because of this active monitoring role, the coaches can more effectively manage each student-athlete's academic progress. In addition, by knowing the timetable of each player's class responsibilities, it is easy for the coaching staff to help guide them toward academic success.
- Members of the coaching staff also have weekly individual meetings with each student-athlete. These weekly meetings are designed to allow time for the players and coaches to openly communicate and usually cover topics such as academics, family issues and social issues.

Student Transitional Educational Program (STEP)

- During the 1993-94 academic year, the Rider Department of Athletics developed the Student Transitional Educational Program (STEP) for varsity student-athletes.
- Under the direction of the coordinator for academic support, STEP provides individual and group tutoring and study halls that are mandatory for certain student-athletes depending on their GPA.
- STEP also coordinates the regular personal progress reports and monitors each student-athletes' academic progress while providing workshops on such topics as test taking, note taking and time management.

Grade Monitoring Procedure

- Grades are monitored twice a semester through forms completed by each professor regarding attendance, quizzes and test grades and class participation.
- Mid-term deficiencies and semester grades are monitored via report through the office of the coordinator of academic support. These reports are reviewed by the coordinator and the respective coach.
- Student-athletes meet with the coordinator of academic support on a regular basis for academic progress review and plans are devised when deficiencies have surfaced.

Tutoring

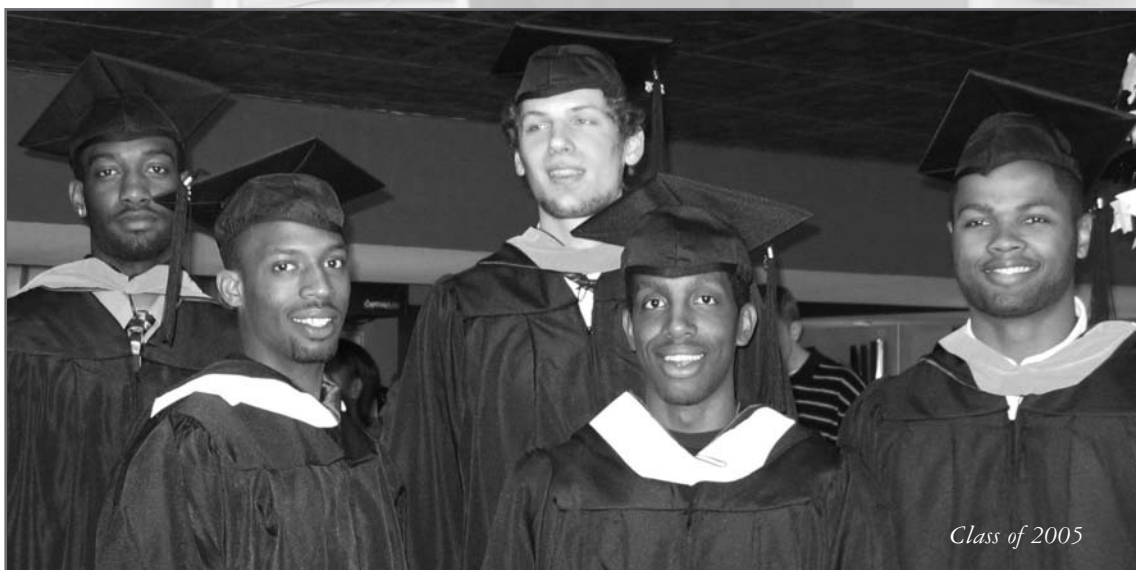
- Tutors are available to assist all student-athletes and individual and group sessions are available upon request.
- Appointments for tutorial assistance are arranged by the coordinator of academic support.

Study Hall

- Student-athletes with a GPA of 2.5 or below as well as all freshmen are required to attend study hall five nights per week.
- Study hall is monitored by one of the assistant coaches and takes place in the library.
- If a student-athlete is struggling in a particular class and/or needs additional help or time to prepare for a test, an assistant coach will help the student-athlete make contact with a tutor.

Bi-Weekly Coaches Meetings

- To provide additional academic support and guidance to the student-athletes in the men's basketball program, weekly meetings between individual players and the coaching staff are a requirement.
- Every Wednesday, each player will sit down with the coaches to discuss academic progress and other important issues. These individual meetings are a great way for the players and coaches to discuss personal matters.
- The coaching staff feels these meetings are a big reason why Rider men's basketball has never had an academically ineligible player.



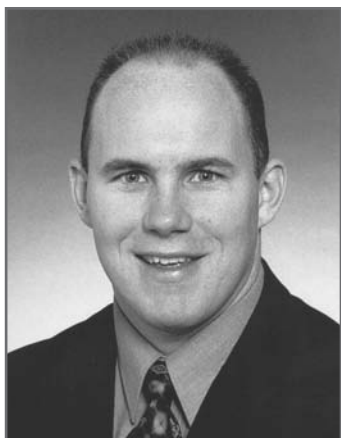
"It is very important to our coaching staff that each player takes pride in their academic performance," said Tommy Dempsey, head coach. "We try to identify players during the recruiting process that are driven not only to be great basketball players while they are here at Rider, but also great students."

