The 1999 SEC Player of the Year, Alexander set three SEC and 15 Alabama rushing records and earned All-America honors during his senior season (1999). That season, he was also a finalist for the Doak Walker Award and *Football News* Offensive Player of the Year honors. He was a consensus All-SEC selection and also earned Academic All-SEC honors. He finished seventh in the Heisman Trophy balloting.

A first-team All-American at cornerback in 2009, Javier Arenas was also one of the all-time NCAA greats as a return specialist. He made 71 tackles with five interceptions, 11 pass breakups and an amazing five sacks from his position at cornerback in 2009. Arenas also averaged 15.41 yards per punt return in 2009 to rank fourth nationally. He set the Alabama and SEC record for career punt return yardage with 1,752 yards and seven touchdowns. Arenas finished just nine yards behind the NCAA record held by Texas Tech's Wes Welker.

The Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award winner in 1994, Barker finished fifth in the Heisman Trophy balloting that season. He finished his career as the winningest quarterback in Alabama history, compiling a 34-2-1 record as the Tide's starting quarterback. He earned All-America and consensus All-SEC honors his senior season. He was also the *Birmingham News* Offensive Player of the Year in the SEC and was a finalist for the Davey O'Brien Award, presented each year to the outstanding college quarterback.

A first-team All-American at safety in 2010 by the Football Writers and a consensus choice in 2011, for four seasons Mark Barron led the secondary from his safety spot as the unit matured into a vital cog in one of the most dominant units in college football history. Barron was twice a first-team All-SEC selection by the league coaches and the *Associated Press*. In 2010, he led the team in tackles with 75, had three interceptions, six pass breakups, two quarterback hurries, two sacks and forced a fumble. Barron was voted a permanent team captain by his teammates at the end of 2010. He repeated that captaincy in 2011, ranking second with 68 tackles, two interceptions, five pass breakups and a fumble recovery

A three-time All-American, Bennett was a unanimous selection in 1986, the year he also won the Lombardi Trophy. He was the SEC Player of the Year in 1986 after earning All-America honors in 1984 and 1985. Bennett was the Defensive Player of the Game in the 1985 Aloha Bowl and the 1986 Sun Bowl and finished seventh in the Heisman Trophy balloting that year. He was selected to the Tide's Team of the Century and was the Player of the Decade for the 1980s. He went on to a stellar career in the NFL, including four Super Bowl appearances with the Buffalo Bills and one with the Atlanta Falcons.

A two-time All-America pick (1980-81), Boyd led the 1980 team with 120 tackles. His 324 career tackles rank second by any Tide player since statistics were kept on a regular basis in 1970. He played on three SEC championship teams and on back-to-back national championship teams in 1978 and 1979. During his four playing years, the Tide went 42-5-1.

A consensus All-America and All-SEC pick in 1973, Brown was also a member of the Tide's Team of the Decade for the 1970s. Known as "Bearcat" by his teammates, Brown won the 1973 Jacobs Trophy given annually to the best blocker in the SEC. He played on teams that compiled a 32-4 record and won three SEC titles and one national championship.



**63 - Jim Bunch**

A consensus All-America selection in 1979, Bunch was a mainstay on the Tide's undefeated, untied national championship team that season. He earned All-SEC honors in 1977-78-79 and played on two national championship teams and three SEC title teams. Bunch played on teams that went 43-5 during his playing career and won three Sugar Bowls and one Liberty Bowl. He is a member of the 1970s Team of the Decade and was named the nation's best sophomore offensive lineman by *Football News* in 1977.



**57 - Johnny Cain**  
All-American: 1931-32

An All-America selection in 1931 and 1932, "Hurri" Cain was one of the great all-around players in Alabama football history. Considered by many experts to be the best punter ever at the Capstone, he was equally gifted running the football. He scored 26 touchdowns in just 24 varsity games. Cain had nine touchdowns in the first four games of the 1932 season before suffering an injury which kept him out of three games. His 81-yard scoring run against St. Mary's is considered one of the great individual efforts in Alabama history. Against Tennessee in 1932, he punted 19 times and averaged 48 yards per kick. Cain was voted a member of the all-time Alabama team in 1943 and then to the Team of the Century as a punter in 1992.



