Series Notes: Alabama and Florida State will meet for the sixth time in series history when the two teams square off on Saturday afternoon at Doak Campbell Stadium. The Crimson Tide currently holds a 3-1-1 all-time advantage with the last meeting coming on Sept. 2, 2017, in Atlanta, a 24-7 win for UA. Saturday's matchup represents the Crimson Tide's first-ever visit to Tallahassee. Alabama head coach Kalen DeBoer has never faced the Seminoles during his head coaching career, while Florida State head coach Mike Norvell will also be matched up against the Crimson Tide for the first time.

NOT SINCE 1931: Head coach Kalen DeBoer produced a 9-4 record in his inaugural season at the Capstone. DeBoer's nine wins finished tied for the most by a first-year head coach at Alabama, sharing the feat with Frank Thomas, who won nine games in his initial season leading the Crimson Tide in 1931.

YEAR TWO UNDER KDB: Head coach Kalen DeBoer has produced stellar results in the second season of his previous coaching tenures. Following an 11-2 overall record and a berth in the semifinals of the NAIA Championship Series after his inaugural season at Sioux Falls in 2005, DeBoer advanced the Cougars to a perfect 14-0 record in 2006, winning the NAIA National Championship. After managing a 3-3 finish with Fresno State in his debut season in 2020, DeBoer proceeded to win six more games in 2021 with the Bulldogs finishing 9-3 under his watch. Most recently, DeBoer led Washington to a College Football Playoff National Championship berth in his second season with the Huskies in 2023, tallying a 14-1 overall record. Washington was 11-2 in DeBoer's initial campaign in Seattle the year prior.

DEBOER AWAY FROM HOME: Entering 2025, Kalen DeBoer has amassed an 8-2 mark in road openers, with both defeats taking place against ranked opponents. DeBoer-led teams have posted a scoring average of 40.5 points per game in 10 previous road openers while allowing just 12.8 points per game, including DeBoer's road debut in 2024, a 42-10 win at Wisconsin on Sept. 14.

STARTING ON THE ROAD: Alabama is slated to open a new campaign with a true non-conference road matchup for the first time since the Crimson Tide traveled to UCLA on Sept. 2, 2000, a 35-24 UA defeat. The Tide is 18-10-1 all-time in 29 previous true road season openers.

SEASON OPENERS OVERALL: Including a 63-0 win over Western Kentucky in 2024, the Crimson Tide is 103-21-3 (.827) all-time in season-opening contests. Alabama has won 22 consecutive season openers dating back to 2002. The 22-game winning streak ranks as the second-longest active streak behind only Ohio State (25).

ALABAMA VS. THE ACC: Entering its matchup with Florida State, Alabama is 90-38-6 (.694) against current affiliates of the Atlantic Coast Conference. Since 2008, the Tide is 10-2 against ACC opponents, including a perfect 9-0 mark in regular season contests. In those 12 games, Alabama has averaged 36.8 points per game while surrendering just 18.2 points per game. UA's most recent regular season matchup against an ACC foe was Sept. 4, 2021, a 44-13 victory over Miami at Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta, Ga.

2025 TEAM CAPTAINS: The Crimson Tide’s 2025 team captains were announced after practice on Aug. 21. As selected by their teammates, Parker Brailsford, Tim Keenan III, Deontae Lawson and Ty Simpson were each named team captains for the season. The honor marks the second year in a row Lawson was voted a team captain, becoming just the 16th player in program history to be named a two-time team captain.

ALABAMA IN THE AP POLL: Alabama’s No. 8 ranking in the preseason edition of the Associated Press Poll marked the 279th consecutive week that the Crimson Tide has appeared in the poll. That streak is the longest active streak in college football. The 279 weeks more than doubles second-place Georgia with the Bulldogs appearing in the poll for 132 consecutive weeks. Alabama’s 279 straight weeks tops the Crimson Tide’s previous program-long streak of 105 consecutive weeks under head coach Gene Stallings in the mid-1990s.

ALABAMA IN THE AP SINCE 2008: Alabama began the 2008 season at No. 24 in the Associated Press Preseason Poll. The Crimson Tide opened the year with a dominant 34-10 win over then-No. 9 Clemson in Atlanta, and since that win over the Tigers, UA has not been ranked lower than No. 17 in 278 polls that have followed. According to the College Poll Archive, the Tide is the only team to be represented on all 279 editions of the poll from the start of the 2008 season to the current week. The next closest team is Ohio State with 264 appearances followed by Oklahoma at 245. Alabama has spent 92.8 percent of the 18-plus years ranked in the top 10. A whopping 78.9 percent of that time Alabama has been ranked in the top five. The Crimson Tide has also been ranked No. 1 a total of 110 times since 2008. Only 14 other teams have earned the No. 1 ranking over that time, with the second-most appearances coming from Georgia at 40 and Clemson in third at 23.

