RUTGERS, THE STATE UNIVERSITY





utgers, The State University of New Jersey, with over 47,000 students on seven campuses in New Brunswick, Piscataway, Newark, and Camden, is one of the major state university systems in the nation. Chartered in 1766 as Queen's College, the eighth institution of higher learning to be founded in the colonies before the revolutionary war.

In 1825, the name of the college was changed to Rutgers to honor former trustee and revolutionary war veteran Colonel Henry Rutgers. Rutgers College became the landgrant Institution of New Jersey in 1964, and, in the same year, the trustees established Rutgers Scientific School, granting the B.S. degree. In 1880, the State Experiment Station for agricultural research was organized, and, in 1914, engineering was granted separate status as the College of Engineering. In 1921, the College of Agriculture (renamed Cook College in 1973) drew together the State Experiment Station, resident instruction, and the Extension programs.

Douglass College was established in 1918 as the New Jersey College of Women. In 1924, the School of Education, which later became the Graduate School of Education, was authorized, as was the title Rutgers University. The College of Pharmacy, which was founded in 1892, joined the University in 1927. In 1934, University College was established for adult evening students, with branches in New Brunswick and Newark.


In 1945, the state legislature affirmed state support for the University, and the entire institution was "collectively designated as The State University of New Jersey". In 1956, it became Rutgers - The State University.


The University expanded significantly in the forties and fifties in Newark and Camden. The University of Newark became a part of Rutgers in 1946, adding the Newark College of Arts and Sciences, the School of Law - Newark, and a school of business administration (now the Graduate School of Management) to the University system. In 1956, the College of Nursing was organized in Newark. In 1950, the College of South Jersey in Camden was incorporated into the Rutgers structure as the Camden College of Arts and Sciences and the School of Law - Camden, and a University College branch was set up.

The Graduate Faculty became the Graduate School in 1952 and since that time the following graduate schools have been established: the Graduate School of Library and information Studies (formerly the Graduate School of Social Work in 1944; the School of Criminal Justice (Newark) in 1974; and the Graduate School of Applied and Professional Psychology in 1974. Also in 1974, the Graduate Faculty of Rutgers - Newark received degree granting authority, and in 1981, the Graduate School-Camden became a separate unit. In addition, numerous specialized institutes and research centers have been established over the years.

At the undergraduate level, Livingston College was founded in 1969, emphasizing the urban environment. In 1976, the Mason Gross School of the Arts was established offering both undergraduate and graduate programs, and an undergraduate School of Business opened in 1986.

Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, will continue to grow. Its direction dictated by the needs of the society it serves.





Dr. T. Alexander Pond
PRESIDENT

Dr. T. Alexander Pond was appointed to the position of Acting President of Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey in December 1989. Dr. Pond first came to the Banks in 1982, and served the past eight years as Executive Vice President and Academic Officer.


Rutgers has been New Jersey's State University since 1945 with a current enrollment of over 48,000 students on the three campuses across New Jersey. The faculty exceeds 2500.

Before coming to Rutgers, Dr. Pond held administrative positions at the State University of New York at Stony Brook. From 1962-1968, he was Chairman of the Physics department directing its growth to a level of international distinction. In 1968, Dr. Pond was confirmed as the Executive Vice President and held this post until 1980. At various times between 1970 and 1979, he was Acting President, serving a total of two years in this position.

Dr. Pond held academic appointments as Princeton University where he as an instructor in Physics from 1951-1953. Between 1953 and 1962, Pond was assistant, then associate professor at Washington University in St. Louis. From 1962-1982, Dr. Pond was a professor then leading professor at the State University of New York at Stony Brook. On his arrival at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, to the present, Dr. Pond has been a professor II of Physics.

