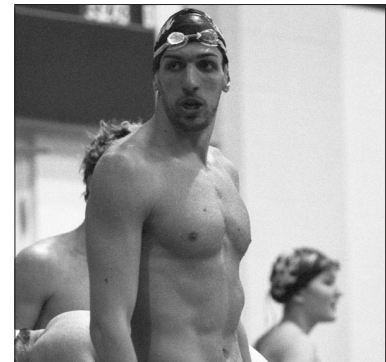

ALABAMA MEDIA RELATIONS

The Alabama Athletic Media Relations Office is located on the ground level of Coleman Coliseum.

MEDIA SERVICES

Members of the media are supplied with up-to-date release packages, which can be obtained from www.rolltide.com or in the Media Relations Office. The release contains updated statistics, season results and notes. Pre-meet notes and media guides are available poolside before meets at the Alabama Aquatic Center. Alabama's coaches and athletes are available for interviews about 15-20 minutes after most meets.

FACILITIES

The Alabama swimming and diving teams compete and practice in the Don Gambril Olympic Pool at the Alabama Aquatic Center located on the corner of Paul W. Bryant Drive and Hackberry Lane. The swimming and diving offices are also located in the Aquatic Center.

INTERVIEWS

The coaching staff is available for interviews in person or by telephone by prior arrangement. Athletes may not be interviewed on meet day until post-meet interviews are granted. Interviews with Alabama swimmers and divers must be arranged through Roots Woodruff of the athletic media relations office at (205) 348-6084. The best times for athlete interviews are either before or after practice at the Alabama Aquatic Center. Interview requests should be made at least 24 hours in advance.

SATELLITE FEEDS/TELEVISION

The University of Alabama, through Crimson Tide Sports Marketing, offers a weekly 15-minute satellite feed consisting of interviews with coaches and athletes, taped video highlights and narrated tape package from September through May. Occasionally the swimming and diving teams will be featured in this package. Please call the media relations office for more details. During their season, the swimming and diving teams' progress will be covered each week on "The Crimson Tide This Week," a 30-minute regional sports show hosted by David Crane.

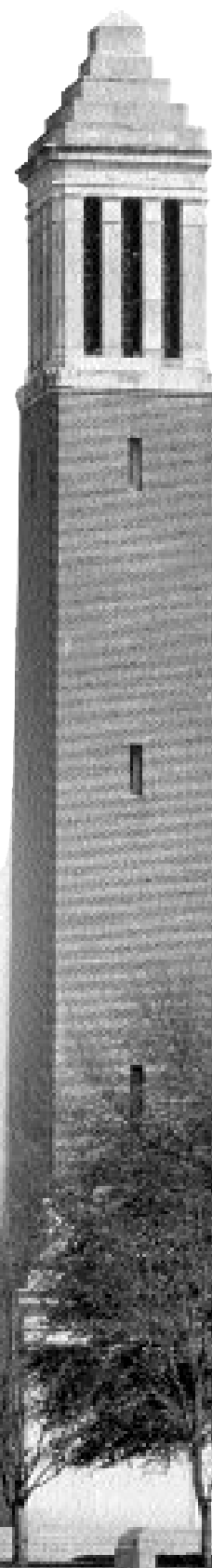

Dr. J. Barry Mason

Interim President
The University of Alabama

Dr. J. Barry Mason was named interim president of The University of Alabama in May 2002. Well-known to alumni, faculty, staff, students and friends of the University, Mason served as dean of the Culverhouse College of Commerce and Business Administration from 1988 until his appointment as interim president.

A faculty member in UA's business school for more than 30 years, Mason served as chair of the department of management and marketing before being named dean. He is the author or co-author of eight college texts, 10 research monographs and 100 published refereed journal articles in such publications as the Harvard Business Review, the University of Chicago's Journal of Business, and the Journal of Marketing Research.

Among his most recent honors, Mason received the Wayne A. Lemburg Award for Distinguished Service from the American Marketing Association; was named a Distinguished Alumnus by his alma mater, the Louisiana Tech University College of Administration and Business; and was recognized in Marketing Educator as one of the top 100 most productive marketing scholars in the last 20 years. He is a former chairman of the board of the 40,000-member American Marketing Association.

In 1994 he was designated a Distinguished Fellow of the Academy of Marketing Science for exemplary services to the Academy and outstanding contributions to the marketing discipline. In 1986, he was named the first annual recipient of the Academy of Marketing Science Outstanding Educator of the Year Award.

In 1984 he received the Levey Award for Excellence in Private Enterprise Education by

the Freedoms Foundation of Valley Forge “for outstanding efforts to help young people better understand the function and benefits of private enterprise and free market economics.” The award honored his service as chairman of the UA Task Force on Cost Savings, which worked with the General Motors Rochester Products Plant in Tuscaloosa and the UAW to identify \$1 million in cost savings and prevent the closure of the 200-employee local facility. That project laid the groundwork for future academic-industrial partnerships involving the University and the business school, including the ongoing relationship with Mercedes-Benz U.S. International.

Mason has also been recognized with some of UA's most prestigious honors, including the National Alumni Association Outstanding Commitment to Teaching Award, the John F. Burnum Distinguished Faculty Award, the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Award and the Minnie Miles Excellence Award for Outstanding Contributions to the University.

Under Mason's leadership, the Culverhouse College of Commerce and Business Administration has been recognized repeatedly for offering a high-quality, cost-effective education. The business school's undergraduate program has been consistently ranked in the top 50 by U.S. News and World Report. It is also rated among the top five percent in the nation by the Gourman Report.

Mason earned his bachelor's degree at Louisiana Tech and his master's and doctoral degrees at UA. Mason and his wife, Linda, have a daughter, Michelle, who also resides in Tuscaloosa.





MAL MOORE

Director of Athletics

Mal Moore represents the glory, pride and tradition of the University of Alabama's athletic past. He is also a symbol of the excitement and enthusiasm of the Crimson Tide's future.

Hired on Nov. 23, 1999, as the Director of Athletics at Alabama, Moore began the next phase in his 28 years of service to the Capstone. Well-known in athletic circles, Moore brings a vision of championships and success to the office of athletics director due in part to over three decades of experience in collegiate athletics.

As a player and coach at Alabama, Moore was part of seven national championships, 14 SEC Championships, and 27 bowl trips.

Alabama capitalized on that background, and Moore's popularity, by naming him as Associate Director for External Affairs in 1994, a position that required constant travel to speaking engagements around the Southeast. Moore joined the administration in 1993 as an assistant athletics director.

In his career he has worked with a diversified field of people, from fellow coaches to former players, to fans and the business community. All those experiences and relationships make him the ideal candidate to lead Alabama athletics into the 21st century.

"Coach Bryant was successful, in great part, because he had a plan," Moore said. "I have firm concepts and ideas that I am ready to implement for the department."

One of Moore's first priorities was to institute a five-year facilities and endowment initiative, the Crimson Tradition Fund. A well-developed plan, the Crimson Tradition Fund is the driving force behind the important project of upgrading all of the Tide's athletic facilities. Moore has placed a particular emphasis on creating a state-of-the-art academic center housed in the former Bryant Hall and completing a major renovation of Alabama's strength and conditioning facility. Another area of attention for Moore has been the need for increased and improved parking for Crimson Tide sporting events.

A 1963 graduate of the University of Alabama, Moore holds both an undergraduate degree in Sociology and a 1964 Master's Degree in Secondary Education from the Capstone. A scholarship player for Coach Paul Bryant, Moore was a member of Alabama's 1961 national championship team.

Coaching football for 31 years, 22 of those at Alabama, provided Moore with a wealth of experience and knowledge in the world of college athletics. As a coach, Moore served as Bryant's graduate assistant in 1964 and then Alabama's defensive backfield coach from 1965-70. He served as the Tide's quarterback's coach from 1971-82 and from 1975-82 took on the additional responsibility and elevated role as the Tide's offensive coordinator.

Alabama won national championships, in 1964, 1965, 1973, 1978, 1979 and 1992 with Moore coordinating all the offensive plays for the last four of those championship teams. He is the only man connected with the Alabama coaching staffs, past and present, who was a member of all seven of those title squads. In addition to Alabama, his coaching career included stops at Montana State, Notre Dame and the NFL's Phoenix Cardinals.

Moore, 61, was born December 19, 1939 in Dozier, Alabama. He has been married to the former Charlotte Davis of Tuscaloosa since July 20, 1968. They have one daughter, Mrs. Steve (Heather) Cook of Scottsdale, Arizona, a granddaughter, Anna Lee and a grandson Charles Cannon.



Gene Marsh
Faculty Athletics
Representative

Gene Marsh is the University of Alabama's Faculty Athletic Representative, a position he has held since 1996. In 1999, he was appointed to the NCAA Division I Committee on Infractions, and in 2001 became the vice-chair of the committee.

Before joining the faculty in the University of Alabama School of Law, Marsh taught in the College of Commerce and Business Administration. He directed the University Honors Program from 1989-93. In the law school he teaches contracts, payment systems, consumer protection and business organizations.

Marsh received the Burlington Northern Foundation Award for Excellence in Teaching in 1987 and the University of Alabama National Alumni Association Outstanding Commitment to Teaching Award in 1988. He received the Student Bar Association Outstanding Faculty Member Award in 1997 and 2001.

He served on the Executive Committee of the Southeastern Conference and the Business/Finance Cabinet of the NCAA. Marsh chaired the NCAA Athletic Certification project for the University. During the 1998-99 academic year, Marsh served as chair of the Faculty Athletic Representatives in the SEC. He represents the Southeastern Conference Faculty Athletic Representatives in a working group of the six major athletic conferences, working on NCAA legislative proposals. In 2002 he also served on the Search Advisory Committee in the selection process for the Commissioner of the Southeastern Conference. He also currently serves as chair of the University Committee for Intercollegiate Athletics.

Marsh served three years in the U.S. Army Infantry with the Presidential Honor Guard (The Old Guard), in Arlington, Virginia. He then received a combined B.S. and M.S. degree summa cum laude from Ohio State University in 1978 and a J.D. from Washington and Lee University in 1981. He is married to Jenelle Marsh, assistant dean for student academic affairs at the University of Alabama School of Law. The couple have two children, Nathan and Elliott.

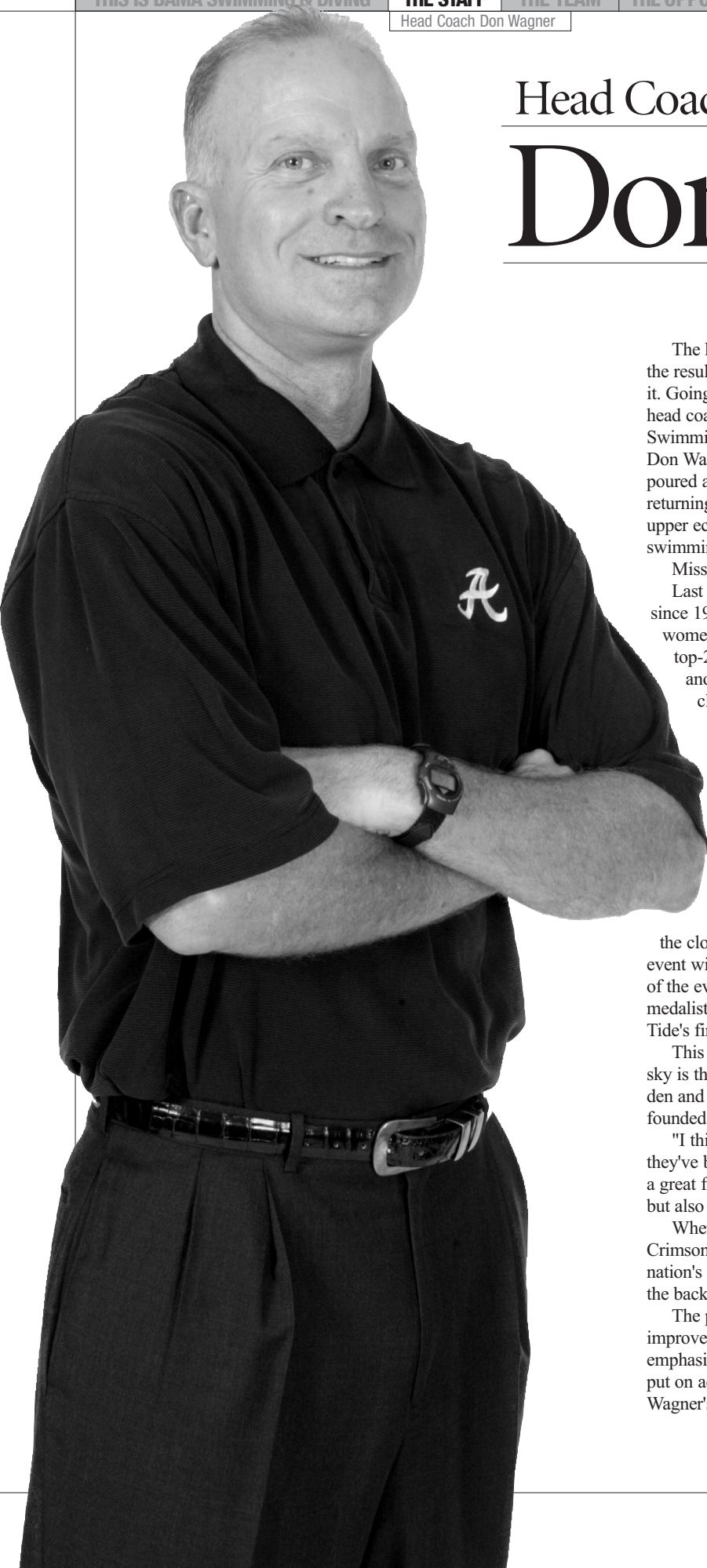

Head Coach

Don Wagner



The hours have been long, but the results have been well worth it. Going into his fourth season as head coach of the Alabama Swimming and Diving program, Don Wagner and his staff have poured all their energy into returning the Crimson Tide to the upper echelon of collegiate swimming and diving.

