THE BIG EAST

Beginning in 1996, Rutgers will compete in the two-division BIG EAST Baseball Conference. Each member participates in a divisional round-robin format, playing each divisional opponent three (3) times per season and each non-divisional opponent twice per season.

The conference produces the league schedule which uses a two-year rotating cycle. The order of opponents and site reverses in year two of the cycle. Cross-divisional opponents play a two-game series using a travel partner system, in a Saturday-Sunday doubleheader format. Divisional opponents play a three game series at one site. In this system, Rutgers and Seton Hall are travel partners and will play each other on successive Wednesdays.

Weekend divisional series consists of a seven-inning game at noon and a nine-inning game to follow on Saturday. On Sunday, the two teams

will play a nine-inning game. Weekend cross-divisional series consist of a seven-inning and nine-inning doubleheader on both Saturday and Sunday. The travel series consists of a seven-inning game and a nine-inning game the first Wednesday and a nine-inning game the following Wednesday.

The conference tournament will comprise six teams and take place at Thomas J. Dodd Memorial Stadium in Norwich, Connecticut. A series of criteria will be used to determine the six teams that compete in the tournament. After each division is seeded 1-4 based on overall league winning percentage, the top two teams in each division will be included in the tournament. The BIG EAST Baseball committee will then pool the remaining four teams and evaluate them using a series of criteria already agreed upon, the first being overall league winning percentage. The presumption prior to evaluation is that both #3 teams will be invited.

FRED HILL

HEAD BASEBALL COACH

RUTGERS UNIVERSITY

The Rutgers Baseball program, headed by Fred Hill, is one of the finest in the Northeast. Now in 1996, he leads RU on a new challenge in the BIG EAST Conference, one of college baseball's best.

His teams approach the game the way Fred Hill approaches everything he does. Through hard work, flawless execution and attention to detail, Rutgers baseball has reached a level that not many enjoy in college baseball.

His tireless and relentless dedication to making the Rutgers program one of the best in college baseball is renowned and his results are nothing short of outstanding. Hill has guided the Scarlet Knights to five NCAA tournament appearances in the last nine years, making Rutgers one of only two Northeast programs to accomplish this feat.

A coach for over 19 years on the collegiate level, Hill reached the historical 500 win plateau last year. His winning percentage as a college coach is .612, one of the finest at Rutgers. With the move to the BIG EAST Conference, Rutgers baseball will look to further enhance its reputation as a power in the East, and along with it carry on the tradition of excellence which coach Hill has established.

He began his college baseball coaching career at Montclair State University, and guided the Red Hawks to 148 wins and three post-season appearances, ultimately reaching the Division III World Series in 1983. That year he was also named District III Coach of the Year. After guiding the MSU baseball program to its highest level, he left Montclair for a new challenge: to revitalize the Rutgers baseball program, which was once a dominant force in the East.

He started at Rutgers in 1984 and the positive results were almost immediate. In just his third season, he guided the Scarlet to the Atlantic 10 Championship and the NCAA Tournament. In the following seasons, he directed Rutgers to four more conference championships and NCAA Tournaments. He has won an impressive 370 games "On The Banks" and boasts a .612 winning percentage. Twice he led Rutgers to a school record 38 games, the first time in 1988 and most recently in 1993.

In 1990, he took the Scarlet to the brink of the College World Series, advancing the team to the finals of the East Region, ultimately losing to eventual national champion Georgia. To get to that game, Rutgers defeated three Top 20 teams (Maine, North Carolina, and Georgia) in successive games.

Not one to take individual credit for some lofty achievements, Hill credits his assistants,



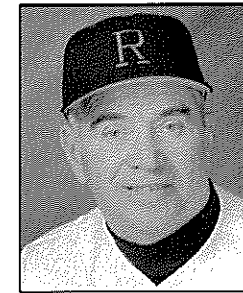
both current and former, as people who have had as much to do with Rutgers' success as anyone. He also credits his players. Time and time again, Hill cites his players' desire to work hard

Possibly his greatest attribute is his ability to teach the game and develop talent. During his tenure, four players have earned All-America honors and 23 players have signed professional contracts, including four Scarlet Knights in the past two seasons. Currently, one of his most recent disciples, Eric Young, stars for the Colorado Rockies and Bob MacDonald was a key part of the New York Yankees' bullpen.

Hill has also seen many of his assistants move on and become very successful head coaches. Former Hill assistant Norm Schoenig guided the Montclair State Red Hawks to the Division III National Championship in 1993 and was named Division III Coach of the Year.

Another former assistant Mike Garlatti is now a primary scout for the Colorado Rockies. Former Scarlet Knights Joe Litterio and Neil Ioviero work as assistants in New Jersey at Monmouth University and Kean College, respectively. RU All-American Joe Lynch was the head coach at Kean College while former Hill assistant John Seymour was the head coach at Rowan College.

A three-sport star at Upsala College, Hill earned 11 letters. Four letters came in baseball, where he led the baseball team in batting twice. Four more came in football, where he led the team in rushing four times and was named the football team's Most Valuable Back three times and a named Small College All-American following his senior year. He earned three more letters in basketball, where he was voted Most Improved Player his senior year. In recognition of an outstanding career as a baseball coach, Hill was honored by his alma mater, in 1992, as a distinguished alumnus who has achieved excellence in his chosen profession.

After his graduation, he began coaching the baseball team at Upsala and also played semi-pro baseball for the East Orange Soverals. His next move was to Clifford Scott High School, where he was an assistant baseball coach for five years and head coach

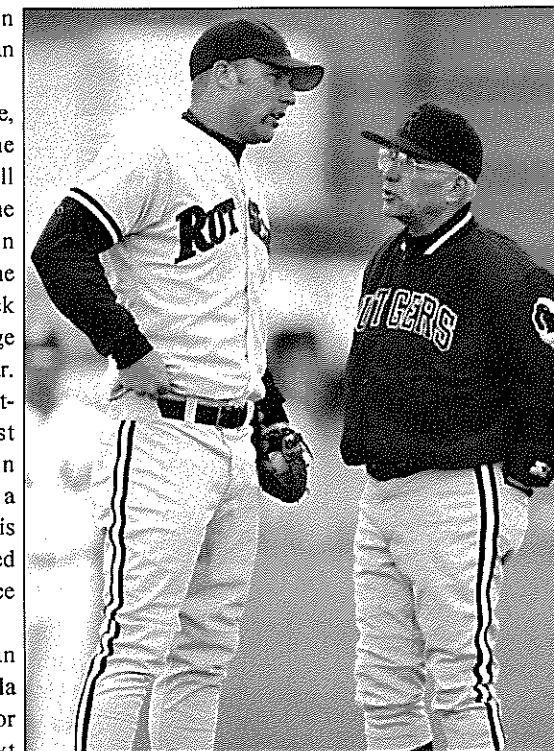

Be assured, however, that Hill puts his players in a position to succeed, tells them and shows them how to succeed and then lets them do what they're

for another six. During those six years, Hill led the Scotties to a 94-58 record, two state sectional championships, and also served time as an assistant football coach. He moved on to coach the Pequannock High School football team for four years and then returned to Upsala as an assistant baseball coach for three years.

In 1977, he was named head baseball and football coach at Montclair State. In his career with Montclair State, he developed the baseball team into a Division III power, winning 62 percent of his games and earning a trip to the Division III World Series. As a football coach, he was instrumental in the development of Sam Mills, now a Pro Bowl inside linebacker selection for the New Orleans Saints, and Jay Aldrich, a Major League ballplayer with two different organizations. For these contributions and many more to the Montclair State Athletic Department, he was selected to their Sports Hall of Fame in 1991.

The tremendously successful and decorated head coach is just as dedicated to his family. He lives in Verona with his wife Evelyn and has six children: Nancy, Fred Jr., Linda, Jim, Tracey, and Karen. He and Evelyn also have four grandchildren; Jessica, Danielle, Brian, and James Patrick. A coaching-rich family, Fred's brother Brian is the coach of the Orlando Magic in the NBA and his son Fred Hill Jr. is an Associate Head Coach at Fairleigh Dickinson University.



Under coach Hill, Rutgers won more Atlantic 10 Championships, went to more NCAA Tournaments, than any team in the conference. Coach Hill was named Coach of the Year an unprecedented three times and Rutgers boasted the highest winning percentage in the conference.

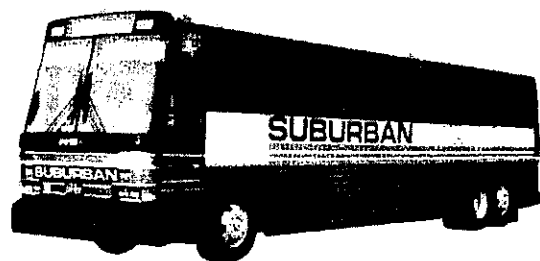

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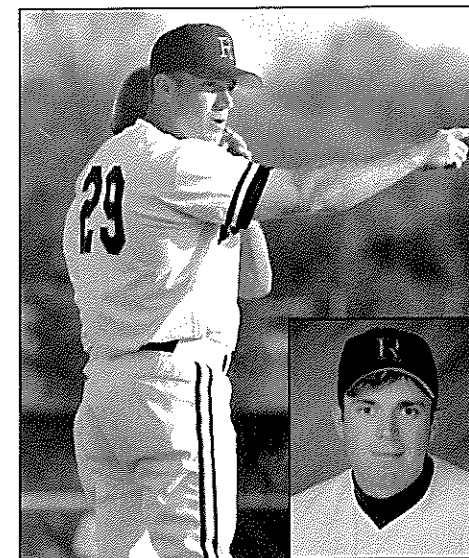

ASSISTANT COACHES



GLEN GARDNER

One of the finest players in Rutgers' history, coach Gardner is now in his fifth season working as coach Hill's right-hand man. He assists coach Hill in overseeing the day-to-day responsibilities of the program, recruiting and works as the batting and outfielders coach.

