ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

RUTGERS IS ONE OF THE TOP ACADEMIC INSTITUTIONS IN THE COUNTRY, YEAR AFTER YEAR.

Rutgers football received public recognition from the NCAA for top academic performance for its multi-year Academic Progress Rate scores. It marked the fifth-consecutive year that the Scarlet Knights' football program was cited by the NCAA.

These awards are given each year to teams scoring in the top 10 percent in each sport with their APRs.

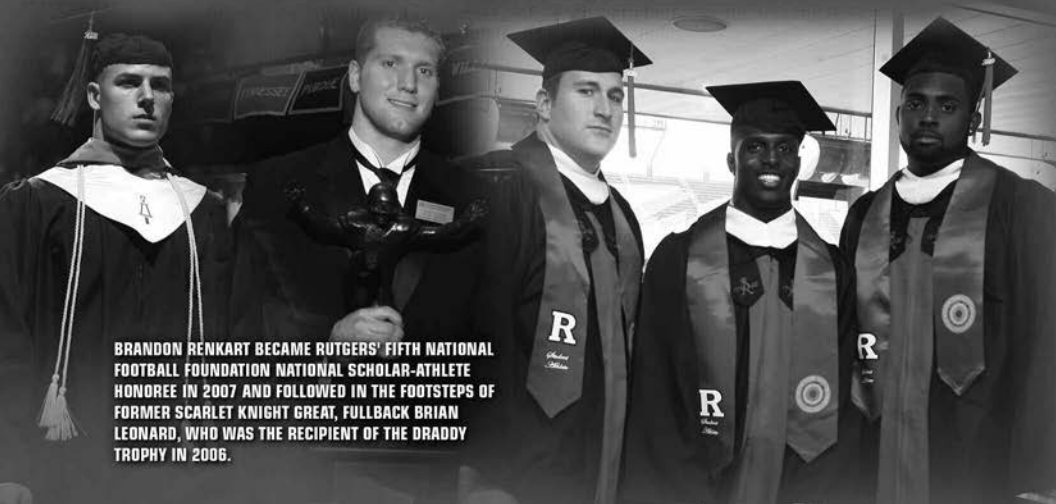
The Rutgers football program was the lone state university on the list to be ranked in the top 10 percent nationally in APR for the fifth-straight year. In addition, Rutgers was the lone institution to win four bowl games while earning the APR honor in the top 10 percent over the previous five-year span. The Scarlet Knights continue to be one of the leaders nationally in both production on the field and in the classroom. Last year, the Rutgers football team achieved the nation's number two ranking in Academic Progress Rate, while earning the nation's number one mark in 2010.

Rutgers is one of only 12 Football Bowl Subdivision programs to be ranked in the top 10 percent in the APR scores.

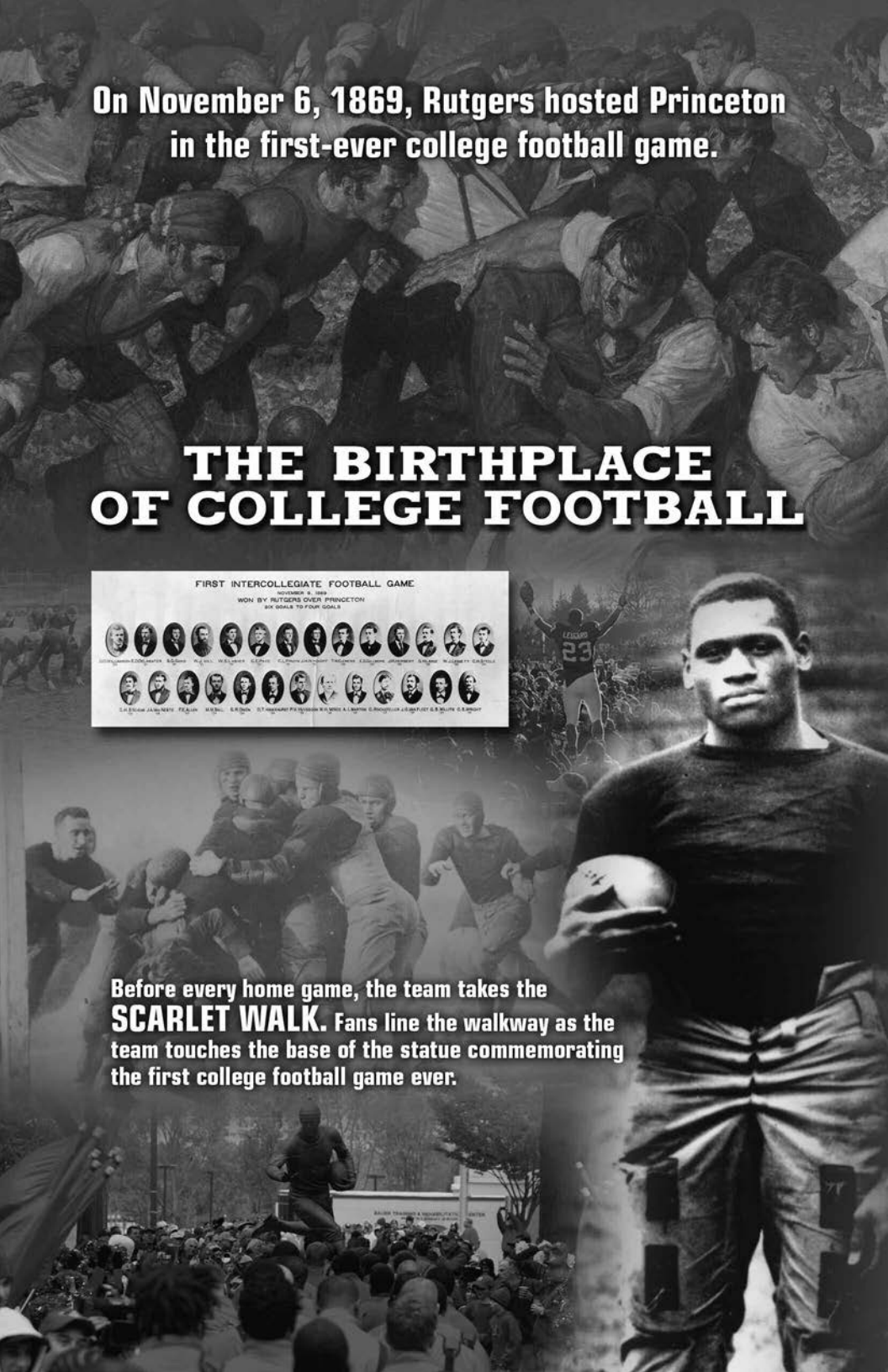

NEW LOOK KNIGHTS

Rutgers unveiled new football uniforms for the 2012-2013 season featuring Nike Pro Combat System of Dress technology combined with unique design inspiration that harkens back to the Scarlet Knights' rich tradition and history.

The fully integrated uniform system incorporates the latest in performance innovation and design while paying tribute to the school's long-time mascot and identity as the Scarlet Knights.

The new uniform features true knight-like designs such as metallic accents and battle "scars" throughout the fabrication. The true knights of old donned more battle scars for battles they had been in and won – which meant they had a uniform that had truly been battle tested. Similarly, the Scarlet Knights' Nike Pro Combat football jersey features added inset ribbing around the shoulders that are made to look like iron plates, yet also enhance the actual technology of the uniform by providing impact and abrasion-resistant screen print allowing for even less "give" and fewer grab points. The pant stripe comes to a point and features a beveled-edge design much like a sword, and ties directly into the knight's plume on the all-new chrome finish helmet. The uniform also features an all-new knight-driven number and font system specific to the team that features a chainmail texture.



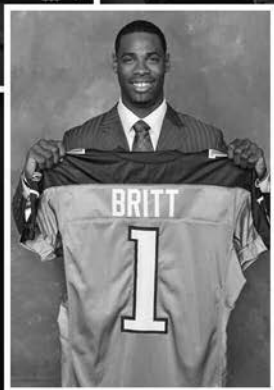


NFL KNIGHTS

Since 2001, more than 50 Scarlet Knights have signed NFL contracts, including 16 in the last three seasons.

Since 2009, more than 30 former Rutgers players have played at the next level, including Pro Bowlers Ray Rice, Shaun O'Hara, Devin McCourty and fellow first-round draft picks Kenny Britt and Anthony Davis.

Rutgers has also been well represented in the Super Bowl, with at least one Scarlet Knight suiting up for the big game in six of the last eight seasons.

HEAD COACH KYLE FLOOD

Kyle Flood was named the 29th head coach at the Birthplace of College Football on January 31, 2012. Flood, who served on Rutgers' coaching staff for the previous seven seasons, assumed the head coaching vacancy created after Greg Schiano resigned his position to become head coach of the NFL's Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

One constant on any coaching staff with Flood is how successful those teams have fared. In 16 of Flood's 17 seasons as an assistant coach, his teams finished with winning records, including earning a National Championship at Delaware.

The last time Rutgers promoted an assistant coach on staff to the head coaching position was the naming of Frank Burns to replace John Bateman in 1973 — and Burns became the winningest coach in school history.

A highly respected figure in the coaching profession, Flood has served as the assistant head coach of the program since 2008 and has been a key part in Rutgers' six bowl appearances over his seven-year tenure in Piscataway. In addition to his four years as the assistant head coach, Flood has been in charge of the offensive line since coming to RU in 2005.

Known as an excellent tactician with strong recruiting ties, Flood has served on the coaching staff of the team with the nation's longest active bowl winning streak at five games. While being part of a program producing victories at a rate unprecedented in Rutgers' history, Flood has understood the value of academics for the Scarlet Knights. In

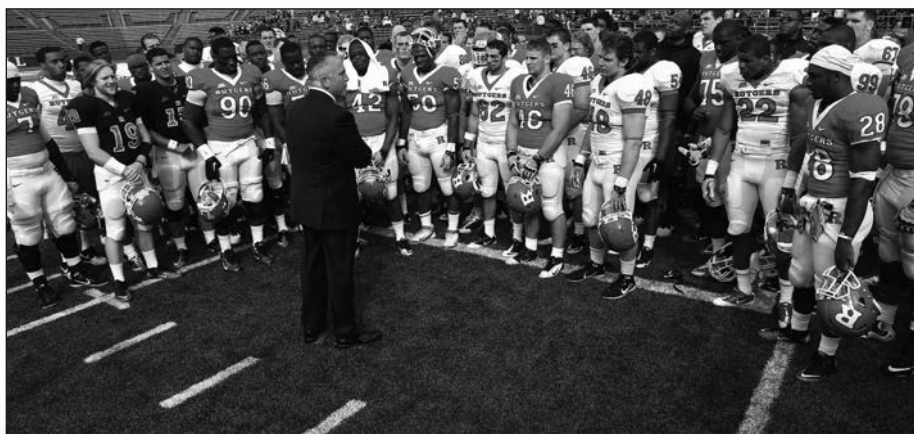
2010, Rutgers' football program ranked first in the nation in Academic Progress Rate and in 2011 the team followed up with the nation's No. 2 ranking. In the most recent NCAA APR scores released, Rutgers placed ninth nationally, becoming the only public institution nationally to be ranked in the top 10 in five-consecutive years.

During his time 'On the Banks', the Rutgers offensive line has consistently produced top-level talent, including several of which who have gone on to the National Football League. Most recently, Anthony Davis became the highest player ever drafted in Rutgers history as the 11th overall pick of the 2010 NFL Draft. Davis has started every game of his two-year career with the San Francisco 49ers at right tackle and helped guide the 49ers to the NFC Championship game in 2012.

In 2011, Flood helped tutor true freshman right tackle Kaleb Johnson into one of the nation's premier rookie offensive linemen, earning Freshman All-America honors. In addition, senior offensive guard Art Forst collected All-BIG EAST First Team honors while senior offensive guard Desmond Wynn was named to the All-BIG EAST Second Team. Wynn was signed as a free agent by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers following the 2012 NFL Draft.

Since arriving at Rutgers, Flood has coached 10 All-BIG EAST First or Second Team selections on the offensive line, one All-American and two Freshman All-America honorees.

Flood has helped engineer some of the most potent offenses in Rutgers history — evident in a record-breaking



2007 season. The Scarlet Knights' offensive line ranked second in the nation with just 10 sacks allowed in addition to an RU offense that became the first in NCAA history to have a 3,000-yard passer, 2,000-yard rusher and two 1,000-yard receivers in the same season.

The Rutgers offense was ranked 18th nationally in total offense in 2007. The offensive line featured two of the top tackles in the nation in Pedro Sosa and Jeremy Zuttah. Both players earned All-BIG EAST honors and were also invited to the NFL Scouting Combine in Indianapolis, with Zuttah becoming a third round selection by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Flood added run game coordinator to his duties in 2007 and his offensive line helped pave the way for All-American running back Ray Rice, who rushed for a school and then-BIG EAST record 2,012 yards that season. Rice went on to become one of the most-recognizable faces in the NFL en route to consecutive Pro Bowl appearances in 2010 and 2011.

In 2006, Flood coached an offensive line that helped Rutgers to one of its most productive seasons, as the group relinquished the fewest sacks in the nation with just eight. His unit was regarded as one of the best in the country and featured Cameron Stephenson and Darnell Stapleton, both who played in the NFL. Flood's corps of hard-nosed blockers helped guide Rice to an All-America season, as he finished second in the nation with 1,794 yards.

Flood came to Rutgers after three seasons at the University of Delaware, where he helped the Blue Hens to a 30-11 record, including a 15-1 mark in 2003 en route to the NCAA FCS National Championship and a share of the Atlantic 10 title in 2004. He also served as assistant head coach and recruiting coordinator during his stint.

Prior to his three seasons at Delaware, Flood was offensive line coach at Hofstra from 1997-2001. While at Hofstra, he helped the Pride earn berths in the NCAA FCS playoffs in 1997 and 1999-2001. The Pride were among the top offensive teams in the nation during his tenure, ranking second in total offense, fourth in passing and fifth in scoring in 2001.



Flood, a 1993 graduate of Iona College, was a four-year letter-winner for the Gaels. A high school teammate of former Rutgers All-American tight end Marco Battaglia at St. Francis Prep High School in Queens, N.Y., Flood earned First Team All-Liberty Conference honors in 1991 and served as team captain of the Gaels in 1992.

Flood's first college coaching position came in 1995-96 as offensive line coach at Long Island University-C.W. Post. While coaching at C.W. Post, he helped the team to the ECAC Division II Eastern title in 1996. Flood began his coaching career at St. Francis Prep in 1993, as both offensive and defensive line coach in 1993-94.

Flood and his wife, Amy, are the proud parents of three children, Kyle, Isabella and Joseph.

A New Jersey native with over 20 years of coaching experience, Dave Brock begins his first year at Rutgers as offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach "On the Banks." Brock comes to Piscataway after a three-year stint at Boston College, including serving as interim offensive coordinator for the majority of the 2011 season.

Brock reunites with Kyle Flood after the two served on the same coaching staff at Hofstra from 1997-2001.

A native of Moorestown, N.J., Brock's 21-year coaching career includes stops at North Carolina, Temple, Hofstra, Kansas State and BC. He has been an offensive coordinator for six seasons and has coached a plethora of current NFL standouts including Hakeem Nicks (New York Giants), Josh Freeman (Tampa Bay Buccaneers), Jordy Nelson (Green Bay Packers) and Marques Colston (New Orleans Saints).

Brock was the Eagles tight ends coach during his three years at BC. In 2009, Brock helped develop tight ends Chris Pantale and Lars Anderson. Pantale had 25 catches for 223 yards and one touchdown while Anderson had eight catches for 102 yards and a touchdown.

Brock was also instrumental in locating and recruiting quarterback Dave Shinskie, who came to BC after a career in professional baseball. Despite being picked to finish last in the ACC's Atlantic Division in preseason media voting, the 2009 Eagles finished with an 8-5 record, came within one win of playing in a third consecutive ACC Championship Game.

Brock spent the 2008 season as Kansas State's offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach after coaching the wide outs in 2007. Kansas State ranked 18th nationally in passing (269.6) and 19th in scoring offense (34.9) under Brock's leadership.

As offensive coordinator at Kansas State, Brock spearheaded a Wildcat offense that produced the 2008 Big 12 Offensive Newcomer of the Year in wide receiver Brandon Banks and Kansas State's most prolific passer in school history in quarterback Josh Freeman. Banks set a Wildcat junior record with 67 receptions and 1,049 yards last season, while Freeman became Kansas State's career leader in passing attempts, completions, yards, touchdowns and total offense in 2008.

In 2007, Brock tutored Kansas State's Jordy Nelson, who was a consensus All-American and Biletnikoff Award finalist, as well as Big 12 Offensive Newcomer of the Year Dean Murphy. Nelson, who became the Wildcats' first-ever offensive consensus All-American, ranked second in the nation in receptions (10.2) and receiving yards per game (133.8) en route to setting 11 Kansas State receiving records.

Kansas State, which set school records for passing yards, completions and attempts in a season, also ranked 20th nationally in passing offense (285.4) and 21st in scoring offense (35.2). The Wildcats finished the season with a 3,000-yard passer, a 1,600-yard receiver and a 1,000-yard rusher for the first time in school history.

Prior to Kansas State, Brock spent two years at North Carolina, where he served as the Tar Heels' assistant head coach/recruiting coordinator and wide receivers coach. In 2005, Jarwarski Pollock became the all-time leading receiver at Carolina with 177 catches.

In 2006, Brock coached wide receiver Hakeem Nicks to honorable mention freshman All-America honors by *The Sporting News* as Nicks set UNC freshman records with 39 receptions for 660 yards and four touchdowns.

