GAMEDAY ENTRANCE

The press box inside Saban Field at Bryant-Denny Stadium is located on the east side of the stadium on level 5 and is accessible via the elevators located just inside Gate 56. Media Will Call is stationed on the northeast corner of Saban Field at Bryant-Denny Stadium outside Gate 59 and will open three hours prior to kickoff.

RADIO

Located within the press box area, there are booths for both home and visiting radio crews as well as national radio. Only those with appropriate passes will be admitted to these booths.

BROADCAST TELEVISION/COACHES

The broadcast television booth as well as coaches booths for both teams are located on the seventh level of the west side of the stadium. Only those with appropriate passes will be admitted to that level.

CREDENTIALS

Media credentials are available only to working members of the media who represent accredited outlets that are actively covering the event. All credential requests must be made through the Crimson Tide's online credentialing system. For further information, contact Assistant Athletics Director, Communications Aaron Jordan at ajordan@ia.ua.edu.

SIDELINES

Alabama follows NCAA and SEC rules regarding media representatives on the sidelines.

Credentials must be visible in order to gain access to the field.

All photographers/videographers on the sideline must have a working purpose with proper equipment.

Photographers are not permitted to shoot between the 25-yard lines.

No credentials will be issued to freelance photographers, cutline writers, equipment carriers or radio station representatives, except for each team's broadcast originating networks.

Affiliate TV stations are not allowed the services of a grip and credentials will not be provided for grip operations.

No one under 18 years of age will be issued a media credential for sideline access.

Photographers and videographers are considered working members of the media and are to refrain from cheering or talking to players, coaches or officials.

Photographers may send photos from the Alabama Photo Room located on the south end of Saban Field at Bryant-Denny Stadium at field level.

Not conforming to any of the above listed guidelines will result in the immediate dismissal from the stadium by event management staff.

PRESS BOX SERVICES

Complete individual and team statistics along with a game book will be distributed via e-mail to members of the working media. Alabama's flipcard will be located at each seat throughout the press box.

Alabama's game notes will be provided via e-mail in PDF form on Monday and Thursday. The Crimson Tide's notes along with opponent notes and conference notes can also be found on RollTide.com in the 'Football' section starting on Monday. A pregame meal will be served beginning 90 minutes before kickoff. Soft drinks and water will be available throughout the game.

PARKING

Media parking is located in lots near Saban Field at Bryant-Denny Stadium. Because of limited space, requests for parking should be made with credential requests. It should not be assumed that parking passes will be provided with all media credentials. All media parking passes are digital and the lots open three hours prior to kickoff. If granted parking, a pass will be sent to the e-mail address provided during the credential request process.

PRESS BOX CONNECTIVITY

Wireless internet is available in the press box inside Saban Field at Bryant-Denny Stadium. In addition, a limited number of ethernet lines are also available.

PRO SCOUTS

Scouts of professional football teams are issued press credentials. Credentials should be requested two weeks prior to the date of the game to guarantee availability and should be requested online. For further details contact Aaron Jordan at ajordan@ia.ua.edu.

SATELLITE TRUCKS

Any outlet utilizing a satellite truck at the stadium on game day must request access and have its truck in place at least five hours prior to kickoff (example: 2 p.m. for a 7 p.m. kickoff). Satellite trucks arriving less than five hours prior to kickoff may be denied access to the stadium. Requests for satellite trucks parking must be made by Wednesday at 12 p.m. CT prior to Saturday games and must be confirmed through Aaron Jordan. All credential needs for personnel must be included in the online request.

INTERVIEW POLICIES

HEAD COACH KALEN DeBOER

All interview requests for head coach Kalen DeBoer are coordinated through Assistant Athletics Director, Football Communications Alex Thompson at athompson@ia.ua.edu or (440) 666-7615. Coach DeBoer along with the offensive and defensive coordinators will meet with the media each Monday preceding a game in the Naylor Stone Media Room on the second floor of the Mal M. Moore Athletic Facility. Coach DeBoer will also participate in the SEC head coaches weekly teleconference with the other 15 league coaches each Wednesday morning.

PLAYERS

All player interviews must be coordinated through the Alabama Athletics Communications Office and must be requested at least one day in advance. Several players will be available each week following Tuesday's practice, as their class schedule permits. Additional one-on-one interviews can be arranged during a game week, as well. Player interviews should be requested through Alex Thompson. Team locker rooms are off limits to media representatives at all times. Media members are not permitted to call players at any time or talk to players on Sunday, Thursday or Friday.

POSTGAME

The University of Alabama observes and abides by Southeastern Conference policy regarding equal access to all members of the working media. Coach DeBoer will conduct his postgame press conference at home games (approximately 15 minutes after the game) in the media room located on the second floor of the North End Zone. His news conference also can be heard in the press box. The Alabama locker room is closed. Requested players will be brought to the media room following Coach DeBoer's postgame press conference. The opposing coach will conduct his postgame news conference in the South End Zone Media Room adjoining the visiting team locker room.

PRACTICE ACCESS

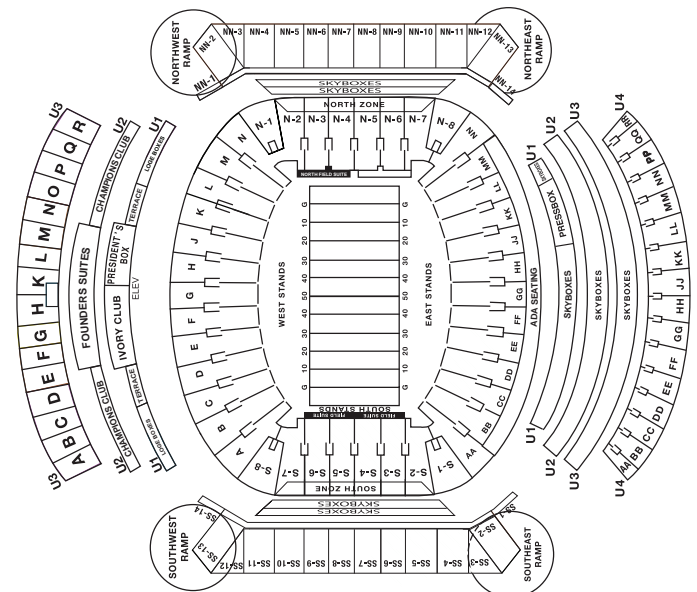

PREVIEWING THE 2025 ALABAMA CRIMSON TIDE

The Crimson Tide's veteran roster may be as deep as any in college football in 2025, with multiple players forgoing the NFL Draft and a conference-low zero players entering the transfer portal during the spring. Alabama welcomes back 14 starters and 38 lettermen in year two under head coach Kalen DeBoer. On offense, 18 letterwinners and six starters return, while the defense is comprised of 19 lettermen and eight returning starters. The 2025 edition of the Tide will also feature one returning letterwinner in the specialist group but no returning starters. On the coaching side, DeBoer's staff in year two includes a pair of new names in offensive coordinator Ryan Grubb and assistant defensive backs coach Jason Jones.

Alabama's six returning starters on offense include three linemen, two wide receivers and one running back. The offensive line features three returning starters in Parker Brailsford, Kady Proctor and Jaeden Roberts, with the trio combining for 59 starts at UA. While the unit will be tasked with replacing first-round pick Tyler Booker, the Tide welcomes back Wilkin Formby and Geno VanDeMark, who each made multiple starts a season ago. To bolster the unit, the Tide added senior transfer Kam Dewberry from Texas A&M while signing a highly regarded group of prep prospects, highlighted by five-stars Michael Carroll and Jackson Lloyd. The line will look to open holes for Alabama's leading rusher a season ago, Jam Miller. The Tyler, Texas, native led UA's running backs with 669 yards and seven scores on 145 rushes. He also added 16 receptions for 155 yards and another score in 2024. Miller will be joined by returners Daniel Hill, Kevin Riley and Richard Young along with a pair of new names in freshman AK Dear and Louisiana-Lafayette transfer Dre Washington. On the outside, Alabama welcomes back one of the nation's best 1-2 punches at wide receiver in Germie Bernard and Ryan Williams. Bernard totaled a team-high 50 receptions for 794 yards and two touchdowns while also rushing for a score a season ago. Williams, who earned All-SEC and All-America honors as a freshman, paced the Tide in yards (865) and touchdown receptions (8) on 48 catches while finishing with 10 total touchdowns, good for seventh in the conference in 2024. He also contributed two rushing scores and assumed punt and kickoff return duties at various points throughout the year. Also returning at wideout are Cole Adams, who missed a majority of last season due to injury, Jalen Hale, who is back from injury, and Rico Scott, who put together a breakout performance in the Tide's bowl game. The already-deep unit added even more talent with the signing of Miami transfer Isaiah Horton and a pair of highly recruited high schoolers in Lotzeir Brooks and Derek Meadows. Adding to the pass-catchers is Josh Cuevas. The veteran tight end played in all 13 games in his first year at Alabama and totaled 218 yards and a touchdown on 16 receptions in '24. With the departure of two-year starter Jalen Milroe, the Crimson Tide's biggest question mark in 2025 will be at the quarterback position. Veteran Ty Simpson returns the most experience, having played in 16 games, while Austin Mack enters his second year at UA and third year in DeBoer's offense. Rounding out the room is one of the nation's top-ranked quarterbacks and recruits at any position in Keelon Russell. The five-star signal-caller was the Gatorade National Player of the Year and the Maxwell High School Player of the Year following a standout career at Duncanville High School in Texas.

The Crimson Tide's defense will feature eight starters from a unit that ranked 10th nationally in scoring in 2024 (17.4 ppg), the lowest total by a UA defense since 2017. A disruptive group, Alabama created 28 turnovers a season ago, tied for fifth nationally, with 11 fumbles and 17 interceptions. The secondary unit played a key role in forcing those turnovers, with four starters returning on the back-end in 2025. Zabien Brown and Domani Jackson return to their starting posts at corner while Bray Hubbard and Keon Sabb are back to man the safety spots. The Tide welcomes back additional experience in the secondary thanks to DaShawn Jones, Dre Kirkpatrick Jr., Zavier Mincey and Red Morgan all receiving significant playing time last season. To bolster the group, Alabama brought in Utah transfer Cam Calhoun while signing a trio of talented defensive backs in Dijon Lee Jr., Chuck McDonald III and Ivan Taylor. The linebacker corps will look to fill in the gap left by first-round pick Jihaad Campbell but will be in good hands with the return of captain Deontae Lawson and senior Justin Jefferson. On the outside, Jah-Marien Latham and Qua Russaw are back to create havoc off the edge. Up front, the Tide features one of the best defensive line duos in LT Overton and Tim Keenan III. Overton led the Tide in quarterback hurries with nine while adding three tackles for loss and two sacks a season ago. A two-year starter at nose, Keenan III brings a wealth of experience to the middle along with a steady presence from a leadership standpoint. The group also features Edric Hill, Jordan Renaud and James Smith, who made an impact in 2024, along with Jeremiah Beaman, who redshirted after his first year. Alabama added some depth along the line this offseason, signing Florida transfer Kelby Collins and adding junior college transfers Fatutoa Henry and Steve Bolo Mboumoua.

Alabama's specialist group will be without long snapper Kneeland Hibbett and punter James Burnip for the first time in four years. A pair of transfers will aim to fill their roles, with David Bird from Cal looking to assume the snapping duties and punter Blake Doud from the Colorado School of Mines vying for the starting punter spot. Alabama also signed Alex Asparuhov to compete at punter, a true freshman who is working his way back from injury. At placekicker, the Tide will be without Graham Nicholson but has Conor Talty ready to step in. Talty assumed all kickoff duties in 2024 and enters 2025 poised to take on all kicking duties for UA.

During his 27 years in coaching, he has consistently prospered at multiple levels and in different roles, helping to build and revitalize programs while establishing a diverse network of contacts across the country, in both coaching and recruiting. In 10 seasons as a head coach, DeBoer accumulated a record of 113-16, which includes a 25-3 record in his previous stop with the Washington Huskies and three NAIA National Championships at Sioux Falls.

DeBoer owns a 15-3 record against top-25 teams in his five combined seasons at Fresno State, Washington and Alabama. Following the 2024 campaign, his 15 wins since 2021 are the second-most victories against top-25 teams among active head coaches during that time. He also boasts a staggering 26-8 record in one-score contests across his 10 years as a head coach.

Taking on an unprecedented challenge in 2024, DeBoer led Alabama to a 9-4 record, including a 3-1 mark against teams ranked in the Associated Press Top 25 Poll at the time of the game. Those victories included an impressive 41-34 win over then-No. 2 Georgia, the eventual SEC Champion, along with dominant performances in a 34-0 shutout of then-No. 21 Missouri and a 42-13 win at then-No. 14 LSU. DeBoer's nine wins in 2024 tied for the most by a first-year head coach in Alabama history, matching the legendary Frank Thomas (1931).

In 2023, he led Washington to the College Football Playoff National Championship Game with a victory over Texas in the Sugar Bowl. DeBoer's '23 group won the Pac-12 Championship and recorded the most wins in a season in program history (14). Additionally, he won the 2023 Associated Press, AFCA, Eddie Robinson, George Munger, Walter Camp, Sporting News and Home Depot Coach of the Year awards.

DeBoer became the first Washington coach to win 11-or-more games in consecutive seasons after going 11-2 in 2022 and 14-1 in 2023 and the first to win a bowl game in his first season with the Huskies. That success resulted in back-to-back Pac-12 Coach of the Year honors. His Washington squads also went 10-1 against ranked teams, and he is 18-3 in playoff games as a head coach, including his stint at Sioux Falls.

Along with winning the Pac-12 and the Sugar Bowl during the 2023 season, UW recorded two top-10 wins over Oregon along with victories against No. 12 Oregon State, No. 13 Utah and No. 24 USC.

He guided quarterback Michael Penix Jr. to the Maxwell Award and a record-setting season with 4,903 yards passing, 36 touchdowns and a 157.1 passer rating. Receiver Rome Odunze caught 92 passes for 1,640 yards and 13 touchdowns while running back Dillon Johnson gained 1,195 yards with 16 scores. Both Penix Jr. and Odunze garnered first team All-America honors and went on to be selected with picks eight and nine, respectively, in the first round of the 2024 NFL Draft.

In his first year at UW, he led the Huskies to an 11-2 overall record after Washington finished 4-8 the previous year. They posted a 3-0 mark against ranked teams and a win over Texas in the Valero Alamo Bowl. His Huskies swept their three Northwest rivals and finished in a tie for second in the Pac-12, while he was named Pac-12 Co-Coach of the Year.

The Washington offense produced an almost unprecedented turnaround in DeBoer's first season. Prior to his arrival in 2021, the Huskies finished 114th in total offense (323.4 ypg), 107th in scoring (21.5 ppg) and 73rd in passing (225.0 ypg) nationally. In 2022, UW ranked first nationally in passing (369.8 ypg), second in total offense (515.8 ypg) and seventh in scoring (39.7 ppg).

Penix Jr. threw for 4,641 yards and 31 touchdowns in DeBoer's first year. He completed 65.3 percent of his passes, averaging 357.0 yards per game with a 151.3 passer rating. Receivers Jalen McMillan and Odunze both cracked 1,000 yards receiving with McMillan hauling in 79 passes for 1,098 yards and nine touchdowns while Odunze had 75 catches for 1,145 yards and seven scores.

Prior to his time at UW, DeBoer spent two seasons at Fresno State, which included the pandemic-shortened 2020 season. Under his guidance, the Bulldogs made great strides on both





sides of the ball, posting a combined 12-6 record. Fresno was 4-8 in 2019 prior to DeBoer's arrival.

In 2021, Fresno State went 10-3 and defeated UTEP, 31-24, in the New Mexico Bowl. The offense finished first in the MWC and 14th in the nation in total offense (464.8 yards per game) and second in the conference and 26th in the FBS in scoring (30.5 points per game). The Bulldogs' passing offense ranked second in the conference and ninth in the country with 326.7 yards per game.

The offense, and passing game in particular, also flourished in 2020, as it produced a conference-best 479.3 yards of total offense per game and the league's second-highest points per game total (32.8). Fresno State also led the Mountain West in passing yards per game and ranked fifth in the FBS in that category with 356.3 per game.

In DeBoer's two seasons at Fresno, the defense also made vast improvements in nearly every team defensive category over the 2019 season, the year before his arrival. The Bulldogs went from 82nd in the nation in scoring defense and 88th in total defense in 2019, to No. 20 and No. 31 in the FBS in 2021, respectively – improvements of 62 and 57 places. In terms of NCAA-FBS national ranking, the run defense improved from 71st to 24th while the pass defense leapt nearly 50 spots from 107th to 58th. FSU also improved its national ranking

by 45-or-more places in yards allowed per play, opponent first downs, sacks, tackles for loss, third-down percentage defense and fourth-down percentage defense.

Before his time leading Fresno, DeBoer was on staff at Indiana University as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in 2019. He helped guide the Hoosiers to an 8-5 record and a berth in the Gator Bowl with the eight victories matching IU's highest win total in 26 seasons. Indiana ranked No. 3 in the Big Ten in total offense, averaging 432.8 yards of total offense per game including 302.4 passing yards per contest and 130.4 rushing yards.

In his first stint at Fresno State, DeBoer joined then-head coach Jeff Tedford as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in 2017. In two seasons in that role, DeBoer helped the Bulldogs to overall records of 10-4 (2017) and 12-2 (2018), along with two division titles, two bowl game victories and the Mountain West Conference Championship in 2018.

DeBoer's two years as the Bulldogs' offensive coordinator concluded with a Mountain West Championship and Las Vegas Bowl win to cap a 22-6 run during the 2017-18 seasons. Those two seasons included double-digit wins each year, coming off a 1-11 campaign in 2016, the year prior to Tedford's (and DeBoer's) arrival.

Fresno State reached unprecedented heights in year No. 2 with DeBoer as the coordinator. The Bulldogs posted a school-record 12 victories and finished ranked No. 18 in both polls. The offense finished 26th nationally in scoring (34.6) and 29th in passing (267.1) while producing five all-conference honorees. The Bulldogs also ranked eighth nationally in team passing efficiency (156.58), tied for 15th in turnovers lost (14), tied for 19th in red zone offense (89.5 percent) and ranked 25th in third-down conversions (44.6).

DeBoer went to Fresno after spending the 2014-16 seasons as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Eastern Michigan. While in Ypsilanti, he helped the Eagles to their third-ever bowl game in 2016. That year, EMU posted their first season of .500-or-better since 1995 and tied the FBS mark for biggest turnarounds in 2016, improving on a one-win season in 2015. DeBoer's offense shattered the school record for total yards with 5,917 in '16, while also setting program-high marks for points (385), passing yards (3,849), touchdown passes (25), first downs (303), pass completions (309), plays (999) and single-game plays (99).

Prior to EMU, DeBoer spent four seasons as offensive coordinator at Southern Illinois, helping the Salukis to 10 wins over top-25 opponents from 2010-13. In 2013, the SIU offense led the Missouri

Valley Conference with 231.8 passing yards per game, the fourth-highest total in school history. SIU's 25 passing touchdowns on the season tied for the third-highest total in school history. Under DeBoer's tutelage, tight end MyCole Pruitt was named to the 2013 American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) FCS All-America team while John Lantz developed into an All-MVFC receiver. During the 2011 campaign, the Salukis ranked third in the nation with an average of 183.1 rushing yards per contest. Bryan Boemer also developed into the Rimington Award winner, which is presented to the nation's premier center.

DeBoer began his coaching career at his alma mater from 2005-09. He compiled a 67-3 overall record at Sioux Falls, including a 49-1 mark in Great Plains Athletic Conference play, and was named NAIA National Coach of the Year in each of his three championship seasons. He guided Sioux Falls to three NAIA titles in 2006, 2008 and 2009, while also finishing as runner-up in 2007 and making the semifinals in his first season. He

coached three NAIA National Player of the Year winners in quarterbacks Lorenzo Brown (2009) and Chad Cavender (2007) along with running back Nick Kortan (2002) and developed 25 first team All-Americans during his tenure. Prior to becoming head coach, DeBoer served as offensive coordinator for the Cougars from 2000-04.

A 1998 graduate of Sioux Falls with a degree in secondary education, DeBoer was a record-setting football and baseball student-athlete. During his football career, he compiled 3,400 yards and 33 touchdowns on 234 career receptions – all school records at the time – and played on the 1996 NAIA Division II National Championship team.

He also played baseball for the Cougars, batting .520 (still a school record) as a senior in 1998. His career average of .492 is tops in USF history, as are his 37 career homers and .944 slugging percentage.

DeBoer and his wife, Nicole, have two daughters, Alexis and Avery.

Bryan Ellis joined Coach Kalen DeBoer's staff as Alabama's tight ends coach in March of 2024.

He spent his first season in Tuscaloosa working with a pair of senior tight ends in CJ Dippre and Robbie Ouzts. Dippre, who started all 13 games for the Tide in 2024, finished third on the team in both receptions (21) and receiving yards (256) while Ouzts recorded eight receptions for 108 yards and two scores. The duo also played a key role as blockers, helping Alabama's rushing offense rack up 41 scores on the ground to lead the SEC and rank fifth nationally at season's end.

Prior to his time in Tuscaloosa, Ellis served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for the Georgia Southern Eagles across the 2022-23 seasons. In 2023, the Eagles were a high-flying offense as they finished in the top 30 nationally in completion percentage and passing offense. Davis Brin set a new school record for completion percentage in a season and wide receiver Khaleb Hood left Statesboro owning nearly every record in the book for a receiver.

The 2022 campaign was a record-breaking one for Ellis as he transformed the GSU offense into an aerial threat. Georgia Southern broke just about every passing record under all-conference quarterback Kyle Vantreese, who finished the year with 4,253 passing yards and 27 touchdowns. Three receivers had over 700 yards apiece and the ground game churned out 23 touchdowns.

Ellis came to Statesboro after working with a record-setting offense at Western Kentucky the previous three seasons. It was his second stint with the Hilltoppers, this time serving as the co-offensive coordinator and inside receivers coach for a Hilltopper team that put up record numbers on their way to the Conference USA championship game and a win over App State in the Boca Raton Bowl.

In 2021, the Hilltoppers ranked second in FBS with 44.2 points per game and were second in total offense at 535.3 yards per game. WKU led the nation with 433.7 passing yards per game, 41.1 yards above the next-best passing attack (Virginia, 392.6) and had 92 passing plays of 20-plus yards.

Ellis tutored wide receiver Jerreth Sterns, who was named a semifinalist for the 2021 Biletnikoff Award and an All-American by The Athletic. He finished the season with 150 receptions for 1,902 yards and 17 touchdowns to lead the FBS in all three categories.

He was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at WKU during the 2020 and 2019 seasons. In 2020, graduate transfer quarterback Tyrrell Pigrome started 10 games for the Hilltoppers and set the program record with 279 consecutive pass attempts without an interception. In 2019, Ellis helped the Hilltoppers improve their offensive production from the year prior in almost every category including 259.3 passing yards per game.

In 2018, Ellis was the quarterbacks coach at USC under Clay Helton where he was tasked with developing the successor to Sam Darnold, the No. 3 overall draft pick in the 2017 NFL Draft. During the 2018 season, Ellis navigated the development of true freshman JT Daniels, just the second true freshman to start a season opener for the Trojans in program history. Not only was Daniels a true freshman, but he also reclassified and joined the program a year early.

Prior to his bump to a full-time role with the Trojans, Ellis assisted Helton in the quarterbacks' room, where the duo worked together with Darnold during the 2017 campaign. That season, Darnold set school marks for passing yards (4,143) and total offense (4,225 yards) while posting the most 200-yard (13) and 300-yard (8) passing games in USC history.

Ellis previously coached wide receivers (2016) and running backs (2015) during his first tour of duty at Western Kentucky.



He initially came to Bowling Green as an offensive quality control assistant in 2014, where he assisted in developing the quarterbacks.

Ellis' previous work at WKU was vast and varied as he worked with three different position groups on the offensive side of the ball, culminating with stepping into the offensive coordinator's role for the 2016 Boca Raton Bowl. With Ellis calling the shots, the Hilltoppers piled up 598 yards of total offense, including a WKU bowl-record 262 rushing yards and 51 points.

In his wide receiver room that season, Ellis' two primary pupils, Taywan Taylor and Nicholas Norris, capped their incredible careers as the then-No. 1 and No. 2 wideouts in school history, resulting in school record marks for receptions (98), receiving yards (1,730) and receiving touchdowns (17).

Taylor's 2016 campaign, which preceded his selection in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft as the second-highest pick in school history, resulted in school record marks for receptions (98), receiving yards (1,730) and receiving touchdowns (17).

In his first year as a full-time assistant in 2015, Ellis inherited a bevy of talented, experienced running backs. WKU's running backs responded by producing a sixth straight 1,000-yard rusher in Anthony Wales and an All-Freshman running back in D'Andre Ferby, the league's top one-two combo in the backfield.

Ellis enjoyed a stellar prep and collegiate career as a quarterback at UAB where he spent the 2013 season in a similar capacity for the Blazers. After his playing career was done, Ellis transitioned to a graduate assistant coaching role working with the quarterbacks for two seasons.

A Byron, Ga., native, Ellis had an outstanding prep career at Peach County High where he passed for more than 3,600 and threw 31 touchdowns as a senior, leading his squad to a Class AAA State Championship.

He is married to the former Janie Cox, and the couple has one daughter, Zoey, and a son, Cade.

Robert Gillespie joined the Alabama coaching staff in January of 2021 to coach the Crimson Tide's running backs and added assistant head coach to his duties with the arrival of Kalen DeBoer.

Known as one of the country's top recruiters, Gillespie is in his fifth season at the Capstone. He arrived in Tuscaloosa after three years coaching running backs at North Carolina for then-head coach Larry Fedora for a season followed by two years for then-head coach Mack Brown.

Over the course of his 20-year career in coaching, Gillespie has produced 13 NFL running backs and counting, including 2017 Offensive Rookie of the Year Alvin Kamara. He has mentored three NFL backs apiece at Alabama, Tennessee and Oklahoma State along with two each at South Carolina and West Virginia.

Under Gillespie's direction in 2024, the Crimson Tide's top three backs in Jam Miller, Justice Haynes and Richard Young accounted for 251 carries, 1,262 yards and 16 rushing touchdowns. Those 16 scores were part of the Alabama's 41 rushing touchdowns on the year, the most in the SEC and the fifth-most nationally. Miller paced the group with 668 yards and seven touchdowns on 145 carries while adding 16 receptions for 155 yards and one score through the air.

Alabama boasted one of the deepest running back rooms in the nation in 2023 with Jase McClellan, Roydell Williams, Miller and Haynes. McClellan led the Crimson Tide with 890 yards (4.9 per carry) and eight touchdowns while Williams contributed 560

yards and five scores. Miller gained 201 yards rushing with another four catches for 73 yards and a score. Haynes turned in a big bowl game and finished with 168 yards and 6.7 yards per carry.

Jahmyr Gibbs was the leader of the Tide's rushing attack in 2022 but also proved to be one of the best pass-catchers out of the backfield in college football as a junior. Gibbs finished the season with 926 rushing yards and seven touchdowns on the ground while catching 44 passes for 444 yards and three more scores. McClellan also turned in a solid season, gaining 655 yards on 112 carries (5.8 ypc) with seven touchdowns, while Williams added 250 rushing yards (four touchdowns) and Miller 223 yards.

Gillespie's first season at Alabama saw Brian Robinson Jr. rush for 1,343 yards and 14 touchdowns in 14 games, helping the Crimson Tide win the SEC Championship and advance to the CFP National Championship Game. Robinson Jr. was also fourth on the team in receiving, catching 35 passes for 296 yards and two touchdowns.

Prior to arriving in Tuscaloosa, Gillespie guided two of the nation's finest running backs in 2020 at North Carolina as Michael Carter and Javonte Williams both recorded 1,000-yard seasons. Carter led the way with 1,245 yards on the ground and nine touchdowns while Williams scored 19 times on the ground and finished with 1,140 yards. In 2019, his running backs helped the Tar Heels rank 12th nationally in total offense while rushing for 188.2 yards per game. The backfield trio of Carter, Javonte Williams and Antonio Williams combined to rush for 2,258 yards (5.8 ypc) and 11 touchdowns while catching 40 passes for another 334 yards and three scores. UNC averaged 193 rushing yards per game and 5.3 yards per carry in 2018, ranking 19th nationally.

Gillespie joined the Carolina staff after five seasons at Tennessee, where he served as assistant head coach and recruiting coordinator in addition to working with the Vols' running backs. While in Knoxville, Gillespie coached several talented backs, including Kamara, Jalen Hurd, John Kelly and Rajion Neal.

During his time on Rocky Top, Gillespie directed a rushing attack that scored a rushing touchdown in a school-record 32 straight games. The Vols scored 31 rushing touchdowns in 2016 alone to go along with 2,668 rushing yards as a team, marking the first time since the 1992, 1993 and 1994 seasons that UT had topped 2,000 rushing yards in three consecutive years.