His strengths are his easygoing nature and his ability to communicate with the Scarlet Knight players. Ironically, several of his pupils are now eclipsing Gardner's records, something he accepts with a smile.

A 1986 and 1987 All-American outfielder at Rutgers, Gardner had some of the most productive offensive seasons in school history. In his three seasons, he compiled a career .356 batting average with 23 home runs, 141 runs batted in. All three numbers rank among the Rutgers all-time top 10 and he ranks among Rutgers' top 10 in 11 offensive categories and holds the record for doubles in a season with 22 in 1988, and career marks in doubles (44) and total bases (336).

In 1987, the San Diego Padres chose him in the 13th round. He opted to stay at RU and was selected by Atlanta the next year. Gardner advanced to Burlington, Iowa in the the Atlanta Braves organization before being struck in eye by a batted ball, which ended his career.

Under Gardner's tutelage, several Scarlet Knights have had outstanding seasons. Among others, Doug Alongi, Angel Echevarria, and Mike Higgins dot the Scarlet Knight record books and all moved on to professional baseball following their RU careers.

TOM BAXTER

One of the most recognized coaches in New Jersey, Tom Baxter begins his seventh season as pitching coach with the Scarlet Knights. Baxter also assists coach Hill with recruiting.

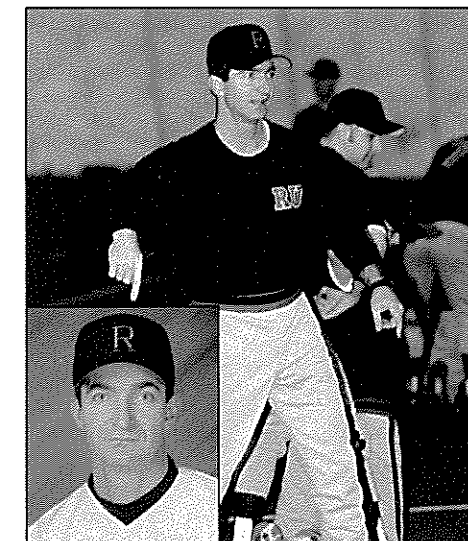
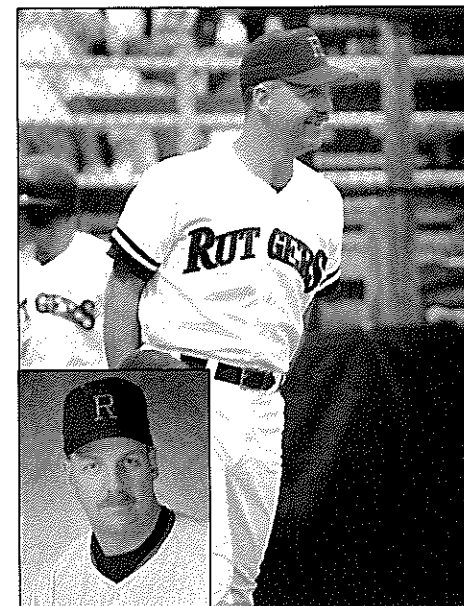
His success with the Scarlet Knight pitchers is unquestioned. Several of his pupils rank among the all-time best at Rutgers and five Scarlet hurlers have been drafted in the last five seasons.

A tremendously successful high school and collegiate pitcher, Baxter's strength is his ability to relate his experiences to today's pitchers. After a 16-0, All-State senior season at Marist High School in Jersey City, he was drafted by the New York Mets in the eighth round of the Major League Baseball draft. He chose to accept a full scholarship to the University of Miami and in his freshman season, he helped lead the Hurricanes to the 1974 College World Series with an 8-3 record.

In 1976 he was drafted by the Oakland A's in the first round of the supplemental draft. He began his pro career with a no-hitter in his first start, but arm troubles ended his career after two seasons.

He came to Rutgers after an extremely successful career as a head baseball coach in Hudson County. In 1984, he began a three-year stint at Dickinson High School in Jersey City before going back to Marist. He led Marist to the 1988 Parochial B State Championship and was also responsible for beginning the development of Joe Borowski, who was drafted by the Chicago White Sox in 1989 and pitched for the Baltimore Orioles last season.

Tom and his wife Terri reside in Pt. Pleasant, NJ and have three children, T.J. (10), Mary Kate (8) and Claire (two).



JERRY HAND

Coach Hand begins his first season at Rutgers working as a volunteer assistant. His responsibilities at Rutgers include working with the catchers and assisting coach Baxter with the pitchers.

A welcome addition to the coaching staff, Hand comes to Rutgers by way of Oregon where he was head baseball coach at Pacific University in Forest Grove, Oregon.

Prior to his appointment at Pacific, Hand worked his way through the coaching ranks while earning several secondary degrees.

In 1983, he began his coaching career at his former high school, Blue Ridge in New Milford, Pennsylvania. He spent the next two years earning an MS in Sports Sciences at Indiana University in Pennsylvania before returning to Blue Ridge as the baseball coach for two seasons.

In 1986, Hand moved up to the college ranks, accepting the head coaching job at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, where he stayed for three seasons.

In 1989, Hand relocated to Louisiana where he spent a year coaching at Louisiana State University for coach Skip Bertman. His responsibilities at LSU included working with the outfielders and hitters. He earned a PhD. from LSU in 1993 and spent a year teaching before moving on to Pacific.

A 1982 graduate of Kutztown State, Hand was a three-year starter in the outfield and was named All-Conference his senior year after leading the conference in hitting.

Hand and his wife Janine have three children, Jackie (4), Jerry (2) and Jimmy (1).

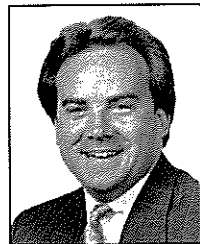
Delores Sherwood

1996 PREVIEW

Nineteen Ninety Six will be a historical year for the Rutgers Baseball program as the Scarlet Knights, led by coach Fred Hill, will participate in the BIG EAST Conference, which is now considered to be one of the best baseball conferences in America.

No longer will Rutgers battle traditional BIG EAST rivals Seton Hall, Connecticut, St. John's and the rest in midweek games where the pitching isn't quite as deep and the regulars get some rest. Now it will be the best against the best, vying for a spot in the six-team conference tournament..

Traditionally one of the powers in the East, Rutgers has always scheduled the top teams in the country which translates into experience. Because of that experience, the step up in competition won't be a culture shock. With the return of almost the entire 1995 pitching staff, there is a quiet confidence that Rutgers' debut in its new conference will be a good one.

It's quiet confidence because a lot hinges on the health of last season's top three pitchers Scott Madison, Bob Prusiensky and Mike Seel. All three were lost for a good portion of the season last year which was a major factor in Rutgers suffering its first losing season in 11 years. Madison, a career 9-2, pitcher was the first to go. In his opening day start, he had to leave the game after just five innings with an injured left pitching elbow. He did not return and Rutgers lost what was expected to be one of the dominant pitchers in the Atlantic 10.

Prusiensky was the next to go down. He developed calcium deposits in his pitching elbow and that set off a chain of events beginning with a slight change in his motion, to compensate, and ended when he shut it down after eight starts. As the season began, Prusiensky was expected to battle both Madison and Seel for the top spot in the rotation, but it never developed. Prusiensky has pitched against some of the nation's best teams and his career record is an impressive 9-3. If he regains his old form, Rutgers will have a workhorse to take the mound against the top teams on the schedule.

Seel was the third starter that was lost to injury last season. Like Prusiensky, he started eight games last year, but a line drive that caught him on his left thumb ended the southpaw's season. Seel, a scholastic star for nearby East Brunswick, looked to be coming last season with wins in four consecutive starts. But his string was ended in the fourth inning against West Virginia. He did get himself ready to pitch in the Atlantic 10 Tournament and in doing so showed a leadership quality that Rutgers will need this year. He

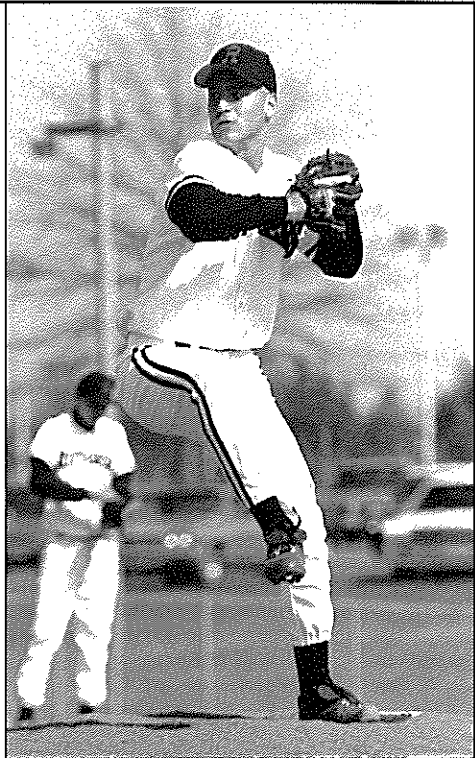
was never called upon in the Tournament, but threw better than he has ever had in the summer and in fall practice, raising hopes that Seel can be the dominant pitcher that he was expected to be when he came to RU.

