



THE BIG EAST

Rutgers began competing in the BIG EAST Conference in 1996. Each member participates in a divisional round-robin format, playing each divisional opponent three (3) times per season and each non-divisional opponent twice per season.

The conference produces the league schedule which uses a two-year rotating cycle. The order of opponents and site reverses in year two of the cycle. Cross-divisional opponents play a two-game series using a travel partner system, in a Saturday-Sunday doubleheader format. Divisional opponents play a three game series at one site. In this system, Rutgers and Seton Hall are travel partners and will play each other on successive Wednesdays.

Weekend divisional series consists of a seven-inning game at noon and a nine inning game to follow on Saturday. On Sunday, the two teams will play a nine-inning game. Weekend cross-divisional series consist of a seven-inning and nine

inning doubleheader on both Saturday and Sunday. The travel series consists of a seven-inning game and a nine-inning game the first Wednesday and a nine-inning game the following Wednesday.

The conference tournament will comprise six teams and take place at Thomas J. Dodd Memorial Stadium in Norwich, Connecticut. A series of criteria will be used to determine the six teams that compete in the tournament. After each division is seeded 1-4 based on overall league winning percentage, the top two teams in each division will be included in the tournament. The BIG EAST Baseball committee will then pool the remaining four teams and evaluate them using a series of criteria already agreed upon, the first being overall league winning percentage. The presumption prior to evaluation is that both #3 teams will be invited.

PRE-SEASON NOTES:

NEUBART TRIES OUT FOR TEAM USA

Sophomore Adam Neubart was one of 66 college players selected to try out for Team USA, which will compete in several international competitions this summer. The trials took place over the semester break and Neubart was very successful, batting .667 (to lead the outfielders), with two stolen bases and two assists. USA Baseball will continue to monitor all 66 players throughout their seasons and invite a group of 40 players to another trial camp before making the final cuts.

TWO SPORT PLAYERS AGAIN ON THE ROSTER

Again, this season Rutgers will have two sport athletes on the roster. Senior third baseman Mike Stephens played quarterback for the Scarlet Knight football team in the fall, starting eight of 11 games. He underwent right shoulder surgery in the off-season and hopes to be ready to start the year. Freshman outfielder Joe B. Cirone played defensive line for the Scarlet in the fall. He did not participate in any games and will most likely redshirt.

Every year there are new challenges, new obstacles, new questions and every year for the past 13 at Rutgers, coach Fred Hill has found the formula to put his team into the conference championship tournament and thus giving the team a chance to come away with another championship. His approach to coaching is not rigid but flexible. Probably his greatest strengths as a coach are his ability to assess talent and then put players in the right position to succeed. To do that you need to be flexible, you need to be able to adjust and coach Hill does it better than anyone. After over 38 years of coaching from high school to college, Coach Hill still looks for different or new techniques, new drills, new ways to teach and communicate with his players. It is that desire to learn and improve that rubs off on his fellow coaches and players and places him among the elite coaches in college baseball.

His success in getting players to the next level is unquestioned. He has seen some of his former players become among the highest draft picks in school history, including three last season, two in the top 12 rounds. In 1996, he became one of just a few coaches in history to see two of his former pupils achieve the highest level of success in two different sports. Former Scarlet Knight Eric Young was selected to play in the 1996 all-star game after an outstanding season at second base for the Colorado Rockies. In football, Sam Mills a linebacker for coach Hill at Montclair State, was named to the Pro Bowl for the fifth time after a tremendous season with the Carolina Panthers.

In his 19 previous seasons, Fred Hill has amassed 550 career wins and boasts a .612 winning percentage. He has won 402 of those games at Rutgers in 13 seasons and has a .610 winning percentage "On the Banks." In his 13 seasons, he has won over 30 games eight times and as many as 28 three other times. Hill has seen six players earn All-America acclaim and 21 others earn All-Conference honors. His team have constantly been in the national rankings for excellence in defense and pitching. In fact, last season, the pitching staff's team ERA of 3.51 was ranked ninth in America. And last season it was the pitching staff the led the charge for Rutgers into the BIG EAST Conference for its initial season.

After years of dominating the Atlantic 10, Rutgers won five league championships in 10 seasons, Rutgers stepped up a level of competition and finished 1996 with the conference's second-best winning percentage and with series victories over every National Division opponent, ultimately earning the Scarlet Knight's 11th consecutive Conference Tournament appearance.

While constantly building the program on the field, Hill also works to build the program off the field with improvements in the baseball facility and in the classroom. Over the past two years Rutgers has seen the overall grade-point-average grow in every semester. Last summer, Hill had the infield replaced through fund-raising and the baseball facility is another step closer to become one of the elite in college baseball.

He began his college baseball coaching career at




Montclair State University, where he guided the Red Hawks to 148 wins and three post-season appearances. He led Montclair State to the Division III World Series in 1983 and was named District III Coach of the Year. After guiding the baseball program to its highest level, he left Montclair for a new challenge: to

revitalize the Rutgers baseball program, which was once a dominant force in the East.

He started at Rutgers in 1984 and the positive results were almost immediate. In just his third season, he guided the Scarlet to the Atlantic

10 Championship and the NCAA Tournament. In the following seasons, he directed Rutgers to four more conference championships and NCAA Tournaments. He has won an impressive 402 games "On The Banks" and boasts a .610 winning percentage. Twice Rutgers has won a school record 38 games, the first time in 1988 and most recently in 1993.

In 1990, he took the Scarlet to the brink of the College World Series, advancing the team to the finals of the East Region, ultimately losing to eventual national champion Georgia. To get to that game, Rutgers defeated three Top 20 teams (Maine, North Carolina, and Georgia) in successive games.

Not one to take individual credit for some lofty achievements, Hill credits his assistants, both current and former, as people who have had as much to do with Rutgers' success as anyone. He also credits his players. Time and time again, Hill cites his players' desire to work hard and become the best they can be, which trickles down from the head coach to his players.

During his tenure, six players have earned All-America honors and 26 players have signed professional contracts, including seven Scarlet Knights in the past three seasons.

Hill has also seen many of his assistants move on and become very successful head coaches. Former Hill assistant Norm Schoenig guided the Montclair State Red Hawks to the Division III National Championship in 1993 and was named Division III Coach of the Year.

