CREDENTIALS — All members of the media covering the game in a working capacity must seek appropriate credentials in advance from Kevin MacConnell for all home games [RU or Giants Stadium]. We would appreciate receiving these requests as early as possible. Requests for working space in press box and photo passes for the sidelines will be honored from sports editors of daily newspapers and sports directors of television stations only. Requests for working credentials must be made in advance in writing on company letterhead to Kevin MacConnell. Spouses, dates, non-workers, and any one 16 years of age or younger, are not permitted in the press box. Violators will not be tolerated. Credentials for Rutgers road games can also be arranged through Kevin by those members of the media who cover Rutgers on a regular basis.

PARKING — Parking is located next to the bubble, across the street from Rutgers Stadium or in lots 9-11 at Giants Stadium. You should request your parking at the same time you request your game day working credential. If time permits, both will be mailed to you.

PRESS BOX SERVICES — Complete NCAA stats, play-by-play, and quote sheets are all regular services on game day. Upon your arrival, you will receive a press folder with game program, flip card, updated stats and game day notes.

POST-GAME INTERVIEWS — Coaches and players, following a 10-minute cooling off period, will be available after each game to members of the media. Player interviews will be held in the locker room located in the new athletic training center while Coach Anderson will be available in a separate room in the athletic training center. A member of the Sports Media Relations department will escort the media to the interview area with 5 minutes to go in the game.

PHONES — A limited number of phones are available in the press box at Rutgers Stadium. The phones are all operator assisted phones. Only credit card, collect calls, or third party billing calls can be made. Please dial 5 and then 0 to make your call. If you wish to order a phone at Giants Stadium, contact Jay Rosenfeld. Only pay phones are available at Giants Stadium unless requested.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS — All player interviews must be arranged through Kevin MacConnell at least one day in advance. Players are available in person on Wednesday nights from 6:00-7:00 p.m. at the Davidson dining hall. Player availability at other times will vary from week to week. A time mutually convenient for the player and the member of the media will be set up by the Sports Media Relations department. Please contact Kevin and he will make every effort to accommodate your requests. There will be no player interviews on Friday.

DICK ANDERSON INTERVIEWS — All interview requests must be arranged through Kevin MacConnell. Coach Anderson will make himself available to the media every Tuesday at the New Jersey-New York Collegiate Football Writers Association luncheons starting at 11:15 [the luncheon begins at 12:00]; Wednesday immediately following practice, and on a Sunday conference call following each game beginning at 3:15 p.m. To be on the conference call, please contact Kevin MacConnell a few days prior to the call. Coach Anderson's availability at other times will vary from week to week.

PRACTICE — Wednesday's practices are open to the media. If you wish to attend a practice session other than Wednesday, please contact Kevin MacConnell and he will make the necessary arrangements. Photographers taking pictures at practices must get clearance through the Sports Media Relations department.

HIGHLIGHTS — Highlights of all Rutgers' home games and selected road games will be made available to the networks at ABC, CBS, and NBC. The newsfeeds are designated News One (ABC), Newsfeed (CBS), and A-News (NBC). Each network will make two minutes of highlights available to all affiliates. Call the Office of Sports Media Relations at Rutgers, (201) 932-4200, for further information.

RUTGERS HOTLINE — The Rutgers Hotline is in service Monday through Friday and will contain interviews with head coach Dick Anderson and Rutgers players throughout the week during the football season.

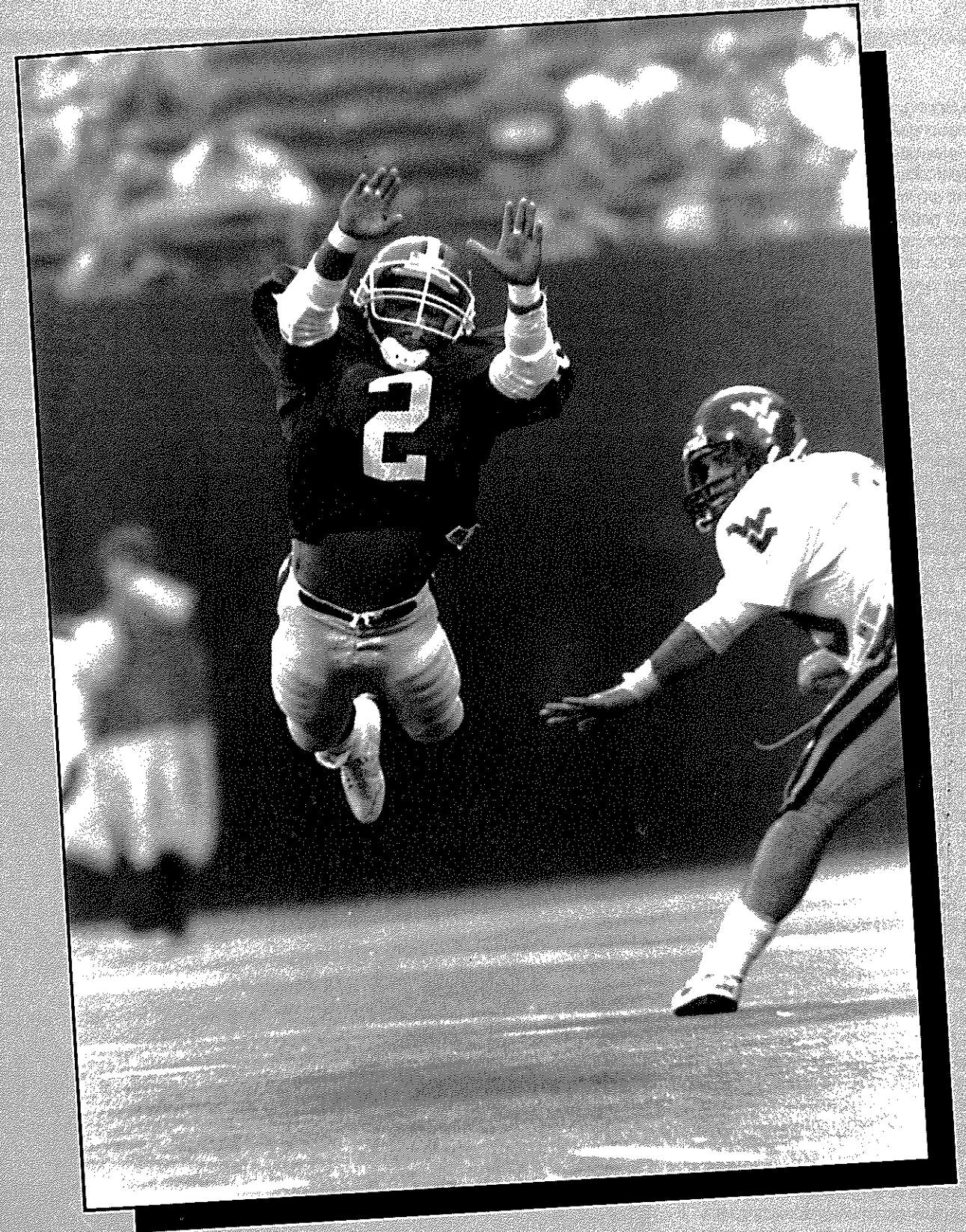
HOTELS — When covering Rutgers home or on the road, hotel accommodations can be made by contacting Kevin MacConnell. Please call at least two weeks in advance.

1987 OUTLOOK

The Spring. Ah, the Spring — 20 on-field sessions of evaluation, of trying to find which players improved, of laying down fundamentals, of experimenting within the system, of watching individual development, of getting ready for the talent-laden opponents, of hoping for the smooth placement of men in the right spots.

Those days of spring practice brought both pain and progress on the charts of Dick Anderson and his coaching staff.

By the time of the spring intrasquad tilt, there would, unfortunately, be three veterans scheduled for extensive rehabilitation and determined unavailable for the 1987 season. Two of these three — running back Matt Prescott and defensive tackle Doug Kokoskie — were keys to the offensive and defensive attacks, respectively, last year. The third, offensive guard Dave Marino, was expected to see a lot of action in the upcoming campaign.

Other injuries during the spring were of the recoverable kind.

Pain aside, there was considerable progress.

"I feel good about our football team in the sense that we have a group of first-line people who have a degree of experience and who know us and our system better than before, with the exception, perhaps, of the quarterback spot," Anderson said as his squad headed into the spring game.

The quarterback spot was one of the spring's concerns and Anderson was happy to be able to give sophomore-eligible Scott Erney a chance to establish himself there. Erney had taken over in last year's fifth game when Joe Gagliardi suffered a career-ending shoulder injury.

"Scott has made significant improvement and has gotten better throughout the spring," Anderson reflected. "I think you're going to see a much better quarterback in Scott in the fall. But still, Scott is a guy who has been around for only half a football season. His better years are ahead."

Anderson still expressed concern about the squad's depth while admitting that "I feel good about the team as we go across that first group.

"My concern is still our depth. . . if we can hold up. We've got to find some people in that second group who are going to be reliable people. You just cannot play a

football season with one team on offense and one team on defense."

Looking at the 1987 schedule, Anderson feels that there are a number of games that can go either way.

"With a twist here and a twist there, we could have a good season; or, with a twist here and a twist there, we could have a poor season."

One closely watched crew in the spring was the linebacking corps which was without, for the first time in four years, the starting duo of Tyrone Stowe and Matt Bachman who combined for 237 tackles in 1986. Junior Pat Udovich and senior Chris Evans won the jobs early and kept the first-line posts through the spring.

Other first-liners who secured defensive spots were junior Carter Giles, a replacement for Kokoskie; junior George Bankos, named the most improved defender; sophomore Scott Miller, who earned a letter as a freshman; and outside linebacker Alec Hoke, a returning starter. A tested defensive backfield returned virtually intact, the veteran unit consisting of junior free safety Derek Baker, strong safety

Darrin Czellecz and the corners, seniors Sean Washington and Jean Austin.

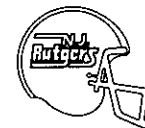
Austin, along with running back Curtis Stephens, were named captains-elect of the squad at the annual off-season get together. Both are fifth-year seniors and, with tight ends Bruce Campbell and Greg Raffaelli, Hoke and Duffy, are the six scholarship athletes who are not among those recruited by Anderson and his staff.

On the offensive side of the ball, the line returns starters John Kutz and Doug Strickland at the guards and part-time starters Steve Tardy and Bill Hiros or Bill Milano at the tackles. Campbell will return to his tight end spot. The only real newcomer will be junior Nick Urda, last year's understudy at center.

Prescott's injury, while creating a huge gap at the tailback spot where he led the Scarlet rushers with 606 yards last year, opens the door for a number of hopefuls who will have to beat out junior Henry Henderson who started the first three games in 1986. Henderson was recovered from a cracked sternum in the spring, but was held from contact. Sophomore

James Cann used the spring game to gain some attention at the spot. After scoring 52 scholastic touchdowns, Cann hit paydirt for the first time as a collegian with a classic nine-yard run for the day's first score, added a couple of other fine bursts and caught three passes.

Stephens returns to the fullback post after putting over 400 rushing yards and over 200 yards receiving last year. His captaincy is well deserved.

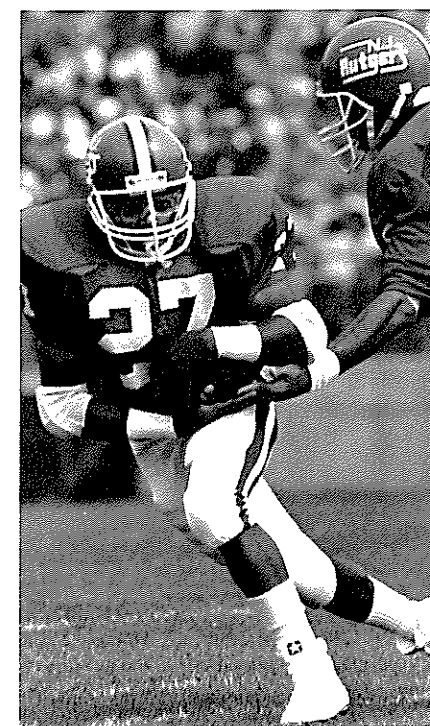
Senior Brian Cobb, who had 966 all-purpose yards last year, will go again as the flanker/returner/runner and will be joined at the other wide spot by Young and junior Tyrone McQueen, who was presented with the most improved offensive player award at the end of the spring sessions.

The spring game, which showcased Erney's fine improvement, also showed off the talents of sophomore QB John Murphy, who was given his first serious attention. While Erney completed 21 of 31 passes for 205 yards and a touchdown, Murphy was 23 for 35 for 163 yards and a score. Junior Doug Giesler held off sophomore Carmen Sclafani's challenge for the placekicking duties by hitting a 33-yard field goal in the game.

The search for depth continued but, after the 20 spring practices, Anderson remained optimistic. "the game is really not that important," said Anderson. "It's the 19 practices that precede it that are important."

Those sessions, arguably, showed the Scarlet Knights to be a stronger and bigger squad with more fine young talent knocking eagerly on the door. Some will emerge, as always, when the first whistle blows.

Quarterbacks: Sophomore eligible Scott Erney took over the generalship of the 1986 squad when Joe Gagliardi suffered a career-ending shoulder injury in the third period of the Penn State game. The 6-2, 190-pound Mechanicsburg, PA, signal-caller started the final six games and finished his first collegiate season with 96 completions on his 190 tosses [.505] for 1,160 yards and six touchdowns. He was intercepted 11 times. Erney had his best outings in back-to-back wins over Army [35-7] and Louisville [41-0]. He hit on 11 of 17 passes for 184 yards and two TDs

against the Cadets and directed his squad to 527 total yards. At Louisville, Erney tossed for four touchdowns, hitting 18 of 28 passes for 223 yards. He threw 42 passes with 23 completions for 237 yards in the finale against Temple. Sophomore John Murphy, given his first serious attention in the spring, and on the basis of a fine display of his considerable skills in the spring game, is an inexperienced but capable back-up. Sophomore Matt Johnson is the third string quarterback.

Running Backs: Seven of eight runners return. Tailback Matt Prescott was last year's ringleader with 606 yards on 155 carries and six touchdowns but was injured late in the spring and will miss the 1987 season. Fifth-year senior Curtis Stephens started all 11 games at the fullback slot and ran for 419 yards on 113 carries, scoring three times and also catching 27 passes for 205 yards. Senior Dan Lipsett [186], junior Mike Botti [154], and sophomore eligible Henry Henderson [129] combined for 469 yards, Henderson playing in only the first three games before suffering a chest injury. Lipsett caught 14 passes for 134 yards, two going for TDs in the Louisville game; Botti,

who picked up a TD on a four-yard run against Penn State, caught a pair of passes; and Henderson had seven receptions. Eric Reid, Roland Banks, and Dwight Giles all saw spot action for the first time. James Cann, Jerry Dennison, and Bart Graf were among last season's recruits.

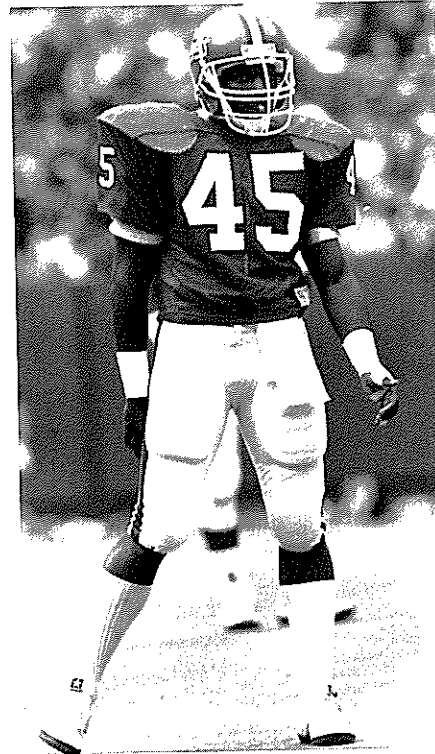
Receivers: A dozen men on the collecting end of passes in 1986 return, half of whom line up at the tight end or wide posts. Senior tight ends Bruce Campbell and junior Greg Alvord combined for 44 receptions, Campbell taking a team-high 30 for 323 yards and one TD and Alvord catching 14 for 141 yards and two scores. Senior Greg Raffaelli should also see considerable action at tight end. Senior flanker Brian Cobb and junior split end Eric Young were 1-2 in yardage with 368 and 331. Cobb grabbed 21 passes and scored four times while Young had 28 catches and tallied twice. In addition, Cobb returned 21 kickoffs for 461 yards and scored on an 88-yarder; he returned 17 punts for 144 yards. Young had 17 kickoff returns for 352 yards. Senior Roy Hoover caught 17 passes as a part-time starter, gaining 198 yards and Tyrone McQueen, had three catches for 38 yards. Six caught passes out of the backfield, Stephens [27-205], Prescott [20-265-1], Lipsett [14-134-2], Henderson [7-50-1], Botti [2-15] and Banks [1-5].

Offensive Line: Second team All-East pick at center, Mike Dillon, and East-West Shrine Classic participant Lee Getz, a three-year starter at a guard spot, will be missed on the front line, but starting tackle John Kutz [Sr. 6-3, 260] and senior guard Doug Strickland [Sr. 6-1, 260] are back. Kutz has been moved to guard this year, replacing Getz. Junior Steve Tardy [6-5, 265] and sophomore eligibles Bill Milano [6-6, 260] and Bill Hiros [6-5, 260] saw considerable action last season earning letters and junior guard Bill Dubiel [6-0, 240] won a letter in a back-up role. Senior Dave Marino [6-3, 240] earned a letter for his special teams work but will miss the season after knee surgery. Junior Nick Urda [6-1, 250] should inherit the center spot with help from sophomore Sydney Crawford [6-0, 265] and, perhaps, Bob Lowther [6-4, 270].

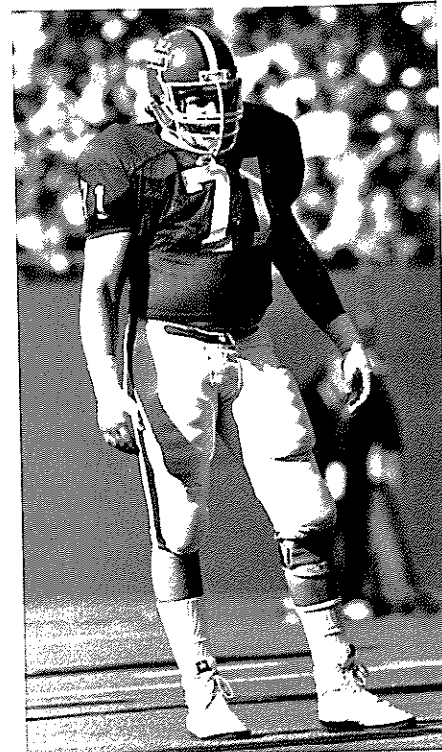

Defensive Line: The interior will be without four-year letterman Harry Swayne, who led the 1986 squad with five sacks and nine tackles for loss, and veteran Mike Fleming. Nose tackle Doug Kokoskie (6-0, 240) reinjured a knee and will miss the 1987 season. But, four others return — junior George Bankos (6-3, 270) and sophomore Scott Miller (6-4, 260) combined for 12 starts, Miller recording four QB sacks and seven tackles for loss. Juniors Carter Giles (6-2, 240) and Chuck Paugh (6-2, 240) also earned letters. Nick Tomkins (6-6, 260) will be a welcome addition after sitting out after transferring from Rice. Bill Mack (6-6, 235) and Marty Mayes (5-11, 235) are among other big youngsters chomping at the bit. Sophomore eligible Joe Savoy and freshman eligible Joe Freed could also see action.

