

ABOUT THE COVER: The 1991 senior class, consisting of Chris McAlindin, Jim Cann, Dave Hornady, Dave Hoehler, Jim Kohl and John Gerckens, has compiled a record of 109-57-1 in their stellar three-year career thus far. Furthermore. Rutgers is 42-6 in Atlantic 10 Conference play over that period and has won two conference titles in the last three seasons. The squad has competed in two NCAA Tournaments and has a 5-4 record in them. Certainly Jim Kohl was the top performer for Rutgers last season. He was 8-0 with a 1.90 ERA and three saves. Those stats earned him third-team All-American honors. He was at his best in the NCAA Tournament where he hurled 8.2 scoreless innings. Rutger's will look to defend their conference title at Boyertown, PA on May 10-12, 1991.

RUTGERS, THE STATE UNIVERSITY

utgers, The State University of New Jersey, with over 47,000 students on seven campuses in New Brunswick, Piscataway, Newark, and Camden, is one of the major state university systems in the nation. Chartered in 1766 as Queen's College, it is the eighth institution of higher learning to be founded in the colonies before the revolutionary war.

In 1825, the name of the college was changed to Rutgers to honor former trustee and revolutionary war veteran Colonel Henry Rutgers. Rutgers College became the landgrant Institution of New Jersey in 1964, and, in the same year, the trustees established Rutgers Scientific School, granting the B.S. degree. In 1880, the State Experiment Station for agricultural research was organized, and, in 1914, engineering was granted separate status as the College of Engineering. In 1921, the College of Agriculture (renamed Cook College in 1973) drew together the State Experiment Station, resident instruction, and the Extension programs.

Douglass College was established in 1918 as the New Jersey College of Women. In 1924, the School of Education, which later became the Graduate School of Education, was authorized, as was the title Rutgers University. The College of Pharmacy, which was founded in 1892, joined the University in 1927. In 1934, University College was established for adult evening students, with branches in New Brunswick and Newark.

In 1945, the state legislature affirmed state support for the University, and the entire institution was "collectively designated as The State University of New Jersey". In 1956, it became Rutgers - The State University.

The University expanded significantly in the forties and fifties in Newark and Camden. The University of Newark became a part of Rutgers in 1946, adding the Newark College of Arts and Sciences, the School of Law-Newark, and a school of business administration (now the Graduate School of Management) to the University system. In 1956, the College of Nursing was organized in Newark. In 1950, the College of South Jersey in Camden was incorporated into the Rutgers structure as the Camden College of Arts and Sciences and the School of Law-Camden, and a University College branch was set up.

The Graduate Faculty became the Graduate School in 1952 and since that time the following graduate schools have been established: the Graduate School of Library and information Studies (formerly the Graduate School of Social Work in 1944; the School of Criminal Justice (Newark) in 1974; and the Graduate School of Applied and Professional Psychology in 1974. Also in 1974, the Graduate Faculty of Rutgers - Newark received degree granting authority, and in 1981, the Graduate School - Camden became a separate unit. In addition, numerous specialized institutes and research centers have been established over the years.

At the undergraduate level, Livingston College was founded in 1969, emphasizing the urban environment. In 1976, the Mason Gross School of the Arts was established offering both undergraduate and graduate programs, and an undergraduate School of Business opened in 1986.

Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, will continue to grow. Its direction dictated by the needs of the society it serves.





Dr. Francis L. Lawrence
PRESIDENT

Dr. Francis L. Lawrence, a noted author and critic of French literature, was named the 18th president in the history of Rutgers, The State University, on July 18th, 1990.

More than 47,000 students attend the 25 colleges and schools of the State University of New Jersey, which is the eighth oldest institution in the country. The University has 175,000 living alumni. Dr. Lawrence comes to Rutgers from Tulane University in New Orleans, Louisiana, where he spent 28 years as a teacher and administrator. From 1962 through 1969, Lawrence was an instructor in French. He was then elected as French Department chair, a position he held until 1976, when he was named to his first administrative position as the Acting Dean of Newcomb College.