Among his many accomplishments Dr. Pond has served as the Director of the Stony Brook Foundation at the State University of New York. He was also appointed by the Governor of New York to be a member of the Tri-State Regional Planning Commission from 1979-1982. Dr. Pond has also been a member and chairman for the New York State Sea Grant Institute, member of the Long Island Regional Advisory Council on Higher Education, Director for the Action Committee for Long Island, Inc., and member of the Board of Directors of Long Island Forum for Technology.

Dr. Pond served in the Navy during World War II. He earned his Bachelor, Masters in Physics, and Ph.D. in Physics at Princeton University.



Frederick E. Gruninger DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

In his more than 16 years as Director of Athletics, Fred Gruninger has guided the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics at Rutgers to unprecedented growth and recognition. Since his appointment in January, 1973, The State University's athletic program has grown to 32 sports, evenly divided between men and women, and has achieved a stature respected across the nation. Numerous Scarlet knights and Lady Knights squads have enjoyed tremendous success.


It is with firm commitment, long experience and unbounded energy that Gruninger directs the Division. His association with the department began in 1963, when he was named head golf coach. He was appointed Assistant Athletic Director in 1968. Three years later, he was named Associate Athletic Director. A 1953 Rutgers graduate, Gruninger coached the golf team between 1963 and 1972, recording a 109-30-2 record and consistently taking teams and individuals into post-season competition.

Currently a member of the NCAA Council, the governing body of collegiate athletics, as well as serving on the Host Committee of the Kickoff Classic and the ECAC Council, Gruninger has also served on many prestigious NCAA and regional committees. These bodies make major decision which affect football, basketball and other sports. He was a member of the College Football Association's Board of Director and is currently a member of the Governor's Council on Physical Fitness. Additionally, he was co-organizer of the Collegiate Athletic Administration of New Jersey, an organization founded to serve and foster relations among the 42 four-year and two-year colleges in New Jersey which compete in men's and women's athletics.

Gruninger, who has been involved in numerous local and state charitable and athletic endeavors, is a native of Fanwood, NJ, and now resided in Martinsville. He and his wife, Barbara, are the parents of two sons - Mark, who holds a Rutgers doctorate in Ceramic Engineering, and Jack, who attends the University of Virginia. Daughter Katherine is a 1984 Lafayette College graduate who played collegiate basketball and co-captained the squad as a senior.



HEAD COACH FRED HILL



For most, winning is a great feat. Success is strived for with the utmost of energy, and the end result of victory is cherished.

Then there are the select few.

The group that takes winning and try to use it as a springboard for even larger successes. The victories are hard earned, but the goals are constantly upgraded. Satisfaction lies in being the best.

Fred Hill falls into this category of select coaches. He has a vision of being the best, and the road to that pinnacle has thus far been paved with a series of wins, wins, and more wins.

In six years, Hill has led the Scarlet Knights to a 174-110-2 ledger, and you will see a steady rise in his team's play. He took the Rutgers post in 1984, and lead his team to a 13-21 record, the only losing season he as endure on the Banks. The 1984 squad was 25-15, and 28-18 in the following year. That 1986

team went onto the first of two NCAATournament appearances under Hill. The '87 squad went over 30 wins for the first time, posting a 36-14-1 mark. Hill's best season was 1988, breaking the one year record for wins by going 38-21-1, and winning the Atlantic-10 tournament, which sent the Scarlet to the NCAA's for a second time.

Hill has not only raised the winning percentage of the Rutgers baseball team, he has upgraded the program and its reputation on a national level. It started by developing a high quality baseball field. The maintenance and care coach Hill and staff have given it has made it one of the top fields in the East. The system Hill has devised for his student-athletics, which includes fall baseball, winter training sessions in the batting cages and offseason workouts make his overall program one of the best anywhere.

Hill has certainly left his mark in New Jersey. He began his coaching career at Montclair State College, and in a seven-year period, left the Indians with one of the best Division III programs in America. His teams compiled a 148-91-2 record, and in his final season at Montclair, went to the Division III World Series while posting a 31-14 mark.

