Series Notes: Alabama and Florida State will meet for the fifth time in the history of the two storied programs. The Crimson Tide holds a 2-1-1 advantage in the series, but the Seminoles were victorious in the latest pairing, claiming a 21-14 victory on Sept. 29, 2007, in Jacksonville, Fla. The series began on Oct. 23, 1965, when UA earned a 21-0 victory in Tuscaloosa. The two teams then tied, 37-37, on Sept. 23, 1967, in Birmingham to open the season, before meeting once again on Oct. 12, 1974, in Tuscaloosa where the Tide would claim an 8-7 win at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

PRESEASON RANKINGS: Alabama opens the 2017 campaign ranked No. 1 in both the Associated Press Preseason Poll and the Amway Coaches Poll. Florida State begins the new season as the No. 3 team in the AP and Amway polls.

NEXT GAME: Alabama will begin its 2017 home schedule with a matchup against Fresno State at Bryant-Denny Stadium on Sept. 9. The game between the Crimson Tide and Bulldogs is set for a 2:30 p.m. CT kickoff on ESPN2. It will be the first meeting between the two schools. While at Alabama, head coach Nick Saban is a perfect 10-0 in home openers and sports a 19-2 mark for his career in home openers with both losses coming during his time at Michigan State.

DOMESTIC OPENERS: Under head coach Nick Saban, Alabama has played in seven season-opening games in a domed stadium. In those seven contests, the Crimson Tide is a perfect 7-0 and owns a 265-104 (37.9-14.9) scoring advantage over its opponents. Alabama opened the 2016 season inside AT&T Stadium with a 52-6 victory over then-No. 20/17 USC.

DOMESTIC SWEET DOME: The Crimson Tide is 24-7-1 (.758) all-time in domed stadiums, including a 15-2 (.882) mark since 2009 and is 16-4 (.800) in Nick Saban's tenure. The Tide was 3-0 indoors in 2016. Alabama opened the year with a 52-6 win over USC on Sept. 3 at AT&T Stadium in Arlington, Texas, then posted back-to-back wins at Atlanta's Georgia Dome - a 54-16 win over Florida in the SEC Championship Game on Dec. 3 and a 24-7 win over Washington in the College Football Playoff Semifinal at the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl on Dec. 31.

NEUTRAL SITES: Alabama is 83-49-4 (.625) all-time in 136 neutral site contests. The list includes all Alabama-Auburn games not played on campus, including Legion Field from 1948-88. The Crimson Tide was 3-1 in neutral site games in 2016. Alabama opened last season with a 52-6 win over USC at AT&T Stadium in Arlington, Texas, on Sept. 3, defeated Florida, 54-16, in the SEC Championship Game at the Georgia Dome on Dec. 3 and Washington, 24-7, on Dec. 31 in the College Football Playoff Semifinal at the Georgia Dome before falling to Clemson, 35-31, in the College Football Playoff Championship Game at Raymond James Stadium in Tampa, Fla. The Crimson Tide is 16-5 (.762) in neutral site games during head coach Nick Saban's tenure at Alabama.

OPENING DAY SUCCESS UNDER SABAN: Alabama has been dominant in season openers under head coach Nick Saban. The Tide is a perfect 10-0 under Saban and has won in impressive fashion. Alabama has outscored its opponents 411-120 in those games and has outgained the opposition, 4,443-1,963. The Tide has averaged 41.1 points per opening contest under Saban and given up just 12.0 points per game. UA has also amassed 444.3 total yards per opener and surrendered just 196.3 yards per matchup.

SABAN IN ATLANTA: Alabama's Nick Saban has a 13-1 career record in games played in Atlanta as the head coach at Alabama (10-1) and LSU (3-0). Saban's Alabama record includes a 5-1 record in SEC Championship Games, a 4-0 mark in Chick-fil-A Kickoff Games and a 1-0 record in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl, all of which were played at the Georgia Dome.

HONORARY GAME CAPTAIN: Former Alabama Heisman Trophy winner Derrick Henry will be the Crimson Tide's honorary captain for the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game. Henry won the 2015 Heisman Trophy after rushing for an SEC record 2,219 yards and set UA records for rushing touchdowns (28), rushing yards per game (147.9), all-purpose yards (2,310), carries (395) and points scored (168).

ALABAMA AS THE NATION'S NO. 1: Alabama has played 74 games as the nation's top-ranked team since the inception of the Associated Press Poll in 1936. In those games, the Crimson Tide boasts a 63-11 (.851) record. Those numbers are even more impressive when you look at the 10 seasons under the direction of head coach Nick Saban (2007-present). Since the ninth game of the 2008 season (116 games), Alabama has played 50 games while being ranked No. 1, posting a 44-6 (.880) record during that span.

FACING OFF WITH THE BEST: The Crimson Tide has the second-toughest schedule in college football this season according to ESPN.com's College Football Power Index. Alabama will face off with nine teams who participated in a bowl game a season ago and will meet four teams ranked in the Associated Press Preseason Top 25.

TIDE TO FACE NINE BOWL TEAMS IN 2017: Alabama's 2017 schedule will include nine bowl teams, tied for the third-most in the country. In addition to opening the season against Florida State, the remaining bowl teams on the Tide's schedule are Colorado State, Vanderbilt, Texas A&M, Arkansas, Tennessee, LSU, Mississippi State and Auburn. The nine teams combined for a 4-5 record in bowl play last season. Only Notre Dame and Syracuse (11 each), Duke, Ole Miss and South Carolina (10 each) meet more teams that appeared in the 2016 postseason.