Prior to North Carolina, Brock was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for three seasons at Temple. In 2004, Temple ranked third in the Big East in rushing, generating 173.0 yards on the ground per game.

Brock served in various roles during seven seasons at Hofstra from 1995 through 2002, including running backs coach (1995), wide receivers coach/recruiting coordinator (1997-99), offensive coordinator (2000-01) and associate head coach (2002). In 2000, Hofstra finished the year ranked No. 7 with a 9-4 record.

Brock played linebacker at Ferrum (Va.) College before earning a bachelor of science degree in political science from Salisbury (Md.) State University.

Brock and his wife, Karen, have three sons - Henry, William, and Richard - and two daughters - Kate and Maggie.

DAVE COHEN

LINEBACKERS

Dave Cohen enters his first season at Rutgers as linebackers coach. A former head coach at Hofstra for four seasons, Cohen returns to the East Coast after a successful two-year stint as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Western Michigan.

Cohen and Kyle Flood coached together at Delaware from 2002-05 as the Blue Hens won the 2003 National Championship at the Football Championship Subdivision level.

In 2011, Western Michigan's defense boasted its fifth MAC Defensive Player of the Year and Phil Steele All-American Drew Nowak. Rover Johnnie Simon and defensive end Freddie Bishop also earned All-MAC honors for the first time in their respective careers.

Cohen's defensive unit at WMU was 10th nationally in turnovers gained in 2011 with 31, sixth nationally in red zone defense and first in the nation in fourth down defense.

Prior to his two-year tenure at Western Michigan, Cohen was the head coach at Hofstra from 2006-09 before the university decided to drop the sport. In 2007, Hofstra recorded the second-most improved record in the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS), going from 2-9 in 2006 to 7-4.

The Pride led the CAA in rushing defense in 2007, allowing just 113.9 yards per game, which ranked as the best average since the 1996 campaign. The Pride also ranked second in total defense, allowing just 312 yards per game. That mark was the second-lowest total since 1996.

For his efforts, Cohen was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Award, which is presented annually to the top FCS coach in the country. Following the 2007 season, cornerback Kyle Arrington entered the NFL and started the 2012 Super Bowl for the New England Patriots, teaming with former Rutgers first-round selection Devin McCourty as the two starting cornerbacks for the Patriots.

In 2008, despite having a team that was decimated by injuries, the Pride led the CAA and ranked fourth in the country in pass defense, ninth in kickoff returns, 39th in rushing offense and 43rd in total defense in the FCS. Hofstra also posted its best pass defense average in 18 years and its best rushing average in seven seasons.

Cohen came to Hofstra after a four-year stint at the University of Delaware - his second tenure at UD - from 2002-05. During that time, his defensive schemes played a large part in Delaware posting a 15-1 record and capturing the NCAA I-AA national title in 2003.

Led by All-American defensive end and Oakland Raider draftee Shawn Johnson and San Francisco 49ers starting safety Mike Adams, the Blue Hens posted the first shutout in I-AA championship game history with a 40-0 win over previously unbeaten Colgate. Cohen was honored in July 2004 as the NCAA I-AA Defensive Coordinator of the Year by American Football Monthly magazine.

In 2004, Cohen led a Blue Hen defense that ranked among the top 25 in the nation in rushing defense, total defense, and turnover margin as Delaware went 9-4 and advanced to the I-AA quarterfinals.

Born in Huntington, New York, Cohen was a three-time league champion, all-county and All-Long Island selection at Commack North High School. A 1988 business management graduate of Long Island University-C.W. Post, Cohen earned his master's degree in education administration from SUNY-Albany in 1990. While at C.W. Post, he was a two-year starter at defensive tackle and earned CoSIDA Academic All-Region honors as a senior.

Following his first stint at Delaware (1994-98), Cohen moved on to Fordham University, where he served three seasons (1999-2001) as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach, including the last two seasons as associate head coach.

He began his coaching career as linebackers coach and strength coach at Albany in 1988-89 before moving on to Lafayette College, where he served four seasons from 1990-93 as linebackers and defensive line coach.

Cohen and his wife Denise have two sons, Charlie and Brian.

Jeremy Cole begins his first season as Head Football Strength and Conditioning Coach with Rutgers football. He previously served as a strength and conditioning assistant for the Scarlet Knights from since 2008.

Cole directs all aspects of the football team's in-season and offseason training in addition to numerous other responsibilities.

Cole served as an Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach with the University of North Carolina during the 2007 season. Primarily focusing on the Tar Heel football team, Cole helped train a UNC squad that scored conference wins over Miami (Fla.), Maryland and Duke.



Prior to his stint with the Tar Heels, Cole spent one season at the University of Kansas as an Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach with the Jayhawk football team. The 2006 KU team reached six victories for only the third time in its prior 11 seasons, including a 39-20 rout of conference rival Kansas State.

Cole began as a personal trainer in the professional ranks, working for the National Football League's Indianapolis Colts from 2005-06.

A four-year letterwinner at Findlay, he played safety for the Oilers. Cole was an all-conference selection, team captain and team MVP. He is the son of former Pittsburgh Steeler and two-time Super Bowl Champion Robin Cole. Cole currently resides in North Brunswick and has a son named Jayln.

DARNELL DINKINS

TIGHT ENDS

Former NFL tight end Darnell Dinkins enters his first year as tight ends coach at Rutgers. After playing for eight seasons with four different organizations in the NFL, the Pittsburgh native joins Kyle Flood's coaching staff after spending the 2010 season as assistant tight ends coach with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Dinkins won a Super Bowl ring in 2009 as a member of the New Orleans Saints. His professional playing career began in 2002 after the New York Giants signed him as a free agent.

He spent parts of three seasons with the Giants until the Baltimore Ravens signed him in October of 2004. Dinkins spent two seasons with the Ravens, scoring his first career touchdown vs. the Cowboys in 2004.

Dinkins was signed by the Cleveland Browns in 2006 and appeared in 14 games in his first season with the Browns. He spent three years with the Browns before he played the 2009 campaign with the Super Bowl Champion New Orleans Saints.

Prior to his eight-year NFL career, Dinkins was a three-year starter at free safety in college for Pittsburgh. He came to Pitt as a quarterback before moving to free safety on the collegiate level.



Off the field, Dinkins established the Maleness to Manhood Foundation to benefit inner-city youth. He was also a finalist in 2005 and 2006 for the James Brown Award for his outstanding work in the community with his foundation.

JIM PANAGOS

DEFENSIVE LINE

A native of Brooklyn, N.Y., Jim Panagos enters his first season as defensive line coach at Rutgers. He has served both on the collegiate level and in the NFL during his career.

Panagos recently completed his fifth season as defensive line coach at the University of Central Florida in 2011. During his time in Orlando, UCF appeared in three bowl games. In 2011, UCF ranked ninth nationally in total defense, ninth in scoring defense, eighth in pass efficiency defense, 16th in rushing defense and led Conference USA in total defense, scoring defense, pass defense and rushing defense. UCF yielded just nine rushing touchdowns on the season.

In addition, UCF surrendered 108.8 rushing yards a game. Since the program's inception in 1979, the Knights' top-three seasons for rushing defense have all occurred in the last three years under Panagos.

In 2010, his defensive line was a key part in perhaps the best season in school history as UCF finished 11-3. The Knights went 7-1 in league play and claimed the Conference USA Championship title. UCF entered the national rankings for the first time and picked up its first bowl win with a 10-6 triumph over Georgia in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

UCF ranked in the top-10 nationally in both rushing and scoring defense during its 11-3 season. Leading the position group was Bruce Miller, who was named the C-USA Defensive Player of the Year for the second-straight season. Miller was selected by San Francisco in the seventh round of the 2011 NFL Draft. Miller graduated as the nation's active leader with 35.5 career sacks and ranked third with 57.5 career tackles for loss. After the 2010 season, Panagos was selected as a national all-star assistant by Rivals.com.

FootballScoop.com named Panagos its National Defensive Line Coach of the Year in 2009 after a season in which the Knights led Conference USA in several defensive categories and finished the season against Rutgers in the St. Petersburg Bowl. Miller (13) and Jarvis Geathers (11) both hit double-digits in sacks while tackle Torell Troup was a second round selection in the NFL Draft by the Buffalo Bills.

In 2008, UCF's defensive line was one of the strongest in the country. The group helped the Knights rank first in C-USA in three categories - rushing defense, pass efficiency defense and tackles-for-loss. UCF recorded 8.62 tackles for loss per game, third nationally.

In Panagos' first season in Orlando in 2007, UCF finished the year 10-4, including a C-USA Championship crown and a spot in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl. The Knights' defensive front showed great improvement during the season by totaling 39 sacks, which ranked first in C-USA and 24th nationally.

Panagos helped three Knights gain individual honors during the 2007 campaign. Leger Douzable (49 tackles, 7.5 sacks) was an All-C-USA First Team pick and fellow senior defensive lineman Keith Shologan (33 tackles, 2.5 sacks) was named to the all-league second team. Miller totaled 38 tackles and 7.0 sacks and was named to the All-C-USA Freshman Team.

Both Douzable (Minnesota) and Shologan (San Diego) signed free-agent contracts with NFL squads. Shologan was also the fourth overall selection in the Canadian Football League Draft by Saskatchewan.

Prior to moving to Orlando, Panagos coached on the Minnesota Vikings staff in the NFL. During the 2004 campaign, Panagos tutored rookies Spencer Johnson and Darriin Scott take on starting roles at defensive tackle and defensive end, respectively. Panagos worked with Kevin Williams that season as the All-Pro led all NFL defensive tackles with 11.5 sacks.

As a student-athlete, Panagos played football at the University of Maryland (1989-92). A two-time letterwinner at defensive tackle, led the Terrapins in sacks (5) and tackles-for-loss (12) as a senior.

In 1993, he began his coaching career as the assistant defensive line coach at his alma mater. Before joining the Terrapins, Panagos spent four years teaching mathematics and coaching football, as well as several other sports, at the C.R. James Alternative School in Tampa, Fla. He also volunteered with Tampa's YMCA football program.

Panagos earned his bachelor's degree in criminal justice from Maryland in 1993. He attended East Islip High School on Long Island, where he earned first-team all-state honors in football. Panagos and his wife Maureen have three children: Jack, Hayden and Olivia.

Joe Rossi reunites with Rutgers defensive coordinator Robb Smith for his first season as special teams coordinator and defensive assistant at Rutgers. The two worked together for two seasons at Maine (2007-08). Rossi, who coached at Maine from 2007-11, was promoted to defensive coordinator following Smith's departure to Rutgers after the 2008 season.

Maine annually had one of the top defensive units in the Football Championship Subdivision under Rossi's watch. In 2011, the Black Bears ranked 26th nationally in sacks, 31st in pass defense and 25th in pass efficiency defense.

In 2010, Rossi helped develop the Maine linebackers and secondary into two of the best positional units in the CAA. Linebacker Donte Dennis collected All-CAA honors for the second straight year and ranked sixth in the conference with 108 tackles.

In his first season as defensive coordinator in 2009, Rossi's unit totaled 19 interceptions (second in the CAA), led by All-CAA defensive back Steven Baker.

Prior to his promotion as defensive coordinator, Rossi directed Maine's special teams in 2007 and 2008. During those two seasons, the Black Bears totaled 16 kickoff returns of 30 yards or more. In 2007, punter Kash Kiefer set a school record with an 82-yard punt at Villanova.

Before arriving at Maine, Rossi coached six seasons at Thiel College in Greenville, Pa., including the final four years as defensive coordinator. In 2006, Thiel led the President's Athletic Conference in scoring defense, total defense, rush defense and pass defense.



In 2005, he was instrumental in leading Thiel to the PAC championship, as the squad made an appearance in the NCAA Division III playoffs.

Robb Smith begins his fourth season on the Rutgers sideline and first as defensive coordinator under head coach Kyle Flood.

Smith previously coached special teams in 2011 and cornerbacks in 2010 after spending the 2009 season leading the outside linebackers. The Scarlet Knights have consistently excelled in special teams under the direction of Smith.

In his first season, the Scarlet Knights enjoyed measured success with Smith as the special teams coordinator. After a 2008 season in which RU did not have a special teams touchdown, Rutgers collected four in 2009 on three kick returns and a punt return. The special teams unit also recorded six blocked kicks.

Over the past two seasons, RU has recorded a total of 15 blocked kicks and seven punt/kickoff return touchdowns. The Scarlet Knights combined for just seven blocked kicks and one TD return in the two seasons prior to Smith arriving 'On the Banks'.

Smith joined Rutgers after a seven-season stint on the Maine coaching staff, serving as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator during the end of his tenure with the Black Bears. In addition to his role as defensive coordinator and assistant head coach, Smith also coached the team's linebackers.

Under Smith, Maine was ranked in the top third nationally in the Football Championship Subdivision in total defense in each of his three seasons as defensive coordinator. Smith earned the promotion to assistant head coach after leading one of the finest defenses in the nation in 2006. In his first season as the defensive coordinator, the "Black Hole" defense ranked among the top five nationally in several categories, including: rush defense (first), total defense (second), sacks (third), scoring defense (fourth) and tackles for loss (fifth).

Before joining the staff at Maine, Smith worked as a quality control/defensive graduate assistant at Iowa from 1999-2001. He was with the 2001 Hawkeye squad that defeated Texas Tech in the Alamo Bowl, 19-16.

A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Smith played at Allegheny College from 1993-97 and was a three-year letterwinner at strong safety. Smith earned his B.A. degree in economics from Allegheny in 1997. He also earned a masters degree in communications from Iowa in 2002. He graduated from Leechburg High School. Smith and his wife, Amy, are the proud parents of two sons, Charlie and Jack.

ROB SPENCE

QUARTERBACKS

New York native Rob Spence begins his first season as quarterbacks coach at Rutgers. A 23-year collegiate coaching veteran, Spence has a wealth of experience under his belt, including serving as an offensive coordinator for 16 seasons. Among the schools he served as offensive coordinator include Clemson, Toledo, Louisiana Tech and Syracuse.

Spence joins Kyle Flood's inaugural coaching staff "On the Banks". Ironically, Flood was the first player Spence recruited at Iona in 1989 and the two coached together at Hofstra from 1997-99.

A quarterbacking expert, Spence has mentored three active NFL quarterbacks in Cincinnati's Bruce Gradkowski (Toledo, 2003-04), Seattle's Charlie Whitehurst (Clemson, 2005) and New Orleans' Luke McCown (Louisiana Tech, 2000). Spence's time with Gradkowski saw the Rocket quarterback post back-to-back seasons with a completion percentage of at least 70 percent, a feat only seven FBS quarterbacks have accomplished since.

Spence comes to Rutgers after serving as offensive coordinator at Bethune-Cookman in 2011 for former Rutgers wide receivers coach Brian Jenkins. Spence's offense at Bethune-Cookman averaged 33.9 points per game (15th nationally) and averaged just under 260 yards rushing per game, fifth in the nation.

A native of Pelham, N.Y., Spence spent 2010 as the wide receivers coach at Temple and the 2009 season at Syracuse as the offensive coordinator.

Prior to joining the Orange, Spence enjoyed a successful four-year tenure at Clemson. The Tigers were balanced on offense and then some during the last three years under Spence. Since Spence came to Clemson prior to the 2005 season, the Tigers finished in the top four in the ACC in rushing, passing, and total offense every year; the only ACC team that can make that claim.

The 2007 offense averaged over 400 yards and 33 points per game with a young group of Tigers at the skill position. James Davis was a 1,000-yard rusher and Aaron Kelly was a 1,000-yard receiver; just the second time that Clemson had one of each in the same year.

Cullen Harper's 2007 season was especially noteworthy, as he established 22 school records directly under Spence's guidance. That included his 27 touchdown passes against six interceptions. He led the ACC in passing efficiency, the first Tiger to pace the ACC in that category since 1983.

In 2006, his second year as offensive coordinator, Clemson gained at least 2,500 yards rushing and passing, one of just four schools nationally to exceed those marks. It was also just the second time in school history it had been done. Clemson led the ACC and was in the top 13 in the nation in total offense, rushing offense, and scoring offense.

In 2006, the Tigers led the ACC in yards per play (6.5), touchdowns (55), and third-down conversion percentage (42). The touchdown total and yards-per-play figures were Tiger records as well.

The veteran assistant led Toledo to four straight top-13 final marks in total offense and helped the Rocket program to 35 wins from 2001-04. Twice in his four years, the Rockets were in the top 20 in the nation in rushing, and twice the team was in the top 20 in passing.

He came to Toledo after a year as co-offensive coordinator at Louisiana Tech, where he tutored the freshman McCown, who threw for 2,533 yards and 21 scores on the way to a freshman All-America season.

Spence was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Hofstra from

1997-99. In 1999, the Pride averaged 34 points a game, and the team had an 11-2 record and No. 5 final national ranking.

Spence was an assistant at Maryland (1992-96) under Mark Duffner, as Maryland set 70 school offensive records. As quarterbacks coach in 1994, Maryland was 10th in the nation in passing.

Spence worked as offensive coordinator at Hofstra in 1990, helping that program to a 12-1 record and No. 3 national ranking. He was also the of-

fensive coordinator at Iona, his alma mater, in 1989, and that team posted an 8-2 record.

Spence, a native of Pelham, N.Y., played football at Saint Andrews School in Middletown, Del. (1972-75). He went on to play tight end at Iona from 1978-81. He earned his bachelor's degree in social work from Iona in 1981 and later earned his master's degree in education from Iona in 1990.

