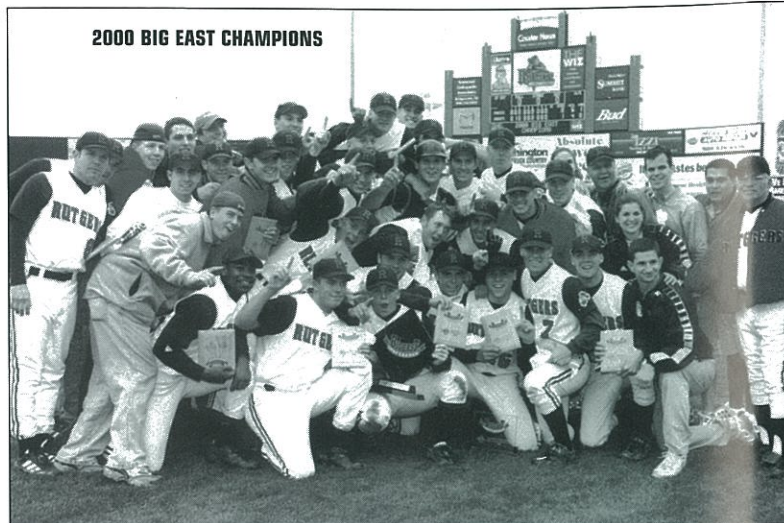


TRADITION

Year in and year out, the baseball program is arguably the most successful at Rutgers University. Driven by a knowledgeable coaching staff committed to fundamentals and carried by determined student-athletes, the baseball program has risen to among the nation's best, debunking the theory that northern schools can't compete nationally. While practicing on the blacktop and hitting indoors might not be the ideal conditions for preparation, especially when teams like Georgia Tech, FAU and FIU are on the schedule, it hardens the team and provides greater resolve heading into the season.

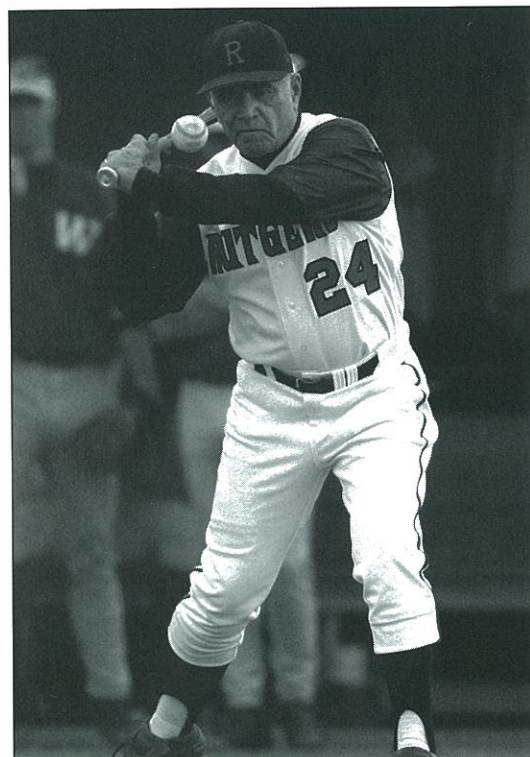
Over the past few years, Rutgers has shown that it can win in the BIG EAST (2003 Regular Season Champions), compete with the nation's top teams and is deserving of NCAA tournament consideration (five bids in the last eight seasons).

2000 BIG EAST CHAMPIONS

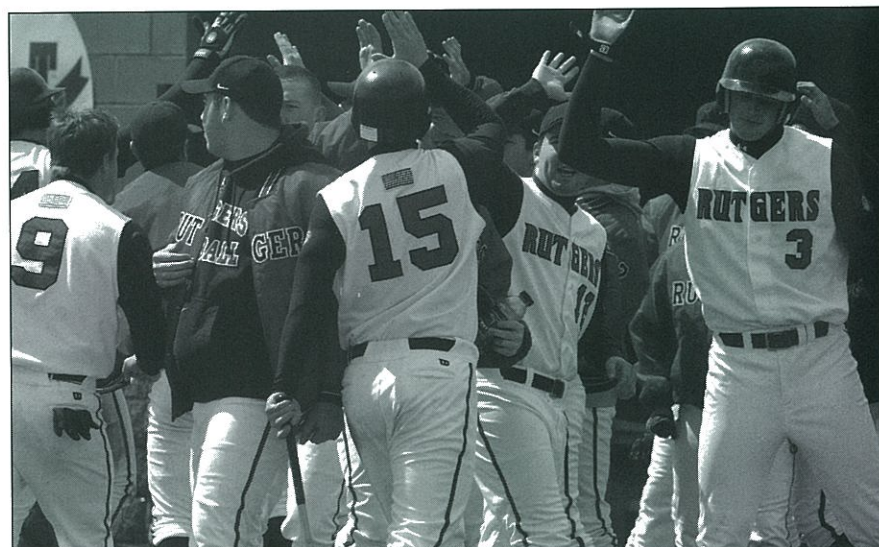


The heart and soul of the team is its players - a tight-knit group of Jersey kids who play their hearts out each and every game and play the game the right way. In 2003, Rutgers subscribed to a "small-ball" approach, using a team record 319 walks and 90 stolen bases to fuel a 37-22 record, despite 16 newcomers on the roster.

Rutgers baseball is about winning and a commitment to playing the game the right way. Players who come through the program get a chance to grow on and off the field and are in a great position to play at the next level as well. In the last eight years, more than 30 players have gone onto the professional ranks, including four players drafted in the top six rounds. The 2000 team, which won the BIG EAST Regular season and tournament championship, featured 18 players who have played professionally at some level in the United States and two others who have played professionally overseas.



As Rutgers embarks on its 2006 season, one thing remains certain: the team will be well-prepared. With a healthy pitching staff returning and six starters back in the lineup, 2006 looks talented and promising. Using a no-frills approach, Rutgers will once again set its sights on a BIG EAST Championship and a trip back to the NCAA Tournament.

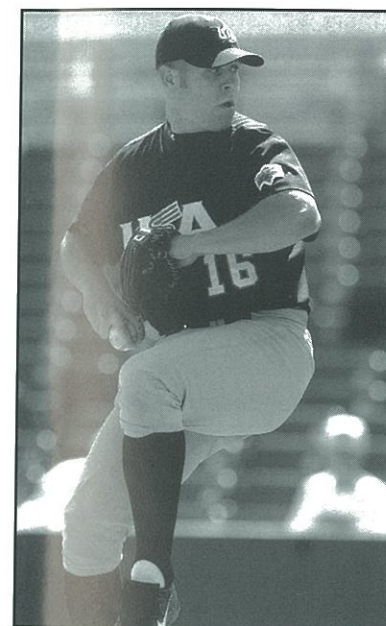
"NEW JERSEY'S TEAM"

- The Rutgers University baseball team features a winning team year in and year out by obtaining the best talent from within New Jersey.

- Last season, Rutgers Baseball was once again "New Jersey's Team" as just seven players - mostly from nearby Pennsylvania and New York - were from outside New Jersey. In 2002, the entire team was comprised of players who grew up and played scholastically in New Jersey.

- Coach Hill feels that there is a tremendous amount of talent in New Jersey and by obtaining the best players from the state, Rutgers will be able to compete with the rest of the nation. New Jersey-driven teams have enjoyed tremendous success over the years, dating back to the first stars of Rutgers, such as Joe Lynch, Darrin Winston, Noel Gluck and Glen Gardner.

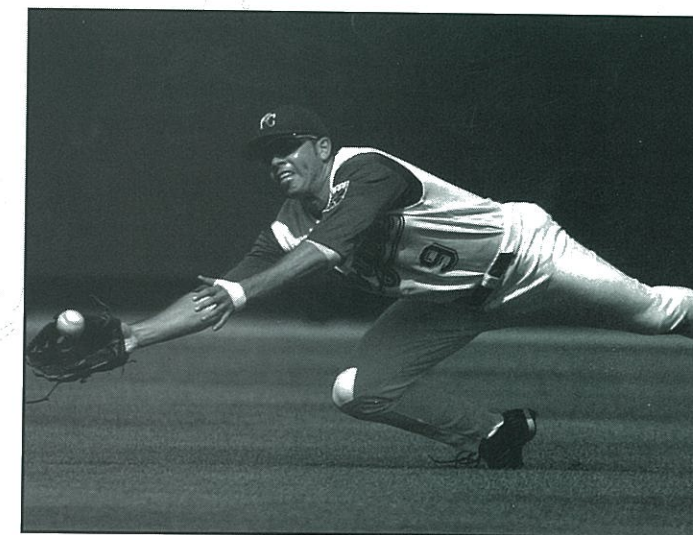
- Around the state of New Jersey there has been a sense of hometown pride as many of the Jersey players turn down out-of-state scholarships to attend Rutgers. Rutgers has attracted the state's top players, including 1999 *Star Ledger* Pitcher of the Year Bobby Brownlie, 2001 honoree Jeff Frazier and 2004 honoree Todd Frazier.

- The New-Jersey based Rutgers coaching staff thoroughly surveys the state for the top talent in each county. Its ability to attend high school and American Legion games, coupled with a focused approach to recruiting, enables the staff to uncover "hidden gems" - players who often go unnoticed by other schools but flourish at Rutgers. A perfect example of this is former standout Val Majewski, who attended Rutgers on an academic scholarship and, three years later, was drafted in the third round by the Baltimore Orioles, making his Major League debut in August of 2004.

- Former RU All-American Billy McCarthy, now playing professionally with the Atlanta Braves, went away to play collegiately in Virginia but could

not resist the temptation to come home and play for Rutgers. In one season at Rutgers, McCarthy earned All-America honors and was a sixth-round draft pick. He was named Braves Minor League Player of the Year in his first season in the minors. The heart and soul of the 2003 BIG EAST Champions, Vinny Esposito, left Rutgers after one season for Oakland (MI), but quickly returned and helped the Scarlet Knights post back-to-back 37-win seasons in 2002 and 2003.

- RU's 2004 squad had two walk-ons, Graig Badger and Nick Cerulo, who played their way into the starting lineup and excelled for the Scarlet Knights. At the conclusion of their collegiate careers, both Badger and Cerulo moved onto professional baseball - a testament not only to their hard work, but to Coach Hill's ability to develop players in his system.

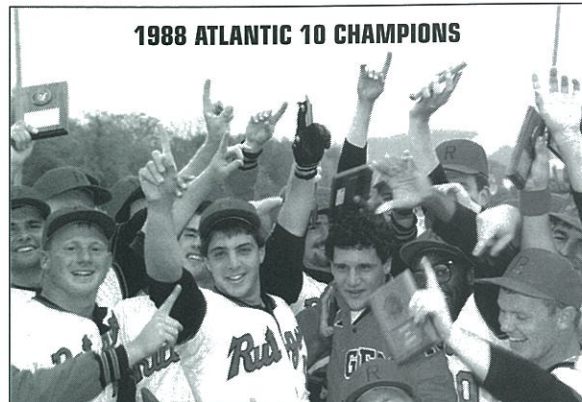


Manalapan, NJ-native Dave DeJesus has been a mainstay in the outfield for the Kansas City Royals for three seasons.

A LEGACY OF SUCCESS



1988 ATLANTIC 10 CHAMPIONS

- When Fred Hill took over the Rutgers baseball program in 1984, the Scarlet Knights were coming off a 13-22 record in 1983 and had not advanced to the postseason since the 1970 season.
- Just two years later, Hill led Rutgers to the 1986 Atlantic 10 Championship and a spot in the NCAA Tournament. Rutgers would win the next eight regular season titles and, starting in 1986, four of the next six tournament championships.
- In 1987, Rutgers posted its first-ever 30-win season, capturing 36 victories, while in 1988, the team eclipsed that mark with 38 wins, including its first NCAA Tournament victory (6-1 vs. Clemson) under Hill.

• In 1990, Rutgers posted a 37-19 mark, won the first of back-to-back A-10 Tournament titles, and came within one win of the College World Series by advancing to the final of the 1990 Northeast Regional in Waterbury, CT. After losing the opening game, 3-2, to UNC, the Scarlet Knights rattled off three-consecutive wins to advance to the finals vs. undefeated Georgia. Needing two wins to knock off the Bulldogs, Rutgers won the first, 4-3, before falling in the final, 20-9. Georgia would not lose another game on its way to the 1990 National Title.

• Despite leaving the Atlantic 10 following the 1995 season, Rutgers still owns the conference record for tournament wins (26), regular-season titles (10) and tournament titles (6).

• In 1996, Rutgers moved to the BIG EAST Conference and, just two years later, captured both the regular season (17-3) and tournament title. Rutgers repeated the feat in 2000, winning the regular season (18-5) and tournament. RU is one of only three teams, along with WVU in 1996 and Notre Dame in 2002, to win both the regular season and league tournament – but the only team to do it twice.

• From 1996 to 2001, Rutgers finished either first or second in the BIG EAST regular season standings and finished no lower than fourth in each of its first six seasons. In 2002, RU finished fourth in the regular season, but advanced to the BIG EAST Championship game for the third time in seven seasons.

• Following its fourth-place finish in 2002, Rutgers captured the 2003 BIG EAST Regular Season Championship (its third since 1998), despite having 16 newcomers and just one senior pitcher on its roster.

• Rutgers has appeared in five of the last eight NCAA Tournaments, serving as the No. 1 seed and host for the 2000 Regional at Upper Montclair and the No. 2 seed at the 2001 Regional in Lincoln, Nebraska, hosted by the University of Nebraska. In 2001, Rutgers advanced to the regional final, before the CWS-bound Cornhuskers rallied for a 14-10 victory in the last inning. In 2003, RU traveled to Tallahassee, FL and went 1-2 in the NCAA tournament, beating Jacksonville, 8-5, in the second round before losing to top-ranked FSU, 17-7.

• In 22 seasons under Hill, Rutgers has enjoyed 20 winning campaigns and 16 seasons of 30 or more wins - including eight straight years dating back to the 1998 BIG EAST Championship season. In 2000 and 2001, the Scarlet Knights eclipsed the 40-win mark, including a program-best 42-17 record in 2001.

• Rutgers has been ranked nationally at some point during seven of the last eight seasons, including a high point of 14th (Baseball America) in 2000. Rutgers was ranked as high as 25th nationally in 2003 and 23rd in 2002. It was ranked 29th by Collegiate Baseball in 2004.

• Rutgers has had at least one All-American in nine of the last 10 seasons, including two in 1999 and 2000. In 2000, shortstop Darren Fenster was RU's first First Team All-American since Jeff Torborg in 1963 and was one of 10 finalists for the Dick Howser Award, given annually to college baseball's top performer. In 2002, Rutgers' Bobby Brownlie was named one of five finalists for the Golden Spikes award, given each year to the top amateur baseball player in the nation. In 2004, OF Jeff Frazier earned several All-America awards and was a finalist for the Dick Howser Award as well. Frazier's younger brother, Todd, was named a Freshman All-American in 2005.

• Bobby Brownlie represented the Scarlet Knights on Team USA in the summer of 2001 and established himself as the team's top hurler. He posted a 7-0 mark, including a 0.84 ERA, and allowed just 32 hits (30 singles) in 53.2 innings. He was also named the Louisville Slugger Preseason National Player of the Year in 2001.

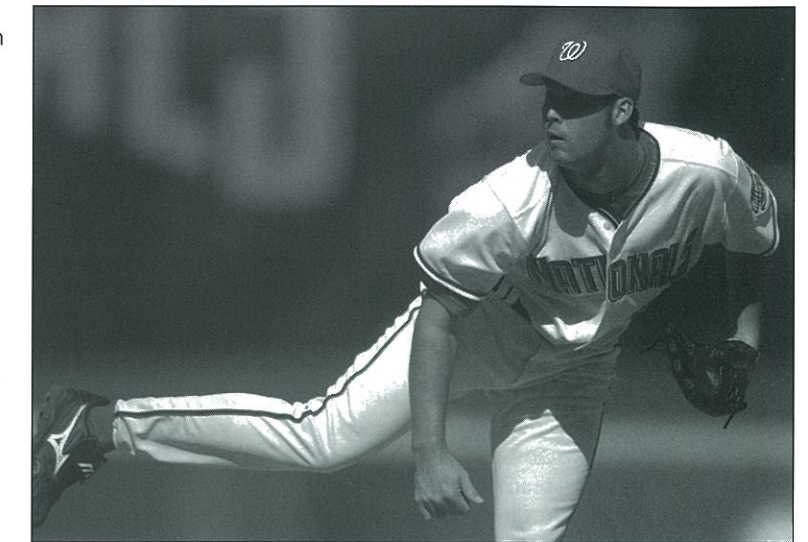
• Rutgers' success is well-chronicled in the summer months as well. RU has sent at least one player to the Cape Cod League in each of the last eight seasons, including Cape All-Stars David DeJesus (Chatham, 1999), Bobby Brownlie (Falmouth, 2000), Val Majewski (Falmouth, 2001) and Jeff Frazier (Chatham, 2003). In 2004, Johnny Defendis and Jeff Grose played with Chatham and sophomore Todd Frazier was named one of the Top 20 prospects on the Cape in 2005, playing for the A's.

• Rutgers has seen 54 players move onto the professional ranks during Hill's tenure. In the last seven years, more than 30 players have left Rutgers to play professionally. In 1998, five players were drafted or signed, while in 2000, five more earned professional status, including fourth-round draft pick David DeJesus. In 2001, Billy McCarthy was a sixth-round selection, while in 2002, Bobby Brownlie (first round, 21st overall) and Val Majewski (third round, 78th overall) were among the first 100 players selected.

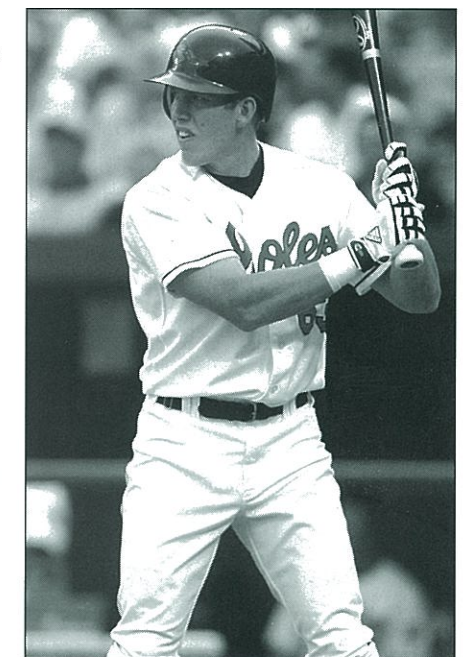
• There are currently four former Scarlet Knights in the major leagues. In all, eight players have reached "The Show" after playing for Hill, including Darrin Winston (Philadelphia Phillies), Bob McDonald (Yankees, Mets, Blue Jays, Tigers) and Angel Echevarria (Rockies, Brewers, Cubs.)