The return of those three will be a big lift to the hopes and expectations for the season, but it might be too much to expect everything to fall into place for the trio. In their absence last year, coach Hill sent three freshmen to the mound on conference weekends and by the end of the year, the entire pitching staff was made up of seven freshmen, two sophomores and one junior. To make matters worse, only two of them had any college pitching experience. With the inexperience came inconsistency but the silver lining is the amount of innings and maturity the pitching staff developed.

Hard-throwing sophomore Rich Kennedy went 6-6 in 12 games and 63 innings. He led the Scarlet Knights in wins and strikeouts (37) and tied fellow sophomore Tom Phillips for team honors with 10 starts. Phillips looked to be the most consistent of the freshman hurlers. He led the team in ERA (3.41), innings (71.1) and had two shutouts. His most impressive start was a complete game effort against George Washington in the Atlantic 10 Tournament. With RU facing elimination, Phillips held the Colonials, a team which knocked him out of his previous start one week earlier, to just four runs. In doing so he showed the maturity and determination that comes with experience. Both Kennedy and Phillips will battle their more experienced teammates for innings and starts.

The Atlantic 10 Tournament was the setting for sophomore Mike Mundy to come of age. Mundy had to come in and relieve Kennedy in the opening game of the tournament. With Rutgers down 9-3 in the fourth, he came in and dominated the UMass hitter in 4.1 innings, allowing just one run but striking out six. RU eventually fell short in losing 10-9, but he began the momentum that saw the team win its next two games and advanced to the championship game of the tournament. Mundy was able to use that effort and build over the summer and fall.

Sophomore Bill Malloy also had an impressive fall after a strong summer. Last season, he combined with junior Brian Stegen to form a solid 1-2 punch in the bullpen. Both Stegen and Malloy were ironmen in the bullpen. Stegen led the way with 27 appearances and Malloy was second with 23. Stegen made the greater splash with a school record nine saves in only his first season of pitching. Malloy, meanwhile was 2-0 with 32.1 innings compared to Stegen's 29 IP. Stegen rested his arm over the summer and fall and concentrated on his hitting and playing first base, he also served as the DH last year, Malloy was able to hone his craft and looked impressive. Stegen, a hard thrower with a good slider, will be challenged by coach Hill to become more of a compete pitcher. If he can, Stegen could be dominant.



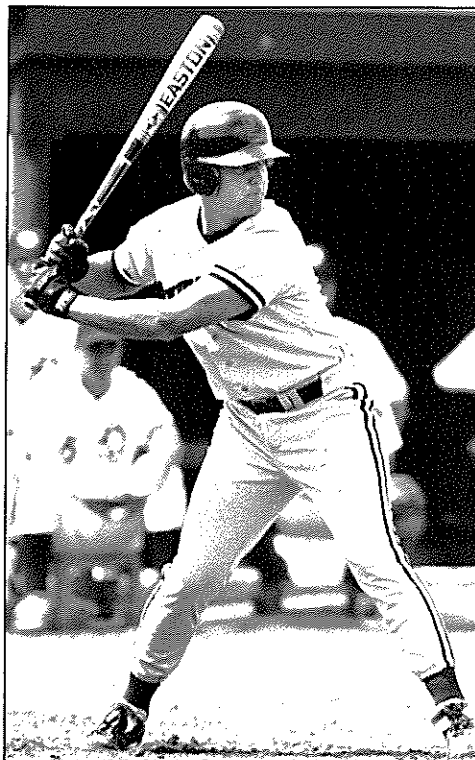
MIKE SEEL EMERGED LAST SEASON, WINNING FOUR OF HIS LAST FIVE STARTS

Also look for lefties Dan Brassem and Jeff Miller to add depth to the rotation. Brassem sat out last season after breaking his ankle in the fall. He looked good in the fall as did Miller. After redshirting a year, Miller got his feet wet last season in four games. Both will be important if the Knights are going to make a run at the post season, as will freshmen Scott Burkholder and Brett Hawken. Both freshmen sat out in the fall to rest tired pitching arms but did throw at the beginning of spring practice. Both have impressive credentials, Burkholder was undefeated last season which included a stretch of 23 consecutive scoreless innings and Hawken was a first-team All State choice out of Pascack Hills High School.

Each pitcher will bring with him plenty of experience. But that won't always be the case when coach Hill sends the other eight players onto the field. Gone from last season's team is three-fourths of the infield, the left fielder and the catcher. First baseman Scott Kassan and shortstop Bob Windows were four-year starters, second baseman Brian Giallella, left fielder Dave Fazekas and catcher Kevin James were two years starters. All five are gone. Together they had participated in four Atlantic 10 tournaments and an NCAA Regional. Their experience in big games and their day-to-day work ethic will be missed. But the cupboard isn't bare.

Replacing Windows at shortstop will be heralded freshman Dave Marciniak. Marciniak, an All State selection from Woodbridge High School, was selected

in the eighth round of the Major League Amateur Draft by the Toronto Blue Jays. He turned down the Jays and thus became one of the highest-rated players

to come to Rutgers. A silky smooth fielder with a powerful bat, the sky is the limit for Marciniak. Backing him up at short will be freshman Rich Wurst, another scholastic star in New Jersey. Junior Rich Saitta could play shortstop, but he will be the starting second baseman.

After two seasons at third base, Saitta, will replace Giallella at second base. After a stellar debut and freshman All-America honors, Saitta took a step backward offensively last year. Batting in the third hole, he led the team with 39 RBI but his average never reached the level of the previous year. If Saitta can return to his old form he will be a catalyst for the offense. In his two seasons at the "hot corner" his physical ability allowed him to make the spectacular play but was also inconsistent. Moving over to second is a natural for him and he looked very comfortable in practice. He will be backed up by sophomore John Schneider. Schneider is also excellent defensively. Both he and Wurst could be interchangeable in the middle infield and are both very fast.

Sophomore Paul Gallucci looks to be the every day third baseman after a year as a backup outfielder and DH. In spot duty he hit .310 with eight extra base hits. He is a very good third baseman and his potential is unlimited. One of the harder working players on the team, Gallucci could be the most improved player on the team. But holding onto his job won't be easy, despite of all his positives. Junior Mike Stephens walked into the lockerroom after two seasons playing football, and hit .338 with two HRs. Statistically,

Stephans and Gallucci were almost identical last year. In three more ABs, Stephens had three more hits and two more RBI, while Gallucci scored three more runs. Those two are going to push each other towards outstanding years.

The same can be said about first base. Heading into the season, freshman Pete Zoccolillo had a tenuous grasp on the position. A shortstop by trade, he is making the difficult transition to first where the graduated Kassin was possibly the finest defensive first baseman in Rutgers history. Offensively, Zoccolillo has a sweet lefty swing. If he can become comfortable with the leather, Zoccolillo, rated as a Blue Chip prospect by *Collegiate Baseball* last year, can hold onto the first base job for a long time. The other two first basemen on the roster are interesting cases. Junior Kyle Pierson spent last year working at first base without seeing much playing time. He looked to be a significant contributor last season, if not at first at least as a DH. But he never got on track with the bat last season.

The other option at first is Stegen, the stopper. He has excellent athletic ability and has played first in a handful of games. He is a career .300 hitter with power. The only questions for Stegen, if he should be used at first, is, "Can he maintain a high level of productivity as a first baseman and pitcher, which includes hitting for a high average with power?" Stay tuned.

One facet of the game the team lacked last year, was speed. That won't be the case this year and it begins in the outfield. Seniors Sal Aquino and Ed Belko return, with Belko holding an edge in experience. He has played different roles for this team his first three years and last year he played in 56 of 57 games in center. He has speed and good instincts, which are important in the vast expanse of the Class of '53 Complex outfield, Rutgers' home stadium. While bringing a consistent level of defense to every game, his offense was inconsistent. Belko's challenge will be to bring more consistency and raise his overall level of play, in his final year at Rutgers. He will be pushed by two underclassmen whose greatest assets may be their speed. Sophomore Shawn Williams saw spot action last season in left and center field last year and can run down most fly balls. He was 4-5 in stolen base attempts and looked very promising in the fall. He will push to start in left and give Belko a run in center along with freshman Adam Neubart. Neubart battles Williams in left and center and has as much potential as any freshman on the roster. Neubart is fast, gets a great jump on the ball and hits for average and power. If he can show consistency at the plate, he will be a regular in the lineup.

The aforementioned Aquino has a home in right field. He is the team's top returning slugger after belting six home runs last year. A vocal leader, Aquino's leadership will be important to the team. He will be

pushed by sophomore Craig Brenhiser. Brenhiser has one of the strongest arms on the team and is Aquino's equal defensively. His swing never came around for him and he didn't get much playing time last year, but he could emerge this year.

The competition for the starting left field job is joined by converted second baseman Kent Speedy. Speedy has a terrific bat. Coach Hill moved him into the left field competition in an attempt to get more offensive production in the lineup. If he become comfortable in left, he will see plenty of playing time. Also look for UNC-Greensboro transfer Jay Jaworski to be in the mix. He has tremendous potential but hasn't played much over the past two season, which includes a redshirt year. He was a heralded scholastic outfielder in Connecticut and his addition to the roster is a welcome one.

