

1988 RUTGERS PREVIEW



Last Spring, Fred Hill saw his first recruiting class bid farewell to the State University - somewhat of a special occasion for a head coach. The five talented athletes, recruited by Hill to attend Montclair State, were persuaded to follow the fiery skipper to his new "home"

Four years and 102 wins later, two are beginning their professional playing careers and two are joining the collegiate coaching ranks · Bob Mac-Donald with the Toronto Blue Jays, Scott Trochim with the Cincinnati Reds, Paul Schwendel head coach at Kean College and Joe Lynch an assistant at Rutgers.

From that 1987 team that broke the record for wins in a season, two underclassmen were also drafted, Sam Ferretti and Glen Gardner. Ferretti gave up his last year of eligibility to sign with the Clevelenad Indians while Gardner, a junior this season, was drafted by the San Diego Padres but decided to stay at Rutgers.

With four players drafted in '87 and just as many projected to be picked in '88 (add Mark Germann, who was drafted by Cincinnati in 1984), it is clear to see that Hill has quickly turned the Rutgers baseball program around.

"We're pretty pleased the way the program has gone," said Hill. "Setting schools records in wins the past three seasons certainly shows that we are on the right track,

"SCARLET DAYS ARE HERE AGAIN" says Baseball America as Rutgers was chosen as the preseason pick to win the Atlantic 10 title for the third straight season. And why not? The Knights have six starters returing including All-America outfielder Glen Gardner and All-American candidate Gary Resetar

Ten pitchers also return from a staff that owned the third best ERA (3.03) in the country last season. Add to that a group of the state's top scholastic players and one can see why the Scarlet Knights are excited about the upcoming campaign

'We are very excited about the season," said Hill. "I think the fall season showed that we have more overall depth, especially in the pitching department. It may be difficult to repeat last year's record with the quality of this year's schedule but I think our team will be equally as good."

Rutgers will face the toughest schedule in the program's history with three games on the road against nationally-ranked Georgia Tech and a threegame series at North Carolina before traveling to Florida for 11 games. Two games against the University of Miami, Air Force, Florida International and St. Thomas (FL) and single games against Southern Illinois and Maine make up the Florida

The schedule continues with tough intra-state rivals Rider, Montclair State, William Paterson, and Fairleigh Dickinson to name a few plus a grueling 16-game Atlantic 10 Conference schedule.

"As always, our goal is to win the dvision and

win the conference so we can recieve the automatic

bid to the NCAA Tournament," said Hill. "We thought we had a good enough team last year but we stumbled in the playoffs. I thought we were as good as anyone else.

Here is a position-by-position look at the 1988 Rutgers baseball team:

Pitching

With 10 pitchers returning from a staff that finished third in the nation last season with a 3.03 ERA, the Knights look solid in the pitching department. Rutgers loses starter Bob MacDonald, the all-time winningest pitcher at the State University and reliever Len Sutton, along with Rob Fazekas but it is the 10 returning pitchers and promising recruits that has Hill confident of his pitching. Darrin Winston returns for his final season. The southpaw was one of the top pitchers in the country last season with a 7-0 record and a 1.82 ERA. Winston has enjoyed an outstanding career at Rutgers recording 16 victories and just three defeats. He has won 14 of his last 15 decisions.

The 1988 captain was three outs away from recording a no-hitter at Massachusetts when Rob Holiday slapped the ball through the infield for the Minutemen's lone hit. The 2-0 win was the first shutout by a Rutgers pitcher since 1984.

Seniors Noel Gluck and Dave Bauer give the Scarlet a solid second and third starter. Gluck has quietly become one of the top pitchers in the program's history. The righthander has a 17-9 career mark and is just four wins shy of breaking the career win record. He also needs 48 strikeouts to become the all-time strikeout leader.

Bauer has also pitched well the past three seasons but is looking for his final year to be his best. The righty has managed to record an 8-2 mark despite nagging arm problems during his stint at Rutgers. His sneaky fastball has caught many opponents by surprise and his fine control has kept Rutgers in many ballgames.