Prior to his time at UT, Gillespie tutored running backs at West Virginia for two years (2011-12), where he helped the Mountaineers to the 2011 BIG EAST title. The Mountaineers rushed for an average of 171.8 yards per game in 2012, a marked improvement of almost 50 yards per game.

Gillespie spent a pair of seasons as the running backs coach at Oklahoma State (2009-10) where he



coached future NFL running backs Kendall Hunter, Joseph Randall and Keith Toston. Hunter was an All-American for the Cowboys in 2010, ranking ninth nationally with 1,548 rushing yards, and went on to play in Super Bowl XLVII for the 49ers. Gillespie coached three All-Big 12 runners at Oklahoma State in Hunter, Toston and fullback Bryant Ward. The Pokes averaged 187.8 yards on the ground in 2009 and followed that up with 174.4 rushing yards per game in 2010, which ranked 36th in the country.

Before his stint in Stillwater, Gillespie spent four seasons at South Carolina (2005-08), beginning his tenure as a graduate assistant in 2005 before being elevated to running backs coach in 2006 where he mentored Cory Boyd, who ended up being the first SC running back drafted since 1998. As a senior, Boyd piled up 1,308 yards from scrimmage and scored 10 touchdowns.

Gillespie was a four-year letterman at running back for the University of Florida from 1998-2001. He totaled 1,854 career rushing yards and was also a reliable receiver out of the backfield. Gillespie still ranks second all-time for the Gators in receptions (96) and receiving yards (1,091) by a running back. He served as team captain in 2001, helping lead the Gators to a 56-23 Orange Bowl victory over Maryland and a No. 3 final national ranking in the Associated Press and USA Today Coaches polls. He also helped Florida win an SEC Championship in 2000.

Following his collegiate playing career, Gillespie played in the NFL for the Washington Redskins (2002-03) and the Jacksonville Jaguars (2003).

A native of Hattiesburg, Miss., Gillespie earned his undergraduate degree from Florida in 2005. He and his wife, Crystal, have two daughters, Nola and Sadie, and a son, Wynston.

University of Alabama head football coach Kalen DeBoer officially announced the addition of Ryan Grubb to his coaching staff in February of 2025. Grubb will serve as offensive coordinator for the Crimson Tide.

A veteran play-caller and one of the top offensive minds in football, Grubb brings a wealth of knowledge to Tuscaloosa. His resumé includes 10-plus combined years as an offensive coordinator, split across the collegiate and high school levels along with the National Football League.

Grubb comes to Tuscaloosa after spending one year as offensive coordinator for the Seattle Seahawks. During the 2024-25 campaign, the Seahawks ranked fifth in the NFL for passing yards with 4,379, including 4,320 from Geno Smith. Smith, in his 11th season, set career-high marks for yards, completions (407) and completion percentage (70.4) while totaling 21 passing scores, good for the second-most of his career. The veteran signal-caller also set the single-season franchise records for passing yards, completions and completion percentage under Grubb. Smith's favorite target, Jaxon Smith-Njigba, led Seattle and tied for ninth in the NFL with 100 receptions for 1,130 yards and six touchdowns. The 100 receptions matched Seattle's single-season high mark.

DeBoer originally brought Grubb to Tuscaloosa in 2024, maintaining their prior relationship from Washington. While with the Huskies, Grubb served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for two seasons from 2022-23.

In 2023, UW made it to the College Football Playoff National Championship, thanks in large part to its offensive production. Grubb helped Michael Penix Jr. earn the Maxwell Award with a record-setting season that saw Penix Jr. throw for 4,903 yards and 36 touchdowns while maintaining a 157.1 passer rating. Penix Jr.'s favorite

target, Rome Odunze, caught a team-high 92 passes for 1,640 yards and 13 touchdowns as both players earned first team All-America honors and went on to be first-round picks in the 2024 NFL Draft.

The 2022 campaign saw the Huskies lead the nation in both passing offense (369.8 yards per game) and third down conversions (57 percent) while also finishing second in total offense (515.8 ypg). Grubb's offensive group also had top-25 finishes in sacks allowed (2nd), first downs (5th), scoring offense (7th) and rushing offense (25th). Individually, Penix Jr. broke the then-Washington single-season record for passing yards with 4,641.

Grubb headed to Washington after spending the previous two seasons with DeBoer as the assistant head coach/offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Fresno State from 2020-21. The 2021 season saw the Bulldogs finish at 9-3 overall, ranked atop the Mountain West Conference in total offense (464.8 ypg) and second in scoring (33.4 ppg) and passing offense (330.1 ypg) during the regular season. Nationally, the group was ninth in passing offense, 14th in total offense and 26th in scoring.

In Grubb's first season in 2020, Fresno led the MWC in yards per game (479.3 ypg) and passing yards per game (356.3 ypg) while ranking second in scoring (32.8 ppg). The Bulldogs generated over 400 yards of offense in all six games during the pandemic-shortened season, marking the first time since 2011 that FSU had a streak of six straight contests with 400-plus yards of offense.

Before serving as the OC for the Bulldogs, Grubb was the assistant head coach/offensive coordinator/offensive line coach in 2019 and the run game coordinator/offensive line coach from 2017-18. The '19 campaign marked a second consecutive season and the then-fourth time in a decade that that FSU offense averaged 30-plus points per game. The Bulldogs averaged 360.0 yards of total offense, including 159.2 on the ground and 226.8 through the air.

In 2018, Grubb's offensive line allowed just 12 sacks and ranked sixth in the FBS for sacks allowed per game (0.86). His first season in 2017 saw the offensive line allow just 10 total sacks in 14 contests (0.71 per game) to rank third in Division I. All five starters earned all-conference honors that season, including one first-teamer, two second-teamers and a pair of honorable mention accolades.

Grubb previously served as the offensive line coach at Eastern Michigan from 2014-16. In his final season at EMU, the line allowed the eighth-fewest sacks in the nation and the second-fewest tackles for loss, highlighted by a pair of All-MAC linemen at season's end. That '16 campaign saw the Eagles shatter the record for total offense with 5,917 yards and also set program-high marks for points scored (385), passing yards (3,849) and touchdown passes (25). Additionally, the offense accumulated the second-most touchdowns (47) and rushing scores (21) in a single season. In 2015, EMU finished with 4,560 yards, the fifth-most in Eastern single-season history, and tallied 39 touchdowns to tie for the fifth-most in a single season.

Prior to his time in Ypsilanti, Grubb worked seven seasons at the University of Sioux Falls from 2007-13 –



the first three as run game coordinator and offensive line coach followed by four years as offensive coordinator. Grubb was part of DeBoer's staff from 2007-09 and took over as offensive coordinator following his departure. He also served as the strength and conditioning coordinator for the USF football program and was named American Football Monthly's 2008 NAAIA National Strength and Conditioning Coach of the Year.

During his time at USF, the Cougars finished with a combined 75-13 (.852) record, with Grubb helping the team to two national championships and four Great Plains Athletic Conference championships. Sioux Falls produced 20-plus all-conference players, multiple All-America honorees and two NAAIA Player of the Year winners.

Before his time at Sioux Falls, Grubb spent the 2005-06 seasons at South Dakota State where he coached the running backs (2005) and wide receivers (2006). Prior to starting his collegiate coaching career, he was the offensive coordinator at Kingsley-Pierson High School in Iowa from 2003-04. While at KPHS, Grubb produced six all-state selections across two seasons and was named the 2004 Class 1A Assistant Coach of the Year.

Grubb earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from Buena Vista University in 1999. While at BVU, he was a four-year starter on offense and served as a team captain for the Beavers. He also received a master's in sports pedagogy from South Dakota State in 2006.

He and his wife, Stephanie, have one daughter, Falynn.

1ST YEAR **JASON JONES**
Assistant Defensive Backs
ALABAMA, 2001

University of Alabama head football coach Kalen DeBoer officially announced the addition of Jason Jones to the Crimson Tide staff in January of 2025. Jones was hired as the assistant defensive backs coach.

A 20-plus year coaching veteran, Jones has spent his entire career in the secondary in addition to six seasons of defensive coordinator experience. Over that time, he has mentored nine first team all-conference honorees and 20 total all-conference selections, in addition to four Jim Thorpe Award semifinalists and one Nagurski Trophy finalist. Jones has also been a part of the coaching staff for five conference championship teams and has coached in 16 total bowl games.

Jones, who earned his undergraduate degree from the Capstone in 2001 and a master's degree in 2005, returns to Tuscaloosa after spending the last two seasons at North Carolina where he served as cornerbacks coach. In 2024, he helped Alijah Huzzie earn all-conference honors for a second consecutive season. Huzzie highlighted UNC's 2023 cornerback unit that contributed to the Tar Heels' 12 interceptions, its most since 2019.

Prior to his time in Chapel Hill, Jones spent three seasons as the safeties coach at Indiana from 2020-22. Jones' work with the defense in 2020 helped the Hoosiers lead the Big Ten and rank 13th nationally for turnovers gained with 20, including a league-high 17

interceptions that finished second in Division I. The IU defense also led the nation in red zone defense (64.0), finished 10th nationally in turnover margin (+1.00) and ranked in the top-25 for scoring and pass efficiency defense in 2020. The IU secondary was led by a pair of All-Big Ten honorees in Jamar Johnson and Devon Mathews in '20, with Johnson going on to be selected in the 2021 NFL Draft.

He traveled to Bloomington after one season at FAU in 2019. While with the Owls, Jones coached cornerbacks, highlighted by Meiko Dotson who earned first team all-conference accolades and tied for the national lead in interceptions with nine. The FAU defense led the nation with 33 takeaways that season en route to Conference USA and Boca Raton Bowl championships.

Jones spent six seasons at Ole Miss from 2013-18 where he served as co-defensive coordinator with a focus on the Rebels' secondary unit. His 2015 group tallied four pick-sixes to tie the OM single-season mark that dated back to 1938. Ole Miss finished that campaign ranked second in the SEC with 15 interceptions and third in the league with 23 total turnovers.

In 2014, Jones was named the National Defensive Backs Coach of the Year by FootballScoop.com after turning one of the Rebels' most inexperienced groups the previous year into one of the most dominant units in the country. His corners helped Ole Miss lead the nation in scoring defense (16.0 ppg) and fewest touchdowns allowed (24) while forcing an SEC-leading 32 turnovers, good for eighth nationally, 22 of which were interceptions to lead the league and rank fifth in Division I. The 2014 defense was highlighted by Nagurski Trophy finalist and consensus first team All-American Senquez Golson, who led the SEC and ranked second nationally with a school-high tying 10 interceptions.

Jones arrived in Oxford after five seasons at Oklahoma State, where the Cowboys totaled a 49-16 mark from 2008-12. With his assistance, the defense forced 130 turnovers from 2009-12 to rank second in the nation during that span. Jones coached three different corners to first team All-Big 12 honors and a pair of Thorpe Award semifinalists in Brodrick Brown (2011) and Perrish Cox (2009). Cox led the nation in passes defended per game in 2009 on his way to first team All-America honors with Brown ranking third in the same category in 2011 as part of an OSU defense that led the nation with 44 turnovers forced. While in Stillwater, Jones also helped develop former high school quarterback Justin Gilbert into the eighth overall pick of the 2014 NFL Draft.



Before his time at OSU, Jones served as the cornerbacks coach and special teams coordinator at Tulsa in 2007. In his second stint at Tulsa, Jones helped the Golden Hurricane to a 10-4 record, an appearance in the Conference USA title game and a 63-7 win over Bowling Green in the GMAC Bowl.

In 2006, he worked as the cornerbacks coach at Rice and helped the Owls to their first bowl appearance in 45 years that season. In his first stint at Tulsa in 2005, Jones coached the corners and helped UT to a Conference USA Championship and bowl berth. With Jones guiding the Tulsa secondary, the defense ranked third nationally in takeaways (36) and interceptions (22) and was 11th in pass efficiency defense along with 17th in the nation for pass defense.

Jones' coaching career began at his alma mater, Alabama. He served as a graduate assistant for the Crimson Tide from 2003-04. He earned his degree in financial planning from the Capstone in 2001 and added a master's degree in sport management in 2005. As a player, Jones was a three-year letterman at defensive back for the Tide and was a part of three bowl teams, an SEC West title in 1996 and an SEC Championship in 1999.

Jones and his wife, Kysha, have four children – Andrew, Jace, Jarah and Jathan.

Regarded as one of the top offensive line coaches in the nation, Chris Kapilovic was added to Kalen DeBoer's Alabama staff in the spring of 2024 to direct the offensive line. Kapilovic (pronounced kuh-pill-uh-vick) joined the Crimson Tide after spending the previous three months as the offensive line coach at Baylor.

Kapilovic has 30-plus years of coaching experience, including roles as an offensive coordinator and/or run game coordinator at Southern Miss (2008-11), North Carolina (2012-18), Colorado (2019) and Michigan State (2020-23). He has coached multiple NFL players, first-round picks and record-setting offenses during his career.

In his first season in Tuscaloosa, Kapilovic significantly improved the Crimson Tide up front. He inherited a group that allowed 49 total sacks, or 3.50 per game, in 2023 and cut that number down by more than half with the 2024 unit allowing only 24 sacks for an average of 1.85 per game. The '24 unit was highlighted by All-Americans Tyler Booker and Parker Brailsford along with all-conference honoree Kady Proctor. Booker led the group with 92 knockdown blocks on the season, or 7.1 per game, across his team-high 778 total snaps. The New Haven, Conn., native allowed just half a sack all year and graded out at a 92.3 percent across 13 starts, including 12 at left guard and one at left tackle.

Kapilovic, who was hired as Baylor's offensive line coach in December of 2023 prior to joining the Crimson Tide staff, worked at Michigan State from 2020-23. While in East Lansing, Kapilovic guided left guard J.D. Duplain and center Nick Samac to honorable mention All-Big Ten accolades in 2022 as the Spartans ranked fourth in the Big Ten and 34th in the FBS after allowing just 1.50 sacks per game.

Kapilovic's offensive line was a key ingredient to Michigan State's school-record turnaround season in 2021 in which the Spartans finished 11-2 overall, won the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl over No. 12 Pittsburgh, and finished ranked No. 8 (coaches) and No. 9 (AP) in the national polls. The o-line helped pave the way for Doak Walker Award winner, Walter Camp Player of the Year and unanimous first team All-American Kenneth Walker III, who led the Big Ten and ranked No. 2 in the FBS with 1,636 rushing yards (136.3 ypg) and 18 rushing touchdowns. The Spartans line was a Joe Moore Award semifinalist after allowing just 1.62 sacks per game, fourth-fewest in the Big Ten and 27th in the FBS. In 2020 with the Spartans, Kapilovic's offensive line helped spur an offense that ranked 10th nationally in the red zone.

During Kapilovic's one season at Colorado in 2019, the Buffaloes allowed the third-fewest sacks in the Pac-12 and averaged 1.75 sacks per game allowed. Arlington Hambricht earned honorable mention all-conference honors and was selected in the seventh round of the 2020 NFL Draft by the Chicago Bears.

Prior to Colorado, Kapilovic coached the offensive line for seven seasons at North Carolina (2012-18). He served as the run game coordinator for UNC his first two seasons (2012-13), was promoted to co-offensive coordinator for the next two years (2014-15), and was the associate head coach and offensive coordinator his final three seasons (2016-18).

Across seven seasons in Chapel Hill, Kapilovic was part of an offensive unit that established numerous school records, including points per game (40.6 ppg in 2012, 40.7 ppg in 2015) and total offense (485.6 ypg in 2012, 486.9 ypg in 2015). The Tar Heels ranked eighth in the FBS in scoring offense in 2012 and No. 9 in 2015. UNC also set school records for the most passing yards for five straight years (2012-16), peaking at 293.2 yards per game in 2016. The 2018 squad allowed just 10 sacks all season, the fourth-fewest in the FBS, and owned a 0.91 sacks allowed per game mark that ranked seventh-best in the country.

In 2016, Kapilovic's offense, led by quarterback Mitch Trubisky, set the school passing yards mark for the fifth season in a row. Trubisky was the No. 2 overall pick in the 2017 NFL Draft, and he was one of 10 Tar Heels to either be drafted or signed by an NFL team under Kapilovic.

During the 2015 season, North Carolina posted an 11-3 record and won the ACC Coastal Division to finish at No. 15 in the national polls. The Tar Heels led the nation in yards per play (7.28) and were ninth in scoring offense (40.7 ppg). Kapilovic's offensive line was a semifinalist for the Joe Moore Award as UNC averaged a school record 6.0 yards per carry and ranked first in the ACC in sacks allowed.

In 2012, his first season at UNC, three Tar Heel offensive linemen were drafted, led by guard Jonathan Cooper (No. 7 overall by Arizona), along with tackle Brennan Williams (third round by Houston) and guard Travis Bond (seventh round by Minnesota).

Before his time at UNC, Kapilovic was at Southern Miss for four seasons (2008-11), all four as the offensive line coach with additional duties as the run-game coordinator his last two years. His offensive lines in Hattiesburg paved



the way for school records total offense three times, with a high of 6,459 in his final season. The Golden Eagles gained over 5,000 yards in all four seasons, including over 2,000 rushing yards each year.

After working as a student-assistant coach at his alma mater, Missouri State, in 1991, Kapilovic started his professional coaching career at Deer Valley High School in Glendale, Ariz. He moved over to Phoenix College, where he worked with the offensive line while also serving as the school's strength coach.

He worked as a graduate assistant at Kansas under coach Terry Allen for the 1999 and 2000 seasons. He was then the offensive line coach for Alabama State (2001-02), with offensive coordinator duties added to his role for the Hornets from 2003-05. He returned to Missouri State for a second stint, this time as its run-game coordinator and the offensive line coach for the 2006-07 seasons.

Kapilovic lettered two years (1989-90) as an offensive tackle at Missouri State University, earning first team All-Gateway Conference honors as a senior. The Bears won the Gateway Conference title both seasons and qualified for the Division I-AA playoffs. He graduated from Missouri State with a degree in education in 1990. He played two seasons at Scottsdale (Ariz.) Community College prior to transferring to Missouri State.

A graduate of Gerard Catholic High School in Phoenix, Ariz., Kapilovic lettered in football, basketball and baseball. He is married to the former Fiona Yount, and the couple has two sons, Carsen and Colin.

2ND YEAR
MAURICE LINGUIST
 Co-Defensive Coordinator/Defensive Backs

Maurice Linguist joined Kalen DeBoer's coaching staff at Alabama in the spring of 2024 and serves as the co-defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach for the Crimson Tide. He came to UA following three years as head coach at the University of Buffalo. Regarded as one of the nation's top recruiters, Linguist has excelled in coaching at both the Power Five level and the NFL.

In his first season in Tuscaloosa, Linguist contributed to a defense that allowed 17.4 points per game, good for fourth in the SEC and 10th nationally. More specifically, his defensive backs helped limit opponents to a 112.38 passing efficiency mark that ranked second in the conference and 10th in Division I. The secondary allowed just 182.2 passing yards per game, good for third in the league and 19th in the country, while picking off 17 total passes, the second-most in the conference and seventh-most in the nation. The 17 interceptions were also the most by an Alabama defense since 2017. The duo of Zabien Brown and Bray Hubbard tied for the team lead with three interceptions apiece while veteran safety Malachi Moore garnered all-conference and All-America honors at season's end.

Prior to joining the Crimson Tide staff, Linguist served as the head coach at Buffalo from 2021-23 while adding defensive play-calling to his duties in 2023. Under Linguist's direction, the Bulls produced 13 All-Mid-American Conference players and had 29 student-athletes selected to the Academic All-MAC lists. Buffalo also signed impressive recruiting classes during Linguist's tenure, highlighted by the 2022 and 2023 groups which were tabbed as the No. 1 classes in the MAC by 247Sports.

The Bulls' defense made significant improvements under Linguist's guidance, recording 45 takeaways across the 2022-23 seasons. That total included 19 in '23 and 26 in '22, with the 2022 defense leading the MAC and ranking seventh nationally in that category. Defensive back

Devin Grant led the UB defense in 2023, earning first team All-MAC honors after the safety finished second on the team in tackles with 79, picked off five passes, had three pass breakups and blocked two kicks.

In 2022, Linguist led the Bulls to a 7-6 record, capped by a 23-21 victory over Georgia Southern in the Camellia Bowl. He became just the second head coach in program history to win a bowl game with the victory over GSU serving as only the third bowl win in UB history. Linguist led Buffalo to a 5-3 record in conference play that season, the seventh time since the joining the league in 1999 that the Bulls had a winning record in MAC play.

A coach with extensive experience on the defensive side of the ball, it was of little surprise several of UB's defensive players had standout seasons in '22. Safety Marcus Fuqua led the nation with seven interceptions and became just the third UB player to be named an Associated Press All-American, while linebacker Shaun Dolac ranked second in the nation with 147 tackles. The Bulls had seven players named All-MAC in 2022, including kicker Alex McNulty who was the first player in program history to be named MAC Special Teams Player of the Year. In his first season as the helm, seven Bulls were named to the All-MAC team, including James Patterson who was a first-team selection at middle linebacker.

Linguist served a brief stint at Michigan in the 2021 offseason as defensive backs coach/co-defensive coordinator before accepting the Buffalo head coaching position. He joined the U-M coaching staff after spending the 2020 season as a defensive backs coach with the NFL's Dallas Cowboys.

In Dallas, Linguist directed a secondary that forced 10 interceptions while allowing the fifth-fewest passing first downs in the league (180). The Cowboys were also ranked in the top half of the league in pass yards allowed (111th), completion percentage against (10th) and takeaways (9th). Linguist's efforts were highlighted by the emergence of rookie cornerback Trevon Diggs, who picked off three passes during his first season in the league.

Linguist has worked with college secondaries at nine programs. Prior to heading to the NFL, he coached cornerbacks at Texas A&M (2018-19), defensive backs at Minnesota (2017), safeties at Mississippi State (2016) and defensive backs at Iowa State (2014-15).

Named one of ESPN.com's 'Top 40 under 40' coaches for 2018, Linguist spent two seasons with Texas A&M. Under his tutelage, the Aggie secondary limited opportunities for opponents and played tight coverage in key situations. Teams converted just 31.2 percent of third down tries (102-of-326) over his two seasons and A&M ranked ninth nationally in that category in 2018. Additionally, the 2019 group ranked 26th in Division I for pass efficiency defense at 118.47, an improvement of 80 spots from the year prior.

While in Bryan-College Station, Linguist also helped the Aggies produce back-to-back top-six recruiting classes nationally in 2019 and 2020. He was the lead recruiter for five-star safety Jaylon Jones, the first five-star defensive back to sign with A&M.

In his lone season at Minnesota, Linguist's secondary anchored a defense that finished No. 11 nationally with 174.5 yards allowed per game after listing 73rd in the NCAA a year earlier. The unit surrendered just 16 touchdowns, a top-25 figure nationally, and ranked among the nation's best in first downs allowed (11th) and total defense (30th). Linguist was also the lead recruiter for Rashod Bateman, the Big Ten's Wide Receiver of the Year.

At Mississippi State, Linguist led the safeties group which was responsible for seven of the team's 14 interceptions. The defense scored four touchdowns, good for eighth nationally, and totaled 14 interceptions during the 2016 season.



Prior to his time in Starkville, Linguist coached defensive backs at Iowa State from 2014-15. His efforts led to three All-Big 12 honorees in two seasons, including safety Kamari Cotton-Moya, a first team freshman All-American by the FWAA and the conference's Freshman of the Year on defense. Linguist then helped corner Brian Peavy be named a finalist for the award the following year. In addition to Cotton-Moya and Peavy, Linguist also mentored corner Nigel Tribune to All-Big 12 recognition.

In his first coaching stint at Buffalo, Linguist helped the Bulls finish second in the MAC East and reach the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl in 2013. The unit ranked second in the league in interceptions (15), points per game allowed (24.4) and yards per game allowed (382.2). Corner Najja Johnson highlighted the BU defense in 2013, earning first team All-MAC honors after leading the conference in interceptions.

Linguist was at James Madison from 2009-11, helping the program finish in the top-20 nationally in scoring defense each of those three seasons. He was also instrumental in the Dukes' top-ranked FCS recruiting class during the 2012 cycle while the team reached the second round of the NCAA Football Championship Series Playoffs. Linguist's first full-time position was at Valdosta State, working with defensive backs and special teams.

He began his coaching career at his alma mater Baylor, working as a graduate assistant with the strong safeties and rover backs. As a player for the Bears, Linguist made 42 appearances with 24 starts at strong safety from 2003-06. He totaled 160 tackles, including 17 for loss, to go with three interceptions and six pass breakups during his career. In 2006, he was named the team's defensive Most Valuable Player and earned second team All-Big 12 accolades.

Chuck Morrell continued his long association with Kalen DeBoer when he joined the Alabama staff as a special assistant to the head coach in March of 2024. He was then moved to linebackers coach in year one.

A former head coach at Montana Tech and defensive coordinator under DeBoer at Sioux Falls, Morrell coached on DeBoer's Fresno State staff as the safeties coach (2020-22). A South Dakota native himself, Morrell was also a teammate of DeBoer's at Sioux Falls, where they both helped the Cougars to the 1996 NAIA Division II national title.

In his first year with the Crimson Tide, Morrell worked with one of the top linebacker combinations in the country in Jihaad Campbell and Deontae Lawson who both earned all-conference honors and were named semifinalists for the Butkus. Campbell led Alabama and ranked fifth in the SEC for total tackles with 117 on the way to All-America accolades. His 117 stops were the eighth-most in UA single-season history and included a team-high 11.5 for loss to go with five sacks. Voted a permanent team captain, Lawson finished second on the team in tackles with 76, including 6.5 for loss and two sacks, despite missing the final two games due to injury. Justin Jefferson also contributed in the middle, finishing fourth on UA in tackles with 60 across his 12 games of action.

Morrell came to Tuscaloosa after spending the previous two years as co-defensive coordinator and the safeties coach at Washington. During that span, Morrell helped direct a defensive unit that led the Huskies to a 25-3 overall record, a Pac-12 championship, two bowl victories (Alamo and Sugar) and an appearance in the 2024 College Football Playoff National Championship Game.

Prior to his move to Seattle, Morrell spent two seasons at Fresno State from 2020-22 and helped coach a defense that made vast statistical improvements in nearly every team defensive category over the 2019 season, the year before his arrival.

The Bulldogs' defense went from 82nd in the nation for scoring defense and 88th in total defense in 2019 to No. 20 and No. 31, respectively, in the FBS in 2021. In terms of FBS rankings, the run defense improved from 71st to 24th while the pass defense leaped from 107th to 58th. Fresno also improved its national ranking by 45 places or better in yards allowed per play, opponent first downs, sacks, tackles for loss, third-down percentage defense and fourth-down percentage defense.

The '21 group ranked among the top-25 nationally in scoring defense, tackles for loss, takeaways, fumble recoveries, third-down conversion defense and fourth-down conversion defense. The Bulldogs allowed 20.5 points and 347.1 yards per game that season, finishing with a 10-3 record and a victory in the New Mexico Bowl.

Morrell began his coaching career at Sioux Falls as defensive backs coach and then spent the next 11 years as defensive coordinator from 1998-2009, a span that included all five of DeBoer's seasons as head coach.

During his time at USF, the Cougars played in five NAIA national championship games, winning three titles in 2006, 2008 and 2009. From 2006-09, the Cougars were the most dominant program in the NAIA, with a record of 56-1. The 2008-09 teams won 29 straight games and outscored opponents, 44.3-8.3. Morrell also helped produce 44 all-conference and 11 All-Americans on defense at Sioux Falls.

Under Morrell's direction, the 2009 defense allowed just 10.5 points and 210.5 yards per game en route to a 15-0 record and a second straight NAIA championship. The year prior produced a



defense was one of the most dominant in NAIA history as the Cougars allowed just 5.9 points, 14.7 rushing yards and 94.7 passing yards per game while going 14-0. USF opponents managed just a 17 percent third-down conversion rate and only 105 first downs across the 2008 season.

When DeBoer left Sioux Falls, Morrell became defensive coordinator at the University of South Dakota for one season before taking over as head coach at Montana Tech prior to the 2011 season.

In nine seasons at Tech, Morrell compiled a 52-44 overall record, was named the Frontier Conference Coach of the Year in 2012, 2015 and 2016, and was also the AFCA Regional Coach of the Year each of those years.

Morrell produced 70 all-conference selections at Montana Tech, along with three conference players of the year and six All-Americans. Montana Tech consistently led the conference in academic all-conference selections and NAIA scholar-athletes during his nine seasons. He arrived at Montana Tech from the University of South Dakota, where he served as the defensive coordinator for one season in 2010.

A safety at Sioux Falls from 1995-97, Morrell was the leading tackler on the 1996 NAIA Division II national championship team. He was inducted into the Cougar Hall of Fame in 2016.

A native of Bon Homme, S.D., Morrell and his wife Jen are the parents of two daughters, Selene and Aleia.