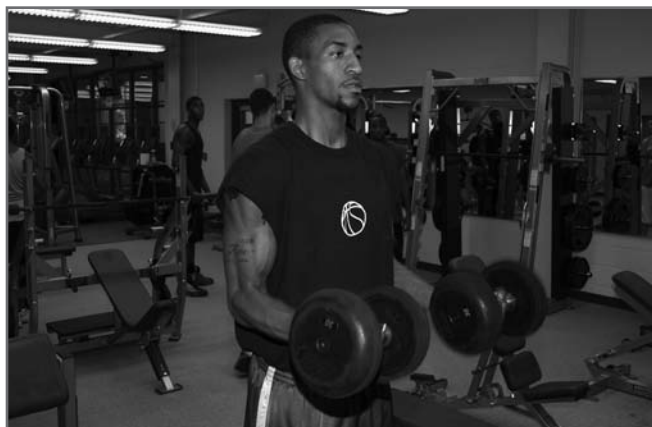
Strength and conditioning have become an important part of the game today. In order to realize your potential as a player, you must not only improve your skill work, but you must improve physically. At Rider, we have set in place a strength and conditioning program to help our players reach their full potential as players.

The end result of this program will make each athlete stronger, quicker, faster and injury free. Our program is designed to work during the pre-season, in-season and off-season. The sets, reps, number of training days, rest time and total exercise can be changed to suit any time of year.

Strength & Conditioning Three Main Parts:

1. Strength training
2. Plyometric training
3. Nutrition

This program is implemented and overseen under the guidance of Mike McNulty. Mike, a certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist and personal trainer, works exclusively with the men's basketball players at Rider.

ATHLETICS STRENGTH & CONDITIONING CENTER



The Fall 2005 opening of the Student Recreation Center provided Rider University with the opportunity to relocate recreational fitness activities from the Maurer Center and consolidate strength and conditioning training for its student-athletes by utilizing the space formerly occupied as the Rider Fitness Center.

To convert it into a state-of-the-art facility for all 20 of Rider's NCAA Division I varsity athletics teams, major renovations took place. Those renovations included: the removal of one wall and expansion of the facility from 2,600 to 4,200 square feet; the purchase of new equipment customized with the Rider logo; installa-

tion of a quiet and energy-efficient central air conditioning system; new flooring, a drop ceiling and lighting; improved circuit training flow from station to station; the transformation of the entrance to the facility; attractively painting all the walls in the Rider University color scheme; and strategically placing logos on the walls to identify the facility as an athletics strength and conditioning center.

This facility now rivals any mid-major strength and conditioning center in the country and will allow Rider to enhance the competitive advantage of its existing programs.

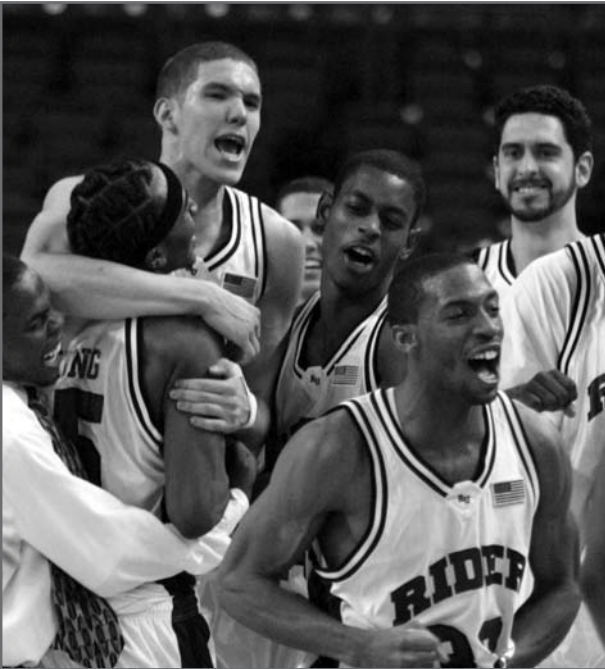

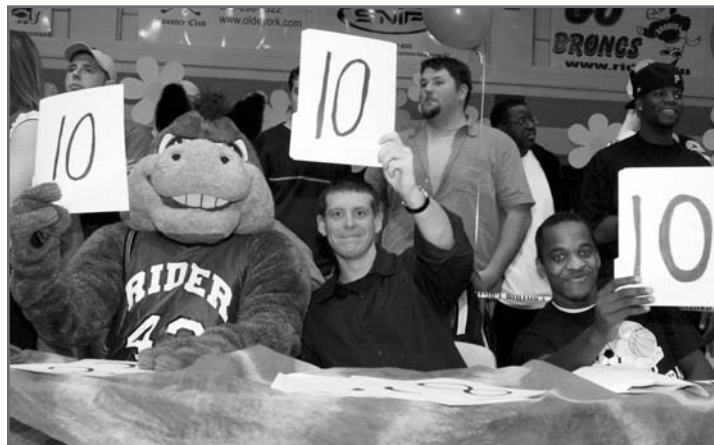

HEAD COACH TOMMY DEMPSEY

Tommy Dempsey was named the head coach of the Rider University men's basketball team in April of 2006, after serving the 2005-2006 season as the interim head coach. It was an easy decision for the Rider administration to make.

Since taking his place on the Rider bench as an assistant coach prior to the 2003-2004 season, Dempsey has shown that he was destined for this job. That proved evident his very first season. Having never lost a home game as a head coach (46-0), Dempsey continued that streak as the Rider assistant coaches took over the team trailing MAAC champion Manhattan by the score of 11-2, and won at the Sovereign Bank Arena in the final week of the 2003-04 season.

