



ABOUT THE COVER — CREDITS

Rutgers Baseball has had eight All-Americans since 1950, when it made its only appearance in the NCAA College World Series. Ray Van Cleef is the only two-time honoree. Current NY Mets manager Jeff Torborg won honors in 1963, when he led the nation in batting with a .537 average. Three Fred Hill-coached players have garnered All-American status, and all are still around baseball. Joe Lynch, a catcher in 1985, is the head baseball coach at Kean College in Union, 1987 honoree Glen Gardner is currently on the Rutgers coaching staff, while Jim Kohl is beginning his second season in the Minnesota Twins organization.

RUTGERS, THE STATE UNIVERSITY

Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, with over 47,000 students on seven campuses in New Brunswick, Piscataway, Newark and Camden, is one of the major state university systems in the nation. Chartered as Queen's College, it is the eighth institution of higher learning to be founded in the colonies before the revolutionary war.

In 1825, the name of the college was changed to Rutgers to honor former trustee and revolutionary war Colonel Henry Rutgers. Rutgers College became a land grant institution of New Jersey in 1864, and, in the same year, the trustees established the Rutgers Scientific School, granting the B.S. degree. In 1880, the State Experiment Station for agricultural research was organized, and, in 1914, engineering was granted separate status as the College of Engineering. In 1921, the College of Agriculture (renamed Cook College in 1973) drew together the State Experiment Station, resident instruction, and the extension programs.


Douglass College was established in 1918 as the New Jersey College for Women. In 1924, the School of Education, which later became the Graduate School of Education, was authorized, as was the title Rutgers University. The College of Pharmacy, which was founded in 1892, joined the University in 1927. In 1934, University College was established for adult evening students, with branches in New Brunswick and Newark.

In 1945, the state legislature affirmed state support for the University, and the entire institution was "collectively designated as The State University of New Jersey." In 1956, it became Rutgers - The State University. The University expanded significantly in the forties and fifties in Newark and Camden. The University of Newark became a part of Rutgers in 1946, adding the Newark College of Arts and Sciences, the School of Law - Newark, and a school of business administration (now the Graduate School of Management) to the University system. In 1956, the College of Nursing was organized in Newark. In 1950, the College of South Jersey in Camden was incorporated into University structure as the Camden College of Arts and Sciences and the School of Law in Camden, and a University College branch was set up.


The Graduate Faculty became the Graduate School in 1952 and since that time, the following graduate schools have been established: the Graduate School of Library and Information Studies; the School of Criminal Justice (in Newark) in 1974; and the Graduate School of Applied and Professional Psychology in 1974. Also in 1974, the Graduate Faculty of Rutgers - Newark received degree granting authority, and in 1981, the Graduate School - Camden became a separate unit. In addition, numerous specialized institutes and research centers have been established over the years.

At the undergraduate level, Livingston College was founded in 1969, emphasizing the urban environment. In 1976, the Mason Gross School of the Arts was established offering both undergraduate and graduate programs, and the undergraduate School of Business opened in 1986.

Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, will continue to grow. Its direction dictated by the needs of the society it serves.



ADMINISTRATION



Dr. Francis L. Lawrence President

Dr. Francis L. Lawrence, a noted author and critic of French Literature, was named the 18th president of Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, on July 18th, 1990.


More that 47,000 students attend the 25 colleges and schools of The State University, which is the eighth oldest institution of higher learning in the country. The University has 175,000 living alumni. Dr. Lawrence comes to Rutgers from Tulane University in New Orleans, Louisiana, where he spent 28 years as a teacher and administrator. From 1962 to 1969, Lawrence was an instructor in French. He was then elected as French Department chair, a position he held until 1976, when he was named to his first administrative position as the Acting Dean of Newcomb College, a school within Tulane.

Lawrence, a native of Woonsocket, RI., became Academic Vice President and Provost and Dean of the Graduate School in 1982. In that position, Lawrence served as the chief academic officer of the over 11,000 students at Tulane, administering a budget of \$100 million, and was responsible for the administration of the academic programs in the colleges of liberal arts and sciences, the Graduate School, and the professional schools of law, social work, business, architecture, and engineering.