• Eric Young, who also played football at Rutgers, broke into the majors in 1992 and was a starting second baseman for 11-straight seasons. He earned a spot on the 1995 NL All-Star team and has hit over .300 twice in his career. He stole 30 or more bases in nine straight seasons and has a .286 career batting average. Echevarria made his MLB debut in 1996 and spent the 2002 season with the Chicago Cubs, where he hit .306 in 98 at bats. His best season was 1999, when he played in 102 games and hit .288 with 11 home runs for the Colorado Rockies.

• In 2004, DeDe DeJesus emerged as the KC Royals' starting centerfielder. Last season, DeJesus was second on the team with a .293 batting average, while scoring 69 runs in 122 games. His 2000 teammate, Jason Bergmann, made his major league debut during the 2005 pennant race with the Washington Nationals.

THE FACILITIES



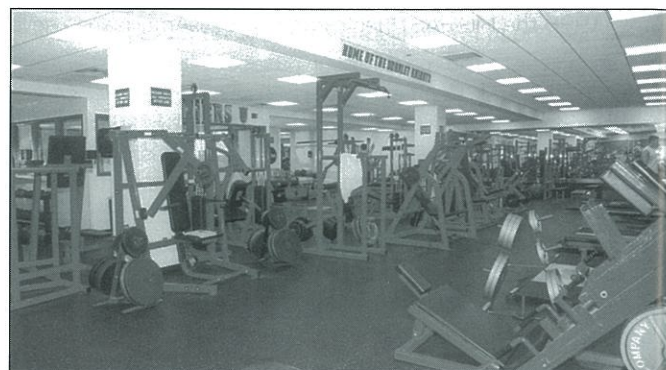
THE FREDERICK E. GRUNINGER/ CLASS OF '53 BASEBALL COMPLEX

The Rutgers baseball team plays in Piscataway, New Jersey directly behind the Louis Brown Athletic Center. The on-field facilities include a practice diamond and two full length batting cages as well as three practice pitching mounds. Newly-installed dugouts and permanent seating for 800 accentuate the field.

RU baseball also features indoor practice facilities that include three 70-foot batting cages and pitching mounds. The Louis Brown Athletic Center, aka the RAC, is also home to a 3,500 square foot weight room in which the Rutgers baseball trains with strength and conditioning coach Mike Johansen. This facility features state-of-the-art equipment that includes free weights, cardiovascular and rehabilitation machines.

In addition, the RAC is home to the clubhouse of the baseball team where the club can prepare mentally and physically for each day. The clubhouse features couches, televisions, entertainment centers and a pool table as well as a full-time equipment staff that maintains the players' uniforms and equipment to help keep the team properly outfitted. The team locker room was recently renovated with a new carpet, furniture and oak lockers for each player.

The baseball team also utilizes a 120-yard indoor astroturf facility known as "The Bubble". "The Bubble" includes a full-length football field with 100-foot high ceilings that allow for game-like simulation. The bubble is a vital component of the preseason practice schedule when weather prohibits outdoor activity.



THE BIG EAST CONFERENCE



- The BIG EAST conference is one of the most respected conferences in the country and its baseball teams are no different.
- This season, the conference welcomes three more baseball-playing institutions in South Florida, Louisville and Cincinnati. Both South Florida and Louisville competed in the 2002 NCAA Tournament.
- Since 1996, the year that Rutgers joined the league, there have been 20 BIG EAST teams go on to play in the NCAA Tournament including five appearances by Rutgers (five in the last eight seasons).
- Since 1998 the BIG EAST has claimed 28 All-Americans - seven of which played for Rutgers: Bobby Brownlie, Darren Fenster, Jake Daubert, Pete Zoccolillo, Billy McCarthy, Jeff Frazier and Todd Frazier.
- The BIG EAST Conference also sends many of its baseball players to the pros; in 2002 alone, 23 BIG EAST players were selected in the Amateur Draft. Highlighting the 2002 class were Joe Saunders from Virginia Tech and Bobby Brownlie from Rutgers, who both went in the first round. Rutgers sent four players on the first day of the draft in 2002 and two players (Brownlie, Val Majewski) were among the first 100 players selected. The BIG EAST had 20 players selected in the 2005 draft, including two from Rutgers.
- As a team, Rutgers has excelled in the conference since becoming a member in 1996 by winning three BIG EAST regular season titles, two tournament titles and going to the NCAA tournament five of the last seven years. Rutgers players have also been standouts in the BIG EAST as RU has been home to 20 league leaders in various statistical categories.
- In 2002, for the first time since the formation of the BIG EAST baseball conference, a team advanced to the NCAA College World Series. Notre Dame, which captured the BIG EAST Championship with a 3-2, 10-inning victory over Rutgers, upset top-ranked Florida State in the Super Regionals to earn the bid.

DID YOU KNOW...

Since the turn of the century, Rutgers has won four BIG EAST team championships and three of the four titles have been captured by the baseball program.

Rutgers won both the regular season and tournament championship in 2000 and was also crowned regular season champs in 2003.



SCHEDULE

- Rutgers boasts one of the most challenging schedules on the East Coast if not the country. RU's first 13 games are against top teams such as William & Mary, Georgia Tech, Florida International and Florida Atlantic. This schedule gives the players on the team not only the opportunity to play against some of the best players in the country but also the chance to be seen by professional scouts.

- Nineteen of Rutgers' first 20 games will be on the road. In all, Rutgers will visit eight states plus Washington, DC during the regular season.

- Rutgers' home schedule features key BIG EAST series with Villanova (March 31-April 2), West Virginia (April 7-9), St. John's (April 28-30) and Pittsburgh (May 6-7).

- The 2006 BIG EAST Baseball Championship will be held at Bright House Networks Field in Clearwater, FL. Home to Major League Baseball's Philadelphia Phillies' Class A affiliate Clearwater Threshers, the stadium will host the tournament from May 23-28. The BIG EAST Baseball Championship had been held at Commerce Bank Ballpark in Bridgewater, NJ, home of the Atlantic League of Professional Baseball's Somerset Patriots, for the last six years.

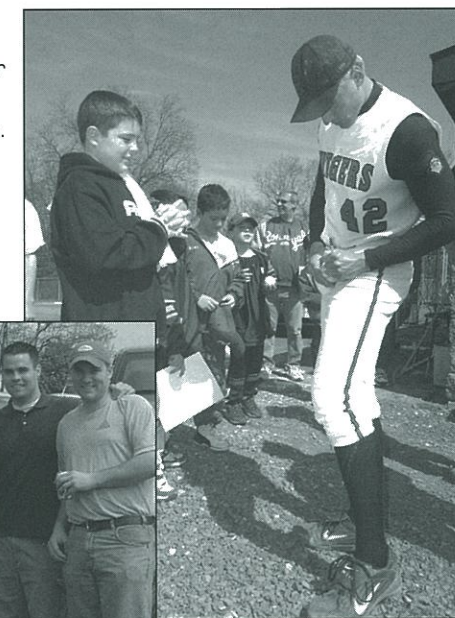
FAN SUPPORT

HEAD COACH
23RD SEASON



Now entering his 23rd season at Rutgers and 30th as a collegiate head coach, Fred Hill remains as focused, committed and enthusiastic as he was back in 1984, when he accepted the challenge of coaching a team that was coming off a 13-22 record in 1983 and had not appeared in an NCAA Tournament in 14 years and proceeded to build Rutgers baseball into what it is today - a program that is among the best in the country, is consistently ranked in the top 25 nationally and is always in the hunt for an NCAA Tournament berth.

After enduring his lone losing season as the first-year coach in 1984 (13-21), Hill began to re-establish the Scarlet Knights as a northeast baseball power with a 25-15 mark in 1985, which preceded a 28-18 mark in 1986 and the first of eight-straight Atlantic 10 regular season championships. That season, Rutgers also captured its first Atlantic 10 tournament title and returned to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1970, one of 10 appearances under Hill. A 36-14-1 record in 1987, which set a school record for wins and winning percentage (.716) was the first of seven-straight 30-win seasons for the Scarlet Knights - a stretch that lasted until 1993 and completed the run of eight-straight league titles. In 1990, when RU posted a 37-19 mark and won the fourth of its seven-straight league titles, the team came within one win of advancing to the College World Series, falling to eventual National Champion Georgia in the tournament final in Waterbury, CT.

A move to the BIG EAST Conference in 1996 had little impact on the Scarlet Knights, as the winning continued. Following back-to-back tournament appearances in 1996 and 1997, Rutgers captured both the regular season and tournament championship in 1998, posting a 33-16 mark along the way and advancing to the NCAA Regional at Tallahassee, FL. The Scarlet Knights scrapped their way out of the losers' bracket during the conference tournament and beat Notre Dame twice in as many days, including a 12-0 championship game win, to clinch the title.

The following season, Rutgers finished at 37-21, placing second in the BIG EAST, and took another step in the national picture, earning the program's first-ever at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament (the six previous trips came from an automatic berth associated with winning the league championship). RU was sent

HILL HIGHLIGHTS

- Hill is entering his 30th year as a collegiate head coach and his 23rd season with the Scarlet Knights. He owns a 716-423-5 record at Rutgers and an 864-529-5 record as a collegiate head coach. He has the most wins of any current BIG EAST coach.
- He has averaged 36 wins over the last five seasons and 32.5 per season at Rutgers. He is the first coach in BIG EAST history to win both the regular season and tournament championship in the same season (1998, 2000), despite only joining the conference in 1996.
- Rutgers has been ranked nationally for at least one week in seven of the last eight seasons, including a high mark of 14th during the 2000 season.
- As a member of the Atlantic 10 from 1984 through 1996, he guided his team to seven-straight A-10 regular season championships and five tournament championships.
- Not only do Coach Hill's teams win championships, they also win in regular season play; he has just one losing season (his first at Rutgers) and has never posted a losing league record in 29 years of collegiate coaching.
- Hill's teams have advanced to the NCAA Tournament in five of the last eight years, winning the BIG EAST Regular Season and Conference Championships in 1998 and 2002 as well as the Regular Season crown in 2003.
- Since the turn of the century - the Rutgers athletic department can boast of four BIG EAST Conference championships. THREE of the four titles have been won by the baseball team.
- In addition to putting winning teams on the field, Coach Hill has developed some of the top players in the country, sending over 20 players onto professional baseball in the last five years. In 2001 - two of his players, Bobby Brownlie and Val Majewski - were among the top 100 players selected. In 2004, Rutgers had five more players sign professional contracts, including third-round draft pick Jeff Frazier (Detroit Tigers). Three former players under Hill - Eric Young (San Diego Padres), David DeJesus (Kansas City Royals) and Jason Bergmann (Washington Nationals) - saw significant action at the Major League level last season.
- From his 2000 squad, which won the BIG EAST Regular Season and Tournament Championship and served as the host of the NCAA Regional at Upper Montclair, 18 players went on to play professionally.
- Hill began his collegiate career at Montclair State University where, in 1977, he was named head baseball and football coach. In his career with Montclair State, he developed the baseball team into a Division III national power, winning 62 percent of his games and earning a trip to the Division III World Series (Hill was named Division III National Coach of the Year in 1983).

to Lubbock, TX to compete in the NCAA Regional with Texas Tech, Wisconsin-Milwaukee and #1 Rice University.

The 2000 season featured another step in the building of the program, as RU once again captured the BIG EAST Regular Season and Tournament championships, posting its first 40-win season (40-18) along the way. In the BIG EAST Championship tie game, then-freshman Bobby Brownlie, working on three days rest, led RU to a 1-0 win with a complete-game shutout of in-state rival Seton Hall. Ranked as high as #14 nationally during the course of the season, Rutgers was selected to host an NCAA Regional at Yogi Berra Stadium in Upper Montclair, NJ, joined by UNC, Penn State and Army.

The 2001 team set the school win mark once again, finishing the year 42-17, with a second-place finish in the BIG EAST. Another at-large NCAA Tournament berth, the program's fourth straight trip, sent the team to Lincoln, NE, where RU came within one win of moving onto the Super Regional round.



A 35-22 mark and a trip to the BIG EAST Tournament finals was not good enough in 2002, but RU returned to the NCAA Tournament in 2003 after winning the BIG EAST Regular Season Championship and advancing to the BIG EAST Championship game for the second-straight season.

A long-time high school coach in New Jersey, Hill began his collegiate coaching career in 1977 at Montclair State University, serving as the head baseball and football coach for the Red Hawks. In seven seasons at Montclair State, Hill posted a 148-91-2 mark, leading his team to two NJAC Championships and three NCAA tournament appearances, including the Division III World Series in 1983. (The following season, Hill's first at Rutgers, Montclair State won the national championship with many of his players still in the program.) Just as successful on the gridiron, Hill led the MSU football program to a 55-13-4 record in seven seasons, including five NJAC titles. His team lost just one league contest in a five-year span from 1978 through 1982.

As a collegiate star at Upsala, Hill earned 11 varsity letters. Four letters came in baseball, where he led the team in batting twice. Four more came in football, where he led the team in rushing four times and was named the football team's Most Valuable Back three times. Three more letters came in basketball, where he was voted Most Improved Player his senior year. Chosen as a Small College All-American following his final football season, Hill was honored by his alma mater in 1992 as a distinguished alumnus who has achieved excellence in his chosen profession. Following his outstanding collegiate career, Hill moved onto a professional career in the Washington Senators organization before beginning his storied coaching career.

He began his coaching career as freshman baseball coach at Upsala while also playing semi-pro baseball for the East Orange Soverals. His next move was to Clifford Scott High School, where he was an assistant baseball coach for five years and head coach for another six. During those six years, Hill led the Scotties to a 94-58 record, two state sectional championships, and also served time as an assistant football coach. He moved on to coach the Pequannock High School football team for four years and then returned to Upsala as an assistant baseball coach for three more seasons.

Hill lives in Verona, NJ with his wife Evelyn and has six children: Nancy, Fred, Linda, Jim, Tracey, and Karen. They also have eight grandchildren: Jessica, Danielle, Brian, James, Natalie, Alexandra and Giselle. A coaching-rich family, Fred's brother Brian is currently the head coach of the NBA's Orlando Magic and his son, Fred, is the Associate head coach of the Rutgers men's basketball team.

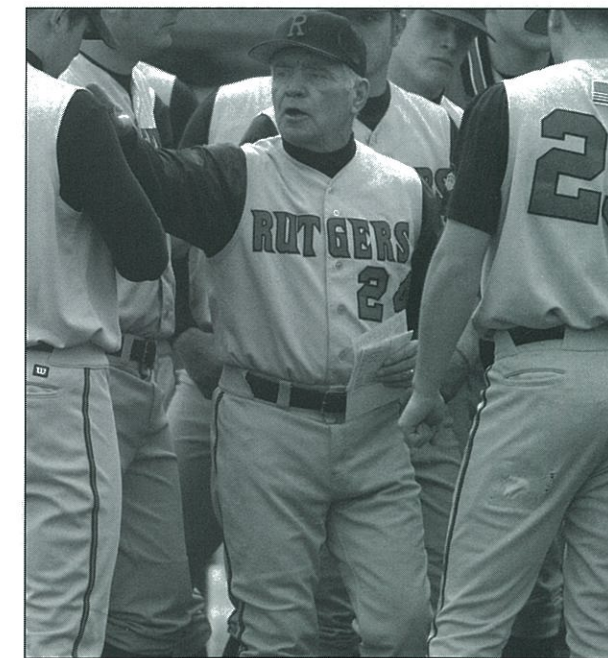

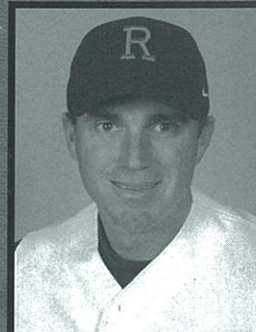

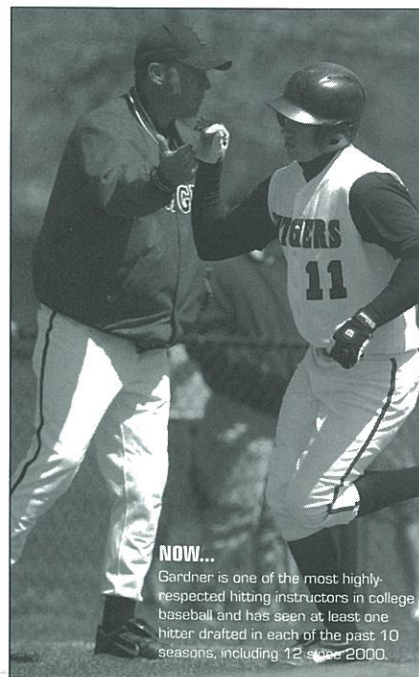


Glen Gardner, one of the finest student-athletes in Rutgers' sports history, is now in his 16th season as an assistant coach with the Scarlet Knights. Nationally-renowned for his hitting instruction and his results at Rutgers, Gardner is the hitting and outfield coach and also assists Coach Hill in the day-to-day responsibilities of the program. Gardner has also become an outstanding recruiter, and Rutgers has brought in some of the finest recruiting classes in the BIG EAST over the past few seasons, helping to elevate Rutgers to national prominence.

Gardner's success as a coach is best exhibited by the success of his players. From 1998-2002, Rutgers posted a team batting average over .310 and several of its players ranked among the nation's best. Darren Fenster (.433) and Joe B. Cirone (.405) finished in the top 40 nationally in 2000, while Billy McCarthy (.423) accomplished the feat in 2001. In 2003, RU posted a team average of .307, with a school-record 319 walks and .409 on-base percentage and in 2004, Jeff Frazier set the career home run record at RU (34) in just three seasons before being drafted in the third round by the Detroit Tigers. His strengths are his easy going nature and his ability to communicate with the players. His infectious, unyielding work ethic sets a standard for everyone in the program, and his rewards come when his pupils match and eclipse his numerous Scarlet Knight hitting records.

One of the most prolific hitters in Rutgers' history, Gardner was a two-time All-American selection and, in 1997, he was elected to the Rutgers Olympic Sports Hall of Fame - one of nine former baseball players who have earned the distinction.

In his three seasons as an outfielder, he compiled a career .356 batting average with 23 home runs and 141 RBI. All three numbers rank among the Rutgers all-time top 10. After his junior year in 1987, the San Diego Padres drafted him in the 13th round, but he opted to stay at RU and was selected by Atlanta the following year.

Gardner is one of the most highly-respected hitting instructors in college baseball and has seen at least one hitter drafted in each of the past 10 seasons, including 12 since 2000.