An avid runner who ran in the Boston Marathon in April of 2004, Spence and his wife Susan have two daughters, Samantha and Sydney Rae.

NORRIES WILSON

RUNNING BACKS

Wilson was named running backs coach for Rutgers football in March 2012.

One of the top assistant coaches in the nation while at the University of Connecticut, Wilson became Columbia's 18th head coach of football in December 2005. Wilson's student-athletes earned 33 All-Ivy League honors since 2006, including two Rookies of the Year and 12 first team selections.

After a 4-6, 2-5 Ivy League season in 2010, Columbia had a total of eight student-athletes named All-Ivy League in football, the second most in school history.

In 2009, Wilson led Columbia to a fourth-place finish in the Ivy League, the Lions' best league finish in six years. Columbia also posted its most wins in six years as eight players earned All-Ivy honors.

Wilson, who served as offensive coordinator at UConn for four seasons, was one of five finalists for the Frank Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach in 2004, a season in which the Huskies led the Big East in both total and scoring offense. In 2003, he guided UConn's offense that posted 477.5 yards per game, which ranked eighth in the nation. In 2002, Wilson was promoted to the Huskies' offensive coordinator after joining the UConn staff in 1999 as offensive line coach. He continued to work specifically with the Huskies' centers and guards.

Before UConn, Wilson spent four seasons at Bucknell. He was the Bison's offensive line coach in 1995 and 1996 before a promotion to offensive coordinator in 1997 and 1998. He was also defensive coordinator at Livingstone College (1993), offensive line/tight ends coach at North Carolina Central (1991-92) and graduate assistant at his alma mater, the University of Minnesota (1989-90).



Wilson was a captain and two-year starter for the Gophers. In 1985, the team defeated Clemson to win the Independence Bowl and competed in the Liberty Bowl vs. Tennessee the following year. He was a three-year letterwinner in football, and earned two letters and qualified for the NCAA Championships as a heavyweight in wrestling. He graduated from Minnesota in 1989 with a degree in psychology.

In addition to his college coaching experience, Wilson has served minority coaching fellowships in the NFL with the Kansas City Chiefs (1992), Jacksonville Jaguars (1995) under

two-time Super Bowl champion head coach Tom Coughlin and the Indianapolis Colts (2000).

DAMIAN WROBLEWSKI

OFFENSIVE LINE

Damian Wroblewski (row-blew-ski) begins his first season as offensive line coach at Rutgers. Wroblewski comes to Rutgers after a five-year stint at the University of Delaware in the same capacity, along with serving as the Blue Hens assistant head coach since the 2008 season.

Wroblewski was the Blue Hens recruiting coordinator in addition to serving as the team's run game coordinator. He helped develop fourth-round NFL draft pick Gino Gradkowski and free agent Shea Allard. Gradkowski was selected 98th overall by the Baltimore Ravens, while Allard inked with the Green Bay Packers.

Wroblewski has a similar coaching path as Kyle Flood as both coached the offensive line at Hofstra and Delaware during their careers.

In 2011, Delaware finished 7-4 as the offense averaged over 165.5 yards per game rushing. His work with the offense in 2010, and specifically with the offensive line, helped Delaware post a 12-3 record, share the Colonial Athletic Association title, and advance to the NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision title game.

The Blue Hens ranked second in the CAA in scoring offense [27.9], total offense [401.8/19th in NCAA], and rushing offense [184.4], and third in passing offense [217.4]. Freshman running back Andrew Pierce, who led the CAA in rushing, and junior offensive guard Gino Gradkowski also earned All-American honors on the offensive side of the ball.

As offensive line coach in 2007, Wroblewski played a big part in Delaware's offense being among the top-rated units in the country. Led by All-American offensive linemen Mike Byrne and Kheon Hendricks, Delaware posted an 11-4 record and advanced to the NCAA Division FCS national title game. Hendricks also earned All-American honors as a senior in 2008.

A native of Westerly, R.I., Wroblewski attended Lafayette College and earned his degree in history in 1999. He was a four-year member of the Leopard football team at center for head coach Bill Russo. He was a three-time All-Patriot League selection and earned the team's Stony Jones Award as the team Most Valuable Player as a senior.

Wroblewski moved to the Football Championship Subdivision level in 2002, where he served as offensive tackles and tight ends coach and special teams coordinator under head coach Al Bagnoli at the University of Pennsylvania. He helped lead the nationally-ranked Quakers to a two-year record of 19-1, including a perfect 14-0 mark in league play as Penn captured consecutive Ivy League titles in 2002 and 2003.



After his stint at Penn, Wroblewski moved on to Hofstra, where he served for two seasons as offensive line coach under Joe Gardi, helping to lead the Pride to a two-year record of 12-10, including a 7-4 mark in 2005.

Hofstra led the Atlantic 10 in passing offense both seasons, ranking third nationally in 2005 (306.4) and fourth in 2004 (326.9). The team also ranked second in the Atlantic 10 in total offense both seasons and ranked No. 10 nationally in scoring in 2004 at 36.4 points per game. He coached three All-Atlantic 10 selections during his tenure, including NFL draft pick Willie Colon, a member of the 2009 Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh Steelers.

Wroblewski moved to Stony Brook in 2006 and helped lead the Seawolves to a 5-6 mark under first-year head coach Chuck Priore. Stony Brook led the Northeast Conference in passing offense [226.3] while ranking third in both total offense [347.4] and scoring [22.0].

He and his wife, Kara, have one son, Damian, Jr.

Ahmad began his collegiate coaching career at Ithaca in 2004 as a volunteer assistant coach with the offensive line.

Ahmad also worked as an assistant football coach at Lakewood High School in 2005, guiding the offensive and defensive lines. In addition, he was the head junior varsity basketball coach and assistant track and field coach, overseeing the field events.

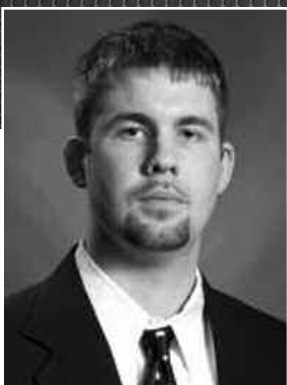

Fitzsimmons served as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Bucknell, in 2006, working with the wide receivers. He spent the previous season coaching quarterbacks at Shaw University in Raleigh, N.C.

A native of New Orleans, La., Fitzsimmons played quarterback and wide receiver for the Bison. In 2004, he won the Bucknell Football Moxie Award for special contributions to the program. He graduated in 2005 with a degree in history and a minor in religion.



TOM McENTIRE

DEFENSIVE ASSISTANT

Tom McEntire began in the role of defensive assistant for Rutgers football in the spring of 2011. Previously, McEntire worked in player development for the Scarlet Knights football team from 2009-11. In his current position, McEntire has worked closely with the head football coach in all meetings and practices.

A former quarterback, running back and wide receiver at Thiel College (Pa.), McEntire has assisted in game day preparation at Rutgers. He has aided in the organization of the scout team and also been responsible for creating weekly playbook and game plan handouts.

McEntire brought coaching experience on the offensive and defensive side of the ball to his assistant position "On the Banks". At the University of Maine from 2008-09, he served as the assistant defensive backs coach and also coached the kick returners. His focus involved the safety position, as well as opponent scouting. At his alma mater, McEntire was Thiel's running backs coach from 2007-08 and wide receivers coach from 2006-07.

A 2006 graduate of Thiel College, McEntire earned a degree in business administration.



DARNELL STAPLETON

OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

Former Super Bowl XLIII starting right guard Darnell Stapleton began in the position of offensive assistant for Rutgers football in 2012. The former Scarlet Knight center worked to the top of the National Football League with the Pittsburgh Steelers after signing as an undrafted free agent following the 2007 NFL Draft. Stapleton did not see action during the 2007 season only to break into the lineup for the 2008 season, starting in 12 of 14 appearances, including the Steelers' victory over the Arizona Cardinals to capture the Vince Lombardi Trophy.

Stapleton started all 13 games at center for Rutgers as a senior in 2006, earning recognition as a finalist for the Rimington Trophy. He anchored an offensive line that blocked for NFL Pro Bowl running back and former Scarlet Knight Ray Rice, who totaled 1,794 rushing yards that season. Stapleton started all 12 games for RU in 2005, securing the starting role after transferring from Hudson Valley Community College.

A native of Union Township, N.J., Stapleton attended Union High School. He went on to earn a degree in Management & Labor Relations at Rutgers.



SCOTT WALKER

DIRECTOR OF FOOTBALL ACADEMIC SUPPORT

Scott Walker enters his ninth season at Rutgers as the Director of Football Academic Support. In his role, Walker oversees the entire academic program for the Rutgers football team.

During his time at RU, Walker has helped the football program establish unprecedented success in the classroom, further upholding the high academic standards of Rutgers University. The team has stood as a pillar for great achievement both on the field and in the classroom.

In the most recent NCAA Academic Progress Report (APR), the Rutgers football program was the lone state university on the list to be ranked in the top 10 percent nationally in APR for the fifth straight year. In addition, Rutgers was the lone institution to win four bowl games while earning the APR honor in the top 10 percent over the previous five-year span.

The Rutgers football squad received a No. 2 ranking nationally in 2011. The prior year, Rutgers ranked first nationally in APR. During the last six years under Walker's guidance, the Rutgers football program has ranked in the top seven nationally and has achieved the top APR of any Football Bowl Subdivision state university in the nation.

Rutgers has had two National Football Foundation Scholar Athletes in Brian Leonard and Brandon Renkart during Walker's tenure. Leonard received the prestigious Draddy Trophy, recognized as the "Academic Heisman," in 2006. He and his staff – Jenna Beverly and Ramel Meekins – work diligently at ensuring that every Rutgers football player maximizes their potential in the classroom. They have made academic success a foremost priority for each student-athlete.



Prior to his tenure at Rutgers, Walker spent three seasons as an assistant football coach at Cornell. He was named the running backs coach at Cornell in the spring of 2001. Before joining the Cornell staff, he served five seasons at Georgia Tech, including three as the director of academics for the football team. In 1997, he was the assistant director of football operations. Prior to Tech, Walker was a coach at the University of Maine for six years, including the final two as the running game coordinator. Walker also spent time coaching at Purdue, Iowa and Texas.

Walker graduated from Princeton in 1984 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in geology. During his time at Princeton, he worked as the freshman defensive ends coach from 1982-84. In addition to attending college in New Jersey, Walker spent 15 years recruiting the New Jersey metropolitan area for various universities during his coaching career.

Scott and his wife, Michelle, have a son, Kyle.

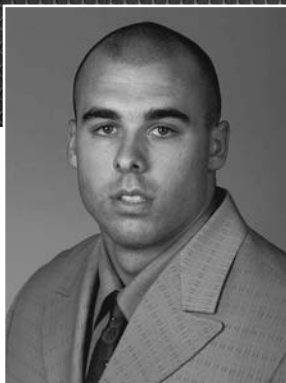
WILL GILKISON

DIRECTOR OF FOOTBALL OPERATIONS

Will Gilkison enters his third season as Director of Football Operations. Gilkison spent the previous year serving as the Director of External Operations and prior to that stint was a member of the Rutgers football staff for three seasons.

Gilkison's duties include the oversight of the day-to-day operations of the football program, along with logistical and budgetary responsibilities. He also manages team travel, organizes preseason camp and serves as the team's liaison to other athletic department offices and university branches.

A four-year letterwinner at linebacker with the Scarlet Knights, Gilkison captained the 2005 Insight Bowl team and was the recipient of the Paul Robeson Award, presented annually to the individual whose performance, leadership, and dedication on and off the field during his career has had the greatest impact on Rutgers Football.



Gilkison became a member of the staff in 2006 as a student assistant. He was responsible for helping prepare and implement weekly practice schedules. Gilkison also worked as a strength and conditioning assistant during this time, creating and facilitating off-season training programs while instructing players in skill development.

In 2008, Gilkison joined the player development staff, serving as a mentor for first and second year players. He oversaw the transition of these individuals into the college environment, assisting them with basic life skills, time management, goal setting and prioritizing.

A 2007 graduate, Gilkison earned a B.A. in History and completed his graduate degree in elementary and special education in 2008. He and his wife Katie currently reside in Union Beach, N.J. The couple has two children, a two year old daughter, Margaret and a one year old son William.

DAVID McCUNE

HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER - FOOTBALL

For over the past decade, the health and wellness of the Rutgers football team has been the responsibility of Head Football Athletic Trainer David McCune. In his 12th season with the Scarlet Knights, McCune oversees all aspects of athletic training from injury prevention to rehabilitation within the program. McCune also assists with the coordination of the entire athletic department's athletic training staff.



McCune is the proud father of two sons, Devon and Braden.

He has worked with head coach Kyle Flood since his arrival as an assistant coach in 2008. McCune worked for former head coach and current Tampa Bay Buccaneers head coach Greg Schiano for more than a decade, also serving as Coordinator of Athletic Training and Football Athletic Trainer at the University of Miami for four seasons (1997-2000), before joining the Scarlet Knights for the 2001 season.

McCune, a Virginia native, received his Bachelor's Degree from James Madison, and earned his Master's Degree from Missouri State University. He began his career as an Assistant Athletic Trainer at Missouri State in 1989, where he worked for one year before being named Head Athletic Trainer at the University of Miami's HealthSouth Sports Medicine Clinic (1989-93), and named the Director of the Clinic from 1993-95.

He then returned to his alma mater, James Madison, as Athletic Trainer, where he served from 1995-97 before joining the University of Miami program.



DR. ROBERT MONACO

ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS/SPORTS MEDICINE

Dr. Robert Monaco is in his 17th year as the Associate Director of Athletics/Sports Medicine and has served as Team Physician for the football program since his arrival in 1996. In addition to working with the football team, Monaco oversees the medical treatment for all of the University's sports. His responsibilities also include supervising a group of 11 full-time certified athletic trainers and a support staff in sports nutrition and psychology.

In addition to his work with the Scarlet Knights, Dr. Monaco is a clinical professor in the Department of Family Medicine at Robert Wood Johnson Medical School and directs the school's Sports Medicine Fellowship Program.

Dr. Monaco earned his Bachelor's Degree from Columbia University, where he was an All-Ivy League wrestler and team captain in 1986 and 1987. He went on to receive his Medical Degree from the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, where he was a member of the Alpha Omega Alpha Medical Honor Society. He completed his residency at UMDNJ Robert Wood Johnson Medical School and St. Peter's Hospital in New Brunswick, working with the Department of Family Medicine.

Dr. Monaco has also done postgraduate study and completed a fellowship in Sports Medicine at Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, which included work at Princeton University and the Hospital for Special Surgery in New York City. In addition, Dr. Monaco holds a Master's in Public Health from Rutgers and UMDNJ Robert Wood Johnson Medical School.

A native of Nutley, N.J., Dr. Monaco comes from a family of physical educators, coaches, and athletes. Dr. Monaco and his wife, Carolyn, are the proud parents of two children, Antonio and Angelina.



SHAWN TUCKER

ASSISTANT ATHLETIC DIRECTOR/STUDENT-ATHLETE DEVELOPMENT

Shawn Tucker is in his third season as Assistant Athletic Director for Student-Athlete Development.

Tucker, a 2006 graduate of Rutgers University and a former standout at wide receiver on the football team, leads the Life Skills and development program for student-athletes. Through programming and counseling, the Life Skills initiative helps to fortify student-athletes at Rutgers with valuable information and tools to guide decision-making in critical life-shaping areas such as career choice, personal finance, leadership, civic involvement, and healthy lifestyle choices.



Tucker came to Rutgers from Douglas High School in Parkland, Fla. He was named team captain as a senior and helped lead Rutgers to its first of four consecutive football bowl championships in 2006. A four-year letterwinner for the Scarlet Knights, Tucker was a key member of two bowl squads during his career "On the Banks."

As an undergraduate, Tucker served on the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee. He graduated with a double major in Geography and Labor Studies in May 2007 and began working for the Office of Continuing Professional Education at Rutgers as a program coordinator for their T.E.E.M. Gateway program. While there, Tucker was a member of a staff that received the 2010 Diversity Leadership Award.

T.E.E.M. Gateway serves all parolees in Essex County, providing education and employment to all youth transitioning back into their community. Tucker's specific responsibilities included working with youth in the areas of academic, personal, career and community development. Tucker also participated in the implementation of the YE2S Center, a partnership among Rutgers, Newark Public Schools, the City of Newark and Communities in Schools of New Jersey focusing on providing education and employment services for youth in Essex County. Tucker has also mentored youth in Newark through the Rutgers Green Rangers Mural program, which focused on the beautification and revitalization of Newark through the Arts, while also serving as a key collaborator in the New Jersey High School Dropout Prevention Campaign.

Currently pursuing a master's degree in city and regional planning, Tucker and his wife Maria, reside in New Brunswick.