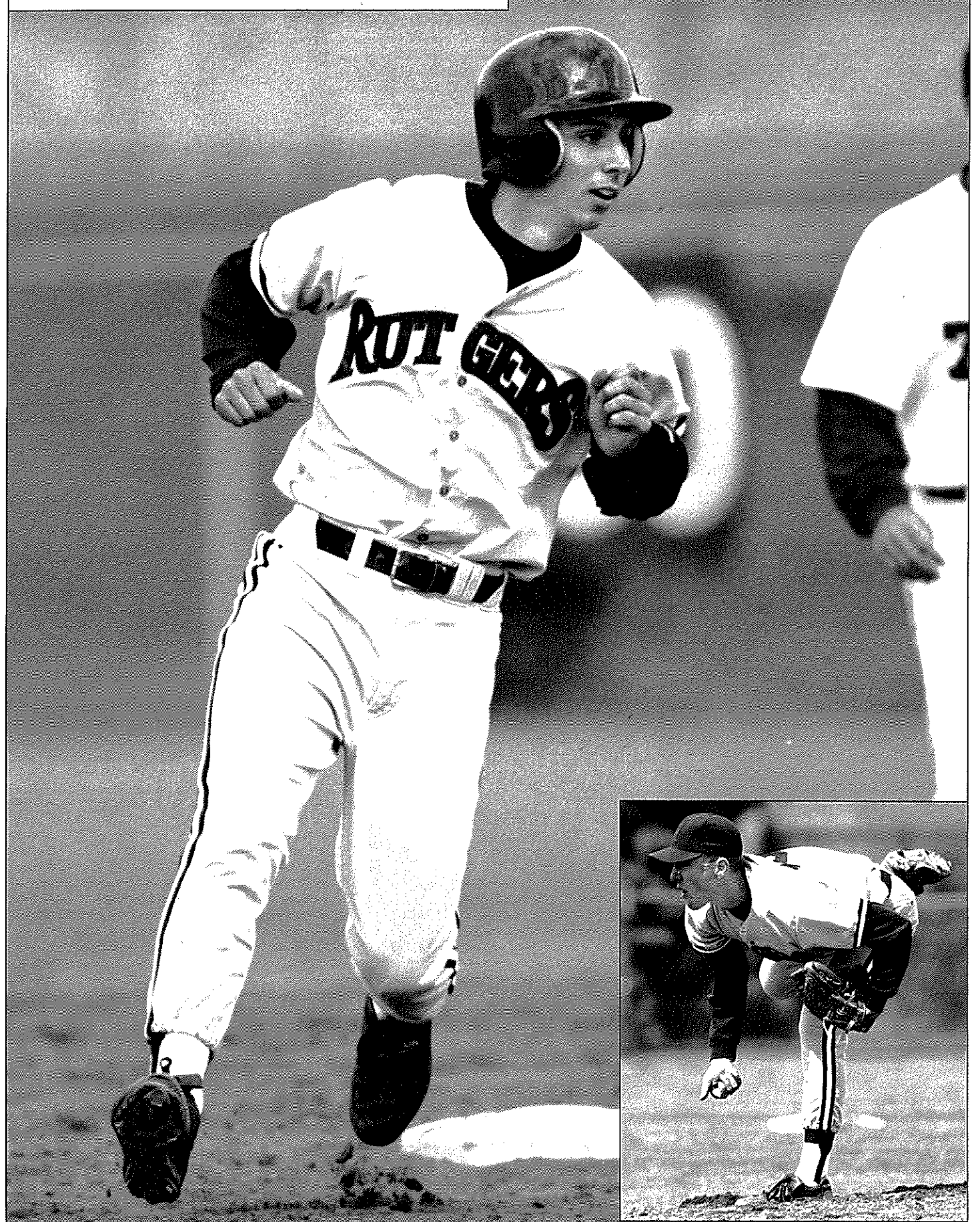

The loss of James behind the plate leaves a void that three sophomores and a freshman will fight to fill. Traditionally, coach Hill has had a "heir apparent" behind the plate, someone ready to take over for a graduated or drafted pitch caller. This year it all about competition. Sophomores Chris Dorsett, Jay Laub and Joe Waleck along with freshman Matt Keller have engaged in the fiercest battle for playing time of any position. Coming out of the fall, it looked like Laub, a switch hitter, was listed at the top of the depth chart. He has a strong arm, perhaps the strongest on the team, and he is good defensively. Last year he struggled to become comfortable behind the plate. But his unfailing work ethic paid off with a new confidence and performance as he heads into 1996. While Laub struggled, Waleck was impressive at the plate, hitting .560 in 14 games. Dorsett appeared in 25 games last season and he is solid in all facets of the catching position. There is no question that the battle among the three has raised their level of play to new heights. The one who shows the most consistency will play the most. Keller, meanwhile, is uncharted waters but he showed tremendous potential in the fall.

The schedule could be one of the toughest Rutgers has ever embarked upon. On tap for 1996 are 12 teams that played in the 1995 post season and includes seven that went to the NCAA Tournament. After opening with three games at Virginia Commonwealth, Rutgers has three with Georgia Tech in Atlanta, three with Miami in Coral Gables, two with Florida International in Miami and three with Central Florida in Orlando. Then the Scarlet Knights come home and begin the conference season.

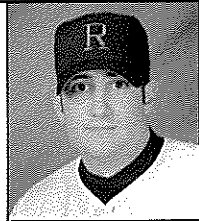

Beginning in 1996, the Scarlet Knights will compete in the BIG EAST, one of the most prestigious baseball conferences in America. Joining the BIG EAST with Rutgers is former Atlantic 10 rival West Virginia and Midwestern Collegiate Conference power Notre Dame. The 11-team conference is divided into two divisions the American and National. Rutgers will compete in the National division with Notre Dame, Georgetown, Seton Hall and Villanova. The top two teams in each division and wild card teams will compete in the BIG EAST Tournament at the Thomas J. Dodd Memorial Stadium in Norwich, Connecticut. The winner of the tournament receives an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament. Last season, BIG EAST Tournament champion Pittsburgh received the league's automatic bid and Providence was given an at-large bid to the tournament.

The 1996 season is sure to be an exciting one in the BIG EAST and for the Scarlet Knights. Here's a look at the teams Rutgers will face this season.

BOSTON COLLEGE

Boston College returns seven of the team's top eight hitters from a year ago including the entire infield. Despite the loss of five key players from last season's 21-24 squad, head coach Richard "Moe" Maloney looks forward to this year's team. "There is always some concern when you lose five players who have been in your program for four years," said Maloney. "But with a strong nucleus coming back and a good crop of freshmen, I am very optimistic and very excited about the coming season." Seniors Bryan Manahan, Brian Sankey and Kevin Penwell are the focal points of this year's team. Penwell led the BIG EAST in hitting at .439, (in conference games) and was 13th in the country with a .425 average. He was also an All-Big East and All-Northeast Region honors. BC touts Manahan, who hit .311 last year, as one of the finest defensive outfielders in the region. Meanwhile, Sankey, a four year starter at first base, was a first team All Conference selection in 1995.

CONNECTICUT

Head coach Andy Baylock is looking for the Huskies to rebound from only their third losing season in the last decade, but he has to do it with a roster made up primarily of underclassmen. This season's lineup will include maybe one or two seniors but the younger players will be the core. One senior who will contribute is first baseman

Chris Bisson. He is a career .357 hitter and has led the Huskies for two straight years in that category. Sophomore catcher Jason Grabowski was the team MVP a year ago after leading the team with 35 RBI and tying Bisson for team honors in home runs with nine. Look for Grabowski to see see time at shortstop as well.

GEORGETOWN

The Georgetown Hoyas led by coach Kirk Mason returns seven starters from last season and look to build on a 17-34 record. Mason, who is now in just his third season as the Hoya coach will look to senior catcher Roy DeCaro, who led the team with nine HRs, senior short-stop Roger Harrington who led the team with 34 stolen bases and senior lefty Brian O'Hare who set the G'town record with 66 strikeouts, for significant contributions this season.

NOTRE DAME

There is plenty of optimism in South Bend that this can be a special year for the Irish. "We are going to be a team that can just as easily score a player from home plate or first base as we can moving them 90 feet at a time. The versatility of this club makes it very dangerous," explains Notre Dame coach Paul Maineri. The Irish returns 19 lettermen from a team that finished with a 40-21 record and lost in the championship game of the Midwestern Collegiate Conference Tournament. ND was ranked No. 24 *Collegiate Baseball's* Preseason Poll and are built around the pitching staff which returns the entire starting rotation from a year ago and led by senior righty Craig Allen and junior Darin Schmalz. The two combined for 12 wins last year. The offense is led by junior Scott Sallman who has an over-.400 career batting average and led the nation in triples last year. Look for the Irish to be one of the top team's in the conference this season.

PITTSBURGH

The Pitt Panthers had their most successful season in school history, finishing 28th in the final *Collegiate Baseball* Poll and 30th in the final *USA Today* Baseball Coaches' Poll. The Panthers will be led by senior outfielder Kurt Womelsdorf, a 1995 second-team All BIG EAST and All-East choice. He led the Panthers in hitting and is the school's all-time leader in stolen bases with 63. Fellow outfielder Jason Conti joined Womelsdorf on the BIG EAST second team.

PROVIDENCE

Following its first-ever at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament, Providence College has high hopes for an encore season. With last season's top three starters in the rotation back including BIG EAST Pitcher of the Year Mike Macone, head coach Paul Kostacopoulos has a nucleus of pitching talent to build the team around. Last season, Macone, Todd Incantalupo and Jim O'Brien went a combined 25-6. The Friars will be hard pressed to replace catcher Bob O'Toole, the 1995 BIG EAST Player of the Year. But returning to the team is an impressive double-play combination in shortstop John McDonald and second baseman Scott Palmieri both were All-BIG EAST choices last season. Look for Providence to be one of the powers in the conference this season.