Another former assistant Mike Garlatti is now a primary scout for the the Colorado Rockies. RU All-American Joe Lynch was the head coach at Kean College while former Hill assistant John Seymour was the Head Coach at Rowan College.

As a collegiate star at Upsala, Hill earned an unbelievable 11 letters. Four letters came in baseball, where he led the team in batting twice. Four more came in football, where he led the team in rushing four times and was named the football team's Most Valuable Back three times. Three more letters came in basketball, where he was voted Most Improved Player his senior year. Chosen as Small College All-American following his final football season, Hill was honored by his alma mater, in 1992, as a distinguished alumnus who has achieved excellence in his chosen profession.

After his graduation, he began his coaching career as freshman baseball coach at Upsala while also playing semi-pro baseball for the East Orange Soverals. His next move was to Clifford


Scott High School, where he was an assistant baseball coach for five years and head coach for another six. During those six years, Hill led the Scotties to a 94-58 record, two state sectional championships, and also served time as an assistant football coach. He moved on to coach the Pequannock High School football team for four years and then returned to Upsala as an assistant baseball coach for three years.

In 1977, he was named head baseball and football coach at Montclair State. In his career with Montclair State, he developed the baseball team into a Division III power, winning 62 per cent of his games and earning a trip to the Division III World Series. For these contributions and many more to the Montclair State Athletic Department, he was selected to their Sports Hall of Fame in 1991.


The tremendously successful and decorated head coach is just as dedicated to his family. He lives in Verona with his wife Evelyn and has six children: Nancy, Fred Jr., Linda, Jim, Tracey, and Karen. He and Evelyn also have four grandchildren; Jessica, Danielle, Brian, and James. A coaching-rich family, Fred's brother Brian is the former head coach of the Orlando Magic in the NBA and his son Fred Jr. is the Associate Head Coach of the Fairleigh Dickinson University Basketball team.

In 1996, Fred Hill had saw two of his former pupils achieve all-star status in two different sports.

Eric Young 1996 All-Star




Sam Mills, 1997 Pro Bowl



SCARLET KNIGHT ASSISTANT COACHES



GLEN GARDNER

Scarlet Knight Outfield Coach and Batting Coach


One of the finest players in Rutgers' history, coach Gardner is now in his sixth season working as coach Hill's right-hand man. He is the hitting and outfield coach and assists coach Hill in overseeing the day-to-day responsibilities of the program. Coach Gardner has also become an outstanding recruiter, and Rutgers has brought in some of the finest recruiting classes in the BIG EAST over the past few seasons.

His strengths are his easygoing nature and his ability to communicate with the Scarlet Knight players. Ironically, several of his pupils are now eclipsing Gardner's hitting records, something he accepts with a smile.


A 1986 and 1987 All-American outfielder at Rutgers, Gardner had some of the most productive offensive seasons in school history. In his three seasons, he compiled a career .356 batting average with 23 home runs, 141 RBI. All three numbers rank among the Rutgers all-time top 10. In all, he ranks among Rutgers' top 10 in 11 offensive categories and holds the record for doubles in a season with 22 in 1988, and career marks in doubles (44) and total bases (336).

After his junior year in 1987, the San Diego Padres drafted him in the 13th round. He opted to stay at RU and was selected by Atlanta the next year. Gardner advanced to Burlington, Iowa in the Atlanta Braves organization before being struck in eye by a batted ball, which ended his career.

Under Gardner's tutelage, several Scarlet Knights have had outstanding seasons. Among others, Doug Alongi, Angel Echevarria, and Mike Higgins dot the Scarlet Knight record books and all moved on to professional baseball following their Rutgers careers.


Scarlet Knight Pitching Coach

One of the most recognized coaches in New Jersey, Tom Baxter begins his eighth season as pitching coach with the Scarlet Knights. Baxter is also a tremendous asset to the program in recruiting, especially in south Jersey.


His success with the Scarlet Knight pitchers is unquestioned. In 1996, he saw the Scarlet Knight pitching staff finish with a 3.53 ERA, which was ranked ninth in the nation and two of the pitchers from that staff were among the highest draft picks in school history, following the season. Relief pitcher Bill Malloy was the first to go for Rutgers in the Major League draft, being selected by the San Francisco Giants in the eighth round. Junior left-hander Scott Madison, a third-team All-American, was then selected in the 12th round of the draft by the Tampa Bay Devil Rays. In all, seven Scarlet Knight pitchers have been drafted since 1990, when Baxter arrived on "The Banks."

A tremendously successful high school and collegiate pitcher, Baxter's strength is his ability to relate his experiences to today's pitchers. After a 16-0, All-State senior season at Bayonne High School, he was drafted by the New York Mets in the sixth round of the Major League Baseball draft, but accepted a full scholarship to the University of Miami. In his freshman season, he helped lead the Hurricanes to the 1974 College World Series with an 8-3 record. In 1976, he was drafted by the Oakland A's in the first round of the draft. His career started off famously with a no-hitter in his first career start, but a shoulder injury ended his career after two seasons.

He joined Rutgers after an extremely successful career as a head baseball coach in Hudson County. In 1984, he began a three-year stint at Dickinson High School in Jersey City before moving on to Marist. He led Marist, to the 1988 Parochial B State Championship. Tom and his wife, Terri, reside in Pt. Pleasant, NJ and have three children, T.J. (11), Mary Kate (9) and Claire (three).

SCARLET KNIGHT CATCHING COACH

Former Major League catcher Scott Bradley has joined the Scarlet Knight staff and he is a pleasant addition who can add another facet to this coaching staff as he relates his experiences from the major leagues to the Scarlet Knights.

Coach Bradley spent nine seasons in the major leagues playing for the New York Yankees, the Chicago White Sox, the Seattle Mariners and the Cincinnati Reds.

Bradley, who holds a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration from North Carolina, was drafted in the second round of the 1981 amateur draft by the New York Yankees after a tremendous career as a Tar Heel. In 1980, he earned All-America accolades and ACC Player of the Year honors as a third baseman after hitting .386 with 19 home runs and 63 RBI. In the next year, he moved to catcher and again claimed All-America honors after batting .352 with 12 HR and 50 RBI.


