Series Notes: Alabama and Texas A&M will meet for the 11th time on Saturday. The Crimson Tide leads the all-time series, 8-2, and won last year's meeting, 27-19, in College Station. Alabama has won the last five contests between the two schools, including a 33-14 win in the Aggies last visit to Tuscaloosa in 2016. Alabama head coach Nick Saban is 5-1 in his career against the Aggies, with all of the matchups occurring during his tenure at Alabama. Texas A&M's Jimbo Fisher is 0-1 all-time against the Tide, dropping a 24-7 decision in the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game on Sept. 2, 2017, to open his final season at Florida State.

RANKINGS: Alabama remains No. 1 in the Associated Press and Amway Coaches polls this week following the Tide's 62-7 win at Ole Miss last Saturday. Texas A&M moves into both the AP and Coaches polls at No. 22 this week after the Aggies improved to 2-1 with a 48-10 win over ULM.

NEXT GAME: The Crimson Tide will step out of conference to face Sun Belt foe Louisiana at Bryant-Denny Stadium on Sept. 29. The Crimson Tide leads the all-time series with the Ragin' Cajuns, 8-0, including a 7-0 mark in the state of Alabama and a 3-0 record at Bryant-Denny Stadium. The most recent meeting was Alabama's lone trip to Lafayette, La., where the Tide came away with a 25-6 victory on Oct. 6, 1990, when Louisiana was known as Southwestern Louisiana.

THE FRIENDLY CONFINES OF BRYANT-DENNY STADIUM: Alabama has won 35 of the last 36 games at its home stadium. Prior to the Sept. 19, 2015 loss to Ole Miss, the Crimson Tide had not lost a game at home since falling to Texas A&M in 2012. Alabama boasts the fourth-best all-time home winning percentage in the FBS at .8275 (260-53-3) at Bryant-Denny Stadium since the stadium opened in 1929. Marshall is the leader with a winning percentage of .830 (156-32) at Joan C. Edwards Stadium (1991). Georgia Southern's Paulson Stadium (1984) is second at .8289 (189-39), just percentage points ahead of Boise State's Albertsons Stadium (1970) at .8286 (261-54). Alabama is fourth, followed by Houston's TDECU Stadium (2014) at .821 (23-5).

SABAN'S 66th GAME AS AP NO. 1: The matchup with Texas A&M on Saturday will be Nick Saban's 66th career game coaching Alabama as the Associated Press No. 1 team, the most games coached as No. 1 at one school. At 58-7 (.892), Saban has won more games coaching as the No. 1 team at one school than any other coach in college football history. Woody Hayes (Ohio State) and Bobby Bowden (Florida State) are tied for second with 40 wins apiece. Bowden was 40-5 (.889) at Florida State as No. 1 and Hayes went 40-6 (.870) with Ohio State. This is also Alabama's 76th week as the No. 1 team in the AP rankings during the Saban era. In addition to the 66 game weeks at No. 1, Alabama was ranked No. 1 during its bye weeks in 2008, 2012, 2013, 2016 and 2017 and topped the postseason poll following its five national championship victories under Saban.

OUTSIDE THE TOP 15: In addition to its 76-game winning streak against unranked teams, Alabama has lost just one game to a team ranked outside the top 15 in the Associated Press poll since the start of the 2008 season (No. 19 South Carolina in 2010). For perspective, no team in the FBS has lost fewer than 10 games to teams outside the top 15 in that same time frame.

MORE THAN A DECADE AT NO. 1: With Alabama's preseason No. 1 ranking, the Crimson Tide has now been ranked No. 1 in the Associated Press poll at least once each season since 2008. The 11-year streak is the longest in the history of the AP rankings. The previous long streak was seven seasons by Miami (Fla.) from 1986-92.

CRIMSON TIDE NO. 1 AT NO. 1: With its Sept. 16 ranking at No. 1, Alabama has sat atop the Associated Press Top 25 a total of 107 times since the poll's inception in 1936, which ranks No. 1 in AP history. Ohio State held the previous record with 105 appearances in the top spot.

LONGEST ACTIVE TOP-10 STREAK: Alabama's No. 1 ranking in the Sept. 16 Associated Press Top 25 marks the 47th consecutive week the Tide has appeared in the AP top-10, which leads the Football Bowl Subdivision for most consecutive weeks in the top-10 in the writers' poll. Alabama's last appearance below No. 10 was the week of Sept. 27, 2015, when the Tide was No. 13 heading to a matchup at Georgia, which resulted in a 38-10 UA victory over the No. 8 Bulldogs. The Tide has also appeared in 165 consecutive AP polls.

SABAN VS. FORMER ASSISTANTS: Alabama's matchup with Texas A&M will be the 13th meeting between Tide head coach Nick Saban and one of his former assistants. A&M's Jimbo Fisher was an assistant under Saban at LSU from 2000-06. Saban is 12-0 all-time against his former staffers during his tenure at Alabama, including a win over Fisher's Florida State squad in the 2017 Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game. Saban also has three wins vs. Derek Dooley (Tennessee, 2010-11-12), three wins over Jim McElwain (Colorado State, 2013; Florida 2015-16), two wins over Will Muschamp (Florida, 2011-14) and Mark Dantonio (Michigan State, 2010-15) and one win over Kirby Smart (Georgia, 2018 CFP National Championship Game).

SABAN LEADS IN WINS VS. TOP-5 TEAMS: Alabama's 26-23 win over then-No. 3 Georgia in the CFP National Championship Game was Nick Saban's 21st career victory against a team ranked in the top 5 of the Associated Press Top 25, the most in college football history. Saban's 21-12 career record in those contests gives him a .636 winning percentage, which is also college football's best. Following Saban on the all-time victory list are Bobby Bowden (18/.378 winning percentage), Barry Switzer (15/.516), Woody Hayes (15/.516), Steve Spurrier (15/.429) and Lou Holtz (15/.419). That record includes five wins in the College Football Playoff: No. 3 Michigan State (38-0) and No. 1 Clemson (45-40) in 2015; No. 4 Washington (24-7) in 2016 and victories over No. 1 Clemson (24-6) and No. 3 Georgia (26-23) in 2017. Alabama also went 3-0 in BCS National Championship Games (vs. Texas, 37-21, 2009; vs. LSU, 21-0, 2011; vs. Notre Dame, 42-14, 2012).

AGAINST THE TOP 10: Since the start of the 2008 season, the Crimson Tide has posted a 27-9 overall record against top-10 teams, including a 12-3 mark vs. the top 10 since the inception of the College Football Playoff. In Saban's five national championship seasons at Alabama, his teams have gone 17-2 against top-10 opponents.

SABAN VS. AP TOP 25: Alabama's 26-23 win over then-No. 3 Georgia in the CFP National Championship Game gave head coach Nick Saban 77 career wins vs. Associated Press Top 25 teams, good for third all-time. Former Penn State head coach Joe Paterno leads the list with 86, four victories ahead of Florida State's Bobby Bowden (82). Alabama's Paul "Bear" Bryant is fourth at 66. Former Duke, Florida and South Carolina coach Steve Spurrier is fifth at 64. Saban's winning percentage against AP ranked teams (.77-39, .664) tops Bryant (.592), Bowden (.557), Spurrier (.529) and Paterno (.512).

BEATING THE BEST: The Crimson Tide is 53-14 (.791) against the Associated Press Top 25, including a 29-8 (.784) mark against AP top-10 teams since the start of 2008. Alabama opened the 2017 season with a 24-7 win over then-No. 3 Florida State on Sept. 2, posted a 24-10 win over No. 19 LSU on Nov. 4, downed No. 18 Mississippi State, 31-24, on Nov. 11 before falling to No. 6 Auburn, 27-14, on Nov. 25. The Tide rebounded to defeat No. 1 Clemson, 24-6, in the Allstate Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1 and captured its 17th national championship with a 26-23 overtime victory over No. 3 Georgia in the CFP National Championship Game on Jan. 8. In 2016, the Tide faced 10 teams ranked in the AP poll, going 9-1 and outscoring those opponents by an average score of 38.0-17.3. Alabama finished 8-1 in 2015 against the AP Top 25 after going 5-2 in 2014, 3-2 in 2013 and 5-1 in 2012. The Tide held a 4-1 mark vs. top-25 teams in 2011 and went 5-3 in 2010.

