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WHAT AN AMAZING YEAR FOR THE CRIMSON TIDE!

From the fall – when our football team advanced to the College Football Playoff for the fourth year in a row and went on to win our fifth national title since 2009 and 17th overall – to the spring – when Alabama became the first school to have both golf teams advance to the NCAA Championship match – the Crimson Tide continues to be on an extraordinary roll.

In between those great feats, our men’s track and field team won the 2018 SEC Indoor Championship in the winter and finished as the 2017-18 USTFCCA Division I Program of the Year after posting the nation’s best combined NCAA indoor, outdoor and cross country team finishes.

Altogether, 17 of our teams reached national postseason competition, nine finished in the top 15 nationally and six placed in the top 10. That comprehensive success led to our highest finish in program history in the Learfield Directors’ Cup, coming in at No. 14.

We were also champions in the classroom again this year. An NCAA-best 11 of our student-athletes earned CoSIDA Academic All-America honors, making Alabama the only school in the nation to post double-figures in this prestigious honor each of the last five years. Our total of 56 over that span is 11 better than Stanford, the next closest school.

Overall, our teams combined for a 3.27 grade point on the year, the best in recent memory. All our programs carried better than a 2.75 team GPA, 16 earned better than a 3.0 and seven combined to post better than a 3.5 GPA. We also saw more than 175 of our student-athletes graduate on the year.

The Crimson Tide has made a tremendous difference in the community, with nearly 200 projects totaling more than 2,800 hours of service. As a department, our student-athletes, coaches and staff have come together in a unity project to lend a helping hand on an ongoing basis with the Alberta Head Start Program.

No matter where you look, there is so much to be proud of when it comes to your Crimson Tide, and it doesn’t stop here. Everything we do within Alabama Athletics is centered around moving forward, and moving together, as we continue strive for excellence in all aspects of the collegiate experience.

To that end, we are ready to embark on The Crimson Standard: A Capital Initiative for Alabama Athletics, which is a 10-year, comprehensive initiative focused on renovating our facilities and developing an infrastructure that will drive success in the future. It is this kind of forward thinking and comprehensive planning that will ensure our programs remain on the forefront of national prominence.

The support from our incredibly passionate fans is vital to our success and your importance to our future cannot be overstated.

All of this just skims the surface of the Crimson Tide success we enjoyed during this past academic year. The following pages really drive home the tremendous scope of all we accomplished. We hope you enjoy this look at the 2017-18 season, and we look forward to sharing in the Crimson Tide’s continued success as we move forward into a new year.

INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS COMMITTEE

DUTIES

Assist the President in the formulation of policy for intercollegiate athletics. In carrying out its duties, the committee shall provide oversight for all aspects of the intercollegiate athletics program. Oversight shall include but not be limited to: the Athletics Department's mission statement; periodic review of Student-Athletes Handbook, Compliance Manual; compliance with NCAA and SEC rules and regulations; academic services, admissions profiles and graduation rates; financial affairs; gender equity and equal opportunity policies and practices; coach/student-athlete relationships and discipline; competitive event scheduling; student-athlete exit interviews; and general reputation of the athletics program.

COMPOSITION

This committee, appointed by the President, shall consist of 11 voting members: a total of six faculty, including the Faculty Senate Representative and the Faculty Athletics Representative (who serves as chair), a Professional Staff Assembly representative, an OCT Staff Assembly representative, a retired faculty/staff representative and two student athlete representatives (one male and one female). In addition, there will be nine ex officio members: Director of Alumni Affairs, Member of the Board of Trustees, President of the Faculty Senate, President of the SGA, Vice President for Student Life, Associate Provost, University Registrar, member of the Tuscaloosa community and the Vice President for Financial Affairs. The four non-designated faculty positions will be nominated by the CUC and serve three-year terms. The Athletic Director and the Associate Athletic Director/Senior Woman Administrator shall serve as liaison members.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE



ACADEMIC HIGHLIGHTS

- Alabama tallied double digit Academic All-America honors each of the last five years, giving the Crimson Tide 56 over that span, the most in the nation and 11 better than second-place Stanford.
- Alabama leads the nation with 88 Academic All-America honors over the past nine years, including a school-record 13 accolades during the 2013-14 academic year.
- The Crimson Tide ranks first among Southeastern Conference and fifth among all NCAA Division I schools in Academic All-America honors with 170 all time.
- When swimmer Anton McKee was named the At-Large Team Academic All-American of the Year for the second time in 2016-17, it marked the eighth consecutive year an Alabama student has earned the honor for their respective sports.
- Alabama student-athletes earned two NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships in 2017-18 and have earned at least one of the scholarships each of the last 17 years, a stretch that includes multiple winners the last 11 years in a row.
- Haylie McCleney's 2017 NCAA Top 10 Award was Alabama's 14th overall. Alabama has earned the honor 11 times since 2000 and seven times over the past decade. Both totals lead the nation.
- Alabama student-athletes have earned 15 NCAA Elite 90 Awards since its inception in 2010, second all time, one behind Stanford for the national lead.
- Anton McKee's 2016-17 SEC H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete of the Year award gave Alabama 11, the most in the award's 33-year history. Alabama has earned eight honors since 2000, the most in the SEC over that span. McKee's win also put the Crimson Tide in first place when it comes to the men's side of the slate with six.

The University of Alabama Athletics Department's run of extraordinary success in the classroom continued during the 2017-18 academic year, further enhancing the Crimson Tide's well-established tradition of scholastic excellence.

On a department-wide basis, Alabama's approximately 600 student-athletes averaged over a 3.27 grade point average. All 17 programs earned better than a 2.75 GPA with 15 earning better than a 3.0. A total of eight Tide teams earned over a 3.5 GPA in 2017-18, marking the eighth year in a row that at least five teams have met that standard.

As impressive as those numbers are, perhaps nowhere has Alabama Athletics' continued academic prowess been on better display than when it comes to the CoSIDA Academic All-America program.

Alabama once again led the nation in Academic All-America honors, totaling 11 during the 2017-18 academic year. The Crimson Tide's total makes Alabama the only school to earn double-digit honors the last five years in a row.

There are 12 Academic All-America teams administered by the College Sports Information Directors of America, including men's and women's soccer, football, volleyball, men's and women's basketball, baseball, softball, men's and women's track and field/cross country, as well as the men's and women's at-large teams, which spans 12 and 14 sports, respectively.

Swimmers Laurent Bams, Robert Howard, Luke Kaliszak and Temarie Tomley along with gymnast Mackenzie Brannan, tennis

player Andie Daniell and golfer Kristen Gillman all earned a place on the at-large teams.

In the fall, Emma Welch took a spot on the soccer list while Leah Lawrence was recognized for volleyball. In the spring, Bailey Hemphill received the honor in softball and Josh Short rounded out the Tide's total when he earned a place on the track and field/cross country team.

It was Brannan's third Academic All-America honor and second for Kaliszak.

In the spring, Alabama became the first school to have a combined seven student-athletes earn a place on the at-large team in the same year. It also marked the second time that the Tide has had the maximum number of student-athletes, four, on the women's at-large team. Alabama was the first school to put four on the women's (2014) and men's (2017) at-large teams and is now the first to put four on the women's team twice (2014 and 2018).

The Alabama men's swimming and diving program has been particularly prolific over the past four years, with six swimmers earning 12 honors. That total is nearly double what any other school has put on the men's at-large team over that span for all sports combined.

Alabama softball players have earned 24 Academic All-America awards over the Tide's 22-year history, including at least one award winner every year since 2008.



UA gymnasts have garnered Academic All-America recognition 23 times with Brannan becoming the third Alabama gymnast to garner three honors in a career with her 2018 accolade. Tide gymnasts have earned Academic All-America honors 10 of the past 11 years and the past six years in a row.

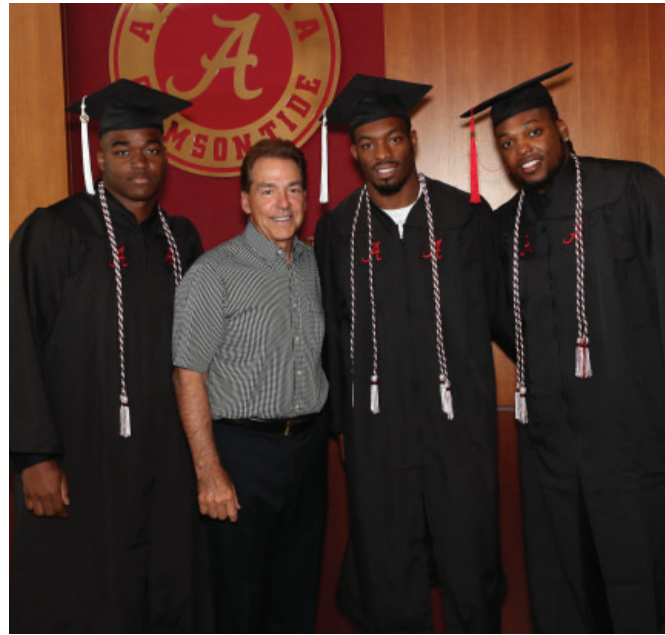
Lawrence's honors marked the fourth season in a row that at least one Tide volleyball player has received the honor.

Welch is the seventh UA soccer player to be named Academic All-America, with her honor becoming the Tide's eighth in program history.

Short's honor marks the ninth year in a row that at least one member of the track & field/cross country program has earned Academic All-American recognition. Overall, 11 members of the program have received Academic All-America recognition 18 times.

In addition to the Tide's 11 Academic All-Americans, six additional UA student-athletes earned Academic All-District recognition: Rachel Bobo (softball), Connor Ferrentino (men's track and field/cross country), Nicole Gardner (women's track and field/cross country), Keith Holcombe (football), Jonah Williams (football) and Braxton Young (at-large/swimming and diving).

With five huge Academic All-America classes in a row, Alabama has made a big jump in the national rankings over that span, moving from 13th all-time in NCAA Division I following the 2012-13 academic year to fifth two years later. Following the 2017-18 school year, Alabama leads the Southeastern Conference with a total of



170 Academic All-America accolades and is ranked fifth among NCAA Division I schools.

Alabama student-athletes have come away with Academic All-America honors a Division I-best 88 times since 2009-10 and 56 times over the last five years. The Tide's five-year total is 11 better than second-place Stanford over that span. Alabama has also made a significant jump in the rankings when it comes to honors since 2000, jumping Notre Dame in 2017-18 to move up to second place with 134.

After a school-record seven student-athletes earned NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships in 2014, Alabama has added 11 more over the last four years, including two in 2017-18 with Brannan and Kaliszak receiving the prestigious scholarship. The Tide now has a seven-year total of 31 NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships. Alabama student-athletes have now earned at least one NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship the last 17 years in a row, dating back to 2002. That stretch includes 11 consecutive years with multiple scholarship winners. Overall, Alabama students have been awarded 64 NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships since football's Steve Davis earned the Tide's first in 1968.

On a conference level, Brannan and Kaliszak both earned SEC Postgraduate Scholarships and were finalists for the SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year. Additionally, Kaliszak was voted the SEC Swimming and Diving Scholar-Athlete of the Year by the league's coaches. It marked the third year in a row that the Alabama men's team has received the honor. Alabama student-athletes from 12



different sports have earned this award 49 times since its inception in 2003, led by women's tennis' eight.

Alabama was also prolific when it came to the SEC Academic Honor Roll, coming away with the accolade 391 times during the 2017-18 academic year. The Crimson Tide had 106, 57 and 136 student-athletes named to the SEC Fall, Winter and Spring Academic Honor Rolls, respectively, and 92 named to the First-Year Academic Honor Roll.

Alabama's success on the football field over the past decade has coincided with its success in the classroom. The Tide's last five national title teams (2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2017) included 114 players who had earned their degrees prior to game time. The 2017 squad featured 12 players who already had degrees in hand going into the season opener with Florida State. An additional 13 Tide players graduated in December of 2017, giving UA 25 graduates on its Sugar Bowl and CFP Championship Game rosters.

Since 2013, Alabama has seen 129 degrees earned (graduate and undergraduate) by players who were still suiting up for the Crimson Tide after having graduated. Since the 2010 season, Alabama has seen an impressive 15 players garner a master's degree before stepping foot on the field for the final time.

Alabama also received the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Academic Achievement Award in 2017 after recording a 100-percent graduation rate for members of its 2010 freshman football class. The Academic Achievement Award is presented annually to the school or schools with the highest score in the

NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) and a federal graduation rate of 75 percent or higher.

More than 175 student-athletes earned their degrees during the 2017-18 academic year, including the winter, spring and summer graduations. The latest numbers reveal that Alabama graduates 71 percent of its student-athletes while the general student population graduates at a rate of 67 percent.

Crimson Tide student-athletes receiving their degrees while still competing has become such a common occurrence, that the department developed a graduation insignia for them to wear on their uniform during competition. That initiative went conference-wide during the 2016-17 academic year.

ACADEMIC PROGRESS RATE

All 21 University of Alabama athletics teams continue to score well above the national cutoff standard in the latest Academic Progress Rate (APR) the NCAA announced. The figures, released in May 2018, cover the four-year period extending from the 2013-14 through 2016-17 school years.

Overall, 15 Crimson Tide teams posted scores above the national average in their respective sports, including seven that bettered the national average of their sport by 10 points or more.

Alabama football scored a program-record 984, which bettered the national average for Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) teams by 16 points. The Crimson Tide men's basketball team posted a 985 APR, bettering the national average by 18 points. Baseball, with a 990 APR, bettered the national average by 15 points.

Four Alabama teams - gymnastics, softball, women's golf and men's cross country - earned public recognition from the NCAA for their APR scores figuring in the top-10 percentile nationally among teams in those sports.

In addition to national recognition, eight Crimson Tide teams ranked among the top two in their respective sports in the SEC, with gymnastics, softball, women's golf, women's swimming and diving as well as men's cross country all ranked No. 1 in the league. Football, baseball and men's swimming and diving all ranked second in the SEC among their respective sports.

Men's cross country, women's golf, gymnastics and softball all scored a perfect 1,000 for their four-year score. Those four teams were joined by women's swimming and diving (998), volleyball (995), men's swimming and diving (994), women's cross country (993), rowing (993), women's tennis (992), women's indoor and outdoor track and field (991) and baseball (990) among the 13 UA programs with scores of 990 or better.

Alabama football (984), men's basketball (985) and soccer (987) were among the teams that posted scores of 980 or better. A total of 15 Alabama teams either matched or exceeded their APR from the year before.

The Academic Progress Rate measures the eligibility, retention and graduation of student-athletes competing on every Division I sports team. It also serves as a predictor of graduation success. The NCAA's Division I Board of Directors set cut scores of 930 (out of 1,000) as a threshold for teams to meet or face possible immediate

and historical sanctions. An APR of 930 translates to approximately a 50 percent Graduation Success Rate (GSR).

GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE

The University of Alabama men's basketball program, along with six other Crimson Tide programs, once again led the Southeastern Conference in Graduation Success Rate (GSR) figures released by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) in November 2017.

Overall, Alabama's GSR was 90 this year, ranking in the top four among SEC schools. The Crimson Tide's overall score ranks in the top third nationally. Alabama's score continues to far exceed the standards for completion of undergraduate studies nationally per the NCAA. This year's GSR spans the period covering student-athletes who attended the University during 2007-10.

The men's basketball team remained at a perfect 100 while the Alabama football team jumped four points from a year ago to 84, which ranks fourth in the SEC, marking the ninth year in a row that the Tide football squad has ranked in the top four in the SEC by GSR.

Alabama also led the SEC with perfect GSR scores of 100 in men's basketball, men's golf, women's golf, gymnastics, men's tennis, women's tennis and men's swimming & diving. Alabama was third among SEC schools in terms of teams scoring a perfect 100. In addition to the sports that posted perfect scores of 100, five others posted scores 90 or better - softball (95), soccer (93), volleyball (92), women's swimming & diving (90) and women's track & field (90). A total of 12 Alabama programs recorded a GSR score of 90 or better. The average GSR for student-athletes is 86 for all of NCAA Division I.

The GSR measures graduation rates at Division I institutions and includes those transferring into the institutions. The GSR also allows institutions to subtract student-athletes who leave their institutions prior to graduation, as long as they would have been academically eligible to compete had they remained.

The NCAA's GSR and the Academic Success Rate (ASR) were developed in response to a mandate by college and university presidents for graduation data that more accurately reflects the mobility among today's college students. Both rates improve on the federally mandated graduation rate by including students who were omitted from the federal calculation. *A*

2018 BASEBALL HIGHLIGHTS

- Alabama finished the 2018 campaign with a 27-29 overall record, including a 22-13 record at home, a 5-15 mark on the road and a 0-1 record in neutral site games.
- UA posted an 8-22 Southeastern Conference record, finishing seventh in the Western Division standings and 14th overall.
- The Crimson Tide regained home field advantage at Sewell-Thomas Stadium, finishing with a 22-13 (.629) mark at home after going 14-22 (.388) during the 2017 season.
- Sewell-Thomas Stadium hosted 35 home games and welcomed 111,986 fans through the gates to average 3,200 fans per game. The Tide's total attendance ranked 15th nationally while the average attendance per game was 20th in the NCAA.
- "The Joe" sold out four times in 2018 with the first two sellouts coming in consecutive nights against Auburn on April 20-21. Alabama added two more sellouts on consecutive days on May 5-6 against Mississippi State.
- On offense, UA improved in nearly every category from a season ago, increasing its numbers in: extra-base hits (+14), doubles (+14), triples (+2), runs (+30), walks (+63) and stolen bases (+7).
- The pitching staff also saw marked improvement from 2017, lowering its ERA by .83 and dropping its walk totals by 65.

SEWELL-THOMAS CONTINUES TO SEE BIG NUMBERS

Alabama enjoyed a third successful season at home after re-opening "The Joe" at the start of the 2016 campaign. In 2018, Sewell-Thomas Stadium hosted 35 home games and saw a total of 111,986 fans come through the gates for an average of 3,200 per game. The Joe sold out four times in 2018 to bring the three-year sellout total to 15. Alabama's first sellout came Friday, April 20, as the Crimson Tide hosted then-No. 25 Auburn on A-Day weekend. A second sellout followed on Saturday evening as part of a doubleheader with the Tigers. Sewell-Thomas then sold out two more times, both coming against Mississippi State from May 5-6. Sewell-Thomas Stadium sold out nine times in its inaugural season in 2016 following a complete renovation during the 2015 season. The Tide then sold out on two occasions in 2017.

GRADUATING SUCCESS

The 2018 Crimson Tide roster featured four players with one degree in hand at the start of the season while two other players earned their degree during the year. Tyler Adams, Hunter Alexander, Keith Holcombe and Connor Short were all enrolled in graduate programs at The University of Alabama when the Tide began its season against Valparaiso on Feb. 16. Seniors Cody Henry and Jake Walters each walked on Saturday, May 5, in the University's graduation ceremonies after earning their degrees at the conclusion of the Spring semester.

BRAD BOHANNON ERA BEGINS

Alabama head coach Brad Bohannon completed his first season at the helm of the Crimson Tide baseball program. Bohannon's 2018 squad got off to a hot start, winning nine consecutive games to begin the season. The 9-0 start is the best by a Tide team since 2002 when Jim Wells' squad started 10-0. The start by Bohannon matched Wallace Wade (1924) for the second-best start to a head coaching career at Alabama, falling one game short of the UA all-time record. Bohannon's first team claimed series victories over two top-25 teams in SEC play, including one on the road. The Crimson Tide also hung around in nearly every game. Fourteen of Alabama's 29 total losses came by two runs or less, including five of the Tide's six losses in May - all against conference foes.

JAKE WALTERS EARNS SEC PITCHER OF THE WEEK

Senior starter Jake Walters was named the SEC Co-Pitcher of the Week on May 21, the first weekly award of his career and the lone weekly league award for the Tide in 2018. Walters' standout effort helped the Crimson Tide take down then-fourth-ranked Ole Miss, 3-0, thanks to a complete game shutout. The Maylene, Ala., native was outstanding in his final start at UA, limiting the high-powered Rebel offense to only four hits in his first career complete game effort, the Tide's first since 2014. He walked two and struck out seven across his career-high 35 batters faced.



TIDE HAS FIVE PLAYERS SELECTED IN 2018 MLB DRAFT

Alabama baseball had five players selected in the 2018 Major League Baseball First-Year Draft to mark the fourth time in five years the Tide has had five or more players selected in the professional draft. First off the board was senior starter Jake Walters, going to the Miami Marlins in the ninth round, and joining him on day two was junior outfielder Chandler Taylor, who was selected as a left fielder by the Houston Astros in the 10th round. The final day of the draft saw a trio of Alabama infielders selected. Junior Cobie Vance started things off on day three, going in the 18th round to the Oakland A's. Next up was fellow junior Jett Manning, who went to the San Francisco Giants in the 20th round. Closing out the draft

was senior Chandler Avant, who was chosen by the New York Mets in round 30 of the draft. Both Vance and Manning were tabbed as shortstops by their respective teams, while Avant was selected as a second baseman. The five total selections in the 2018 draft increased the Crimson Tide's all-time draft pick total to 153 (143 players selected) since the event began in 1966. Alabama has now had at least one player selected in 40 consecutive years dating back to 1979 and 47 of the 53 MLB drafts overall. More recently, the Tide has had 45 selections (43 players) in the last nine years and 80 total picks across the last 19 drafts dating back to 2000. *A*

2017-18 HIGHLIGHTS

- The University of Alabama men's basketball team finished with an overall record of 20-16 during the 2017-18 season, including an 8-10 mark in Southeastern Conference play. The Crimson Tide earned its first trip to the NCAA Tournament since 2012 and won its first NCAA Tournament game since 2006.
- Alabama defeated Virginia Tech, 86-83, in the opening round of the 2018 NCAA Tournament, before falling to eventual national champions Villanova in the second round. It marked the Tide's 20th NCAA tournament trip in program history. UA is 19-20 all-time in the tournament and has advanced to the Sweet 16 seven times and the Elite Eight once (2004).
- Alabama reached the SEC Tournament semifinals for a second consecutive season. It was the first time in 22 years that the Tide has achieved that feat, dating back to the 1994 and 1995 seasons.
- The program set a single-season attendance record this year for both overall (227,640) and per game average (13,391). Furthermore, three of the top six single-season attendance averages occurred in head coach Avery Johnson's first three seasons at the helm.
- The Crimson Tide owned a record of 6-3 against AP top-25 opponents during the season, which was the most wins over ranked opponents in a single season in program history (also tied for the nation's most entering the NCAA Tournament). The ranked opponents Alabama defeated during the season (all ranking at time of the game) included: No. 5 Texas A&M (12/30), No. 17 Auburn (1/17), No. 12 Oklahoma (1/27), at No. 23 Florida (2/3), No. 15 Tennessee (2/10) and vs. No. 16 Auburn (3/9).

