THE GAME: The No. 1/1 University of Alabama football team travels to Arlington, Texas, for its season opener with No. 20/17 USC in the AdvoCare Classic on Saturday, Sept. 3. The neutral site matchup at AT&T Stadium between the Crimson Tide and Trojans is scheduled for a 7 p.m. CT kickoff on ABC. Chris Fowler will serve as the play-by-play announcer with Kirk Herbstreit at his side as the color analyst. The pair will be joined by sideline reporter Sam Ponder. Eli Gold and Phil Savage will handle the radio call on the Crimson Tide Sports Network, with Chris Stewart serving as the sideline reporter. ESPN Radio will carry the game as well, with Bill Rosinski, David Norrie and Ian Fitzsimmons on the call.

PRESEASON RANKINGS: Alabama opens the 2016 campaign ranked No. 1 in both the Associated Press Preseason Poll and the Amway Coaches Poll. USC begins the season as the No. 20 team in the AP Poll and the 17th-ranked squad in Amway Coaches Poll.

USC: The Trojans are coming off an 8-6 year that ended with a 23-21 loss to Wisconsin in the Holiday Bowl. USC finished the regular season at 8-4 overall and 6-3 in the Pac-12 to earn a spot in the conference championship game. The Trojans are led by Clay Helton, who will be starting his first full season as the head coach at USC. Helton served as the Trojans' interim head coach for the final seven regular season games of 2015. After a 5-2 run in that span, Helton was named to the post permanently prior to the Pac-12 Championship Game. Helton has a career head coaching record of 6-4 that encompasses two stints as the interim head coach at USC (6-2) and two games as the full-time head coach at the end of 2015 (0-2). The Trojans return 14 starters and 54 lettermen in 2016.

SERIES HISTORY: Alabama and USC will meet for the eighth time in the history of the two programs, with the Crimson Tide owning a 5-2 advantage in the series. The most recent meeting between the two teams came on Dec. 28, 1985, in Honolulu, Hawaii, where Alabama capped a 9-2-1 season with a 24-3 victory over the Trojans in the Aloha Bowl.

NEXT GAME: Alabama will open its home schedule against Western Kentucky on Sept. 10 on ESPN2 with a 2:30 p.m. CT kickoff at Bryant-Denny Stadium. The Crimson Tide and Hilltoppers have met just twice all-time, with Alabama claiming victories in both contests. In the most recent meeting, the Tide recorded a 35-0 victory in Alabama's 2012 home opener.

ALABAMA ATHLETICS COMMUNICATIONS

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DOMES OPENERS: Under head coach Nick Saban, Alabama has played in six season-opening games inside a domed stadium. In those six contests, the Crimson Tide is a perfect 6-0 and owns a 213-98 scoring advantage over its opponents. Alabama opened the 2015 season inside AT&T Stadium with a 36-17 win over then-No. 20/18 Wisconsin.

DOMES SWEET DOMES: The Crimson Tide is 21-7-1 (.741) in domed stadiums, including a 12-2 mark since 2009 and 13-4 in Nick Saban's tenure. The Tide had four appearances in domes last season, including the season opener against Wisconsin and the Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic against Michigan State - both of which were at AT&T Stadium. Alabama also defeated Florida at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta to claim the program's 25th SEC title, and defeated Clemson at University of Phoenix Stadium in Glendale, Ariz., to win the school's 16th national championship.

NEUTRAL SITES: Alabama is 80-48-4 (.621) in neutral site contests. The list includes all Alabama-Auburn games not played on campus, including Legion Field from 1948-88. The Crimson Tide played four neutral site games last season, opening the year with a 35-17 win over Wisconsin in the AdvoCare Classic in Arlington, Texas. In the postseason, UA claimed its 25th SEC championship with its 29-15 win over Florida in Atlanta, and followed that with a 38-0 win over Michigan State in the Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic at AT&T Stadium. Alabama capped the season with a 45-40 win over Clemson in the CFP Championship Game at University of Phoenix Stadium. The Crimson Tide is 15-4 in neutral site games during head coach Nick Saban's tenure at Alabama.

GAME CAPTAINS: Former Alabama running back Johnny Musso and former USC running back Sam Cunningham will be the honorary captains for the AdvoCare Classic. Musso rushed for 85 yards and two touchdowns to lead Alabama to a 17-10 victory over the Trojans in Los Angeles in 1971. In 1970, Cunningham rushed for 135 yards and two touchdowns as USC defeated Alabama, 42-21, at Legion Field.

FACING OFF WITH THE BEST: The Crimson Tide has the fourth-toughest schedule in college football this season according to ESPN.com's College Football Power Index, trailing only USC, Ole Miss and Florida State. Alabama will face off with nine teams who participated in a bowl game a season ago and will meet four teams ranked in the Associated Press Preseason Top 25.

TIDE TO FACE NINE BOWL TEAMS IN 2016: Alabama's 2016 schedule will include nine bowl teams, tied for the third-most in the country. In addition to season-opening foe USC, the remaining bowl teams on the Tide's schedule are Western Kentucky, Ole Miss, Arkansas, Tennessee, Texas A&M, Mississippi State, LSU and Auburn. The nine teams combined for 7-2 record in bowl play last season. Only USC (11), BYU, Colorado, Ohio State and Ole Miss (10 each) meet more teams that appeared in the 2015 postseason.