ALWAYS IN THE HUNT: Since the 2008 season, Alabama has played in 125 of 128 regular season games that have had national championship implications. Following the Crimson Tide's 24-21 loss to LSU during the 2010 calendar year, UA was essentially eliminated from a chance to keep itself in the national championship discussion. The final three games of that season mark the only three regular season contests without direct national championship implications over the last 11 seasons.

NON-OFFENSIVE TDs IN THE SABAN ERA: Xavier McKinney's third quarter 30-yard interception return for a touchdown against Ole Miss on Sept. 15 was Alabama's 65th non-offensive touchdown of the Nick Saban era and the Tide's fourth this season. Alabama totaled a single-season record 15 non-offensive scores in 2016, which led the Football Bowl Subdivision and was the most in a season by a FBS team in the last 20 years. Alabama scored a non-offensive touchdown in 10 consecutive games dating from to the CFP semifinal vs. Michigan State on Dec. 31, 2015, to the Texas A&M game on Oct. 22, 2016, and had 14 non-offensive touchdowns in that span – four interceptions, four punt returns, five fumble recoveries and a kickoff return.

ALABAMA IN THE AP POLL

Alabama has been ranked in 778 of the 1,140 Associated Press college football polls since 1936, according to the AP Poll Archive. The Crimson Tide owns a 470-129-8 (.781) all-time record in games when ranked in the Associated Press college football poll, including a 111-17 (.867) mark under head coach Nick Saban. The Crimson Tide is also ranked in the AP poll for the 165th consecutive week, topping its previous streak set in the mid-1990s when UA was ranked for 71 straight weeks under head coach Gene Stallings. Alabama has started seven seasons at No. 1 (2018, 2017, 2016, 2013, 2010, 1978, 1966).

ALABAMA IN THE COACHES POLL

The Crimson Tide has enjoyed much success in the coaches rankings over the past half century. The United Press International debuted the coaches poll in 1950 and ran the poll through the 1990 season. USA TODAY has administered the poll for the past 28 seasons (1991-2018), and in 2014, Amway became the title sponsor. Alabama was ranked No. 1 in the 2010 preseason coaches' poll after starting out the 2009 preseason poll at No. 5. Alabama remained in the top five the entire season, reaching No. 1 after defeating Florida in the SEC Championship and holding the position to claim the national championship after defeating Texas in Pasadena. The Tide then claimed the No. 1 spot to close out the 2011, 2012, 2015 and 2017 seasons. The Tide has compiled four UPI (1961, 1964, 1973 and 1979) and six USA TODAY (1992, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015 and 2017) coaches poll national titles.

ALABAMA HAS MOST WINS SINCE 2008: Dating back to the start of the 2008 season, Alabama has won 128 games, which is the most in the Football Bowl Subdivision. The Crimson Tide won 12 games in 2008, followed by a perfect 14-0 record in 2009, a 10-3 mark in 2010 and a 12-1 record in 2011. Alabama finished 13-1 in 2012, 11-2 in 2013, 12-2 in 2014, 14-1 in both 2015 and 2016, and was 13-1 this past season. Ohio State is second with 115 wins, followed by Boise State (113), Oklahoma (108) and Clemson (107) to round out the top five.

UNRANKED, NO PROBLEM UNDER SABAN: With its 62-7 win over Ole Miss on Sept. 15, Alabama has defeated 76 consecutive unranked teams under head coach Nick Saban, the longest streak in FBS history. Alabama's last loss to an unranked team was a 17-10 defeat at the hands of Auburn on Nov. 24, 2007. The current streak began with a win over Colorado on Dec. 30, 2007 in the Independence Bowl. The previous record was 72 games, shared by Miami (Fla.) (1984-95) and Florida (1989-2000). Under Saban, Alabama holds an 80-3 (.964) (76-3, .962 after vacations) mark against unranked opponents.

FIRST TIME STARTERS: Sophomore Jerry Jeudy became the 12th Crimson Tide student-athlete to make his first career start this season when he took the field for the opening snap against Arkansas State on Sept. 8. The Crimson Tide had 11 student-athletes make their first career start vs. Louisville on Sept. 1, including four on offense, four on defense and three specialists. Getting their first career nod on offense were offensive lineman Alex Leatherwood, wide receivers Henry Ruggs III and DeVonta Smith and quarterback Tua Tagovailoa. Making their first start on defense were defensive lineman Quinnen Williams and defensive backs Saivion Smith, Xavier McKinney and Shyheim Carter. Placekickers Austin Jones and Joseph Bulovas along with punter Skyler DeLong started for the first time on special teams.

ALABAMA ON 2018 NFL ROSTERS: The National Football League season opened with a league-leading 54 former Alabama players dotting the rosters of 27 of the league's 32 teams. Among the 54 are 16 players from the Tide's 2017 national championship team, the most of any college football team from a season ago. Alabama also boasts an astounding 16 defensive players from its 2016 and 2017 teams currently on NFL rosters.

LEADING THE WAY TO THE NFL: Alabama has had more draft picks over the last 10 drafts (77) than any other college in the nation. Twenty-six of those picks have been first-round selections and 41 have gone in the first two rounds. The list of 77 features five Super Bowl champions, nine Pro Bowl selections, six All-Pro members and one Offensive Rookie of the Year. Alabama has had 22 players selected in the last two drafts, including eight in the first round and 11 in the first two rounds. The Tide had six players picked on offense, 15 on defense and one specialist in the 2018 draft. The defensive draftee total from the last two drafts includes all 11 of Alabama's 2016 season-opening defensive starters.

NFL DRAFT: The Crimson Tide saw 12 former UA players selected in the 2018 NFL Draft, including four first-round picks in Minkah Fitzpatrick (No. 11, Miami Dolphins), Da'Ron Payne (No. 13, Washington Redskins), Rashaan Evans (No. 22, Tennessee Titans) and Calvin Ridley (No. 26, Atlanta Falcons). Ronnie Harrison (No. 93, Jacksonville Jaguars) followed in the third round with Da'Shawn Hand (No. 114, Detroit Lions) and Anthony Averett (No. 118, Baltimore Ravens) going in the fourth round. JK Scott (No. 172, Green Bay Packers) was selected in the fifth round while Shaun Dion Hamilton (No. 197, Washington Redskins) and Bradley Bozeman (No. 215, Baltimore Ravens) were chosen in round six. Bo Scarbrough (No. 236, Dallas Cowboys) and Joshua Frazier (No. 246, Pittsburgh Steelers) rounded out the former Alabama players taken in the seventh round. The 12 selections is a new high for UA players taken in one draft under head coach Nick Saban. The total is also the most in school history, surpassing the 10 Tide players chosen in 2017 and in what was a 32-round draft in 1945.

OFF-THE-FIELD NOTES

ALABAMA DEGREES: Alabama's success on the field over the past 11 seasons under Nick Saban has coincided with the Crimson Tide's success in the classroom. The 2018 squad enters the season with 12 players who already had degrees in hand going into the season, which ties for eighth nationally first in the Southeastern Conference. The 12 graduates are: Keaton Anderson, Joshua Casher, Ronnie Clark, Johnny Dwight, Hale Hentges, Austin Jones, Derek Kief, Christian Miller, Jamey Mosley, Richie Petitbon, Ross Pierschbacher and Deionte Thompson. Since 2013, Alabama has seen 136 degrees earned (graduate and undergraduate) by players who were still suiting up for the Crimson Tide following graduation. Since the 2010 season, Alabama has seen 15 players earn a master's degree before stepping foot on the field for the final time.

GRADUATING WITH THE BEST: The Alabama football team has not only been dominant on the field, but also in the classroom. The Crimson Tide is tied for seventh among Associated Press Preseason Top 25 teams for its graduation rate of 84 percent. Ahead of Alabama were Stanford (96 percent), Notre Dame (96), UCF (92), Miami (Fla.) (88), Virginia Tech (86) and Clemson (84). Mississippi State and Penn State tied with the Tide for sixth place. Alabama's percentage tied for fourth among Southeastern Conference football programs.