**59 - Antoine Caldwell**

A consensus first-team All-American, Antoine Caldwell anchored one of the nation's top offensive lines in 2008 as he helped lead the Crimson Tide to a 12-2 record and an SEC West Championship. He started 48 career games, including all 14 in 2008, and is one of just eight players in school history to be voted a team captain two consecutive years. He received prestigious All-America honors from the Associated Press, the American Football Coaches Association, and *Sporting News* while being selected first-team All-SEC by the Associated Press, *Sporting News* and SEC coaches. Caldwell was also a Rimington Trophy finalist in 2008.



## 19 - Jeremiah Castille

An All-America selection in 1982, Castille was also selected a member of the Tide's Team of the Century and the Team of the Decade of the 1980s. He had 16 career interceptions which, at the time, was the most in school history. He had three interceptions to win the Most Valuable Player trophy in Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant's final game, a 21-15 win over Illinois in the Liberty Bowl. He went on to a stellar career in the NFL with the Tampa Bay Bucs and Denver Broncos.

## 6 - Ha Ha Clinton-Dix

One of the nation's finest defensive players in 2013, Clinton-Dix earned a starting job as a sophomore in 2012 and never left the lineup. He started 10 of 14 games in Alabama's 2013 national championship season, earning the starting job at safety during the season while notching a team-leading 5 interceptions with four pass breakups, along with 37 tackles and a forced fumble. As a junior in 2013, Clinton-Dix became one of the nation's top safeties, ranking fourth on the team with 52 tackles with two interceptions, four pass breakups, and 3.5 tackles for loss. He was a consensus first-team All-America selection in 2013, foregoing his senior season and becoming a first-round selection (21st) of the Green Bay Packers in the 2014 NFL Draft.

From his nose guard position, Terrence Cody manned the middle of the country's No. 2 rush defense in 2008-08. Cody registered 52 career tackles and 10.5 tackles for loss. He blocked not one but two field goals attempts by Tennessee in the fourth quarter to help Alabama secure a 12-10 win over the rival Vols on their way to the 2009 National Championship. He was a two-time consensus first-team All-American. Cody was a finalist for Lombardi, Bednarik and Nagurski Awards as a senior.

An All-America pick in 1966, Cole played on teams that were 30-2-1 and won two national championships. He served as defensive captain of the 1966 undefeated SEC title team. He had eight tackles and keyed the pressure attack on Auburn in the 1965 game when the Tide intercepted seven passes. He also had six solo tackles in the Tide's 31-7 win over LSU in 1965.



## 26 - Landon Collins

A consensus first-team All-American at safety in 2014, Landon Collins was the backbone of a defense that ranked sixth nationally in scoring defense and 12th in total defense. As a junior in 2014, Collins led Alabama in tackles with 103 (60 solos) and interceptions (7). As a true freshman at Alabama, Collins contributed as a backup. He started on the kickoff and punt coverage units on and saw reserve action. As a true freshman in 2012, Collins started at safety in all 14 games, recording 17 tackles and blocking a punt. He became a starter in 2013 as a sophomore and finished with 70 tackles and two interceptions. Selected by his coaches as one of three captains of the Tide's 2014 SEC title team, Collins made himself eligible for the NFL Draft following his junior season and was selected by the New York Giants with the first pick of the second round as the 33rd overall draft pick.

He was selected to the Tide's Team of the Decade of the 1970s.

## 9 - Amari Cooper

All-American: 2014

The 2014 SEC Offensive Player of the Year, a consensus first-team All-American in 2014 and the winner of the 2014 Biletnikoff Award as the nation's outstanding receiver, Amari Cooper finished third in the voting for the Heisman Trophy as a junior. Cooper shattered every meaningful Alabama single-season and career receiving record as he grabbed a staggering 124 passes for 1,727 yards and 16 touchdowns as a junior in 2014, leading the nation in catches, yards and receiving touchdowns and bettering the Tide record for catches by 46, yards by 594 and touchdowns by 5. His career totals of 228 catches for 3,463 yards and 31 touchdowns eclipsed the old mark for catches by 34, yards by 540 and touchdowns by 13. Cooper made himself eligible for the NFL Draft following his junior season and was selected by the Oakland Raiders with the fourth pick of the first round.

A consensus All-America choice in 1992, Copeland helped the Tide to a national title in 1992. He was also a first-team All-SEC pick that season. In 1992, UA opponents averaged just 1.67 yards per rush during the season. He finished his career with 17.5 sacks and 19 stops behind the line. He played on teams that went 24-1. He won Defensive Player of the Week honors after getting four tackles, two sacks, one TFL and one caused fumble in a 17-10 win over Tennessee.

