FRED HILL

HEAD COACH 19TH SEASON

The 2001 season was a record setting year for the Rutgers baseball team, as the Hill-led Scarlet Knights won a school record 42 games and reached the NCAA Tournament for the fourth-straight season. The team also finished second in the BIG EAST Regular Season and served as the No. 2 seed in the Lincoln, Nebraska Regional, pushing eventual College World Series participant Nebraska to the brink in two, highly-competitive contests. The success of the 2001 season was not surprising when one considers the energy and knowledge that Hill brings the field each and every season.

Entering his 26th season as a head coach and 19th at Rutgers, Fred Hill's teams have played to the best of their ability with amazing frequency and consistency. Hill has been successful every step of the way, and last year, in only his 25th season, he collected his 700th victory at the collegiate level while leading Rutgers to a No. 25 national ranking at season's end.

He has spent 25 years coaching collegiate baseball, seven at Montclair State and 18 at Rutgers University. In those 25 years, his teams have competed in over 1,100 games.

When you add the countless practice sessions, the fall games, the clinics, the high school games, and the summer league contests you realize that Fred Hill has seen a lot of baseball and that doesn't include the previous years as a high school coach or his playing days. When you get right down to it, Coach Hill has been involved in baseball all of his life.

Despite his lifelong association with America's pastime, Hill remains as energetic as he was during his own playing days and his energy and charisma can be seen in each player involved with the program. Beyond the wins, the championships and the acclaim he has brought to two of New Jersey's finest collegiate baseball teams, Fred Hill is a tremendous role model and mentor to each person who dons a Scarlet Knight uniform. After 16 consecutive postseason appearances, four-consecutive NCAA berths and numerous league championships, Hill still holds to the same principles that made him a scholastic star at Upsala. Most importantly, he remains as enthusiastic about the game as he did when he first started coaching and remains focused on returning Rutgers to Omaha, Nebraska and the College World Series for the first time in over 50 years.

Hill began his collegiate career at Montclair State University where, in 1977, he was named head baseball and football coach. In his career with Montclair State, he developed the baseball team into a Division III national power, winning 62 percent of his games and earning a trip to the Division III World Series (Hill was named Division III National Coach of the Year in 1983). For those contributions and many more to the Montclair State Athletic Department, he was elected to their Sports Hall of Fame in 1991.

Hill left Montclair State in 1984 and found himself with the daunting task of rebuilding the State University's venerable baseball program - a program that was coming off a 13-22 season and had not advanced to the NCAA Tournament since 1970. Very slowly, Hill began to craft a team in his mold - one that thrived on hard work and was driven by suc-

cess. In 1984, his first season at Rutgers, Hill endured a 13-21 record, one of only two losing seasons he has had. Since that 1984 season, Hill has guided Rutgers to winning seasons in 15 of the past 16 years. He has also won seven conference championships in the that time (five A-10, two BIG EAST) and has guided the Scarlet Knights to eight NCAA Tournament bids. More importantly, Hill has developed the Rutgers baseball team into one of the most well-respected and revered programs in the nation - a "northern" school that has proven, time and time again, that it is capable of competing with any team in the country.

After years of dominating the Atlantic-10 (Rutgers won five league championships in 10 seasons), Rutgers stepped up a level of competition in 1996 and Hill's team did not miss a beat. Just two years into their BIG EAST experience, Rutgers captured the BIG EAST Regular Season and Tournament championship in 1998 and repeated the impressive feat two seasons ago in 2000.

Hill first led Rutgers to the NCAA Tournament in just his third year, including a 28-16 regular season record in 1986. The following season, Hill posted a then school-record 36 wins and in 1988, Hill set another school record by recording 38 wins with a 38-21-1 record that included another NCAA Tournament appearance and a 6-1 win over Clemson in the second round. In 1989, Hill reached the 30-win mark for the third-consecutive season, but it was not until 1990 that Rutgers put itself on the national map for good.