ALABAMA HAS MOST WINS SINCE 2008: Dating back to the start of the 2008 season, Alabama has won 112 games, which is the most in the Football Bowl Subdivision. The Crimson Tide won 12 games in 2008, followed by a perfect 14-0 record in 2009, a 10-3 mark in 2010 and a 12-1 record in 2011. Alabama finished 13-1 in 2012, 11-2 in 2013, 12-2 in 2014 and 14-1 in both 2015 and 2016. Boise State is second with 100 wins while Florida State is third with 94 victories, and Oregon, Oklahoma and Oklahoma State are tied at 93 wins apiece over that stretch.

ALWAYS IN THE HUNT: Since the 2008 season, Alabama has played in only three regular season games that did not have national championship implications. Following the Crimson Tide's 24-21 loss to LSU during the 2010 calendar year, UA was essentially eliminated from a chance to keep itself in the national championship discussion. The final three games of that season mark the only three regular season contests without direct national championship implications during that time.

BEATING THE BEST: The Crimson Tide is 48-13 (.787) against the Associated Press Top 25, including a 25-7 (.781) mark against AP top-10 teams since the start of 2008. In 2016, the Tide faced 10 teams ranked in the AP poll, defeating then-No. 20 USC, 52-6, then-No. 19 Ole Miss, 48-43, then-No. 16 Arkansas, 49-30, then-No. 9 Tennessee, 49-10, then-No. 6 Texas A&M, 33-14, then-No. 15 LSU, 10-0, then-No. 16 Auburn, 30-12, then-No. 15 Florida, 54-16, and then-No. 4 Washington, 24-7, before falling to then-No. 2 Clemson, 35-31, in the CFP Championship Game. The Tide outscored its 10 ranked opponents by an average score of 38.0-17.3. Alabama finished 8-1 in 2015 against the AP Top 25 after going 5-2 in 2014, 3-2 in 2013 and 5-1 in 2012. The Tide held a 4-1 mark vs. top-25 teams in 2011 and went 5-3 in 2010.

ALL-AMERICANS: Under head coach Nick Saban, 36 Crimson Tide players have earned 40 first-team All-America honors since 2008, including an FBS-best 29 consensus All-Americans. Florida State is second with 12 consensus picks. Oklahoma (11) and Texas (10) are the only other programs with double-digit totals in that span. Of the Tide's 29 consensus selections under Saban, 16 were unanimous picks.

LEADING THE WAY TO THE NFL: Alabama has had more draft picks over the last nine drafts (65) than any other college in the nation. Twenty-two of those picks have been first-round selections and 37 have gone in the first two rounds. The list of 65 features four Super Bowl champions, nine Pro Bowl selections, six All-Pro members and one Offensive Rookie of the Year.

NFL DRAFT: The Crimson Tide saw 10 former UA players selected in the 2017 NFL Draft, including four first-round picks in Marlon Humphrey (No. 16, Baltimore Ravens), Jonathan Allen (No. 17, Washington Redskins), O.J. Howard (No. 19, Tampa Bay Buccaneers) and Reuben Foster (No. 31, San Francisco 49ers). Cam Robinson (No. 34, Jacksonville Jaguars) was next to go as the second pick of the draft's second round. Joining Robinson in the second round were Ryan Anderson (No. 49, Washington Redskins) and Dalvin Tomlinson (No. 55, New York Giants). The third round saw Tim Williams (No. 78, Baltimore Ravens) and ArDarius Stewart (No. 79, New York Jets) go in consecutive order, before Eddie Jackson's fourth-round selection (No. 112, Chicago Bears) rounded out the former Alabama players taken. The 10 selections was the most UA players taken in one draft under head coach Nick Saban and represented the most Alabama players selected in a seven-round draft in program history.

ESPN COLLEGE GAMEDAY: Alabama will be making its 40th (25-14 record) appearance on ESPN's College GameDay when the popular pregame show broadcasts from Atlanta on Sept. 2 prior to the Crimson Tide's season opener with No. 3/3 Florida State at Mercedes-Benz Stadium. It will mark Alabama's 31st appearance under head coach Nick Saban (22-8). The 31 appearances in the Nick Saban era are 10 better than Oregon for the most GameDay appearances since the 2007 season. It will be the 12th time College GameDay has been on-site for a Crimson Tide neutral site game since Nick Saban arrived in Tuscaloosa in 2007. Alabama owns a 9-2 record in those contests with wins over Clemson (2008, 2016 CFP Championship Game), Virginia Tech (2009), Florida (2009), LSU (2011 BCS Championship Game), Michigan (2012), Georgia (2012), Notre Dame (2012 BCS Championship Game) and Wisconsin (2015). Alabama is 4-1 in GameDay games played in Atlanta.

RETURNING SUCCESS: The Crimson Tide returns 13 starters and 51 letterwinners from its 2016 squad that finished 14-1 as the SEC Champion and advanced to a second consecutive College Football Playoff National Championship Game. The 2017 team returns six starters apiece on both sides of the ball. The defensive unit is highlighted by a veteran secondary featuring starters Minkah Fitzpatrick, Ronnie Harrison, Anthony Averett and Tony Brown. Seniors Shaun Dion Hamilton and Rashaan Evans return to lead the linebacking corps while Da'Ron Payne stands out along the defensive front. Alabama's offense features second-year starter Jalen Hurts at quarterback with Calvin Ridley the leader among the wideouts. The Tide's standout backfield features veterans Damien Harris and Bo Scarbrough and will have an experienced offensive line unit to run behind that includes Bradley Bozeman, Ross Pierschbacher and Jonah Williams.