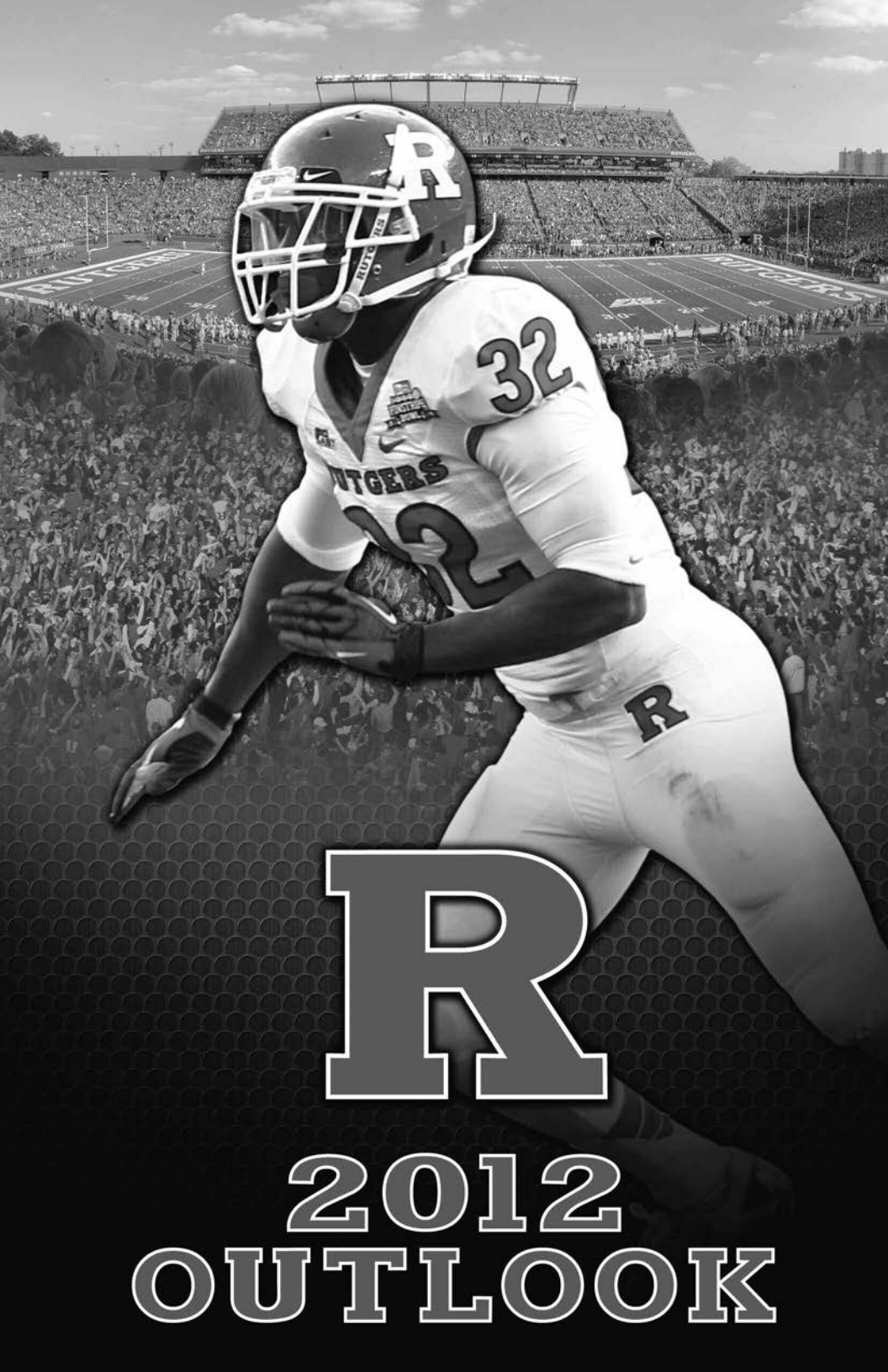

OUTLOOK**



The 2012 season marks the beginning of the Kyle Flood era for Rutgers football. Flood, a seven-year veteran of coaching "On the Banks", takes control of the Scarlet Knights after the squad completed a successful 9-4 campaign in 2011 that included four BIG EAST wins and a 27-13 victory over Iowa State in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl. RU's new leader previously held the role of assistant head coach since 2008 and oversaw the offensive line since coming to Piscataway in 2005.

Rutgers fans across the nation have had fond memories rekindled of the last time an assistant coach on staff at RU was promoted to the head coaching position. Frank Burns, who replaced John Bateman in 1973, went on to become the winningest coach in school history. The hiring of Flood has Scarlet-clad fans in a frenzy to see the 2012 season begin, when the RU squad will take the field in new Nike Pro Combat uniforms.

Flood's first squad is set to return 16 starters from last season's bowl-winning squad – RU's fifth-consecutive postseason victory – tied for the longest active streak in the nation.

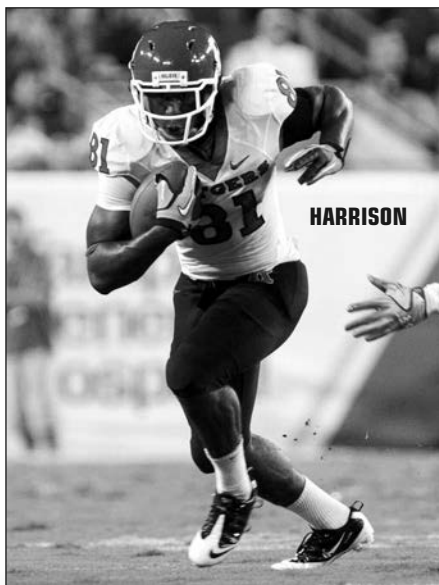
OFFENSE

The Rutgers offense has experience and youth to mix under new offensive coordinator Dave Brock. Junior Chas Dodd and sophomore Gary Nova split time at quarterback in 2011, combining for 3,127 passing yards and 21 touchdown passes.

RU's quarterback play will be supplemented by a full stable of talented wide receivers. Led by seniors Mark Harrison and Tim Wright, the group features size, speed and versatility. Brandon Coleman, who stands 6-6, totaled 17 catches for 552 yards and six touchdowns last season. Coleman averaged over 30 yards per reception on the season. Quron Pratt, a junior, returns with a

team-best 32 receptions for 327 yards and one score.

Rutgers' BIG EAST-leading kick returner, Jeremy Deering, made the move to receiver from running back to bring his speed and agility to the group. The All-BIG EAST Second Team kickoff returner ran back 17 kicks for 530 yards (31.2) last season, including a 98-yard return to kick-start RU's comeback in the 20-17 overtime victory against USF on Nov. 5, 2011. Also bringing top-notch speed to wide receiver is sophomore Miles Shuler. The former high school quarterback was a U.S. Army All-American game participant.





Rutgers returns two high-profile sophomore running backs from last season in Jawan Jamison and Savon Huggins. Jamison rushed for 897 yards and nine touchdowns on 231 carries in his first year of action after an initial redshirt season. Huggins was the highest-rated recruit to ever sign with RU when he joined the Scarlet Knights in 2011. The true freshman rushed for 146 yards on 56 carries last season.

Bolstering the run game is sophomore fullback Michael Burton, who started three games in his first Rutgers campaign. Fellow classmate Sam Bergen emerged in the spring to back up the position, along with redshirt freshman Paul Canevari.

The tight end position returns experience from the 2011 squad in seniors D.C. Jefferson and Paul Carrezola. Jefferson started nine games for RU last season, making 12 catches for 118 yards. Carrezola found the end zone with an 11-yard scoring grab in a 38-26 victory over Ohio on Sept. 24, 2011. He finished with four catches for 35 yards in 2011.

Backing up the tight end position are senior Beau Bachety, junior Malcolm Bush and redshirt freshman Tyler Kroft. The trio showed promise during RU's spring practice sessions, routinely making catches.

The Rutgers offensive line, a group overseen by Flood in his time as an assistant coach for the Scarlet Knights, returns five players who started at least three games in 2011. Betim Bujari, Andre Civil, Kaleb Johnson, Antwan

Lowery and David Osei bring experience back into the trenches for RU's 2012 campaign. In total, the five Scarlet Knights have made 37 career starts on the offensive line. Last season, Johnson earned recognition on the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) Freshman All-America team. As a true freshman in 2011, he started 11 games for Rutgers at right tackle.

Former Maryland three-year starter R.J. Dill and sophomore Taj Alexander look to secure starting spots at right tackle and right guard, respectively. The 6-7 offensive tackle transfer with 30 career starts adds additional experience to Rutgers' big blockers. Alexander, who moved from defensive line to offensive line last season, performed well this spring upfront for the Scarlet Knights. Rounding out the group of linemen competing for playing time are junior Matt McBride, senior Devon Watkins and a decorated group of incoming freshmen.

The attacking style taught by Brock has benefited a number of individuals in the NFL, including Hakeem Nicks (New York Giants), Josh Freeman (Tampa Bay Buccaneers), Jordy Nelson (Green Bay Packers) and Marques Colston (New Orleans Saints). While at Kansas State in 2008, Brock served as offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach. The Wildcats ranked 18th nationally in passing (269.6) and 19th in scoring offense (34.9).



Other fresh offensive coaching faces "On the Banks" include: Darnell Dinkins (tight ends), Rob Spence (quarterbacks), Norries Wilson (running backs) and Damian Wroblewski (offensive line).

Dinkins brings experience from the highest level of football, having played eight seasons with four different organizations in the NFL. Dinkins won a Super Bowl ring in 2009 as a member of the New Orleans Saints. He spent the 2010 season as assistant tight ends coach with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

A 23-year collegiate coaching veteran, Spence has 16 seasons of experience as an offensive coordinator. He will apply his knowledge of the game to RU's quarterback position. Among the schools he served as offensive coordinator include Clemson, Toledo, Louisiana Tech and Syracuse.

Wilson comes to Rutgers after spending the previous six seasons as head coach at Columbia University. He previously served as offensive coordinator at UConn for four seasons. He was one of five finalists for the Frank Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach in 2004.

Wroblewski comes to Rutgers after a five-year stint at the University of Delaware in the same capacity. The Blue Hens' offensive lines paved the way for success in his time at UD, including a 12-3 record and advancing to the NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision title game in 2010.

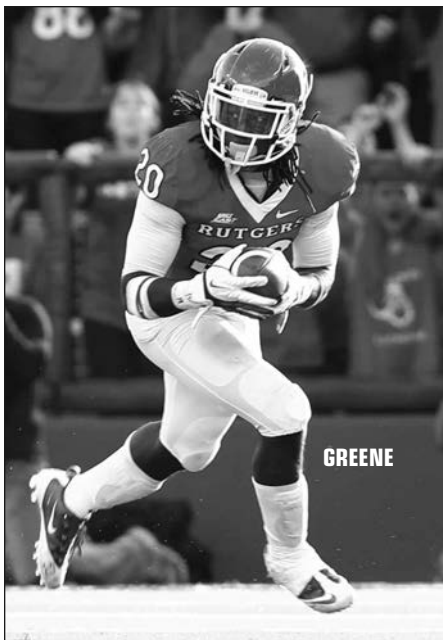
DEFENSE

The Rutgers defense made big plays throughout the 2011 season, finishing tied for fifth in the nation in turnovers gained. The Scarlet Knights look ready to be after the football even more in 2012, as the team welcomes back eight starters from last season's swarming defensive unit.

Rutgers' defensive secondary includes senior Brandon Jones and junior All-BIG EAST Second Team selection Logan Ryan at cornerback, with senior All-BIG EAST First Team performer Duron Harmon returning at safety. The three started all 13 games in 2011 and intercepted a combined 10 passes. Harmon led the group with five picks to rank second in the BIG EAST.

The other safety spot in the RU secondary is set to be occupied by sophomore Lorenzo Waters and senior Wayne Warren. The two Scarlet Knights exited Rutgers' spring practice with Waters in line to receive the starting nod. Waters made 10 tackles last season, while Warren totaled 28 stops, including 2.5 sacks.

Rutgers' defense is marked by the return of senior linebacker Khaseem Greene, the 2011 BIG EAST Co-Defensive Player of the Year. Greene elected to finish his career "On the Banks" over a potential early start on an NFL career. He led the conference in tackles with 141 stops and will look to add more to his tally after missing spring practice due to injury.



Fellow senior Steve Beauharnais anchors the defense from the middle linebacker spot. He trailed only Greene in tackles, making 77 stops. His total included a team-leading 16 tackles-for-loss. Junior Jamal Merrell and sophomore Kevin Snyder head into the fall competing for the third starting linebacker position. Snyder showed his versatility in the spring by filling in for the absence of Greene. The unit also welcomes the emergence of red-shirt freshman Quentin Gause and converted fullback Robert Joseph, a junior.

Rutgers' defensive linemen offer an intriguing mixture of size and speed. Filling the middle for the Scarlet Knights is the ever-present Scott Vallone. The senior leader has started 38 games in his career, making 143 tackles. He recorded a personal-best 58 tackles last season, including 8.5 tackles-for-loss and 2.5 sacks. Vallone is joined in the interior by junior Isaac Holmes, who notched 12 tackles while seeing action in all 13 games as a freshman in 2011. Junior Jamil Merrell, twin brother of linebacker Jamal Merrell, also figures into the mix with six starts to his name at defensive tackle. Redshirt freshmen Al Page and Marquise Wright both look to add depth to the tackle position group in their first season of action.

The Scarlet Knights' defensive ends look to be an imposing force with experienced seniors Ka'ilal Glaud and Marvin Booker and juniors Michael Larrow and Marcus Thompson leading the way. All four started at least one game last season. Larrow appeared in six games and started five for the Scarlet Knights before a leg injury

ended his 2011 campaign. Glaud and Thompson received starting nods for two contests last season, while Booker started once. The foursome's experience and playmaking ability is an exciting prospect for RU fans with 44 combined tackles and 8.5 tackles-for-loss between them last season.



HARMON

Converted wide receiver Jawaun Wynn and former linebacker David Milewski, both sophomores, provide further depth to the defensive end position.

Robb Smith begins his fourth season on the Rutgers sideline and his first as defensive coordinator under Flood. The former special teams coach at RU will also have the Scarlet Knights' highly reputed secondary under his tutelage.

Rutgers' new defensive coaches bring experience and intensity to an already strong group of players. First-year coaches on the defensive side of the ball include: Dave Cohen (linebackers), Jim Panagos (defensive line) and Joe Rossi (special teams/defensive assistant).

Cohen, formerly the head coach of Hofstra from 2006-09, will head RU's linebackers. Cohen most recently served as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Western Michigan the past two seasons.

Panagos will coach Rutgers' defensive line, coming off a five-year stint as defensive line coach at Central Florida. The Knights appeared in three bowl games during his time there.

Serving as a special teams and defensive assistant coach will be Rossi, who last served as defensive coordinator at Maine since 2009. In 2011, the Black Bears ranked 26th nationally in sacks, 31st in pass defense and 25th in pass efficiency defense.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Rutgers seeks to replace four-year starting kicker San San Te and has a freshman in contention to take the spot. Kyle Federico, an early enrollee who participated in spring practice, holds the top spot on RU's post-spring depth chart after a solid debut for the Scarlet Knights. Sophomore Nick DeLouisa is set to provide depth behind Federico. Senior Justin Doerner resumes his punting duties for Rutgers after earning All-BIG EAST Second-Team honors in 2011. He ranked fourth in the conference with a 40.3 yards per punt average. Solidifying the group is two-year starting snapper Robert Jones. The junior has appeared in 25-straight games for the Scarlet Knights.

Entering its 22nd season as a football-playing entity in 2012, The BIG EAST Conference is poised, among a sea of change in the college football world, to continue as one of the nation's top conferences.

By any objective metric, the BIG EAST has been a success story on the football field. The conference has regularly put its teams in position for the Bowl Championship Series National Championship while amassing an impressive head-to-head record against its counterparts.

The BIG EAST football membership in 2012 will consist of the University of Cincinnati, the University of Connecticut, the University of Louisville, the University of Pittsburgh, Rutgers University, the University of South Florida, Syracuse University and Temple University.

The BIG EAST membership will have a new look in 2013 as the conference becomes the first truly national major college football league. That year, the league will welcome Boise State University, the University of Central Florida, the University of Houston, the University of Memphis, San Diego State University and Southern Methodist University to its football ranks. The U.S. Naval Academy will join the BIG EAST in 2015.

Eight of the schools that will comprise the future membership of the BIG EAST finished in the top 25 of the final BCS standings at least once since 2006, with a combined 14 top-25 finishes by those schools in that six-year span.

That kind of success underscores the BIG EAST's recent history as one of the deepest conferences in college football. Every BIG EAST team won at least five games in 2011 – the first time since 1905 that a major college football conference could make that claim. The BIG EAST is the only Division I conference in which each of its members played in at least one bowl game in the past two seasons. The BIG EAST will likewise be the only league in which each team has at least one bowl win in the last four years.

The BIG EAST has always been strategic in its growth, with a goal of showcasing high-quality teams in highly populated markets. The conference's forthcoming membership changes will further enhance that strategy by placing at least one BIG EAST school in all four time zones across the continental United States. All told, the BIG EAST football membership will be centered in 11 states, 12 of the top 50 Nielsen media markets and six of the top 25 media markets. The conference will have a television households reach of 24.3 million – by far the largest number in college football.

The BIG EAST has been a charter member of each of the major bowl agreements with the major conferences, beginning with the Bowl Coalition in 1992, followed by the Bowl Alliance in 1995 and the Bowl Championship Series in 1998. Eight times in the league's 21 seasons, a BIG EAST squad has played for a claim to the national crown in a postseason game. The conference has produced two national championship teams and has seen three teams finish as the No. 2-ranked team nationally.

The 2012 season will mark the fifth of a six-year arrangement with ESPN that gives the BIG EAST national exposure on ABC television and the ESPN family of networks. ESPN, ESPN2 or ABC will carry a minimum of 19 BIG EAST home games each season, marking the highest guaranteed total on ESPN and ABC in league history. Championship Week in December includes three BIG EAST games on either ABC, ESPN or ESPN2. At least four BIG EAST games are featured on ESPN's Thursday-night package each year.