ALABAMA RETURNS TO NCAA TOURNAMENT

Alabama made its first NCAA Tournament appearance since 2012 and just the second since 2006. With its opening round win over Virginia Tech, the Crimson Tide secured its first victory in the big dance since 2006. Alabama, which earned the No. 9 seed, defeated the eighth-seeded Hokies, 86-83, in the opening round at PPG Paints Arena in Pittsburgh, Pa. Freshman Collin Sexton poured in a game-high 25 points to go along with six assists, while fellow freshman John Petty was red-hot from beyond the arc, going 6-of-8 from three-point range and finishing with 20 points off the bench. Junior Donta Hall finished with 10 points on a perfect 5-of-5 shooting from the floor and sophomore Dazon Ingram had nine points, seven rebounds and four assists in the win. The neck-and-neck second-round battle saw 10 ties and 10 lead changes throughout, but the Crimson Tide's three straight field goals and free-throw shooting down the stretch allowed UA to hang on for the win. The Tide advanced to the round of 32 where it fell to eventual NCAA national champions Villanova, 81-58, to end the 2017-18 season. Alabama has now made 35 postseason appearances in program history, including 20 NCAA and 15 NIT showings.

AMAZING ROOKIE SEASON SENDS SEXTON TO CLEVELAND CAVS AS THE NO. 8 PICK OVERALL IN THE NBA DRAFT

Freshman guard Collin Sexton was selected by the Cleveland Cavaliers as the eighth overall pick at the 2018 National Basketball Association Draft. Sexton became the 15th Alabama player to be chosen in the first round and the fourth top-10 selection in



program history, joining Antonio McDiyaess (No. 2 overall in 1995), Derrick McKey (No. 9 overall in 1987) and Leon Douglas (No. 4 overall in 1976). Sexton had one of the most memorable freshman seasons in recent memory, highlighted by a plethora of honors and accolades following the year, including becoming the 19th different player in program history, and first since 2008 (Richard Hendrix), to earn All-America accolades. Additionally, he was named to the NABC and USBWA All-District teams, selected as the Associated Press Newcomer of the Year and AP First Team All-SEC honoree, while the league's coaches voted him as the SEC Freshman of the Year and to the All-Freshman squad and All-SEC second team. During the 2017-18 season, Sexton scored a total of 632 points, which ranked third-most in program history and set the freshman single-season scoring record. The Mableton, Ga., native finished the year ranked second in the SEC with 19.2 ppg, while adding 3.8 rpg and a team-leading 3.6 apg. He topped Alabama in field goals made (196) and attempted (438) and free throws made (196) and attempted (252). In addition to his freshman scoring record, Sexton set a new school record for free throws made in a season and ranked fourth in program history in free throws attempted. In the classroom, Sexton, a business major, finished with a 3.88 grade point average on the year and earned a perfect 4.0 GPA during the fall semester, placing him on the President's List.

HALL TABBED TO SEC ALL-DEFENSIVE TEAM

Junior Donta Hall earned conference recognition as the Luverne, Ala., native was named to the league's All-Defensive team. Hall was a force down low for the Tide throughout the season. In 32 contests, Hall averaged 10.6 ppg, while he led the team and finished fifth in the SEC and 12th nationally with 2.0 blocks per game. That number ranked eighth best in UA lore, while his 68 total blocks was 10th most in the record books.

TOPPLING THE TOP 25

Alabama head coach Avery Johnson has led his teams to great success when playing against teams ranked in the Associated Press Top 25 during his three seasons at the Capstone. In 21 total games played against teams ranked in the AP Top 25, Johnson has led the

Tide to a record of 11-10. That's a huge improvement, especially considering prior his arrival, Alabama had lost 21 consecutive games to nationally-ranked opponents. This season alone, the Tide boasted a record of 6-3 against Top-25 teams. The six wins over ranked opponents in a single season is a program record. *A*

2017-18 HIGHLIGHTS

- Alabama finished its 2017-18 campaign with 20 wins for the second consecutive season, marking the first time the Crimson Tide has had back-to-back 20-win seasons since the late 1990s.
- The team advanced to the quarterfinals of the Women's National Invitation Tournament for the second straight season as well, posting wins over Southern, UCF and Georgia Tech.
- Alabama won seven Southeastern Conference games for the first time since the 2014 season and finished eighth in the final league standings.

SUPER SENIORS

Alabama's 2017-18 graduates finished as the Crimson Tide's winningest senior class in 16 years, collecting 70 victories over its four seasons. As juniors, they helped Alabama to 22 wins, the most since the 1997-98 season, and advanced to the quarterfinals of the Southeastern Conference tournament and the Women's National Invitation Tournament, both firsts since the early 2000s. Under their leadership, the Tide made another WNIT quarterfinal run in 2018 and reached the 20-win mark for the second straight year.

TIDE BOASTS TRIO OF 1,000 POINT SCORERS

For the first time in program history, Alabama had three 1,000-point scorers on the same roster as seniors Hannah Cook, Ashley Williams and Meoshonti Knight each reached the milestone before ending their careers. The trio would finish among the top 20 in career points for the Tide, as Cook ended her career at No. 8 (1,468 points), Williams at No. 9 (1,450 points) and Knight at No. 20 (1,151 points).

COOK CEMENTS HER NAME IN RECORD BOOK

Senior Hannah Cook, a four-year starter for the Crimson Tide, was one of the best scorers to wear the crimson and white in many years. The Ozark, Mo., native finished her career ranked in the top 10 in scoring (No. 8 – 1,468), three-point field goals made (No. 4 – 262) and three-point field goals attempted (No. 1 – 781). She scored in double figures 79 times in her four years, nine of which were for 20 or more points. Cook was named to the 2018 Cheryl Miller Award Watch List and also earned most valuable player honors at the 2015 Nugget Classic in Reno, Nev.

WILLIAMS FINISHES CAREER TOP FIVE IN REBOUNDS

Not only did she finish her career No. 8 in scoring, but senior Ashley Williams also moved all the way up to No. 5 on Alabama's career rebounds chart, collecting 859 boards. She recorded double-doubles in all but three of her final nine contests as a senior.

CLIMBING THE LADDER PAYS DIVIDENDS AT THE FREE THROW LINE

Alabama has been one of the best teams in the nation over the last few years in getting to the free throw line, however, converting those attempts has not always come easy. In 2017-18, the team ended each practice by "Climbing the Ladder" where all 14 student-athletes gathered in a circle around the free throw line and took turns shooting free throws, two at a time. The drill was not complete until the team combined to make 21 of 28 attempts. Alabama's free throw percentage went up from 65.7 in 2016-17 to 72.8 percent in 2017-18.

SHOT-BLOCKING SENSATIONS

The Crimson Tide boasted a pair of solid shot-blockers in senior Quanetria Bolton and sophomore Ashley Knight. In just two seasons, Knight climbed all the way to No. 2 on Alabama's career blocks list with 149 rejections. Bolton will also go down as one of the Tide's best defenders in the circle as she finished with 124 blocks, good for fifth on UA's career list.

THE CRIMSON TIDE TIDE WINS FOR THE FIRST TIME IN KNOXVILLE

For the first time in program history, Alabama beat Tennessee on its home court, defeating the then-11th-ranked Lady Volunteers, 72-63, in Thompson-Boling Arena. Sophomore Jordan Lewis poured in a team-high 19 points, 14 in the second half, and added seven rebounds, while senior Ashley Williams finished with 16 points, 10 rebounds, five assists and a pair of steals. In addition to it being the first win for UA at Tennessee, the victory gave the Crimson Tide its fourth consecutive win over the Lady Vols.

WILLIAMS EARNS NATIONAL NOTORIETY AFTER BACK-TO-BACK DOUBLE-DOUBLES

For the second time in her career, senior Ashley Williams earned a spot on espnW's Starting Five, this time for her play against Tennessee and Auburn. Williams had a monster week for the Crimson Tide, recording double-doubles in both of Alabama's wins, averaging 16.5 points, 10.0 rebounds, 2.5 assists and 2.5 steals in the two games. She helped guide UA to its first victory in program history in Knoxville, which also snapped a 22-game losing streak against AP top-25 teams. Williams shot 70 percent from the field at Thompson-Boling Arena to finish with 16 points and 10 rebounds, while also adding a career-high five assists in the contest. Three days later, and on Senior Day nonetheless, she backed up her performance against the Lady Vols with another double-double, recording a team-high 17 points and game-best 10 rebounds to go along with three steals and a block against rival Auburn. In addition to being named to espnW's Starting Five, Williams also earned SEC Player of the Week honors for her performances. *A*

THE 2018 SUGAR BOWL BOWL CHAMPIONS



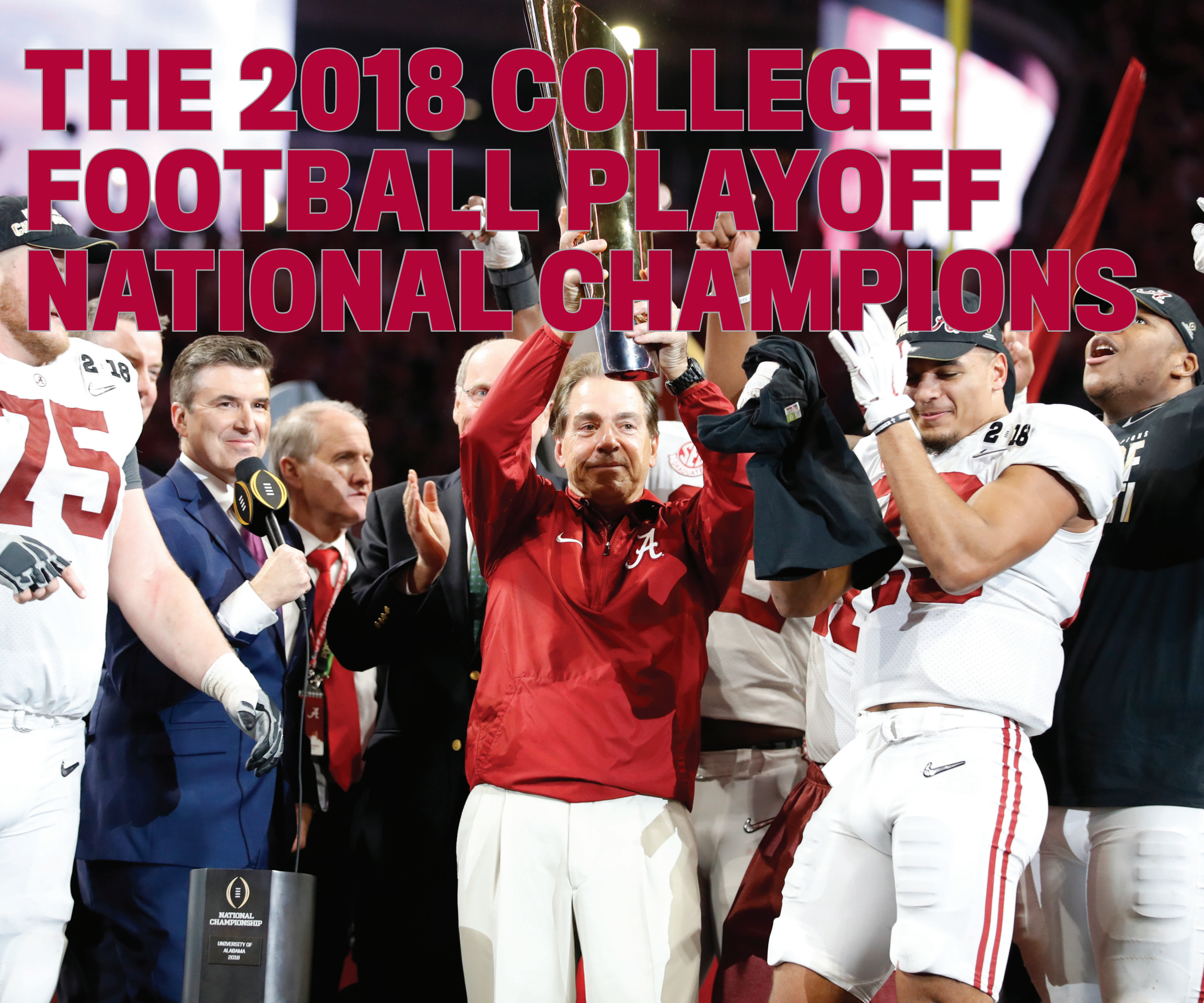


SWEET REVENGE IN THE SUGAR BOWL

The fourth-ranked Crimson Tide defeated No. 1 Clemson, 24-6, in dominating fashion at the 84th installment of the Allstate Sugar Bowl at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome in New Orleans, La. The Crimson Tide scored 14 points off two turnovers in the third quarter to put the game out reach. On the defensive side of the ball, Alabama collected five sacks and limited Clemson to just 188 total yards of offense, while holding the Tigers to their lowest point total since the 2014 season. Sophomore linebacker Mack Wilson grabbed his first career pick-six to go along with six tackles and a pass breakup, while junior defensive lineman Da’Ron Payne picked off his first career pass and caught a one-yard touchdown pass, also the first of his Alabama career. Rashaan Evans led the team with nine tackles, including one sack, and added a pass breakup. On offense, sophomore quarterback Jalen Hurts finished 16-of-24 with 120 yards and a pair of touchdowns through the air while picking up 40 rushing yards on 11 carries in the win. Junior running back Damien Harris led the Tide on the ground with 77 yards on 19 attempts. Hurts earned Offensive Most Valuable Player honors while Payne represented the Tide as the Defensive MVP. The win in the College Football Playoff Semifinal advanced the Crimson Tide to the 2018 College Football Playoff National Championship to take on SEC East rival Georgia.

SEVENTEEN IN '17

Alabama claimed its NCAA-leading 17th national championship thanks to a 41-yard touchdown pass-and-catch from the freshman duo of Tua Tagovailoa and DeVonta Smith in overtime for the 26-23 win over Georgia in the College Football Playoff National Championship Game at Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta, Ga. After the Bulldogs were held to a field goal on their first possession in overtime, the Crimson Tide got its chance. A Georgia sack of Tagovailoa on first down lost 16 yards and put UA in a 2nd-and-26 situation. With the game on the line, Tagovailoa found a wide open Smith for the game-winner. Tagovailoa earned Offensive Most Valuable Player accolades after going 14-of-24 for 166 yards and three scores through the air to go with 27 yards on the ground – all coming after the Tide made the switch at quarterback during the halftime break. On the defensive side of the ball, junior defensive lineman Da’Ron Payne was named Defensive MVP thanks to six tackles in the title game. Sophomore linebacker Mack Wilson led the team with a career-high 12 tackles, including two for loss. Senior defensive back Tony Brown and sophomore defensive lineman Rackwon Davis each had an interception in the win over the Bulldogs. The victory secured head coach Nick Saban’s sixth national title overall and his fifth during his tenure at Alabama. Saban’s six national titles matches Paul “Bear” Bryant for the most in college football history. His win over Kirby Smart improved the Crimson Tide coach to 12-0 all-time against his former assistants.

2017 HIGHLIGHTS

- Alabama finished the 2017 season with a 13-1 record that included a 24-6 win over top-ranked Clemson at the Allstate Sugar Bowl in New Orleans, La., followed by an overtime victory against No. 3 Georgia in the College Football Playoff National Championship Game in Atlanta, Ga.
- The Crimson Tide finished the season ranked atop both the Associated Press and USA Today Coaches polls, closing out the 2017 campaign as the nation's No. 1 team.
- Alabama was the No. 4 seed in the College Football Playoff standings and became the only team to make each of the first four postseasons under the CFP system.
- The Tide posted a 7-1 mark in SEC West competition and was the West co-champion.
- UA was 5-1 against Associated Press Top-25 opponents.
- Alabama reached the 13-win plateau for a third consecutive season, becoming the first team in college football to achieve the distinction since the 19th century (Penn, 1895-97).
- Minkah Fitzpatrick was honored with the Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's top defensive back and the Chuck Bednarik Award as college football's top defender. Fitzpatrick became the second player in UA history - and the first Antonio Langham in 1993 - to win the Thorpe. He also helped UA secure the Bednarik for a second straight season after Jonathan Allen won the award in 2016. The junior defensive back became the third player in the history of the awards to win both in the same season, joining Patrick Peterson and Charles Woodson.

HEAD COACH NICK SABAN

Alabama head coach Nick Saban (Kent State, 1973) completed his 11th season with the Crimson Tide in 2017. Named the school's 27th head coach on Jan. 3, 2007, Saban has compiled a 127-20 (.864) record (132-20, .868 before five vacated wins in 2007) at Alabama while leading the Tide to eight SEC Western Division championships, five conference titles and five national championships. He is the only coach to have won back-to-back BCS national championships and has won six national titles in his last 12 years as a collegiate head coach. Saban is one of three college coaches in the poll era (since 1936) to win three national championships in four years, joining Frank Leahy of Notre Dame (1946-47, 1949) and Tom Osborne of Nebraska (1994-95, 1997). He also joins Paul "Bear" Bryant as the only two coaches in college football history to win six national titles. Saban holds a career record of 218-62-1 (.778) as a collegiate head coach, earlier serving at Toledo, Michigan State and LSU. He won his first national championship as a head coach at LSU in 2003. Saban has coached eight conference championship teams (1990 Mid-American, plus SEC titles in 2001, 2003, 2009, 2012, 2014, 2015 and 2016) and 19 of his 22 teams have played in postseason bowl games with the Tide appearing in a bowl game all 11 years under Saban, including 10 BCS/New Year's Six Bowl/College Football Playoff games. Saban was also the first head coach to win BCS national championships at two different schools and is the only coach in SEC history to win multiple conference titles at more than one school.

SEVEN ALL-AMERICANS

Alabama had seven players earn All-America accolades in 2017, highlighted by junior defensive back Minkah Fitzpatrick, who became the program's 17th unanimous All-American. Joining Fitzpatrick as a first-teamer was senior linebacker Rashaan Evans (AFCA). Collecting second-team accolades were seniors center Bradley Bozeman (Walter Camp, FWAA, AP, The Sporting News, AFCA, Sports Illustrated) and punter JK Scott (AFCA), along with defensive back Ronnie Harrison (Sports Illustrated) and defensive tackle Da'Ron Payne (AFCA). Adding to the Tide totals was sophomore offensive tackle Jonah Williams, who earned second- (AFCA) and third-team (AP) All-America recognition.

13-WIN THREEPEAT

With its 13-1 record in 2017, Alabama became the first program in the last 120 years to win 13 or more games in three consecutive seasons. The last team to accomplish the feat was Penn, which won 14 games in 1895 and 1896 and 15 games in 1897. The Tide finished 14-1 in 2015 and 2016, winning the national championship in 2015 and finishing runner-up in 2016. The 13 wins also marked the sixth time Alabama reached that win total (1992, 2009, 2012, 2015, 2016, 2017), the most by any school in NCAA history.

TIDE SENIORS COLLECT NCAA RECORD 53RD WIN

Alabama's win over Georgia in the CFP National Championship Game was the 53rd for members of Alabama's senior class. The group finished their careers with a four-year record of 53-5 (.914), two national championships, three consecutive Southeastern Conference championships from 2014-16 and four College Football Playoff appearances. The 53 wins surpassed the NCAA record set by Alabama's 2016 senior class, which posted a 51-6 (.895) career mark from 2013-16.

10 STRAIGHT YEARS REACHING NO. 1

The 2017 season marked the 10th straight year Alabama has appeared at No. 1 in the Associated Press rankings. The Crimson Tide was just the second team in the era of the AP poll to appear at No. 1 for at least eight years in a row coming into the 2015 season. Alabama's streak began in 2008 and has seen the Crimson Tide finish first in the final AP poll in five of the past nine years. Alabama holds the college football record for consecutive seasons with at least one week at No. 1. Miami (Fla.) held the previous record at seven straight years from 1986-92.



TIDE AMONG LEADERS IN TRUE FRESHMAN DEBUTS

With an abundance of injuries, the Crimson Tide called on 17 first-year players to make their Alabama debuts in 2017, a total that ranked as the fourth-most in the Football Bowl Subdivision. Illinois (22), LSU (20) and Texas A&M (18) were the only schools to play more true freshmen last season.

MISSED STARTS ON DEFENSE

Injuries were a significant issue for Alabama in 2017, especially on the defensive side of the ball. The Tide had 10 starters on defense miss 47 combined starts last season, including Shaun Dion Hamilton, who was lost for the season against LSU, Hootie Jones, who suffered a season-ending injury at Auburn, and Anfernee Jennings, who was injured near the conclusion of the Allstate Sugar Bowl. A closer look shows that 41 of the 50 missed starts came from within the UA linebacking corps where Terrell Lewis and Christian Miller missed 12 starts; Hamilton missed five starts; Mack Wilson and Jennings were out for three games; and Rashaan Evans and Dylan Moses missed two starts apiece. Defensive lineman Da'Shawn Hand was absent for five starts while Jones missed two games and Minkah Fitzpatrick was absent for one game in the secondary.

FITZPATRICK CLAIMS PAIR OF DEFENSIVE AWARDS

Junior defensive back Minkah Fitzpatrick was presented with both the Chuck Bednarik and Jim Thorpe awards at the annual ESPN College Football Awards Show. The Bednarik recognizes the nation's top defensive player while the Thorpe is presented annually to college football's top defensive back. Fitzpatrick joined Michigan's Charles Woodson (1997) and LSU's Patrick Peterson (2010) as only the third player to win both awards in the same season. He is the

second player in Alabama history to win each award joining Antonio Langham (1993) for the Thorpe and Jonathan Allen (2016) as the winners of the Bednarik.