Dempsey continued his role as assistant and proved to be an important courtside consultant to then Head Coach Don Harnum, before Harnum took on the administrative role as Rider's director of athletics.

"I was very excited to be able to name Tommy Dempsey as the head men's basketball coach," said Harnum, who served in that role at Rider from 1997 to 2005. "He is a great fit for Rider because of his regional recruiting contacts and his working relationship with our current group of players. There is no doubt in my mind he will attack this job with a passion and energy that is worthy of the proud tradition of Rider basketball."

Dempsey, 32, is the third youngest head basketball coach on the Division I level of the NCAA, behind Dane Fife (25), the head coach at the Indiana University Purdue University at Fort Wayne, and Jeff Capel (30), the head coach at Virginia Commonwealth.

"I am very honored to be the next head basketball coach at Rider University," Dempsey said upon his hiring in April. "I feel very fortunate and I am so thankful that (Rider) President (Mordechai) Rozanski and our athletic director, Don Harnum, feel comfortable enough to allow me to move this program forward. I will work tirelessly to reward their decision to name me as the next head coach in a program with such great tradition."

Last year Dempsey returned to the head coaching ranks, where he has experienced nothing but success in the past. Dempsey recorded his first win at Rider on November 26, a 71-64 victory over Boston University. The 2006 Broncs had four freshmen and a sophomore among the top eight players on the team and produced an All-MAAC selection (Jason Thompson) and a MAAC All-Rookie Team member (Lamar Johnson).

As a head coach, Dempsey has taken two different institutions to the NJCAA Final Four. In three years as head coach on the junior college level, Dempsey compiled an 88-12 record and was twice a finalist for National Coach of the Year honors.

At Lackawanna College, Dempsey reached the Division II National Title Game in 2003 and was the Region 19 and District 9 Coach of the Year, taking a team that was not in the preseason top 40 and finishing National Runner-Up with a school-record 33 wins.

In 2001 and 2002, Dempsey was the Region 19 and District 6 Coach of the Year at Keystone College. He took Keystone College to the 2002 Division III Final Four with a school-record 29 wins. He took over an 11-12 team and went 55-8 over the next two seasons and reached the NJCAA Division III National Tournament, earning Eastern Pennsylvania College Coach of the Year honors in 2001.

Dempsey began his head coaching career at age 24 at Wyoming Seminary Preparatory School in Kingston, Pa., in 1999. Dempsey is a former assistant coach to Frank Marcinek at Susquehanna University where he was a former player. Dempsey was a three-year letter-winner in basketball and team captain in 1996-97 at Susquehanna.

Dempsey received his bachelor's degree from Susquehanna University and master's degree from Bloomsburg University. Dempsey came to Rider from Scranton, Pa. with his wife Amy and children Tommy and Emily and currently resides in Bucks County, Pa.

What is your coaching philosophy?

My coaching philosophy centers around building a basketball program that everyone associated with Rider University can be proud of. We try to accomplish this by recruiting the type of student-athletes that can be successful both on the court, in the classroom, and as members of the campus community. As coaches we take pride in constantly challenging our players to become better basketball players, better students, and better people while they are here with us. If our players win championships on the court, graduate, and go on and become productive members of society, then we are doing our job as coaches.

What is your recruiting philosophy?

Recruiting is the key to running a successful college basketball program. I believe that the head coach has to do the bulk of the recruiting with the support of the assistants, not the other way around. Our goals in recruiting are to identify players as early as possible that we believe can be successful student-athletes at Rider and to build relationships with the student-athletes, their families, coaches, teachers, guidance counselors, and anyone else who is important to them. It is important to attract players who not only fit the academic profile of the school, but also have the ability and desire to develop as basketball players over their four-year careers.

What will the strength of the 2006-2007 Rider team be?

I think we will be a team that can really stretch the court on offense and defense. We should also be a very good shooting team. Even some of our bigger guys shoot the three very well, which forces teams to come out and chase us on the perimeter, and that really opens up the court. Defensively, we will be more athletic, which will allow us to be more aggressive and come after people more than we did a year ago. Expect to see a team that attacks in the full court on both offense and defense.

If you could describe this year's team in one word, what would it be?

Versatile. We will put a lot of players on the floor who can play multiple positions, which will

allow us to play a more up-tempo style that the players like to play and that I love to coach. I think our fans will really enjoy the style of play.

What are you most proud of in your life?

My family and friends. My wife, Amy, and my children, Tommy and Emily, my parents, sisters, aunts, uncles, cousins and friends have all provided me with great perspective and support. It means a lot to look behind the bench and see close to 50 family members and friends at some games. I come from a very close knit family and community and I always know that they are experiencing every emotion with me whether times are good or times are bad. I never feel alone and that is a great way to go through life.

Which teams will be in the running for a MAAC title in 2007?

The MAAC is such a great league year in and year out; it is always up for grabs. If you are asking me for the favorite, I would have to say Marist.

What was your initial reaction when asked to be the interim head coach for the 2005-2006 season?

Initially, I had mixed emotions. I was so excited to have the opportunity to coach the team for a year, but at the same time, I wanted to make sure that Don (Harnum) was comfortable with his decision and that it would be well received by the players. The year was very awkward for everybody, but once the University decided to name Don the director of athletics and me the coach, and I was sure that everyone, including the players, were ready to move forward. I have become much more comfortable with my role. I am so much more prepared to coach this team now than I was a year ago and I am determined to have success here at Rider.