He was a significant contributor to the 14-7 Tide win over Tennessee when he intercepted a pass to stop a Vol drive. He is also a member of the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame.



### 54 - Paul Crane

Crane played both center and linebacker and won unanimous All-America accolades in 1965 at the center position. He earned SEC Lineman of the Year honors in 1964, but he was a dominating linebacker as well. He was a captain on the 1965 national championship team. Alabama was 28-4-1 during his career. He starred in the NFL with the New York Jets and was a teammate of Joe Namath on the 1969 Super Bowl Championship team.



### 59 - Sylvester Croom

An All-America and All-SEC selection in 1974, Croom earned the Jacobs Trophy, given annually to the SEC's best blocker. He was a two-year starter for the Tide and played on teams that went 32-4. Alabama won the SEC championship all three of his playing years and won a national championship in 1973. The Tide went to the Cotton, Sugar and Orange bowls during his playing career.



### 80 - Eric Curry

A unanimous All-America selection in 1992, Curry was also tabbed Chevrolet Defensive Player of the Year, UPI Lineman of the Year and the Pigskin Club of Washington Lineman of the Year. Curry also finished 10th in the Heisman Trophy balloting that year. He had four quarterback sacks against Southern Mississippi in 1992 and finished his career with 114 tackles, 18 stops behind the line and 22.5 quarterback sacks. He earned consensus All-SEC honors and was a Lombardi Award finalist. He started 15 games for the Tide.

A first-team All-SEC selection and All-American as a senior in 2014, DePriest was third on the team in tackles as a senior with 88 (41 solos) along with breaking up three passes and forcing a fumble. DePriest started all 13 games he was active for in 2014, playing in 53 games during his Alabama career and starting 39 of the Tide's 41 games over the span of his final three seasons. For his career DePriest accumulated 237 tackles (112 solos) with 17.5 for losses (63 yards) while forcing three fumbles, recovering two fumbles, breaking up seven passes and making one interception.

### 45 - Joe Domnanovich

A consensus All-America pick in 1942, Domnanovich was selected as a member on the all-time Alabama team picked in 1943 for the first 50 years of Alabama football. He was also selected as a member of the all-time Orange Bowl team after recording a safety in the come-from-behind win over Boston College in the 1943 Orange Bowl. He also served as team captain for the 1942 season.



### 70 - Cecil Dowdy

Dowdy was a consensus All-America pick in 1966 as an offensive lineman. He was also a member of the Team of the Decade for the 1960s. In 1966, he won the Jacobs Trophy, symbolic of the SEC's best blocker. He played on teams that went 30-2-1 and claimed a pair of national championships. He gained national recognition in the 39-28 Orange Bowl win over Nebraska on New Year's Day 1966 when he dominated Nebraska All-American lineman Wally Barnes.



### 17 - Philip Doyle

A unanimous All-America pick in 1990, Doyle broke Alabama kick scoring records for a single game, season and career. He was the two-time NCAA individual leader in field goals with 22 in 1989 and 24 in 1990. In 1990, he kicked a school-record six field goals against Southwestern Louisiana. His 47-yarder on the final play of the 1990 Tennessee game gave the Tide an unforgettable 9-6 win. He scored 345 points during his Tide career, including 78 field goals.

An All-America and All-SEC pick in 1964, coach Paul Bryant said "he's the finest guard I've ever coached." He played both offense and defense during his career, but started on offense during the Tide's National Championship season in 1964. He competed on teams that played in two Orange Bowls and one Sugar Bowl and compiled a 29-4 record.



### 61 - Sam Gellerstedt

Gellerstedt earned first-team All-America honors from *Football News* in 1968 and was also an All-SEC selection. Although defensive statistics were not kept during that era, he received UPI Lineman of the Week honors after the Mississippi State game. He was also awarded "Defender of the Week" following the Virginia Tech, Vanderbilt, Mississippi State and LSU games by the Tide coaching staff.



## 52 - Harry Gilmer

All-American: 1945  
Career: 1944-47

Birmingham, Ala.