Montclair, amazingly enough, also had tremendous accomplishments in football with Hill at the helm. He guided the gridsters to a 52-16-4 record, and set the program up to become a Division III power.

A Garden Stater through and through, Hill attended Upsala College in East Orange. In a remarkable four-year stint, Hill won 11 varsity letters. Four came in baseball, with his best year being his junior season, when he led the team in hitting.

Four more came in football, which was probably the sport he excelled at the most. As a running back, he lead Upsala in rushing all four years, and in scoring three times. He was honored with Most Valuable Back awards in 1954, '55, and '56, with that final year seeing Hill named Little All-American.

Hill spent three seasons as a hoopster, and was the team's Most Improved Player in his senior season.

Upon graduation in 1957, Hill began his coaching career at his alma mater as freshman baseball coach. At the same time, he was on the staff of the East Orange Soverals, a semi-proteam in the Essex County league.

Staying in New Jersey, as he has done in every coaching job he has ever taken, Hill went to Clifford Scott High School in 1960, and was an assistant there for five seasons until he was named head coach. His six-year record with the Scotties was 94-58, and they twice won state sectional championships. He also coached football during his tenure at Clifford Scott.

The gridiron would be the home for Hill for the next four seasons as he took over as head football coach at Pequannock High School. Following his stay with the Panthers, Hill returned to Upsala for three final years as an assistant baseball coach before taking the reigns at Montclair State.

Fred and his wife, Evelyn, reside in Verona and have six children Nancy, Fred Jr., an assistant basketball coach at Maine, Linda, Jim, Tracey, and Karen. Hill's brother Brian is an assistant coach with the Atlanta Hawks.

Entering his second season with the Rutgers baseball staff is Mike Garlatti.


Garlatti played at Ramapo College, where he was a team captain, and an all-conference catcher. Mike also played one season at Middlesex County College, and served as a volunteer assistant coach.

A native of Highland Park, Garlatti was an all-county and all-conference player in his junior and senior seasons at Highland Park HS, while leading his team to conference titles in the same two seasons.

Garlatti became a full time assistant at Ramapo in 1987, where he as a jack-of-all-trades. His responsibilities ranged from coaching, to press work, to field maintenance. His efforts were greatly rewarded when the Roadrunners played in the 1987 Division III Northeast Regionals.

Garlatti will work with the hitters and the outfielders. He will also coordinate the team's recruiting efforts.

Garlatti will serve as head coach of the Teaneck A's in the ACBL this summer. Garlatti is currently single, and resides in his native Highland Park.




TOM BAXTER

Tom Baxter joins Fred Hill for his first season at the State University as an assistant coach.

Baxter has coached high school baseball in the Hudson County area for the last six seasons. In 1984, Baxter became head coach at Dickinson HS in Jersey City, and stayed there for three years before moving to Marist HS in Bayonne. His team won the State Parochial "B" Championship last year. He was instrumental in the development of Joe Borowski, who was taken in the latest Major League Draft.

Baxter was a student pitcher scholastically at Bayonne HS. He compiled a 16-0 record in his senior year, and earned a scholarship to hurl at the University of Miami. He led the Hurricanes to their first-ever College World Series in 1974. He left Miami after one season to sign a professional contract with the Oakland A's, lasting for two seasons in the organization before developing permanent arm trouble.

GARY GERAHTY

Gary Gerahty begins his second season with the Scarlet Knights as assistant coach. He enjoys a successful three-year career with Rutgers in 1985-87. Gerahty will work primarily with the pitchers, and will also run the "B" team.


BILL ANDERSON

Season Outlook

Fred Hill is a mover.

He is one that usually looks to the future. However, 1989 is a year that seems to be haunting him.

"We are very disappointed about last season," laments Hill. "We won 34 games, and we thought we had the best team in the Atlantic 10 Conference. We just did not play well when we had to. We wanted to go to the NCAA tournament for the second year in a row. It is our ultimate goal to get there again."