This season you have two sets of brothers on your team. What are the advantages and disadvantages of having brothers on a team?

As a coach you are always hoping that your teams develop great chemistry, and you are constantly trying to foster that environment. I

would love for all of our players to think of their teammates as brothers. Sure, brothers will have fights here and there, but when it comes right down to it, they will always stick up for each other and go to war along side one another. If you can get your team to take on that mentality, you can accomplish anything. The teams winning championships usually have great chemistry.

When did you first know you wanted to be a coach?

In college. I started to become very interested in watching film as a player and being tuned into the opponent scouting reports. The game has been one of the most important things in my life since I was five years old. As my college career started winding down, I realized I wasn't ready to give up basketball.

You have already accomplished some great things as a head coach. What are you most proud of?

The relationships. I love to watch the kids graduate. That is what it is all about. As a junior college coach, I enjoyed watching my players receive scholarships to four-year schools and then graduate. I went to a few graduations of my former players at their four-year institutions. I've stayed in touch with a lot of my former players, and I take pride in their accomplishments. The same goes for the players I've had here at Rider. Watching them become successful as adults is as rewarding as anything.

You were able to bring in another outstanding incoming class this year. How were you able to attract such a strong class and how good can they be?

The first thing we did was work extremely hard in building solid relationships with the players, their families, and their high school and AAU coaches. The second thing is that we have a lot to sell right now. We have a great university with a great basketball program, so this is a good time for kids to be a part of that. If you believe in what you are selling, you become a better salesman, and we all believe this is a great place for a kid to go to school.

Fischer, a 2002 graduate of Ithaca College, came to Rider from Williams College, where he was an assistant coach for two seasons.

"Dane has been a great addition to our staff here at Rider," said Rider Head Coach Tommy Dempsey. "He brings enthusiasm and a great work ethic with him to the office everyday. He has a very bright future in the coaching profession."

At Rider, Fischer's chief duties include recruiting, assisting with individual instruction, scouting, practice and game preparation and academic support.

"Dane Fischer has a very successful background in college basketball, both as a player and a coach," said Rider Director of Athletics Don Harnum. "He is knowledgeable and enthusiastic about the game and has a very bright future."

At Ithaca, Fischer was a three-year starting point guard and two-year captain, and graduated among the top 10 in Ithaca career assists and steals. The team MVP in 2002, Fischer led the Bombers to the Empire Eight Championship and to the NCAA Tournament as a senior.

Fischer, who was raised in Rochester, Minn., resides in Lawrenceville.

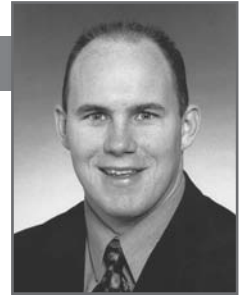

A native of Lyndhurst, N.J., Minarick is a 1986 graduate of Queen of Peace High School, where he earned two varsity letters in football.

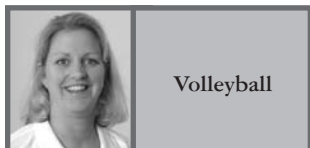

Coming of Age. An exciting time to be a young Bronc.



Coming of Age. An exciting time in the life of a young man. The 2006-2007 Rider University men's basketball program is expecting some exciting times this year with the Coming of Age of this year's team.

Led by one of the top underclassman in the nation, junior Jason Thompson, the Broncs will be both young and experienced this season under second year head coach Tommy Dempsey. Dempsey took over a young team last year and had four freshmen and a sophomore among his top eight players. This year he has one senior, veteran point guard Terrance Mouton. "With the exception of Terrance, we'll have this group together for the next couple of years and we are looking to make a big leap forward in the conference standings in 2006-2007," said Dempsey. "We have worked extremely hard as a staff and as a team since April and we are looking forward to seeing positive results on the court."

Combine the young returnees with the incoming group that was ranked among the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference's best for the second year in a row by the HoopScoop online National Recruiting Report and the ground work has been laid for a successful run.

"Going through a season like last year was not easy for anybody associated with our program," Dempsey remembers, after serving the 2005-2006 season as the interim head coach. "The one thing it did do was it brought us closer together as a team. It was a year of transition in the program, a lot of new faces and a new coach. This year we are all so much more comfortable with the situation. Now we're ready to be successful!"

Like most things coming of age, the Broncs will be very aggressive and entertaining to watch. "Defensively you can expect us to get after the basketball," said Dempsey. "We'll play multiple defenses with the central focus on ball pressure. We have to do a better job of creating offense with our defense this year. We'll play a style that the players like to play and it should be fun to watch."

The offense starts with the 6'10" Thompson, a Second Team All-MAAC selection last year. "Offensively we will push the ball in transition and try to spread out the defense with our shooters in the half court. We will try to pound the ball inside to Jason and play off of him. If Jason can dominate the paint and the guards are improved we will be tough to beat," said Dempsey.

The Gilbert P. Rossi Award winner as the team's Most Valuable Player last season, Thompson ranked second in the MAAC in blocks, fourth in rebounding, sixth in field goal percentage and seventh in scoring, and was the only player in the MAAC to rank among the top seven in more than two of those four categories.

"Jason is one of the top couple of players in the MAAC," Dempsey said. "He had a very good first two years and now is the time for him to become a star in this league. If I had my pick of any player in the MAAC, there is no doubt I would pick Jason Thompson. He can score on you inside and he can step you out to the perimeter. He is the toughest match-up in the league. We expect him to be a Player of the Year candidate the next two seasons."