A halfback/quarterback, Gilmer was a do-it-all player who earned All-America and SEC Player of the Year honors in 1945. He was also voted Most Valuable Player after leading Alabama to a 34-14 win over Southern California in the Rose Bowl. He accounted for 52 total touchdowns during his career, 19 rushing, 29 passing, two punt returns, one kickoff return and one interception return. He suffered just 22 career interceptions in 413 attempts. In 1946, he led the Tide in passing, rushing, interceptions, punt returns and kickoff returns. He was selected to the Tide's Team of the Century, as a defensive back. His best game was against Kentucky when he rushed six times for 216 yards and was two-of-two passing for 50 yards. Gilmer finished 5th in the Heisman Trophy balloting in both 1945 and 1947.

An All-SEC pick two straight years, Hall earned All-America honors in 1968. He had a single-game record of 24 tackles against Clemson in 1968. He blocked a punt for a safety in the Tide's 21-0 win over LSU in 1966. Hall was selected National Lineman of the Week in 1968 for his play against Auburn when he had 16 tackles, intercepted two passes and switched over to offense to catch a touchdown pass from Scott Hunter. He served as defensive captain of the 1968 squad. He was a member of the Team of the Decade for the 1960s.



## 78 - Jon Hand

All-American: 1985

An All-America pick in 1985, Hand finished his career with 234 tackles to earn a spot on the Tide's all-decade team of the 1980s. In 1992, he was also selected to Alabama's Team of the Century. His senior season, Hand was named the Washington D.C. Pigskin Club's Defensive Player of the Year and then played in the East-West Shrine Game in 1986. Perhaps his best career game came against LSU in 1985 when he had six tackles, one stop behind the line for four yards, one sack for seven yards, two pass break-ups, a blocked field goal and pressure on the Tigers' final field goal attempt of the game that failed. The game finished in a 14-14 tie.

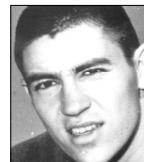

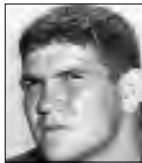

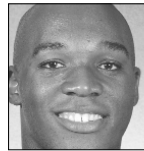

Only 12 of his punts were returned and he set a school single-game record for punting average with a 55.0-yard average on seven punts (385 yards) in a Sugar Bowl loss to Ohio State.

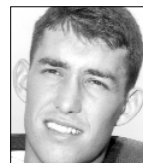

A Phi Beta Kappa student, Sington was called "the greatest lineman in the country" by Notre Dame head coach Knute Rockne. Sington earned All-America honors in both football and baseball. He was selected to Alabama's Team of the Century, the College Football Hall of Fame and was a member of the all-time team for the first 50 years of Alabama football.

He finished 10th in the Heisman Trophy balloting in 1965.

Smith became just the second player at Alabama to win the Outland Trophy in 2008, joining former Crimson Tide great Chris Samuels in being named the top interior lineman in the nation. The Birmingham native was also a Lombardi Award finalist as a junior and earned first-team All-America status by every major publication. He surrendered just one sack in 2008 and seven during his 38-game career. As a sophomore in 2007, Smith was a first-team All-SEC selection and won the Jacobs Blocking Trophy.

Smith played fullback on the 1934 national championship team and was named to the second team on the all-time Alabama squad picked in 1943.

Selected to the All-America team in 1967, "Snake" Stabler played on Tide teams that compiled a 28-3-2 record. Stabler completed 12 of 17 passes for 218 yards and rushed for 40 more while earning MVP honors. In his senior season of 1967, Stabler was named SEC Player of the Year by the Birmingham Quarterback Club and the Atlanta Touchdown Club. In 1992, Stabler and Joe Namath were selected as quarterbacks on the Tide's All-Century team. He was a first-round selection by the Houston Astros in baseball, but turned down that offer to play football with the Oakland Raiders.

Thomas was named National Player of the Week after his performances against Kentucky and Penn State in 1988. He served as defensive captain for the 1988 team, posting an incredible 27 sacks that season after shattering the school record with 18 in 1987. He finished 10th in the Heisman Trophy balloting in 1988. He was named NFL Rookie of the Year in 1989 while playing for the Kansas City Chiefs.

VandeGraaff had a 78-yard punt, scored 17 of the Tide's 23 points and with the game tied at 10 in the fourth quarter, batted a pass in the air, caught it and raced 65 yards for a TD. He was picked to the all-time Alabama team for the first 50 years. After leaving Alabama, he enrolled, and graduated from West Point.

The Tide went 35-5 with Warmack as a starter as he blocked for 24 100-yard performances in his career and led the team with pancake blocks as a senior in 2012.