Lawrence, a native of Woonsocket, R.I., became Academic Vice President and Provost and Dean of the Graduate School in 1982. In that position, Lawrence served as the chief academic officer of the over 11,000 students at Tulane, administered a budget of over \$100 million, and was responsible for the administration of the academic programs in the colleges of liberal arts and sciences, the Graduate School, and the professional schools of law, social work, business, architecture and engineering.

Lawrence attended Saint Louis University, from which he graduated, with honors, with a Bachelor of Science Degree in French and Spanish in 1959. He earned his Ph.D. in French Classical Literature, as a N.D.E.A. Fellow, from Tulane in 1962.

A distinguished writer and editor of numerous volumes of French Literature, Lawrence in the author of the book "Moliere: The Comedy of Unreason." He has contributed to the publications "Visages de Moliere" and "The Influence of Rhetoric on Seventeenth Century French Literature."

In 1977, he was decorated chevalier by the Palmes Academiques and received the John H. Stibbs award, given by the Tulane Student Senate for outstanding service to students, in 1977 and 1985.

Dr. Lawrence and his wife, Mary Kay, are the parents of four children: Elizabeth Ann Hurley, Christoper, Naomi and Jennifer.



Frederick E. Gruninger DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

In his more than 17 years as Director of Athletics, Fred Gruninger has guided the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics at Rutgers to unprecedented growth and recognition. Since his appointment in January, 1973, The State University's athletic program has grown to 31 sports, evenly divided between men and women, and has achieved a stature respected across the nation. Numerous Scarlet Knights and Lady Knights squads have enjoyed tremendous success.

It is with firm commitment, long experience and unbounded energy that Gruninger directs the Division. His association with the department began in 1963, when he was named head golf coach. He was appointed Assistant Athletic Director in 1968. Three years later, he was named Associate Athletic Director. A 1953 Rutgers graduate, Gruninger coached the golf team between 1963 and 1972, recording a 109-30-2 record and consistently taking teams and individuals into post-season competition.

Currently a member of the NCAA Council, the governing body of collegiate athletics, as well as serving on the Host Committee of the Kickoff Classic and the ECAC Council, Gruninger has also served on many prestigious NCAA and regional committees. These bodies make major decisions which affect football, basketball and other sports. He was a member of the College Football Association's Board of Directors and is currently a member of the Governor's Council on Physical Fitness. Additionally, he was co-organizer of the Collegiate Athletic Administration of New Jersey, an organization founded to serve and foster relations among the 42 four-year and two-year colleges in New Jersey which compete in men's and women's athletics.

Gruninger, who has been involved in numerous local and state charitable and athletic endeavors, is a native of Fanwood, NJ, and now resides in Martinsville. He and his wife, Barbara, are the parents of two sons – Mark, who holds a Rutgers doctorate in Ceramic Engineering, and Jack, who holds a systems engineering degree from the University of Virginia. Daughter Katherine is a 1985 Lafayette College graduate who played collegiate basketball and co-captained the squad as a senior.



HEAD COACH FRED HILL

The best picture a college coach can create is one of a winning program.

It is one thing to have a winning team, but any coach will tell you that they would rather have a successful program, which has depth and produces quality citizens, year after year.

Without question, Fred Hill has turned the Rutgers Baseball team into the Rutgers Baseball program and it has emerged as one of the best baseball programs in the nation.

• As every season ends the list of accomplishments becomes larger. The Rutgers program wins over 60% of its games on a regular basis. The team seems to advance farther into the NCAA Tournament every time it qualifies. More players are recognized and drafted by professional teams every year. Furthermore, the program is now on par with the top programs in America.

If you think that the last statement is not true, just ask Mike Sheppard of Seton Hall, Joe Russo of St. John's, Mike Roberts of North Carolina, Dr. John Winkin of Maine or Steve Webber, coach of the National Champion Georgia Bulldogs, because Rutgers defeated all of those nationally-recognized programs during the 1990 season.