Along with Thompson, the list of returnees is led by the lone senior, Mouton, and sophomores Lamar Johnson and Harris Mansell.

Mouton led the Broncs in minutes played and three-point field goals made last season and finished ninth in the MAAC in free throw percentage. "This is a big year for Terrance," said Dempsey. "If he has a great season, I think we will as well. Terrance is a very talented point guard who has had a lot of ups and downs in his three years. We are hoping he can put it all together this year and become an all-league player as a senior."

Johnson was named to the MAAC All-Rookie Team last year and finished fifth on the Broncs in scoring and field goal percentage. "Lamar had some great games and he struggled at times," Dempsey said. "For Lamar and Harris, it is time to take the next step in their careers. Both are very talented, but were inconsistent as freshmen. It is time to make a big jump now that they know what to expect. Lamar is a very good shooter. We have worked with him to expand his game and become more of a complete offensive player. He has a chance to become a great guard in this league."

Mansell led the 2006 Broncs in steals, was second on the team in three-point field goal percentage, fourth in free throw percentage, fifth in rebounds, blocks, free throws made, three-pointers made and minutes played, and was sixth in scoring. "Harris may have to play all three guard positions for us this season," said Dempsey. "His development from freshman to sophomore year is very important to us. He needs to take a big step forward. Last year there were flashes of a kid who could be a great player, but at times he struggled with being a consistent player. He needs to use his freshman year as a learning experience and have a great sophomore season."

Other key returnees include Barney Anderson, Kevin Vosilla, Kamron Warner and Kevin Hickman.

Anderson was fourth on the team in field goal percentage last year and averaged 9.6 points and 7.4 rebounds per 40 minutes played. "This is a big year for Barney," Dempsey said. "He didn't have as much of a role as he would have liked as a freshman. He is looking for a bigger role this season and he can earn that by playing hard every-day and becoming a great rebounder. Barney is a great athlete and he is the best defensive player on the team."

Vosilla was an All-Long Island selection who was named the MVP of the Nassau County Exceptional Senior Game in 2005. Last year at Rider, he led the team in field goal percentage and was sixth on the team in free throw percentage, averaging 10.6 points and 7.1 rebounds per 40 minutes played. "This is a big year for Kevin in his development," Dempsey said. "As sophomores you need to turn the corner. Kevin is a big strong kid who needs to become a force in the paint. If he does that he can have a successful season with an increased role."

Warner started four games last season, was third on the team in three-point field goal percentage and compiled 16.6 points per 40 minutes played, fourth highest on the team. "Kam is the best shooter in the program right now," said Dempsey. "Like Lamar, we are trying to expand his game beyond just being a shooter. Kam's a hard worker and a terrific kid. There will always be a role for Kam, because he knows how to put the ball in the basket."

Hickman is a former All-Diamond State Conference player at Wilmington Christian School who made the Broncs as a walk-on for the third consecutive year. "Kevin is the ultimate walk-on," said Dempsey. "He's a terrific team guy who has gotten a lot better in his two seasons because he has invested time in his game. If he continues to work hard I wouldn't be surprised to see him on the court before his career is over." Hickman was a member of the MAAC Academic Honor Roll and a Gold Award winner at Rider Academic Achievement Night for the Fall 2004, Spring 2005 and Fall 2005 semesters.

The four newcomers include Joel Green, Patrick Mansell, Robbie Myers and Ryan Thompson.

Green comes to Rider from Cecil Community College in North East, Maryland where he averaged 13.3 points, 9.4 rebounds and 2.1 blocked shots per game for the 33-2 team that won the NJCAA Division II National Championship. "Joel brings a winning attitude with him to the program in coming off a season in which his team won a national championship," said Dempsey. "He's a veteran even though it is his first year at Rider. He is mature and a very good athlete who shoots the ball well and is a good rebounder. Joel should be a very big part of things here in his final two seasons." Green red-shirted his freshman year at Siena before transferring and excelling at Cecil.

Myers, a 6'8" 235lb. center who compiled over 1,100 career points in high school, led Crestwood (PA) to the Wyoming Valley

Conference Division I and AAA District 2 Championship as a First Team All-Wyoming Valley Conference selection. "Robbie Myers is a big, strong kid who we expect to compete for minutes as a freshman," Dempsey said. "He is coming off a very successful high school career and once he makes the adjustment to the college game, he has a chance to have an even better college career."

Rider will have two sets of brothers on the team this season as Patrick Mansell joins brother Harris and Ryan Thompson joins brother Jason. "Brothers will always stick up for each other and I would love for all of our players to think of their teammates as brothers," Dempsey said.

Patrick Mansell is a 6'1" guard who was twice a First Team All-Suburban One League selection, compiling 1,874 career points at Cheltenham High, second highest all-time to brother Harris. Mansell made 334 three-point field goals in his scholastic career and averaged 22.4 points per game as a senior. He led Cheltenham to a 99-23 four-year record and four consecutive PIAA Tournament appearances. "In a word, Patrick is a 'shooter'," said Dempsey, "coming off a high school career where he made over 300 three-pointers. We will be trying to develop Patrick into more than just a shooter. He's a tough kid and a hard worker who should have a great career here at Rider."