TIDE BOASTS THE NATION'S TOP DEFENSE AT YEAR'S END

The Alabama defensive unit ended the season ranked in the top 10 in every significant defensive category in the FBS. The Tide led the country in scoring defense (11.9), total defense (260.4 ypg) and rushing defense (94.7), finished second in pass efficiency defense (96.78) and ranked sixth in pass yards allowed at 165.7 ypg. **A**

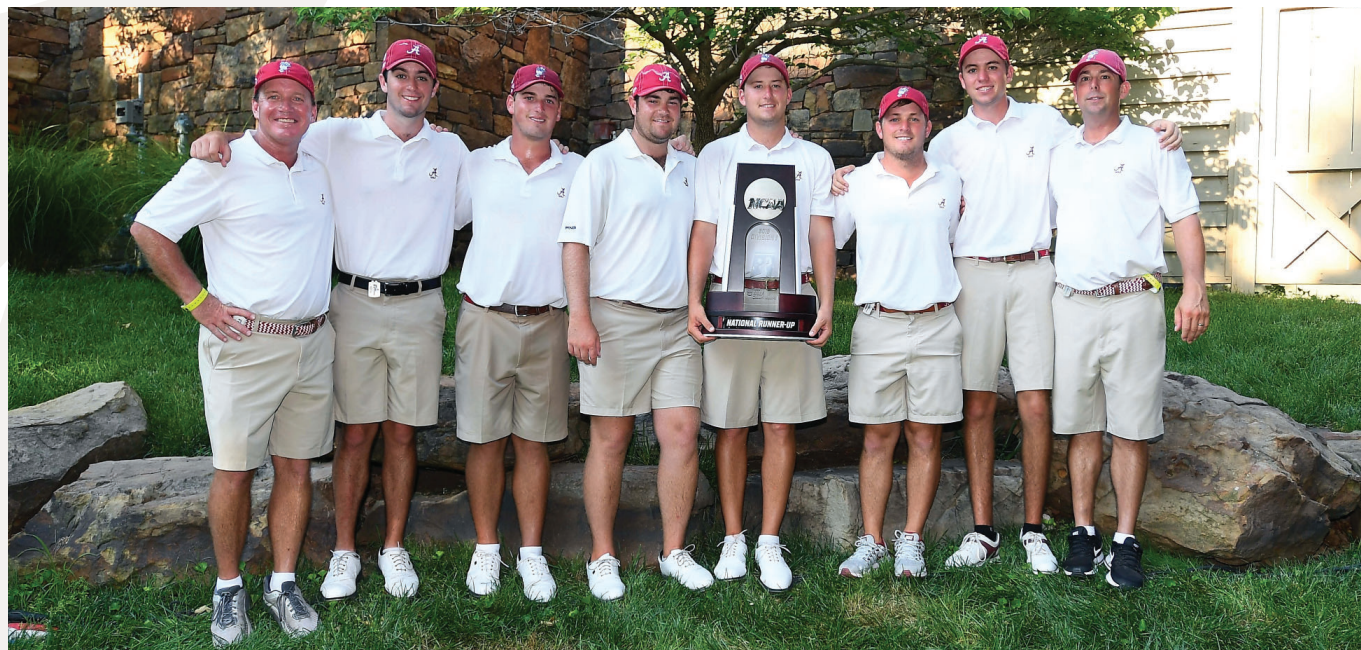

2017-18 HIGHLIGHTS

- The Alabama men's golf team finished national runners-up at the 2018 NCAA Men's Golf Championships, which was held in Stillwater, Okla., at the par 72, 7,406-yard Karsten Creek layout. The Crimson Tide defeated Texas Tech, 3-2, in the quarterfinals of match play before upending Duke, 5-0, in the semis. Alabama dropped a 5-0 decision to tournament host and top-ranked Oklahoma State in the championship match.
- Alabama's berth in the NCAA Men's Golf Championships marked its 20th appearance at nationals and the 10th showing in the last 12 years under head coach Jay Seawell. In all, the Crimson Tide has made 28 NCAA appearances (regionals and nationals combined) with 15 coming under Seawell, including a active string of 14 consecutive dating back to the 2005 season.
- Alabama made the top-eight cut at this year's NCAA Championships, earning a spot in match play for the first time since 2014. The Crimson Tide tied for sixth overall after four rounds of stroke play, closing with a four-day total of 1,168 (294-279-301-294). It was the third-lowest 72-hole score in program history.
- Lee Hodges, Davis Riley and Davis Shore were each named as SEC Golfers of the Week this season. Riley was the first recipient when he claimed medalist honors at the Olympia Fields/Illini Invitational last fall, earning SEC Golfer of the Week recognition on Sept. 17. Hodges was honored with the league's weekly award for the week of March 21 after winning medalist honors at the Linger Longer Invitational. Finally, Shore earned the conference freshman of the week on April 18 after finishing runner-up at the Mason Rudolph Championship.

TIDE MAKES 20TH NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS APPEARANCE

The Alabama men's golf team was the No. 5 seed at the 2018 NCAA Men's Golf National Championships, which marked the team's 20th appearance at Nationals and 28th NCAA showing overall in program history. Alabama made its seventh NCAA Championships appearance in the last eight years, which set a school record for national championship appearances in an eight-year stretch. The 2018 NCAA Championship teed off on May 25 and ran through May 30 at the par 72, 7,406-yard Karsten Creek course in Stillwater, Okla.

UA FINISHES NATIONAL RUNNER-UP

The fifth-ranked Alabama men's golf team finished runner-up at the 2018 NCAA Men's Golf Championships, falling to No. 1 Oklahoma State, 5-0. The Cowboys, which were playing on their home course throughout this year's championships, became the first top seed to win the national title since the inception of the match-play format in 2009. With an estimated 4,000 fans in attendance on a hot and humid day, Alabama fell in a hole early and was never able to dig out. It marked the fourth time in the last seven years the Crimson Tide was in the NCAA title match – the most of any team since the current format came into play. Alabama claimed the national championship in 2013 and 2014, and has now finished runner-up in 2012 and 2018.

HODGES, DAVIS EARN ALL-AMERICA/ALL-REGION HONORS

Senior Lee Hodges and junior Davis Riley were selected as third-team All-Americans and also named to the PING All-Region team by the GCAA. It marks the ninth time in the last 11 seasons that the Crimson Tide has boasted multiple All-America honorees. Riley earned the recognition for the second time in his career after garnering honorable mention All-America honors in 2016. Meanwhile, Hodges claims the honor for the first time in his four-year career. The duo's all-region accolades marks the second consecutive year they received All-Southeast Region honors and the eighth straight season the Crimson Tide has had multiple representatives earn the recognition. Riley earned the accolade for the third straight year after garnering all-region honors in 2016 and 2017. In doing so, the Hattiesburg, Miss., native becomes just the fifth player in program history to achieve that feat. Together, the duo led the Crimson Tide throughout the season. Hodges and Riley rank as the team's top two golfers in stroke average, average vs. par and top-20 finishes. Golfweek ranked both among the top-25 golfers in the nation, as Hodges was No. 19 and Riley is No. 22 following play at the championships.

DUO NAMED TO FIRST TEAM ALL-SEC

Alabama senior Lee Hodges and junior Davis Riley were named to the Southeastern Conference Men's Golf First Team. In addition, sophomore Alex Green was selected to the SEC Community Service Team, marking the second consecutive year he has earned that recognition. Hodges and Riley became the first Alabama teammates voted to the league's first team since 2014 when four Crimson Tide golfers earned the recognition. Hodges, who earned his first All-SEC accolade since joining the team prior to the 2016-17 season, led the Crimson Tide throughout the season. The Ardmore, Tenn., native claimed two medalist honors (Puerto Rico Classic and Linger Longer Invitational), and finished with six top-10 finishes and eight top-20 results in the Tide's 11 tournaments on the year. Hodges finished ranked No. 19 in the nation and topped the squad in stroke average (71.14), average vs. par (-0.22) and victories. Meanwhile, Riley had an equally impressive season as he ended the year ranked No. 22 in the nation according to the Golfweek/Sagarin rankings. The Hattiesburg, Miss., native led the team in rounds of par or lower (23) and top-five finishes (4), and ranked just behind Hodges in both stroke average (71.22) and average vs. par (-0.14).

ADDING TO THE TROPHY CASE

Alabama won four team tournament titles in 2017-18, tied for sixth-most in a season in the program record books. The Tide claimed team victories in the Carpet Capital Collegiate (Sept. 8-10), the Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate (Oct. 9-10), the Steelwood Collegiate (Oct. 28-29) and the Linger Longer Invitational (March 18-20). In the Tide's 11 tournaments, UA finished out of the top six only once. In all, Alabama claimed four victories, six top-two finishes and nine top-five results, all while playing one of the toughest schedules in the nation. UA finished with a 37-23-5 record against teams ranked in the top-25 and 71-28-5 against top-50 opponents on the year. UA was 39-0 against teams ranked outside the top 50.

TIDE FINISHES RUNNER-UP AT SEC CHAMPIONSHIPS

Alabama dropped a heartbreaker on the final hole of the 2018 Southeastern Conference Men's Golf championship match, falling to Auburn, 3-2, at the Sea Island Golf Club on the par 70, 7,005-yard Seaside Course layout. The teams were tied at two points apiece with the final pairing all square after senior Jonathan Hardee birdied the par 3 17th hole to even the score against Wells Padgett. However, Padgett rolled in a 20-foot birdie putt on the 18th to clinch the championship. Alabama advanced to Sunday's championship after it captured a 3-2-0 win over fourth-ranked Vanderbilt in quarterfinal play and followed that with a 3-1-1 win over seventh-ranked Florida in the semis. UA reached match play after finishing tied for fourth overall after 54 holes of stroke play with a team total of 8-over par 848 (283-280-285). *A*

2017-18 HIGHLIGHTS

- Alabama finished second at the 2018 NCAA Women's Golf Championships in Stillwater, Okla. The Crimson Tide advanced to match play at the national championships for the first time since the format was introduced in 2015 and defeated Kent State, 4-1, and USC, 3-1-1, before falling, 3-2, to Arizona in the championship match.
- Alabama won the NCAA Tallahassee Regional with an eight shot victory over host Florida State, May 7-9. The Crimson Tide finished 33-under par (282-276-273/831) to set a school record for low score and low score vs. par in regional play. Alabama's 15-under par third round was also a UA regional record.
- Alabama head coach Mic Potter won his second WGCA Coach of the Year award in 2018 after leading the Tide to a No. 2 national finish. Alabama also set school records for scoring average (283.55) and score vs. par (-3.36) in 2017-18.
- Junior Lauren Stephenson became Alabama's first Golfstat Cup recipient, which is presented annually to the nation's leading scorer. The Lexington, S.C., native set a school record with a season scoring average of 69.76 to win the award.
- Kristen Gillman, Cheyenne Knight and Lauren Stephenson earned first team All-America honors, marking just the second time in Alabama history that the Tide has boasted a trio of All-Americans on the same team (2012).
- Alabama joined USC as one of only two teams to have qualified for the NCAA Championships each of the past 13 years. The Tide has posted 11 consecutive top-15 finishes at the NCAA Championships, including the 2012 NCAA title and this year's runner-up finish.

ALABAMA FINISHES SECOND AT NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

In a match that required a 19th hole for the final pairing, Alabama fell, 3-2, in a hard-fought championship match to the Arizona Wildcats at the 2018 NCAA Women's Golf Championships in Stillwater, Okla. With the team score tied 2-2, senior Lakareber Abe birdied the 18th hole to force a playoff with Arizona's Haley Moore before Moore converted a birdie putt of her own on the first playoff hole to clinch the match for the Wildcats. The match play championship appearance at the par-72, 6,328-yard Karsten Creek Golf Club was the first for Alabama since the NCAA adopted the format in 2015.

MIC POTTER NAMED WGCA COACH OF THE YEAR

Mic Potter was named the National Coach of the Year by the Women's Golf Coaches Association (WGCA) in 2017-18. The honor is the second for Potter, who was previously recognized after the Tide's national championship season in 2012. Potter, who completed his 13th season as the Crimson Tide's head coach in 2017-18, led Alabama to a runner-up finish at the 2018 NCAA Championships. The NCAA trip was the 13th in a row for UA during his tenure and the finish was the 10th straight in the top 15 at the national championships. The Tide also set school records for scoring average (283.55) and score vs. par (-3.36) this season.

STEPHENSON WINS GOLFSTAT CUP

Alabama's Lauren Stephenson became the first Tide golfer to win the Golfstat Cup in 2017-18. The Golfstat Cup is presented to



the collegiate golfer who posts the best scoring average in relation to par each season. Stephenson finished the season with a 69.76 scoring average to set a new Alabama school record. She recorded 19 rounds in the 60s and 26 rounds of par or better in 33 rounds played in 2017-18, both of which led the team. The Lexington, S.C., native earned individual medalist honors at the Mason Rudolph Championship and the Liz Murphey Collegiate Classic during the regular season and posted eight top-three finishes and 11 top-10 finishes in 11 tournaments to lead the Tide in both categories.



ALABAMA TIES FOR THIRD AT SEC CHAMPIONSHIPS

Alabama tied for third at the SEC Championships after a 1-1 record in the match play portion of the tournament. The Tide opened match play with a 3-2 win over seventh seed Vanderbilt. Kristen Gillman, Lauren Stephenson and Angelica Moresco posted wins for UA to set up a semifinal match with Arkansas. Moresco posted Alabama's lone semifinal win as the Razorbacks advanced to the championship match with a 3-1-1 victory.



KNIGHT, GILLMAN AND STEPHENSON NAMED ALL-AMERICA

Sophomore Kristen Gillman and juniors Cheyenne Knight and Lauren Stephenson were named First Team All-Americans by the Women's Golf Coaches Association and Golfweek in 2017-18. Knight and Gillman were first-team selections by both groups. The honors gave Alabama a trio of First Team All-Americans in the same season for just the second time in school history (2011-12). Eight Alabama players have earned First Team All-America honors 24 times in school history. *A*

ALABAMA ADVANCES NCAAS FOR 13TH STRAIGHT YEAR

The Alabama women's golf team under head coach Mic Potter's direction has qualified for 13 consecutive NCAA Championships, joining USC as the only teams to qualify in each of the last 13 seasons. The longest consecutive streak of NCAA appearances is 23 years by Arizona State (1991-2014) and Miami (Fla.) (1970-92).

ALABAMA WINS TALLAHASSEE REGIONAL

Alabama turned in a 15-under par final round to win the 2018 NCAA Tallahassee Regional and clinch the program's 14th NCAA Championship appearance and 13th consecutive trip under head coach Mic Potter. The Crimson Tide (282-276-273/831) finished 33-under par at the par-72, 6,342-yard Don Veller Seminole Golf Course and Club to set a new school regional record and equal the previous course record. In addition to the 54-hole record regional score, Alabama's -15 final round is also its single round regional low and low score vs. par.

2018 HIGHLIGHTS

- The Crimson Tide is one of just two schools in collegiate gymnastics history to finish in the top nine nationally every year since 1983.
- The 2018 NCAA Gymnastics Championships marked the 26th and final year of the Super Six format. Alabama finished with the most Super Six Team Finals appearances in history with 23. The Tide also advanced in nine of the format's last 10 years, tying with Florida for the most over that span.
- Alabama won the 2018 NCAA Tuscaloosa Regional, marking the 36th consecutive year Alabama has finished in the top two at an NCAA Regional, winning its NCAA-best 32nd regional title.
- Seniors Nickie Guerrero and Kiana Winston combined to earn three All-America honors in 2018.
- Lexi Graber was the only freshman in the nation to win a regional all-around crown in 2018. She also won the vault while Kiana Winston won the balance beam in her last routine ever in Coleman Coliseum.
- After finishing second in 2018, Alabama is also the only team to finish in the top-three each of the last 20 SEC championships.
- In the 38-year history of the Southeastern Conference Gymnastics Championships, Alabama is the only program to never finish outside the top four.
- Junior Ari Guerra won the SEC floor exercise championship. Guerra and seniors Nickie Guerrero and Kiana Winston earned All-SEC honors. Lexi Graber earned SEC All-Freshman honors.
- Alabama gymnastics earned the NCAA Public Recognition Award for the fourth year in a row in 2018.

ALABAMA AT THE NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

The gymnastics team made its 36th consecutive appearance at the NCAA Championships in 2017, taking eighth place. Only Utah, with 37 bids, has been to more and only Florida has been to as many, though the Gators' total is not consecutive. The Tide is one of only six teams to win an NCAA title, earning national championships in 1988, 1991, 1996, 2002, 2011 and 2012. In 36 championship appearances, Alabama has finished first six times, second seven times, third 10 times, in the top six 33 times and has never finished outside the top 10.

CRIMSON TIDE WINS NCAA-RECORD 32ND REGIONAL TITLE

Alabama won its NCAA-best 32nd regional championship to advance to the NCAA Championships for the 36th year in a row in front of a boisterous Tuscaloosa crowd in April. The Crimson Tide finished nearly a three-quarters of a point ahead of second-place Georgia (196.500). Freshman Lexi Graber earned a career-best 39.575 to win the all-around. She also took first off the vault with a career-best 9.950. Senior Kiana Winston won the balance beam in the last Coleman Coliseum routine of her illustrious career. In addition to winning the meet, Alabama posted the highest team score in all four events.

WINSTON EARNS PAUL W. BRYANT AWARD

Senior Kiana Winston, an 11-time All-American and four-year Scholastic All-American who graduated in December 2017 with a psychology degree, was the female winner of the 2018 Paul W. Bryant Student-Athlete Award created by the Tuscaloosa County

Chapter of The University of Alabama Alumni Association in 1985 to honor the UA Athletics Department's top student-athlete.

2018 ALL-AMERICANS

Seniors Nickie Guerrero and Kiana Winston both received National Association of Collegiate Gymnastics Coaches/Women (NACGC/W) Regular Season All-America honors in 2018. Guerrero earned first-team honors on the balance beam and second team on the vault, while Winston took second team on the uneven bars. Winston leads the Crimson Tide in the six-year history of the award in both career first-team and combined first- and second-team honors. She finished her career with four first-team accolades and six combined first- and second-team accolades. Guerrero garnered three combined honors for her career. In all, eight Alabama gymnasts have earned 29 regular season All-America honors since the award's inception in 2013. NACGC/W Regular Season All-America honors are based on the final regional qualifying scores of the season with those ranked in the top eight (including ties) on each event and in the all-around earning first team and those ranked in the next eight (including ties) being named second team.

COSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA

Mackenzie Brannan earned a place on the CoSIDA Academic All-America At-Large First Team in 2018. It was the Austin, Texas, native's third consecutive Academic All-America accolade, making her one of three UA gymnasts to earn the prestigious honor three times in a career. The at-large team spans the sports of fencing, golf, gymnastics, ice hockey, lacrosse, rifle, skiing, swimming and diving, tennis, water polo, bowling, field hockey and rowing. Brannan, a four-time All-American, won a pair of NCAA regional titles while pursuing a psychology degree. She graduated in May of 2018 with a perfect 4.0 grade point average. At least one Crimson Tide gymnast has garnered a place on the women's at-large team in 10 of the last 11 years and Alabama gymnasts have earned Academic All-America honors 23 times since 1987. Overall, Alabama placed seven student-athletes on the men's and women's at-large teams in 2018, giving the Crimson Tide the best single-year total in the award's history. Over the last five years, the Tide's men and women have earned at-large honors an NCAA-best 28 times with the next closest school tallying 16 honors.

MORE ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Crimson Tide gymnasts were honored as the Alabama Athletics team with the top team grade point average (3.79) at the 2018 Crimson Choice Awards. Overall, six of the Crimson Tide's 15

gymnasts earned a 4.0 GPA in the fall with four posting a 4.0 in the spring. Three gymnasts recorded a 4.0 for the 2017-18 academic year. A total of 14 gymnasts carried a 3.5 or better career grade point average at the end of the 2018 season, including 11 that posted better than a 3.7 GPA and four that earned better than a 3.9. Senior Mackenzie Brannan received her third CoSIDA Academic All-America honor as well as Southeastern Conference and NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships. Alabama now has 21 NCAA and 12 SEC Postgraduate Scholarships, giving the Tide the most of any gymnastics program in both categories.

PACKING THEM IN

Alabama gymnastics averaged over 10,000 fans per meet for the 15th year in a row in 2018 and the 16th time overall, averaging 11,013. It also marked the 12th time in program history that the Crimson Tide has averaged over 11,000 fans per meet. The Tide's 2018 average puts them in rare company. Alabama, LSU and Utah gymnastics and South Carolina basketball were the only collegiate women's programs to average more than 11,000 fans per home contest in 2017-18. In addition to being the only four to average over 11,000 fans, Alabama, LSU, Utah and South Carolina along with Georgia gymnastics and UConn basketball were the only collegiate women's programs to average more than 10,000 fans per contest at home in 2017-18. Alabama has drawn crowds of 10,000-plus 78 times since first breaking the 10,000 barrier on March 4, 1995, when 12,021 fans flooded Coleman Coliseum for a meet against Georgia.

2017-18 HIGHLIGHTS

- Alabama finished fifth at the Big 12 Championship. All five championship crews competed in Grand Final events, tying a program-best mark of three boats each taking home bronze medals in their races.
- Alabama received top-20 votes for the first time in program history.
- Alabama's 11 Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association Scholar-Athletes was tied for most in the conference and third-most nationally, marking the fourth straight season that Alabama has placed at least 10 student-athletes on the list.
- Alabama received five top-20 US Rowing/CRCA Coaches Poll votes for first time in program history.
- Alabama senior Nicole Lane was named Big 12 Rowing Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

ROWING EARNS THREE MEDALS, FINISHES FIFTH AT 2018 BIG 12 CHAMPIONSHIP

With all five crews competing in Grand Final races on day two of the 2018 Big 12 Championships, Alabama earned a trio of event bronze medals and posted a fifth-place finish at the conference championships. After medaling in three events last season, the Tide equaled that performance this year by grabbing third in the Third Varsity 8+, Second Varsity 4+ and First Varsity 4+. Those showings helped propel Alabama to a fifth-place finish with 23 team points. Senior Nicole Lane, a member of the Tide's conference 1V8+ crew, earned All-Big 12 honors.

ALABAMA EARNS 11 CRCA SCHOLAR-ATHLETE HONORS

Alabama rowing placed 11 student-athletes on the 2018 Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association (CRCA) Scholar-Athlete list, tied for the most in the conference and third-most nationally. The 11 award winners on this year's list marks the fourth straight season in which the Crimson Tide has posted 10 or more student-athletes on the list and fifth time overall. To qualify as a CRCA Scholar-Athlete, a student-athlete with a 3.5 cumulative career GPA must be in at least their sophomore year of eligibility and have rowed in a minimum of 75 percent of the team's 2017-18 season or in the school's regional conference event. Alabama's honorees included Charlotte Adkins, Tayla Cabana, Makena Clark, Raien Emery, Danielle Kem, Nicole Lane, Anne Lehmann, Monica McGraw, Emily Navin, Rachel Sowell and Lindsey Taylor.

LANE NAMED BIG 12 ROWING SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF YEAR

Senior Nicole Lane was named the 2018 Big 12 Rowing Scholar-Athlete of the Year. The food and nutrition major carried a 4.0 cumulative grade point average. It was the first such honor in Alabama rowing history.

ALABAMA RECEIVES TOP-20 VOTES FOR FIRST TIME IN PROGRAM HISTORY

For the first time in program history, the Crimson Tide received five top-20 votes in the US Rowing/CRCA Coaches Poll on May 2. No. 3 Texas, Alabama and Oklahoma were the only Big 12 teams to either be ranked or receive votes for that week's rankings.