OFF-THE-FIELD NOTES

ALABAMA DEGREES: Alabama's success on the field over the past 10 seasons under the direction of head coach Nick Saban has coincided with the Crimson Tide's success in the classroom. The 2017 squad features 12 players who already have degrees in hand going into the season opener with Florida State, which is tops among teams ranked in the Associated Press Preseason Top-25. Over the previous nine seasons (2008-16) Alabama saw 116 degrees earned (graduate and undergraduate) by players who were still suiting up for the Crimson Tide after having graduated. Since the 2010 season, Alabama has seen an impressive 14 players earn a master's degree before stepping foot on the field for the final time. In 2016, the Crimson Tide tied for second among all bowl teams with a total of 22 players who earned their degrees prior to the start of postseason play. Three of the 22 earned their master's degrees during the 2016 campaign.

GRADUATING WITH THE BEST: The Alabama football team has not only been dominant on the field, but also in the classroom. The Crimson Tide is tied for sixth among Associated Press Preseason Top 25 teams for its graduation rate of 80 percent. Ahead of Alabama are only Stanford (99 percent), Virginia Tech (89 percent), Miami (Fla.) (86), Clemson (84) and South Florida (82 percent). Florida and Penn State are tied with the Tide for sixth place. Alabama's percentage tied for fourth among Southeastern Conference football programs.

ACADEMIC PROWESS: The Tide has been a model of success on the football field, but the team has generated plenty of accolades in the classroom as well. Below are some of the academic highlights under head coach Nick Saban.

- A total of 12 Crimson Tide players will take the field with their degrees in hand for the season opener with Florida State.
- Earned Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 80 this year is tied for fourth among SEC football programs.

ALABAMA IN THE AP POLL

Alabama has been ranked in 759 of the 1,121 Associated Press college football polls since 1936, according to the AP Poll Archive. The Crimson Tide owns a 454-128-8 (.776) all-time record in games when ranked in the Associated Press college football poll, including a 96-16 (.857) mark under head coach Nick Saban. The Crimson Tide is also ranked in the AP poll for the 133rd consecutive week, topping its previous streak set in the mid 1990s when UA was ranked for 71 straight weeks under head coach Gene Stallings. Alabama has started six seasons at No. 1 (2017, 2016, 2013, 2010, 1978, 1966).

ALABAMA IN THE COACHES POLL

The Crimson Tide has enjoyed much success in the coaches rankings over the past half century. The United Press International debuted the coaches poll in 1950 and ran the poll through the 1990 season. USA TODAY has administered the poll for the past 27 seasons (1991-2017), and in 2014, Amway became the title sponsor. Alabama was ranked No. 1 in the 2010 preseason coaches' poll after starting out the 2009 preseason poll at No. 5. Alabama remained in the top five the entire season, reaching No. 1 after defeating Florida in the SEC Championship and holding the position to claim the national championship after defeating Texas in Pasadena. The Tide then claimed the No. 1 spot to close out the 2011, 2012 and 2015 seasons. The Tide has compiled five UPI (1961, 1964, 1973 & 1979) and five USA TODAY (1992, 2009, 2011, 2012 & 2015) coaches poll national titles.

- In 2016, Alabama tied for second nationally with 22 graduates on its roster during postseason play. The Tide led the nation in graduates on its roster during postseason play in 2015 (29), 2014 (22) and 2013 (28).
- Alabama's last four national title football teams (2009, 2011, 2012, 2015) included 89 players who had earned their degrees prior to game time.
- The 2014 team was recognized as one of the nation's top academic programs, ranking third in the annual academic rankings of the top 25 college football teams produced by New America, a Washington D.C. think-tank.
- The 2011 BCS national championship team had 21 graduates playing in the bowl game, which was the second most in the country.
- That 2011 team led the SEC with 38 student-athletes being named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll.
- The 2009 BCS national championship team led the country with 11 graduates playing in the bowl game.
- In 2016-17, Alabama finished second in the number of football student-athletes being named to the SEC First-Year Academic Honor Roll with 11 honorees. Alabama topped that list in 2009, 2010 and 2011 and shared the top spot in the 2015-16 academic year.

CRIMSON TIDE IN THE COMMUNITY: Last season, Alabama worked 400-plus hours of community service in Tuscaloosa and the surrounding areas. The team volunteered their time across numerous areas during the 2016 season including in schools, hospitals, with Habitat for Humanity and on campus.

ALABAMA ATHLETICS AS A WHOLE: The University of Alabama has built a total program, winning championships on the field and bringing home plenty of academic awards in the classroom.

- Since 2008, Crimson Tide athletics teams have won 10 national championships in five different sports and 23 SEC championships in seven different sports.
- Alabama claimed another SEC team title during the 2016-17 academic year with football winning its 26th championship.
- The overall cumulative grade-point average of UA student-athletes in 2016-17 was 3.25.
- Fourteen Crimson Tide teams had cumulative GPAs above 3.0 for 2016-17
- Seven UA teams posted cumulative GPAs above 3.5 for 2016-17.
- Alabama student-athletes earned SEC Academic Honor Roll recognition 372 times during the 2016-17 academic year. The Crimson Tide had 78, 65 and 127 student-athletes named to the SEC Fall, Winter and Spring Academic Honor Rolls and 102 named to the First-Year Academic Honor Roll.
- Since 2009-10, UA leads all NCAA Division I schools with 77 Academic All-America honors. Stanford is second over that span with 72, while Nebraska is third at 58.
- Since 2000, UA has produced 123 Academic All-America honorees, which is third nationally over that span behind only Nebraska (142) and Notre Dame (129). Stanford (117) and Penn State (104) round out the top five.