While playing for Alabama, the Tide went 17-5 and won a national championship in 1941. He went on to a distinguished Naval career, retiring as a rear admiral.

A two-time All-American for the Tide, Wilcox was named to Alabama's Team of the Century and its 1980s Team of the Decade. In the 1926 Georgia Tech game, Winslett dominated play and the Tide rolled to an unexpected 21-0 win over the highly favored Engineers. Winslett passed for two TDs and set-up another on a pass play.

# Alabama in the College Football Hall of Fame

Located in Atlanta, Ga., the College Football Hall of Fame has enshrined 24 members of the Crimson Tide football family.



### Cornelius Bennett

Linebacker, 1983-86  
Birmingham, Ala.  
•2005 Inductee•

A three-time All-American, Bennett was a unanimous selection in 1986, the year he also won the Lombardi Trophy. He was selected as SEC Player of the Year in 1986 after earning All-America honors in 1984 and 1985. Cornelius was Defensive Player of the Game in the 1985 Aloha Bowl and the 1986 Sun Bowl and finished 7th in the Heisman Trophy balloting that year. He was selected to the Tide's Team of the Century and was the Player of the Decade for the 1980s. He went on to a stellar career in the NFL, including four Super Bowl appearances with the Buffalo Bills and one with the Atlanta Falcons.



### Johnny Mack Brown

Halfback, 1923-25  
Dothan, Ala.  
•1957 Inductee•

A two-year all-Southern Conference player, Brown is best remembered for his role in Alabama's 20-19 win over Washington in the 1926 Rose Bowl. He was on the receiving end of two long passes—a 58-yarder from Grant Gillis and a 62-yarder from Pooley Hubert—which fueled Bama to its victory. Inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1957, his performance in that '26 Rose Bowl earned him a spot on the all-time Rose Bowl team. Known as the "Dothan Antelope" during his playing days, he was the first of four brothers to play for the Tide. He died of a kidney disease Nov. 15, 1974 in Beverly Hills, Calif.



### Paul Bryant

Right End, 1933-35  
Fordyce, Ark.  
•1986 Inductee•

Often forgotten in the legend of Paul Bryant was his prowess as a football player for the Crimson Tide in his 1933-35 career. Known as the other end because of the superstar status of Don Hutson, Bryant did not live in total anonymity. He was a second team All-SEC selection in 1934 and a third team choice in 1935. Only 11 players were picked to the squads back then and the SEC had 13 members instead of today's 12. Known for his unquestioned toughness, Bryant played in the 1935 Tennessee game with a broken leg, a contest won by Bama 25-0.



### Johnny Cain

Fullback, 1930-32  
Montgomery, Ala.  
•1973 Inductee•

Known best as a powerful left-footed punter, Johnny "Hurri" Cain was the only sophomore starter on Alabama's 1931 Rose Bowl Championship team. A two-time All-America selection, Cain was named to the all-time Alabama team and in 1973 received the ultimate honor for a college football player when he was inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame. His most famous game as a punter was against Tennessee, the 1932 game which was played in a driving rainstorm, when he punted 19 times for an average of 48 yards a punt. He was a three-time member of the All-Southern Conference team.



### Harry Gilmer

Quarterback/Defensive Back, 1944-47  
Birmingham, Ala.  
•1993 Inductee•

One of the all-time football legends at Alabama, Harry Gilmer's deftness in passing, running, tackling, returning kicks and kicking highlighted an extraordinary career. An All-America and SEC Player of the Year in 1945, Harry was voted MVP of the Rose Bowl after leading Bama to a 34-14 victory over Southern California. His 16 career interceptions rate as second-best in Alabama history, while his 436 punt return yards in 1946 are the best in Bama annals. Gilmer accounted for 52 touchdowns in his Crimson Tide career, an Alabama school record. In 1946, he led the team in passing, rushing, interceptions, punt returns and kickoff returns.



### John Hannah

Guard, 1970-72  
Albertville, Ala.  
•1999 Inductee•

Considered the finest offensive lineman to play the game of football, John Hannah was a unanimous All-America selection in 1972. He was also named to some All-America teams in 1971 and was an All-SEC pick in 1971-72. He was a member of Alabama's Team of the Century, was selected to ESPN's all-time college football team in 1989 and was a member of Alabama's team of the decade for the 1970s. Named winner of the 1972 Jacobs Trophy, given annually to the best blocker in the SEC, Hannah went on to a stellar career in the NFL where he was elected to the NFL Hall of Fame. He is also a member of the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame.