ALABAMA HAS MOST WINS SINCE 2008: Dating back to the start of the 2008 season, Alabama has won 98 games, which is the most in the Football Bowl Subdivision. The Crimson Tide won 12 games in 2008, followed by a perfect 14-0 record in 2009, a 10-3 mark in 2010 and a 12-1 record in 2011. Alabama finished 13-1 in 2012, 11-2 in 2013, 12-2 in 2014 and 14-1 in 2015. Boise State is second with 90 wins while Oregon is third with 89 victories.

ALWAYS IN THE HUNT: Since the 2008 season, Alabama has played in only three regular season games that did not have national championship implications. Following the Crimson Tide's 24-21 loss to LSU during the 2010 calendar year, UA was essentially eliminated from a chance to keep itself in the national championship discussion. The final three games of that season mark the only three regular season contests without direct national championship implications during that time.

BEATING THE BEST: The Crimson Tide is 39-12 (.764) against the Associated Press Top 25, including a 22-6 (.786) mark against AP Top 10 teams since the start of 2008. This season, the Tide will face off against four teams in the AP preseason poll. Alabama finished 8-1 in 2015 against the AP top 25 after going 5-2 in 2014, 3-2 in 2013 and 5-1 in 2012. The Tide held a 4-1 mark vs. top-25 teams in 2011 and went 5-3 against the AP Top 25 in 2010.

NFL DRAFT: The Crimson Tide saw seven former UA players selected in the 2016 NFL Draft, including first-round pick Ryan Kelly who went 18th overall to the Indianapolis Colts. Linebacker Reggie Ragland was the next to go (41st, Buffalo Bills) followed by Derrick Henry (45th, Tennessee Titans), A'Shawn Robinson (46th, Detroit Lions), Jarran Reed (49th, Seattle Seahawks) and Cyrus Jones (60th, New England Patriots), all in the second round. Running back Kenyan Drake rounded out the 2016 NFL Draft class when he was chosen by the Miami Dolphins at 73rd overall in the third round.

LEADING THE WAY TO THE NFL: Alabama has had more draft picks over the last six drafts (44) than any other college in the nation. Fifteen of those picks have been first-round selections and 25 have gone in the first two rounds. The list of 44 features four Super Bowl champions, seven Pro Bowl selections, one All-Pro and one Offensive Rookie of the Year.

RETURNING SUCCESS: The Crimson Tide returns 14 starters and 46 letterwinners from its 2015 squad that finished 14-1 as the SEC and national champions. The 2016 team returns five starters on a veteran defense including Jonathan Allen, Eddie Jackson and Reuben Foster. The offense welcomes back key pass catchers in tight end O.J. Howard and receiver Calvin Ridley.

OFF-THE-FIELD NOTES

ALABAMA DEGREES: Alabama's success on the field over the past nine seasons under the direction of head coach Nick Saban has coincided with the Crimson Tide's success in the classroom. **The 2016 squad features nine players who already have degrees in hand going into the season opener with USC.** Over the previous eight seasons (2008-15) Alabama saw **94 degrees earned (graduate and undergraduate)** by players who were still suiting up for the Crimson Tide after having graduated. Since the 2010 season, Alabama has seen an impressive **11 players earn a master's degree** before stepping foot on the field. In 2015, the Crimson Tide led all bowl teams with a total of 29 players who earned their degrees prior to the start of postseason play. Three of the 29 earned their master's degrees during the 2015 season.

GRADUATING WITH THE BEST: The Alabama football team has not only been dominant on the field, but also in the classroom. The Crimson Tide ranks fourth among Associated Press Preseason Top 25 teams for its graduation rate of 86 percent. Ahead of Alabama are only Stanford (99 percent) and Notre Dame (93 percent) and UCLA (89 percent). Alabama's percentage was the Southeastern Conference's highest graduation success rate (GSR) of all 14 SEC football programs.

ALABAMA IN THE AP POLL

Alabama has been ranked in 744 of the 1,106 Associated Press college football polls since 1936, according to the AP Poll Archive. The Crimson Tide owns a 454-127-8 (.777) all-time record in games when ranked in the Associated Press college football poll, including a 96-15 (.864) mark under head coach Nick Saban. The Crimson Tide is also ranked in the AP poll for the 131st consecutive week, topping its previous streak set in the mid 1990s when UA was ranked for 71 straight weeks under head coach Gene Stallings. Alabama has started five seasons at No. 1 (2016, 2013, 2010, 1978, 1966).

ALABAMA IN THE COACHES POLL

The Crimson Tide has enjoyed much success in the coaches rankings over the past half century. The United Press International debuted the coaches poll in 1950 and ran the poll through the 1990 season. *USA TODAY* has administered the poll for the past 25 seasons (1991-2015), and in 2014, Amway became the title sponsor. Alabama was ranked No. 1 in the 2010 preseason coaches' poll after starting out the 2009 preseason poll at No. 5. Alabama remained in the top five the entire season, reaching No. 1 after defeating Florida in the SEC Championship and holding the position to claim the national championship after defeating Texas in Pasadena. The Tide then claimed the No. 1 spot to close out the 2011, 2012 and 2015 seasons. The Tide has compiled five UPI (1961, 1964, 1973 & 1979) and five *USA TODAY* (1992, 2009, 2011, 2012 & 2015) coaches poll national titles.

