Take Verrazano Bridge and Outerbridge Crossing into New Jersey. Follow signs to Route 287 North. Follow above directions.

FROM SOUTH JERSEY **VIA GARDEN STATE PARKWAY:**

Leave Parkway North at Exit 127. Follow signs to Route 287 North and follow directions above.







Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, with over 49,000 students on seven campuses in New Brunswick, Piscataway, Newark, and Camden, is one of the major state university systems in the nation. Chartered in 1766 as Queen's College, the eighth institution of higher learning to be founded in the colonies before the revolutionary war, it opened its doors in New Brunswick in 1771 with one instructor, one sophomore, and a handful of freshmen.

In 1825, the name of the college was changed to Rutgers to honor the former trustee and revolutionary war veteren Colonel Henry Rutgers. Rutgers College became the land-grant institution of New Jersey in 1864, and, in the same year, the trustees established Rutgers Scientific School, granting the B.S. degree. In 1880, the State Experiment Station for agricultural research was organized, and, in 1914, engineering was granted separate status as the College of Engineering. In 1921, the College of Agriculture (renamed Cook College in 1973) drew together the State Experiment Station, resident instruction, and the Extension programs.

Douglass College was established in 1918 as the New Jersey College for Women. In 1924, the School of Education, which later became the Graduate School of Education, was authorized, as was the title Rutger University. In 1926, the University Extension Service (now known as the Division of Continuing Education) was organized. The College of Pharmacy, which was founded in 1892, joined the university in 1927. In 1934, University College was established for adult evening students, with branches in New Brunswick and Newark.


In 1945, the state legislature affirmed state support for the university, and the entire institution was "collectively designated as the State University of New Jersey." In 1956, it became Rutgers – The State University.

The university expanded significantly in the forties and fifties in Newark and Camden. The University of Newark became a part of Rutgers in 1946, adding the Newark College of Arts and Sciences, the School of Law – Newark, and a school of business administration (now the Graduate School of Management) to the university system. In 1956, the College of Nursing was organized in Newark. In 1950, the College of South Jersey in Camden was incorporated into the Rutgers structure as the Camden College of Arts and Sciences and the School of Law – Camden, and a University College branch was set up.

Since the 1950's Rutgers University has continued to grow, especially in the area of graduate education. The Graduate Faculty became the Graduate School in 1952 and since that time the following graduate schools have been established: the Graduate School of Library and information Studies (formerly the Graduate School of Library Service) in 1953; the Graduate School of Social Work in 1954; the School of Criminal Justice (Newark) in 1974; and the Graduate School of Applied and Professional Psychology in 1974. Also in 1974, the Graduate Faculty of Rutgers – Newark received degree-granting authority, and, in 1981, the Graduate School – Camden became a separate unit. In addition, numerous specialized institutes and research centers have been established over the years.

At the undergraduate level, Livingston College was founded in 1969, emphasizing the urban environment. In 1976, the Mason Gross School of the Arts was established offering both undergraduate and graduate programs.

Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, will continue to grow, its direction dictated by the needs of the society it serves.



Edward J. Bloustein, the 17th president of Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, is a philosopher, lawyer, scholar and political activist.

Inaugurated as president of one of the largest universities in the country in 1971, he resolved to maintain a university "where men and women of good will may join together in restoring confidence in the institution of reason," calling the university a place "where reason resides."

Despite the vortex of campus tensions over the Vietnamese War, civil rights, university organization and traditional education, despite student protests and disruptions at Rutgers and nationwide, Dr. Bloustein worked to reinforce the role of reason within the University.

From the time of his inauguration, he has been outspoken about the role of the university, civil rights, women's rights, the difference between dissent and disruption, and about the mission of Rutgers in serving a new, more urban and more heterogeneous student population. In recent years, he has advocated a new partnership between the University and developing high technology industries in New Jersey.

Dr. Bloustein, who attended James Monroe High School in the Bronx, was also educated at New York University's Washington Square College where he was a Phi Beta Kappa graduate in 1948. He went on to earn a Bachelor of Philosophy degree at Wadham College of Oxford University in 1950, attending Oxford as a Fulbright Scholar. He earned a Ph.D. in philosophy at Cornell and a J.D. degree from the Cornell School of Law in 1959.

