2008 Season Preview

Radford women's soccer enters the 2008 season with its goals and expectations set at a high level. Head coach Ben Sohrabi is entering his 13th season at the helm of the program and believes that his Highlanders are ready to contend for a Big South Championship. After an 0-2 start last season, the Highlanders put together a great middle stretch and looked poised to make a run at the Conference championship. However, a number of things didn't go Radford's way down the stretch.

"We got things going and had a really good middle of the season," said Sohrabi. "A couple of out of the ordinary knee injuries and three one-goal setbacks hurt us down the stretch. That left us with a bad taste in our mouths."

Despite the excitement and the level of expectations, Sohrabi realizes there are several things that need to be worked on in pre-season in order to reach their goals.

"We worked very hard on finishing games in the spring and will continue to do so in the preseason," Sohrabi said. "It hurt us down the stretch last year and we don't want to have a repeat of it in 2008."

The Highlanders and Sohrabi quickly put 2007 in the back of their minds and focused on the upcoming 2008 campaign with a strong spring campaign. Several players gained valuable experience, especially the freshmen (12), who as a group were able to see a lot of playing time together.

"A lot of players saw significant playing time in the spring," stated Sohrabi. "We were somewhat young and went through a bit of a rebuilding season. Those freshmen gained a lot of experience in spring which will make us a lot deeper than we have been in the past."

Radford's depth is due in part to the 17 players (nine starters) returning from last year's squad that saw time on the pitch. Despite the loss of four seniors, the Highlanders have a good core of returnees which includes two all-conference honorees in senior McKenzie Vergara and junior Caitlyn Roan and a pair of all-fresh-

men selections in Latrice Lee and SharDavia Bell. To complement those players, the Highlanders added six newcomers. Sohrabi feels the combination of letterwinners and newcomers gives him a very athletic club with good size and speed especially on the outside.

"This is one of the most athletic groups I have had here in 13 years," commented Sohrabi.

Goalkeepers

Radford's sophomore duo of Alex Traughber and Emily Heath will be joined by freshman Lisa Lubke, as the three net minders vying for a starting spot this season.

"We will have good competition at goalkeeper this year," said Sohrabi. "All three have different qualities that we will be able to use in different situations."

Traughber and Heath put together solid freshman campaigns. Traughber, who made 13 starts, saw the majority of the minutes (1113:55) posting a 1.78 GAA and making 48 saves. Heath also made a key contribution with six starts (603:16). She recorded a 1.79 GAA and a .745 save percentage. Both of them used the spring to their benefit, gaining more confidence and being more consistent throughout the season. They combined for a 1.78 goals against average, .717 save percentage and four shutouts.

Lubke, an all-state performer, will be thrown right into the thick of things. The 6-1 Columbus, Ohio native brings good size and ball distribution to the mix.

Defenders

The Highlander defense will have a different look in 2008. Four-year starter Jenna Ramer has graduated and two-year starter Jackie Cozza is making the move to the midfield. To counter those losses, a couple of veteran midfielders, Caitlyn Roan and Jill Boyer, will be making the move to the back. They will join returning starters, junior Amanda Heins and senior Corin O'Donnell.

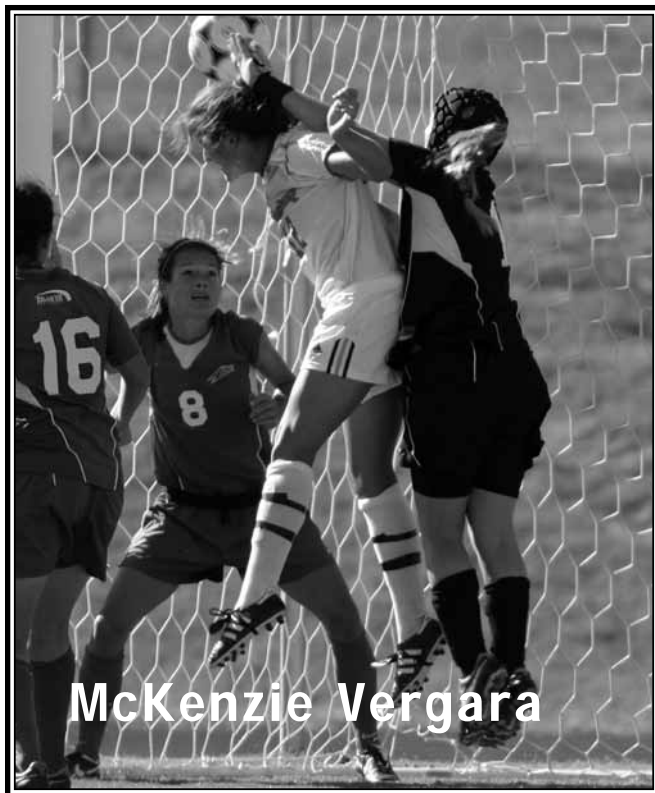
Sophomore SharDavia Bell and red-shirt freshman Tayler Shull also saw time in the back last season. A couple of red shirts will add depth to the bench, a luxury Sohrabi did not have in 2007.