In addition, ESPN Regional Television will continue to produce and distribute its BIG EAST Network package to a nationally syndicated audience, reaching more than 30 million homes. Sportsnet New York (SNY) will carry more than 20 BIG EAST Network games, providing a reach of more than 13 million homes alone. A minimum of five home games will be carried on ESPN.

Extensive television exposure and the BIG EAST have been synonymous terms. The league established its own regional football television package in 1991 before it had played a game. The BIG EAST Television Network immediately was the largest regional college football network in the country.

The BIG EAST has always aligned itself with prestigious bowl games. The league is one of the original founders of the Bowl Championship Series and continues to be one of only six conferences that receives an automatic annual bid in the existing agreement.

The BIG EAST Conference champion earns the league's automatic BCS bid. The BCS – which enters its 15th season in 2012-13 – is a five-game arrangement for postseason college football that is designed to match the two top-rated teams in a national championship game and to create exciting and competitive matchups between eight other highly regarded teams in four other BCS games.

If the BIG EAST champion finishes No. 1 or No. 2 in the final BCS standings, that team earns a spot in the BCS National Championship Game. Otherwise, the league champion will compete in one of the four remaining BCS bowl games – the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, Discover Orange Bowl, Allstate Sugar Bowl or the Rose Bowl Game presented by VIZIO. Each bowl hosts two games once every four years – its traditional game plus the National Championship Game approximately one week later.

The BIG EAST unveiled an enhanced collection of bowl partnerships beginning in 2010 that matches conference teams against opponents from the Atlantic Coast Conference, the Big 12 Conference, the Southeastern Conference and Conference USA.

The Champs Sports Bowl has the first selection of BIG EAST teams after the conference's BCS representative is determined. The Atlantic Coast Conference will provide the opposition for the Champs Sports Bowl, which is played in Orlando, Fla.

The BIG EAST enters its 11th year as a partner with the Belk Bowl in Charlotte, N.C. Played in Bank of America Stadium, the Belk Bowl will select its BIG EAST participant after the Champs Sports Bowl with the ACC again providing the opponent.

The BIG EAST and the Big 12 conferences partnered for a new bowl game in 2010 as the New Era Pinstripe Bowl was played for the first time at Yankee Stadium in New York City. The game was an immediate success and the New Era Pinstripe Bowl is now firmly entrenched into New York's festivities surrounding New Year's Day. In the event that the Big 12 is unable to send an eligible team to the New Era Pinstripe Bowl, Notre Dame could step in as the BIG EAST team's opponent.

A BIG EAST representative will face either an opponent from the Southeastern Conference or the Conference USA champion as part of a four-year arrangement with the BBVA Compass Bowl in Birmingham, Ala., and the AutoZone Liberty Bowl in Memphis. The BIG EAST will send a team to one of those bowl games in each year of the deal. The BIG EAST has been a partner with the BBVA Compass Bowl since 2006 and has sent a number of teams to the AutoZone Liberty Bowl in recent years.

The 2012 season will mark the fifth year of the BIG EAST's partnership with the Beef 'O'Brady's Bowl at Tropicana Field in St. Petersburg, Fla. The Beef 'O'Brady's Bowl pairs the BIG EAST representative against an opponent from Conference USA.

The enhanced lineup gives BIG EAST teams access to at least six postseason games each year in some of the most accessible and desirable destinations in college football.

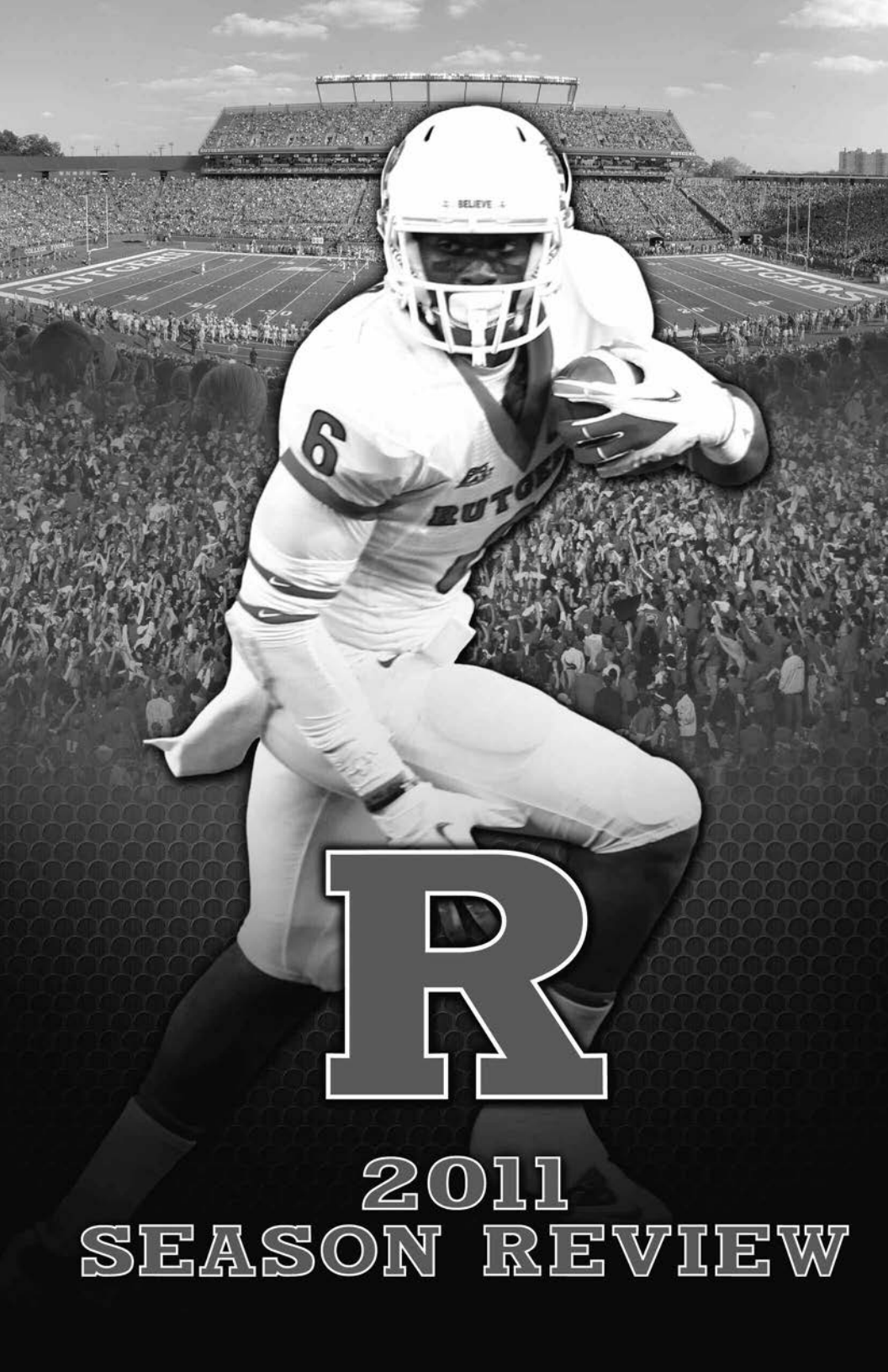

SEASON REVIEW**

For the sixth time in seven seasons, Rutgers appeared in a bowl game as the Scarlet Knights defeated Iowa State 27-13 in the 2011 New Era Pinstripe Bowl at Yankee Stadium in the Bronx. The Scarlet Knights closed out the year 9-4.

Rutgers is tied for the nation's longest active bowl winning streak with five consecutive victories in postseason play. The Scarlet Knights are 5-2 all-time in bowl games.

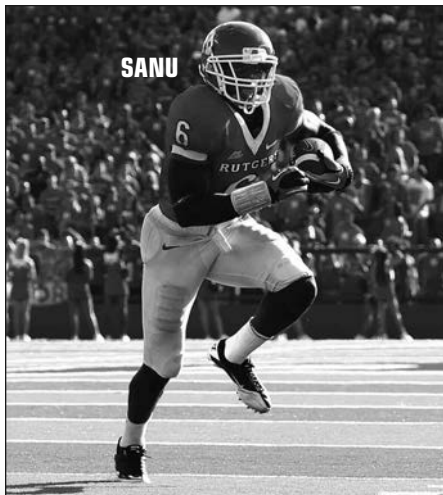

The Scarlet Knights won nine games in a season for the seventh time in school history. **Greg Schiano** had three nine-win seasons at RU, tied for the most in school history along with Frank Burns (1975, '76, '78).

RU was 2-0 at Yankee Stadium in 2011 and 3-7-1 all-time at the big ballpark in the Bronx. The Scarlet Knights played their 49th game all-time in a MLB venue, including their fourth bowl game (3-1).

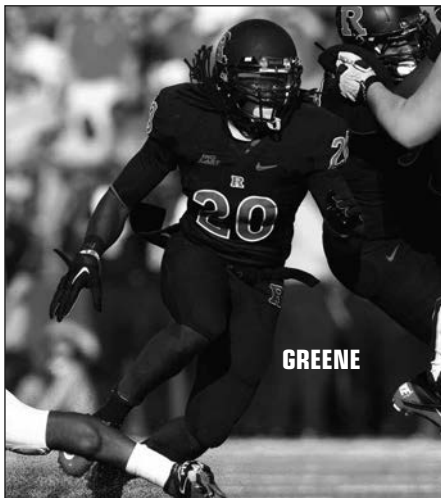
Tackles-for-loss – 3.0 Khaseem Greene (broke previous record of 2.5 by Jamaal Westerman in 2006 Texas Bowl)

Redshirt freshman RB **Jawan Jamison (Starke, Fla.)** was named MVP of the New Era Pinstripe Bowl with 27 carries for 131 yards and two touchdowns. It was the third 100-yard game of Jamison's career (all in 2011). He rushed for two touchdowns in a game for the third time in his career.

Junior WR **Mohamed Sanu (South Brunswick, N.J.)** became Rutgers' all-time leader in career receptions with six catches for 62 yards vs. Iowa State. Sanu finished with 210 career receptions, passing former All-American FB Brian Leonard (204).

Sanu ended the season with 115 receptions (school and BIG EAST record) for 1,206 yards. The 1,206 yards receiving place Sanu third in RU single-season history and eighth in BIG EAST single-season history.



Junior LB **Khaseem Greene (Elizabeth, N.J.)** finished with a team-high 13 tackles, but left the game in the fourth quarter with an ankle injury. Greene ended the year with 141 tackles, fifth in RU single-season history.

Greene's breakout season included the program's first BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Year honors.

BIG EAST's Best

Mohamed Sanu broke the school and conference records for receptions in a season with his 13-reception performance in the win over Army. Sanu first broke former first round NFL pick Kenny Britt's single-season record at RU of 87 receptions in 2008. He then passed Larry Fitzgerald's (Pitt) BIG EAST record of 92 receptions in 2003.

Special Teams Truly Special

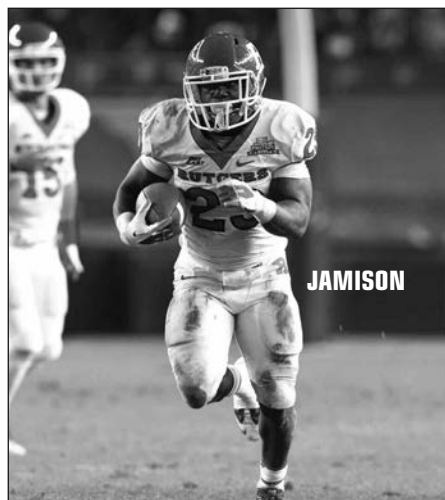
Under the direction of special teams coordinator Robb Smith, Rutgers has continued its trend under Greg Schiano of having one of the nation's elite special teams units.

The Scarlet Knights ranked 16th nationally and first in the BIG EAST in kickoff returns (24.2). Always a threat to block a kick, Rutgers had eight blocks in 2011. Only Fresno State (10) blocked more kicks in 2011.

Rutgers also scored three special teams touchdowns in 2011. Jordan Thomas scored on a 32 yard yard return on a Wayne Warren blocked punt vs. Army. Jeremy Deering returned a kickoff 98 yards for a score vs. USF and Marcus Cooper recovered a fumble on a punt for a three-yard touchdown vs. Ohio.

Redshirt freshman running back Jawan Jamison became the third freshman running back in school history to rush for 200 yards in a game with his 200-yard performance Nov. 19 vs. Cincinnati. Jamison carried 34 times for 200 yards and two touchdowns.

The 200 yards rushing marked the most by a freshman running back in school history at home. Jamison established career-highs in rushing attempts (34), rushing yards (200) and equaled a career-best with two rushing scores.

The 200 yards rushing were the 13th-best single-game total in school history.

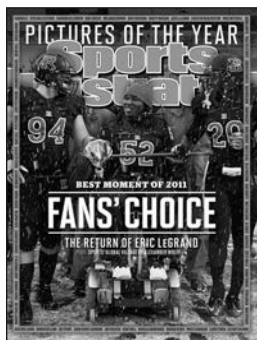
Ground Game Paves Way to Victory

Rutgers is 39-13 (.750) when rushing for 150 yards or more in a game since 2001.

The Scarlet Knights were 3-1 in 2011 when going over the 150-yard mark on the ground. Since the start of the 2006 season, Rutgers is 28-7 (.800) when rushing for more than 150 yards.

Under 300 the Magic Number

The Rutgers defense held four opponents to under 300 yards of total offense in 2011, going 4-0 in those contests. Since 2001, the Scarlet Knights are 39-4 (.907) when limiting the opposition to under 300 yards of total offense.



Eric LeGrand – Inspiring with a Smile

With the ax in tote, Eric LeGrand led the Rutgers football team on to the field at High Point Solutions Stadium in his wheelchair on Oct. 29, 2011. It was a moment that all who braved the winter storm or watched on television will always remember.

That snowy day was the first time LeGrand had been on the field with his teammates since his injury on Oct. 16, 2010 at New Meadowlands Stadium.

"It felt great leading the team out on to the field today," said LeGrand about the moment. "That's the team I played with throughout my career here. Leading them out on the field was a great opportunity and it really was a great time. It was a very special moment. I can't even explain it – it was a very emotional moment."

It was indeed a very emotional moment for everyone involved. LeGrand – who could have easily been negative and felt sorry for himself – has inspired many around the country and world with his positive attitude and flashy smile in the face of adversity.

The moment was also recognized as a special one across the nation. LeGrand's return to the field was selected by an online voting contest to be Sports Illustrated's Best Moment of 2011. For one week, from Dec. 9–16, 2011, fans could visit a custom tab on Sports Illustrated's Facebook page to rank their choices, knowing that the winning moment would appear on the 2011 year-end issue's cover. The project produced votes from 178 countries and led to more than 6,000 users to post comments on Facebook.

LeGrand beat out two of the world's most well-known soccer stars (Lionel Messi and Abby Wambach), a record-breaking surfer (Kelly Slater) and a milestone for the captain of the New York Yankees (Derek Jeter's 3,000th hit), among 15 iconic moments that fans could choose from.

"There is a reason why it happened, that's what I truly believe," LeGrand told the media before the season. "I was picked for this to happen to. Some people can't go through injuries like this, it would just put them down. I just believe God put me through this because he knows I can fight through this."

Even bigger news came LeGrand's way when he received a call from former head coach Greg Schiano. The first-year leader of the NFL's Tampa Bay Buccaneers signed LeGrand as a college free agent. The May 2 deal made LeGrand one of five Scarlet Knights to sign free agent deals after the 2012 NFL Draft. The former defensive tackle had his sights on that particular draft – he would have been an eligible senior. LeGrand recorded 60 tackles, 11 tackles for loss, 2.5 sacks and three fumble recoveries, before his playing career ended prematurely.

Additionally, LeGrand received the Most Courageous Athlete Award from the New Jersey Sports Writers Association in January and will also receive the Unsung Hero Award at the New Jersey Hall of Fame induction ceremony on June 9 for his representation of courage, strength and character.