CRIMSON TIDE PUTS LEAGUE-BEST 35 ON ACADEMIC ALL-BIG 12 LIST

Off the water, Alabama continued its dominance with a league-leading 35 student-athletes finding a spot on the Academic All-Big 12 list, including 33 first-team honorees. That number is a bump from last year's total of 30. Twelve of the 175 rowing honorees between the league's eight affiliate schools posted perfect 4.0 GPAs and, for the third straight year, Alabama led the way with five of those 12 perfect GPAs. The second team consisted of student-athletes with a GPA between 3.00-3.19, while the first team award winners held GPAs of 3.20-plus. To qualify, student-athletes must

maintain a 3.00 GPA or higher, either cumulative or the two previous semesters, and must have participated in 20 percent of their team's scheduled contests. Senior student-athletes who have participated for a minimum of two years and meet all the criteria except percent-of-participation are also eligible.

LONG-TIME CRIMSON TIDE MENTOR RETIRES FOLLOWING 2017-18 SEASON

At the end of the 2017-18 season, Larry Davis announced his retirement as head coach Davis spent 12 seasons at the helm of the Crimson Tide after being named the program's inaugural coach in 2006. Under Davis' direction, Alabama rowing made enormous strides, beginning with the transition from club team to NCAA Division I competitor. In the program's first year, the Tide earned a number of top-5 finishes and dual-meet victories against established programs. Since then, the Tide has earned numerous medals at races such as the Head of the Charles Regatta, the Knecht Cup Regatta, the San Diego Crew Classic, the Head of the Hooch and at conference championships. In the fall of 2017, Alabama's women's club 4+ won gold by setting a course record at the Head of the Charles in Boston. The season concluded with a fifth-place finish at the 2018 Big 12 Championships after competing in all five grand final races, earning a trio of bronze medals. *A*

2017 HIGHLIGHTS

- Alabama ended the 2017 campaign with an overall 12-8-1 record, including a 4-5-1 mark in Southeastern Conference play. The Tide finished the season in seventh place in the SEC standings and made its third NCAA Tournament appearance in program history.
- After an outstanding regular season, senior Celia Jimenez Delgado and juniors Emma Welch and Abbie Boswell earned All-SEC honors. Jimenez Delgado was named to the first team while Welch and Boswell were tabbed to the second team.
- Celia Jimenez Delgado and Emma Welch earned United Soccer Coaches NCAA Division I Women's All-Southeast Region honors. Jimenez Delgado was named to the second team while Welch landed on the third team.
- Welch was named to the 2017 CoSIDA Academic All-America Women's Soccer Third Team, the first Academic All-America honor for the program since Merel van Dongen (first team) and Laura Lee Smith (second team) in 2014. Welch earned her first CoSIDA academic accolade thanks to a 4.0 grade point average in the Accelerated Master's Program at the Capstone.

SOCCER LANDS THREE ON ALL-SEC LIST

Senior Celia Jimenez Delgado and juniors Emma Welch and Abbie Boswell earned All-SEC honors for the 2017 season. Jimenez Delgado was named to the first team while Welch and Boswell were tabbed to the second team. Jimenez Delgado snagged First Team All-SEC honors for the first time in her career after serving as the team captain. Moving to defender in the latter half of the season, she played in 18 contests, making 16 starts on the year.

Jimenez Delgado knocked in two goals and assisted on six scores while accumulating a total of 10 points. Welch earned second team All-SEC honors, the first conference honor of her career, after an amazing season in the midfield. The quick-footed junior tallied two goals, delivered seven assists and totaled 11 points after 1,465 minutes of action on the pitch. Welch ended the regular season ranked fourth in the conference in assists and 38th in the country in that same category. Boswell also earned her first conference honor of her career after an amazing campaign at striker. After transferring from Ball State, the Illinois native emerged as the team's top goal scorer for two straight years. Boswell notched a season-high eight goals and tallied a pair of goals in three games in 2017 against Troy (Sept. 3), Auburn (Oct. 10) and Missouri (Oct. 22). In conference play, Boswell ranked amongst the top players in seven offensive categories including tying for fourth in goals and game-winning goals.

THE TIDE EARNS THIRD NCAA BID IN PROGRAM HISTORY

For the third time in program history, the Alabama women's soccer team competed in the NCAA Soccer Tournament. The Crimson Tide earned a bid to the NCAA Tournament after posting a 12-7-1 overall record and registering a 4-5-1 record in Southeastern Conference play. Alabama's 12 wins are the most victories recorded by the Tide in a single season since 2002.

DOMINANT NON-CONFERENCE PERFORMANCE

Alabama wrapped up its 2017 non-conference slate at 8-1, the best non-conference performance since 2002 when the Tide went 9-1.

Alabama outscored its opponents 20-8, outshot its non-conference foes 169-78 and put 76 shots on frame to its opponents' 35. Goalkeeper Kat Stratton and the defense silenced four teams and allowed only seven total goals, holding its opponents to 0.89 goals per game.

BEST WIN IN PROGRAM HISTORY

For the first time in program history, the Alabama soccer team upset a top-10 opponent by shutting out No. 6/4 Florida State, 1-0, in Tuscaloosa on Aug. 27. Freshman Taylor Morgan sent in the second-half dagger to pick up the Tide's first victory over Florida State in the series between the two programs and the second win for the Tide over an ACC opponent in school history. It was also the first top-10 victory of the Wes Hart era and the first win over his former school after serving as a Florida State assistant coach before joining the Tide.

CELIA JIMENEZ DELGADO GOES PRO

Senior Celia Jimenez Delgado was selected by the Seattle Reign FC in the fourth round as the 36th overall pick of the 2018 National Women's Soccer

League (NWSL) Draft on Jan. 18, 2018. Jimenez Delgado was one of four players selected from the Southeastern Conference and is the first player in Crimson Tide history to be drafted into the national league.

FRESHMEN TAKE THE LEAD

Freshmen made a huge impact on the Crimson Tide in 2017, scoring ten of Alabama's 32 goals with eight freshmen earning at least one start. Taylor Morgan was third on the team in goals (3) and ranked second in shots (41), while Casey Wertz finished second in goals (4), second in shots on goal (22) and boasted the best shots on goal percentage after 21 games (.579). Despite missing six games due to injury, Brynn Martin played a crucial role in the Tide's back corps, by helping Alabama blank six of its opponents and keep its foes to 1.33 goals per game. At the midway point of the season, Martin was recognized as one of the top 100 freshmen to watch according to TopDrawerSoccer.com as the site ranked her at No. 49. *A*

2018 HIGHLIGHTS

- Alabama made its 20th straight NCAA Tournament appearance and its 14th straight Super Regional appearance. The Crimson Tide is one of just eight teams in the nation with an NCAA Tournament appearance streak of at least 20 years and is the only team to appear in all 14 Super Regional rounds since its introduction in 2005.
- The Crimson Tide swept its three NCAA Regional opponents in 2018, stretching its regional-win streak to 37 straight games, an NCAA-best.
- The Tide finished the 2018 season ranked No. 14 in the ESPN.com/USA Softball poll and USA Today/NFCA poll. Alabama has finished with a top-15 ranking every year since 2003.
- Freshman outfielder Kaylee Tow earned Second Team NFCA All-America recognition, becoming the 11th Tide freshman to do so. It is the 54th All-America accolade in program history, giving the Tide at least one award-winner every year since 1998.
- Tow earned First Team All-SEC and SEC All-Freshman honors while senior Alexis Osorio and sophomores Elissa Brown and Bailey Hemphill were named Second Team All-SEC.
- Hemphill earned Second Team CoSIDA Academic All-America honors, giving Alabama at least one award-winner every year since 2008.

TIDE STRETCHES REGIONAL WIN STREAK, PLAYS IN 14TH CONSECUTIVE SUPER REGIONAL ROUND

Alabama earned a No. 12 national seed for the 2018 NCAA Tournament, stretching its postseason appearance streak to 20 consecutive years. It is the longest such streak for any SEC team

and only eight other Division I teams have an active streak of at least 20 seasons. Serving as a regional host for the 14th straight season, Alabama swept its three games against Middle Tennessee, Wisconsin and Oregon State to claim a 16th regional title and secure a spot in the NCAA Seattle Super Regional against fifth-seeded Washington. Alabama is the only team in the country to play in every Super Regional round since its introduction in 2005. In Seattle, the Tide dropped an extra-innings heartbreaker in game one, 3-2, before falling in game two, 6-0.

KAYLEE TOW NAMED NFCA ALL-AMERICAN

Freshman Kaylee Tow earned NFCA Second Team All-America accolades in 2018, becoming the 11th Tide freshman to do so and the first since Alexis Osorio and Demi Turner in 2015. It is the 54th All-America award in program history, giving the Crimson Tide at least one All-American every year since 1998. Tow started 55 of the team's 56 games in 2018, leading the squad with 35 runs and 49 hits in 150 at-bats, good for a .327 batting average. She was second on the team with seven doubles, 11 home runs, 31 RBI and 35 walks. Her 11 home runs are the fourth-highest total by a Tide freshman.

BAILEY HEMPHILL EARNS COSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA

Sophomore Bailey Hemphill earned CoSIDA Second Team Academic All-America distinction, the first award of Hemphill's career and the 24th in program history. Alabama has had at least one CoSIDA Academic All-American every year since 2008. The Lafayette, La., native is a human development major with a 4.0 grade point average and is a Dean's List and three-time President's

List honoree. She led the team with 13 home runs, 48 RBIs and 40 walks, hitting 41-for-123 (.333) with 26 runs scored in 2018. She had 13 games with multiple RBIs, the most on the team, and was top-10 in the SEC in slugging percentage, walks, on-base percentage and home runs.

ALEXIS OSORIO SETS NCAA STRIKEOUT RECORD, CONCLUDES CAREER AT TOP OF TIDE RECORD BOOKS

Senior Alexis Osorio concluded her Crimson Tide career as one of the program's all-time leaders in numerous categories. Opponents batted .162 against the Riverside, Calif., native over her four-year career, the lowest mark of any Tide pitcher. She averaged 9.95 strikeouts-per-game, also a program best. Her 1,063 career strikeouts ranks third in UA history, making her just the fourth Alabama pitcher to throw 1,000 career strikeouts. Twenty-one of those strikeouts came on March 10, 2018, as Osorio tied an NCAA record for strikeouts in a seven-inning game, a feat which had only previously occurred once. The record performance came one day after she threw her seventh career no-hitter, trailing only Kelsi Dunne (2008-11) for the most in program history.

TIDE PLACES FOUR ON POSTSEASON ALL-SEC TEAMS

Four Alabama softball standouts were among those voted to the 2018 Southeastern Conference postseason awards list. Freshman Kaylee Tow earned First Team All-SEC recognition and a spot on the SEC All-Freshman team, while senior Alexis Osorio and sophomores Elissa Brown and Bailey Hemphill made the All-SEC second team. The four honorees are the most for the Crimson Tide since 2015 and brings the program's total to 97 in its 22-year history. Alabama has had at least one player selected to the league's postseason team every year since its inaugural 1997 season.

ALABAMA LEADS NATION IN ATTENDANCE

A crowd of 3,000-plus fans took in the regular season finale at Rhoads Stadium on Sunday, May 6 vs. Texas A&M, giving the Tide a season-average attendance of 3,043. This marks a new NCAA record, breaking Alabama's previous best mark of 3,033 set in 2016. Nine of the 12 conference games at Rhoads Stadium in 2018 saw crowds above 3,000, including an NCAA-best 3,940 in game one of the Tennessee series. *A*

2017-18 HIGHLIGHTS

- A total of 13 men and women combined for 33 All-America honors in 2018.
- Since the arrival of Dennis Pursley and his staff prior to the 2013 season, a total of 29 Alabama men and women have earned 140 All-America accolades.
- The Crimson Tide continued its assault on the school record board in 2017-18, breaking seven UA marks, including three individual and four relays records.
- With a 13th-place finish in 2018, a sixth-place finish in 2016, 10th place finishes in 2015 and 2017 as well as 12th place finish in 2014, Alabama's men have posted five consecutive NCAA top-15 finishes for the first time since earning 12 in a row between 1975-86.
- After finishing 30th in 2018, Alabama's women have now posted three top-30 finishes in the past four years, the most since the Tide earned six top-30 finishes between 2000-05.
- Christopher Reid posted the Tide's best SEC finish when he won his second consecutive 200 backstroke title in 2018.
- The Crimson Tide men's 200 freestyle relay came away with an SEC title when Laurent Bams, Robert Howard, Zane Waddell and Braxton Young turned in a 1:16.38 for the win.
- In addition to winning an SEC relay title, the Crimson Tide men also went undefeated in relay competition during the regular season, including both dual meets and invitationals.
- Bailey Scott earned her second consecutive trip to the podium in the 50 freestyle at the SEC Championships, taking third place. The 200 freestyle relay squad of Flora Molnar, Temarie Tomley, Lindsey Morrow and Scott also earned a bronze medal at the SEC Championships.

ALL-AMERICANS

Seven UA women earned All-America honors in 2018, the most since 2001 when Alabama also had seven swimmers take home the honor. The last time Alabama had more in a single season came in 1996, when nine UA swimmers and divers received All-America accolades. Bailey Scott earned All-America three times, bumping her career total to four. Flora Molnar earned three All-America accolades in her rookie season while Justine Macfarlane and Temarie Tomley took two each and Lindsay Morrow, Katie Kelsoe and Leonie Kullmann all earned one apiece. The women's 200 and 400 freestyle relays and 200 medley relay all posted All-America finishes, marking the first time since 2001 that UA's women has had three or more relays earn that distinction in a single season. On the men's side of the slate, six swimmers earned All-America in 2018. Robert Howard led the way with six All-America accolades, bumping his career total to nine. Zane Waddell tallied five All-America honors, boosting his two-year total to 10. Laurent Bams took four honors and now has 10 heading into his senior year. Christopher Reid earned three and Luke Kaliszak had two All-America accolades in their final season, totaling seven and 12, respectively, for their careers. Braxton Young also earned All-America recognition in his first trip to the NCAA championships.

ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

For the second year in a row, an extraordinary four Alabama swimmers - Laurent Bams, Robert Howard, Luke Kaliszak and Temarie Tomley - earned a place on the CoSIDA Academic All-America At-Large team. It was the second Academic All-America nod for Kaliszak and the first for Bams, Howard and Tomley.

Swimming and diving led Alabama to an NCAA-best 11 Academic All-Americans overall in 2017-18, making UA the only school to earn double-digit honors the last five years in a row. The four Tide swimmers were also part of a record seven UA student-athletes named to the at-large team. The previous record for combined honors was six by Alabama (2017 and 2014) and the U.S. Naval Academy (2016). Alabama's 2018 total was three better than the second-ranked school, Stanford. The Alabama men's swimming and diving program has been particularly prolific over the past four years, with six swimmers earning 12 honors. That total is nearly double what any other school has put on the at-large team over that span for all sports combined. The CoSIDA Academic All-America program includes men's and women's soccer, basketball and track and field/cross country along with football, women's volleyball, baseball and softball as well as the men's and women's at-large teams, which includes 14 women's and 12 men's sports. The Tide swimming and diving program has now earned 23 Academic All-America honors since 2005.

EVEN MORE RECORD SMASHING

For the fifth year in a row, Alabama continued to rewrite its record book, bettering seven school marks, including four relays and three individual standards. Both the men and the women closed out their seasons by bettering the school 400 freestyle relay record at the NCAA Championships. The quartet of Bailey Scott, Temarie Tomley, Leonie Kullmann and Flora Molnar clocked a time of 3:14.37 to shave more than half a second off the previous school

mark, set in prelims on the national championships. Scott, in the final race of a storied career, bettered her own school mark in the 100 freestyle to lead off the relay, posting a 48.38, lowering the school mark for the second time in 2018. The men's 400 freestyle relay of Zane Waddell, Robert Howard, Christopher Reid and Laurent Bams raced to a 2:48.76 in prelims, bettering the school record set in 2017 before taking seventh place in finals. The women also lowered their 200 medley relay (Katie Kelsoe, Justine Macfarlane, Molnar and Scott/1:36.81) and 200 freestyle relay (Molnar, Tomley, Lindsay Morrow and Scott/1:28.11) records at the SEC Championships. Individually, Kullmann broke the women's school 200 and 500 freestyle records at the Georgia Tech Fall Invitational, before bettering both at the SEC Championships, lowering them to 1:45.09 and 4:39.26, respectively.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Alabama ranked second among all NCAA Division I teams in terms of College Swimming & Diving Coaches Association of America (CSCAA) Scholar-Americans in 2018 with 34. The men's team led the nation with 20 honors while the women were ninth with 14. As a team, the Alabama men posted a 3.56 team grade point average in the spring, which ranked third among NCAA Division I schools and first among teams that finished in the top-20 at the NCAA Championships. The Tide women posted a 3.46 GPA in the spring. The men (3.61) and women (3.51) both tallied better than a 3.5 team grade point average in the fall.

MORE ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Luke Kaliszak closed out his Crimson Tide career in style, not only earning All-America honors in the pool, but also earning a number of academic accolades. The Huntsville, Ala., native earned both Southeastern Conference and NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships and was the 2018 Paul W. Bryant Award winner, which goes annually to Alabama Athletics top student-athlete. A two-time CoSIDA Academic All-American and the 2018 SEC Swimming and Diving Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year, Kaliszak graduated in May of 2018 with a 3.9 grade point average in pre-med. An NCAA champion as part of the Tide's 2015 200 medley relay and a 12-time All-American, Kaliszak is the ninth UA swimmer to earn an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship, the seventh to earn an SEC Postgraduate Scholarship and the fourth to earn both. He is also the sixth Tide swimmer to earn two or more Academic All-America honors.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE HONORS

Luke Kaliszak brought home the SEC Swimming and Diving Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year in 2018, marking the third year in a row that honor went to a UA swimmer. Kaliszak and Christina Lu were also named to the SEC Community Service Team. Laurent Bams, Robert Howard, Christopher Reid, Zane Waddell and Braxton Young earned First Team All-SEC honors in 2018, while Kaliszak, Flora Molnar, Lindsay Morrow, Bailey Scott and Temarie Tomley earned second-team accolades. Molnar, Leonie Kullmann and Tyler Sesvold all earned a place on the SEC All-Freshman team. *A*

2017-18 MEN'S TENNIS HIGHLIGHTS

- Alabama secured its 18th appearance in the NCAA Tournament as the No. 3 seed in the Tallahassee Regional. The Tide defeated No. 23 Tulane, before upsetting No. 11 Florida State to make it to its fourth-ever Round of 16 appearance.
- Junior Mazen Osama made history by becoming the first Crimson Tide singles player to make it to the Round of 16 in the NCAA Singles Tournament. Osama took it a step further by winning in the Sweet 16 to advance to the quarterfinals of the tournament.
- For the seventh year in a row, the Tide earned a berth in the NCAA Doubles Tournament with Osama and sophomore Edson Ortiz being selected to the field of 32.
- Osama racked up the awards this season after becoming the first UA All-American since 2001 when he earned a national seed in the NCAA Singles Championships. The junior was also the first Tide player to be named the ITA National Player to Watch. The Cairo, Egypt, native earned First Team All-SEC honors while Ortiz was voted Second Team All-SEC.
- The Tide began the season with the best start in program history after going 14-0 in dual match play. The historic start to a season also marked the longest win streak in the program's existence.
- For only the 10th time in program history, Alabama ended the season with 20 wins. The Tide toppled four nationally-ranked opponents during the year.
- Osama finished the year as the highest ranked Crimson Tide player ever in the final Oracle/ITA Singles Rankings on May 30, coming in at No. 8 in the nation.

ALABAMA EARNS 18TH NCAA TOURNAMENT BID, ADVANCES TO SWEET 16

The Crimson Tide used a late-season push to earn its 18th appearance in the NCAA Tournament. The Tide defeated Auburn in the first round of the SEC Tournament that was held in Tuscaloosa. UA followed up with a much-needed win over No. 25 Kentucky in the second round, before falling to No. 19 Tennessee, 4-3, in the quarterfinals. Alabama secured a spot in the Tallahassee Regional as the No. 3 seed. The Tide moved past No. 23 Tulane, 4-1, before upsetting host No. 11 Florida State, 4-2, to advance to the Sweet 16 for only the fourth time in program history and the first time since 2007. Alabama fell to No. 5 Texas A&M in the Round of 16 in Winston-Salem, N.C. The Crimson Tide ended its season with 20 wins, marking only the 10th time in program history to have 20-plus victories in a campaign.

MAZEN OSAMA MAKES A RUN TO QUARTERFINALS IN THE NCAA SINGLES TOURNAMENT

Junior Mazen Osama became the first Crimson Tide singles player to make his way to the Round of 16 in the NCAA Singles Tournament, before advancing a round further in the quarterfinals of the tournament. Osama began in the Round of 64 by besting No. 51 Aswin Lizen (Virginia), and followed up by moving past No. 65 Trevor Johnson (TCU) to move on to the Sweet 16. The Cairo, Egypt, native dominated No. 47 Runhao Hua (Michigan) to make it to the quarterfinals where he fell to No. 1 Martin Redlicki (UCLA) in Winston-Salem. Osama finished the season 18-8 in singles competition, including defeating 12 nationally-ranked opponents.



OSAMA AND EDSON ORTIZ EARN SPOT IN NCAA DOUBLES TOURNAMENT

For the seventh year in a row, Alabama had a doubles pair earn a berth in the NCAA Doubles Championships. Mazen Osama and Edson Ortiz clinched a spot in the field of 32 as an at-large duo. The two ended the season at 16-10 in the No. 1 spot for the Tide, including besting two nationally-ranked foes. The tandem finished the year at No. 38 in the final Oracle/ITA Rankings.

OSAMA BECOMES FIRST ALABAMA MEN'S TENNIS ALL-AMERICAN SINCE 2001

Mazen Osama earned All-American honors after securing a national seed in the NCAA Singles Tournament. The junior moved up to No. 10 in the rankings going into the tournament before ending the season as the highest ranked Crimson Tide singles player ever at No. 8 in the country.

OSAMA AND ORTIZ EARN ALL-SEC HONORS

The tandem of Mazen Osama and Edson Ortiz were voted on the All-SEC teams in May. For his performance during the spring, Osama was named First Team All-SEC, while Ortiz was selected Second Team All-SEC. In addition, Ortiz secured a spot on the SEC Men's Tennis Community Service Team.

ALABAMA REPRESENTED IN ITA AWARDS

After being named ITA Southern Region Player to Watch for the second year in a row, Mazen Osama became the first Crimson Tide player to be selected as the ITA National Player to Watch. Assistant Coach Robbie Weiss was also recognized by the ITA as the Southern Region Assistant Coach of the Year. As a team, Alabama was awarded the Southern Region Community Service Team of the Year.

CRIMSON TIDE BEGINS SEASON WITH HISTORIC RUN

Alabama started the season off hot, with a program-best 14-0 beginning to the year. The 14-match win streak also marked the longest win streak in the program's existence. During the streak, the Crimson Tide won 11 matches at home, including wins over Virginia Tech and Penn State. *A*

2017-18 HIGHLIGHTS

- Alabama women's tennis wrapped up the 2018 campaign at .500, including a huge, upset win over then-No. 32 Texas A&M in the regular-season finale.
- In addition to earning ITA All-Academic Team recognition in 2018, Alabama women's tennis led the Southeastern Conference in Intercollegiate Tennis Association Scholar-Athlete accolades with seven.
- Andie Daniell finished at No. 101 in the final ITA singles rankings and earned both First Team All-SEC and CoSIDA Academic All-American honors for the first time in her career.

