2017 ACC FOOTBALL NOTES

ACC TEAMS IN THE TOP 25 RANKINGS

Led by Florida State and Clemson, five Atlantic Coast Conference football teams are ranked in both the preseason Associated Press and Amway Coaches Top 25 polls. The Seminoles are third in both polls, and Clemson is fifth in both. Also included in the rankings are No. 16 (AP)/17 (Amway) Louisville, No. 18/18 Miami and No. 21/22 Virginia Tech. Nine of the 14 ACC teams are ranked or received votes in the coaches poll. NC State and Pitt received votes in both polls, while Georgia Tech, North Carolina and Syracuse received votes in the coaches poll.

The ACC is the only conference with two top-five selections in the AP poll and is tied for second with five teams in the poll. This marks the second consecutive season (and second time overall) two ACC teams have been included in the AP preseason top five. Last year, Clemson and Florida State also were ranked in the top five.

The league has now had a pair of top 10 teams in the AP preseason poll on seven occasions, beginning with its first year of existence in 1953 when Maryland was ranked ninth and Duke 10th. The ACC also had two top 10 teams in 1991 (No. 8 Georgia Tech, No. 9 Clemson), 1997 (No. 3 Florida State, No. 7 North Carolina), 2001 (No. 6 Florida State, No. 10 Georgia Tech), 2004 (No. 8 Virginia Tech, No. 9 Miami), 2005 (No. 8 Virginia Tech, No. 9 Miami) and 2016 (No. 2 Clemson, No. 4 Florida State).

Alabama was picked No. 1 in the AP poll and will face No. 3 Florida State on Saturday, Sept. 2, in the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game in Atlanta. Those are the highest-ranked teams in a season opener since the AP started a preseason poll in 1950. Dubbed the "Greatest Opener of All-Time (GOAT)," the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game is the fourth season-opening match-up between two top five opponents. The others were No. 1 Pitt against No. 5 North Carolina in 1982, No. 1 Nebraska against No. 4 Penn State in 1983 and No. 1 Oklahoma against No. 4 UCLA in 1986.



PREVIEWING THE 2017 ACC SCHEDULE

ACC teams will play more games (22) against Power 5 non-conference teams in 2017 than any of its peer conferences. The ACC will also have a higher percentage (.393) of its non-conference games against Power 5 opponents than any other league.

ACC teams will play more games against non-conference teams (9) that were ranked in this year's AP Top 25 than any other peer conference.

Including the 11 ACC teams that went to bowl games, no ACC team will face fewer than seven opponents that went to bowls last season. ACC teams will play 26 games against non-conference opponents that went to bowl games in 2016, the second-highest total among peer conferences.

The 2017 schedules for three ACC schools – Syracuse (seventh, .613), Georgia Tech (eighth, .609) and Duke (ninth, .606) – rank among the top 10 nationally in opponents' winning percentage.

ACC teams' FBS non-conference opponents had the second-highest winning percentage (.526) in 2016 of any of the Power 5 conferences.

LABOR DAY WEEKEND: ACC TO PLAY 14 GAMES OVER FIVE DAYS

The ACC will begin the 2017 season tying its record (14) for most games on a single weekend, which was set in 2015 when all 14 schools played non-conference opponents.

Last year, the ACC tied its record for most non-conference victories on an opening weekend by posting a 10-2 record. That is also the best winning percentage on an opening weekend with eight or more non-conference games. The ACC had 10 non-conference wins in 2010 and 2015.

The ACC set a league record in 2014 for most non-conference wins on any weekend, posting a perfect 11-0 mark in week two. That was also the most wins in an undefeated weekend in league history.

ACC LABOR DAY MONDAY NIGHT RATINGS

Throughout its 12-game history, the ACC's Labor Day Monday night appearance on ABC and ESPN, has been a ratings success. The 12 games have averaged 7.3 million viewers. Last year's Florida State-Ole Miss game drew 8.35 million viewers. Combined with the 2015 game between Virginia Tech and Ohio State, almost 19 million viewers have tuned into the game in the past two seasons.