Junior Mike Greco will move into the starting rotation after having two superb seasons out of the bullpen. Greco's 0.95 ERA last season was the third best in the country last season and in 1986 he had a 0.93 ERA.

The sophmore tandem of lefthanders Darrin Kotch and Scott Wilkins had fine fall seasons and will move into the starting rotation. Kotch recorded one victory last season over Princeton while Wilkins worked just four innings.

The bullpen will be one of the scarlet's strong areas in '88 with juniors Kevin Conover and Marty O'Brien returning. Conover, a lefty, appeared in 11 games last year hurling 13 innings. O'Brien has had a stellar career recording a 4-1 mark with four saves. The hard throwing righthander has a 3.47 career ERA giving up 14 earned runs in 36 1/3 innings

Also providing help in the bullpen will be senior Gary Geraghty, who will try to return to form after having shoulder surgery last summer, freshmen lefthanders Dave Hornaday and Jim Dunphy and righthander Jim Kohl

Rutgers will certainly have no problem scoring with the top five hitters returining from a year ago. The Scarlet Knights will be led by junior All-American Glen Gardner, Gardner hit a team-high .368 with 45 RBI despite missing the final 13 games because of a hand injury. The lefthanded hitter has collected 126 hits in just two seasons and has provided the Knights with power, stroking 14 home runs over the past two seasons.

Bo Jackson and John Elway aren't the only collegiate athletes who ever excelled in two sports. Junior Eric Young became one of that group last year. He provided the Scarlet Knights with hitting, speed and defense in 1987 while also becoming one of the football team's top receivers. He hit .366 with five home runs and 10 stolen bases.

The New Brunswick, NJ native joined the Scarlet baseball team last speing and was a last minute addition to the squad heading down to Florida. The junior surprised everyone by hitting home runs in his first two at bats against LaSalle. Two days later, the centerfielder hit a two-run home run against Miami.

Gary Resetar also returns providing Rutgers with another solid bat. The Bayonne, NJ native hit .346 last season with 26 RBI. The lefty had an excellent summer winning the Most Valuable Player award in the Atlantic Collegiate Baseball League where he hit .461 with 41 RBI and seven home runs.

Senior Paul Johnson is known throughout the East for his glove at first base but few have noticed his offensive output. Over the past three years, Johnson has hit .310 with 91 RBI and has also smacked 13 home runs.

Senior Kevin Kerekes had a fine year in '87 and is expecting to contribute, again, in 1988. Kerekes hit .314 and stole 10 of 11 bases last season after transferring from Seton Hall. One of the top defensive outfielders in the East, Kerekes provided Rutgers with speed and timely hitting.

Senior Bob Osborne and freshman Sean Ryan will platoon at the designated hitter's spot in the lineup. Osborne, a righthanded hitter, was the Knights' third leading hitter with a .350 average a year ago. The former Connecticut player provides the Knights with a powerful bat. Ryan comes to Rutgers after having a stellar high school career. Considered one of the best hitters in the state. Rvan will fill the DH spot against righthanders. The second team All-Stater hit .553 and belted six home runs while striking out just three times in his final two seasons. Ryan will give Rutgers another power hitter in an, already, potent lineup.

The infield will be of some concern for head coach Fred Hill with Paul Johnson the only returning starter. Junior Mike Haberman will get the call at third base to fill the shoes of Scott Trochim, now with the Cincinnati Reds organization. Freshman Ted Ciesla will fill the hole at shortstop left by the absence of Mark Ozoroski. Ciesla was considered one of the best defensive infielders in the state last year. The first team All-State pick turned the double play, perhaps, better than any other in the state. Sophmore Joe Miscik had an excellent fall season to earn the starting spot at second base.

Johnson's defensive play at first base will certainly help the young and inexperienced infielders. The Emerson, NJ native is one of the top first basemen in the country mastering the glove and footwork around the base.