ALABAMA HAS THE MOST WINS SINCE 2008: Dating back to the start of the 2008 season, Alabama has won 208 games, which is the most in the Football Bowl Subdivision. That sum is 16 more than Ohio State who owns the next-closest win total over that stretch at 192.

ALWAYS IN THE HUNT: Since the 2008 season, Alabama has played in 196 of 202 regular season games that have had national championship implications. The final three games of the 2010 campaign and the final three weeks of the 2022 schedule marked the only six regular season contests without direct national championship implications over the last 17 seasons.

ALABAMA REACHES 1K: With the Oct. 26, 2024 victory over then-No. 21/17 Missouri, Alabama reached 1,000 on-field wins. The Crimson Tide became only the second program in NCAA Division I history to record 1,000 wins (1,003), joining Michigan (1,012). Entering the 2025 season, the Tide’s record, as recognized by the NCAA, stands at 974-341-43 (.733), accounting for vacated and forfeited victories.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

THE DeBOER-GRUBB COMBO: On Feb. 6, 2025, head coach Kalen DeBoer announced the hiring of offensive coordinator Ryan Grubb, a veteran play-caller and one of the top offensive minds in football. DeBoer and Grubb have worked alongside one another at multiple stops over the years, producing potent offenses. In four previous seasons with DeBoer as head coach and Grubb as the offensive coordinator, the pair have combined to post a 37-9 (.804) record while averaging 36.0 points per game and 479.9 yards of total offense per game.

FIRST YEAR STARTING QBs AT ALABAMA: With the exit of two-year starter Jalen Milroe, the Crimson Tide has tabbed Ty Simpson as its starting quarterback in 2025. Since 2009, a total of nine quarterbacks have maintained their starting role for 10-plus games of a season in which they were named QB1 for the first time. The list of nine includes: Milroe (2023), Bryce Young (2021), Mac Jones (2020), Tua Tagovailoa (2018), Jalen Hurts (2016), Jake Coker (2015), Blake Sims (2014), AJ McCarron (2011) and Greg McElroy (2009). All but McCarron won an SEC Championship in their first season at quarterback while four upperclassmen (redshirt sophomore or above) won national titles - Jones (redshirt junior), Coker (senior), McCarron (redshirt sophomore) and McElroy (junior).

TY TAKES OVER: Ty Simpson was named the starting quarterback by head coach Kalen DeBoer on Aug. 11, replacing two-year starter Jalen Milroe, who was drafted in the third round (92nd overall) by the Seattle Seahawks in the 2025 NFL Draft. Simpson's initial start at Florida State on Aug. 30 will represent his first-career nod at Alabama. Simpson has produced solid numbers in limited action over the last three seasons, completing 29-of-50 (58.0 percent) passes for 381 yards in 16 career games. The Tennessee native has also totaled 22 carries for 130 yards (5.9 yards per carry) and three touchdowns on the ground.

ROOKIE YEAR TO REMEMBER: Ryan Williams burst onto the scene in his first year of collegiate football, leading Alabama in yards (865) and touchdown catches (8) while ranking second in receptions (48). His 18.02 yards per catch average finished 28th among all FBS receivers and eighth in the SEC, with Williams producing seven catches of 43-plus yards in 2024. The 865 receiving yards were the second-most by any freshman in the country. Williams' eight receiving touchdowns were tied for the second-most among rookies while his 48 catches were tied for the fourth-most nationally among freshmen. Additionally, the Mobile native's 177 receiving yards in the Crimson Tide's win over then-No. 2/1 Georgia on Sept. 28 were the second-most by a true freshman in UA single-game history, trailing only David Bailey's 187 yards set on Nov. 29, 1969, against Auburn.

MR. RELIABLE: Germie Bernard enters his senior season in 2025 and was quietly one of the most consistent wideouts in college football a season ago. Bernard led all Tide receivers in receptions (50) while finishing second behind Ryan Williams in receiving yards (794), serving as one of just three UA players to record at least one receiving and rushing touchdown in 2024. The Nevada native became a go-to target down the stretch for Alabama, averaging a team-high 71.7 receiving yards per contest over his final eight games, eclipsing 80-plus receiving yards in five of the eight contests.