ACADEMIC PROWESS: The Tide has been a model of success on the football field, but the team has generated plenty of accolades in the classroom as well. Below are some of the academic highlights under head coach Nick Saban.

- A total of nine Crimson Tide players will take the field with their degrees in hand for the season opener with USC.
- Earned Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 86 this year, the highest across all 14 SEC football programs.
- In 2015, for the third consecutive year, Alabama football led the nation in graduates on its roster during postseason play (29 in 2015, 22 in 2014; 28 in 2013).
- Alabama's last four national title football teams (2009, 201, 2012, 2015) included 89 players who had earned their degrees prior to game time.
- The 2014 team was recognized as one of the nation's top academic programs, ranking third in the annual academic rankings of the top 25 college football teams produced by New America, a Washington D.C. think-tank.
- The 2011 BCS national championship team had 21 graduates playing in the bowl game, which was the second most in the country.
- That 2011 team led the SEC with 38 student-athletes being named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll
- The 2009 BCS national championship team led the country with 11 graduates playing in the bowl game.
- In 2015-16, Alabama tied for the lead in the in number of football student-athletes being named to the SEC First-Year Academic Honor Roll with 10 honorees. Alabama topped that list in 2009, 2010 and 2011.

CRIMSON TIDE IN THE COMMUNITY: Last season, Alabama worked 400-plus hours of community service in Tuscaloosa and the surrounding areas. The team volunteered their time across numerous areas last season including in schools, hospitals, with Habitat for Humanity and on campus.

ALABAMA ATHLETICS AS A WHOLE: The University of Alabama has built a total program, winning championships on the field and bringing home plenty of academic awards in the classroom.

- Since 2008, Crimson Tide athletics teams have won 10 national championships in five different sports and 22 SEC championships in seven different sports.
- Alabama claimed two SEC team titles during the 2015-16 academic year - football and women's golf.
- The overall cumulative grade-point average of UA student-athletes in 2015-16 was 3.16.
- Twelve Crimson Tide teams had cumulative GPAs above 3.0 for 2015-16
- Alabama student-athletes earned SEC Academic Honor Roll recognition 350 times during the 2015-16 academic year. The Crimson Tide had 82, 59 and 126 student-athletes named to the SEC Fall, Winter and Spring Academic Honor Rolls and 83 named to the First-Year Academic Honor Roll.
- Since 2000, UA has produced 113 Academic All-America honorees, which ranks third nationally over that span behind only Nebraska (136) and Notre Dame (125). Alabama passed Stanford (106) and Penn State (99) round out the top five.
- Since 2010, UA leads all NCAA Division I schools with 65 Academic All-America honors. Stanford is second over that span with 62, while Nebraska is third at 53.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

VETERAN DEFENSE: The 2015 Alabama defense includes five starters from a season ago. Those five return 245 total tackles, 32 tackles for loss and 16 sacks to this year's team. Of those returning starters, three come from the Tide secondary, including senior Eddie Jackson, who recorded 46 tackles, three tackles for loss and six interceptions. Jackson set a school record with 230 return yards on his interceptions and took two back for touchdowns. Senior linebacker Reuben Foster leads all returnees with 73 total tackles. Returning senior defensive lineman Jonathan Allen was the team leader in tackles for loss (14.5) and sacks (12.0) in 2015.

10 POINTS OR FEWER: Under head coach Nick Saban, the Crimson Tide has held opponents to 10 points or fewer 57 times since the start of the 2007 season. In 2015, Alabama held six opponents to 10 points or less and recorded two shutouts. In 2014, Alabama shut out two opponents and held seven opponents to two touchdowns or less. Alabama held 9-of-13 opponents to 10 points or less in 2013 with three shutouts. Seven opponents were limited to 10 points or less in 2012, four of which were shutouts. Alabama was successful in holding opponents in the 0-10 point range in nine games in 2011 and eight times in 2010. UA kept opponents within that range seven times in both 2008 and 2009, and in 2007 posted two games in which it held opponents to 0-10 points. Alabama has shut out the opposition 17 times during the Saban era.

HARD TO FIND THE END ZONE AGAINST THE TIDE: Since the start of the 2009 season, no defense has allowed fewer touchdowns than the Crimson Tide. Alabama's defense has surrendered only 142 touchdowns over the last 95 games. That is 43 fewer than the second most in the nation (Florida with 185).

HOLDING OPPONENTS UNDER 200: During head coach Nick Saban's last 110 games at the Capstone (since the start of the 2008 season), the Crimson Tide defense has held the opposing offense to fewer than 200 yards of total offense 36 times, including four times in 2015 (Florida – 180, Charleston Southern – 134, LSU – 182 yards, ULM – 92). Alabama's best came in 2009 when the Tide held Chattanooga to 84 yards of total offense.