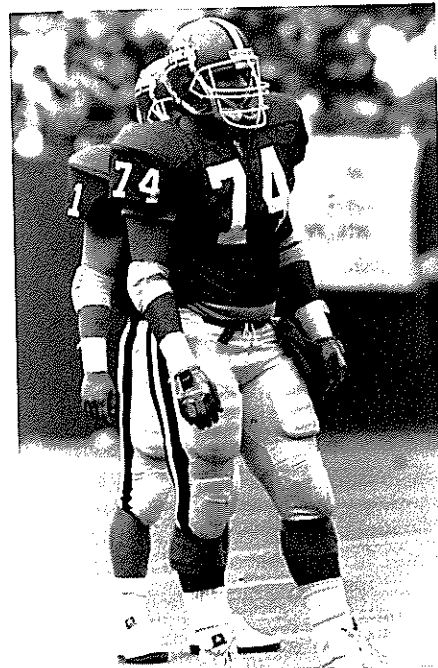
Defensive Ends: Only one defensive end from last year's club has graduated — Paul Halada. Senior Tom Duffy, who had 44 tackles last year, holds the number one spot coming into 1987. Sophomore Tim Lester had a fine spring game and should see plenty of playing time.

Linebackers: A new era will begin with the graduation of Tyrone Stowe and Matt Bachman. Stowe, who earned All-America honors and was the team MVP for two years running while establishing all the Scarlet tackle marks, led the squad with 150 tackles and Bachman was second on last year's list with 87. Just one letterwinner returns on the inside, sophomore eligible Pat Udovich, who had 30 tackles and an interception playing in every game a year ago. Chris Evans was moved inside to lend experience. Sophomore Bob Speidel also saw action and sophomore Chris Pickel, the third Pickel at Rutgers, is expected to follow in his brothers' big footsteps. Speidel and Pickel also had big spring games. On the outside, senior Alec Hoke should rule the roost. The veteran had the third best tackle total (52) last season. Newcomers Mike Conlan, brother of Penn State All-America, Shane, and Rich Humphreys appear to be the outside men of the future.

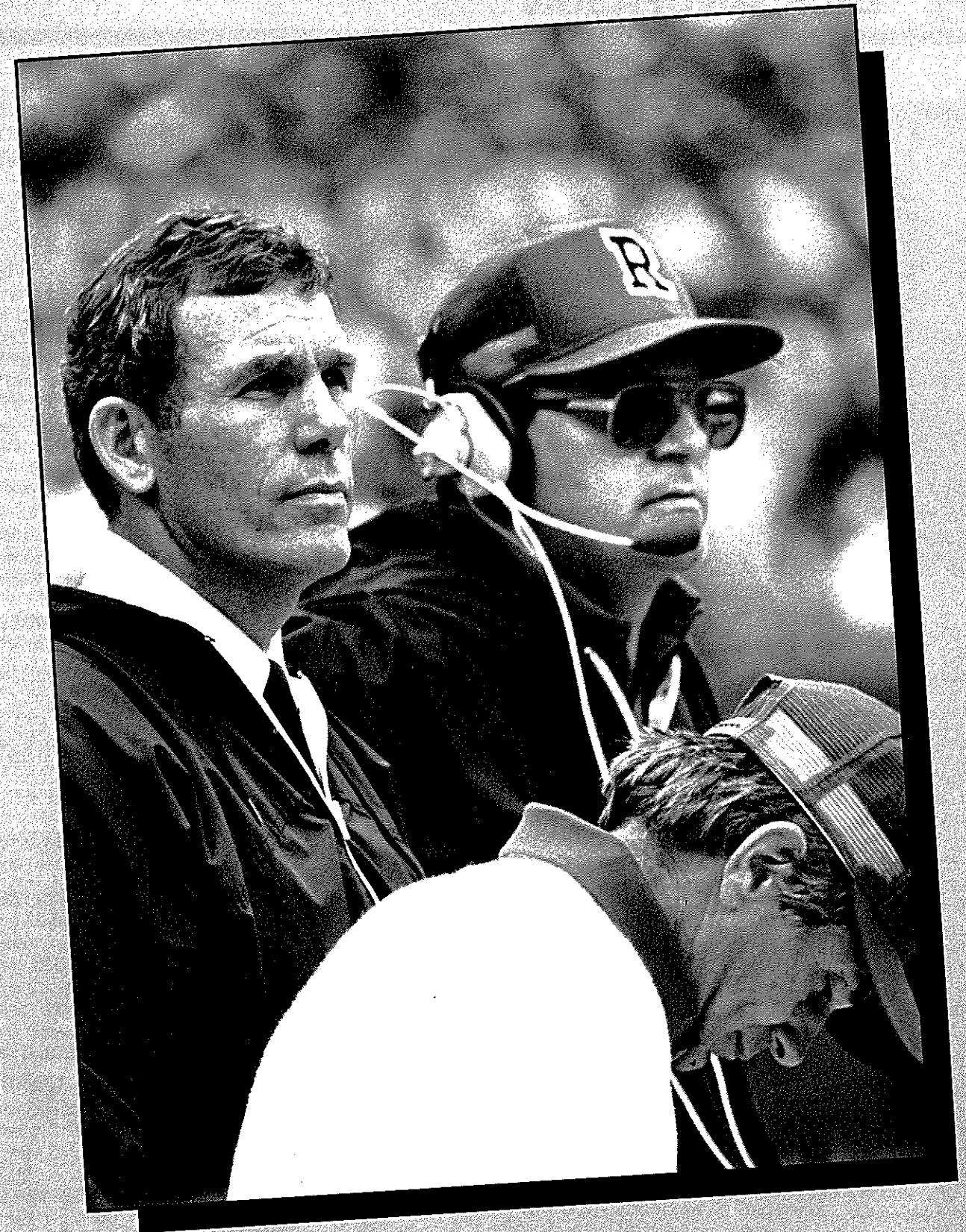
Defensive Backs: Ten men earned letters in the secondary spots in 1986 and only two depart, Luis Moro, a starter at

the strong safety post, and Steve Twamley, a part-time starter at a corner. Junior Derek Baker will return to the free safety spot where he led the secondary group with 47 tackles. Junior Darrin Czellecz, who shared the strong safety spot with Moro, had 40 tackles and a pair of interceptions. Seniors Jean Austin and Sean Washington, along with junior Glenn Miller, all alternated at the starting cornerback posts, Washington recording 45 tackles, Austin, 26, and Miller, 20. Junior Jeff Newman will challenge as will sophomore Vaughn McKoy, both letterwinners. Others who could contribute are sophomore eligible Bernarr Battle and freshman eligible John Blanton.

Specialists: Junior Matt O'Connell has handled all the punting duties for the past two seasons, averaging 39 yards as a freshman and 41.4 last season. He also held for all placements last year. Junior placekicker Doug Giesler won the scoring title with 56 points on 14 field goals and 14 PATs. Junior walk-on Carmen Sclafani is Giesler's back-up. Quarterback Scott Erney will be the back-up punter.

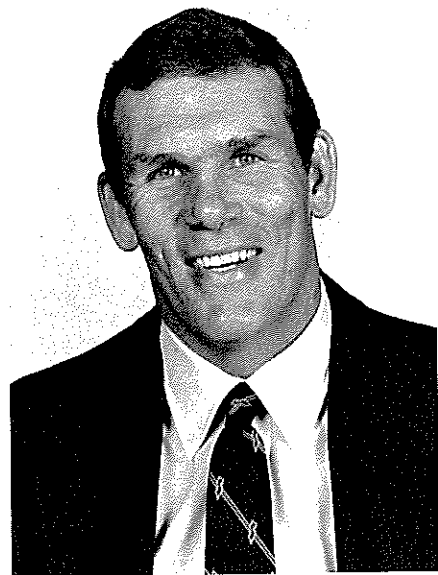

Dick Anderson enters his fourth season at Rutgers perhaps with more optimism than he has allowed himself to show before. Cautiously, however, he throws a twist into the consideration.

"I look at our [1987] football season and I think with a twist here, we could have a very good season, but a twist there, we could have a poor season."

In his first campaign at the State University — his first head coaching season — Anderson saw his squad stay relatively healthy and post a 7-3 record after the two previous Scarlet squads had gone a combined 8-14. The next season, his team was beset by an incredible number of injuries and the record fell off to 2-8-1. Last year, after a 3-0-1 start, quarterback Joe Gagliardi suffered a career-ending shoulder injury and, though the record built to 5-2-1, Rutgers lost the final three games and finished at 5-5-1.

Asked to evaluate his head coaching career and conjecture about 1987, Anderson was hesitant at the hard question but answered a bit surprisingly.

"I really anticipate our season going like the third year — somewhat steady, where we play some good football and we have a chance to win a few games. I would expect this year to be like last year.

"Although I feel good about this team in terms of the first group we have on both sides of the ball, I'm still concerned about the depth factor. Obviously the concern

comes because of the injuries we've had. Sure, this team has a chance to be better than the three previous teams, but I think you have to analyze our schedule and how we'll cope with the depth factor."

This spring, Anderson enjoyed the improvement of sophomore eligible quarterback Scott Erney who "has gotten better throughout the spring. I think you are going to see a much better quarterback this fall. . . He has better understanding, his mechanics are better, and he is more comfortable running the team."

Anderson was also able to give back-up quarterback John Murphy his first "serious" consideration and was pleased that both signal-callers came through with flying colors in the annual spring game.

Erney and Murphy will have to be at their best for a successful Scarlet season, and making athletes the best they can possibly be is a job Anderson has dedicated himself to. His relationship with his players reaches far beyond the practice and playing fields. He involves himself in all facets of their lives, stressing the disciplines he believes are necessary for success on and off the field.

"To achieve anything worthwhile, you have to work at it," he says strongly and the solid statement is received as if indelibly written. "When you go on the field, it's a matter of working at 100 per cent all the time. When you're off the field, it's the same, whether it be in the weight room, the classroom or back in your own room studying.

"If you don't have good work habits, you don't have discipline and you're not going to be successful."

Anderson's messages have a way of getting across, not because of his physical size, which, at 6-4, 220 is imposing, but because of his sincerity and strength of purpose. His words about discipline are delivered in the sure sense that discipline brings the players together and makes them believe in themselves as individuals and as a team.

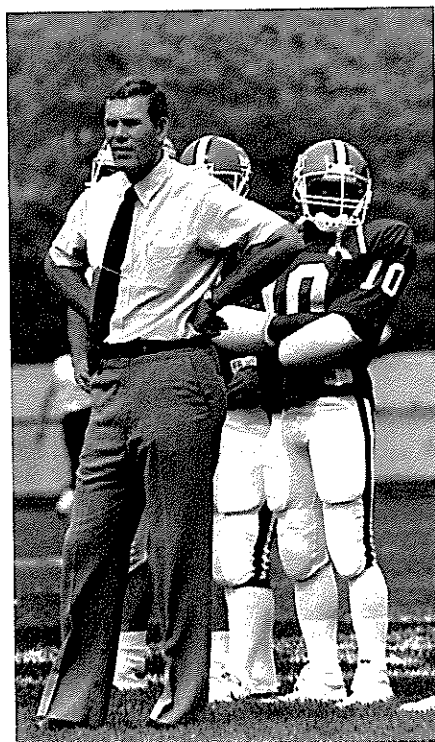
"No other sport requires people to come together in so precise and disciplined way as football," he firmly believes. "The reward for hard work is the satisfaction of succeeding, the satisfaction of the excitement on Saturdays, and ultimately, the satisfaction of winning."

Anderson knows something about winning.

Over his 11 seasons at Penn State, the Nittany Lions compiled a 107-25-1 mark, including a national championship in 1982. As a player in Happy Valley between 1961 and 1963, he lettered for three years as a tight end on teams that went 8-3, 9-2, and 7-3, the first two participating in the Gator Bowl (a win over Georgia Tech and a loss to Florida). In the 1961 bowl victory, he figured in a pair of touchdown drives with receptions of 15 and six yards and caught another for 19 yards, all from current Florida head coach Galen Hall.

In his senior season, Anderson led the Lion receivers with 21 catches for 229 yards and two TDs. He was drafted by the Cleveland Browns but chose to pursue a master's degree while playing weekend football for the Newark Bears.

Football was only one of Anderson's passions. While attending East Rutherford High School (now Becton Regional), he also played baseball, a game he continued to love at Penn State where he captained his senior squad and hit .333 for the District 2 titlists who finished fifth in the College World Series. However, it was foot-



ball that held greater excitement and presented a stronger physical challenge.

Born in Queens, NY [7-30-41], Anderson grew up in East Paterson (now Elmwood Park) and considers New Jersey his home. He earned a master's degree in Education from Penn State in 1965 and then took his first coaching assignment at Lafayette that year under Harry Gamble. He was responsible in part for the 23-18 Leopard victory over Rutgers in 1965, although the Scarlet Knights defeated Lafayette for the next four seasons Anderson was in Easton.

When Gamble moved on to Pennsylvania in 1970, Anderson packed his bags and went along, remaining with the Quakers for three seasons before returning to his alma mater at the call of Joe Paterno. Becoming the Lion offensive coordinator in 1981, he earned the reputation as one of the nation's top offensive line coaches. He is credited with the development of five first team All Americans — John Nessel [1974], Tom Rafferty [1975], Keith Dorney [1977-78], Bill Dugan [1980], and Sean Farrell [1980]. It was the latter who praised Anderson as one who was "in his office late at night going over films or evaluating players long after everyone else had gone home."

Anderson now goes home to Bridgewater where he lives with his wife, Kathryn [DeWitt], and daughter Lynn. His youngest son, Jeff, will enroll at Penn State this fall and play as a linebacker. Son Rick played football at the Naval Academy and Ken is a Penn State student.

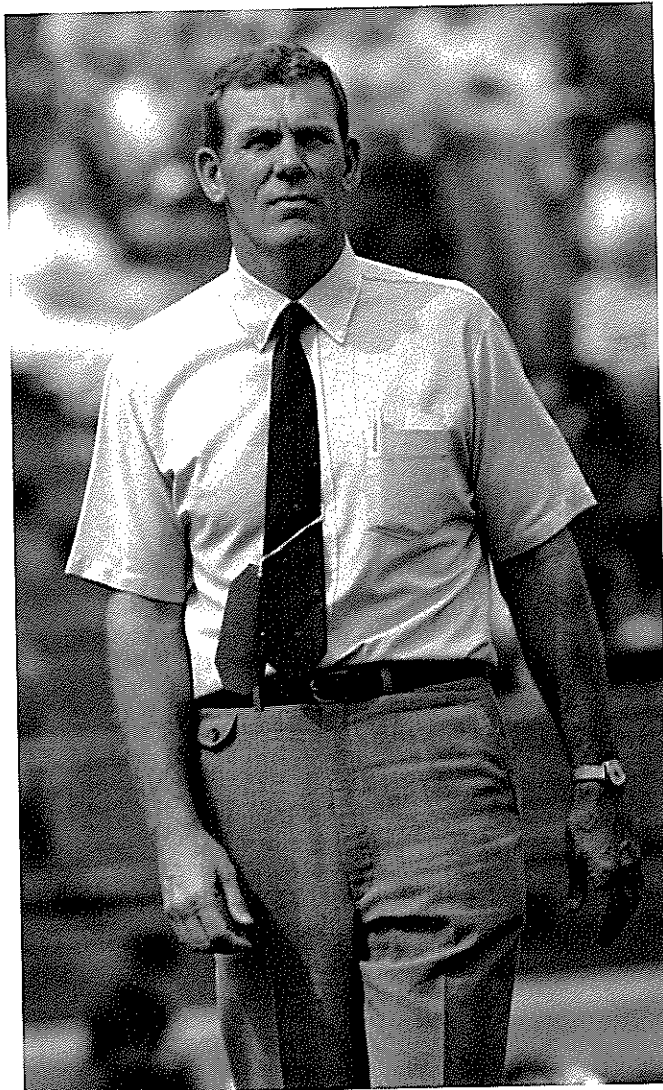
In his fourth season at Rutgers, Anderson has seen one of his dreams come to fruition. Upon his arrival at Rutgers he quickly dedicated himself to having "facilities comparable to those of the major college teams we are now competing against." After overseeing the completion of an artificial surface practice field and an indoor facility that ranks among the finest anywhere, he thrilled as the multi-purpose Athletic Training Center, attached to Rutgers Stadium, neared completion.

It is there, in a centralized structure costing upwards of \$7 million that the football program is expected to take wing. The new football offices are alive with business and much midnight oil will no doubt be burned there. And, no doubt, Dick Anderson will be one of the last to leave for home.





DICK ANDERSON COMMENTS



Q. WHAT ARE THE PARTICULAR CHALLENGES OF THE 1987 SCHEDULE?

A. Our 1987 schedule is exciting and challenging. We will play an improved Cincinnati team in the first game and then return home for three home games in a row. Our schedule includes some of the best football programs in America. We will play the usual tough eastern independents but we will also compete in the ACC with Duke and the Southeast Conference with Kentucky and Vanderbilt.

Q. ENTERING YOUR FOURTH HEAD COACHING SEASON, WHAT ARE YOUR THOUGHTS ABOUT THE PROGRAM AT THIS STAGE OF DEVELOPMENT?

A. Our program has continued to improve. This is an exciting time at Rutgers. We are undergoing many changes as a university and also as an athletic department and football program. We are looking forward to the future with great anticipation.

Q. IN FOUR YEARS OF RECRUITING HERE, DO YOU FEEL GOOD ABOUT THE INTEREST OF NEW JERSEY ATHLETES?

A. Each of the succeeding years of recruiting at Rutgers has been marked by improvements in that we have a better response from top athletes in New Jersey as well as surrounding states. I also think the high school coaches, alumni, and fans have looked at our program as having a steady increase of credibility.

Q. YOU HAVE SAID THAT SPRING PRACTICE IS NECESSARY AT THE DIVISION I LEVEL. YOUR REASONS.

A. If we are going to maintain the same quality football, spring practice is a must. The spring is a time to teach fundamentals. Most positions are won or lost during the spring.