Between 1965 and his inaugural at Rutgers, he was president of Bennington College, a small, highly regarded experimental liberal arts college in Vermont.

Recently, Dr. Bloustein took on the leadership of a national project to examine the purpose of State Research Universities in the 21st century. He did so as part of his current chairmanship of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges.

Throughout his tenure, he has expressed his moral, ethical and educational philospohies openly and clearly through public statements and organizational commitments.

When Dr. Bloustein was about to assume the presidency of Rutgers, a local newspaper editorial noted that "the presidency of Rutgers, The State University, is an island of controversy surrounded by rebellious students, an independent faculty, a strong-willed governor, an ambitious bureaucracy, ax-wielding legislatures and a pinch-penny system of taxation."

Many aspects of that portrait have moderated in the past 16 years, but the role of the Rutgers president is still difficult.

Dr. Bloustein is married to Dr. Ruth Ellen (Steinman), a pediatrician, and they are the parents of two daughters, Elise and Lori.

"Rutgers University is building an athletic program of quality and distinction of its academic programs. This is our commitment to the elements of educational philosophy with roots as far back as Plato and Aristotle. Rutgers is dedicated to educating the whole person, mind and body.

"At a time when New Jerseyans are demonstrating more and more pride in their state, I am convinced that they are proud of the successes of Rutgers athletics, both in men's and women's sports. They expect and deserve academic and athletic performances by The State University that places us among the best in the nation.

"If we challenge our student-athletes to compete with the best, both in the workplace and in sports, then they deserve the best in the quality of teaching, coaching and physical facilities. Rutgers is determined to provide them."

FREDERICK E. GRUNINGER - DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Fred Gruninger, who assumed the position of Director of Athletics at Rutgers in January of 1973, oversees an athletic program which consists of 16 men's and 16 women's sports on the NCAA Division I-A level.

Under Gruninger's guidance, the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics, as well as the Rutgers athletic reputation, has grown significantly. During his tenure as director of athletics, Rutgers teams have enjoyed tremendous success. Most recently, the 1985-86 season saw four Rutgers squads participate in post-season play — women's basketball, women's soccer, baseball, and men's lacrosse. In addition, strong individual and team showings by the men's soccer, women's golf, field hockey, men's and women's tennis, wrestling, and women's lacrosse teams highlighted a close to .600 winning percentage campaign.

The recognizability of the Rutgers athletics name has also grown under his direction. Since Gruninger assumed responsibility for the Rutgers program, The State University has been the host institution for numerous regional and national intercollegitate and professional sporting events. Highlighting these events is the hosting of the NCAA East Regional Baseketball Tournament, in conjunction with the New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority at the Meadowlands Arena, for an unprecedented four consecutive years. Also, the 1986-87 year will see Rutgers host the NCAA Lacrosse Championship in May—the second time Rutgers will do so. These and several conference end-of-season championships, along with the U.S. Women's Indoor Tennis Championship, have led to the added exposure of the Rutgers name.

During his tenure, major renovations, expansion and new construction programs to enhance and upgrade athletic facilities have taken place. The Athletic Center and the adjacent field complex have brought life and support to the men's and women's basketball teams, the baseball and softball squads, and the women's lacrosse and field hockey teams.

The Stadium Athletic Complex is presently undergoing a major addition to the stadium, in addition to the already expanded athletic field complex. Indoor and outdoor synthetic practice and competition areas have been completed and the new stadium training center/football office/athletic and academic classroom facility will be completed in the spring of 1987.

The finished products, and the soon-to-be completed works will increase, immeasureably, the program support for both men and women student-athletes. Future plans include construction of a world class aquatic center as part of the Student Recreation Center, and the expansion of the University Boat House to meet the growing needs of the men's and women's crew programs. Other upgrading and expansion programs are underway.

Under Gruninger's direction, the University athletic awards system has broadened the recognition of the student-athlete for athletic and academic achievements. Special programs of awards are designed annually for all sports along with an annual recognition ceremony.


In 1968, Gruninger began his association with the Athletic Department when he was named Assistant Athletic Director. Three years later, he was appointed Associate Athletic Director.

In addition to his administrative duties, Gruninger coached the Scarlet Knights golf team from 1963-1972, recording a 109-30-2 mark and taking teams and individuals to a number of post-season tournaments.