In seven seasons, the numbers will testify to the greatness of the Rutgers program. Hill has a 211-127-2 record over that period. Furthermore, he has guided 16 players into the professional ranks, including Bob McDonald, who appeared in seven games for the Toronto Blue Jays last September. Hill also has coached three All-Americans and two Academic All-Americans.

The improvement in the team's play each season also illustrates the growth in the Rutgers Baseball program. In Hill's first year he was 25-15 and 28-18 in

the following year. The 1986 team went on to the first of three NCAA Tournaments under Hill. In 1988, Hill established a school record for wins in a 38-21-1 campaign and sent the Scarlet Knights to their second NCAA appearance.

It is only fitting that Hill be on of the top coaches at Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, since he is a native Garden Stater and has never held a coaching position outside of state lines.

As a matter of fact, all of Hill's noteworthy accomplishments have come in New Jersey.

A graduate of Upsala College in East Orange, Hill won an amazing 11 letters during his collegiqte career. Four came in baseball, where his best year came as a junior, when he led the team in hitting.

Four more came in football, which was his best sport. As a running back, he led the team in rushing in all four years and in scoring three times. He was the team's Most Valuable Back in 1954, '55 and '56, with the final year seeing Hill honored as a small college All-American

Hill also played for three seasons as a basketball player and was voted the squad's Most Improved Player in his senior season.

Upon graduation in 1957, Hill began his coaching career at his alma mater as freshman baseball coach. At the same time, he was on the staff of the East Orange Soverals, a semi-pro team in the Essex County league.

Hill moved on to Clifford Scott HS in East Orange in 1960 and was an assistant there for five years until he was named head coach. In the six years that followed, he led the Scotties to a 94-68 record and two state sectional championships. He also was an assistant football coach there.

The gridiron would be the home for Hill for the next four seasons as he took over as the head football coach at Pequannock HS. Following his stay with the Panthers, Hill returned to Upsala for three final years as and assistant baseball coach.

The big break for Hill came in 1977 when he was named baseball and football coach at Montclair State College. In seven years with the Indians, Hill developed the baseball program into one of the best Division III teams in the nation. His teams compiled a record of 148-91-2 over the time period. His 1983 team was his best one finishing 31-14-1 and earning a trip to the Division III World Series. This past spring, he was elected to the Montclair State Sports Hall of Fame.

Montclair also became a Division III football powerhouse with Hill at the helm His seven-year record was a stellar 52-16-4. He was instrumental in the development of Sam Mills who is now a starting linebacker with the New Orleans Saints of the NFL.

Fred and his wife Evelyn reside in Verona and have six children, Nancy, Fred Jr., and assistant basketball coach at Maine, Linda, Jim, Tracey and Karen. Fred's brother Brian is an assistant basketball coach with the Orlando Magic of the NBA.

Entering his third season at The State University under Coach Hill is Mike Garlatti. Garlatti played at Ramapo College, from where he was graduated in 1988. While with the Roadrunners, he was team captain and an All-Conference catcher. Mike also played at Middlesex County College for one season.

A native of Highland Park, N.J., Garlatti was an All-County and All-Conference catcher in his junior and senior seasons at Highland Park High School, while leading the Owls to two conference titles in the same two seasons.

After coaching for one year at Middlesex as a volunteer assistant, Garlatti became a full-time assistant in 1987 at Ramapo, where he was a jack-of-all-trades. His responsibilities ranged from coaching, to press work, to field maintenance. His efforts were greatly rewarded when Ramapo earned a bid to the 1987 Division III Playoffs.

This past summer, Garlatti served as head coach for the New Jersey A's of the Atlantic Collegiate Baseball League. He also coached ACBL All-Stars against the Korean National Team in August.

At Rutgers, Garlatti will coach the catchers, as well as work with the hitters. He also coordinates the team's recruiting efforts. Garlatti is single and resides in his native Highland Park.