Mission accomplished.

Last season, for the first time since 1994, both the men and women's teams finished in the top-20. This season, after another standout recruiting class, the Tide, under Wagner's expert guidance, is set to continue its march toward the very top.

Not only has Wagner restocked Alabama's roster with top-notch talent, he's also got some world beaters in the mix.

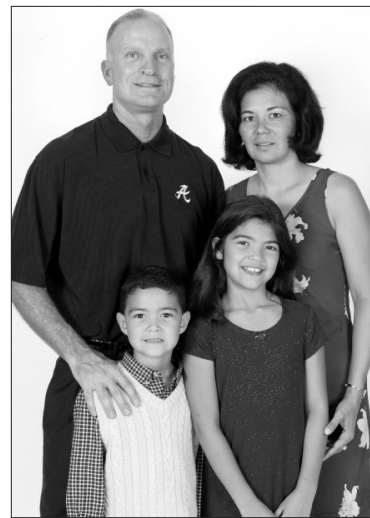
Junior Anne Poleska posted the fourth fastest 200 breaststroke time ever last season in the finals of the NCAA Championships where she finished third in the fastest final in the history of the event. Sophomore Stefan Gherghel was racing against history and the clock in the NCAA finals of the 200 butterfly. Not only did he win the event with a school record, but he posted the third fastest time in the history of the event. The only two men who have been faster are Olympic gold medalists Pablo Morales and Melvin Stewart. Gherghel's win marked the Tide's first swimming NCAA title since 1983.

This is what Wagner and his staff have managed in just three years. The sky is the limit for the years to come. And while the success has been sudden and dramatic, there is no magic formula for it. The Tide's success is founded on hard work, dedication and a belief in the program.

"I think almost to a person, the swimmers feel really good about what they've been able to accomplish in a short span of time," Wagner said. "It's a great foundation for what we can do. Success is not just working hard, but also being confident, not just in yourself, but in your teammates."

When Wagner took over as Alabama's coach in March of 1999, the Crimson Tide was a program in need of a confidence boost. One of the nation's elite programs since the mid-'70s, the late '90s saw the Tide slide to the back of the top-25.

The pool wasn't the only area of the Tide's mission to see immediate improvement. Grades, always good with the Crimson Tide, have been re-emphasized. The result of his encouragement and the emphasis that Wagner put on academics was a noticeable jump in the team grade point average Wagner's tenure.

In the pool, Wagner emphasizes the team concept, creating an atmosphere where success isn't the goal, but the norm. To build that success, Alabama works hard in every aspect of training, from dryland training to water workouts, attacking things with an enthusiasm and burgeoning confidence.

Wagner is neither surprised at the progress, nor satisfied. But he is happy with the start.

"We have gone after people who will not only help us, but would also continue the positive image that Alabama swimming and diving has in the classroom and the community," Wagner said. "We are a good team now and we are going to be a better team. We are going to win meets and we are going to swim fast. But we are going to do it the right way. This program is going to be balanced between academic and athletic success."

Wagner is a firm believer that balance in all things is the key to success. He has integrated that belief into every program he has been a part of and it has paid tremendous dividends.

"This program is not just about being a fast swimmer or a top diver," Wagner explains. "I think if you ignore the other parts of a person's growth, you can't be a good athlete. Being a top athlete and a top student absolutely go hand in hand."

Wagner isn't just satisfied with doing well; he wants his charges to do their very best in every aspect of life. He and his staff have worked hard to create, in a short period of time, an environment where tremendous and positive efforts are the norm.

"Our team grade point averages have been significantly better over the past two years. I know that was not by accident. Stressing academics made them not only better students, but better swimmers. It helped build their confidence. If we can give them the confidence to attack school and attack swimming and the discipline to follow through, we are helping them be more mature and responsible adults.

"That's my responsibility as their coach," Wagner said.

Overall, Wagner is happy with the progress the Crimson Tide has made in his short tenure. Grades, effort, attitude and results have improved across the board, dramatically in some cases.

"The future for Alabama swimming and diving is certainly bright," Wagner said. "I think if people want to see some great swimming and diving, Alabama is going to be the place. Our meets are going to be a lot of fun. We aren't swimming patsies. We're swimming good teams, and we're going to be competitive."

When Wagner was tapped to become Alabama's fourth head coach of the combined men and women's program, the Crimson Tide got

one of the nation's top coaches. His Tuscaloosa tenure was preceded by four years as head coach Texas A & M's women's program.

His stint with the Aggie women came on the heels of three seasons as U.S. Olympic coach Mark Schubert's top assistant and recruiting coordinator at Southern Cal.

Before Southern Cal, he was head coach of one of the United States Swimming's premiere clubs, Fullerton Aquatic Sports Team, for three years. During his time with Fullerton, he coached swimming legend Janet Evans among others. Wagner started his career with a six-year stint as an assistant with the University of Arizona.

In addition to his regular coaching gigs, the former University of Nebraska swimmer has answered his country's call more than a few times, having served on four national team and two Olympic Festival staffs. In 1995, he served as head coach of the U.S. World University Games squad. Other international stops included assistant coach of the U.S. Pan Pacific squad in 1989 and 1991.

Wagner knew that his Alabama staff had to be top of the line because of the responsibility invested in them. One of the things he learned from his last coaching stop as an assistant was the power of delegation.

"What I learned from Mark (Schubert), while coaching at Southern Cal, was to surround yourself with the absolute best, and trust them to do their job," Wagner said. "That's what I've done at Alabama. Our staff is one of the nation's finest. They're going to do a great job and I'm going to let them."

The pace Wagner has set has been relentless. Returning Alabama to the elite has demanded extreme dedication, hard work and teamwork by the Tide staff. They have answered the call, but it has left down time at a premium.

Still, despite the crazy schedule, there are some spare moments and those are spent with his family. Wagner is married to the former Alice Igawa. The couple has two children, a daughter Savannah and a son Ryan.

"A good off day is spent with the family," Wagner allows. "Both Ryan and Savannah like to ride their bikes and go swimming. Ryan likes to watch football with me, so sometimes during the weekend we'll do that together or all of us will go to Books-A-Million and read, which is fun."

And after practice during the week, while Dad's on the phone with recruits, or planning out the next day's practice, the rest of the Wagner family can often be found in the pool, proving that swimming is truly a family affair.

Associate Head Coach

Arthur Albiero

An integral part to the Crimson Tide's recent success story, Arthur Albiero was elevated to associate head coach this past summer, in time for his fourth season with the Crimson Tide.

Albiero joined the Tide at the same time Wagner took over the program in the spring of 1999. During their combined tenure, Alabama has returned to upper echelon of collegiate swimming, with both the men and the women's team finishing in the top-20 last season.

"Arthur has been an invaluable part of this program since the day he arrived on campus as evidenced by the progress we have made over the last three years," Wagner said. "His commitment and dedication to Alabama warranted this promotion. He certainly has the utmost respect of the athletes, staff and coaching peers."

In addition to overseeing the Tide's middle distance and stroke athletes, Albiero helps direct all areas of the program, from recruiting to strength and conditioning.

"I am honored to have this opportunity and by the commitment the University of Alabama and the athletics department have made to the swimming and diving program," Albiero said. "We've had a steady climb with this program and I look forward to continuing that trend. Working with the top caliber athletes that we have brought to Alabama has been absolutely rewarding. I look forward to every day."

This is in fact Albiero's second stint in Tuscaloosa. His introduction to Alabama swimming came in 1986. He came to Tuscaloosa with a group of athletes from his native Brazil to attend the Alabama Swim Camp. He was 13 year's old. Former Alabama and U.S. Olympic coach Don Gambriel ran the camp.

"I was kind of overwhelmed," Albiero remembered. "It was far from home, but we had a lot of fun."

In the Spring of 1999, Alabama came calling, asking him to return to the Capstone. It was a different Don calling, but the opportunity head coach Don Wagner was presenting was just as persuasive.

Albiero brings the kind of dedication and ability to the Alabama deck necessary for head coach Don Wagner's style of coaching.

Albiero was an 18-time All-American swimmer for Oakland University where he helped lead the Pioneers to three straight NCAA Division II team titles. He also earned three NCAA titles and was Scholastic All-American three years in a row.

In 1996, he graduated from Oakland with a Bachelor's degree after majoring in Psychology and minoring in Exercise Physiology.

After leaving Oakland, he joined the coaching staff at Kenyon College, the most dominant NCAA Division III program in history. During his three year stint there, the Lords and Ladies won six national championships, three each for the men and the women.

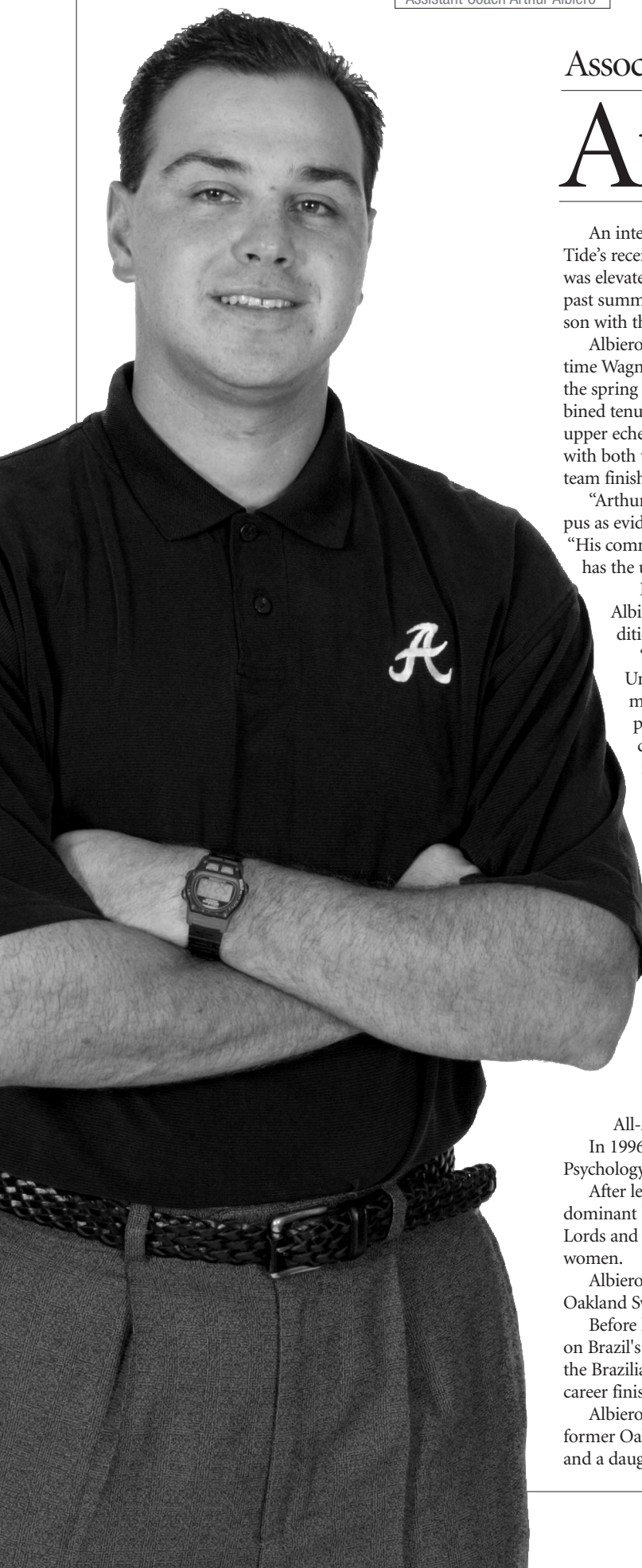
Albiero has also coached the Oakland Live Y'ers in Michigan as well working the Oakland Swim Camp and the Total Performance Swim Camp during the summers.

Before his collegiate swimming career, Albiero was one of the up and coming talents on Brazil's national swimming scene. The Sao Paulo native was a perennial finalist at the Brazilian National Championships in the IM and backstroke events. His highest career finish at the national championships was second place in the 200 IM.