ALABAMA SHARES 2017 AFCA ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT AWARD: The Alabama football program was among seven recipients of the 2017 American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Academic Achievement Award. The award is the first for the Crimson Tide. Alabama is one of seven programs that recorded a 100-percent graduation rate for members of its 2010 freshman football class. Joining the Tide as honorees this year are Cincinnati, Middle Tennessee, Northwestern, Utah, Utah State and Virginia. The Academic Achievement Award is presented annually to the school or schools with the highest score in the NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) and a federal graduation rate of 75 percent or higher. The GSR is based on a six-year graduation window for student-athletes and was developed by the NCAA as part of its academic reform initiative to more accurately assess the academic success of student-athletes. The GSR holds institutions accountable for transfer students, unlike the federal graduation rate. The GSR also accounts for midyear enrollees.

ACADEMIC PROWESS: The Tide has been a model of success on the football field, but the team has generated plenty of accolades in the classroom as well. Below are some of the academic highlights under Nick Saban.

- A total of 12 Crimson Tide players will take the field with their degrees in hand for the season opener with Louisville.
- Earned Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 84 in 2016-17 tied for fourth among SEC football programs.
- In 2017, Alabama ranked among the national leaders with 25 graduates on its roster during postseason play. The Tide led the nation in graduates on its roster during postseason play in 2015 (29), 2014 (22) and 2013 (28), as well.
- Alabama's five national title football teams under Nick Saban (2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2017) included 114 players who had earned their degrees prior to game time.
- The 2014 team was recognized as one of the nation's top academic programs, ranking third in the annual academic rankings of the top 25 college football teams produced by New America, a Washington D.C. think-tank.
- The 2011 BCS national championship team had 21 graduates playing in the bowl game, which was the second most in the country.
- That 2011 team led the SEC with 38 student-athletes being named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll.
- The 2009 BCS national championship team led the country with 11 graduates playing in the bowl game.
- In 2017-18, Alabama finished second in the number of football student-athletes being named to the SEC First-Year Academic Honor Roll with 10 honorees. Alabama topped that list in 2009, 2010 and 2011 and shared the top spot in the 2015-16 academic year

CRIMSON TIDE IN THE COMMUNITY: Last season, Alabama worked 400-plus hours of community service in Tuscaloosa and the surrounding areas. The team volunteered its time across numerous areas during the 2017 season including in schools, hospitals, with Habitat for Humanity and on campus.

ALABAMA ATHLETICS AS A WHOLE: The University of Alabama has built a total program, winning championships on the field and bringing home plenty of academic awards in the classroom.

- Since 2008, Crimson Tide athletics teams have won 11 national championships in five different sports and 24 SEC championships in eight different sports.
- Alabama claimed another SEC team title during the 2017-18 academic year with men's track & field winning the 2018 SEC indoor title.
- On a department-wide basis, Alabama's approximately 600 student-athletes earned a 3.27 grade point average. All 17 programs earned better than a 2.75 GPA with 15 earning better than a 3.0. A total of eight Tide teams earned over a 3.5 GPA in 2017-18, marking the eighth year in a row that at least five teams have met that standard.
- Alabama was also prolific when it came to the SEC Academic Honor Roll, earning the accolade 391 times during the 2017-18 academic year. The Crimson Tide had 106, 57 and 136 student-athletes named to the SEC Fall, Winter and Spring Academic Honor Rolls and 92 named to the First-Year Academic Honor Roll.
- Alabama once again led the nation in Academic All-America honors, totaling 11 during the 2017-18 academic year. The Crimson Tide's total makes Alabama the only school to earn double-digit honors the last five years in a row.
- Alabama has earned Academic All-America honors a Division I-best 88 times since 2009-10 and 56 times over the last five years. The Tide's five-year total is 11 better than second-place Stanford over that span. Alabama has also made a significant jump in the rankings when it comes to honors since 2000, jumping Notre Dame in 2017-18 to move up to second place with 134.
- Since 2009-10, UA leads all NCAA Division I schools with 88 Academic All-America honors. Stanford is second over that span with 82, while Nebraska is third at 62.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE SCORING: Alabama's offense isn't the only unit leading the country in scoring. The Crimson Tide defense tops the Football Bowl Subdivision in defensive scoring with three touchdowns through three games in 2018. Alabama defensive backs Shyheim Carter (Louisville), Saivion Smith (Arkansas State) and Xavier McKinney (Ole Miss) have each returned an interception for a score this season, giving the Tide 16 pick-sixes over the last 47 games, dating to the start of the 2015 season.

TURNOVERS, TURNOVERS, TURNOVERS: Alabama's three forced turnovers against Ole Miss on Sept. 15 gives the Crimson Tide at least one forced turnover in 45 of its last 47 games dating to the start of the 2015 season. During the current run, the Crimson Tide have forced 79 turnovers (55 interceptions, 24 fumbles) and returned 20 of those miscues for touchdowns.

HARD TO FIND THE END ZONE AGAINST THE TIDE: Since the start of the 2009 season, no team has allowed fewer touchdowns than the Crimson Tide. Alabama has surrendered only 188 touchdowns over the last 127 games. That is 51 fewer than the second most in the nation (LSU with 239).

TOUGH SLEDDING ON THE GROUND: Alabama has not allowed a rushing touchdown in 2018 and has permitted just 21 scores on the ground in its last 47 games dating to the start of the 2015 season. Alabama allowed nine rushing touchdowns a season ago and led the nation in 2016 with just five rushing touchdowns allowed. In 2015, the Crimson Tide allowed just seven rushing touchdowns in 15 games, the second-lowest total in the country. Since head coach Nick Saban arrived in 2007, the Crimson Tide has allowed 77 rushing touchdowns. Ohio State is No. 2 in that category, giving up 123 since 2007, followed by Iowa (130), TCU (139) and Utah (142). Alabama is one of just seven FBS teams that has yet to allow a rushing touchdown this season.

HOLDING OPPONENTS UNDER 200: Clemson's 188 yards in total offense in the Allstate Sugar Bowl last season marked the 48th time in the last 142 games under Nick Saban (since the start of the 2008 season) that the Crimson Tide defense has held the opposition to fewer than 200 yards of total offense.

HOLDING OPPONENTS UNDER 300: The Crimson Tide's defensive performance against Ole Miss on Sept. 15 marks the 98th time in 155 games (63.2 percent) under head coach Nick Saban that the Tide has held an opponent to less than 300 yards of total offense. The Tide has now held 10 of its last 17 opponents below 300 yards, dating to the start of the 2017 season.

RUSHING DEFENSE: Alabama has surrendered only 18 individual 100-yard rushing performances dating back to the 2005 season, a mark that is the lowest in the nation. Since head coach Nick Saban's arrival in 2007, the Tide has allowed 13 players to rush for more than 100 yards in a game: Auburn's Kerryon Johnson (104 on Nov. 25, 2017), Ole Miss' Jordan Wilkins (101 on Sept. 30, 2017), Georgia's Nick Chubb (146 on Oct. 3, 2015), Ohio State's Ezekiel Elliott (230 on Jan. 1, 2015), Auburn's Tre Mason (164 on Nov. 30, 2013), Virginia Tech's Trey Edmunds (132 on Aug. 31, 2013), Georgia's Todd Gurley (122 yards on Dec. 1, 2012), LSU's Jeremy Hill (107 on Nov. 3, 2012), Georgia Southern's Dominique Swope (153 on Nov. 19, 2011), Tennessee's Tauren Poole (117 on Oct. 23, 2010), Ole Miss' BenJarvus Green-Ellis (131 on Oct. 13, 2007), Houston's Anthony Alridge (100 on Oct. 6, 2007) and Darren McFadden of Arkansas (195 on Sept. 15, 2007).

MILLER EARNS SEC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS FOR PERFORMANCE AGAINST OLE MISS:

Alabama football's Christian Miller was selected as the Southeastern Conference Defensive Player of the Week for his performance at Ole Miss on Sept. 15. The conference honor is the first of Miller's career. Miller had a career night in Oxford, helping Alabama to a dominant 62-7 victory over the Rebels. The redshirt senior totaled a career-high five tackles, including 2.5 sacks (-11 yards), also a career-best mark. His 2.5 sacks were part of the Crimson Tide's season-high tying four sacks (-16 yards) in the game. Miller helped lead an Alabama defensive effort that limited the SEC's top scoring offense to only seven points, 54.5 points below the Rebels' season average entering Saturday's matchup. The Crimson Tide defense limited Ole Miss to just 248 yards of total offense, 348 yards below its season average going into the conference contest.