SETON HALL

The Pirates may be in a transition this season after losing seven starters and five pitchers from a 38-16 team. Returning for the Pirates is one of the top pitchers in the BIG EAST in Jason Grilli. Grilli was 8-2 last season with a 1.85 ERA. Jim Duffy returns for the Pirates at first base. Last season he hit .429 with 3 HRs and 44 RBI. Both of those players will have to repeat those statistics if Seton Hall will maintain its lofty standards.

ST. JOHN'S

Ed Blankmeyer takes over at St. John's this season and he is very familiar to the Scarlet faithful after 15 years with Seton Hall. Blankmeyer has 21 lettermen returning from a team that represented America in the Pan American Games last season. Shortstop Jason Dellaero is one of the anchor's in the lineup after a successful season at shortstop last year. Derek Adair was 3-3 last season and looks to be one of the top pitchers on the squad as well.

WEST VIRGINIA

A longtime rival of Rutgers from their Atlantic 10 days, head coach Greg Van Zandt has 16 lettermen returning from last season including six starters. Despite the 18-32 record a year ago, the Mountaineers took two of three from the Scarlet and will be strong once again. Shortstop Tony Myers and second baseman Chris Swaney will anchor the middle infield for Van Zandt and he will also look to senior Jason Hively to return to his sophomore season form. Myers hit .372 with 12 HRs and 46 RBI and was an All-East selection a year ago. Swaney hit .361 in the leadoff spot but will move to a more comfortable second hole in 1996. Hively, meanwhile, was a dominant pitcher his sophomore season with a 7-3 record. He had a down junior year, but could be someone to watch in conference battles.

VILLANOVA

Villanova returns seven starters from its 40-win squad of a year ago. The pitching isn't as deep as a year ago and coach George Bennett will look for some young Wildcats to step up including the 1994 BIG EAST Rookie of the Year Trevor Pepkowski. He combined with senior Larry Williams for a record of 12-6. Look for third baseman Jason Cassessa to be a leader after a 56 RBI year in 1995 when he earned first team All- BIG EAST honors.

1995 REVIEW

What the Scarlet Knights accomplished in 1995 won't be found in the final record. For the first time since 1983, Rutgers finished with a below .500 record at 28-29. Despite the substandard season, Rutgers finished with a 15-13 conference record and lost in the championship game of the tournament to UMass in its 10th consecutive appearance in the post-season. What Rutgers accomplished was a getting to the championship game of the tournament with guts, guile and hard work, trademarks of the Fred Hill program.

Rutgers entered the tournament with the fourth seed and an opening round game against regular season champion UMass. The Minutemen were the first team to sweep Rutgers in Atlantic 10 history.

Heading to the mound for Rutgers in the opening game of the tourney was freshman Rich Kennedy. A heralded high school pitcher and despite a very successful first season, it probably wasn't what coach Hill had envisioned at the start of the year. Kennedy looked to compete for innings with juniors Scott Madison, Bob Prusiensky and Mike Seel. The aforementioned trio looked to be the top three starters on the squad and certainly the most experienced pitchers on the roster. But, one by one, all three suffered injuries that curtailed their seasons.

It began with Scott Madison injuring his elbow in the first game of the season. After pulling himself out of the game after 5.1 innings, Madison had surgery to remove bone chips from his left elbow. It ended his season, but he should be 100 percent by the start of fall practice. Then Prusiensky started experiencing tightness in his pitching elbow as the starts piled up. By mid-season, he was out of the rotation. Seel, was having his most productive year when a line drive caught him on the pitching hand and broke his thumb in early April. He had the cast removed prior to the Atlantic 10 Tournament and was ready to pitch if called upon.

If there is anything positive to be taken from this calamity, it was the performance of the underclass-

men pitchers who took the mound in some important games. Kennedy had the most wins on the staff with six and fellow freshman Tom Phillips had five wins and two shutouts. Both became anchors on the staff by the midpoint of the season. Corey Long, the third freshman to start conference games, showed flashes of outstanding ability in two complete-game wins, but like most freshmen he experienced his down moments as well.

By the end of the season, the performance curve was going straight up for sophomore Keith Connolly. A heralded scholastic pitcher, Rutgers had been waiting for him to reach his potential. With two wins and a third outstanding start against UMass in the A-10 Tournament, Connolly looked to be the most improved pitcher on the staff by seasons end.

Other encouraging signs came from first year relievers Brian Stegen, Bill Malloy and Mike Mundy. Stegen, a first baseman his freshman year, moved to the bullpen and all he did was set the single-season record with nine saves. He appeared in a school record 27 games and also gave the team quality at-bats as a DH with a .294 batting average. Malloy was right behind Stegen with 23 appearances, second on the all-time list. As a first year reliever, he showed signs of great promise with good velocity and the ability to strikeout batters. Mundy will build on his appearance against UMass in the opening game of the conference tournament. He appeared in 18 games and against UMass, he held the Minutemen to one run and struck out six in 4.1 innings of quality relief.

But it wasn't the pitching that got Rutgers to the Championship game of the Atlantic 10 Tournament, it was the hitting. Down 10-3 against UMass in the opener RU battled back to 10-9 and had the tying run on base in both the eighth and ninth innings but couldn't get it across the plate. Undaunted by the loss, RU rocked GW, the team that had swept them the previous weekend, 9-4. Phillips was outstanding, going the distance and shutting down the Colonial offense that banged out a total of 40 runs in their last three games.

Just four hours later, Rutgers battled St. Bonaventure back and

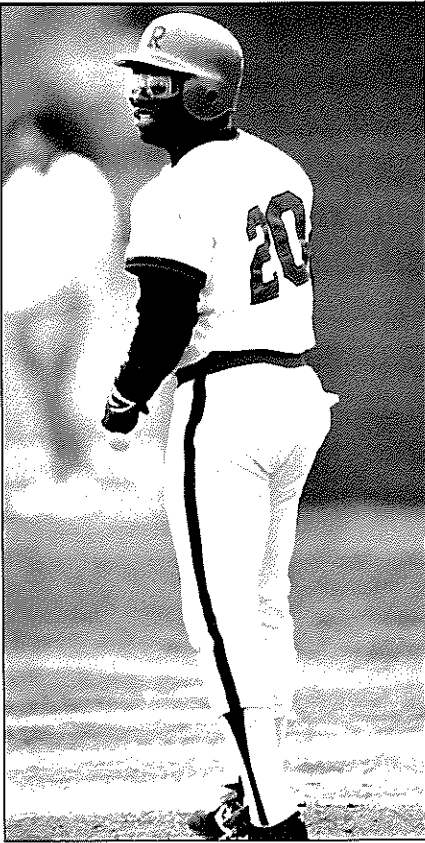

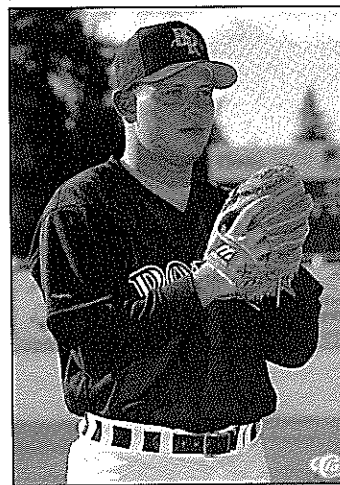
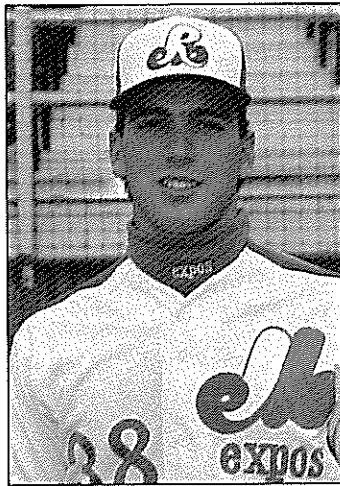

Alongi was one of two All-Americans on the 1993 squad, which was one of Rutgers' finest. He helped lead RU to a school record in wins (38) while finishing with a .371 batting average, nine home runs, 39 stolen bases and 143 total bases. He set RU single-season records with his stolen bases (39) and total bases (146). His nine HRs places him 10th on the all-time single-season list. Alongi also recorded 18 doubles and six triples, ranking him fourth and second on those single-season lists, respectively. Alongi made just one error in right field and led all RU outfielders with 14 assists. Alongi also claimed Atlantic 10 Player of the Year honors as well as ECAC and NJCBA recognition.

Now a coach with the Scarlet Knights, Gardner was one of the most outstanding outfielders in Rutgers' history and one of two Scarlet Knights to be chosen as two-time All-Americans. A 1986 *Baseball America* Freshman All-America, Gardner was second on the team in hitting that year with a .398 batting average while leading RU in hits (70), RBI (45), home runs (6), total bases (102), slugging percentage (.580), and on-base percentage (.470).

In 1987, Gardner followed his impressive debut by collecting *Collegiate Baseball* All-America honors. Gardner led the team in hitting at .368 despite missing 13 games with a hand injury. He finished second on the team in HRs (8) and RBI (45). Gardner also earned his second-consecutive Atlantic 10 and NJ honors as well as being named to the NCAA East Region first-team.