The addition of Roan and Boyer will give the Highlanders more experience and speed, solidifying the back four. Boyer, who brings speed to the outside back position, was third on the team with five assists as a sophomore. Roan, a second team All-Big South selection in 2007, is familiar with the back. She made the move late in the 2007 season when a rash of injuries plagued the team. Roan, who tallied three goals and four assists last year, provides Radford with a smart central defender, who will distribute well from back while providing Radford with a scoring threat.

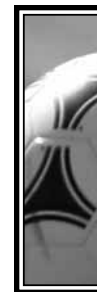
Heins gives Radford experience in the back with 17 starts at central defender last season and 29 starts in her first two seasons in the Red and White. Heins is coming off a late season injury. She missed two matches towards the end of year, but was able to finish the season on the pitch and has a full summer of rehab under her belt.

O'Donnell is the other returning starter. She played in every match last season, making 16 starts. A three-year veteran, O'Donnell has suited up for 48 matches and provides some versatility, playing either in the middle or on the outside. She also provides an ability for a long throw in that can get Radford out of its defensive third or set up a scoring opportunity in its offensive third.

Bell and Shull add speed and athleticism to the mix. As freshmen last season, they both made significant contributions. Bell played in all 19 matches and made two starts. Shull, a Radford High School product, worked her way into the starting lineup five matches into the season, but an injury against Eastern Kentucky sidelined her for the rest of the year. Both will be key factors in the backfield.

Two other freshmen from last year's squad, Kayla Enterline and Molly Hill, did not play in 2007. After valuable minutes during the spring helped them get acquainted to the college game, the duo will provide depth to the position.

Midfielders

With the movement of Roan and Boyer to the backfield, the Highlander midfield will also have a different look to it in 2008. The pair of starters moving into the midfield are senior McKenzie Vergara and junior Jackie Cozza. A two-time all-conference forward, Vergara will be making the transition to outside midfielder for her senior season. Her experience will add some offensive punch to the position. In 2007, she netted nine goals which were second on the team and sixth in the Big South. In her career, Vergara also has found the scoring touch during conference matches, scoring 11 of 20 collegiate goals against Conference foes.

Starting all 37 matches in the back at Radford, Cozza brings a physical presence to go along with her experience. She has the ability to control the middle, using her size and strength to win balls through the air.

Even though there will be a different look, some familiar faces will roam the middle for Radford.

Senior Laura Culver has patrolled the midfield as a starter (55 starts) for the past three seasons. A technically sound central midfielder, Culver's leadership and experience in the middle will be that position's success on the field. In 2007, she added a little offense to her game, tying Boyer for third on the team with five helpers.

They will be joined by sophomore Kathleen Jarvis who was a key reserve off the bench last season and redshirt freshman Chelsea Webb who missed the season with an injury. A pair of newcomers, Jennah Yunger and Maryellen Derenda, will also be in the mix.

Jarvis saw action in 16 matches and made one start during her freshman campaign. Webb suffered an injury during her senior year of high school and spent the last year rehabbing and getting into game shape. Coming off good springs, both bring good size to the table and will contribute to the position.

Yunger and Derenda are a pair of newcomer that will help out tremendously. Yunger, who transferred from Western Carolina, has a good understanding for the game and plays the possession game well. Derenda, a 5-10 freshman, is an all-around athlete from Osbourn Park High School who will challenge for a starting position. She has good size and is tremendous in the air, making her a great target on corner kicks and free kicks.

Forwards

Of the returning starters, sophomore speedster Latrice Lee will be expected to build on her successful freshman year. Lee tallied seven goals and six assists, while scoring a lot of key goals for Radford.

With the loss of leading goal scorer Brianna Kipper (13 goals, 9 assists) and the move of Vergara to the midfield, Lee will be the go-to person up top.

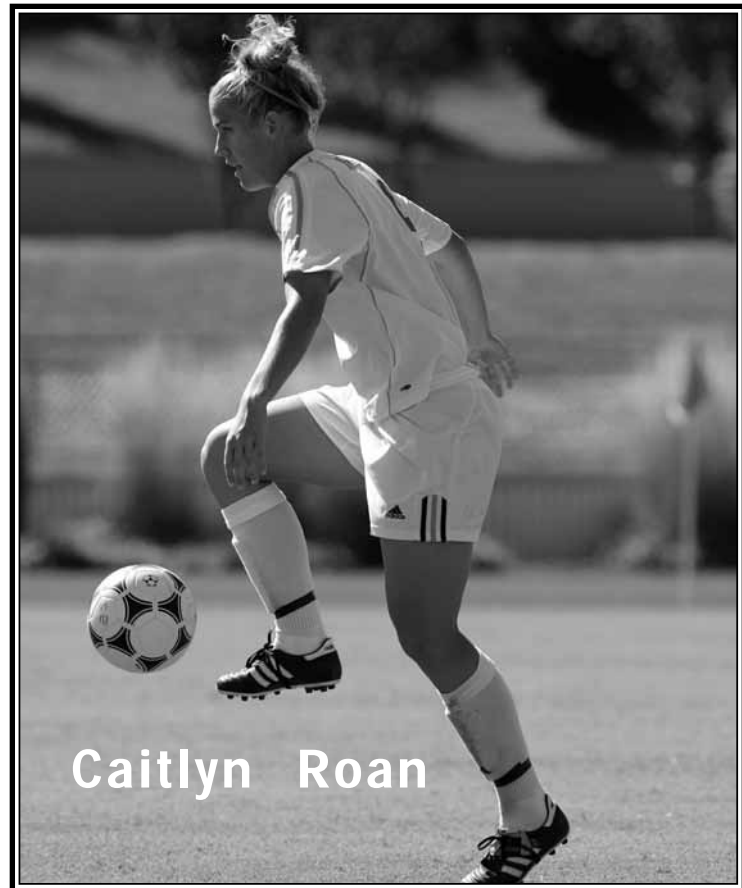
"We are very deep at forward," said Sohrabi. "There will be a lot of good competition for playing time which in turn will make us even better."