A distinguished writer and editor of numerous volumes of French Litrature, Lawrence is the author of the book "Moliere: The Comedy of Unreason." He has contributed to the publications "Visages de Moliere" and "The Influence of Rhetoric on 17th Century French Literature."

In 1977, he was decorated chevalier by the Palmes Academiques and received the John H. Stibbs award, given by the Tulane Student Senate for outstanding service to students, in 1977 and 1985

Dr. Lawrence and his wife, Mary Kay, are the parents of four children: Elizabeth Ann Hurley, Christoper, Naomi and Jennifer.



Frederick E. Gruninger Director of Athletics


In his more than 18 years as Director of Athletics, Fred Gruninger has guided the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics at Rutgers to unprecented growth and recognition. Since his appointment in January, 1973, the State University's athletic program has grown to 31 sports, evenly divided between men and women, and has achieved a stature respected across the nation. Numerous Scarlet Knights and Lady Knights squads have enjoyed tremendous success.

It is with firm commitment, long experience and unbounded energy that Gruninger directs the Division. His association with the Division began in 1963, when he was named head golf coach. He was appointed Assistant Athletic Director in 1968. Three years later, he was named Associate Athletic Director. A 1953 Rutgers graduate, Gruninger coached the golf team between 1963 and 1972, recording a 109-30-2 record and consistently taking teams and individuals into post-season competition.

Currently a member of the NCAA Council, the governing body of collegiate athletics, as well as serving on the Host Committee of the Kickoff Classic and the ECAC Council, Gruninger has also served on many NCAA and regional committees. These bodies make major decisions that affect football, basketball and other sports. He was a member of the College Pootball Association's Board of Directors and is currently a member of the Governor's Council of Physical Fitness. Additionally, he was co-organizer of the Collegiate Athletic Administration of New Jersey, an organization founded to serve and foster relations among the 42 four-year and two-year colleges in New Jersey which compete in men's and women's athletics.

Gruninger, who has been involved in numerous local and state charitable and athletic endeavors, is a native of Fanwood, NJ, and now resides in Martinsville. he and his wife, Barbara, are the parents of two sons - Mark, who holds a Rutgers doctorate in Ceramic Engineering, and Jack, who holds a systems engineering from the University of Virginia. Daughter Katherine is a 1985 Lafayette College graduate who played collegiate basketball and cocaptained the the squad as a senior.

HEAD COACH FRED HILL



While many coaches are dedicated to excellence, Fred Hill, year after year, presents it.

Excellence in his program can be illustrated in many ways. Look at his 244-151-4 record in eight seasons here on "the Banks", or at his four Atlantic 10 Conference titles in six years, or at his performances in the NCAA Tournament, specifically the 1989 Regional, where he led the Scarlet to win against three of the top 15 teams in America in a 24-hour period in reaching the finals, It is obvious by the on-the-field statistics that Hill had built a great program.

There is something else about a program that makes it excellent, and that is development. Coach Hill seems to have a knack for developing the all-around talents of his players. Under his tutelage over the past eight years, 18 players have signed professional contracts, including Rob MacDonald, who spent almost the entire 1991 season with the Toronto Blue Jays, where he posted a 3-3 record as a mokie. Hill's players have also enjoyed tremendous success in the classroom, where four of his players have earned GTE/CoSida District II All-Academic Team honors, and two of them, Scott Trochim and Mike Haberman, have been touted as Academic All-Americans, As both students and athletes, Hill has

a proven track record for development and maturity the players in his program.

The improvement of the team's play each season also illustrates the growth of the Rutgers Basebali program. In Hill's first year, he endured his only losing season at Rutgers with a 13-21 record. The 1984 squad went 25-15, and 28-18 the following year. The 1986 team advanced to the first of four NCAA Tournaments under Hill. In 1988, the single-season win record was established with a 38-21-1 mark, a year which saw another NCAA appearance. The 1990 team will long be remembered as the one that excited and shocked college baseball when Rutgers defeated Maine, North carolina and Georgia in a 24-hour period to advance to within one game of the College World Series. Georgia beat the Scarlet Knights in the regional final, and went on to capture the national championship.

It is only fitting that Hill has become one of the top coaches at The State University, since he is a native Garden Stater, and has never held a coaching position outside of state lines.

As a matter of fact, all of Hill's noteworthy accomplishments have come in New Jersey.