It is a different story when one talks about the outfield. Three starters return - Eric Young, Kevin Kerekes and Glen Gardner. Young played most of the '87 season in centerfield with the injury to Kerekes but finished the season in left field, the position he will play this season. Kerekes will start in centerfield. The senior committed just one error last season while collecting 43 putouts. Gardner, who has improved defensively each season, will start in right field. The Somerville native had 53 putouts and two assists while committing six errors. Junior Gene Casaleggio provides head coach Fred Hill with a valuable utility man. Casaleggio will fill in at first base, third base, the outfield and behind the


One area which will be very strong for the Scarlet Knights is the catching position. Gary Resetar returns for his third season behind the plate. Resetar possesses a good arm but his effectiveness is in his quick release. Backing up Resetar will be Casaleggio and first team All-State catcher Rob Springer of Voorhees, NJ.

HEAD COACH FRED HILL

It has been four years since the fiesty 5'8' skipper with the crew cut journeyed down the Garden State Parkway to wave his magic wand over the State University. In those four years, Rutgers has improved its record and, in turn, its success and its reputation in eastern college baseball.

It hasn't been as easy as waving a magic wand. It has taken hard work and dedication. But signs of improvement were evident as early as the first season when Hill directed a young and inexperienced team to seven wins in its last 10 games to finish 13-21.

Since that initiation into Division I baseball, Hill has transformed the program into one of the best in the East and is on the verge of making noise on the national level.

In the past three years, Rutgers has improved its record breaking the school win mark each season with 25 in 1985, 28 in 1986 and 36 in 1987. In 1986, Hill also took Rutgers to its first NCAA Tournament in over 15 years.

Building a baseball power is commonplace for Hill. Before coming to Rutgers, he guided the Montclair State program and built it into one of the finest Division III programs in the nation. He spent seven years with the Indians and compiled a 148-91-2 mark.

The highlight of his Montclair stint came in 1983 when his team finished 31-14 and won the Mid-Atlantic Regional Championships. For his efforts, Hill was named NCAA Division III Coach of the Year.

In addition to his baseball duties, Hill was also in command of Montclair's football program, putting together a 52-16-4 career record.

A 1957 graduate of Upsala College, Hill enjoyed tremendous success as an undergraduate, earning 11 varsity letters in three sports. In baseball, he received four letters and saw his best season as a junior by leading Upsala in hitting.

In football, the little running back was Upsala's leading rusher for four seasons as well as its leading scorer three times. For his accomplishments, he was named Most Valuable Back for the 1954, 1955 and 1956 seasons and capped off his career by being honored as a little All-American.

In basketball, Hill earned three varsity letters and garnered the Most Improved Player award in 1957. For all of his work, Upsala named Hill the Most Outstanding Athlete in 1955, 1956 and 1957.

Upon graduation, Hill began his coaching career after a brief stint with the Washington Senators. He returned to his alma mater in 1959 to assume the coaching duties of the freshman baseball team. At the same time, he served on the coaching staff at the East Orange Soverals, a semi-pro team in the Essex County league.

After a year, Hill went to the high school level to be an assistant at his old haunt, Clifford Scott High School in East Orange. After serving as an assistant for five years, Hill took control of the program in 1965 and led Scott to a six-year mark of 94-58, including two state sectional championships. While at Scott, Hill also served as its head football coach from 1966 to 1970.

In 1970, Hill moved on to Pequan-

nock High School where he was head football coach. Hill stayed at Pequannock for four years before going back to Upsala as an assistant baseball coach. he remained at Upsala until 1977 when he took over at Montclair State.

Now, at Rutgers, the Scarlet Knights are reaping the benefits of Fred Hill's many years of baseball knowledge. Known for his hard work and dedication, one can always find Fred Hill at the batting cage, bullpen or his office. No matter where, he'll be talking baseball.