WILLIAMS EQUALS CAREER TACKLES HIGH AGAINST OLE MISS: Defensive lineman Quinnen Williams led Alabama in tackles for the second time this season, equaling his career high with six stops against Ole Miss on Sept. 15. The redshirt sophomore also had six in the Tide's season-opening win over Louisville on Sept. 1. Through three games this season, the Birmingham, Ala., native ranks second on the team with 14 tackles and leads the defense in tackles for loss with 4.0 (14 yards). He has also contributed three quarterback hurries and a pass breakup.

McKINNEY NOTCHES FIRST PICK SIX AT OLE MISS: Defensive back Xavier McKinney's third quarter 30-yard interception return for a touchdown at Ole Miss on Sept. 15 was the sophomore's first pick and score of his career. The Roswell, Ga., native also forced a fumble against the Rebels that led to Alabama's third touchdown of the game in the first quarter. The interception return was the third for a score for the Tide this season.

FIRST CAREER INTERCEPTION FOR SMITH AGAINST ARKANSAS STATE: Defensive back Saivion Smith recorded his first career interception against Arkansas State on Sept. 8. The junior picked off an errant Red Wolves pass in the second quarter and returned it 38 yards for a touchdown to give the Tide a 40-0 second quarter lead. The score was the second interception return for a touchdown for UA this season.

DOUBLE-DIGIT TACKLES FOR LOSS: Alabama's 11 tackles for loss against Louisville on Sept. 1 marked the second consecutive game the Tide reached double digits in that category. Alabama had a 2017 season-high 12 stops behind the line against Georgia in the 2018 CFP National Championship Game. Alabama is averaging 6.7 TFLs this season.

CARTER RECORDS FIRST CAREER INTERCEPTION AND SCORE AGAINST LOUISVILLE: Shyheim Carter's 45-yard interception return for a touchdown against Louisville on Sept. 1 was his first career interception. The score was also the first by interception for Alabama since Mack Wilson's 18-yard return against Clemson in the 2018 Allstate Sugar Bowl.

CAREER NIGHT EARNS WILLIAMS SEC DEFENSIVE LINEMAN OF THE WEEK HONORS: Alabama defensive lineman Quinnen Williams earned SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week honors for his performance against Louisville on Sept. 1. The Birmingham, Ala., native finished with career highs in tackles (six) and tackles for loss (3.5) in his first career start. Williams' previous career best in tackles was five vs. LSU in 2017. His previous high in tackles for loss was two on two occasions.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

ALABAMA TOPS THE NATION IN SCORING: Through three games in 2018, Alabama boasts the nation's top scoring offense. The Crimson Tide is averaging 56.7 points per game and has outscored its opponents 170-28 so far this season. The Tide also ranks No. 3 nationally in team pass efficiency with a rating of 206.28. Alabama is averaging 544.7 total offensive yards per game, 308.0 yards passing and 236.7 rushing yards per contest.

DRIVES UNDER A MINUTE: In addition to leading the nation in scoring, Alabama also shares the NCAA lead with Memphis in scoring quickly. Seven of the Crimson Tide's 20 touchdown drives this season have lasted less than a minute with three lasting less than 50 seconds.

THREE CONSECUTIVE 50+ POINT GAMES TO START THE SEASON: With Alabama's 62-7 win over Ole Miss on Sept. 15, the Crimson Tide has now scored 50-plus points in three straight games to open the season, which is the first time that has been accomplished in Southeastern Conference history. It is also the first time UA has scored 50-plus in a three-game span since the 1945 season (Kentucky, 60-19; Vanderbilt, 71-0; Pensacola N.A.S., 55-6; Mississippi State, 55-13).

500 YARDS IN TOTAL OFFENSE FOR THE THIRD TIME IN 2018: Alabama's 516 yards in total offense at Ole Miss on Sept. 15 marks the third time the Crimson Tide has topped 500 yards this season and the 15th time in the last 47 games. This is Alabama's first three-game run of 500-yard total offense performances since the first three games of the 2015 season.

SCORING STREAK CONTINUES: Alabama extended its school record for scoring in consecutive games to 230 against Ole Miss on Sept. 15 with Damien Harris' opening drive 43-yard touchdown run. The Crimson Tide was last held off the scoreboard in a 9-0 loss to Auburn on Nov. 18, 2000. Alabama has a 177-52 (.773) record over the course of the current streak.

FIRST HALF SCORING: Through three games this season, Alabama is outscoring its opponents, 117-7 (39.0-2.3), in the first half. That total includes a 61-7 first quarter advantage and a 56-0 difference in the second quarter.

POINTS IN A FIRST QUARTER: Alabama's 28 points in the first quarter against Ole Miss on Sept. 15 ties for the most in an opening quarter for the Crimson Tide during the Nick Saban era. The Tide scored 28 in the opening quarter against Duke in 2010 and Charleston Southern in 2015. The 28 points also marks just the fourth time in the last 15 seasons an SEC team scored 28 or more first-quarter points against a conference opponent.

OPENING DRIVE TOUCHDOWNS: With its 62-7 win over Ole Miss on Sept. 15, Alabama has now won 18 straight games when scoring a touchdown on its first offensive possession of a game. The Tide's last loss after finding the end zone on its first drive was to Oklahoma in the 2014 Allstate Sugar Bowl.

SCORING AGAINST OLE MISS: Since Ole Miss took a 24-3 lead against Alabama with 2:43 remaining in the first half of the 2016 game, the Crimson Tide has outscored the Rebels, 173-29 in the last 12+ quarters of play in the series. Last Saturday's 62-7 win also marks the first time UA has topped 60 points in consecutive games against Ole Miss.

TUA AT THE HELM: Through three games in 2018, Tua Tagovailoa has directed 20 drives as the Tide's starting quarterback with 14 resulting touchdowns and one culminating in a field goal. In those drives, the Tide offense was 15-for-19 on third down conversions, accounting for 1,024 yards on 108 snaps for an average of 9.5 yards per play and 99 of the 150 points scored by the UA offense. If you go back to last year's CFP National Championship Game, Tagovailoa has directed 29 drives as Alabama's quarterback, the scoring 17 touchdowns while leading the offense on three drives that resulted in field goals. On those 29 drives, Alabama has snapped the ball 158 times, accumulated 1,331 yards of offense, scored 126 points and averaged 8.4 yards per play.

THIRD DOWN IS TUA TIME: In third down passing situations through three games this season, Tua Tagovailoa is 13-for-13 for 298 yards and six touchdowns, a quarterback rating of 444.86. He was 3-for-3 passing for 65 yards and a touchdown against Louisville on third down; 7-for-7 for 142 yards and three touchdowns against Arkansas State and 3-for-3 for 91 yards and two touchdowns against Ole Miss. Seven of the 13 third down situations have been third-and-10 or more and have covered 139 yards with three touchdowns and three first downs. The sophomore has also rushed three times on third down for 34 yards and three first downs, giving the Tide six touchdowns and seven first downs in his 16 touches on third down this season.

MOVING THE CHAINS: The Alabama offense has proven very effective on third down in 2018, converting 26-of-43 opportunities for a conversion rate of 60.5 percent that ranks fourth nationally. Starting quarterback Tua Tagovailoa has led the Tide to third-down conversions on 15-of-19 attempts in three games this season (78.9 percent). He helped the Tide convert all six of his third-down chances in the season opener against Louisville on Sept. 1, was 6-of-9 on third down opportunities in the home opener against Arkansas State on Sept. 8 and 3-of-4 against Ole Miss last week. Alabama converted 40 percent of its third-down opportunities a season ago.

RUSHING TO SUCCESS: Alabama rushed for 210 yards against Ole Miss on Sept. 15 and is now 106-6 (.946) since the start of the 2008 season when rushing for at least 140 yards. The only losses were at Auburn in 2013 and 2017, at Ole Miss and vs. Ohio State in 2014, against Ole Miss in 2015 and against Clemson in 2016. The Tide has topped the 140-yard mark 39 times in its last 47 games dating to the start of the 2015 season. UA rushed for 140 yards or more 10 times in 2015 and 13 times in 2016 and 2017 and has done so three times this season.