The Scarlet catcher battled Doug Alongi in almost every offensive category while captaining the Scarlet. He was second in hitting with a .370 average, he drove in 56 runs, then a school record, tied Alongi for team honors with nine HRs and led the Scarlet Knights in doubles (20). His 39 walks and 20 doubles were both second on the all-time season record. While handling of RU's finest pitching staff's Higgins made just one error.

JIM KOHL

1990 ABCA THIRD- TEAM

Relief ace extraordinaire, Jim Kohl was one of the keys to Rutgers run in the East Region, where it finished one game shy of the College World Series. Kohl finished with a perfect 8-0 record and three saves while appearing in 22 games and starting just two. Even more impressive may be his team low 1.85 ERA or the fact that he walked just eight batters in 39.0 innings. In the 1990 tournament, where Rutgers went 4-2, he recorded 8.2 innings of scoreless relief.

JOE LYNCH

1986 ABCA THIRD- TEAM

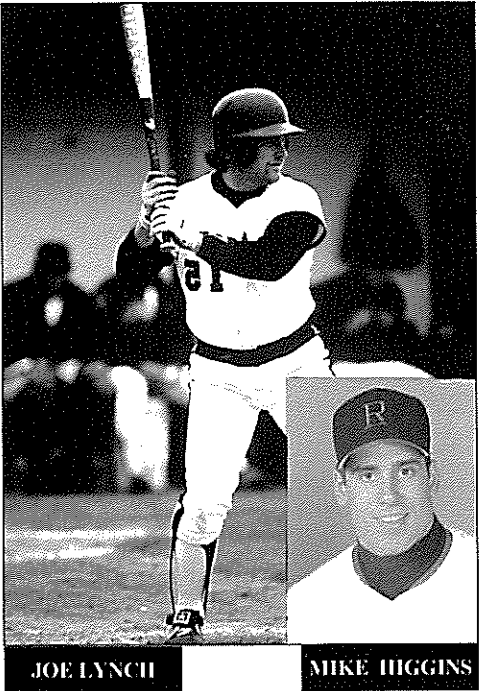

JEFF TORBORG

1963 AACBC FIRST- TEAM

A 1963 All-America choice, he set the school record for batting average (.537). His slugging percentage that year (1.032) is also a single-season standard. He led the 1963 Scarlet Knight team with 21 RBI and six home runs. In his three-year career, Torborg batted .390 and set the career slugging percentage mark at .684. During his career, the Scarlet Knights were 40-13-1. He is the only Scarlet Knight to have his Number (10) retired.

RAY VAN CLEEF

1951 AACBC FIRST- TEAM

Centerfielder Ray Van Cleef was chosen by American Association of College Baseball Coaches following his senior season where he batted .378, scored 22 runs and smacked two triples, all team-highs. He made just one error in center while playing in all 23 games. In 1950, Van Cleef paced the Scarlet with a lofty .404 average, 44 hits, 15 extra-base hits, 35 runs and 18 stolen bases. He was a first-team District II choice and the MVP of National Baseball Tournament.

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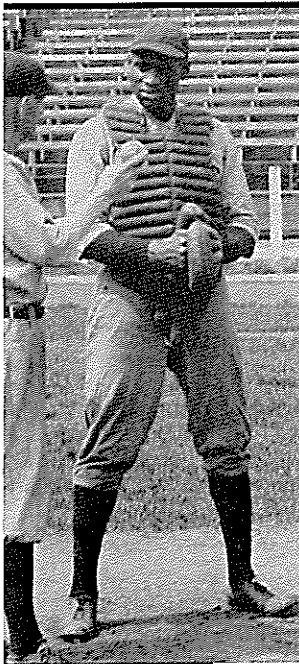

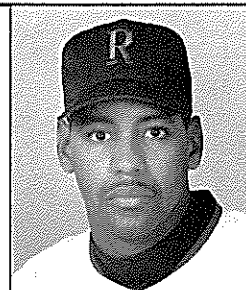

RUTGERS, THE STATE UNIVERSITY

Long recognized for its excellence in teaching, research and public service, Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey is pursuing a new goal of achieving distinction through a strategic plan approved by the Board of Governors in June 1995.

"A New Vision of Excellence" is based on several primary presumptions about the university--that instruction is the heart of Rutgers' mission; that undergraduate education in a research university is invigorated and nourished by its contact with research; and that public service relies on faculty scholarship in order to be useful to those who benefit from it. Emphasizing a strong sense of community, diversity, globalization and collaboration, the plan charts a course of continual growth and progress for a university noted for its rich tradition and commitment to quality.

Rutgers began its history in 1766 as Queen's College, the eighth institution of higher education to be founded in the American colonies. It became Rutgers College in 1825, honoring Colonel Henry Rutgers, a former trustee and Revolutionary War veteran. In 1946, the University of Newark merged with Rutgers and the College of South Jersey in Camden was incorporated into Rutgers in 1950. Legislative acts in 1945 and 1956 designated all its divisions as The State University of New Jersey. Rutgers is the only university in the nation to have been a colonial college, a land-grant college and a state university.

Today, Rutgers is a member of the prestigious Association of American Universities (AAU), a select group of 60 public and private research institutions. With campuses in New Brunswick, Newark and Camden, Rutgers enrolls approximately 48,000 students, yet the university provides a small-to-medium-sized campus atmosphere through its 29 degree granting divisions offering more than 10,000 courses and 100 majors.

A glance at Rutgers' highlights shows why the State University of New Jersey has been the center of a great intellectual tradition for more than 225 years.

RUTGERS' IMPACT ON NEW JERSEY

- * The university's economic impact on New Jersey is more than \$2 billion annually.
- * Rutgers is one of the largest employers in the state with 12,000 faculty and staff.
- * The university's activities generate 8,000 additional jobs.
- * Employees, students and visitors accounted for \$46 million in tax revenues in 1993 (the largest figure available).
- * More than 2,300 students contributed over 147,000 hours of public service through Rutgers' Citizenship and Service Education program since 1989.
- * Over 262,000 alumni have graduated from Rutgers and approximately 70 percent of living alumni reside in New Jersey.

* The 1995 edition of "America's Best Values" by "U.S. News and World Report" ranked Rutgers-New Brunswick 13th among the best values in the nation.

* In the 1994 and 1995 editions of "America's Best Graduate Schools" by "U.S. News and World Report," several Rutgers' graduate programs were ranked among the nation's best, including rating the women's history program as number one. Others in the nation's top five percent were English and history, while drama and mathematics were in the top ten percent.

THE STUDENTS ARE THE DIFFERENCE

- * Rutgers students rank in the top third of their high school classes.
- * Almost 10,000 Rutgers students graduate each year.
- * Eighty-seven percent of Rutgers students are from New Jersey.
- * Rutgers' graduation rate is eighth among the public AAU schools.
- * The Rhodes scholarship, the most prestigious undergraduate award in the nation, was won by two Rutgers students in 1994. Dana Brown and Randal Pinkett were the first woman student and the first African-American student to receive this prestigious award at Rutgers. They were among only 32 students in the nation to receive the award that year.
- * Albert Zhou won a Goldwater scholarship, the most prestigious award for science students in the nation, in 1995.
- * Five Rutgers students in the past two years have been named to USA Today's All USA College Academic Teams.
- * Rutgers ranks first among AAU institutions in African-American enrollment.
- * Douglass College, one of Rutgers' 16 undergraduate divisions, is the largest undergraduate women's college in the country.

THE BEST ACADEMIC ENVIRONMENT

Long recognized for its strength in academics, Rutgers University stands at the forefront of America's State Universities. The school is consistently ranked among the nation's top Universities by *Money Magazine* and *U.S. News and World Reports* for its strength in academics, including courses of study, facilities and professors. While at Rutgers, the student athlete can choose from a variety of courses of study and have the opportunity to obtain internships and assistantships with many of New Jersey's finest corporations. It is the goal of the entire athletic department that the student-athlete receives the complete academic and athletic experience at Rutgers.

In recent years, the academic support program at Rutgers has doubled in size and beginning this year, there is an academic study computer room in the Louis Brown Athletic Center where the baseball team is head quartered. Kathleen Shank works closely with the Scarlet Knight baseball team and the grades in the fall semester of 1995 were outstanding.

Thirteen Scarlet Knights finished with a 3.0 or higher GPA and five finished the fall with over a 3.5 g.p.a. Coach Hill takes as much pride in the success of the baseball on the field as he does when they perform well in the classroom and he is most proud of last semester's work. When a student athlete comes to Rutgers to play baseball, coach Hill insists that his priorities be academics, baseball, and social life, in that order. He feels that Rutgers has all the advantages of the best academic institutions in America and wants the baseball players to take advantage of them. Every year, the athletic department makes a stronger commitment to athletics, through increased personnel, facilities and technology and the result is one of the most complete student-athlete academic services department in America.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

- * The library system contains over 3 million volumes in 18 facilities on three campuses and ranks among the nation's top 20 research library systems.
- * Learning Resource Centers on all campuses offer tutoring, study tips, and general academic support to undergraduate students. The centers helped 13,215 students in 1994-95, bringing the three-year total to 24,615.
- * Teaching Excellence Centers on Rutgers' three campuses provide support to faculty members in their role as teachers.
- * The Rutgers Dialogues Program awards grants to faculty who devise innovative curricular programs for improving students' oral and written communications, critical thinking, and computer and mathematics literacy.
- * Rutgers' Jane Voorhees Zimmerli Art Museum houses the largest collection of Soviet non-conformist art in the world and the largest collection of Russian art outside Russia. The museum is also the home of the Kusakabe-Griffis Japonisme Gallery, the only one of its kind in the world.
- * Financial Aid
 - * Undergraduate students receive more than \$126 million in federal and state grants and loans, work/study jobs, and university scholarships annually.
 - * The average annual individual support is approximately \$6,179.
 - * More than 60 percent of the entering class receives awards.