Q. THE 1987 SQUAD MAY BE THE BIGGEST EVER. COMMENT ON THE SIZE AND ITS IMPORTANCE.

A. Our squad is bigger physically than it has been but that in itself does not make our team better. Our squad must be conditioned properly and have the ability to execute the necessary shields in order to win in the best competitions.

Q. HOW DO YOU WORK WITH THE OFFENSIVE AND DEFENSIVE COORDINATORS? WHAT IS YOUR INPUT?

A. Our offensive and defensive coordinators are responsible for the day-to-day planning with the offensive and defensive staffs. They are responsible for the game plans and the basic offensive and defensive systems. I regularly meet with the offensive and defensive staffs to determine the direction we take with plays, strategy, and personnel. The details are worked out by the coordinators in conjunction with their respective staffs.

Q. PLAYING IN GIANTS STADIUM. ADVANTAGES AND DISADVANTAGES?

A. Giants Stadium represents one of the finest football stadia in the country. It is to our advantage to play there because of the seating capacity, prestige, and financial advantage. After we expand our own campus stadium we will play less at Giants Stadium but we will always play one or two games a year in the Meadowlands.

Q. WHAT CHANGES, IF ANY, WOULD YOU LIKE TO SEE IN THE GOVERNANCE OF COLLEGIATE FOOTBALL?

A. Collegiate football needs more divisional independence so that the divisions can legislate and enforce rules that deal with their particular needs and problems. We also need the presidents to take more of an interest in the athletic programs so they truly understand the problems that exist in college football.



Q. DO YOU SUPPORT THE IDEA OF A PLAYOFF SYSTEM FOR THE NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP? WHY OR WHY NOT?

A. I favor a playoff system if it can be flexible enough to incorporate the bowls and the academic calendars of our universities.

Q. GIVEN THE CONTROVERSY, YOUR THOUGHTS ON DRUG TESTING.

A. Because of the prevalence of drugs in our society, it has become necessary to initiate a drug education, testing, and counseling program. I don't think anyone likes the idea of drug testing, but it is necessary to protect the well-being of our football team.

Q. DO PRO SCOUTS GET "IN THE WAY" OF YOUR PRACTICES?

A. Pro scouts do not get in the way of our practices, but the ways that aggressive agents deal with college athletes, and the procedure of professional football in dealing with prospects between the end of the football season and the draft, need attention.

Q. PLAYING SURFACES. WHAT IS YOUR PREFERENCE AND WHAT IS THE FUTURE?

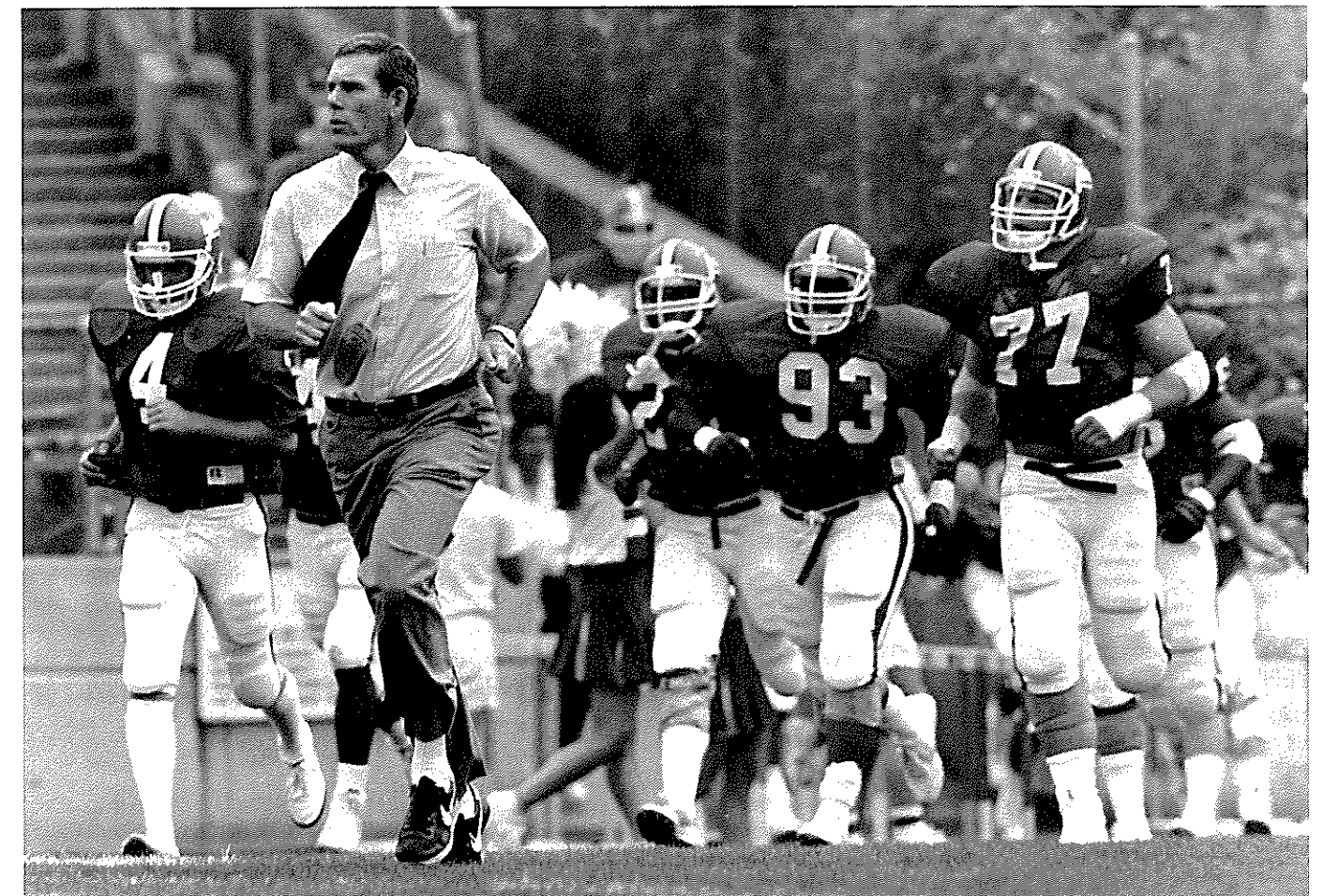
A. Our squad has performed well on natural and artificial surfaces and we have sustained injuries on both. Both artificial and natural surfaces will improve as science continues to make advances. Equipment will also continue to improve. Hopefully, the end result will be fewer injuries. I think natural surfaces will make a comeback but I don't think we will see an end of artificial surfaces because they are too practical.

Q. GIVEN THE PRESSURES OF COACHING, WHAT "BREAKS" DID YOU GIVE YOURSELF DURING THE SUMMER MONTHS?

A. July is about the only time to get some time away from football. Although this is a good time to get away, there are some things that will need attention during this time.

Q. THE COMPLETION OF THE TRAINING CENTER. WHAT ADVANTAGES?

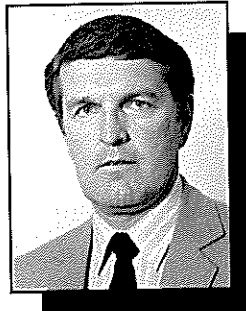
A. With the completion of our new training center we will have one of the finest facilities of its kind anywhere. It will give us the opportunity to train our athletes mentally and physically in a more efficient and functional way and will also act as an effective recruiting tool.

A 1962 graduate of the University of Richmond, where he played as a Spider quarterback, Dick Curl has been the Scarlet offensive coordinator since 1983. 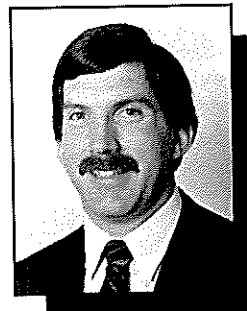
as an assistant before taking over as head coach at York Suburban (PA) High where his teams won 26 consecutive games on the way to a 32-6-1 mark over his four years.

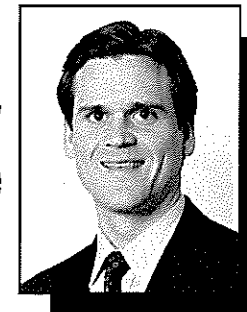

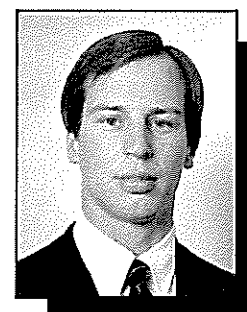

The former Blue Hen cornerback was a part-time assistant under Charlie Pell at the University of Florida between 1979 and 1982 working with the Gator secondary.

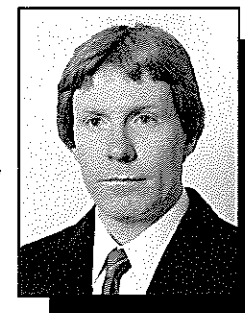
A native of Pittsburgh, Slowik played scholastically at Baldwin High. He is 33.

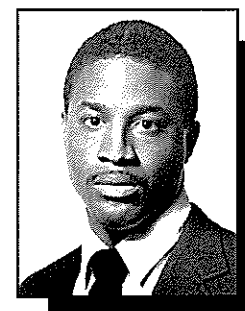

ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT FOR ATHLETICS

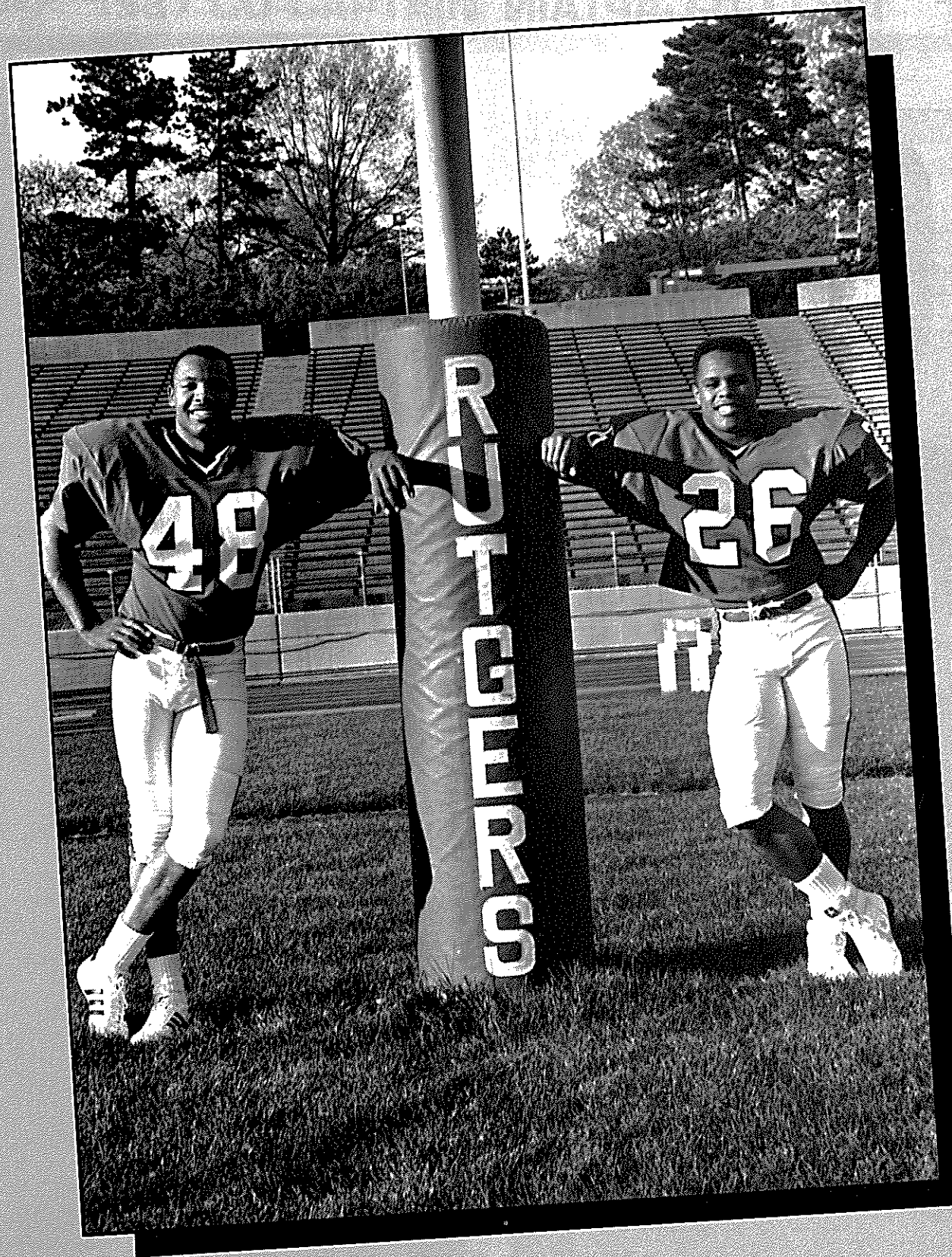

1986 Season In Review



1986 SEASON REVIEW

The Scarlet Knights had won just two games in 1985, defeating Richmond and Colgate in games 7 and 10 after opening with a 28-28 tie at Florida. Eight teams had beaten Rutgers and seven were back on the 1986 schedule — a situation that gave considerable concern to the coaching staff and players heading into the lidlifter at Boston College on September's first weekend.

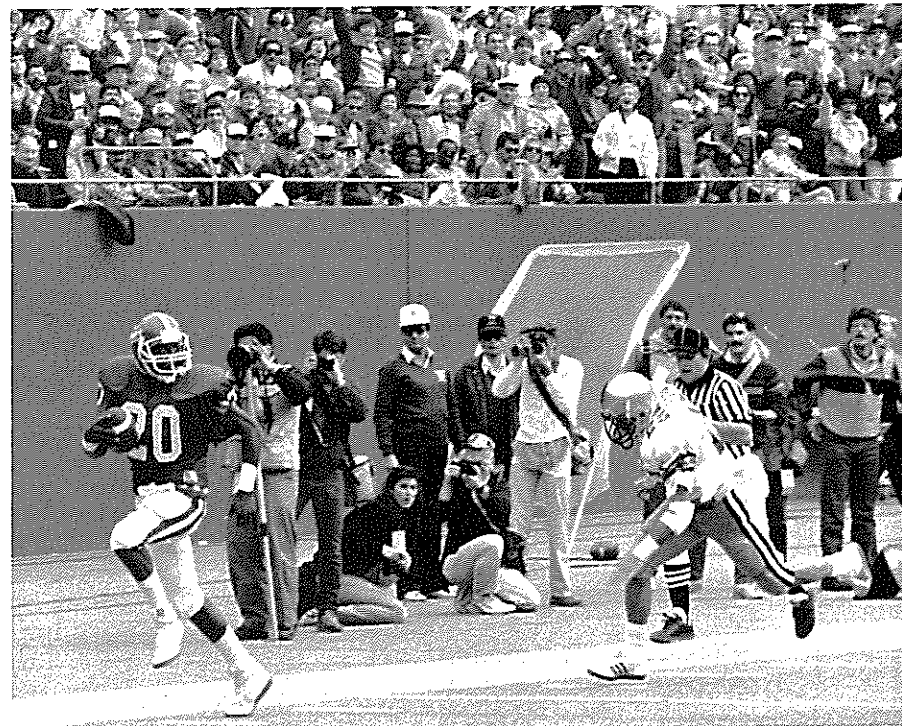
A tough 11-9 victory over the Eagles did much to put 1985 out of mind and, three weeks later, Rutgers held a 3-0-1 record going into games with Penn State and Florida. Quarterback Joe Gagliardi had the Scarlet on a roll, fairly balancing the running and passing attacks in the Boston College win, the 16-16 tie at Kentucky, the big Homecoming Day production against Cincinnati, and the momentous road victory over Syracuse. Rutgers had reversed 1985 decisions with the Eagles and the Orangemen and the mood was mighty.

The Penn State game was indeed billed as a battle of unbeaten, as a contest for the right to be called the Beast of the East. A bit of wind was taken out of the sail in Happy Valley with the 25-point loss, but the loss of Gagliardi was an even greater blow. Florida would deflate the Scarlet hope even more with the 15-3 setback in Giants Stadium in Scott Erney's debut as the starting quarterback. The record had fallen off to 3-2-1 and the season was on the line.

Erney proved himself in this pressure situation with excellent back-to-back victories over Army and Louisville, games that produced 527 and 508 total yards respectively, and saw the Scarlet put 12 touchdowns on the board. Rutgers rushed for a season-high 343 yards against the Cadets as the defense limited the Giants Stadium opponent to just 43 passing yards and a 197-yard game total with one touchdown.

At Louisville, a hot Erney threw four touchdown passes, launched his runners for 285 yards and watched his defensive complement allow the Cardinals minus 38 rushing yards, best of the season. The record became a far healthier 5-2-1.

West Virginia had shutout the Scarlet in 1985 (27-0); Pittsburgh was 28 points better than the Knights in the 2-8-1 campaign; and Temple took a last minute 14-13 decision that previous season. Those three squads were to be faced over the

final three weeks of the season and it was not presumptuous at the time to feel that Rutgers just might reverse the two and the eight in the 1985 record.

However, in Giants Stadium, West Virginia rebounded from a 17-10 deficit at the end of three periods to score twice in the fourth for a 24-17 upset as the Scarlet managed just 87 yards in the air. Pittsburgh passed for 265 yards and Rutgers ran for only 97 yards in Pitt Stadium as the Panthers won by a 20-6 count. The Scarlet record was 5-4-1 with Temple coming into Rutgers Stadium, both fighting for winning campaigns.

These teams had played three consecutive one-point games and Owl Heisman Trophy runner-up Paul Palmer was the man to stop. The Scarlet defense managed that awesome task just as it had negated Craig Heyward a week earlier in Pittsburgh. Palmer had 89 of the 105 Temple rushing yards as Rutgers rushed for 166 and passed for 237 yards, 88 total yards more than the visitors. But, TD passes of 17 and 70 yards with three field goals and a rushing TD sent the Scarlet to a 29-22 defeat to close the season.

As a team, the Scarlet put up some hefty numbers.

Among the season's highlights were the 343 rushing yards against Army and the 285 against Louisville; the Scarlet 313 aerial yards in the Cincinnati game, also topping 200 against Penn State (258), Temple (237), and Louisville (223); going over 400 total yards four times — Army (527), Louisville (508), Cincinnati (440), and Temple (403).

On the defensive side of the ball, Rutgers limited Louisville (-38) and Cincinnati (48) to low rushing marks while holding four others to fewer than 137 yards; held four teams to under 160 yards in the air; and allowed three opponents well under 300 total yards and a total of seven under 335.