The 1990 season featured a future major leaguer (Angel Echevarria) and the star-power helped lead Rutgers to a 37-19 overall mark. After beating West Virginia in the A-10 finals to earn an automatic berth to the NCAA Tournament, Rutgers headed off to East Regions

in Waterbury, CT. After losing a 3-2 heart-breaker to North Carolina in the opening round, Rutgers rallied back with a 15-5 victory over Connecticut in the second round before putting together a run that will forever be remembered by Scarlet Knight baseball fans. The Scarlet Knights put on a show following the win over Connecticut, rattling off three wins over Top 15 teams in a 24-hour period, including a 4-3 win over Georgia. Rutgers rallied back from the consolation bracket to meet that same Georgia team in the finals and although Rutgers dropped a 20-9 decision to the Bulldogs, the

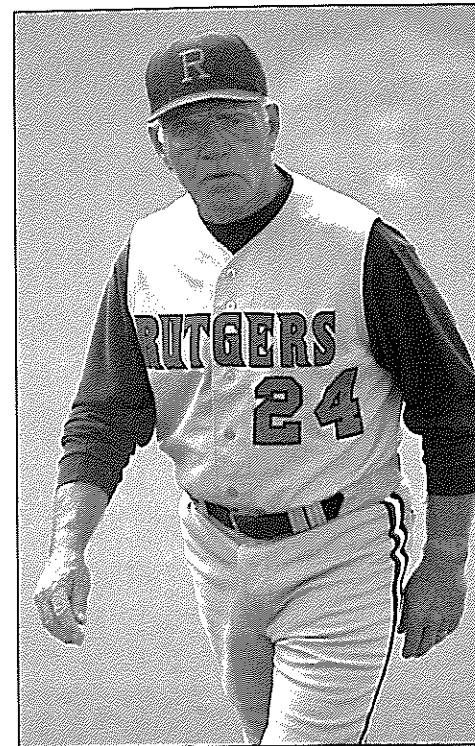
eventual National Champions, the Scarlet Knights showed everyone that they could compete with the best.

Thirty win seasons in each of the next three years ran the total to six-straight as Hill had quickly developed Rutgers into a perennial NCAA team and a constant Atlantic-10 favorite. A 28-19 season in 1994 followed by a 28-29 season in 1995, closed out the Atlantic-10 chapter as Rutgers moved into the BIG EAST Conference. Just three seasons later, Rutgers was crowned the Regular Season and BIG EAST Champion in 1998 and then finished second in 1999 and earned the school's first-ever at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament, a sign that Rutgers had developed a national-level reputation. That success continued to grow in 2000, as another league championship and a trip to the NCAA Championship highlighted a tremendous year. Then in 2001 his team set a school record with 42 wins and its fourth consecutive NCAA Tournament berth. All of this has also set the stage for even greater expectations and hope in 2002.

Not one to take individual credit for some lofty achievements, Hill credits his assistants, both current and former, as people who have had as much to do with Rutgers' success as anyone. Time and time again, Hill cites his players' desire to work hard and become the best they can be, which trickles down from the head coach to his players.

He has seen several of his players go on to play professionally and the list of his former players who now coach the game is too long to

recite. His legacy and aggressive coaching style is well-known and still growing throughout New Jersey and beyond.

He has seen some of his former players become among the highest draft picks in school history, including twelve in the past four seasons. In 1996, he became one of just a few coaches in history to see two of his former pupils achieve the highest level of success in two different sports. Former Scarlet Knight Eric Young was selected to play in the 1996 All-Star Game after an outstanding sea-

son at second base for the Colorado Rockies. In football, Sam Mills, a linebacker for Hill at Montclair State, developed into a perennial Pro Bowler with the Carolina Panthers. In his 24 seasons, Fred Hill has amassed 730 career wins and boasts a .621 winning percentage. He has won 582 of those games at Rutgers in 18 seasons and has a .622 winning percentage "On the Banks." In his 18 seasons, he has won over 30 games 12 times and as many as 28 three other times. Hill has seen 13 players earn All-America acclaim (including Billy McCarthy in 2001) and 40 others earn First Team All-Conference honors. His teams have constantly been in the national rankings for excellence in defense and pitching. In fact, in 2000, Rutgers was the only team in the nation to be ranked in the top ten nationally in both batting average and team ERA.