HOLDING OPPONENTS UNDER 300: In head coach Nick Saban's tenure at Alabama, the Crimson Tide has limited opponents to under 300 yards of total offense 76 times, or 62.3 percent of the time. Alabama limited the opposition to less than 300 yards of offense 10 times in 2015 (Michigan State, 239 yards; Florida, 180; Auburn, 260; LSU, 182; Arkansas, 220; Georgia, 299; ULM, 92; Middle Tennessee, 275; Wisconsin, 268).

TOUGH SLEDDING ON THE GROUND: Alabama allowed only seven rushing touchdowns in 15 games in 2015, second-lowest total in the country (Boston College allowed six in 12 games). The Tide leads the nation in allowing the fewest rushing touchdowns since the start of the 2005 season, surrendering only 78. Since head coach Nick Saban arrived in 2007, the Crimson Tide has allowed 62 rushing touchdowns. Ohio State is No. 2 in that category, giving up 96 since 2007.

RUSHING DEFENSE: Alabama has surrendered only 16 individual 100-yard rushing performances dating back to the 2005 season, a mark that leads the nation. Since head coach Nick Saban's arrival in 2007, the Tide has allowed only 11 players to rush for more than 100 yards in a game: Georgia's Nick Chubb (146 on Oct. 3, 2015), Ohio State's Ezekiel Elliot (230 on Jan. 1, 2015), Auburn's Tre Mason (164 on Nov. 30, 2013), Virginia Tech's Trey Edmunds (132 on Aug. 31, 2013), Georgia's Todd Gurley (122 yards on Dec. 1, 2012), LSU's Jeremy Hill (107 on Nov. 3, 2012), Georgia Southern's Dominique Swope (153 on Nov. 19, 2011), Tennessee's Tauren Poole (117 on Oct. 23, 2010), Ole Miss's BenJarvus Green-Ellis (131 on Oct. 13, 2007), Houston's Anthony Alridge (100 on Oct. 6, 2007) and Darren McFadden of Arkansas (195 on Sept. 15, 2007).

OFFENSIVE NOTES

RIDLEY LED ALL SEC FRESHMAN RECEIVERS: In 2015, Calvin Ridley broke the school and SEC single-season freshman record for receptions with 89. He finished with the second-highest catch total by a true freshman receiver in FBS history behind Antonio Brown's mark of 102 at Central Michigan in 2007. Ridley also set the Alabama single-season freshman receiving record for yards with 1,045, eclipsing the previous mark of 1,000 held by Amari Cooper (2012).

HOWARD AMONG ACTIVE TIGHT END LEADERS: Alabama senior tight end O.J. Howard ranks among the national leaders in receptions and yards among active tight ends. Howard's 1,131 yards is fifth on the list of returning tight ends and his 69 career receptions is the 10th-best total in the group.

FIRST-YEAR QUARTERBACKS: Alabama will open the 2016 season with a new starting quarterback for the fifth time under head coach Nick Saban. Since 2009, Alabama's four previous rookie signal callers posted a record of 52-3 (.945) and won three national championships.

FIRST HALF POINTS: Alabama has scored in the first half of its last 118 games, the longest streak in the nation. The last time UA failed to score in the first half was on Sept. 29, 2007, when Alabama and Florida State headed into halftime in a scoreless tie. The Seminoles won that game, 21-14. Alabama owns a 102-16 record during that streak.

SCORING STREAK CONTINUES: Entering the 2016 season, the Crimson Tide has scored in 198 consecutive games – the longest streak in program history.

RUSHING TO SUCCESS: Alabama is 80-4 since the start of the 2008 season when rushing for at least 140 yards. The only losses were at Auburn in 2013, Ole Miss and Ohio State in 2014, and Ole Miss in 2015. The Crimson Tide rushed for 140 yards or more 10 times in 2015.

BALL PROTECTION: In its past 109 games dating back to a 20-6 win over Tulane on Sept. 6, 2008, Alabama has turned the ball over only 127 times (70 fumbles, 57 interceptions) for 1.17 turnovers per game. Since 2009, that mark is even better as the Tide has turned the ball over only 108 times in 96 games (1.13/gm). Since 2009, UA starting quarterbacks have thrown an impressively low 44 interceptions in 2,603 attempts (1 INT every 59.2 attempts). Dating back to the 2009 season, the top two running backs in the rotation have lost a fumble only 20 times. Over that 109-game span, the top two running backs have recorded 2,877 touches, losing a fumble once every 143.9 touches.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

SCOTT AMONG THE NATION'S BEST PUNTERS: Junior punter JK Scott is again a candidate for the Ray Guy Award, presented annually to the nation's top punter. Scott proved to be nothing short of amazing as a freshman in 2014, averaging 48.0 yards per punt to lead the nation. He also helped Alabama lead the nation in net punting at 44.67 yards per punt. Scott placed 26 of his 55 punts (56.4 percent) inside the 20, which was the best percentage nationally. The punter also had 23 boots of 50 yards or more last season with seven kicks of over 60 yards and two over 70 yards with a career long of 73. As a sophomore in 2015, Scott averaged 44.2 yards per punt on 70 attempts with 21 kicks of 50 yards or more. He placed 25 of his punts inside the 20 and forced 18 fair catches a season ago.