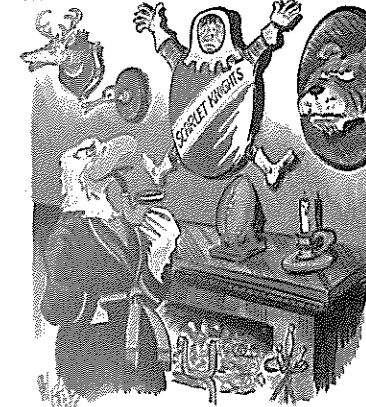
Rutgers averaged 158.6 yards rushing, 189.5 passing for a 348.1 total yards a game. Opponents averaged 137.3 yards rushing, 186.6 passing for a 323.8 total yards a game. The figures, a Scarlet edge of 21 rushing yards a game, three passing yards per contest and 24 total yards probably reflect the 5-5-1 record. Yet, as the following game-by-game accounts make clear, the season might have gone a little better. As head coach Dick Anderson said elsewhere in this media guide, "a twist here or a twist there..."

The Scarlet Knights stymied two Eagle drives in the first period and got on the board first early in the second on a four-yard pass from Joe Gagliardi to Henry Henderson, players who would not finish the season because of injuries. A two-point conversion by Curtis Stephens gave Rutgers an 8-0 lead that would hold until Doug Giesler hit a 24-yard field goal in the third period. Boston College came back to score on a 20-yard Troy Stradford romp after picking up a fumble in the Eagle backfield but missed on a two-point conversion try. The Eagles added a 28-yard field goal less than three minutes later but the Scarlet held on to break a six-game hex by the Eagles. Gagliardi was 18 for 32 for 144 yards and Stephens ran for 67 yards. The Scarlet defense limited Boston College to 114 rushing yards, 95 by Stradford.

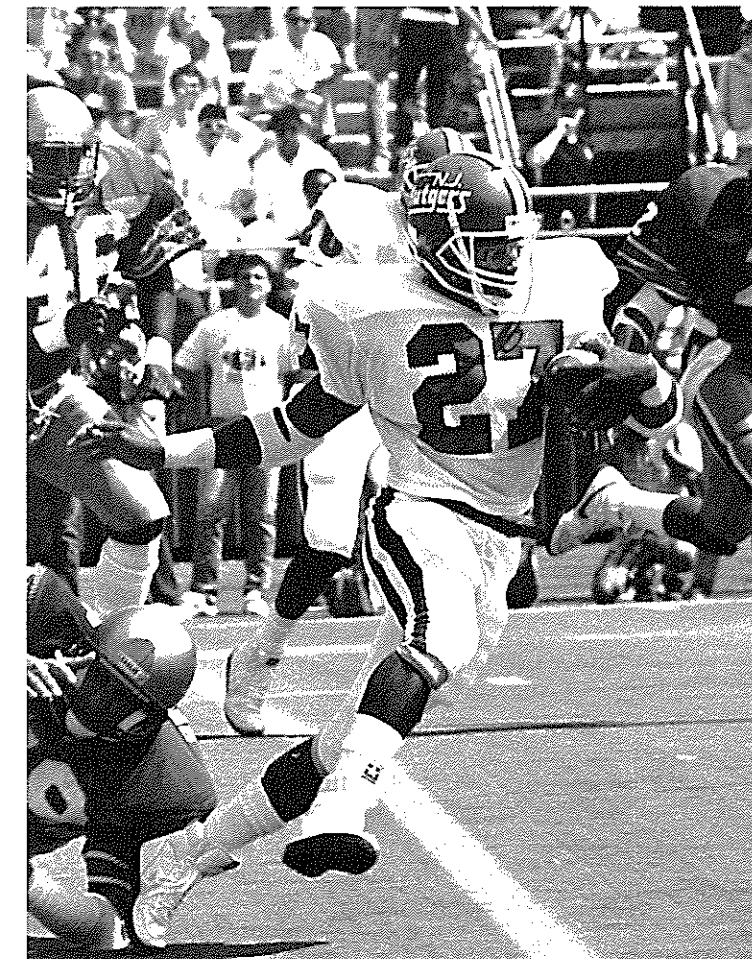

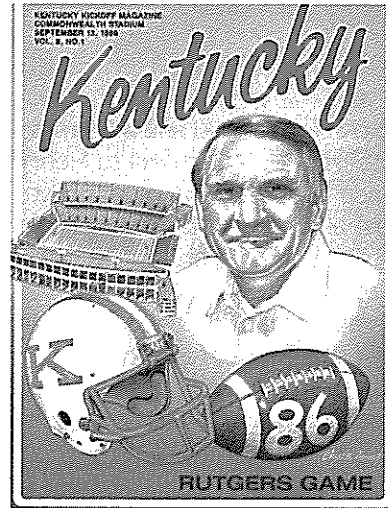


Henry Henderson scored Rutgers' first touchdown of 1986 on a 4-yard touchdown reception versus Boston College.

The Wildcats came back to score 10 points in the third period on a 15-yard run and a 20-yard field goal. The Scarlet Knights then went up, 13-10, on Giesler's 43-yard three-pointer halfway through the final period but Kentucky tied the contest on its next possession with a 25-yard field goal. Freshman defensive tackle Scott Miller recovered a Wildcat fumble at the UK 23 with three minutes remaining and Giesler's third field goal from 37 yards made it a 16-13 game. A long Wildcat drive took the ball to the Rutgers 15 and Joe Worley hit the tying 32-yard field goal with just one second on the clock.

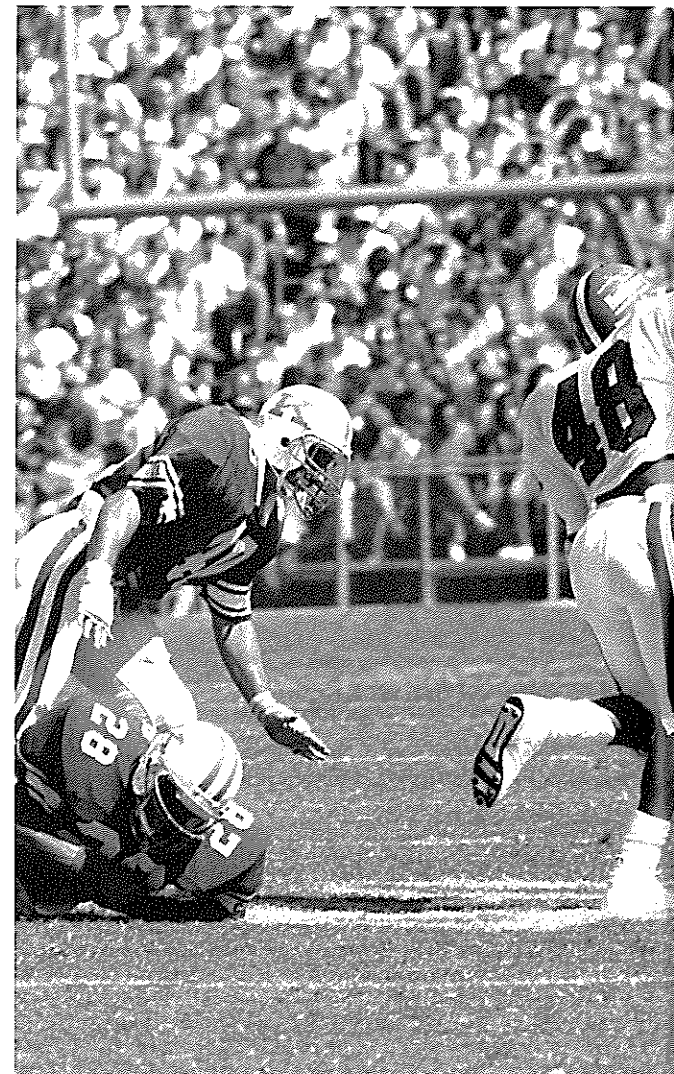

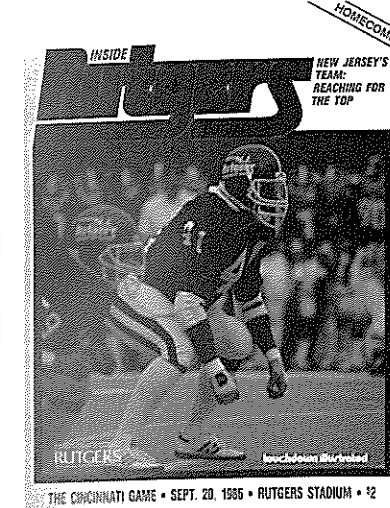


Curtis Stephens avoids two University of Kentucky players during 16-16 tie at Kentucky.

Homecoming produced the season's highest scoring affair, Rutgers rolling up 432 total yards with 313 coming through the air on Joe Gagliardi's 21 for 29 passing effort. Rutgers scored 17 unanswered points in the first period on Doug Giesler's 22-yard field goal, Matt Prescott's one-yard dive, and Eric Young's 23-yard pass reception. The visitor's got on the scoreboard twice in the second period but Brian Cobb also scored twice for the Scarlet on 15 and 44-yard passes from Gagliardi for the 29-13 halftime count. 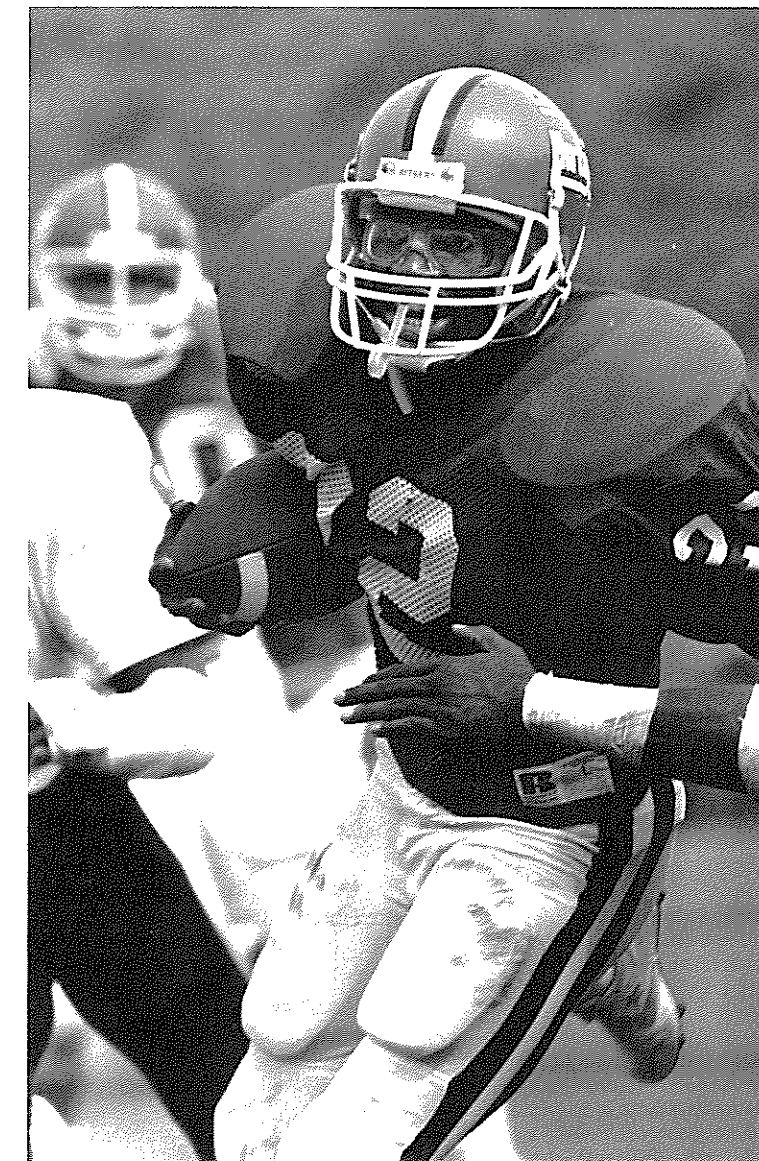

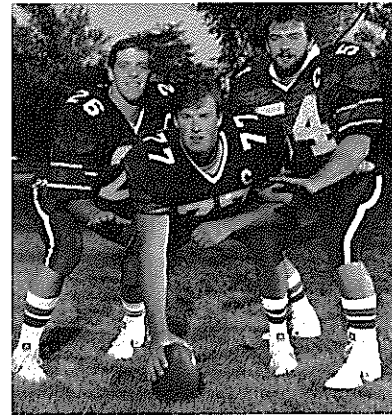


Eric Young breaks a tackle on his way to a 23-yard touchdown reception.

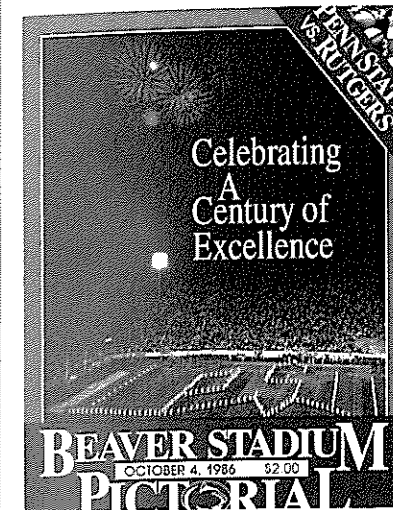


Curtis Stephens led all rushers with 80 yards in 16-10 win at the Carrier Dome.

The Nittany Lions added another touchdown to win their fifth game on the way to the Fiesta Bowl and the national title. Penn State ran for 287 yards and added 191 passing while allowing the Scarlet just 45 rushing yards. Rutgers, however, had 258 yards passing, 146 by Joe Gagliardi before the senior quarterback was felled for the season with a shoulder injury. Sophomore Scott Erney came on for his first extended action and would handle the Scarlet snaps for the rest of the campaign.

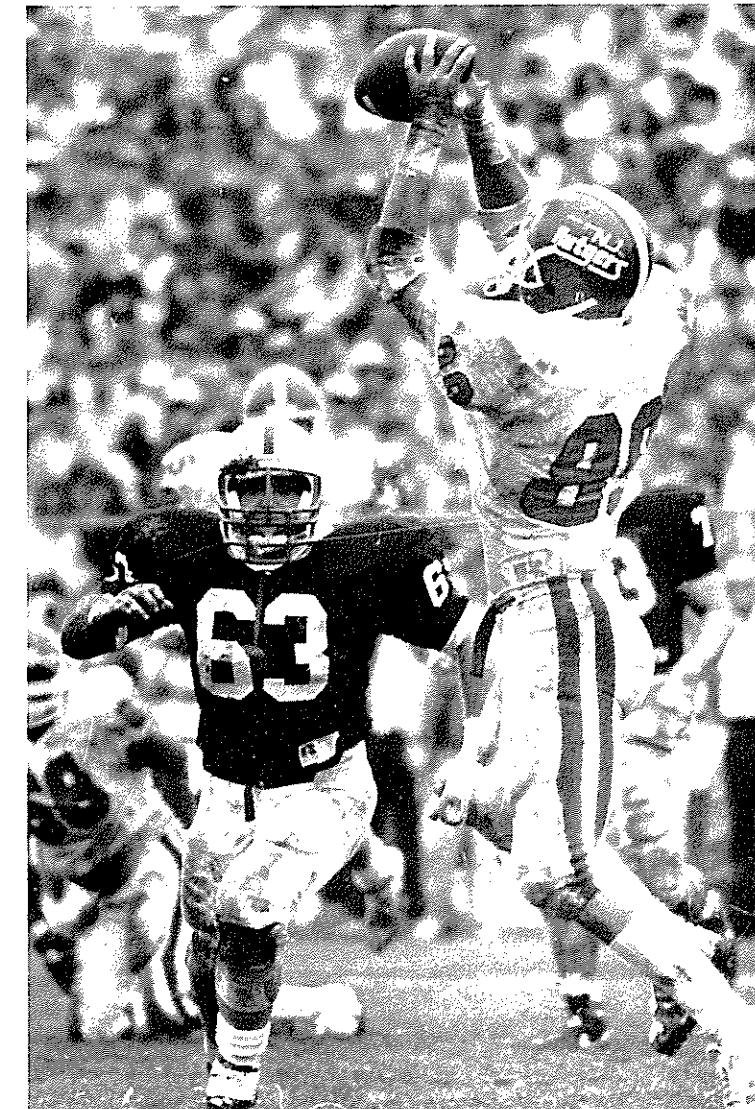

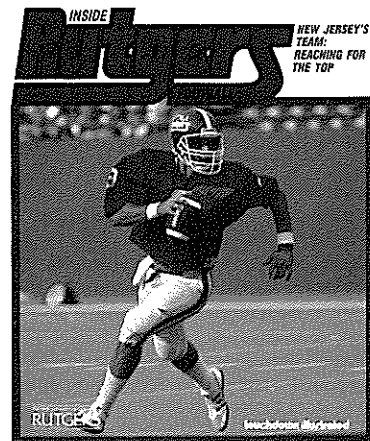


Bruce Campbell catches one of his five receptions of the day.

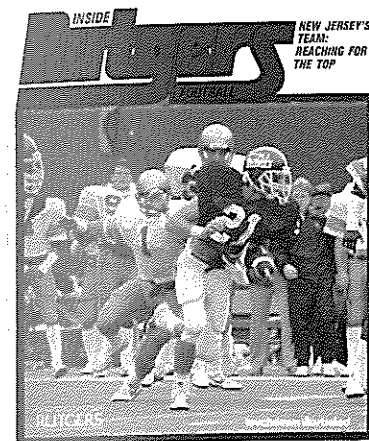


Matt Prescott rushed for a team high 85 yards versus Gators.

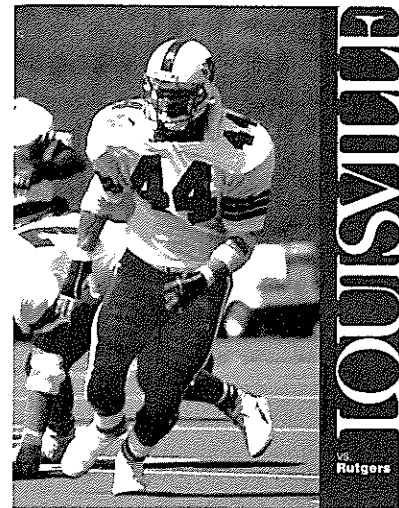


Curtis Stephens scored two touchdowns to help lead Rutgers University to its 35-7 win against Army.