During his tenure, 11 players have earned All-America honors and 39 players have signed professional contracts, including 14 Scarlet Knights in the past four seasons. Currently, two former Scarlet Knights - Young and Echevarria - are on major league rosters and several others are well on their way down similar paths. Hill's teaching and coaching style develops strong players and even stronger people.

As a collegiate star at Upsala, Hill earned an unbelievable 11 varsity letters. Four letters came in baseball, where he led the team in batting twice. Four more came in football, where he led the team in rushing four times and was named the football team's Most Valuable Back three times. Three more letters came in basketball, where he was voted Most Improved Player his senior year. Chosen as a Small College All-American following his final football season, Hill was honored by his alma mater in 1992 as a distinguished alumnus who has achieved excellence in his chosen profession. Following his outstanding collegiate career, Hill moved onto a professional career in the Washington Senators organization before beginning his storied coaching career.

He began his coaching career as freshman baseball coach at Upsala while also playing semi-pro baseball for the East Orange Soverals. His next move was to Clifford Scott High School, where he was an assistant baseball coach for five years and head coach for another six. During those six years, Hill led the Scotties to a 94-58 record, two state sectional championships, and also served time as an assistant

football coach. He moved on to coach the Pequannock High School football team for four years and then returned to Upsala as an assistant baseball coach for three more seasons.

The tremendously successful and decorated head coach is just as dedicated to his family. He lives in Verona, NJ with his wife Evelyn and has six children: Nancy, Fred, Linda, Jim, Tracey, and Karen. He and Evelyn also have five grandchildren: Jessica, Danielle, Brian, James and Natalie. A coaching-rich family, Fred's brother Brian, currently an assistant with the Charlotte Hornets, has held NBA head coaching positions with the Orlando Magic and the Vancouver Grizzlies in the NBA and his son, Fred, is an assistant coach with the Villanova University men's basketball team.

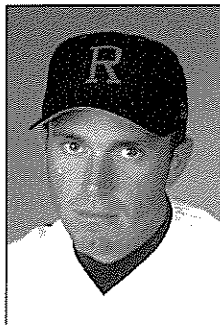

GLEN GARDNER ASSISTANT COACH 11TH SEASON

Entering his 11th season of coaching at Rutgers, Glen Gardner is one of the finest student-athletes in Rutgers' sports history.

Nationally-recognized for his hitting instruction and his results at Rutgers, Gardner is the hitting and outfield coach and also assists Coach Hill in the day-to-day responsibilities of the program. Coach Gardner has also become an outstanding recruiter, and Rutgers has brought in some of the finest recruiting classes in the BIG EAST over the past few seasons, helping to elevate Rutgers to national prominence.

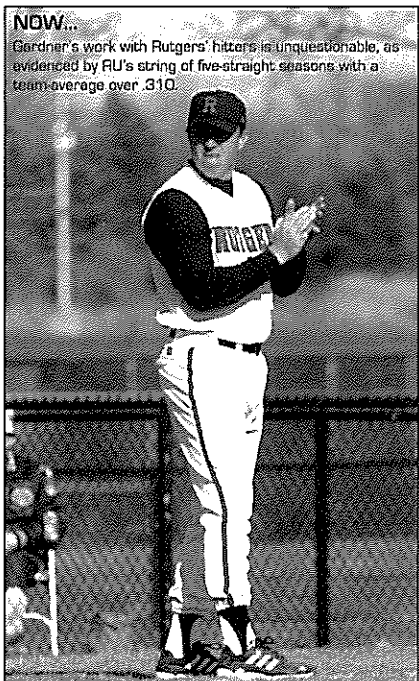
Gardner's success as a coach is best exhibited by the success of his players. In each of the past five seasons, Rutgers has posted a team batting average over .310 and several of its players have been ranked among the nation's best. Darren Fenster (.433) and Joe B. Cirone (.405) finished in the top 40 nationally in 2000, while Billy McCarthy (.423) accomplished the feat in 2001.

His strengths are his easy going nature and his ability to communicate with the players. His infectious, unyielding work ethic sets a standard for everyone in the program, and his rewards come when his pupils match and eclipse his numerous Scarlet Knight hitting records.

One of the most prolific hitters in Rutgers' history, Gardner was a two-time All-American selection and, in 1997, he was elected to the Rutgers Olympic Sports Hall of Fame – an honor given to only the finest student-athletes in Rutgers sports history.