Gardner advanced to Burlington, Iowa (Class A) in the Atlanta Braves organization before being struck in the eye by a batted ball, which ended a promising professional career.

Under Gardner's tutelage, several Scarlet Knights have had outstanding seasons. Gardner has worked diligently to develop the Scarlet Knight offense and he has seen several of his pupils continue on to the professional level. In the past five years, Rutgers has sent 13 hitters onto the professional ranks, including sixth-round pick Billy McCarthy (Braves) in 2001, fourth-round pick David DeJesus (Royals) the season before and Midwest League All-Star Pete Zoccolillo (Brewers) in 1999.

Gardner is single and resides in Pt. Pleasant, NJ. He played scholastically at Immaculata High School in Somerville and was named one of the top New Jersey players of the 1980's by the Star Ledger sports staff.

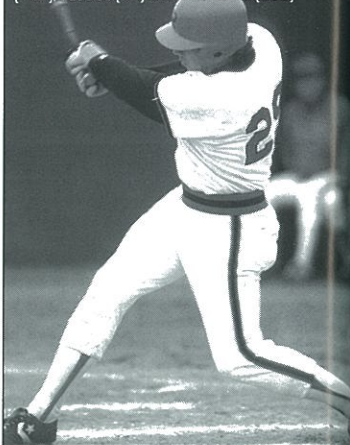

Rick Freeman returned to Rutgers for his second stint with the Scarlet Knights in 2005, returning to head coach Fred Hill's staff for the first time since 1988. Freeman, who works with the RU pitching staff, brings a broad range of experience to the position as a collegiate assistant and head coach at the NCAA and junior college level and as a head coach of one of New Jersey's most successful American Legion teams.

Back in 1988, Freeman served as an assistant under Hill, working with the outfielders, hitters and pitchers, while also coaching third base. He then moved onto an assistant position at Rider University (1989-1993) before becoming the head coach at Mercer County College in Trenton. At Mercer, Freeman posted a 155-102 (.603) record and appeared in six-straight regional championships, advancing to the NJCAA World Series in 1996.

In 1999, he returned to Rider University as the team's assistant coach and recruiting coordinator, a post he held through the 2004 season. He worked with several outstanding pitchers, including Kevin Barry, who is one of the Atlanta Braves' top pitching prospects.

Since 1976, Freeman has also coached the Hamilton Post 31 American Legion team. As the head coach since 1985, Freeman has posted a 538-149 mark (.783), winning a record 13 league titles, including 10 straight through 2005. His team captured the New Jersey State Championship in 1987 and 1993 and finished fifth in the country at the 2000 American Legion World Series.

A 1981 graduate of Marquette University, Freeman got his start as the head coach of the Marquette club baseball team in 1978, revitalizing a program that had been dormant for over 50 years. He returned to New Jersey in 1982 as an assistant at Rider for one year, the first of three stints with the Broncos.

He is also a columnist and sports copy editor for the Trenton Times and heavily involved in Mercer County civic affairs.

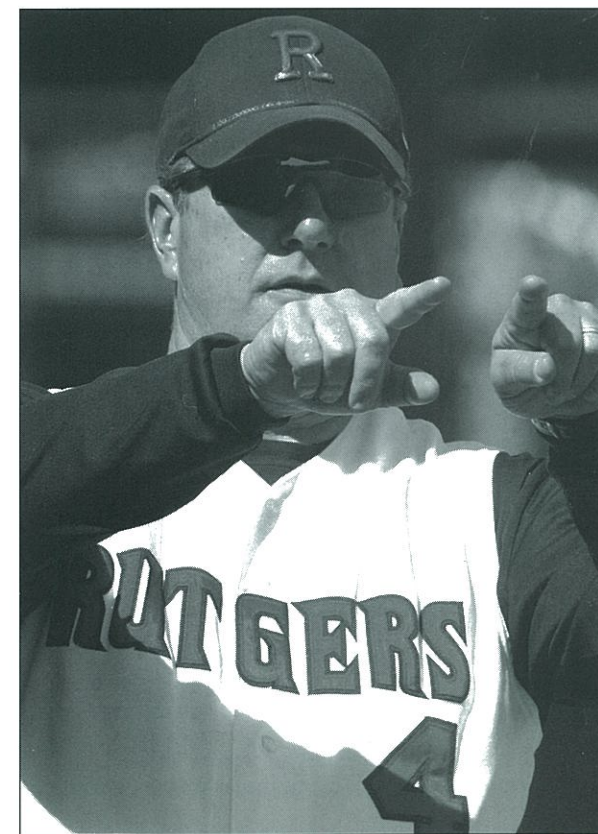

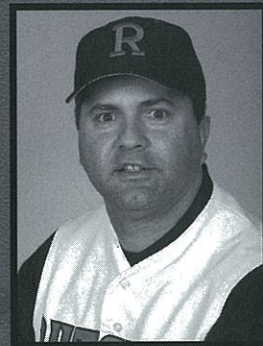

Returning to Rutgers in 2006 is assistant coach Jay Blackwell. He begins his third stint on the Scarlet Knights' staff, also serving as an assistant coach during the 1999 season and from 2001-2004. He is in his sixth season on the RU bench. The Scarlet Knights have advanced to the NCAA Tournament in three of his previous five seasons, something he hopes to help RU return to in 2006. A key member of the 1998 coaching staff that guided Rutgers to its first-ever BIG EAST Regular Season and Tournament titles, Blackwell will work with the hitters and catchers while also coaching first base for the Scarlet Knights. He was recently appointed as the Recreation Director in his hometown of Keansburg. Blackwell currently resides in Leonardo, NJ with his wife, Katie.

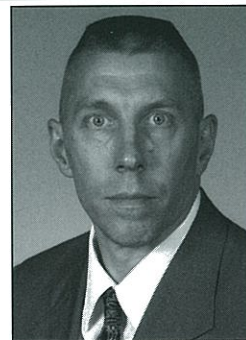


GLORIA BUTTIGLIERI ADMIN. ASSISTANT

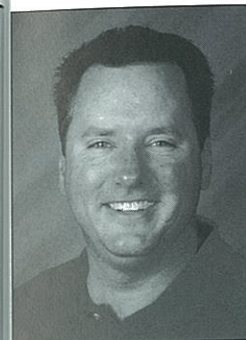
MIKE JOHANSON STRENGTH COACH

The 38-year old Johansen (born February 9, 1968) has been a member of the Scarlet Knight strength and conditioning staff since 1992.

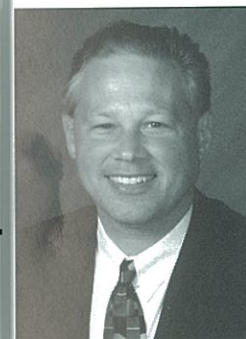

DAVID GLOVER ATHLETIC TRAINER

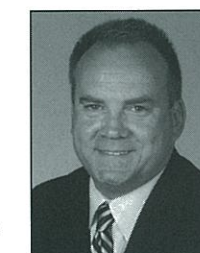

2006 OUTLOOK

For the second straight year, the Rutgers baseball team found itself on the outside looking in at the postseason picture in 2005, something the Scarlet Knights will look to erase in 2006. RU split its 24 BIG EAST games, finishing fifth in the league standings and not part of the four-team BIG EAST Championship - something Rutgers had been a part of every season prior to 2004. Despite winning 30 games for the eighth straight season last year, the 2006 squad looks to return to the postseason where it belongs.

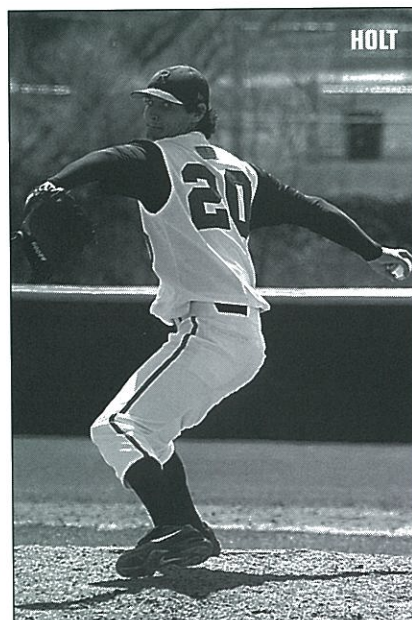
With 30 letterwinners returning, the Scarlet Knights seek to re-establish their rightful place among the conference and region's elite programs. The addition of three new members - Louisville, Cincinnati and South Florida - to the 12-team conference will present a further challenge to RU's goals, but the well-experienced roster hopes to persevere from the struggles of the last two seasons and return to the postseason.

A severely-depleted pitching staff left the Scarlet Knights without a regular rotation last season and the consistency that they were accustomed to in years past. Barring a repeat of last season's unreasonably high number of prolonged injuries to RU's hurlers, the Scarlet Knights have all the necessary tools to compete in the new BIG EAST and return to the national spotlight. Four position starters and its top seven pitchers (according to earned run average) return this season - all with postseason aspirations. Couple that with a stable of talented newcomers on the mound and at the plate, the 2006 squad possesses a balance of youth and experience - a recipe of past success "On the Banks."

Coming off a 32-21 overall record that included head coach Fred Hill's 700th victory at the helm of the Scarlet Knights, RU brings back a pair of All-BIG EAST selections from a year ago in senior outfielder Jeff Grose and sophomore shortstop Todd Frazier.

PITCHERS

With almost a full year to heal, the pitching staff's 2005 injury-riddled roster has returned its potency in 2006. The Scarlet Knights lost several starting pitchers early last season and were forced to deal with a non-structured rotation all year long.



Among Rutgers' eight seniors are six pitchers, making for an experienced stable of hurlers. Senior OJ DeChristofano started 12 games for the Scarlet Knights in 2005 - the most of RU's returnees. He posted a 5.34 ERA and a 4-5 record with 36 strikeouts last season and is coming off a successful summer where he earned a spot on the New York Collegiate Baseball League Eastern Division All-Star Team as a member of the Glens Falls Golden Eagles.

Jim Jansen served as the Scarlet Knights' midweek starter, owning a team-best 5-1 record and a 3.96 ERA. He pitched the most innings (63.2) of RU's returnees, giving up just one home run all season.

Matt Pustay made the most appearances of any Scarlet Knight last season, seeing action in 25 games, including four starts.

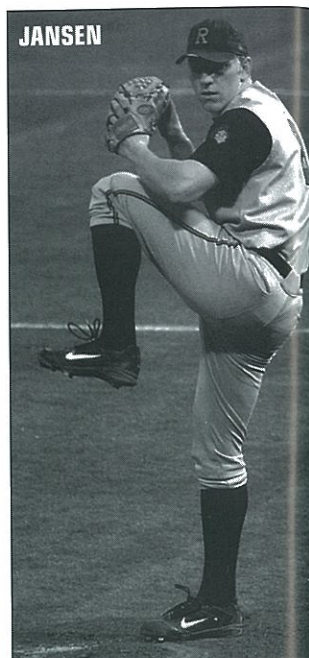
Ryan Bradley posted a 3.20 ERA in 10 appearances in his first season in a Scarlet Knight uniform last season after spending his first two years at Butler Community College.

Bobby Acampora can expect to see more action after appearing in 10 games in relief for RU in 2005, while Joe Baione (transferred to RU last season after two years at Brookdale Community College) looks to make his Scarlet Knight debut on the mound in 2006.

Junior Steve Holt made eight starts for RU last season, going the distance once. He owned a 4.94 ERA and a 3-3 record in 11 total appearances, totaling 34 strikeouts in 51 innings.

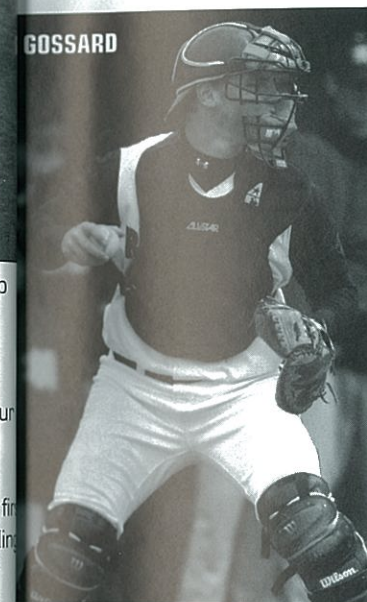
Junior Steve Healing returns to action in 2006 after injury caused him to miss the entire 2005 season. He posted an impressive 4-1 record with 17 strikeouts in 27 innings in 2004 before ending his season prematurely due to injury.

Sophomore Tim Woodhull handled the bulk of the closing duties with a team-high three saves last season, while junior Sean Spicer owned a 3-1 record with a pair of saves.



Chris Lillis (won his only decision last season) and Mark Lampariello (3.26 ERA in seven appearances) will help bolster RU's bullpen.

The Scarlet Knights added four pitchers to its roster in 2006, all of which could make an immediate impact. Second Team All-State selection Matt Giannini leads the group after posting a 9-1 record and a 0.90 ERA with 100 strikeouts as a senior at Watchung Hills High School. Joining him are right-handers Kyle Bradley and Kevin Lillis and lefty Dennis Hill. Lillis is the third member of his family to join Rutgers, with current Scarlet Knight Chris and Ryan, a former standout "On the Banks." Tony Wargo and Jon McCue are coming off redshirt seasons and could see time on the mound.



CATCHERS

Both of RU's starting catchers in Jon Gossard and Frank Meade return in 2006. They split duties behind the plate last season, with Gossard seeing the bulk of time.

Gossard hopes to continue his success at the end of last season where he hit .351 over the final month of the 2005 campaign. He was sound defensively last season with only four passed balls, while gunning down 12 would-be base stealers.

Meade gained valuable experience in his first season as a Scarlet Knight, starting 12 games and appearing in 25 overall. He made just one error behind the plate all season.

Adding depth to the position are newcomers Tim Reilly and Dan Malandrucolo.

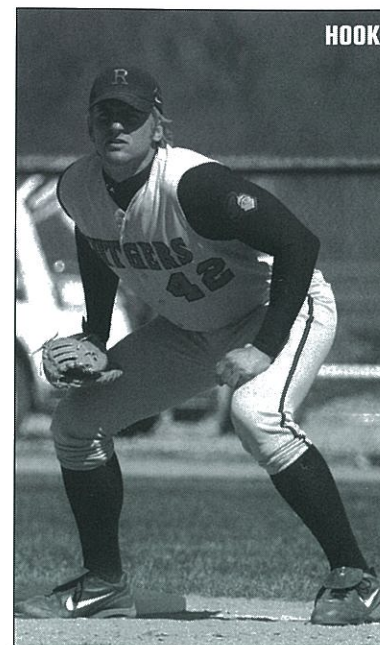
INFIELD

Rutgers' starting infield remains virtually intact from last season, with the exception of second base where the Scarlet Knights lost Cory Rodriguez (.342 average and 49 RBI in 2005) to graduation.

Steve Hook returns at first base where he took over for the injured Rich Canuso early last season, starting 33 games. Offensively, Hook was a power hitter for the Scarlet Knights, tying for the team lead with nine home runs.



After virtually two seasons away from the field due to injury, Mike Bionde returns and will occupy second base for the Scarlet Knights in 2006. RU's starting shortstop as a freshman in 2003, Bionde injured his shoulder during the Scarlet Knights' postseason run in the NCAA tournament that season. Two games into the 2004 campaign, he re-injured the shoulder which required season-ending surgery. An attempted comeback last season was cut short again after another shoulder injury during preseason workouts. A fully healthy Bionde returns in 2006, moving to second base where he is expected to be the starter.



Frazier lived up to his billing in his first year with the Scarlet Knights last spring, earning Freshman All-America honors, following a 2005 campaign that saw him hit .295 with 61 runs, 36 RBI and 19 steals from the leadoff spot. Rutgers' starting shortstop in all 53 games last season, he broke the Rutgers single-season record for most home runs by a leadoff hitter with nine last season.

Tim Querns and Jason Grover split time at third base last season for RU, but with Grover (graduated) now gone, Querns steps in as the Scarlet Knights' full-time starter. In 38 games, including 27 starts last season, he batted .303 with 27 hits.

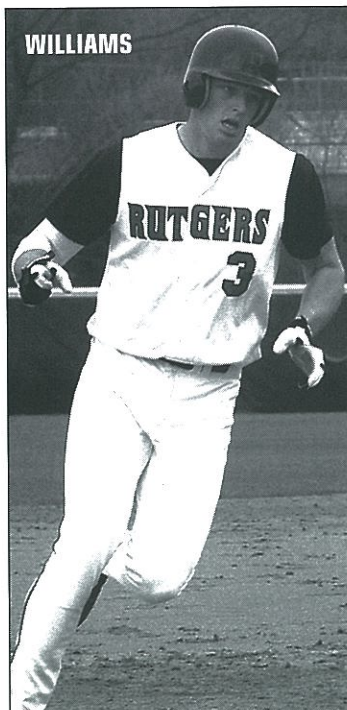
Vic Cegles, Tom Edwards, Vincent Sangemino and Nick Stavarakis will serve reserve roles in the infield for Rutgers in 2006. Cegles appeared in 17 games in 2005, hitting .333.

OUTFIELD

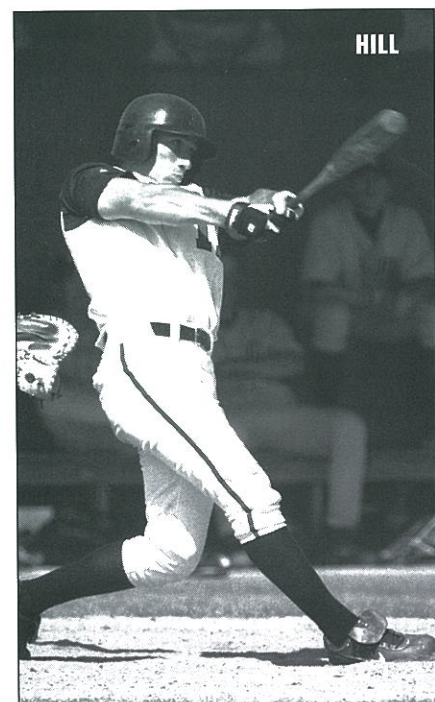
Rutgers returns two of its three starting outfielders from a year ago. The Scarlet Knights will no doubt feel the loss of centerfielder Johnny Defendis, who led the team in nearly every offensive category last season. Defendis, an All-BIG EAST selection and the New Jersey Collegiate Baseball Association Player of the Year as a junior last season, was selected by the Chicago Cubs in the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft.

Replacing Defendis is no easy task, but the Scarlet Knights have a viable option in senior Jeff Grose, who moves over from his starting left field spot last season to centerfield in 2006.