Fred and his wife, Evelyn, reside in Verona and have six children, Nancy, Fred Jr., Linda, Jim, Tracey, and Karen. Fred Jr. is an assistant basketball coach at Marquette University. Fred's brother Brian is an assistant coach for the NBA's Atlanta Hawks.

ASSISTANT COACHES



PAUL NELSON

Paul Nelson enters his second season as an assistant coach under Fred Hill. Nelson, a 1986 graduate of Montclair State College, will serve as the pitching coach.

Nelson pitched three seasons for the Indians at Montclair. As a sophmore in 1983, he went 7-2 and pitched in the Division III College World Series. In the summer of '83, the Carteret native injured his throwing arm and redshirted in 1984. Seeing limited action on the mound in his final two seasons, Nelson joined his father at Carteret High School as an assistant baseball coach. In the spring of '87, Nelson moved on to Rutgers where he assisted in the developing of the pitchers on both the varsity and sub-varsity teams.

With the absence of Fred Hill's long time assistant coach Norm Schoenig, Nelson's responsibilities will expand in 1988. Schoenig became the new head baseball coach at Montclair State.

Nelson is unmarried and currently residing in Carteret.




RICK FREEMAN

Rick Freeman enters his first season as an assistant coach at the State University. Freeman, a 1981 graduate of Marquette University, will assist Fred Hill on the varsity level and will coach the outfielders. At Marquette, Freeman started the baseball program, a team that is still recognized at the Milwaukee school as a club sport.

The Steinart (Trenton, NJ) High School graduate comes to Rutgers after coaching four seasons at Mercer County Community College. He also coached at Rider College in 1982 and at Steinart in '83.

Freeman also coached Hamilton Post 31 of Trenton in the American Legion League since 1977, winning the state championship in 1987.

Freeman currently attends Trenton State and will earn a Masters Degree in English Literature this spring.



JOE LYNCH

After performing on the diamond for four years at the State University, Joe Lynch begins his coaching career under Fred Hill in 1988. Lynch, a native of Pequannock, will coordinate the "B" team as well as work with the hitters and catchers on the varsity level.

Last year's team captain had a .311 career batting average and drove in 111 runs while collecting 152 hits. He spent his freshman and sophmore campaigns behind the plate as the Scarlet's catcher and his junior and senior year occupying the designated hitter's spot in the lineup.

He enjoyed a stellar season in 1986 when he hit .364 with 30 RBI to lead the Scarlet Knights to the conference championship and a berth in the NCAA Tournament. That year, Lynch was a Third Team All-America selection by the American Baseball Coaches Association, a First Team All-District II pick and was named to the All-East squad as well as the All-Atlantic 10 team.

Lynch will be completing his undergraduate studies while coaching at the State University this spring.

Fred Hill's Scarlet Knights rewrote the record book in 1987, producing the best baseball season in the history of the program. It was the third consecutive year that the team set a new win standard. In 1985, Rutgers won 25 games and in 1986 the mark improved to 28.

The Scarlet Knights finished with the best record in the program's history, 36-14-1, which included wins over perennial World Series participants Maine, Miami, Southern Illinois, and Rider, Division III National Champion Montclair State and Florida International.

Rutgers also finished the season with the country's third best ERA at 3.03 and had one of its pitchers, Mike Greco (0.95), ranked third in the nation in ERA.

In addition, the Scarlet bats were in full swing throughout most of the season as the team set a record for most home runs with 51, an average of 1.0 a game.

Individually, senior southpaw Bob MacDonald became the winningest pitcher in Rutgers history by recording six wins in his final year. He owns the career win record with 20. Sam Ferretti became the all-time leader in hits with 165 as he had another solid year at the plate hitting .302.

Scott Trochim set new career marks in doubles with 33 as well as runs scored (130) and walks (117). He also set new season standards for walks (39) and runs scored (50).

Although the State University failed to receive the automatic bid at the Atlantic

10 Tournament, few can argue that the team's success warranted them a trip to post-season play.

Rutgers opened the season on the road with a win over William & Mary but then dropped three straight against North Carolina to head into Florida with a 1-3 mark.