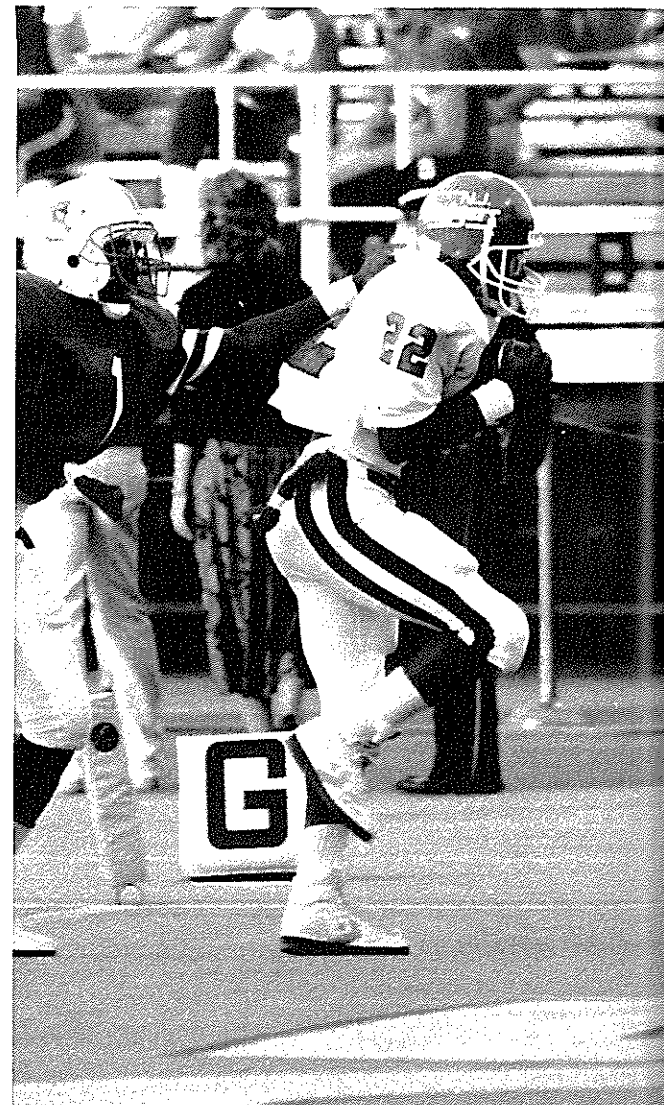

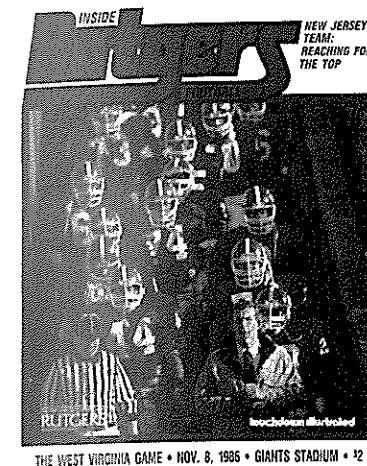


Eric Young's 39-yard touchdown reception gave Rutgers a 27-0 lead.

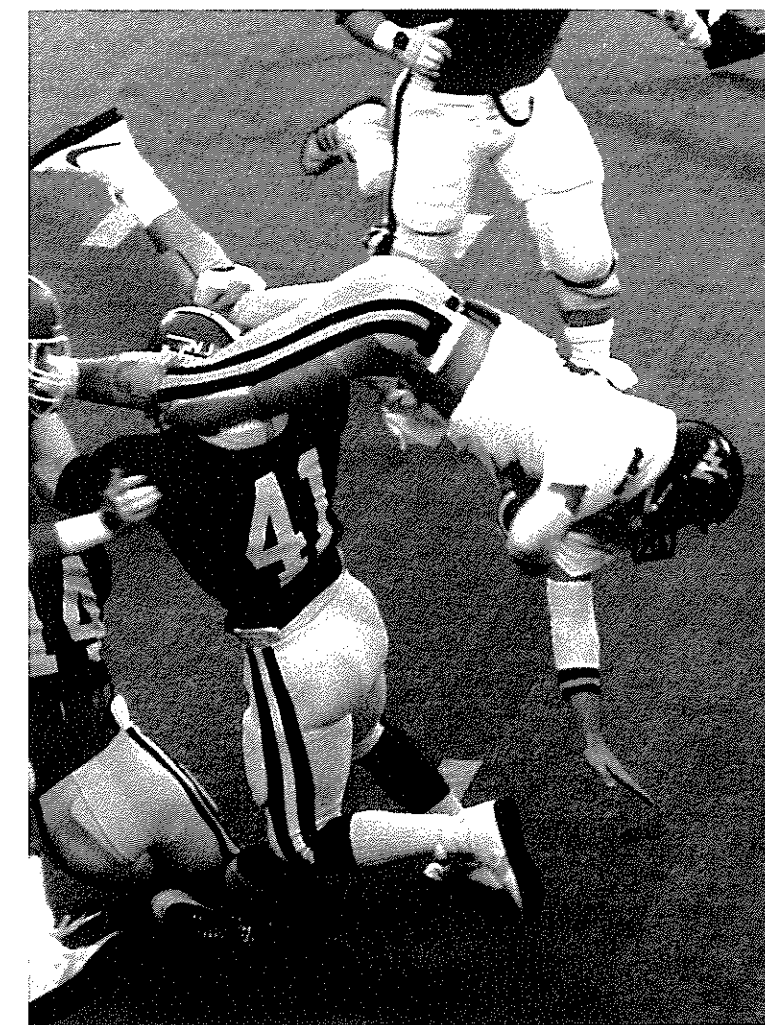

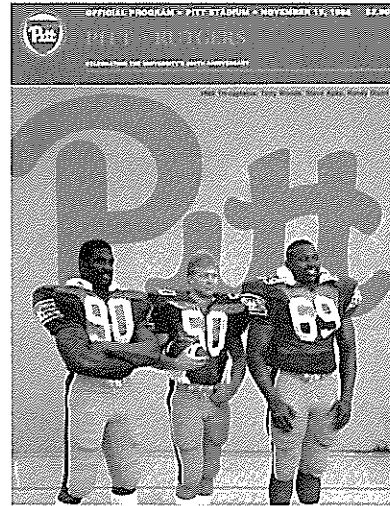


Tyrone Stowe [41] collected a career-high 27 tackles in loss to Mountaineers.

Rutgers got on the board after six and a half minutes of play on a five-yard run by Curtis Stephens, leading 6-0 after a two-point conversion try failed. However, the Scarlet never moved into high gear again as the Panthers scored on a second period pass, added field goals in the final two periods and got a three-yard TD run by Craig Heyward, who had rushed for 254 yards a week earlier against Miami. Heyward was held to 86 yards and the Panther backs to 109 on the day. But, Mike Felitsky bombed the Scarlet for 259 yards on 20 of 33 passes. Rutgers had just 66 yards rushing and Scott Erney was 16 for 28 for 203 yards. Down 10-6 near the end of the first half, the Scarlet squandered a scoring opportunity at the Pitt 21 when the drive was stopped by an interception. Rutgers fell to 5-4-1.

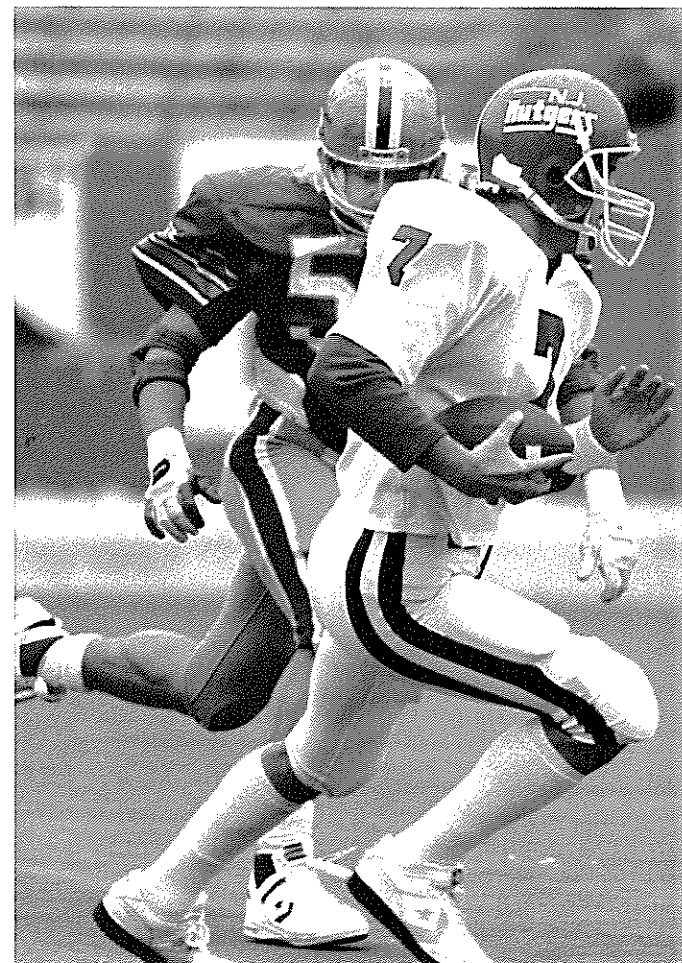

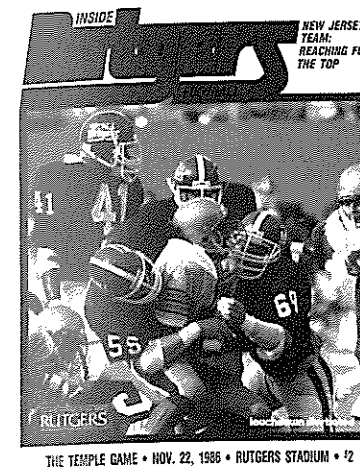


Scott Erney attempts to avoid Pitt's Steve Apke during 20-6 Rutgers loss.

Both teams looked at winning campaigns and the Owls scored the final 10 points to overcome a 22-19 deficit to finish at 6-5, Rutgers all even at 5-5-1. Temple took a 9-0 lead in the first period on a pass and a field goal and held a 16-7 advantage before Matt Prescott tumbled for his second one-yard score two minutes before the half. Ben Wright booted the second of his three field goals to give the visitors a 19-14 lead in the third period after which Scott Erney put the Scarlet ahead on a three-yard run and a conversion pass to Bruce Campbell. The advantage went back to Temple when QB Lee Saltz scampered four yards to put the count at 26-22. Heisman Trophy runner-up Paul Palmer was held to 89 yards on 30 carries but Saltz starred with 11 completions on 19 pass attempts for 209 yards and two scoring strikes to WR Keith Gloster. Erney passed for 237 yards on 23 of 42 but the Scarlet ground game produced 158 yards. Tyrone Stowe ended his celebrated career with 17 tackles to extend his all-time tackle marks to perhaps unreachable numbers.

GARDEN STATE BOWL I

Prior to Garden State Bowl I, there had been only a few attempts to stage a post-season bowl game in the Northeast because of unpredictable weather conditions in mid or late December. The Gotham Bowl was held in the Polo Grounds in 1961, with Baylor defeating Utah State, 24-9, and, in its second try in 1962 in Yankee Stadium, Nebraska defeated Miami, 36-34, reportedly in 17-degree weather. The Liberty Bowl was started in 1960 in Philadelphia and was staged there through 1964, then moving indoors in Atlantic City in 1965 before going to warmer climes in Memphis, TN, in 1966.

But, on Dec. 16, 1978, the thermometer in Giants Stadium read an unseasonable 40 degrees. And, despite the pre-game hope by the Rutgers squad that it would be much colder as it entertained an Arizona State team accustomed to playing in warm weather, Rutgers was hot at the start.

A two or three touchdown underdog to the 8-3 Sun Devils [who had defeated rival Arizona in the regular season finale and also owned a victory over otherwise undefeated Southern Cal], Rutgers gained possession after an Arizona State punt at its own 32 and moved to the Sun Devil 47 in four plays. David Dorn then went off his right tackle, reversed his field and raced the distance down the left side for the game's first score. Kennan Starzell's PAT made it a 7-0 ball game early and the visitors were shocked further when Ed Steward recovered a fumble and Starzell booted his longest-ever field goal to that point in his career. The 46-yarder gave the Scarlet a 10-0 lead.

On the next Arizona State possession, Bob Hynoski intercepted a Mark Malone pass and raced 36 yards to the Sun Devil four-yard line. The count might have gone to 17-0 but Dorn fumbled at the two and the visitors took over.

Unable to add to the lead, the Sun Devils took over the ball at the Scarlet 44 with 1:53 remaining in the half and got on the scoreboard when Malone hit Bob Weathers in the end zone from the 14. A play earlier, Malone was trapped on a fourth and 10 play but shook loose to connect for a first down. Instead

of 17-0 or 10-0, it was a 10-7 game at the half.

Malone tossed 26 and 47-yard touchdowns in the third period to MVP John Mistler and Chris DeFrance to give Arizona State a 21-10 lead in the third period and ran in from the one early in the final frame for a 28-10 lead. Lethargic for a period and a half, Rutgers rebounded with 5:49 left in the game when Ted Blackwell scored on a five-yard run and then caught a two-point conversion pass from Ed McMichael.

"They were on their way to a nice, neat orderly finish," wrote syndicated columnist Jerry Izenberg. "And then, Kennan Starzell kicked the ball.

"Mechanically, it was the perfect squibbler. It had been done on a million football fields and when it works the kicking team recovers. The ball bounced off of Arizona State's Morris Williams . . . it bounced off of Rutgers' Mark Freeman . . . it skidded under the belly of Arizona State's Henry Pollard and came to rest underneath Rutgers' Craig Nielsen — in the Arizona State end zone. This is not unlike bunting for a home run.

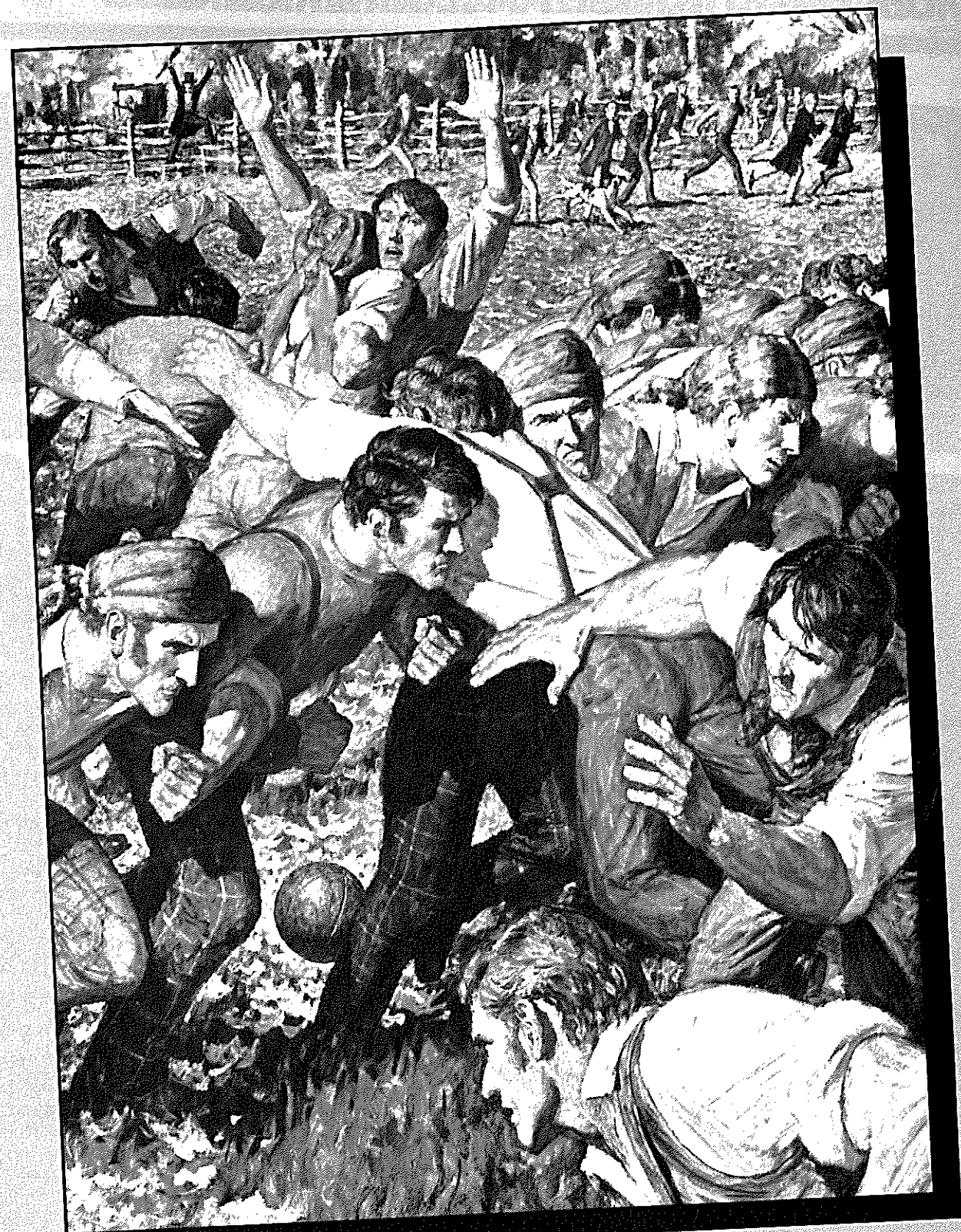
"One official signalled touchdown — six points for Rutgers. A second apparently signalled touchback — Arizona's ball on its own 20. A third signalled toward the heavens with outstretched hands, which according to the annotated NCAA Hymnal and Prayer Book means: Why me, O Lord?"

But, back upfield, lay a yellow flag. Rutgers was said to have been offside on the kickoff and that ruling held. Instead of a 28-24 count and a possible 28-26 ballgame, the score reverted to 28-18 with 4:44 to go. In the game's final minute, Malone scored on a four-yard run for the closing 34-18 scoreboard count.

The weather had cooperated, the 33,402 fans had had their full, the ball had nearly bounced in Rutgers' favor and it was a devil of a day. The Garden State Bowl would continue for three more years and would give way to the current pre-season classic format.



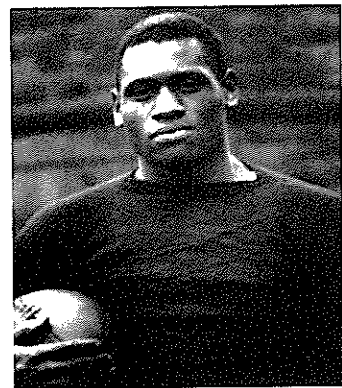

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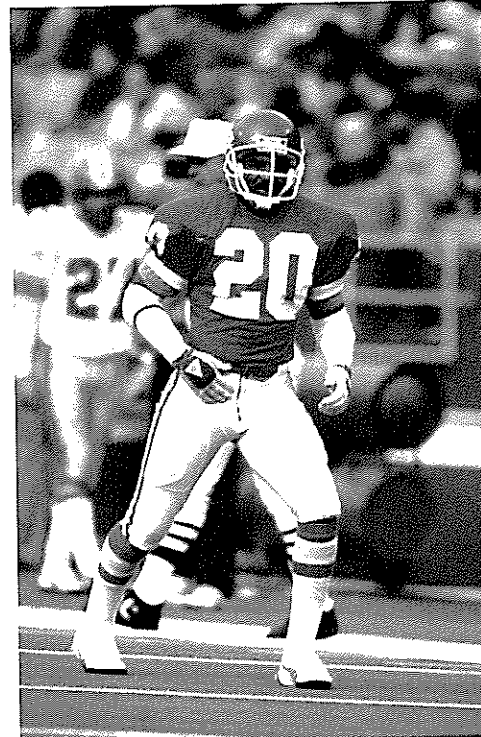


Bruce Campbell catches one of his seven receptions [102 yards] vs. Cincinnati in 48-28 win last year.