-FACILITIES-

- * Classrooms in Newark, Camden and New Brunswick/Piscataway were improved last year as the result of a \$1 million fund dedicated to enhancing the university's educational mission.
- * The completion of \$2.7 million in renovations to biology labs on the Busch and Douglass campuses mean major improvements in the quality of undergraduate instruction.
- * The John Cotton Dana Library at Rutgers-Newark opened its expanded and renovated facility last fall. The \$7.4 million project included a two-floor vertical addition to the library's North Wing. The top floor now houses the Institute of Jazz Studies.
- * Rutgers houses over 15,000 students, making it one of the largest housing and food service operations in the nation.

- * David Levering Lewis, the Martin Luther King Jr. Professor of History, earned the 1994 Pulitzer Prize.

- * Francine Essien, a professor of biology, was selected at the Carnegie Foundation's 1994-95 U.S. Professor of the Year for Research and Doctoral Universities, making Rutgers the only institution in the nation to have had two recipients of this annual award. The award recognizes Dr. Essien's extraordinary dedication to teaching and her commitment to students.
- * Rachel Hadas, a professor of English, Henryk Iwaniec, a professor of mathematics, and Charles Wuorinen, a professor of music and an internationally acclaimed composer, were elected fellows of the prestigious American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 1995.
- * Four members of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences-New Brunswick were awarded Guggenheim Fellowships for 1995-96. A member of the Faculty of Management in Newark was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship for the 1995-96 academic year.
- * A representative of the National Science Foundation called the 1994 findings of Richard Lutz, associate director of the Institute of Marine and Coastal Sciences, "one of the most dramatic underwater discoveries in history."



Francis L. Lawrence President

Francis L. Lawrence became the President of Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey,

in the fall of 1990. To improve the efficiency, effectiveness and service orientation of the university in a time of fiscal constraint, he took immediate steps to streamline the administration, reduce red tape and encourage TQM-style teamwork. An independent management audit assisted the university in developing long- and short-term goals for improvement in its operations. At the same time, a university-wide strategic planning process was instituted for both administrative and academic units, culminating in a university-wide strategic plan completed this year.

The vision that President Lawrence has proposed for Rutgers is its transformation into a new model of the land-grant university that responds to the pervasive, continuing demand of our society for advanced knowledge. Rutgers is meeting this challenge by building a comprehensive, statewide network of outreach; educating a broader, more inclusive spectrum of our society; strengthening the learning community with additional supports for teaching and learning; taking the scholar-mentor as a model in the learning community; and building unity within its diversity.

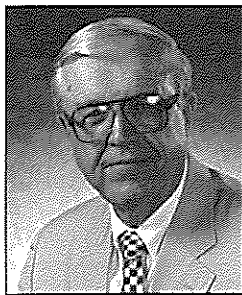
One of the president's first initiatives in sharpening the focus of the university's mission was to place more emphasis upon teaching in promotion and tenure review and in hiring. Improvement of the quality of undergraduate education is among the president's foremost concerns. He also set in motion a university-wide study of the undergraduate curriculum. A teaching evaluation was administered university-wide. Teaching Excellence Centers were set up on all three regional campuses to offer teachers support in enhancing instruction. Several Learning Resource Centers were opened throughout the university to offer students assistance ranging from study skills and computer-assisted instruction to tutoring. "Rutgers Dialogues," the report of the university-wide Curriculum Review Committee, is being implemented in new and revised undergraduate courses throughout the university. With financing from a student fee, the university and the state, new student-access computing facilities have been opened and student computing accounts made available for all Rutgers students.

The increase in quality of the 1980's, which was capped by the admission of Rutgers to the Association of American Universities in 1989, has gained momentum in the 1990's. The Rutgers faculty is winning impressive national honors for high distinction in scholarly accomplishment. In recent years, faculty members have earned awards that include a Pulitzer Prize, the National Medal of Science, the MacArthur Foundation "genius" prize, and a long list of other coveted awards, including Guggenheim Fellowships, National Science Foundation Young Investigator awards, Sloan Fellowships and the nation's highest teaching recognition, the U.S. Professor of the Year award. A record-breaking total of \$149.4 million was raised in externally-sponsored research in 1994, an increase of 14.7 percent over the preceding year.

Increased diversity in the university community is also among the president's primary areas of priority for Rutgers. The university's enrollment of minorities has risen from under 23 percent in 1987 to more than 31 percent. Admissions recruitment efforts have succeeded in ranking Rutgers first among 29 public AAU schools in African-American enrollment, third in Latino enrollment, third in Asian-Pacific Islander enrollment and first

in total minority enrollment. Rutgers has been recognized nationally in two successive years for its graduation of the second-largest number of African-American students among predominantly-white universities. The two Rhodes scholarships won by Rutgers students in 1994 were awarded to the first woman student and the first African-American student to receive these prestigious awards at Rutgers. In the spring of 1995, a university-wide Plan for Multicultural Student Life was formulated in order to reinforce and renew a sense of community based on mutual respect and open communication in an environment that is welcoming and supportive for all students.

President Lawrence is a native of Rhode Island who received his bachelor's degree in French and Spanish from St. Louis University in 1959 and his Ph.D. in French Classical Literature from Tulane in 1962. He rose through Tulane's academic and administrative ranks to full professor and chief academic officer (Provost and Dean of the Graduate School). On the national level, President Lawrence has served as president of the North American Society for French Seventeenth-Century Literature and member or chair of several editorial boards of journals and a monograph series. In New Jersey, among other state responsibilities, he is the elected chair of the New Jersey Presidents' Council and a member of the New Jersey Commission on Higher Education.



Frederick E. Gruninger Director of Athletics

Throughout his 23-year as Director of Athletics at the State University, Frederick Gruninger has established a widely-recognized reputation as a respected and tireless leader. While the signature accomplishments of his career have centered on constant improvement and expansion, Gruninger has continually endeavored to enrich the quality of life for student-athletes and maintain the reputation of academic and athletic excellence for which Rutgers has become renowned.

In the 1994-95 academic year, a number of the Division's 30 sports teams enjoyed remarkable success at the conference, regional and national level. The year was highlighted by the advancement of the men's soccer team to the NCAA Final Four. The men's tennis team captured its first-ever Atlantic 10 Championship and both the women's field hockey and basketball teams battled in Atlantic 10 title contests.

Notable achievements by individuals in men's track and both men's and women's fencing earned them berths in NCAA Championship events.

Another landmark occurrence during Gruninger's tenure is Rutgers' inclusion as a full member of the BIG EAST Conference in March of 1994. This was preceded by the University's charter membership in the BIG EAST Football Conference in 1991. Beginning in the 1995-96 season, Rutgers will participate in all 19 BIG EAST championship sports.

Top-notch facilities are considered vital to the success of any athletic program and under Gruninger's direction, Rutgers' facilities have been improved and expanded so that they are now known as some of the finest in the nation. The most recent major project is the new Rutgers Stadium, a state-of-the-art, lighted, 41,500-seat facility that was completed in the summer of 1994. The Hale Center, which has been lauded as among the best in the nation, provides a modern training facility for several men's and women's teams, and furnishes the football program with a necessary support facility

for academic and athletic needs. On April 16, 1994, a new 5,000-seat soccer and lacrosse stadium on the Busch Campus and separate track and field complex on the Livingston Campus were dedicated. The 8,500-seat Louis Brown Athletic Center, the first of many major facilities to adorn the athletic landscape since Gruninger's tenure began, and the surrounding sports complex, are areas of concentrated in-season activity for the Lady and Scarlet Knight teams.

Other areas that have seen significant growth under Gruninger are the academic support program and the athletic awards system. Both of these programs have become widely-appreciated adjuncts and continually provide athletes with deserving recognition and support. In addition to a wide spectrum of awards for its over 1,000 student-athletes, Rutgers athletics reaches back to honor its storied past. Annually, the Football Hall of Fame, the Basketball Hall of Fame, and, the Olympic Sports Hall of Fame, all established under Gruninger's guidance, spotlight the memorable individual and team achievements of the past. Each year, Rutgers' "best and brightest" are honored at separate team awards banquets and, then, collectively, at the marquee event — the Scholar-Athlete/Most Valuable Player celebration. The Division concludes the academic year with the presentation of two coveted awards, the Coursen Award, and the Headley-Singer Award, which designate the top graduating male and female athlete in the senior class. The prestigious Werblin Award recognizes a student-athlete or team for national-level recognition.

Under Gruninger, Rutgers has continued its tradition of hosting numerous prestigious conference, regional and national championships, that bring the best college athletes to the New Brunswick campus and the state of New Jersey. Rutgers has co-hosted the NCAA East Regional Basketball Championship an unprecedented eight times over the last 10 years, and, in conjunction with the New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority will host the Final Four in 1996. Rutgers also hosted the 1994 Women's Basketball East Regional at the Louis Brown Athletic Center. NCAA lacrosse, soccer and field hockey championships have been contested on Rutgers' facilities numerous times. Finally, Rutgers will host the NCAA men's lacrosse quarterfinal doubleheader and serve as the site for the NCAA Championships in 1997 and 1998.

The University continues to provide a place for sports championships at the Olympic, AAU and New Jersey scholastic levels as well as national clinics and training camps.