Ryan Thompson is a 6'5" guard who earned First Team All-Conference and All-Group IV South Jersey honors. "We expect a lot from Ryan over the next four years," said Dempsey. "I look at Ryan and I see unlimited potential. Ryan has a chance to have a tremendous career and I expect he will compete for playing time right away."

The schedule begins at New Jersey Institute of Technology on November 14 and features road games at Notre Dame, Villanova, Boston University and Delaware and home games with Northeastern, Drexel and Monmouth. "The schedule is really challenging, starting with Big East powers Villanova and Notre Dame, and has teams we've traditionally had great games with Delaware, Drexel, Monmouth and FDU," Dempsey said. "The schedule will have us prepared well for the MAAC."

With 10 institutions strongly bound by the sound principles of quality and integrity in academics and excellence in athletics, the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference enters its 26th year of competition during the 2006-2007 academic year.

The MAAC was founded in 1980 by six charter members: the U.S. Military Academy, Fairfield University, Fordham University, Iona College, Manhattan College and Saint Peter's College. Competition followed one year later in the fall of 1981 with members competing in the sports of men's cross country and men's soccer. On January 2, 1982, Army traveled to Iona for the first MAAC men's basketball game and the MAAC story had begun.

Today, Conference members include: Canisius College, Fairfield University, Iona College, Loyola College (Md.), Manhattan College, Marist College, Niagara University, Rider University, Saint Peter's College, and Siena College. In addition, associate members Duquesne University and LaSalle University compete in football. Le Moyne College competes in baseball and women's lacrosse, while Mount St. Mary's College, Providence College, Saint Joseph's University, Virginia Military Institute and Wagner College compete in men's lacrosse. St. Francis (N.Y.) College, Villanova University and Wagner College are all associate members of the MAAC Women's Water Polo League. The MAAC will support 25 sports and conduct 24 championships during the 2006-2007 academic year.

The 2007 MAAC Basketball Championships move to the Arena at Harbor Yard in Bridgeport, Connecticut, with Albany's Pepsi Arena preparing to host the 2008 championship. By having an excellent working relationship with these working facilities, the MAAC has been able to attract a number of NCAA Championship events. In 1995, the MAAC and Siena hosted the highly successful First and Second Rounds of the

Division I Men's Basketball Championship. In 2000, the MAAC, along with Canisius and Niagara, again received rave reviews as they hosted the First and Second Rounds of the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship at the HSBC Arena in Buffalo, NY. The MAAC, Rider and Siena co-hosted the 2002 NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships at the Pepsi Arena. The MAAC and Siena successfully hosted the 2003 NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship East Regional at the Pepsi Arena. Additionally, the MAAC, Canisius and Niagara served as hosts for the 2003 Division I Men's Ice Hockey Championship, also at the HSBC Arena. In 2004, the MAAC, Canisius and Niagara once again successfully hosted the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship First and Second Rounds at the HSBC Arena. All three parties will host that event again in 2007 and 2010. The MAAC and Rider University will co-host the 2009 NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championship Regional as well 2010 NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championship First and Second Rounds at the Sovereign Bank Arena in Trenton, New Jersey after recording the third highest attendance figure for the women's championship with the First and Second Rounds last season.

MAAC ASSOCIATE SPORTS

In January of 1993, the conference announced the formation of the MAAC Football League, which began play in September 1993. The league consists of the three football-playing MAAC schools - Iona, Marist and Saint Peter's - and two associate

members Duquesne and La Salle. The MAAC Football League keeps costs to a minimum through a series of innovative conference rules involving travel squad size, length of the practice season, and a limited number of full-time coaches. Most importantly, however, there are no athletic scholarships, just need-based financial aid.

In June of 1995, the MAAC continued to develop opportunities for student-athletes as the conference announced the formation of the MAAC Men's and Women's Lacrosse Leagues. The men's league began competition in the spring of 1996, while the women's league commenced in the spring of 1997. The men's league consists of four MAAC schools -- Canisius, Manhattan, Marist, and Siena - and five associate members - Mount St. Mary's, Providence, Saint Joseph's, Virginia Military Institute and Wagner. The women's league consists of MAAC institutions Canisius, Fairfield, Manhattan, Marist, Niagara and Siena, plus Le Moyne.

In 2002, the MAAC added the MAAC Women's Water Polo League, making it the 25th sport that the conference sponsors. The league is made up of three MAAC schools - Iona, Marist and Siena - as well as three associate members, St. Francis (NY), Villanova and Wagner.

ACADEMICS AND ATHLETICS

The MAAC prides itself on the accomplishments of its student-athletes in the classroom, as well as on the field. Mary Beth Riley, a 1991 graduate of Canisius, was the first recipient of the NCAA Woman of the Year Award. In the fall of 1998, Erin Whalen, a member of the Iona women's rowing team, was awarded

one of the nation's 32 Rhodes Scholarships for academic achievement and civic leadership. Jose Vargas, a Loyola student, was also awarded a Rhodes Scholarship in 1999.

First-class facilities are the rule with MAAC schools, as teams regularly play in top-notch arenas, such as Madison Square Garden, the Continental Airlines Arena, HSBC Arena, Pepsi Arena, the Arena at Harbor Yard and Sovereign Bank Arena. The other MAAC championships boast their share of outstanding locales as well, such as Dutchess Stadium in Fishkill, NY, home of the baseball championship, and the fabled Van Cortlandt Park in the Bronx, where the cross country championships are contested. This year, the MAAC will take its Volleyball Championship as well as Men's and Women's Golf Championships to Orlando, Florida, where it will conduct its post-season championships at Disney's Wide World of Sports Complex. In 2007, the MAAC Men's Soccer Championship will be at Walt Disney World.