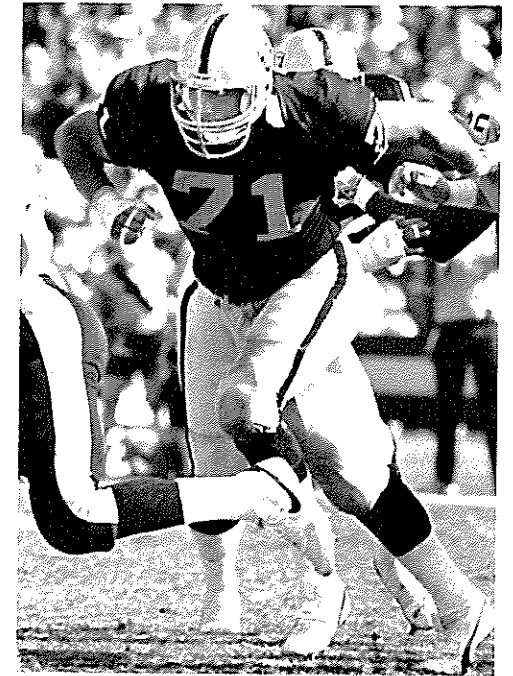

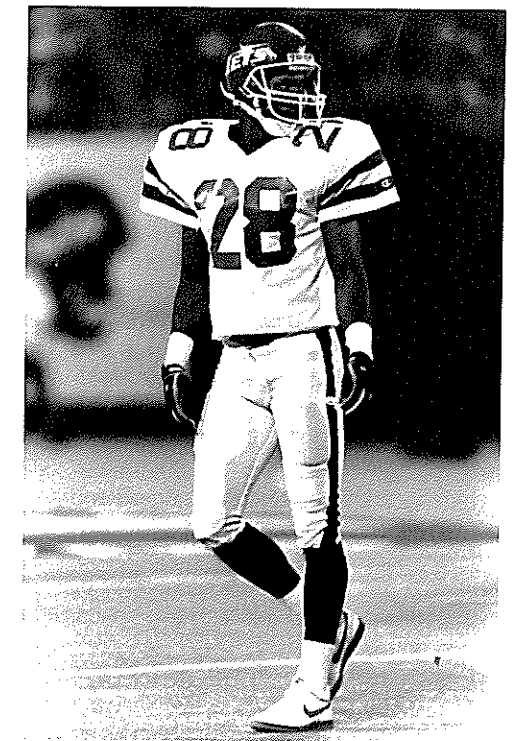

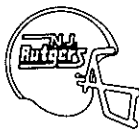

INTERCOLLEGIATE FOOTBALL'S FIRST GAME



Rutgers University and its neighbor, Princeton, played the first game of intercollegiate football on Nov. 6, 1869, on a plot of ground where the present-day Rutgers gymnasium now stands in New Brunswick, NJ.

Rutgers won the first game, 6-4.

The game, which bore little resemblance to its modern counterpart, was played with two teams of 25 men each under rugby-like rules, but in common with modern football it was "replete with surprise, strategy, prodigies of determination, and physical prowess," to use the words of one of the Rutgers players.

William J. Leggett, captain of the Rutgers team who later became a distinguished clergyman of the Dutch Reformed Church, suggested that rules for the contest be adopted from those of the London Football Association. Leggett's proposal was accepted by Captain William Gunmere of Princeton, who later became Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of New Jersey.

At 3 p.m. on that memorable afternoon, the 50 combatants and about 100 spectators gathered on the field. Most of the assemblage sat on a low wooden fence, watched the athletes doff hats, coats and vests and use suspenders as belts. To distinguish themselves from the bareheaded visitors, 50 Rutgers students, including the players, donned scarlet-colored scarfs which they converted into turbans.

The teams lined up with two members of each team remaining more or less stationary near the opponents' goal in the hope of being able to slip over a score from unguarded positions. Thus was the present day "sleeper" conceived. The remaining 23 players were divided into groups of 11 and 12. While the 11 "fielders" lined up in their own territory as defenders, the 12 "bulldogs" carried the battle.

Each score counted as a "game" and 10 games completed the contest. Following each score, the teams changed direction. The ball could be advanced only by kicking or batting it with the feet, hands, heads or sides.

Events leading up to the game were described by the late John W. Herbert, Rutgers '72, who was one of the players: "To appreciate this game to the full you must know something of its background," Herbert wrote in 1933. "The two colleges



were, and still are, of course, about 20 miles apart. The rivalry between them was intense. For years each had striven for possession of an old Revolutionary cannon, making night forays and lugging it back and forth time and again. Not long before the first football game the canny Princetonians had settled this competition in their own favor by ignominiously sinking the gun in several feet of concrete. In addition to this, I regret to report, Princeton had beaten Rutgers at baseball by the harrowing score of 40-2. Rutgers longed for a chance to square things."

A challenge for the game was issued by Rutgers. Three games were to be played that year, the first played at New Brunswick and won by Rutgers. Princeton won the second game, but cries of "over-emphasis" prevented the third game in football's first year when faculties of both institutions protested on the grounds that the games were interfering with student studies.

Herbert gives a detailed account of the play in the first game.

"Though smaller on the average, the Rutgers players, as it developed, had ample speed and fine football sense. Receiving the ball, our men formed a perfect interference around it and with short, skillful kicks and dribbles drove it down the field. Taken by surprise, the Princeton men fought valiantly, but in five minutes we had gotten the ball through to our captains on the enemy's goal and S.G. Gano, '71 and G.R. Dixon, '73, neatly kicked it over. None thought of it, so far as I know, but we had

without previous plan or thought evolved the play that became famous a few years later as 'the flying wedge.'"

Herbert then relates that his teammates failed to note a conference the Princeton's captain was holding with the giant of the Tiger team, J.E. Michael, '71, known to his mates as "Big Mike."

"Next period Rutgers bucked, or received the ball, hoping to repeat the flying wedge," Herbert's account continues. "But the first time we formed it Big Mike came charging full upon us. It was our turn for surprise. The Princeton battering ram made no attempt to reach the ball but, forerunner of the interference-breaking ends of today, threw himself into our mass play, bursting us apart, and bowling us over. Time and again Rutgers formed the wedge and charged; as often Big Mike broke it up. And finally on one of these incredible break-ups a Princeton bulldog with a long, accurate, perhaps lucky kick, sent the ball between the posts for the second score.

"The flying wedge thus checkmated, Rutgers might have been in a bad spot had not Madison Ball, '73, come through. He had a trick of kicking the ball with his heel. All the game he had been a puzzle to the Princetonians. The ball would be rolling toward the Rutgers goal, and, running ahead of it instead of taking time to turn, he would heel it back. He made several such plays, greatly encouraging his team. Then he capped all this by one tremendous lucky backward drive directly to Dixon, standing squarely before Princeton's goal . . . Dixon easily scored, giving us a one-goal lead. Big Mike again rose, however, in a berserk endeavor, and, getting the ball, he called the Princeton men into a flying wedge of their own and straight-away they took the ball right down the field and put it over."

It was at this point that a Rutgers professor could stand it no longer. Waving his umbrella at the participants, he shrieked, "You will come to no Christian end!"

Herbert's account of the game continues:

The fifth and sixth goals went to Rutgers. The stars of the latter period of play in the memory of the players after the lapse of many years were 'Big Mike' and Large (former State Senator George H. Large of Flemington, another Rutgers player.) Someone by a random kick had

driven the ball to one side, where it rolled against the fence and stopped. Large led the pursuit for the ball, closely followed by Michael. They reached the fence, on which students were perched, and unable to check their momentum, in a tremendous impact struck the fence which gave way with a crash and over went the band of yelling students to the ground.

"Every college probably has the humorous tradition of some player who has scored against his own team. This tradition at Rutgers dated from this first game, for one of her players, whose identity is unknown, in the sixth period started to kick the ball between his own goal posts. The kick was blocked, but Princeton took advantage of the opportunity and soon made the goal. This turn of the game apparently disorganized Rutgers, for Princeton also scored the next goal after a few minutes of play, thus bringing the total up to four all."

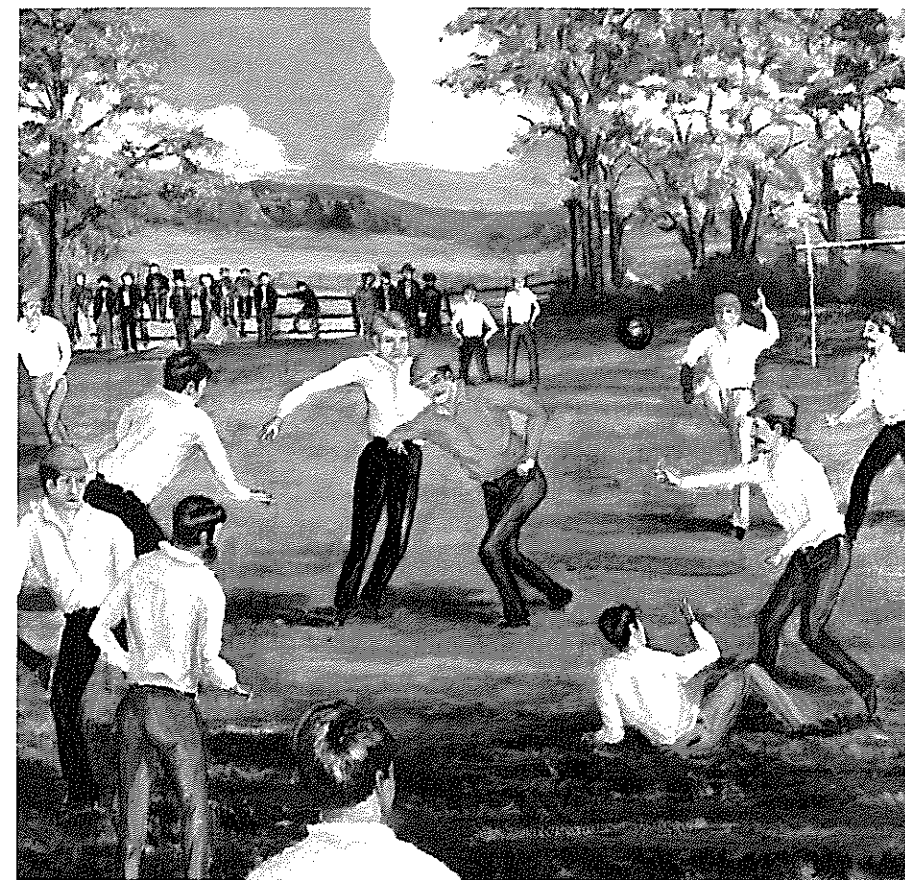
At this point Leggett introduced strategy to turn the tide in favor of Rutgers. Noticing that Princeton obtained a great advantage from its taller players, Leggett ordered his men to keep the ball close to the ground. Following this strategem, Rutgers kicked the ninth and tenth goals, thus winning the match.

An analytical account of the game appeared in the November, 1869 issue of the "Targum", Rutgers undergraduate newspaper:

"To describe the varying fortunes of the match, game by game, would be a waste of labor; for every game was like the one before," wrote the student reporter. "There was the same headlong running, wild shouting, and frantic kicking.

In every game the cool goal-tenders saved the Rutgers goal half a dozen times; in every game the heavy charger of the Princeton side overthrew everything he came in contact with; and in every game, just when the interest in one of those delightful rushes at the fence was culminating, the persecuted ball would fly for refuge into the next lot, and produce cessation of hostilities until, after the invariable 'foul', it was put in straight. . . .

"To sum up. Princeton had the most muscle, but didn't kick very well, and wanted organization. They evidently don't like to kick the ball on the ground. Our man, on the other hand, though compar-



atively weak, ran well, and kicked well throughout. But their great point was the organization, for which great praise is due to the captain. The right men were always in the right place."

One of the Princeton players, William Preston Lane, in 1933 contended in a newspaper interview that Rutgers "ran us Princeton men out of town. I never found out why they did that," he related. "But we didn't ask any questions. When we saw them coming after us, we ran to the outskirts of New Brunswick and got into our carriages and wagons and went away as fast as we could."

Lane's contention is refuted in the Targum account. "After the match, the players had an amicable 'feed' together," the paper reported. "At 8 o'clock our guests went home, in high good spirits, thirsting to beat us next time, if they can."

The Daily Fredonian, New Brunswick paper of that era, supported the Targum account in its issue of November 8, 1869.

"Though the generous liberality of the

students of Rutgers College," the Fredonian reported, "a bountiful entertainment was prepared for our Princeton friends, at the favorite resort in Church Street known as Northrop's where 'mine host' and his estimable lady know-how to get up a good supper."

Regardless of what actually happened after the first game, football was here to stay. Rutgers got Columbia University started in the grid sport the following season and in a few years most of the East's colleges and universities were represented on the gridiron.

The foregoing account of America's first intercollegiate football game was prepared from material obtained from reliable sources. Previous drafts of the account were authenticated by surviving members of the first Rutgers and Princeton teams, all of whom are now deceased. The last surviving Princeton player died on the morning of the 1938 Rutgers-Princeton game which dedicated the Rutgers Stadium. The last surviving Rutgers player died in the spring of 1939.

1976

Last Homecoming was a natural.

The activities centered on the celebration of the 25th and the 10th anniversaries of the 1961 and 1976 Rutgers football teams, respectively, which gave the State University its only undefeated squads, 15 years apart.

Members of both of those teams took the field at halftime and memory was well served. The full house gave proper note of those who count those seasons as the highest achievement of their athletic careers. Rutgers Stadium has probably not heard a sound as great or as prolonged.

Undefeated seasons are rare wherever one looks and the fact that Rutgers has had just two in 118 years of football is of little concern. When a team accomplishes the feat, it is to be honored. Maryland and Pittsburgh were also perfect in 1976 and, with Rutgers, brought the total to only 18 major college teams to turn the trick since 1940.

In Rutgers' case, there are several striking parallels in the way the two teams created perfection.

First, the coaches. John Bateman was just in his second season as head coach in 1961. Frank Burns, who had worked with and then succeeded Bateman, was in his fourth head coaching season in 1976. Bateman had burst on the Rutgers scene with an 8-1 record in his Rutgers debut, his 1960 contingent winning its last three games. Burns closed out the 1975 season with seven straight wins for a 9-2 record. Perfection was not predicted in either case but the undefeated squads had come off excellent seasons.

Then, there were six common opponents for the 1961 and the 1976 teams—Princeton, Connecticut, Bucknell, Lehigh, Columbia, and Colgate. Each of the teams came back to win after being down on the scoreboard to four foes. Princeton, Lehigh, Delaware, and Columbia got out to leads in 1961 and the 1976 squad had to rebound against Navy, Lehigh, Tulane, and Colgate.

And, most exciting of all, both teams experienced especially trying times in their final games, both on the 25th day of November. In 1961, Columbia led at 3-0 and 19-7 before the Scarlet dramatics and, in 1976, Colgate twice had leads, at 3-0 and 6-3.

1961

On Nov. 25, 1961, Columbia entered the story-book setting of Rutgers Stadium intent on being spoilers. The Lions, indeed, had spoiled a perfect season for the Scarlet back in 1947, a 40-28 opening season victory after which the Scarlet won eight in a row. True to their threat, the Lions took a 3-0 lead and held a 19-7 advantage with only three minutes left in the third period. Then, as Larry Pitt wrote in his *History of Rutgers Football*, "came 12 minutes of the most explosive and thrilling football the Stadium has ever seen."

Dave Brody "lit the fuse" with a 58-yard kickoff return and Bill Speranza hit Lee Curley for a score at the start of the final period. Pierce Frauenheim intercepted a Columbia pass, returning it to the Lion 26 and Speranza led a surge and scored himself to tie the game at 19, the conversion attempt going awry.

Steve Simms' three-yard burst gave Rutgers its first lead of the day with three and a half minutes left. Frauenheim then picked off a Lion pass and took it into the end zone for the final 32-19 count and the first undefeated (9-0) season in Scarlet history. Note here that the 1976 team won its only contest but one game does not a season of perfection make.

"Ten Rutgers teams had come within a single step of a perfect season," wrote John McDonald in his recap of the campaign and "for more than half of the magnificently fought game, it seemed that this 1961 team was foredoomed, too, to fall one step short."

On the night of Nov. 25, 1976, Colgate, whose perfect season had gone by the week before with a loss to Army, brought an 8-1 record into Giants Stadium, geared up to ruin the Scarlet hope of perfection and halt a 17-game Rutgers winning streak.

A field goal made the visitors look like spoilers at the start. Kennan Startzell's 43-yard boot tied the game, but, after Colgate blocked a punt, the Red Raiders held a 6-3 halftime lead.

What was to follow would cause considerable controversy and, if the 1961 finale ranks among the most explosive offensive shows in Rutgers football history, the third period, fourth down 11 yards to go situation at the Meadowlands has to rate as one of the most bizarre.

With the line of scrimmage at the Colgate 46, Scarlet punter Joe Moss was startled when the center snap sailed over his helpless fingers. Red Raider linebacker Pat Horan raced in pursuit of the ball and Moss led the race, only to be pushed by Horan. The official's call was a "loose ball clip" which gave Rutgers possession of the Colgate 31, a turnaround of some 54 yards from where the ball lay.