RUTGERS BASEBALL

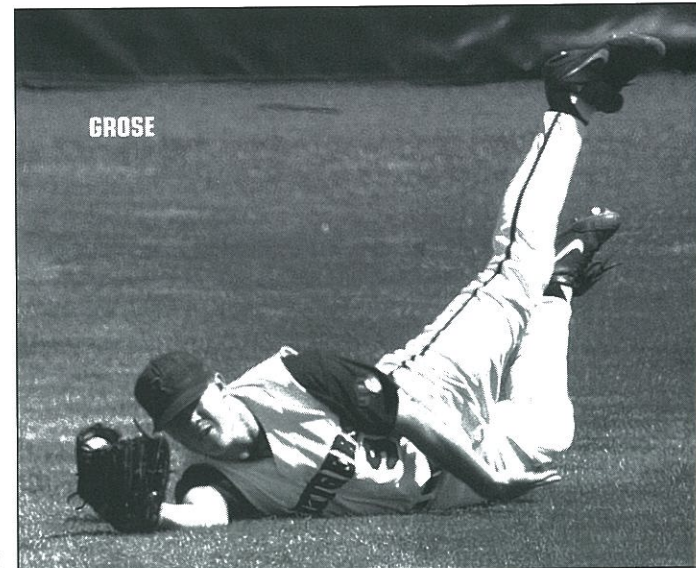


In his first season as the Scarlet Knights' starting right fielder, David Williams was impressive, hitting .312 with 48 hits, 11 doubles and six home runs. He owned a .513 slugging percentage, while proving successful on all four of his stolen base attempts. Williams' performance as a regular starter did not go unnoticed as he was selected by the Arizona Diamondbacks in last season's Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft, but chose to return to Rutgers in 2006 for what will be his redshirt junior season.



Redshirt sophomore Ryan Hill takes over the reigns in left field. Hill started half of the 42 games he appeared in his first season of competition with RU. He played both left field and right field while also serving as the team's designated hitter. Hill, a lefty, proved his explosiveness from the plate with a .315 batting average and a team-best .573 slugging percentage that included seven doubles, two triples and four home runs. He did not make an error all season.

Grose, an All-BIG EAST pick last season, has been a starter for the Scarlet Knights throughout his career. Coming off a season where he hit .317 with 60 hits and was a force on the base paths with 10 steals in 12 attempts, Grose will be looked upon to continue to his stellar play in the outfield and at the plate. The versatile lefty also possesses a strong arm which he not only displayed in the outfield but also on the mound where he was called in to pitch five times last season. He posted six strikeouts in 5.0 innings of work, earning a victory in his only decision, while picking up one save on the season.



Donny Callahan and newcomers Luis Feliz and Mike Livingston could all see time in the outfield this season. Callahan appeared in 16 games as a redshirt freshman last season.

SCHEDULE

Challenging as always, RU will head south to start its season, playing three games at William & Mary (Feb. 17-19), three at Old Dominion (Feb. 24-26) and three at nationally-ranked Georgia Tech (March 3-5) before its annual spring break trip to Florida. Rutgers opens play in the Sunshine State at Florida International for three games (March 10-12), followed by a single game at Florida Atlantic on March 14. From there, RU will head somewhat north to Lynchburg, VA, for a three-game series with Liberty (March 17-19). The Scarlet Knights will face St. Peter's in their home opener on March 22, before opening BIG EAST play with a weekend series at league newcomer Louisville on the road (March 24-26).

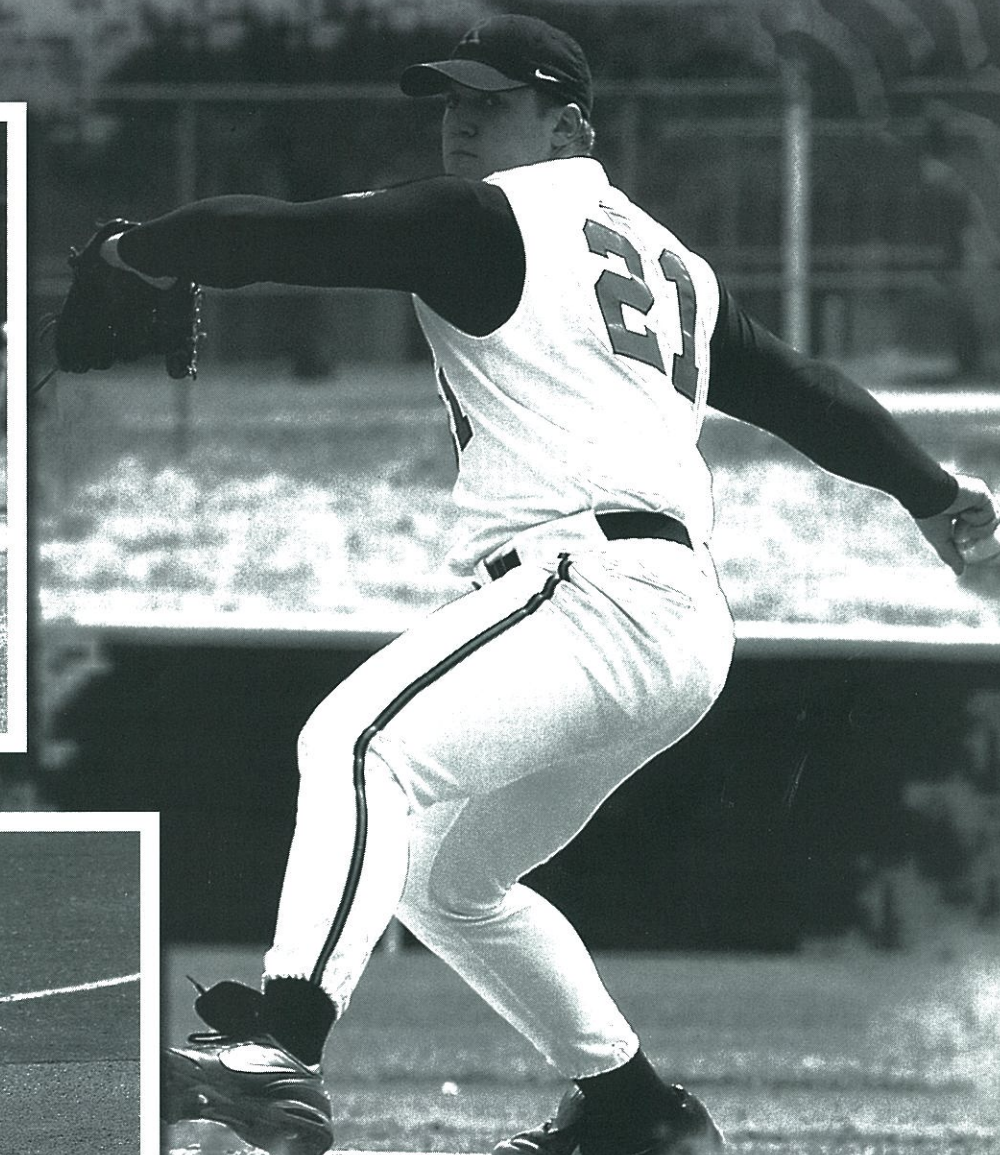
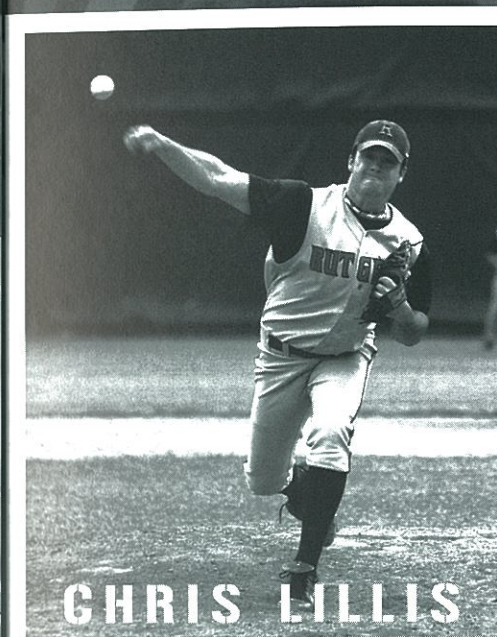
Single games against Rider (March 28) and Princeton (March 29) open a six-game homestand that includes a weekend series with Villanova (March 31-April 2).

The Scarlet Knights will also welcome BIG EAST foes West Virginia (April 7-9), St. John's (April 28-30) and Pittsburgh (April 6-7) to the Class of 1953 Baseball Complex. RU will travel to Ohio for a series at BIG EAST newcomer Cincinnati (April 13-15), while the league did not include the Conference's third first-year school, South Florida on the Scarlet Knights' 2006 schedule.

RU will, however, head to Florida at the end of the regular season, should it finish among the top-eight teams in the league. The regular season as the BIG EAST Championship was moved from Commerce Bank Ballpark in Bridgewater, NJ, to Bright House Networks Field in Clearwater, FL.

FROM WILLIAMSPORT TO PISCATAWAY

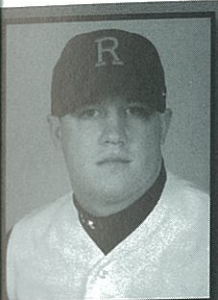
Current sophomore Todd Frazier is one of several Scarlet Knights that have played in the Little League's grandest stage, the Little League World Series in Williamsport, PA.

Frazier first earned fame for his role on the 1998 Toms River American Little League team that won its first Little League World Series with a 12-9 victory over Kashima, Japan. Former Scarlet Knights, however, helped pave the way for RU's current starting shortstop.

Colin Gaynor, who finished his career with the Scarlet Knights in 2005, was member of the 1995 Toms River Little League team that also advanced to Williamsport, posting a 1-2 record, with its lone victory coming vs. Arden Hills, Minnesota, which represented the Central region. Gaynor, ironically, played alongside Todd's older brother, Jeff, in Williamsport and later with the Scarlet Knights. Jeff Frazier was a member of the Scarlet Knights from 2002-2004 and is now playing in the Detroit Tigers organization.

The trend will continue next season as Colin's younger brother, Casey Gaynor, joins the Scarlet Knights in 2007. Casey was the lone 11-year-old on the 1998 team and returned to Williamsport in 1999, giving the Gaynor family three trips to the mecca of Little League baseball. Gaynor's father, Mike, coached all three teams.

Frazier, by the way, hit .600 with four home runs to lead his team and was on the mound when the final out was recorded.

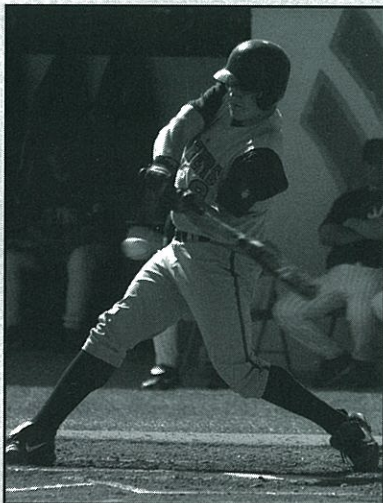
It takes a talented player to do one thing well on the college level, but some, such as Jeff Grose, are willing to help the team with a multitude of talents. Grose has started in the outfield for Rutgers in each of the past three seasons, but has also jumped on the mound when his team needed him, especially during the early portion of the season.

"Jeff is a starting outfielder, but you never know when we might need him to get a hitter out," said head coach Fred Hill. "He is a real gamer and doesn't back down when he pitches."

Grose's first collegiate pitching appearance came as a freshman in 2003, when he entered a game vs. nationally-ranked Georgia Tech - with the bases loaded and nobody out. Grose's competitiveness took over from there, as he wiggled out of the jam unscathed.

"Coach Hill told me to go out there and throw strikes," said Grose. "It was pretty nerve-racking, but once I got the first out, I settled down. The hardest part of pitching and hitting is separating your performance at the plate from what you need to do on the mound."

Grose expects his pitching responsibilities to increase in 2006, and his team-first attitude will suit him well, no matter where he takes the field.

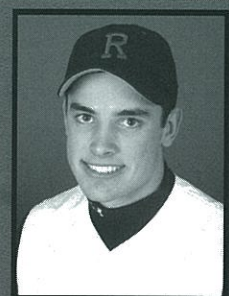
FAMILY AFFAIR

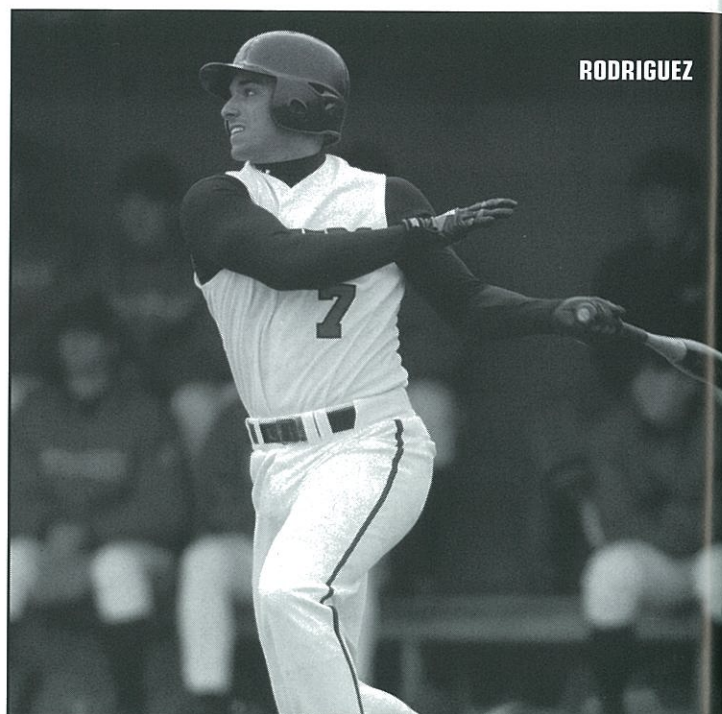
2005 SEASON REVIEW

Despite a 32-21 record and eighth-straight 30-win season, Rutgers ended the 2005 season in disappointing fashion as, for the second straight season, RU was not part of the postseason picture. After participating in postseason play for 18 consecutive years under Fred Hill, the Scarlet Knights found themselves just outside of the four-team league postseason tournament for the second straight season.

Unfortunately, in almost a mirror image of the previous year, prolonged injuries to the Scarlet Knights' pitching staff, coupled with another season-ending set back by starting shortstop Mike Bionde caught up with RU.

Although the Scarlet Knights lost one Frazier in Detroit Tigers prospect Jeff Frazier, they happily welcomed his younger brother, Todd, to the team as the freshman earned the starting shortstop role in preseason, replacing the injured Bionde. He lived up to his billing as a High School All-American, setting the school record for home runs by a leadoff hitter with nine in 2005. Frazier was one of two Scarlet Knights to start all 53 games, finishing the season with a .295 batting average and a team-high 61 hits and 13 doubles. He finished third in the league in runs and fifth in stolen bases with 19. Frazier was honored as a Freshman All-American by Baseball America and Collegiate Baseball, also earning Third Team All-BIG EAST accolades.

The Scarlet Knights' biggest bat in 2005 was Johnny Defendis, a junior centerfielder. He led the team in nearly every offensive category, including average (.370), hits (81), triples (4), RBI

(49) and total bases (111). Defendis, the New Jersey Collegiate Baseball Player of the Year and Second Team All-BIG EAST pick, was selected by Chicago Cubs in the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft following the season.

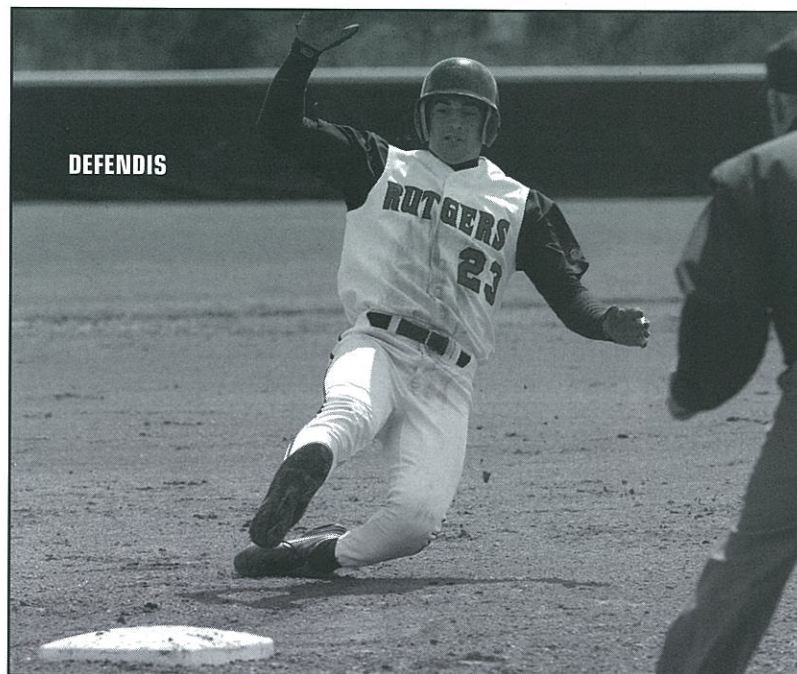
Defendis joined seniors Cory Rodriguez, Jason Grover, Colin Gaynor, Tom Malafronte, Rich Canuso and Aaron Kalb, who wrapped up their Scarlet Knight careers in 2005.

Gaynor moved from catcher to first base, replacing Rich Canuso, who was limited by injuries his senior season. He batted .341 in 52 starts with 16 doubles and five home runs as the Scarlet Knights' cleanup hitter.

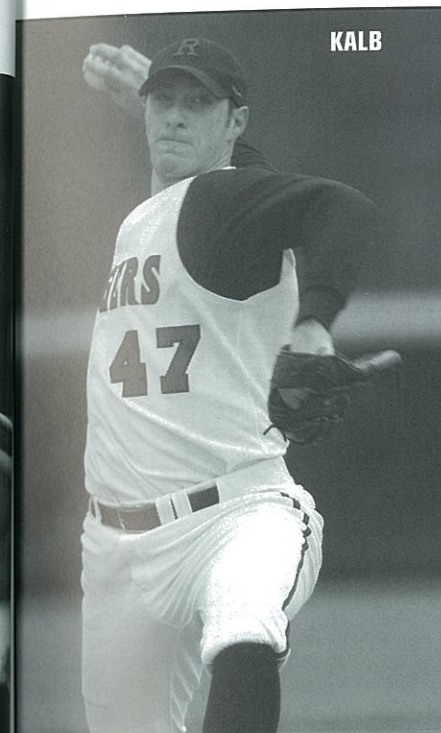
Rodriguez, the Scarlet Knights' starter at second base, hit .342 with 69 hits, earning All-BIG EAST honors along with Gaynor.