ALLSTATE AFCA GOOD WORKS TEAM NOMINEE - MINKAH FITZPATRICK: Minkah Fitzpatrick was nominated for the 2017 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team. The award is one of the most esteemed off-the-field honors in college football, and recognized 146 nominees across all NCAA and NAIA divisions for the 2017 season. While at UA, Fitzpatrick has been a team leader in the community and on campus. He has given his time to several groups in his two years with the football program, including the YMCA, TAP, Inc. and the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, mentoring at-risk youth in the Tuscaloosa area. Most recently, he spent his spring break with a group of Alabama student-athletes as part of an FCA mission trip that did relief work in Costa Rica.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

RETURNING DEFENSE: The 2017 Alabama defense includes six starters from a season ago. Those six return a combined career 462 total tackles, 33 tackles for loss, 10 sacks and 16 interceptions to this year's team. Of those returning starters, four come from the Tide secondary, including junior Minkah Fitzpatrick, who recorded 66 tackles, 5.5 tackles for loss, 1.5 sacks and six interceptions in 2016. Fitzpatrick holds the school record for career interception returns for touchdowns with four. Junior Ronnie Harrison leads all returnees with 85 total tackles from a season ago, while senior linebacker Shaun Dion Hamilton recorded 9.0 tackles for loss in 2016.

HARD TO FIND THE END ZONE AGAINST THE TIDE: Since the start of the 2009 season, no defense has allowed fewer touchdowns than the Crimson Tide. Alabama's defense has surrendered only 162 touchdowns over the last 109 games. That is 40 fewer than the second most in the nation (LSU with 202).

10 POINTS OR FEWER: Under head coach Nick Saban, the Crimson Tide has held opponents to 10 points or fewer 66 times since the start of the 2007 season. Alabama held nine opponents to 10 points or less in 2016 and recorded two shutouts. In 2015, six of UA's opponents were limited to 10 points or fewer and the Tide posted two shutouts. In 2014, Alabama shut out two opponents and held seven opponents to two touchdowns or less. The Crimson Tide held nine of 13 opponents to 10 points or less in 2013 with three shutouts. Seven opponents were limited to 10 points or less in 2012, four of which were shutouts. Alabama was successful in holding opponents to single digits in nine games in 2011 and eight times in 2010. UA kept opponents within that range seven times in both 2008 and 2009 and in 2007 did it twice. The Crimson Tide has shut out the opposition 19 times during the Saban era.

DEFENSIVE DOMINANCE: Under head coach Nick Saban, Alabama's defense has finished in the top 10 nationally in rushing defense and scoring defense in each of the last nine seasons. During the current run, Alabama has led the nation in rushing defense four times (2016, 2015, 2012, 2011) and finished second twice (2009, 2008). The Tide has topped the nation in scoring defense three times (2016, 2012, 2011) and has held the opposition to less than two touchdowns per game in a season six of the last nine seasons (2016, 2013, 2012, 2011, 2010, 2009). No other FBS program has a current streak in both categories. Boston College has finished in the top 10 in rushing defense in each of the last three seasons. Ohio State, Michigan and Wisconsin have appeared in the top 10 in scoring defense in the previous two seasons.

HOLDING OPPONENTS UNDER 200: During head coach Nick Saban's last 125 games at the Capstone (since the start of the 2008 season), the Crimson Tide defense has held the opposition to fewer than 200 yards of total offense 44 times, including eight times in 2016 (USC - 194 yards, Kent State - 166, Kentucky - 161, Tennessee - 163, LSU - 125, Chattanooga - 184, Auburn - 182 and Washington - 194). Alabama's best performance under Saban came in 2009 when the Tide held Chattanooga to 84 yards of total offense.

HOLDING OPPONENTS UNDER 300: In head coach Nick Saban's tenure at Alabama, the Tide has limited opponents under 300 yards of total offense 88 times in 138 games, or 63.8 percent of the time. In 2016, Alabama limited its opponents to less than 300 yards 12 times (USC - 194 yards, Western Kentucky - 239, Kent State - 166 yards, Kentucky - 161, Tennessee - 163, Texas A&M - 278, LSU - 125, Mississippi State - 274, Chattanooga - 184, Auburn - 182, Florida - 261, Washington - 194).

TOUGH SLEDDING ON THE GROUND: Alabama allowed only five rushing touchdowns in 2016 to lead the nation. In 2015, the Crimson Tide allowed just seven rushing touchdowns in 15 games, the second-lowest total in the country. The Tide leads the nation in allowing the fewest rushing touchdowns since the start of the 2005 season, surrendering only 81. Since head coach Nick Saban arrived in 2007, the Crimson Tide has allowed 66 rushing touchdowns. Ohio State is No. 2 in that category, giving up 102 since 2007.

RUSHING DEFENSE: Alabama has surrendered only 16 individual 100-yard rushing performances dating back to the 2005 season, a mark that is the lowest in the nation. Alabama has not allowed a 100-yard rusher in the past 23 games (Nick Chubb, Georgia on Oct. 3, 2015). Since head coach Nick Saban's arrival in 2007, the Tide has allowed 11 players to rush for more than 100 yards in a game: Chubb (146 on Oct. 3, 2015), Ohio State's Ezekiel Elliott (230 on Jan. 1, 2015), Auburn's Tre Mason (164 on Nov. 30, 2013), Virginia Tech's Trey Edmunds (132 on Aug. 31, 2013), Georgia's Todd Gurley (122 yards on Dec. 1, 2012), LSU's Jeremy Hill (107 on Nov. 3, 2012), Georgia Southern's Dominique Swope (153 on Nov. 19, 2011), Tennessee's Tauren Poole (117 on Oct. 23, 2010), Ole Miss' BenJarvus Green-Ellis (131 on Oct. 13, 2007), Houston's Anthony Alridge (100 on Oct. 6, 2007) and Darren McFadden of Arkansas (195 on Sept. 15, 2007).