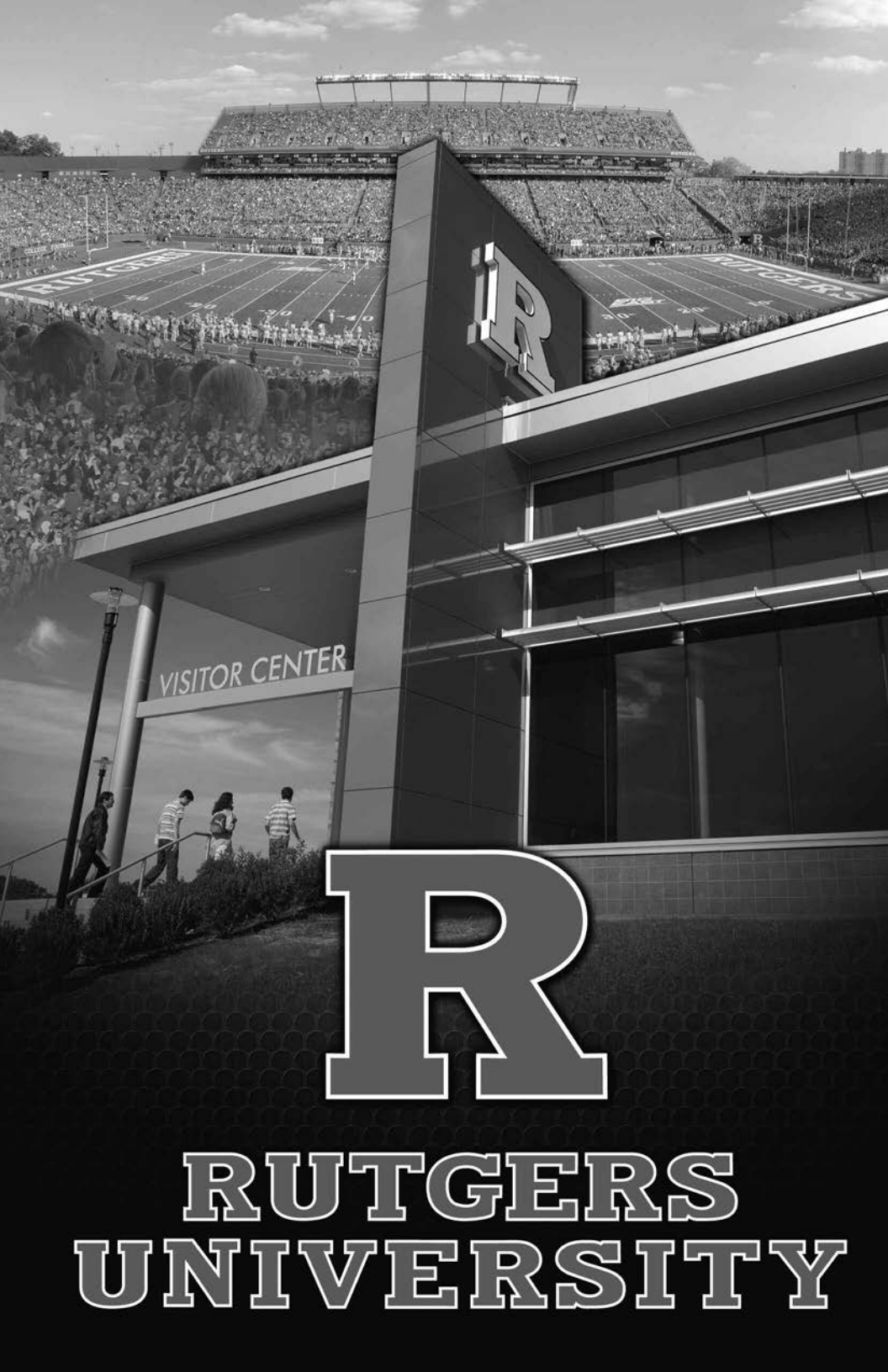

PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY



Robert L. Barchi is the 20th president of Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, a position he assumed on September 1, 2012. From 2004 to 2012, Dr. Barchi served as president of Thomas Jefferson University, nationally regarded as a top university dedicated to health sciences education and research. Previously, he was provost and chief academic officer of the University of Pennsylvania, where he had responsibility for Penn's 12 schools, their academic programs, athletics, students, and faculty.

Dr. Barchi began his academic career in 1972 on the Penn faculty. He founded the university's Department of Neuroscience, was chair of Penn's Department of Neurology, and for more than a decade was director of its Mahoney Institute of Neurological Sciences. Appointed provost and chief academic officer in 1999, he recruited new leadership for nine of the twelve schools at Penn and established a number of university-wide interdisciplinary

educational and research institutes.

Dr. Barchi assumed the presidency of Thomas Jefferson University in 2004. Under his leadership, the university grew from three to six schools, including the establishment of the Jefferson School of Pharmacy. During his eight-year presidency, enrollment across Jefferson increased more than 50%, fundraising doubled in spite of the economic downturn, and 22 new endowed professorships and 50 endowed scholarships were established. He also oversaw the transformation of the institution's urban environment into a vibrant university campus.

Throughout his career, Dr. Barchi has been active as a clinical neurologist and as researcher in the fields of neuroscience and neurology. In 1993, he was elected to the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences for his work on the structure and function of voltage-gated ion channels. He is also a member of the American Society for Clinical Investigation and the Association of American Physicians, and is a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Barchi received his B.S. and M.S. degrees from Georgetown University, and Ph.D. and M.D. degrees from the University of Pennsylvania.

A BRIEF HISTORY

Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, is one of the leading universities in the nation. The university is comprised of 28 degree-granting divisions; 10 undergraduate colleges, 10 graduate schools, and eight schools offering both undergraduate and graduate degrees. Six are located in Camden, eight in Newark, and 13 in New Brunswick and one in Newark and New Brunswick.

Rutgers has a unique history as a colonial college, a land-grant institution, and a state university. Chartered in 1766 as Queen's College, the eighth institution of higher learning to be founded in the colonies, the school opened its doors in New Brunswick in 1771 with a handful of first-year students. During its early years, the college developed as a classic liberal arts institution. In 1825, the name of the college was changed to honor a former trustee and Revolutionary War veteran, Colonel Henry Rutgers.

Rutgers College became the land-grant college of New Jersey in 1864, resulting in the establishment of the Rutgers Scientific School, featuring departments of agriculture, engineering, and chemistry. Further expansion in the sciences came with the founding of the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station in 1880, the College of Engineering (now the School of Engineering) in 1914, and the College of Agriculture (now the School of Environmental and Biological Sciences) in 1921. The precursors to several other Rutgers divisions were also established during this period: the College of Pharmacy (now the Ernest Mario School of Pharmacy) in 1892, the New Jersey College for Women (now Douglass Residential College, part of the School of Arts and Sciences) in 1918, and the School of Education (now Graduate School of Education) in 1924.

In 1924, Rutgers College officially became Rutgers University, a reflection of the institution's rapidly expanding number of schools and academic programs. Early in the century, Rutgers had begun offering educational opportunities to women when the New Jersey College for Women was founded in 1918, and to adult learners when University College, an evening division, was established in 1934. After World War II, enrollment exploded as Rutgers admitted all qualified candidates under the GI Bill. Rutgers was becoming an institution for all people, and in 1945 and 1956, state legislative acts formally designated Rutgers as The State University of New Jersey.

A flurry of expansion ensued. The University of Newark (now Rutgers–Newark) joined Rutgers in 1946, followed by the College of South Jersey (now Rutgers–Camden) in 1950. An ambitious building program added libraries, classrooms,

and student housing across the three regional campuses. In 1969, Livingston College opened, providing a co-educational residential experience with a special commitment to diversity. Graduate education in the arts and sciences grew through the establishment of the Graduate School–New Brunswick, the Graduate School–Newark, and the Graduate School–Camden. Professional schools were formed to serve students in the fields of business; communication, information, and library studies; criminal justice; education; fine arts; law; management and labor relations; nursing; planning and public policy; psychology; public affairs and administration; and social work. Meanwhile, as industry and government sought partners in solving problems and advancing knowledge, the concept of the research university emerged.

In 1981, Rutgers adopted a blueprint for its transformation into a major public research university. With increased support from state, federal, and corporate partners, Rutgers' strength in research grew dramatically. In 1989, in recognition of its enhanced stature, Rutgers was invited to join the prestigious Association of American Universities, an organization comprising the top 61 research universities in North America. Today, professors and students work in more than 200 specialized research centers, unraveling mysteries in marine sciences, early childhood education, neuroscience, advanced materials, climate change, nutrition, homeland security, transportation, stem cells, and many other areas that can improve life both in New Jersey and around the world.

A 2007 major reorganization of undergraduate education in New Brunswick reinvigorated the undergraduate experience for both students and faculty by combining the traditions and strengths of four undergraduate liberal arts colleges—Douglass, Livingston, Rutgers, and University—into a single School of Arts and Sciences.

With 28 schools and colleges, Rutgers offers more than 100 undergraduate majors and more than 180 graduate and professional degree programs. The university graduated more than 13,000 students last year, and has more than 400,000 living alumni residing in all 50 states and on six continents. Rutgers also sponsors community initiatives in all 21 New Jersey counties. Universitywide, new degree programs, research endeavors, and community outreach are in development to meet the demands of the 21st century.

Today, Rutgers continues to grow, both in its facilities and in the variety and depth of its educational and research programs. The university's goals for the future include the continued provision of the highest quality education, along with the increased support of research and commitment to public service to meet the needs of society.

2009 economic impact report showed that Rutgers and its faculty, staff, students and visitors channel \$3.8 billion in direct and indirect spending into the state economy – more than six times the state's \$595.3 million investment in the university.

- With holdings of more than 3.6 million volumes, the Rutgers library system ranks among the nation's largest.
- Rutgers enrolls more than 58,000 students, including more than 43,000 undergraduates and 14,000 graduate students.
- More than 13,000 students earned a degree from Rutgers in the 2011-2012 academic year.
- The university has more than 400,000 living alumni; 200,000 alumni reside in New Jersey.
- In 2008, the Middle States Commission on Higher Education reaccredited Rutgers for the next 10 years.



TEACHING AND LEARNING

- Rutgers faculty include an Abel Prize winner, Fulbright Scholars, Guggenheim Fellows, members of the American Academy of Arts and Science, fellows of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, a National Endowment for the Arts "Jazz Master" and winners of many other prestigious awards and grants.

The MBA program was ranked 30th in the country for the employment rate of its graduates three months after graduation by *U.S. News & World Report*. To meet rising demand, a new on-year MBA track was created for students with advanced standing.
- In Newark, the business school resides in a new state-of-the-art building which opened in 2009. In New Brunswick, a new building will open in 2013 as the center of a new Livingston Professional Campus, accommodating the massive growth in the new four-year undergraduate program.
- The Edward J. Bloustein School of Planning and Public Policy is ranked third among the nation's top graduate programs in urban planning according to a survey by Planetizen, a Los Angeles-based planning and development network.

RESEARCH

- Streptomycin, the first effective cure for tuberculosis, and other potent antibiotics were discovered at Rutgers by Professor Selman Waksman and his students in the 1940s. Waksman received the Nobel Prize for his important contributions to medicine.
- The Rutgers Stem Cell Research Center, part of the Division of Life Sciences of the School of Arts and Sciences, is located in Nelson Laboratories on the New Brunswick campus where its mission is to support research with human embryonic stem cells for Rutgers University researchers and collaborators.
- The Rutgers Cell and DNA Repository is a valuable resource for researchers around the world studying the role heredity plays in such complex genetic diseases as schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, autism, Alzheimer's, alcoholism, diabetes, and Tourette's syndrome.
- The Protein Data Bank, based at Rutgers, is the international repository of three-dimensional protein structures. With \$30 million in federal funding, the data bank provides vital information on more than 82,500 proteins and other macromolecules for scientists working to design more effective treatments for disease.
- Rutgers' Institute of Marine and Coastal Sciences ranks fourth among the top oceanographic research institutions in the world, according to a recent poll conducted by Thomson Reuters.
- The Ernest Mario School of Pharmacy, the only public pharmacy school in New Jersey and one of the top institutions of its kind in the nation, ranks in the top 15 percent among pharmacy schools nationwide in research dollars awarded by the National Institutes of Health with \$7.6 million of funding awarded to the school in 2009.
- Rutgers holds more than 600 United States patents, half of which have been issued in the last decade. To date over 80 start-up companies have been created based on Rutgers technologies; three-quarters of these are New Jersey - based.
- Rutgers is a partner in the Southern African Large Telescope, one of the world's largest optical telescopes and the southern hemisphere's newest eye-on-the-sky.

SERVICE TO NEW JERSEY

- Rutgers' Center for Government Services trains New Jersey's municipal employees to better serve their constituents and trains approximately 20,000 annually through 16 separate programs and 600 courses.
- Rutgers Continuing Education offers more than 4,000 course sections with 120,000 annual enrollments. Courses are offered in every county in New Jersey.
- The Office of the New Jersey State Climatologist at Rutgers is the state's official weather resource.
- Each year on a single Saturday in the spring, Rutgers opens its doors to the world for "Rutgers Day." More than 250,000 people have visited the five New Brunswick campuses during the event the last four years to celebrate the institution's three-part mission of teaching, research and service. "Rutgers Day," which made its debut in 2009, is an expansion of the successful annual New Jersey Folk Festival and Ag Field Day programs.

SERVICE TO THE NATION

- Rutgers New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station has offices in all 21 New Jersey counties and serves the residents of the state through research, education and service programs that run the gamut from 4-H Youth Development to family and community health. Research from the Experiment Station has led to renowned Jersey tomatoes, disease-resistant dogwoods, improved coastline management, new forms of mosquito control and world-famous turfgrass varieties that have been used everywhere from the new Yankee Stadium to the Augusta National Golf Club.
- Rutgers School of Environmental and Biological Sciences builds on a tradition of hands-on learning and research excellence in areas that cover the biological spectrum from organisms to ecosystems. Students and researchers alike are dedicated to finding solutions to the problems that most concern our state's residents, particularly in the areas of environmental sustainability, alternative energy, food, health and nutrition.
- Such nationally respected institutes at Rutgers, including the National Transit Institute, the National Institute for Early Education Research and the Institute for Health, Health Care Policy and Aging Research, are helping to shape national and state policy in critical areas.
- Rutgers is the nation's primary source for anti-terror security training for public transit workers.
- In April of 2009, Rutgers was selected by the United States Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to co-lead a new DHS Center of Excellence in Command, Control, and Interoperability (CCI) to conduct research into the technological issues involved with maintaining homeland security. It is one of 12 DHS Centers of Excellence in the nation.
- The Edward J. Bloustein School of Planning and Public Policy's National Transit Institute is one of seven academic institutions around the nation that comprise a National Transportation Security Center of Excellence.
- Most meals ready to eat (MREs) manufactured for our nation's troops are produced using Rutgers-developed technology.
- The Douglass Developmental Disabilities Center is a pioneer in developing effective methods to help autistic children.

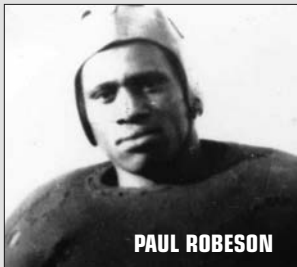

TIM PERNETTI

DIRECTOR OF INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS



A New Jersey native with a strong passion for his alma mater, Tim Perneti has come full-circle in becoming one of the nation's youngest leaders in college athletics.

A former student-athlete "On the Banks", Perneti was named Rutgers' sixth Director of Intercollegiate

Athletics on February 26, 2009. He oversees 24 men's and women's intercollegiate teams in New Brunswick, a larger number than fielded at most of the university's peer institutions. Perneti has been influential in the world of college athletics since he received a bachelor's degree in journalism and mass media from Rutgers in 1993, and a master's degree in communication in 1995.

Perneti's influence on Rutgers Athletics has been immediate – from the key coaching hires of Mike Rice (men's basketball), Dan Donigan (men's soccer) and Brian Brecht (men's lacrosse) – to securing the first two naming rights partnerships in Rutgers Athletics history.

Under his leadership, Rutgers inked a 10-year naming rights deal with High Point Solutions to acquire the naming rights for Rutgers Stadium, along with a 10-year contract with Audi for the Audi Rutgers Club at High Point Solutions Stadium. Both deals have netted the Department of Athletics nearly one million dollars in new revenue to the annual budget.

Two other key objectives on Perneti's watch were to secure a new food vendor for Rutgers Athletics and secure an all-sports shoe and apparel deal for the department. Perneti led the charge to bring Sodexo to Rutgers as the exclusive concessionaire and caterer for the Athletics Department. The 10-year agreement will enhance the game-day experience, significantly increase revenues to Athletics, and fund future capital improvements at High Point Solutions Stadium and the RAC. He further directed negotiations with Nike to execute the first-ever all-sports shoe and apparel deal for all 24 sports at Rutgers. The five-year agreement worth approximately \$5.2M in equipment and apparel will provide state-of-the-art apparel for all Rutgers student-athletes.

During his introductory press conference, Perneti spoke about his vision to build a broadband network to deliver

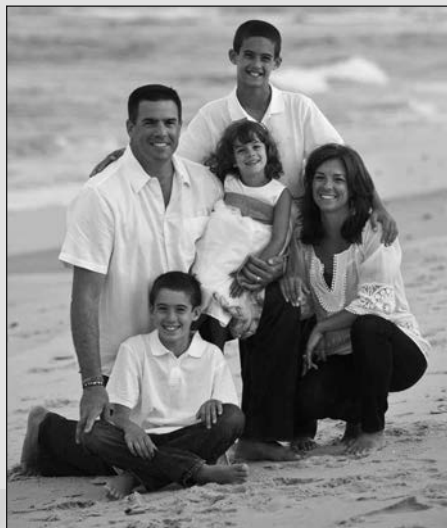
hundreds of live events. That promise has blossomed into RVision, powered by ScarletKnights.com, as RVision has streamed hundreds of live events per year, including unprecedented live game coverage for many of the Scarlet Knights Olympic Sports.

Prior to returning to Rutgers, Perneti was the Executive Vice President, Content, for CBS College Sports Network. In that role, he oversaw the rights and relationship business, on-air talent, and all network programming and content on air, online and across all distribution platforms for the nation's first company dedicated to college sports.

Perneti helped to build the CBS College Sports Network, previously CSTV, prior to its launch in 2003, and has played a critical role in establishing it as the multi-media leader in college sports programming, content, news and information. He was a recipient of the prestigious Sports Business Journal Forty under Forty Award, and the Multichannel News 40 under 40 Award both in 2008.

Charged with developing relationships, acquiring rights and creating multi-platform original programming for the first ever 24-hour sports college sports network, Perneti successfully navigated through a complicated web of media rights deals to come up with new ways to serve college sports fans.

Perneti worked closely with the NCAA and hundreds of schools in every major conference, securing over 2,500 hours of event programming each year and multiple NCAA Championships across 35 men's and women's sports.

Pernetti was in charge of the CBS College Sports Network exclusive long-term agreements with the US Naval Academy, Mountain West Conference, Conference USA, and the Atlantic 10. Further, he managed company relationships with more than 30 conferences and thousands of institutions.