A graduate of Upsala College in East Orange, Hill won an amazing 11 letters during his collegiate career. Four came in baseball, where he led the team in batting as a junior.

Four more came in football, which was his best sport. As a running back, he led the team in rushing in all four years, and in scoring three times. He was the team's Most Valuable Back in 1954, '55 and '56, with the final year seeing Hill honored as small college All-American.

Hill also played three seasons as a basketball player, and was voted most immproved player as a senior.

Upon graduation in 1957, Hill began his coaching career at his alma mater as freshman baseball coach. At the same time, he was on the staff of the East Orange Soverals, a semi-pro team in the Essex County league.

Hill moved to Clifford Scott HS in East Orange in 1960, and was an assistant coach there for five years, when he was promoted to head coach. In the six seasons that followed, Hill led the Scotties to a 94-58 record and two state sectional championships. He was also assistant football coach during that stretch.

The gridiron would be home to Hill for the next four seasons, as he took over the head coaching reins at Pequannock HS. Following his stay with the Panthers, Hill returned to Upsala for three final years as an assistant baseball coach.

The big break came for Hill in 1977, when he was named baseball and football coach at Montclair State College. In his seven years with the Indians, he developed one of the real powers in Division III baseball. His teams compiled a record of 148-91-2 over the time period, and his 1983 team, his last at Montclair, was 31-14-1 and advanced to the Division III College World Series.

Montclair also became a Division III football power with Hill at the helm. His sevenyear record was a stellar 52-16-4, and he was instrumental in the development of Sam Mills, who is a Pro-Bowl linebacker with the New Orleans Saints. When you consider that Jay Aldrich, a player with two different major league teams, was also coached by Hill at Montclair, you see that Hill is one of the real rarities in coaching in that he has guided players into the professional ranks in two major sports.


For his great contributions to the Montclair athletic program, Hill was elected last spring to the Montclair State Sports Hall of Fame.

Fred and his lovely wife, Evelyn, reside in Verona and have six children, Nancy, Fred Jr., an assistant basketball coach at Fairleigh Dickinson University, Linda, Jim, Tracey, and Karen. They are also the proud grandparents of Jessica and Danielle. Fred's brother, Brian, is an assistant basketballl coach with the Orlando Magic of the NBA.

COACHING STAFF



TOM BAXTER


One of the great scholastic pitchers in New Jersey history, Tom Baxter will enter his third season as the tutor of the Rutgers pitching staff.

Before coming to Rutgers, Baxter coached scholastically for six seasons in Hudson County, In 1984, Baxter began a three-year stint at Dickinson HS in Jersey City, before moving on to Bayonne's Marist HS. In the three years that followed, Baxter found large success, as his 1988 team took home the state Parochial "B" Championship. He was instrumental in the development of Joe Borowski, an all-state player selected in the 1989 amateur draft by the Chicago White Sox.

A scholastic standout at Bayonne HS, Baxter compiled a 16-0 record and all-state honors in his senior season, and earned a scholarship to the University of Miami. He helped lead the Hurricanes to a runner-up finish in the 1974 College World Series with an 8-3 record and a 2.25 ERA. He left Miami to sign a professional contract with the Oakland A's, where he lasted for two seasons before developing permanent arm troubles.

In addition to his pitching duties, Baxter aids in the team's recruiting.

Tom and his wife, Terri, reside in Brick, NJ, and have two children, T.J. (six) and Mary Kate (four).



GLEN GARDNER


One of the all-time greats in Rutgers baseball history, Glen Gardner returns for his second season as assistant coach.

Gardner still holds career records in hits (201), doubles (44) and RBI (141), His 22 doubles in 1988 is also a team mark. A .356 career hitter, Gardner was not only a power hitter, as his 11 career triples and 23 stolen bases in 27 career attempts would indicate.

The Immaculata HS graduate was twice drafted in the amateur draft. In 1987, he was taken in the 13th round by the San Diego Padres, but opted to stay at Rutgers for his junior year. He was drafted the following spring by the Braves, and signed a contract.

A three-time All-Atlantic 10 and 1986 All-American selection, Gardner played for three seasons in the organization, advancing as far as Sumpter, before being struck in the eye with a batted ball, which ended his career.

Gardner will work with the Scarlet Knight outfielders as well as the hitters.