OFFENSIVE NOTES

SCORING STREAK CONTINUES: Entering the 2017 season, the Crimson Tide has scored in 213 consecutive games - the longest streak in program history.

RUSHING TO SUCCESS: Alabama is 91-5 (.948) since the start of the 2008 season when rushing for at least 140 yards. The only losses were at Auburn in 2013, at Ole Miss and vs. Ohio State in 2014, against Ole Miss in 2015 and against Clemson in 2016. The Tide rushed for 140 yards or more 10 times in 2015 and 13 times in 2016.

BALL PROTECTION: In its past 125 games dating back to the start of the 2008 season, Alabama has turned the ball over only 146 times (80 fumbles, 66 interceptions) for 1.17 turnovers per game. Since 2009, the Tide has turned the ball over only 127 times in 109 games (1.16/game). Since 2009, UA starting quarterbacks have thrown an impressively low 53 interceptions in 2,904 attempts (1 INT every 54.8 attempts). Dating back to the 2009 season, the top two running backs in the rotation have lost a fumble only 21 times. Over that span, the top two running backs have recorded 3,147 touches, losing a fumble once every 149.9 touches.

RIDLEY CLIMBING CAREER RECEPTIONS LIST: Junior Calvin Ridley enters the 2017 season ranked No. 4 on the Alabama career receptions list with 161 catches. Julio Jones (2008-10) is third with 179 catches while D.J. Hall (2004-07) is second with 194. Amari Cooper is the Alabama leader with 228 receptions from 2012-14.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

SCOTT AMONG THE NATION'S BEST: Senior JK Scott is again a candidate for the Ray Guy Award, presented annually to the nation's top punter. Scott averaged 47.2 yards per punt on 64 attempts in 2016, a mark that ranked No. 4 nationally. Scott forced 15 fair catches and dropped 25 punts inside the 20. Twenty-five of his 64 punts traveled more than 50 yards, including six of 60 yards or more, which was second nationally. He boasts a school-record career average of 46.3 yards per punt on 189 attempts, has placed 73 punts inside the 20 and booted 60 punts of 50 yards or more in 44 career games.

NON-OFFENSIVE TDs IN THE SABAN ERA: Alabama has scored 59 non-offensive touchdowns during the Nick Saban era and totaled a single-season record 15 non-offensive scores in 2016. The 15 non-offensive touchdowns led the Football Bowl Subdivision and are the most in a season by an FBS team in the last 20 years. The Tide scored an FBS-best 123 points off turnovers in 2016. Alabama scored at least one touchdown on defense or special teams in the first eight games of the season, including multiple non-offensive scores in the first three SEC road contests of 2016 (Ole Miss, Arkansas and Tennessee). Alabama had scored a non-offensive touchdown in 10 consecutive games dating back to the CFP semifinal vs. Michigan State on Dec. 31, 2015, and had 14 non-offensive touchdowns in that span – four interceptions, four punt returns, five fumble recoveries and a kickoff return. The streak was snapped in the Tide's 10-0 win over LSU on Nov. 5.

SERIES NOTES

THE ALABAMA-FLORIDA STATE SERIES: Alabama and Florida State will meet for the fifth time in the history of the two storied programs. The Crimson Tide holds a 2-1-1 advantage in the series, but the Seminoles were victorious in the latest pairing, claiming a 21-14 victory on Sept. 29, 2007, in Jacksonville, Fla. The series began on Oct. 23, 1965, when UA earned a 21-0 victory in Tuscaloosa. The two teams then tied, 37-37, on Sept. 23, 1967, in Birmingham to open the season, before meeting once again on Oct. 12, 1974, in Tuscaloosa where the Tide would claim an 8-7 win at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

FLORIDA STATE CONNECTIONS: Alabama defensive coordinator Jeremy Pruitt served as both defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach at Florida State in 2013 as part of a staff that led the Seminoles to an undefeated season and the 2013 national championship. Crimson Tide analyst Chris Weinke quarterbacked the Seminoles to the 1999 national championship and won the 2000 Heisman Trophy as a senior at FSU. Florida State head coach Jimbo Fisher served as Nick Saban's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach from 2000-06 at LSU. FSU co-offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach Lawrence Dawsey was a graduate assistant on Saban's 2003 LSU staff while Seminole linebackers coach Bill Miller and defensive ends/outside linebackers coach Brad Lawing were on Saban's Michigan State staff from 1999-2000.

GENERAL NOTES

SEASON OPENERS: Alabama has compiled a 98-21-3 (.816) all-time record in season openers, and is in the midst of a 15-game winning streak dating back to 2002 when Alabama defeated Middle Tennessee, 39-34, at Bryant-Denny Stadium. Alabama is 36-4 (.900) in its last 40 season-opening contests dating to 1977 and the Tide has posted a 23-2 (.920) opening day record since 1991. The 2017 season marks the 18th consecutive year that the Crimson Tide has opened the season with a non-conference opponent.

SEASON OPENERS BY OPPONENT: The Crimson Tide will open the 2017 season with Florida State, marking the fifth meeting between the two teams in the storied history of both programs. Alabama has met the Seminoles one other time in a season opener, with the Tide and 'Noles playing to a 37-37 tie on Sept. 23, 1967, at Legion Field. All-time, Alabama has met 60 different opponents on opening day. The Tide's most common opening day opponent is Howard (now Samford). UA has also played five current SEC teams on opening day, compiling a 14-8-1 (.630) record against Ole Miss, Georgia, Vanderbilt, Florida and LSU. The Tide has not opened the season against an SEC opponent since a 28-17 win at Vanderbilt in 1999.