BALL PROTECTION: In the last 142 games dating to the start of the 2008 season, Alabama has turned the ball over only 160 times (90 fumbles, 70 interceptions) for 1.13 turnovers per game. Since 2009, the Tide has turned the ball over only 142 times in 128 games (1.11/game). That number since 2009 includes 54 interceptions in 3,229 attempts (1 INT every 59.8 attempts) by UA starting quarterbacks and 21 fumbles in 3,438 carries (one fumble every 163.7 carries) by the Tide's top two running backs.

BRYANT-DENNY OPENER POINTS HIGH UNDER SABAN: Alabama's 57 points against Arkansas State on Sept. 8 is the most scored by a Nick Saban team in its Bryant-Denny opener. The previous high under Saban occurred in a 52-6 win over Western Carolina in Saban's first game at Alabama on Sept. 1, 2007. The total is also the most points scored by the Tide in its Bryant-Denny season debut since a 63-14 win over Southern Miss on Sept. 27, 1969.

JEUDEY OFF TO A HOT START FOR THE TIDE: Wide receiver Jerry Judey is quickly establishing himself as the Crimson Tide's go-to receiver this season. The sophomore has a team-leading 287 yards and six touchdowns on 11 receptions and is averaging 26.1 yards per catch. He has at least one touchdown catch in each game this season.

SIX SCORING TOSSES BY THE TIDE AGAINST ARKANSAS STATE: Alabama's six touchdown passes in its win over Arkansas State on Sept. 8 – four by Tua Tagovailoa and two by Jalen Hurts – ties for the second-most in school history. Hurts and Tagovailoa combined for six against Mercer a season ago. The school record of seven scoring tosses came in Alabama's 53-0 win over Southern Miss on Nov. 11, 1950.

UA TOUCHDOWN PASSES IN A QUARTER RECORD: Tua Tagovailoa's three first quarter touchdown passes against Arkansas State on Sept. 8 were the most in a single quarter by an Alabama quarterback since AJ McCarron threw three in the second quarter against Auburn on Nov. 24, 2012.

CAREER DAY FOR TAGOVAILOA AGAINST ARKANSAS STATE: Quarterback Tua Tagovailoa established new career highs for passing yards and passing touchdowns in the win over Arkansas State on Sept. 8. The sophomore finished the game with 228 yards passing and four scoring tosses. The touchdown total ties for No. 2 on the single-game touchdown passes record. Gary Hollingsworth threw for five touchdowns in a 62-27 win over Ole Miss on Oct. 7, 1989.

NAJEE HARRIS TOPS THE CENTURY MARK AGAINST THE RED WOLVES: Running back Najee Harris established a new career high in rushing yards against Arkansas State with the first 100-yard rushing performance of his Alabama career. The sophomore finished with 135 yards and one touchdown on 13 carries, averaging 10.4 yards per rush.

OPENING DAY QUARTERBACKS: Tua Tagovailoa's two touchdown passes against Louisville on Sept. 1 equal the most for an opening day starting quarterback during the Nick Saban era at Alabama. AJ McCarron and John Parker Wilson threw for a pair of scores against Michigan (2012) and Clemson (2008), respectively. Tagovailoa's 227 passing yards against the Cardinals ranks No. 3 for an opening night starter in the Saban era. The sophomore's total trails only Blake Sims' 250 yards against West Virginia in 2014 and Greg McElroy's 230 yards against Virginia Tech in 2009.

BY ANY MEANS NECESSARY: Alabama's 51-14 victory over Louisville on Sept. 1 marked the first time Alabama has scored on a rush, reception, kickoff return and interception since the Crimson Tide's 35-10 win over Virginia Tech on Aug. 31, 2013 in Atlanta.

SOPHOMORE TRIO TD GRABS: For the first time in the careers of sophomores Jerry Judey, Henry Ruggs III and DeVonta Smith, the trio each caught a touchdown pass in the same game. Judey caught two against Arkansas State to give him four up to that point in the season, while Ruggs III and Smith hauled in their first scores of the year. Judey leads the team with 11 catches for 287 yards and six touchdowns while Smith has 10 receptions for 204 yards with Ruggs pulling in eight grabs for 96 yards and a pair of scores.

TAGOVAILOA PASSING TD PER ATTEMPT: Crimson Tide starting quarterback Tua Tagovailoa has thrown eight touchdown passes in three game this season on only 50 attempts, an average of a touchdown every 7.5 attempts. During his two seasons in an Alabama uniform, Tagovailoa has thrown 19 touchdowns in 127 career passing attempts, which averages out to a passing touchdown every 6.7 attempts.

WHEN UNDER PRESSURE: Tua Tagovailoa is the third-highest ranked quarterback in the Football Bowl Subdivision when pressured according to Pro Football Focus. He has completed 5-of-10 attempts on 15 dropbacks for 94 yards, two touchdowns and four first downs in his first three games. He posted a 122.2 NFL passer rating on those 10 attempts, trailing only Memphis' Brady White (135.4) and Boise State's Brett Rypien (134.6) (min. 15 passing attempts per game).

A LOOK AT TUA'S STARTS: Tua Tagovailoa is the highest rated passer in the nation through the first three weeks of the college football season. He led a passers in the ESPN's Total QBR metric at 98.3 (out of 100) and his 153.8 NFL passer rating is the highest among all FBS quarterbacks with at least 50 attempts. He ranks second in collegiate passer efficiency at 233.3. He has passed for 646 yards on 36-of-50 passing (72.0 percent) with eight touchdowns and no interceptions while rushing 14 times for 93 yards and one score.

CHARTING TAGOVAILOA'S 16 PASSES VS. LOUISVILLE: Tua Tagovailoa completed 12-of-16 passes for 227 yards and two touchdowns against Louisville. He was able to work all areas of the field as he picked apart the Cardinals for a 235.4 passer rating. He completed all three of his passes beyond 20 yards with a touchdown. Tagovailoa was 2-for-4 passing with a touchdown from 10-19 yards while going 5-for-5 in the 0-9 yard range and was 2-of-3 behind the line of scrimmage (does not account for batted balls or throw aways).

CAREER NIGHTS FOR JEUDEY AND SMITH AGAINST LOUISVILLE: DeVonta Smith and Jerry Judey established career highs in multiple categories against Louisville on Sept. 1. Smith set career bests for receptions (four) and yards (99). Smith caught one pass in eight different games as a freshman in 2017 and had a career high 41 yards receiving against Georgia in the 2018 CFP National Championship Game. Judey's four catches and two touchdown receptions were also career bests. He caught one touchdown in two games as a freshman a season ago and had three receptions on two occasions in 2017.

HARRIS TIED FOR SECOND ON UA CAREER YARDS PER CARRY LIST: Through 44 career games, running back Damien Harris has averaged 6.8 yards per carry, which is tied with Eddie Lacy (2010-12) for No. 2 all-time at Alabama for backs with at least 200 rushing attempts. Harris has rushed for 2,372 yards and 15 touchdowns on 351 career attempts. Wilbur Jackson (1971-73) is the UA career leader at 7.2 yards per carry (1,529 yards on 212 attempts).

HARRIS 14TH ON UA CAREER RUSHING YARDS CHART: Senior running back Damien Harris' 2,372 career rushing yards ranks No. 14 all-time at Alabama. Eddie Lacy (2010-12) is No. 13 at 2,402. Derrick Henry is Alabama's career rushing leader with 3,591 yards. Harris is just the 20th back in UA history to surpass the 2,000-yard rushing mark for his career.

HARRIS RANKS AMONG THE SEC'S BEST: Though he does not yet have enough career attempts to qualify for the SEC career yards per carry list (minimum 400 attempts), Damien Harris' 6.8 yards per carry average is tied for third with SEC career leader Bo Jackson of Auburn among SEC career leaders with 350 collegiate rushing attempts. Jackson's career average of 6.62 yards per carry on 650 career rushes ranks No. 1 in SEC history.

HURTS TOPS UA QUARTERBACK CAREER RUSHING TOUCHDOWN LIST: Jalen Hurts' 21 career rushing touchdowns is an Alabama career high for quarterbacks, surpassing the previous career best of 19 established by Harry Gilmer from 1944-47.