Albiero is married to the former Amy Comerford, a native of Columbus, Ohio and a former Oakland swimming standout. The couple have two sons, Estefan and Nicolas, and a daughter Gabriela.

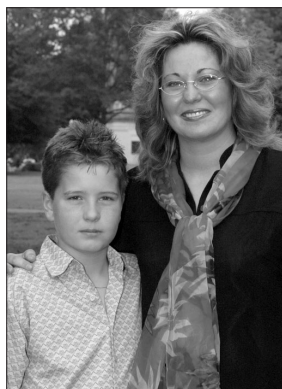


Estefan, Arthur, Nicholas, Amy and Gabriela Albiero



Assistant Coach

Laura Ghilik-Micu

As a former national champion in her native Romania, Laura Ghilik-Micu knows what it takes to be a champion. As the coach of European Champions, she knows what it takes to lead a champion. Both of these qualities, along with not being complacent with what she has accomplished in her career are what bring her to Alabama.

Swimming has been a part of Laura Ghilik for more than 17 years now. She started swimming in 1974, at the age of six. She won numerous awards during her career, including the Romanian National Championship in the backstroke event for juniors and seniors. Ghilik wanted to be a coach, and she had to choose between school and athletics when she entered college.

The old rule in Romania was either you went to school or you were an athlete. There was no such title as 'student-athlete'.

"Kids in the United States are very privileged to be able to do both, even though the rules are not like that anymore in Romania, they don't realize how fortunate they have been to be able to compete while in school," she said.

Ghilik chose school and pursuing her career as a coach in 1990 at the National Academy for Physical Education and Sport in Bucharest, Romania. There she earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education and by 1998 she became nationally certified as a First Class swimming coach.

Her coaching career started by leading two different club teams from 1990 through 1995, when she was appointed by the Romanian State Department as County Inspector for Sport Activities. Two years later, in 1997, she was a coach on the Romanian Olympic Team, where they took sixth place in the 2000 Sydney Games. She coached the Romanian juniors to a first place finish at the European Championships. But even after all of this success, Ghilik still was not content on what she had accomplished.

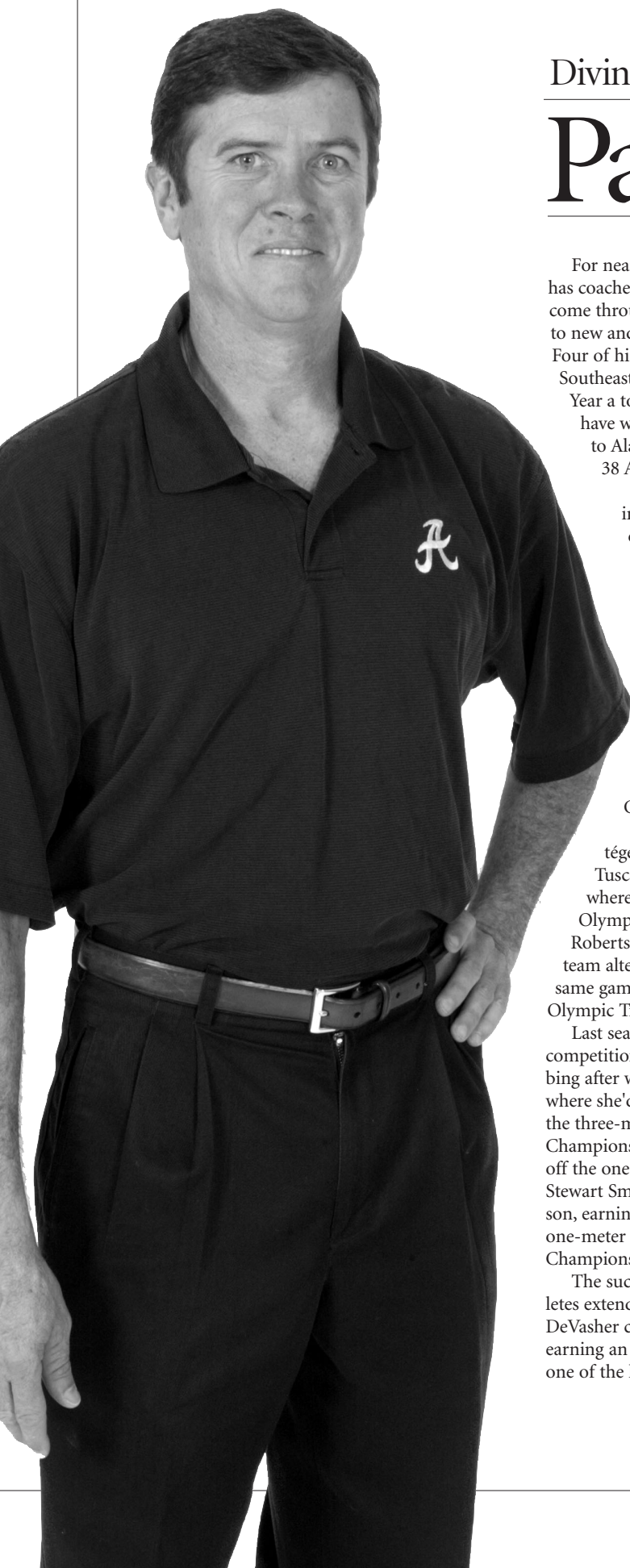
"I felt that my mission was not complete as a coach. I feel that you have to branch out and see other forms of the sport," she said. "American swimming is different than European when it comes to the college aspect, and Americans are very good at swimming, so I told myself I have to know this part of it, and after this, I'll be a very good coach."

After coaching in Romania for eleven years, Laura came to the United States two years ago, coaching at Nebraska for the final five months of the 2001 season. When she came to Tuscaloosa to interview for a position on Don Wagner's staff, it was her first experience at the Capstone. Her next visit was an even better one; she came as an Assistant Coach for the Crimson Tide. Ghilik does not see this opportunity as a short visit; she plans to stay as long as she is wanted.

"I would like to stay and help develop this program," Ghilik said. "If you want see the results you have to work a while and be patient."

Laura enjoys writing, and has been published several times in Romanian magazines and journals. She has a son, Eduard, who is 9, and a swimmer like his mother. Eduard swims for the Crimson Tide Athletics club.





Diving Coach

Pat Greenwell

For nearly two decades, Pat Greenwell has coached some of the finest athletes to come through the Crimson Tide program to new and increasingly dizzying heights. Four of his athletes have been named Southeastern Conference Diver of the Year a total of five times. His athletes have won 14 SEC titles since he came to Alabama for the 1988 season and 38 All-American honors.

And in 1998, after coming so close, so many times, one of Greenwell's athletes took the step from contender to champion on the national stage.

Brent Roberts became Greenwell's first NCAA Champion, taking top honors off the 10m platform. It marked the first time since 1983 that an Alabama athlete has stood atop the dais at the NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships.

In 2000, Greenwell protégé Rafael Alvarez traveled from Tuscaloosa to Sydney, Australia, where he competed in his third Olympiad for his native Spain. Roberts was the United States Olympic team alternate on the platform for the same games after finishing third at the Olympic Trials.

Last season Lane Bassham returned to competition after a year off spent rehabbing after wrist surgery and picked up where she'd left off as a freshman. She won the three-meter title at the SEC Championships and was an All-American off the one and three-meter boards. Stewart Smith ripped into his rookie season, earning All-American honors off the one-meter board at the NCAA Championships.

The success of Greenwell's student-athletes extends to the classroom as well. Jill DeVasher capped off her career in 1988 by earning an SEC Postgraduate Scholarship, one of the league's most prestigious ac-

ademic honors. Mark Rourke, a 1991 graduate of the program, brought the swimming and diving program its first NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship, one of the most prestigious awards offered on the national level.

Greenwell has a well established reputation as one of the nation's top coaches over the past 20-plus years. A teacher of the sport, Greenwell is known for getting the most out of his diver's talents and abilities. He has earned Southeastern Conference "Coach of the Year" honors four times, the most by any conference coach over the same span.

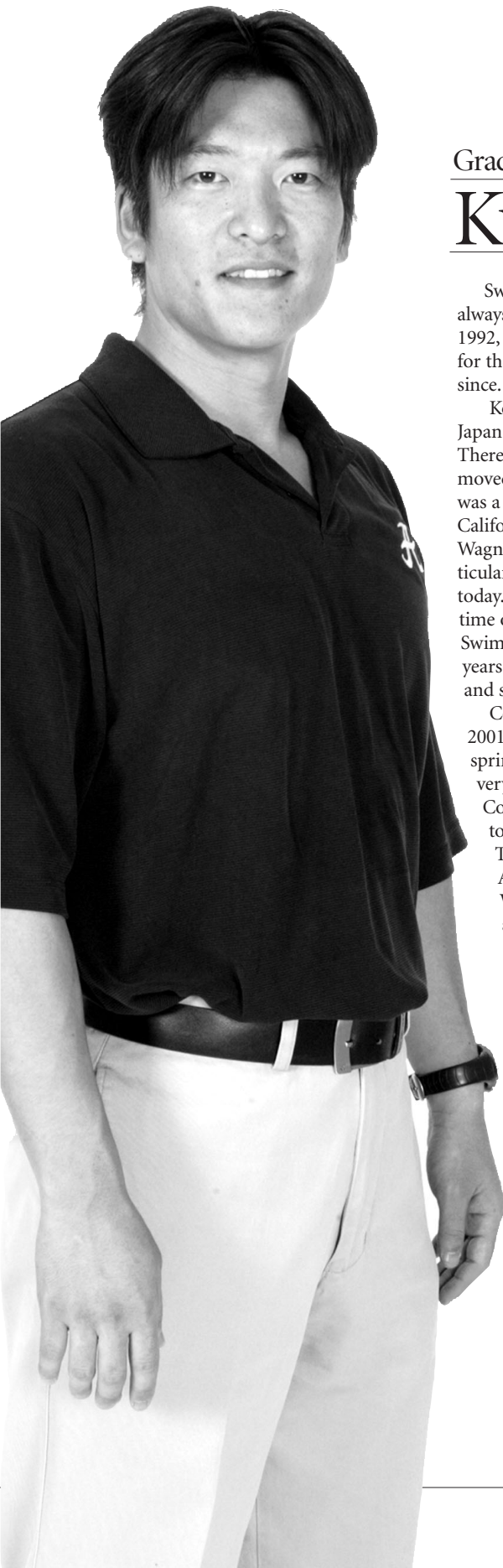
His pupils populate the upper echelon of the Southeastern Conference and NCAA ranks year in and year out. Not only does he make good divers great, he makes great divers into champions.

Brent Roberts (1997 and 1998), Ed Morse (1990), Rourke (1991) and Alvarez (1995) have all been tabbed SEC "Diver of the Year". Under Greenwell's tutelage, Rourke became the first diver in conference history to win all three diving events at the SEC Championships, doing so in 1991. Since the Tampa, Fla. native inherited the tradition rich Alabama program in the fall of 1987, Crimson Tide divers have bettered three of the six SEC Championship diving records.

Greenwell's success at Alabama comes after a five-year stint at Clemson University. The Tigers dove to four individual Atlantic Coast Conference titles while Greenwell was at the helm.

He dove collegiately at the University of Pittsburgh, garnering All-America honors on the way to earning his bachelor's degree in health and physical education in 1981. While coaching at Clemson, Greenwell earned his master's degree in post-secondary counseling.

An active member of U.S. Diving as both a coach and a judge, Greenwell has served as the U.S. National Coach for competitions in China and Canada. In 1997 and 1999 he served as the U.S. judge at the World University Games.

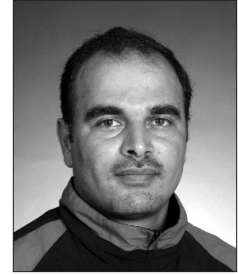
Kunio Kono

Swimming since the age of seven, Kunio Kono has always wanted to coach swimmers. On Christmas Day 1992, his wish came true. Kono came to the United States for the first time that day, and he's been coaching here ever since.

Kono's first stop in the U.S. from his home in Osaka, Japan was the Phoenix Swim Club in Phoenix, Arizona. There he volunteered as a coach for six months until he moved to Los Angeles. During the summer of 1993, he was a volunteer assistant for the University of Southern California, and it was there that he met Coach Don Wagner. Kono had no idea to the importance of that particular meeting. It would later bring him to where he is today. Six months there after he returned to Arizona, this time offering his assistance to the University of Arizona Swim Team, where he has been coaching for the last eight years. While at Arizona, Kono coached 12 All-Americans and seven Olympians.

Coach Wagner called Kunio during the summer of 2001 and offered him a graduate assistant spot coaching sprinters, his previous position at Arizona. "Kunio is very knowledgeable and good at communicating," Coach Wagner said. "His greatest strength is his ability to instill confidence in the athletes." Kunio came to Tuscaloosa and viewed the campus, seeing the Aquatics Center, and meeting some of the team. Within three days, Kono had accepted the graduate assistant position for the University of Alabama Swimming and Diving team.