The Yankees brought him up to the majors in 1984 where he spent one and one half seasons in the Bronx before being traded to the Chicago White Sox, where spent the first half of the 1986 season. He was traded to the Seattle Mariners prior to the 1987 season and he spent the next six years with the Mariners. While with the Mariners, he caught Randy Johnson's no-hitter on June 2, 1990. After the 1991 season, Bradley joined the Cincinnati Reds organization for one season.

After his year in Cincinnati, he spent two seasons as a player/coach in the Braves and Rockies farm systems. He was a career .257 hitter in the majors and his best season was 1987 when he hit .273 with five home runs, 43 RBI and he scored 34 runs.

Over the past two years, he has served as a color analyst for Trenton Thunder baseball telecasts.

Bradley comes from a coachin-rich family. His brother, Bob, is currently an assistant coach with DC United in Major League Soccer and also served as assistant coach on the U.S. Olympic team. His other brother Jeff is the Director of Public Relations for the New York/New Jersey Metrostars of the MLS. Scott and his wife Mary Frances reside in Pennington, NJ and have two children Kevin (3 1/2) and Kyle (1 1/2). They are expecting a third child in early April.

1997 Season Preview

Last season, Rutgers proved a lot to itself and to the college baseball world. Long a power in the Atlantic 10, Rutgers stepped up a level of competition in its first year of the BIG EAST Conference and carried on its tradition of winning without missing a beat. Not only did Rutgers win every series in the National Division of the Conference, but the team finished with the conference's second-best regular season record, a tribute to how consistently well Rutgers played all season. Even more impressive was Rutgers 41st ranking in the final RPI report for the 1996 season, which was the highest ranking in the BIG EAST Conference and second among Northeastern baseball teams.

Now in its second year of the BIG EAST, Rutgers looks to continue that consistent play and remain among the elite in the conference and the Northeast. With several key players back (six starters, 17 letterwinners) and an outstanding

recruiting class, there is a quiet confidence that Rutgers will compete for the regular season championship and the conference tournament championship, bringing with it a berth in the NCAA Tournament.

As with all successful teams, the key ingredient is pitching. Last year's Scarlet Knights had one of the best pitching staffs in America, finishing with a 3.53 ERA, which was ranked ninth in college baseball. The two key losses from that staff are All-American and first-team All Conference selection Scott Madison and senior Brian Stegen. Together, they combined for 13 wins and were among the top five in the conference in ERA and top 20 in America. Madison was drafted in the 12th round by the Tampa Bay Devil Rays and Stegen will miss 1997 with an elbow injury. Those losses are tough to overcome, but there are some veterans who are ready to step in and take over. Junior Rich Kennedy has been a conference starter for two years. He has logged 119.3 innings and he has the potential to be outstanding. Junior Mike Mundy grew into one of the finest relief pitchers in the BIG EAST last season and now looks to be a starter. He could combine with Kennedy could be a very formidable 1-2 punch. Joining them in the rotation are two pitchers who missed all of last season and could be the difference between a very good and outstanding season. Senior Bob Prusiensky has a career 9-3 record and if not for injuries could be one of the finest pitchers Rutgers has had. He has

fully recovered from injuries and hopes to get into the rotation immediately. Junior Keith Connolly missed last season to concentrate on academics. He has been a midweek starter his freshman and sophomore years and at times showed flashes of brilliance. The year off for Connolly may have been a blessing in disguise because he has come back bigger, stronger and with a fastball in the high 80s range. The feeling is that among these four pitchers, RU could have a deeper rotation than last year.

It doesn't end with those four pitchers either. There are other pitchers on this roster who have a wealth of experience and ability, who will push for innings throughout the year. Junior Jeff Miller had as good a year in the bullpen as any Rutgers pitcher in history and became one of the finest relief pitchers in America. He finished the year 4-1 with a 1.53 ERA.

Junior Corey Long has logged plenty of innings over the past two seasons, including many against some of

America's top teams. He was the winning pitcher in Rutgers' win over Georgia Tech in 1996 and coach Hill sent him to the mound every week with confidence that he could get wins. He made only one start in the friendly confines of Rutgers Stadium last season and his ability to deal with adversity is one of his biggest strengths. He has already established himself as a consistent, winning pitcher. If his stuff improves and he maintains his consistency, he could be starting on weekends very successfully for Rutgers.

Junior Tom Phillips took a step back last season with what has been described as a "tired" arm. He was one of the top freshman pitchers in the Atlantic 10 with a 5-4 record and a 3.41 ERA, in 1995, but could not get back to that level last year. After resting his arm through the summer and fall, hopes are high that his arm will be rejuvenated and he can return to his old form.

Last season, the bullpen was one of the strengths of this team. With Miller, Mundy and Bill Malloy, Rutgers had a dominant trio. Miller is still there, Mundy could move into the starting rotation and Malloy was drafted by the San Francisco Giants in the sixth round of the amateur draft last year. The challenge for the coaching staff will be to put together another consistent bullpen and there is a cast of characters who will push to get innings out of the pen. Lefties Chris Checchetto and Dan Brassem are of the same mold. They keep left handed hitters off balance and runners close. The senior Checchetto has the edge in experience over the sophomore Brassem. Stay tuned. Freshmen lefties John Gonzalez, Lance Horta and Bob McFetridge, along with sophomore lefty Brett Hawken throw harder than both Checchetto and Brassem and could complement them well, giving coach Hill plenty of options against left handed hitters. Also, look for Horta and Hawken to push for innings as starters. Hawken was a former All-State hurler and Horta was so impressive in the fall that people talk about him being a midweek starter at the onset of the season.