Getting back to the NCAA's means winning the Atlantic 10 Conference tournament. For Rutgers to do that, they will need to replace the firepower of CF Eric Young, now a rising star in the Dodger's organization, the steadiness of SS Mark Ozoroski, the versatility of Gene Cassalegilo, the stick of Mike Haberman, and pitchers Kevin Conover, drafted by the Chicago White Sox, righty reliever Mike Greco, and stopper Marty O'Brien.

This year's roster has a peculiar mix of youth and experience. A team with only four seniors would usually be considered a year away from big things, but considering that three of four are the nucleus of the pitching staff, the time is now to think success.

"Our pitching staff is veteran, and talented," states an excited Hill." Since pitching is such a large part of the game, we are very thrilled about the prospects in 1990."

Rutgers has three infielders and two outfielders returning to the lineup, along with James McDowell at catcher, and eight pitchers. Six freshmen have been added to the fold, and one will probably start.

"Our lineup will feature very good team speed, and improved defense," comments Hill. "We will hit for average, and some power. I am a little concerned about having to start three newcomers. We have not had to do that in quite some time."

The path for the Scarlet Knights in 1990 will be blazed with the standard complement of top caliber competition. The early season trips will be to Georgia Techand Virginia Commonwealth, before the Florida spring break trip, where the Scarlet will face So. Illinois, Firoida International, St. Thomas, Washington State, Florida Atlantic, and the annual two-game set with national powerhouse Miami.

Upon return form the Sunshine State, Rutgers looks at Seton Hall, St. John's, Rider, Montclair State, and Old Dominion to highlight the out-of-conference schedule. The Atlantic 10 games begin on March 31 with a weekend of twinbills against Temple, and continuing with Rhode Island, Massachusetts, and St. Joseph's, before culminating with the Atlantic 10 tournament, which once again will be held in Boyertown, Pa.

If the young players advance for Coach Hill the way he expects them to, and his veteran pitching can put up the numbers, his seventh year on the Banks may prove to be a year to remember.

POSITION-BY-POSITION CAPSULES

INFIELD - The infield will be a solid unit for Coach Hill in 1990. Two every-day starters and a part-time starter will return, and a true freshman at the hot corner round out the interior tour.

The mainstay is Sean Ryan at first base. Ryan is coming off a super fall campaign, and a solid 1989 where he batted .349 with 5 HR and 36 RBI. The prospects for his junior year were elevated after an absolutely unbelievable summer. In the ACBL, Ryan hit .435 with 12 HR and 41 RBI on his way to Player-

of-the-Year honors. He also earned Collegiate Baseball second-team All-American honors as a designated hitter. He will be the cleanup hitter for the Scarlet Knights this spring.

Ted Ciesla also returns at shortstop. After starting his career at short, he was moved to third to make room for the departed Mark Ozoroski. This year the junior will move back to short, and with some polish, should be a good defensive player. With the stick, Ciesla checked in at .298 last year, and drove in 23 runs. He also has stolen 10 of 11 bases in his career. He will occupy the three spot in the batting

After a good fall, Chris McAlindin will handle the chores at second base. He returns as the team's leading hitter with a .352 average. "Mac" struck out only three times in 88 AB's, and had a .467 on base percentage. He has good speed, and should improve on his five for eight in steals. His bat control makes him the perfect number two hitter

The third base job appears headed to Mark Hughes. He hit .409 as a senior at Wayne Valley High School, with 6 HR and 22 RBI. He hit .419 for his four-year scholastic career. He possesses excellent speed and a good eye at the plate.

Look for serious contribution to come from freshman Joe Miller in the infield. The 1989 Middlesex County Player-of-the-Year hit .465 last year at Madison Central High, while stealign 17 bases.