Rutgers led the 10-team BIG EAST in batting average (.313) and on-base percentage (.405), finishing second in the league in home runs (47), slugging percentage (.494) and walks (252).

Junior Jeff Grose shined as the Scarlet Knights' starting left fielder, earning Third Team All-BIG EAST honors after hitting .317 with 60 hits, including 20 doubles. He was also a force on the base paths, stealing 10 bases in 12 attempts.

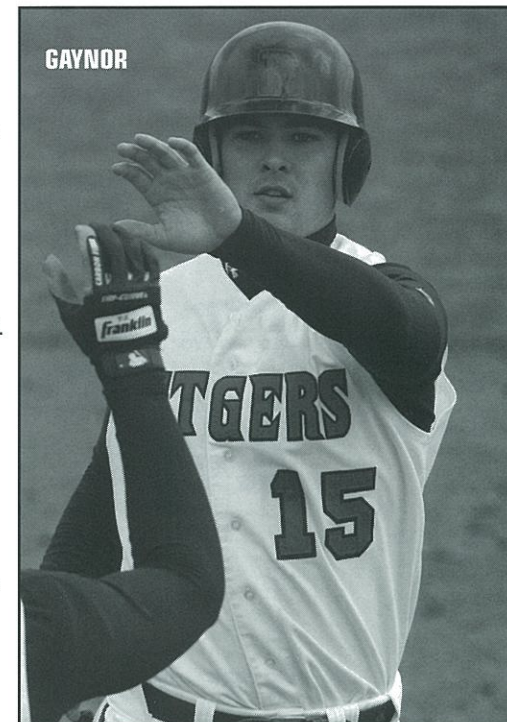
Several members of RU's pitching staff suffered injuries early in the season, causing a reshuffling of the Scarlet Knights' rotation. Senior Aaron Kalb was a constant presence on the mound for RU with a 5-2 record and a team-high 43 strikeouts in a team-high 12 starts. Junior OJ DeChristofano started 11 contests with a 5.34 ERA and a 4-5 record, while senior Tom Malafronte had two wins in six starts. Steve Holt (4.94 ERA and 3-3 record in 11 starts)

and Jim Jansen (3.96 ERA and 5-1 record in eight starts) were solid for Rutgers all season.

The Scarlet Knights opened the season strong with a sweep of William & Mary in the season-opening series. Following a split against No. 13 Georgia Tech, RU headed south for its annual trip to Florida. Rutgers surged to the top of the BIG EAST

standings with five victories in its first six games, capped by a two-game sweep of Notre Dame. However, RU ended up 12-12 in conference play and just missed the league tournament, finishing fifth.

One of the biggest highlights of the season came in a 9-8 victory over Monmouth on April 6, which gave Hill his 700th career win at Rutgers. He finished his 22nd year as the Scarlet Knights' mentor with an impressive overall record of 716-423-3 record for a .628 winning percentage. With four position starters and RU's top seven pitchers returning in 2006, the Scarlet Knights have aspirations of returning to the postseason and national spotlight.

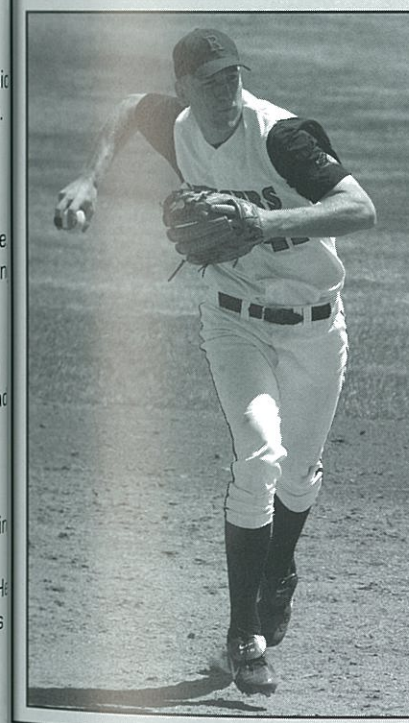
FRAZIER NAMED FIRST TEAM ALL-FRESHMAN HONORS FROM BASEBALL AMERICA

Shortstop Todd Frazier earned his second All-America honor following his standout spring, being named to the 2005 Baseball America All-Freshman First Team. Frazier was also lauded by Collegiate Baseball.

Frazier, who played primarily at shortstop, started all 53 games (one of two players to do so) for the Scarlet Knights. He hit .295 from the leadoff spot and led the team in runs (61), home runs (9), total bases (111) and steals (19). He also posted a .392 on-base percentage and set a single-season school record for home runs by a lead-off hitter, passing current Kansas City Royals OF David DeJesus, who hit eight in 2000.

He made just seven errors in 11 starts at third base and 42 at shortstop. He hit safely in all but 12 games and reached base safely in 50 of 53 contests. He also had a 14-game hitting streak during the season which raised his average to .305 on April 23. The starting shortstop for the Chatham A's of the Cape Cod Baseball League over the summer, Frazier batted .270 with 27 RBI and five home runs and a .480 slugging percentage in 41 games on the Cape.

Frazier represents the 11th All-America selection for Rutgers since 1996, including his brother Jeff who earned Freshman honors in 2002 and five different All-America awards in 2004.

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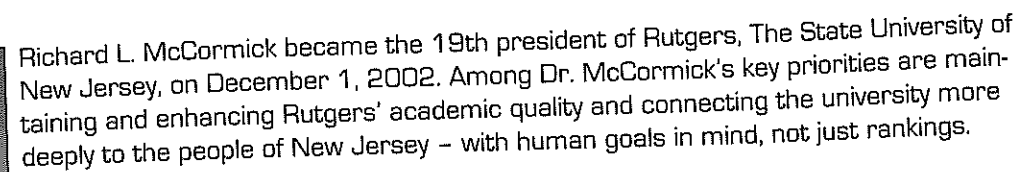

THE STATE UNIVERSITY



Prior to becoming president of Rutgers, Dr. McCormick enjoyed a distinguished career as a faculty member, scholar, and university administrator. After earning his B.A. in American studies from Amherst College in 1969 and his Ph.D. in history from Yale University in 1976, Dr. McCormick began his career as an assistant professor of history at Rutgers-New Brunswick/Piscataway. He rose through the ranks to become professor of history (1985), chair of the Department of History (1987-1989), and dean of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences (1989-1992). From Rutgers, Dr. McCormick moved in 1992 to the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where he served as executive vice chancellor, provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. In 1995 he became president of the University of Washington where he served until returning to Rutgers in 2002.

Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, with more than 51,000 students on campuses in Camden, Newark, and New Brunswick/Piscataway and more than 340,000 living alumni, is New Jersey's flagship public research university and one of the nation's major state universities. Devoted to shaping New Jersey's future, Rutgers is a vibrant, diverse, and cohesive community that capitalizes on its many strengths to benefit residents in every corner of the state, from financiers and farmers to educators and engineers.

Rutgers is a member of the prestigious Association of American Universities, a group comprising the top public and private research universities in North America, among them Harvard, Princeton, the University of Michigan, and the University of California at Berkeley. As a leading comprehensive university, Rutgers' research, teaching, and service initiatives resonate around the globe, from aiding fledgling democracies in the former Soviet states to collaborating internationally on promising new therapies for victims of spinal cord injuries. In every facet of human endeavor, the people of Rutgers are a force for creating a better society. They are ambassadors for the state of New Jersey, and their collective accomplishment is a measure of the best that New Jersey has to offer.

A PROUD HISTORY

Rutgers has a unique history as a colonial college, a land-grant institution, and a state university. Chartered in 1766 as Queen's College, the eighth institution of higher learning to be founded in the colonies, the school opened its doors in New Brunswick in 1771. During this early period, the college developed as a classical liberal arts institution. In 1825, the name of the college was changed to Rutgers to honor a former trustee and Revolutionary War veteran, Colonel Henry Rutgers.

Rutgers College became the land-grant college of New Jersey in 1864. Further expansion in the sciences came with the founding of the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station in 1880, the College of Engineering (now the School of Engineering) in 1914, and the College of Agriculture (now Cook College) in 1921. The precursors to several other Rutgers divisions were also founded during this period: the College of Pharmacy (now the Ernest Mario School of Pharmacy) in 1892, the New Jersey College for Women (now Douglass College) in 1918, and the School of Education (now a graduate school) in 1924.

Rutgers College assumed university status in 1924, and legislative acts in 1945 and 1956 designated all its divisions as the State University of New Jersey. During these years, the university expanded significantly with the founding of an evening division, University College, in 1934, and the addition of the University of Newark (now Rutgers–Newark) in 1946 and the College of South Jersey at Camden (now Rutgers–Camden) in 1950. After World War II, enrollment, degree programs, and research activity grew rapidly. In 1989, Rutgers was elected to membership in the Association of American Universities.

Today, Rutgers continues to grow, both in its facilities and in the variety and depth of its educational and research programs. The university's goals for the future include the continued provision of the highest quality undergraduate and graduate education along with increased support for outstanding research to meet the needs of society and to fulfill Rutgers' role as the State University of New Jersey.

Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, has been the center of a great intellectual tradition for more than 238 years. Here are just a few highlights.

FACULTY

- Rutgers' student to faculty ratio is 14:1.
- Ninety-eight percent of faculty hold the highest degree in their field.
- Rutgers faculty hold 43 memberships in the nation's leading honor societies: the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the National Academy of Sciences, the National Academy of Engineering, and the Institute of Medicine.
- Senior faculty regularly teach undergraduate courses and include under-graduates in their research projects.
- Among AAU universities, Rutgers ranks fourth in the percentage of African-American faculty and seventh in the percentage of female faculty.

STUDENTS

- Each year, more than 11,000 men and women receive a Rutgers degree.
- Undergraduates can choose from more than 100 majors and 4,000 courses.
- Despite Rutgers' impressive size, students don't get lost in the crowd. Undergraduates enroll in 18 small- to medium-sized colleges that offer friendly campus communities.
- Rutgers' student body is highly diverse. Among AAU universities, Rutgers is sixth in total minority enrollment, third in African-American enrollment, eighth in Asian enrollment, and eleventh in Latino enrollment.
- Rutgers ranks second among AAU public universities in the percentage of baccalaureate degrees awarded to African-Americans.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

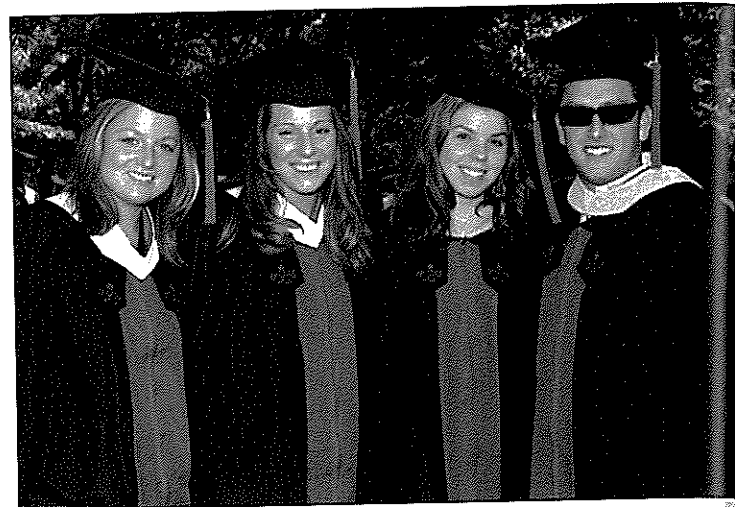
- Rutgers Learning Centers on all campuses offer tutoring, study tips, and general academic support to undergraduate students. The centers help more than 13,000 students each year.
- In New Brunswick/Piscataway, student-athletes participate in the Academic Support Services Program that provides help to all Scarlet Knights. In addition, several state-of-the-art computer labs, such as the Hershorn Academic Center, are available exclusively to student-athletes.

RESEARCH

- Rutgers is a research powerhouse, bringing in more than \$258.6 million in research grants in fiscal year 2003 and making discoveries that gain national media attention.
- Recent research achievements by Rutgers faculty include the identification of the gene responsible for melanoma and the discovery of the oldest known stone tools crafted by human ancestors.
- Major research centers at the university explore a myriad of areas of great scientific and social import, including marine and coastal sciences, computer science, biotechnology and medicine, fiber optics, advanced food technology, environmental prediction, molecular neuroscience, workforce development, transportation, and health and health care policy.

IMPACT ON NEW JERSEY

- The university's economic impact on New Jersey is more than \$2.8 billion annually through direct and indirect spending, more than five times the state's investment in the university.
- There are more than 340,000 living Rutgers alumni, more than half of whom reside in New Jersey.
- Rutgers has been instrumental in the launching of 46 start-up companies, including 34 in New Jersey. There are some 400 technologies available for licensing from Rutgers.

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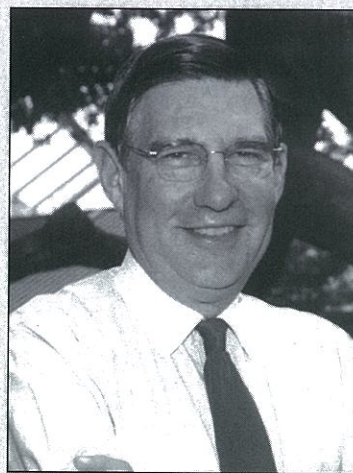
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ROBERT E. MULCAHY III DIRECTOR OF INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

Innovation, achievement and excellence have been the hallmarks of Robert Mulcahy's tenure as Director of Athletics at Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey. Since coming to Rutgers in 1998, Mulcahy has been the guiding force in the continued growth and development of the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics. He is committed to the ideal that Rutgers Athletics will

provide the best possible experience for its student-athletes.

Mulcahy's vision for Rutgers Athletics has led the division to unprecedented growth and accomplishment. Wide-ranging improvements in facilities have allowed the division to function at greater efficiency, thus enabling opportunity for greater success for Rutgers student-athletes, both in the classroom and on the playing field.

With a strategic plan now in place, Mulcahy has brought reality to this vision. He has been responsible for raising the division's endowment by \$4 million, and was instrumental in developing and securing outside revenue totaling \$24 million, resulting in the renovation, and construction, of a number of facilities.

Capital projects from this funding include the expansion and enhancement of the Hale Center, allowing that facility to become one of the finest of its kind nationally, with an expansive strength and conditioning facility, a state of the art training room and academic support facilities which include classrooms, study rooms and computer labs. Rutgers Stadium has enjoyed significant enhancements under Mulcahy's watch, as well, and now features a state-of-the-art scoreboard and Field Turf playing surface, all helping to ensure the best possible experience for student-athletes and fans.

Other projects have resulted in a modern, state-of-the-art academic support laboratory in the Louis Brown Athletic Center, as well as an expanded weight training complex, and a modern media headquarters and interview room. Office space for coaches and administrators was a priority that has come to fruition, allowing the senior athletic administration to be centrally located in the LBAC for the first time, while future plans call for the continued upgrading of the LBAC.

Mulcahy has made significant upgrades in the area of academic support, which has been reflected by substantial gains in the classroom by student-athletes. The division remains committed to its goal of exceeding the grade point average of the general student population. Increased academic support has included the addition of full-time personnel, computer labs and tutorial services. Programs such as the comprehensive RU Strong/LifeSkills have been bolstered to help ensure a positive and meaningful experience for the Rutgers student-athlete.

Under Mulcahy's leadership, Rutgers student-athletes are standouts in the community as well. Among the many projects they organize and participate in are the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee annual Holiday Toy Drive, a University-wide Blood Drive, the Read Across America program, and visits to area hospitals.

The Annual Report, which chronicles the division's achievements and goals and was produced for the first time ever following the 1998-99 academic year under Mulcahy's direction, includes the cumulative grade point averages of each varsity team.

The Division continues to be a leader in its commitment to gender equity, and has increased funding for scholarships and facility improvements in that area.

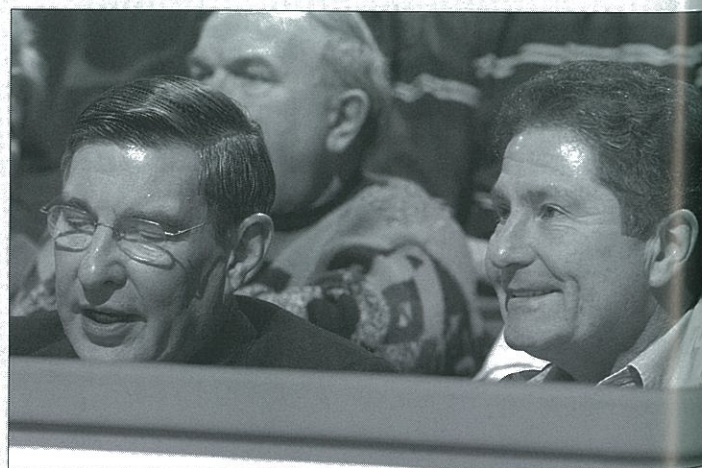
Mulcahy has also overseen the institution of a comprehensive marketing and promotional plan to further increase corporate revenue and enhance the overall image of the athletic program. Corporate sponsorship has risen each year during Mulcahy's administration, and will continue to expand as Rutgers Athletics maintains its sponsorship with one of the nation's leading firms, Nelligan Sports Marketing.

All the while, the Rutgers athletic program continues to grow and improve on the field of play.

In 2004-05, the women's basketball team won the BIG EAST Conference's regular season championship and eventually advanced to the NCAA Tournament's Elite Eight, its seventh NCAA appearance in eight years (including a Women's Final Four in 2000). In a week-long span in the middle of the season, the Scarlet Knights defeated three Top 10 teams (including the No. 1 squad at the time), serving notice that Rutgers has achieved its rightful place among the nation's elite.

The Rutgers men's track and field team enjoyed perhaps its best season in school history in 2004-05, winning the 2005 BIG EAST Conference Outdoor Championship, and claiming both the IC4A Indoor and Outdoor titles. The Scarlet Knights' men's golf team enjoyed its most successful campaign in more than two decades and earned a berth in the NCAA Tournament, and the Rutgers gymnastics team stepped to the fore by winning the USAG Collegiate National Championship.

There were plenty more superb events in 2004-05. The football program, and the entire University, were showcased in the memorable 2004 season-opening win over Michigan State before a sellout crowd and ABC-TV audience on Labor Day Weekend, and the men's basketball team hosted seven sellout crowds and attracted the third highest attendance figure in school history.



Mulcahy has also put great emphasis on the composition and performance of the Scarlet Knights' coaching staff, which has proven to be a major strength of the program. In 2004-05, six members of the coaching staff were honored as "Coach of the Year" by their respective conferences/organizations.