In his three seasons as an outfielder, he compiled a career .356 batting average with 23 home runs and 141 RBI. All three numbers rank among the Rutgers all-time top 10. After his junior year in 1987, the San Diego Padres drafted him in the 13th round,

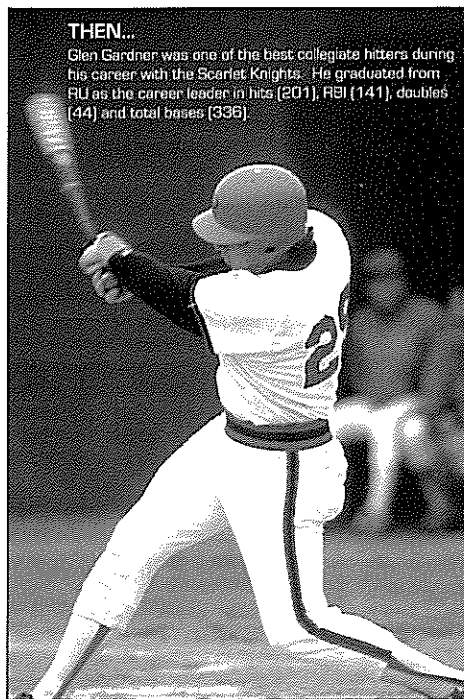
but he opted to stay at RU and was selected by Atlanta the following year. Gardner advanced to Burlington, Iowa (Class A) in the Atlanta Braves organization before being struck in the eye by a batted ball, which ended a promising professional career. Under Gardner's tutelage, several Scarlet Knights have had outstanding seasons. Gardner has worked diligently to develop the Scarlet Knight offense and he has seen several of his pupils continue on to the professional level. In the past four years, Rutgers has sent ten hitters onto the professional ranks,

including sixth-round pick Billy McCarthy (Braves) last season, fourth-round pick David DeJesus (Royals) the season before and Midwest League All-Star Pete Zoccolillo (Brewers) in 1999.

Gardner is single and resides in Point Pleasant, NJ. He played scholastically at Immaculata High School in Somerville and was named one of the top New Jersey players of the 1980's by the Star Ledger sports staff.

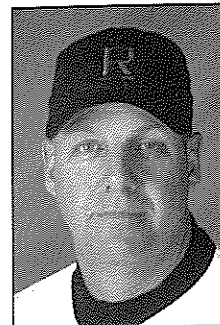

TOM BAXTER ASSISTANT COACH 13TH SEASON

One of the most recognized coaches in New Jersey, Tom Baxter is now in his 13th season as pitching coach with the Scarlet

Knights. Baxter is also a tremendous asset to the program in recruiting, especially in the South Jersey and Shore areas.

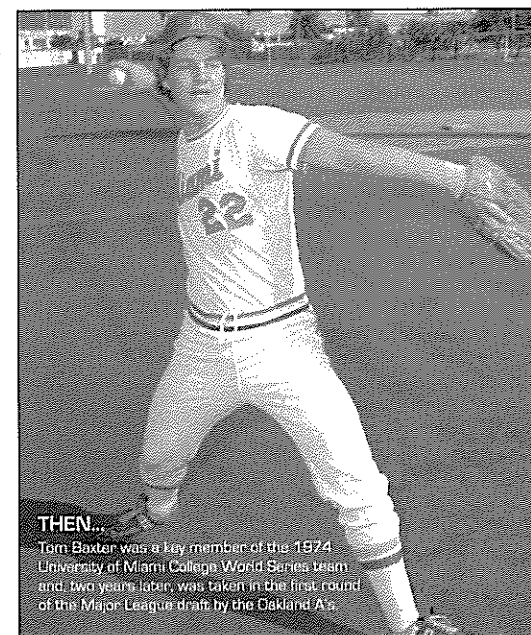
His success with the Scarlet Knight pitchers is unquestioned. Last season, Baxter guided a pitching staff with just two seniors to a 3.82 team ERA, which ranked 18th nationally. He also helped two players into the professional ranks - Buddy Gallagher (Rockies) and Eric Brown (Cubs). In 2000, he led the Scarlet Knight pitching staff to a 3.50 ERA, which ranked seventh in the nation while in 1996, the team's 3.53 mark was 18th best. Relief pitcher Bill Malloy was the first to go for Rutgers in the Major League draft from that 1996 team, selected by the San Francisco Giants in the eighth round. Junior left-hander Scott Madison, a third-team All-American, was selected in the 12th round of the draft by the Tampa Bay Devil Rays. Two seasons later, in 1998, Baxter sent two more pitchers - Mike Mundy and Keith Connolly - onto the professional ranks. In all, Baxter has helped 12 pitchers towards professional careers since 1990.