Kono says he enjoys being an assistant coach, and would rather do that than become a head man. "I'm studying Fine Arts now, doing photography and painting, and I want to do both. So my time is taken by two different things," he said. Kono studied graphic design at Arizona, and enjoyed computer engineering. Kunio says his favorite part of coaching is that he loves to work with the athletes. "I want us to grow individually, and grow as a team, and I enjoy that the most," he said. "I'm enjoying the campus, the people, the team, and the coaching staff. I really love working with them."

Medical Staff

Even with the most physically conditioned athletes, injury can occur. The University of Alabama is prepared for such moments, with a full staff of doctors and athletic trainers ready to lend their expertise to any medical situation so Alabama's athletes can return to play in peak condition as soon as it's safe and possible.

Dr. Jimmy Robinson, Dr. Craig Buettner and Dr. Jeff Laubenthal all volunteer their time to ensure that Crimson Tide athletes stay in peak medical condition. They supervise the total healthcare needs of all of Alabama's athletes. Other physicians helping to keep the Tide healthy include Dr. Les Fowler and Dr. James Andrews (orthopedics).

Rodney Brown heads the athletic training staff. He works primarily with football in the football-training complex.

The full-time staff at Coleman Coliseum includes Sherry Kimbro (women's basketball, swimming and diving, and volleyball), John Morr (men's basketball, men and women's tennis, softball and men's and women's golf), Ginger Gilmore (baseball, soccer and cheerleading), Bernard Burroughs, (men and women's track and field), and Monica Decker (gymnastics)

The athletic training staff also consists of 9 graduate assistants: Joshua Warren (men's and women's swimming), Erica Dixon (softball), Brian Parker (soccer), Chris Mudd (cheerleading), Jen Vaughan (volleyball), Colleen McCready (women's track and field), Clint Haggard (football), Brian Metz (football) and Eric Law (men's and women's tennis).

Trainers can spend an average of 10 to 12 hours a day on the job depending on what point of the season the team is in.

Student athletic trainers receive hands-on experience as a part of the CAAHEP athletic training education program at the University of Alabama. Each student trainer gains experience by working with one contact sport as well as with one non-contact sport. Dr. Ken Wright's high school outreach was designed to give more student trainers the opportunity to work with contact sports, especially football.

Student trainers must maintain a GPA of at least 2.50. Student trainers are given a monthly stipend depending on their level of experience in the program.

Alabama ensures the safety of its athletes by assigning at least one trainer to each team to cover home and away events, conditioning, practice and travel.

Strength & Conditioning Staff

Behind the impressive gains by the swimmers and divers last year was the extensive dryland and weight workout routines performed by the Crimson Tide. This winning combination and the amazing rise of Alabama since Don Wagner has taken over have produced athletes who are fit, competitive and have superb strength-to-weight ratios.

Utilizing all four of the athletic departments weight rooms according to group, season, and plan, the Tide swimmers work on core body strength and swimming specific exercises designed to translate directly into superior performance in the pool.

Individual differences and needs are taken into account as athletes feel that the program is designed especially for their goals. Much time is taken with proper technique, as well as well-recorded data on weight room performance for all lifts, phases and cycles.

Coaches Don Wagner and Arthur Albiero along with volunteer assistant coach Ali Nawwas have developed a flexible routine compromised of body weight exercises and modified circuit training. Much time is taken to develop core body strength not only with free weights and weight machines, but also physio-ball routines and specialized equipment training. Each athlete is assessed according to the kind of strength training experience they bring to the Capstone. Based on their previous experiences and individual needs, the sprint athletes go through a four week general strength training period that gives everyone superior technique and base strength. Then, every two to four weeks, the lifting cycle changes to ensure continuing gains in the development of speed power and speed endurance.

The strength and conditioning staff and the swimming and diving coaches design workouts with the individual athlete's needs in mind. The staff produces workout regimens for Alabama athletes that consist of year round strength training and includes workouts they can conduct should they choose to spend their summers away from Tuscaloosa.

The swimming staff works hand in hand with the Crimson Tide's strength and conditioning staff under the direction of Terry Jones, a former football standout for the University of Alabama from 1975-1977 as well as a player for the Green Bay Packers for eight years. Jones is in his 11th year assisting the strength and conditioning program at the Capstone. Jones played both center and defensive tackle for the Crimson Tide and, in his collegiate football career, Alabama won three Southeastern Conference Championships, two Sugar Bowl titles and the 1976 Liberty Bowl crown under then-head coach Paul W. "Bear" Bryant.

Assistant strength and conditioning coach Steve Martin heads up the strength and conditioning for the men and women's swimming and diving teams.

The 2003 • Women's Preview

The 2003 Crimson Tide roster comes in at a trim 18 athletes, but there is much talent in that number. Seven freshmen, one sophomore, five juniors and five seniors populate the roster, led by returning All-Americans Anne Poleska, Lane Bassham, Catalina Casaru and Meghan Lynch.

Poleska finished third in both the 100 and 200 breaststrokes at last year's NCAA Championship and became the first Tide swimmer or diver to defend an SEC event title. She has now won four SEC titles, repeating as 100 and 200 breaststroke champion last season, and holds four individual team records and the 200 breaststroke conference mark. Joining Poleska in the breaststroke lane will be senior Holly McCreless.

Diving will be another strong point for the Tide. After taking missing her second Tide season while rehabbing after wrist surgery, redshirt junior Lane Bassham came back with a vengeance last year, earning All-American honors off both the one and three-meter boards. She also won the three-meter diving event at the SEC Championships. Joining her off the boards will be senior Katherine Bortelanger, sophomore Miranda Matias, senior Laine Patterson and rookie Crystal Rasmussen.

Junior Catalina Casaru is extremely versatile and led the Tide in the 200 butterfly, 200 backstroke last season and was tough in the 200 and 400 IMs as well. Casaru holds the school record in the 400 IM.

Senior butterflyer Meghan Lynch had some back luck last season, which included breaking her nose late in the season, but she should be ready to make an impact in her senior season, hopefully regaining the All-American form of her sophomore year. Joining Lynch and Casaru in the butterfly events will be freshmen Victoria Genova and Candace Weiman.

Junior Ann Ross is the Tide's top returning 100 backstroker, ranking in Alabama's all-time Top-10. Along with Casaru in the 200, Ross will be joined in the backstroke lane by rookie Kathryn Hallquist, junior Liz McGiffin and senior Kelly Ker.

The freestyle events will largely be the realm of the freshmen. While Poleska can swim a mean 200 freestyle (she holds the school record in that event), she will likely be busy in other events. Rookies Sonya Adams, Genova, Anna Grant and Alison Lavefers will all have to step up in year one. Ross could see sprint freestyle action while McGiffin could see middle distance and distance freestyle work as well.

SEC SWIMMING & DIVING



The Southeastern Conference has long been one of the nation's premiere athletic conferences both in overall strength and in nearly every sport individually. Swimming and diving is certainly no exception. The SEC has placed at least one team in the top-10 of the NCAA Championships every year since the first title tilt in 1982. That first championship had four SEC team's among the top-10 including No. 1 Florida, No. 4 Auburn, No. 9 Alabama and No. 10 Tennessee.

Individually the SEC has won over 100 individual NCAA titles. Tracy Caulkins of Florida is perhaps the conference's greatest champion, the Olympic gold medalist earned 12 individual NCAA titles in her three-year collegiate career.

Megan Neyer, another Gator, ranks as the conference's greatest diver. She swept the one and three-meter boards each year of her career, giving her a total of eight titles from 1982 to 1986.

While Florida long dominated the national scene with 13 top-3 finishes, including the 1982 national titles, Georgia has come on over the last several years, winning three NCAA titles in a row, 1999-2001. Last season Auburn extended the conference's winning streak to four, winning its first national crown while UGA finished second.

The conference put six team's in the national top-10 in 2001 and five teams last season.

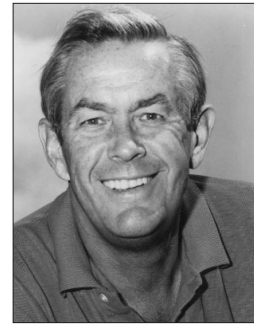
The SEC holds eight NCAA records with six individual and two relay marks.

There are 12 SEC Schools: Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU, Mississippi, Mississippi State, South Carolina, Tennessee and Vanderbilt. Of the 12 SEC schools, nine currently sponsor swimming and diving Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU, South Carolina and Tennessee.

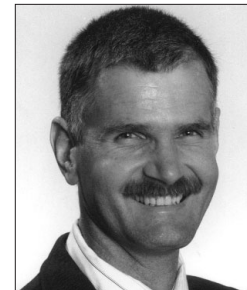

Alabama in the SEC

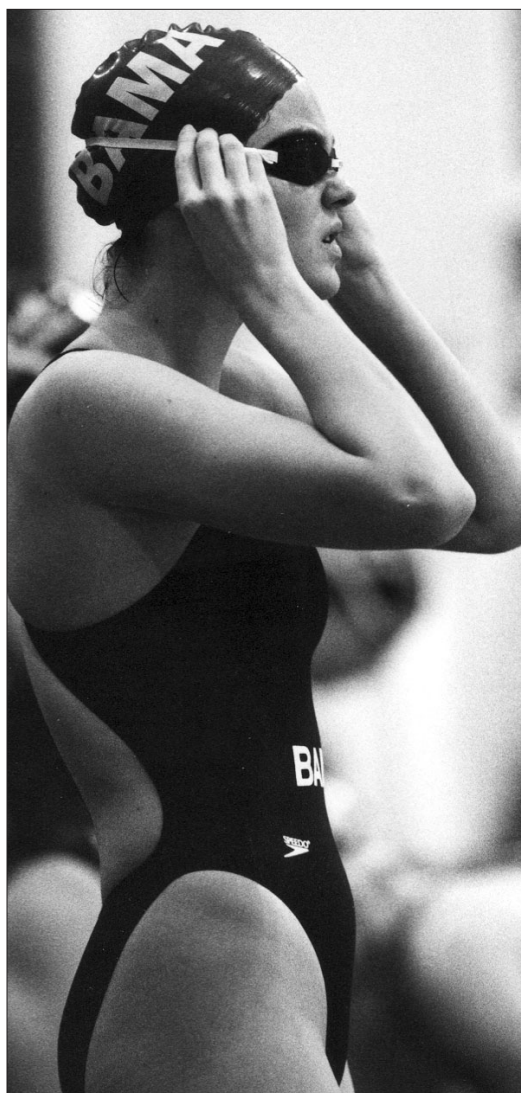
When the Crimson Tide won the 1985 Southeastern Conference team title, it became the first team to unseat the University of Florida as the SEC champion. To date, Georgia is the only other team to unseat the Gators.

The Tide has won 27 individual SEC titles. The first came in 1981 when Barbara Logan won both the one and three-meter diving events and the latest came last season when Anne Poleska defended her 100 and 200 breaststroke titles and Lane Bassham won the three-meter diving title. Alabama's latest SEC Record came in 2001 when Poleska set standard for others to strive for in the 200 breaststroke. Four relay titles belong to Alabama. The first came in 1983 when the Tide won the 800 free relay. Alabama claims 12 first-team All-SEC selections, Logan being the first and Poleska and Bassham being the latest. Poleska was named the 2001 SEC Freshman of the Year.

Academically, the Tide has earned Academic All-SEC honors 81 times since 1984.

Alabama on the National Scene

The Crimson Tide women competed in the AIAW division from 1974 to 1981, after which time they moved into the NCAA division. While in the AIAW the Tide had six top-20 finishes, the highest was fourth at the 1976 championships.

The Tide moved to the NCAA in 1982. Since that time Alabama has posted seven Top-10 finishes, the highest being a fifth-place finish at the 1983 championship.

The Tide lays claim to seven individual national collegiate titles. Angelika Knipping won the last one in 1983 winning the 50 breaststroke and setting an NCAA record in the process.

ALABAMA WOMEN'S Swimming & Diving HISTORY

THE GARY ILLMAN YEARS

The University of Alabama added women's swimming to its roster of sports in 1975. Gary Illman served as the women's inaugural coach, leading the Crimson Tide through its first three seasons, posting a 14-5 dual meet record during his time at the Capstone. With Illman at the helm, 13 swimmers earned All-America honors.

It was also under Illman's tutelage that Vicky Stanely and Christina Jarvis became the Tide's first national champions in 1976.

Stanely won the 1976 AIAW 50 freestyle title, setting an AIAW record in the process.

Jarvis touched first in both the 100 and 200 breaststroke becoming the AIAW champion in both events. A year later, Jarvis would successfully defend her titles from 1976 and add the 50 breaststroke title as well, giving her a two year total of five national titles.

While Illman was at the helm, the Tide finished 29th in 1975, fourth in 1976 and ninth in 1977, at the AIAW Championships.

THE HAROLD LANIER YEARS

Illman was followed by Harold Lanier in 1978. Lanier's teams produced a two-year slate of 11-3 in dual meet competition and 15 swimmers earned All-America status.

In the AIAW Championships, the Tide finished 16th and 11th in 1978 and 1979 respectively.