Mulcahy came to Rutgers on April 15, 1998, after an extraordinary 19-year tenure as President and CEO of the New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority. Under Mulcahy's leadership, the NJSEA developed into the nation's premier sports and entertainment venue. Among his noteworthy achievements at the Meadowlands includ-

ed establishing New Jersey as the home of the finest college athletic competition in the country, including the creation of the Kickoff Classic Football Game, attracting the Army-Navy game to the facility on three occasions, and hosting eight NCAA Men's Basketball Eastern Regionals and the last Final Four ever to be held in an Arena, in 1996. Mulcahy led the negotiations that resulted in the NHL's Devils, the NFL's Jets, and Major League Soccer's MetroStars calling the Meadowlands their home.

Mulcahy's leadership at the NJSEA helped develop legislation which led to it overseeing the reconstruction of Rutgers Stadium and building new soccer, lacrosse and track and field facilities in 1994. The Sports and Exposition Authority matured from primarily a horse racing and professional football business into a statewide engine for sports, entertainment and exposition development during Mulcahy's tenure. By the end of his tenure at the Meadowlands, the Sports Complex was hosting 600 events a year, drawing seven million visitors annually to such attractions as the Giants, Jets, Devils, Nets, and horse racing, as well as a broad variety of family shows and concerts.

Mulcahy's lifelong passion for scholastic and college athletics, and his undying commitment to public service, has not gone unnoticed. The New York Times described his tenure with the NJSEA as one of "quiet fervor and foresight, establishing the Meadowlands as one of the nation's leading sports and entertainment complexes." The Newark Star Ledger hailed the holding of the NCAA Final Four, an event that was co-hosted by Rutgers, in New Jersey as "the miracle of the Meadowlands."



Among his many professional affiliations, Mulcahy serves on the Board of the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame, is Chair of its Awards Committee, is an honorary member of the American Football Coaches' Association, and serves or has served on the Boards of several business and charitable corporations.

Mulcahy, a graduate of Villanova University (AB in History, 1958), has received several awards from his alma mater, including the Medal of Excellence from the College of Arts and Sciences, the Alumni Medal, and the James "Jumbo" Elliot Achievement Award. Among other honors, his most prized awards include the Knight of St. Gregory medal, received from Pope John Paul II, and the Ellis Island Medal of Honor.

After 37 years in Mendham, Bob and his wife Terry relocated to Basking Ridge. They are the parents of seven children, and also have 11 grandchildren.

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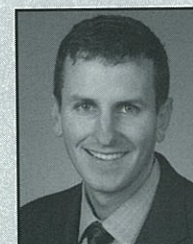
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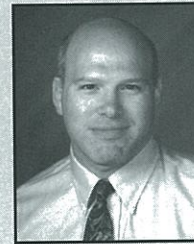

New Brunswick provides the perfect complement to the academic environment provided by Rutgers University. The city's economic outlook has changed drastically over the past few decades, with help from over \$1.5 million in investments pumped into the downtown area. The city has been revitalized by the construction of major office and retail complexes, the development of an internationally recognized cultural arts center, the emergence of state-of-the-art health care facilities and much more. According to, *The Star Ledger*, "New Brunswick stands out as perhaps the state's most dramatic example of downtown revitalization."

A welcoming community with a small-city-feel, New Brunswick features an impressive amount of cultural and entertainment opportunities. Renowned for its wide array of international and domestic cuisine, it is home to hundreds of restaurants, shops, theaters, museums, clubs, taverns, and cafes. The city boasts over 60 restaurants, including fine dining with diverse cuisine such as Ethiopian, Mediterranean, Mongolian and Jamaican, as well as the more traditional Italian, Mexican, Chinese and American. each year to enjoy drama, music, dance and theatre at the State Theatre, George Street Playhouse and Crossroads Theatre. Along with the American Repertory Ballet and Rutgers' Mason Gross School of the Arts, these entities comprise the New Brunswick Cultural Center.

If night-life is what you're searching for, look no further than New Brunswick. Scattered around the city are over 30 bars, pubs and clubs of all atmospheres in which to watch sporting events, play pool, dance, or just relax with friends. In addition, the city is home to eight galleries and museums, including the Rutgers University New Jersey Museum of Agriculture and the Jane Voorhees Zimmerli Art Museum.

Despite all of these attractions, New Brunswick is not done growing just yet. It is forecast that 2.8 million square feet of new construction will be underway or completed in the next 24 months, representing an additional investment of \$447 million.

New York is a short 35 minute train ride away, with Times Square only 37 miles from New Brunswick. In short, New Brunswick is a place with small-city-feel, but with big-city opportunities.

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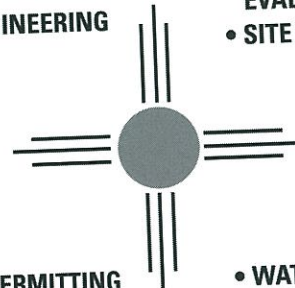
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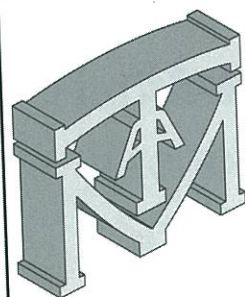
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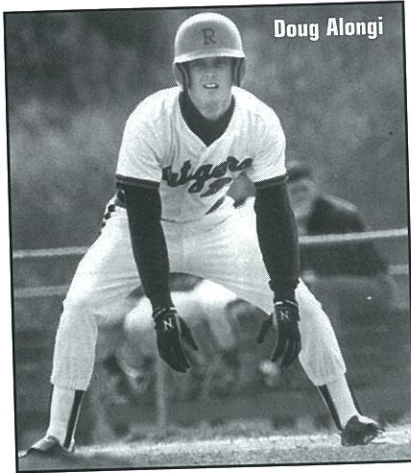
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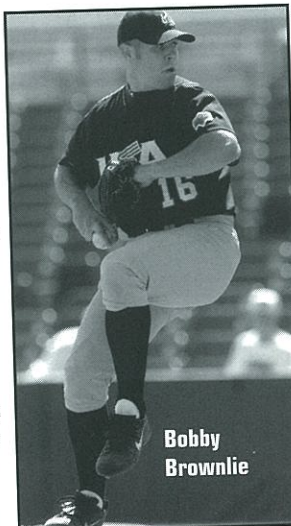

14 assists. Alongi also claimed Atlantic 10 Player of the Year honors as well as ECAC and NJCBA recognition.

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One of college baseball's biggest surprises in 2000, Bobby Brownlie arrived on the scene and emerged as one of the top young players in the nation. In 2000, Brownlie posted a 10-1 record, including a perfect 7-0 mark in the BIG EAST. He fired eight complete games and posted an ERA of just 2.55, fourth-best among all freshmen in the country. He was on the mound when Rutgers clinched the 2000 BIG EAST Regular Season Championship, outdueling Notre Dame's Aaron Heilman for the crown. He then collected two wins in the BIG EAST Tournament, including a 1-0, complete-game shutout of Seton Hall in the title contest. He closed his season with a 4-3 win over Army in the opening round of the NCAA Championship, running his win streak to 10 games and tying the single-season win mark at Rutgers. His 89 strikeouts established a new school record, and he allowed just a .247 opponent batting average.

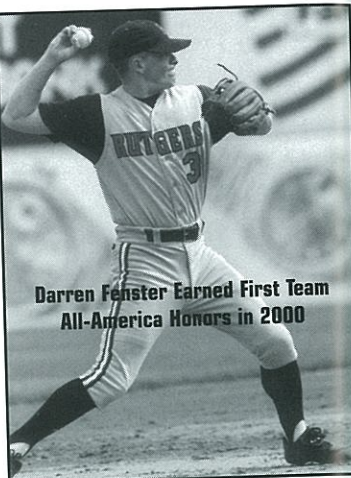
Jake Daubert enjoyed a fine offensive season in 1998, batting .368 in his inaugural college season. In addition, he set or tied eight Rutgers records, the most impressive being the single-season RBI mark, which he eclipsed by knocking in 64 runs. Daubert was named Rutgers first BIG EAST Rookie of the Year and, at the end of the season, was named to the Louisville Slugger/TPX Freshman All-America squad.

2000- Fenster, a two-time All-American, became the first RU player to achieve First Team honors since Jeff Torborg in 1963. Fenster led Rutgers in hitting for the second-straight season, posting a .433 average, which included a new school-record 101 hits in a season. Along the way, Fenster also set the school mark for career hits with 315, becoming the first RU player to reach the 300-hit mark. In addition to his 101 hits and .433 average, Fenster scored 59 runs, drove in 55, collected 23 doubles and hit a career-high four home runs. He also led the team with 182 assists at shortstop, committing just 10 errors.

1999- Fenster, known initially for his defensive work at shortstop, enjoyed a breakthrough offensive season in 1999, leading the team in batting with .424 average, including a .505 mark in conference action. Batting in the second spot in the order, Fenster provided stability to the Rutgers offense, which ended the season ranked seventh in the nation in team batting average. Fenster's .424 mark was the sixth-best single-season mark in Rutgers history and his .505 BIG EAST average was the best in 12 seasons. A model of consistency, Fenster hit safely in 50 of 56 starts, collecting 37 multiple hit games. He also continued to play flawlessly in the field, stabilizing the defense from his shortstop position for the third year in a row.

The 2001 Star Ledger (N.J.) High School Player of the Year, Frazier's adjustment to the college game came quickly. He was the first true freshman since Darren Fenster in 1997 to start the season opener and proceeded to start all 57 games in left field for the Scarlet Knights. After an 0-for-3 effort in the season opener, Frazier was 7-for-14 over his next three games and was hitting as high as .424 through the first 17 games of the season. After dipping to a season-low .353 on April 14, Frazier went on a seven-game tear from April 17 through April 26, raising his average to .392. He was 15-for-24 (.625) with seven home runs, 14 runs scored and 22 RBI during that span.

In 2004, he hit a team-best .382 overall and .365 in BIG EAST play this season. He was among the league leaders in several offensive categories, including average (2nd), home runs (13, 2nd) and RBI (59, 3rd). He also led the league in hits with 79 and finished tied for third in doubles (16). Frazier was also third in slugging percentage (.657). He led the Scarlet Knights in batting average, at bats (207), runs (59), doubles, total bases (136), slugging percentage, hits, sacrifice flies (4), RBI, home runs, tying the single-season record he set in 2002.

2005 BASEBALL AMERICA FRESHMAN FIRST TEAM 2005 LOUISVILLE SLUGGER FRESHMAN ALL AMERICAN

Frazier, the younger brother of former Rutgers All-American Jeff Frazier, had a standout rookie season with the Scarlet Knights in 2005. He was named a Freshman All-American by both Baseball America and Collegiate Baseball. He hit .295 from the leadoff spot last season and led the team in runs (61), home runs (9), total bases (111) and steals (19). He also posted a .392 on-base percentage and set a single-season school record for home runs by a lead-off hitter, passing current Kansas City Royals OF David DeJesus, who hit eight in 2000. The All-BIG EAST selectoin also made just seven errors in 11 starts at third base and 42 starts at shortstop. He hit safely in all but 12 games and reached base safely in 50 of 53 contests. He also had a 14-game hitting streak during the season which raised his average to .305.

GLEN GARDNER

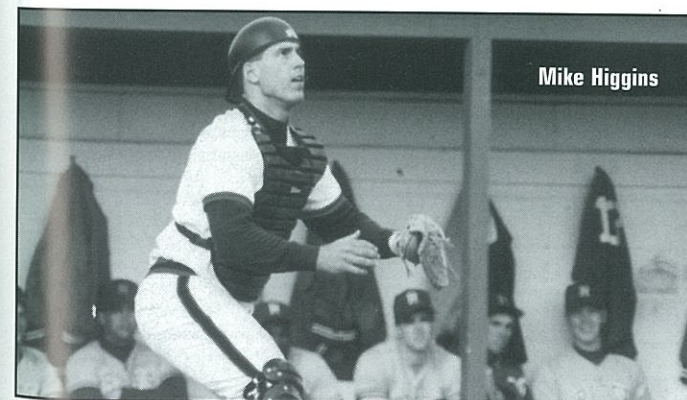
Now a coach with the Scarlet Knights, Gardner was one of the most outstanding outfielders in Rutgers' history and one of two Scarlet Knights to be chosen as two-time All-Americans. A 1986 Baseball America Freshman All-America, Gardner was second on the team in hitting that year with a .398 batting average while leading RU in hits (70), RBI (45), home runs (6), total bases (102), slugging percentage (.580) and on-base percentage (.470).

In 1987, Gardner followed his impressive debut by collecting Collegiate Baseball All-America honors. Gardner led the team in hitting at .368 despite missing 13 games with a hand injury. He finished second on the team in HRs (8) and RBI (45). Gardner also earned his second-consecutive Atlantic 10 and NJ honors as well as being named to the NCAA East Region first-team.

PETE HALL

1961 AACBC SECOND TEAM 1962 AACBC SECOND TEAM

Hall is another Scarlet Knight to garner multiple All-America honors. In 1961, the third baseman from Bound Brook led the Scarlet Knights in hitting at .397, runs (21), hits (31), RBI (30) doubles (6), home runs (4), and made just five errors while starting in every game.



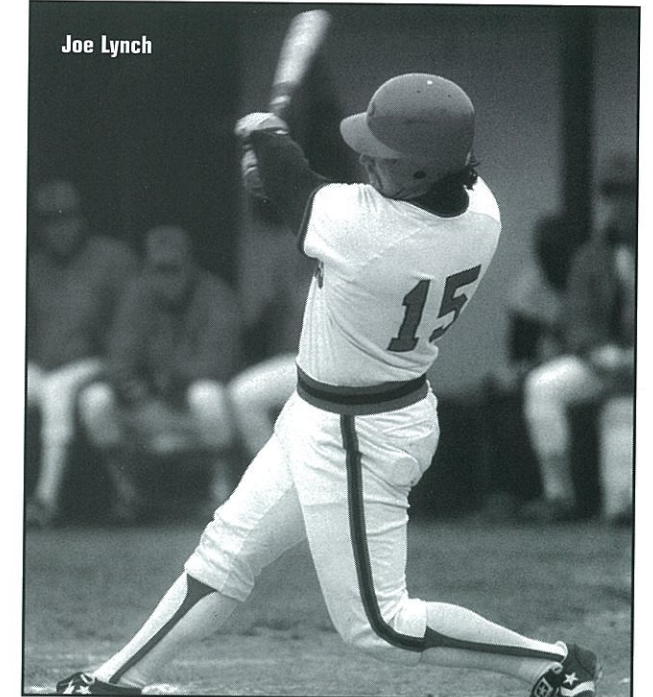

1993 ABCA THIRD-TEAM

The Scarlet Knights' catcher battled Doug Alongi in almost every offensive category while captaining Rutgers during the 1993 season. He was second in hitting with a .370 average, drove in 56 runs, then a school record, tied Alongi for team honors with nine HRs and led the Scarlet Knights in doubles (20). His 39 walks and 20 doubles were both second on the all-time season record at that time.

JIM KOHL

1990 ABCA THIRD TEAM

Relief ace extraordinaire, Jim Kohl was one of the keys to Rutgers' run in the East Region, where it finished one game shy of the College World Series. Kohl finished with a perfect 8-0 record and three saves while appearing in 22 games and starting just two. Even more impressive may be his team low 1.85 ERA or the fact that he walked just eight batters in 39.0 innings. In the 1990 tournament, where Rutgers went 4-2, he recorded 8.2 innings of scoreless relief.

JOE LYNCH

1986 ABCA THIRD TEAM

As a designated hitter, Lynch was third on the Scarlet with a .364 average. He also smacked 3 HRs and drove in 30 runs. A captain in 1986, Lynch had 55 hits with 11 doubles and two triples. His .470 on base percentage tied for team honors as well. Lynch also collected All-District II, Atlantic 10 and All East honors.

SCOTT MADISON

1996 ABCA THIRD TEAM

After missing all of 1995 due to elbow surgery, Madison returned to the mound and made an impact by beating some of America's top teams on his way to an 8-3 record and a 2.33 ERA which was ranked 15th in the country. Madison earned first team All-BIG EAST honors and was the most dominant pitcher in the conference from the beginning of the season to the end. He finished 1996 with eight complete games and a school-record four shutouts. His 92.2 innings was the second-highest total in school history. Madison finished his career with a .722 (17-5) winning percentage which ranks eighth all time. He owns Rutgers records for shutouts in a season with four.

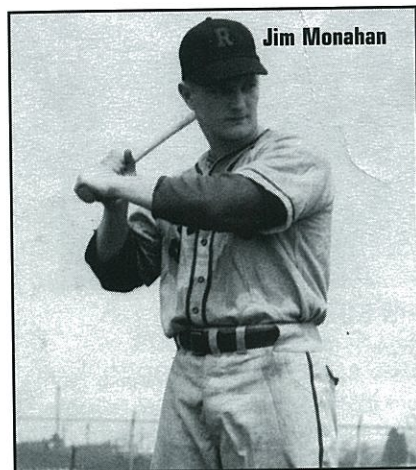

Billy McCarthy, from Washington Township, NJ, transferred to Rutgers in 2000 after two highly-successful seasons at Radford University. The move "back home" proved to be a beneficial decision for both RU and McCarthy. The junior right fielder batted a team-high .421 (20th best in the country) and added seven home runs, 21 doubles, 56 runs, 11 stolen bases and a team-high 65 RBI while playing exceptional defense and providing an all-out hustling style of play. His .421 average led the BIG EAST Conference. A First Team All-BIG EAST pick, McCarthy earned All-Tournament honors after an outstanding showing in the NCAA Regional in Lincoln, NE. At season's end, he was selected in the sixth round by the Atlanta Braves (195th overall) and signed a contract to play professionally.

The Scarlet left fielder led the team with a .400 batting average, 26 hits and 17 stolen bases. He was second on the team in home runs with 2 and RBI with 18. Appearing in all 17 games, he made just three errors. He was also a member of the 1950 College World Series team.

MIKE O'BRIEN

1997 LOUISVILLE SLUGGER FRESHMAN ALL-AMERICA

A designated hitter/first baseman, Mike O'Brien was named to the Louisville Slugger Freshman All-America team, as announced by Collegiate Baseball.

O'Brien appeared in 38 games for the Scarlet Knights starting 31. He batted .302 with 11 doubles, six home runs and 36 RBI. His six home runs were the most by an RU freshman since Angel Echevarria hit nine in 1990. He hit a robust .348 against the BIG EAST and was named to the BIG EAST All-Rookie team.

HARDING PETERSON

1950 AACBC FIRST-TEAM

Catcher Harding Peterson was the lone All-America choice from RU's 1950 College World Series team. Known for his defensive ability, he made just two errors behind the dish in 27 games. He hit a respectable .276 while driving in 23 runs which tied for second on the team.