A tremendously successful high school and collegiate pitcher, Baxter's strength lies in his ability to relate his experiences to today's pitchers. He was drafted by the New York Mets in the sixth round of the 1973 Major League Baseball draft, but accepted a full scholarship to the University of Miami, following a 16-0, All-State senior season at Bayonne (NJ) High School. He was also voted by the Star Ledger sports staff as one of the top high school players in New Jersey during the 1970's after a standout HS career.

In his freshman season at Miami, he helped lead the Hurricanes to the 1974 College World Series with an 8-3 record. In 1976, he was drafted by the Oakland A's in the first round of the draft. His career started off impressively with a no-hitter in his first career start, but a shoulder injury ended his professional career after just two seasons.

Baxter joined Rutgers after an extremely successful career as a head baseball coach in Hudson County. In 1984, he began a three-year stint at Dickinson High School in Jersey City before moving on to Marist. He led Marist to the 1988 Parochial B State Championship before joining the staff at Rutgers.

Tom and his wife, Terri, reside in Pt. Pleasant, NJ and have three children, T.J. (16), Mary Kate (14) and Claire (8).

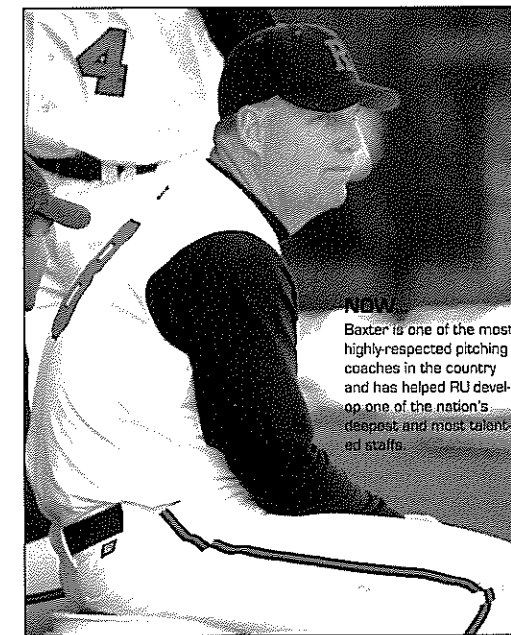

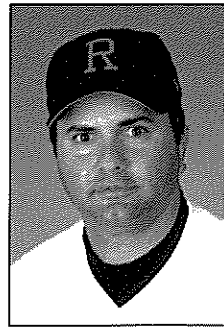

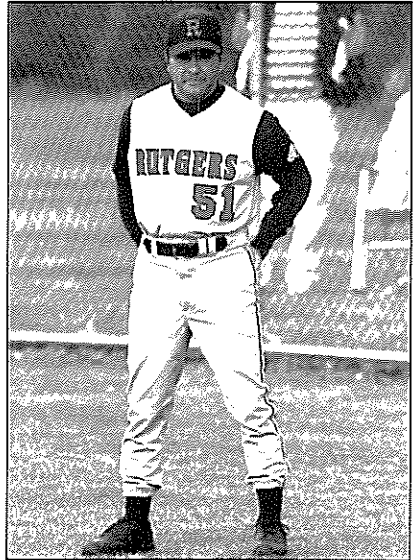
JAY BLACKWELL ASSISTANT COACH THIRD SEASON

Returning to Rutgers in 2002 for his third season is assistant coach Jay Blackwell. In each of his previous two seasons here at Rutgers the team has gone on to the NCAA

Tournament, something he hopes to help the Knights reach again this season. A key member of the 1998 coaching staff, Blackwell will

work with the hitters and catchers while also coaching first base for the Scarlet Knights. He is a well-known baseball personality in New Jersey whose seven years of collegiate coaching experience and expertise help on the field.