Junior Justine Dugger will battle for a starting position after being a key contributor off the bench (36 matches) the past two seasons. With the ability to strike the ball, Dugger scored a career high four goals in 2007.

Other returnees include senior Erin Michael, and sophomores

Jourdan McDaniel and Wanda Noblin who combined to play in 15 matches last year. Noblin improved tremendously, opening the eyes of the coaching staff during the spring. Michael and McDaniel play well with their backs to the goal. Michael is a good distributor, while McDaniel plays well in the air.

More of the depth can be contributed to three of the incoming freshmen, Melony Davis, Katie Douez and Ashley Johnson. Davis, who hails from Ashburn, Va., gives the Highlanders a good target player who is good in the air and has the knack to find the open player. A Woodbridge native, Douez is a dangerous forward who strikes the ball well with both feet. Johnson, a Springfield, Va. native, brings a lot of speed to the table and is a very advanced soccer player.

Schedule

Radford will play a challenging schedule for the upcoming season.

"We will be tested early on in the season," stated Sohrabi. "After the first seven non-conference matches we will be able to see where we are and what we need to work on."

After seeing the likes of Evansville, Old Dominion, Mount St. Mary's and Marshall, the Highlanders will venture into Big South play towards the end of September. Radford closes out the season with nine of its last 11 matches in conference play before competing in the Big South Tournament at High Point from Nov. 6-9.

"This will be a challenging year in the Big South," commented Sohrabi. "The Conference is getting better and I have a lot of respect for the all the other coaches in this league."

Ben Sohrabi, Radford's all-time winningest women's coach, is entering his 13th season at the helm of the Highlanders. He has guided Radford to two Big South Championships and two NCAA Tournament appearances. He has been awarded for his success with a pair of Coach of the Year honors and three of his athletes have been named Player of the Year in the last seven seasons.

In 2006, Sohrabi became Radford women's soccer's all-time winningest coach and reached the 100-victory plateau at the University.

Sohrabi reached both milestones on the road. On Sept. 23, Radford defeated Charleston Southern, 3-2 for his 98th win, surpassing Don Staley. He notched his 100th Radford victory when the Highlanders downed the Bulldogs of South Carolina State, 4-0 on Oct. 8.

Two seasons earlier, Sohrabi notched his 100th career win against his alma mater, Maryville College. The Highlanders shut out the Lady Scots, 4-0 on Sept. 7, 2004 in Maryville, Tenn.

In 2002, he coached the Highlanders to a 15-5-1 record, tying them for the second highest win total in school history, and a second NCAA Tournament appearance in his tenure. He earned Big South Coach of the Year honors and had five of his players named to the All-Conference teams, including Big South Player of the Year Nikki Porter.

He also has several accomplishments under his belt while at Radford. It started with a school-record 16 wins in 1997, followed by a NCAA Tournament berth for the first time in 14 years in 1998. That Tournament berth was earned after the Highlanders claimed their first ever Big South Tournament Championship. In 1999, he directed RU's magical 6-0 run through the Big South Conference to win the regular-season title, firsts in the program's history. All of these accomplishments completed a remarkable turnaround which began upon Sohrabi's arrival 13 years ago.

Sohrabi landed at Radford in 1996 inheriting a team coming off its worst season in school history. His 1996 team started slowly but finished strong, generating positive momentum that

led to landmark seasons in 1997 and 1998.

Sohrabi's hard work paid dividends in 1997 when he led his Highlanders to a school-record 16 victories, earning coach of the year honors from the Virginia Sports Information Directors (VaSID) Association in the process.

His effort in 1998 may have been more impressive. As injuries mounted in the opening weeks of the season, the Highlander boss kept his squad focused on the long-term goal of winning the Big South title. That effort paid off as the Highlanders finished strong to win the tournament title on their way to an 11-8-2 overall mark.

In 1999 things all came together, as the Highlanders, who were picked to win the league, completed their run through the BSC regular season with a perfect 6-0 record only to be stopped by Liberty, 1-0, in the in the semifinals of the Big South Tournament.

Sohrabi previously served as head coach at Lambuth University in Jackson, Tenn. Sohrabi led Lambuth to a 19-16-2 record in only two seasons after taking over a program in disarray. In 1995, he guided the Eagles to a 16-4-2 record and their first national ranking, 27th overall.