Hill's squad then turned in its best Florida trip ever by going 6-3 against some of the nation's best teams. The highlight of the nine-game road trip was back-to-back wins over perennial World Series participants Maine and Miami.

Senior Joe Lynch cracked a three-run home run in the bottom of the seventh inning to give the Knights a 6-4 come-frombehind victory against the Black Bears and the next night against the Hurricanes the Scarlet Knights ripped 13 hits including home runs by Glen Gardner and Eric Young to pound the University of Miami, 12-7.

But Rutgers found home the best place to be as it returned to New Jersey and won six straight to raise its record to 13-6. After losses to New York Tech and Seton Hall, Rutgers won 10 of its next 11 games to improve its mark to 25-9.

The Knights then traveled to Massachusetts for a four-game series looking to clinch a playoff berth in the conference. But RU managed to win just one game and that took a one-hitter by Darrin Winston for a 2-0 win.

Hill's team stood in third place with a 5-4-1 conference record and needed to sweep the remaining two games against Temple to stay alive in the playoff picture. Rutgers swept the twinbill in Philadelphia and needed to split a four-game series with St. Joseph's to clinch a spot in the Atlantic 10 Tournament.

On its home field, where they owned a 17-2 record in 1987, the Knights swept the series from the Hawks and the Scarlet entered the tournament in Boyertown, Pa. as the top seed in the Eastern Division for the second straight season.

Rutgers' opening round opponent was Penn State, a team they defeated twice at home earlier in the year. Darrin Winston, the ace of the staff, held the Lions to five hits and breezed to an 8-1 win.

Next up was West Virginia. The Scarlet Knights hit the ball well but the Mountaineers came up with big plays to rob extra-base hits from the Scarlet hitters. The result was a frustrating 2-0 loss to the Western Division champion.

The loser's bracket final pitted Rutgers against its Eastern Division nemesis Massachusetts. The Minutemen jumped on freshman starter Rob Fazekas for five runs in the second inning and never looked back in an 8-3 UMass win.

Rutger's season had ended abruptly. But after the tears were wiped away and the shock wore off, the Scarlet Knights reminded themselves of the banner year that they had experienced.

The post-season honors were plentiful. Winston was named New Jersey Pitcher of the Year by the New Jersey Baseball Coaches Association for his 7-0 record and 1.82 ERA.

Glen Gardner, Rutgers leading hitter in '87, was named Third Team All-America by **Baseball America** and was an All-East selection by the NCAA and Trochim was honored as a Second Team Academic All-American by GTE. Winston, Gardner, and Trochim were also named to the All-Conference team.

In addition, four players were drafted in the June Major League Baseball Draft. Bob MacDonald signed with the Toronto Blue Jays, Trochom with the Cincinnati Reds and Ferretti with the Cleveland Indians. Gardner was also drafted by the San Diego Padres but decided to stay at Rutgers.

Yes, it was certainly a banner year for the Scarlet Knights.

RUTGERS UNIVERSITY

RUTGERS, THE STATE UNIVERSITY

Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, with over 49,000 students on seven campuses in New Brunswick, Piscataway, Newark, and Camden, is one of the major state university systems in the nation. Chartered in 1766 as Queen's College, it was the eighth institution of higher learning to be founded in the colonies before the revolutionary war.

In 1825, the name of the college was changed to Rutgers to honor former trustee and revolutionary war veteran Colonel Henry Rutgers. Rutgers College became the landgrant institution of New Jersey in 1864, and, in the same year, the trustees established Rutgers Scientific School, granting the B.S. degree. In 1880, the State Experiment Station for agricultural research was organized, and, in 1914, engineering was granted separate status as the College of Engineering. In 1921, the College of Agriculture)renamed Cook College in 1973) drew together that State Experiment Statin, resident instruction, and the Extension programs.