On the right side of the bullpen, is a group of young and very talented hurlers who will not only contribute now, but will make up the core of the pitching staff in the future. Junior Bob Baxter is the elder statesman of the group and will be in the mix for some midweek starts because of his experience. Freshmen Scott Burkholder, Barry Walsh, and Pat Steines could combine to fill out the midweek rotation as well as get work as relievers. Burkholder redshirted last season and has shown good control in practice. Walsh also showed good ability in the fall and could be a starter like Horta right from the beginning.

lot of innings last year and it will only pay off this season. Probably Rutgers best all-around player this year will be sophomore **Adam Neubart**. He spent time last season at all three outfield positions and led Rutgers in eight offensive categories. He was named Mizuno freshman All-America by *Collegiate Baseball* and he was chosen to try out for team USA. The feeling is that Neubart's talent, maturity and work ethic could culminate with a lot of honors and recognition. Taking over in centerfield for graduated two-year starter Ed Belko, is junior **Shawn Williams**. Williams made a push to be the starter last year, hitting .333 in 25 games. A left-handed bat, he seems comfortable hitting against lefties as well as righties. Williams' defense is excellent and he could bring a certain excitement to the lineup. In right field there will be a battle between Junior Craig Brenhiser and sophomore Jason Jaworoski. Loaded with talent, everyone in the Rutgers camp is waiting for Brenhiser to reach his potential. Jaworoski, is a powerful hitter who could add some pop to the lineup. Either way, Rutgers could boast the finest outfield trio in the conference, all with good speed, arms and offense.

Also in the outfield for Rutgers this season will be, Hawken, and freshmen **Joe. B. Cirone**, **Bob DeMasse**, **Norberto Ramos** and **Barry Scoville**. Jaworoski is the most experienced of the group and has a potent bat. Hawken has played a lot of outfield over the past two summers and has good speed and a good arm. In Cirone, Rutgers might have a pleasant surprise. He was a three-year outfielder for Bellarmine Prep in California and spent the fall playing football. He opened some eyes during the semester break.

Sophomore Matt Keller will share the catching chores with Chris Dorsett this season.

Three-fourths of the infield comes back in first baseman **Pete Zoccolillo**, shortstop **Dave Marciniak** and third baseman **Paul Gallucci**. The lone loss is a big one, however. Second baseman Rich Saitta was drafted by the Los Angeles Dodgers in the amateur draft. He led the Scarlet Knights in RBI over the last two years, and was as good a defensive second baseman as there has been at Rutgers. Looking to fill that gap in heralded freshman **Darren Fenster**. Fenster was an honorable mention High School All-American choice by *USA Today* and his defense is close to Saitta's already. If he puts the ball in play, Rutgers might not miss a beat at second. Sophomores Marciniak and Zoccolillo played just about every inning last season and will only be better this year. Marciniak came in with a lot of expectations after being selected in the eighth round of the baseball draft after his senior year at Woodbridge High School. He showed a keen eye at the plate with a school record 42 walks. He needs to raise his all-around game but has some of the best baseball


instincts on the team and could be a star. Gallucci had a knack of getting the big hits in big games for Rutgers. He was a factor in the team's biggest wins last year with key hits against Miami, Georgia Tech and Notre Dame. He is now one of the veteran leaders on this team.

Another talent-rich department for this year's team is the infield, Rutgers has some very good players who will push for time along the infield right away. Senior third baseman **Mike Stephans** will push Gallucci after recovering from shoulder surgery about two months prior to the start of spring practice. Stephans spent the fall as the Scarlet Knights quarterback and now rejoins the team for the spring. Freshmen infielders **Rich Wurst** and **Jeff Marciniak** along with sophomore **John Schneider** are all versatile middle infielders with the ability to play a couple of different positions. 


Junior Keith Connolly returns to the mound which should be a big boost to the rotation

catchers. Returning for the Scarlet is a trio of seasoned veterans. Juniors **Chris Dorsett** and **Joe Waleck** along with sophomore **Matt Keller** all return for Rutgers and the competition for playing time is the most heated on the squad. Dorsett has the most experience as a receiver and has a solid all-around game. He has been a starter for two years and knows how to handle the different pitchers on this staff. Waleck has always contributed when called upon and has a good bat. Keller, meanwhile, has the potential to be the best of the group. He doesn't have the experience of the other two but he is an outstanding athlete with excellent skills and takes blocking balls personally. Also among the catchers is freshman **Mike Leonardi**. A switch-hitter, he is improving all the time and Rutgers possibly has a catching star of the future in Leonardi.

The schedule is as tough as always for Rutgers. Last season, the Knights were able to get some key victories against America's top teams, which resulted in such a high RPI rating. This season, the task at hand includes four NCAA Tournament teams to start the season (Old Dominion, Tulane, Florida International, Central Florida) and the very competitive BIG EAST Conference, which was rated the eighth best baseball conference in the nation by *Baseball America*. The conference schedule breaks well for Rutgers because they will host, West Virginia, Notre Dame, and St. John's, who combine with Rutgers to form the top elite teams of the BIG EAST. If RU can survive a difficult 25-game road stretch to open the season, it could be a very special year "On the Banks."



1996 SEASON REVIEW

When the season began, there were a lot of questions to be answered like, "How would Rutgers fare in its new conference?" and, "How would several freshmen respond in their key roles in the lineup?" The answers were overwhelmingly good and Rutgers had a very successful year.


Playing against what had to be considered one of the strongest schedules in the country, Rutgers returned to the 30 win mark with a 32-21-1 record. In its first year of BIG EAST play, Rutgers finished second in the National Division, to clinch an automatic bid to the conference tournament. The Scarlet Knight pitching staff rebounded from a disappointing 1995 and found itself among the nation's top 10 in ERA.

Right from the start, the Scarlet Knights proved there was something special about this team with wins over Miami and Georgia Tech in consecutive games. Those wins marked the first time Rutgers had beaten top 25 opponents on consecutive days since 1990. Those two wins were tremendous confidence builders for a young team still searching for an identity.

As the season went on, Rutgers proved those wins weren't flukes with wins over several teams

that were receiving votes for the top 25, a 10-8 record against NCAA Tournament teams and series wins against every National Division foes. When the final numbers came out, Rutgers found itself atop the conference in the RPI rankings at No. 41, the second highest ranking in the Northeast.

So it was a very impressive and successful year for the Scarlet Knights, despite losing both of its BIG EAST Tournament games. And while there was plenty of disappointment after a poor showing in the tournament, there can be some optimism for the years to come because coach Hill started four freshmen, two sophomores and one junior in the tournament.



Junior Scott Madison had perhaps the the finest year of any Scarlet Knight pitcher in the last decade. He led Rutgers and the BIG EAST in several pitching categories and was named ABCA All-american

PITCHING WAS THE KEY

One of the biggest question marks heading into the 1996 season was the pitching staff. There was hope that the injuries and lack of pitching depth in 1995 would turn into experience and quality in 1996. But no one could have expected the outstanding performances by several pitchers.