### Frank Howard

Guard, 1928-30  
Barlow Bend, Ala.  
•1989 Inductee•

During his playing days at the Capstone, Howard was known as the "Little Giant of the Tide's Herd of Red Elephants." Those were productive years for Bama, especially Howard's senior year when Alabama claimed a national title and defeated Washington State 24-0 in the Rose Bowl. Howard coached at Clemson from 1940-69 and while a head coach he compiled a record of 165-118-2. Clemson's football stadium is named after him. He was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame in 1989.



### Dixie Howell

Halfback, 1932-34  
Hartford, Ala.  
•1970 Inductee•

In the first two years of the Southeastern Conference's existence, Millard Howell, better known as Dixie, led Alabama to a pair of conference titles and one national championship. An All-America choice in 1934, he is best remembered for his record-setting performance in Alabama's 29-13 win over Stanford in the 1935 Rose Bowl. He rushed for 111 yards, completed 9-of-13 passes for 160 more, and punted six times for a 43.8 average. He was elected to the college football Hall of Fame in 1970 and to the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame in 1993.



### Pooley Hubert

Quarterback, 1922-25  
Meridian, Miss.  
•1964 Inductee•

The second All-American football player in the school's history, he was a four-year letterman on Alabama teams that had a combined record of 31-6-2, including a 1925 squad that went unbeaten and made the Tide's first bowl appearance. He quarterbacked Alabama to the first of six Rose Bowl appearances and led the Tide to a 20-19 victory over Washington. Alabama fell behind 12-0 but Hubert rallied the Tide by scoring one TD and passing to Johnny Mack Brown for another. He was elected to the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame in 1964.



### Don Hutson

End, 1932-34  
Pine Bluff, Ark.  
•1951 Inductee•

Don Hutson established himself among college football's legends in the 1935 Rose Bowl game when he caught six passes for 165 yards and scored twice on passes of 59 and 54 yards in the Tide's 29-13 win over Stanford. Voted to the all-time college football team in 1969 and to Sports Illustrated's Silver Anniversary Team, Hutson left the Capstone to become the NFL's first superstar receiver while playing for the Green Bay Packers. His college coach Frank Thomas said of Hutson, "He was the best player I ever coached." Hutson, who came to Alabama on a partial baseball scholarship, also starred as a sprinter on the Tide's track team. He was selected to the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame in 1993.



### Lee Roy Jordan

Linebacker, 1960-62  
Excel, Ala.  
•1983 Inductee•

A two-time All-America selection for the Crimson Tide, Lee Roy Jordan is considered the best inside linebacker in Alabama football history. Voted Alabama's Player of the Decade for the 1960s and to the ESPN all-time college football team in 1989, Jordan was inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1983. During his career, Alabama compiled a 29-2-2 record and Jordan will forever be remembered for his unforgettable Orange Bowl performance against Oklahoma on New Year's Day, 1963. In that 17-0 Alabama triumph, Jordan was credited with 31 tackles.



### Woodrow Lowe

Linebacker, 1972-75  
Phenix, Ala.  
•2009 Inductee•

Woodrow Lowe was one of the Tide's all-time great linebackers, playing for legendary coach Paul "Bear" Bryant from 1972-75. One of just two Alabama players to be named a three-time All-American, he earned the honor from 1973-75. In 1973, Lowe set the Alabama single-season record with 134 tackles. He was Alabama's all-time leading tackler with 315 when he finished his career in 1975. Lowe was named to Alabama's first-team All-Decade Team and was a second-team All-Century selection. He missed only one game in 11 seasons with the San Diego Chargers and tallied 21 interceptions.



### Marty Lyons

Defensive Lineman, 1975-78  
Pinellas Park, Fla.  
•2011 Inductee•

A consensus All-American in 1978 and a two-time All-SEC selection in 1977 and 1978, Lyons was part of "The Goal Line Stand" in the 1979 Sugar Bowl as Alabama turn back Penn State 14-7 to capture the 1978 national championship. He made 59 tackles with five tackles for loss in 1977 to earn first-team All-SEC honors. In 1978, Lyons earned consensus All-America and All-SEC honors by recording 119 tackles and 15 tackles for loss. He served as a defensive captain of the 1978 team and was selected to the Tide's Team of the Century and to the All-Decade Team of the 1970s. Lyons had perhaps his best game in the 1978 Iron Bowl with 16 tackles and three quarterback sacks against Auburn. Lyons was selected by the New York Jets with the 14th pick of the first round in the 1979 NFL Draft. Lyons played 11 NFL seasons, amassing 29 sacks as part of the Jets "New York Sack Exchange."