Sohrabi is a 1992 graduate of Maryville College, where he was a standout from 1988-91, earning All-South honors in 1991. From 1992-93, he served as executive director of the professional Nashville Metros in the U.S. Indoor Soccer League. He then returned to his alma mater as the assistant men's and women's coach from 1993-94. Sohrabi also played semi-pro soccer for six seasons.

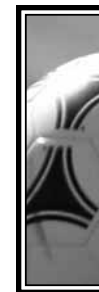

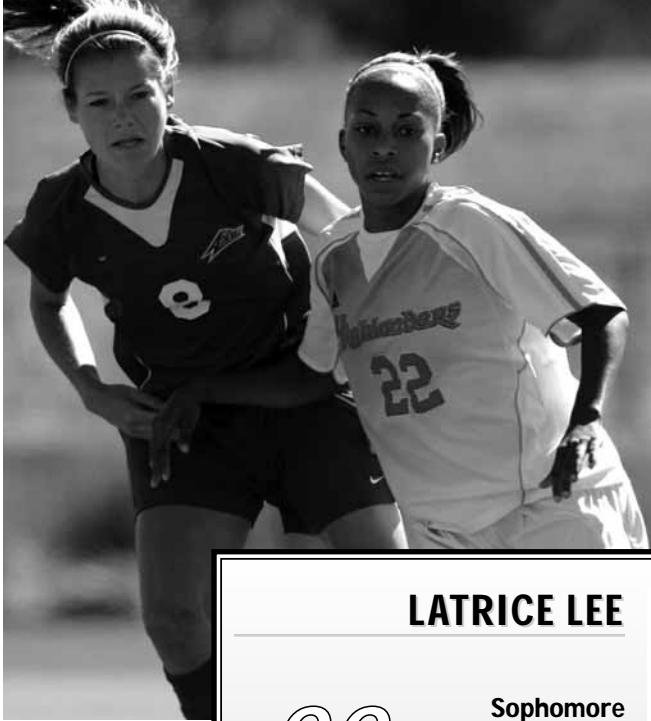

RADFORD WOMEN'S SOCCER

As Radford women's soccer enters its 28th season of competition, it has established itself as one of the top programs in the Big South Conference. The Highlanders, who have won two Big South Championships, have posted the most conference (48) and overall (138) wins of schools that have played in five or more Big South seasons. They have also recorded the most 15-plus victory seasons (three) of any Conference school and have the second most 10-plus win seasons (six).

A total of 51 Highlanders have been named all-conference. Radford boasts five players of the year (the most by any school), including the first ever in Sue Williams and the first back-to-back recipient in Nikki Porter. It has also had two rookies of the year, two coaches of the year, two tournament MVPs and one scholar-athlete of the year.

Prior to the Big South, the Highlanders had plenty of success. The 1983 and 1985 teams finished ranked in the top 25, while the 1987 team was the first to reach the NCAA regionals.

Under the guidance of Don Staley, Radford's program took off, posting seven winning seasons from 1985 through 1993. During that stretch, they defeated the likes of Virginia, North Carolina State and Texas.

In 1981, Tommy Lillard was named the first head coach. The team went 2-2-1 against varsity competition. Will Iandolo followed winning seven games in 1982 and six in 1983, which had them finish 19th in the polls. After Randy Jones led Radford in to an 8-7-1 record in its first season of Division I, Don Staley took over and in his first season, led the Highlanders to a 14-7-1 record and a final ranking of 14th in the NCAA poll. Staley also led RU through its first season in the Big South, finishing second with a 6-1 record.

Ben Sohrabi took over the reigns in 1996 and in his second season (1997) led Radford to its most wins in school history, finishing with a 16-3-1 record. His success continued in 1998 with Radford's first Big South Tournament Championship and in 1999 with its first undefeated Conference regular season. In 2002, he led them to their second Conference championship and posted the second most wins in school history with 15.

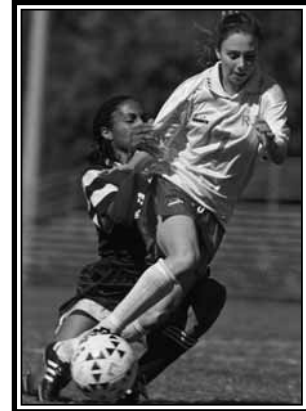

Patrick D. Cupp Memorial Stadium was completed in 2003 and quickly became one of the premier soccer and track and field stadiums in the Southeast.