STRONG START TO THE SEASON

The Crimson Tide started the season with a nine-match winning streak, defeating UCF, who was receiving votes to be nationally ranked at the time, in the first road match of the season, and went 12-1 in the first 13 matches, which marked the best start to a season since 2009.

THE TIDE RECEIVES NATIONAL RECOGNITION

Alabama was featured on the Oracle/ITA Division I Women's Team computerized rankings for three straight weeks in 2018. The Crimson Tide landed at No. 49 with a 14.00 average on March 6 and came in at No. 37 with a 17.75 average on Feb. 27. The Crimson Tide earned its highest ranking at No. 31 with a 20.41 average in the first computerized rankings on Feb. 20. Furthermore, the squad ended the year ranked at No. 59.

DANIELL TABBED FIRST TEAM ALL-SEC

Andie Daniell earned her first recognition First Team All-SEC list after a scorching-hot spring season at the No. 1 singles position for the Crimson Tide. The Douglasville, Ga., native amassed a team-high 17 wins in singles, while totaling 26 overall victories for the 2017-18 season. In doubles, Daniell ended her campaign with 19 wins. Daniell upset three ranked opponents in the spring season. Her first victory over a nationally-recognized singles player came on March 2 when she took down No. 117 Justina Mikulskyte of Kentucky, 7-6(3), 6-2, and she later topped No. 52 Ingrid Gamarra Martins of South Carolina in straight sets, 6-2, 6-3, on March 24. Then on April 13, Daniell handled No. 85 Ryann Foster of LSU, 6-2, 6-3, at No. 1. During the fall slate, Daniell defeated No. 45 Lindsey Hodge from Rice, 6-4, 6-1, while also reaching the semifinal round of the 2017 ITA Southern Regional Championships. Daniell ended the fall with a 9-2 record.

CRUSHING THE CLASSROOM

Alabama women's tennis posted an overall grade point average of 3.889, capping the 2017-18 academic year with a perfect 4.0 GPA for the spring semester. For the second consecutive year, the Crimson Tide had seven women earn Intercollegiate Tennis Association Scholar-Athlete status while also earning ITA All-Academic Team recognition. The team earned seven Dean's List honors, as well as seven President's List honors for the year. Andie Daniell highlighted the Tide's academic success by being named a 2018 CoSIDA Academic All-American in the spring. Daniell registered a 4.0 GPA for both the fall and spring semesters.



UPSET CITY

The Alabama women's tennis team closed out the regular season with a bang by knocking off No. 32 Texas A&M, 4-3, at the Alabama Tennis Stadium on Senior Day. After dropping the doubles point, the Crimson Tide used a strong singles performance to knot the contest at three apiece. In the deciding match, sophomore Alba Cortina-Pou recovered from a 1-6 first-set deficit and captured the final two sets to clinch the match and give the Tide its second conference win of the season. In addition, the Crimson Tide picked up its first victory over a ranked opponent since April 7, 2017

and defeated the Aggies for the fifth time in program history.

BREAKOUT SEASON

Since transferring to the Capstone in 2017, sophomore Alba Cortina-Pou has made her mark on the Crimson Tide tennis program. The Blanes, Spain, native tied for second on the team with the most singles victories over the 2017-18 season and topped the squad with nine dual-match singles wins. In conference play, Cortina-Pou clinched two crucial matches at the No. 5 position.

2018 SEC MEN'S INDOOR CHAMPIONS

The Alabama Crimson Tide men stormed to their first conference title since 1972 on the final day of the 2018 Southeastern Conference Indoor Track & Field Championships at Texas A&M's Gilliam Indoor Stadium in College Station, Texas. In second place after the first day's events, the Tide roared to the front of the pack behind a 21-point performance in the 5,000 meters and four additional top-three finishes on Day 2 to clinch the crown. Alabama won the title with 91 points, three points ahead of runner-up Arkansas (88). The conference title is the sixth indoor championship in school history. Alabama entered the final day trailing Florida, 30.5-28 following Shelby McEwen's win in the high jump, a second-place finish by Daniel Haugh in the weight throw and third- and fifth-place finishes by Vincent Kiprop and Gilbert Kigen, respectively, in the 3,000 meters. The Gators extended the lead with multiple scorers in Sunday's first five events but Ruebin Walters and Keitavious Walter kept the Tide within striking distance with second- and seventh-place finishes in the 60-meter hurdles and 60 meters, respectively. However, it was the longest race of the day that catapulted the Tide into championship contention as Kigen, Kiprop, Alfred Chelanga and Conner Thompson finished 2-3-5-6 in the men's 5,000 meters for 21 points to push Alabama into a lead it would not relinquish. The Tide continued to pile up the points as Will Herrscher and Jake Spotswood finished 3-4 in the pole vault. Christian Edwards and Kord Ferguson added second-place finishes in the triple jump and shot put, respectively, and Walter finished sixth in the 200 meters. Alabama clinched the championship with an eighth-place finish in the 4x400-meter relay, the final event of the meet.

2018 HIGHLIGHTS

- The Crimson Tide men won their first SEC indoor championship since 1972. Alabama's distance corps posted 31 points in the 3,000 meters and 5,000 meters to lead the Tide to a 91-point performance and a three-point victory over runner-up Arkansas.
- Junior Shelby McEwen became Alabama's first conference champion in the indoor high jump since 1985 when he cleared 7-4 1/4 (2.24m) at the SEC Indoor Championships in College Station, Texas.
- The 2018 indoor track & field season saw the Crimson Tide men record a second consecutive top-10 finish at the NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships. Alabama finished ninth in 2018, following up on an eighth-place finish in 2017.
- Eleven Alabama track & field student-athletes earned All-America honors in 10 events at the 2018 NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships.
- Junior Portious Warren (shot put) and senior Kaitlin Walker (600 meters) set women's indoor school records and the men's and women's teams combined to post 32 performances that rank among the top-10 in school history in their respective events in 2018.

MEN PLACE FIRST, WOMEN EIGHTH AT SEC INDOOR MEET

Fueled by SEC high jump champion Shelby McEwen, and a 31-point performance in the 3,000 and 5,000 meters, Alabama won the 2018 Southeastern Conference indoor track & field championship. The Crimson Tide scored in 11 of 14 events as eight student-athletes earned All-SEC honors. The title is the sixth for the program and the first since 1972. The Alabama women finished eighth at the SEC indoor meet in College Station, Texas. Leading the way for the Alabama women were freshman Daija Lampkin and junior Stacey Destin. Lampkin finished fifth in the 200 meters in 23.16, which ranks as the fifth-fastest time in school history, and, along with sophomores Takyera Roberson and Symone Darius and freshman Tamara Clark, turned in the fourth-fastest time in UA history in the 4x400-meter relay. The quartet finished fourth in 3:34.50.

WATERS NAMED SEC COACH OF THE YEAR

Alabama head coach Dan Waters was named Men's SEC Coach of the Year after Waters and his staff coached the Crimson Tide men to the 2018 Southeastern Conference Indoor Championship on Feb. 25. The title was the first indoor crown for Alabama since 1972. In addition to the SEC honor, Waters was recognized as the South Region Coach of the Year by the United States Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA) for the second year in a row.



MCEWEN WINS SEC HIGH JUMP TITLE

Junior Shelby McEwen won the high jump at the Southeastern Conference Indoor Track & Field Championships with a clearance of 7-4 1/4 (2.24m). The win was the fourth in the event for UA and the first since 1985. McEwen joins Thomas McCants (1984, 1985) and Jeff Woodard (1978) as the Crimson Tide's only conference champions in the indoor high jump.

KIPROP, KIGEN LEAD CRIMSON TIDE ALL-SEC PERFORMERS

Ten Alabama track & field student-athletes earned All-SEC honors for their performances at the 2018 Southeastern Conference Indoor Track & Field Championships. Three Tide student-athletes were named to the SEC All-Freshman team. Eight members of the SEC champion UA men's team were honored, led by junior first-team selection Shelby McEwen, who won the high jump at the conference meet. Earning second-team honors were freshman Christian Edwards (triple jump), juniors Kord Ferguson (shot put), Will Herrscher (pole vault), Gilbert Kigen (5,000 meters) and Vincent Kiprof (5,000 meters) as well as seniors Daniel Haugh (weight throw) and Ruebin Walters (60-meter hurdles). Edwards and fellow freshman Jake Spotswood (pole vault) were named to the Freshman All-SEC team.

Juniors Stacey Destin (high jump) and Portious Warren (shot put) earned second-team All-SEC honors for the Alabama women. Freshman Jaimie Robinson (triple jump) was named to the women's Freshman All-SEC squad.

TIDE MEN NINTH AT NCAA MEET

The Alabama men's ninth-place finish at the 2018 NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships gave the Tide back-to-back top-10 finishes at the indoor national meet for the first time since 2001 and 2002. The Tide finished ninth with 22 points in 2018 to follow up on an eighth-place finish in 2017, marking the first back-to-back top-10s for the Crimson Tide men since 2001 (fourth) and 2002 (second).

TWELVE CRIMSON TIDE STUDENT-ATHLETES EARN ALL-AMERICA HONORS

Twelve members of the Alabama track & field team earned All-America honors in 10 events at the 2018 NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships. Four men earned individual first-team honors, including junior Kord Ferguson (sixth/shot put), senior Daniel Haugh (fourth/weight throw), junior Vincent Kiprof (second/5,000 meters) and junior Shelby McEwen (third/high jump). Second-team awards went to junior Gilbert Kigen (10th/5,000 meters) and senior Ruebin Walters (13th/60-meter

hurdles). Junior Stacey Destin earned first-team honors in the high jump (sixth) and second-team honors in the pentathlon (10th) for the Crimson Tide women. Five other members of the Tide women's team also earned second-team selections, including freshman Tamara Clark (16th/4x400-meter relay), sophomore Symone Darius (16th/4x400-meter relay), freshman Daija Lampkin (16th/200 Meters; 16th/4x400-meter relay), junior Mauricia Prieto (16th/4x400-meter relay) and junior Portious Warren (11th/shot put). Destin earned double All-America honors for the second season in a row. She was a first-team selection in the high jump and pentathlon in 2017.

TWO SCHOOL RECORDS FALL DURING INDOOR SEASON

The 2018 indoor track & field season saw junior Portious Warren and senior Kaitlin Walker set women's school records in the shot put and 600 meters. Warren finished third in the shot put at the SEC Championships with a school-record mark of 56-3 1/4 (17.15m) to become the first Alabama shot putter to surpass 56 feet indoors. Walker finished third in the 600 meters at the New Mexico Classic on Feb. 2 in a school-record time of 1:30.89. The time surpassed her previous UA best of 1:31.50, set a week earlier at the Bob Pollock Invitational and gave her the three fastest times in the event in school history. *A*

2018 HIGHLIGHTS

- The Alabama men's track & field/cross country team won the 2017-18 United States Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA) John McDonnell NCAA Division I Men's Program of the Year, the USTFCCCA announced June 12. The honor is the first for the Alabama program.
- In seven years under Dan Waters, the Alabama track and field team has produced four individual NCAA outdoor champions to go with six top-20 outdoor team finishes.
- The Tide men tied for fifth at the NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships in 2018 for their second consecutive top-10 finish.
- The Alabama men finished fourth and the women finished ninth at the SEC Championships in Knoxville, Tenn. The men's finish gave them three consecutive top-five finishes for the first time since a run of three in a row from 1989-91.
- The Tide men have scored at the NCAA Outdoor Championships each of the last 11 years.
- Three members of the 2018 Crimson Tide track & field team will compete for the United States at the IAAF World U20 Championships this summer - Tamara Clark (women's 4x100 relay), Christian Edwards (men's triple jump) and Daija Lampkin (women's 100 meters, women's 4x100 relay).
- A total of 16 members of the track and field team earned first- or second-team outdoor All-America honors.

MEN'S TRACK & CROSS COUNTRY EARNS NATIONAL TEAM OF THE YEAR

The Alabama men's track & field/cross country team was the 2017-18 United States Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA) John McDonnell NCAA Division I Men's Program of the Year. The honor is the first for the Alabama program. The Program of the Year award has been presented annually since 2009 to the track & field and cross country program with the best combined finish at the NCAA cross country, indoor and outdoor national championships. The Crimson Tide finished 14th at the NCAA Cross Country Championships, ninth at the indoor championships and tied for fifth at the outdoor championships for 28.5 total points to edge out Arkansas, which finished second with 31 points.

MEN RECORD TOP-10 FINISH AT NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Crimson Tide men tied for fifth at the 2018 NCAA Outdoor Championships in Eugene, Ore., with 33 points. The finish is first in the top-five for the Tide men at the NCAA Championships since a fourth-place finish in 1986 and the third in program history (third, 1983).

24 EARN OUTDOOR ALL-AMERICA CITATIONS

Sixteen Alabama track & field student-athletes earned All-America recognition at the 2018 NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships which took place June 6-9 in Eugene, Ore. The selections were announced June 11 by the United States Track & Field Coaches Association (USTFCCCA). Additionally, the



USTFCCCA awarded honorable mention status to six Tide student-athletes. First-team recognition for the Crimson Tide men went to freshman Christian Edwards (triple jump), junior Kord Ferguson (discus), junior Daniel Haugh (hammer throw), junior Gilbert Kigen (10,000 meters), junior Vincent Kiprop (10,000 meters), junior Shelby McEwen (high jump) and senior Ruebin Walters (110-meter hurdles). First-team honorees for the Tide women were freshmen Tamara Clark, Daija Lampkin and Demi Washington, as well as sophomore Symone Darius in the 4x100-meter relay. Men's second-team honors went to Ferguson (shot put), Haugh (discus), Kigen (5,000 meters), Kiprop (5,000 meters), senior Alfred Chelanga (10,000 meters) and junior Keitavious Walter (200 meters). Women's second-team recognition went to Darius (4x400-meter relay), Lampkin (4x400-meter relay), sophomore Katie Funcheon (4x400-meter relay), sophomore Takyera Roberson (4x400-meter relay) and junior Portious Warren (shot put). Earning honorable mention were Chelanga (5,000 meters) for the men and Clark (100 meters, 200 meters), Warren (discus), junior Tamara Moncrieffe (triple jump), freshman Jaimie Robinson (triple jump) and senior Britainy Smith (pole vault).

SHORT NAMED ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICAN

Josh Short earned CoSIDA Track & Field/Cross Country Academic All-America honors, CoSIDA announced June 21. The Cedarburg, Wis., native carried a 4.0 grade point average in political science. The distance ace served as captain of the Crimson Tide's 2017 cross country squad. He also competed in the 3,000-meter steeplechase at the 2017 NCAA East Regional and the 2017 and 2018 SEC Outdoor Track & Field Championships. He ran a career-best 9:04.71 in the steeplechase at the 2017 Mount Sac Relays. In the classroom, Short earned President's List honors (4.0 GPA) throughout his career. The 2017-18 season marks the ninth year in a row that at least one member of the Alabama track & field/cross country team has earned a place on the CoSIDA Academic All-American squad. Overall, 11 members of the program have earned Academic All-America recognition 18 times.

MEN FOURTH, WOMEN NINTH AT SEC MEET

The Alabama men and women finished fourth and ninth, respectively, at the 2018 Southeastern Conference Outdoor Track & Field Championships, May 11-13 in Knoxville, Tenn. Individually, the Crimson Tide finished with three event champions, 12 All-SEC honorees

and two school records at the conference meet. Conference champions were Shelby McEwen in the men's high jump and Vincent Kiprop in the 5,000 meters and 10,000 meters. The performances propelled the Crimson Tide men to a fourth-place finish in the team standings, giving UA a third consecutive top-five finish at the conference outdoor meet for the first time since a run of three in a row from 1989-91. The Crimson Tide women finished ninth in the team standings with 53.6 points.

HAUGH, WARREN SET SCHOOL RECORDS

Daniel Haugh and Portious Warren added their names to the Alabama record book in 2018 with school record marks in the men's hammer throw and women's shot put, respectively. At the LSU Invitational on April 28, Haugh won the hammer throw with an effort of 241-2 (73.50m) to surpass the previous school record that was set in 2014. Warren established a new women's shot put record at UA with a mark of 56-11 1/4 (17.35m) at the SEC Outdoor Track & Field Championships on May 12. The attempt bettered the previous mark that had stood since 2006. *A*

2017 HIGHLIGHTS

- In 2017, the Alabama men made their first team appearance in the NCAA Championships since 2010 and finished 14th on the strength of All-America performances by juniors Gilbert Kigen (fourth), Vincent Kiprop (seventh) and Alfred Chelanga (37th).
- Kiprop earned SEC Runner of the Year honors after winning the individual SEC cross country championship.
- Kigen was named South Region Runner of the Year following his victory at the NCAA South Regional in Tuscaloosa.
- The Crimson Tide men finished second at the 2017 SEC Cross Country Championships with 81 points as Kiprop, Kigen and Chelanga earned First Team All-SEC honors.
- The Alabama women finished seventh at the SEC Championships with 171 points. Sophomore McKenzie Yanek was the top Tide women's finisher at the SEC Championships, finishing 14th to earn All-SEC honors.
- Yanek and junior Nicole Gardner were Alabama's top finishers in four of the Tide's six meets in 2017.
- Alabama's women finished ninth at the NCAA South Regional Championships in Tuscaloosa.

CRIMSON TIDE MEN MAKE FIRST TRIP TO NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS SINCE 2010

Fueled by All-America performances by Gilbert Kigen, Vincent Kiprop and Alfred Chelanga, the Crimson Tide men advanced to the NCAA Championships for the first time since 2010. The Tide finished 14th overall and Kigen (fourth), Kiprop (seventh) and Chelanga (37th) became the first Tide trio to finish in the top-40 at one NCAA Championship and the first Crimson Tide trio to earn All-America honors in the same season.

KIGEN HONORED AS SOUTH REGION RUNNER OF THE YEAR

Alabama junior Gilbert Kigen was selected as the NCAA South Region Men's Runner of the Year by the United States Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA). The Kipkabus, Kenya, native won the NCAA South Region cross country championship on Nov. 10, completing the 10,000-meter course at Alabama's Harry Pritchett Running Park in 29:44.5 to lead UA to a third-place finish. Kigen also placed second at the SEC Cross Country Championships and won the individual title at the Joe Piane Notre Dame Invitational earlier this season. Kigen is the second Tide runner to earn regional runner of the year honors in the last three seasons, joining Antibahs Kosgei who was honored in 2015.

KIPROP NAMED SEC RUNNER OF THE YEAR

Alabama junior Vincent Kiprop was selected as the Southeastern Conference Men's Runner of the Year as voted by the league's head coaches. The Kericho, Kenya native won the SEC men's cross country title on Oct. 27, circling the 8,000-meter course at the University of Georgia in 23:15.4 to lead an Alabama sweep of the top three spots as fellow UA juniors Gilbert Kigen (23:18.8) and Alfred Chelanga (23:23.4) finished second and third, respectively, to lead the Tide to a second-place finish. The runner-up finish is the first in the top two for Alabama since 2010. Kiprop is the fifth UA athlete to be honored as the SEC men's runner of the year. David Kimani claimed the award in 2001 and 2002, while Emmanuel Bor earned the honor in 2007. Tyson Davis (2008) and Antibahs Kosgei (2015) were Alabama's most recent winners prior to the 2017 campaign.

KIPROP WINS TENTH UA SEC CROSS COUNTRY CROWN

Vincent Kiprop led from wire-to-wire en route to claiming the individual men's title at the 2017 SEC Cross Country Championships on Oct. 27. Kiprop's victory was the 10th for UA and the second in the last three years for Alabama at the SEC meet. Kiprop and fellow Tide juniors Gilbert Kigen and Alfred Chelanga finished 1-2-3 to earn All-SEC honors.

CRIMSON TIDE MEN FINISH SECOND AT SEC CHAMPIONSHIPS

Vincent Kiprop led Alabama to a runner-up finish at the 2017 SEC Cross Country Championships at the University of Georgia Golf Course on Oct. 27 with an individual victory. Kiprop circled the 8,000-meter course 23:15.4 to headline an Alabama sweep of the top three spots as fellow UA juniors Gilbert Kigen (23:18.8) and Alfred Chelanga (23:23.4) finished second and third, respectively. The runner-up finish is the first in the top two for Alabama since 2010. Kiprop is the seventh man to win an individual SEC title for UA in cross country and the crown is the 10th individual title for the program. The victory gives the Crimson Tide two men's champions in the last three years. Antibahs Kosgei took home individual honors at the 2015 SEC Cross Country Championships in College Station, Texas. Alabama also got strong performances from seniors Garrett Bull (25:00.4) and Andrew Bull (25:08.4), who finished 37th and 40th, respectively, to round out the scoring for the Tide.

2017 HIGHLIGHTS

- Senior middle blocker Leah Lawrence broke the program's career blocks record en route to earning AVCA All-Region honors. She was also awarded for her academic performance, earning CoSIDA Academic All-America recognition.
- With an 18-14 record, Ed Allen posted his 25th winning record in 26 years as a head coach. He is 628-275 (.695) all-time, including a 134-92 (.593) record in seven seasons at Alabama.
- The Crimson Tide posted a 10-5 record at Foster Auditorium, marking its sixth straight season with double-digit home wins. Under Allen, Alabama is 73-32 (.695) on its home court.

LEAH LAWRENCE EARNS AVCA ALL-REGION, COSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA HONORS

Leah Lawrence wrapped up her four-year Crimson Tide career with a stellar senior season, earning AVCA All-Region honors for her play on the court and CoSIDA Academic All-America accolades for her accomplishments in the classroom. Both honors were the first of her career. She is the 12th Alabama player to earn All-Region recognition since the award's inception in 2007. Ten of those 12 honorees have come under head coach Ed Allen, with the Tide putting at least one player on the list every year since 2013. Her Academic All-America award is the seventh in Crimson Tide program history and the fifth under head coach Ed Allen. At least one Alabama volleyball student-athlete has earned Academic All-America distinction every year since 2014, as Lawrence joins former teammates and two-time winners Sierra Wilson (2014-15) and Krystal Rivers (2014, 2016) in the distinguished group.

LEAH LAWRENCE BREAKS ALABAMA CAREER BLOCKS RECORD

With six blocks in the Nov. 12 match against Tennessee, senior Leah Lawrence became Alabama's all-time blocks leader, passing previous record-holder Shelly Adamcik's (1999-02) career total of 438 that had stood for over a decade. Lawrence finished her career with 449 blocks and is also among the top 10 at Alabama in block assists (2nd, 358) and solo blocks (3rd, 91).