Jay Nunez came to Alabama in the spring of 2024 as a special assistant to the head coach and eventually moved into a role as the Crimson Tide's special teams coordinator.

Nunez' unit in 2024 welcomed back two starting specialists in Kneeland Hibbett and James Burnip while the Tide added 2023 Lou Groza Award winner Graham Nicholson at placekicker. Hibbett excelled once again, earning semifinalist honors for the Patrick Mannelly Award, presented to the nation's top long-snapper. Burnip was a major weapon, finishing fourth in the SEC and ninth nationally with a 45.4 yards per punt mark after accumulating 2,359 yards on 52 punts. A whopping 20 of his boots went for 50-plus yards while 19 of his kicks landed inside the opponent 20-yard line.

Burnip's ability to flip the field paid off, as the punting unit allowed just 1.00 yards per punt return for the season to lead the nation in that category. The Tide finished with a 43.67 net punting mark that was second in the conference and ranked fourth in Division I. On kickoff, Nunez' group ranked 10th in starting field position after kickoff with a minus-seven total. That number, in addition to UA's punting efforts, helped Alabama rank 14th overall in special teams efficiency in 2024.

Nunez joined the Alabama staff after two years as a senior analyst at Oklahoma where he directed the Sooners' special teams. OU went from 99th nationally in punt returns the year before he arrived to 12th (15.08 ypr) in 2022. The Sooners also improved 41 spots nationally in average kickoff return in 2023.

OU punter Michael Turk was exceptional for the Sooners in '22, ranking third nationally in yards per punt at 46.79. Nunez then made the move to Central Michigan transfer punter Luke Elzinga in the middle of the 2023 season and saw him finish with a 45.07 average.

Before Oklahoma, Nunez spent five years at Eastern Michigan where he served as the special team coordinator while working with the defensive tackles. He then added the title of assistant head coach prior to the 2021 season.

In 2021, Eagles' punter Jake Julien proved to be one of the best in the nation, averaging 45.7 yards per punt to rank 14th nationally. EMU also finished 17th nationally in net punting at 41.7 net yards per punt. Additionally, Eastern Michigan ranked 28th in punt returns (10.92 ypr), 33rd in kickoff return defense (17.68 ypr) and 41st in kickoff returns (21.44 ypr).

The EMU special team's units were once again some of the very best in the Mid-American Conference in 2020. In coverage, EMU finished first in the league with one blocked kick and was also the best in the conference at protecting its kickers. Eastern's kickoff return defense held opponents to just 18.04 yards per return, which was the second-fewest in the league, while its punt return defense allowed just 0.75 yards per return, good for 10th nationally.

Julien was strong in his 2020 efforts, as he booted 16 kicks for 708 yards, a 44.25 yards per punt average, while EMU's 43.8 yards per punt mark finished as the best in the MAC. In the kicking game, junior Chad Ryland recorded his best season as an Eagle as he finished with an 84.7 percent clip in field goals (11-of-13).

Nunez also added responsibilities with the defensive line in 2020, where he helped groom defensive tackles Turan Rush and Jose Ramirez into All-MAC honorees.

Rush, a second team All-MAC selection, established himself as one of the most dangerous pass rushers in the conference in 2020. The West Virginia native finished sixth in the MAC and 32nd in the FBS in sacks at 0.75 per game.

Ramirez, named to the MAC's third team, appeared in each of EMU's six games in 2020, and notched his first-career tackle against Kent State on Nov. 4. He recorded at least two tackles in every appearance in 2020 with his breakout game coming at Western Michigan on Dec. 5 where he set personal bests in tackles (7), tackles for loss (2.0), sacks (2.0) and forced fumbles (1).

The EMU defense, aided by Nunez, was successful at forcing turnovers throughout the team's six games in 2020. Eastern recovered nine fumbles, which ranked first in the MAC and 11th nationally that season.

In 2019, punter Julien set the program's single-season punting mark at 43.8 yards per boot. Overall, Julien led the MAC and ranked 30th nationally in punting. Furthermore, Ryland connected on 14 field goals, including the game-winner to upend Big Ten Conference foe Illinois.

In 2018, EMU special teams ranked second nationally in punts downed inside the five, fourth in punts downed inside the 10, and 23rd in punts downed inside the 20. Furthermore, the Eagles were fifth in the FBS in punts past the 50.

He also helped mentor punter Julien to second team All-MAC honors in 2018, while becoming the first EMU player to earn MAC Player of the Week accolades five times in the same season. Julien finished his career the only EMU player, in records that date back to 1959, to have recorded two punts of 70-or-more yards. He led the MAC and ranked 29th nationally in punting with an average of 43.4 with 13 punts of 50-or-more yards and 24 that were downed inside the 20-yard line.



Nunez served as the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach for the SIU football program in 2016. In Nunez's only season with the Salukis, he guided Southern Illinois to some of the most dynamic special teams play in the nation. Southern led the Missouri Valley Football Conference in kick return average and ranked eighth nationally in that category. D.J. Davis was named All-MVFC as a returner after averaging a league-best 26.0 yards per kick return.

In addition to kick returns, SIU blocked two kicks while allowing zero blocks. Austin Johnson became the first kicker in SIU history to hit three career field goals of 50 yards or longer. Under Nunez' guidance, tight end Jacob Varble started 10 games and caught 16 passes for 202 yards and a touchdown.

From 2011-15, Nunez served as the quality control assistant for special teams at Minnesota and helped manage the day-to-day operations of the unit. He also aided the Gophers with opponent breakdowns and other tasks. Nunez got his coaching start at Pittsburg State, where he worked with the offensive and defensive lines for two seasons. He also developed game and weight room plans in addition to help with video sessions and recruiting.

Nunez was a four-year letter winner on the Pittsburg State University football team. He was a team captain as a senior and was a semifinalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy in 2009, which is awarded by the National Football Foundation to the American college football player with the best combination of academics, community service and on-field performance.

A native of Alva, Okla., Nunez received his bachelor's degree in history/government in 2009 and his master's degree in educational leadership in 2013 from Pittsburg State.

Nunez and his wife, Ashley, have three sons, Aaron, Emmit and Kayde.

Freddie Roach returned to coach the Crimson Tide's defensive line under head coach Kalen DeBoer with the added responsibility of associate head coach in 2024. Prior to the '24 campaign, Roach spent four seasons in charge of the defensive line in Tuscaloosa.

Roach's line provided a steady presence on the defensive side of the ball in 2024, with veterans Tim Keenan III, Tim Smith and Jah-Marien Latham pairing with transfer LT Overton to produce solid results. Keenan III posted a career year, totaling 40 stops, including 7.5 tackles for loss and 2.5 sacks – all career-high marks – to go with a pair of quarterback hurries and one pass breakup. Smith and Latham each set career-high totals for tackles while Overton paced the group with 42 tackles and a team-leading nine quarterback hurries.

Alabama's 2023 defensive line was one of the deepest, smartest and most effective in recent years. Justin Eboigbe led the way with 64 tackles, 11.5 tackles for loss and seven sacks. Keenan III stepped up and manned the middle, adding 38 tackles and seven quarterback hurries, while Smith was equally effective with 31 tackles. The line's output up front helped Alabama finish 14th nationally in sacks (2.79) and 18th in total defense (316.0 ypg).

The 2022 defensive line helped the Crimson Tide rank ninth in scoring defense (18.2 ppg), 13th in total defense (318.2 ypg) and 22nd in tackles for loss (6.9 ppg). Senior Byron Young led the way with 48 tackles, 5.5 tackles for

loss and four sacks, while Smith made 20 stops and DJ Dale added 2.5 sacks.

In his second season back at the Capstone, Roach's defensive line turned in an outstanding season that saw the unit get better each week. The Crimson Tide finished fourth nationally against the rush, allowing just 86.0 yards per game, and seventh in total defense at 304.1 ypg in 2021.

Redshirt senior Phidarian Mathis led the group with a dominant effort that included 53 tackles, 12 tackles for loss and nine sacks. He was joined by Young, who finished with 40 tackles and 9.5 tackles for loss, while Smith recorded 24 tackles to go with Eboigbe and Dale, who each had 19 tackles apiece.

In 2020, Roach inherited a young defensive front that steadily developed along the Crimson Tide's march to an undefeated national championship season. Redshirt sophomore Christian Barmore led the team and was second in the SEC with eight sacks while recording 37 tackles to pace all linemen. He was named the Defensive Most Valuable Player of the College Football Playoff National Championship with five tackles, including two key sacks, and was eventually selected in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft by the New England Patriots.

Mathis also stepped up along the defensive front in 2020, finishing with 31 tackles, including five for loss, to go with three pass breakups and three quarterback hurries. Young added 6.5 tackles for loss while Dale finished with 22 tackles and Eboigbe had 19.

Prior to returning to Tuscaloosa, Roach spent 2017-19 at Ole Miss. In Oxford, Roach's 2019 line was led by nose tackle Benito Jones and defensive end Josiah Coatney. Jones recorded 10 tackles for loss and 5.5 sacks, while Coatney added 46 total tackles, including 3.5 tackles for loss and two sacks, to go with four quarterback hurries.

In 2018, Coatney (63) and Qaadir Sheppard (48) combined for 111 tackles and three forced fumbles. Sheppard produced a season-high 10 tackles for loss, while Markel Winters (4.0) and Jones (3.0) solidified the defensive front. During his first season at Ole Miss, Roach developed a pair of NFL Draft picks in Braeland Speaks (2nd round) and Marquis Haynes (4th round). The two combined for 14.5 sacks while earning second team All-SEC accolades. Haynes finished as Ole Miss' career leader in sacks (32.0) and tackles for loss (47.5).

Roach was previously at Alabama from 2015-16 as the Tide's director of player development where his primary focus was the off-the-field activities of Crimson Tide's football student-athletes, serving as a resource in balancing the demands of academics, athletics and community outreach. He also served as a liaison for high school coaches while assisting with Alabama camps and clinics. During his time in that role, Alabama won back-to-back SEC titles and played for the national championship all three years, winning the crown in 2015 and 2017.



Before his player development stint at UA, Roach spent the 2013 and 2014 seasons as the defensive ends and outside linebackers coach at South Alabama under head coach Joey Jones. Roach helped the Jaguars end the 2013 season ranked third nationally in sacks per game and 21st in tackles for loss per contest while finishing second in the Sun Belt in pass, total and scoring defense. The 2014 defense was second in the Sun Belt in total defense.

In 2012, Roach coached Murray State's defensive line while also assisting with the strength and conditioning program. The previous fall, he coached the defensive line and was the director of strength and conditioning at East Mississippi Community College, helping lead the Lions to the NJCAA National Championship.

Roach's initial return to the Alabama coaching staff came from 2008-10 as an assistant strength and conditioning coach, during which time the Crimson Tide won both the BCS national championship and Southeastern Conference title in 2009.

As a player, Roach was a four-year letterman at linebacker for the Crimson Tide from 2002-05. While at the Capstone, he was named the National Freshman of the Year in addition to earning Freshman All-America accolades and was twice tabbed as a second team All-SEC honoree. He was also named to Alabama's All-Decade Team for the 2000s. Following his time at the Capstone, Roach signed as a free agent with the Patriots in 2006.

A native of Killen, Ala., he made 194 tackles with 23 tackles for loss and six forced fumbles as a senior at Brook High School. Roach earned his bachelor's degree in human environmental sciences from The University of Alabama in 2008.

Roach and his wife, Ashley, have three daughters, Mattie, Addison and Alexandria, and a son, Freddie III.

One of the top young defensive minds in college football, Christian Robinson was added to Kalen DeBoer's coaching staff in the spring of 2024 to direct outside linebackers.

In his first season with the Crimson Tide, Robinson's unit was led by veteran Que Robinson. The fifth-year senior provided a presence off the edge, totaling four sacks, good for second on the team, and seven tackles for loss to rank third in that category prior to a season-ending injury at LSU. Following his exit, Qua Russaw stepped up in a big way. The Montgomery, Ala., native finished the year with 36 total tackles, including 2.5 for loss and one sack, to go with a pair of quarterback hurries, a forced fumble and two interceptions.

Before coming to Tuscaloosa, Robinson coached inside linebackers at Baylor in 2023. Bears' middle linebacker Matt Jones led the team in tackles with 82, including 11.5 tackles for loss and three sacks under Robinson's guidance.

A native of Lawrenceville, Ga., Robinson was named to the American Football Coaches Association '35 Under 35' in 2022 while at Auburn, a list highlighting some of the nation's best up-and-coming coaches under 35. In his lone year at AU he served as the linebackers coach and defensive run game coordinator. Robinson helped Owen Pappoe to a team-leading 91 tackles, including three for a loss and two sacks, to go with two forced fumbles.

Robinson got his start as a full-time coach at Florida from 2018-21. In his final season in Gainesville, he coached linebackers, helping lead Florida to a fourth consecutive bowl berth. During his four years at Florida, the Gators ranked fourth nationally in sacks, trailing only Alabama, Clemson and Pitt. The Gators also forced 78 turnovers during Robinson's four-year tenure, a total that was 26th-best in the nation.

In '21, the Gators totaled 37 sacks and out-sacked opponents by plus-23 over the course of the year. Florida improved defensively in points per game, first-downs allowed, third-down and fourth-down percentage, rushing, passing and total yards allowed. Individually in 2021, Mohamoud Diabate ranked second on the team with 89 tackles, including 2.5 for loss, to go with four quarterback hurries. Brenton Cox Jr. added 41 tackles, 14.5 tackles for a loss and 8.5 sacks.

In 2020, Florida's linebackers shined under Robinson, helping lead the Gators to the SEC Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. Ventrell Miller led the team with 88 tackles, including 7.5 for a loss and 3.5 sacks, while Diabate added 69 tackles, including seven for a loss, to go with an interception and two forced fumbles.

Robinson helped mold Florida's defense into one of the nation's top units in 2019. The Gators finished seventh nationally in scoring defense with an average of 15.5 points, allowing just 23 offensive touchdowns over the course of the season to tie for the fourth-fewest in the FBS. UF was one of just two FBS teams to hold five opponents without an offensive touchdown in 2019, including three shutouts.

In 2018 for the Gators, Robinson's unit was led by Jonathan Greenard and David Reese II. A graduate transfer from Louisville, Robinson helped Greenard make the most of his lone season in Gainesville. Greenard totaled 52 tackles and led the SEC with 9.5 sacks and 15.5 tackles for loss, earning first team All-SEC honors.

The 2018 defense ranked 11th in the nation in forced fumbles and takeaways, 12th in fumble recoveries, 17th in passing efficiency defense, 20th in scoring defense and sacks per game, and 33rd in yards per play. UF also led the nation in fourth-quarter opponent passing efficiency and was second nationally in fourth quarter opponent completion percentage.

Prior to his four seasons at Florida, Robinson served as a graduate assistant at Mississippi State (2017), Ole Miss (2015-16) and his alma mater, Georgia (2013-14), where he played linebacker from 2009-12.



Robinson worked with the defensive line as a graduate assistant at Ole Miss where the Rebels ranked in the top three among SEC teams in tackles for loss (8.1/game – 7th in NCAA), interceptions (15 – t-23rd in NCAA) and takeaways (23 – t-38th in NCAA).

Most notably, Robinson tutored 2015 Hornung Award finalist and first team All-American Robert Nkemdiche, who was taken in the first round (29th overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft by the Arizona Cardinals. Ole Miss defensive linemen combined for 24 sacks that season, led by a school record-tying 10 from Marquis Haynes.

Robinson began his coaching career at Georgia in 2013 as a defensive graduate assistant and quality control assistant. During the two-year span (2013-14) he spent in Athens, Ga., the Bulldogs led the SEC in turnover margin and ranked among the nation's best pass defenses in 2014.

As a player for the Bulldogs, Robinson saw time in 51 games with 17 starts at linebacker from 2009-12. He compiled 159 tackles, 22.5 tackles for loss and 4.5 sacks. He was also a part of back-to-back SEC Eastern Division title teams in 2011 and 2012.

The Lawrenceville, Ga., native earned his bachelor's degree in sports management from UGA in 2012. He is the son of former NFL player and high school coach Ken Robinson and Lori Robinson. He attended mini-camp with the St. Louis Rams before embarking on a coaching career.

Robinson is married to the former Kaley Crook. The couple has one daughter, Charlie.

JaMarcus Shephard followed head coach Kalen DeBoer to Tuscaloosa to join the Alabama coaching staff in February of 2024. Shephard serves as the assistant head coach, co-offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach.

In year one in Tuscaloosa, Shephard helped Germie Bernard and Ryan Williams post standout first seasons with the Crimson Tide. A Washington transfer, Bernard led UA in catches and posted career-high marks for receptions (50) and yards (794) while adding two touchdowns. Following closely behind was freshman sensation Ryan Williams, who accumulated a team-high 865 yards and eight touchdowns on 48 receptions. He added two rushing scores to finish with 10 total touchdowns for the season, good for seventh in the SEC, while adding punt and kickoff return to his duties. Williams' rookie campaign finished with all-conference and All-America honors.

Before coming to Alabama, Shephard spent the 2022-23 seasons at Washington with DeBoer. In 2023, UW boasted arguably the best wide receiver corps in the nation with two players recording 1,000-yard seasons, led by first team All-American Rome Odunze and Ja'Lynn Polk. Odunze recorded 92 receptions for 1,640 yards and 13 touchdowns, while Polk caught

69 balls for 1,159 yards and nine scores. The duo went on to be selected in the first and second rounds, respectively, of the 2024 NFL Draft. The Huskies' passing game ranked second nationally in '23 with 343.7 yards per game while scoring 36.0 points per game.

In his first season at UW, Shephard oversaw a receivers unit that helped the Husky offense rank among the most prolific in the nation. Washington led Division I in both passing offense (369.8 yards per game) and third-down conversions (57 percent) while also finishing second in total offense (515.8 yards per game). Just one season earlier, Washington finished the season 73rd in passing offense and 114th in total offense.

Shephard's wideout group included Odunze and Jalen McMillan, who each earned first team All-Pac-12 honors from multiple outlets. McMillan led the team in receptions with 79 for 1,098 yards, while Odunze paced the Huskies with 1,145 yards, on 75 catches – each posting a season that finished in the top-10 in program history.

Shephard arrived at Washington after spending the previous five seasons at Purdue from 2017-21, including the final four as co-offensive coordinator.

In 2021, Purdue's offense averaged 355.3 passing yards per game, good for fifth nationally, on the way to a 9-4 finish and a win over Tennessee in the Music City Bowl. With Shephard's guidance, wide receiver David Bell caught 93 passes for 1,286 yards to rank second in the NCAA in receptions per game and fifth in yards per game. Bell earned first team All-Big Ten for the second straight season in '21, while teammate Milton Wright made honorable mention thanks to his 57 catches for 782 yards. In 2020, Bell led the Big Ten in receptions (53), receiving touchdowns (eight) and yards per game (104.2), while teammate Rondale Moore caught 35 passes for 270 yards over just three games.

Bell was selected as the 2019 Big Ten Freshman of the Year one season after Moore had won that same honor – just the fifth time in history that teammates had won that award in back-to-back seasons. As a freshman, Bell tied for the conference lead with 86 receptions totaling 1,035 yards and seven touchdowns. Moore, who was lost for the season in the fourth game of the year, still managed to catch 29 passes for 387 yards and two touchdowns for the season.

In 2018, Moore led the nation with 114 receptions for 1,258 yards and 12 touchdowns. His standout effort earned him consensus first team All-America honors, the first freshman to do so in Big Ten history, along with being named the Paul Hornung Award winner as the nation's most versatile player. He broke school records for all-purpose yards in a game (313 vs. Northwestern) and season (2,215) and went on to be selected in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft by the Arizona Cardinals. Seniors Isaac Zico and Terry Wright added a combined 74 receptions for 1,211 yards and 11 scores.

Before his time in West Lafayette, Shephard spent the 2016 campaign at Washington State where he served as the inside



receivers coach. For that season, the Cougars averaged 370.8 passing yards per game. Despite his season being cut short due to injury, star wideout River Cracraft still notched 53 receptions for 701 yards and five touchdowns.

Prior to working at WSU, Shephard spent four seasons at Western Kentucky. He joined the WKU staff in 2011 as a defensive analyst and volunteer assistant, a position he held for two seasons. Shephard was then moved to offensive analyst in 2013 before being hired full-time as the Hilltoppers' receivers coach in 2014. In his two seasons as a full-time staffer, Hilltopper receivers amassed 553 receptions and 86 touchdowns as the offense threw for 374.3 yards per game in 2014 and 372.2 yards in 2015.

Shephard got his start in football coaching in the Indiana high school ranks, serving as an assistant at his alma mater, Fort Wayne Northrop, in 2005 before moving to Broad Ripple in Indianapolis in 2006. He also served as a volunteer assistant with the DePauw track & field program in 2007, working with the long jumpers and sprinters.

A native of Fort Wayne, Ind., Shephard was a four-year letterman at DePauw (2001-04). He was a two-time All-American and still holds the school record for career kickoff return yards (1,430) while ranking sixth in receptions (168) and seventh in receiving yards (2,382). As a senior, Shephard caught 47 passes for 815 yards and seven touchdowns. He was one of only two Division III players to compete in the 2005 Hula Bowl. He also served as captain for both the football and track & field teams as a senior.

Shephard worked as an intern with the Philadelphia Eagles during his junior year at DePauw. He also worked in the NCAA Championships and Education Services Division in 2006 and 2007 and with the National Center for Drug-Free Sport in Kansas City, Mo., from 2007 to 2011.

Shephard earned a bachelor's degree in sports medicine from DePauw in 2005 and his master's degree in recreation and sport administration from Western Kentucky in 2013. He and his wife, Hallie, have three children – Jaylan, Alana and Maliyah.

Nick Sheridan joined Kalen DeBoer's Alabama coaching staff in February of 2024. He served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in his first season before shifting to co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach starting in 2025.

In his first season with the Crimson Tide, Sheridan's offense averaged 33.8 points per game, good for third in the SEC and 22nd nationally. The ground game was key to scoring points, with the Tide combining for 41 rushing touchdowns to lead the conference and rank fifth nationally. The passing game was also a weapon, with the quarterbacks producing a 146.39 passing efficiency mark that was fifth in the league and 28th nationally. Big plays were a common theme for the aerial attack, as Alabama averaged 13.6 yards per completion to rank fifth in the conference and 18th nationally under Sheridan's guidance. The 2024 offense was also solid on third downs, converting at 47.3 rate that was second in the SEC and 12th in Division I.

Sheridan coached tight ends at Indiana in 2019 when DeBoer coordinated the Hoosiers' offense. He then took

over as the offensive coordinator at IU when DeBoer left for Fresno State. When DeBoer took the Washington job, Sheridan followed him to Seattle and coached the Huskies' tight ends in both the 2022 and 2023 seasons.

The UW tight end room in '23 was a catalyst for one of the most explosive offenses in the nation. Jack Westover led the tight end group with 46 catches for 433 yards and four touchdowns, while Devin Culp added 16 grabs for 208 yards and two scores. The passing game ranked second nationally at 343.7 yards per game with running back Dillon Johnson adding 1,195 yards and 16 touchdowns on the ground.

In his first year at Washington in 2022, Sheridan helped the Husky offense to new heights as UW led the nation in both passing offense (369.8 yards per game) and third-down conversions (57 percent) while also finishing second in total offense at 515.8 yards per game. Just one season earlier, Washington ranked 73rd in passing offense and 114th in total offense.

Before his time in Seattle, Sheridan helped Indiana quarterback Michael Penix Jr. become a Davey O'Brien Award semifinalist and second team All-Big Ten selection in 2021. Penix led the Big Ten Conference with 274.2 passing yards per game. That same season, Ty Fryfogle was a first team all-conference selection and was named the Big Ten Receiver of the Year. In 2020, IU finished fourth in the Big Ten in scoring (28.9) along with fifth in passing offense (250.9) and time of possession (31:15).

In 2019, alongside DeBoer, Indiana improved at least 40 spots in the national rankings from 2018 in time of possession (+87), average yards per pass (+83), average yards per reception (+78), red zone touchdowns (+70), 20-yard passing plays (+69), 20-yard scrimmage plays (+62), points per game (+46) and total touchdowns (+43). That same season, tight end Peyton Hendershot, a three-time All-Big Ten honoree, set school records for the position with 52 receptions for 622 yards.

With Sheridan in his second year as quarterbacks coach in 2018, Indiana finished third in the conference in passing offense (257.8) for the second straight year. Quarterback Peyton Ramsey started all 12 games, completing 66.0 percent of his passes for 2,875 yards and 19 touchdowns while adding 354 rushing yards and five scores.

His first season at IU in 2017 saw Sheridan named one of the top-30 coaches under the age of 30 by 247Sports.com. In that '17 campaign, the Hoosiers' 265.7 passing yards per game ranked 35th in the



country. Quarterbacks Richard Lagow (1,936 yards, 15 touchdowns) and Ramsey (1,252 yards, 10 touchdowns) combined for 3,188 yards and 25 scores while completing 61.2 percent of their passes. Ramsey earned freshman All-Big Ten honors after he set a then-school record 65.4 completion percentage mark.

Prior to heading to Bloomington, Sheridan served as an offensive grad assistant at Tennessee from 2014-16. In 2016, he worked with quarterback Joshua Dobbs, who was selected in the fourth round of the 2017 NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers. Dobbs finished his career with 7,138 passing yards, the fifth-most in UT history. He also became just the fifth player in Vols history to eclipse 7,000 career passing yards.

He spent one season at South Florida in 2013 under former Western Kentucky coach Willie Taggart. While with the Bulls, Sheridan worked as the quarterbacks coach and passing game coordinator. He traveled to Tampa after a two-year stint with Taggart at Western Kentucky from 2011-12. While at WKU, Sheridan worked as a graduate assistant in '11 and was elevated to quarterbacks coach and passing coordinator in '12.

As a player, Sheridan walked on at quarterback for the University of Michigan in 2006 and earned a scholarship prior to his junior year. He appeared in 12 career games, making four starts in 2008.

Sheridan earned his bachelor's degree in political science from Michigan in the spring of 2010 and began his coaching career that fall as quarterbacks coach at his alma mater, Saline High School in Michigan.

Nick and his wife, Sarah, have two sons, Beau and Heath, and two daughters, Sloane and Summer.

Kane Wommack, a respected head coach and defensive coordinator, was hired by Alabama head coach Kalen DeBoer to coordinate the Crimson Tide defense.

Under Wommack's tutelage, the Alabama defense grew each week as the 2024 season wore on, eventually finishing at No. 10 nationally in scoring at 17.4 points per game, the lowest total by a UA defense since 2017. Against the Tide defense, opponents averaged just .255 points per play, the sixth-lowest mark nationally, and only 4.7 yards per play to tie for eighth in Division I. A key to Alabama's success was in the takeaway department. The Tide recorded 28 turnovers to tie for fifth nationally, including 11 fumbles and 17 interceptions. Alabama was one of just six teams to force at least 28 turnovers in 2024, with 20 of those takeaways coming across the final eight games of the season.

The '24 group included a pair of All-Americans along with four All-SEC selections. Alabama's defense was highlighted by Jihaad Campbell, who earned all-conference and All-America accolades. Campbell led the team with 117 tackles to rank fifth in the SEC and eighth in UA single-season history, while adding a team-high 11.5 tackles for loss. Two-time team captain Malachi Moore led the secondary unit, garnering all-conference and All-America honors at season's end. Moore recorded 70 tackles, including three for loss and one sack, to go with two forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and a pair of interceptions for a combined 72 return yards.

Wommack, arrived in Tuscaloosa after three years as the head coach at South Alabama. He posted a 22-17 record with the Jaguars, qualifying for back-to-back bowl games and winning the 2023 Ventures 68 Bowl.

Under his leadership, USA went 7-6 in 2023, winning the first bowl game in program history. The 7-6 record in 2023, combined with a 10-3 finish in 2022, marked the first time in program history that South Alabama put together back-to-back winning seasons as a full FBS participant.

In 2022, the Jags went 10-3 and finished second in the Sun Belt Conference West Division. The 10 wins were the most of any South Alabama team during FBS play and tied the school record for wins in a season dating back to the inception of the program. South Alabama had 14 players selected to all-conference teams at the end of the year with La'Damian Webb and Yam Banks earning first-team honors and Banks earning All-America recognition.

In his first season at the helm, the Jags finished 5-7, dropping four games by one score or less. South Alabama had eight all-conference selections including Jalen Tolbert, who earned Sun Belt Conference Offensive Player of the Year honors, before being selected in the third round by the Dallas Cowboys.

Wommack (pronounced WAH-mick), 34 at the time of his hiring and one of the youngest head coaches in college football, became the third head coach since the inception of South's program and the youngest at the NCAA FBS level. The Jaguars' defensive coordinator in 2016 and 2017, he returned to the program after working three years as linebackers coach at Indiana including serving as the Hoosiers' defensive coordinator his final two seasons.

Wommack was one of five finalists for the Broyles Award in the fall of 2020 after his efforts helped IU post a 6-2 mark overall on the way to finishing 12th in the final Associated Press poll and earning an invitation to the Outback Bowl.