Pernetti remains most proud of establishing a strong relationship in women's collegiate sports including the establishment of a women's basketball game of the week package in 2004 with the Big East Conference.

In 2006, Pernetti spearheaded a landmark multi-media partnership with the NCAA to make CBS College Sports Network the home of Division II Sports. The innovative deal effectively increased the scope and reach of NCAA Division II sports with hundreds of games now available nationally via the broadcast network and online.

Pernetti's commitment to providing greater exposure to women's and under-served sports is evidenced by the network's unprecedented coverage of lacrosse and volleyball, among others. He has also been at the forefront of the development and creation of the Collegiate Nationals, which crowns champions in dozens of high endurance sports, and innovative original production including CBS College Sports Network's groundbreaking NCAA March Madness Central, NCAA March Madness Highlights on CBS College Sports, and the WIRED franchise which gives viewers an inside look at games and

events through wireless microphones on coaches during game action.

Prior to joining CBS College Sports Network, Pernetti served eight years at ABC-TV and ABC Sports most recently as Director of Programming, where he was integral in acquiring, managing and developing several ABC Sports properties including college football, the Bowl Championship Series, and college basketball.

For five years, Pernetti handled relationships and negotiated television rights with all of the major collegiate conferences. As a student at Rutgers, Pernetti was a four-year letterwinner at tight end on the Rutgers football squad. He was also the color commentator for Rutgers Football on the Rutgers Football Radio Network and announced weekly NFL games nationally on Sports USA Radio.

A resident of Oakland, N.J., Pernetti is married to the former Danielle Bahto. His wife also graduated from Rutgers and was a letterwinner on the women's lacrosse team. Danielle and Tim are the proud parents of their three children – Max, Conor and Natalie.

In his spare time Pernetti is the Commissioner of Oakland (N.J.) Recreation Youth football program, serves on the Board of Directors of the Reed Academy (a school in Oakland serving children with autistic spectrum disorder), and has been named a member of the NY/NJ Super Bowl Host Committee for Community Engagement.

HISTORY &
TRADITION



Rutgers and Princeton played the first game of intercollegiate football on Nov. 6, 1869, on a plot of ground where the present-day Rutgers gymnasium now stands in New Brunswick, N.J. Rutgers won that first game, 6-4.

The game was played with two teams of 25 men each under rugby-like rules, but like modern football, it was "replete with surprise, strategy, prodigies of determination and physical prowess," to use the words of one of the Rutgers players.

At 3 p.m. on that memorable afternoon, the 50 competitors and about 100 spectators gathered on the field. To distinguish themselves from the bareheaded visitors, 50 Rutgers students, including players, donned scarlet-colored scarves which they converted into turbans.

Events leading up to the game were described by John W. Herbert, Rutgers '72, who was one of the players: "To appreciate this game to the fullest you must know something of its background," Herbert wrote in 1933. "The two colleges were, and still are, of course, about 20 miles apart. The rivalry between them was intense. For years each had striven for possession of an old Revolutionary cannon, making night forays and lugging it back and forth time and again. Not long before the first football game, the canny Princetonnians had settled this competition in their own favor by ignominiously sinking the gun in several feet of concrete. In addition to this, I regret to report, Princeton had beaten Rutgers in baseball by the harrowing score of 40-2. Rutgers longed for a chance to square things."

A challenge for the game was issued by Rutgers. Three games were to be played that year. The first, played at New Brunswick, was won by Rutgers. Princeton won the second game, but cries of "over-emphasis" prevented the third game in football's first year when faculties of both institutions protested on the grounds that the games were interfering with student studies.

An analytical account of the game appeared in the November, 1869 issue of the *Targum*, Rutgers' undergraduate newspaper.

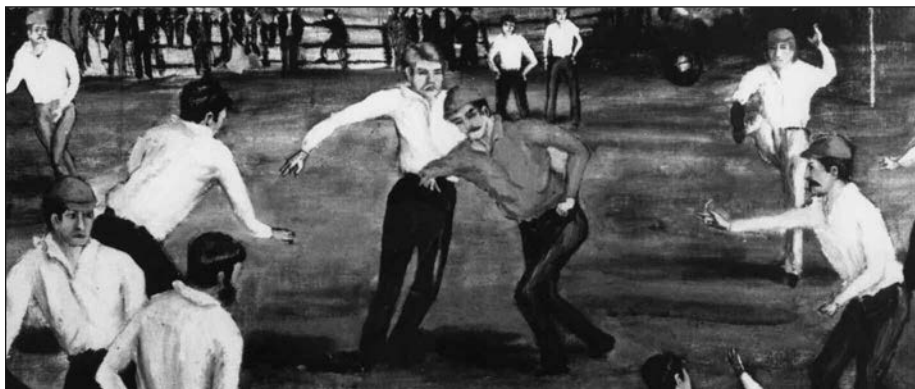
"To describe the varying fortunes of the match, game by game, would be a waste of labor for every game was like the one before," wrote the student reporter. "There was the same headlong running, wild shouting, and frantic kicking.

"To sum up, Princeton had the most muscle, but didn't kick very well, and wanted organization. They evidently don't like to kick the ball on the ground. Our men, on the other hand, though comparatively weak, ran well, and kicked well throughout. But their great point was the organization, for which great praise is due to the captain. The right men were always in the right place."

One of the Princeton players, William Preston Lane, in 1933 contended in a newspaper interview that Rutgers "ran us Princeton men out of town. I never found out why they did that," he related. "But we don't ask any questions. When we saw them coming after us, we ran to the outskirts of New Brunswick and got into our carriages and wagons and went away as fast as we could."

Lane's contention is refuted in the *Targum* account. "After the match the players had an amicable 'feed together,'" the paper reported. "At 8 o'clock our guests went home, in high good spirits, thirsting to beat us next time, if they can."

Regardless of what actually happened after the first game, football was here to stay. Rutgers got Columbia University started in the grid sport the following season and in a few years most of the colleges and universities in the East were represented on the gridiron.



The following is an excerpt from an article that was written by John Bruns, former long-time sports writer for the Home News, and the Easton Times-Express.

When Rutgers defeated Princeton in the first intercollegiate football game ever played in 1869, the setting was quite different than it is today. The game was contested on a field along College Avenue in New Brunswick. There weren't tens of thousands of cheering fans in a multi-million dollar stadium. There was no manicured grass field or electronic scoreboard. There was no elaborate athletic equipment or television cameras. But on that fall day in 1869, those students established a tradition of quality football programs, competitiveness and school spirit that continues at Rutgers, the birthplace of intercollegiate football.

Rutgers won six of 10 games in 1882, but played only one game in 1885. Similarly, the Scarlet Knights went 8-6 in 1891, but two years later played only four games. By the early 1900's, scheduling had become more consistent and football became more popular across the country.

The eight wins of 1891 weren't matched until Rutgers went 8-1 in 1947 with one of the most successful teams of coach Harvey Harman in the Golden Era immediately following World War II. That team, quarterbacked by Frank Burns, who would later become Rutgers' most successful coach, lost its opener to Columbia and then swept through eight straight opponents.

In 1913, coach George Foster Sanford began a tradition of success among Rutgers coaches in their inaugural year by leading his team to a 6-3 mark. He then flirted with two perfect seasons, improving the team to 7-1 in 1915 and 7-1-1 in 1917. Those two seasons, which featured All-American Paul Robeson, were among Rutgers' best.

Sanford, a member of Rutgers' Hall of Fame, also helped to introduce Rutgers to the New York metropolitan area, playing games at the Polo Grounds against teams like Notre Dame, Nebraska, Louisiana State and West Virginia. A few years later, in 1924, two-time All-American end and full-back Homer Hazel helped coach John Wallace continue the tradition of first-year coaching success, as Rutgers posted a 7-1-1 mark.

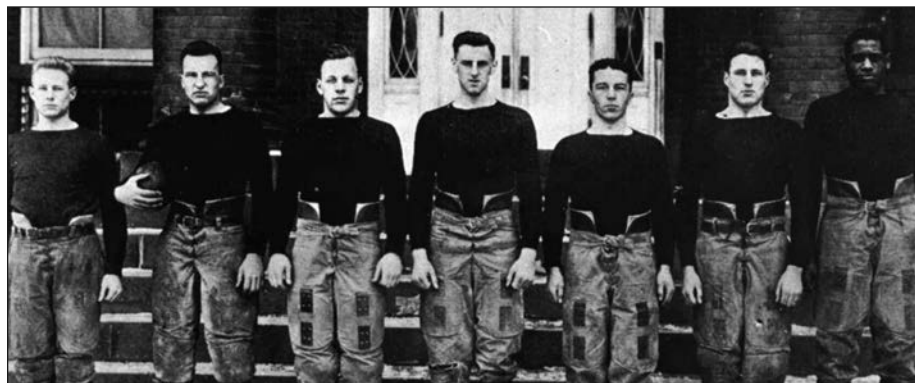
Harvey Harman also had a successful first season, going 7-1 in 1938, the year Rutgers dedicated the original Rutgers Stadium. Rutgers won the dedication game, 20-18, over Princeton. Harman, however, was replaced by former coach Harry Rockafeller during World War II. His tenure included an 8-1 season in 1947 when Rutgers, dominated by WWII veterans, registered a combined record of 27-7 from 1945-48.

When John Stiegman coached Rutgers from 1956-59, he brought back the single-wing formation to the Scarlet Knight offense, and led Rutgers to an 8-1 mark in 1958. The only loss of that season, 13-12 to the Quantico Marines, came when All-American tailback Billy Austin had to miss a game due to a broken hand.

Another first-year coach got off to an impressive start when John Bateman went 8-1 in 1960. That campaign was followed by Rutgers' first undefeated season in 1961, when the team went 9-0, capping the season with a fourth-quarter, 25-point comeback win over Columbia. That team included All-American center Alex Kroll, and was ranked 15th nationally. In his 11 seasons, Bateman led Rutgers to 73 wins in 124 games.

In 1973, Frank Burns took the reins of Rutgers football and became the most successful Rutgers coach ever by building teams recognized for fundamentals and defense. Burns himself was also known as a fierce linebacker and won the Most Valuable Player Award in the 1949 College All-Star game, when he made 17 tackles against the New York Giants. The Burns defenses were led by linebackers Ed Steward, Jim Hughes, Jim Dumont and defensive end Nate Toran. Burns' first team went 6-5, while running back "Ju" Jennings set single-season records for rushing yardage (1,353) and touchdowns (21) that still stand.

Over the next five seasons, Burns' teams won at least seven games each season, including a five-season stretch from 1975-79 when Rutgers' winning percentage was .803 with a record of 45-11. The jewel in the crown of Burns' tenure as Rutgers' coach was the 1976 season, when the team was perfect at 11-0, establishing the best season ever at Rutgers. During Burns' 11 seasons at Rutgers, the Scarlet Knights won nearly two-thirds of their games (78-44). He also took Rutgers to its first bowl appearance, the Garden State Bowl, at Giants Stadium against Arizona State in 1978.



Doubtless, the biggest win of the Burns era was the 13-7 upset of Tennessee on November 3, 1979 at Knoxville. Burns called it "the greatest of my coaching career."

The following year, 1980, Rutgers had one of its great "near-misses" of its long history when the Scarlet bowed, 17-13, to a highly-favored and No. 1-ranked Alabama team coached by Bear Bryant at Giants Stadium. In a post game comment, Bear Bryant said, "We didn't beat Rutgers. All I can say is we won."

In 1984 when Dick Anderson was named head coach, a renewed commitment to football at Rutgers was backed by a \$3 million state-funded package. Those funds helped finance the artificial surface practice fields, the practice "Bubble" and the Hale Center, which includes lockerrooms, offices, a weight-training area and medical facilities for the football team.

Anderson won seven of 10 games in his inaugural season and his teams produced some of the most exciting players in Rutgers history, including record-breaking passer Scott Erney, career tackles leader Tyrone Stowe and career kick-off return leader Eric Young.

Doug Graber became the Scarlet Knights' 23rd coach in 1990 and placed an emphasis on recruiting the best talent in the state of New Jersey. His first recruiting class included three first-team All-State selections and two second-team All-State selections among the 12 recruits from New Jersey.

Another major boost for Rutgers came in 1991 when it joined the BIG EAST Football Conference. The team went 13-9 in its first two years in the BIG EAST, including a 4-2 BIG EAST mark in 1992, before slipping to 4-7 the following season.

The 1994 season celebrated not only the 125 years of college football, but also the return of the newly-renovated and expanded Rutgers Stadium.

A new stadium has been quite a different setting than that of the first college football game played over 130 years ago. The Scarlet Knights are playing for their own place in history as they continue the college football tradition that was born "On the Banks of the Old Raritan." After a less than stellar run through the mid-1990's under 1998 BIG EAST coach of the year Terry Shea, the Scarlet Knights opted to take the program in a different direction.

On December 1, 2000, then Director of Athletics Bob Mulcahy introduced the newest coach in the storied history of Rutgers Football - Greg Schiano.

Schiano's 11-year tenure featured six bowl appearances in the last seven years, including the nation's longest active bowl winning streak of five games. While producing victories at a rate unprecedented in the program's history, the Rutgers football team also committed fully to succeeding in the classroom. In 2010, Rutgers' football program ranked first in the nation in Academic Progress Rate; in 2011, the team followed up with the nation's No. 2 ranking. Schiano's career record at Rutgers was 68-67 and he left as the third-winningest coach in Rutgers history.

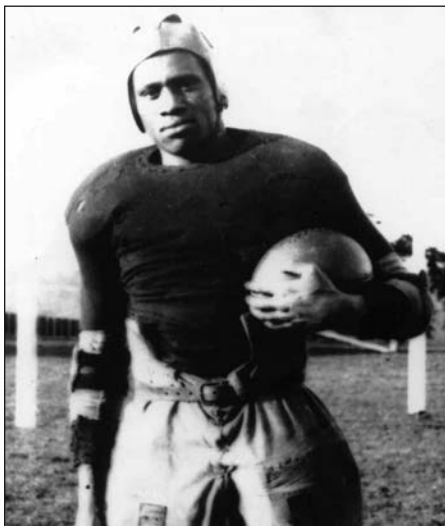
In 2006, Schiano directed the Scarlet Knights to new heights as RU finished the season 11-2 overall and ranked 12th in the final rankings. Rutgers captured the nation's attention starting the season 9-0, including a magical 28-25 victory over previously undefeated and third-ranked Louisville in a November ESPN primetime contest.

Rutgers Director of Intercollegiate Athletics Tim Perneti announced on January 31, 2012 the appointment of Kyle Flood as the 29th head coach at the Birthplace of College Football. Flood, who served on Rutgers' coaching staff for the previous seven seasons, assumed the head coaching vacancy created after Schiano resigned his position to become head coach of the NFL's Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

One constant on any coaching staff with Flood is how successful those teams have fared. As an assistant coach, 16 of Flood's 17 seasons his teams have finished with winning records, including earning a National Championship at Delaware.

The last time Rutgers promoted an assistant coach on staff to the head coaching position was the naming of Frank Burns to replace John Bateman in 1973 — and Burns became the winningest coach in school history.

A highly respected figure in the coaching profession, Flood has served as the assistant head coach of the program since 2008 and has been a key part in Rutgers' six bowl appearances over his seven-year tenure in Piscataway. In addition to his four years as the assistant head coach, Flood has been in charge of the offensive line since coming to RU in 2005.



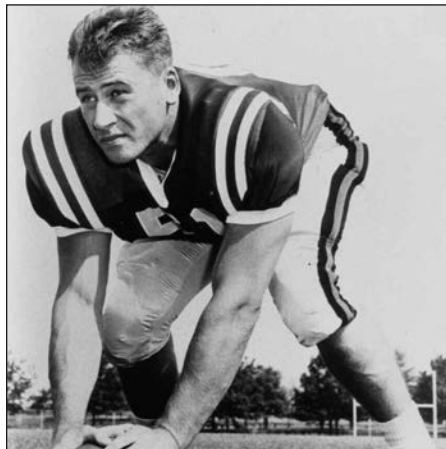
PAUL ROBESON

Paul Robeson played four years for the famous coach, G. Foster Sanford. Rutgers had a 22-6-3 record in that time. In 31 games, Rutgers scored 941 points to opponents' 191. Robeson was a powerful contributor to that record.... Robeson was a two-time All-America end. Frank Menke named him All-America in 1917 and 1918. Walter Camp picked him in 1918. (Camp did not name an All-America team in 1917.) Following college, Robeson played three years as a pro - 1920 with Hammond, 1921 with Akron and 1922 with Milwaukee - in the American Professional Football League.

He obtained his law degree in 1923. At Rutgers, Robeson was elected to Phi Beta Kappa and was valedictorian of the class of 1919. He won the college oratorical contest four straight years and gave the commencement address at graduation. Robeson won 12 letters in four sports - four in football, three each in basketball and baseball, and two in track. He stood 6-3 in height and his weight was listed at 191 in early years, at 215 his senior season. This man of many talents became an actor, singer and lecturer. He was on Broadway and in the movies. His rich basso made his signature song "Ol' Man River" a classic. He starred in plays, such as "The Emperor Jones", "Othello", "Showboat", as well as many others, in the U.S., Europe and Africa. In 1925 he made a recording that sold 55,000 copies in four months. In 1972 he received the Whitney Young Memorial Award. Ebony Magazine called him "one of the 10 most important black men in American history."...

Paul Robeson was born April 9, 1898, in Princeton, N.J. His father, Rev. William Robeson, had escaped slavery in 1860 in North Carolina at age 15. His mother, Maria Bustill, was a teacher. When Paul was a high school senior, he won the statewide academic test and received a scholarship to Rutgers. In 1915 he was the third black to enter Rutgers and the first to play football. He died January 23, 1976.