400+ YARDS OF TOTAL OFFENSE: Alabama has gained 400-plus yards of total offense in 73 of its last 96 games, dating back to the start of the 2018 season. The Crimson Tide produced at least 400 yards of offense in seven games during the 2024 campaign, including Western Kentucky (600), Wisconsin (407), Georgia (547), Missouri (486), LSU (420), Mercer (508) and Auburn (457). In the 22 instances where the offense did not go over 400 yards, Alabama is 16-6.

ALABAMA IN THE AP POLL

Alabama has been ranked in 891 of the 1,251 Associated Press college football polls since 1936, according to the AP Poll Archive. The Crimson Tide owns a 550-139-8 (.795) all-time record in games when ranked in the Associated Press college football poll. Alabama is also ranked in the AP Poll for the 279th consecutive week, topping its previous streak of 105 consecutive polls from 1991-97 under head coach Gene Stallings. The 279 consecutive weeks is the second-longest stretch by any program in the poll's history, trailing only Nebraska's all-time mark of 348 consecutive weeks. Alabama has started nine seasons at No. 1 (2022, 2021, 2018, 2017, 2016, 2013, 2010, 1978, 1966).

ALABAMA IN THE COACHES POLL

The Crimson Tide has enjoyed much success in the coaches' rankings over the past half century. The United Press International debuted the coaches poll in 1950 and ran the poll through the 1990 season. USA TODAY has administered the poll for the past 35 seasons (1991-present) with US LBM coming on the title sponsor of the poll at the start of the 2023 season. Alabama was ranked No. 1 in the 2010 preseason coaches poll after starting out the 2009 preseason poll at No. 5. Alabama remained in the top five the entire season, reaching No. 1 after defeating Florida in the SEC Championship and holding the position to claim the national championship after defeating Texas in Pasadena. The Tide then claimed the No. 1 spot to close out the 2011, 2012, 2015, 2017 and 2020 seasons. The Tide has compiled four UPI (1961, 1964, 1973 and 1979) and seven USA TODAY (1992, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2017 and 2020) coaches poll national titles.

500+ YARDS OF OFFENSE: With 508 yards of offense in the 52-7 win over Mercer on Nov. 16, 2024, Alabama has eclipsed 500 yards of offense in 60 games since the start of the 2015 season, including three times in 2024. Along with the win over the Bears, UA went for 500-plus against Western Kentucky (600) and Georgia (547) in '24. The Crimson Tide accumulated 500-plus twice in 2023 along with seven times apiece in both 2022 and 2021. Additionally, the Tide went for 500-or-better eight times in 2020 and nine times in 2019, with the 2018 roster setting the Alabama single-season record with 500-or-more yards in 12 contests.

600+ YARDS OF OFFENSE: Alabama totaled 600 yards of offense in the 63-0 win over Western Kentucky to open the 2024 campaign. The 600-plus yard performance marked the 15th instance in program history that the Tide has been at or above 600 yards.

STAYING ON THE FIELD: The Alabama offense converted 78 third downs across 165 opportunities (47.3 percent) in 2024, the second-best mark in the SEC and the 12th-best figure in the nation last season.

QUICK STRIKE: The Tide created a reputation as a big-play offense in 2024. Of Alabama's 58 offensive touchdowns, 24 were scores of 20-plus yards (41.4 percent) split between 13 passes and 11 runs.

POINTS APLENTY: Alabama scored at least 34 points in eight games in 2024. The Crimson Tide's 33.8 points per game average finished third in the SEC and 22nd in the FBS at season's end. UA's 30 offensive touchdowns in conference play led all SEC programs, while the Tide's 28.4 points per game mark in league games finished fourth among all SEC teams. .

MOST PPG SINCE 2018: Alabama has produced a scoring average of 41.4 points per game in 96 games since 2018, the highest scoring margin among all Division I teams in that span. Ohio State owns the second-highest points per game mark over that time, managing a 40.8 points per game average.

OPENING DRIVE TOUCHDOWNS: The Crimson Tide has won 58 of its last 59 games when scoring a touchdown on the first offensive possession of the game. The most recent instance came on Nov. 16, 2024 against Mercer when Ryan Williams rushed into the end zone from 29 yards away to open the day's scoring. Alabama's lone loss when scoring a touchdown on the opening drive during the current stretch came at Texas A&M on Oct. 9, 2021.