In the past several years, several of the MAAC schools have also enjoyed success in NCAA Tournaments. MAAC schools have made a total of 69 NIT appearances and 37 NCAA appearances. Combined with recent bracket expansion in several sports, the MAAC possesses 11 automatic bids

in men's and women's basketball, baseball, softball, men's and women's soccer, volleyball, men's golf, men's and women's tennis, and men's lacrosse. In 2003, the Iona College men's cross country team finished fourth - just one point out of third place - at the NCAA Division I Cross Country Championships. Canisius softball, Manhattan track, Manhattan and Marist baseball and Loyola soccer and lacrosse have also flourished on the national stage.

The MAAC has also been a leader in the forefront of technology, expanding the notoriety of the league into cyberspace. In 2001, the league retained Host Communications, Inc. to sponsor the MAAC web page. Launched in November 1999, www.maacsports.com has been a great success, providing fans with up-to-date contest results, fan polls and an online merchandise store.

The MAAC President for the 2006-2007 academic year is Rev. Joseph L. Levesque, C.M., the President of Niagara University. The Vice-President is Rev. Brian F. Linnane, S.J., the President of Loyola College. Eugene Doris, Director of Athletics at Fairfield University, will chair the Committee on Athletic Administration, and Traci Murphy, Associate Athletics Director/Senior Woman Administrator at Canisius College will serve as Vice Chair.

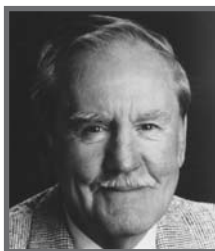


KEVIN BANNON

INDUCTED 2001

During his eight seasons at Rider, Kevin Bannon tallied a 131-103 record while compiling 100 victories faster than any other Rider coach. He led his teams to five conference championship games, two Northeast Conference Tournament championships, and back-to-back NCAA appearances in 1993 and

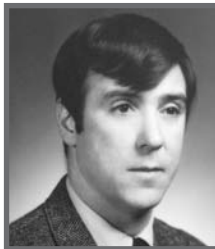
1994. Having inherited a team that finished 5-23 the previous year, Bannon took over the reins of the Broncos in 1989-90 and improved their record each of the following five seasons, capping that run with the 1993-94 squad that went 21-9. During his tenure at Rider, he won 18 or more games in a season five times and had a 47-9 record in Alumni Gym against NEC opponents, including conference tournament games. Bannon was twice voted NEC Coach of the Year, was a Metropolitan Basketball Writers Coach of the Year, and earned New Jersey Basketball Coaches Association Coach of the Year honors.



RUSS COLEMAN '42

INDUCTED 1994

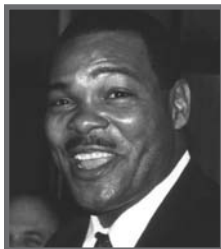
A great all-around athlete, Russ Coleman compiled 13 varsity letters in his Rider tenure, competing in basketball, soccer, swimming, track, and baseball. A former member of the Rider Board of Trustees, Coleman went on to an illustrious coaching career at Neptune (NJ) High School.



JACK CRYAN '66

INDUCTED 1993

A Little All-American (presented in the 1960s to the best college basketball players less than 6-feet tall), Jack Cryan graduated as the career leader in both points and assists. Today the 1993 inductee's 6.2 assists per game still stands as do his single-season marks for most free throws made and best free-throw shooting percentage.



ALBERTO BAPTISTE '80

INDUCTED 1998

Inducted in 1998, Alberto Baptiste was Rider's career scoring leader from 1980 until 1993. He still holds the records for field goals made in a season, consecutive games with 20 or more points and consecutive games played. He was the leading scorer in the ECC West in 1980 and had seven

games of 30 or more points that year. His 22 points per game in his senior year put him among the top 25 scores in the nation. In both 1979 and 1980, he earned the Gilbert P. Rossi Memorial Award for the team's MVP. A New Jersey resident, Baptiste is assistant vice president at Derivatives Portfolio Management.



FRANK DONLON

INDUCTED 1992

Frank Donlon took the reins of the Rider athletics department following Clair Bee's resignation. The athletic director, basketball coach and track coach, Donlon's career at Rider spanned 28 years. In 11 years at the helm of the basketball team, he recorded a 99-76 record, coaching his 1936 team to the Olympic District II playoff, the equivalent of today's NCAA Tournament.



CLAIR BEE, CHARTER MEMBER

INDUCTED 1990

The founder of varsity sports at Rider in 1929, Clair Bee coached the first three Rider varsity basketball teams to a 53-7 record. The institution's first athletic director, Bee also coached football, baseball and women's basketball. One of the great innovators of

the game of basketball, he developed the three-second rule and the shot clock and is enshrined in the Naismith National Basketball Hall of Fame and the NY Basketball Hall of Fame.