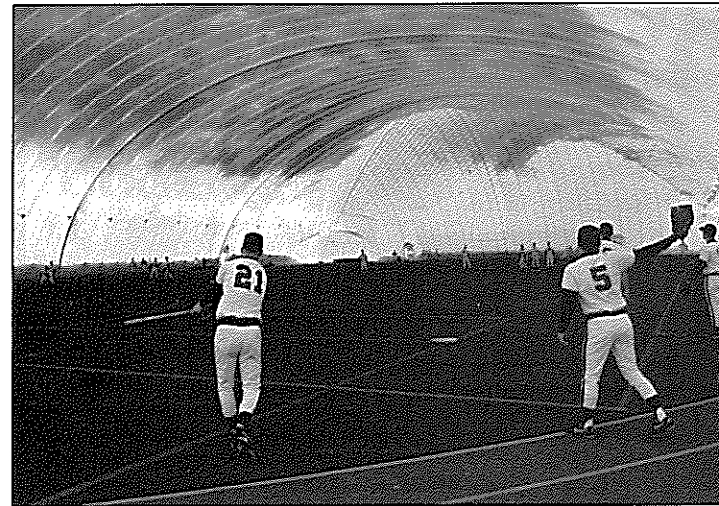
In conjunction with the University's overall thrust in community service, Rutgers athletes are developing a meaningful relationship with local communities, particularly hospitals, schools and charitable organizations in central New Jersey. The commitment of the student-athlete's time and talent further signifies Rutgers' desire to be linked with neighboring communities and charities.

Gruninger, a 1953 Rutgers graduate, began his association with the athletic division in 1963 when he was named head golf coach. He was appointed an Assistant Athletic Director in 1966, and in 1971, was named Associate Athletic Director. He became Athletic Director in 1973.

He has served as a member of the NCAA Council and was recently elected as third vice president of the National Association of College Directors of Athletics. Gruninger has also been a committee officer on several conference, state, regional and national athletic associations. The College Athletic Administration of New Jersey, an organization which he helped form, recognized his leadership and dedication by presenting him with the Garden State Award. He continues to serve in numerous other capacities that promote athletics in the state and the nation.

A native of Fanwood, N.J., Gruninger and his wife, Barbara, reside in Martinsville. The Gruningers are the parents of two sons — Mark, who holds a Rutgers doctorate in Ceramic Engineering, and, Jack, a systems engineering graduate of the University of Virginia — and a daughter, Katherine, a graduate of Lafayette College.

BASEBALL FACILITIES

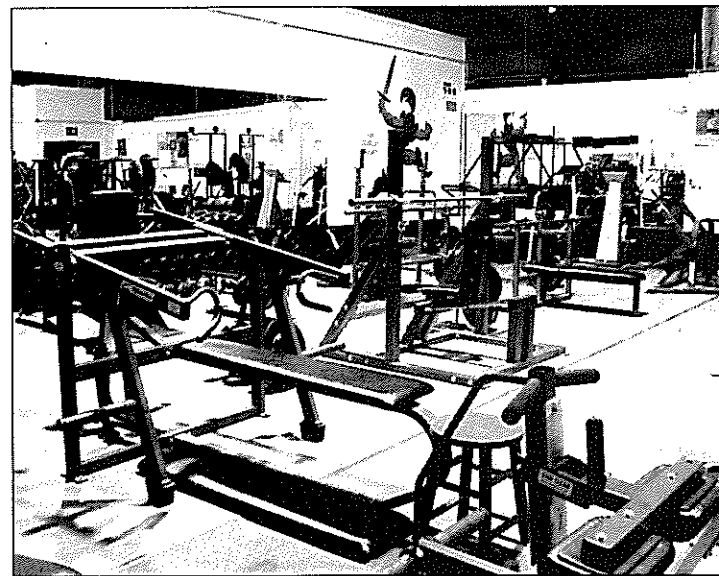


THE "BUBBLE"

Every program at every school has its own strengths, they are the cornerstones of the program. One strength at the Rutgers program is the facilities. The knock on college baseball programs in the Northeast is simply that the weather prohibits a baseball player from being able to fully develop his skills. It's not the case at The State University of New Jersey. Collectively, the facilities the Rutgers baseball program has at its disposal are among the finest in the Northeast, and possibly all of college baseball.

Beginning with fall practice, the Scarlet Knights have two baseball diamonds to work with as well as a pair of batted cages and pitching mounds built with asphalt and covered in turf. No matter what the conditions, Scarlet Knight hitters can get their swings in and the pitchers can maintain their throwing schedules.

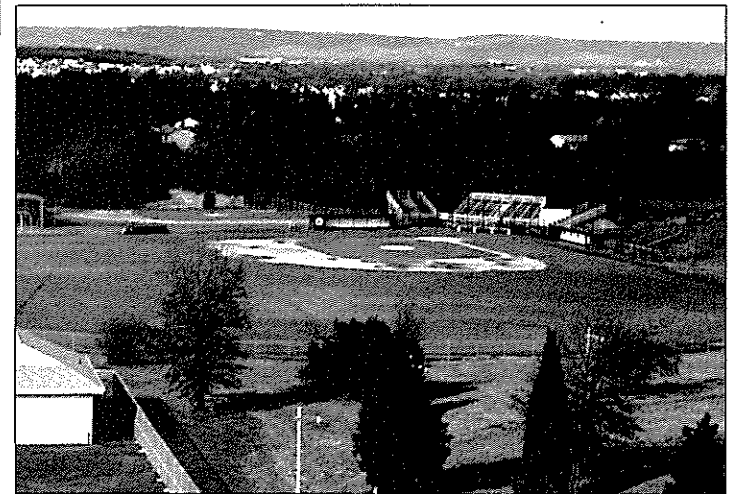
At the close of fall practice, the Scarlet Knights move indoors into the spacious Louis Brown Athletic Center where they can begin their own individual workout program. There are three

individual batting cages with two pitching machines as well as two pitching mounds inside the friendly confines of the RAC. The Scarlet Knights also have at their disposal an outstanding strength and conditioning room. Traditionally one of the hardest working teams at Rutgers, the weight room is constantly filled with baseball players who are involved in a rigorous fitness program.

The spacious Scarlet Knight weight room houses the finest in free-weight and nautilus equipment. Strength and conditioning coach Eric Amkraut designs and develops individual programs for the Scarlet Knights and in doing so provides the hands on instruction the complete workout program needs. The college baseball season is one of the most rigorous in college athletics and it demands a very high fitness level and Rutgers is able to provide its baseball players the opportunity to reach that level.



THE CLASS OF '53 COMPLEX

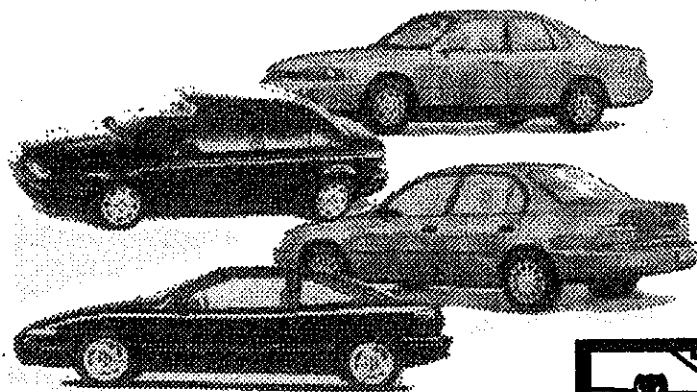
Perhaps the most unique and effective facility that coach Hill has at his fingertips is the indoor "Bubble" facility. It is the nation's largest fully air-supported facility which houses a 120-yard artificial turf football field and a quarter-mile track. When spring practice begins, there are no limits. Coach Hill can spend half of his practice time working with the defense. The outfielders run under fly balls, the infielders turn double-plays and the catchers block balls in the dirt. A baseball player would be hard pressed to find a better facility in the Northeast and possibly in the country. And by the way, the temperature inside the "Bubble" averages 30 degrees higher than the outside temperature.

When the season begins, the Scarlet Knights play their home games in one of the finest stadiums in the Northeast. The Class of 1953 complex is the Home of Rutgers Baseball. What makes the complex so special is the attention to the little things that coach Hill spends so much time with. The Scarlet Knights benefit from a well manicured and well maintained field and the results have been obvious. In 198, the Scarlet Knights led the nation in fielding percentage, and in 1993, the team finished fourth.

When you sum up the entire package, it quickly becomes obvious that the Scarlet Knights have the facilities at their disposal that allows them to develop and become the best players they can be, a hallmark of the coach Hill program.

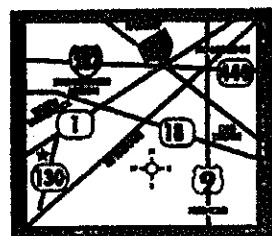
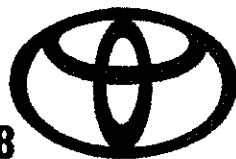
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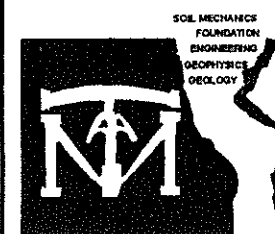
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








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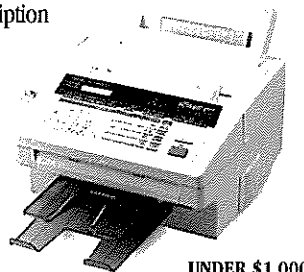