His unit led the Big Ten Conference with 17 interceptions and a 64 percent red zone defensive rate – ranking first in the country in the latter category and second in the former – while also pacing the league with 20 takeaways and 3.12 sacks per contest. The Hoosiers also finished 10th nationally in turnover margin (1.00) and were among the top-25 in scoring (20.2 ppg) and passing efficiency (120.96).

Following the '20 season, seven members of the IU defense earned all-Big Ten honors including a school-record four – Jamar Johnson, Jerome Johnson, Micah McFadden and Tiawan Mullen – first-team selections. Mullen also became the first cornerback in program history to earn first team All-America honors.

In his first year as the youngest Power 5 defensive coordinator, Wommack led IU to top-50 rankings nationally in scoring, total, rush and pass defense for the first time since 1993. His efforts helped the Hoosiers hold four opponents to three points or less, the most in one season since 1945.

Wommack was the Jaguars' defensive coordinator and linebackers coach during the 2016 and 2017 campaigns, leading a unit that was among the top-10 in the country in passing defense (174.6 ypg) while allowing 10-plus points fewer than the previous season – the



fifth-best improvement in the NCAA FBS that fall. In 2017, South was in the top-15 nationally in both red zone defense and fumble recoveries as the Jags recorded 20 takeaways both seasons in Mobile.

Prior to his arrival at South, Wommack was the defensive coordinator and safeties coach at Eastern Illinois, where he helped the Panthers make a first-round appearance in the NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision playoffs. EIU also finished in the top-25 of the final national poll in 2015. That fall, EIU's defense ranked second nationally in interceptions (19), third in takeaways (31), fourth in pass efficiency defense (103.0), eighth in red zone defense (67.3%) and 10th in tackles for loss (98).

Wommack began his coaching career at Tennessee-Martin in 2010, went to Jacksonville State in 2011 as a graduate assistant and then served as a graduate assistant Ole Miss from 2012-13.

He began his collegiate playing career at Arkansas, where he was a fullback in 2005 and 2006, helping the Razorbacks win the Southeastern Conference West Division title his second year. After transferring to Southern Miss, Wommack helped the Golden Eagles to three straight bowl appearances before earning his undergraduate degree in political science in 2009. He then began his coaching career as a volunteer assistant while at USM.

In addition to his on-field coaching duties, Wommack is also a member of the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Board of Trustees.

Wommack and his wife Melissa have three sons – Asher, Tatum and Jones. His father, Dave, had more than 35 years of experience coaching at the collegiate level, including serving as defensive coordinator at Ole Miss before retiring following the 2016 season.

Regarded among the best in the field, David Ballou joined the Alabama program in March of 2020 as the Director of Sports Performance after spending two years at Indiana University (2018-20) where he was the Director of Athletic Performance.

Now in his sixth year with Alabama, Ballou brings a scientific approach to the Crimson Tide's tradition of hard work and dedication that is put towards maximizing genetic potential. Ballou implements Coach DeBoer's offseason program, which is still called the "Fourth Quarter Program."

Ballou and his entire strength and conditioning staff work in unison with sports medicine and performance nutrition to create the optimal high-performance model for training and development. At Alabama, Ballou oversees the Crimson Tide's 37,000-square-foot weight room that was updated in the spring of 2023 with Elite Form 3-D camera systems and a full line of 1080 Sprint equipment and technology.

The newly renovated state-of-the-art facility is comprised of a weight room that is highlighted by 30 one-of-a-kind racks which feature platforms built into the ground for a level surface that provides a safer training environment. It also features a dedicated sports science space which is comprised of the most innovative technology

in human performance. The weight room also has a state-of-the-art performance nutrition center to fuel Alabama student-athletes plus physicians' offices and strength and conditioning offices.

During his time at Alabama, Ballou has developed two Heisman Trophy Winners, a Joe Moore Award-winning offensive line, one Maxwell Award recipient, a Walter Camp Player of the Year honoree, and winners of the Unitas Golden Arm, Davey O'Brien, Paul Hornung, Biletnikoff and Doak Walker awards along with the Outland and Rimington trophies. Also, during his tenure at Alabama, the Crimson Tide won the 2020 National Championship and the SEC Championship in '20, 2021 and 2023. During his career, he has worked with 20 first round draft picks and over 80 current NFL players.

Prior to Alabama, Ballou spent two seasons with Indiana. While in Bloomington, he helped 11 players earn All-Big Ten honors in 2019 as Indiana went 8-5 and played in the Gator Bowl, the team's first Florida bowl game. IU's eight wins were also its most since 1993. Four IU standouts moved on to the NFL under Ballou, including Washington Redskins fourth-round pick Wes Martin.

Prior to Indiana, Ballou spent 2017 as Notre Dame's co-director of football strength and conditioning. In his lone season in South Bend, the Fighting Irish went 10-3 with a victory over LSU in the Citrus Bowl. Notre Dame had posted a 4-8 record prior to his arrival. During his time with the Fighting Irish, Ballou helped develop a Joe Moore Award-winning offensive line, honoring the best line in the country. Two of those linemen, guard Quenton Nelson (6) and tackle Mike McGlinchey (9), were drafted in the top 10 of the 2018 NFL Draft while four ND players were selected overall.

Before his time in college, Ballou worked as the head football strength and conditioning coach at IMG Academy in Bradenton, Fla., for two years, helping both the 2015 and 2016 teams go undefeated. In 2015, IMG finished the season ranked 7th in the country followed by a No. 4 national ranking to close out the 2016 campaign. Ballou coached double-digit players at IMG that are currently on NFL rosters.

Ballou's longest tenure was at Avon (Ind.) High School from 2002-14. During his time as the strength and conditioning coach, the teams won



six state championships in multiple sports and seven others were finalists. He also assisted in the development of 80 Division I athletes. In 2014, Ballou was a finalist for the NSCA National High School Strength Coach of the Year.

A graduate of Indiana in 2001, Ballou played fullback for the Hoosiers from 1997-99 and was recognized as the Hoosier Strength Challenge Champion. Ballou earned his bachelor's degree in kinesiology while in Bloomington and obtained a master's degree in human movement from A.T. Still University in 2009.

Ballou has been a certified strength and conditioning specialist since 2001. He is married to the former Leah Horn, a Bloomington, Ind., native who was a pole vaulter and graduate at IU. The couple has two daughters, Mallory and Aubrey.

Courtney Morgan was Kalen DeBoer's first hire at The University of Alabama, joining the staff as general manager in January of 2024. He came to Tuscaloosa after spending the 2022-23 seasons at the University of Washington as DeBoer's director of player personnel and general manager.

In his role, Morgan is tasked with managing the Crimson Tide's roster while overseeing and directing the daily operations of both the personnel and recruiting departments. He helps organize the head coach's film evaluations and prospect communication while also organizing transfer portal evaluations. Additionally, Morgan supervises internal brand management for Alabama football.

Morgan's work paid off immediately, as the Crimson Tide signed the nation's No. 3 overall recruiting class in the 2025 cycle while adding 10 players through the portal. Morgan's first full offseason also included the retention of 38 total letterwinners, including 14 starters from the '24 team.

While at Washington, Morgan's influence was instrumental in helping the Huskies go from a 4-8 squad prior to DeBoer's arrival, to a CFP National Championship Game appearance just two years later. UW compiled a 25-3 record and also claimed a Pac-12 title in their two years in Seattle. Morgan helped Washington secure a top-30 recruiting

class in 2023 while assisting in the addition of key contributors to the 2022 and 2023 UW teams through the transfer portal.

He spent 2021 in the general manager position at his alma mater Michigan, where he helped propel the Wolverines to a berth in the 2021 College Football Playoff.

Prior to his year in Ann Arbor, Morgan operated in the GM role under DeBoer at Fresno State, where he was named the No. 3 recruiter in the Mountain West Conference by 247Sports for the class of 2021 cycle. Morgan restarted his work in the college ranks at San Jose State in 2019.

Morgan's experience in sports is diverse and impressive. After his time at UCLA as director of player development from 2013-14, he co-founded Pure Influence Group, where he connected professional athletes, businesses and entertainers with opportunities to increase brand awareness, community imprint and revenue.

Senior associate athletics director for sports medicine Jeff Allen is in his 19th season at The University of Alabama and his 37th consecutive season working as an athletic trainer in college football.

In his role at Alabama, Allen oversees a staff of 27 athletic trainers that are responsible for the medical care of all Alabama teams.

He joined the Crimson Tide program as one of the original hires made by then-head coach Nick Saban in 2007, and was a part of all six national championships during Saban's tenure at the Capstone.

Before joining the Crimson Tide, Allen was the head athletic trainer at the University of Central Florida. At UCF, Allen was responsible for all the sports medicine needs for the entire department.

Prior to his post at UCF, Allen was head athletic trainer at Chattanooga from 2000-04, overseeing the athletic training operations for 16 varsity sports while handling all of the duties associated with the football program.

Allen was an assistant athletic trainer at the University of Kentucky from 1997-2000 and earlier served as an assistant athletic trainer from 1995-97 at Valdosta (Ga.) State, where he was head athletic trainer for the football and baseball teams.

One of the most respected athletic trainers in the country, Allen was honored with the National Athletic Trainers Association's Division I Head Athletic Trainer of the Year Award at their 2018 symposium for his work during the 2017 season. Through collaborations with the College of Engineering, Allen was the original inventor of the SidelinER, a medical tent that is now used on almost every sideline in college football and in the NFL.

He has authored several published articles and is a regular speaker at national and state athletic training conferences. His work has been published by The Journal of Athletic Training and Athletic Therapy Today. Allen has served as a featured speaker at conferences held by the National Athletic Trainers Association and the Southeast Athletic Trainers Association, as well as state meetings in Georgia, Kentucky and Tennessee.

He earned a master's degree at Valdosta State University in 1995 and a bachelor's degree from Georgia Southern University in health and physical education in 1993. Jeff's wife Mary is a professor in The University of Alabama Speech-Language pathology program. They have one daughter, Makennah, who is an assistant coach for the Crimsonettes with the Million Dollar Band.

 Director, Recruiting
 EAST TENNESSEE STATE, 2003

Jatavis Sanders joined the Alabama staff in January of 2024 to serve as the director of recruiting under head coach Kalen DeBoer.

In his role with the Crimson Tide, Sanders serves as the primary liaison between the University and high schools. He is tasked with building and managing relationships with high school coaches, players and their parents, and all parties involved in the recruitment process. Sanders' main focus involves the states of Georgia and North Carolina.

He also helps with managing UA's recruitment board. Once potential prospects arrive on-campus, Sanders hosts players and their families on official and unofficial visits while also organizing communications plans for recruiting visits. In addition to his work with recruiting, Sanders assists with camps, coaching clinics and is involved in gameday operations for the Crimson Tide.

Sanders' work this past season helped Alabama secure a top-five recruiting class by all major outlets. The 2025 group included three top-ranked players at their specific positions by 247Sports, including quarterback Keelon Russell, offensive lineman Michael Carroll and cornerback Dijon Lee Jr.

Prior to his time in Tuscaloosa, Sanders spent three years at North Carolina State University from 2022-24. He began his time with the Wolfpack as the director of scouting in 2022 before being promoted to director of recruiting. In his first year leading State's recruiting efforts, the Wolfpack signed a top-50 class and followed that one year later by inking the nation's 28th-ranked recruiting class in 2024, the highest-rated class in 12 years under head coach Dave Doeren.

He arrived in Raleigh after serving as the director of recruiting for the Willie Anderson Lineman Academy in Atlanta, Ga., from 2018-22. While in Atlanta, Sanders

consulted with clients, evaluated film and provided insight to clients on the college football recruiting process. He also promoted film and highlight tapes for potential recruits to increase their exposure to scholarship opportunities.

Sanders began his time in football as a high school coach. He served as the co-offensive coordinator and running backs coach at Norcross [Ga.] High School from 2017-22 after a stint as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Arabia Mountain High School in Georgia from 2013-17.

A 2003 graduate of East Tennessee State, Sanders played quarterback collegiately at both ETSU and NC State. While with the Wolfpack, he backed up Philip Rivers from 1999-2000. In 2009, he earned a master's in business administration (MBA). He also earned a teaching certification from the University of Georgia in 2012.

During his lone season as the assistant director of football operations in 2017, Summerford also served as an assistant to the director of player personnel and operations, while helping oversee the organization and execution of the recruiting department. He assisted with team travel, logistics and day-to-day operations in consultation with associate athletics director Ellis Ponder.

Summerford began his career with the Crimson Tide as a recruiting specialist in May of 2012 before being promoted to head recruiting specialist in April of 2013 where he served for two seasons. He was promoted to recruiting analyst in 2015 and spent two seasons in that role. He has been a part of four national championship teams at Alabama (2012, 2015, 2017, 2020) along with eight SEC title teams.

Bob Welton joined the Alabama staff in May of 2018 and is in his seventh season as the Tide's director of player personnel.

Welton's responsibilities with the Crimson Tide include the organization of all recruiting efforts while also working with compliance regarding initial eligibility and assisting with coaching clinics, camps and other on-campus events.

He came to Alabama after a brief stint as Nebraska's director of recruiting operations during the spring of 2018. Welton also brought several years of SEC experience to Tuscaloosa, serving as the director of player personnel at Tennessee for five seasons (2013-17). With the Volunteers, he helped Tennessee put together five top-25 recruiting classes, including two top-10 classes according to 247Sports.com, finishing No. 7 in 2014 and fourth in 2015.

A nine-year veteran of the NFL, Welton served as a college scout with the Cleveland Browns from 2004-13 before moving on to Knoxville. Prior to joining the Browns, he spent seven years as a high school football coach.

His final stop in high school was at Coloma (Mich.) High School where he guided the team to its first undefeated season and first playoff victory in school history. Walter Brock joined the Alabama football staff in March of 2024 as the director of creative and production. Director, Player Development

Josh Chapman was named one of Alabama's directors of player development in February of 2020 after spending the previous four years working as a strength and conditioning assistant in the Crimson Tide's weight room.

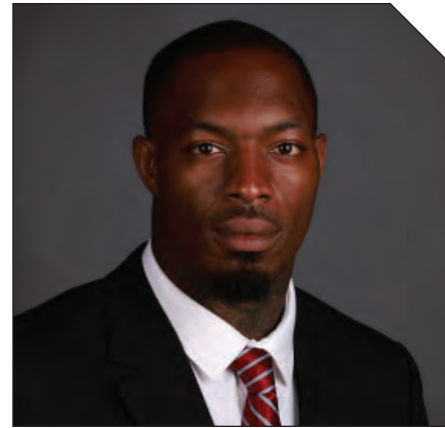
In his role working as one of the Tide's directors of player development, Chapman's main focus is the off-the-field activities of Alabama football's student-athletes, and he serves as an important resource in balancing the demands of academics, athletics and community outreach. He also serves as a liaison for high school coaches while assisting with Alabama camps and clinics.

Chapman originally joined the Crimson Tide staff in February of 2016 as part of the strength and conditioning staff. He returned to Tuscaloosa following a four-year stint in the National Football League with the Indianapolis Colts. The former defensive tackle helped lead the Colts to three consecutive playoff appearances, including the conference championship in 2014.

He was selected by the Colts in the 2012 NFL Draft after a standout career at Alabama. A member of Nick Saban's initial recruiting class in 2007, Chapman played in 44 career games for the Crimson Tide from 2008-11. During that stretch, UA went 48-6 overall and claimed the 2009 and 2011 national championships.

A native of Hoover, Ala., Chapman helped Hoover High School to the state title game as a senior. He was rated as the No. 12 prospect in Alabama coming out of HHS after recording 97 tackles, including 22 for loss and two sacks, with an interception as a senior.

Chapman earned his bachelor's degree in human and environmental sciences from The University of Alabama in 2011. He is married to the former Kourtney Ancar. The couple has three sons, Abram, Joshua Jr. and Jru.



HA HA CLINTON-DIX

Director, Player Development

Former NFL player and Alabama football standout Ha Ha Clinton-Dix was named one of the program's directors of player development in December of 2022.

Clinton-Dix returned to Alabama following an eight-year career in the National Football League in which he was named to the 2014 All-Rookie Team and in 2016 earned Pro Bowl and second-team All-Pro honors.

Before being traded to Washington in the middle of the 2018 season, Clinton-Dix played in 71 games (65 starts) for the Green Bay Packers and recorded 14 interceptions. He added three more picks in seven postseason contests.

He played for the Chicago Bears in 2019, and was on the field for two games with the Oakland Raiders in 2021. In between he also spent time in the offseason or on the practice squads with Dallas, San Francisco and Denver.

Under former head coach Nick Saban at Alabama from 2011-13, Clinton-Dix earned All-America and All-SEC First Team honors in 2013. He was a starter on the 2011 and 2012 BCS Championship teams and earned a significant amount of playing time as a freshman.

His on-field success with the Crimson Tide led to him becoming a first-round pick by the Packers in the 2014 NFL Draft.

A native of Orlando, Fla., he attended Dr. Phillips High school where he was a five-star recruit, No. 1 safety and the sixth overall player in his class.

In 2017, Clinton-Dix returned to the University of Alabama to complete requirements for his degree, interning at the Green Bay Police Department. He graduated from the University of Alabama in 2018 with a bachelor's degree in criminal justice.



DENZEL DEVAL

Director, Player Development

Denzel Devall was named Alabama's director of player development in February of 2017 after a year as the associate director of player development in 2016.

In his role as the Tide's director of player development, Devall's main focus is the off-the-field activities of Alabama football's student-athletes, and he serves as an important resource in balancing the demands of academics, athletics and community outreach. He also serves as a liaison for high school coaches while assisting with Alabama camps and clinics.

He joined the Crimson Tide staff in July of 2016 as the associate director of player development after an outstanding four-year career on the field for the Crimson Tide. He was part of two national championship teams (2012, 2015) and helped win three SEC titles (2012, 2014, 2015).

During his playing career, Devall saw time in 50 career games with 25 starts at outside linebacker while making 84 tackles with 14 tackles for loss and six sacks. He was a Freshman All-American in 2012 by *The Sporting News*.

A native of Bastrop, La., Devall was a 2011 Louisiana Sports Writers Association 4A All-State selection as a senior at Bastrop High School. He earned his bachelor's degree in human and environmental sciences from The University of Alabama in 2015.

Devall and his wife, Parris, have one daughter, Peyton, and one son, Denver.



JEREMY GSELL

Associate Head Athletic Trainer, Football

Jeremy Gsell is in his 20th season as an athletic trainer for the Alabama football program and his first as associate head athletic trainer for football.

In his primary role at Alabama, Gsell is charged with facilitating the long-term injury and post-surgical care and rehabilitation for all football student-athletes. This includes serving as the direct liaison to the Crimson Tide's weight room and team physicians.

Prior to his arrival at Alabama, Gsell served as an athletic trainer at the University of Southern Mississippi for one season (2005) where he was the Golden Eagles' primary athletic trainer for men's basketball while assisting with football.

His first stint at Alabama came as a graduate assistant athletic trainer for the Crimson Tide football program from 2003-05. During his time at the Capstone, Gsell completed his master's degree in sports management in 2005.

Assistant AD, Sports Technology and Innovation

In his role as assistant athletics director for sports technology and innovation, Daniel Lyerly oversees technology operations for all sports at The University of Alabama.

He is in his 21st season with the University and continues to ensure that Alabama Athletics is at the forefront of innovative IT solutions to remain among the top universities in the nation in sports technology.

The 2020 Southeastern Conference Video Coordinator of the Year, Lyerly's main responsibilities are with the football program. He not only administers all video and technology for Alabama's football coaching staff, but he also produces selected segments for the "Kalen DeBoer Show" and facilitates all production aspects of public service announcements and commercials featuring DeBoer. Additionally, he offers coaches the most up-to-date recruiting technologies in order to attract top talent to the University.

Before moving to Tuscaloosa, Lyerly spent two years as a student assistant at Coastal Carolina University in 2002 and 2003 working in the video and equipment departments, helping them form their first football team. Following that, he transferred to Alabama and received his undergraduate degree in political science with a minor in computer science.

Dr. Peter Mohler began his tenure as the 30th president of The University of Alabama on July 21, 2025. A nationally recognized leader in higher education, Dr. Mohler brings to UA a distinguished record of advancing research, innovation, academic excellence and collaboration.

Before joining UA, he served for about 15 years at The Ohio State University, where his leadership roles included executive vice president for research, innovation and knowledge; chief scientific officer of the Wexner Medical Center; and acting university president.

Dr. Mohler is a Pew Scholar in Biomedical Sciences and an Outstanding Investigator of the American Heart Association, and he has authored over 250 articles.

- A record-breaking number of in-state first-year students highlights The University of Alabama's fall 2024 total enrollment of 40,846, surpassing 40,000 for the first time.
- UA currently enrolls a record number of 1,173 National Merit Scholars, making UA one of the nation's largest enrolling institutions of National Merit Scholars.

GREG BYRNE

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



With over 30 years of experience in sports administration, Alabama Director of Athletics Greg Byrne has built an impressive career highlighted by consistent competitive success, innovative strategies, vigorous fundraising and a strong emphasis on academic excellence and student-athlete enhancement.

Named Alabama's 17th Director of Athletics on January 17, 2017, Byrne made an immediate impact on the Crimson Tide, developing and implementing both The Standard, a strategic plan outlining the mission statement and core values of Alabama Athletics, and The Crimson Standard, a 10-year, \$600 million capital initiative focused

on the renovation of facilities and development of infrastructure.

That impact has continued throughout his tenure as evidenced by major extension and expansion announcements with national partners in Fanatics, LEARFIELD and CLC. On July 25, 2022, Alabama and Fanatics made public their new long-term, multifaceted partnership, which included the first-ever team store inside Saban Field at Bryant-Denny Stadium. The expanded partnership allowed the University to capitalize on Fanatics merchandising platforms to create, promote and distribute Alabama merchandise featuring the name, image, and likeness (NIL) rights of current Crimson Tide student-athletes.

Nearly seven months later, the extension of the Tide's multimedia rights relationship with LEARFIELD was announced. The 15-year landmark deal is one of the longest and most integrated in college athletics, building on traditional components along with several new strategic initiatives. Among those are a first-of-its-kind, dedicated NIL hub called The LLH Advantage Center, an original content platform in collaboration with LEARFIELD Studios and access to robust data and analytics enhancements via the company's Fanbase infrastructure.

In 2024, Alabama Athletics and CLC, the leading collegiate trademark licensing agency, agreed to a 15-year extension, making it the longest contract extension in the history of the company. The Tide, once again, raised the bar finishing FY25 as the highest royalty-generating year in Tuscaloosa.

Under Byrne's leadership, the Crimson Tide has:

- Posted its top four finishes in program history in the LEARFIELD Directors' Cup, coming in seventh in 2020-21, ninth in 2023-24, 12th in 2022-23 and 14th in 2017-18
- Added high-impact coaches Kalen DeBoer (football), Nate Oats (men's basketball), Rob Vaughn (baseball), Margo Geer (men's and women's swimming and diving), Ashley Johnston (gymnastics), Rashinda Reed (volleyball), Jonatan Berhane (women's tennis) and Kumari Lewis (rowing)
- Won the 2021 and 2018 College Football Playoff National Championships and made appearances in the CFP National Championship Game in 2018, 2019, 2021 and 2022
- Advanced to the NCAA Men's Basketball Final Four for the first time in program history in 2024 and made the program's first back-to-back appearances in the NCAA Elite Eight in 2024 and 2025
- Earned Southeastern Conference titles in football (2017, 2020, 2021, 2023), men's basketball (2021, 2023), softball (2021, 2019), women's soccer (2022), men's cross country (2022), women's cross country (2024, 2022), gymnastics (2021), and men's indoor track and field (2018)
- Brought home individual and relay national titles in cross country, gymnastics, men's tennis, swimming and diving and track and field and produced nearly 250 All-Americans in 12 different sports
- Posted a 995.5 department-wide NCAA Academic Progress Rate on June 5, 2024, marking the highest average in school history
- Tide student-athletes combined for a department-best 3.501 GPA in the spring of 2025
- Earned 80 CoSIDA Academic All-America certificates as well as some of the nation's top academic honors, including the NCAA Top 10 Award, the NCAA Elite 90 Award, CoSIDA Academic All-America of the Year, NCAA and SEC Postgraduate

Scholarships

- Earned the H. Boyd McWhorter Male SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year in 2017, the SEC's Brad Davis Community Service Award in 2023 and 2024 and produced 21 SEC Scholar-Athletes of the Year awards in 11 different sports, including a conference-record eight during the 2019-20 academic year

Another hallmark of Byrne's career has been both building and enhancing facilities to championship levels. In eight years at Alabama, the Tide has:

- Constructed Crimson Reserve, the premier collegiate golf training facility that opened in fall of 2024
- Began the Coleman Coliseum Basketball Training & Player Development Facility Expansion and Renovation
 - Added a state-of-the-art, first-of-its-kind Sports Science Center featuring advanced treatment services and technology with spaces dedicated to cryotherapy, chiropractic care, stretch, massage, relaxation, recovery and mental health services
 - Improved and renovated Saban Field at Bryant-Denny Stadium, including enhancements to all team and recruiting areas, renovations of multiple fan areas, including new Loge and sky boxes and a trio of club areas and an added student plaza
 - Renovated and expanded the football team locker room, training room, equipment room and lobby within the Mal M. Moore Athletic Facility
 - Added and renovated multiple areas of the John and Ann Rhoads Softball Stadium, with upgrades to the press box and clubhouse, the addition of a new umpire locker room, new restrooms and a new concessions building, as well as new hardscape for the plaza and entryway along first base
 - Revitalized the Alabama Aquatic Center with a renovation that included the addition of an outdoor pool

In addition to his role as Director of Athletics, Byrne serves on several committees at both the conference and national levels including:

- United States Olympic & Paralympic Committee Collegiate Advisory Council
- NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee
- National Coalition of Minority Football Coaches Coalition Academy
- Served as president of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics in 2020

The son of Bill Byrne, whose long and highly successful career included 30 years as an athletics director, Greg Byrne has spent a lifetime around major college athletics. That background has allowed the younger Byrne to consistently develop and grow as a dynamic and impactful administrator with each new role he has undertaken, with career highlights prior to Alabama that include:

- Serving as the University of Arizona's Vice President for Athletics (2010-17) and Mississippi State University's Director of Athletics (2008-10), making Alabama the third NCAA Division I program he has led
- Fostering major improvements across the spectrum of sports at both Arizona and MSU, raising the bar to new heights when it came to student-athlete enhancement and academic success in preparation for life after sports
 - More than \$140 million in construction and renovation of athletics facilities at Arizona
 - Serving as the youngest athletics director in the SEC and the youngest to lead an athletic program at the NCAA Division I-A level while at Mississippi State where he oversaw the hiring of head football coach Dan Mullen and former head baseball coach and current Auburn Director of Athletics John Cohen
 - Experience in the Southeastern Conference, having spent 2002-05 at the University of Kentucky as Associate Athletics Director for Development and Fundraising prior to serving as Associate Athletics Director for External Affairs at MSU from 2006-08 before becoming the Bulldogs' Director of Athletics
 - Working at the Fiesta Bowl (1994-95), Oregon (1995-98) and Oregon State (1998-2002)

A native of Pocatello, Idaho, Byrne earned his bachelor's degree from Arizona State University in 1994 and his master's degree from Mississippi State University in 2009. Byrne is married to the former Regina Misa of Junction City, Ore., and the couple has two sons, Nicholas and Davis.

Paul William Bryant retired from coaching as the game's all-time winningest coach with a 323-85-17 (.780) overall record. He spent 25 of his 37 years on the sidelines at The University of Alabama, where he returned the Crimson Tide football program to national prominence.

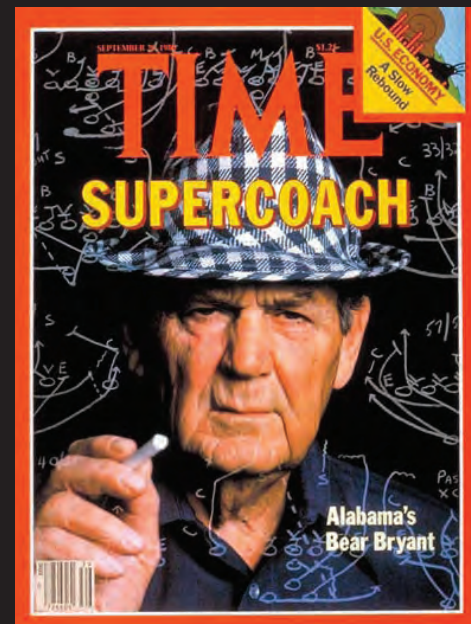
During his time in Tuscaloosa, Bryant compiled a 232-46-9 (.824) record and directed Alabama to six national championships. He also led the Crimson Tide to 13 SEC titles, was the national coach of the year three times and the SEC coach of the year on eight occasions.