The 2010 Virginia Tech-Boise State telecast was seen by more households, at the time, than any ESPN college football telecast in history. The 7.3 rating was the highest Monday night rating and tied for the second-highest rated regular season college football telecast on ESPN since 1994.

Nine of the 12 games have been close with an average margin of victory in those contests of just 5.9 points and two of the games going into overtime.

Florida State and Miami have met four times on Labor Day Monday, with the average margin of victory being just four points and the average TV rating 6.48.

This year, Georgia Tech makes its second appearance on Labor Day Monday night when it faces Tennessee in Atlanta at the new Mercedes-Benz Stadium as the second of the two Chick-fil-A Kickoff Games scheduled for the opening week.

ACC COACHING SUCCESS

Six ACC coaches – the most of any conference – rank in the top 18 of all active coaches in career winning percentage with a minimum of five years as a head coach. Florida State's Jimbo Fisher ranks second (.821), followed by Clemson's Dabo Swinney (sixth, .761), Miami's Mark Richt (seventh, .737), Louisville's Bobby Petrino (10th, .717), Georgia Tech's Paul Johnson (16th, .670) and Virginia's Bronco Mendenhall (18th, .656).

The ACC has five coaches ranked among the top nine nationally in wins per season, with a minimum of five years of head coaching experience. Florida State's Jimbo Fisher leads all head coaches nationally, averaging 11.14 wins per season after seven years as a head coach. Clemson's Dabo Swinney is fifth (9.89), Miami's Mark Richt is seventh (9.63), Louisville's Bobby Petrino is eighth (9.08) and Georgia Tech's Paul Johnson is ninth (8.85). In addition, Virginia's Bronco Mendenhall ranks 18th (8.42), North Carolina's Larry Fedora is 20th (8.22) and NC State's Dave Doeren is tied for 24th (8.00).

Georgia Tech head coach Paul Johnson ranks fourth among all active head coaches in career victories, having recorded 177 wins in his 20-year career. Miami's Mark Richt is eighth with 154 wins, followed by Louisville's Bobby Petrino, who is 16th with 109 wins, Dave Claw-

2017 ACC FOOTBALL NOTES

Florida State Picked To Win ACC Football Title

Florida State was the preseason favorite to claim the Atlantic Coast Conference football championship, according to a poll of 167 media members at the 2017 ACC Football Kickoff.

Reigning Heisman Trophy winner Lamar Jackson of Louisville was chosen to repeat as ACC Player of the Year after a record-setting 2016 campaign in which he averaged 393.4 yards per game of total offense and accounted for 51 touchdowns, both ACC single-season records. His 1,571 rushing yards and 21 rushing touchdowns were also ACC records for a quarterback.

Clemson led all schools with five selections to the 2017 All-Atlantic Coast Conference Preseason Football Team.

son of Wake Forest (103) who is 21st, Virginia's Bronco Mendenhall, who is 22nd with 101 wins, and Duke's David Cutcliffe, who is tied for 24th with 96 wins.

2017 AWARD WATCH LISTS

The ACC led all conferences with the most players on seven preseason watch lists for the Bednarik Award (top defensive player), the Outland (top interior lineman) and Nagurski (top defensive player) Trophies, the Mackey (top tight end), Groza (top placekicker) Hornung (most versatile) Awards and Hendricks Awards (Top Defensive End), and tied for the most players chosen for the preseason watch list for four more in the Manning Award, the Jim Thorpe Award (top defensive back), the Wuerffel Trophy (most service) and the Walter Camp.

In all, a total of 95 ACC players were named on at least one preseason National Awards Watch List for a total of 178 selections. Clemson defensive lineman Christian Wilkins leads all ACC players, being named on eight preseason awards watch lists. Florida State defensive back Derwin James and Boston College's Harold Landry were each named to six different watch lists, while Louisville's Lamar Jackson and Virginia's Quin Blanding were each named on five lists.