SEASON OPENERS BY SITE: Alabama football has played its season opener in 19 different cities in its football history. The most common venue for the Tide's season opener is on the UA campus in Tuscaloosa, where Alabama has begun its season 52 times and compiled a 49-2-1 record. The Crimson Tide is 19-1-1 in season-opening games at Bryant-Denny Stadium (circa 1929). UA opened the 2012, 2015 and 2016 seasons at AT&T Stadium in Arlington, Texas, and will head to Atlanta this season for the fifth time to open the new Mercedes-Benz Stadium. The Tide was 5-0 all-time in openers at the Georgia Dome. Alabama defeated Clemson, 34-10, in 2008 then returned in 2009 and defeated Virginia Tech, 34-24. UA met the Hokies again in 2013, coming away with a 35-10 win. Alabama also defeated West Virginia, 33-23, in the 2014 season opener. The Crimson Tide is 8-0 all-time in neutral site season openers, including a 7-0 mark under Nick Saban.

SEASON OPENERS BY HEAD COACH: Coach Nick Saban currently stands at a perfect 10-0 in season openers during his tenure at the Capstone. Frank Thomas (1931-46) set the Tide's standard for coaches on opening day, compiling a 13-0-2 (.933) record in his 15 seasons at Alabama. Legendary coach Paul W. "Bear" Bryant (1958-82) is the school's winningest coach in openers, logging 18 opening-day wins across his 25-year career. Bryant's record in Alabama season openers was 18-6-1 (.740), including a six-game winning streak to close out his career.

ALABAMA VS. THE ACC: Alabama has played 122 games in program history against the current members of the Atlantic Coast Conference and owns an 81-36-4 (.680) record all-time (including vacations) in those contests. The Crimson Tide has played 11 of the 14 league members with Pittsburgh, Virginia and Wake Forest being the only teams the Tide has not faced. Former SEC member Georgia Tech has matched up with Alabama the most with the two teams meeting a total of 52 times and Alabama holding a 28-21-3 (.538) series lead. The Tide is 2-1-1 against 2017 season-opening foe Florida State. Alabama is 4-1 in its last five meetings with ACC teams dating back to 2009. The Crimson Tide is 10-1-1 all-time in season openers against current ACC members and 0-0-1 in openers against the Seminoles.

SABAN IN SEASON OPENERS: Head coach Nick Saban is 18-3 (.857) in his collegiate career in season openers, including a perfect 10-0 mark at Alabama. He led UA to a 52-6 win over Western Carolina on Sept. 1, 2007, in his inaugural game with the Crimson Tide. He followed that up with a 34-10 win over Clemson in 2008 and a 34-24 victory over Virginia Tech in 2009, with both games being played in Atlanta. In 2010, Saban guided Alabama to a 48-3 win over San Jose State and followed with a 48-7 victory over Kent State in 2011, both games being played at Bryant-Denny Stadium. The Tide headed to Arlington, Texas, in 2012, downing then-No. 8 Michigan, 41-14, before returning to Atlanta the next two seasons. The 2013 season began with a 34-10 win over Virginia Tech and the Tide came home with a 33-23 victory against West Virginia to kick off 2014. Alabama returned to Arlington in 2015 and defeated Wisconsin, 35-17. The 2016 season saw the Tide again open in Arlington, this time with a 52-6 win over USC. Saban won his very first collegiate game on Sept. 8, 1990, as he led Toledo to a 20-14 win over Miami (Ohio). He was 3-2 in season openers at Michigan State and 4-1 in season openers at LSU.

SABAN VS. FORMER ASSISTANTS: Alabama's season opener with Florida State will be the 11th meeting between Tide head coach Nick Saban and one of his former assistant coaches (Florida State's Jimbo Fisher was Saban's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at LSU from 2002-06). Saban is 10-0 all-time against his former staffers during his tenure at Alabama, including three wins vs. Derek Dooley (Tennessee, 2010-11-12), two wins over Will Muschamp (Florida, 2011-14), two wins over Mark Dantonio (Michigan State, 2010-15) and three wins over Jim McElwain (Colorado State, 2013; Florida 2015-16).

SABAN VS. THE ACC: Crimson Tide head coach Nick Saban has faced current ACC teams a total of 12 times in his career. Saban's teams are 9-3 all-time against ACC opponents, including a 7-2 mark in the regular season. Saban is 3-0 in season openers vs. ACC foes - all of which were played at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta. The Tide defeated Clemson, 34-10, in 2008 and Virginia Tech, 34-24, in 2009 and 35-10 in 2013 to open each of those seasons. The Crimson Tide is 6-1 against the ACC under Saban, including a 5-0 mark in the regular season.

SABAN MOVING UP SEC WINS LIST: With his 103rd conference win vs. Florida in the SEC Championship Game on Dec. 3, Alabama head coach Nick Saban is quickly moving up the charts for victories in conference contests (total includes SEC championship games) against conference opponents. His 103 wins ranks fifth all-time in SEC history. Three of the four coaches ahead of Saban on the list are already in the College Football Hall of Fame (Paul "Bear" Bryant, Johnny Vaught and Vince Dooley). Saban ranks first in league history in SEC regular season winning percentage at .798 (103-26). He is second in league history in winning percentage in all games at .826 (161-34). Saban is eighth on the SEC career wins list at 161. Tennessee's Robert Neyland is seventh at 173.

106-7 UNDER SABAN WHEN LEADING AT THE HALF: Under head coach Nick Saban, the Crimson Tide is 106-7 (.938) when leading at the half since 2007 and has held the lead at the break in 24 of its last 30 games dating back to the start of the 2015 season, including 13 of 15 games in 2016.