During Lanier's tenure, Marla Brooksbank started a career that would make her one of the most successful swimmers in Alabama history. As a freshman in 1979, Brooksbank finished second at the AIAW Championships in the 1650 freestyle. The next year at the World University Games held in Mexico City, she won the 800 freestyle.

THE DON GAMBRIL YEARS

In 1980, Don Gambрил unified Alabama's swimming programs adding the women's program coaching duties to a slate that already included the men's team.

After two years in AIAW competition, which saw the Tide finish 19th in 1980 and 18th in 1981, Gambрил's squad made the jump, beginning with the 1982 season, to NCAA competition.

It was in 1981, Gambрил's second year as head coach of the women's team, that Barbara Logan earned the Tide's first individual SEC title. Logan won both the one and three-meter diving titles.

The 1983 season saw Angelika Knipping win the SEC 200 breaststroke title. She went on to win NCAA 50 breaststroke crown that year in championship record time. 1983 would also see the Tide earn its highest NCAA finish to date, taking fifth place after producing a 10-1 dual meet record and a second place finish

at the SEC Championships.

In 1985, Alabama became the first, and to date only, SEC team to beat the University of Florida in a dual meet on its way to posting its first, and only undefeated dual meet season, going 12-0. Alabama added another first to its growing list by becoming the first team to unseat Florida as conference champions.

The Tide won out over the Lady Gators in the University of Georgia's Stegeman pool, breaking Florida's string of four SEC titles.

Alabama won six individual SEC titles in 1985 and two relay titles. Kim Nicholson won the 50 freestyle and the 100 backstroke in 1985, upping her career total to four, a Tide record.

Alabama's eight total SEC titles in 1985 rank as the most in a single year for the Tide.

Overall, Gambрил produced a dual meet record of 100-26 over the 11 years he coached the Tide women, making him one of the few coaches in the country to coach both a men's and women's to a 100 or more dual meet wins each.

There have been 18 individual and relay SEC championships, six AIAW individual titles and one NCAA individual title for the Tide women.

Jonty Skinner took control of the women's program in the spring of 1990 when Gambрил left coaching to become an assistant athletic director at Alabama.

THE JONTY SKINNER YEARS

Jonty Skinner posted a short, but highly successful tenure as Alabama's head coach. Under his direction, Alabama brought home three SEC individual titles. Ragga Runolfsdottir won the 200 breaststroke title in 1991 while Katherine Rhodes won it in 1994. In between Jennifer Mahaney won the SEC platform diving title on her way to setting an SEC record. As a team, Alabama posted its first top-10 national finish in seven years under Skinner's direction when the 1993 team finished 10th.

1994 was the Tide's best year under Skinner. The Tide broke 12 different school records and posted a ninth place finish at the NCAA Championships. In addition to winning the SEC 200 breast title in 1994, Rhodes set the Tide's first SEC swimming record since Angelika Knipping set the 50 breast record in 1983.

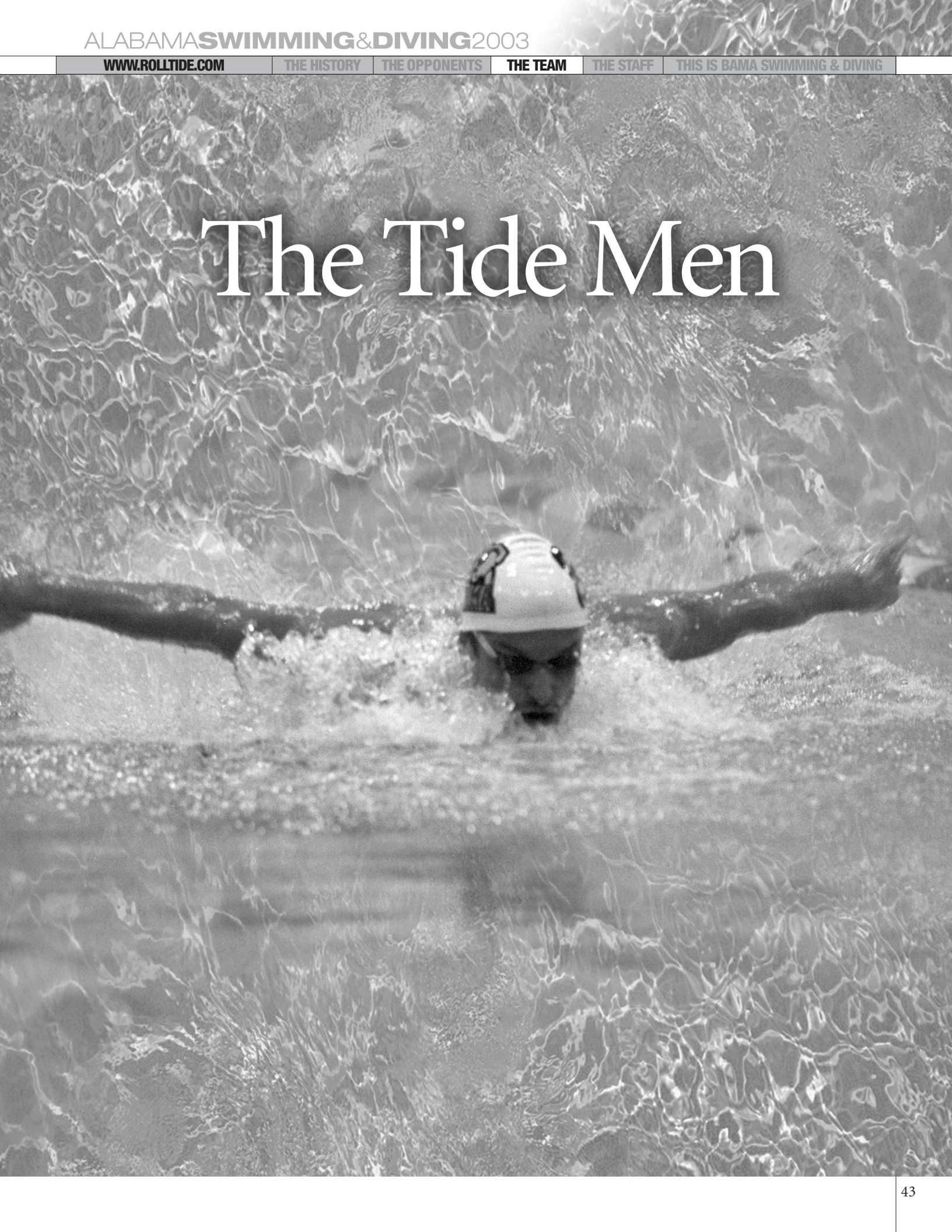
For his work with the 1994 squad, Skinner was named SEC Coach of the Year.

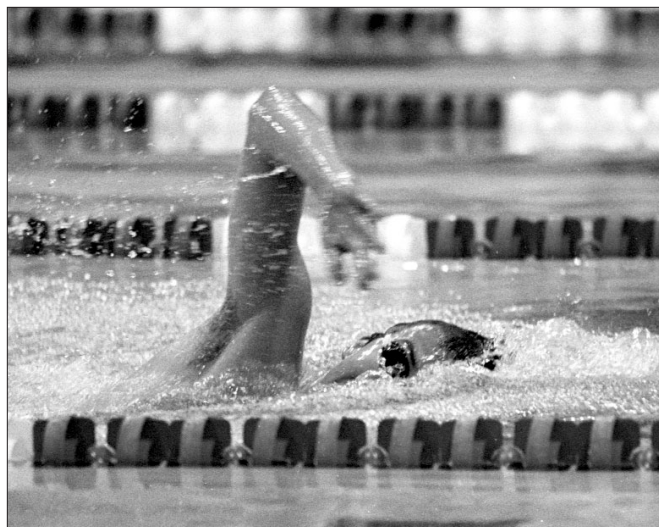
Skinner left Alabama in August of 1994 to become the head coach of the U.S. Resident National Team.

THE CHUCK HORTON YEARS

Following Skinner's departure, former Tide assistant coach Chuck Horton was chosen to coach Alabama. His tenure ran from 1994 through August of 1998 and included a trio of top-25 national finishes. During his tenure, three members of the Tide, Amy DeVasher, Ann-Sofie Joensson and Jill DeVasher, earned prestigious postgraduate scholarships. Amy DeVasher and Joensson earned NCAA scholarships and Jill DeVasher's came from the Southeastern Conference. Ed Reed served as interim coach for the 1998-99 season, and Don Wagner was hired in March of 1999 to lead the Tide into the new millennium.

The 2003 • Men's Preview

The Crimson Tide's 2003 roster is made up of a nice mix of young and old. There are 10 freshmen, six sophomores, nine juniors and one senior. Alabama will again be led by returning All-Americans Stefan Gherghel and Stewart Smith.

Gherghel is as steady as he is spectacular. In addition to his NCAA title, he shattered the 100 and 200 butterfly school records, bettering the marks set by Olympic champion Jon Sieben in 1985. In another Olympic tie-in, the only two men that stand in front of Gherghel in the 200 butterfly, all-time, are Olympic champs Melvin Stewart and Pablo Morales. Along with senior Charles Reeves, sophomore Spiros Bitsakis and former Tider Jordie Proffitt, Gherghel set the school 400 medley relay mark last season, eclipsing the previous record set in 1991.

Diving duties will be in good hands with the return of Smith who was named SEC Freshman Diver of the Year last season. Smith will be joined by freshmen Alan Harris, JR Hillis and

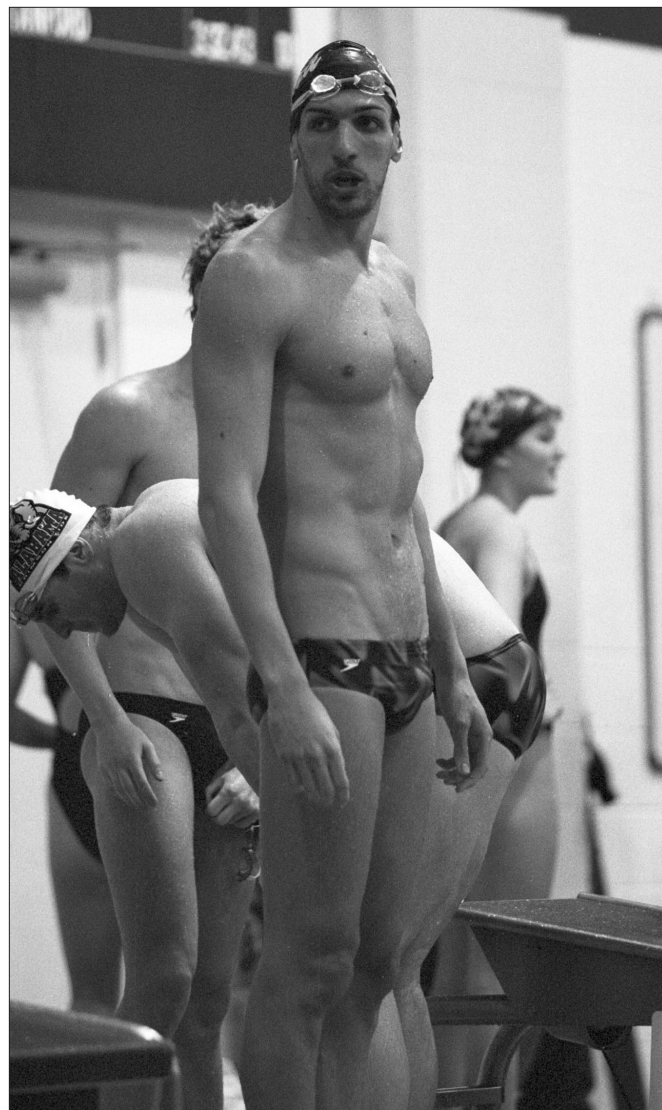
junior Anthony DiGiacco.

Joining Gherghel in the butterfly events will be sophomore Chris Flamion, redshirt-junior Zach Winchester and freshmen JT Jones and Guido Arroyo.

In the backstroke events, Alabama will look to multi-event star sophomore Franck Southon, who ranks second all-time for the Tide in the 200 backstroke. In the spring backstroke junior Brendan Ashby will be available for duty along with redshirt-junior Scott Weaver. Weaver sat out last season to rehab his shoulder.

Alabama's lone senior this season, Reeves has been steady as the Tide's go-to guy in the breaststroke events over the last two seasons, ranking in the Tide's all-time top-10 in both the 100 and 200 breaststrokes. This season he will be joined by rookies Vlad Polyakov and Bernardo Romero along with sophomore Evan Mueller and junior Adam Hall.

There will be host of athletes ready for duty in the IM events led by Southon, who ranks second all-time for the Tide in the

400 IM and junior Ben Worby who is fourth all-time in the 200 and 400 IM. Weaver is also an IM standout along with Romero.

In the freestyle, the Tide will be led in the sprints by sophomore Spiros Bitsakis. Bitsakis joined Alabama for the spring semester last year and made an immediate impact. He posted the Tide's top 50 and 100 freestyle times and became the fifth fastest Tider all-time in the 50 freestyle. Also making a big impact in the sprint freestyle events last season was Ashby.