The ACC tied for the most quarterbacks selected to the Manning Award preseason watch list with five. Tabbed from the ACC were Eric Dungey of Syracuse, Ryan Finley of NC State, Deondre Francois of Florida State, Lamar Jackson of Louisville and Daniel Jones of Duke. The Manning Award is presented annually to the nation's best quarterback and was won by former Clemson All-America Deshaun Watson the past two years. Jackson was a finalist for last year's award.

A national-best 18 ACC players were named to the watch list for the Bednarik Award Watch List, given to the nation's top defensive player.

Eleven ACC players were named to the watch list for the Maxwell Award, given to the nation's top football player.

2017 ACC FOOTBALL NOTES

Five ACC Coaches In Top 10 In Wins Per Season

The ACC features five of the top nine coaches in the FBS in wins per season. Led by Florida State's Jimbo Fisher, who has averaged 11.14 wins during his first seven seasons as a head coach. Four other ACC coaches rank among the nation's top nine coaches in wins per season with a minimum of five seasons as an FBS head coach.

Clemson's Dabo Swinney is fifth (9.89) followed by Miami's Mark Richt (7th, 9.63), Louisville's Bobby Petrino (8th) and Georgia Tech's Paul Johnson (9th, 8.85)

Virginia's Bronco Mendenhall is 18th, averaging 8.42 wins a year, followed by North Carolina's Larry Fedora (20th) and NC State's Dave Doeren (tied for 24th). In all, eight ACC coaches are among the Top 25.

NATIONAL TITLES & HEISMAN TROPHY WINNERS

Two of the last four national champions have come from the ACC (Clemson in 2016, Florida State in 2013), the only conference with multiple winners over that stretch. The ACC has had a team in the championship game in three of the four years.

The ACC is the first conference since 1994 to have a football national title winner (Clemson) and a Heisman Trophy winner (Lamar Jackson, Louisville) from two different schools in the same season.

Louisville's Lamar Jackson became the second ACC player in the last four years to claim the Heisman Trophy. With Clemson's Deshaun Watson at No. 2 in the Heisman voting, it marked the seventh time in the 82-year history of the award that the top two finishers have been from the same conference, and only the second time that the top two finishers have been quarterbacks from the same conference.

With junior QB Lamar Jackson returning to lead Louisville in 2017, the ACC has had reigning Heisman Trophy-winner return to compete in the league twice in the last four years. Florida State's Jameis Winston did so in 2014 after winning the 2013 Heisman Trophy. Jackson is the youngest athlete (19 years, 337 days) to win the Heisman Trophy, while Winston (19 years, 342 days) is the second youngest.

ACC AGAINST POWER 5 COMPETITION

The ACC finished the 2016 season with a 17-9 (.654) mark against Power 5 competition, the only league with a winning record in such games. The ACC finished ahead of the Pac-12 (8-8), SEC (11-14), Big Ten (9-11), and Big 12 (5-8).

The ACC was 51-17 against all non-conference competition in 2016, the best record of any conference and a league record for most wins in a season. The previous mark of 46 wins came in 2013 and 2014. The 51-17 record is the best of any conference this year, both in total wins and winning percentage (.750). The winning percentage is the second-highest in league history, topped only by the .770 mark set in 1990, when the league played only 37 non-conference games (28-8-1).

The ACC was 7-5 (.583) against ranked non-conference opponents last year, the best record of any league.

The ACC was 10-4 against the SEC last year and 6-2 against the Big Ten. Both are league records for most wins against those respective conferences.

The ACC had 11 teams with winning records, the most in league history and two more than any other conference last year.

ACC BOWL SUCCESS

The ACC was 9-3 in 2016 postseason bowl games, a league record for most bowl wins in a season and tied for the most for any conference in history.

Over the last five seasons, the ACC has the most wins in BCS, New Year's Six, and College Football Playoff games. The league's 8-3 record in these games leads the Pac-12 (5-4), Big Ten (6-7), SEC (5-8), and Big 12 (3-5).