ABCA third-team All-American Scott Madison, who would eventually be drafted by the Tampa Bay Devil Rays in the 12th round of the Major League Baseball Amateur draft, came back from elbow surgery to lead Rutgers in wins (8), innings (92.2), complete games (8), and shutouts (4). His eight wins is second on the single-season record list, his 92.2 innings was the fourth highest single-season total at Rutgers, and his four shutouts is the new Scarlet Knight standard and ties him for the most shutouts in a career. Madison also beat Miami, Central Florida, and Notre Dame, three teams which were either ranked or were receiving votes at the time RU

played them. Following his spectacular year, he was named to the first-team All-BIG EAST which was Rutgers' only selection to an All-Conference team.

Along with Madison, junior Brian Stegen moved into the starting rotation and immediately became a major factor in Rutgers' BIG EAST games. Stegen finished 1996 with a 5-4 record and a BIG EAST best 2.28 ERA. He won all five of his games as a starter after converting from short relief on March 24. Probably his most successful week as a Scarlet Knight came when he won three conference games in eight days and batted .385 as a DH. For that effort, he was named Mizuno National Player of the Week.

Backing up those two was one of the finest bullpen trios in the nation. Sophomores Bill Malloy, Jeff Miller and Mike Mundy combined for a 8-3 record and 10 saves. Miller, a second team All East selection, was perhaps the most successful, finishing 1996 with a 4-1 record, three saves and a 1.53 ERA. Mundy, led the team in saves with five and backed up Madison with three innings against Miami in Rutgers' 5-4 win. Malloy, was a perfect 3-0 with two saves. He held opposing batters to a .206 batting average. At the close of 1996, he became one of Rutgers' highest draft choices in school history with an sixth round selection by San Francisco in the Major League Baseball draft.

Sophomore Corey Long also had an excellent second season. In his first appearance of 1996, he was thrown into the fire against Georgia Tech

and he responded with two scoreless innings to earn the win in RU's 5-4 victory over the nation's pre-season No. 5 team.

At the close of 1996, the Scarlet Knights had a team ERA of 3.53 which was the ninth best team ERA in America. Juniors Stegen and Madison also found themselves atop the ERA rankings at No. 13 and No. 15 respectively.

YOUTH IS SERVED

As the season began, Rutgers coach Fred Hill penciled in three freshmen into the starting lineup and by the end of the season, four freshmen and two sophomores made up a majority of the lineup in the BIG EAST Tournament. In what coach Hill feels may be his finest group of fresh-

men, none stood out more than Adam Neubart, a Mizuno Freshman All-America. Neubart led the Scarlet Knights in hitting, runs, doubles, on-base percent, slugging percent and stolen bases. He played all three outfield positions and had assists from both left field and right field. His 46 runs, and 16 doubles were the most by a freshman in Rutgers' history and he had the highest batting average (.333) by a freshman since Gary Resetar in 1986.

Shortstop Dave Marciniak played every game and displayed a keen eye at the plate with a school record 42 walks. Fellow frosh Pete Zoccolillo started 42 games at first base and made just two errors. Pete also came on late, raising his average 74 points over his final 16 games. Coach Hill also used catcher Matt Keller more extensively as the season grew long. Keller started a game in the BIG EAST Tournament and hit a solid .333 during the year. If all four improve in the natural progression you would expect, Rutgers will have four special players in the lineup for a few more years.

TIMELY HITTING EQUALS BIG WINS

The Scarlet Knights were not a powerful hitting team, but it was the timely hitting that made the difference. On several occasions, the Scarlet Knights got the key hit and drove in the key run for a big win. Sophomore Paul Gallucci had two run doubles against Miami and Notre Dame driving in game-winning runs... Marciniak squeezed bunted in the game-winning run against against Georgia Tech in the ninth inning... Joe Waleck had an RBI single against Pitt for an extra-inning win... Sal Aquino, who hit .397 over the final 23 days of his career, hit a pinch double to drive in two against Rider and smacked a three run triple against Pace in two RU victories... Mike Stephans hit a bases-loaded single against Delaware for a 2-1 win over the No. 26 Blue Hens. It was just that kind of season.

Along with the hits came some timely defense that was just as critical to the Scarlet Knight success. Junior Rich Saitta was brilliant at second base all season long. In fact, many feel that his play at second base was the best in RU history. Time after time, he quelled rallies with diving stops and was involved in turning 41 double plays. For the second consecutive year, Saitta also led the Scarlet with 35 RBI.

The year ended with two disappointing losses in the BIG EAST Tournament, but Rutgers established itself as one of the premier teams in the BIG EAST for



Junior Rich Saitta led the Scarlet Knights in RBI for the second straight season and played a big part in Rutgers turning 57 double plays which was 20th in the nation.


years to come, in what can only be described as a truly special year.


In 1996, Rutgers saw three of its players drafted by Major League teams, two of which were among the highest draft picks in Rutgers history.

THE 1950 SCARLET KNIGHTS

Rutgers 1950 College World Series Game-By-Game

The Scarlet Knights opened play on **Thursday, June 15** in the opening game of the tournament, against defending national champion Texas (22-5)... Texas took a 2-0 lead in the second on Frank Womack's two-run homer, and Murray Wall pitched six shutout innings before giving up a run in the seventh... Trailing 2-1, Rutgers rallied to take the lead in the eighth, scoring three runs off Wall on three walks, two singles and an error... Wall walked home a run, and Rutgers first baseman Bob Suba stole home for another... Suba finished the game with three stolen bases, as Rutgers set a College World Series record with a total of seven for the game... Herman Hering steadied after giving up the early home run, and although he walked seven and struck out only one, he also allowed only three hits in going the distance for the win... Ray Van Cleef paced the attack, going three for four, as Rutgers won, 4-2.

Saturday, June 17, Rutgers faced Wisconsin in a second-round winner's bracket matchup before only 955 fans in steady drizzle... Tom Forster pitched a complete-game six-hitter, and Van Cleef went four-for-five with a double and a run scored to pace the Scarlet 5-3 win, and a 2-and-0 record in the tournament...