MEGAN NEELON POSTS TOP-FIVE FRESHMAN ASSISTS MARK

Freshman setter Meghan Neelon posted 1,213 assists through 121 sets played, giving her the fifth-highest total by a freshman in program history. In the Nov. 8 match against Kentucky, Neelon passed teammate Shannon Mikesky's freshman mark of 996 set in 2016. Neelon's total is the second-highest freshman assist total under head coach Ed Allen, only trailing Sierra Wilson's 2012 freshman total of 1,293.

DEFENSE POSTS TOP-10 DIG AND BLOCK TOTALS AT ALABAMA

The 2017 front- and back-row defense made its mark in the Crimson Tide records books for digs and blocks. The Tide's 1,875 digs in 2017 ranks seventh in single-season UA history, the highest total since 2007 and the highest mark under head coach Ed Allen, and its 15.50 digs-per-set average ranks sixth. The Tide moved into the single-season top-10 ranks in total blocks in the last week of competition, finishing with 278.0. This passed

the previous 10th-place mark of 275.0 set in 2014, which was also the highest single-season total under Allen. Alabama's 2.33 blocks-per-set average ranks 10th in program history and is the highest block average since 2006. The team's 104 solo blocks is third all-time in UA history and marks just the fifth time an Alabama team has reached triple digits. It is also the team's highest total since 1994.

GARY POSTS TOP DIGS MARK UNDER ALLEN

In her first season as the team's full-time libero, junior Quincey Gary posted career dig numbers from the back row. Her 536 digs is a career-best for Gary and is the highest total for any UA player under head coach Ed Allen. The single-season total ranks third in program history and marks just the fifth time a player has surpassed 500 digs, the first time since 2007. *A*

BEST OF THE BEST

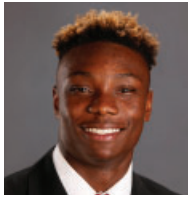
The University of Alabama Athletics Department enjoyed enormous success during the 2017-18 academic year, not only winning a national championship and posting a pair of NCAA runner-up finishes as well as team and individual Southeastern Conference titles, but also in terms of the individual conference, regional and national honors that poured in for Crimson Tide student-athletes. In addition to helping lead Alabama to its fourth consecutive berth in the College Football Playoff and its 17th national football title, defensive back **Minkah Fitzpatrick** captured both the Chuck Bednarik Award and the Jim Thorpe Award as a junior. Golfer **Lauren Stephenson** earned the Golfstat Cup and was named the Golfweek Player of the Year. **Vincent Kiprop** won the individual 2017 SEC Cross Country championship on the way to earning SEC Cross Country Runner of the Year recognition. **Luke Kaliszak** was named the 2018 SEC Swimming and Diving Scholar-Athlete of the Year, marking the third year in a row that honor has gone to a member of the UA men's team. Both Kaliszak and gymnast **Mackenzie Brannan** received SEC and NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships. Junior **Mazen Osama** was named the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) National Player to Watch. A total of 48 UA student-athletes earned All-America honors during the 2017-18 academic year while an NCAA-best 11 earned CoSIDA Academic All-America honors. Crimson Tide student-athletes also won seven individual SEC championships and one relay title.

FACILITIES

“BUILT BY BAMA”

More than just a tagline used by Alabama and its fanbase, “Built by Bama” speaks to the ongoing efforts by The University of Alabama Department of Athletics to make its facilities all that Crimson Tide students and coaches need to be successful. Such was the late Mal Moore’s vision when he took over as Director of Athletics in 1999 and so it remains today for the department as a whole. To that end, over the past decade Alabama has undergone an unprecedented transformation, one that has touched all its facilities. During the 2018-19 academic year, the newly built Crimson Tide Dining Hall/ Nutrition Center came online as part of the Mal Moore Athletics Building, as Alabama continues works tirelessly to keep its facilities at the forefront of collegiate athletics.



BRYANT-DENNY STADIUM

With projects of \$47 and \$65 million to renovate and expand the north and south end zones in the last several years, Bryant-Denny Stadium is truly one of the top facilities in all of collegiate football. The current seating capacity is 101,821 making Bryant-Denny Stadium one of the largest on-campus football stadiums in the nation. The most recent renovation not only pushed capacity to 101,821, but gave Bryant-Denny Stadium an additional 36 skyboxes and 1,700 club seats. The 2010 renovation marked the fourth expansion since 1988 and the seventh time Bryant-Denny Stadium has been expanded since it was originally completed in 1929. Other expansions were completed in 1946, 1961, 1966, 1988, 1998 and 2006. The Tide beat Mississippi College, 55-0, in the first game played at Denny Stadium, named for UA President George Denny on September 28, 1929. The stadium was officially dedicated October 5, 1929, when the Tide beat Ole Miss, 22-7. The stadium was re-named Bryant-Denny Stadium, in honor of legendary coach Paul Bryant and Denny, on April 10, 1976, during the annual A-Day game. The renovations over the past decade included a plaza connecting the stadium with University Boulevard. The plaza, which quickly became a focal point on game-day Saturdays, honors Alabama’s national championship coaches and commemorates the Tide’s 17 national and 26 SEC titles. Alabama bettered its own record for the largest crowd to see a game in the state of Alabama when a sell-out crowd of 101,821 fans filled the seats in the Crimson Tide’s 2010 season opener against San Jose State. Going into the 2018 season, the Crimson Tide owns an impressive 261-53-3 (.828) all-time record at Bryant-Denny Stadium and a 346-66-3

(.837) mark in all games played in Tuscaloosa. Dating back to the 1988 renovation of Bryant-Denny Stadium, more than 17 million fans have witnessed the Crimson Tide play in 206 home games over the last 30 seasons.

COLEMAN COLISEUM

The center of much of The University of Alabama campus life since opening in 1968, Coleman Coliseum is home to Alabama men’s basketball and gymnastics. The women’s basketball team, which moved to Foster Auditorium in 2011, moved its games back to Coleman Coliseum prior to the 2016-17 season. Originally named Memorial Coliseum, Coleman Coliseum has served as the home court of the Alabama men’s basketball team since its opening and the women’s gymnastics team since 1985. One of college basketball’s finest facilities, the multi-purpose arena was ahead of its time when originally constructed at a cost of \$4.2 million. The building occupies two acres of land with the roof reaching 90 feet above the competition surface and almost 100,000 square feet of space in the main seating area. The arena was re-dedicated in 1988 as Coleman Coliseum in honor of Jeff Coleman, a long-time Crimson Tide historian, business manager for athletics and alumni director who served on the committee that oversaw construction and planning of the Coliseum. The coliseum houses athletics department offices, including coaching offices for more than a dozen of the Tide’s teams, the communications department’s offices, the ticket and Tide Pride offices, a club level room (the Crimson Tide Room), a President’s reception area (the C.M. Newton Room), practice facilities for men’s basketball and



gymnastics, an equipment room, weight rooms, training rooms, food service areas, photo studios and locker room facilities for student-athletes and staff.

HANK CRISP INDOOR FACILITY

The Hank Crisp Indoor Facility, considered one of the finest facilities of its kind in the nation, underwent a renovation in the summer of 2009. The renovation included the removal of the tennis indoor facility to make the building a complete open space to be utilized for practice by baseball, football, soccer and softball, when inclement weather or extreme temperatures prevent those teams from practicing outdoors. The facility's 130+ yard field makes it the largest collegiate indoor practice facility in the nation under one roof. Hank Crisp Indoor has 97,000 square feet of clear space, measuring 20 percent larger than a typical college football field. As part of the 2009 renovation, a new artificial field turf system was installed. Another addition in 2009 was the installation of the state-of-the-art Wavacam™ system. The camera system, which suspends from the ceiling of the facility, operates similar to that of the sky cam systems used by network broadcasts of college football games. The system gives the football coaching staff superior vantage points to break down plays compared to traditional standard practice video. The facility is fully heated and air conditioned which is an unusual feature in most indoor practice facilities.

ALABAMA STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COMPLEX

The Crimson Tide's Strength and Conditioning Complex opened prior to the 2013-14 academic year and links the Mal M. Moore Athletics Facility with the Hank Crisp Indoor Facility. It serves all 21 of Alabama teams and features a state-of-the-art weight room and physician and strength and conditioning offices as well as the Crimson Tide's performance nutrition center to fuel Alabama student-athletes. The 37,000-square-foot weight room is a showcase for the Crimson Tide's lauded training regimes, such as the "Fourth Quarter Program." The weight room features 21,000-square feet on the lower level and 16,000-square feet on the second floor. The weight room is highlighted by 24 combination racks that have platforms built into the ground for a level surface, providing a safer workout environment, as well as a dumbbell station. The upper level houses cardio stations, medicine balls, office space for team doctors and a rehabilitation center. The complex features a state-of-the-art nutrition center, video monitor and sound system. The weight room seamlessly connects the Mal M. Moore Athletics Facility, where Alabama's administration and football offices are located, to the Hank Crisp Indoor Practice Facility. The latest renovations to the Mal M. Moore Athletics Facility feature a complete overhaul of Alabama's football locker room, meeting spaces as well as lounge and recruiting areas to give the Crimson Tide a premier player development hub. The transformation comprises a redesigned locker room with new furnishings from top to bottom, including 137 custom-built lockers and a cascading built-in spa for post-practice recovery. The meeting rooms are built around a new theater-style team room that has 175 oversized seats and is equipped



with a 300-inch projection screen. The renovations also feature eight new theater-style position meeting rooms. The player lounge area has an 80-inch high-definition television, an arcade room and three gaming areas along with pool and ping-pong tables.

MAL M. MOORE ATHLETICS FACILITY

Widely considered one of the finest facilities of its type in the nation, the Mal M. Moore Athletics Facility is the centerpiece of Crimson Tide Athletics and home to the Alabama football program. The south wing of the building houses senior administrators of the athletics department, while the north side holds the football offices. The building, which has undergone two renovations since 2005, contains a state-of-the-art training room featuring aquatic rehabilitation pools. The training room is utilized by all Crimson Tide athletics programs. The football team's equipment room, meeting rooms, recruiting room, coaches' offices and media room are all located in the Mal M. Moore Athletics Facility. The Hall of Champions located on the second floor of the building highlights Alabama's rich football history. Trophy cases for each of the Tide's national championships are located in the Hall of Champions, as well as a large case featuring the program's 26 Southeastern Conference championships. The Hall features individual accomplishments as well, including a trophy case for some of the more recent individual awards received by Crimson Tide football players. Mark Ingram's 2009 Heisman Trophy and Derrick Henry's 2015 Heisman Trophy stand side-by-side on twin marble pedestals in the middle of the Hall. Every Alabama football player to be named a first team All-American, as well as those inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame are recognized with individual



plaques in the Hall. Prior to the 2018-19 academic year, a 25,000 square foot Fuel Center & Smoothie Bar addition to the Mal Moore Athletics Facility opened, housing five performance chefs and four dietitians. In addition to the main dining hall, the facility includes an upstairs patio dining area overlooking the football practice fields and more than 50 HD televisions.

RHOADS STADIUM

The John and Ann Rhoads Softball Stadium was built in 2000 and recently received enhancements that make the nation's most packed college softball venue an imposing site for visiting teams. That stadium, completed at a cost of \$2.2 million, added right field tier seating to push stadium capacity past the 3,000 mark. The stadium was expanded for the third time in its short history following the 2011 season, bringing the official capacity to 3,940. During the 2009 season, tier seating in the right field corner was added along with a standing room concourse area that includes tables and drink rails. After the completion of the 2010 season, construction began on an expanded clubhouse that features a new locker room, expanded training room and player's lounge, a new team video room and lobby. The expanded clubhouse connects to the new indoor practice facility that includes three batting cages and a bullpen.

SEWELL-THOMAS STADIUM

Sewell-Thomas Stadium is home of The University of Alabama baseball team. Opened as Thomas Field on March 26, 1948, in honor of former Tide head coach Frank Thomas, the stadium originally had a seating capacity of 2,000. In 1978, the stadium was renamed Sewell-Thomas Stadium, adding the name of former

UA baseball standout and head coach Joe Sewell, who spent 14 years with the Cleveland Indians and New York Yankees during his Hall of Fame baseball career. Referred to by many as "The Joe," Sewell-Thomas Stadium has been the home of Alabama's baseball team since 1948, but has undergone many changes over the years. The complex underwent two major renovations in 1996 and again in 2001 before undergoing a total transformation during the 2014-15 academic year. The "New Joe" embodies a character and atmosphere unique to The University of Alabama, while updating facilities, seating and fan amenities to appeal to everyone. The stadium accommodates the needs of players, coaches and fans alike and provides the best possible experience to anyone who steps inside the historic grounds. The stadium allows for a maximum capacity of 5,200 fans on game day. Sewell-Thomas Stadium includes field level seating throughout the yard as well as club, terrace and patio seating plus a berm and family area. The facility includes a 7,500 square foot, year-round, all-weather hitting facility that came online in January 2015. The stadium also features a player lounge, locker room, meeting room, athletics training facilities and coaches offices for the team and staff to utilize. The whole project, which houses a state-of-the-art facility with a distinctly traditional baseball feel, was re-opened with a baseball alumni gathering prior to the 2016 season opener, a 3-1 win over Maryland, on Friday, Feb. 19.

FOSTER AUDITORIUM

Beginning in 2011, The University of Alabama Athletics Department renovated and expanded Foster Auditorium to create a home for the Crimson Tide's volleyball and women's basketball



programs. The remodeling of Foster included refurbishing the arena portion of the building with new seating, both on the floor level and the second level which overlooks the court, creating an impressive competitive atmosphere for both sports. The restoration of the venerable three-story building was completed in January of 2011 in time for the women's basketball game between Alabama and Florida on Feb. 13, 2011, when the Tide defeated the Gators 64-59. The renovation also included suites for both programs that house the teams' locker rooms, team areas, meeting and video rooms and coaches' offices. A weight room and athletics training facilities were also included in the project. Originally built in 1939, Foster Auditorium was named in 1942 for Richard Clarke Foster, president of The University of Alabama from 1937-41. It was the largest and most expensive of 14 buildings added to campus between 1936 and 1939 using funds from the Public Works Administration. While continuing to practice in Foster, women's basketball moved back to Coleman Coliseum for its games starting with the 2016-17 season.

UA TENNIS STADIUM

Alabama tennis student-athletes have the privilege of playing in one of the finest facilities in the country as The University of Alabama Tennis Stadium was one of nine winners of the 25th Annual USTA Facility Awards Program. The outdoor complex, built in 2004, features 12 hard courts with overhead seating for 2,000 spectators that faces all courts. The \$4.2 million facility houses a team lounge, a conference room, coaches' offices, player locker rooms with private rest rooms and showers, a full-service athletics training room and a concession stand. The facility contains an elevator from the



first level up to the seating area. Conducive to the highest level of competitive play, the complex is also a terrific place for hosting school and community tournaments, with amenities for spectators and visiting teams.

ROBERTA ALISON BAUMGARDNER TENNIS FACILITY

The Roberta Alison Baumgardner Tennis Facility, which houses six indoor courts, opened in 2012. Located adjacent to the outdoor tennis stadium, the Baumgardner Tennis Facility features a lobby, restrooms and seating above the courts in addition to seating at court level. The addition of the indoor facility not only allows the teams to practice and compete during inclement weather, but also benefits Alabama when submitting bids to host events such as the NCAA Championships.

SAM BAILEY TRACK AND FIELD STADIUM

The Crimson Tide's home track and field facility, named for legendary coach and administrator Sam Bailey, was rebuilt from the ground up prior to the 2013 season, utilizing every inch of the facility to give Alabama students everything they need to be successful at the highest level. The new design and layout ensures that the Sam Bailey Track and Field Stadium is one of the premier facilities in the nation. The nine-lane track has a state of the art Beynon BSS-2000 track surface, which allows for a faster and more durable surface for both competition and training. The track gives Tide athletes a training and competition facility nearly identical to what they will see during the championship season. The shot put area is located at the west end of the track, outside of the

oval, with combined landing pits to provide a more functional and efficient throws area. The infield was replaced with Tifway 419 hybrid Bermuda grass and provides the landing areas for the javelin, hammer throw and discus. The cages for the throw events have been strategically placed with both "D zone areas" to allow for better meet management. Timing locations have been added throughout the track area to allow for the use of the most current event timing techniques. The jumps area is designed to make both training and competition more efficient. There are two long jump runways, two pole vault runways, two high jump aprons. Permanent stadium lights give the Tide far more flexibility when it comes to training and competition. In addition to the track renovations, the grandstands were upgraded as was the press box. An entry plaza incorporated into the facility includes displays to commemorate the history of Alabama track and field students, both in collegiate and Olympic competition. There is also a permanent awards area, created out of the same material as the track itself.

UA SOCCER STADIUM

The University of Alabama Soccer Stadium was built in 2004. It houses a team lounge complete with a flat-screen television and couches, a conference room, coaches' offices, student-athlete locker rooms with private restrooms and showers, a full-service athletics training room and a concession stand with a kitchen. In addition, the facility is equipped with a pair of locker rooms for visiting teams and officials. The outdoor complex features covered bench areas for both teams, a press box and seating for 1,500 spectators with standing room for many more.



JERRY PATE GOLF CENTER AT OL' COLONY GOLF COMPLEX

The Jerry Pate Golf Center at the Ol' Colony Golf Complex provides The University of Alabama men's and women's golf teams with one of the best practice and playing facilities in collegiate golf. The Pate Center is a private facility that is only utilized by the Alabama golf teams. The Pate Center provides plenty of space for both the men's and women's teams with the ability to conduct full practice sessions during inclement weather. The facility has six indoor hitting bays and two indoor putting surfaces. The Pate Center is also equipped with state-of-the-art teaching tools, including the V1 Swing Analysis System, the SAM Putting Lab and Trackman, which aides the coaching staffs in ball flight analysis using Doppler radar and club fitting. The locker rooms inside the Pate Center feature tour-sized lockers and all of the amenities. The center also includes a Hall of Champions area, highlighting the Crimson Tide's tradition of excellence. The Ol' Colony Golf Course was named one of the "Top Five Best New Public Courses in America" by Golf Digest in 2001 and Golfweek named it one of the top-50 municipal courses in America in 2010. The Jerry Pate-designed course is considered one of the best public courses in the nation. The course is a test for even the most advanced golfer, with large bunkers, mature trees and numerous water hazards, including a 25-acre lake that challenges almost every shot. The practice range at the Pate Golf Center, which already provides Crimson Tide golfers all the practice components and tools needed to develop, recently finished an expansion and renovation. The facility includes a full practice range, putting greens, a chipping area and practice bunkers.



The Jerry Pate Golf Center also recently added a new putting green with an expanded chipping and hitting area. The new chipping and hitting areas are complete with new bunkers and practice tees that allow players to hit up to 200 yards into six new target greens.

DON GAMBRIL OLYMPIC POOL AT THE ALABAMA AQUATIC CENTER

One of the nation's fastest pools, the Alabama Aquatic Center has hosted more than 200 major competitions including seven Southeastern Conference Swimming and Diving Championships. Two of the three SEC championships the Tide won in the decade of the 1980s (men's titles in 1982 and 1987) were won in the Aquatic Center. The Aquatic Center's main competition pool, named for the legendary Don Gambril in 2002, is 25-yards by 50-meters. It is 6.5 feet deep at its shallowest point and 18 feet at its deepest. When set up for long-course competition, the pool boasts eight nine-foot wide lanes. When setup for short course, the pool can accommodate up to 17 nine-foot wide lanes. The main pool has four springboards - two 1-meter and two 3-meter. The diving well also boasts a five- and 10-meter platform. The main competition venue, which seats 1,500 fans, is often packed during invitational and championship meets. In addition to the main competition course, the Aquatic Center has an eight lane, 25-yard pool as well as coaches and administrative offices. The Aquatic Center also contains a weight room as well as dryland training areas and meeting rooms.

THE ALABAMA ROWING BOATHOUSE

The Alabama rowing team moved into its state-of-the-art boathouse in August 2014. Located on the west side of Manderson Landing on the Black Warrior River, the 11,163-square-foot facility includes storage space for the team's equipment and is coupled with brand-new facilities at the Presidential Village. The Presidential Village includes locker rooms, lounge, athletics training facilities and coaches' offices as well as an ergometer suite that overlooks the Black Warrior River. The Black Warrior River, blessed with high banks, long, protected straightaways, and minimal current, provides Alabama one of the best practice and competitive courses in the nation. The Tide is also fortunate that the river is dotted with prime viewing areas for dual meets and regattas, including The Park at Manderson Landing, which sits near the finish line of most UA home events. With its multi-tiered slope down to the edge of the river, the park is a natural 'stadium' for cheering on the Tide.

THE SARAH PATTERSON CHAMPIONS PLAZA

The Sarah Patterson Champions Plaza, located between Coleman Coliseum and Sewell-Thomas Stadium and dedicated on October 4, 2013, features marble slabs highlighting all of the Crimson Tide's varsity sports other than football and includes a listing of all of UA's NCAA and Southeastern Conference team titles. The plaza also honors the Tide's national champion coaches for all sports outside of football - Sarah Patterson (gymnastics), Mic Potter (women's golf), Patrick Murphy (softball) and Jay Seawell (men's golf). The plaza is named for former UA gymnastics coach Sarah

Patterson, who along with her husband and assistant coach David Patterson, won six NCAA titles during their 36-year career at the University. Sarah Patterson, Potter, Murphy and Seawell all won national titles during an exciting four-year period (2009-14) that saw Alabama claim two national football championships, two gymnastics titles, two NCAA men's golf titles and championships in women's golf and softball.

THE BILL BATTLE ACADEMIC CENTER AT PAUL W. BRYANT HALL

Since opening in 1965, Bryant Hall has been a part of many historic events in the life of University of Alabama athletics. In 2005, the venerable building was transformed into the Crimson Tide's Academic Center. The renovation converted Bryant Hall into a state-of-the-art academic facility covering 52,300 square feet and featuring the most modern technology to benefit all UA student-athletes. Formally re-dedicated on April 22, 2005, The Bill Battle Academic Center (BBAC) serves as the home of the Crimson Tide's full-service academic facility. Bryant Hall boasts a 48-seat computer lab as well as math, English and writing labs along with 40 individual study rooms. A pair of 50-seat classrooms and a 140-seat lecture hall are also available. There are 16 information stations throughout the building that can provide student-athletes with news about tutorials, study sessions and practice schedules. There are several student lounges, giving student-athletes a more relaxed place to gather and study. Connected to Bryant Hall is Bryant Sports Grille which includes The Bryant Bistro, a full-scale coffee cafe featuring Starbucks Coffee, espresso and smoothies. The bistro also offers pastries, Einstein Brothers Bagels and gourmet desserts. With sports-themed pictures adorning the walls and flat-screen televisions keeping everyone up-to-date on the latest sporting events, Bryant Sports Grille is a social hub as much as a dining hall. The Crimson Tide Academic Hall of Fame, located in the Academic Center lobby, features plaques recognizing all Alabama's Academic All-Americans beautifully housed and displayed in the entry area. One of the latest enhancements to the Bill Battle Academic Center came in the 2013-14 academic year, when the Susan and Gaylon McCollough A-Club Career and Leadership Development Center opened. The center, located on the second floor of Bryant Hall, is a place where Alabama student-athletes can hone the skills necessary to take the next step in their lives. The center and its staff help student-athletes learn everything from creating a resume to utilizing social media in a professional way to how to interview and network effectively. *A*

STUDENT WELFARE



The secret behind academic success for Alabama student-athletes is Alabama's Bill Battle Academic Center (BBAC), located in Bryant Hall and headed by Senior Associate Athletics Director, Student Services Jon Dever. From the moment a recruit first walks onto the campus to the moment a student-athlete graduates with diploma in hand, comprehensive academic service is available.