ACC ORANGE BOWL SUCCESS

When FSU defeated No. 6 Michigan, 33-32, in the Capital One Orange Bowl, it marked the fifth straight victory for an ACC team in the Orange Bowl. That's the longest such streak for a conference in the Orange Bowl in 72 years. FSU began the streak in the 2013 contest against No. 16 Northern Illinois and it has continued with Clemson's win over No. 7 Ohio State in 2014, Georgia Tech's win over No. 8 Mississippi State in 2015 and Clemson's win over No. 4 Oklahoma in 2016.

DR PEPPER ACC FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game will be held at Charlotte's Bank of America Stadium for a seventh time this season, resuming an agreement between the ACC and the Queen City venue that runs through the 2020 season.



2017 ACC FOOTBALL NOTES

The 13th annual Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game is set for Saturday, Dec. 2. The game will again be shown in prime time on ESPN (at 7:45 p.m.) or ABC (at 8 p.m.)

The six Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Games held in Charlotte have been extremely successful from a fan experience and attendance standpoint. The games have averaged over 69,000 fans per contest, including sellout crowds in 2010, 2011, and 2015. An ACC Football Championship record crowd of 74,514 in 2015 set an attendance record at Bank of America Stadium. Over the last seven years, the ACC ranks second among all conferences in attendance at its football championship games.

Since 2011, the ACC Championship has been the most competitive of the four major conference championship games, as it has been decided by more than five fewer points per game than any other championship.

ACC BOWL PARTNERSHIPS

The ACC is in its fourth year of a 12-year agreement with the Capital One Orange Bowl, which will host an ACC team—either its champion or next available team—in all years in which the Orange Bowl is not a semifinal site for the College Football Playoff. The opponent will be the highest ranked available team from the SEC, Big Ten or Notre Dame.

The ACC has won five consecutive Orange Bowl games, the longest winning streak in the Orange Bowl by any conference in 72 years.

The ACC is in its fourth year of an extended bowl relationship, with teams potentially playing in the Camping World Bowl in Orlando, Belk Bowl in Charlotte, Hyundai Sun Bowl in El Paso, New Era Pinstripe Bowl in the Bronx, Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl in Nashville, TaxSlayer Bowl in Jacksonville, Military Bowl presented by Northrop Grumman in Annapolis, Independence Bowl in Shreveport, Quick Lane Bowl in Detroit, Bad Boy Mowers Gasparilla Bowl in St. Petersburg, and the Birmingham Bowl in Birmingham. In addition, if the ACC's opponent in the Capital One Orange Bowl is a team from the Big Ten, then the ACC will have a team selected to the Citrus Bowl.

Overall, the lineup of bowl games provides more postseason opportunities, selection flexibility, improved financials, marquee matchups and attractive destinations for the ACC's member schools.

ACC ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Ten of 14 ACC Football teams earned a graduation success rate at or above the FBS average of 74 in 2016. That ties for first among Power Five conferences, both in terms of percentage and in total number.

The ACC remains the only Power 5 conference to have multiple teams score 90 or higher every year since 2005. Duke (94), Wake Forest (91) and Boston College (90) reached that plateau last year.

In its 2016 U.S. News and World "Best Colleges" rankings, ACC member schools combine for an average rank of 55.7, marking the 10th straight year that the ACC has led all Power Five conferences.

THE ACC & THE NFL DRAFT

The ACC had 43 players chosen in the 2017 NFL Draft. The total was the second highest of any conference this year and the third highest in league history.

The ACC has had 158 players chosen in the last four NFL Drafts, the second-highest total of any conference.

In the 2017 draft, Miami led all ACC teams with nine selections followed by Clemson and North Carolina (6 each), Pitt (5), Florida State and Virginia Tech (4 each), NC State (3), Boston College and Louisville (2 each), and Georgia Tech and Wake Forest with one selection apiece.

0.62 The average number of interceptions per game by Florida State sophomore CB Tarvarus McFadden in 2016. McFadden tied for the FBS lead in interceptions per game.

.706 The winning percentage for Clemson under head coach Dabo Swinney against teams ranked in the Top 10. The Tigers are 12-5 against Top 10 teams under Swinney.