Junior James Willcox was the Tide's top 200 freestyler last season, cracking the Tide's all-time

top-10. Also making some 200 noise was Southon and Gherghel, giving the Tide a potent 800 freestyle relay. Jones will be the Tide's first true distance swimmer on the men's side in several years, though Southon and Willcox are both strong in the middle distance events.

Also available for freestyle duty will be rookies Apostolis Tsagarakis, Brent Arckey, Matt Schmidt and Darren Erasmus along with juniors Ben Worby, Brad Willard and Jeff Smith.

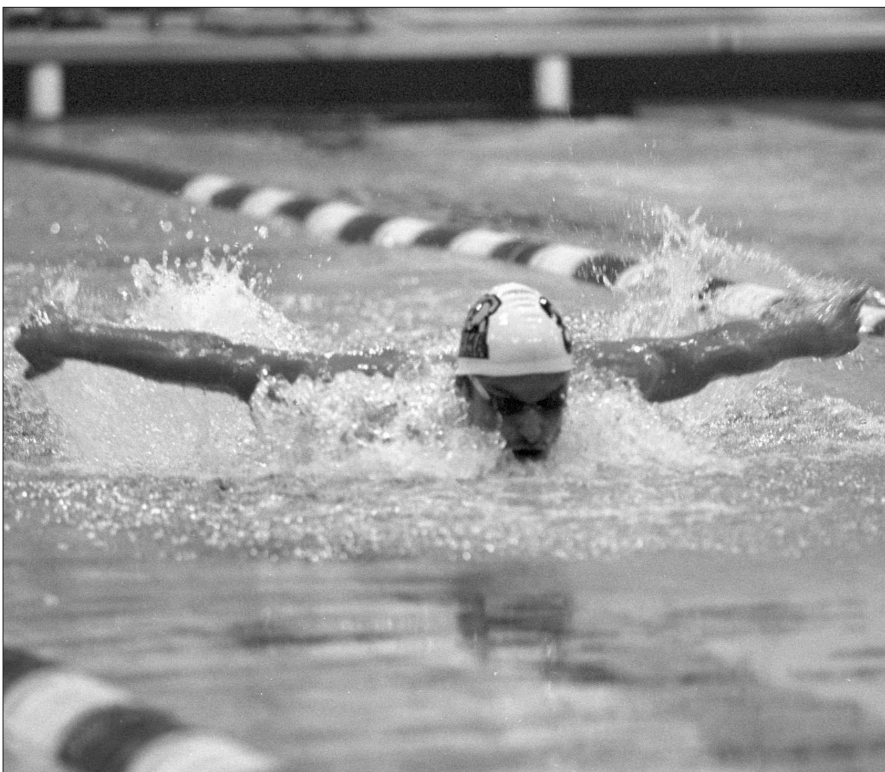

Alabama on the National Scene

The Crimson Tide's highest NCAA finish came when Alabama earned the runner-up position at the 1977 championships. Alabama has finished in the top-10 a total of 11 times, and in the top-25 a total of 22 times, including the 1997 season.

Individually, members of the Tide lay claim to eight individual NCAA titles. Jonty Skinner earned the first one, winning the 100 free in 1975. Members of the Tide have also set three NCAA records. Skinner set the 100 freestyle record. Casey Converse became the first man to break the 15 minute barrier in the 1650 freestyle on his way to winning the event in 1977. Converse also set an NCAA record in the 1000 freestyle during a dual meet at Auburn.

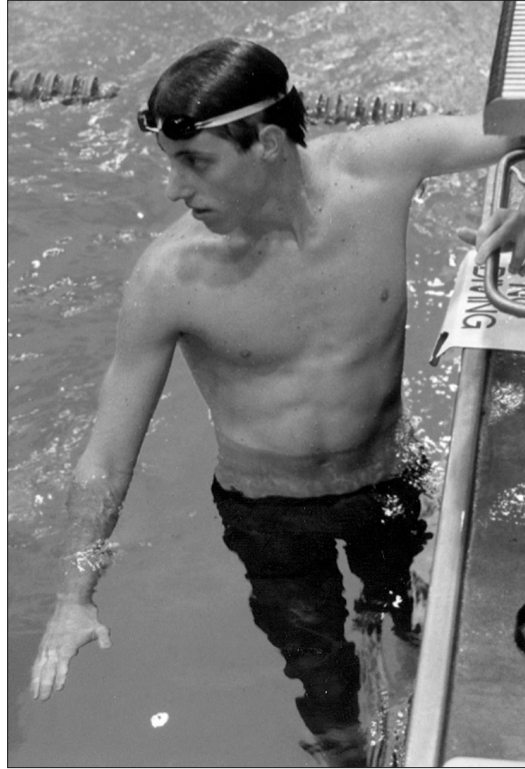

Swimming & Diving HISTORY

THE JOHN FOSTER YEARS

The University of Alabama swim program started with the 1960 season when John Foster came from coaching an age group swim team in the Atlanta area and working in the Georgia Tech Physical Education department to be the Crimson Tide's first head coach.

For the next 14 years Foster was the Tide's task master, nurturing the fledgling program into a perennial SEC contender and bringing Alabama to the national level. In addition to his duties with the swim team, Foster also served as the Natatorium Director, Supervisor of Intramural and Recreational Swimming and assistant professor in the Department of Physical Education.

Foster was responsible for cultivating swimming not only at the collegiate level, but on the high school and age group swimming level as well, organizing high school and junior high school state swimming championships and running clinics around the state, anything to get Alabama's youth involved in swimming.

Foster's hard work paid big dividends. During his tenure, Alabama finished no lower than third at the SEC Championships after its first two seasons and finished runner-up four times. Tide swimmers won 21 individual SEC titles under Foster's direction. That number includes the three won by Ralph Wright in 1967, when he became the first man in Alabama history to sweep his events at the SEC championships. Wright's feat would not be matched for fifteen years.

On the national level, Foster coached the Tide to its first NCAA Championship placing in 1973 when the team finished 28th. As individuals, five swimmers won All-American honors under Foster.

After compiling a 124-40 dual meet record to go along with his record in the SEC and NCAA, Foster left coaching after the 1973 season to devote more time to his teaching and aquatics program and above all, to spend more time with his family. Foster's team was the winningest of all that competed at the Capstone during his 14 year run, outside of football. Before retiring, Foster tapped his successor for the job of taking the Tide into the future. Don Gambril became the head coach of the Tide on May 2, 1973.

THE DON GAMBRIL YEARS

Don Gambril led his first Alabama team into the 1974 season, a year that saw the Tide post an 8-1 dual meet season, a fourth place finish at the SEC Championship meet and its first NCAA top-20 finish, taking 19th.

Alabama jumped two places in the SEC the next year and an astounding 14 places at the NCAA Championships, giving Alabama a fifth place finish. The '75 squad was the first to produce an individual national champion when freshman Jonty Skinner won the 100 freestyle in an NCAA and U.S. Open record time of 43.92.

Alabama produced the first 400 freestyle relay in history to break the three minute barrier. Skinner, Mike Curington, Scott MacDonald and Jack Babashoff combined in the prelims of the 1975 NCAA Championships to swim a 2:59.98.

The 1976 squad posted the Tide's first undefeated season. On its way to posting that undefeated season, Alabama snapped the Tennessee's string of 85 dual meet wins, which spanned seven seasons. Alabama won the meet 65-48. The 1976 squad also produced a single season record of nine SEC individual and relay titles on its way to reprising its fifth place finish in the NCAA.

The 1977 season proved to be one of the program's high water-marks as the Tide posted its highest NCAA finish to date, taking second behind Southern California.

Casey Converse shone in '77, winning the NCAA 1650 freestyle title in an NCAA and American record time of 14:57.30. Converse's time made him the first man in the history of swimming to go under 15 minutes in the 1650 freestyle.

Freshman Wayne Chester won the 1978 NCAA one-meter diving competition while Carlos Berrocal won the 100 backstroke title the next year.

Alabama won its first SEC team championship in 1982. Gregg Higginson added the points of three SEC titles to the Tide's team total, making him the second man in Tide swimming history to win all of his races at the SEC Championships. Alabama went undefeated during the 1983 dual meet season with a 12-0 slate on the way to a runnerup SEC finish and a fifth place NCAA finish. Senior Glenn Mills won the 1983 200 breaststroke title.

The Crimson Tide returned to the top of the SEC standings in 1987.

In addition to going undefeated in 1990 with a 12-0 record, the Tide captured nine SEC individual and relay titles matching the team record that was set in 1976. Junior Jon Olsen became the third man in the annals of Tide history to sweep his events at the SEC Championships, bringing home three individual titles in 1990.

After 17 seasons, 170 wins against 21 losses, six NCAA champions, more than 60 All-Americans, 60 SEC individual and relay titles, and two SEC team titles, Don Gambril ended his coaching career with the Crimson Tide after the 1990 season. Gambril was named SEC Coach of the Year in 1981, 82 and 87. In addition he served as an assistant coach with the U.S. Olympic team in 1968, 1972, 1976 and 1980. He served as the head coach of the highly successful 1984 U.S. Olympic team. The 1991 U.S. World Championship team was the last U.S. National team he coached. He left his coaching position to become an Assistant Athletic Director at Alabama, in charge of all men's sports with the exception of football and basketball. Women's track and swimming also fell under his auspices. He retired from that position in 1997.

Gambril tapped Alabama's first individual NCAA Champion to lead Alabama into the 1991 season and beyond. Jonty Skinner took the responsibility of taking the Crimson Tide into the future.

THE JONTY SKINNER YEARS

Jonty Skinner made the most of a short tenure with the Tide. The former Tide champion led Alabama to four straight top-20 and one top-10 showing at the NCAA Championships.

Jon Olsen became the Tide's most decorated and successful athlete under Skinner's tutelage. Olsen finished out his career with five SEC titles, three school records and a runner-up finish at the 1991 NCAAs in the 100 freestyle. After his stint with the Tide, Olsen went on to become a mainstay of the U.S. National team, winning five medals at two Olympics.

Also in 1991, Mark Rourke became the first diver to win all three boards at the SEC Championships, three years after he won the inaugural platform diving title at the 1989 SEC Championships.

Travis Myers led Alabama to a 10th place finish at the 1994 NCAA Championships, while finishing second in the 100 breaststroke. It was the Tide's first top-10 finish since 1990. Skinner left Alabama in August of 1994 to become the head coach of the U.S. resident national team.

THE CHUCK HORTON YEARS

Chuck Horton was the Tide's next mentor, serving as head coach from 1994-98. The former Tide assistant and Villanova front man led Alabama to four top-30 national finishes. Ed Reed served as interim coach during the 1998-99 season. Don Wagner, was hired in March of 1999 to lead the Tide into the new millennium.

Alabama's Diving Excellence

It is a tradition that is as long as it is proud. For the last 25 years, the Alabama diving crew has accumulated the Southeastern Conference's finest reputation, earning the league's highest honors again and again.

Alabama divers have earned Southeastern Conference "Diver of the Year" honors ten times, by far the best total in the league. Since 1981, Alabama coaches have earned SEC "Diving Coach of the Year" nine times, once again best in the conference and again, no other squad comes close.

In 1981, The Crimson Tide enjoyed a sweep of sorts when Barbara Logan was named the female SEC Diver of the Year, Wayne Chester won the award on the men's side and their mentor, coach Bob Webster, won the first of three SEC Diving coach of the Year awards. Four years earlier, as a freshman, Chester won the Crimson Tide's first NCAA Diving championship when he took top honors off the one-meter board.

Alabama divers earned five SEC Diver of the Year awards during the 80s: Logan, Chester, Craig Ford - 1982, Mike Marmann - 1984 and Perry White - 1987. Webster would be named the league's top coach four times, 1981, 1982, 1984 and 1985 while his successor, Mike Finneran earned the distinction in 1986 and 1987.

The 1988 season marked the advent of coach Pat Greenwell and a continuation of the Tide's good diving fortune. Greenwell has seen four of his charges Ed Morse - 1990, Mark Rourke - 1991, Rafael Alvarez - 1995 and Brent Roberts - 1997 and 1998, named SEC Diver of the Year. Greenwell himself has been named the league's top coach four times, 1990, 91, 95 and 97. In addition being named the SEC's best diver, Roberts also captured the 1997 NCAA 10-meter diving title.

The platform diving event was added to the conference slate in 1989 and Alabama proceeded to win the first three titles, with Rourke winning the inaugural title and the 1991 title and Morse winning the 1990 platform championship. Rourke pulled off another first in 1991, when he became the first SEC diver to win all three diving events, one-meter, three-meter and platform, in the same season.

Alabama divers have won 28 SEC crowns since Chester won the first in 1978, taking top honors on the one-meter board. Junior Lane Bassham won the latest title last season when she took top honors off the three-meter board. Sophomore Stewart Smith was named SEC Freshman Diver of the Year last season after earning All-American honors off the three-meter board.