Douglass College was established in 1918 as the New Jersey College for Women. In 1924, the School of Education, which later became the Graduate School of Education, was authorized, as was the title Rutgers University. In 1926, the University Extension Service (now known as the Division of Continuing Education) was organized. The College of Pharmacy, which was founded in 1892, joined the University in 1927. In 1934, University College was established for adult evening students, with branches in New Brunswick and Newark.

In 1945, the state legislature affirmed state support for the University, and the entire institution was "collectively designated as The State University of New Jersey." In 1956, it became Rutgers — The State University.

The University expanded significantly in the forties and fifties in Newark and Camden. The University of Newark became a part of Rutgers in 1946, adding the Newak College of Arts and Sciences, the School of Law — Newark, and a school of business administration (now the Graduate School of Management) to the University system. In 1956, the College of Nursing was organized in Newark. In 1950, the College of South Jersey in Camden was incorporated into the Rutgers structure as the Camden College of Arts and Sciences and the School of Law — Camden, and a University College branch was set up.

The Graduate Faculty became the Graduate School in 1952 and since that time the following graduate schools have been established: the Graduate School of Library and Information Studies (formerly the Graduate School of Library Service) in 1953; the Graduate School of Social Work in 1954; the School of Criminal Justice (Newark) in 1974; and the Graduate School of Applied and Professional Psychology in 1974. Also in 1974, the Graduate Faculty of Rutgers — Newark received degree-granting authority, and, in 1981, the Graduate School — Camden became a separate unit. In addition, numerous specialized institutes and research centers have been established over the years.

At the undergraduate level, Livingston College was founded in 1969, emphasizing the urban environment. In 1976, the Mason Gross School of the Arts was established offering both undergraduate and

graduate programs.

Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, will continue to grow, its direction dictated by the needs of the society it serves.

Before coming to Rutgers, Dr. Bloustein was president of Bennington College in Vermont from 1965 to 1971 and professor of law at New York University from 1961 to 1965.

Dr. Bloustein holds bachelor's degrees from New York University and Oxford University and doctoral degrees in law and philosophy from Cornell University. A graduate of James Monroe High School in the Bronx, he attended Washington Square College of New York University from which he graduated Phi Beta Kappa, in 1948. He earned a Bachelor of Philosophy degree at Wadham College of Oxford University in 1950 as a Fulbright Scholar. He also earned a Ph.D. in Philosophy at Cornell and a J.D. degree from the Cornell School of Law in 1959. He has been awarded honorary degrees by six institutions.

Inaugurated as president 17 years ago, Dr. Bloustein resolved to maintain a university "where men and women of good will

may join together in restoring confidence in the institution of reason," calling he university a place "where reason resides."

From the time of his inauguration, he has spoken out on the role of the university, civil rights, women's rights, the difference between dissent and disruption, and about the mission of Rutgers in serving a new, more urban and more heterogeneous student population. He has strongly advocated a new partnership between the University and developing high technology industries in New Jersey.

Dr. Bloustein served in 1984 as chairman of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges, which represents 140 American State universities and colleges.

As one of the nation's leading spokesmend for public higher education, he has testified frequently before congressional committees on the need to provide added research funds to American universities. He is now chairman of NASULGC's Special Committee on the Future of State

Universities in the Year 2000.

Dr. Bloustein has published extensively in the fields of freedom of expression, privacy, the first Amendment, and public policy on nuclear energy. He is author of "Education at a Crossroads; The Imperatives of our Technetronic Age" (1982), "Individual and Group Privacy" (1987) and "The University and the Counterculture" (1972). He is joint author of "Dimensions of Academic Creedom" (1969) and edited the book "Nuclear Energy, Public Policy and the Law" (1964).