In 1958, Bryant returned to his alma mater and the rebuilding process was underway. In his second year back at the Capstone, he beat Auburn and took the Tide to its first of 25 straight bowl appearances. In 1961, Bryant's first recruiting class, highlighted by quarterback Pat Trammell, linebacker Lee Roy Jordan and lineman Billy Neighbors, helped the Tide capture the first of Bryant's six national titles.

Two more titles followed in 1964 and 1965 and despite an 11-0 record the Tide missed out on a third in 1966. Bryant installed the "wishbone" offense in 1971 to revamp the Tide program. Over the next 10 years, Alabama dominated the college football scene, winning 108 games, three more national titles and placing Bryant atop college football's all-time leaderboard for career wins.

In 1934, the first year of the Southeastern Conference, Bryant helped the Crimson Tide win the initial SEC championship and a national championship as a player. Bryant became known in football folklore as the 'other end' to Don Hutson as Alabama went 10-0 and knocked off Stanford 29-13 in the Rose Bowl to claim the school's fourth national crown.

Bryant's head coaching career began in 1945 at Maryland. The following year he made the move to Kentucky for eight years and followed that with a four-year stint at Texas A&M. Bryant guided teams to 15 conference titles, including 13 at Alabama, across his illustrious coaching career.



PROVEN PROCESS

A man of vision who produced an unmatched record of championship success, head coach Nick Saban took The University of Alabama to the top of the college football landscape and kept it there with his commitment to building the total program for 17 years. After the victory over Ohio State in the 2021 College Football Playoff National Championship Game, Saban passed Paul “Bear” Bryant to become the only coach to win seven national titles in the poll era of college football. Saban completed his hall-of-fame worthy career at the conclusion of the 2023 season. His uncompromising dedication to excellence in every phase of the coaching process resulted in six national championships at Alabama since 2009 and seven overall.

A nine-time National Coach of the Year, Saban achieved resounding success as a head coach and earned a reputation as an outstanding tactician, leader, organizer and motivator. Those qualities sparked impressive turnarounds at every stop of his career. Saban’s consistent approach and disciplined leadership was the reason his teams were known for exhibiting grit, determination and resilience, often overcoming adversity to achieve victory.

In his 28 seasons as a collegiate head coach, Saban produced a 297-71-1 (.806) record, including a 206-29 (.877) mark in Tuscaloosa. His teams at Alabama won nine SEC Championships while he has 11 SEC titles to his name (2001 and 2003 at LSU).

Saban also put his players into the NFL at a staggering rate. He coached 52 first-round draft picks in his career – the most by any coach in college football history – including 47 at Alabama. During his time in Tuscaloosa, 133 of Saban’s players were drafted into the National Football League with an astonishing 91 going in the first three rounds of the draft.

Bryce Young was Saban’s fourth Heisman Trophy win in 2021, tied for the most of any coach in college football history with Notre Dame’s Frank Leahy. He is the only coach to ever coach Heisman Trophy winners at three different positions (RB, WR, QB). The Alabama program had just six individual national award winners when Saban arrived on campus, but Crimson Tide players have secured 60 national awards since 2008.

His players at Alabama have won 66 All-America honors by 58 different players over the past 16 seasons. Eight players have been named two-time All-Americans along with 46 consensus honors and 25 unanimous selections. Will Anderson Jr. became the first two-time unanimous All-American in Alabama history (2021-22).

Already one of the most historic venues in all of college football, Bryant-Denny Stadium officially added head coach Nick Saban to its namesake on Sept. 7, 2024. Now officially known as Saban Field at Bryant-Denny Stadium, the venue will forever feature two of college football's most legendary coaches in its title.

Saban Field at Bryant-Denny Stadium is not only one of the most iconic facilities on The University of Alabama campus, but it is also often one of the most visited destinations in the state. The current seating capacity of 100,077, following renovations in 2020, makes the Crimson Tide's home stadium one of the nation's largest on-campus venues.

The latest renovation marked the fifth since 1988 and the eighth time overall that Saban Field at Bryant-Denny Stadium has had significant upgrades since it was originally constructed in 1929. Other renovations and expansions were completed in 1946, 1961, 1966, 1988, 1998, 2006 and 2010.

Since those early games, a number of projects have taken place to get Saban Field at Bryant-Denny Stadium to its current state. The 1998 east side expansion added 10,000 bleacher seats and two spiral walkways to give the stadium a more symmetrical appearance. A total of 81 skyboxes, on two levels, were also added. The skyboxes were built in two sizes, 24-seat capacity (18) and 16-seat capacity (64). In 1999, four additional skyboxes were added and a scoreboard with video replay capabilities was installed in the south end.

Other additions to Saban Field at Bryant-Denny Stadium included two east side reception areas for Scholarship and A-Club level patrons. These areas are located above the center entrance on the east side and include rooms large enough to host receptions and pre-game meal functions. A bank of lights was also added on the east side.

In 2006, three levels of premium seating and 38 luxury skyboxes were added in addition to a pair of large video scoreboards in the north end zone, and state-of-the-art, wrap-around display boards situated on the facades of the east and west upper decks.

When Alabama and Hawai'i met to open that 2006 season, a sellout marked the largest crowd to view a college football game in the state of Alabama. That record fell when 101,821 fans filled the seats for the Crimson Tide's 2010 season opener against San Jose State.

The 2010 renovation pushed capacity to 101,821, with an additional 36 skyboxes, to bring the total to 159, and 1,700 club seats. Other additions included a club level area and traditional upper-deck seating. Office space was included, as well as a home team locker room located in the north end zone.

Before the 2020 season, the venue went through a \$107 million renovation that included updating and expanding multiple seating areas with three new club areas and the addition of 3,826 new premium seats, loge boxes, the Terrace Club, the Champions Club and Founders Suites on the west side, new skyboxes on the east U1 level, as well as the renovation of existing skyboxes. Improvements were made to all team areas including the locker room and tunnel, and the recruiting room was expanded to nearly double in size. A student plaza was added on the south side as well as larger videoboards in the four corners, and the press box was relocated to the east side.

One of the most unique aspects of Saban Field at Bryant-Denny Stadium is a plaza connecting the stadium with University Boulevard. The plaza, which quickly became a focal point on game day Saturdays, honors Alabama's national championship coaches and commemorates the Tide's 18 national and 30 Southeastern Conference titles.

Another unique aspect of Saban Field at Bryant-Denny Stadium, while not part of a renovation or expansion, was the installation of a state-of-the-art LED light system in 2019. The lights feature instant on/off capabilities, are fully dimmable and are connected to a system that allows them to function in different colors, scenes and effects.

The Crimson Tide owns an impressive 304-55-3 (.844) all-time record inside Saban Field at Bryant-Denny Stadium and a 390-68-3 (.849) mark in all games played in Tuscaloosa. Dating back to the 1988 renovation of Saban Field at Bryant-Denny Stadium, nearly 21 million fans have witnessed the Crimson Tide play in 253 home games over the past 37 seasons.



THE CRIMSON TIDE HAS BEEN TO MORE BOWL GAMES (72) THAN ANY OTHER TEAM IN THE COUNTRY

The Alabama football team has made an NCAA-leading 72 bowl appearances. The Crimson Tide has played in more bowl games (72) and earned more bowl wins (42) than any team in college football history. Alabama spent New Year's Eve of the 2022 season making its 17th Sugar Bowl appearance, the most of any program in the bowl's storied history. Alabama has also appeared in eight Rose Bowl games in the past, including the 2023 College Football Playoff Semifinal. The Crimson Tide has been bowling for 21 consecutive seasons, something that has not happened since Alabama played in 25 straight bowl games from 1959-83.

ALABAMA OWNS A WINNING RECORD AGAINST 13 OF THE 15 MEMBER SCHOOLS IN THE EXPANDED SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

The Southeastern Conference begins its 94th season of play in 2025 and its second with Oklahoma and Texas as part of the league. The conference began play in 1933 with 13 member schools - Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, LSU, Ole Miss, Mississippi State, Sewanee, Tennessee, Tulane and Vanderbilt.

Alabama won the league's first conference title in 1933 by virtue of its 5-0-1 conference record and has won a total of 30 SEC titles in the school's illustrious history.

Sewanee left the conference following the 1940 season, while Georgia Tech exited after the 1963 season and Tulane followed after the 1965 campaign. Arkansas and South Carolina entered the SEC prior to the 1992 slate, while Missouri and Texas A&M began play in 2012. The Sooners and Longhorns officially became conference members this summer on July 1, 2024.



The No. 8/8/8 Alabama football team won its 30th SEC Championship with a 27-24 victory over then-No. 1/1/1 Georgia in Mercedes-Benz Stadium on Saturday, Dec. 2, 2023.

ALABAMA HAS BEEN A FORCE IN THE SEC OVER THE PAST 17 SEASONS

Alabama dominated the 2008 and 2009 seasons in Southeastern Conference play with a 16-0 combined mark in the regular season, capturing back-to-back Western Division championships and the 2009 SEC championship. The 2011 season saw the Crimson Tide win the program's 14th national championship but finish second in the SEC West to LSU, who the Tide would later defeat 21-0 in the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. Alabama won its 23rd SEC championship in 2012, followed by its 15th national championship. In 2013, UA tied for the Western Division crown with a 7-1 record.

Alabama secured the program's 24th, 25th and 26th SEC titles in 2014, 2015 and 2016 becoming the first team to earn three consecutive SEC Championship Game victories since Florida won four in a row from 1993-96. In 2014, the Tide captured the trophy with a 42-13 win over Missouri, while the 2015 victory came against Florida, 29-15. Alabama defeated the Gators for the second consecutive year in 2016 by a score of 54-16. In 2017, the Crimson Tide tied for the Western Division crown with a 7-1 record on the way to an NCAA-record 17th national championship.

The 2018 season saw the Tide finish a perfect 8-0 once again on the way to a 27th SEC title thanks to a thrilling 35-28 comeback win over Georgia. The Tide followed that up with their 28th SEC title and 18th national championship in a unique 2020 season, posting a perfect 13-0 record after dominant performances against Notre Dame (31-14) in the College Football Playoff Semifinal and Ohio State (52-24) in the CFP Championship Game. In 2021, Alabama came back from an early 10-0 deficit to take down then-No. 1/1/1 Georgia, 41-24, for the program's 29th SEC crown. The most recent victory came over the top-ranked Bulldogs in 2023 for UA's 30th conference title.

The SEC was the first conference to split into two divisions and have its regular season culminate in a conference championship game. The first SEC Championship Game was held on Dec. 5, 1992, at Legion Field in Birmingham, Ala. The SEC Championship Game moved to the Georgia Dome in 1994 and was staged there through 2016. The game then moved next door to Mercedes-Benz Stadium in 2017. The divisions were eliminated prior to the 2024 campaign with the top two teams by conference record now earning a spot in Atlanta.

A-DAY PHENOMENON

Spring games across the country took on a whole different meaning once Alabama's A-Day Game in 2007 sparked a new phenomenon. In '07, an amazing 92,138 fans packed Bryant-Denny Stadium for then-head coach Nick Saban's first spring game in Tuscaloosa. Even more impressive were the 5,000-plus fans that were turned away at the gate and spent the afternoon tailgating around the stadium just like a fall Saturday when the stadium was deemed at capacity.

ESPN took notice of the spring game excitement and started making Alabama a part of its college football coverage each spring. The ESPN family of networks have televised 10 of the last 15 A-Days nationally on ESPN, ESPN2 or ESPNU. The 2012 installment was televised by Comcast.

Prior to an adjusted A-Day in 2025, the previous 17 spring games saw an average of 72,333 fans pack Bryant-Denny Stadium. The streak of record-setting attendance began in 2008 with 78,200 attendees followed by 84,050 showing up in 2009. A crowd of 91,312 came out in 2010 and a school-record 92,310 in 2011. The 2012 game had 78,526 in attendance; 78,315 fans witnessed the 2013 event; 73,509 in 2014; 65,175 in 2015; 76,212 in 2016; 74,326 in 2017; 74,732 in 2018; and 62,219 in 2019. After canceling the spring game in 2020 because of the public-health threat, 47,218 Alabama fans filled Bryant-Denny Stadium in 2021 followed by 31,077 in 2022 and 58,710 in 2023. The Kalen DeBoer era at Alabama got off to a frenzied start in 2024 as 72,358 fans flocked to Tuscaloosa to get their first look at the Crimson Tide's new head coach in action. Over that 17-year stretch from 2007-24, the Crimson Tide drew a mind-boggling 1,229,664 fans for its annual A-Day Game.

Prior to the start of Alabama's A-Day Game each spring, the Crimson Tide's permanent team captains from the previous year are forever captured at the base of Denny Chimes. The captains have their handprints and footprints placed in cement to recognize their roles as team leaders. At the 2025 affair, quarterback Jalen Milroe and defensive back Malachi Moore took part in the ceremony for a second time and were joined by offensive lineman Tyler Booker and linebacker Deontae Lawson with the foursome placing their hand and foot prints in cement at the base of Denny Chimes.



THE NATIONAL SPOTLIGHT

Alabama has proven to be one of the top television draws in college football due to its history, tradition, personalities and fans. The Crimson Tide has played in 219 nationally televised or streamed games since 2008, including every contest since the start of 2014. Further evidence was the presence of ESPN College GameDay at Alabama's games, with four in 2008, 2012, 2013, 2015, 2018 and 2023, three games in 2009, 2011, 2016 and 2017, two games in 2010, 2014, 2020, 2022 and 2024, along with one appearance in 2019.

Alabama's popularity also has been a draw for national publications. The Crimson Tide has been represented on the covers of many of those publications in recent years. The Tide appeared on the cover of Sports Illustrated 28 times from 2009-22, including four times in 2012 and 2017, three times in 2009, 2011 and 2015, two times in 2013, 2014, 2016 and 2018, and once in 2010, 2021 and 2022. In 2008, Nick Saban was featured on the cover of Forbes. Saban became the first college football coach to be featured on the cover of Forbes since the publication began in 1917.



NATIONAL TITLES



From the roaring 1920s and Wallace Wade, through legendary coach Frank Thomas, on to the dynasty that was the Paul "Bear" Bryant era, through Gene Stallings' 1992 national championship team and, finally, Nick Saban's six titles in Tuscaloosa, the Alabama Crimson Tide has helped define college football for nearly a century. Alabama has captured a college football-best 18 national championships and an impressive 32 conference titles, including a conference-best 30 SEC titles.

Bryant led the Tide to six national championships during his 25 years roaming the sidelines with national titles in 1961, 1964, 1965, 1973, 1978 and 1979. Wade won Alabama's first three titles in 1925, 1926 and 1930. Thomas then led Alabama to championships in 1934 and 1941 while Stallings' 1992 team has proven to be one of the best in college football history.

Saban's 2009 team carved an identity of its own with suffocating defense and an efficient and explosive offense. That 14-0 team produced the school and conference record for wins in a season, defeated No. 1 Florida in the SEC Championship Game and bested No. 2 Texas in the BCS National Championship Game to claim the title. The 2011 team avenged a regular-season loss to LSU in the BCS National Championship with a resounding 21-0 shutout of the Tigers in New Orleans. The defense was historic in 2011, leading all four major categories nationally, while the offense averaged almost 35 points per game. In 2012, Alabama beat LSU with a last-second comeback in Death Valley, escaped the SEC Championship Game with a thrilling 32-28 win over Georgia, and finished the year off by crushing then-No. 1 Notre Dame 42-14 in the BCS National Championship Game.

In 2015, the second year of the College Football Playoff, the Tide shut out Michigan State, 38-0, in the CFP Semifinal at the Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic and followed that up with a 45-40 win over Clemson to claim Alabama's first CFP National Championship. Saban's fifth title in Tuscaloosa in 2017 was punctuated with a dramatic come-from-behind 26-23 victory over Georgia in the CFP National Championship Game. Alabama trailed the Bulldogs 13-0 at halftime and made the move to Tua Tagovailoa at quarterback who helped engineer a comeback for the ages. Tagovailoa threw three touchdown passes after halftime, including a 41-yard strike on second-and-26 in overtime to DeVonta Smith to seal the victory. Alabama exacted sweet revenge over Clemson just seven days prior in the semifinal game at the Sugar Bowl with a 24-6 win.

The Alabama football team won its 18th national championship Monday, January 12, 2021 at Hard Rock Stadium in Miami Gardens, Fla., with a dominating 52-24 win over No. 3 Ohio State in the College Football Playoff National Championship Game. Alabama finished its season with a clean 13-0 record. In addition to it being the Crimson Tide's 18th national football championship overall, it was Nick Saban's seventh as a head coach, giving him the most in collegiate football history, and his sixth at Alabama.

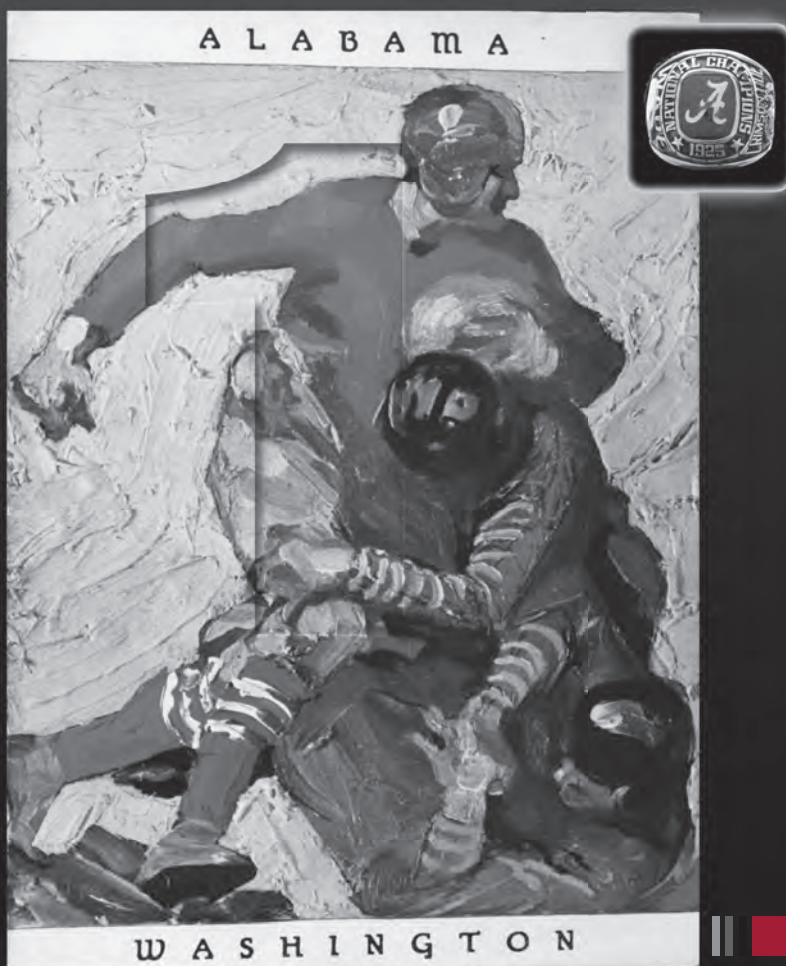
THE FIRST TITLE

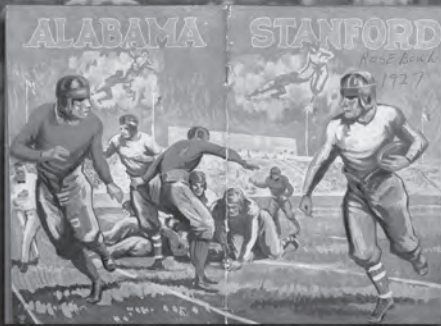
1925

Alabama's football history has been about champions and the 1925 team garnered the first national title by posting a perfect 10-0 record and beating powerful Washington 20-19 in the Rose Bowl. It marked the first time a southern team had been to Pasadena, and the locals appeared shocked with the Tide victory.

Senior stars Johnny Mack Brown and All-American Pooley Hubert mesmerized the crowds of the 1920s with their unique skills. Known as the "Dothan Antelope," Brown was the scourge of Bama foes. Brown scored on a 58-yard reception from Grant Gillis and a 62-yard catch from Hubert in the Rose Bowl win.

In the win over Washington, Hubert also rushed for a touchdown and starred defensively. Both Brown and Hubert would become College Football Hall of Famers. Brown and guard Bill Buckler also were All-Southern Conference selections.





PASADENA BOUND

1926

Four teams (Alabama, Stanford, Navy and Lafayette) had been declared winners of the 1926 national championship before the Crimson Tide reached Pasadena to play Stanford in the Rose Bowl. A 7-7 tie between the Southern and Western Conference champions did not settle any scores New Years Day, 1927.

The 1926 squad featured All-Americans Hoyt "Wu" Winslett and Fred Pickhard. Three other Alabama men, backs Ernie Barnes and Herschel Caldwell and center Gordon "Sherlock" Holmes joined them on the 11-member All-Southern Conference team.

Besides the Rose Bowl standoff against Stanford, Alabama's only other challenge came in a 2-0 tiff with then-powerful Sewanee. A blocked punt that went out of the end zone by Pickhard proved to be the difference in the Sewanee contest. The very next week, Pickhard blocked two punts, both resulting in touchdowns, in a 24-0 win over LSU. Alabama clinched a Rose Bowl berth with a 33-6 victory over Georgia on Thanksgiving Day.

A 10-0 season, along with a 24-0 whitewashing of Washington State in the Rose Bowl gave Wallace Wade his third championship and ended an era of Tide football on a glorious note.

Extraordinary tackle Fred Sington finished an unmatched career as a student-athlete being unanimously picked to the 1930 All-America teams and earning Phi Beta Kappa honors for his toils in the classroom.

Halfback John Henry Suther joined Sington on the All-America list while super sophomore Johnny Cain and guard John Miller were All-Southern Conference picks. Incredibly in the Rose Bowl, Wade defied logic by starting his second unit, feeling his team was vastly superior to the West Coast Champions. Monk Campbell earned Rose Bowl MVP honors.

Alabama shut out eight of its 10 foes with Tennessee (18-6) and Vanderbilt (12-7) holding the distinction of being the only teams to score on the 1930 Tide.

“MY BEST TEAM”

1934

Frank Thomas candidly called it his best Alabama team and the 29-13 romp over Stanford in the Rose Bowl confirmed the coach's belief that the 1934 team was special.

In an era where points were at a premium, Alabama averaged 31.4 a game while the opposition could manage but 4.5 a contest. Legendary end Don Hutson, who some 56 years later would be named to the all-time college football team, displayed the skills that would one day earn him induction into seven different Halls of Fame (Alabama, Arkansas, Green Bay Packers, NFL, College, Helms Foundation and Wisconsin).

Tailback Dixie Howell and tackle Bill Lee joined Hutson as All-Americans. The only close game all year came in the annual heavyweight thriller with Tennessee, a 13-6 Crimson Tide win. Howell, Hutson, Lee and guard Charlie Marr earned All-SEC honors.

In the Rose Bowl, Howell scored two touchdowns, one on a scintillating 67-yard scamper. He also passed 59 yards to Hutson for another score. For the game, he averaged 43.8 yards a punt, gained 111 rushing yards and 160 passing.

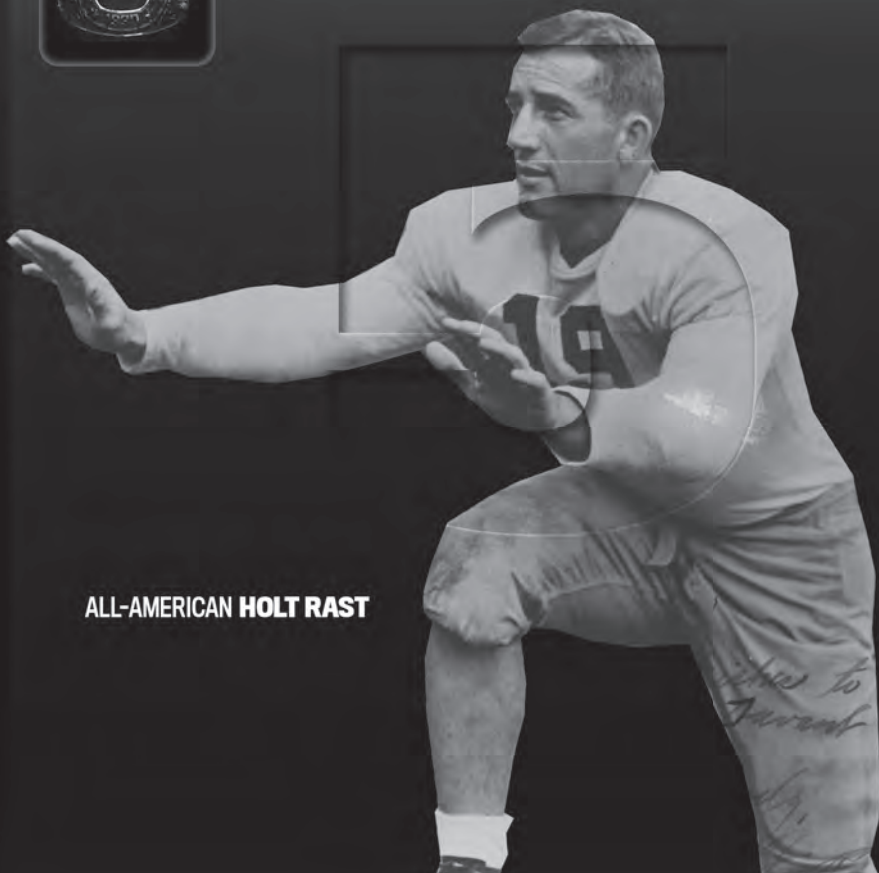
COTTON BOWL CHAMPS



Alabama received a share of the 1941 title by being named to the honor roll of the Houlgate System. The Crimson Tide team finished the year 9-2 with conference losses to Mississippi State and Vanderbilt.

The 1941 team was gifted with brilliant end Holt Rast earning unanimous All-America accolades and plaudits of being one of the best 11 players in the first 50 years of Alabama football.

Along with a 29-21 victory over SWC champion Texas A&M in the Cotton Bowl, significant wins for the Tide came against Georgia, featuring future Heisman Trophy winner Frank Sinkwich, along with Tennessee, Georgia Tech and Miami. In the Cotton Bowl win, halfback Jimmy Nelson returned a punt 72 yards for one touchdown and scored on a 21-yard run for another. Rast, concluding his career, returned an interception for a touchdown and Russ Craft scored twice. After the game, Nelson, Rast and Don Whitmire shared MVP honors.

1961

As far-fetched as it sounded back when he was recruiting his first class four years before, Paul Bryant's promise of a 1961 national championship proved as accurate as his precise demand for excellence.

Led by quarterback Pat Trammell, center/linebacker Lee Roy Jordan and two-way line star Billy Neighbors, Alabama ascended to the pinnacle of the college football world, winning all 11 games and being named the No. 1 team in America.

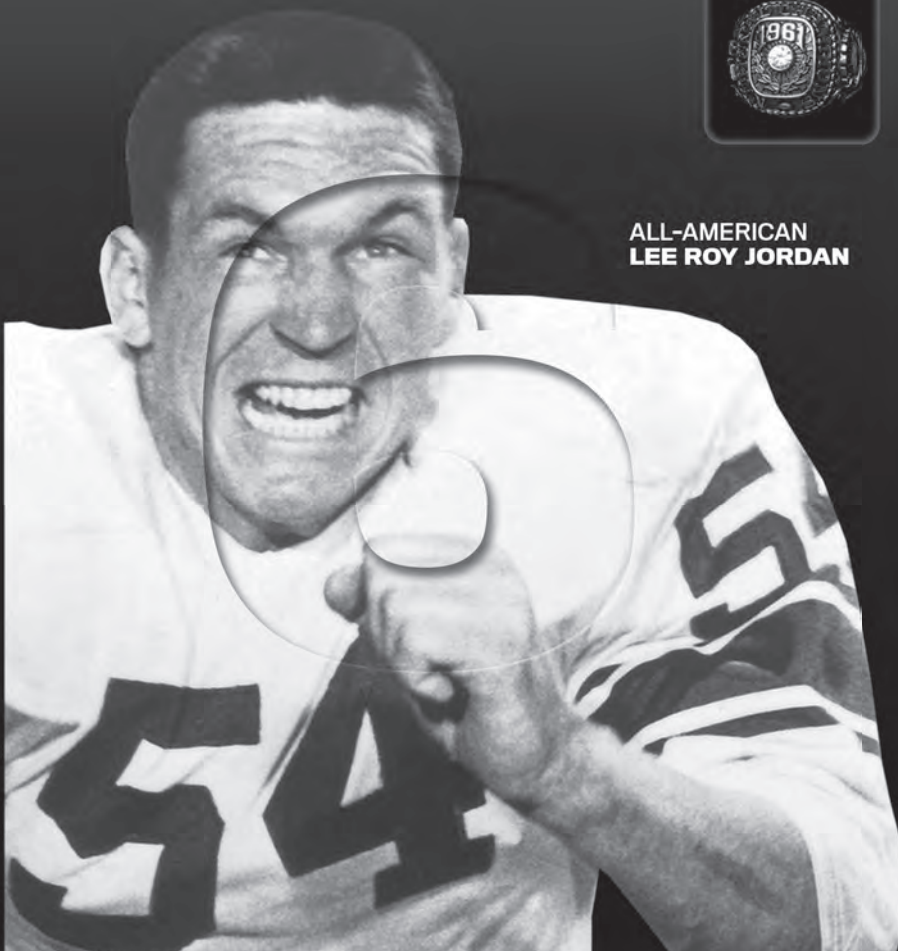
Alabama outscored its opponents 297-25 and after Tennessee managed a field goal in a 34-3 loss to the Tide, no one scored again until Arkansas equaled that three-point output in the Sugar Bowl.