JEFF TORBORG

1963 AACBC FIRST TEAM

A 1963 All-America choice, he set the school record for batting average (.537). His slugging percentage that year (1.032) is also a single-season standard. He led the 1963 Scarlet Knight team with 21 RBI and six home runs. In his three-year career, Torborg batted .390 and set the career slugging percentage mark at .684. In his career, the Scarlet Knights were 40-13-1.

RAY VAN CLEEF

1951 AACBC FIRST TEAM

Centerfielder Ray Van Cleef was chosen by American Association of College Baseball Coaches following his senior season where he batted .378, scored 22 runs and smacked two triples - all team-highs. He made just one error in center while playing in all 23 games. In 1950, Van Cleef paced the Scarlet with a lofty .404 average, 44 hits, 15 extra-base hits, 35 runs and 18 stolen bases. He was a first-team District II choice and the MVP of National Baseball Tournament.

PETE ZOCCOLILLO

1998 NCBWA THIRD-TEAM

1999 RAWLINGS/ABCA SECOND-TEAM

Zoccolillo, one of three players to earn All-America honors in two consecutive seasons, was named to the 1998 NCBWA Third Team, 1999 NCBWA Third Team and Rawlings/ABCA Second Team during his final two seasons. In 1998, Zoccolillo was the team's top offensive threat, slugging a club record 12 home runs while knocking in 59 runs and batting .387. He followed up his outstanding 1998 season with a record-breaking 1999, setting 10 school records and two BIG EAST marks while leading Rutgers to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances. He left the Rutgers baseball program as the all-time leader in eight offensive categories and the single-season leader in two others.

RUTGERS 1950 COLLEGE WORLD SERIES GAME-BY-GAME RECAP

The Scarlet Knights opened play on Thursday, June 15 in the opening game of the tournament against defending national champion Texas (22-5)... Texas took a 2-0 lead in the second on Frank Womack's two-run homer, and Murray Wall pitched six shutout innings before giving up a run in the seventh... Trailing 2-1, Rutgers rallied to take the lead in the eighth, scoring three runs off Wall on three walks, two singles and an error... Wall walked home a run, and Rutgers first baseman Bob Suba stole home for another... Suba finished the game with three stolen bases, as Rutgers set a College World Series record with a total of seven for the game... Herman Hering steadied after giving up the early home run, and although he walked seven and struck out only one, he also allowed only three hits in going the distance for the win... Ray Van Cleef paced the attack, going three for four, as Rutgers won, 4-2.

Saturday, June 17, Rutgers faced Wisconsin in a second-round winner's bracket matchup before only 955 fans in steady drizzle... Tom Forster pitched a complete-game six-hitter, and Van Cleef went four-for-five with a double and a run scored to pace the Scarlet 5-3 win, and a 2-and-0 record in the tournament.

On Monday, June 19, Rutgers met Washington State in the winner's bracket final... The game was a terrific pitcher's duel between Al Willenbrock for Rutgers and Rod Keogh for the Cougars... Willenbrock gave up an early home run to Ted Tappe of the Cougars, but the Scarlet tied it in the fourth on a triple by Jim Monahan and an infield out... That would prove to be the only hit off Keogh, but he walked eight and was frequently in trouble... In the seventh, Rutgers loaded the bases, with Willenbrock up... without warning, (Rutgers later said it was not a called play), the runner on third tried to steal home and was tagged out... As he broke, the runner on second started toward third, then hesitated, and was eventually run down and tagged out to complete an unusual double play, killing the potential rally... In the top of the ninth, Washington State

loaded the bases with no outs... Don Paul grounded sharply to third baseman Steve Kalapos, who threw home for the force there... catcher Hardy Peterson then threw to first to double Paul, and Suba, the first baseman, then spotted Gordon Brunswick, the runner at second, trying to make a surprise dash to home... Suba threw back to Peterson, who tagged Brunswick to complete the triple play... It was the second of three triple plays in the CWS... In the top of the 10th, Washington State finally broke through on an outfield error, hit batter and a two-run double by Terry Carroll to take a 3-1 lead, and Keogh completed his one hitter by retiring the side in the bottom of the 10th... Washington State improved to 3-0, and Rutgers fell to 2-1... Van Cleef, after going seven-for-nine in the first two games was held to 0-for-5...

On Wednesday, June 21, Rutgers came back from its one-hit outing to blow out Wisconsin 16-2...The Scarlet collected 11 hits, including two apiece by four different players, and the Badgers unraveled, committing seven errors... (Van Cleef was 1-for-6)... Herman Hering turned in his second complete game win of the tournament, scattering eight hits, and also contributed a triple and a single to the 11-hit attack... Wisconsin was eliminated at 2-2, and Rutgers joined Texas and Washington State at 3-1 (Texas had beaten the Cougars, 12-1, on Tuesday). Washington State drew the bye into the championship game, and Rutgers faced Texas for the second time, on Thursday, June 22... The Scarlet went with second-round winner Tom Foster, but Texas knocked him out early, scoring three in the second, and five in the fourth on their way to a 15-9 win... Charlie Gorin went the distance for Texas, despite allowing 12 hits and nine runs, as the Longhorns out-hit Rutgers, 15-12...Texas went on to win the title over Washington State the next night, 3-0, while Rutgers finished third at 3-2... finishing the season at 17-4-1...Van Cleef was 2-for-4 in the final game to finish the CWS at .417 on 10-for-24, and was named the Most Outstanding Player.



RUTGERS HALL OF FAME

One of the oldest traditions at Rutgers University, the Scarlet Knight Baseball program has been successful for over 129 years. There have been 20 All-Americans, 12 trips to the NCAA Tournament and one trip to the College World Series. With all of this illustrious history, you can imagine that there have been several "special" players on "The Banks." Ten of those players have been selected to the Rutgers University Olympic Sports Hall of Fame which honors the best of the best in Rutgers' Sports. The baseball program has been represented in five of the last seven years - Eric Young (1999), Darrin Winston (2000), Matt Bolger (2001), Jim Monahan (2002) and Pete Zoccolillo (2004).

GLEN GARDNER '91

Gardner, one of the most prolific hitters in Rutgers baseball history, was elected after a stellar three-year career (1986-88), which saw him earn two All-America awards as well as collect a host of offensive records. Gardner, one of New Jersey's top all-time athletes, came to Rutgers from Immaculata High School, where he was a first-team All-State choice in both football and baseball. Following his freshman season, Gardner was named Freshman All-America by Baseball America. He was drafted after his sophomore season by the San Diego Padres in the 13th round of the Major League Baseball Amateur draft. He chose to stay at Rutgers for his junior season and that year set nine single-season offensive records and earned All-America honors from Collegiate Baseball. He was a three-time Atlantic 10 choice and a three-time New Jersey College Baseball Association honoree. Following his junior season, Gardner was drafted by the Atlanta Braves and he began a professional career in that organization. He ended his career as the Rutgers all-time leader in six offensive categories and ranked in the top 10 in four others.

PETE HALL '62

Hall is one of only two Scarlet Knights to twice earn All-American honors (1961 and 1962) in baseball. During his three letter-winning years (1960-62), the Scarlet Knights were 40-14-1. The former third baseman holds fifth place on the career batting average chart (.384) and second place on the career slugging average chart (.612) in the Scarlet Knight record book. Hall was a 1961 draft pick of the New York Yankees. Hall was the Upstream Award winner in 1962. In 1961, he led the team in hitting (.397), runs (21), hits (31), RBI (30) and made just five errors in starting every game.

HARDING PETERSON '50

Peterson, the backstop for the 1950 Rutgers College World Series team, was a second-team All-America selection by the American Baseball Coaches Association and a first-team District II choice that year, as well. Known for his defensive ability, Peterson made just two errors in 27 games in 1950 while hitting .276 (27-98), with 21 runs, 23 RBI (second on team), 4 doubles and 2 triples. His best season as a collegian was in 1948, when he hit for a .312 average (10-32) with 7 RBI and 3 doubles. In his three varsity seasons, Peterson led his teams to a combined 57-16-2 record, highlighted by a third-place finish in the 1950 College World Series. Following his career at Rutgers, Peterson signed as free agent with Pittsburgh Pirates in 1950 but had his career interrupted by Korean War service. Following the war, Peterson played four years with Pirates until a broken arm in a home plate collision hastened his retirement. A well-respected baseball man, Peterson spent over 30 years with the Pirates, including stints as a player (4 years), manager (9 years), farm director and scouting director. He was named VP for player personnel in 1976 and named executive VP in 1979 and is possibly best known for the trade of C Manny Sanguillen to Oakland A's for manager Chuck Tanner in 1976. His dealings helped bring the Pirates their World Series Championship in 1979. Peterson also spent two years with the Yankees - and was a Co-General Manager in 1990 and two more years with San Diego as a scout.

JEFF TORBORG '63

Jeff Torborg was a 1963 All-American and set the school record for season batting average (.537) that year, which was the national leading average for 100 at bats and under. His .537 average was the highest ever recorded up to that time and since then, only two college players have hit for a better average. His slugging percentage that year (1.032) is also a single-season standard. In 1963, he led the team with 21 RBI and six home runs. A draft choice of the Los Angeles Dodgers, he played 10 seasons in the major, seven with the Dodgers and three with the California Angels. He caught three no-hitters, a perfect game with Sandy Koufax and another no-hitter with Bill Singer of the Dodgers and Nolan Ryan of the Angels; and was the backstop in Don Drysdale's record fifth straight shutout in 1968. He was a successful manager with the Chicago White Sox, the Cleveland Indians and the New York Mets, winning the Baseball Writer's Association, Associated Press, United Press International and The Sporting News Manager of the Year award. In his three-year career from 1961-63, the Westfield, NJ native batted .390, his number (#10) was retired in 1992. He still holds the career slugging percentage mark of .684. During his career, the Knights were 15-4-1, 14-4 and 11-5 for a three-year mark of 40-13-1 (.741 winning percentage).

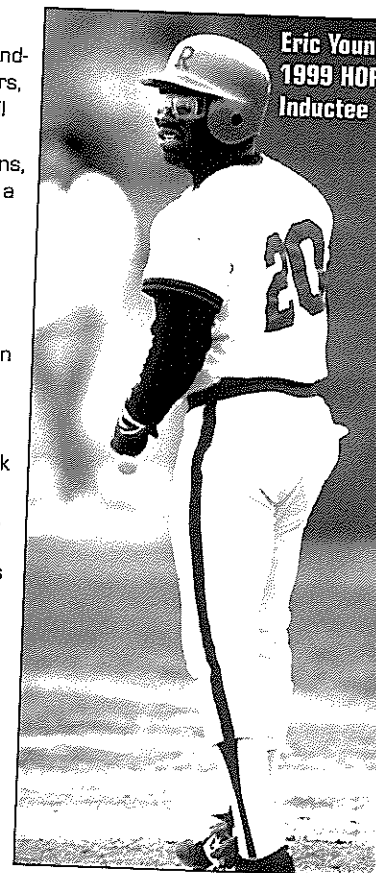
RAY VAN CLEEF '52

Van Cleef was a two-time All-American in baseball, garnering first-team accolades from the American Association of College Baseball Coaches in 1950 and 1951. In the process, he became the first Eastern player to repeat as an All-American. A veteran of two NCAA Tournaments, he was the starting centerfielder on the 1950 Rutgers team which advanced to the College World Series. He batted .458 (11-24) in the series en route to MVP honors, while leading the Knights to a co-runner-up finish. Van Cleef batted .404 that season, his junior year, and followed it up with a .378 mark in 1951. He currently ranks second in career batting average at Rutgers. He set the Rutgers single season record for triples with seven in 1950 and stands second in career triples with 13. Van Cleef is also third in career slugging percentage with a .806 mark. The Knights were 50-21-2 his three varsity years. He also won three letters in basketball and one in soccer.

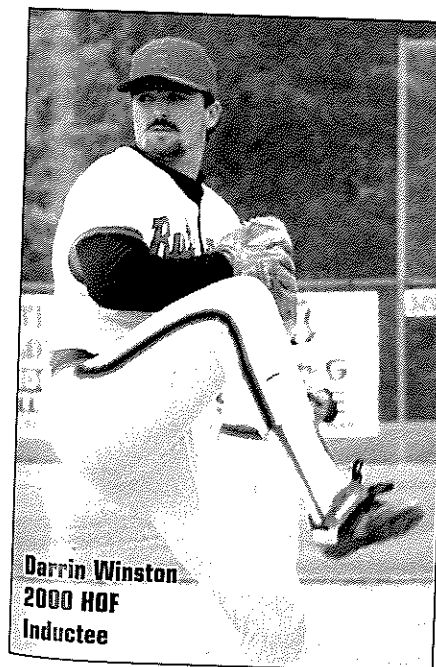


ERIC YOUNG '89

Eric Young was a two-sport standout (football, baseball) at Rutgers, earning three letters in baseball (1987-89). Young batted over .300 in each of his three seasons, including a career high .337 as a senior in 1989. During his career on the diamond, Young was a two-time Atlantic-10 All-Conference selection and led Rutgers to an Atlantic-10 Championship and NCAA berth in 1988. Young graduated from Rutgers as the career runs, triples and stolen base leader, setting a then single-season mark with 28 thefts in 1989. At the conclusion of his Rutgers career, Young was the recipient of the Coursen Award in 1989 and was selected by the Los Angeles Dodgers in the 1989 amateur draft. Young made his major league debut with the Colorado Rockies in 1993 and was selected to the 1995 All-Star game. A nine-year major league veteran with a .289 career average, Young is the starting second baseman for the Chicago Cubs.

DARRIN WINSTON

Darrin Winston received his nod in 2000. Winston was a four-year letterwinner at Rutgers from 1985-88, and concluded his career as one of Rutgers' all-time winningest pitchers. A left-hander, Winston was a three-time team MVP, and led the Scarlet Knights to two berths in the NCAA Tournament, as well as the 1988 Atlantic 10 Championship. He was an all-region selection in 1988 after posting a 10-4 record with a 3.74 ERA, and was the MVP of the A-10 Tournament that year. At the time of his induction, Winston was the Rutgers leader in several statistical categories, including

career wins (26), career innings pitched (278), career strikeouts (176), career complete-games (8), and single-season wins (10). Originally from Woodbridge, NJ, Winston was drafted by the Montreal Expos and later pitched in the major leagues for the Philadelphia Phillies.



MATT BOLGER, HEAD COACH

Matt Bolger spent 22 years at the head coach of the Scarlet Knights baseball team, compiling a record of 288-245-7 during his career. A 2001 Olympic Sports Hall of Fame Inductee, Bolger led Rutgers to three NCAA Tournaments in a five-year span from 1966-1970, and posted his best season in 1961, when the Scarlet Knights finished with a 15-4-1 record. A two-time Coach of the Year honoree by the New Jersey Collegiate Baseball Association, Bolger mentored several major league draft picks, including former first-round pick Jeff Torborg. A past President of the American Association of College Baseball Coaches, Bolger is a member of the AACBC Hall of Fame, as well as the Newark Hall of Fame and the St. Benedict's Prep Hall of Fame. Bolger, who coached at Rutgers from 1961 through 1983, was the school's all-time winningest coach in any sport at the time of his retirement.

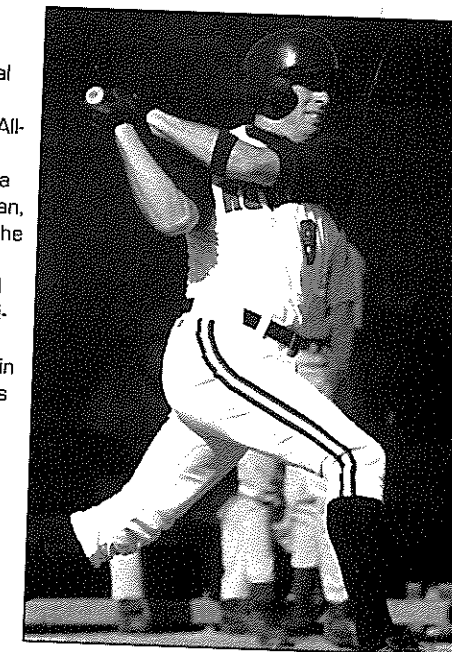
JIM MONAHAN ('52)

Jim Monahan was a key member of the 1950 Rutgers baseball team which advanced to the College World Series for the first and only time in school history. Monahan was among the offensive leaders in five categories in 1950, while his best season came in 1952. That year, Monahan earned First Team All-East and First Team All-America honors after hitting .400 with a team-high 17 stolen bases and 18 RBI, second-best on the team. Rutgers enjoyed a 41-19-1 record during his four seasons, including a 17-4-1 mark during that memorable 1950 campaign.

** 2004 INDUCTEE **

PETE ZOCCOLILLO ('00)

When Pete Zoccolillo left Rutgers in 1999, he held 10 career and single-season records, including career hits, RBI, home runs and total bases. A four-year starter, he earned All-BIG EAST honors each year and was a two-time All-American, leading Rutgers to the 1998 BIG EAST Regular Season and Tournament championship and NCAA Tournament berths in 1998 and 1999. As a senior in 1999, he set the school and BIG EAST single-season record with 72 RBI, while hitting .418. Drafted by the Chicago Cubs in 1999, he made his Major League debut with the Milwaukee Brewers in 2003 and was a AAA All-Star in 2004 as a member of the Oklahoma City Red Hawks. He has since signed a free agent contract with the St. Louis Cardinals. He played for the Cardinals' AAA affiliate Memphis Redbirds last season, hitting .261 with nine home runs and 34 RBI in 79 games.

MAJEWSKI GOES FROM LITTLE-KNOWN WALK-ON TO CAMDEN YARDS OUTFIELD

The story of Val Majewski's rise from walk-on to MLB draft pick during his Rutgers career is well-chronicled and his story is one that is heard annually in college baseball. Majewski falls into the category of players who improve dramatically during their college years. Even more impressive than his rise at Rutgers has been his rise through the Baltimore Orioles farm system. Drafted in June of 2002, it took Majewski just over two years to make his debut in a Baltimore Orioles uniform, following two-plus outstanding seasons in the minor leagues.

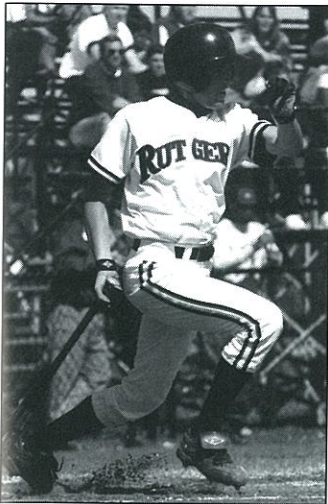
"Playing at Rutgers was a great experience because Coach Hill places such a huge emphasis on the fundamentals," said Majewski. "Sometimes, it can seem a bit repetitive, but when you get to the pros and see all the guys around you who don't have good fundamentals, you appreciate it really quickly. I think my fundamentals and baseball instincts are a direct result of playing at Rutgers under Coach Hill and the way he runs his program."