Dr. Bloustein is chairman of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools and vice chairman of the Central New Jersey Round Table Steering Committee. He is a member of the Conference Board, the New Jersey State Assembly Task Force on the 21st Century and the Board of Directors of the National Council on Crime and Deliquency, among other affiliations. Dr. Bloustein is married to Dr. Ruth Ellen Steinmen, a pediatrician, and they are the parents of two daughters, Elise and Lori.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS: FREDERICK E. GRUNINGER



Fred Gruninger, who assumed the sition of Director of Athletics at Rutgers January of 1973, oversees an athletic ogram which consists of 16 men's and women's sports on the NCAA Divini I level.

Under Gruninger's guidance, the vision of Intercollegiate Athletics, as all as the Rutgers athletic reputation, s grown significantly. During his ture as director, Rutgers teams have joyed tremendous success. Over the st several years, numerous teams we participated in post-season play, ast notably the women's basketball aad's Final Eight appearances in the t two seasons. There have also been ong individual achievements which we resulted in a near .600 overall wing percentage for Rutgers teams.

Since he assumed the responsibility the Rutgers program, the State iversity has been the host institution many regional and national interlegiate and professional sporting ents. Highlighting these is the hosting he NCAA East Regional Basketball irnament in conjunction with the New sey Sports and Exposition Authority he Meadowlands Arena for an uncedented four consecutive years.

Rutgers hosted the 1987 NCAA Division I Lacrosse Championship last May for the fourth time, also an unprecedented achievement. Many conference end-of-season championships have been held at Rutgers and, along with such events as the United States Women's Indoor Tennis Championships, have led to added exposure of the Rutgers name.

During his tenure, major renovations, expansion and new construction programs to enchance and upgrade athletic facilities have taken place. The Louis Brown Athletic Center and the adjacent field complex have brought life and support to the men's and women's basketball teams, the baseball and softball squads, and the women's lacrosse and field hockey teams.

The Rutgers Stadium Complex has undergone a major addition. Indoor and outdoor syntheic practice and competition areas have been in service for three years and the recently dedicated Hale Center gives Rutgers one of the finest facilities of its kind anywhere. The \$7.5 training center integrates the entire foorball program. Expansion of the stadium's seating capacity and improvement in the stadium's amenities are now on the boards.

These completed projects increase, immeasurably, the program support for both men and women. Plans are underway for the construction of a world class aquatic center as part of the Busch Student Recreation Center, the expansion of the University Boat House to meet the growing needs of the men's and women's crew programs, and the completion of several unfinished areas of the Kilmer Campus Athletic Center.

Under Gruninger's direction, the University athletic awards system has broadeded the recognition of the student athletes for their athletic and academic achievements. Special programs of awards are designed annually for recognizing those individuals and teams

which have distinguished themselves on and off the field of athletic competition.

In 1968, Gruninger began his association with the Athletic Division when he was named Assistant Athletic Director. Three years later, he was appointed Associate Athletic Director.

In addition to his administrative duties, Gruninger coached the Scarlet Knights golf team from 1963 to 1972, recording a 109-30-2 mark and taking teams and individuals to a number of post-season tournaments.

The energetic and enthusiastic administrator has held various offices in state, regional, and national athletic organizations. He was recently appointed to serve as the Division I-A North independents representative on the NCAA Council. He also holds membership on the College Football Association's Board of Directors and on the Board of the Major Independent Football Association. Gruninger is a member of the Host Committee of th eKickoff Classic and recently completed his tenure as a member of the NCAA Post-Season Football Committee. Additionally, he was coorganizer of the Collegiate Athletic Administration of New Jersey (CAANJ), an organization founded to serve and foster relations among the 42 four-year and two-year colleges in the state which compete in men's and women's athletics.

Gruninger, who has been involved in numerous local and state charitable and athletic endeavors, is a native of Fanwood, NJ, and now resides in Martinsville. He and his wife, Barbara, are the parents of two sons—Mark, who received a Ph.D. degree in Ceramic Engineering from Rutgers this spring, and Jack, a student and member of the football team at the University of Virginia. Daughter Katherine is a 1985 graduate of Lafayette College where she cocaptained the woman's basketbll team in her senior season.