Additional depth will come from "B" squad players John Conrad and Brian McComb. McComb batted .306 with seven stolen bases, while Conrad led the "B" squad in batting with a .545 average.

The infield defense is excellent from an overall standpoint. Ryan was much improved with the glove this summer, and Hill liked his defense this fali. A deft fielder, McAlindin made only five errors all of last season, and is particularly good at turning the double play. He and Ciesla should form a formidable double play combination. Ciesla moves back to shortstop, a place he played in his freshman year. He has been getting better with the glove each year, and given his speed and range, he could be very sharp at short. Mark Hughes has very good hands, and outstanding reaction to the ball, two components necessary to play third base. Coming out of the fail, Hughes seemed ready to handle the "hot corner."

The Rutgers interior defense is good at the corners, but even better where it really matters up

OUTFIELD - The big reconstruction job in 1990 for Hill. He must cope with the loses of CF Eric Young, now a rising star in the Dodger organization, and Pete Bomersbach, who will probably miss the season as a redshirt due to an injury in an automobile accident this past fall.

The shifting begins in right field, where Doug Meiner, the starter in right a year ago, will move to center. Meiner, only a sophomore, checked in with a .255 average and 15 RBI. His speed and defensive ability will help ease the pain of Young's loss.

Left field will see the return of Jay Marchese, who also batted .255 last year. The sophomore has a good mix of speed and power. He had a .370 slugging ercentage, and was successful on six of seven stolen base attempts.

The right field spot is vacated by all the shifting and there are two candidates for the position. Junior James Cann is one of them. The starting tailback for the football team joined the baseball team last year and batted .275 with one homer, a 420-foot blast against Miami. Cann's athletic ability and speed make him the leader heading into the spring. After a great fall campaign, freshman Angel Echevarria also is in the running at the right field position. Echevarria came to Rutgers from Bridgeport, Conn., where at Bassick High School he batted .573 with 18 RBI and 15 steals. Echevarria played well in the fall, will play either right field or be the righty

John Gerkens has the versatility and skill to play any of the three outfield positions, and will be the lefty DH. Additional depth in the outfield will come from sophomores Tim Roth and Brian Powers, who batted .464 and .341 respectively, on the "B" squad

The outfield will be solid defensively. Meiner is a veteran in left field, but has the speed, and the arm, to fill the void left by Young in CF. Marchase is a returning starter at left field, with experience at the position to go along with fine reaction. Rightfield will be manned by a newcomer. Cann is an outstanding athlete, and has the speed to cover a lot of ground. Echevarria is slower, but has better arm. With time, that position should get very good.


CATCHING - A very solid core of catchers will handle the backstop chores in 1989. James McDowerll returns as the number one starter. A super defensive catcher, he made only one error last year. With a gun for an arm, he is very mobile behind the plate. McDowell batted .200, with 11 hits and 11 walks in 1989.

Sophomore Steve Michaels, up from the "B" team, will provide depth at catcher. Michaels batted .414 with four RBI last season. He is coming off a good fall and will see action in 1990.

Hill was particularly impressed with freshman Michael Higgins this past fall. The three-sport star at Nutley High School was at his best on the diamond, batting .324 with 4 HR and 25 RBI. He also threw out 27 runners in his senior season, and that, combined with a very good fall, bodes well for him as far as playing time is concerned. He can catch, and his good bat qualifies him for time as righty DH.