TOM BAXTER


Returning for his second season as Rutgers assistant is Tom Baxter.

Before coming to Rutgers, Baxter coached scholastically for six seasons in Hudson County. Baxter became head coach at Dickinson High School in Jersey City in 1984 and stayed there for three years before moving to Marist High School in Bayonne. His 1988 team won the State Parochial "B" Championship. Baxter was instrumental in the development of Joe Borowski, an All-Stater who was taken in the 1989 amateur draft by the Chicago White Sox.

Baxter pitched scholastically at Bayonne (NJ) High School. In his senior season, he compiled a 16-0 record, which earned him a scholarship to the University of Miami (FL). He led the Hurricanes to a runner-up finish in the 1974 College World Series with an 8-3 record and a 2.25 ERA. He left Miami to sign a professional contract with the Oakland A's, where he lasted for two seasons before developing permanent arm trouble.

Baxter is the pitching coach and aids in the team's recruiting.

Tom and his wife, Terri, have two children, a five year old son \overline{T} .J., and a three year old daughter Mary Kate. They reside in Brick Township.

Baseball. The team won its third Atlantic 10 Conference championship, and thus, its third NCAA tournament bid in five years. In the tournament, Rutgers shocked the baseball world by defeating three nationally-ranked teams, including the eventual national champion, of the Northeast Regional.

Enthusiasm is the key word as the team enters the 1991 campaign. Coach goals of the team.

"As always, our top priority is to win the Eastern Division of the Atlantic 10 "That will get us to the conference tournament. From there, you just have to take it one step at a time.

"We feel like we have the potential to get back to the NCAA Tournament and even a reasonable chance to get to the College World Series. Last year's success gives us that feeling."

With 16 letterwinners and six starters returning from the Regional Final game lineup against Georgia, Hill feels that overall experience will be a great Rutgers pitching staff. The top two strength to this team.

"Our entire outfield is intact and the depth there is excellent," comments Hill. "The right side of our infield should be solid. We do, unfortunately, lose our shortstop, Ted Ciesla and our first baseman, Sean Ryan, to the professional ranks so we are looking at ways to offset that."

Here is a look at the Scarlet Knights broken down by position:

PITCHING

This is an area where Rutgers has to offset some losses. Gone from last year's team are two stalwarts in Bob Fazekas and Darrin Kotch. "Without a doubt, we are going to miss Darrin and Bob," states Hill. "What we are hoping for now are some of our returnees to fill the spots left by those two fine young men."

Easing the losses of those two starters is the return of All-American reliever Jim Kohl. A right-hander, Kohl was one of the nation's top short relievers in 1990,


with an 8-0 record and a 1.85 ERA. Kohl 1990 was a special year for Rutgers has one of the best curveballs in America. which he uses as his out pitch. He will be the ace of the Rutgers bullpen.

The starting rotation will have two mainstays in senior Dave Hornaday and Phil Schneider. Hornaday hurled the third no-hitter in school history last year against Upsala and it came during Georgia in advancing to the title game a dramatic run when he reeled off five consecutive victories late last season. Schneider was outstanding in his freshman campaign, winning all five of Hill, however, has not lost sight of the his decisions. A lefty who throws in the low 80's, Schneider give Hill another quality lefthanded starter.

Good news came when it was Conference," stated the Rutgers mentor. announced that Mike Barckley was returning to Rutgers. After sitting out last season, Barckley is looking to build on a strong 1989, when he went 6-1 with an ERA of under 2.00.

> Also returning to the fold is **Dave Hoehler**, the tallest Scarlet Knight at 6'5". He has developed nicely over his first two varsity seasons and is counted on to be the top spot starter on the staff.

> A bevy of freshman will be asked to step up and become factors on the candidates to enter the weekend rotation are Neil loviero and Scott **Simpson**, a pair of All-Monmouth County and All-Group pitchers. loviero,

a big lefty, has been timed in the low 80's and has developed a great changeup. Simpson had a good fall, where he showed impressive control and a good breaking pitch.