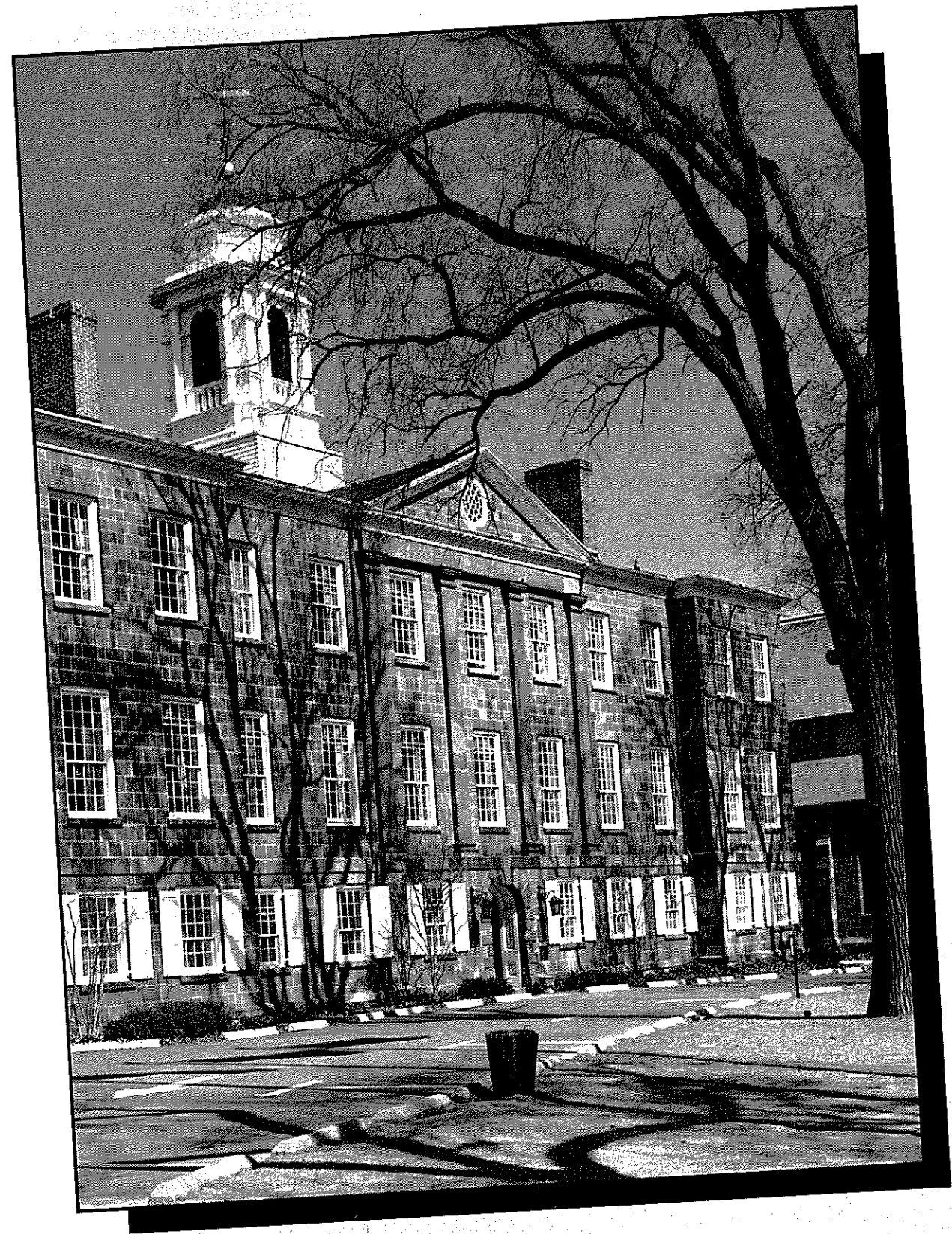
When the ruling was finally accepted, Rutgers squandered the scoring opportunity. However, after regaining possession, Bert Kosup hit Mike Fisher on a one-yard pass for a 10-6 lead at the end of the period.

Jerry Andrewlavage's third field goal narrowed the Scarlet advantage to 10-9 halfway through the final period but Mark Lassiter short bolt with 1:12 on the clock brought total euphoria. There was a last second scare when Don Harris' pass deflection in the end zone averted a Colgate score and a possible tie.

In 1961, the opener provided a thrill when Bill Speranza connected with Lee Curley on an 87-yard TD toss for the 16-13 win over Princeton. Speranza intercepted a Bucknell pass and raced 46 yards to key the 21-6 road win over the Bisons in the third game. Rutgers had relatively easy times in the victories over Connecticut and Lehigh contests, scoring four consecutive times in each. The Scarlet Knights limited both Lehigh and Lafayette to just 10 yards rushing to capture the Middle Three title. In the snow at Colgate, Sam Mudie took interceptions for 52 and 38 yards for touchdowns in a 26-6 win and his 36-yard scamper against Delaware was instrumental in the 27-19 home victory over the Blue Hens. Bucknell, Penn, Lafayette, and Colgate managed just six points against the fine Scarlet defense as Rutgers outscored the nine opponents, 246-102. Center-linebacker Alex Kroll, who returned for the celebration last season, was a consensus All American.

In 1976, Rutgers led the nation in total defense (limiting the 11 opponents to just 179.2 yards a game), in rushing defense (allowing only 83.9 yards a game on the ground), and tied Michigan for the leadership in scoring defense (7.4 on the average). Only five other teams had pulled off the triple titles.

Rutgers opened the 1976 season with a tough, come-from-behind 13-3 win at Navy and the Scarlet defense, which shutout Princeton, Connecticut, Columbia, and Louisville, held Princeton to 38 rushing yards, Cornell to 57 and Massachusetts to 58. Fullback Glen Kehler gained 131 yards in his collegiate debut against Princeton and Jim Hughes saved the day with an interception at Lehigh. Mark Lassiter scored the first touchdown in Giants Stadium in the first college game there and came back to add two more against Columbia. Rutgers was named the ECAC Division I Team of the Year, Frank Burns was honored as the Walter Camp Foundation Coach of the Year and the Scarlet Knights were ranked 17th in the nation. Nate Toran was named a third team All-American.



Rutgers University



RUTGERS, THE STATE UNIVERSITY

Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, with over 49,000 students on seven campuses in New Brunswick, Piscataway, Newark, and Camden, is one of the major state university systems in the nation. Chartered in 1766 as Queen's College, the eighth institution of higher learning to be founded in the colonies before the revolutionary war.

In 1825, the name of the college was changed to Rutgers to honor former trustee and revolutionary war veteran Colonel Henry Rutgers. Rutgers College became the landgrant institution of New Jersey in 1864, and, in the same year, the trustees established Rutgers Scientific School, granting the B.S. degree. In 1880, the State Experiment Station for agricultural research was organized, and, in 1914, engineering was granted separate status as the College of Engineering. In 1921, the College of Agriculture (renamed Cook College in 1973) drew together the State Experiment Station, resident instruction, and the Extension programs.

Douglass College was established in 1918 as the New Jersey College for Women. In 1924, the School of Education, which later became the Graduate School of Education, was authorized, as was the title Rutgers University. In 1926, the University Extension Service (now known as the Division of Continuing Education) was organized. The College of Pharmacy, which was founded in 1892, joined the University in 1927. In 1934, University College was established for adult evening students, with branches in New Brunswick and Newark.

In 1945, the state legislature affirmed state support for the University, and the entire institution was "collectively designated as The State University of New Jersey." In 1956, it became Rutgers — The State University.

The University expanded significantly in the forties and fifties in Newark and Camden. The University of Newark became a part of Rutgers in 1946, adding the Newark College of Arts and Sciences, the School of Law — Newark, and a school of business administration (now the Graduate School of Management) to the University system. In 1956, the College of Nursing was organized in Newark. In 1950, the College of South Jersey in Camden was incorporated into the Rutgers structure as the Camden College of Arts and Sciences and the School of Law — Camden, and a University College branch was set up.

The Graduate Faculty became the Graduate School in 1952 and since that time the following graduate schools have been established: the Graduate School of Library and Information Studies (formerly the Graduate School of Library Service) in 1953; the Graduate School of Social Work in 1954; the School of Criminal Justice (Newark) in 1974; and the Graduate School of Applied and Professional Psychology in 1974. Also in 1974, the Graduate Faculty of Rutgers — Newark received degree-granting authority, and, in 1981, the Graduate School — Camden became a separate unit. In addition, numerous specialized institutes and research centers have been established over the years.

At the undergraduate level, Livingston College was founded in 1969, emphasizing the urban environment. In 1976, the Mason Gross School of the Arts was established offering both undergraduate and graduate programs.

Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, will continue to grow, its direction dictated by the needs of the society it serves.

Dr. EDWARD J. BLOUSTEIN

PRESIDENT



A philosopher and lawyer, Dr. Edward J. Bloustein has served as president of Rutgers, The State University, since 1971. He is among the dozen longest-serving presidents of public colleges and universities in the United States.

More than 48,000 students attend the 25 colleges and schools of the State University of New Jersey, which is the eighth oldest institution in the country. The University has 175,000 living alumni.

Before coming to Rutgers, Dr. Bloustein was president of Bennington College in Vermont from 1965 to 1971 and professor of law at New York University from 1961 to 1965.

Dr. Bloustein holds bachelor's degrees from New York University and Oxford University and doctoral degrees in law and philosophy from Cornell University. A graduate of James Monroe High School in the Bronx, he attended Washington Square College of New York University from which he graduated, Phi Beta Kappa, in 1948. He earned a Bachelor of Philosophy degree at Wadham College of Oxford University in 1950 as a Fulbright Scholar. He also earned a Ph.D. in philosophy at Cornell and a J.D. degree from the Cornell School of Law in 1959. He has been awarded honorary degrees by six institutions.

Inaugurated as president 17 years ago, Dr. Bloustein resolved to maintain a univer-

sity "where men and women of good will may join together in restoring confidence in the institution of reason," calling the university a place "where reason resides."

From the time of his inauguration, he has spoken out on the role of the university, civil rights, women's rights, the difference between dissent and disruption, and about the mission of Rutgers in serving a new, more urban and more heterogeneous student population. He has strongly advocated a new partnership between the University and developing high technology industries in New Jersey.

Dr. Bloustein served in 1984 as chairman of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges, which represents 140 American state universities and colleges.

As one of the nation's leading spokesmen for public higher education, he has testified frequently before congressional committees on the need to provide added research funds to American universities. He is now chairman of NASULGC's Special Committee on the Future of State

Universities in the Year 2000.

Dr. Bloustein has published extensively in the fields of freedom of expression, privacy, the First Amendment, and public policy on nuclear energy. He is author of "Education at a Crossroads: The Imperatives of Our Technetronic Age" (1982), "Individual and Group Privacy" (1978) and "The University and the Counterculture" (1972). He is joint author of "Dimensions of Academic Freedom" (1969) and edited the book "Nuclear Energy, Public Policy and the Law" (1964).

Dr. Bloustein is chairman of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools and vice chairman of the Central New Jersey Round Table Steering Committee. He is a member of The Conference Board, the New Jersey State Assembly Task Force on the 21st Century and the Board of Directors of the National Council on Crime and Delinquency, among other affiliations.

Dr. Bloustein is married to Dr. Ruth Ellen Steinmen, a pediatrician, and they are the parents of two daughters, Elise and Lori.

FREDERICK E. GRUNINGER

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Fred Gruninger, who assumed the position of Director of Athletics at Rutgers in January of 1973, oversees an athletic program which consists of 16 men's and 16 women's sports on the Division I level.

Under Gruninger's guidance, the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics, as well as the Rutgers athletic reputation, has grown significantly. During his tenure as director, Rutgers teams have enjoyed tremendous success. Over the past several years, numbers of teams have participated in post-season play, most notably the women's basketball squad's Final Eight appearances in the last two seasons. There have also been strong individual achievements which have resulted in a near .600 overall winning percentage for Rutgers teams.

The recognizability of Rutgers athletics name has also grown under his direction. Since he assumed the responsibility for the Rutgers program, the State University has been the host institution for many

regional and national intercollegiate and professional sporting events. Highlighting these is the hosting of the NCAA East Regional Basketball Tournament in conjunction with the New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority at the Meadowlands Arena for an unprecedented four consecutive years. Rutgers hosted the 1987 NCAA Division I Lacrosse Championship last May for the fourth time, also an unprecedented achievement. Many conference end-of-season championships have been held at Rutgers and, along with such events as the United States Women's Indoor Tennis Championships, have led to added exposure of the Rutgers name.

During his tenure, major renovations, expansion and new construction programs to enhance and upgrade athletic facilities have taken place. The Athletic Center and the adjacent field complex have brought life and support to the men's and women's basketball teams, the baseball, and softball squads, and the women's lacrosse and field hockey teams.

The Rutgers Stadium Complex has undergone a major addition to the Stadium. Indoor and outdoor synthetic practice and competition areas have been in service for three years and the Athletic Training Center will be open this fall.

These completed projects will increase, immeasurably, the program support for both men and women student athletes. Future plans include construction of a world class aquatic center as part of the Student Recreation Center, and the expansion of the University Boat House to meet the growing needs of the men's and women's crew programs. Other upgrading and expansion programs are underway.

Under Gruninger's direction, the University athletic awards system has broadened the recognition of the student athletes for their athletic and academic

achievements. Special programs of awards are designed annually for all sports along with recognition ceremonies.

In 1968, Gruninger began his association with the Athletic Department when he was named Assistant Athletic Director. Three years later, he was appointed Associate Athletic Director.

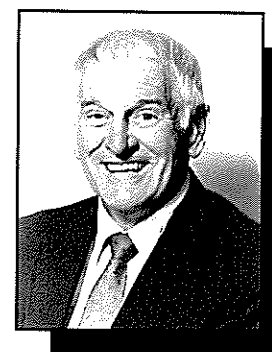
In addition to his administrative duties, Gruninger, a graduate of Rutgers, coached the Scarlet Knights golf team from 1963 to 1972, recording a 109-30-2 mark and taking teams and individuals to a number of post-season tournaments.

The energetic and enthusiastic administrator has held various offices in state, regional, and national athletic organizations, including membership on the College Football Association's Board of Directors and the Board of the Major Independent Football Association. Currently, Gruninger is a member of the NCAA Post-Season Football Committee and the Host Committee of the Kickoff Classic. Additionally, he was co-organizer of the Collegiate Athletic Administration of New Jersey [CAANJ], an organization founded to serve and foster relations among the 42 four-year and two-year colleges in the state which compete in men's and women's athletics.

Gruninger, who has been involved in numerous local and state charitable and athletic endeavors, is a native of Fanwood, NJ, and now resides in Martinsville. He and his wife, Barbara, are the parents of two sons—Mark, who received a Ph.D. degree in Ceramic Engineering from Rutgers this spring, and Jack, a student and member of the football team at the University of Virginia. Daughter Katherine is a 1985 graduate of Lafayette College where she co-captained the women's basketball team in her senior season.

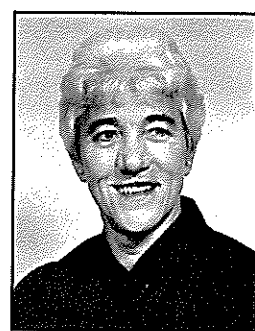

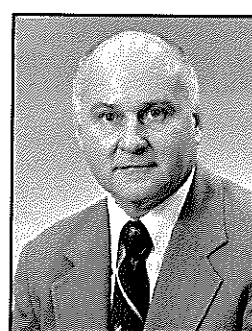

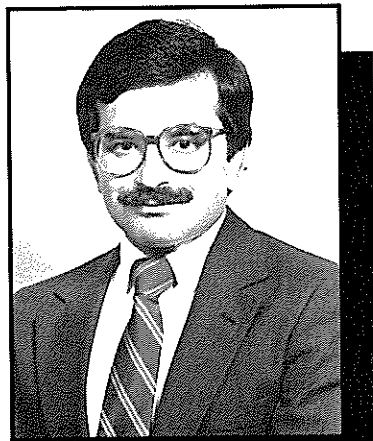

SPORTS MEDICINE

David Scott



DIRECTOR, SPORTS MEDICINE

Dr. David I. Scott, who, in the past, worked with elite international athletes, is in his third season as the Director of Sports Medicine at the State University.

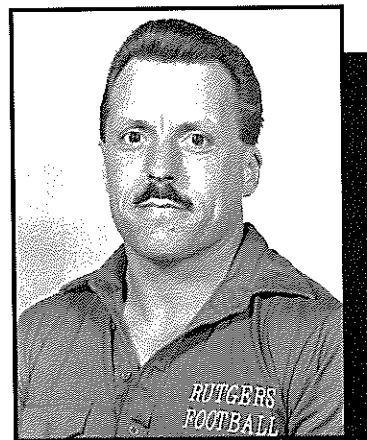
A Metuchen native and a Rutgers Prep graduate, Dr. Scott, 33, received his medical degree from the Temple University School of Medicine in 1981 after graduating, Phi Beta Kappa, from Franklin and Marshall College in 1976. He completed his internship and residency at Shands Hospital, University of Florida. Prior to his appointment at Rutgers, he was a clinical fellow at the Fort Collins Sports Medicine Clinic in Colorado.

At Fort Collins, Dr. Scott served as a clinician in the adult and pediatric sports medicine program which is operated in conjunction with the University of Colorado School of Medicine. Athletes of all ages, and abilities, are treated in the program. He has also served as team physician at high schools in Gainesville, FL, and Fort Collins.

Currently, he is the assistant clinical professor at the Robert Wood Johnson School of Medicine and the director of the Rutgers Athletic Substance Abuse Program. He served at the US Olympic Training Camp in Colorado Springs this summer.

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

Paul Kennedy



Dr. Paul Kennedy arrived at Rutgers in 1984 and quickly began to install his ideas about strength and conditioning. These are ideas he refined through his career as an athlete, an educator, and as a coach. He incorporated them into his doctoral thesis ("The Effect of Eccentric Exercise on the Development of Power and Strength") last year when he won his doctorate from Penn State.

Kennedy, an admitted maverick in the field, develops his workouts on the idea that they should be time-effective and should circumvent fatigue, taking "every muscle to failure because workouts are only meaningful after every muscle and joint is taken to exhaustion."

The programs, which he puts together for each player, are intended to "be meaningful . . . brief so they don't have to spend

hours in the weightroom and . . . give them results they can see over short period of time."

Strength, flexibility, and endurance are the ultimate results of the generally 35-minute programs. And, though the former Olympic lifter at first met some opposition from those who favored other methods, he and his purposes were readily accepted by the Scarlet football squad.

"Our purpose, particularly with football players, is injury prevention," says the Texas-born Kennedy who served on the strength and conditioning staff at Penn State for three years prior to his appointment at Rutgers. "We hope to increase the flexibility of their joints while we concomitantly increase the strength of the muscle surrounding the joint so that the athlete is less prone to injury.

"We can never totally reduce injuries to zero, but we know that if an athlete is more flexible and stronger, he will recover from any injuries he incurs during the football season."

Kennedy, whose varied background includes coaching football and wrestling on the scholastic level in Delaware for four years while also teaching classes in English, is a riveting lecturer and his articles appear with great regularity in athletic magazines. His intensity in the weightroom and on the field is infectious and his accessibility is appreciated. He coordinates the conditioning program for all 32 sports at Rutgers with assistants Matt Brzycki and Jim Small and his dedication has made believers of all who come to him for advice and help.

Kennedy works closely with the members of the athletic training staff whose focus is also on educating the student-athlete



in correct health care practices. Preventive taping and strapping, emergency first aid care and rehabilitative efforts are intended to keep the athletes ready to participate. Support in these efforts also comes from the First Aid Squad, the University's health services, a team doctor and dentist and other staff groups.

As the Athletic Training Center neared completion this summer, Kennedy was ecstatic about the ways the structure will help his program.

"It will allow us to train a greater number of athletes more

comprehensively and completely," says the irrepressible coach, now a resident of Manasquan. "We will have an even more comprehensive program due to the variety of equipment and greater space in which to get the job done."

The ultra-modern facility will feature a near 5,000 square foot, fully equipped exercise and strength training room and a spacious treatment and rehabilitative care training area.

There, Kennedy's ideas of intensity, brevity and meaningfulness will be given even greater emphasis.