Recently named the Orioles' Minor League Player of the Year, Majewski had his stint in Baltimore cut short due to injury, but had enough of a taste to work tirelessly for a return in 2005. Now fully healthy, Majewski has his sights set on a speedy return to the big leagues.

"Looking back on my high school days, I is definitely strange to think about a time when no one except Rutgers was really interested in me," said Majewski. "My parents and coaches always told me to work hard and that I needed to earn things in life. I am thankful for that. Playing professional baseball is always something I've wanted to do and I know better than anyone how fortunate I am right now."



DEJESUS TURNING INTO A MAJOR LEAGUE STAR



From the time he arrived in Piscataway as a skinny freshman in the fall of 1997, David DeJesus played with the natural grace of someone destined for big things. The way he ran the bases, the way he threw and the fluidity of his swing made DeJesus a real-life "Natural".

As a freshman in 1998, DeJesus earned All-Rookie honors from the BIG EAST and helped lead Rutgers to its first-ever BIG EAST Regular Season and Tournament Championship. On a team laden with seniors, DeJesus fit right in, hitting .297 overall (.310 in BIG EAST games) in 39 starts. Those close to the program were well-aware of DeJesus' talents, but word began to spread quickly around the East Coast.

As a sophomore in 1999, DeJesus rewrote the Rutgers and BIG EAST record books, crossing the plate a school and conference-record 85 times in 58 games, while hitting .373 with 20 doubles, six triples, eight home runs, 45 RBI and 20 stolen bases from the leadoff spot.

After venturing to the Cape Cod League in the summer of 1999, where he earned All-Star honors, DeJesus returned to Rutgers as a junior in 2000 and was among the most closely-watched outfielders in the country by Major League Baseball scouts. Another stellar season (.368, 21 doubles, 2 home runs, 37 RBI, 18 stolen bases) was cut short by injury in the NCAA Tournament, but not before DeJesus led the Scarlet Knights to the BIG EAST Regular Season and Tournament championships.

In the opening game of the NCAA Regional at Upper Montclair, hosted by Rutgers, DeJesus collided with the Army second baseman on a steal attempt, fracturing a bone in his forearm. He missed the remainder of the weekend, as Rutgers bowed out of the NCAA Tournament in just three games with its offensive catalyst on the bench.

Despite the injury, DeJesus was drafted in the fourth round by the Kansas City Royals, although he did not play during his first pro season, instead letting his arm fully heal. Ready to return for the 2001 season, DeJesus tore a ligament in his throwing arm during spring training and was forced to undergo "Tommy John" surgery, sending him to the sidelines once again.

"It was really frustrating for me to not play right away and deal with so many injuries," said DeJesus, while accepting his American League Rookie of the Year Award at the annual New Jersey Sportswriters Luncheon.

Fully healed yet again in 2002, DeJesus embarked on his professional career just a few short miles from New Jersey - with the Class A Wilmington Blue Rocks in Wilmington, DE. Joined on the Blue Rocks' roster by fellow Scarlet Knight Darren Fenster, DeJesus didn't miss a beat, hitting .296 and earning Carolina League All-Star honors before earning a promotion to the Wichita Wranglers, the Royals' AA affiliate, where he hit .253 in 25 games.

"Dave came back and picked up right where he left off," said Fenster, who remains in the Royals system. "He was so sharp right from the start and had a big year in Wilmington. I think he really opened a lot of people's eyes with how natural he looked after basically missing two years."

Displaying the same natural swing and athleticism that made him a highly-coveted prospect with the Scarlet Knights, DeJesus returned to Wichita to start the 2003 season and hit .338 in 17 games before moving up to AAA Omaha, where he hit .298 in 59 games before earning a promotion to Kansas City when the rosters expanded in 2004, although

he missed some time with a shoulder injury sustained in spring training. In the middle of a pennant race, DeJesus played in just 12 games, with seven at bats, but got a taste of what lied ahead.

"It was great to be with the team during the pennant race," said DeJesus. "There were some pretty intense games down the stretch."

The offseason in Kansas City was spent dealing with Carlos Beltran trade rumors - with DeJesus as his replacement in centerfield. DeJesus started the 2004 season in Omaha but was called up in late April to fill a void in left field. Things, for the first time in DeJesus' career, did not go according to plan as he struggled along with just one hit in 23 at bats (.043) before heading back to Omaha.

"That was tough to deal with," said DeJesus. "I just couldn't get on track and began to press. When I went back to Omaha, it took me a while to relax but once I did, I started to hit again and things fell back into place."

Following the trade of Beltran to the Astros, DeJesus was recalled once again and handed the starting centerfield job - with no pressure or worry of someone else taking his playing time. He thrived in his second tour with the Royals, hitting .359 in August and earning rave reviews for his plate discipline, defense and hustle. DeJesus found a home in centerfield for the Royals, although his path there was one he is more than happy to leave behind.

"Between the injuries and the horrible start in 2004, I think I grew as a person and as a player," said DeJesus. "I learned a lot about the game, but more importantly, I learned a lot about myself. Playing through injuries and adversity makes you stronger and the second time I was more prepared for the challenges."

DeJesus returns as the Royals' starting center fielder this season, after a stellar 2005 campaign in his first full season as the Royals' starter. He ranked fourth among all Major League center fielders last season with a .293 batting average. The mark was also the second highest on the team. He ranked fourth on the Royals roster in RBI with 56, despite spending the majority of the season as the club's leadoff hitter. DeJesus played in 122 games, leading the team with six triples and finishing second on the club with 69 runs scored. He also clubbed nine home runs in 2005. Defensively, DeJesus recorded just four errors in 306 chances last season, finishing with .987 fielding percentage - the highest by a Royals outfielder in five years.

Most baseball pundits predict a long and productive career in the Major Leagues. And for those who witnessed DeJesus' development during his years at Rutgers, no one should be surprised.

ZOCOLILLO TO COMPETE IN
WORLD BASEBALL CLASSIC


Former Rutgers baseball All-American Pete Zoccolillo will join a number of Major League Baseball All-Stars in the World Baseball Classic. Zoccolillo, who starred at Rutgers from 1996-1999, was selected to play for the Italian team in the event. The tournament will pit the best baseball players from around the globe against one another, from March 3-20.

"This is a great opportunity," said Zoccolillo. "I am excited to be selected to play in this prestigious tournament and represent the country of my family's heritage. I will play against the best players in the world. It is a great experience that is run by the best in the business."

Zoccolillo, who spent this winter working out at both Rutgers and a facility in Randolph, NJ, joined his Italian team for an abbreviated training at the Detroit Tigers facility, beginning February 21. The Italian team will play an exhibition game against the Tigers on March 3 as a final tune-up before opening play in the World Baseball Classic.

He is part of an Italian team that includes David Dellucci, Mike Piazza, Frank Catalanotto, Matt Mantei and Mike DiFelice, among others with Major League Baseball experience.

Zoccolillo, who played for the St. Louis Cardinals' Class AAA affiliate Memphis Redbirds last summer, recently signed a free agent contract with the Colorado Rockies and will report to spring training with the club in Arizona once his duties at the World Baseball Classic are completed. He made his major league debut during the 2003 season, playing in 20 games with the Milwaukee Brewers. Zoccolillo was originally drafted by the Chicago Cubs following the 1999 season and was traded to the Brewers in 2001.



"The event will be heavily scouted and I am hoping to open some eyes with my play," Zoccolillo added. "I will be playing on the center stage of the world."

At Rutgers, Zoccolillo was a three-time All-BIG EAST First Team honoree and a two-time All-American. He graduated as the team's career or single-season leader in 10 offensive categories and still leads in career RBI (191) and single-season RBI (72). He posted a .376 career batting average at Rutgers and is second all-time in hits (285) and home runs (32). As a senior in 1999, Zoccolillo batted .418 with 22 doubles, 12 home runs and 72 RBI.

"I am proud to represent Rutgers on an international stage," said Zoccolillo. "I am still close with several of my former teammates there and remain close with the coaching staff. A lot of Rutgers players have been drafted since I was there and many guys are having success in the professional ranks."

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THE BIG EAST CONFERENCE



The BIG EAST Conference moves into 2005-06 with an emphasis on the word "Big" as the league becomes the largest Division I-A conference in the nation with 16 outstanding academic and athletic institutions. The goal of the BIG EAST has always been to compete at the highest level and to do so with integrity and sportsmanship.

In 2005-06, the league welcomes five new members: University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 33 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Milwaukee and Cincinnati. With the incoming members, the BIG EAST markets will contain almost one fourth of all television households in the U.S.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 25 national championships in six different sports and 123 student-athletes have won individual national titles. Last year, Providence's Kim Smith won the NCAA women's cross country championship. The Notre Dame women's soccer team took the 2004 national title.

The BIG EAST has always been able to boast that some of its best students are also some of its best athletes. More than 300 student-athletes have earned Academic All-America honors.

In 2003-04, three BIG EAST student-athletes were named the national scholar-athletes of the year in their respective sports - Connecticut's Emeka Okafor in men's basketball, Notre Dame's Vanessa Pruzinsky in women's soccer and St. John's Chris Wingert in men's soccer.

BIG EAST student-athletes also have continued their success after leaving the classrooms and playing fields. Former Connecticut women's basketball standout Dr. Leigh Curl was inducted into the Academic All-America Hall of Fame in 1999. Former Georgetown men's basketball star Dikembe Mutombo was named a winner of the President's Service Award, the highest honor in the U.S. for volunteer service.

The BIG EAST continues to thrive in the basketball arena. In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA titles in the same season. With the Syracuse men and the UConn women grabbing NCAA crowns the previous year, the BIG EAST also became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in consecutive seasons. In fact, the BIG EAST has won five of the last six women's basketball crowns and three of the last seven men's titles.

Whether it's the student-athletes or the league as a whole, moving proactively has been a consistent strategy for the conference that was formed in 1979. The Big East has continually turned challenges into opportunities to bolster its strength.

In the spring of 2001, the BIG EAST added women's lacrosse and rowing to its growing list of sports. The inaugural women's golf championship was held in the spring of 2003.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse Universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. The BIG EAST Conference has enjoyed a leadership role nationally. Its student athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably show a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization needs outstanding leadership. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Dave Gavitt, moved into the Commissioner's chair in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student athletes. The conference has enjoyed long-standing relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC.

While BIG EAST basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden, attendance figures also are significant at BIG EAST soccer, women's basketball and baseball games.

More than 500 BIG EAST athletes have earned All America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals in each of the last five summer Olympiads.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,500 athletes in 23 sports.

THE BIG EAST BASEBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

The BIG EAST Conference, in conjunction with Minor League Baseball's Clearwater Threshers, announced that the 2006 BIG EAST Conference Baseball Championship will be held at Bright House Networks Field in Clearwater, FL. Bright House Networks Field is the Spring Training home of Major League Baseball's Philadelphia Phillies and is also home to the Clearwater Threshers - the Philadelphia Phillies' Class A Affiliate. The 2006 BIG EAST Baseball Championship will take place on May 23-28.

The BIG EAST increased its baseball membership to 12 teams in 2006 with the addition of the University of Cincinnati, University of Louisville and University of South Florida. The league's top eight teams based on regular-season finish in the conference standings will qualify for the double-elimination event. The tournament champion receives the league's automatic bid to the 2006 NCAA Division I Baseball Championship.

"The BIG EAST Conference is extremely excited to be bringing its 2006 Baseball Championship to the beautiful city of Clearwater and to a state-of-the-art facility like Bright House Networks Field," BIG EAST Commissioner Michael Tranghese said. "We are looking forward to our association with the Clearwater Threshers and with an outstanding organization like the Philadelphia Phillies."

Bright House Networks Field, which opened its doors in 2004, is a fan-friendly ballpark with a capacity of 8,500. The ballpark distinguishes itself with a 360-degree main concourse, grass berm seating, and a tiki-hut pavilion in left field. The stadium also includes group picnic areas, a children's play area, and a state-of-the-art video scoreboard.

The BIG EAST Baseball Championship had been held at Commerce Bank Ballpark in Bridgewater, N.J. - home of the Atlantic League of Professional Baseball's Somerset Patriots - for the last six years.

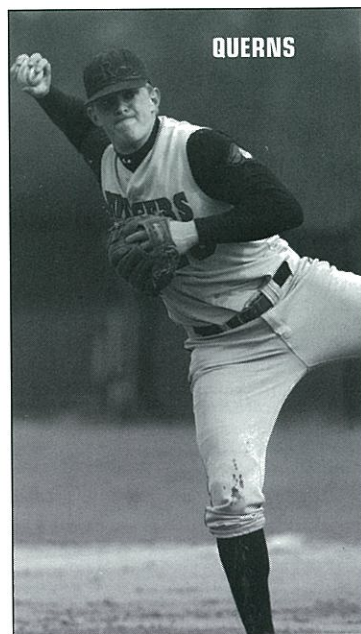

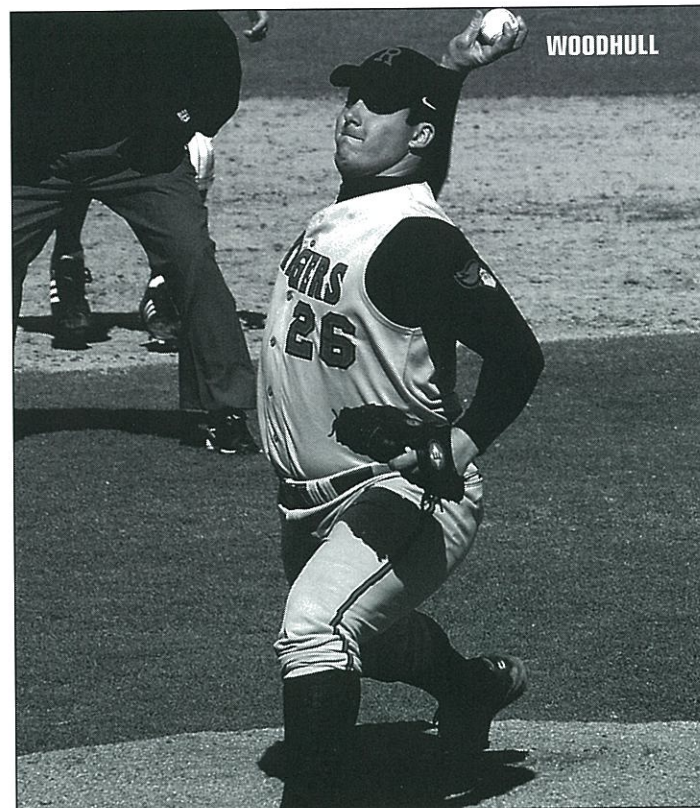

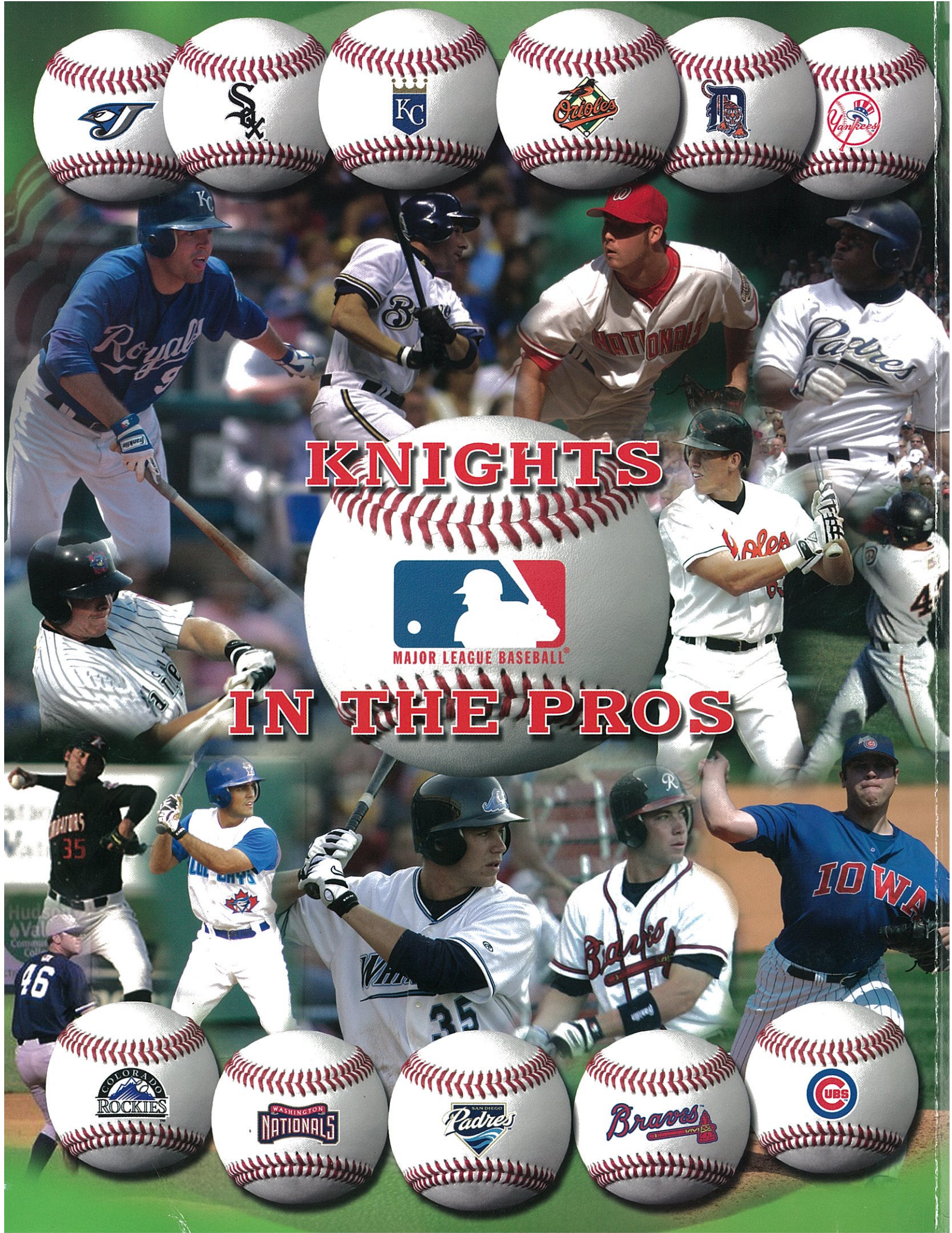