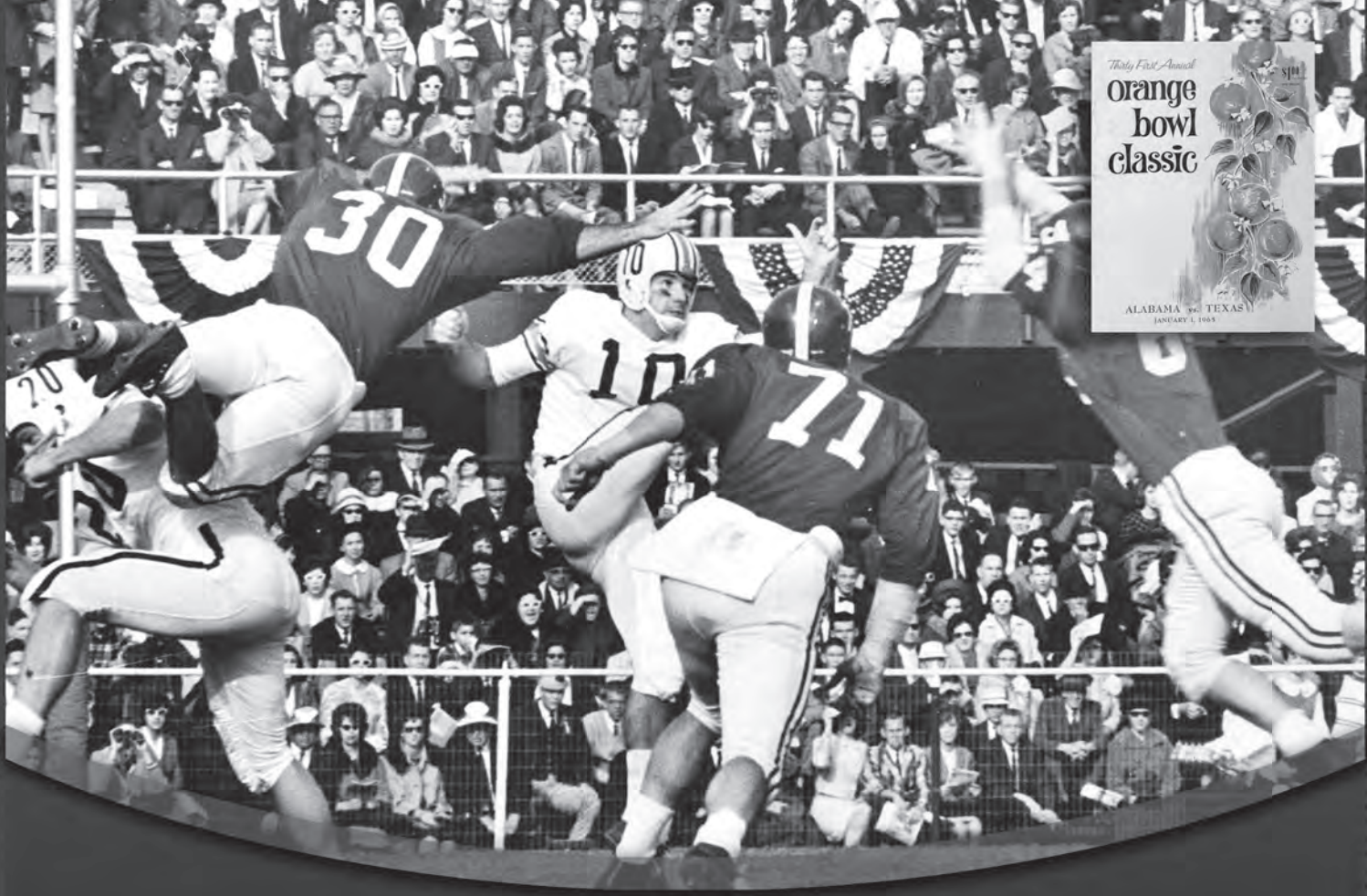
North Carolina State, led by future NFL star quarterback Roman Gabriel, fell to the Tide 26-7. The seven points were the most yielded to an opponent during the entire season.

Neighbors was a unanimous All-America selection while Jordan and Trammell were second-team picks. It would be the first of six national title runs for Bear Bryant during his 25-year career at Alabama.

Gimpy-legged Joe Namath aired his immense talents to a nationally televised audience in the first ever night Orange Bowl game.

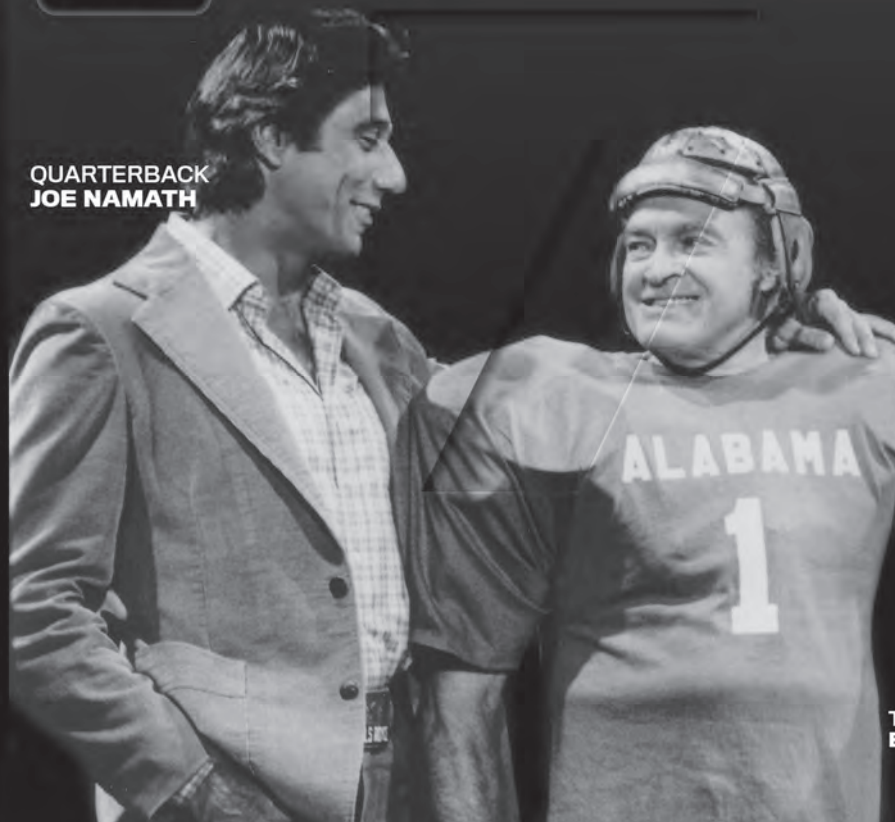
Namath and his teammates contended then, and now, that the star quarterback scored what would have been a game winner on a sneak play from the Longhorn six-inch line in the fourth quarter. One official ruled him in, the other out, and in the end it was a 21-17 Texas win.

Despite the controversial loss to Texas, Alabama was the 1964 AP and UPI National Champion. Namath's knee injury vs. North Carolina State gave backup Steve Sloan the chance to lead the Tide to wins over Florida, Tennessee, Mississippi State and LSU. Namath, who came off the bench in the final minutes against Georgia Tech, sparked a 24-7 win over the Yellow Jackets that ended the bitter series for 15 years.

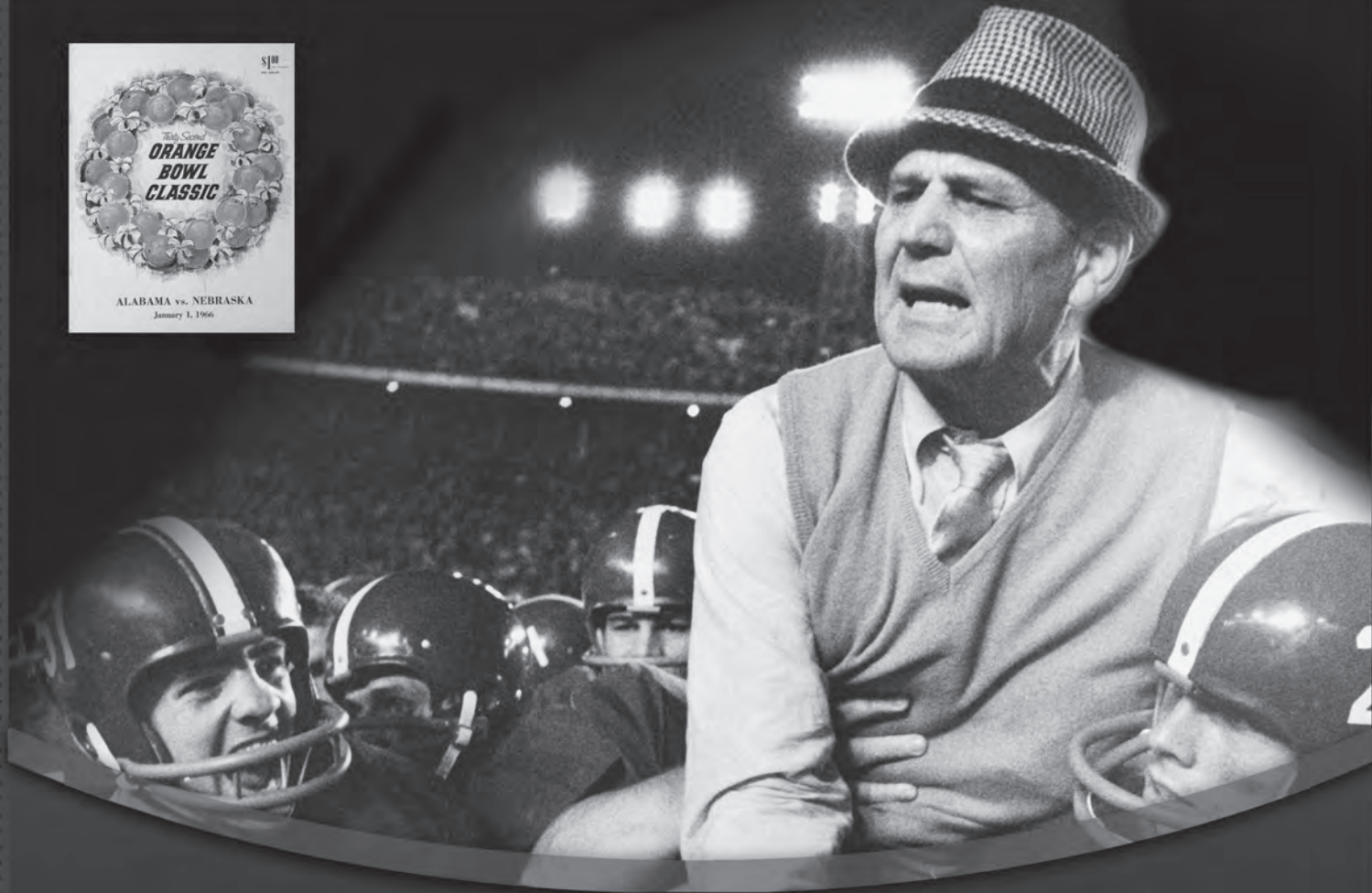

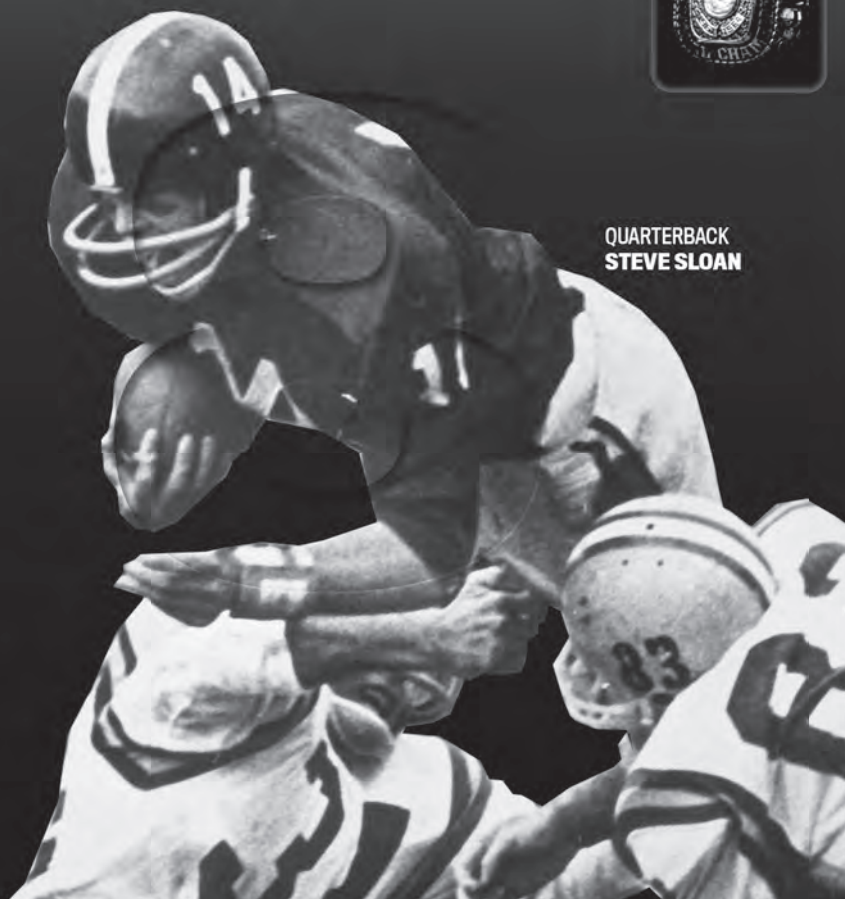
The 1965 edition of the Alabama Crimson Tide got off to a slow start, losing its first game of the season to Georgia 18-17. The Crimson Tide quickly rebounded with wins over Tulane, Ole Miss and Vanderbilt. Alabama finished off the season with a 30-3 thumping of in-state rival Auburn. This victory also gave the Crimson Tide the SEC title, its second in a row.

The Crimson Tide's season earned the team a No. 4 ranking and an invitation to the 1966 Orange Bowl where they would face the Nebraska Cornhuskers. The national title seemed a long shot for both teams, but with No. 1 Michigan State falling to UCLA in the Rose Bowl and No. 2 Arkansas losing to LSU in the Cotton Bowl earlier in the day, it appeared that the outcome of the Orange Bowl would decide the national champion.

The teams traded blows for much of the game, but the arm of Steve Sloan proved too much for the Huskers. Sloan went 20-of-28 passing to break the Orange Bowl pass completion record set one year earlier by fellow Tide quarterback Joe Namath. Sloan finished the game with 296 passing yards, also setting an Orange Bowl standard and giving Alabama a 39-28 victory and the 1965 national championship.

It was the first meeting ever between the two giants of college football and the game was promoted so heavily even the fans were tired of all the advanced publicity. It was "The Game" of all-time in a lot of ways, and it certainly lived up to every inch of newspaper space and moment of radio-TV air time.

Notre Dame won, 24-23, in one of the all-time classics of college football. It had everything you could want in a football game and Notre Dame vaulted from third to first in the final AP rankings.

Alabama finished at No. 1 in both polls during the regular season and remained the UPI champion. Seldom do games live up to all the advance and frenzied billing. But when Ara Parseghian of Notre Dame and Bear Bryant of Alabama unleashed two of the finest college teams in history onto the Sugar Bowl's soggy artificial turf, this game caught the fancy of the entire football world.



GOAL LINE STAND

1978

Coach Bryant's 1978 Alabama Crimson Tide squad started off the season with a convincing 20-3 win over the Nebraska Cornhuskers in front of a packed house in Birmingham. Alabama went on to win 11 games in 1978. The only loss of the season came at the hands of the USC Trojans in Birmingham in a 28-14 battle. Alabama then tore through eight straight opponents on its way to a No. 2 ranking and a bid to play in the 1979 Sugar Bowl against Joe Paterno's No. 1-ranked Penn State Nittany Lions.

The game was close and physical all the way to the end of the game with Alabama outgaining Penn State on the ground 208-19 and Penn State outgaining Alabama through the air 163-91. Crimson Tide running back Major Ogilvie was quoted after the game as saying, "It was, by far, the hardest-hitting game I've participated in. There's not even a close second."

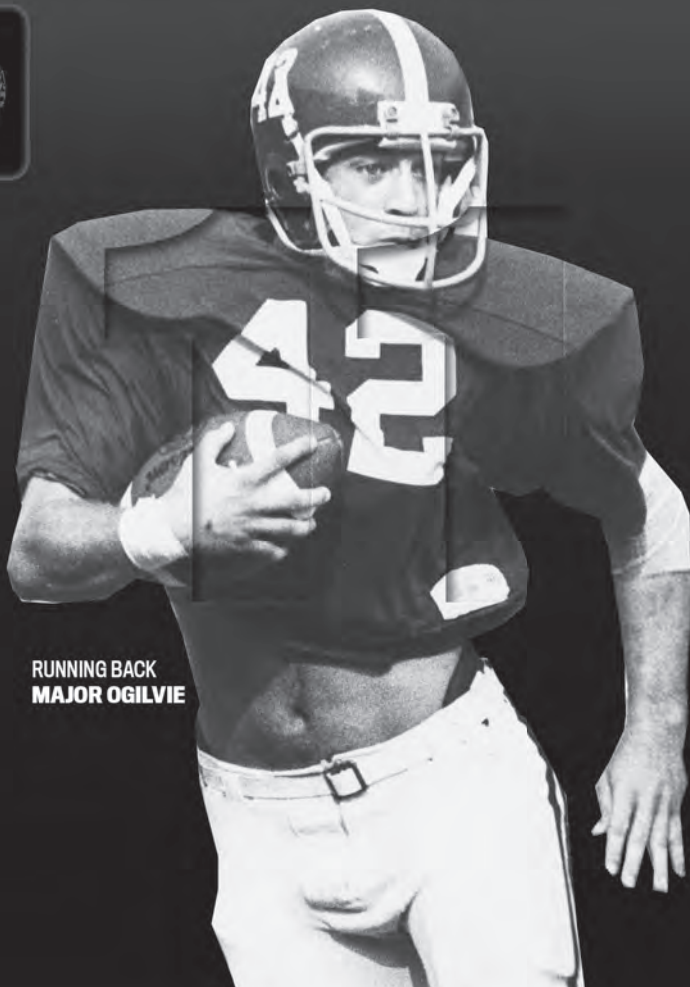
UA secured the victory and the national championship on one of the most legendary plays in Crimson Tide history. On a fourth down and inches play from the Alabama goal line, Joe Paterno called on tailback Matt Guman to take the ball up the middle into the heart of the Crimson Tide defense. Guman was met head on by a host of Alabama defenders, led by All-America linebacker Barry Krauss who stopped Guman inches shy of the goal line to lock up the 14-7 Sugar Bowl victory and the national title.

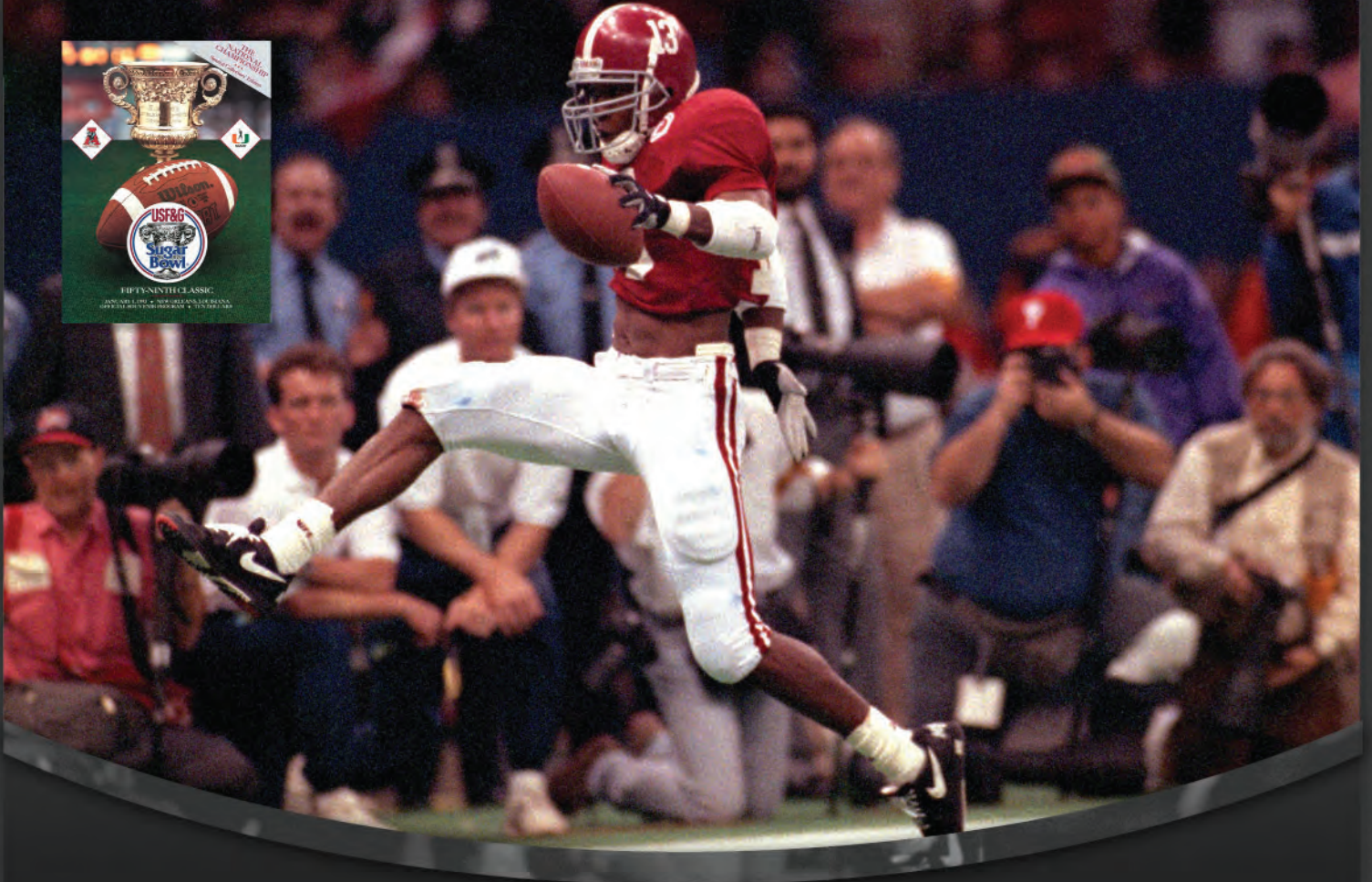
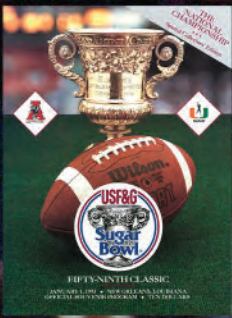

BACK-TO-BACK

The 1979 Alabama Crimson Tide was fierce to say the least. Alabama's defense posted shutouts against Baylor, Wichita State, Florida, LSU and Miami. Alabama outscored five of its opponents on the season by 30 points or more with the biggest margin of victory coming against Vanderbilt in a 66-3 game. Alabama capped off the undefeated regular season by beating Auburn 25-18 and Miami 30-0.

After its perfect 11-0 regular season, Coach Bryant's Crimson Tide team returned to the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans again for the second straight year. This time the Crimson Tide faced its future SEC West rival in the University of Arkansas Razorbacks, who then were a part of the Southwest Conference.

Alabama was led by running back Major Ogilvie as the Tide outgained the Razorbacks 284-97 in rushing yards. Ogilvie scored two touchdowns in a 24-9 victory that gave the Crimson Tide its 11th national title and Bryant his sixth and final championship.



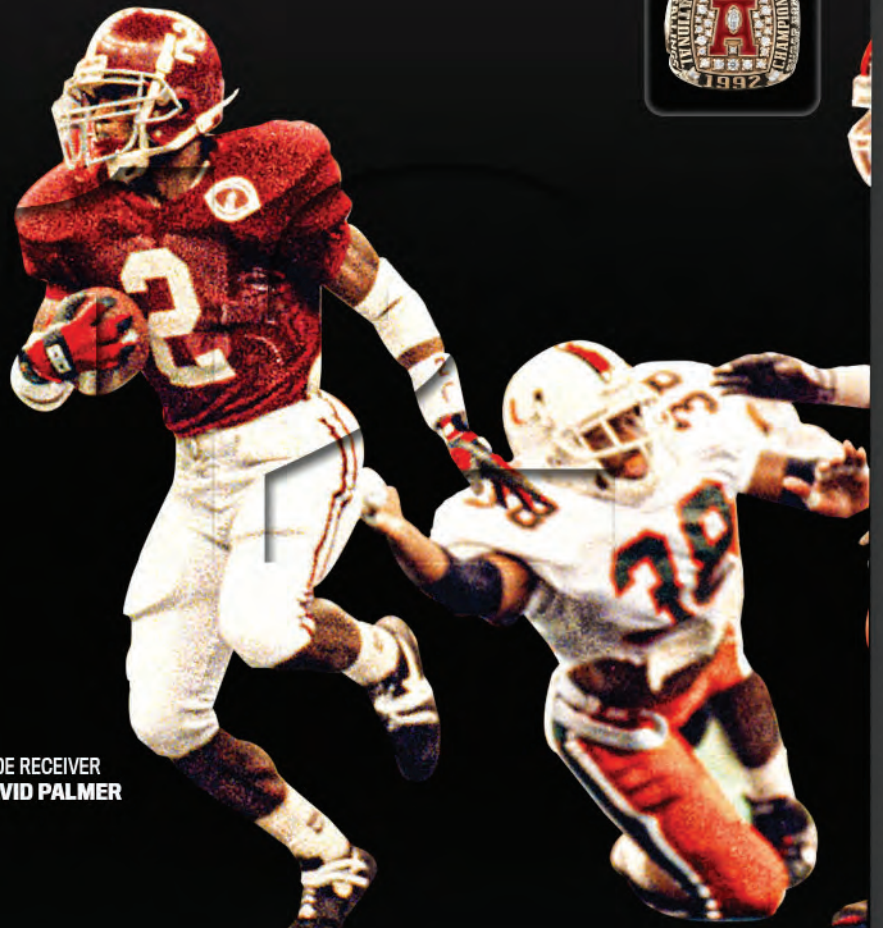
HIGH TIDE

Head Coach Gene Stallings' Crimson Tide team was led in the 1992 season by a tenacious defense that held 10 of its 13 opponents under 12 points. The offense was led by the arm of quarterback Jay Barker who threw for 1,614 yards, and the legs of running back Derrick Lassie, who ran for 905 yards. The Alabama defense had 22 interceptions with defensive backs Antonio Langham and George Teague tied with six a piece.

The Crimson Tide started off the season with a 25-8 win over SEC rival Vanderbilt and continued this winning streak all the way to the Sugar Bowl. Some of the highlights of this perfect season were a 17-10 victory over Tennessee, a 17-0 win against in-state rival Auburn and a 28-21 win over Steve Spurrier's Florida Gators in the SEC Championship Game.

Alabama's perfect regular-season record led them to a No. 2 ranking and another visit to the Sugar Bowl to face 1992 Heisman Trophy-winning quarterback Geno Torretta and the No. 1 ranked Miami Hurricanes. The Crimson Tide was a heavy underdog to the boisterous Miami team. However, from the opening kickoff to the final whistle Alabama dominated the Hurricanes en route to a 34-13 victory. Alabama finished the season with a 13-0 record and the program's 12th national championship.