On **Monday, June 19**, Rutgers met Washington State in the winner's bracket final... The game was a terrific pitcher's duel between Al Willenbrock for Rutgers and Rod Keogh for the Cougars... Willenbrock gave up an early home run to Ted Tappe of the Cougars, but the Scarlet tied it in the fourth on a triple by Jim Monahan and an infield out... That would prove to be the only hit off Keogh, but he walked eight and was frequently in trouble... In the seventh, Rutgers loaded the bases, without warning, (Rutgers later said it was not a called play), the runner on third tried to steal home and was tagged out... As he broke, the runner on second started toward third, then hesitated, and was eventually run down and tagged out to complete an unusual double play, killing the potential rally... In the top of the ninth, Washington State loaded the bases with no outs... Don Paul grounded sharply to third baseman Steve Kalapos, who threw home for the force there... catcher Hardy Peterson then threw to first to double Paul, and Suba, the first baseman, then spotted Gordon Brunswick, the runner at second, trying to make a surprise dash to home... Suba threw back to Peterson, who tagged Brunswick to complete the triple play... It was the second of three triple plays in the CWS... In the top of the 10th, Washington State finally broke through on an outfield error, hit batter and a two-run double by Terry Carroll to take a 3-1 lead, and Keogh completed his one hitler by retiring the side in the bottom of the 10th... Washington State improved to 3-0, and Rutgers fell to 2-1... Van Cleef, after going seven-for-nine in the first two games was held to 0-for-5...

On **Wednesday, June 21**, Rutgers came back from its one-hit outing to blow out Wisconsin 16-2...The Scarlet collected 11 hits, including two apiece by four different players, and the Badgers unraveled, committing seven errors... (Van Cleef was 1-for-6)... Herman Hering turned in his second complete game win of the tournament, scattering eight hits, and also contributed a triple and a single to the 11-hit attack... Wisconsin was eliminated at 2-2, and Rutgers joined Texas and Washington State at 3-1 (Texas had beaten the Cougars, 12-1, on Tuesday). Washington State drew the bye into the championship game, and Rutgers faced Texas for the second time, on **Thursday, June 22**... The Scarlet went with second-round winner Tom Foster, but Texas knocked him out early, scoring three in the second, and five in the fourth on their way to a 15-9 win... Charlie Gorin went the distance for Texas, despite allowing 12 hits and nine runs, as the Longhorns outlit Rutgers, 15-12... Texas went on to win the title over Washington State the next night, 3-0, while Rutgers finished third at 3-2... finishing the season at 17-4-1...Van Cleef was 2-for-4 in the final game to finish the CWS at .417 on 10-for-24, and was named the Most Outstanding Player.





Alongi was one of two All-Americans on the 1993 squad, which was one of Rutgers' finest. He helped lead RU to a school record in wins (38) while finishing with a .371 batting average, nine home runs, 39 stolen bases and 143 total bases. He set RU single-season records with his stolen bases (39) and total bases (146). His nine HRs places him 10th on the all-time single-season list. Alongi also recorded 18 doubles and six triples, ranking him fourth and second on those single-season lists, respectively. Alongi made just one error in right field and led all RU outfielders with 14 assists. Alongi also claimed Atlantic 10 Player of the Year honors as well as ECAC and NJCBA recognition.

Now a coach with the Scarlet Knights, Gardner was one of the most outstanding outfielders in Rutgers' history and one of two Scarlet Knights to be chosen as two-time All-Americans. A 1986 *Baseball America* Freshman All-America, Gardner was second on the team in hitting that year with a .398 batting average while leading RU in hits (70), RBI (45), home runs (6), total bases (102), slugging percentage (.580), and on-base percentage (.470). In 1987, Gardner followed his impressive debut by collecting *Collegiate Baseball* All-America honors. Gardner led the team in hitting at .368 despite missing 13 games with a hand injury. He finished second on the team in HRs (8) and RBI (45). Gardner also earned his second-consecutive Atlantic 10 and NJ honors as well as being named to the NCAA East Region first-team.

His 39 walks and 20 doubles were both second on the all-time season record. While handling of RU's finest pitching staff's Higgins made just one error.







After missing all of 1995 due to elbow surgery, Madison returned to the mound and made an impact by beating some of America's top teams on his way to an 8-3 record and a 2.33 ERA which was ranked 15th in the country. Madison earned first team All-BIG EAST honors and was the most dominant pitcher in the conference from the beginning of the season to the end. He finished 1996 with eight complete games and a school-record four shutouts. His 92.2 innings was the second-highest total in school history. Madison finished his career with a .722 (17-5) winning percentage which ranks eighth all-time. He owns Rutgers records for shutouts in a season with four.





During his career, the Scarlet Knights were 40-13-1. He is the only Scarlet Knight to have his Number (10) retired.

RAY VAN CLEEF

1951 AACBC FIRST-TEAM

Centerfielder Ray Van Cleef was chosen by American Association of College Baseball Coaches following his senior season where he batted .378, scored 22 runs and smacked two triples, all team-highs. He made just one error in center while playing in all 23 games. In 1950, Van Cleef paced the Scarlet with a lofty .404 average, 44 hits, 15 extra-base hits, 35 runs and 18 stolen bases. He was a first-team District II choice and the MVP of National Baseball Tournament.

Rutgers Baseball in the Olympic Hall of Fame

Since it's inception in 1994, Rutgers Baseball has played a major role in the Olympic Sports Hall of Fame which honors the very best in Rutgers Sports History.

RUTGERS, THE STATE UNIVERSITY OF NEW JERSEY

Long recognized for its excellence in teaching, research and public service, Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey is building on that reputation through the implementation of a strategic plan designed to guide the university as it prepares to enter the next century.

In an exceptionally collaborative process, some 250 members of Rutgers' faculty and administration worked throughout the 1995-96 academic year to develop proposals that support the growth areas identified in "A New Vision of Excellence." These growth areas build upon strong existing programs and identify exciting new initiatives.

The implementation phase of the strategic plan was endorsed by the Board of Governors in June 1996. The proposals identified for implementation stress the importance of maximizing existing resources by increasing partnerships among departments, among campuses, and between Rutgers and other institutions.