During their first year at the Capstone, freshmen and junior college transfers are required to attend nightly study halls. After that, the attendance is based on the individual's grade point average and study needs. The BBAC staff works as a liaison between the athletics department and the University's undergraduate divisions and administrative office. The BBAC staff offers career advice and counseling, ensures that all athletes are maintaining satisfactory progress toward a degree, and monitors academic eligibility. Academic coordinators supervise tutorial services, schedule study sessions, and coordinate all other aspects of BBAC's academic enrichment program.

All of these services begin with the recruit's first visit. The advisors set up individual appointments within the department of the recruit's area of study and accompany the prospect to the meeting. They give the recruit a tour of the campus and summarize services provided by BBAC. Alabama's BBAC staff will provide student-athletes with every opportunity to achieve their highest goals.

COMPREHENSIVE PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

The NCAA Life Skills initiative is committed to the total development of student-athletes, preparing them with "life skills" that are useful throughout the college experience and after graduation. Previously known as CHAMPS/Life Skills, the student-athlete development program was modeled after the "Total Person Project" established by Dr. Homer Rice, longtime athletics director at Georgia Institute of Technology.

The Life Skills initiative stems from the belief that excellence is a result of a balanced life including academic achievement, athletic success and personal wellbeing – core values that the Crimson Tide coaches and staff strive to bring to their everyday interaction with student-athletes.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

The Crimson Tide focuses on supporting student-athletes in all aspects of their academic success. University of Alabama student-athletes have the best resources at their fingertips in Alabama's Bill Battle Academic Center, located in Bryant Hall. That support has helped Crimson Tide student-athletes excel at the highest levels, including leading the nation in CoSIDA Academic All-America honors since 2010 with 88 and an NCAA-best 11 in 2017-18.

ATHLETICS EXCELLENCE

From highly qualified coaches and support staffs to top-notch facilities, Alabama student-athletes are provided all the tools needed to compete at the highest level. That support has resulted in 11 national championships and 24 SEC team titles since 2008.



LIFE SKILLS

Established by the pillars of service, commitment, and impact, the mission of the Alabama Athletics' Life Skills program is to provide student-athletes with opportunities for growth through personal development and service initiatives, empowering Crimson Tide student-athletes to be difference makers and people of positive influence as they pursue success at Alabama and beyond.

The Life Skills program assists student-athletes with developing their own unique identity, building fiscal responsibility, and engaging in diverse experiences with the purpose of promoting an inclusive environment. Additionally, the program focuses on facilitating community outreach opportunities, encouraging student-athletes to utilize their platform to make a difference in the local communities, showing gratitude for all the support they provide to the university and athletics.

DRIVE FOR SUCCESS

Alabama Athletics' DRIVE for Success Career and Leadership Development program is an innovative and dynamic initiative that celebrated its fourth year in 2017-18. Dedication, Responsibility, Influence, Vision, and Excellence are the program's values, highlighted through the DRIVE acronym. Its mission is to actively support professional and leadership growth of current and former Crimson Tide student-athletes through practical education and comprehensive programming in preparation for success in life.

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Located in the heart of the Bill Battle Academic Center, the Susan and Gaylon McCollough A-Club Career and Leadership Development Center opened in the fall of 2013. Many aspects of the DRIVE For Success program occur in the center, such as resume development, interview preparation, employer information sessions, as well as creating individualized career game plans. Additional program workshops and events, such as a student-athlete specific career fair, networking with alumni, and a transition series for seniors provides student-athletes with the opportunity to hone the skills necessary to take the next step in their lives.

LEADERSHIP GROWTH

Student-Athlete Advisory Committee – The Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) includes representatives from all 17 sports programs and is dedicated to serving as the voice of Alabama student-athletes to enhance their overall experience and well-being while at the Capstone. SAAC leaders provide education and information to their peers as the team liaison to the Athletic Department, the SEC, and the NCAA, while also engaging their teammates in valuable opportunities that promote academic excellence, personal development, and community involvement.

Emerging Tide Leaders Academy – The Emerging Tide Leaders Academy is an elite two-year leadership development program designed to cultivate and strengthen crucial leadership skills of select student-athletes through curriculum facilitation,



empowerment of their leadership ability, and encouragement to actively engage learned skills in their everyday environment.

SPORTS MEDICINE VISION STATEMENT

The University of Alabama Sports Medicine Program provides injury prevention, care and rehabilitation services and athletics education of recognized excellence to every student-athlete. The program is committed to becoming a national leader in sports medicine services.

Already one of the nation's best, The University of Alabama Athletics Life Skills program continued to build on its three main pillars – service, commitment and impact – throughout the 2017-18 academic year. Under the direction of Jessie Gardner, Assistant Athletics Director, Student-Athlete Enhancement, and Joe Suiter, Coordinator of Life Skills and Community Outreach, the Crimson Tide's Life Skills initiative forged an increasingly close working bond with Alabama's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) and the Crimson Tide DRIVE for Success program to the betterment of all three organizations.

Through a robust community outreach schedule, the Life Skills and SAAC programs continued to provide student-athletes at The University of Alabama chances for growth through service opportunities. The intent is to empower our student-athletes to be difference makers and people of positive influence as they pursue success at Alabama and beyond.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

In the community, Alabama teams participated in more than 185 projects between August and March, tallying more than 2,854 hours of outreach, impacting an estimated 12,900-plus people in West Alabama. The Athletics Department's community outreach efforts were also recognized during the annual Crimson Choice Awards. Individually, Mac Hereford (football) and Virginia Dodenhoff (rowing) earned the Tide's Heart of Service Award while tennis was the women's team with the most community outreach hours and football earned the honor for the men. Every Alabama team makes a difference in the community around them in one way or another,

whether it's providing a positive role model for the Tide's younger fans, espousing the importance of reading to elementary school students, visiting a senior living facility or any of the many projects that Alabama student-athletes undertake each year.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY BUILDS

In the heat of September and October, seven Alabama teams took part in the Crimson Tide's annual Habitat for Humanity builds, a pair of two-day events where 60-plus student-athletes helped build homes for Tuscaloosa residents. This annual event began as a result of the aftermath of the 2011 tornado. The Tide's rowing, softball and men's and women's track and field teams were all represented during the first weekend while rowing, softball, track and field, men's and women's tennis as well as gymnastics took part in the opportunities in October painting siding, building shelves, helping assemble the foundation, and constructing a safe room in case of another tornado. In March, 30 members of the Alabama football team, in conjunction with the Nick's Kids Foundation, Nick and Terry Saban's philanthropy, took part in a work day, helping build Nick's Kids 17th Habitat house, in honor of the Crimson Tide's 17 national football titles.

POWER OF PINK

The University of Alabama Athletics Department continued its annual Power of Pink campaign in 2017-18. Since 2009, Alabama Athletics has developed Power of Pink initiatives for all women's sports to raise the awareness of and support in the fight against breast cancer among students and fans. While the Power of Pink initially began in 2004 with legendary Alabama gymnastics coach



Sarah Patterson, the program now includes the full spectrum of the Crimson Tide's women's teams - including soccer, volleyball, cross country, basketball, tennis, rowing, softball, swimming and diving and track and field - with events in the fall, winter and spring.

HALLOWEEN EXTRAVAGANZA

Life Skills and SAAC combined to host Alabama's 15th Halloween Extravaganza in the Hank Crisp Indoor Football Facility in 2017. The annual event, which sees area children pack the indoor practice field, provides the Tuscaloosa community with a fun-filled, supervised opportunity to celebrate the holiday and engage with some of their favorite Alabama student-athletes. Crimson Tide student-athletes were hands-on in coordinating the event that brought more than 2,100 people together, almost double the total from the year before, including more than 250 UA student-athletes. Each team hosted activities in a night that also included a bounce house, an inflated slide and a Big Al sighting.

PROJECT ANGEL TREE HOLIDAY PARTY

Alabama Athletics took part in Project Angel Tree for the 26th consecutive year in 2017, making it one of the longest-tenured groups to do so in the state. In another joint venture, the Life Skills program and SAAC worked together to coordinate an interactive event for the children. The 2017 event was held at Bryant-Denny Stadium which included a tour for the children in attendance. The kids and families also had the opportunity to face paint, decorate sugar cookies, take pictures with Santa, spend time with student-

athletes, utilize virtual reality headsets, play a game of golf and compete against student-athletes in Twister. The student-athletes donated money, shopped for and wrapped Christmas gifts for local children, with all the Crimson Tide's teams participating in the outreach project.

ALABAMA ATHLETICS UNITY PROJECT

In addition to the outstanding work that individual University of Alabama Athletics teams do in the community through the Crimson Tide's Life Skills program and Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC), the athletics department made the decision to embark on a year-round unity project that includes student-athletes, coaches and staff to help make an even greater difference in the community.

With that in mind, in the fall of 2017, during SAAC meetings, the group, along with members of the staff, discussed potential ways for student-athletes to use their platform to make an impact, promote positive dialogue and illustrate respect, tolerance, acceptance and compassion in the community. During that meeting then-junior football student-athlete Joshua Casher spoke up about Alberta Head Start. After hearing Casher's passion for AHS, the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee voted unanimously to partner with Alberta Head Start for a unity project as part of Alabama's diversity and inclusion initiatives.

"I believe the importance of the project is to make a difference in the lives of our youth," Casher said. "One thing about it I know, not everyone is granted the opportunity to have the resources to achieve

the greatness they set out for in their lives. I believe, through doing this project, it will give the kids a chance. I believe the project means that somebody cares. That someone is willing to show interest in them and let them know they are not left behind. To let them see a greater side of Alabama, not just the football program, the basketball team or the athletic department, but the university as a whole is showing an interest in them and caring about them."

The Crimson Tide's involvement with Alberta Head Start includes, but is not limited to, helping in both the classroom and the cafeteria, reading programs, facility projects, field days and donation drives.

"The ownership our student-athletes have taken and passion they've shown towards this project and the students and staff of Alberta Head Start is quite special," said Alabama Director of Athletics Greg Byrne. "This all came about because of our student-athletes, and our staff is extremely proud of the way they've chosen to use their platforms. What a great way for the Crimson Tide to make a positive impact, not only in the present, but also for years to come, in our community."

Alberta Head Start, through the Community Service Programs of West Alabama, Inc., provides educational services to approximately 150 children between the ages of six weeks and five years. The program is geared toward educating children from low-income homes and/or those with disabilities. *A*

2017-18 HIGHLIGHTS

- Alabama won its 27th national title during the 2017-18 academic year and 17th in football.
- A total of nine Alabama teams finished their competitive season in the national top 15, either via ranking or actual NCAA postseason finish, including six that finished in the top 10. The Crimson Tide football team advanced to the College Football Playoff for the fourth consecutive year and won its second CFP title, 17th national championship and fifth since 2009. The men's and women's golf teams both finished second at the NCAA championships and men's track and field team was ninth indoors and fifth outdoors at NCAAs. The gymnastics team finished eighth in the nation, extending its streak of top-10 national finishes to 36. The men's swimming and diving finished 13th at their NCAA championships. The men's cross country team was 14th at the NCAA championships while softball finished 14th.
- The Crimson Tide football team, the only team to earn a berth in the College Football Playoff in each of the CFP's first four years, was one of 16 Crimson Tide teams to earn national berths, a list that also included NCAA postseason appearances by men's basketball, men's cross country, men's golf, women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's swimming and diving, women's swimming and diving, men's tennis, men's indoor track and field, women's indoor track and field, men's outdoor track and field, women's outdoor track and field and a WNIT appearances by women's basketball, respectively.
- Since 2008, Alabama teams have combined to win 24 SEC team championships in seven sports - five in football, four in men's golf, four in gymnastics, four in softball, three in women's golf, two in men's cross country and one each in men's indoor track & field and women's tennis.

The University of Alabama Athletics Department posted its best finishes ever in the two all-sports rankings for college athletics - the Learfield Sports Director's Cup and the Capital One Cup.

The Crimson Tide ranked 14th in the Learfield Director's Cup for the 2017-18 academic year, marking the 10th year in a row that Alabama has earned a place among the top 35. Alabama's finish was also 11 spots better than its finish the year before.

The Learfield Sports Directors' Cup standings, begun in the 1993-94 academic year, encompass the combined men's and women's programs.

Alabama finished the 2017-18 academic year ranked 14th out of 293 schools in the all-sports rankings. In the Directors' Cup, 20 total teams (10 men and 10 women) can be scored for the final standings. The Crimson Tide has 21 teams (nine men and 12 women) in 17 sports programs. In contrast, Stanford, this year's winner and the winner of the last 23 Directors' Cups, fields 37 total varsity teams. Alabama scored 405.75 points in the spring, 320.75 points in the winter standings, and 186.5 points in the fall in the Learfield rankings.

The Crimson Tide had 15 of its teams score points, eight of which placed within the top 10 of their respective categories. Football led the way, scoring 100 points for the national championship finish, while men's and women's golf collected 90 points apiece for their runner-up finishes. Other sports scoring included men's track & field in both outdoors (74.25) and indoors (69) gymnastics (68.25), men's tennis (64), softball (64), men's swimming & diving

(63), men's cross country (61.5), men's basketball (50), women's swimming & diving (44), women's indoor track & field (26.5), soccer (25) and women's outdoor track & field (23.5).

The Tide was one of seven Southeastern Conference schools to finish this year's list in the top 20, three better than the Pac 12, Big 12 and ACC, which tied for second with four teams each.

Alabama's men finished a program-best second in the final 2017-18 Capital One Cup standings while the women were 39th. The men's tally of 80 points came on the strength of top-10 finishes in football (first), golf (second) and track and field - (ninth indoors/fifth outdoors), while the women's 15 points came after top-10 finishes in women's golf (second) and gymnastics (eighth).

Points toward the Capital One Cup are based on final standings of NCAA Championships and final official coaches' polls. The Capital One Cup counts only top-10 national finishes and uses a tiered points system. That tiered system awards greater value to "marquee sports" (football, basketball, etc.) and lesser value to others.

Under the Capital One system, 106 NCAA Division I men's teams and 92 women's teams earned points during the 2017-18 academic year.

Five years ago, the Tide's women's teams posted what remains their highest finish in the Capital One Cup standings, taking third place following the 2011-12 season - led by NCAA team titles in gymnastics, women's golf and softball. Overall, Alabama has won 11 national team titles since 2009, including five in football. *A*



The official University of Alabama Athletics Department website, RollTide.com, features a number of different ways for fans to follow the Crimson Tide. The website provides the most up-to-date information about Alabama athletics through press releases, recaps, statistics and coach and player interviews. Alabama also provides mobile device applications, for both Apple and Android devices, allowing fans access to information about the Tide at their fingertips.

The latest redesign of RollTide.com, the official website of The University of Alabama Athletics Department, was unveiled in July of 2016. The the current iteration of RollTide.com is highlighted by enhanced imagery, featured student-athletes and simplified navigation. Information for events as well as information and statistics on coaches and student-athletes is easily accessible with the consistent look and open feel. Game-specific stats, videos, photos and stories are grouped together on the front page as well as the schedule to make everything easy to find. Rosters include links to stories and videos about that specific coach or student-athlete.

The responsive layout offers fans the flexibility of accessing the site on any size device, making all content available regardless of how the site is being viewed. Up-to-date schedules, rosters and stories can be accessed at any time.

Additionally, fans have access to new featured videos for free throughout the year, including practice footage and one-on-one interviews. Buttons to share these videos with friends via social media are available for each. The design is structured in such a way to put the Tide's teams, student-athletes, coaches and championship tradition front and center in an online environment that provides fans with a treasure trove of Alabama-centric information, news, videos and photos.

RollTide.com ranked as one of the top athletics websites in the country in viewership. Through one of the most successful eras in school history, with the Crimson Tide earning 11 national titles since 2009, the UA athletics website has generated page impressions in the 10s of millions per year, while producing millions upon millions of unique browser impressions. *A*

EXCELLENCE IN WOMEN'S ATHLETICS



The University of Alabama officially began its foray into women's intercollegiate athletics in 1974 when five sports were added to the varsity list. Basketball, golf, gymnastics, swimming and diving and volleyball made up the initial Crimson Tide women's sports roster, competing for the first time during the 1974-75 academic year.

Tennis joined the department in 1975, before cross country and indoor and outdoor track and field were added prior to the 1977-78 school year. Soccer was added in 1982 but was dropped as a varsity sport in 1989 before being reinstated in 1994. Volleyball also took a brief break from varsity competition when it was dropped as a varsity sport in 1982, before being reinstated in 1989. Softball was the 11th women's sport added to the UA varsity platform prior to the 1996-97 school year, making its first appearance in the spring of 1997.

The most recent addition to the Alabama athletics department belongs to the rowing team when it was added in 2006-07. Prior to beginning its seventh season as a varsity sport in 2011-12, the rowing program received funding for the full allotment of 20 scholarships by the institution. With rowing reaching fully funded status, all 21 varsity sports at Alabama are fully funded in athletics scholarships, based on the maximum allowed by NCAA rules.

With 12 women's varsity teams at Alabama, the University had 248 female student-athletes competing for the school during the 2017-18 academic year. To complement the participation of women's

sports, Alabama provides 185 athletics scholarships to its female student-athletes.

The Crimson Tide is in the midst of an unprecedented era of success, one that includes 11 national championships from 2009-18, four of which came from the Crimson Tide women. In 2011-12 alone – during which the University won four national championships, the most of any NCAA Division I school that year – three of the Crimson Tide's four were won by women's teams. That season, the gymnastics team captured its second consecutive NCAA title and sixth overall. The women's golf team became the first program at the Capstone outside of football and gymnastics to win a national title. The Tide closed that magical season with the softball team making the Women's College World Series for the eighth time and winning its first national title.

Alabama's women continued to roll in 2017-18, producing a pair of top-eight national finishes, including a second-place finish in women's golf and a eighth-place finish in gymnastics. Softball finished 14th nationally in 2018 and remains the only school to advance to the Super Regional round of the NCAA tournament every year since its inception. Soccer earned its first NCAA tournament bid since 2011, while swimming and diving as well as indoor and outdoor track and field all scored at their respective NCAA championships. Women's basketball once again earned a WNIT berth and advanced to the quarterfinals. Individually, 22 Crimson Tide women earned All-America honors in five different sports during 2017-18.

On a conference basis, gymnastics earned its 20th top-three finish at the league championship in 2018 with a runner-up finish while golf advanced to the semifinals of the SEC tournament. Alabama's women have won 17 Southeastern Conference team titles since 2000 with 11 of those coming over the last eight years. Overall, Crimson Tide women have won 27 SEC titles in seven different sports.

In the classroom, every women's program earned over a 3.0 team grade point average in 2017-18, with nine squads averaging over a 3.5, paced by tennis' 3.97. Tennis also led the way in the spring with an astonishing 4.0 team GPA.

Individually, seven Tide women earned Academic All-America honors in 2017-18, including Mackenzie Brannan (gymnastics), Andie Daniell (tennis), Kristen Gillman (golf), Bailey Hemphill (softball), Temarie Tomley (swimming and diving) and Emma Welch (soccer). Brannan also earned both SEC and NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships.

Alabama's women have been especially prolific when it comes to the CoSIDA Academic All-America At-Large team, which spans 14 different sports. Over the last five years, the Tide has earned 14 spots on the at-large team, more than all but one other school has earned when it comes to men's and women's honors combined. Alabama was also the first school to have four women (the maximum) earn at-large honors in a single year (2014) and the first to have four student-athletes earn at-large honors in a single year more than once (2014 and 2018).

Attendance has continued to be strong for a number of women's sports at the University. In 2018, the gymnastics team once again averaged more than 11,000 fans per meet during the regular season at Coleman Coliseum. The gymnasts' average attendance of 11,013 was the fourth highest among all women's collegiate sports during 2017-18. Softball stretched its streak as the NCAA attendance leader to 11 straight seasons, welcoming a school-record 73,942 fans to Rhoads Stadium in 2018, an average of 2,957 per game. In its second season back playing its games in Coleman Coliseum, basketball averaged 2,052 fans per home game, including a season-best 4,179 fans that piled into Coleman Coliseum to see Alabama down Jacksonville. *A*

TOP PERFORMERS

TAMARA CLARK - TRACK & FIELD



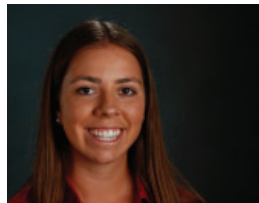
Tamara Clark came out of the blocks strong to start her Crimson Tide career, earning All-America honors during the 2018 indoor and outdoor seasons. She also garnered All-SEC honors in both the 100 and 200 meters during the outdoor season, joining Pauline Davis (1987, 1989) as the only women in UA history to earn All-SEC honors in the 100 and 200 in the same season. Clark also broke the school record in the 100 meters with a time of 11.02 at the SEC Championships.

ANDIE DANIELL - TENNIS



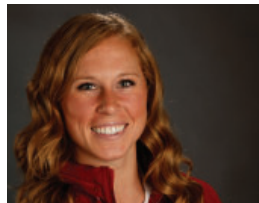
Firing on all cylinders throughout her junior season, Andie Daniell earned First Team All-SEC honors in 2018 on the way to earning CoSIDA Academic All-America honors in the classroom as well as a place on the SEC Community Service Team. She finished her third UA season with a 26-9 singles mark and a 19-14 doubles tally. A three-year ITA Scholar-Athlete, Daniell has been nationally ranked in both singles and doubles during her career.

KRISTEN GILLMAN - GOLF



Kristen Gillman followed a stellar rookie season that included Women's Golf Coaches Association and Golfweek First Team All-America as well as Southeastern Conference Women's Golf Freshman of the Year honors with an even better sophomore season in 2018. Gillman earned First Team All-America honors for the second year in a row, adding CoSIDA Academic All-America accolades to the mix. After helping Alabama to a runner-up finish at the NCAA Championships, she went on to help the United States win both the Curtis and Palmer Cups. In July, Gillman became the first UA women's golfer to win a professional event playing as an amateur capturing the Century 21 Ladies' Tournament in Japan.