GARY RESETAR

A member of the winningest team in Rutgers Baseball history, Gary Resetar returns to Rutgers as an assistant for his first season.

Resetar, a catcher on the 1988 squad that won 38 games, led the team in hitting that year with a .367 average. He also led the team in hits (76) and game-winning RBI (six).

Resetar, who batted .404 as a freshman in 1986, was a 19th-round selection of the Minnesota Twins in the 1988 amateur draft. He advanced to Kenosha (AA), and was invited to the major league camp in 1990. Midway through the season, Resetar was traded to the Cleveland Indians for future considerations. He finished out his career at Canton, before beginning on his coaching career here at The State University.

Resetar will coach the catchers this season and will aid in the recruiting efforts of the

Resetar still resides in his native Bayonne, NJ.

= 1992 SEASON OUTLOOK

While the 1992 Rutgers Baseball roster has many familiar faces, it is missing some key names. Gone from the program are three pitchers in Dave Hoehler, the 1991 Atlantic 10 Tournament Most Outstanding pitcher, Dave Hornaday, a 12-game winner in his career, and Jim Kohl, a 1990 All-American and the all-time saves leader in Rutgers history. Also departed are Jim Cann, a past team MVP, John Gerckens, a valuable reserve outfielder, and 1991 captain Chris McAlindin, who was the leader of the 1991 Scarlet Knights. Kohl was drafted by the Minnesota Twins in the the amateur draft. He joined Jason Imperial, the leading hitter on last year's team, as players who entered the professional ranks after the end of last season.

This past senior class proved to be one of the best in Scarlet Knight history, as they advanced to three NCAA Tournaments in four years. A third straight trip to the NCAAs will depend on how the program will be able to fill these gaps. Here is a breakdown on how the 1992 Scarlet Knights will attack the upcoming season.

PITCHING

It will not be easy to replace the leadership of the three seniors, especially Kohl, who was arguably the East's top closer. His eight saves in 1991 set a school record, and ended his brilliant career with an 18-9 record. In the fall, Albie Mallen emerged as a top candidate to replace Kohl in closer spot. A former quarterback on the football team, Mallen used the fall to sharpen his skills, and by the end of the fall, the righty began to regain his hard fastball as well as his slider. Lefty Brett Skapinetz, who spent most of the summer and fall recovering from a chronic back condition, could be used as a lefty complement out of the pen,

Freshman Mike Ricciardi, a hardthrowing righty, is also a candidate.

In the starting rotation, a problem arose in the fall when lefty Phil Schneider (7-2, 4.54), who has a 12-2 record in his first two seasons. developed some nerve damage in his throwing arm. It will probably require surgery, which may cause him to miss the 1992 season. Coach Hill can breathe a little easier knowing that he will have back Mike Barckley (6-1. 1.95 in 1989), a big righthander, after missing two seasons with a variety of shoulder problems. He was very effective as a freshman, and a solid fall seems to have him back on his game.

Also returning is Neil Ioviero (4-5, 5.59). The sophomore lefthander paced the Scarlet Knights in complete games with four, including a strong effort against Penn State in the Atlantic 10 Tournament which kept Rutgers in the championship hunt. Scott Simpson (2-1, 4.11) was very effective in a spot starter role last vear, has improved on his fastball, which should complement his very good breaking stuff. The coaching staff is also very optimistic about the recuperation of Vin Surace, who had to red-shirt last season after shoulder

surgery. A 1989 scholastic all-stater, Surace is a flame-thrower, and his health could be a key to the Rutgers pitching efforts. Two freshman to keep your eyes on are a pair of local products in Chris Cochrane and Mike Seel. Cochrane, a sturdily-built righthander, was a first-team all-stater at South Plainfield HS, where he went 11-1 in his senior season. The southpaw Seel, an All-Group IV hurler at E. Brunswick HS, was 8-2 as the ace of the staff.

The middle relief chores are in good hands, especially with the development of junior Steve DePolo (2-0, 4.78, one save), who has combined four pitches, including a forkball, into his repetoire. Righty Joe Martino (1-1, 7.57) had a solid summer and hopes to make a contribution in the spring. Freshman Vin DiChiara and Dave Fazekas will bolster the middle relief core.