Coach Hill is excited about two of his "sleepers" in the freshman class. Lefty Brett Skapinetz was impressive in the fall season and may contend for a starting spot. After nursing a tender arm in the fall, the coaching staff is excited about the prospects for Vin Surace, who has good velocity. Providing depth in the long relief/spot starter role are **Steve** DePolo, who advanced from the "B" program and Colonia product Joe Martino. Joe improved a great deal over the fall and with a little more experience can help the Scarlet Knights.

OUTFIELD

Without question, the strength of the 1991 Scarlet Knights. All three starters are back and the reserve core is outstanding.

The return of Angel Echevarria has the coaching staff very excited. The team leader in homers last year with nine, Echevarria was one of only two freshman to be named to the All-Atlantic 10 team. Angel also paced Rutgers in slugging percentage (.540). Echevarria has an excellent arm in rightfield and has improved on his overall defensive

As he enters his junior season, Jay Marchese looks to improve on some good career numbers. In two years Marchese has shown good power (17 doubles and seven homers, good speed (8/10 in stolen bases) and some great defensive ability. Highlighting his 1990 season was a long home run against All-American hurler Oscar Munoz of Miami. FL.

The centerfield postion shapes up as a duel between two speedy players. Doug Meiner hit .306 and tied for the team lead in triples with five. Ironically, he was tied in tree-base hits with his competition in center, Jim Cann, who missed the fall campaign because of his football duties as a tailback. The 1990 team MVP, Cann had a monstrous season last year, pacing the squad in

runs (39) and steals (9/10). The player that does not start in the field will probably be the righthanded DH.

Gerckens could prove to be very valuable, as could his glove in the late innings. Speed is the best asset for **Tim Roth**. Roth, who could play any of the outfield positions as well as first base, batted .350 in a limited role. Coach Hill is also excited about the play of freshman Doug Alongi, a 1988 All-Stater from St. Joseph's High School in Metuchen, who may be the fastest Scarlet Knight ever to enter the program.

INFIELD

On the right side of the infield, things are pretty set. Captain Chris McAlindin will anchor the infield at second base. "Mac" has been a two-year starter, where he has posted a .312 career average. Amazingly, he has struck out only 10 time in two seasons, which makes him the prototype number two-hitter.

After a slow start in his freshman year, Mark Hughes looks to challenge

for substantial playing time. He ended the year at .238, but made great strides as the season progressed especially on The lefthanded bat of **John** defense, when he was swithched from third to second.

> Moving up from the "B" program is Adam Deutsch, who will bring good defensive skills to the varsity level. He will battle for playing time at first base as well as a DH.

> The biggest hole to fill is at shortstop, where Ted Ciesla departed for the professional ranks after a remarkable junior season. Coach Hill is toying with two options. He could shift Mike Winchock from third to short, which was his natural position in high school Winchock was simply brilliant in the post season, hitting safely in all four Atlantic 10 Tournament games and four fo the six NCAA Regional tilts. If that occurs, the third base spot will be occupied by by Jason Imperial, a transfer from Tennessee. In two seasons as a Volunteer, Imperial hit 11 homers in the pitching-tough SEC. Jason showed

excellent skills in the fall.

Solidifying the hot corner is freshman Brian Donnelly, an two-sport All-Stater at Madison Central High School.

It helps to have a utility player in the infield. Rutgers has that player this season in the person of Joe Litterio, a product of the "B" program.

CATCHER

Mike Higgins, after an outstanding NCAA Tournament, is the incumbent at catcher. Higgins was named to the All-Tournament team at the NCAA Regionals, where he batted .370 (10/27). He has the perfect catcher's body and will be the starter in 1991. His reserve core will include junior Steve Michaels, and freshman Kevin James and Scott Dzierzgowski. Michaels was slowed last year by a shoulder injury, but has excellent potential. Both James and Dzierzgowski had good showings in the fall. Coach Hill is Hoping to see one of these men step up and take charge as the top