SCORING STREAK CONTINUES: Alabama extended its school record for consecutive games with a score to 323 thanks to Robbie Ouzts' 25-yard touchdown reception against Michigan on Dec. 31 of last season. The Tide was last held off the scoreboard in a 9-0 loss to Auburn on Nov. 18, 2000. Alabama owns a 259-64 (.802) record over the course of the current streak.

BALL PROTECTION: In the last 232 games (dating back to the start of the 2008 season), Alabama has turned the ball over only 252 times (133 fumbles, 119 interceptions) for an average of 1.09 turnovers per game. Since 2009, the Tide has turned the ball over only 234 times in 220 games (1.06/game). The 234 turnovers since 2009 includes 99 interceptions in 5,859 attempts (one interception every 59.2 attempts) by UA starting quarterbacks and 33 lost fumbles in 5,678 carries (one fumble lost every 172.1 carries) by the Tide's top two running backs.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

THE CRIMSON CURTAIN: The Alabama defense enters the 2025 campaign with significant experience at all three levels, including 10 players that saw at least 400 of UA's 915 total defensive snaps last season. Below is a look at Alabama's returning defensive production from a season ago:

CERTIFIED SAFETY: Safety Bray Hubbard accumulated 57 tackles, including one for loss (-2 yards), to go with two pass breakups, three interceptions and one forced fumble in 2024. Hubbard's 89.2 overall Pro Football Focus grade finished as the sixth-highest mark in Division I, while his coverage grade of 89.7 closed as the seventh-best figure in the FBS.

TK UP FRONT: Defensive lineman Tim Keenan III posted 7.5 tackles for loss (-26 yards) and 2.5 sacks (-16 yards) as part of his 40 total stops in 2024. The Crimson Tide's interior defender also contributed one pass breakup and two quarterback hurries as a redshirt junior. Keenan III's 85.3 overall Pro Football Focus grade was the ninth-best among interior defenders, while his 89.8 run defense grade was the fifth-best mark in the country at season's end. He enters 2025 as one of PFF's top-rated interior linemen.

BUCKLING DOWN: The Crimson Tide defense allowed just 17.4 points per game in 2024, good for fourth in the SEC and 10th nationally. Over the final six contests, Alabama's defense surrendered just 12.8 points per game. The 17.4 points per game total is the lowest scoring average allowed by a Tide defense since 2017 when that national championship squad finished first in Division I for scoring defense at 11.9 points per game. Prior to the 2017 season, only the 2022 roster finished in the top-10 for scoring defense when it ranked ninth at 18.2 points per game allowed.

CREATING CHAOS: The Crimson Tide forced 28 total turnovers (11 fumbles, 17 interceptions) in 2024, the second-most in the SEC and tied for the fifth-most in Division I last season. Alabama was one of just six teams to force at least 28 turnovers in 2024. Over the final eight games, the Tide forced 20 takeaways (eight fumbles, 12 interceptions), the fourth-most turnovers gained in Division I in that span.

MARGIN FOR VICTORY: Alabama finished the 2024 season with a plus-7 turnover margin. That total tied for the 31st-best ratio in the FBS and was the second-best figure in the SEC during the '24 campaign.

TURNOVERS, TURNOVERS, TURNOVERS: Alabama has forced at least one turnover in 123 of the last 140 contests (dating back to the start of the 2015 season). During the current run, Alabama has forced 223 turnovers (142 interceptions, 81 fumbles) and returned 43 of those miscues for touchdowns.

SHUTOUTS SINCE 2007: Since 2007, Alabama has recorded 28 shutouts, including 13 in Southeastern Conference play. The Crimson Tide produced two shutouts in 2024, including Alabama's 34-0 win over then-No. 21/17 Missouri on Oct. 26 and UA's 63-0 win over Western Kentucky on Aug. 31. The Crimson Tide defense has 13 more shutouts than its nearest competitor, with Ohio State's 15 shutouts the next-closest total in that span.

HARD TO FIND THE END ZONE AGAINST THE TIDE: Since the start of the 2009 season, no team has allowed fewer touchdowns than the Crimson Tide. Alabama has surrendered only 393 touchdowns over the last 221 games. That is 48 fewer than second-place Iowa (441).

KEEPING THE GROUND GAME IN-CHECK: The Crimson Tide defense limited Auburn to just 98 yards rushing in its 28-14 win over the Tigers on Nov. 30 to close out the 2024 regular season. Alabama's defensive unit has held 26 of its last 55 opponents (dating back to 2021) to less than 100 yards rushing. UA has also limited 14 of the last 40 opponents to 80 yards or less dating back to the start of the 2022 campaign, including three times in 2024.