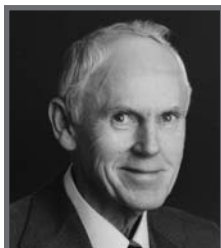


HERB KAY '48

INDUCTED 1992

Known as Herb Krautblatt during his Rider years, Kay earned All-American honors from the Associated Press and was team MVP for the 1947-48 season. Owner of a then-Rider record of 367 points in one season, Kay went on to play with the Baltimore Bullets,

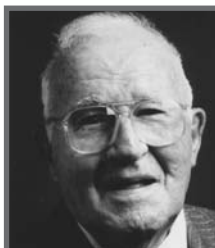
the defending national basketball champions. After one season with the Bullets, he returned to Trenton to play for the Tigers of the American Basketball League.



LEO CHESTER '57

INDUCTED 1994

Inducted in 1994, Leo Chester currently ranks 12th on the Broncos' scoring list with 1,332 points - a Rider record at the time of his graduation - and helped Rider to its first 20-win season in his final year. A longtime Rider fan, Chester is also a member of the Booster Club Hall of Fame.



TOM LEYDEN

INDUCTED 1993

In 15 years as head coach, Tom "Tiger" Leyden compiled a 187-157 record, including Rider's first 20-win season in 1957. That 20th victory came against heavily favored St. Michael's (VT), advancing Rider to the NAIA quarterfinals.



HALL OF FAME



JACK MADDEN '65

INDUCTED 1993

When he left Rider, Jack Madden held the marks for scoring and rebounding. Today those numbers (1,341 points, 777 rebounds) rank him 11th and fourth, respectively. Although he long ago ended his playing career, Madden only recently stepped off the basketball court. Four years ago he retired after an incredible career as an NBA referee, including 25 NBA Championship series games.



RICHARD "DIGGER" PHELPS '63

INDUCTED 1994

A reserve player for two seasons, Digger Phelps was the graduate assistant when the Broncs ended NYU's 23-year homecourt winning streak and was credited with developing the scouting report that brought the end to NYU's run. As the head coach at Notre Dame, he led the Fighting Irish to a 393-197 record, including 13 20-win seasons and 15 NCAA Tournament berths. Phelps is an ESPN college basketball commentator.



BARRY SPEARS '72

INDUCTED 1994

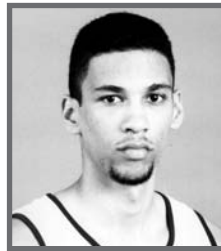
A coach on the court, according to former head coach John Carpenter, Barry Spears was among the team leaders in assists, scoring, and rebounding in his sophomore, junior and senior seasons. The 1994 inductee graduated second in career assists (and is currently eighth) and seventh in career rebounds (now 17th), helping his three varsity teams to a 51-27 combined record.



LOU ZARA '30

INDUCTED 1996

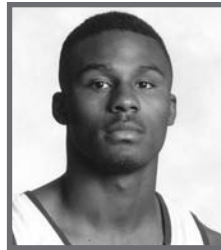
A member of the first collegiate team to compile 1,000 points in a season, Lou Zara was the leading scorer in the East in 1930 until the final game of the season. The 1996 inductee and Rider Booster Club Hall of Fame member helped his two varsity teams to a 34-6 combined record.



DARRICK SUBER '93

INDUCTED 1999

Darrick Suber put Rider athletics on the map when he led the 1993 basketball team to the conference championship and NCAA Championship Tournament. Graduating as the career-scoring leader with 2,219 points, Suber is one of only two Broncs to compile over 2,000 career points. He was the Player of the Year in the Northeast Conference, and was MVP of the championship tournament in both the East Coast Conference and, a year later, in the Northeast Conference.



DEON HAMES '96

INDUCTED 2002

As a point guard, Deon Hames led his team to the conference championship game during all four of his years, winning two and twice advancing to the NCAA Tournament. A three-time All-Conference selection and twice an All-MET pick after earning conference Rookie of the Year honors, Hames was a two-time team MVP, setting the career record at Rider for assists while finishing fifth in career scoring at the time. Hames holds Rider records for free throws made in a game, assists in a season and games played in a career, and was one of the best defensive guards in the history of Rider basketball. His four teams compiled a record of 77-42.



DICK KUCHEN '66

INDUCTED 2004

Dick Kuchen graduated as the Rider career leader in rebounds and was fifth in career scoring. A member of the 1963 Rider team that beat national powerhouse NYU (Kuchen made the winning foul shots in the 66-63 upset), Kuchen was drafted by the St. Louis Hawks of the NBA. As a coach, he went to the Final Four as an assistant at Notre Dame and was a head coach for over 20 years at Cal-Berkley and Yale.



MARC WILCOX '94

INDUCTED 2006

Mark Wilcox graduated 13th in career scoring and fourth in career assists, and led the Broncs to three Conference Title games, two Conference Championships, and two NCAA Tournaments. He led the conference in three-point field goals made as a senior captain, earning second team All-Conference honors.

NAISMITH NATIONAL BASKETBALL HALL OF FAME

THOMAS BARLOW

Nicknamed the Babe Ruth of basketball, Thomas Barlow was only the 53rd person selected for the Naismith National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, MA. One of the top 100 basketball players of all time, Barlow helped the professional game get off the ground as he joined the teams that barnstormed across the Northeast. A graduate of the Rider-Moore-Stewart Business College of Trenton, Barlow made his mark in sports before Rider introduced varsity athletics to its campus. He played in the first professional basketball game in Madison Square Garden and finished his career with the Philadelphia Warriors. A fine baseball player, Barlow also was a catcher for the NY Giants and was sought after by the NY Yankees.