Last year Coach Blackwell returned to Rutgers following a two-year stint as head coach at Division II Bloomfield College, where he guided his team to the postseason in both years. Prior to the 1998 season at Rutgers, Blackwell served as an assistant at Bloomfield

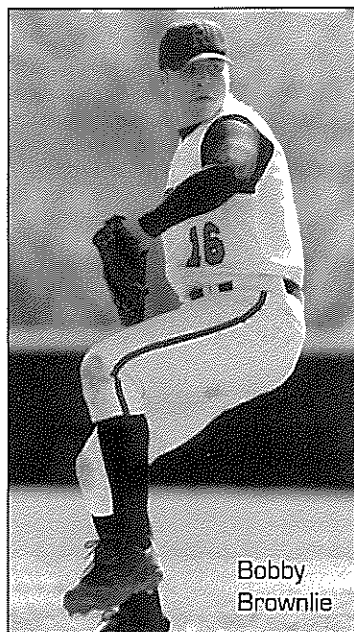
2002 OUTLOOK

There is no longer a safe place to hide. The Rutgers University baseball team, tucked away in central New Jersey, has for years been known as a strong team from the Northeast, the college baseball equivalent of being a bridesmaid. Being successful in the northeast carried a label of relativity in the eyes of the college baseball world, but all that has changed with the continued development of the baseball program at Rutgers.

Back-to-back 40-win seasons, four-straight trips to the NCAA Tournament, national top 25 rankings in each of the last four seasons and numerous victories over national powers have forced Rutgers to shed its "underdog" status and emerge as one the best programs in the country, for any region. After sweeping through its first six games last season, beating No. 1 Georgia Tech and taking two of three from eventual National Champion Miami as part of a season-opening 18-game road trip, Rutgers began to make waves in February and did not stop until the final pitch was thrown in the regional final.

The momentum from 2001 should carry over to this season, as Rutgers returns seven position players and the bulk of its pitching staff from a year ago. While the faces may change at some of the positions and the roles may seem a bit different,

one thing remains the same again in 2002 - Rutgers will be gunning for its third BIG EAST Championship in five years and a fifth-straight trip to the NCAA Tournament.

PITCHING

The conversation about Rutgers' strengths begins with its pitching staff, which returns all but two hurlers from last season. The team's top starter, junior Bobby Brownlie, is coming off a strong sophomore season. Brownlie posted a 6-3 record in 2001, despite missing nearly a month with a broken thumb. He led the team in strikeouts with 86 and also picked up the team's NCAA Tournament first win with a complete-game effort vs. BYU. In the summer, Brownlie pitched for Team USA and posted a 7-0 mark, earning Summer Player of the Year honors from Baseball America.

After Brownlie, Coach Hill will turn to a long list of talented hurlers. Senior lefty Tom Crohan is another dependable starter coming off a strong season. Crohan worked out of the bullpen for his first two seasons, but found his way into the starting rotation last year. He responded with a 6-2 mark in 74.2 innings of work. He turned in strong performances vs. Old Dominion (two runs, 6.2 innings), NC State (0 ER, 5.2 IP) and Notre Dame, when he took a no-hit-

Rutgers was ranked in all four national preseason polls this season. Rutgers was ranked 23rd by Collegiate Baseball, 24th by Baseball Weekly/ESPN and 25th by the NCBWA and Baseball America.

Rutgers returns 8 of 11 pitchers from last season, including top prospect Bobby Brownlie. Brownlie tied the school-record for strikeouts in only two years, which he looks to break this season. He went 7-0 for Team USA with a 0.84 ERA, and received Baseball America's Summer Player of the Year Award. Also back is senior southpaw Tom Crohan (6-2, 3.38), senior Tom Wheeler (6-2, 4.04) and senior Ryan Molchan (3-2, 4.06).