SABAN AMONG 20-YEAR LEADERS: Alabama's 45-40 win over Clemson in the 2016 College Football Playoff Championship Game was head coach Nick Saban's 191st victory in his first 20 years as a college head coach. That total is the second-most in FBS history for a coach in the first 20 seasons of his career. Former Nebraska head coach Tom Osborne won 195 games in the opening two decades of his tenure in Lincoln. Long-time Penn State head coach Joe Paterno ranks third with 187. Saban's five national championships in 20 seasons tops both Osborne (none) and Paterno (1).

10-WIN SEASONS: With last season's 51-3 victory over Mississippi State, Alabama reached the 10-win milestone for the ninth consecutive season. The nine straight years with 10 wins extends the school record. The previous total for most consecutive 10-win seasons was five, set by coach Paul "Bear" Bryant's teams from 1971-75. In 121 seasons, the Tide has won 10 or more games 36 times, equaling Oklahoma for the most 10-win seasons in college football history. Alabama has produced 11 10-win seasons since 2002 (2002, 2005, 2008-2016). Bryant had a school-record 13 10-win seasons at Alabama, while Saban is second with nine.

SEC RECORD: In 2016, Alabama extended its record for most consecutive 10-win seasons in SEC history when it defeated Mississippi State on Nov. 12, 2016, to improve to 10-0 on the year and finished 14-1. UA had a 12-2 record in 2008, 14-0 in 2009, 10-3 in 2010, 12-1 in 2011, 13-1 in 2012, 11-2 in 2013, 12-2 in 2014 and 14-1 in 2015.

ALABAMA'S TV RECORD: Alabama has compiled a 253-132-4 (.656) all-time record in 389 televised games (not including pay-per-view, tape-delayed or closed circuit telecasts). The Crimson Tide was 14-1 in televised games in 2015 and again in 2016.

108 NATIONAL TV APPEARANCES IN 124 GAMES: With the Tide's appearance in the CFP National Championship Game on Jan. 9, Alabama has played in 108 nationally televised games since the start of the 2008 season, including every contest since the start of the 2014 season. In 2016, Alabama appeared on CBS six times (Ole Miss, Tennessee, Texas A&M, LSU, Auburn and the SEC Championship Game). ESPN aired five Tide contests (Kentucky, Arkansas, Mississippi State, the CFP Semifinal at the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl vs. Washington and CFP National Championship Game vs. Clemson). ESPN2 carried the Western Kentucky and Chattanooga games and the SEC Network broadcast the Kent State matchup. The Tide opened 2016 vs. USC on ABC. The Crimson Tide was featured on CBS seven times in 2015, including at Georgia, Texas A&M, Mississippi State and Auburn; home against Tennessee and LSU and against Florida in the SEC Championship Game. The ABC family of networks hosted the other eight contests during the 2015 season, including the season opener against Wisconsin and Clemson (ABC), against Middle Tennessee, Louisiana-Monroe and Charleston Southern (SEC Network) and on ESPN for the Ole Miss, Arkansas and Michigan State games. In 2014, Alabama was televised in eight games on the ABC family of networks including contests with West Virginia (ABC), FAU (SEC Network), Southern Miss (ESPN2), at Arkansas (ESPN), at Tennessee (ESPN2), Western Carolina (SEC Network), the most-viewed college football game ever on ESPN, the Iron Bowl against Auburn and the Sugar Bowl against Ohio State (ESPN). The Tide also played in six contests that were televised on CBS, including versus Florida, at Ole Miss, against Texas A&M, in the Bayou against LSU, versus top-ranked Mississippi State, and finally in the SEC Championship against the Missouri Tigers. Eleven of the Crimson Tide's 13 games in 2013 were televised nationally with the Virginia Tech, Arkansas, Mississippi State and Oklahoma games on ESPN, the Texas A&M, Tennessee, LSU and Auburn games on CBS, the Colorado State and Kentucky games on ESPN2. Alabama played 12 nationally televised games in 2012, with one game on ABC, six on CBS and five on ESPN. In 2011, Alabama played on CBS four times, while having two on ABC and ESPN2, one on ESPN and one game on ESPNU. In 2010, Alabama had five games on CBS, three on ESPN, two on ESPN2, one on ABC and one on ESPNU. In 2009, the Tide played two games on ABC (including the BCS title game), and six on CBS, while ESPN televised two more Crimson Tide games. In 2008, Alabama had 10 of its 14 games televised nationally, including five on CBS, three on ESPN, one on ABC and one on FOX.

NEW HIRES: Nick Saban made three new additions to his 2017 staff during the offseason, hiring Brian Daboll as offensive coordinator, Michael Locksley as wide receivers coach and co-offensive coordinator and bringing back Joe Pannunzio to coach tight ends and special teams. Daboll was tapped to coordinate the Alabama offense in February after spending 17 years in the National Football League with New England, Kansas City, Miami, Cleveland and the New York Jets. Locksley spent the 2016 season as an offensive analyst at UA and has previous head coaching experience at New Mexico and Maryland. Pannunzio returns to Alabama after spending the last two seasons as the Philadelphia Eagles' director of personnel operations. He served as Alabama's director of football operations from 2011-14.

ALABAMA AMONG NFL COACHING EXPERIENCE LEADERS: The Alabama coaching staff ranks fifth among all Football Bowl Subdivision programs - and leads the SEC - in years of National Football League coaching experience among its on-field coaching staff. The Crimson Tide boast 36 years of NFL experience between head coach Nick Saban (eight years), offensive coordinator Brian Daboll (17) and defensive line coach Karl Dunbar (11). Illinois ranks No. 1 with 56 years followed by UCLA (45), Michigan (40), Baylor (38) and the Tide.