TOUGH SLEDDING ON THE GROUND: Alabama's defense has been a force in the run game since 2007. More recently, the Tide has given up just 104 rushing scores in the last 140 games (dating to the start of the 2015 season). Since 2007, UA has allowed the fewest rushing touchdowns in the nation at 160, a total that is 23 fewer than second-place Iowa (183).

A FRESH START ON SPECIAL TEAMS: Following the graduations of punter James Burnip, long snapper Kneeland Hibbett and placekicker Graham Nicholson, the Crimson Tide is tasked with replacing all three specialists for the first time since 2010.

PUNT OF NO RETURN: The Alabama punting unit averaged just 1.00 yard per return in 2024 to lead all of Division I. The Crimson Tide also maintained a net punting mark of 43.67 that finished second in the SEC and fourth nationally.

SERIES NOTES

THE ALABAMA-FLORIDA STATE SERIES: Alabama and Florida State will meet for just the sixth time in series history when the two teams meet on Saturday afternoon at Doak Campbell Stadium. The Crimson Tide currently holds a 3-1-1 advantage in the series with the last meeting coming on Sept. 2, 2017 in Atlanta, a 24-7 win for UA. Alabama will be making its first appearance at Doak Campbell Stadium since the series began in 1965.

GENERAL NOTES

ALABAMA DEGREES: Alabama has seen significant success on the field over the last 17 seasons and that success has coincided with the Tide's efforts in the classroom. The 2025 squad is no exception as the Crimson Tide enters the season with 16 student-athletes who already have their degree in-hand. The list of student-athletes who enter the 2025 season with an SEC Graduate patch include: Parker Brailsford, Prince Butler, MJ Chirgwin, Josh Cuevas, Blake Doud, Nikhai Hill-Green, Justin Jefferson, Tim Keenan III, Peter Knudson, Jah-Marien Latham, Deontae Lawson, Danny Lewis Jr., Jam Miller, Jaeden Roberts, Ty Simpson and Geno VanDeMark.

CHAMPIONS IN THE CLASSROOM: Alabama's achievements in the classroom have been most impressive during national title seasons. Those six squads (2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2017 and 2020) included 139 student-athletes who had earned their degrees prior to game time.

APR SUCCESS: According to the most recent Academic Progress Rate (APR) numbers that were announced by the NCAA in May of 2025, figures that cover the four-year period extending from the 2020-21 through 2023-24 school years, the Crimson Tide continued to score well above the national cutoff standard. The Crimson Tide boasted 10 teams that led their respective sport in the SEC in APR numbers with 12 UA squads setting or tying all-time program-high marks for the four-year average. Altogether, it adds up to an average APR score of 994.9 across the university's 21 sports. In fact, this year's report marks the fourth consecutive year Alabama's overall average score rated over a 992. A total of seven Alabama teams led the nation in APR rankings (men's and women's cross country, men's and women's golf, softball, women's tennis and volleyball), with women's golf earning the honor for the 14th consecutive year.

OVERTON NAMED TO WUERRFEL TROPHY WATCH LIST: Alabama defensive lineman LT Overton was one of 116 candidates named to the 2025 Allstate Wuerffel Trophy Watch List, the Wuerffel Foundation announced on July 31. Widely regarded as college football's premier award for community service, the Allstate Wuerffel Trophy celebrates student-athletes who use their platforms to serve others and create positive change. Overton has grown into a consistent volunteer, using his platform to benefit the community and underprivileged youth. The Georgia native has made frequent stops at the Tuscaloosa Juvenile Detention Center to mentor at-risk children, also appearing at local schools in town to speak to students regarding the importance of academics. His service commitments also include the Boys & Girls Club and the Two Roads Autism Center, with Overton sponsoring a student at his alma mater, Milton (Ga.) High School, providing equipment funds for multiple sports. Former Crimson Tide offensive lineman Barrett Jones stands as the lone recipient of Wuerffel Trophy, earning the honor in 2011.

SABAN TO THE HALL: Former Alabama head coach Nick Saban was selected as part of the 2025 College Football Hall of Fame class, the National Football Foundation announced on Jan. 10. A seven-time national championship coach, Saban is the fifth Alabama coach to be elected to the College Football Hall of Fame and the 27th inductee in program history. He completed his Hall-of-Fame career at the conclusion of the 2023 season, winning six national championships with Alabama and seven overall with his first title coming at LSU in 2003. A nine-time National Coach of the Year, Saban coached collegiate football for 28 seasons, producing a 297-71-1 (.806) record, including a 206-29 (.877) mark in Tuscaloosa. His teams at Alabama won nine SEC Championships while he captured 11 SEC titles in his career (2001 and 2003 at LSU).