INFIELD

Rutgers is experienced at the corners, with a starter returning at each position. Mike Winchock (.322, 2, 27), shifts back to third base after playing shortstop in 1991. The junior's home run against #7 Oklahoma State knotted that game, and put the cap on a great offensive season. "Winnie" has greatly improved with the glove, and will be a more than adequate fielder at the hot corner. He will be backed up by freshman Scott Kassan.

After being in a platoon situation last year, senior Steve Michaels (.281, 4, 12) used a strong post season and a good fall to help him gain the starting position in the spring. He is one of Rutgers' real long ball threats, and he showed that power by clubbing two monsterous home runs in the Atlantic 10 Tournament, Junior Adam Deutsch (.214, 0, 1) and provide depth here.

In the middle of the infield, coach Hill will be looking at a few bodies. One player who had shown

freshman Chris Matthews will

signs of having a big junior year is Mark Hughes (.264, 1, 9), who will get a good look at second base. Hughes has a great blend of speed and strength, and looks to be improved with the glove. Switch-hitting freshman Brian Gialella will challenge Hughes for the spot. A real battle is brewing at shortstop. Junior Joe Litterio (.250, 0, 2) and freshman Bob Windows are in a dogfight that is too close to call at this time. Litterio had a sharp fall, while Windows comes in with Pennsylvania All-State credentials. Freshman Scott Kmiec is a versatile sort who can play either middle-infield position.

OUTFIELD

One of the nation's top outfielders will be patrolling rightfield this year at Rutgers. Angel Echevarria (.358, 12, 54) is coming off a record-breaking season, setting school marks in homers (12), RBI (54) and hits (80). He is just three home runs shy of the career mark of 24. After a productive summer in the Cape Cod League, Echevarria will have the eyes of many professional scouts looking at him this year. Jay Marchese (.289, 3, 39) looks to close his great career out in fine

fashion. In three seasons, the sturdy leftfielder has shown a great blend of power, speed and defensive prowess. He has 10 career homers, 88 RBI, and has been outstanding on the base paths, swiping 23 bases in 29 career attempts (79.3%), He will also get a good look by the professional people. In center field, two seniors will battle for the position. Captain Tim Roth (.295, 0, 22) will switch from first to his normal position, and will battle senior Doug Meiner (.125, 1, 11) for the spot. Roth had a good 1991 with the bat, sporting a sparkling .640 average with runners in scoring position. Meiner, a solid defensive player, hopes to get back closer to his 1989 batting average of .306. Sophomore Doug Alongi (.326, 0, 18) returned to the diamond after a year layoff and became one of the East's top leadoff men. Alongi, who is also good with the glove, paced the team with his 21 stolen bases, and scored 44 runs in only 49 games. Freshman Craig Fleming impressed the coaching staff this fall, and the Ft. Lauderdale native appears to have a bright future. Andy Dengler is another first-year player who will provide depth in the Scarlet outfield.

CATCHER


There were plenty of heroes in the 1991 championship game victory over Massachusetts. To get to the final game on Sunday, Rutgers had to battle through the loser's bracket after being beaten by the Minutemen the day earlier. To win the tournament, Rutgers had to win three consecutive games, including two against Massachusetts, to get to the NCAA Tournament. Neil Ioveiro pitched a gem, and Steve Michaels had a long home run in the 4-2 win over Penn State. That set up another dramatic final day, which saw coach Hill's troops needing to sweep UMass to take the title. Game one went to extra innings, before Mike Winchock's RBI-single in the 10th was the margin of victory in the 5-4 win. Jim Kohl pitched 2.2 innings to get the win.

The nightcap was a typical Rutgers Atlantic 10 nail-biter. Trailing 2-1 after six innings, Rutgers got a run in the seventh and six in the eighth to spark an 8-3 victory. Dave Hoehler, who surrendered seven runs in 2.2 innings to UMass a day earlier, hurled a complete game seven-hitter to earn Most Outstanding Pitcher honors while Jason Imperial was named the tournament's Most Outstanding Player on the strength of a .555 average and seven RBI.





Sam Ferretti - A member of the Indians organization last season, Ferretti was a utility infielder for Canton Akron franchise. Had 12 doubles and three triples in 299 ABs, driving in 23 runs. Will play in the Baltimore Orioles chain in 1992.