HURTS NO. 2 ON UA QUARTERBACK CAREER RUSHING LIST: Jalen Hurts' 1,870 career rushing yards ranks No. 2 all-time for quarterbacks at Alabama. Harry Gilmer (1944-47) tops the chart with 2,025 yards. Hurts' total also ranks No. 22 on Alabama's all-time career rushing list.

HURTS' CAREER TOUCHDOWN RESPONSIBILITY: Jalen Hurts' combined 65 career rushing and passing touchdowns ranks No. 2 on the Alabama career touchdown responsibility list. AJ McCarron (2010-13) is the UA career leader with 80 in 53 games. Hurts has thrown 44 touchdown passes and rushed for 21 scores in 32 career games.

HURTS THIRD ON UA CAREER TOUCHDOWN PASSES LIST: Quarterback Jalen Hurts' two touchdown passes against Ole Miss on Sept. 15 gives the junior 44 touchdown passes in his 32-game career, which ranks No. 3 on the Alabama career list. John Parker Wilson (2005-08) is second with 47. AJ McCarron is Alabama's career leader with 77 touchdown passes from 2010-13.

HURTS THIRD ON UA CAREER TOTAL OFFENSE LIST: With 6,976 total offensive yards in his 32-game career, Jalen Hurts ranks third on the Alabama career total offense list. John Parker Wilson (2005-08) is second with 8,099 yards. AJ McCarron (2010-13) is the UA career leader with 8,969 yards.

HURTS SEVENTH ON UA CAREER PASSING YARDS LIST: Jalen Hurts' 85 yards passing against Ole Miss on Sept. 15 gives the junior 5,109 career passing yards, which ranks seventh on the Alabama career passing yards list. Jay Barker (1991-94) is sixth at 5,689 yards. AJ McCarron (2010-13) is the UA career leader with 9,019 yards.

WADDLE NAMED SEC FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK: Alabama freshman receiver/punt returner Jaylen Waddle was named the SEC Freshman of the Week for his performance against Louisville on Sept. 1. In his Alabama debut, the Houston, Texas, native returned four punts for 80 yards with a long of 31. He also caught three passes for 66 yards, including a 49-yard reception to set up the Crimson Tide's third touchdown.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

ALABAMA LEADS THE NATION IN KICKOFF RETURN AVERAGE: Alabama is averaging an FBS-best 59.3 yards per kickoff return this season. The Tide's three returned kicks have gone for a total of 178 yards and one touchdown.

KICKOFF RETURN TOUCHDOWN: Josh Jacobs' 77-yard kickoff return for a touchdown against Louisville on Sept. 1 was Alabama's first kickoff return for a score by the Crimson Tide since Kenyan Drake's 95-yard return against Clemson in the 2016 CFP National Championship Game.

SERIES NOTES

THE ALABAMA-TEXAS A&M SERIES: Alabama leads the series with Texas A&M by an 8-2 margin, dating back to the first meeting in the 1942 Cotton Bowl, a 29-21 Alabama win that secured a piece of the 1941 national championship. The Aggies defeated the Tide in the 1968 Cotton Bowl, 20-16, to even the series. Alabama then swept a home-and-home series, winning 23-10 in Birmingham in 1985 and 30-10 in College Station in 1988. In 2012, Texas A&M came away with a 29-24 win in its first trip to Bryant-Denny Stadium. Alabama returned the favor a year later in College Station, winning 49-42. In 2014, the Crimson Tide pitched a 59-0 shutout in Tuscaloosa, the largest win over a ranked opponent in Alabama history. In 2015, the Tide returned three interceptions for touchdowns on the way to a 41-23 win over the Aggies in College Station. In the most recent contest in Tuscaloosa, Alabama broke open a tight game with two third-quarter touchdowns to defeat the Aggies, 33-14, at Bryant-Denny Stadium in 2016. The Crimson Tide pushed its win streak against A&M to five in a row in 2017 with a 27-19 win at Kyle Field.

Saban and the Tide won the last meeting in Tuscaloosa, 33-14, during the 2016 season.

ALABAMA-TEXAS A&M CONNECTIONS: The Alabama football team has many connections back to Texas A&M. Most of those relationships were formed via former Alabama head coach Paul "Bear" Bryant's coaching stints at both schools. Two of Bryant's protégés have served as head coach at A&M: Gene Stallings and Jackie Sherrill. Bryant and Stallings are the most notable connection between the two programs. Stallings played for Bryant at A&M before serving as an assistant coach at Alabama from 1958-64. He returned to Tuscaloosa as head coach from 1990-96, and has remained active with both institutions since his retirement from coaching. Sherrill played for Bryant at Alabama from 1963-65 and served as head coach at A&M from 1982-88. Both Stallings and Sherrill coached against the Crimson Tide as A&M head coach, with Stallings and the Aggies winning the 1968 Cotton Bowl against Bryant and Sherrill leading the Aggies against Alabama in 1985 and 1988. There are numerous other connections as well: John David Crow was the 1957 Heisman Trophy winner and an assistant coach at Alabama from 1969-71 ... Curly Hallman, a native of Northport, Ala., played at A&M for head coach Gene Stallings and starred as defensive back from 1966-68 before returning to Alabama as an assistant from 1973-76 and 1996-97 ... Bobby Drake Keith played for Bryant at A&M and was an assistant coach at Alabama

in 1958-59 ... Elwood Kettler was a quarterback on Bryant's first A&M team in 1954 and was an assistant at Alabama in 1960 ... Bobby Marks played for Bryant at A&M and was later a part of his Alabama staff from 1972-82 ... Dee Powell played for Bryant at A&M and served 20 years as an assistant coach at Alabama in 1958 and 1964-82 ... Dennis Franchione was the head coach at both schools, coaching the Crimson Tide in 2001-02 before taking over as head coach at A&M from 2003-07 ... Amy Bragg, who serves as the Crimson Tide Director of Performance Nutrition, came from Texas A&M prior to the 2010 season ... Alabama special teams coordinator and tight ends coach Jeff Banks spent five seasons in College Station before joining the Tide staff this season.

PAUL "BEAR" BRYANT AT TEXAS A&M: Before he became a national icon, legendary Alabama head coach Paul "Bear" Bryant earned a national reputation as an outstanding coach via a remarkable turnaround of the Texas A&M program as head coach from 1954-57, where he compiled a 25-14-2 overall record and won a Southwest Conference championship. Bryant took a struggling Aggie program from a 1-9 record in 1954 to a 7-2-1 mark in 1955 (the best single-season turnaround in A&M history), a 9-0-1 SWC championship season in 1956 and an 8-3 mark in 1957. A&M was ranked No. 1 in the nation for three weeks during the 1957 season – the last time that A&M has achieved that lofty status. Bryant accepted the Alabama job near the end of the 1957 season, returning to Tuscaloosa where he created an unparalleled standard of excellence while leading the Crimson Tide to six national titles and 13 SEC championships. The only Heisman Trophy winner that Bryant coached, John David Crow, played for him at A&M before serving as an assistant coach at Alabama. Crow later served as athletics director at A&M.

ALABAMA VS. A&M AT VARIOUS SITES: The Alabama-Texas A&M series has been played at four different sites and returns to Bryant-Denny Stadium for the fourth time. Since the initial meeting in the 1942 Cotton Bowl in Dallas, the Crimson Tide faced the Aggies in the 1968 Cotton Bowl and then played A&M in Birmingham in 1985, Tuscaloosa in 2012, 2014 and 2016 and College Station in 1988, 2013, 2015 and 2017.

GENERAL NOTES

SABAN'S HOME RECORD: Alabama head coach Nick Saban is 130-19 (.872) in home games during his college head coaching career. He owns the advantage at every stop he has made as a college head coach, including a 71-7 (.910) mark while at Alabama. Saban has won 42 of his last 44 contests at Bryant-Denny Stadium and has lost back-to-back matchups only once, with consecutive losses coming at the end of the 2007 season (LSU and ULM).

SABAN IN SEC HOME OPENERS: Nick Saban is 14-2 (.875) all-time in Southeastern Conference home openers spanning his time at Alabama and LSU and his teams have outscored its opponents by a score of 534-236 (33.4-14.8 ppg). He is 10-1 (.909) at Alabama and his teams have outscored its foes by a 348-132 (31.6-12.0) mark during his first 11 conference home openers at Alabama.