GRIFFITH CLOSING IN ON TOP TEN: With 228 career points (36 FG, 120 PAT) entering the 2016 season, senior placekicker Adam Griffith sits just four points out of 10th place on Alabama's all-time scoring list. Running back Johnny Musso scored 232 points (38 TD, 2 2-point conversions) from 1969-71 and currently sits in 10th. Griffith is also No. 6 on Alabama's all-time kick-scoring list. Jeremy Shelley is No. 5 on the list with 304 kicking points (44 FG, 133 PAT) from 2009-12.

NON-OFFENSIVE TDs IN THE SABAN ERA: Kenyan Drake's 95-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in the fourth quarter of the 2016 CFP National Championship Game against Clemson marked the 46th non-offensive touchdown of the Nick Saban era. In 2015, the Tide recorded 10 non-offensive touchdowns. The Crimson Tide took a school-record three interceptions back for touchdowns against Texas A&M on Oct. 17, first a 33-yard return by Minkah Fitzpatrick, then a return of 93 yards by Eddie Jackson and, finally, a 55-yard return to seal the victory, once again by Fitzpatrick. It was the first time since 2013 that Alabama had three non-offensive touchdowns in a single game. Prior to the A&M game, UA returned both a blocked punt and an interception for touchdowns against Georgia. Since Saban took over in 2007, Alabama has garnered 19 interception returns, 13 punt returns, six kickoff returns, four fumble returns and four blocked punt returns for a touchdown. Alabama scored one non-offensive touchdown in 2014. The Tide scored seven non-offensive touchdowns in 2013, including three in the season opener against Virginia Tech, marking the first time the Crimson Tide had done so in a game since Sept. 30, 1995, against Georgia.

SERIES NOTES

THE ALABAMA-USC SERIES: Alabama and USC will meet for the eighth time in the history of the two programs, with the Crimson Tide owning a 5-2 advantage in the series. Alabama won the first two meetings in the series - 19-7 in 1938 in Los Angeles and 34-14 in the 1946 Rose Bowl. The teams met four times in the 1970s with both winning twice on the other team's field. Alabama claimed 17-10 and 21-20 wins at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum in 1971 and 1977, respectively. The Trojans claimed 42-21 and 24-14 victories at Legion Field in Birmingham in 1970 and 1978. The most recent meeting between the two teams came on Dec. 28, 1985, in Honolulu, where Alabama capped a 9-2-1 season with a 24-3 victory over the Trojans in the Aloha Bowl.

USC CONNECTIONS: Alabama offensive coordinator Lane Kiffin served as USC's head coach from 2010-13. Kiffin also served as an assistant coach for the Trojans from 2001-06, serving as the offensive coordinator in 2005 and 2006. USC offensive line coach Neil Callaway was the offensive line coach for the Tide from 1997-2000 and played for Alabama from 1974-77. First-year USC tight end assistant Keary Colbert was a member of Alabama's support staff in 2014-15.

GENERAL NOTES

ALABAMA'S TV RECORD: Alabama has compiled a 239-131-4 (.644) all-time record in 374 televised games (not including pay-per-view, tape-delayed or closed circuit telecasts). The Crimson Tide were 14-1 in televised games in 2015.

93 NATIONAL TV APPEARANCES IN 109 GAMES: With a victory over Clemson in the 2016 College Football Playoff National Championship Game, Alabama has now played in 93 nationally televised games since the start of the 2008 season, including every contest the past two seasons. The Crimson Tide was featured on CBS seven times in 2015, including at Georgia, at Texas A&M, at Mississippi State and at Auburn; home against Tennessee and LSU and against Florida in the SEC Championship Game. The ABC family of networks hosted the other eight contests during the 2015 season, including the season opener against Wisconsin and Clemson (ABC), against Middle Tennessee, Louisiana-Monroe and Charleston Southern (SEC Network) and on ESPN for the Ole Miss, Arkansas and Michigan State games. In 2014, UA was televised in eight games on the ABC family of networks including contests with West Virginia (ABC), FAU (SEC Network), Southern Miss (ESPN2), at Arkansas (ESPN), at Tennessee (ESPN2), Western Carolina (SEC Network), the most-viewed college football game ever on ESPN, the Iron Bowl against Auburn and the Sugar Bowl against Ohio State (ESPN). The Tide also played in six contests that were televised on CBS, including versus Florida, at Ole Miss, against Texas A&M, in the Bayou against LSU, versus top-ranked Mississippi State, and finally in the SEC Championship against the Missouri Tigers. Eleven of the Crimson Tide's 13 games in 2013 were televised nationally with the Virginia Tech, Arkansas, Mississippi State and Oklahoma games on ESPN, the Texas A&M, Tennessee, LSU and Auburn games on CBS, the Colorado State and Kentucky games on ESPN2. UA played 12 nationally televised games in 2012, with one game on ABC, six on CBS and five on ESPN. In 2011, Alabama played on CBS four times, while having one on ABC, two on ESPN and ESPN2, and one game on ESPNU. In 2010, Alabama had five games on CBS, three on ESPN, two on ESPN2, one on ABC and one on ESPNU. In 2009, UA played two games on ABC (including the BCS title game), and six on CBS, while ESPN televised two more Crimson Tide games. In 2008, Alabama had 10 of its 14 games televised nationally, including five on CBS, three on ESPN, one on ABC and one on FOX.