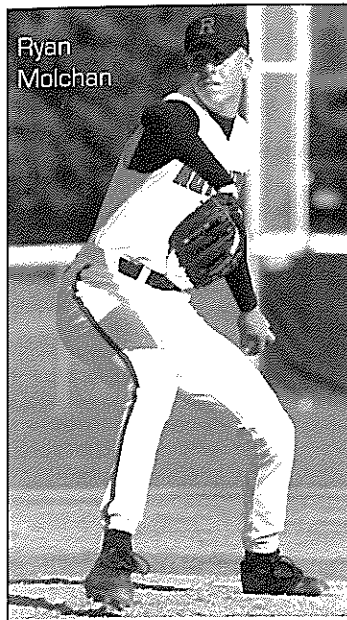
Rutgers will also return 7 of 9 starting position players, including preseason All-BIG EAST team members Val Majewski and Mike Popowski. Last season, Majewski batted .378 with 8 home runs and tied the school record with 24 doubles, while Popowski hit .335 with 7 home runs. The Knights will also look to four-year starter second baseman Matt Wolski, a second team All-BIG EAST pick in 2001, to add to the offensive punch like he has done in the past.

Head coach Fred Hill will embark upon his 26th season of collegiate coaching, including his 19th at Rutgers. Hill won his 700th career game last season and has guided Rutgers to an unprecedented four-straight NCAA Tournament appearances. He has also eclipsed the 40-win mark in each of the last two seasons, including a program-best 42 in 2001.

Juniors Bobby Brownlie (First Team) and Val Majewski (Third Team) were named to the NCBWA, Collegiate Baseball and Baseball America Preseason All-America Teams. Brownlie was also named Preseason Player of the Year by Louisville Slugger.

The Knights will be returning the entire infield which held the best fielding percentage in the BIG EAST last season and 16th best nationally. With Majewski moving to the outfield, junior Steve Normane will take over full-time at first base and will be looked on to add power to the lineup this year. On the other side of the infield, senior third baseman Ryan Lillis (.282) and junior shortstop Tim Sweeney (.241) will look to improve on their productive seasons of a year ago. Senior Matt Wolski, a Second Team All-BIG EAST pick, returns for his fourth-year at second base.

Rutgers will play 17 games against teams that competed in last year's NCAA Tournament, including three-game series against College World Series participant Tulane and National Champion Miami. The Scarlet Knights will start the year with William & Mary (3 games), while also traveling to Old Dominion (3 games) then on to Tulane and Miami for three game-series as well.

ter into the fifth inning against the top-ranked Irish. Joining Crohan in the mix this season is fellow senior Tom Wheeler. Wheeler, who posted an identical 6-2 mark in 2001, owns a 16-4 career record and fired 19.1 consecutive shutout innings during the season.

Also in the mix are juniors Jason Bergmann and Sean Atchison. Bergmann enjoyed a strong freshman season in 2000, but struggled a bit during his sophomore campaign. After an All-Star summer in the New England Collegiate Baseball League, he appears ready for a breakthrough campaign. Atchison, a transfer from Winthrop, was 2-0 in limited duty last season. When he did pitch,

however, he was outstanding, allowing just 12 hits and two runs in 15.1 innings of action. A crafty lefty, Atchison also enjoyed a strong summer and is throwing harder in 2002.

Another pitcher whose value will escalate this season is fifth-year senior Ryan Molchan. Yet another southpaw, Molchan is well-known among his teammates as the squad's hardest worker and his efforts have paid off. Last season, Molchan appeared in a team-high 24 games and posted a 3-2 record. He also pitched well in the summer, helping the Winchester Royals to The Valley League championship.

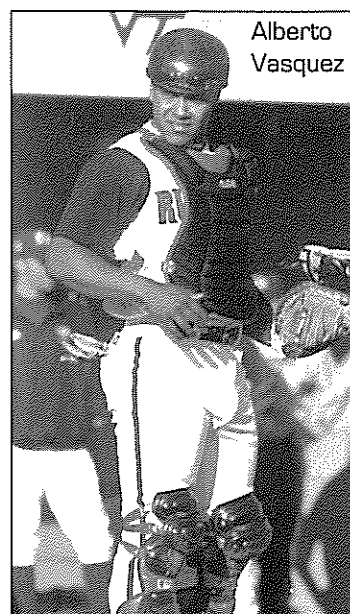
Also factoring this season will be seniors Brian Winters and Jeff Pierce, as well as junior David Santiago (5-0, 3.15). All three have fought back from arm surgeries over the past two seasons and appear ready to contribute. Mix in redshirt freshmen David Caffrey and Tom Malafronte, as well as true freshmen Aaron Kalb and Jack Egbert and Rutgers possesses, yet again, one of the nation's deepest staffs.