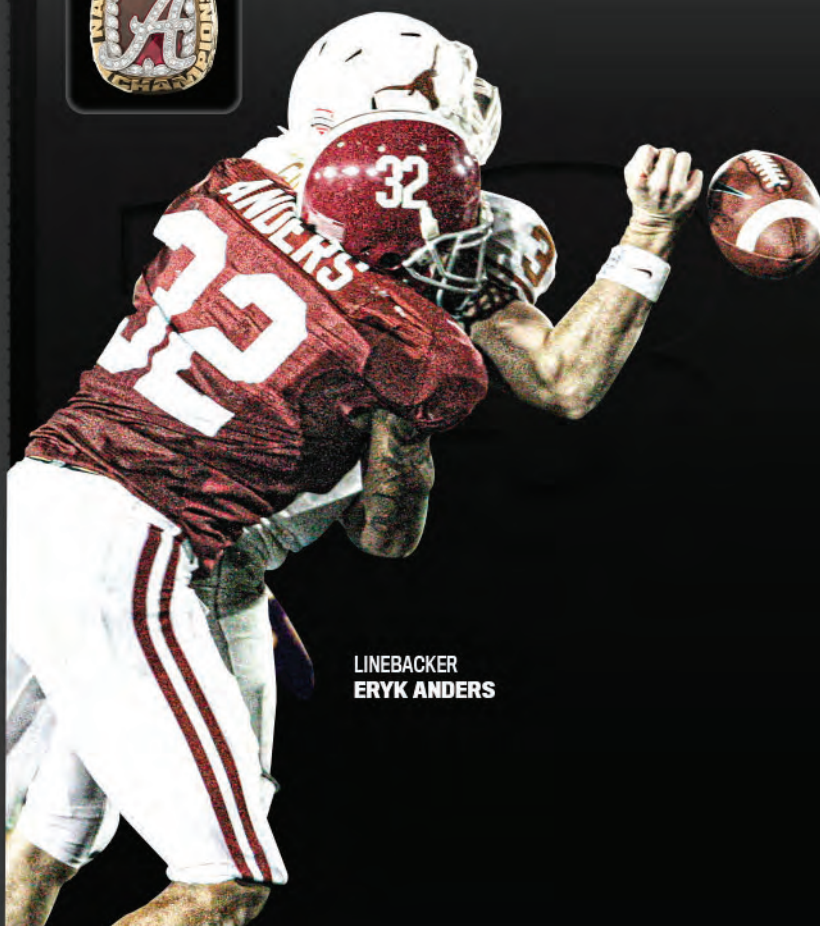

Nick Saban's 2009 national championship team had the perfect combination of suffocating defense, a potent rushing attack, a winning quarterback and outstanding special teams. The 2009 team captured the program's 13th national championship and the school's 22nd SEC Championship with a 14-0 record. The Crimson Tide conquered every challenge placed in front of them, including a 32-13 thrashing of top-ranked Florida in the SEC Championship Game and a 37-21 triumph over Texas in the Citi BCS National Championship Game at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif.

The Crimson Tide produced a record six first team Associated Press All-Americans and eight first team All-SEC selections. Mark Ingram became Alabama's first Heisman Trophy winner and Rolando McClain claimed the Butkus Award and the Lambert Award, presented to the nation's top linebacker. Ingram set a school record with 1,658 rushing yards with 20 total touchdowns while averaging 189.0 all-purpose yards and nine touchdowns in six games against nationally ranked opponents. McClain led the team with 105 tackles while accounting for 14.5 tackles for loss, four sacks, two interceptions, four pass breakups and 14 quarterback hurries. First-year starting quarterback Greg McElroy completed 61 percent of his passes for 2,508 yards with 17 touchdowns. His 81.25 pass attempts for every interception thrown in 2009 was the second-best mark in SEC history, behind only Peyton Manning.

Alabama knocked off six top-25 opponents on the way to the national championship with wins over No. 7 Virginia Tech, No. 16 Ole Miss, No. 22 South Carolina, No. 9 LSU, No. 1 Florida and No. 2 Texas. Maybe the Tide's toughest wins came in hotly contested games with rivals Tennessee and Auburn. UA used two blocked field goals by Terrence Cody against the Vols to escape with a 12-10 win and then used a fourth-quarter drive, engineered by McElroy, for a 26-21 win over the Tigers on the Plains.



DOMINATION IN THE DOME

2011

The 2011 Crimson Tide claimed the school's 14th national championship, handing the previously undefeated LSU Tigers a resounding 21-0 loss in the season's title game. It was the first shutout in Bowl Championship Series history and the first time since Miami in 1991 that a team pitched a shutout to secure the national title.



Alabama produced an astounding seven first-team All-Americans, including Mark Barron, Barrett Jones, Dont'a Hightower, Dre Kirkpatrick, DeQuan Menzie, Trent Richardson and Courtney Upshaw. Richardson became Alabama's first Doak Walker Award winner and finished third in the Heisman Trophy voting. Jones received the Outland Trophy, the Wuerffel Trophy and the ARA Sportsmanship Award. Carson Tinker accepted the Disney Spirit Award for the team's efforts following the April 27, 2011, tornado that ravaged Tuscaloosa.

Richardson set a school record with 1,679 rushing yards to go along with 24 total touchdowns and 21 rushing scores. Hightower led the team with 85 total tackles while Upshaw accounted for a team-high 18 tackles for loss (-90 yards) and 9.5 sacks (-62 yards) plus one interception return for a touchdown, two forced fumbles and 11 quarterback hurries. First-year starting quarterback AJ McCarron completed 66.8 percent of his passes for 2,634 yards with 16 touchdowns. McCarron threw only five interceptions or one every 65.6 pass attempts in 2011, which was the third-best mark in SEC history, behind only Peyton Manning and Greg McElroy.

Defensively, Alabama put together one of the best seasons in the modern era of college football. The Crimson Tide led the nation in the four major categories: scoring defense (8.2 ppg), total defense (183.6 ypg), rush defense (72.2 ppg) and pass efficiency defense (83.69) while also leading the nation in pass defense at 111.46 ypg. Alabama was only the second team to lead the nation in all four defensive categories and the first since Oklahoma in 1986. On the offensive side of the football, the Tide averaged 429.6 yards per game while scoring 34.85 points per game, statistics that ranked fourth and fifth, respectively, in school history.

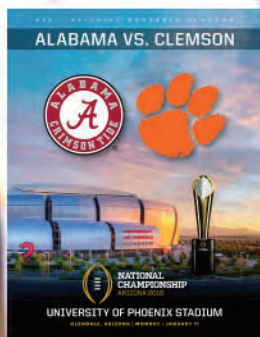
The Alabama football team established its dominance early against Notre Dame on its way to an overwhelming performance as the Crimson Tide earned the programs 15th national championship in football with a 42-14 victory over Notre Dame in the 2013 Discover BCS National Championship Game.

Alabama's 2012 senior class won a school record 49 games over a four-year span while losing only five contests. The 49 wins tied Nebraska for the most in college football history and ranks among the best four-year totals in Southeastern Conference history (Florida won 48 games from 2006-09 and Alabama won 48 from 2008-11).

Alabama produced four first team All-Americans in 2012, giving them 22 All-America honors by 19 different players from 2008-12. The 2012 first team All-Americans included Barrett Jones, Dee Milliner, C.J. Mosley and Chance Warmack. D.J. Fluker was also a second-team All-American and A.J. McCarron garnered third-team honors. Jones also became Alabama's first William V. Campbell and Rimington Trophy winner.

McCarron led the Alabama offense with a school-record 30 touchdown passes while leading the nation with a 175.28 pass efficiency rating. He threw for 2,933 yards with only three interceptions while completing 67.2 percent of his passes. Lacy led the way on the ground with 1,322 yards and 17 scores. Yeldon added a freshman record 1,108 yards and 12 rushing touchdowns. Cooper led all receivers with a freshman-record 59 receptions for 1,000 yards and 11 scores.

Defensively, Alabama put together another outstanding season, leading the nation in three major categories: scoring defense (10.9 ppg), total defense (250.0 ypg) and rush defense (76.4 ppg). Alabama pitched four shutouts, the most since the 1979 team had five. On the offensive side of the football, the Tide averaged 445.5 yards per game while scoring 38.7 points per game. UA's 542 points in 2012 was a school record.



TAMING THE TIGERS

2015

In a top-ranked matchup of contrasting styles, the Alabama Crimson Tide showed incredible resourcefulness and resilience to earn its 16th national championship against the Clemson Tigers in the College Football Playoff National Championship by a score of 45-40.

The title, Alabama's fourth in the last seven seasons, concluded a 14-1 year for the Tide while Clemson suffered its first loss of the 2015 campaign. It was head coach Nick Saban's fifth national title, four of which came at UA, joining Paul "Bear" Bryant as the only two coaches in college football history to win at least five national championships during their tenure.

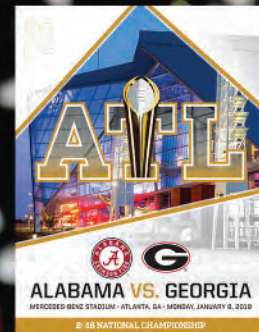
Tight end O.J. Howard caught five passes for a career-high 208 yards on his way to Offensive MVP honors in the season's final game. Jake Coker passed for a career-best 335 yards, while running back Derrick Henry rushed for 158 yards and three scores. Senior Kenyan Drake returned a kickoff for 95 yards and a score to lift the Tide to the 45-40 win in front of 75,756 (capacity: 71,000) at University of Phoenix Stadium in Glendale, Ariz.

Derrick Henry was the catalyst for the Alabama offense, recording school records in yards (2,219), rushing touchdowns (28), attempts (395) and all-purpose yards (2,310). His 2,219 yards led the nation and shattered the SEC single-season rushing record previously held by Herschel Walker (1,891). First-year starter Jake Coker finished his career at Alabama a perfect 14-0 as the starting quarterback and recorded 3,110 yards through the air along with 21 touchdowns by season's end. His favorite target, Calvin Ridley, set the freshman record for yards with 1,045 receiving, eclipsing the previous freshman record of 1,000 held by Amari Cooper (2012). Ridley hauled in a team-leading 89 catches for a team-high 1,045 yards in 15 games (11 starts) and added seven touchdown catches. In total, the Crimson Tide's offense averaged 199.9 rushing yards per game and 227.1 yards through the air per contest.

Defensively, Alabama checked in as the nation's top-ranked rush defense, third in total defense and scoring defense, and eighth in pass efficiency defense. Possibly the best defense during the Saban era, the Tide recorded 49 sacks, the most by a Saban-coached team and the third-most sacks in program history. The defense also forced and SEC-leading 27 turnovers, 19 of which were interceptions which also led the conference. The 442 return yards on those picks led the nation, while the four pick-sixes by Alabama's secondary ranked second in the NCAA. Senior linebacker and defensive captain Reggie Ragland led the Tide in tackles with 102, while defensive lineman Jonathan Allen paced the defense with 12.0 sacks (-80 yards) and 14.5 tackles for a loss (-92 yards). Eddie Jackson, in his first year as the starting safety, picked off six passes for an Alabama all-time record 230 return yards, including two scores.

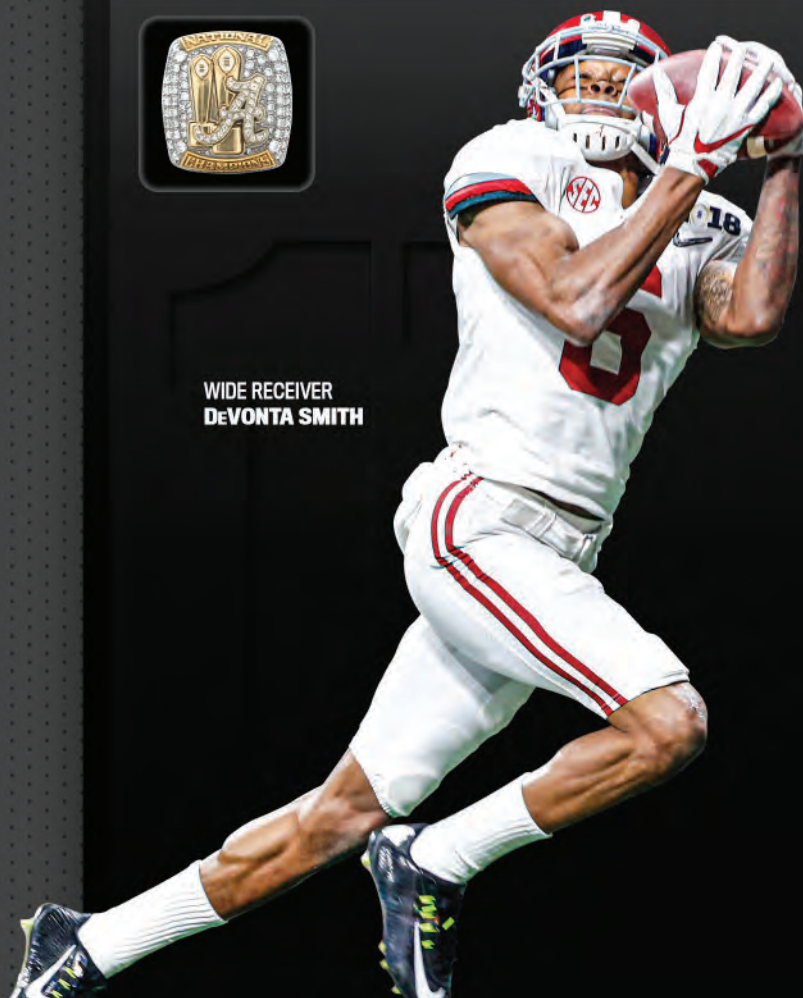

The No. 4-ranked University of Alabama football team defeated third-ranked Georgia, 26-23, on a game-winning 41-yard touchdown pass from freshman Tua Tagovailoa to fellow freshman wide receiver DeVonta Smith in the 2018 College Football Playoff National Championship Game at Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta.

The Crimson Tide won its 17th national championship and fifth in the last nine seasons with the win over the Bulldogs. Alabama head coach Nick Saban improved to 12-0 against his former assistants with the win over UGA's Kirby Smart.

Tagovailoa was named Offensive MVP after going 14-of-24 for 166 yards, three scores through the air and 27 yards on the ground, all in the second half.

On defense, junior Da'Ron Payne was named the Defensive MVP with six tackles in the game. Sophomore linebacker Mack Wilson led the team with 12 tackles, including two tackles-for-loss. Senior defensive back Tony Brown and sophomore defensive lineman Raekwon Davis each had an interception in the win.

Georgia received the ball first in the overtime period, starting at the UA 25-yard line. The Alabama defense pushed Georgia back nine yards to the 34-yard line, where the Bulldogs netted a 51-yard field goal attempt to go up 23-20.

Lining up on the UGA 25-yard line in Alabama's first overtime possession, Tagovailoa was sacked on the first play for a 16-yard loss to the 41-yard line. On the next play from scrimmage, Tagovailoa found Smith sprinting down the field for a 41-yard touchdown reception to give Alabama the 26-23 win in thrilling fashion.



SUPREME 18

2020

The Alabama football team won its 18th national championship Monday, January 12, 2021 at Hard Rock Stadium in Miami Garden, Fla., in front of 14,926 fans with a dominating 52-24 win over No. 3 Ohio State in the College Football Playoff National Championship Game. Alabama finished its season with a clean 13-0 record.

In addition to it being the Crimson Tide's 18th national football championship overall, it was Nick Saban's seventh as a head coach, giving him the most in collegiate football history, and his sixth at Alabama. Under Saban, Alabama has posted 50-plus points against Associated Press Top 25 teams on seven occasions, including the Tide's 52-24 win against the Buckeyes in the 2020 National Championship Game. It also marked UA's third 50-plus point effort on the season.

Najee Harris capped off the Tide's opening drive with a one-yard rush to put Alabama on the board first. Master Teague III's eight-yard rushing touchdown evened the score on Ohio State's second drive of the game.

In the second quarter, Mac Jones connected with DeVonta Smith from five yards out to finish off a 75-yard drive for Alabama's second touchdown of the game. Then, Teague III found the end zone for the second time, coming from four yards out, for another rushing score. Harris set the SEC single-season touchdown record (29) on his second score of the game off a 26-yard pass from Jones. Ohio State's Jake Seibert responded with a 23-yard kick through the uprights for the game's first field goal. After that, Smith trotted across the goal line after catching a five-yard pass from Jones for his second touchdown of the game, then he caught a perfectly placed 42-yard pass to give the Tide an 18-point advantage at the half.

Alabama's Will Reichard recorded his 14th field goal in as many attempts, this one from 20 yards out for the first score of the second half. The Buckeyes' Justin Fields tossed a 20-yard pass to Garrett Wilson deep in the end zone for their only receiving score of the game. Closing the third, Slade Bolden became the third different Alabama player to record a receiving touchdown, this one coming off a five-yard pass from Jones.

In the fourth quarter, the Tide's Harris carried for one yard for his second rushing touchdown and third overall in the game to put an exclamation mark on a historic season.

Smith was the game's Offensive MVP after setting championship game records for the most receptions (12) and receiving touchdowns (3), while accounting for 215 of the Crimson Tide's 464 receiving yards, all of which came in the first half. He concluded his Tide career with 3,965 receiving yards, which ranks atop both Alabama's and Southeastern Conference's all-time records.

Smith became the seventh player in the BCS/CFP era to win the Heisman and a national title in the same season.

Christian Barmore was named the Defensive MVP of the game after totaling five tackles, a sack and two tackles for loss in a disruptive performance.

Jones threw for a CFP championship game record 464 yards on 36-of-45 passing, including a CFP championship game record tying five touchdowns. His 36 passes marked a career high for the quarterback. Meanwhile, the 464 yards marked his fifth 400-plus yard performance on the season, owning five of just 11 such performances in Alabama history.

Najee Harris became just the fifth player to score both rushing and receiving touchdowns in a BCS/CFP title game with two on the ground and one through the air. He totaled 158 yards of total offense, including 79 yards rushing on 22 attempts and 79 yards receiving on seven catches in the game. With his performance, Harris recorded 30 total touchdowns during the 2020 season for the most by any Alabama or SEC player ever.

Christian Harris and Dylan Moses led the Tide defense in tackles with six each.

The Alabama offensive line concluded the season blocking for the Power 5's No. 1 scoring offense (48.5 ppg), No. 1 pass efficiency offense (198.9), No. 2 passing offense (358.2 ypg), No. 2 total offense (541.6 ypg) and No. 23 rushing attack (183.5 ypg).

The Crimson Tide moved to 8-3 all-time in College Football Playoff games since the playoff's inception in 2014 and is one of only two teams to appear in five of the six Playoffs, joining Clemson. The Crimson Tide holds the record for the most CFP wins with eight and most games played at 11.

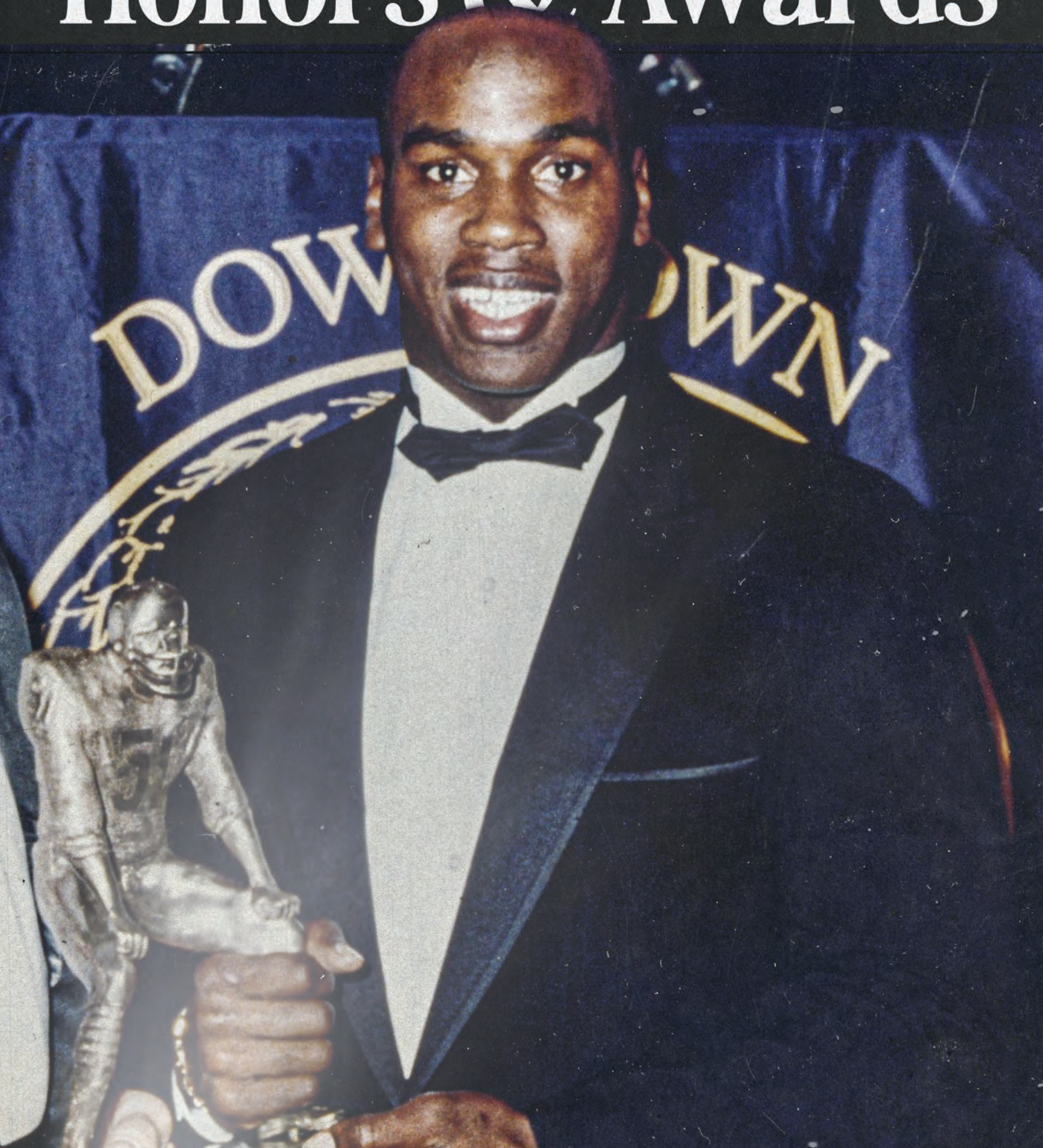

In the process, DeVonta Smith broke the CFP National Championship Game record for most receiving yards in a half (215), and he became the first player to have three receiving touchdowns in a CFP National Championship Game and the most receptions with 12.

A TRADITION OF CHAMPIONS

Honors & Awards



THE HEISMAN

In 2009, Alabama sophomore running back Mark Ingram became the 75th recipient of the Heisman Trophy and first Crimson Tide player to take home the honor.

Derrick Henry brought home Alabama's second Heisman Trophy in 2015 after rushing for an SEC record 2,219 yards and 28 touchdowns, as he led the Crimson Tide to its 16th national championship.

DeVonta Smith was the third Crimson Tide player to win the Heisman Trophy, after leading the nation with 117 receptions for a school-record 23 receiving touchdowns and 1,865 receiving yards in 2020.

In 2021, Bryce Young became the first Alabama quarterback to win the Heisman Trophy, following a season that featured an Alabama record 4,872 yards and program leading 47 touchdowns.



Alabama boasts a rich and storied football history. The Crimson Tide has won an NCAA-leading 18 national championships to go with 34 conference championships, while also producing 147 first team All-Americans, 26 members of the College Football Hall of Fame and numerous national award winners. But, until 2009, Alabama had never laid claim to the most celebrated and sought-after award in college athletics – the Heisman Trophy. The Heisman is a national symbol of the collegiate football experience and unmatched competitiveness. The Crimson Tide had been represented by numerous finalists over the years, but none of the first 74 Heisman Trophies found a home in Tuscaloosa.

All of that changed as a sophomore from Flint, Mich., burst into the nation’s consciousness in 2009, breaking tackles all the way to the Nokia Theater in New York City’s Times Square where Mark Ingram became Alabama’s first Heisman Trophy winner. He edged out Stanford’s Toby Gerhart by 28 points to capture the most coveted award in college football, tallying 1,304 points and 227 first-place votes in the closest Heisman Trophy vote in the award’s history.

The Crimson Tide collected its second Heisman Trophy in 2015 as Derrick Henry, a native of Yulee, Fla., set the SEC rushing record with 2,219 yards on his way to victory. Henry earned 1,832 points to capture the Heisman, including 378 first-place votes that outdistanced Stanford’s Christian McCaffrey by 293 points with Deshaun Watson third (1,165 points).

Alabama’s third Heisman came from an unlikely suspect as DeVonta Smith became the first wide receiver to hear his name called since Desmond Howard in 1991. Smith was joined by Alabama teammates in quarterback Mac Jones (third, 1,130 points) and running back Najee Harris (fifth, 216 points) in the top five, becoming just the second trio of teammates to finish in the top five in the award’s history (Army, 1946).

In 2021, Bryce Young helped the Crimson Tide produce back-to-back Heisman Trophy winners with his 684 first-place votes, the 10th most all-time, and 2,311 total points. He made history at the award show, becoming the first Alabama quarterback to garner the highest individual honor in collegiate sports. It also marked just the fifth instance a school has had two straight Heisman winners. Moreover, the Tide signal caller was just the fifth sophomore to haul in the distinguished prize all time, sharing that record with Sam Bradford, Lamar Jackson, Mark Ingram and Tim Tebow.

Ingram, Henry, Smith and Young are among 16 players in Southeastern Conference history to win the Heisman Trophy as the SEC has produced nine in the last 19 years, joining 2007 winner Tim Tebow (Florida), 2010 winner Cam Newton (Auburn), 2012 winner Johnny Manziel (Texas A&M), 2019 winner Joe Burrow (LSU) and 2023 winner Jayden Daniels (LSU). Other SEC winners include Frank Sinkwich (Georgia, 1942), Billy Cannon (LSU, 1959), Steve Spurrier (Florida, 1966), Pat Sullivan (Auburn, 1971), Herschel Walker (Georgia, 1982), Bo Jackson (Auburn, 1985) and Danny Wuerffel (Florida, 1996).

Ingram produced a 2009 season that was one for the Alabama football history books. He rushed for a then-school-record 1,658 yards with 20 total touchdowns in 14 games for a 118.43 yards per game average to rank 11th nationally and second in the SEC. Ingram added 30 receptions for 322 yards and three scores. His 1,992 all-purpose yards ranked as the third-highest single-season total in school history at the time. Ingram also gained an astonishing 1,075 yards - or 54 percent of his all-purpose yards - after contact. His numbers climbed even higher when the Crimson Tide’s opponent was ranked in the top 25, accounting for 1,134 all-purpose yards, or 189.0 yards per game, in six games against top-25 foes, including four against top-10 teams.

Henry’s 2,219 yards in his junior campaign were the fifth-best rushing total by a running back in the history of the Football Bowl Subdivision following the ‘15 season. He also set school records for rushing touchdowns (28), rushing yards per game (147.9), all-purpose yards (2,310), carries (395) and points scored (168). Henry seemed to play even better against the best competition, averaging 138.8 yards per game (10 games) against teams with rush defenses ranked in the top 50 and 166.6 yards per game against teams ranked in the top 25 (nine).

Smith led the nation in receptions (117), receiving touchdowns (23) and receiving yards (1,856) in 2020, setting school records in each category and claiming the SEC records for touchdowns and receiving yards. He averaged 142.8 receiving yards per game and converted a first down or scored a touchdown on 85 of his 117 catches. He also scored a rushing touchdown and returned a punt for a score at Arkansas. He was a unanimous All-American, while also capturing the Maxwell Award, Walter Camp Player of the Year, Associated Press Player of the Year, the Biletnikoff Award and the Paul Hornung Award.

In 2021, Young set the Alabama single-season records for passing yards (4,872) and touchdowns (47), while he also led the SEC and ranked second nationally in both of those categories. In fact, throughout his sophomore season, his performances set a handful of other Crimson Tide records, too, which are not limited to: Becoming the first Alabama quarterback in their starting debut to record four touchdown passes when he did so against Miami; breaking the school record for best completion percentage in a single game (minimum of 20 completions) twice in 2021, including his completion of 21-of-23 (.913) passes against New Mexico State; and setting the Alabama record for passing yards in a game with 559 against Arkansas.

Known as the DAC Trophy when it first was presented to Jay Berwagner, the legendary “one man gang” of the University of Chicago on Dec. 9, 1935, the bronze statue depicts a football player side-stepping and straight arming a tackler. Cast in the highly artistic method known as the lost wax process of bronze medal molding, the statue weighs 45 pounds and is 14 inches long, 13 and a half inches in height and six and a half inches in width. It was designed by New York sculptor Frank Eliscu, who was commissioned by the Downtown Athletic Club to create a figure of a football player in imperishable bronze to serve as an annual trophy award. Eliscu used his friend, Ed Smith, a starter on the New York University Football team, as the player model for his initial creations.

However, reference to the award as the DAC Trophy was only used once. Following the death of John Heisman in October of 1936 (Heisman at the time was the Director of Athletics at the Downtown Athletic Club), the award was renamed the Heisman Memorial Trophy. Today, the annual award involves the use of two statues. One is presented to the college football player selected for excellence and this remains the permanent possession of the winner. A second trophy is awarded to the school represented by the winner.

CHUCK BEDNARIK AWARD

Created in 1995, the Chuck Bednarik Award is presented annually to the top defensive player in college football as chosen by the Maxwell Football Club. The award is named for Chuck Bednarik, a former college and professional American football player. Voters for the Maxwell College Football Awards are NCAA head college football coaches, members of the Maxwell Football Club, and sportswriters and sportscasters from across the country. Jonathan Allen became the Crimson Tide's first recipient in 2016 and was followed one year later by Minkah Fitzpatrick as the award's 2017 honoree. Will Anderson Jr. was the most recent winner, taking home the honors as part of his haul in 2022.