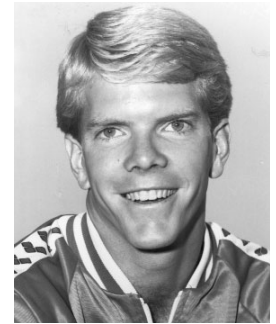
And so Alabama's diving excellence continues, dive by dive, year by year.

Alabama's Commitment to Academics

Priority one . . . that's what education is for Don Wagner and his staff. Sure he wants his athletes to leave the Capstone with championship hardware, but more than anything, before anything, he wants them to leave with a diploma.

"There is nothing that is more important than a good education," Wagner said. "That's why you come to college, to learn, to prepare for your future and grow as a person."

Alabama's swimming and diving program is not only talking the talk about achieving a proper balance of education and athletics, it's walking the walk. Case in point, Mark Jollands earned four All-American honors in the pool and posted the fastest 500 freestyle time in the conference as a senior in 2000. During that same time he posted a 3.96 grade point average, was named one of the athletic department's Top-6 Senior Scholar-Athletes and earned an SEC Postgraduate Scholarship.

That kind of balance between academic and athletic excellence has been evident throughout the Tide's history.

The swimming and diving program earned back-to-back-to-back Postgraduate Scholarships in the mid-90s when Amy DeVasher earned one from the NCAA in 1996 and Ann-Sofie Joensson brought an NCAA award back to the Capstone in 1997. Jill DeVasher completed the trifecta in 1998 winning and SEC scholarship, an award also bestowed upon her sister, Amy DeVasher.

Amy DeVasher and Joensson were stand-out examples of balancing outstanding academics while competing at the highest level. Both women were first team All-Americans in addition to being academic all-stars.

Diver Mark Rourke was Alabama Swimming and Diving's first NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship winner. In 1991, the five-time SEC Champion and the 1991 NCAA Runner-up off the one-meter, capped

off his career by earning the scholarship.

Coach Wagner's goal to increase this level of academic success is a lofty one, but he has a formidable ally on his side.

One of the secrets behind the academic success for Tide athletes is Alabama's Center of Athletic Student Services (CASS), headed by Director of Athletic Academics Jon Dever. Dever, who was named director following former director Kevin Almond's promotion to Associate Athletic Director for Student Services this past summer.

Dever is assisted by Fern Hampton, who works hand in hand with the swimming and diving teams, Brenda Elliott, Cathy Elliott, and Wes Maas. Life Skills Director Karin Lee rounds out the CASS staff. Joining this group are seven graduate assistants and 55 part-time tutors who work in the CASS building adjacent to Bryant Hall. The facility includes 17 study rooms, 33 individual study cubicles, a lecture room and IBM and Macintosh computer labs.

From the moment a recruit first walks on to campus to the moment an athlete graduates with diploma in hand, the academic services provided are outstanding. For the first year at the Capstone, freshmen and junior college transfers are required to attend nightly study halls. After that, attendance is based on the individual's GPA and study needs.

The CASS staff works as a liaison between the Athletics Department, undergraduate divisions, and administrative office of the university. The staff offers career advice and counseling, makes sure all athletes are maintaining satisfactory progress toward their degrees, and monitors academic eligibility. The advisors also secure tutors and schedule study sessions.

All of these services begin with the recruit's first visit. The advisors set up individual appointments within the department of the recruit's area of study and accompany them to the meeting. They give the recruit a tour of the campus and go over services provided by CASS.

The dedicated CASS staff can only give guidance and direction. Achievement is left in the hands of the student-athlete. If the athlete wishes to succeed in the classroom as they do in competition, then Alabama's CASS will provide them with every opportunity to achieve their highest goals.

CHAMPS

The NCAA's Life Skills Program

In an era when athletes are scrutinized as much for their off-the-field actions as for their on-the-field accomplishments, the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) has stepped to the forefront of the issue and developed a program to assist its student-athletes.

The NCAA in a partnership with the Division 1A Athletic Directors' Association created the CHAMPS/Life Skills program in an effort to enhance the athletic and personal responsibility of student-athletes. With the NCAA providing the educational programming, resources and training, and Division 1A Directors providing marketing, leadership and funding assistance, the program is now in place to enhance the total development of students participating in intercollegiate athletics.

"Among all of intercollegiate athletics' responsibilities, there is none more important than providing the tools for the total development of the student-athlete," said Cedric W. Dempsey, executive director of the NCAA.

One of the keys of success for the Tide program has been the work of Karin Lee, the Director of the Life Skills Program. Lee, along with the coaching staffs, has been the driving force behind the increase of community involvement by Crimson Tide

student-athletes. She plans and organizes community service opportunities as well as plans workshops and speakers to help educate Alabama's athletes on sports related issues.

"The Life Skills program is a win-win situation," said Lee. "I only see positive benefits. This plan gives our student-athletes a chance to give back to the community, and allows them the opportunity to create a positive image for the chil-

dren. The face-to-face interaction with the community provides our athletes with a sense of worth and accomplishment. The program also brings enjoyment to both the student-athletes and the kids."

The CHAMPS program was created by the Division 1A Athletic Directors' Association to initiate a framework for operating successful athletics programs. Based on the mission of the Association to "prepare student-athletes for life as productive citizens in our society," the association, along with UA, believes the program will enable athletic departments to prepare this generation of student-athletes to face "real life" with greater skill than ever before."

"The goal of the life skills

program is to help the student-athletes leave here, not just a member of a sports team, but as a person who excelled in the classroom, gave back to the community and got involved in the community," Lee said. "We strive to add to the life of the student-athlete through educational programs and resources."

CHAMPS, an acronym for Challenging Athletes' Minds for Personal Success, consists of

five components - athletic commitment, academic commitment, career development, personal development and community service.

In meeting the career development needs of Crimson Tide athletes, the athletic department has developed "1st & 10 Career Day", an annual event for Alabama student-athletes which brings 60-70 successful business leaders to campus for a job fair. In addition, the department has also held an "Agents Day" program in which football, men's basketball and women's basketball players met and discussed professional playing options with a Player Personnel representative from the NFL, an attorney and former Alabama athletes now playing professional sports.

In addition, Alabama athlete's personal development was addressed with several department sponsored events including programs on gambling, media relations, nutrition, health decisions and sexual responsibility.

This past year, Alabama student-athletes participated in a variety of community service programs. Through the auspices of the LifeSkills program, Alabama athletes led clothing

drives for the Salvations Army, worked in soup kitchens for Hunger and Homelessness Week, participated in the American Heart Association's Heart Walk and led the

"Beat Auburn" food drive. From raising money for Project Angel Tree to speaking engagements at elementary schools, Crimson Tide athletes have been shining examples in the community.

"I have seen the life skills program grow every year since I have been here," Lee said. "Athletes have participated in over 1000 hours of community outreach each year and it continues to increase. I know the life skills program benefits all who participate, because the athletes always come back after volunteering with a group or school and want to do more. The program is not mandatory, but we have so many athletes that want to participate because they want to give back to the community."

At the 100 yard mark, it was a good swim. By the time he hit the wall at the 150, it was an even better swim. At an even 200 it was one of the best in the history of the sport.

Stefan Gherghel, the Crimson Tide's freshman phenom, went from seventh at 100 yards, fifth at 150 yards to first at the last wall in the championship final of the 200 butterfly at last season's NCAA Championships. Not only did he better the elite field, he also swam faster, at 1:42.68, than almost anyone in the history of the event. Only Olympic Champions Pablo Morales and Melvin Stewart had gone faster.

Another Olympic tie saw Gherghel shatter the Alabam school record of another Olympic champion, Jon Sieben, who set the Tide mark in 1985.

For Gherghel, who won the Southeastern Conference 200 butterfly title earlier in his rookie season, the title was standard operating procedure.

"People always ask me, 'What is your goal?'," Gherghel said. "In everything, my goal is to

win."

Head coach Don Wagner said that it is that drive that set his first NCAA Champion, and the Tide's first swimming national champion since 1983, apart.

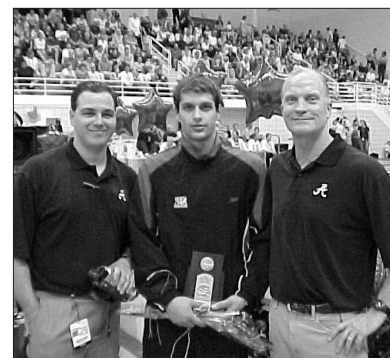
"You love people that are that way," Wagner said. "He's so competitive, so tough. He's passionate about what he does and I think that shows in his swimming."

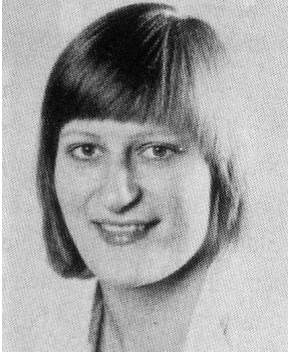
His work ethic is another thing that shows in his swimming according to Wagner.

"He's a horse in the pool," Wagner said. "I like the way he goes about his business."

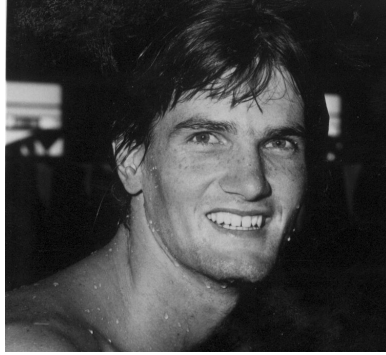
As for the future, another NCAA title is certainly a goal, along with the NCAA record, but Gherghel and Wagner have an even loftier goal, a world record.

"In looking at the tape of my NCAA swim, I saw so many mistakes that I made, so many things I did wrong that I feel I can do it, no problem," Gherghel said of the world mark.

Alabama's National Champions

Fifteen times a member of the Crimson Tide Swimming and Diving team has stood at the top of the awards stand as national champion. The events range from the 50 freestyle to the 1650 freestyle and from one-meter diving to the 10-meter platform.

Jonty Skinner won the first title in 1975, winning the 100 freestyle in his freshman campaign, setting an NCAA record in the process (43.92).

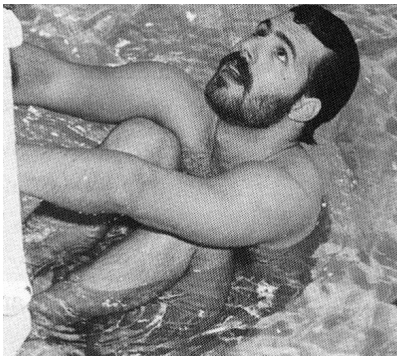
Christina Jarvis and Vicky Stanley won titles in 1976. Jarvis won the AIAW 100 and 200 breaststroke championships setting a U.S. Open record in the 100 breaststroke. Stanley won the AIAW 50 freestyle crown, setting an AIAW record with her performance. In 1977 Jarvis became the only Alabama swimmer to date to repeat as national champion when she successfully defended her 100 and 200 breaststroke titles and added the 50 breaststroke crown to her haul.

The 1977 season also saw Casey Converse better the American and NCAA record in the 1650 freestyle on his way to the awards stand. Converse became the first swimmer to break the 15 minute mark in the 1650 freestyle with his national championship swim of 14:57.30. Wayne Chester became the Tide's first diving champion in 1978 winning the one-meter diving title. Carlos Berrocal brought the 1979 100 backstroke crown to the Capstone while Arne Borgstrom earned Alabama's first title of the 1980's when he won the 1982 1650 freestyle. It seemed that Alabama owned the breaststroke in 1983 when Angelika Knipping won the women's 50 breaststroke title and Glenn Mills won the men's 200 breaststroke title.

Diver Brent Roberts added to the Crimson Tide legacy of champions winning the 10-meter platform in 1998 and last season, freshman Stefan Gherghel posted the third fastest time in the history of the 200 butterfly to win the Tides' latest NCAA title.



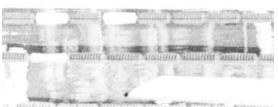

Eleven Summer Olympiads have come to pass during the 40 plus year history of Alabama swimming, and the Crimson Tide has been represented at all of them. Of the 10 Olympic Games at which the Tide had representatives, nine have resulted in at least one medal. Former Alabama diving coach Bob Webster was a two time Olympic champion, winning the 1960 and 1964 platform diving gold medal. Jack Babashoff was the first Alabama swimmer to bring back a medal when he earned a silver medal in the 100 freestyle.

In Sydney, Australia, the Crimson Tide was represented by 2001 senior Oren Azrad who represented his native Israel. Former Tide great Rafael Alvarez, the SEC Diver of the Year in 1995, represented Spain in his second Olympiad. School record holder Rania Elwani swam for Egypt while All-American sprinter Stavros Michaelides swam for Cyprus. 2000 All-American Glen Walshaw swam the sprint events for Zimbabwe. And before they took their first swims for the Crimson Tide, sophomore Anne Poleska and freshman Stefan Gherghel were representing their countries (Germany and Romania respectively) in Sydney.