The energetic and enthusiastic adminsitrator has held various offices in state, regional and national athletic organizations, including membership on the College Football Association's Board of Directors and the Director's Board of the Major Independent Football Association. Currently, Gruninger is a member of the NCAA Post-Season Football Committee and the Host Committee of the Kickoff Classic. Additionally, he was a co-organizer of the Collegiate Athletic Administration of New Jersey (CAANJ), and organization founded to serve and foster relations among the 42 four-year and two-year colleges in the state which compete in men's and women's athletics.

Gruninger has involved himself in numerous local and state charitable and athletic endeavors. He has served as a member of the Boards of Directors for the Raritan Valley Chamber of Commerce, the Heart Fund and Multiple Sclerosis Fund. He was also a member of the Township Greenacres Committee and continues to serve on the tournament committee of the New Jersey Golf Association.

A native of Fanwood, NJ, and currently a resident of Martinsville, NJ, Gruninger and his wife, Barbara, are the parents of two sons — Mark, who will receive a graduate degree in Ceramic Engineering from Rutgers in the spring, and Jack, a student-athlete at the University of Virginia. Daughter Katherine is a 1985 graduate of Lafayette College and co-captained the women's basketball team during her senior year.



1987 RUTGERS SCARLET KNIGHTS PREVIEW

1987 OUTLOOK

In each of the last two seasons, Fred Hill's Scarlet Knights have established Rutgers records for wins in a season. The 1985 campaign saw Rutgers go 25-15 and, in 1986, the Scarlet Knights went 28-18, won the Atlantic 10 Conference Championship and advanced to the NCAA Tournament.

So what do you do for an encore?

"I don't think we can go into the year saying that we are going to win the conference or go to the NCAA's" says the fourth year Scarlet Knight coach. "What we have to do is play better defense than we did last year and get the type of consistency we need from our pitchers. If we can do those things, then I feel we have a chance to, at least, match last season's success."

Hill returns everyone from last year's recordbreaking team, including Atlantic 10 Tournament MVP Sam Ferretti and All-Conference selections Glen Gardner and Joe Lynch, who also gained All-America honors from **Baseball America** as well. Add to that group top pitchers Darrin Winston and Bob MacDonald and the Scarlet Knights "have a chance to, at least, match last season's success."

The schedule includes some of the top teams in the country. The Scarlet Knights will play three games at William & Mary and three games against North Carolina at Chapel Hill before travel-

ling to Florida for a nine-game road trip. In the Sunshine State, the Scarlet Knights will battle College World Series participants Miami and Maine (2) along with Southern Illinois (2), LaSalle, St. Thomas, and Florida International (2).

"Our overall schedule is the toughest it has ever been," says Hill. "with additional games against Maine, Southern Illinois, LaSalle and William & Mary, it is certainly a tough schedule."

The Atlantic 10 schools will see a new format this season with each team playing divisional foes in two weekend doubleheader instead of the previous three game series. "The league will be a real dogfight," says Hill. "With four games each weekend, you'll have to be deep in pitching and play very well defensively to sweep a series."



As all baseball people say, to have a good team one has to have good pitching. Rutgers is no exception to the rule - kind of.

If one looks at last season's statistics, the first thing that pops up is a staff ERA of 6.01, almost one full run higher than 1985. However, statistics can be very deceiving and this could be a case of strong deception. Last season, the Rutgers pitching staff gave up quite a few runs early, 113 through the first 13 games (8.7 runs per game), and not less than six runs in any of those games, to be exact. However, over the last 33 games, Rutgers limited opponents to just 178 runs (5.4 runs per game).

"We're always going to have problems early in the year with our pitching staff because the teams we play have played more games than we have at that early point of the season," says Hill. "It appears that the pitching isn't there but it really isn't as bad as the statistics indicate".

As the season progressed, the staff became stronger and, by season's end, the rotation had gelled.

This season everyone is a year older and with that year under the staff's belt, the problems of pitching should be less harsh. Leading the Rutgers starters are MacDonald, Winston, and Gluck. "We think our pitching should be relatively strong with the experience we have now," boasts Hill

The only senior in the starting rotation, Mac-Donald will be the leader of the staff. Last spring, the southpaw had his best season as a Scarlet hurler. His heartbreaking 7-6 loss to the Univeristy of Miami earlier in the year displayed his true talents. The Lavallette native pitched well in every outing. In fact, opposing teams managed to hit only .248 against him, the lowest among Scarlet pitchers. During the fall, MacDonald threw faster and had better control of all his pitches than he ever had before.