BAILEY SCOTT - SWIMMING & DIVING



In the last race of her final Crimson Tide season, Bailey Scott broke not one, but two school records on the way to scoring at the NCAA Championships. As the lead off leg of Alabama's 400 freestyle relay, she bettered her own school mark in the 100 freestyle, while also leading the Tide to a new school mark in the relay. A four-time All-American and a finalist for the Honda Inspiration Award, Scott ended her career as the school record holder in two individual events and as part of four relays.



LAUREN STEPHENSON - GOLF



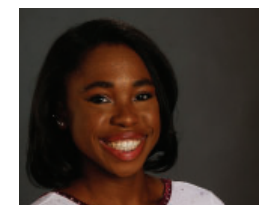
Already a great player coming into her junior season, Lauren Stephenson was dominant in 2018, earning the Golfstat Cup with the lowest average in collegiate women's golf on the way to being named the Golfweek Player of the Year. A First Team WGCA and Golfweek All-American, Stephenson led Alabama to a runner-up finish at the NCAA Championships before helping the United States to wins in both the Curtis Cup and Palmer Cup. Stephenson's 69.76 scoring average is an Alabama record for a single season. She also set five other UA season records in 2018.

KAYLEE TOW - SOFTBALL



Kaylee Tow made an immediate impact on collegiate softball, earning National Fastpitch Coaches Association, All-America honors as a rookie in 2018, becoming the 11th UA player to earn the accolade as a freshman and the first since 2015. Tow also earned NFCA All-South Region, First Team All-SEC and SEC All-Freshman recognition during her inaugural UA campaign. The outfielder started 55 of the team's 56 games in 2018, leading the Tide in hits and runs.

KIANA WINSTON - GYMNASTICS



Kiana Winston closed out her Crimson Tide career as an 11-time All-American, a four-year Scholastic All-American as well as an individual Southeastern Conference and NCAA regional champion. In her last routine in Coleman Coliseum, Winston clinched Alabama's 36th consecutive NCAA Championship appearance with a regional balance beam title. In addition to her numerous other accolades, she earned the 2018 Paul W. Bryant Award, which goes UA's top student-athlete.

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MISSION

The Crimson Tide Foundation was established in February 2005 to benefit The University of Alabama's athletics department. Its purpose is to promote and encourage a continuing interest in, and loyalty to, the intercollegiate athletics programs at The University of Alabama; to support the staff of the University's Department of Athletics in their efforts to coordinate, develop, maintain and improve a superior intercollegiate athletics program at the University.

IMPACT

Since its inception, the Crimson Tide Foundation has raised over \$275,000,000 through gifts and pledges. During the 2017-18 fiscal year, in excess of \$44,000,000 was raised from over 3,400 gifts and new pledges supporting priority funding areas such as buildings and facilities, athletics excellence and endowed scholarships. Additionally, during 2017-2018, over \$32,000,000 was generated from TIDE PRIDE contributions. The combined fundraising total for Alabama Athletics during 2017-18 exceeded \$77 million.

The Crimson Tide Scholarship Fund (CTSF) provides UA Athletics with annual scholarship support. Private funding of scholarships is necessary to provide our student-athletes with the best opportunities for learning and personal growth at The University of Alabama. In order to provide the maximum number of scholarships allowed by the NCAA, Alabama Athletics funds over \$19 million in scholarship expenses. After graduation, our student-athletes'

unparalleled experiences through Alabama Athletics combined with their education from the Capstone provide the tools necessary to be successful in their chosen professions and make a positive impact in their communities.

The annual support from the donors who support the Crimson Tide Scholarship Fund is an important piece of the revenue structure to fund the \$19 million annual scholarship expense. In 2017-18, over 2,400 contributions generated \$1,500,000 for the CTSF.

FUTURE GROWTH

Maintaining and improving the 16 athletics buildings and facilities is essential to the experiences of both our student-athletes and fans who support our teams on game days. The stadiums, practice facilities, complexes and arenas are constantly in use and always in need of improvements and general maintenance. The Athletics Department buildings and facilities serve the training and competition needs of our approximately 600 student-athletes each day. Additionally, the quality of our infrastructure enhances our coaches' ability to recruit the top athletes to The University of Alabama.

Since the inception of the Crimson Tide Foundation, athletics facilities improvements on campus have been substantial, impacting many of our sports, including football, softball, soccer, tennis, golf, men's and women's basketball, rowing and baseball. Additionally, renovations to the Mal M. Moore Athletic Facility including the

Strength and Conditioning Center and new Athletics Dining Facility provide support and services to student-athletes from all of our sports.

The buildings and facilities in which our student-athletes train, practice and compete are vital to attract and retain the best student-athletes and provide the support needed for our teams to compete for championships. Alabama Athletics will be embarking on a 10-year, comprehensive initiative focused on renovating our facilities and developing an infrastructure that will drive success in the future. **The Crimson Standard: A Capital Initiative for Alabama Athletics** will universally impact Alabama Athletics. The initiative will include varying levels of updates and renovations to nearly all of Alabama Athletics' facilities, keeping the Tide at the forefront of collegiate athletics and enhancing both the fans' game-day experience and our student-athletes' time at the Capstone.

SCHOLARSHIPS/ENDOWMENTS

Alabama Athletics is committed to offering the full number of scholarships authorized by the NCAA to our approximately 600 student-athletes. Each year, mounting tuition and housing costs place greater pressures on the athletics department. UA Athletics currently funds approximately \$19 million annually for student-athlete scholarships in 21 sports. However, the cost of tuition continues to rise dramatically. Keeping pace with the increasing scholarship costs is critical to remaining competitive on a national level. In such a climate, private giving in the area of scholarship support is important to the future financial health of the department.

ESTABLISHING A NEW SCHOLARSHIP OR GIVING TO AN EXISTING SCHOLARSHIP

Endowments are gifts that keep on giving. Endowments are invested by the University and a portion of the earnings provides annual scholarship support. The remaining earnings are reinvested to grow the endowment over time and to provide scholarship support in perpetuity. Endowed scholarships cover tuition, educational fees, books, and room and board for our student-athletes.



HISTORY

During Dr. Robert Witt's tenure as president, he supported Alabama Athletics with a keen understanding that a powerful program only enhances the overall goal of making the University foremost in education with the finest academic and student facilities possible.

"The commitment to improving all athletic facilities is a never-ending process," said former UA Director of Athletics Mal Moore, who spearheaded the task of providing student-athletes with the best possible venues to compete in the nation's most difficult conference.

Prior to 2002, the athletics department had never raised funds through donors to maintain and build new facilities or to endow scholarships. That changed with the implementation of the Crimson

Tradition Capital Campaign for Athletics. Three years later, the Crimson Tide Foundation was established to help ensure that the University maintains the level of excellence expected by its supporters for years to come.

The athletics department at The University of Alabama is self-supporting; all private gifts contribute directly to the needs of our student-athletes, coaches and staff. Therefore, the Crimson Tide Foundation provides a venue through which loyal alumni, fans and friends can give financial support to the athletics department.

Private support enables UA Athletics to increase its standing, in both athletics and academics, over competing universities beyond what can be accomplished with annual revenue from ticket sales, media rights and other licensing agreements. *A*

Anything that happens in Alabama Athletics is immediately newsworthy throughout the state, region and nation. The interest generated by Crimson Tide athletics teams provides immeasurable exposure for The University of Alabama as a whole while serving as a symbol of excellence for the state.

The University of Alabama's Department of Athletics Communications guides the messaging and strategic communications efforts of the entire Department of Athletics. The communications department also ensures that accurate, important and timely information is distributed to news media throughout the state and nation.

The Department of Athletics Communications works diligently to create a cooperative atmosphere that encourages and facilitates coverage by a variety of nationally prominent media outlets. Crimson Tide athletics has a global reach, thanks in no small part to the efforts of the Athletics Communications staff, via Alabama's social media outlets via [RollTide.com](#), Facebook, Twitter and Instagram.

Athletics Communications staff members work every UA home sporting event while also providing statistical information, game notes and personal insight on all UA student-athletes to the media, as well as historical perspective and strategic communications advice to all UA coaches and staff members. The staff works closely with Alabama's athletics marketing department, Crimson Tide Productions, Crimson Tide Sports Marketing and the Crimson Tide Sports Network to ensure that an expansive mix of athletics events are available for Crimson Tide fans across Alabama, the nation and

the world. The Athletics Communications office also serves as the backbone of the athletics department's crisis response initiatives as the staff works with local, regional and national media outlets and journalists as part of its layered coverage efforts.

During the 2017-18 athletics year, the Department of Athletics Communications produced more than 1,500 news releases; arranged more than 1,700 interviews with news media; and provided daily strategic media advice for Alabama's approximately 600 student-athletes.

GUIDANCE FOR THE GRAND STAGE

As the Crimson Tide grows exponentially more popular on communications platforms that didn't even exist five years ago, it becomes increasingly imperative that its students, coaches and staff understand how to properly present themselves in all aspects of the collegiate experience. In today's age of constant connectivity, the Athletics Communications department's role in preparing individuals and teams for the new reality is a vital part of Alabama Athletics' ongoing success. To that end, members of The University of Alabama Athletics Communications staff are constantly teaching, guiding and mentoring each member of the overall program on how to present their best selves – in public, to the media and in the vastness of social media. These efforts start the day each student steps on campus and come in a multitude of ways – including classroom settings with experts in their field brought in to address particular subjects – to the informal conversations that occur during time on the road or around practices.



THE SEC NETWORK

Already one of the nation's most popular sports entities, the advent of the SEC Network in August of 2014 has given The University of Alabama Athletics Department an incredible partner in growing the exposure of all the Crimson Tide's teams and students. The Athletics Communications staff has worked hand-in-hand with the flourishing network to provide Alabama fans around the world a window into the Crimson Tide nation.

The SEC Network has enjoyed tremendous success through its first three years. After just 11 months, the Network had 70 million subscribers and was carried nationally by nine of the top 10 cable providers in the country. The Network's initial goal was to carry 1,000 live events in year one. When the last contest came to a close for the 2014-15 season, more than 1,500 events were available nationwide, a feat it repeated in year two and bumped up to 1,600 in year three.

The SEC Network is also now available in more than 50 countries throughout Europe, Middle East and Africa via ESPN Player, ESPN's sports streaming service in the region. In addition to long-term deals with 9 of 10 top cable providers, SEC Network is now available in every multi-channel streaming subscription service currently in the marketplace – DIRECTV Now, Playstation Vue, Sling TV, Hulu and YouTube TV

SOARING ON SOCIAL MEDIA

Social media is one of the tools the Alabama Athletics Communications Office uses to further the Crimson Tide's message to the world. The Crimson Tide has quickly become

one of the dominant forces in all of collegiate athletics when it comes to Twitter, Facebook and Instagram. At the end of the 2017-18 academic year, Alabama was once again one of just two schools to rank in the top 10 when it comes to both its athletics department and football Twitter accounts. In 2017-18, the Tide ranked in the top 25 in 15 of its accounts No. 1 in four - softball, men's golf, women's golf and gymnastics - and in the top-10 in six more - football (No. 4), women's tennis (No. 4), track and field/cross country (No. 4), rowing (No. 6), main account (No. 7) and swimming and diving (No. 10). During the fall of 2014, Alabama became the first school to have both its athletics department (AlabamaAthletics) and football Facebook accounts (AlabamaFTBL) earn more than a million likes.

WRITING AND PUBLICATIONS ACCOLADES

The University of Alabama's Athletics Communications Department has consistently garnered national recognition for excellence in publications and writing by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). Over the last dozen years, the department has earned more than 25 citations for excellence for both its publications and writing, including more than a dozen "Best In The Nation" citations from CoSIDA. The Crimson Tide's yearly award tally routinely ranks in the top five among all Division I CoSIDA schools. *A*

MARKETING & LICENSING



The impact and influence of athletics marketing has never been more evident than in the current era of Alabama Athletics. The Crimson Tide's passionate fan base has largely earned a national reputation for devotion based on its following of UA football.

In recent years, that devotion and passion has become evident across the board as the seven Alabama sports that require tickets for admission (football, men's basketball, women's basketball, baseball, softball, gymnastics and volleyball) sold more than 1,000,000 tickets, generating in excess of \$39 million in ticket revenue during the 2017-18 athletics year. Overall, among its 17 sports programs, Alabama Athletics welcomed well over a million fans to its home events in 2017-18.

The 17-time national champion Crimson Tide football team saw 712,053 fans pack Bryant-Denny Stadium (capacity: 101,821) over the course of seven home games. Men's basketball entertained 227,640 total fans for an average home attendance of 13,391 which is a program record and included five sellout crowds in 2017-18. The six-time NCAA champion gymnastics team averaged 11,016 fans per meet, once again ranking the Tide in the top five in the nation among all women's collegiate programs. Alabama continues to lead the nation in softball attendance, drawing with 57,825 fans 20 home games at Rhoads Stadium in 2018. The average home attendance for softball of 3,043 this season set not only a program but NCAA Division I record which was also previously held by Alabama Softball.

In its second season back in Coleman Coliseum, the women's basketball team averaged 2,359 fans per home game in 2017-18 including a season-best 4,179 fans that were on hand to see the Tide beat Jacksonville in the annual 5th Grade Fast Break game.

Baseball hosted 35 games in Sewell-Thomas Stadium and welcomed 111,244 fans through its gates to average 3,476 fans per game. The Tide's total attendance ranked 15th nationally.

Alabama athletics events provide the Tuscaloosa community and the state at large with consistent family-friendly attractions. Sports events at the Capstone are known for providing a quality fan experience through exciting in-venue atmospheres, enhanced fan engagement, and affordable prices.

Alabama Athletics has also embraced and continues to be on the forefront of digital marketing which includes digital display ads, social media, e-mail and mobile strategies. During the 2017-18, digital marketing accounted for almost 300 million impressions across the world, which helped in generating revenue along with building and growing the Alabama brand.

CRIMSON TIDE REWARDS PROGRAM

Completing its seventh year, the Crimson Tide Rewards program presented by Tuscaloosa Toyota allowed a record number of members the opportunity to win great prizes, including Alabama gear and exclusive fan experiences. Members earned points for each athletics event they attended and were able to utilize those points

to redeem 2,435 prizes, a program record, in recognition of their support of the Crimson Tide

OUTBOUND TICKET SALES

In its second full year of operation, the Outbound Ticket Sales department continued to advance customer service and retention initiatives while also implementing strategic sales plans. This year, the department provided a revenue impact of over \$3 million and sold over 75,000 tickets. The efforts of this department assisted in the reaching or exceeding aggressive sales goals while also contributing to several attendance records set for various sports this season.

TICKET TRANSFER

In an effort to enhance the fan experience and increase ticket utilization, Alabama Athletics eliminated ticket transfer fees just before the start of the 2017-18 men's basketball season. The change made an immediate impact during the men's basketball season as season ticket utilization increased by 14% from the previous year. Free ticket transfers are now available for all Alabama Athletics ticketed home events.

BIG AL'S KIDS CLUB

Alabama Athletics launched its free Big Al's Kids Club program during the 2017-18 season. Children 12 and under received exclusive ticket offers, experiences, giveaways and more, all by simply displaying the new Big Al's Kids Club mobile app. In just one year, membership in the program increased by 147% with the elimination of registration fees.

EXPERIENCE UPGRADES

Alabama Athletics again offered fans the opportunity to upgrade their gameday experience at several home athletic events during the 2017-18 season. Purchasers were able to secure memorable experiences such as access to the locker room tunnel as the Crimson Tide football team took the field and watching pregame warmups from the bench prior to men's basketball games. Total sales increased by 39% from the 2016-17 season – led by an A-Day mark that generated the highest single-event sales of any comparable experience program in college or professional sports.

ALABAMA'S TRADEMARK LICENSING PROGRAM

In 1981, The University of Alabama created a trademark licensing program to protect the marks and logos of the University and establish cooperative relationships with licensees and retailers to

assist in the further development of a market for officially licensed collegiate products.

Licensing revenues are directed to The University of Alabama to support scholarship programs as well as operations in other University departments. Royalties are paid by more than 500 officially licensed manufacturers that manufacture products bearing the marks and logos of The University of Alabama. The licensing program promotes a mutually beneficial relationship between the University and its licensees.

Royalty income from the licensing program is directed to The University of Alabama's National Merit Scholarships, the Paul W. Bryant Museum and the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics. The marks of The University of Alabama are controlled under a licensing program administered by IMG College Licensing. Any use of these marks requires written approval by The University of Alabama.

Between July 1, 2017 and June 30, 2018, Alabama generated over \$11.9 million dollars, its largest gross royalty collection in program history. Alabama finished the year as IMG College Licensing's No. 1 ranked institution for units sold and royalties generated. Since the program began in 1981, the University has generated over \$125,000,000 in gross royalties. *A*

MISSION AND OBJECTIVES

The purposes of The University of Alabama A-Club Alumni Association are to provide a means for the former student-athletes of The University of Alabama who earned varsity letters in any of the sports for men and women recognized by the NCAA to gather from time to time for certain social purposes, to promote the interests and mission of The University of Alabama and to support the Athletics Department, the athletics programs, and the current student-athletes of The University of Alabama.

Active (dues-paying) Members – Approximately 1,400

LEADERSHIP

The officers of the A-Club consist of the elected officers: president, president-elect, secretary-treasurer and the director of athletics or a designee from The University of Alabama Athletics Department. Each officer, with the exception of the director of athletics, serves for a two-year term from the date of his/her election. Any officer may serve more than one term if nominated and re-elected. In the event of the death or resignation of any officer, the vacancy shall be filled by the appointment of the successor for the unexpired term by the executive committee. The officers of the Association shall perform such duties as commonly pertain to their respective offices.

There is an executive committee of the association consisting of the immediate past president, president, president-elect, secretary-treasurer, president of the Alabama A-Club Educational and Charitable Foundation, director of athletics or a designee within The University of Alabama Athletics Department and 10 at-large members (at-large members include at least five different varsity men's and/or women's sports). The immediate past president of the association serves as chairman of the executive committee. Any vacancies occurring on the executive committee are filled immediately by an appointment by the executive committee. Five are replaced annually for two-year terms. The executive committee, subject to the supervision and approval of the association, has general control of the association's affairs.

CONTRIBUTIONS AND GIFT GIVING

Revenue sources for the A-Club include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Dues (\$50 per person annually)
- Meal card sales
- Donations from football lettermen for football season tickets
- A-Club Classic golf events
- Special projects as approved by the A-Club Executive Committee, e.g., "Defining Moments" DVD; 2009, 2011, 2012, and 2015 National Championship T.P. Mills putters; and A-Club Football Committee BBQ



DONATIONS MADE BY THE A-CLUB INCLUDE, BUT ARE NOT LIMITED TO, THE FOLLOWING:

- Twenty percent of annual dues revenue goes to the A-Club Educational and Charitable Foundation.
- A sizeable portion from the revenue sources listed above goes to one or more of the A-Club Endowed Scholarships. In the past seven years, more than \$1 million has been donated by the A-Club to scholarships in the names of Mal Moore, Sarah Patterson, Mic Potter, Patrick Murphy, Jay Seawell and Nick Saban.
- \$100 donations are made to the A-Club Educational and Charitable Foundation in memory of any recently deceased A-Club members.

THE A-CLUB ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

The A-Club executive committee, in conjunction with the Crimson Tide’s head coaches and Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC), voted on the The A-Club Athlete of the Year honor, presented at the annual Crimson Choice Awards in April. The A-Club also provided the trophy given for the honor.

PROGRAMS AND EVENTS

A-Club activities throughout the year include, but are not limited to, pregame meals at every home football game, reunions for all sports, the A-Club Classic golf events, the spring A-Day Weekend and various events to raise funds for endowed scholarships. Services include newsletters, e-mail blasts, the administration of the A-Club football ticket program for football lettermen, the coordination of A-Club Committees for all sports, and the A-Club website.

ALUMNI GATHERINGS AND REUNIONS

Throughout any year, the A-Club hosts alumni gatherings and/or team reunions, and the 2017-18 year was no exception.

- During the Alabama-Colorado State football weekend in mid-September, the A-Club hosted a men’s tennis reunion in the indoor tennis facility.
- At the Alabama-Ole Miss football game in late September, the 1977 SEC champion football team held a 40-year reunion.

- At the Alabama-Arkansas football game in October, the 1992 team celebrated the 25th anniversary of its national and SEC championships that came under Coach Gene Stallings..

A strong commitment to playing by the rules has seen Alabama Athletics ascend to the national forefront in rules compliance. The office of compliance works with Crimson Tide student-athletes, coaches, staff members, administrators, prospective student-athletes and their families, fans, stakeholders, benefactors and the general public. That commitment ensures adherence to NCAA rules and highlights the integrity of The University of Alabama.

The University of Alabama Athletics Compliance Department coordinates the University's NCAA compliance efforts on behalf of 21 varsity sports and approximately 600 student-athletes. The department conducts ongoing educational efforts, monitors activities and practices while constantly reviewing standards and practices to maintain and enhance compliance. Staff members routinely work with key campus partners on all compliance matters.

The compliance department focuses on The University of Alabama's core values: leadership, excellence, integrity and service. With that as its guide, the Alabama Department of Athletics strives to compete and succeed at the highest level in all sports while exhibiting the highest level of integrity.

COMMITMENT

Alabama Athletics is committed and obligated to the principle of institutional control in operating its athletics program in a manner that is consistent with the letter and spirit of NCAA, SEC and University rules and regulations.

The commitment and obligation to operate the intercollegiate athletics program in adherence to the principle of institutional control is both institutional and individual. The University is committed to maintaining control of its athletics programs through the responsible administrators, faculty and institutional bodies; to educate coaches, staff, student-athletes and other individuals involved with the athletics program in their institutional responsibilities under the rules. Also, the University is committed to developing operating systems within the athletics department and the University that provide guidance in how to work within the rules; and to discover and report any violations of rules that occur. Each individual involved in intercollegiate athletics is obligated to maintain competency in knowledge of the rules; to act within his or her realm of responsibility in full compliance with the governing legislation; and to report any violations of NCAA, conference and/or institutional rules of which he or she is aware.

MISSION

The mission of the UA Athletics Compliance Department is to function within the realm of the University's compliance structure, coordinating, monitoring and verifying compliance with all NCAA and Conference requirements, and to educate athletics department staff members, student-athletes, the various constituencies of the University and the community regarding NCAA regulations. The Athletics Compliance Office is committed to the principle of institutional control in the operation of the athletics department in a way that is consistent with the rules and regulations of the NCAA, the Southeastern Conference and the University.

The vision of the Athletics Compliance Department is recognized as one of the most comprehensive and proactive compliance programs in the areas of institutional control, education and rules violation prevention.