HITTING - Right on top of the order, there is a problem. How does coach Hill replace Eric Young on top of the lineup card. "EY" batted .337, scored 60 runs and stole 28 bases. He was perhaps the speediest Scarlet Knight ever to grace the diamond. Young was the ideal lead-off hitter, who had a .507 on base percentage last year, Heading to the spring, there is no real choice for the one hole. Mark Hughes may get a look because of his blazing quickness. If he can develop a keen eye at the plate to go along with his quick bat, he will become a prime candidate. Chris McAlindin is the ideal number two hitter. His ability to put the ball in play in hit-andrun situations, as well as his sacrificing skills, make him invaluable to the Rutgers attack. If the table is set by now, Rutgers will score plenty of runs. Ted Ciesla will be the three hitter, and that is a good thing for the Scarlet. Although his homerun output dropped from seven to three, he finished 1989 with a .438 slugging percentage and 23 RBI. He raised his average 50 points from 1988 to 1989, finishing the latter at .298. Ciesla appears poised to have a big

people serve notice that even better things are on the way this past summer with an All-American performance in the ACBL. His strength and bat speed combine to make him very dangerous from the cleanup spot.

Jay Marchese will figure prominently in the offense. The sophomore finished out last year at .255, with seven doubles and 15 RBI. In limited time in 1989, McDowell showed some pop, with a homer and 10 RBI. Cann's future seems very bright. In 40 AB last year, he had 2 doubles, a triple, and a mammoth homer against Miami. He batted .275, and had a .450 slugging percentage.

There are some young bats to watch for as well. Angel Echevarria has the power and speed to be a huge offensive threat. Joe Miller batted .465 as a high school senior, while Michael Higgins is a great contact hitter.

Rutgers returns players that hit 18 of its 23 homers last season, 193 of its 280 RBI's, and 37 of its 83 stolen bases. Certainly, the experience and power returns to the lineup, and if Rutgers can fill the leadoff spot with a solid bat, the offensive attack can be as good as ever.

PITCHING - The meal ticket for the 1990 Scarlet Knights. Experienced and deep. Perhaps the most veteran starting rotation Coach Hill has ever

"We are very pleased with our depth in pitching," states Hill. "Pitching in college is extremely important, so we are very excited about 1990."

Hard-throwing Darrin Kotch headlines the

starters. The lefthander, who has been timed in the low-80's, is coming off a 5-2 season with a 3.47 ERA. Kotch allowed the opposition a .221 batting average while giving up a mere 47 hits in 57 innings. Kotch has the sawy to go along with a live fastball.

Righty Bob Fazekas enters the spring as a starter for the third time as a Scarlet Knight. After sitting out the 1988 season, "Zeke" came back with avengeance last year. The team's leading winner with seven in 1989, the senior will be the big-game pitcher for Hill in 1990. "Bob got the starts in the tough games for us," Hill remarks. "His experience in those games will make him tough to beat in 1990."

Fazekas spent the summer with North Plainfield Pilots in the Atlantic Collegiate Baseball League, and was 7-2. He has some pop on the fastball, but his top pitch is a brutal overhand curve.

Scott Wilkins will be the third starter for Rutgers. The lanky lefthander brings a 9-8 career mark into his senior year. Wilkins will get people out with his outstanding change of pace. He has had game starts in the Atlantic-10 tournament as well as the NCAA Regionals.

The fourth spot in the rotation will probably come down to two hurlers. Mike Barkley, a spot starter, is the favorite. He is coming off a 6-1 freshman campaign, with four complete games. Barkley walked only 11 in 45 innings, and gave up a teamlow .216 batting average to the opposition. Barkley also led the team in shutouts, with two, and ERA, with a sparkling 1.60.

Lefty Dave Hornaday will also vie for a starting spot. Imposing physically at 6'3" and 200 lbs.,



1990 should be a historic year for Rutgers Baseball. Entering the campaign, the Scarlet Knights need 28 wins for the 1000th win in the teams history. Beginning competition in 1870, Rutgers Baseball has compiled a 972-935-18 ledger, good for a 51% winning percentage. However, since 1938, Rutgers has posted a 684-494

mark (58%). George Case, a recent Washington Hall of Stars indictee, coached Rutgers to 113 victories in the 1950's. Matt Bolger, the schools all-time winningest coach, won 294 games in his career. Most recently, Fred Hill has skipped the Scarlet Knights to a pair of NCAA tournaments while winning 62% of his games.