10-WIN SEASONS: With last season's 56-6 victory over Charleston Southern, Alabama reached the 10-win milestone for the eighth consecutive season. The eight straight years with 10 wins extends the school record. The previous total for most consecutive 10-win seasons was five, set by coach Paul "Bear" Bryant's teams from 1971-75. In 120 seasons, the Tide has won 10 or more games 35 times, one behind Oklahoma (36) for the most 10-win seasons in college football history. Alabama has produced ten 10-win seasons since 2002 (2002, 2005, 2008-2015). Bryant had a school-record 12 10-win seasons at Alabama, while Saban is second with eight.

SEC RECORD: In 2015, Alabama extended its record for most consecutive 10-win seasons in SEC history when it defeated Charleston Southern on Nov. 21, 2015, to improve to 10-1 on the year. UA had a 12-2 record in 2008, 14-0 in 2009, 10-3 in 2010, 12-1 in 2011, 13-1 in 2012, 11-2 in 2013, 12-2 in 2014 and 14-1 in 2015.

95-6 UNDER SABAN WHEN LEADING AT THE HALF: Under head coach Nick Saban (since 2007), the Crimson Tide is 95-6 (.941) when leading at the half. Alabama led at the half in 11 of its 15 games in 2015, trailing Ole Miss and Arkansas, tied at 7-7 versus Tennessee and 14-14 vs. Clemson. UA had converted 36 straight halftime leads into wins before falling at Auburn on Nov. 30, 2013. The Crimson Tide had converted 28 consecutive halftime leads into victories before seeing that streak snapped in 2010 against LSU. Alabama held a 20-17 halftime lead before losing to LSU, 41-34, in 2007 at Bryant-Denny Stadium. In 2010, the Tide led 10-3 at the half before the Tigers rallied for a 24-20 win in Death Valley. Alabama lost 28-27 to Auburn to close out the 2010 season, after leading 24-7 at the half. The Crimson Tide is 4-8 under Saban when trailing at halftime after coming away with a victory against Arkansas on Oct. 10, despite trailing 7-3 at half. The four wins in the Saban era when trailing at the half: 34-24 over No. 7 Virginia Tech in 2009 (in Atlanta); a 24-15 over No. 9 LSU in 2009; 24-20 at Arkansas in 2010; 27-14 vs. Arkansas in 2015. His Tide teams are 4-3 when tied at halftime, and Alabama's four wins under Saban when tied at halftime: at LSU in 2008, (27-21), at Auburn in 2009 (26-21), against Tennessee in 2011 (37-6) and against Tennessee this season (19-14).

SEASON OPENERS: Alabama has compiled a 97-21-3 (.814) all-time record in season openers, and is in the midst of a 14-game winning streak. Dating back to the 1977 season, Alabama is 35-4 in its last 39 season opening contests and the Tide has posted a 22-2 opening day record since 1991. The 2016 season marks the 17th consecutive year that the Crimson Tide has opened the season with a non-conference opponent.

COACH SABAN IN SEASON OPENERS: Head coach Nick Saban is 17-3 in his collegiate career in season openers, including a perfect 9-0 mark at Alabama. He led UA to a 52-6 win over Western Carolina on Sept. 1, 2007, in his inaugural game with the Crimson Tide. He followed that up with a 34-10 win over Clemson in 2008 and a 34-24 victory over Virginia Tech in 2009, with both games being played in Atlanta. In 2010, Saban guided Alabama to a 48-3 win over San Jose State and followed with a 48-7 victory over Kent State in 2011, both games being played at Bryant-Denny Stadium. The Tide headed to Arlington, Texas, in 2012, downing then-No. 8 Michigan, 41-14, before returning to Atlanta the next two seasons. The 2013 season began with a 34-10 win over Virginia Tech and the Tide came home with a 33-23 victory against West Virginia to kick off 2014. Alabama returned to Arlington in 2015 and defeated Wisconsin, 35-17. Saban won his very first collegiate game on Sept. 8, 1990, as he led Toledo to a 20-14 win over Miami (Ohio). He was 3-2 in season openers at Michigan State and 4-1 in season openers at LSU.

OPENING DAY SUCCESS UNDER SABAN: Alabama has been dominant in season openers under head coach Nick Saban. The Tide is a perfect 9-0 under Saban and has won in impressive fashion. Alabama has outscored its opponents 359-114 in those games and has outgained the opposition, 3,978-1,769. The Tide has averaged 39.8 points per opening contest under Saban and given up just 12.6 points per contest. UA has amassed 442.0 total yards per opener and surrendered just 196.6 yards per matchup.

SEASON OPENERS BY HEAD COACH: Coach Nick Saban currently stands at a perfect 9-0 in season openers during his tenure at the Capstone. Coach Frank Thomas (1931-46) set the Tide's standard for coaches on opening day, compiling a 13-0-2 record in his 15 seasons at Alabama. Legendary coach Paul W. "Bear" Bryant (1958-82) is the school's winningest coach in openers, logging 18 opening day wins across his 25-year career. Bryant's record in Alabama season openers was 18-6-1 (.740), including a six-game winning streak to close out his career.