Winston will secure the second spot in the rotation. Last year, the southpaw started poorly losing to Creighton (14-1) and Maine (14-10). In the two defeats the highly touted pitcher from Edison lasted just 3 2/3 innings. However, his season quickly turned around when the Knights returned to the Garden State. Winston went on a tear winning seven straight. What was even more remarkable was the fact that all seven wins were of the complete game fashion — quite a turnaround from his 7 1/3 innings of work in Florida. Winston finished the year as the Scarlet Knights leader in both wins and complete games. The coaching staff hopes Winston will continue where he left off last season.





Gluck turned in another solid year going 6-4 while leading the Scarlet staff in strikeouts with 48. Gluck, known as a control pitcher, kept hitters off stride with good control of his breaking pitches. The Montville native recorded five complete games, one of which was a win over West Virginia in the second round of the Atlantic 10 Tournament. One problem Gluck had was surrendering too many home runs, yielding 17 round trippers last year, 12 more than any other Scarlet pitcher.

Righthander Dave Bauer is the early pick for the fourth spot in the rotation but freshman Bob Fazekas (Pompton Plains) also has a shot. Bauer pitched well early in the year but suffered arm problems late and missed the homestretch of the season and post season play.

Last season, the bullpen was young and untested but it still managed to record five wins and five saves. This season, the pen is a year stronger which should add to their effectiveness. Marty O'Brien and Gary Geraghty, two big surprises in the 1986 campaign, will anchor pitching coach Norm Schoenig's relief staff. O'Brien, a sophomore, finished 1-0 with a team-high two saves. In 18 innings of work, the righty fanned 16 and held opponents to a .257 batting average.

Geraghty had a fine year, going 3-1, starting three games and appearing 10 times in relief. With Bauer out with an arm injury, Geraghty was called upon to step into the starting rotation and responded with two consecutive wins over Delaware, 9-3, pitching 7 2/3 innings and Rider, 5-1, hurling 8 2/3 innings.

With a year under his belt, Mike Greco will be looked upon for middle inning relief. The sophomore from Parsippany pitched six innings of three-hit ball in the Atlantic 10 Championship game against West Virginia.

Senior Len Sutton will provide much-needed experience out of the bullpen. The four-year letterwinner has 31 career appearences and a 4-2 overall record. Possessing good control and an excellent curveball, Sutton will be looked upon as the veteran of the relief corp.

Hitting

Last season the Scarlet Knights set a new record for season team batting average when they hit .326. With the entire team returning, the Scarlet offense should have no problem scoring runs. Last year, seven players hit over .300 and two players missed the .300 plateau by one and seven percentage points, respectively.

Leading the way will be Gary Resetar. Resetar had played two fall seasons before the 1986 spring

season. He missed the 1985 spring slate because of monoucleosis. But the catcher from Bayonne performed like a veteran. He hit .404 to lead the team in batting and drove in 35 runs. With a full spring season behind him, Resetar is expected to have an even better year at the plate.

There may not have been a better freshman in the East last year than Gardner. He hit .398 and drove in a team-high 45 runs. With his experience as a freshman, coach Hill sees nothing but improvement for the freshman All-American.

Joe Lynch, one of only four seniors on the '87 squad, had an exceptional year at the plate hitting .364 with 55 hits and 30 RBI's. As a designated hitter, Lynch adds both power and consistency to a very solid line-up. With Sam Ferretti (.309), Scott Trochim (.305), Paul Schwendel (.308), Paul Johnson (.299) and Mark Ozoroski (.277) rounding out the everday lineup, Rutgers will

certainly be lighting up the scoreboard again in 1987.

Defense

When an entire squad returns from a 28-18 NCAA Tournament team, there is not much a coach has to change to improve his ball club. Defense is no exception. The Scarlet defense concluded with a .965 fielding percentage committing 60 errors in 46 games. One of Rutgers strong points is the infield. Ferretti at second base and Ozoroski at short-stop give the Knights a solid double play combination. At the corners lie two of RU's best fielders in third baseman Trochim and first baseman Johnson.