In addition to the athletes in Sydney, former Alabama swimmer, assistant coach and head coach Jonty Skinner was making his second Olympic trip as a coach on the U.S. staff, reprising the assistant role he first earned in 1996.

The Tide had the most representatives at the 1984 Olympic Games held in Los Angeles. Twenty Alabama swimmers and divers would compete in Los Angeles. The

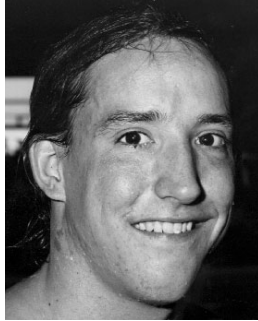
1984 Olympics also saw former Tide mentor Don Gambriel serve as head coach of one of the most successful U.S. Olympic squads in history.

In 1992, Jon Olsen was the mainstay of the U. S. relay squads, anchoring both the 400 free and medley relays to gold medals and the 800 free relay team to a bronze. Along with teammates Jeff Rouse, Nelson Diebel and Pablo Morales, Olsen swam to a world record finish in winning the 400 medley relay. The fastest man in the history

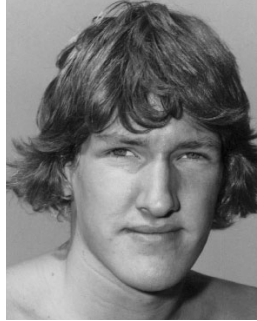
of the Crimson Tide, Olsen's leg on the U.S.'s 400 freestyle relay stands as one of the fastest in the history of the sport. Olsen came back for another taste of Olympic glory in 1996. Elected captain of the United States squad by his peers, Olsen swam to double gold as part of the 400 and 800m freestyle relays. With a total of five Olympic medals, four of which shine gold, Olsen is the Tide's most successful Olympian.



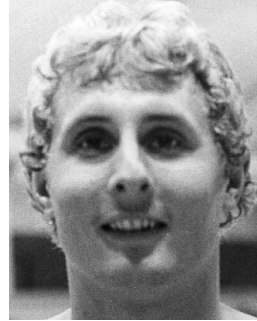

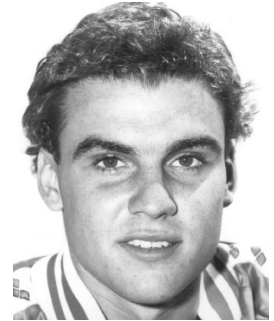

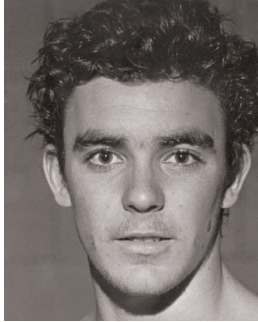

Alabama Swimming & Diving Hall of Fame

In 1975, then head coach Don Gambriel decided to create the Alabama Swimming Hall of Fame to honor those Alabama swimmers, divers and related personnel who had made outstanding contributions to the Crimson Tide program through superb performances.

Former head coach and Tide swimming legend Jonty Skinner was the first member to be inducted into the Hall of Fame on the strength of his NCAA national championship and his world record, both in the 100 free. Last season, Stefan Gherghel became the latest inductee when he swam the third fastest 200 butterfly time in the history of the event to win the NCAA title.

An Athlete must meet one of six requirements to be eligible for induction:

1. AIAW or NCAA champion in an individual event.
2. Member of the U.S. Olympic Team
3. Finalist at the Olympic Games
4. Member of the U.S. World Championship Team
5. Finalist at the World Championships
6. Pan-American or Pan-Pacific Games individual medalist

In addition to those picked by the above criteria, one athlete is chosen for each decade as "The Athlete of the Decade," for outstanding contribution to the University of Alabama Swimming and Diving Team. Since Skinner became the first inductee in 1975, the Hall of Fame has grown to 32 members.

Jonty Skinner — 1975

First member of the Hall of Fame • Earned the first individual NCAA championship in Alabama's swimming history • His time of 43.92 in the 100 freestyle on March 29, 1975 in Cleveland, Ohio, set an NCAA record and U.S. Open record • Set a world record in 1976 in the 100 freestyle • Served as the Tide's head coach from 1991-94.

Jack Babashoff — 1976

Earned a silver medal in the 100 meter freestyle and a gold medal as part of the U.S. 400 freestyle relay at the 1976 Olympics • Gold medalist at the 1975 Pan American games • Four year All-American.

Christina Jarvis — 1976

Won a total of five AIAW titles, winning the 100 and 200 breaststroke in 1976 and the 50, 100 and 200 breaststroke in 1977 • She set the U.S. open record in 1976 in the 100 meter breaststroke • AIAW record holder in the 200 breaststroke, 2:18.79 • U.S. open and AIAW record holder in the 100 breaststroke, 1:04.56.

Casey Converse — 1977

Set an NCAA record and became the first man in swimming history to break the 15 minute barrier on his way to winning the 1650 freestyle when he went 14:57.30 on March 26, 1977 in Cleveland, Ohio • Also held the NCAA record in the 1000 freestyle • Participated in the 1976 Olympics.

Vickey Stanley — 1977

1976 AIAW champion in the 50 freestyle, her winning effort set an AIAW record in that event.

Mike Curington — 1978

Won three gold medals at the 1975 Pan Am Games • Won four gold medals at the 1977 World University Games in addition to being a four-year All-American.

Wayne Chester — 1978

Became the first Alabama diver to win a NCAA title, taking the one-meter board at the 1978 NCAA championships.

Carlos Berrocal — 1979

Won the 1979 NCAA 100 backstroke title • Earned a fourth-place finish at the 1976 Olympic Games in the 100 backstroke.

Mark Tonelli — 1979

Finalist in the 200 backstroke at the 1976 Olympic Games for Australia • Won the gold at the 1980 Olympic games as part of Australia's 400 medley relay • Former SEC record holder in the 200 backstroke • 1979 200 backstroke runner-up at the NCAA Championships.

John Foster — 1980

The Crimson Tide's first coach • From 1960 to 1973 he compiled 123-48 record in dual meet competition.

Arne Borgstrom — 1982

Won the 1982 NCAA 1650 freestyle title • Named the 1982 SEC Swimmer of the Year • Named 1982 Alabama Athlete of the Year • Earned All-America honors four consecutive years • First man to swim faster than 15 minutes in winning the 1650 freestyle at the SEC Championships.

Angelika Knipping — 1983

Won the NCAA 50 breaststroke title on the way to setting a collegiate record in that event which still stands • Won three SEC titles and earned All-America honors 13 times.

Glenn Mills — 1983

Won the NCAA 200 breaststroke title • Member of the 1980 U.S. Olympic team • Also a member of the 1982 U.S. World Championship Team.

Don Gambriel — 1984

Head Coach of the 1984 U.S. Olympic Team in Los Angeles • Head coach of the 1983 U.S. Pan-American squad • Head coach of the 1991 U.S. World Championship Team • First individual recipient of U.S. Swimming Award.

Bob Webster — 1985

Won gold medals in platform diving in the 1960 and 1964 Olympics • Earned SEC Diving Coach of the Year, four times • Coached an NCAA champion and 10 SEC champions.

Marcello Juca — 1985

Won three medals at the 1983 Pan-American Games • Three-time All-American • Member of the 1984 Brazilian Olympic Team.

Jens-Peter Berndt — 1987

World record holder in the 400 IM • Finalist at the 1988 Olympic Games • Two time SEC champion.

Ralph Wright — 1988

Alabama Swimmer of the 1960's. Three year Most Valuable Swimmer • 1968 SEC Most Valuable Swimmer • Five time SEC champion • Held four SEC records during his career.

Jon Olsen — 1991

Five time SEC Champion • 1991 NCAA Championship 100 freestyle runnerup • 50, 100 and 200 freestyle Alabama school record holder • Four year MVP for the Tide • Member of the 1991 & 1994 U.S. World Championship team • Goodwill Games gold medalist • 1991 Pan-Pacific Games gold medalist • 1992 Olympic 400 medley and freestyle relay gold medalist and 800 freestyle relay bronze medalist • World record holder as part of the U.S.'s 400 medley relay • Captain of the 1993 U.S. Pan Pacific squad • Four time gold medalist at the 1993 Pan Pacific Games - 50 and 100 freestyle and the 400 freestyle and medley relays • Inaugural U.S. Resident National Team member • 1996 Olympic double gold medalist, 400 and 800 freestyle relays • Voted 1996 Olympic team captain by his peers.

Mark Rourke — 1991

Finalist at the 1984 Olympics representing Canada in the platform event • Four time SEC champion • At the 1991 SEC Championships, became the first diver in SEC history to win all three diving events • School and SEC record holder for the one-meter diving event • Runner-up at the 1991 NCAA Championships in the one-meter diving event • Finalist at the 1992 Olympic Games off the three-meter board.

Ellen (McGrath) Owen — 1992

Member of the 1992 U.S. Olympic Diving Team • Finaled off the platform at the 1992 Games • 1985 SEC Champion off the three-meter board • Academic All-SEC in 1985 • two time All-America.

Marla Brooksbank — 1992

Swimmer of the 1970's
First female Alabama swimmer to earn individual All-America honors all four years of her career • Gold medalist at the 1979 World University Games held in Mexico • 1979 Most Valuable Swimmer.

Jeff Wade — 1992

Swimmer of the 1970's
Anchored the 800 freestyle relay at the 1970 NCAA Championships which earned Alabama's first All-American honors • 1970 Academic All-America • Three year team MVP and three year Captain • Five time SEC champion • Three individual titles and two relay titles • Three time All-SEC • Held the SEC record in the 200 IM, 200 backstroke and 800 freestyle.

Greg Higginson — 1992

Swimmer of the 1980's
Total of 12 All-America honors from 1980 to 1983 • Five time individual SEC Champion • Winner of the 1982 Commissioners Trophy • Member of the 1982 SEC Championship team • Three year All-SEC.

Kim Nicholson — 1992

Swimmer of the 1980's

The Don Gambriel Olympic Pool at the Alabama Aquatic Center

The Alabama Aquatic Center has, during the past two decades, gained a reputation for housing one of the fastest pools not only in the Southeastern Conference, but in the nation.

And now that pool bears the name of the man who caused it to be built. Don Gambriel, long-time Alabama mentor and head coach of the 1984 United States Olympic Team, saw the competition pool of the aquatic center from plans to completion and then saw the Crimson Tide become one of the toughest places in the nation for an opposing team to come in and win. And just before last season, in a dedication ceremony, the pool where he ruled became The Don Gambriel Olympic Pool.

The home of the Crimson Tide received not just a face lift but a full blown renovation in the fall of 1996 bringing the facility back to the standard of excellence that it has enjoyed through the years.

The \$1.2 million renovation included the following changes:

- A new pool surface
- Office space was added for coaches and administration.
- The men's and women's locker rooms were redone with tile floors and new lockers
- The staff locker rooms were totally redone.
- The pool was painted and tiled.
- The facility's light fixtures were changed.
- A new sound system was installed.

Before last season, the lobby of the aquatic center was converted into a Hall of Fame which housed the University of Alabama Swimming and Diving Hall of Fame (see pages 80-81) but also mementos and informational displays of Alabama's past and present, making it one of the nicest presentations of a program in the nation.

One thing that has not changed is the

facilities reputation as one of the fastest pools in the country. One of the testaments to augment this claim occurred when Martin Zubero set a world record in the 200 meter backstroke (1:56.57) during the 1992 Rammer Jammer Invitational.

It was not the first time that Zubero has had a 'good' time at the Alabama Aquatic Center, he set a U.S. Open record in the 200 yard backstroke (1:43.40) at the SEC Championships in 1990.

Further proof was offered by the legendary Tracy Caulkins a short time after the pool opened. Caulkins set two American records at the Aquatic Center.

The Crimson Tide has built an impressive reputation for winning in the Aquatic Center. Since the facility opened in 1981 the Crimson Tide men's team has only lost a handful of home dual meets. Of the three SEC Championships the Tide won in the decade of the '80's, two, the 1982 and 1987



men's titles, were won in the Aquatic Center. All this proves that the Tide is tough to beat at home.

The Aquatic Center's main competition pool is 25-yards by 50-meters and is 6.5 feet deep at its shallowest point, 18 feet at its deepest. When set up for long course competition, the pool boasts eight nine-foot wide lanes, and when set-up for short course, the pool can accommodate up to 17 nine-foot wide lanes.

The main pool has four diving boards - two one-meter and two three-meter - and a five and ten-meter platform off which the Tide divers compete.

The main competition venue seats 1,500, every seat of which is often taken during invitational and championship swimming and diving meets.

In addition to the main competition course, the Aquatic Center has an eight lane 25-yard pool. The Aquatic Center also contains a complete weight room, dryland training areas and meeting rooms, all utilized by the Alabama swimmers in their training.

Since opening its doors in 1981 the Aquatic Center has played host to more than 170 swimming competitions including some of the most prestigious in the sport.

The Alabama Aquatic Center is located at the corner of Paul W. Bryant Drive and Hackberry Lane.