The first three projects to be implemented are the Arts and Sciences Honors Program, geared toward the very brightest students; the Rutgers Calculus Project, designed to improve calculus instruction by increasing faculty-student interaction; and the Writing and Speaking at Rutgers Program, which links English composition more closely with other disciplines.

These and other initiatives will carry Rutgers forward as it achieves its goals of becoming one of the top-ranked public research universities in the next 15 years.

HISTORY

Rutgers began its history in 1766 as Queen's College, the eighth institution of higher education to be founded in the American colonies. It became Rutgers College in 1825, honoring Colonel Henry Rutgers, a former trustee and Revolutionary War veteran. The University of Newark merged with Rutgers in 1946 and the College of South Jersey in Camden was incorporated into Rutgers in 1950. Legislative acts in 1945 and 1956 designated all its divisions as The State University of New Jersey. Rutgers is the only university in the nation to have been a colonial college, a land-grant college and a state university.

The office of Student-Athlete Academic Support Services is under the direction of the Assistant Director of Athletics, Academic Support. The new Director, Dr. Michael Mahan came to Rutgers in September of 1995. Since arriving on the banks, there have been numerous changes in the area of Academic Support and it is quickly becoming one of the most complete and well-rounded departments in America.

One of the first steps taken by the new Director was the reorganization of the department into separate units. One unit is located in the Louis Brown Athletic Center, home of the Scarlet Knight baseball team, one unit is located in College Avenue Gym and one unit is located in the Hale Center. Each of these units is responsible for the athletic teams housed in the three athletic areas. For the first time each student-athlete at Rutgers University has an identified academic counselor, and each coach has one counselor for his or her team. Closer relationships have been formed with the Dean's Offices on each campus.

Kathleen Shank, a former assistant coach of the Scarlet women's basketball team and administrator for over 13 years, now works with the Scarlet Knight baseball program and has done so for the past two years. In her time with the baseball program she, along with tremendous improvements in facilities and technological support, has seen the overall g.p.a of the baseball team rise each of the last four semesters.

A new 10 station computer center has recently been opened in the Hale Center for the student-athletes. The computer lab features state-of-the-art computer equipment, including five Apple Power Mac 7500/100's, and five Dell XPS P100c's, all connected to laser printers. This lab is evidence of the continuing commitment of Rutgers University and the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics towards

the student-athlete. New policies regarding study halls and tutors are being implemented. Study-halls run from Sunday night through Thursday night and a number of special tutors, particularly in Math and English, are available to help the individual student-athlete.

On July 1st, the office of the Assistant Director Athletics, Academic Support, will relocate to the Hale Center. The backbone of the program has been and will continue to be academics counseling for the student-athlete. Due to an increase in staff there is now available individual and personal counseling as well as some career counseling. The goal of the entire staff is to assist each of the Rutgers student-athletes reach their academic potential while developing their athletic skills. In the future we will entertain the public with outstanding athletic teams and at the same time prepare tomorrow's leaders.

ACADEMIC FACILITIES

*Classrooms in New Brunswick and Piscataway were improved as the result of a \$1 million fund dedicated to enhancing the university's education mission.

*The completion of \$2.7 million in renovations to biology labs on the Busch and Douglass campuses have meant major improvements in the quality of undergraduate instruction.

*Foran Hall on the Cook campus was dedicated last year. The 150,400 square-foot, three-story, \$37 million building contains classrooms, teaching laboratories, seminar rooms and a rooftop greenhouse. It houses the Chang Science Library, Center for Agricultural Molecular Biology, Center for Turfgrass Science and the departments of plant science and plant pathology.

*In the spring of 1996, the Civic Square Building was dedicated. Located in the heart of New Brunswick, it houses the Visual Arts Department, the Office of the Dean of the Mason Gross School of the Arts, the Edward J. Bloustein School of Planning and Public Policy, and the Center for Urban Policy Research.

*In 1994, the \$54 million Easton Avenue dormitory complex opened. This popular 12-story facility includes 672 beds for students, parking for 1,000 cars, and 14,000 square feet of retail space.

*Rutgers houses over 15,000 students, making it one of the largest housing and food service operations in the nation.



RUTGERS ADMINISTRATION



RUTGERS UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT FRANCIS L. LAWRENCE

Francis L. Lawrence became the President of Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, in the fall of 1990. To improve the efficiency and service orientation of the university in a time of fiscal constraint, he took immediate steps to streamline the administration, reduce red tape, and encourage TQM-style teamwork. An independent management audit assisted the university in developing long and short-term goals for improvement in its operations. At the same time, a strategic planning process was instituted for both administrative and academic units, culminating in a university-wide strategic plan completed this year.

The vision that President Lawrence has proposed for Rutgers is its transformation into a new model of the land-grant university that responds to the pervasive, continuing demand of our society for advanced knowledge. Rutgers is meeting this challenge by building a comprehensive, statewide network of outreach; educating a broader, more inclusive spectrum of our society; strengthening the learning community with additional supports for teaching and learning; taking the scholar-mentor as a model in the learning community; and building unity within its diversity.


One of the president's first initiatives in sharpening the focus of the university's mission was to place more emphasis upon teaching in promotion and tenure review and in hiring. Improvement of the quality of undergraduate education is among the president's foremost concerns. A teaching evaluation was administered university-wide. Teaching Excellence Centers were set up on all three regional campuses to offer teachers support in enhancing instruction. Several Learning Resource Centers were opened throughout the university to offer students assistance ranging from study skills and computer-assisted instruction to tutoring. "Rutgers Dialogues," the report of the university-wide Curriculum Review Committee, is being implemented in new and revised undergraduate courses throughout the university. With financing from a student fee, the university, and the state, new student-access computing facilities have been opened and student computing accounts made available to all Rutgers students.

The increase in quality of the 1980s, which was capped by the admission of Rutgers to the Association of American Universities in 1989, has gained momentum in the 1990s. The Rutgers faculty is winning impressive national honors for high distinction in scholarly accomplishment. A total of \$141.5 million was raised in externally sponsored research in 1995. The innovative Rutgers strategic plan, A New Vision for Excellence, selected thirteen interdisciplinary areas of strength for cooperative development by the university's three geographically separated campuses. More than 250 faculty from all three campuses have worked together to solicit, to formulate, and to choose proposals that bring departments, bureaus, centers, and institutes together in new multidisciplinary alliances that make effective use of the university's resources to serve the people of New Jersey by creating new knowledge and transmitting it through excellent instruction and distinguished public service.