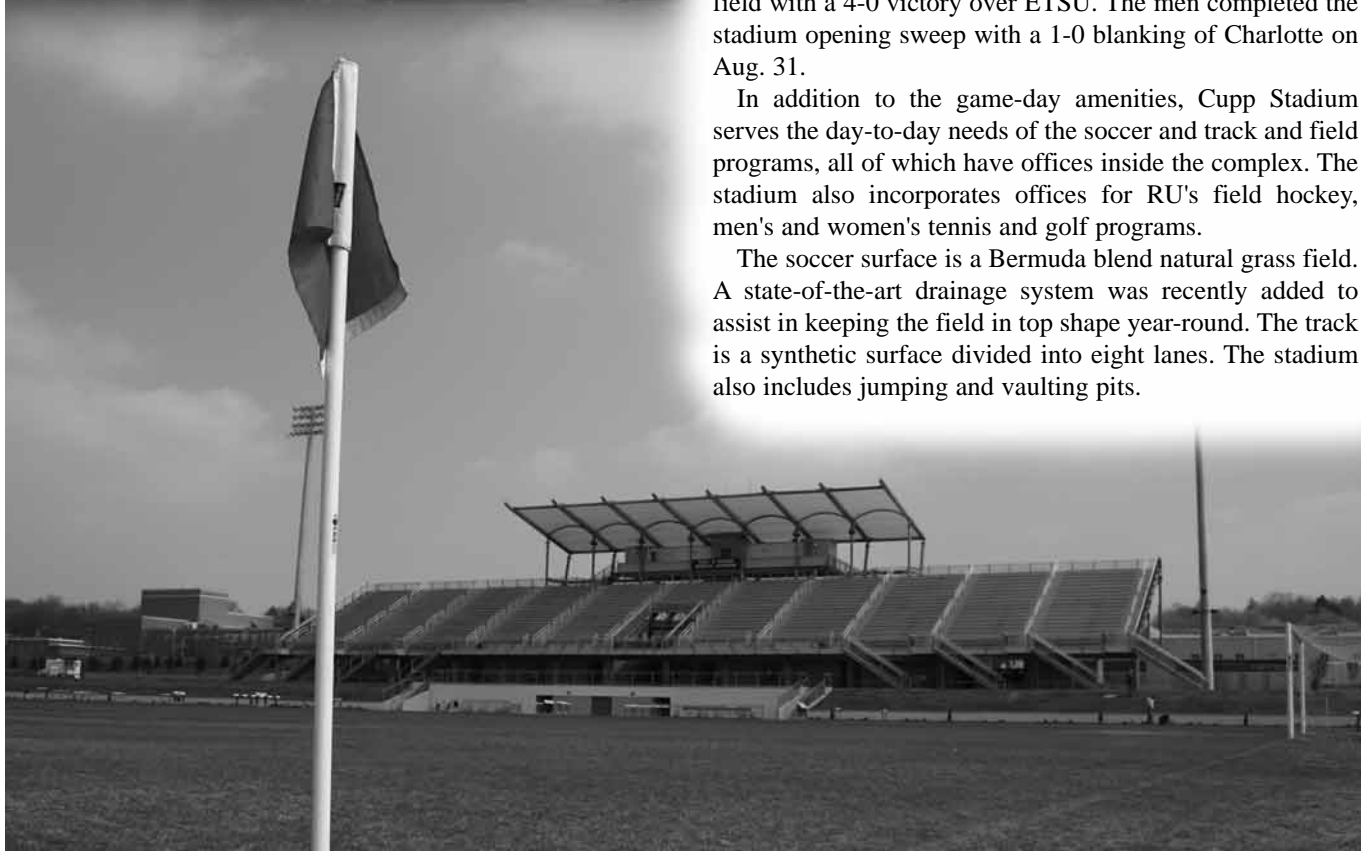
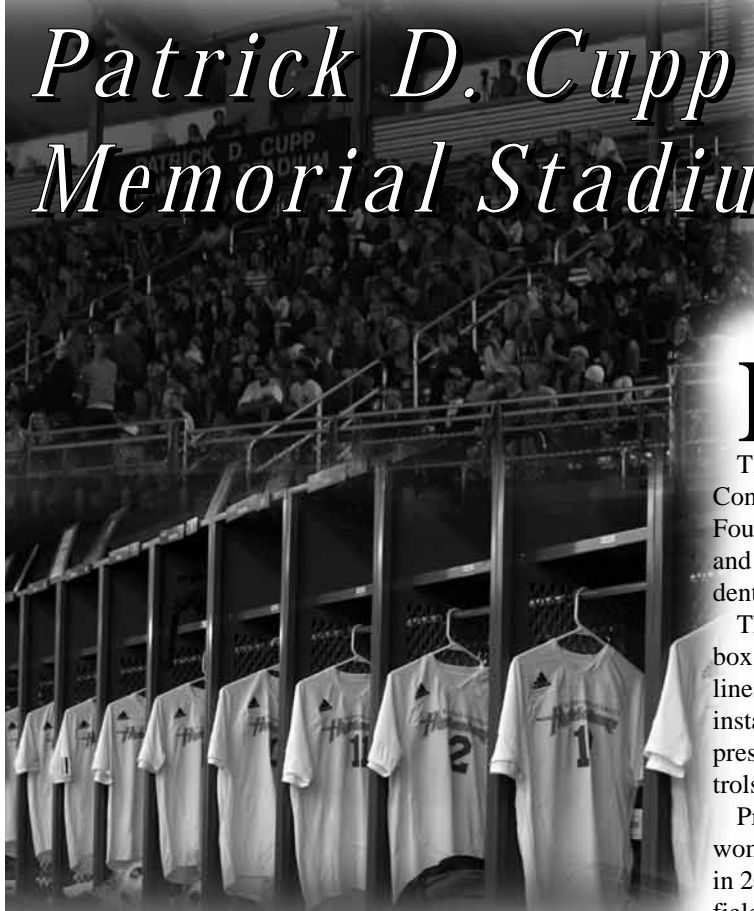
The largest soccer/track facility in the Big South Conference, Cupp Stadium has seating for 5,000 spectators. Four large locker rooms, an on-site athletic training room, and a dedicated laundry room highlight the amenities for student-athletes and teams.