The outfield will have plenty of experience with Schwendel roaming centerfield and Gardner playing left. With the absence of Steve Hooey, Seton Hall transfer Kevin Kerekas may find himself in the Knights' starting lineup.

Resetar emerged as one of the top catchers in the Atlantic 10 last season and will, again, be behind the plate. Lynch, normally the designated hitter, gives Hill an experienced back-up catcher. Catcher Gene Casaleggio saw limited time last year but with a year's experience, he may see more action. Sophomore Mike Haberman will also see some time behind the plate.

No one can blame Fred Hill for smiling just a little these days. After all, in just three seasons, he has transformed the Rutgers baseball program into one of the best in the East. Add the fact that the entire team from last season returns, it is safe to say the Scarlet skipper will have his ship sailing smoothly this spring.

Wherever Hill has gone, success has followed. Such is the case at The State University. Last season, the Scarlet Knights captured their first Atlantic 10 title and appeared in the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1970. For guiding his team to a stellar season, Hill was honored as University Division Coach of the Year by the New Jersey Baseball Coaches Association.

Over the three years under Hill, the Scarlet's record has improved. In his first season on the Banks of the Raritan River, Hill took the reigns of an unfamiliar group of players and went 13-21, winning seven of its last 10 games. The year 1985 was a successful one for the Scarlet as the squad raced to a 25-15 mark - the most wins ever by a baseball team at RU - until last season. In 1986, the Scarlet went 28-18 – the best record in the school's baseball history.

Building a baseball power is commonplace for Hill. Before coming to Rutgers, Hill guided the Montclair State program and built it into one of the finest Division III programs in the nation. He spent seven years with the Indians where he compiled a 148-91-2 record. The highlight of his seven-year stint came in 1983 when the Indians finished 31-14 and won the Mid-Atlantic Regional Championships. For his efforts, Hill was named NCAA Division III Coach of the Year.

In addition to his baseball duties, Hill also was in command of Montclair's football program, putting together a 52-16-4 career record.

A 1957 graduate of Upsala College, Hill enjoyed tremendous success as an undergraduate, earning 11 varsity letters in three sports. In baseball, Hill received four letters and saw his best season as a junior by leading Upsala in hitting.

In football, the little running back was Upsala's leading rusher for four seasons as well as its leading scorer three times. For his accomplishments, he was named Most Valuable Back for the 1954, 1955 and 1956 seasons and capped off his career by being honored as a little All-American.

In basketball, Hill earned three varsity letters and garnered the Most Improved Player award in 1957. For all of his work, Upsala named Hill the Most Outstanding Athlete in 1955, 1956, and 1957.

Upon graduation, Hill began his coaching career after a brief stint with the Washington Senators. He returned to his alma mater in 1959 to assume the coaching duties of the freshman baseball team. At the same time, he served on the coaching staff at the East Orange Soverals, a semipro team in the Essex County league.

After a year, Hill went to the high school level to be an assistant at his old haunt, Clifford Scott High School in East Orange. After serving as an assistant for five years, Hill took con-

trol of the program in 1965 and led Scott to a six-year mark of 94-58, including two State sectional championships. While at Scott, Hill also served as its head football coach from 1966 to 1970.

In 1970, Hill moved on to Pequannock High School where he was head football coach. Hill stayed at Pequannock for four years before going back to Upsala as an assistant baseball coach. He remained at Upsala until 1977 when he took over at Montclair State.



Now, at Rutgers, the Scarlet Knights are reaping the benefits of Fred Hill's many years of baseball knowledge. Known for his hard work and dedication, one can always find Fred Hill at the batting cage, bullpen or his office. No matter where, he'll be talking baseball.

Fred and his wife, Evelyn, reside in Verona and have six children, Nancy, Fred, Linda, Jim, Tracey, and Karen.

Hill will be assisted by Norm Schoenig and John Seymour.


NORM SCHOENIG

Norm enters his 11th season as an assistant to Fred Hill. Schoenig was in charge of the "B" program at Montclair State for two seasons where he enjoyed tremendous success. He then took over the responsibility of developing the pitching staff and did an excellent job in that capacity. Norm then moved on to Rutgers with Fred Hill and, again, was in charge of the pitching corp as well as coaching the third base line. The Montclair State graduate is also involved in recruiting and is in charge of the Rutgers summer baseball program.