218 NATIONAL TV APPEARANCES IN 232 GAMES: The Crimson Tide's matchup with Michigan on Dec. 31 was the Tide's 218th nationally televised or streamed game since the start of the 2008 season, including every contest since the start of 2014.

ALABAMA vs. No. 1: Alabama owns the NCAA record for the most wins all-time against the Associated Press Poll's No. 1 team since the poll was introduced in 1936. The Crimson Tide has compiled 11 wins against the AP's top-ranked team in program history, most recently against then-No. 1 Georgia in the 2023 Southeastern Conference Championship Game. Prior to that, the Tide downed the top-ranked Bulldogs in the 2021 SEC Championship Game.

AGAINST THE TOP 10: Alabama owns an 86-80-1 (.516) all-time record against teams ranked in the top-10 of the Associated Press Poll. Since the start of the 2008 season, the Crimson Tide has posted a 37-14 (.725) overall record against top-10 teams, including a 22-8 (.733) mark versus the top 10 since the inception of the College Football Playoff.

BEATING THE BEST: The Crimson Tide is 83-23 (.783) against the Associated Press Top 25 since the start of 2008. That record includes last season's 42-13 win over then-No. 14 LSU on Nov. 9, a 34-0 win over then-No. 21 Missouri on Oct. 26 and a 41-34 win over then-No. 2 Georgia on Sept. 28. Alabama owned a 4-2 mark in 2023 with wins against No. 15 Ole Miss on Sept. 23, No. 17 Tennessee on Oct. 21, No. 13 LSU on Nov. 4 and finally against No. 1 Georgia in the SEC Championship Game on Dec. 2. Since 2007, Alabama has 26 wins over AP top-five teams, the most in the country. LSU has produced the next-closest win total with 12.

DEBOER AGAINST RANKED OPPONENTS: Alabama head coach Kalen DeBoer is 15-3 across 18 career matchups with teams ranked in the Associated Press Top 25, including an impressive 5-1 mark against top-10 teams. Added to those totals was the Crimson Tide's 42-13 win over then-No. 14 LSU on Nov. 9, the 34-0 win over then-No. 21 Missouri on Oct. 26 and a 41-34 win over then-No. 2 Georgia on Sept. 28, all last season. DeBoer's first career matchup against a top-25 foe at the FBS level came at Fresno State on Sept. 4, 2021, with the Bulldogs falling at No. 11 Oregon. Following the loss to the Ducks, DeBoer-led teams at Fresno and Washington proceeded to reel off 12 straight wins against ranked foes, including six victories in 2023. The winning streak was snapped following Washington's 34-13 loss to top-ranked Michigan in the 2025 CFP National Championship Game.

BAMA IN THE NFL

LEADING THE WAY TO THE NFL: As of the 2025 NFL Draft, Alabama has had more draft picks over the last 17 drafts (140) than any other program in the nation. The list of 140 features 16 Super Bowl champions, 44 Pro Bowl selections and 20 First Team All-Pro members along with one Defensive Player of the Year, one Offensive and one Defensive Rookie of the Year.

2025 NFL DRAFT: The Crimson Tide saw seven former players selected in the 2025 NFL Draft, including two first-rounders in offensive lineman Tyler Booker (No. 12, Dallas Cowboys) and linebacker Jihaad Campbell (No. 31, Philadelphia Eagles). The third round featured quarterback Jalen Milroe (Seattle Seahawks), while the fourth round saw defensive back Malachi Moore (New York Jets) and linebacker Que Robinson (Denver Broncos) selected by their respective franchises. Day three concluded with the Seahawks adding tight end Robbie Ouzts (fifth round) before defensive tackle Tim Smith was picked by the Indianapolis Colts in the sixth round.

QUICK HITS ON ALABAMA'S NFL DRAFT SUCCESS: Below is a look at some of Alabama's recent success in the NFL Draft.