The facility also includes a large, fully functional press box with dedicated storage and restrooms. Standard phone lines wireless and hard-wired internet connections were installed to serve all possible media needs. In addition the press box houses the stadium's leading edge scoreboard controls and sound system.

Prior to the completion of the bleachers, the men's and women's soccer teams began competition at Cupp Stadium in 2002. On Aug. 30, 2002, the women's team christened the field with a 4-0 victory over ETSU. The men completed the stadium opening sweep with a 1-0 blanking of Charlotte on Aug. 31.

In addition to the game-day amenities, Cupp Stadium serves the day-to-day needs of the soccer and track and field programs, all of which have offices inside the complex. The stadium also incorporates offices for RU's field hockey, men's and women's tennis and golf programs.

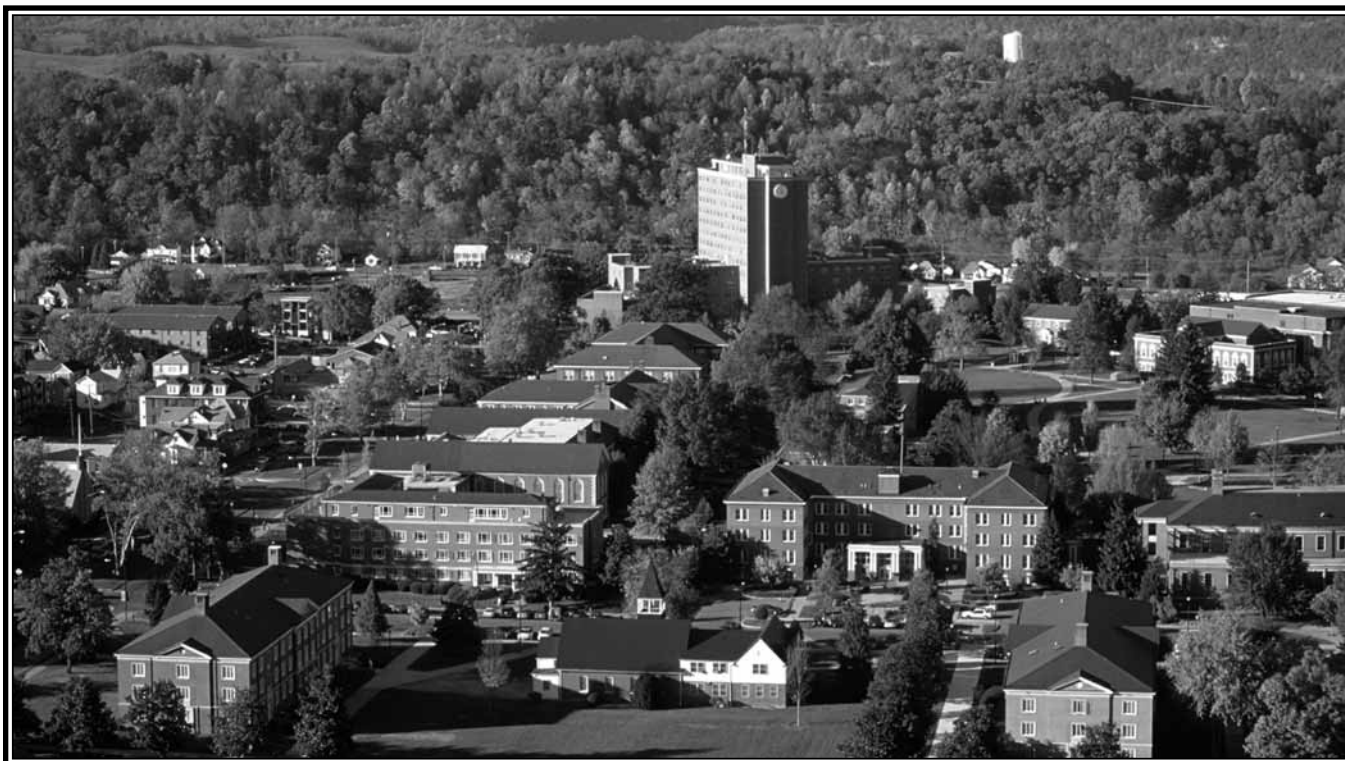
The soccer surface is a Bermuda blend natural grass field. A state-of-the-art drainage system was recently added to assist in keeping the field in top shape year-round. The track is a synthetic surface divided into eight lanes. The stadium also includes jumping and vaulting pits.