Schoenig is a graduate of Fairlawn High School in New Jersey where he lettered in baseball. He moved on to Bergen County Community College and enjoyed a stellar baseball career in 1969 and 1970 being named to the All-Region 19 All-Star team in his final season. After two years at BCCC, Norm enrolled at Montclair State where he patrolled the outfield from 1971-1973.

Norm resides in Verona with his wife, Pat, daughter Janine and son Brian.

Fred Hill on Schoenig: "Norm is a very fine baseball man. He is an extremely hard worker and leaves no detail unturned. Norm is a very knowledgeable pitching coach and has the patience to work with our young pitchers and succeed. He has done an outstanding job evident by last year's success. We are looking for our staff to have another outstanding year under Norm's tutelage."



JOHN SEYMOUR

John Seymour, who played under Fred Hill for two seasons at Montclair State enters his second season as an assistant at the State University. A three-year varsity performer, John had a .338 career batting average with 64 RBI's, 14 doubles, and six home runs while playing on a team that had a combined record of 88-40-3. The Cinnaminson, N.J. native played in two college World Series with the Indians which included a third place finish in 1984. In that year, John hit .363 with 11 doubles and 31 RBI's and cracked two homers, one of which beat William Paterson in the conference playoffs. For his outstanding achievements in '84, John was named a member of the District All-America team as a DH.

In the fall of 1984, Seymour served as a junior varsity coach at Montclair before stepping up to an assistant on the varsity level in 1985 when the Indians went 36-12-1 and finished fourth in the Division III College World Series.

A soccer and baseball standout at Cinnaminson H.S., John was named to the All-State soccer team and garnered All-Burlington County honors in baseball. In the summer of his senior year, the first baseman played on the Burlington Babe Ruth All Star Team, which placed third in the national tournament.

At Rutgers, John will assist coach Hill with the varsity outfielders and will manage the "B" team.

Fred Hill on Seymour: "John has definitely been a fine addition to our program. After playing for me at Montclair State, he has the understanding of my philosophy. He's a hard-working and dedicated baseball man. There is no doubt in my mind he will develop our young players so they can contribute on the varsity level."

1986 SCARLET KNIGHTS REVIEW

If one focused on the start of the '86 Scarlet Knights, there was very little to be optimistic about. The Rutgers baseball squad, under Fred Hill, lost its first eight games on the road before beating Florida International, 11-9, in extra innings. Pitching was the problem as the Knight hurlers yielded 86 runs in their eight losses.

After the team returned to New Jersey, they reeled off 13 straight wins and, coincidentally, the pitching started to improve.

"We're always going to have problems early in the year with our pitching," says head coach Fred Hill. "The teams we play against are far more into their season in terms of actual games played because of the weather conditions here in the northeast."

The 13-game winning streak included two impressive victories over Penn State and two wins over the Temple Owls.

In league competition, the Knights

were living up to expectations winning four of their first five league contests. RU then swept St. Joseph's and took a commanding lead in the eastern division of the Atlantic 10 with a 7-1 record. Needing just one win to clinch the regular season crown, the Scarlet diamondeers won two of three from the University of Massachusetts.

During this drive to the A-10 playoffs, Hill received excellent hitting from freshman Glen Gardner, junior captain Joe Lynch and sophomore infielder Sam Ferretti. But one player surprised everyone by coming on strong down the stretch. Gary Resetar, a freshman catcher from Bayonne, finished the season with a team-high .404 batting average.

The Scarlet Knights entered the Atlantic 10 Tournament as a slight favorite, due to its home field advantage. The Scarlet Knights cruised to the finals and met West

Virginia, the winner of the Western division. The most valuable pitcher of the tournament Ken Smith (West Virginia) pitched superbly, beating the Knights to force a championship game.

West Virginia broke out quickly in the first inning with three runs. But, while Mike Greco pitched six innings of three-hit ball in relief, the Knights crawled back to come to within one, 3-2. In the eighth inning, the Knights reserved a spot in the NCAA tournament, scoring eight runs to take a 10-3 lead in which they never gave up.

Although the Scarlet Knights lost both games in the NCAA Northeast Regional Tournament to host and eventual winner Maine and Rider, the Scarlet Knights' season was a successful one finishing 28-18, the best record in the school's history. With the entire team returning this season, more success is certain to be enjoyed in 1987.