SABAN'S SEC HOME RECORD: Alabama head coach Nick Saban owns a 54-10 (.844) all-time record when playing in a Southeastern Conference game at home, going 16-4 (.800) during his time at LSU and owning a 38-6 (.864) record at Alabama. While with the Crimson Tide, Saban has posted five perfect home SEC slates and has not lost more than one home conference game in any season other than 2007 (two losses). All six of his losses at home have been by seven points or less with half of those by three or fewer. Under Saban, Alabama has outscored its SEC home opponents 1,487-597 (33.8-9.3 points per game) and has limited the opposition to 14 points or less on 29 occasions, including six shutout victories.

SABAN MOVING UP SEC WINS LIST: Alabama head coach Nick Saban's 108 conference wins (including SEC championship games) ranks No. 3 on the SEC career conference wins list. Saban ranks first in league history in SEC regular season winning percentage at .806 (108-26). He is also second in SEC history in winning percentage in all games at .832 (178-36). Saban is sixth on the SEC career wins at 178 victories.

120-7 UNDER SABAN WHEN LEADING AT THE HALF: Under head coach Nick Saban, the Crimson Tide is 120-7 (.945) when leading at the half. Alabama has held the lead in 37 of its last 47 games dating back to the start of the 2015 season. Alabama is also 104-4 (.963) when leading by seven or more points at the break during the Saban era.

PRESEASON THREEPEAT: This year marks Alabama's third straight appearance at No. 1 in the Associated Press preseason rankings. The Crimson Tide now joins Oklahoma (1985-87) as just the second team to start the season at No. 1 in three consecutive seasons since the poll began in 1936.

SABAN AMONG 20-YEAR LEADERS: Alabama's 45-40 win over Clemson in the 2016 College Football Playoff Championship Game was head coach Nick Saban's 191st victory in his first 20 years as a college head coach. That total is the second-most in FBS history for a coach in the first 20 seasons of his career. Former Nebraska head coach Tom Osborne won 195 games in the opening two decades of his tenure in Lincoln. Long-time Penn State head coach Joe Paterno ranks third with 187. Saban's five national championships in 20 seasons tops both Osborne (none) and Paterno (1).

TIDE REACHES 11 WINS FOR THE 21st TIME: With the win against Mercer on Nov. 18 last season, Alabama secured its 11th victory of the year, marking the 21st time in program history that the Tide has achieved the feat. Under head coach Nick Saban, Alabama has had nine 11-win seasons (2008-09, 2011-17). It is the seventh straight season with at least 11 wins, which is the longest streak of its kind in SEC history. The SEC has had three streaks of three seasons with at least 11 victories, including Alabama from 1973-75, LSU from 2005-07 and South Carolina from 2011-13.

10-YEAR RUN: Nick Saban compiled a 125-14 (.899) record over the past 10 seasons in Tuscaloosa (2008-17), which is the best of any major college school over a 10-year span since Bud Wilkinson and Oklahoma in the late 1940s through the late 1950s. UA's 125 wins over the past decade are the most for any FBS school during a 10-year span in the Associated Press poll era (since 1936).

10-WIN SEASONS: Alabama's 31-24 victory over Mississippi State on Nov. 11 last season marked the 10th consecutive season the Crimson Tide has reached the 10-win mark. The 10 straight years with 10 wins extends the school record. The previous total for most consecutive 10-win seasons was five, set by coach Paul "Bear" Bryant's teams from 1971-75. In 122 seasons, the Tide has won 10 or more games 37 times, the most in college football history. Alabama has produced 12 10-win seasons since 2002 (2002, 2005, 2008-2017). Bryant had a school-record 13 10-win seasons at Alabama while Nick Saban is second with 10.

SEC RECORD: Alabama extended its record for most consecutive 10-win seasons in SEC history in 2017 when it defeated Mississippi State, 31-24, on Nov. 11, to improve to 10-0 on the year. UA had a 12-2 record in 2008, 14-0 in 2009, 10-3 in 2010, 12-1 in 2011, 13-1 in 2012, 11-2 in 2013, 12-2 in 2014 and 14-1 in 2015 and 2016.

ALABAMA'S TV RECORD: Alabama's game at Ole Miss on Sept. 15 was the Tide's 406th televised game. Alabama has compiled a 269-133-4 (.667) all-time record in televised games (not including pay-per-view, tape-delayed or closed circuit telecasts).

125 NATIONAL TV APPEARANCES IN 142 GAMES: With the Tide's appearance on ESPN at Ole Miss on Sept. 15, Alabama has played in 125 nationally televised games since the start of the 2008 season, including every contest since the start of the 2014 season.

FIRST TIME PLAYERS: True freshmen Emil Ekiyor (OL) and Stephon Wynn Jr. (DL) made their Alabama debuts at Ole Miss on Sept. 15, becoming the 21st and 22nd Crimson Tide student-athletes to debut this season. They joined the 20 players who made their first UA appearances in the season opener against Louisville on Sept. 1. Appearing for the first time against the Cardinals were true freshmen Eyabi Anoma (LB), Slade Bolden (WR), Skyler DeLong (P), Jerome Ford (RB), Josh Jobe (DB), Ale Kaho (LB), Cameron Latu (LB), Jaylen Moody (LB), Patrick Surtain II (DB) and Jaylen Waddle (WR). Redshirt freshmen Markail Benton (LB), Joseph Bulovas (PK), Mac Jones (QB), Phidarian Mathis (DL), Kyriq McDonald (DB), Tyrell Shavers (WR) and Chadarius Townsend (WR) also saw their first career action for the Tide as did junior transfers Tevita Musika (DL) and Saivion Smith (DB) and senior transfer Austin Jones.

RETURNING SUCCESS: The Crimson Tide returns 12 starters and 53 letterwinners from its 2017 squad that finished 13-1 and won its 17th national championship. The 2018 team returns seven starters on offense and three on defense. The offense is highlighted by 2,000-yard career rusher Damien Harris at running back and quarterback Jalen Hurts, who enters the season with a 26-2 career record as a starter. Other returning starters on offense are linemen Lester Cotton Sr., Ross Pierschbacher, Jonah Williams and Matt Womack along with tight end Hale Hentges. Alabama's defense returns defensive Isaiah Buggs and Raekwon Davis and linebacker Anfernee Jennings. Davis earned first team All-SEC honors a season ago when he led the Tide with 8.5 sacks.

NEW HIRES: Nick Saban made six new additions to his 2018 staff during the offseason, hiring Jeff Banks as special teams coordinator and tight ends coach, Dan Enos as associate head coach and quarterbacks coach, Josh Gattis as co-offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach, Pete Golding as co-defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach, Craig Kuligowski as associate head coach and defensive line coach and Karl Scott as defensive backs coach. In addition, holdovers Michael Locksley and Tosh Lupoi assumed the roles of offensive and defensive coordinators, respectively.

SABAN AND FIRST ROUND NFL DRAFT PICKS: Since the advent of the NFL Draft, Alabama head coach Nick Saban ranks third all-time among college coaches who have tutored first round draft picks. Saban has coached a total of 31 players who were chosen in the opening round of the draft, including 26 from Alabama. Florida State's Bobby Bowden is the career leader with 35, followed by Penn State's Joe Paterno at 32.

CRIMSON TIDE PLAYERS ON NFL ROSTERS: The Alabama football program is again well-represented in the NFL during the 2018 season with numerous former players on league rosters. The Tide has a league-high 54 former players (active, injured reserve, practice squad) working on an NFL roster. In the last 10 NFL Drafts (including 2018), Alabama has had 77 players selected, including 26 players in first round, 23 in the second and third rounds, eight in the fourth, eight in the fifth, three in the sixth and nine in the seventh round.

- Saban has a 226-62-1 (.784) record as a college head coach to date (221-62-1, .780 after vacations). He has six national championships – five at Alabama – eight conference championships and 19 of his teams have played in postseason bowl games, including a trip to the BCS National Championship Game following the 2003, 2009, 2011 and 2012 seasons and the College Football Playoff Semifinals each of the last four seasons including the last three CFP National Championship Games.