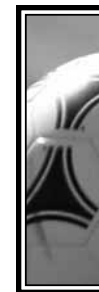
Across the Curriculum and the Oral Communications Program prepare students to be lifelong learners.

The Galax, Va., native joined Radford with more than 30 years of experience in state government, the corporate and legal arenas and higher education.

Upon assuming the presidency, President Kyle immediately focused on leading the university's initiative to become one of the top 50 masters universities in the nation. The Radford University strategic plan "7-17", completed in 2007 at her direction, identifies four strategic directives -- the investment in people, programs, global and local society and the future of Radford University.

Under President Kyle's leadership, the university also added its first doctoral program with an emphasis in rural mental health and launched an initiative to grow graduate college student enrollment by offering additional doctoral and masters level programs. She hired the university's first provost and created two new vice presidential areas of responsibility, Information Technology and University Relations. The Radford University Board of Visitors, at Kyle's request, has increased its membership by four positions to provide an opportunity for more diversity and leadership innovation within the governing body.

A graduate of Guilford College, she earned a Juris Doctorate from the University of Virginia and an MBA from the College of William

The Radford University athletic program offers 19 varsity sports, eight for men and 11 for women: men's and women's basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, tennis, indoor and outdoor track, along with field hockey, swimming, softball and volleyball for women, and baseball for men.

The Dedmon Center and the outdoor athletic facilities, which surround the multi-purpose building are the award-winning focal point of a program that has grown rapidly the last three decades.

The athletic program has grown dramatically since 1974-75, when men's sports were first offered on a varsity level. Growth of the program has been rapid, but not random. Each step has been carefully controlled, with new sports being added only to meet existing demands and only after assurances for a quality operation could be met. The result is a well-balanced and highly successful program.

Radford currently competes in the Big South Conference. A charter member of the young league, Radford has won 33 League titles in nine different sports and has advanced to NCAA postseason play in six sports.

Highlander athletics offers strong support for its student-athletes. From academic advising to compliance services, Radford gives its student-athletes the support needed to be successful in the classroom. Radford's athletic training and strength and conditioning programs allow the student-athletes to compete at their best possible level.

A true team atmosphere, the Highlander family consists of each and every Radford student-athlete past and present, the coaches and athletics staff. Support for each program starts from within athletics and reaches out into the general university population and the community at large. Student-athletes and staff support each other, across sports, into training and the weightroom. ATHLETIC TRAINING

The Sports Medicine department within Radford University Athletics is comprised of Certified Athletic Trainers, Licensed physicians and several other health care professionals who collaborate to optimize performance and provide health care for the student-athletes competing on 19 intercollegiate teams. This health care delivery team works together in the prevention, diagnosis, and intervention of emergency, acute, and chronic medical conditions involving impairment, functional limitations, and disabilities.

Under the direction of Dave Jager ATC, the Athletic Training staff, certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association Board of Certification, and licensed by the Commonwealth of Virginia, work out of two athletic training facilities. They provide physical medicine and rehabilitative services for the student-athletes throughout the day, as well as first responder professional rescue services at the teams' practices and competitions. Various other responsibilities include: travel with teams; drug testing coordination, appropriate health care referral, supervision, education, and evaluation of students enrolled in the Athletic Training Education Program (ATEP); and education of student-athletes and coaches in numerous health-related areas.

The Athletic Training Department could not operate without the assistance of medical personnel outside of the university. The addition of two physicians' weekly visits to the athletic training room has significantly enhanced the program. Dr. Delmas Bolin, a physician specializing in Sports Medicine, serves as the Head Team Physician. He visits the athletic training room on a weekly basis to examine and treat student-athletes. He also provides medical assistance at various intercollegiate contests. Dr. James Lebolt, an orthopedic surgeon, and Associate Team Physician provides expertise in his field. Dr. Lebolt is well regarded by his peers in providing quality up to date surgical procedures. Both physicians are of great asset to the Athletic Department.

COMPLIANCE

Compliance with NCAA regulations is of the highest priority to Radford University and the Department of Athletics.

The purpose of the Radford Compliance Office is to ensure the University's nearly 300 student-athletes and coaches abide by the NCAA Division I rules and regulations; while also educating university staff, alumni, boosters, and donors.

Prior to a prospective student-athlete's arrival to RU, the Compliance Office confirms each individual's eligibility to practice, compete and receive financial aid at the NCAA Division I level. During one's tenure at Radford, the Compliance Office continually advises and monitors each student-athlete's progress towards a successful graduation.

Additionally, the Radford Compliance Office is committed and compelled to enforce the rules and regulations in the areas of recruiting, amateurism, financial aid, and extra benefits. The Radford Office works closely with each of the team's coaches in these areas and notifies the NCAA and the Big South Conference of all violations - should they occur.

The importance of following all NCAA guidelines is imperative to maintaining the integrity of Radford and its intercollegiate athletics. Strict adherence to rules is a never-ending process that requires the combined effort of the Department of Athletics, student-athletes, coaches, and the entire university community. Therefore, in order to protect the eligibility of current and prospective student-athletes, the Radford Compliance Office urges you to "Always, Ask before you Act."