SEASON OPENERS BY OPPONENT: The Crimson Tide will open the 2016 season with USC, marking the eighth meeting between the two teams in the storied history of both programs. Alabama has met the Trojans three times in season openers, with the Tide winning two of those contests. All-time, Alabama has met 60 different opponents on opening day. The Tide's most common opening day opponent is Howard (now Samford). UA has also played five current SEC teams on opening day, compiling a 14-8-1 (.630) record against Ole Miss, Georgia, Vanderbilt, Florida and LSU. The Tide has not opened the season against an SEC opponent since a 28-17 win at Vanderbilt in 1999.

SEASON OPENERS BY SITE: Alabama has played its season opener in 19 different cities in its football history. The most common venue for the Tide's season opener is on the UA campus in Tuscaloosa, where Alabama has opened its season 52 times and compiled a 49-2-1 record. The Tide is 19-1-1 in season-opening games at Bryant-Denny Stadium (circa 1929). UA opened the 2008, 2009, 2013 and 2014 seasons at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta and will head to Arlington, Texas, for a third time this season. Alabama traveled to AT&T Stadium in 2012 and defeated then-No. 8 Michigan, 41-14. The Tide returned to Arlington a year ago and opened the 2015 season with a 35-17 win over Wisconsin.

ALABAMA VS. THE PAC-12: Alabama has played 23 games in program history against the current members of the Pac-12 Conference and owns a 15-7-1 record all-time in those contests. The Crimson Tide has played eight of the 12 league members with Arizona, Arizona State, Oregon and Oregon State being the only teams the Tide has not faced. Season-opening opponent USC has matched up with Alabama the most with the two teams meeting a total of seven times and Alabama holding a 5-2 series lead. Alabama is 2-3 in its last five meetings with Pac-12 teams dating back to 1991. The Crimson Tide is 3-3 all-time in season openers against the conference and 2-1 in openers against the Trojans.

SABAN VS. THE PAC-12: Crimson Tide head coach Nick Saban has faced current Pac-12 teams a total of eight times in his career. Saban's teams are 4-4 all-time against Pac-12 opponents, including a 3-1 mark in the regular season and a 2-0 record in season openers. Saban's 1999 Michigan State squad posted a 27-20 season-opening win over Oregon in East Lansing and his 2004 LSU team opened their season with a 22-21 win over Oregon State in Baton Rouge. The Crimson Tide is 1-1 against the Pac-12 under Saban, with both games occurring in the postseason. Alabama defeated Colorado, 30-24, in the 2007 Independence Bowl and fell to Utah, 31-17, in the 2009 Sugar Bowl. This will be Saban's first meeting with USC.

SABAN AMONG 20-YEAR LEADERS: Alabama's 45-40 win over Clemson in the 2016 College Football Playoff Championship Game was head coach Nick Saban's 191st victory in 20 years as a college head coach. That total is the second-most in FBS history for a coach in the first 20 seasons of his career. Former Nebraska head coach Tom Osborne won 195 games in the opening two decades of his tenure in Lincoln. Long-time Penn State head coach Joe Paterno ranks third with 187. Saban's five national championships in 20 seasons tops both Osborne (none) and Paterno (1).

SABAN MOVING UP SEC WINS LIST: Alabama head coach Nick Saban is quickly moving up the charts for victories in SEC regular season games against conference opponents with 93. His 93 wins rank seventh in SEC history, five behind Shug Jordan (Auburn) and Phillip Fulmer (Tennessee) on the league's list of conference wins. Each coach ahead of Saban on the list, except for former South Carolina and Florida head coach Steve Spurrier, is in the College Football Hall of Fame. Paul "Bear" Bryant tops the list with 159 conference wins at Kentucky (1946-53) and Alabama (1958-82). Spurrier is second with 131 league wins followed by Johnny Vaught (Ole Miss, 106), Vince Dooley (Georgia, 105), Jordan (Auburn, 98) and Fulmer (Tennessee, 98). Saban ranks second in league history in SEC regular season winning percentage at .790 (94-25). He is fifth in league history in all-time winning percentage at .812 (147-34) and ranks ninth all-time for career wins.

NEW HIRES: Nick Saban made three new additions to his 2016 staff during the offseason, hiring Derrick Ansley to coach the secondary, Karl Dunbar to lead the defensive line and bringing in Brent Key to coach the offensive guards and centers. Ansley rejoins the Crimson Tide staff after four seasons at Tennessee (2012) and Kentucky (2013-15). He previously served as a graduate assistant under Saban in 2010 and 2011. Dunbar is returning to college football after a decade in the National Football League with the Bills, Jets and Vikings from 2006-2015. Dunbar also worked as a defensive line coach with the Bears in 2004. He previously coached at the college level with LSU, Oklahoma and Nicholls (La.) State. Key joined the Alabama staff after 11 seasons at UCF, most recently serving as the Knights' offensive coordinator and running backs coach.