- Saban is the only coach to win four BCS national championships, the only coach to win back-to-back BCS national championships and the only coach to win multiple CFP National Championships. He has won six titles in his last 14 years coaching college football after capturing CFP National Championship following the 2017 season. Saban is one of three college coaches in the poll era (since 1936) to win three national championships in four years, joining Frank Leahy (Notre Dame - 1946-47, 1949) and Tom Osborne (Nebraska - 1994-95, 1997). He is also just the second coach in the poll era to win six national championships (Paul "Bear" Bryant) and the first two ever win five titles in a nine-year span.

- In 2009, Saban produced Alabama's first national championship in 17 years by guiding the Crimson Tide to a 14-0 season with dominant wins over Florida in the SEC championship and Texas in the Citi BCS National Championship Game. He then followed that up with his second BCS championship in three years with a 21-0 shutout of LSU following the 2011 season at the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. He made it back-to-back BCS national championships in 2012 with a 42-14 win over Notre Dame in the Discover BCS National Championship Game. He took down Clemson 45-40 to capture title No. 5 following the 2015 season in the CFP National Championship Game. He captured his sixth national championship - and fifth at Alabama - in 2017 with a 26-23 overtime win over Georgia in the 2018 CFP National Championship Game.

- In addition to the on-field success, the 2011 team was also recognized with the Disney Spirit Award, which was presented to snapper Carson Tinker, for the team's response to the community following the tornado that devastated Tuscaloosa on April 27, 2011. The Tide also had extensive success in the classroom that year with 38 SEC Academic Honor Roll selections, a league record, and produced an Academic All-American in Barrett Jones.

- His most recent college head coaching stint, a five-season run at LSU, produced a record of 48-16 (.750), one national championship (2003), two Southeastern Conference championships, three SEC West Division championships, and a 3-2 record in bowl games including two Sugar Bowl victories and a Peach Bowl win. The Tigers constructed a 28-12 (.700) record against SEC opponents under Saban's guidance. He was named the 2003 National Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and earned both the Paul W. "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award by the Football Writers Association of America. Saban was named SEC Coach of the Year twice (by the Birmingham News in 2001 and by the Associated Press in 2003).

- Saban served as head coach at Michigan State from 1995-99, his second stint at the East Lansing school as he also spent 1983-87 as the Spartans' defensive coordinator/secondary coach. After playing in just one bowl game in the previous four years, Michigan State made four postseason appearances in Saban's five years at the helm. Saban led MSU to a 34-24-1 (.585) record as head coach.

- In 1999, Saban led his final Spartans team to a No. 7 national ranking as MSU finished in a tie for second in the Big Ten. The Spartans defeated Notre Dame, Michigan, Ohio State and Penn State in the same year for the first time since 1965 and recorded six wins at home for the first time since the 1912 season. The Spartans' performance that year landed them a spot in the Citrus Bowl. The Spartans led the Big Ten in rushing defense (77.0 yards per game) and total defense (299.0 yards per game) while ranking fifth nationally in rushing defense and 11th in total defense. The Michigan State offense averaged 31.0 points per game.

- Saban's first head coaching position came at the University of Toledo in 1990, as he guided the Rockets to a record of 9-2 that year, finishing as co-champions of the Mid-American Conference. The Rockets ranked among the NCAA leaders in both total defense (12th at 284.8 yards) and scoring defense (16th at 16.2 points), and missed posting an undefeated record by a mere five points.

- A native of Fairmont, W.Va., Saban is a 1973 graduate of Kent State University where he earned a bachelor's degree in business. He earned a master's degree in sports administration from Kent State in 1975. Born October 31, 1951, Saban and his wife, the former Terry Constable, have two children, Nicholas and Kristen. They have one granddaughter, Amélie, and a daughter-in-law, Kelsé.

- At Michigan State, Saban started the "Nick's Kids" Foundation, which the Sabans continue here in Tuscaloosa. Since their arrival at the University of Alabama, the Sabans have helped raise roughly \$8 million for "Nick's Kids" that has been distributed to more than 250 charities and organizations throughout the state of Alabama and the Southeast. The Sabans also built 16 homes, one for each of the Tide's national championships, with Habitat for Humanity following the April 27, 2011, tornado that struck Tuscaloosa.

- In June of 2008, the Sabans announced a \$1 million gift to benefit Alabama's first-generation scholarship program. The gift has a special meaning to the Sabans as both Nick and Terry were both first-generation graduates.

ORLANDO, Fla. — The top-ranked Alabama Crimson Tide were in control from start to finish in a 51-14 win over Louisville in the Camping World Kickoff at Camping World Stadium in Orlando, Fla., in the 2018 season opener for both teams.

The Crimson Tide used a balanced attack to outgain the Cardinals, 519-268, in total offense, including a 222-16 mark in the rushing game. UA's victory improved head coach Nick Saban's record in season openers to a perfect 12-0 while at UA.

Sophomore quarterback Tua Tagovailoa led the UA offense, totaling three touchdowns with 253 yards of offense in his first career start. Tagovailoa went 12-of-16 for 227 yards with two passing scores to fellow sophomore Jerry Jeudy, while rushing for 26 yards and a score. On the receiving end, sophomore wideout DeVonta Smith led the charge with four catches for 99 yards.

The Tide defense was led by sophomore lineman Quinnen Williams, who finished the game with six tackles including a team-high 3.5 tackles for loss to go along with one quarterback pressure and a pass breakup. Redshirt junior defensive back Deionte Thompson had a solid performance with five tackles, 1.5 for a loss, three pass breakups and an interception.

Alabama added a pair of non-offensive touchdowns thanks to the defensive and special teams units. Junior defensive back Shyheim Carter returned an interception 45 yards for a score while third-year back Josh Jacobs took a kickoff back for a 77-yard return late in the third quarter to add to the Tide's cushion.

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. — The No. 1-ranked Alabama football team cruised to a 57-7 win over Arkansas State in the Crimson Tide's home opener at Bryant-Denny Stadium on Saturday afternoon.

Alabama threw five touchdown passes in the first half with sophomore Tua Tagovailoa completing three and junior Jalen Hurts connecting for two scores. For the game, Tagovailoa completed 13-of-19 passing attempts for 228 yards and four touchdowns - both career-high marks, while Hurts went 7-for-9 for 93 yards and two scores.

The six scoring tosses equals the second-most in a game in Alabama football history. Tagovailoa's four touchdown passes also ranks second on the individual single-game touchdown passes list.

Sophomore running back Najee Harris eclipsed the 100-yard mark for the first time in his career after running for 135 yards and a touchdown on just 13 carries. Five different receivers caught touchdown passes, including two by sophomore Jerry Jeudy for a second consecutive game.

Offensively, the Tide finished with 599 yards of total offense - 321 through the air and 278 on the ground.

On the defensive side of the ball, sophomore defensive back Xavier McKinney paced the Tide with a career-high seven tackles as Alabama limited the Red Wolves to a single third quarter touchdown. Junior defensive back Saivion Smith posted the Tide's third non-offensive touchdown of the season with a 38-yard interception return for a touchdown in the second quarter.

OXFORD, Miss. — The No. 1 Alabama football team scored 62 unanswered points to cruise to a 62-7 victory over Ole Miss in its Southeastern Conference opener at Vaught-Hemingway Stadium on Saturday night in Oxford, Miss.

The Crimson Tide became the first team in SEC history to score 50-plus points in its first three games of a season, after putting up 51 against Louisville in the season-opening contest and 57 against Arkansas State in the Tide's home opener.

Playing in just the first half, sophomore quarterback Tua Tagovailoa went 11-for-15 passing for 191 yards and two scores to lead the Alabama offense while adding five carries for 47 yards rushing to his totals. On the receiving end, sophomore wideout Jerry Jeudy led the way with three catches for 136 yards and two touchdowns. The two-touchdown performance was Jeudy's third consecutive this season. Alabama's offensive output doubled Ole Miss thanks to a 516-248 yard output from both teams.

On defense, sophomore lineman Quinnen Williams finished the game with a team-high six tackles, while linebacker Christian Miller accounted for five tackles and 2.5 sacks - both career-high marks for the redshirt senior. Redshirt junior defensive back Deionte Thompson recorded his second interception of the season with a return of 40 yards, while sophomore safety Xavier McKinney picked off his first career pass, returning the interception for a pick-six totaling 30 yards, and added a forced fumble to his stat line.