.744 The winning percentage for Virginia Tech head coach Justin Fuente in his last two seasons at Memphis and his first year at Virginia Tech. Fuente's teams posted a 29-10 mark during that time as he became just the 13th coach to be named ACC Coach of the Year in his first season in the league and only the third to be named Coach of the Year and lead his team to 10 wins.

.821 The winning percentage for Florida State head coach Jimbo Fisher, who has posted a 78-17 record in just seven seasons as head coach of the Seminoles. Fisher ranks second among all active FBS head coaches, trailing only Ohio State's Urban Meyer.

1.27 Boston College junior DE Harold Landry led the nation in sacks per game in 2016, averaging 1.27 per contest with 16.5 sacks in 13 games.

3 A trio of ACC teams — Miami, Pitt and Boston College — lead ESPN.com's list of schools since 2002 that over perform in producing players for the National Football League. Miami leads overall and in producing long-time starters in the NFL as 29.2% of the Hurricanes NFL players have started for eight or more years. Pitt (13.2%) edges out Boston College (10.3%) in producing All-Pro players.

5 Five ACC receivers return who ranked among the Top 20 nationally in yards per reception in 2016. Pitt's Jester Weah (24.17) and Louisville's Jaylen Smith (22.19) rank first and second among all returnees. Stephen Louis (19.3) of NC State, Ahmmon Richards (19.06) of Miami and Deon Cain (19.05) of Clemson all ranked in the Top 20. Richards' average was the highest by a freshman in the nation in 2016.

5 Pitt all-purpose back Quadree Henderson enters his junior year having scored five times on returns. Henderson has four kickoff returns for scores and one punt return for a TD. The ACC record for career kickoff TD returns is seven, set by former Clemson standout C.J. Spiller during the 2006-09 seasons.

7 The number of ACC players chosen to the AP preseason All-America first team. Pitt's Quadree Henderson (All-Purpose), Boston College's Harold Landry (DE), NC State's Bradley Chubb (DE), Clemson's Dexter Lawrence (DT), Louisville's Jaire Alexander (CB) and Florida State's Tarvarus McFadden (CB) and Derwin James (S) were all selected to the first team. 9 Nine of the 14 ACC teams are ranked or received votes in the Preseason Amway Coach poll. In addition to Florida State (3), Clemson (5), Louisville (17), Miami (18) and Virginia Tech (22) that were ranked in the Top 25, NC State, Georgia Tech, North Carolina and Syracuse all received votes.

9.94 Virginia safety Quin Blanding leads all active players nationally in tackles per game. Blanding, entering his fourth year as a starter, has 358 career tackles, an NCAA-leading average of 9.94 per game. Blanding also leads all returnees in total tackles.

10 Clemson has won 10 or more games in each of the last six years. The Tigers and Alabama are the only two teams that currently have active streaks of six or more years with double-figure victories. The Tigers are only the 11th team to have had 10 wins in six successive seasons.

14 With Clemson claiming the 2016 national title, current ACC teams have won 14 national championships as decided by the College Football Playoff, the AP, the Football Coaches and the BCS. ACC teams have won seven national titles, beginning with former league member Maryland (1953) and including Clemson (1981, 2016), Georgia Tech (1990) and Florida State (1993, 1999, 2013). Before it joined the ACC, Miami won five titles (1983, 1987, 1989, 1991 and 2001), Pitt two (1937, 1976) and Syracuse one (1959).

19 Louisville sophomore Lamar Jackson became the youngest person to win the Heisman Trophy by just five days over Florida State's Jameis Winston. Jackson captured the 2016 Trophy at 19 years and 337 days, compared to Winston's 19 years and 342 days in 2013.

42 In head coach Larry Fedora's 65 games as head coach of North Carolina, the Tar Heels have scored 30 or more points in 42 of them, topping the 40-point mark 64.6 percent of the time.

165 Virginia Tech WR Cam Phillips leads all ACC receivers in career pass receptions with 165. Phillips ranks third nationally among all returning receivers.

5,602 Heading into his senior season, Wake Forest QB John Wolford, leads all ACC signal callers in career passing yards, having completed 522 of 901 passes for 5,602 yards.