A true renaissance man, Robeson won 12 letters in four sports at Rutgers - four in football, three each in basketball and baseball, and two in track. After his tenure at Rutgers, he became an accomplished actor, singer and lecturer, and was recently commemorated on a US postal stamp.



ALEX KROLL

Alex Kroll, a consensus All-American center on Rutgers' first undefeated football team in 1961, is the Scarlet Knights' sixth inductee into the College Football Hall of Fame, as a part of the Class of 1997.

Kroll followed end Paul Robeson, halfback Homer Hazel and coaches George Foster Sanford and Harvey Harman into this most cherished of college football's honors. Former athletic director George Little is also among the all-time honorees.

Kroll, a 6-2, 228-pound center and linebacker, was a major force in Rutgers compiling a 17-1 record in his two years of play "On the Banks." In 1960, the Knights under coach John Bateman were 8-1 and followed up with the school's first undefeated campaign, going 9-0 in 1961. Team captain of the lauded 1961 squad, Kroll was a two-time first-team All-ECAC choice and won first-team All-American honors from *Associated Press*, *United Press International*, *Newspaper Enterprise Association*, *Look*, and the *American Football Coaches Association*. Known as a "coach on the field," he was credited with making the quarterback sneak an offensive weapon as Rutgers scored seven TDs on that play in 1961 with Kroll clearing the way into the endzone for the signal-caller.

He was also a first-team All-East choice by the AP in 1961 and played in the North-South game and the Senior Bowl. In 1960, he was an honorable mention All-American. Following his senior season, he was a second-round draft pick of the New York Titans, playing for one season in 1962.

Kroll earned a BA in English Literature in 1962 and was a Henry Rutgers Scholar with a perfect grade point average in his major. He received a National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame Post-Graduate Scholarship in 1961. In 1986, he was awarded the Silver Anniversary Award from the National Collegiate Athletic Association for his collegiate achievements.

Immediately following his last game with the Titans, he joined the workforce at Young & Rubicam, the world's largest independent advertising agency, as a copywriter. After a succession of writing and supervisory jobs in the creative department, he was named executive vice president and worldwide creative director in 1970. He was named president and chief operating officer in 1982 and, four years later, Kroll became chairman of Young & Rubicam. He is retired but still serves as Chairman Emeritus of Young & Rubicam.



HARVEY HARMAN

Few men loved the game with the fervor of Harvey Harman, a huge man with a grand smile and a fierce dedication to the sport.

A former president of the American Football Coaches Association, Harman received that group's Amos Alonzo Stagg Award, symbolic of outstanding service to the profession. It was not surprising that Harman

achieved such acclaim, for he learned his football lessons from two of the game's mentors - Glenn "Pop" Warner and Jock Sutherland - while at Pittsburgh. Harman was a starting tackle for the Panthers before taking his first coaching assignment at Haverford. From there he moved on to Sewanee (the University of the South), Pennsylvania and Rutgers.

It was at Rutgers that he had his greatest success, directing the Scarlet Knights to a 26-7-1 record before interrupting his career to serve in the U.S. Navy during World War II.

Harman returned to Rutgers after the war and led the Scarlet Knights for another 10 seasons before accepting a position as Executive Director of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame, Inc. In that capacity, Harman became known as the goodwill ambassador for football, continuing to serve the game until his death in 1969. His career record lists a slate of 140-104-7.



HOMER HAZEL

He parted his dark hair down the middle, in the fashion of the day, and his deep-set eyes glowed with a competitive fire. Homer Hazel, Rutgers' first All-Famer, was, without doubt, the most versatile player the Scarlet ever produced.

A natural athlete, Hazel excelled in various sports and was most successful as a track and field star. His speed and quickness served him well, for he once recovered his own kickoff in the enemy end zone for a touchdown.

Homer led Rutgers to identical 7-1-1 records in his final two seasons, earning All-America laurels in each. He was an end in 1923, when the only Scarlet loss was to West Virginia (27-7). He had Rutgers on the way to an unbeaten finish in 1924 - this time as a hard-hitting fullback - when Bucknell untracked the Scarlet in the final game of the season, 12-7. During the 1924 campaign, Homer Hazel established school records for most points after a touchdown and longest completed pass.

He could do it all. Carrying 226 pounds over a 5-foot-11 frame, Homer lettered in football, basketball, baseball and track at Rutgers. He later served as Athletic Director, football and basketball coach at the University of Mississippi for more than five years. He was a golf pro for four years, and a labor relations manager for more than 20 years. Hazel won his first letter in football at Rutgers in 1916. He left school because of a lack of funds. Hazel worked at various jobs and, at age 28, played football again at Rutgers. Walter Camp named him All-America end in 1923, All-America fullback in 1924. Hazel was born June 2, 1895, and died February 3, 1968.



GEORGE LITTLE

A graduate of Ohio Wesleyan, George Little opened his coaching career at the University of Cincinnati and produced a two-year record of 10-8-0 before moving up the road to Oxford, Ohio, home of the Miami Redskins, in 1916. There, Little brought the Redskins their first Conference Championship and a 7-0-1 mark.

After service in World War I, Little returned to Miami and directed the Red and White to yet another league crown and a three-year post-war record of 20-3-1. He also coached the Miami basketball and track teams, claiming a conference crown in the latter sport.

The 1922 and 1923 seasons found Little at Michigan under head coach Fielding Yost, the man he replaced in 1924. That year, Little's Wolverines were 6-0-3-1. The next season, Little was in Wisconsin as the new Athletic Director and head coach of the Badgers, and he led his charges to a two-year mark of 11-3-2. His teams displayed imagination and strength on offense, a unique ruggedness on defense.

Little wound up his collegiate career as the Athletic Director at Rutgers, and then served as executive secretary of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame.



GEORGE FOSTER SANFORD

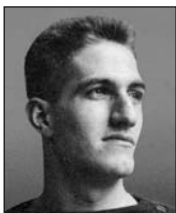
At the entrance to Rutgers Stadium, inscribed upon a bronze plaque, is a tribute to George Sanford. It was financed and installed by his players, the men "...he inspired to deeds beyond themselves."

Undoubtedly, Sanford was an inspirational leader of men, a gentleman who excelled as both player and coach. Sanford played center on the 1891 and 1892 Yale teams which held each of their 26 opponents scoreless. Though he was never chosen to an All-America team, a 1927 poll named him the all-time Yale center.

Sanford began his coaching career at Columbia (1899-1901), called in to revive the football program which had been abandoned after the 1891 campaign. His 1899 team defeated Yale for the first time ever, and it was at Columbia that Sanford developed the famous "Flying Hurdle Play" which saw Harold Weekes catapulted over the scrimmage line. Moving to Rutgers (1913-23), Sanford had marked success as his club rolled to a 56-32-5 record. He was hailed as a "miracle worker" in 1917, after his Rutgers team beat the heavily-favored Newport Naval Reserve All-Stars, 14-0. Between his teams at Columbia and Rutgers, Sanford devoted his energy toward a successful insurance brokerage business.

1978 GARDEN STATE BOWL

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. - In its first postseason action in program history, Rutgers faced Arizona State at Giants Stadium in the inaugural Garden State Bowl in 1978. The Scarlet Knights pulled ahead in the first half on a touchdown by David Dorn and field goal from Kennan Startzell to take a 10-0 lead. However, the Sun Devils closed the gap just before the end of the first half when Mark Malone found Bob Weathers in the end zone. In the third quarter, Arizona State claimed the lead with two Malone touchdown passes and in the final quarter added another score with a rushing TD to make the score 28-10. Ted Blackwell brought the Scarlet Knights to within 10 points with his five-yard rushing touchdown and successful two-point conversion. Rutgers had a final chance to take over the game when an offside kick came bouncing its way, but an offside flag on the kickoff erased the Scarlet Knights' good fortune. Arizona State tacked on two touchdowns to secure the 34-18 victory.



2005 INSIGHT BOWL

PHOENIX, Ariz. - Rutgers and Arizona State met for the second time in a bowl game, this time at Phoenix's Chase Field. The Scarlet Knights came up just short in the contest, losing 45-40 to the Sun Devils. RU scored the game's first touchdown on a pass from Ryan Hart to Clark Harris, but ASU quickly responded with a TD of its own, evening the game at 7-7. Both teams traded a number of scores but back-to-back touchdowns in the fourth quarter helped ASU to a 45-33 lead and the eventual victory. Rutgers engineered a 63-yard TD drive in the final 51 seconds, but it was not enough as the Sun Devils held on for the 45-40 win.



2006 TEXAS BOWL

HOUSTON, Texas - Rutgers' most memorable season ended with the program's biggest milestone - the first bowl victory in the history of Scarlet Knight football. Ray Rice rushed for 170 yards and a touchdown, while Tim Brown hauled in two TD passes as the 16th-ranked Scarlet Knights defeated Kansas State 37-10. Rice eventually went on to be named the Texas Bowl's Most Valuable Player. In the first quarter, Mike Teel hit Brown in the end zone on a 14-yard touchdown pass and the pair later connected, this time with a 49-yard strike to give Rutgers a 14-0 lead. Jeremy Ito sent a 37-yard field goal through the uprights with less than a minute remaining in the first half to take a 17-10 lead at halftime. In the opening minute of the third quarter, Rutgers extended its lead on an interception returned for a touchdown by Quintero Frierson. The Scarlet Knights scored the final 23 points of the game as Rice added a 46-yard touchdown run and Ito converted a pair of field goals to give RU the 37-10 victory.



2008 INTERNATIONAL BOWL

TORONTO - In its third-consecutive bowl game, Rutgers pulled off another program milestone with its second-straight postseason victory as the Scarlet Knights defeated Ball State 52-30. Ray Rice had one of the finest individual outings in college football history, rushing for a career-high 280 yards and four touchdowns en route to being named the International Bowl's Most Valuable Player; his second-consecutive MVP honor in a bowl game. Rice's 280 yards were the third-most rushing yards in NCAA Bowl history. He entered the game with 1,732 yards on the ground and ended his season with 2,012 yards rushing to become the 13th player in NCAA history to amass more than 2,000 yards. The rushing total also set a BIG EAST and school single-season record. The 52 points scored were the most in Rutgers' bowl history. Including both individual and team marks, RU set a total of nine bowl records at the International Bowl.



2008 PAPAJOHNS.COM BOWL

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. – Fitting that Rutgers would end the 2008 season with a come-from-behind win. After winning only one of their first six games, Mike Teel and the Scarlet Knights erased an 11-point second half deficit to defeat North Carolina State 29-23 in the PapaJohns.com Bowl.

Leading the comeback – as he did all season – was Teel, who passed for 319 yards and two touchdowns, including a 42-yard scoring toss to Kenny Britt to give the Scarlet Knights (8-5) the lead for good in the fourth quarter. Teel's pass to Britt with 8:30 to play proved to be the winning touchdown. Britt, a third-team All-American, made a juggling catch as he crossed the goal line and finished with six catches for 119 yards.

Teel, a senior, was the game's most valuable player. He ended his career on a seven-game winning streak after being booed at home when he was struggling earlier in the season. NC State (6-7) held a 17-6 halftime edge, led by quarterback Russell Wilson who was 11-for-23 for 186 yards and a score. But Wilson left the game with a strained knee late in the first half and did not return.

The Scarlet Knights scored 10 consecutive points in the third quarter on a 31-yard field goal by San San Te and an 11-yard pass from Teel to Tiquan Underwood. Rutgers took a 19-17 lead with 13:31 to play on a 28-yard field by Te after a 10-play 70-yard drive. The Wolfpack came right back as reserve quarterback Daniel Evans drove them 64 yards in eight plays and hit Anthony Hill with a 16-yard touchdown pass to give NC State a 23-19 lead. But it was only two plays later when Teel hit Britt for the go-ahead score.



2009 ST. PETERSBURG BOWL

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. – Rutgers (9-4) capped off its fifth-straight bowl appearance with its fourth-consecutive bowl victory, defeating Central Florida 45-24 in the 2009 St. Petersburg Bowl on Saturday, Dec. 19 at Tropicana Field.

The Scarlet Knights showed a great display of balance in all three phases of the game, recording touchdowns on offensive, defensive and special teams. RU ended the night with two rushing touchdowns, two passing touchdowns, one interception and one kickoff returned for scores.

Rutgers gained 380 yards of total offense behind a career passing day from freshman quarterback Tom Savage who completed 14-of-27 passes for 294 yards and two touchdowns. Fellow true freshman Mohamed Sanu also enjoyed a career-best evening as he accounted for three of RU's five touchdowns. Sanu had 13 carries for 41 yards and a pair of touchdowns, in addition to catching four passes for 97 yards and a TD.

For his performance Sanu was awarded the Most Outstanding Player trophy, joining past bowl honorees Ray Rice (2006 Texas Bowl, 2008 International Bowl) and Mike Teel (2008 PapaJohns.com Bowl).



2011 NEW ERA PINSTRIPE BOWL

BRONX, N.Y. – Chas Dodd hit Brandon Coleman for an 86-yard touchdown pass late in the fourth quarter and Jawan Jamison ran for two scores to lead Rutgers over Iowa State 27-13 in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl on Dec. 30, 2011.

The Scarlet Knights (9-4) ran their bowl winning streak to five and improved to 2-0 this season at Yankee Stadium, where they beat Army earlier in the season. Rutgers, which played in one bowl game before 2005, is 5-1 in the postseason since that season.

The Cyclones (6-7) finished the season on a three-game losing streak, their last win coming on Nov. 18 in Ames, Iowa, when they pulled off the biggest upset of the season against Oklahoma State.

That night Jared Barnett threw for 376 yards. In this game, Steele Jantz relieved Barnett in the second quarter and helped pull the Cyclones within 20-13 in the fourth on Jeff Woody's 20-yard touchdown run with 1:00 left.

After an exchange of punts left Rutgers deep in its own end, Dodd went deep to Coleman. The 6-foot-6 redshirt freshman went over 5-7 cornerback Jeremy Reeves, then outran the corner to the end zone to make it 27-13 with 5:47 left.

It was Coleman's only catch, but it turned out to be the play of the game.

Jamison, another redshirt freshman giving Rutgers fans hope for more bowls to come, finished with 134 yards on 27 carries.

MEDIA CREDENTIALS

Admittance to the High Point Solutions Stadium Press Box is limited to working media members only. Credential requests must be made through Rutgers' online credentialing system.

Please request credentials at least two weeks in advance of the game to permit sufficient time for mailing. Media credentials which cannot be mailed will be left at Media Will Call (Media Entrance) beneath the press box at High Point Solutions Stadium at Gate A.

Working space in the Rutgers Press Box is allotted on the following basis: (1) daily newspaper writers covering for next-day publication; (2) sports editors of newspapers in New Jersey, New York and Eastern Pennsylvania; (3) radio personnel for broadcast origins; (4) official school student daily newspaper; (5) approved special coverage; (6) press and TV working photographers; (7) weekly press representatives; non-originating radio representatives of AM news stations; and Internet writers for sites affiliated with established, nationally-recognized media outlets will be considered on a game-by-game basis as space permits. Visiting freelance and amateur photographers are not eligible for media credentials.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Sideline photographers and media members must follow NCAA guidelines, which prohibit entry to the bench areas.

PARKING

Media parking is located in the Green Lot, which is located next to the Indoor Practice Bubble. To enter the Green Lot, take River Road to Sutphen Road. Once on Sutphen, make your first left at Fitch Road and attendants will direct you to the media lot. You should request your parking at the same time you request your game credential. If time permits, both will be mailed to you. There is no day-of-game media parking list and therefore members of the media must have a media parking credential in advance of the game.

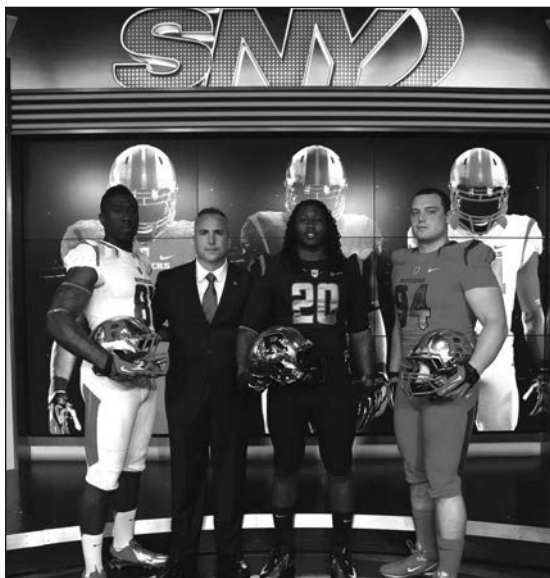
The press box has wireless internet access. Login information will be provided on gamedays.

All player interviews must be arranged through the Athletic Communications Office at least one day in advance. Players are available in person on Mondays at the weekly Rutgers Football Luncheon, and following practice on Tuesdays and Wednesdays, pending class schedules/availability.

Please consult with Jason Baum regarding availability. Player availability at other times will vary from week to week. A time mutually convenient for the player and the member of the media can be set up by the Athletic Communications Office. During a traditional game week, there will be no player interviews after Wednesday until following the game.

COACH FLOOD INTERVIEWS

All interview requests must be arranged through Jason Baum. Coach Flood will be available to the media every Monday at 10:30 a.m. at his weekly news conference in the team meeting room of the Hale Center, Monday at 11:10 a.m. on the BIG EAST Teleconference and after practice on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.