- Over the last 17 NFL Drafts, Alabama has produced 140 total picks which is more than any other program in the nation. Of those 140, an impressive 49 (35.0 percent) have been first-rounders.
- Since 2000, the Crimson Tide has produced an NCAA-leading 51 first-rounders, a number that is nine better than the next closest school Ohio State (42)
- Since 2010, Alabama has had an NCAA-best 48 players selected in the first round, a number that nearly doubles the next closest school in OSU (29).
- With the selection of Tyler Booker in the 2025 NFL Draft, Alabama has had at least one player selected in the first round of 17 straight drafts (2009-present) to set the new NCAA record. The Crimson Tide passed Miami (1995-2008), who owned the old mark of 14 consecutive first-rounders.
- Alabama has produced multiple first round picks in 14 of the last 17 NFL Drafts with single first-round selections in 2009, 2015 and 2016.

CRIMSON TIDE IN THE NFL: Alabama enters the 2025-26 NFL regular season with 64 players on active rosters (including reserve/practice squad) and is represented on 25 of the league's 32 teams headed into the final week of the preseason. Alabama had 74 total players (including reserve/practice squad) overall and 62 on an active 53-man roster in Week 1 of the 2024-25 regular season, the most of any program in college football. The next closest school for active players was Ohio State with 49 followed by Georgia at 45, LSU with 39 and Michigan at 38 to round out the top five. LEADERS IN THE LEAGUE: Every year, the National Football League allows each of its 32 teams to name up to eight team captains. The start of the 2024-25 season featured nine former Crimson Tide players who were selected as one of the permanent captains for their respective squads. The list of captains to start the year included Will Anderson Jr. (Texans), Bradley Bozeman (Chargers), Jalen Hurts (Eagles), Ryan Kelly (Colts), Pat Surtain II (Broncos), Tua Tagovailoa (Dolphins) and Bryce Young (Panthers) along with both C.J. Mosley and Quinnen Williams for the Jets. Despite featuring Alabama players on their rosters, the Commanders, Cowboys, Packers, Ravens and Seahawks all do not name permanent team captains for the season or select captains on a game-by-game basis.

75 IN A SEASON: A total of 75 former Crimson Tide players appeared in a game and recorded at least one snap through all 18 weeks of the 2024-25 regular season, setting a new NFL record. The 75 tops the previous mark of 71, which was also set by Alabama during the 2023-24 campaign. Prior to that, the Tide became the only program to have 70 former players see game action in any regular season in league history during 2022-23 season. The number of former Alabama players to play in an NFL regular-season contest has now increased each year for eight consecutive seasons starting with 38 in 2016. The 2017 season saw 44 former players earn game action, breaking Alabama's previous record of 40 in 1987, and was followed by 52 in 2018. The total moved to 62 in 2019, followed by 64 in 2020, 68 in 2021, 70 in 2022 and 71 in 2023.

POSTSEASON TIDE: Alabama was well-represented in the 2024-25 NFL Playoffs with a league-high 38 former players spotting 12 of the 14 rosters. The Tide's postseason players were as follows: six apiece on both the Eagles (Dickerson, Hurts, Ricks, D. Smith, Steen, By. Young) and Texans (Anderson Jr., Averett, C. Harris, Metchie III, Smith Jr., To'oTo'o); four apiece on the Chargers (Bozeman, Eboigbe, E. Jackson, Scott), Lions (Arnold, Branch, Gibbs, Ja. Williams) and Ravens (Armour-Davis, Dalcourt, Henry, Humphrey); three apiece on the Commanders (Allen, Payne, Robinson Jr.) and Vikings (Reichard, C. Robinson, Turner); two apiece on the Bills (Cooper, K. Jackson), Packers (Jacobs, McKinney) and Steelers (Fitzpatrick, N. Harris); and one total on the Broncos (Surtain II) and Buccaneers (Braswell).

ALL-PRO DBU: Alabama had three defensive backs selected to the 2024 All-Pro Team, as voted on by the Associated Press. The trio included Patrick Surtain II (cornerback), Xavier McKinney (safety) and Marlon Humphrey (slot corner). Surtain II received the most votes of any defensive player with 49 first-team votes and one second-team selection out of the 50 total voters. Additionally, Derrick Henry was selected to the All-Pro Second Team at running back.

CERTAINLY SURTAIN: Former Alabama defensive back Patrick Surtain II was named the 2024 Associated Press NFL Defensive Player of the Year on Feb. 6, becoming just the second Denver Broncos player in franchise history to earn the honor and the first former UA player to be named Defensive Player of the Year since the award was created in 1971. Surtain is just 10th player in NFL history — joining the likes of Hall of Famers Lawrence Taylor and Reggie White — to earn Defensive Player of the Year and a pair of first team All-Pro selections in his first four NFL seasons. In addition to tying a career high with four interceptions and posting double-digit passes defensed, Surtain II ranked at the top of the league in nearly every advanced metric. Among cornerbacks with at least 400 coverage snaps, Surtain II ranked first in fewest yards allowed (306), fewest yards allowed per coverage snap (0.6), lowest target rate (10.9 percent) and fewest air yards per target (7.1), according to Next Gen Stats.