### Vaughn Mancha

Center, 1944-47  
Birmingham, Ala.  
•1990 Inductee•

Vaughn Mancha earned the starting assignment at center in his first college game as a freshman against LSU in 1944. He never relinquished his spot and went on to a career that earned him a spot in the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame in 1990. He was a consensus All-America pick in 1945, a year in which the Tide posted a perfect 10-0 record and beat Southern California 34-14 in the Rose Bowl. During his career, he also played in a pair of Sugar Bowls.



### Johnny Musso

Halfback, 1969-71  
Birmingham, Ala.  
•2000 Inductee•

Johnny Musso earned All-America honors in 1970 and 1971, including unanimous selection in '71. He was SEC "Player of the Year" in 1971 as selected by the Nashville Banner, the Atlanta Touchdown Club and the Birmingham Quarterback Club. He was selected to Alabama's Team of the Century, the all-decade team of the '70s and is a member of the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame. The 1971 offensive team captain, he was also an Academic All-America and National Scholar Athlete winner. He rushed for 2,741 yards and 34 touchdowns and had 495 receiving yards and four touchdowns in his collegiate career.



### Billy Neighbors

Tackle, 1959-61  
Northport, Ala.  
•2003 Inductee•

One of the best to play for Coach Bear Bryant, Neighbors played on Tide teams that went 26-3-4 and won a national championship during his three year tenure. A unanimous All-America pick in 1961, Neighbors helped Alabama to three straight bowl appearances, including the 1962 Sugar Bowl and a perfect, 11-0 season. Defensively, Bama yielded just 25 points during the championship run. The MVP of the Senior Bowl, Neighbors won the SEC's Jacobs Trophy in 1961, given to the top blocking lineman. An All-Conference pick and team captain, he was selected in the sixth round of the AFL draft by the Boston Patriots.



### Ozzie Newsome

Split End, 1974-77  
Leighton, Ala.  
•1994 Inductee•

Voted Alabama's Player of the Decade for the 1970s, Ozzie made 102 receptions for 2,070 yards and 16 touchdowns during his Alabama playing career. He averaged 20.3 yards per catch, still the SEC's best mark on a minimum of 100 receptions, as the Tide went 42-6 during his career. Ozzie started 47 consecutive games and helped the Tide to win three Southeastern Conference championships. He also returned punts, averaging 7.5 yards per return on 40 returns. He went on to a 13-year NFL career, where he started 176 for the Cleveland Browns.

**Fred Sington**  
Tackle, 1928-30  
Birmingham, Ala.  
•1955 Inductee•

A consensus All-American and Phi Beta Kappa choice as well, Sington capped his brilliant career by leading the Tide to a perfect season in 1930 capped by a 24-0 win over Washington State in the Rose Bowl. Elected to the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1955, Sington was such a dominant lineman legendary Notre Dame coach Knute Rockne called him, "the greatest lineman in the country." Also a standout baseball player, Sington played professional baseball for the Washington Senators.



**Riley Smith**  
Quarterback, 1934-35  
Columbus, Miss.  
•1985 Inductee•

A converted fullback, a position he played in 1933, he quarterbacked Alabama in 1934-35, earning All-America honors. He also won the Jacobs Award, given annually to the SEC's best blocker. Still considered one of the best blockers in Alabama football history, he came back from an injury to lead the Tide to impressive wins over Georgia (17-7) and Tennessee (25-0) in his senior year. In the win over the Vols, he threw for one touchdown and ran for another. He was selected to the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1985.



**Gene Stallings**  
Head Coach, 1990-96  
Paris, Texas  
•2010 Inductee•

Gene Stallings was the head coach of the Crimson Tide from 1990-96, Stallings led Alabama to an on-field record of 70-16-1, while leading the Crimson Tide to the 1992 National Championship, one Southeastern Conference title (1992), four SEC West Division championships (1992, 1993, 1994 and 1996), five victories in postseason bowl games and four final top-10 national rankings. He coached 13 first-team All-Americans during his head coaching career. A member of College Football Hall of Fame coach Bear Bryant's "Junction Boys" as a player at Texas A&M and took over as head coach in 1965. After spending the next 17 seasons as an NFL coach, Stallings took over as head coach at Alabama in 1990.