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

A component that is vital to the Radford athletic program is the strength and conditioning program directed by Strength and Conditioning Coach Max Appleby. Highlander Athletics have long been recognized as one of the leaders among mid-Atlantic schools in its conditioning and strength training. It has been an instrumental part in the success of Radford University sports through the years.

Under the direction of Appleby and assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach Kim Faulkner,

The Student-Athlete Support Services functions in conjunction with the Learning Enhancement Center (LEC) where student-athletes come to receive academic support and

meet required study time. Any student-athlete is welcome and various resources are provided for all student-athletes. Basic academic advising, study skills, time management, career assistance and goal setting is emphasized within the LEC.

All student-athletes sign a Buckley Amendment Release form at the beginning of the academic year. This form allows the Student-Athlete Support Staff to obtain grades and speak with professors and faculty on campus about the student-athletes performances. Mid-term grades are also received on all student-athletes. Any student-athlete not meeting our set academic standards will have progress reports sent to those professors so that more information can be gathered. Tutors can be requested or assigned at anytime to ensure proper support is being provided to the student-athlete. Any student-athlete deemed at-risk will have required meetings with the Student-Athlete Support Staff and increased contact with professors will be made to ensure the student-athlete is meeting their academic goals necessary to continue at the collegiate level.

Not only does Radford University have some of the most picturesque athletic venues in the Big South, it has some of the best in the mid-atlantic region.

One of the most spectacular of these facilities is the Dedmon Center, a state-of-the-art recreational and convocation complex, opened in 1981. The center was only the tenth permanent structure with an air-supported fabric roof built in the United States, and its superb design and versatility have made it an eye-popping addition to campus.

Surrounding the Dedmon Center, which recently underwent a multi-million dollar renovation, are several adjoining facilities, including intramural soccer, football and softball fields and intercollegiate fields and courts for baseball, softball, field hockey and tennis. The natatorium and tennis courts are also intercollegiate venues for the Highlanders, but both facilities are also available for general student use.

The most recent and arguably most noticeable of these facilities is Patrick D. Cupp Memorial Stadium. Completed in 2003, the stadium serves as the home for Radford soccer and track and field. It contains locker rooms, offices, a training room and ample and game operations space.

BIG SOUTH CONFERENCE

For 25 years, the Big South Conference has been a progressive, NCAA Division I athletic Conference reflecting the energy and growth of the Southeastern United States. Founded in 1983, the Big South has matured into a competitive leader in college athletics, actively pursuing excellence both on the field of play and in the classroom. Based in Charlotte, N.C., the Big South Conference's growing presence as an NCAA Division I athletic league is evident by competitive success on the national stage, innovative marketing and media partnerships, increased television packages, the enhancement of the quality of the student-athlete experience, and strategic planning that has carried the Big South through the first decade

of the 21st Century.

Celebrating its 25th year of existence in 2008-09, the Big South Conference continues to emerge by providing quality athletic competition while intentionally fostering the academic, personal, social, athletic and leadership development of each student-athlete. The League consists of 10 member institutions: Charleston Southern University, Coastal Carolina University, Gardner-Webb University, High Point University, Liberty University, Presbyterian College, UNC Asheville, Radford University, Virginia Military Institute and Winthrop University.

The Big South Conference was formed on August 21, 1983, when Charleston Southern (then Baptist College) Athletic Director Howard Bagwell and Augusta President George Christenberry initially began recruiting members into the Big South. One month later, Dr. Edward M. Singleton was selected as the League's first Commissioner and continued to solicit new members. The League's seven charter members were Armstrong State, Augusta, Campbell, Charleston Southern, Coastal Carolina, Radford and Winthrop.

In 1989, George F. "Buddy" Sasser replaced the retiring Dr. Singleton as Commissioner. Under Sasser's leadership, the Conference implemented its public relations and compliance programs, and introduced its first-ever men's basketball television package, featuring the Big South competing among some of the finest teams in the nation. In August 1996, Kyle B. Kallander replaced Sasser as the League's third Commissioner, and in his 11 years at the helm of the Big South, Kallander has been instrumental in aggressively promoting the Conference to new levels. He developed the Big South Marketing Group, he brought television coverage to Big South women's basketball, baseball and softball for the first time in Conference history and created the Big South Television Network in 2001 as a television syndicate for the League. In addition, Kallander has solidified membership with the addition of High Point in 1999, Virginia Military Institute in 2003 and future members Gardner-Webb and Presbyterian in 2008. Kallander's long range vision has also included technological advancements, as the Conference introduced its first live event video streaming in 2005 and has since expanded its video offerings to all sports.

Entering the 2008-09 season, the Conference will have an expanded lineup on regional network SportSouth, in addition to a partnership with the fledgling national network, The America Channel, allowing the Big South to televise its largest array of events and sports in its history. The Conference also boasts relationships with FSN South, Comcast SportsNet (CSN), Comcast Sports Southeast (CSS), College Sports Television (CSTV), Fox College Sports (FCS) and the ESPN family of networks, which will also host the 2009 Men's Basketball Big South Championship.