SABAN AND FIRST ROUND NFL DRAFT PICKS: Since the advent of the NFL Draft, Alabama head coach Nick Saban ranks third all-time among college coaches who have tutored first round draft picks. Saban has coached a total of 27 players who were chosen in the opening round of the draft, including 22 from Alabama. Florida State's Bobby Bowden is the career leader with 35, followed by Penn State's Joe Paterno at 32.

CRIMSON TIDE PLAYERS ON NFL ROSTERS: The Alabama football program is again well-represented in the NFL heading into the 2017 with numerous former players dotting league rosters. The Tide has 51 former players (active or injured reserve) working on an NFL roster as of Aug. 30. In the last nine NFL Drafts (including the 2017 Draft), Alabama has had 65 players selected, including 22 players in first round, 22 in the second and third rounds, six in the fourth, seven in the fifth, one in the sixth and seven in the seventh round.

- Saban has a 205-61-1 (.770) record as a college head coach to date (210-61-1, .774 on-field record). He has five national championships – four at Alabama – eight conference championships and 18 of his teams have played in postseason bowl games, including a trip to the BCS National Championship Game following the 2003, 2009, 2011 and 2012 seasons and the College Football Playoff Semifinals each of the last three seasons including the CFP National Championship Game in 2015 and 2016.

- Saban is the only coach to win four BCS national championships and the only coach to win back-to-back BCS national championships. He has won five titles in his last 13 years coaching college football after capturing CFP National Championship following the 2015 season. Saban is one of three college coaches in the poll era (since 1936) to win three national championships in four years, joining Frank Leahy (Notre Dame - 1946-47, 1949) and Tom Osborne (Nebraska - 1994-95, 1997). He is also just the second coach in the poll era to win five national championships (Paul "Bear" Bryant).

- In 2009, Saban produced Alabama's first national championship in 17 years by guiding the Crimson Tide to a 14-0 season with dominant wins over Florida in the SEC championship and Texas in the Citi BCS National Championship Game. He then followed that up with his second BCS championship in three years with a 21-0 shutout of LSU following the 2011 season at the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. He made it back-to-back BCS national championships in 2012 with a 42-14 win over Notre Dame in the Discover BCS National Championship Game. He then took down Clemson 45-40 to capture title No. 5 following the 2015 season in the CFP National Championship Game.

- In addition to the on-field success, the 2011 team was also recognized with the Disney Spirit Award, which was presented to snapper Carson Tinker, for the team's response to the community following the tornado that devastated Tuscaloosa on April 27, 2011. The Tide also had extensive success in the classroom that year with 38 SEC Academic Honor Roll selections, a league record, and produced an Academic All-American in Barrett Jones.

- His most recent college head coaching stint, a five-season run at LSU, produced a record of 48-16 (.750), one national championship (2003), two Southeastern Conference championships, three SEC West Division championships, and a 3-2 record in bowl games including two Sugar Bowl victories and a Peach Bowl win. The Tigers constructed a 28-12 (.700) record against SEC opponents under Saban's guidance. He was named the 2003 National Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and earned both the Paul W. "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award by the Football Writers Association of America. Saban was named SEC Coach of the Year twice (by the Birmingham News in 2001 and by the Associated Press in 2003).

- Saban served as head coach at Michigan State from 1995-99, his second stint at the East Lansing school as he also spent 1983-87 as the Spartans' defensive coordinator/secondary coach. After playing in just one bowl game in the previous four years, Michigan State made four postseason appearances in Saban's five years at the helm. Saban led MSU to a 34-24-1 (.585) record as head coach.

- In 1999, Saban led his final Spartans team to a No. 7 national ranking as MSU finished in a tie for second in the Big Ten. The Spartans defeated Notre Dame, Michigan, Ohio State and Penn State in the same year for the first time since 1965 and recorded six wins at home for the first time since the 1912 season. The Spartans' performance that year landed them a spot in the Citrus Bowl. The Spartans led the Big Ten in rushing defense (77.0 yards per game) and total defense (299.0 yards per game) while ranking fifth nationally in rushing defense and 11th in total defense. The Michigan State offense averaged 31.0 points per game.

- Saban's first head coaching position came at the University of Toledo in 1990, as he guided the Rockets to a record of 9-2 that year, finishing as co-champions of the Mid-American Conference. The Rockets ranked among the NCAA leaders in both total defense (12th at 284.8 yards) and scoring defense (16th at 16.2 points), and missed posting an undefeated record by a mere five points.

- A native of Fairmont, W.Va., Saban is a 1973 graduate of Kent State University where he earned a bachelor's degree in business. He earned a master's degree in sports administration from Kent State in 1975. Born October 31, 1951, Saban and his wife, the former Terry Constable, have two children, Nicholas and Kristen. They have one granddaughter, Amélie, and a daughter-in-law, Kelsé.

- At Michigan State, Saban started the "Nick's Kids" Foundation, which the Sabans continue here in Tuscaloosa. Since their arrival at the University of Alabama, the Sabans have helped raise more than \$7 million for "Nick's Kids" that has been distributed to more than 250 charities and organizations throughout the state of Alabama and the Southeast. The Sabans also built 16 homes, one for each of the Tide's national championships, with Habitat for Humanity following the April 27, 2011, tornado that struck Tuscaloosa.

- In June of 2008, the Sabans announced a \$1 million gift to benefit Alabama's first-generation scholarship program. The gift has a special meaning to the Sabans as both Nick and Terry were both first-generation graduates.