In his first 10 seasons as a head coach, DeBoer accumulated a record of 113-16, which includes a 25-3 record in his previous stop with the Washington Huskies and three NAIA National Championships at Sioux Falls.

• Entering 2025, DeBoer owned a 15-3 record against top-25 teams across his five combined seasons at Fresno State, Washington and Alabama. He also boasted a staggering 26-8 record in one-score contests across his first 10 years as a head coach.

• DeBoer took on an unprecedented challenge in his first season in Tuscaloosa, replacing arguably the greatest coach in the history of college football. The 2025 campaign saw the Crimson Tide finish 9-4, including a 3-1 record against ranked teams. DeBoer's nine victories matched Frank Thomas (1931) for the most wins by a first-year head coach in Alabama history.

• In 2023, he led Washington to the College Football Playoff National Championship Game with a victory over Texas in the Sugar Bowl. DeBoer's '23 group won the Pac-12 Championship and recorded the most wins in a season in program history (14). Additionally, he won the 2023 Associated Press, AFCA, Eddie Robinson, George Munger, Walter Camp, Sporting News and Home Depot Coach of the Year awards.

• DeBoer became the first Washington coach to win 11-or-more games in consecutive seasons after going 11-2 in 2022 and 14-1 in 2023 and the first to win a bowl game in his first season with the Huskies. That success resulted in back-to-back Pac-12 Coach of the Year honors. His Washington squads also went 10-1 against ranked teams, and he is 18-3 in playoff games as a head coach, including his stint at Sioux Falls.

• In his first year at UW, he led the Huskies to an 11-2 overall record after Washington finished 4-8 the previous year. They posted a 3-0 mark against ranked teams and a win over Texas in the Valero Alamo Bowl. His Huskies swept their three Northwest rivals and finished in a tie for second in the Pac-12, while he was named Pac-12 Co-Coach of the Year.

• Prior to his time at UW, DeBoer spent two seasons at Fresno State, which included the pandemic-shortened 2020 season. Under his guidance, the Bulldogs made great strides on both sides of the ball, posting a combined 12-6 record. Fresno was 4-8 in 2019 prior to DeBoer's arrival.

• In 2021, Fresno State went 9-3 under DeBoer. The 2020 season saw the Bulldogs finish at 3-3 overall.

• Prior to Fresno, DeBoer was on staff at Indiana University as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. He helped guide the Hoosiers to an 8-5 record and a berth in the Gator Bowl. IU's eight victories in 2019 matched their highest wins total in 26 seasons, and IU ranked No. 3 in the Big Ten in total offense. Indiana averaged 432.8 yards of total offense per game, throwing for 302.4 yards per contest while rushing for 130.4.

• DeBoer joined then-head coach Jeff Tedford as the Fresno State offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in 2017. In two seasons in that role, DeBoer helped the Bulldogs to overall records of 10-4 (2017) and 12-2 (2018), along with two division titles, two bowl game victories and the Mountain West Conference Championship in 2018.

• After the 2009 season, he took a job at Southern Illinois as offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach from 2010 through 2013. He moved to Eastern Michigan as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach from 2014 through 2016, helping the Eagles to their third-ever bowl-game berth in 2016. plays (99).

• A school-record setting wide receiver at the University of Sioux Falls (S.D.), DeBoer later led his alma mater to three NAIA National Championships in five seasons as head coach, winning titles in 2006, 2008 and 2009, while also finishing as runner-up in 2007 and making the semifinals in his first season as head coach in 2005. During his five seasons at Sioux Falls, DeBoer compiled a 67-3 overall record, including a 49-1 mark in Great Plains Athletic Conference play. He was NAIA National Coach of the Year in each of his three championship seasons at USF.

• A 1998 graduate of Sioux Falls with a degree in secondary education, DeBoer was a record-setting football and baseball student-athlete. During his football career, he compiled 3,400 yards and 33 touchdowns on 234 career receptions — all school records at the time — and played on the 1996 NAIA Division II National Championship team.

• He also played baseball for the Cougars, batting .520 (still a school record) as a senior in 1998. His career average of .492 is tops in USF history, as are his 37 career homers and .944 slugging percentage.