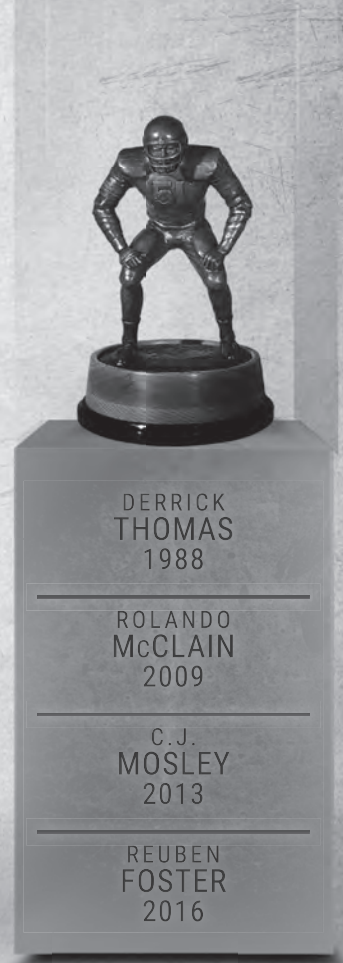
BILETNIKOFF AWARD

The Biletnikoff Award is presented annually to the nation's most outstanding college football receiver (the award defines receiver as any player who catches a pass) by the Tallahassee Quarterback Club Foundation, Inc. The award is named for Fred Biletnikoff, who starred for Florida State and then the Oakland Raiders. Amari Cooper was the first Alabama football player to win the Award (2014) after a record-setting season with 124 catches for 1,727 yards and 16 touchdowns. Jerry Jeudy joined Cooper in 2018 after putting up similar numbers, with 14 touchdowns and 1,315 receiving yards. DeVonta Smith received the honor in 2020 after leading the nation with 117 receptions to go with a school-record 23 receiving touchdowns and 1,865 receiving yards.



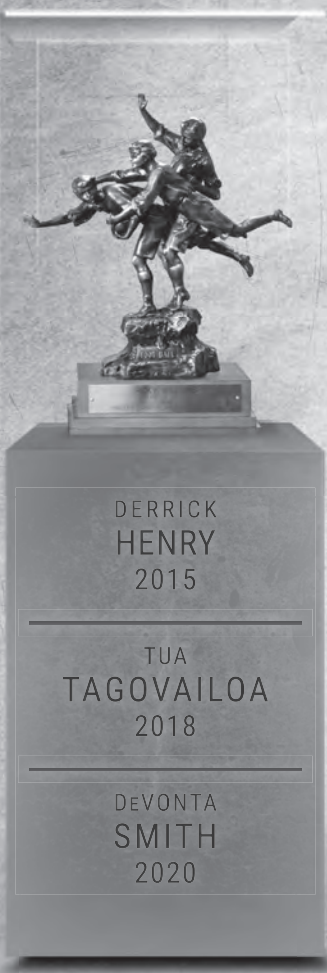
BROYLES AWARD

The Frank Broyles Award was established to recognize some of the most dedicated, hardest-working people in America – the college football assistant coach. And, over the years, the award has done just that. Each head coach can nominate one assistant coach from his staff, while the five Broyles Award finalists are chosen from almost 1,500 assistant coaches representing the College Football Bowl Subdivision. Kirby Smart became Alabama's first Broyles Award Recipient in 2009. Mike Locksley was UA's second in 2018 after guiding one of the nation's top offenses to a national championship appearance. Steve Sarkisian was the winner of the 25th annual Broyles Award, helping Alabama to its 18th national title with the Power 5's top-ranked scoring offense (48.5 ppg) and pass efficiency offense (198.9). All three assistants would go on to become collegiate head coaches following their time in Tuscaloosa.



BUTKUS AWARD

Created in 1985, the Butkus Award is given annually to college football's top linebacker. The award is named in honor of College Football Hall of Fame and Pro Football Hall of Fame linebacker Dick Butkus, widely regarded as one of the best linebackers of all time and a star at the University of Illinois and for the Chicago Bears. A 1979 inductee of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, Butkus played in the NFL for the Chicago Bears and earned a reputation as one of the most intimidating players in the history of the game. The late Derrick Thomas was the first Alabama player to take home the Butkus in 1988. He was followed by Rolando McClain (2009), C.J. Mosley (2013) and most recently Reuben Foster (2016).

WALTER CAMP PLAYER OF THE YEAR

The Walter Camp Trophy is awarded to the outstanding player of the year in college football who has exemplified the qualities of self-discipline, unselfish team play, a desire to excel, mature judgement and respect for leadership. His performance on the playing field must be accompanied by an equally strong effort to contribute off the field. He must exhibit an awareness of the need to fulfill his role as a leader. He must espouse the ideals adhered to by Walter Camp, the "Father of American Football." Derrick Henry brought home Alabama's first Walter Camp Player of the Year honor in 2015 after rushing for 2,219 yards and 28 touchdowns. Tua Tagovailoa became the second recipient in 2018 after passing 3,966 yards and 43 touchdowns. DeVonta Smith was the winner in 2020 after leading the nation with 117 receptions for a school-record 23 receiving touchdowns and 1,865 receiving yards.

WILLIAM V. CAMPBELL TROPHY

The William V. Campbell Trophy has become the most prestigious and desirable 'academic' award in college football. The trophy recognizes an individual as the absolute best in the country for his academic success, football performance and exemplary community leadership. The finalists receive a postgraduate scholarship as a member of the National Football Foundation's Scholar-Athlete Class. The winner of the Campbell Trophy then has his postgraduate scholarship increased to \$25,000. Alabama offensive lineman Barrett Jones was the sixth Alabama player selected as a finalist and became the program's first winner in 2012. In 2024, quarterback Jalen Milroe became the Crimson Tide's second recipient of what is often considered to be college football's 'Academic Heisman'.

DISNEY SPIRIT AWARD

The Disney Sports Spirit Award has been presented each year since 1996 to college football's most inspirational player, team or figure. The Alabama football team, represented by Carson Tinker, was recognized for its efforts following the April 27, 2011, tornado that tore through Tuscaloosa. The award is not based on statistics or other on-field records or achievements, but rather for bravery, courage, overcoming adversity, and the love of college football.

JOHNNY UNITAS GOLDEN ARM AWARD

The Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award is given annually to the nation's most outstanding senior or fourth-year quarterback in college football. It was established in 1987 by a foundation named for Johnny Unitas, the Hall of Fame quarterback who played at the University of Louisville before going on to a legendary career for the NFL's Baltimore Colts. Jay Barker (1994) and AJ McCarron (2013) both captured the award during their senior seasons at Alabama. Mac Jones received the honor in 2020 after setting Alabama's all-time single-season record for passing yards with 4,500 yards.



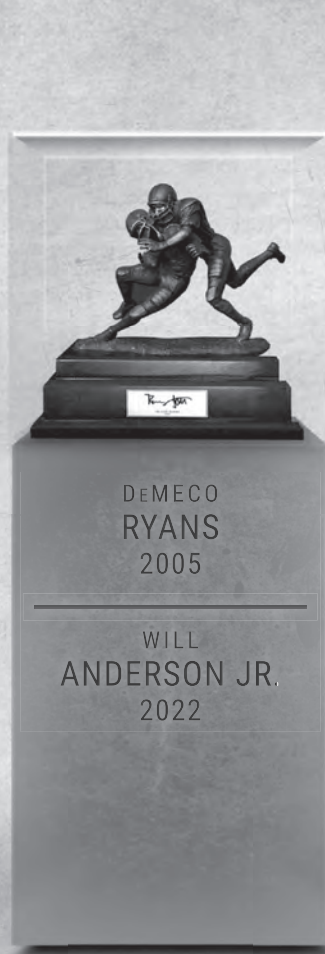
TED HENDRICKS AWARD

Created in 2002, the Ted Hendricks Award is given annually to college football's top defensive end. The award is named after Ted Hendricks, who is a member of both the College Football Hall of Fame and Pro Football Hall of Fame and is presented by the Ted Hendricks Foundation. Jonathan Allen became Alabama's first recipient of the award following a dominant 2016 season.



LOMBARDI AWARD

Began in 1970, the Lombardi Award is hosted by the Rotary Club of Houston and benefits the American Cancer Society. The award goes annually to the college football lineman on offense or defense that, in addition to outstanding performance and ability, best exemplifies the discipline of Vince Lombardi. As the legendary coach of the Green Bay Packers, Lombardi first made a name for himself as the smallest but toughest member of Fordham University's "Seven Blocks of Granite," renowned in their day (1934-37) for being the most unyielding line in college football. Cornelius Bennett (1986), Jonathan Allen (2016) and Will Anderson Jr. (2022) each claimed the Lombardi during their Crimson Tide careers.



LOTT TROPHY

The Lott Trophy is presented annually to the college football Defensive IMPACT Player of the Year. IMPACT is an acronym for: Integrity, Maturity, Performance, Academics, Community and Tenacity. The award recognizes the personal character of the winning player as well as athletic excellence and is named in honor Ronnie Lott, a defensive back who starred at Southern California and for the NFL's San Francisco 49ers. Lott is a member of both the College Football Hall of Fame and the Pro Football Hall of Fame. DeMeco Ryans was the first Alabama player to earn the honor in 2005. Will Anderson Jr. then became the second Lott winner in UA history when he took home the honors in 2022.



MAXWELL AWARD

The Maxwell Football Club presents the Maxwell Award to the College Football Player of the Year. This award is presented in honor of Robert W. (Tiny) Maxwell, legendary college player, official and sports columnist. The award has been given annually since 1937 when Yale's Clint Frank was honored. The Maxwell Award is voted on by head coaches, members of the Maxwell Football Club and sportswriters and sportscasters from across the country. Tua Tagovailoa became Alabama's third winner in 2018, joining AJ McCarron (2013) and Derrick Henry (2015). DeVonta Smith was Alabama's fourth winner in 2020 thanks to his record-setting senior season. The very next season, Bryce Young received the honor to become the fifth Alabama player in just nine years to claim the award.

JOE MOORE AWARD

The Joe Moore Foundation for Teamwork awarded Alabama the inaugural Joe Moore Award in 2015 and then presented the Tide with the trophy again in 2020. It is given annually to college football's best offensive line unit. The award is designed to preserve the legacy of Joe Moore, who coached most notably at Pittsburgh and Notre Dame. Moore was responsible for developing the skills of several All-Americans throughout his storied career, including Bill Fralic, Mark May, Russ Grimm, Jimbo Covert, Mark Stepnowski, Aaron Taylor and Andy Heck. Coach Moore sent 52 players on to the NFL, several of whom are in the Pro and College Football Hall of Fame.

BRONKO NAGURSKI TROPHY

The Bronko Nagurski Trophy has been awarded annually since 1993 to the top defensive player in college football as voted on by the membership of the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA). The award is presented by the Charlotte Touchdown Club and the FWAA and is named for Bronko Nagurski, who played football for the University of Minnesota and the Chicago Bears. Jonathan Allen became the first Alabama football player to win the Bronko Nagurski Trophy in 2016. Will Anderson Jr. received the award in 2021, leading the nation in tackles for loss with 34.5 (-148) and sacks 17.5 sacks (-108). Anderson Jr. then won the Nagurski for a second consecutive season in 2022, becoming just the second two-time winner in the trophy's 30-year history.

OUTLAND TROPHY

The Outland Trophy is awarded to the best United States college football interior lineman by the Football Writers Association of America. It is named after John H. Outland, one of a select few players ever named All-America at two positions. Outland earned consensus All-America honors in 1898 at tackle and consensus All-America honors at halfback in 1899 for the University of Pennsylvania. Alex Leatherwood became Alabama's sixth winner in 2020, joining Quinnen Williams (2018), Cam Robinson (2016), Chris Samuels (1999), Andre Smith (2008) and Barrett Jones (2011).

RIMINGTON TROPHY

The Rimington Trophy was created to recognize the most outstanding center in the Football Bowl Subdivision. The trophy is named after former Nebraska center Dave Rimington, who won the Outland Trophy in consecutive years, was a two-time first team All-American and the 1982 Big Eight Offensive Player of the Year. The trophy is presented by the Boomer Esiason Foundation, which was created when his son, Gunnar, was diagnosed with cystic fibrosis. The Rimington Trophy has played a major role in raising money to support the CF community and is essential in honoring one of the most pivotal roles on the football field. Landon Dickerson became Alabama's third winner in 2020 after Ryan Kelly (2015) and Barrett Jones (2012) each captured the honors before him.



JIM THORPE AWARD

Created in 1986, the Jim Thorpe Award is presented each season to the top defensive back in college football. Winners are judged on their performance on the field, athletic ability and character. The award is named for Jim Thorpe, an Olympic gold medalist in 1912 who also played professional football, baseball and basketball. His football prowess enabled tiny Carlisle College to become a national college football power early in the 20th century. Thorpe was widely considered the world's greatest athlete of the first half of the 20th Century. Antonio Langham was the first Crimson Tide player to garner Thorpe honors in 1993. He was followed by Minkah Fitzpatrick, with the versatile defensive back taking home the Thorpe in 2017.

DOAK WALKER AWARD

Created in 1989 to recognize the nation's premier running back for his accomplishments on the field, achievement in the classroom and citizenship in the community, the Doak Walker Award is the only major collegiate football award that requires all candidates to be in good academic standing and on schedule to graduate within one year of other students of the same classification. The award is named after famed SMU running back Doak Walker, a three-time All-American and the 1948 Heisman Trophy winner. Trent Richardson became the first Alabama player to win the award in 2011 after rushing for 1,679 yards and 21 touchdowns. Derrick Henry was the second Crimson Tide player to see his name etched on the trophy in 2015 after rushing for an SEC-record 2,219 yards and 28 touchdowns. Najee Harris received the honor in 2020 after leading the nation in total touchdowns (30), rushing touchdowns (26) and scoring (180).

WUERFFEL TROPHY

The Wuerffel Trophy is presented by the All Sports Association of Fort Walton Beach, Fla., to the college football player who best combines exemplary community service with athletic and academic achievement. It is named for former University of Florida quarterback Danny Wuerffel, the 1996 Heisman Trophy winner. Barrett Jones became the first Alabama player to take home the Wuerffel when he was named the winner in 2011.

POLYNESIAN AWARD

The Polynesian College Football Player of the Year Award recognizes the most outstanding player of Polynesian ancestry who epitomizes great ability and integrity. The Polynesian Football Hall of Fame honors Polynesia's greatest players, coaches and contributors. It also serves as a resource for Polynesian football history, provides academic scholarships and supports educational programs for Polynesian youth. Its permanent home is located at the Polynesian Cultural Center (Oahu's North Shore) and was established in 2013 by Super Bowl Champions Jesse Sapolu and Ma'a Tanuvasa. Tua Tagovailoa earned the honors in back-to-back seasons in 2018 and 2019.



DAVEY O'BRIEN AWARD

The Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award is the nation's oldest national quarterback award. The Fort Worth Club established the Davey O'Brien Foundation and the Davey O'Brien Memorial Trophy in November of 1977. The Davey O'Brien Award honors candidates who exemplify Davey O'Brien's enduring character while exhibiting teamwork, sportsmanship and leadership in both academics and athletics. Mac Jones was the first Alabama quarterback to earn this award, doing so after setting Alabama's then-single-season record for passing yards with 4,500 in 2020. Bryce Young followed up with an even more impressive season, topping Jones' record with 4,872 passing yards and adding 47 touchdown passes to earn the Tide a second O'Brien.

PAUL HORNUNG AWARD

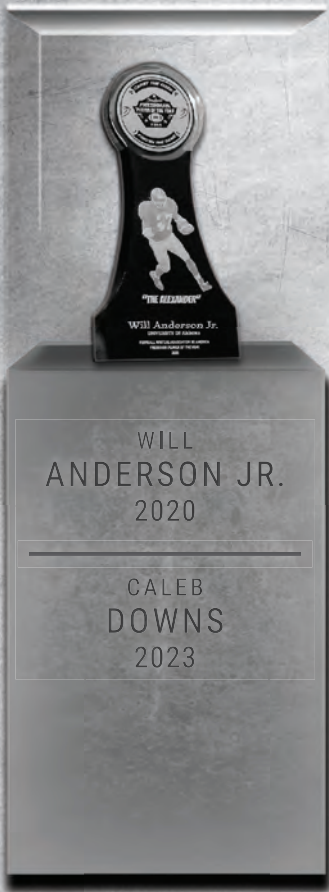
The Paul Hornung Award is given annually by the Louisville Sports Commission (LSC) to the most versatile player in major college football. The Award was created by the LSC in January 2010 with the support of the Golden Boy himself, Paul Hornung, a native and lifelong resident of Louisville and member of the College and Pro Football Halls of Fame. DeVonta Smith brought home Alabama's first Paul Hornung Award after converting 60 percent of his receptions into scores or first downs and leading the nation with 117 receptions to go with a school-record 23 receiving touchdowns and a school-record 1,865 receiving yards in 2020.

MANNING AWARD

Prior to the 2004 college football season, the Manning Award was created by the Allstate Sugar Bowl in honor of the college football accomplishments of Archie, Peyton and Eli Manning. It is the only college football quarterback award that includes the candidates' bowl performances in its balloting; therefore, it is presented annually following the completion of the bowl season. Mac Jones won UA's first Manning Award after leading the nation and setting the Alabama single-season record by passing for 4,500 yards in 2020. Just one year later, Bryce Young received the Manning in 2021, breaking Jones' single-season record for passing yards (4,872) and also setting the Alabama single-season record for touchdown passes (47).

PATRICK MANNELLY AWARD

The Patrick Mannelly Award, presented by William Blair, annually celebrates the best long snapper in college football. Thomas Fletcher earned the 2020 Patrick Mannelly Award after starting every game during his Alabama career and recording a perfect grade on all of his snapping duties across four seasons at the Capstone.



ALEXANDER FRESHMAN OF THE YEAR

Shaun Alexander is a former All-Pro running back. He finished a four-year career with the Crimson Tide holding 15 records including 3,565 career rushing yards and the most touchdowns (five) in a game. He was drafted by Seattle as the 19th overall pick in the 2000 NFL Draft, and, in his second season, had a breakout year with 1,318 yards and 14 touchdowns, including a franchise-record 266 yards on 35 carries in a memorable ESPN Sunday Night Football game against Oakland. Will Anderson Jr. won the Tide's first Shaun Alexander-FWAA Freshman of the Year honor after dominating in his first season at the Capstone. He totaled 52 tackles, including 10.5 for loss and seven sacks, to go with eight quarterback pressures. Caleb Downs was the Tide's second recipient of the Alexander in 2023.



ASSOCIATED PRESS PLAYER OF THE YEAR

DeVonta Smith won Alabama's first Associated Press College Football Player of the Year, picking up the honor in 2020. He became the first wide receiver to win the award since it was established in 1998. Smith finished his senior season as the only receiver in SEC history to record multiple career games with four-or-more receiving touchdowns, while also holding the league record for career receiving touchdowns (46) and career receiving yards (3,965). In 2020, he led the nation in receptions (117), receiving touchdowns (23) and receiving yards (1,856). Bryce Young earned the honor just one year later in 2021, after setting the Alabama single-season marks for passing yards (4,872) and touchdowns (47).

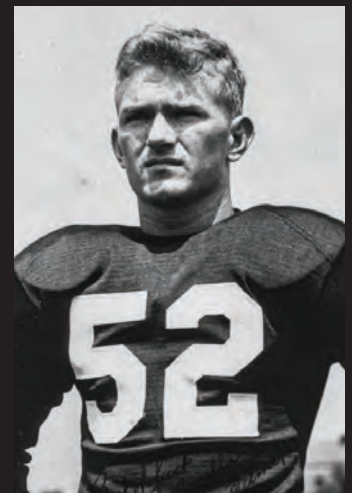

Former Alabama head coach Nick Saban was selected as part of the 2025 College Football Hall of Fame class, the National Football Foundation announced in January. He became the fifth Crimson Tide coach to be elected to the College Football Hall of Fame and the 27th inductee in program history. Saban completed his career in coaching at the conclusion of the 2023 season, winning six national championships from 2007-23 in Tuscaloosa and seven overall for his career - the most by any coach in the history of college football.

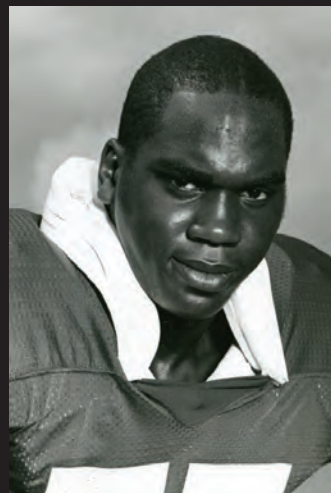

Names such as Shaun Alexander, Cornelius Bennett, Joe Namath, Chris Samuels, Kenny Stabler and Derrick Thomas have starred on the NFL gridiron after their career at the Capstone. The most recent history of the draft has been dominated by Alabama, as the Crimson Tide has produced 49 first round draft picks and 140 total picks over the last 17 years. That total is the most by any program in college football during that span.

This past season, Alabama had two players selected in the first round. First off the board was Tyler Booker, who went to the Dallas Cowboys with the 12th overall pick, followed by Jahaad Campbell, who was selected with the 31st pick by the reigning Super Bowl Champion Philadelphia Eagles. Alabama has had at least one player selected in the first round of 17 straight drafts (2009 – present), which broke Miami's (1995-08) previous NCAA record for the most consecutive years with a first round draft pick.

The remainder of the 2025 NFL Draft saw five more Alabama players selected, including Jalen Milroe (No. 92, Seattle Seahawks) in the third round followed by a pair of fourth-rounders in Malachi Moore (No. 130, New York Jets) and Que Robinson (No. 134, Denver Broncos). Robbie Ouzts (No. 175, Seattle Seahawks) heard his name called in the fifth round with Tim Smith (No. 190, Indianapolis Colts) rounding out the Tide's draft class when he was selected in the sixth round.

The Crimson Tide has had at least seven draft picks for 14 straight years (2012 – present), including 10-or-more in six of the last nine drafts, highlighted by a program-best 12 selections in 2018.

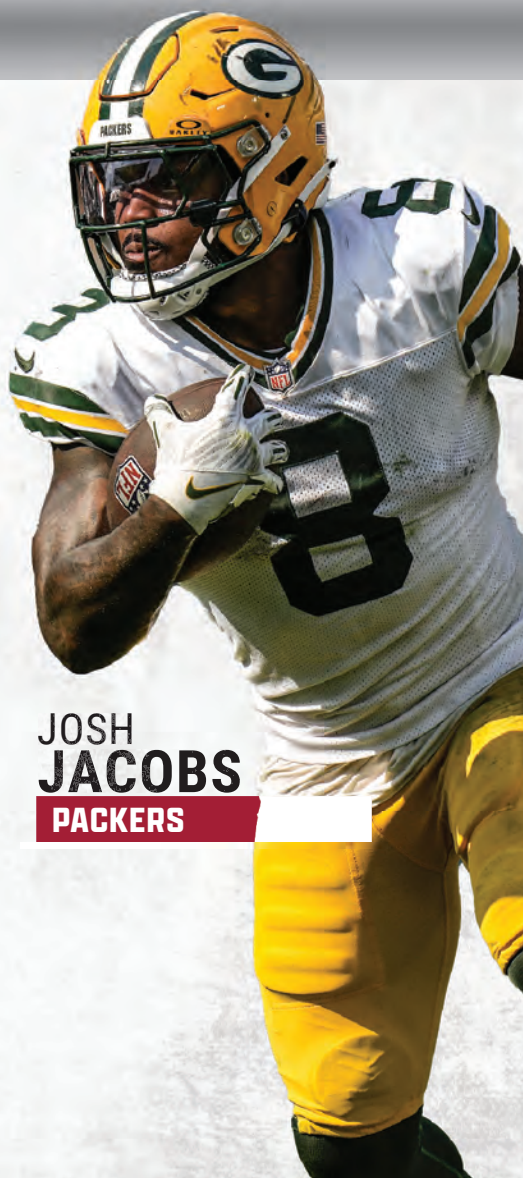

1963

GREEN BAY PACKERS 1935-45
ALABAMA 1932-34

Don Hutson could outmaneuver and outrace virtually every defender in the league. He led the NFL in receiving in eight of his 11 seasons and in scoring five straight years. Twice, in 1941 and 1942, he was named the league's MVP.

When Hutson retired in 1945 after 11 superb seasons, he held 18 NFL records, including 488 career receptions.

BART STARR

1977

GREEN BAY PACKERS 1956-71
ALABAMA 1952-55

Bart Starr was a 17th-round draft choice of the Green Bay Packers in 1956. Three years later, his playing time still was limited and his football future appeared in doubt. That's when Vince Lombardi took over as the Packers coach, an event that may have saved Starr's NFL career.

Lombardi, in tireless study of films, found that he liked Bart's mechanics, his arm, his ball-handling techniques and, most of all, his decision-making abilities. Under Lombardi's careful nurturing, Starr gained the confidence to become one of the NFL's great field leaders.

JOE NAMATH

1985

NEW YORK JETS 1965-76
ALABAMA 1962-64

Joe Namath is best remembered for his performance in the New York Jets' stunning 16-7 upset of the heavily favored Baltimore Colts in Super Bowl III. However, during his 13-year tenure from 1965 through 1977 he was one of the game's most exciting, proficient and publicized quarterbacks.

Namath earned all-league accolades four times in his career (1967, 1968, 1969, and 1972) and was named to the all-time AFL honor team in 1969. He also was elected to four AFL all-star games and one AFC-NFC Pro Bowl.



JOHN HANNAH

1991

NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS 1973-85
ALABAMA 1970-72

John Hannah, a guard from Alabama, was the first-round pick of the New England Patriots and the fourth player selected in the 1973 NFL Draft.

He was an eight-letterman star in football, track and wrestling and a two-time gridiron All-America at Alabama. Hannah finished his career after the 1985 season on a high note. His final campaign had produced an AFC championship and Super Bowl XX appearance for the Patriots, and All-Pro honors and a Pro Bowl invitation for the veteran lineman.



DWIGHT STEPHENSON

1998

MIAMI DOLPHINS 1980-87
ALABAMA 1977-79

Dwight Stephenson was born Nov. 20, 1957, in Murfreesboro, N.C. He was a quiet, intense, hard-working and competitive offensive lineman out of the University of Alabama. He was an exceptionally quick blocker and possessed an explosive charge off the snap. Stephenson was the Dolphins offensive captain and his presence as the anchor of the offensive line was a major factor in the Dolphins' record of allowing the fewest quarterback sacks in the NFL for six straight years.



OZZIE NEWSOME

1999

CLEVELAND BROWNS 1978-90
ALABAMA 1974-77

Throughout his 13-season, 198-game NFL career with the Cleveland Browns from 1978 to 1990, Ozzie Newsome was a fixture at tight end, a true team leader in every respect, and one of only five players in Browns history to play in parts of three decades.

Nicknamed the "Wizard of Oz," Newsome became the leading tight end receiver in NFL history with 662 receptions for 7,980 yards and 47 touchdowns. He ranked as the fourth-leading receiver when he retired. Newsome is now the general manager of the Baltimore Ravens.



DERRICK THOMAS

2009

KANSAS CITY CHIEFS 1989-99
ALABAMA 1985-88

Derrick Thomas displayed extraordinary pass-rushing skills throughout his 11-season career that tragically was cut short by his death following an automobile accident shortly after the 1999 NFL regular season.

No player amassed more sacks during the decade of 1990s than the 116.5 sacks by Thomas. He finished his career with 126.5 sacks, which was the fourth-highest total by a linebacker in NFL history. Thomas had 10 or more sacks in a season seven times and recorded multi-sack games 27 times during his 169-game career.



KENNY STABLER

2015

OAKLAND RAIDERS 1970-79
ALABAMA 1965-67

A four-time Pro Bowl selection and two-time AFC Player of the Year, Kenny Stabler led the Oakland Raiders to their first Super Bowl championship with a victory over the Minnesota Vikings in Super Bowl XI.

Stabler was named the NFL's MVP in 1974 when he led the Raiders to a 12-2 record and a berth in the AFC Championship game. He remains Oakland's career leader in victories, passing yardage, completions and touchdown passes.

During his Heisman Trophy season in 2015, **Derrick Henry** eclipsed the 100-yard mark in 10 of the Crimson Tide's 15 games, including a program-high tying four games of 200-plus yards.



Mac Jones put together an impressive 2020 campaign, setting the NCAA single-season completion percentage mark (77.4 percent) while also recording 10 games of 400-plus passing yards, the most in Crimson Tide history and tied for the SEC record. Additionally, Jones managed to take hold of the top spot on Alabama's single-season passing yards list with 4,500 in that season.