Increased diversity in the university community has also been among the president's primary areas of priority for Rutgers. The university's enrollment of minorities has risen from under 23 percent in 1987 to more than 31 percent. Admissions recruitment efforts have succeeded in ranking Rutgers first among 29 public AAU schools in African-American enrollment, third in Latino enrollment, third in Asian-Pacific Islander enrollment, and first in total minority enrollment. Rutgers was recognized nationally in two successive years for its graduation of the second largest number of African-American students among predominantly white universities.

Dr. Lawrence served on the Governor's Panel to Restructure Higher Education and on the quality Education Commission. He was the first elected chair of the forty-six member New Jersey Presidents' Council and served as a member of the New Jersey Commission on Higher Education. He is also a member of the New Jersey Commission on Science and Technology and the New Jersey-Israel Commission.

On the national level, Dr. Lawrence has been the president of the Association of Graduate Schools of the Association of American Universities and served on the Board of Directors of the Association of American Colleges and Universities. He is currently a member of the Kellogg Commission on the Future of State and Land-Grant Universities of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges; the Association of American Universities Committee on the Future of Graduate Education; and the American Council on Education's Commission on International Education. Dr. Lawrence received his bachelor's degree in French and Spanish from St. Louis University in 1959 and his Ph.D. in French Classical Literature from Tulane University in 1962. He and his wife Mary Kay have four children and nine grandchildren.



RUTGERS UNIVERSITY DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS FREDERICK E. GRUNINGER

As Director of Athletics at the State University, Frederick Gruninger has established a widely-recognized reputation as a respected and tireless leader. He has continually endeavored to enrich the quality of life for student-athletes and maintain the reputation of academic and athletic excellence for which Rutgers has become renowned, while centering his attention on constant improvement and expansion.

In 1995-96, Rutgers competed for the first time in the BIG EAST as an all-sports member in its 19 championship sports, which signals the University's commitment to a comprehensive program for men and women. The baseball, field hockey, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's track and field, men's and women's swimming, men's and women's tennis, softball, men's and women's fencing, gymnastics, volleyball, wrestling and women's lacrosse teams competed successfully at conference post-season events. Individuals from fencing, track and field and wrestling were spotlighted at NCAA Championship events. Record-breaking performances in several sports, a consensus All-American in football and a coaching staff of the year in men's track were complimented by the NCAA fencing championship in men's team epee.

Top-notch facilities are considered vital to the success of any athletic program and under Gruninger's direction, Rutgers' facilities have been improved and expanded so that they are now known as some of the finest in the nation. The most recent major project is the new Rutgers Stadium, a state-of-the-art, lighted, 42,000-seat facility that was completed in the summer of 1994. The Hale Center, which has been lauded as among the best in the nation, provides a modern training facility for several men's and women's teams, and furnishes the football program with a necessary support facility for academic and athletic needs. The 8,600-seat Louis Brown Athletic Center, and the surrounding sports complex, are areas of concentrated in-season activity for the Lady and Scarlet Knight teams.

Other areas that have seen significant growth under Gruninger are the academic support program and the athletic awards system. Both of these programs have become widely-appreciated adjuncts and continually provide athletes with deserving recognition and support. In addition to a wide spectrum of awards for its over 1,000 student-athletes, Rutgers athletics reaches back to honor its storied past. Annually, the Football Hall of Fame, the Basketball Hall of Fame, and, the Olympic Sports Hall of Fame, all established under Gruninger's guidance, spotlight the memorable individual and team achievements of the past. Each year, Rutgers' "best and brightest" are honored at separate team awards banquets and, then, collectively, at the marquee event -- the Scholar-Athlete/Most Valuable Player celebration.

Under Gruninger, Rutgers has continued its tradition of hosting numerous prestigious conference, regional and national championships, that bring the best college athletes to the New Brunswick campus and the state of New Jersey. With Rutgers playing more than a major role, the 1996 Final Four was a large success. Rutgers has co-hosted the NCAA East Regional Basketball Championship an unprecedented eight times over the last 10 years. Finally, Rutgers will host the NCAA Men's Lacrosse Championships in 1997 and 1998. The University also continues to provide a place for sports championships at the Olympic, AAU and New Jersey inter-scholastic levels as well as national clinics and training camps.


In conjunction with the University's overall thrust in community service, Rutgers athletes are developing a meaningful relationship with local communities, particularly hospitals, schools and charitable organizations in central New Jersey. The commitment of the student-athlete's time and talent further signifies Rutgers' desire to be linked with neighboring communities and charities.

Gruninger, who holds both bachelor's and Master's degrees from Rutgers, was appointed an Assistant Athletic Director in 1966, and in 1971, was named Associate Athletic Director. He became Athletic Director in 1973. He served as golf coach from 1963-1971.

He has served as a member of the NCAA Council and was recently elected as second vice president of the National Association of College Directors of Athletics. Gruninger has also been a committee officer on several conference, state, regional and national athletic associations. The College Athletic Administration of New Jersey, an organization which he helped form, recognized his leadership and dedication by presenting him with the Garden State Award. He continues to serve in numerous other capacities that promote athletics in the state and the nation.

A native of Fanwood, NJ, Gruninger and his wife, Barbara, reside in Martinsville. They have three married children and one grandchild.

RUTGERS BASEBALL FACILITIES




CLASS OF 1953 STADIUM COMPLEX

A spacious baseball complex set behind the Louis Brown Athletic Center, the Rutgers Stadium complex boasts some of the finest amenities that any baseball program in America would be proud of.

The entire infield has been remodeled with a state-of-the-art drainage system. The diamond dirt is specialized for the Northeast climate and is the same dirt used at Waterfront Park in Trenton, NJ.

The complex also boasts two infield diamonds which allows for more flexibility in drill and technique work. The outdoor batting cages have been customized with artificial turf and the Rutgers bullpen has three pitching mounds.



The Rutgers University "Bubble" America's largest fully air supported facility houses 120 yards of artificial turf and is situated to allow for an entire baseball diamond to be laid out and used for practice rain or shine.