**Derrick Thomas**  
Linebacker, 1985-88  
Miami, Fla.  
•2014 Inductee•

Perhaps no defensive player in Crimson Tide history had a greater ability to singlehandedly change the course of a football game than Derrick Thomas. Known as "The Sackman" during his Alabama days, Thomas was voted the Tide's Defensive Player of the Decade for the 1980s and was later selected to the Alabama Team of the Century. A unanimous All-American in 1988, Thomas posted an amazing 27 quarterback sacks as a senior in 1988, a national record that still stands. In 1987, he had set a new Tide standard for sacks with 18 - a total that would be dwarfed the following season. He finished his Alabama career with 52 sacks, a nation record. Thomas is one of a select group of defensive players in college football history to have finished among the top 10 in the voting for the Heisman Trophy, finishing 10th in the balloting in 1988. Thomas went on to an outstanding career with the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs and was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2009. He died February 8, 2000.



**Frank Thomas**  
Head Coach, 1931-46  
Muncie, Ind.  
•1951 Inductee•

Frank Thomas followed Wallace Wade as head coach at Alabama, being named to the position in January, 1931. A 1923 graduate of Notre Dame where he played for the legendary Knute Rockne, Thomas compiled a 115-24-7 (.812) as the head coach of the Crimson Tide. Six of his teams appeared in major bowls, including three Rose Bowl tilts and two of his teams were crowned national champions. He had four undefeated teams, including his 1934 and 1945 squads which won Rose Bowl championships. Among the players he coached at Alabama were Don Hutson, Dixie Howell, Riley Smith, Harry Gilmer, Vaughn Mancha, Johnny Cain, and Paul Bryant.



**Wallace Wade**  
Head Coach, 1923-30  
Trenton, Tenn.  
•1955 Inductee•

Under Wallace Wade's tutelage, Alabama football was established as a national power. During his eight year coaching tenure, the Crimson Tide compiled a 61-13-3 record and won three national championships. In 1925, he led the Tide to an undefeated record and to its first bowl game, a trip to Pasadena to play Washington in the Rose Bowl. Alabama won 20-19, clinching a first national title and forever establishing the Crimson Tide among the nation's football powers. Alabama also appeared in the 1927 and 1931 Rose Bowls under Wade. After Alabama beat Washington State 24-0 on January 1, 1931, Wade left the Capstone for Duke. He was inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1955. Wade died October 6, 1986.



**Don Whitmire**  
Tackle, 1941-42  
Decatur, Ala.  
•1956 Inductee•

An All-America tackle for the Crimson Tide, he helped the Tide to a 9-2-0 season in 1941 and an 8-3 mark in 1942, including a 37-21 win over Boston College in the Orange Bowl. He was later chosen to the all-time Orange Bowl squad. After the 1942 season, he moved to Annapolis and the Naval Academy. He was awarded the Knute Rockne Trophy, signifying him as being the nation's best lineman in 1943. He rose to greater heights in the Navy, advancing to the rank of admiral. He was chosen to the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame in 1956. Whitmire died May 4, 1991.

Although no Alabama football player had won the Heisman Trophy before Mark Ingram's victory in 2009, 20 Tide players have finished in the top 10 in Heisman balloting a total of 21 times. Following is a list of those Alabama players.

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# Crimson Tide Players in the Super Bowl

The MVP of Super Bowls I, II and III all played for Alabama. Bart Starr, who lettered from 1952-55, played in the league's first two championship games, quarterbacking the Green Bay Packers. Joe Namath, who lettered at Alabama from 1962-64, was the MVP of Super Bowl III, leading the New York Jets to victory. In all, Tide players have won 26 Super Bowl titles. Cornelius Bennett (1983-86) has played in the most Super Bowls, having appeared in five, four times with the Buffalo Bills and once with the Atlanta Falcons. Larry Roberts (1982-85), Jeff Rutledge (1975-78) and Bart Starr (1952-55) have each won two Super Bowl rings, tying for the most by a former UA player. Overall, 49 former Crimson Tide players have played on teams that have played in the Super Bowl.