SABAN AND FIRST ROUND NFL DRAFT PICKS: Since the advent of the NFL Draft, Alabama head coach Nick Saban ranks third all-time among college coaches who have tutored first round draft picks. Saban has coached a total of 23 players who were chosen in the opening round of the draft, including 18 from Alabama.

CRIMSON TIDE PLAYERS ON NFL ROSTERS: The Alabama football program is well-represented in the NFL heading into the 2016-17 season with numerous former players dotting league rosters. The Tide has 54 former players (active or injured reserve) working on an active NFL roster this season, the second-most nationally behind only LSU (55). In the last eight NFL Drafts, Alabama has had 55 players selected, including 18 players in first round, 17 in the second and third rounds, five in the fourth, seven in the fifth, one in the sixth and seven in the seventh round.

- Saban has a 191-60-1 (.760) record as a college head coach to date. He has five national championships – four at Alabama – seven conference championships and 17 of his teams have played in postseason bowl games, including a trip to the BCS National Championship Game following the 2003, 2009, 2011 and 2012 seasons and the College Football Playoff National Championship Game in 2015.

- Saban is the only coach to win four BCS national championships and the only coach to win back-to-back BCS national championships. He has won five titles in his last 13 years coaching college football after capturing CFP National Championship following the 2015 season. Saban is one of three college coaches in the poll era (since 1936) to win three national championships in four years, joining Frank Leahy (Notre Dame - 1946-47, 1949) and Tom Osborne (Nebraska - 1994-95, 1997). He is also just the second coach in the poll era to win five national championships (Paul "Bear" Bryant).

- In 2009, Saban produced Alabama's first national championship in 17 years by guiding the Crimson Tide to a 14-0 season with dominant wins over Florida in the SEC championship and Texas in the Citi BCS National Championship Game. He then followed that up with his second BCS championship in three years with a 21-0 shutout of LSU following the 2011 season at the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. He made it back-to-back BCS national championships in 2012 with a 42-14 win over Notre Dame in the Discover BCS National Championship Game. He then took down Clemson 45-40 to capture title No. 5 following the 2015 season in the CFP National Championship Game.

- In addition to the on-field success, the 2011 team was also recognized with the Disney Spirit Award, which was presented to snapper Carson Tinker, for the team's response to the community following the tornado that devastated Tuscaloosa on April 27, 2011. The Tide also had extensive success in the classroom that year with 38 SEC Academic Honor Roll selections, a league record, and produced an Academic All-American in Barrett Jones.

- His most recent college head coaching stint, a five-season run at LSU, produced a record of 48-16 (.750), one national championship (2003), two Southeastern Conference championships, three SEC West Division championships, and a 3-2 record in bowl games including two Sugar Bowl victories and a Peach Bowl win. The Tigers constructed a 28-12 (.700) record against SEC opponents under Saban's guidance. He was named the 2003 National Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and earned both the Paul W. "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award by the Football Writers Association of America. Saban was named SEC Coach of the Year twice (by the Birmingham News in 2001 and by the Associated Press in 2003).

- Saban served as head coach at Michigan State from 1995-99, his second stint at the East Lansing school as he also spent 1983-87 as the Spartans' defensive coordinator/secondary coach. After playing in just one bowl game in the previous four years, Michigan State made four postseason appearances in Saban's five years at the helm. Saban led MSU to a 34-24-1 (.585) record as head coach.

- In 1999, Saban led his final Spartans team to a No. 7 national ranking as MSU finished in a tie for second in the Big Ten. The Spartans defeated Notre Dame, Michigan, Ohio State and Penn State in the same year for the first time since 1965 and recorded six wins at home for the first time since the 1912 season. The Spartans' performance that year landed them a spot in the Citrus Bowl. The Spartans led the Big Ten in rushing defense (77.0 yards per game) and total defense (299.0 yards per game) while ranking fifth nationally in rushing defense and 11th in total defense. The Michigan State offense averaged 31.0 points per game.

- Saban's first head coaching position came at the University of Toledo in 1990, as he guided the Rockets to a record of 9-2 that year, finishing as co-champions of the Mid-American Conference. The Rockets ranked among the NCAA leaders in both total defense (12th at 284.8 yards) and scoring defense (16th at 16.2 points), and missed posting an undefeated record by a mere five points.

- A native of Fairmont, W.Va., Saban is a 1973 graduate of Kent State University where he earned a bachelor's degree in business. He earned a master's degree in sports administration from Kent State in 1975. Born October 31, 1951, Saban and his wife, the former Terry Constable, have two children, Nicholas and Kristen. They have one granddaughter, Amélie, and a daughter-in-law, Kelsé.

- At Michigan State, Saban started the "Nick's Kids" Foundation, which the Sabans continue here in Tuscaloosa. Since their arrival at the University of Alabama, the Sabans have helped raise approximately \$5.5 million for "Nick's Kids" that has been distributed to more than 250 charities and organizations throughout the state of Alabama and the Southeast. The Sabans also built 16 homes, one for each of the Tide's national championships, with Project Team Up and Habitat for Humanity following the April 27, 2011, tornado that stuck Tuscaloosa.

- In June of 2008, the Sabans announced a \$1 million gift to benefit Alabama's first-generation scholarship program. The gift has a special meaning to the Sabans as both Nick and Terry were both first-generation graduates.