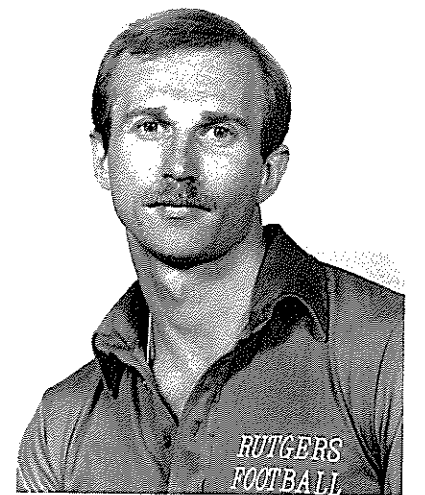

STUDENT-ATHLETE SERVICES

While fully committed to achieving excellence on the playing fields, Rutgers recognizes the special needs of the student-athlete and is just as committed to helping the student-athlete realize that preparation must be made for life after athletic competition.

Academic excellence at the State University is never compromised. The Division of Intercollegiate Athletics is totally aware that a university must provide exceptional educational experiences for its students, and thus it is imperative for the future of the student-athlete that he take full advantage of his opportunities. The Division thus provides services which cover a wide spectrum of concerns. A comprehensive counseling program is designed to help the student-athlete meet the heavy demands imposed by participation in athletics as well as squaring off with the challenging curricula at Rutgers.

Basically, the program aims to assist the student-athlete in achieving academic success while also preparing him to attain personal and career goals after his college sports career. In the program, each student-athlete is treated as an individual, each receiving special attention so that he can better adjust, according to his own character, to the college environment and its ever-changing aspects.

The office of academic support programs has as its mission the daily oversight of classroom development. Coaches also take very active roles, working closely with the counselors in reaffirmation of the philosophy that academic pursuits must be a priority in an athlete's collegiate career.

The goal of the academic support office is to have every student-athlete as successful academically as he can possibly be and to have him graduate. The services include individualized attention to academic needs, curriculum counseling, supervision of study halls, study skills development, and tutorial assistance.

The total student-athlete service program focuses on the needs of the athlete, adjustments to the environment, time management, study skills, interpersonal relationships with teachers and coaches, career planning, and counseling. The program components include freshman orientation, mandatory study halls, a study skills seminar, extensive tutorial services, monitoring of progress and performance, counseling for effective and realistic career decision-making, and post graduate placement assistance. Opportunities for part-time work, summer employment and internships — some which may lead to careers after graduation — are also provided.

These tasks come under the direction of a staff fully aware of the mission and enthusiastically in recognition that the members are, in effect, a resource center. They approach the mission as energetically as coaches preparing a team for competition.

In fact, two of the principals have been coaches at Rutgers

during their varied and successful careers. All have close career ties to athletics.

Assistant Directors Paul Vitek (Student Athletic Services) and Joe Boylan (Academic Support Programs) have been on the Rutgers football and basketball staffs, respectively, and both have had broad teaching experience. Don Barrows (Athletic Academic Advisor), an honorable mention All-American fullback at Yale, is a candidate for a doctorate degree. Christine Sohn (Athletic Academic Advisor) has had experience on both the collegiate and professional levels.

The athletic program at Rutgers remains consistent with the overall mission of the University — to achieve athletic and academic excellence by building winners on and off the field.

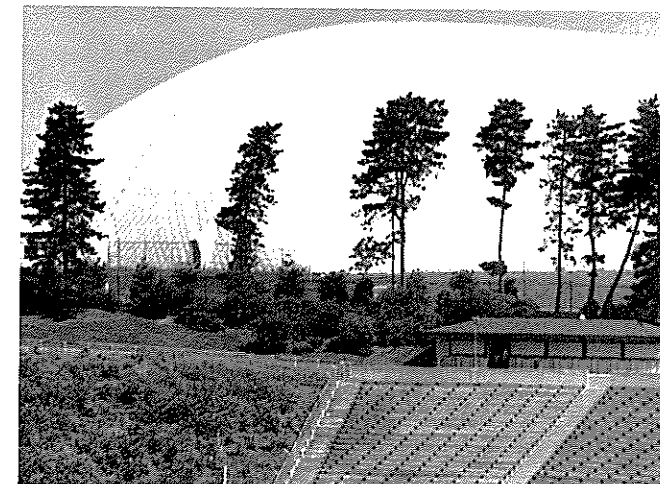


FACILITIES

Flights descending on or taking off from Newark International Airport provide air travellers a magnificent view of the metropolitan area and also of the broad expanse of the State University. That view has been enhanced recently by several distinct features on the Busch Campus in Piscataway — the Sports Complex at Rutgers Stadium.

Rutgers Stadium, which will be in its 50th season this year, stands majestically in its natural ravine and its strictly maintained grass turf is brilliant testimony to the builders and the current grounds crew.

Now, attached to the old, is the new — a \$7 million multi-purpose Athletic Training Center, a handsome granite-faced structure on three levels on the Stadium's East side. Just across the road from the Stadium and adjacent to the golf course is "a big, puffy white cloud on the ground" — an indoor facility known affectionately as the "Bubble," the nation's largest air-supported structure with a full-sized synthetic football field and running track for all-weather use. And, a bit northeast of the Stadium, a third practice field that has an artificial surface with lighting.

These new features are the result of a plan for progress conceived in 1984 with a strong commitment by both Rutgers and the State of New Jersey. The indoor practice and conditioning bubble and the artificial practice area were the first to be completed in 1984 while the go-ahead was given for the training center.

The outdoor practice field went into use in time for the 1984 pre-season camp and soon became the home field for soccer and lacrosse. The indoor facility, measuring 430 x 230 feet and at a height of 80 feet, has been used in inclement weather and into the night when its lights give an eerie glow through the translucent polyester vinyl fabric.

Completed during the summer months, the Athletic Training Center is built on three levels above and around the East side of the historic Stadium. The first level includes a 4,750 square foot, fully equipped exercise and strength training room with mirrored walls and carpeted floors. The modern lockerroom has 120 built-in oak cubicles and is divided into separate sections for the offensive and defensive teams. The 3,000 square foot area is large enough for coaches to address the entire team at one time. It features a large skylight, a sauna, and showers. Equipment and laundry rooms are nearby.

A treatment and rehabilitative care training room contains the most modern equipment, including several whirlpool baths, an emersion tank, an X-ray room, and offices for the team physician.

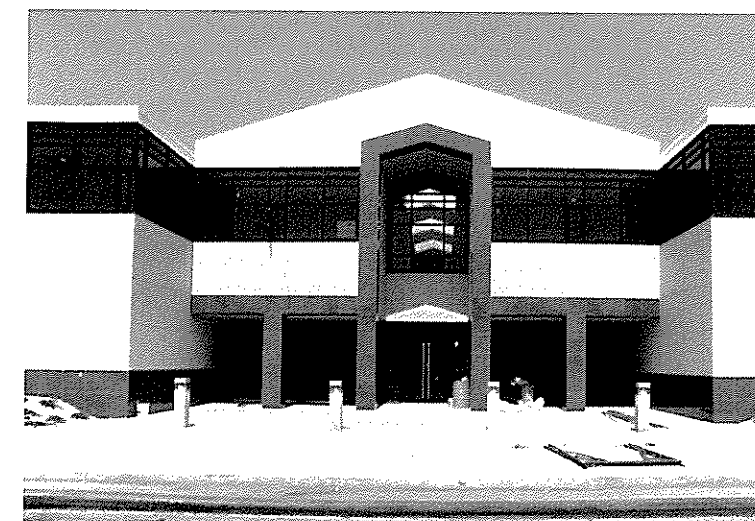
The coaches' offices are on the second level as well as an attractive reception area, six classrooms, and a large lecture hall with state of the art audio visual equipment.

On the third level, is a striking 1,300 square foot VIP lounge and multi-purpose room overlooking the 50-yard line. The entire wall facing the playing field is of glass and, outside, a large open terrace will allow viewing when the weather is agreeable. TV monitors and a superior sound system complement the lounge.

For the first time at Rutgers, all the facilities for the football program are in one place, which pleases head coach Dick Anderson to no end.

"The integration in one building of training facilities, coaches' offices, and facilities for student athletes will strengthen the interaction between coaches and players," says Anderson, who believes that football is "the ultimate [sport] in terms of coordinating people."

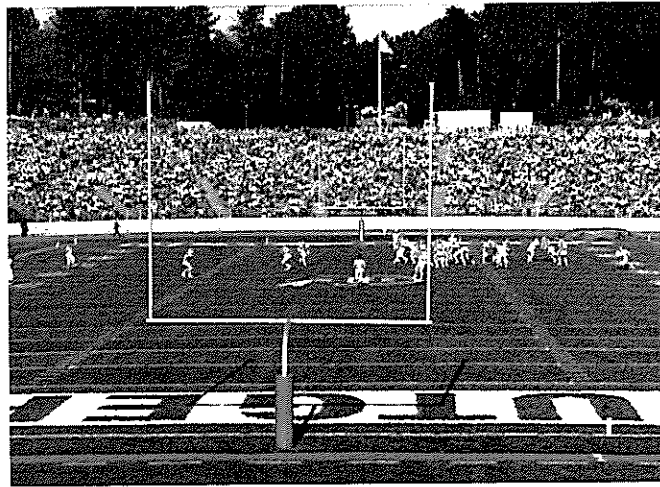

RUTGERS STADIUM



The 1987 football season will be the 50th in Rutgers Stadium and the Syracuse game will be the 218th in this facility, perhaps, one of the most esthetic in the country. Dedicated in 1938 [Nov. 5], the stadium seats 25,000. The Dedication game, a 20-18 victory over Princeton, is doubly celebrated because it was the first win over the Tigers since the first intercollegiate football contest in 1869. The game missed by just one day of being on the same date as the first game.

The rich history of Rutgers Stadium includes 155 victories with only 50 losses and three ties, and has seen 36 winning campaigns.

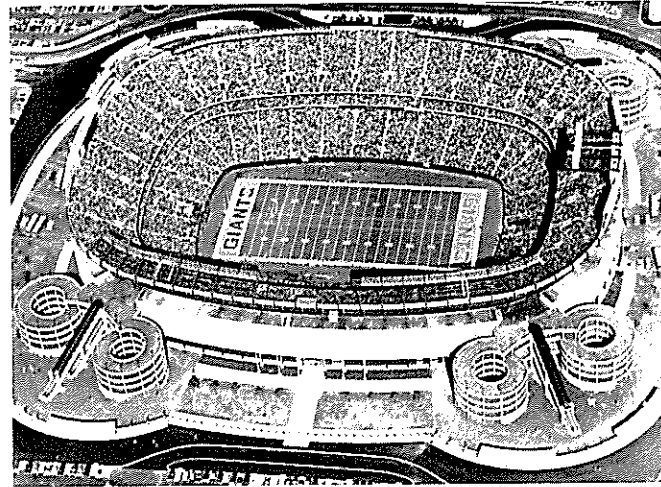
Rutgers posted a 7-0 stadium record in 1975 and went 6-0 in 1941. In addition to these undefeated seasons, there have been eight other unblemished seasons and two marred only by ties — 1939 and 1952. For the record, the undefeated seasons were in 1941 [6-0, with four shutouts], 1946 [4-0], 1947 [5-0], 1950 [3-0], 1961 [4-0], 1975 [7-0], 1976 [4-0], 1977 [4-0], 1982 [2-0], and 1984 [4-0]. There have been nine .500 seasons, including last year, and just three losing seasons, 1951, 1953, and 1955.

The longest winning streak in Rutgers Stadium was recorded between 1974 and 1978 when the Scarlet Knights put together a string of 20 consecutive victories. Wins over Boston University and Colgate started the streak at the end of the 1974 season and extended through the 1978 campaign before Colgate brought it to an end with a 14-9 upset in the season finale.

Rutgers went 19 games without a loss in the stadium at the start of play in 1938, taking three straight before Richmond tied the 1939 game at 6-6. The non-losing skein continued through 1942 when Lafayette scored a 19-13 victory.

The Scarlet Knights have lost a single game in 20 of the 49 seasons, have lost two games nine times, three just four times and four games only once, in 1953. The last time Rutgers suffered a pair of losses was in 1980 and the most recent three-loss season was in 1971.

GIANTS STADIUM



Rutgers will take a 10-14 Giants Stadium record into the September 26 game with Kentucky and a win that day, with victories also over Duke and Pittsburgh there, would draw near the .500 mark for play in the 12th season for the magnificent second home.

Last year, Rutgers defeated Army but lost to Florida and West Virginia in the Meadowlands park.

Rutgers holds the distinction of having played in the first college game in Giants Stadium, defeating Columbia in 1976. The Scarlet Knights have hosted 14 different opponents in the 11 years. Army has visited four times as an opponent; Penn State and West Virginia have made three appearances against the Scarlet; Columbia, Pittsburgh, and Boston College have met Rutgers squads twice each; and one-time foes have been Princeton, Alabama, Virginia, Syracuse, Tennessee, Colgate, Florida, and Arizona State.

The Scarlet Knights have scored five shutouts in the 10 victories but have been outscored overall, 452-439. The shutouts came over Columbia in the 1976 christening contest [47-0], over Princeton [24-0] and Columbia [69-0] in 1978, over Army in 1979 [20-0] and over Virginia in 1981 [3-0].

Following wins over Columbia and Colgate in 1976, Rutgers lost to Penn State, 45-7, a loss which halted an 18-game [the nation's longest at the time] Scarlet win streak. Rutgers bounced back with shutouts over Princeton and Columbia in 1978 before losing to Arizona State [34-17] in Garden State Bowl I.

In 1979, the lone appearance was a 20-0 victory over Army and the single game in 1980 was the memorable thriller as Bear Bryant brought his top ranked Crimson Tide squad in for a 17-13 win but verbally gave the victory to Rutgers.

Rutgers split the 1981 games, narrowly edging Virginia and losing big to Pittsburgh, 47-3. The 1982 season saw the Scarlet score a 24-3 win over Army between defeats by Syracuse [31-8] and West Virginia [44-17]. Penn State [36-25], Boston College [42-22], and Tennessee [7-0] left Rutgers winless in the Stadium in 1983 but the Scarlet won both 1984 contests — defeating Army, 14-7, and West Virginia, 23-19. Rutgers was again without a win in 1985, dropping games to Penn State [17-10], Pittsburgh [38-10], and Boston College [20-10].

Last season, Rutgers defeated Army, 35-7, between losses to Florida, [15-3] and West Virginia [24-17].

RADIO

All Rutgers games will be broadcast over the Rutgers Radio Network with WCTC [1450 AM] in New Brunswick again serving as the flagship station. Bruce Johnson begins his second season as play-by-play announcer. Johnson, WCTC's news director, also provides play-by-play call for Rutgers basketball. Joining Johnson is Rich Policastro. Policastro, a First-Team All-East quarterback for the Scarlet Knights in 1969, provides expert commentary. Policastro holds the school record for touchdowns in a season with 15 in 1968 and also holds the record for career scoring tosses with 29. Larry Pitt rounds out the broadcasting crew. Pitt, a Rutgers alumnus and sports historian, adds color and statistical information to the broadcast. Every game will also be carried by the Rutgers student station WRSU [88.7 FM].

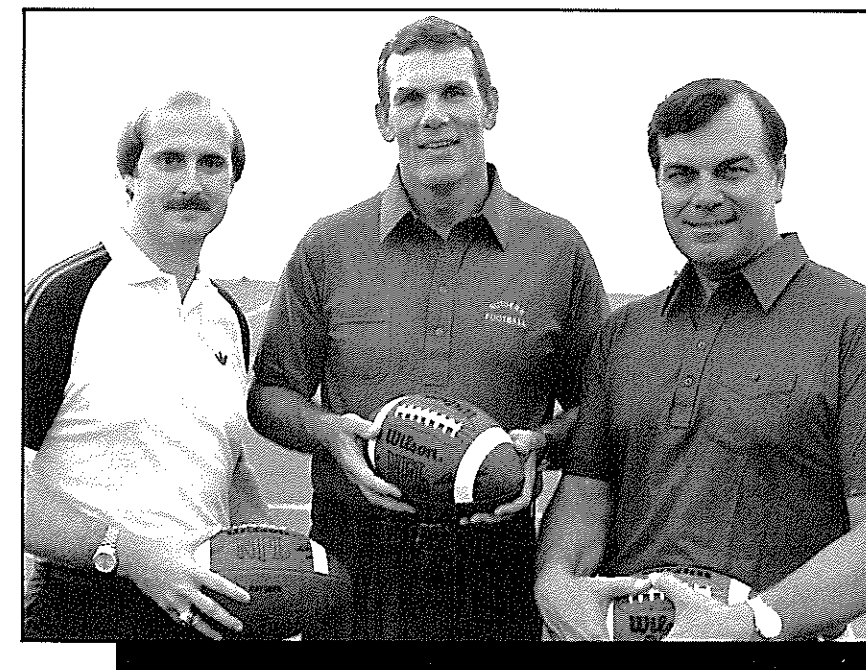
TELEVISION

"Rutgers Football Preview" with Dick Anderson begins its third season this fall. The show, hosted by Pat Scanlon, Sports Director of New Jersey Network and former Princeton head coach Bob Casciola, airs on New Jersey Network each Friday evening at 11:00 p.m. The 30-minute show features highlights of the past week's game as well as previewing the upcoming game, and also includes questions from fans for Anderson and feature stories on the many exciting aspects of Rutgers football.

At press time of this publication, Rutgers University was one of nine schools [Boston College, Pittsburgh, Syracuse, Temple, Army, Navy, West Virginia, and Notre Dame] to be finalizing plans with television syndicator Jefferson Pilot to televise a game of the week. The syndicated series will be known as the "Great American Independent Football Production" and will start on September 12, 1987. A complete schedule was to be announced at a later date. Steve Martin will be the play-by-play voice while color commentary will be provided by Bob Casciola.

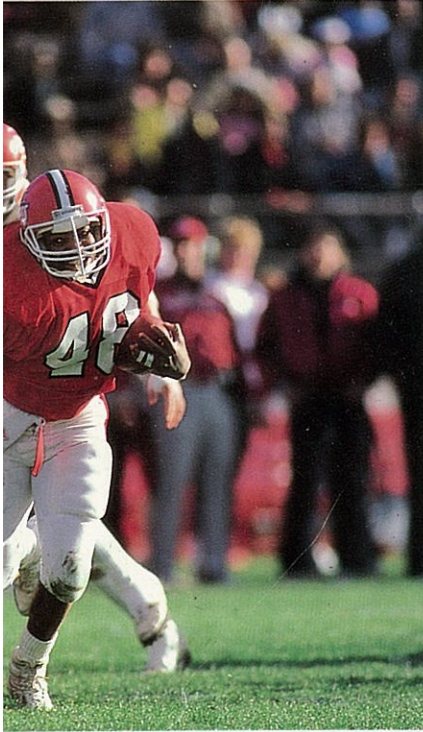