"You can never have enough good pitching," said Hill. "The past couple of years, we have been fortunate to get good pitching and we

hope that will continue this season. Most of our guys are either very experienced or made huge strides in the summer and fall. All of our roles are wide open and the most talented guy will pitch."

CATCHING

The Scarlet Knights will benefit from the return of fifth-year senior Mike Popowski, who was undrafted last June despite a very productive spring. Popowski hit .335 with career highs in home runs (7) and RBI (47) last season, including seven in the NCAA Tournament. Popowski has hit over .300 in each of his previous three seasons with Rutgers and will see time behind the plate, while also serving as

the team's designated hitter on occasion. His ability to duplicate his offensive production of last season will be paramount to the team's success. Joining Popowski is junior Alberto Vasquez, who performed well last season. Vasquez is coming off an All-Star summer in the Valley League and has shown vast improvement in all facets of the game. Last season, he threw out a team-high nine base runners and posted a .409 on-base percentage in BIG EAST games.

"Popowski and Vasquez did a nice job for us last year," said Hill. "We are in a good position with them because they are both experienced and do a nice job of handling our pitching staff."

Also in the mix is redshirt freshman Lee Moskowitz. Moskowitz, who served as Brownlie's catcher in high school, did not play last season, but is an athletic player with above-average speed, not only for a catcher but for any position on the field. Moskowitz will see time in a limited capacity, but is an able back-up should the need arise.

INFIELD

The team posted one of the nation's top fielding percentages last season, and the steady play of its infield was a big reason for it. In 2002, RU returns its entire starting infield from a season ago, which include three, first-year starters in 2001.

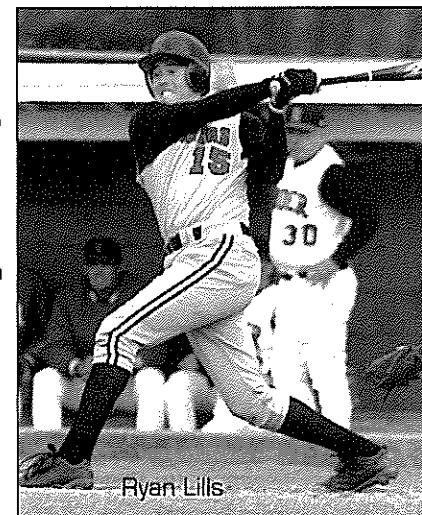
Returning at first base is junior Steve Normane who, through improved play, earned the starting job for the final third of the season. Normane batted .262 and displayed promising power. Backing up Normane will be sophomore Rich Canuso, another promising power hitter who will continue his development in 2002.

The second base position is locked up by senior Matt Wolski, a four-year starter and second team All-BIG EAST pick in 2001. Wolski will once again hit second for the Scarlet Knights after posting a .346 average with a career high three home runs in 2001.

At shortstop, Tim Sweeney returns after a strong first season in 2001. Sweeney started slowly, but raised his average to .241 by season's end, played outstanding defense and displayed spurts of impressive power. Sweeney and Wolski will be backed up by sophomore Graig Badger, as well as freshmen Jason Grover and Cory Rodriguez. All three could also see time at DH.

At third base, senior Ryan Lillis returns after his first year as a starter. Lillis batted .282 last season, but more importantly, he emerged as one of the league's top defensive infielders. Lillis made just six errors at third base last season and showed outstanding range and a strong throwing arm. He will be supported by sophomore Vinny Esposito, who returns to the Scarlet Knights after missing all of last season. As a freshman in 2000, Esposito batted .267 in 14 games.

"Having the entire infield back is a nice luxury," said Hill. "All four worked hard in the off-season to make themselves into better players, so I think we can expect even more from them this season. They will play good defense and be a big part of our offense as well."

OUTFIELD

The Scarlet Knight outfield will take on a different look for the second straight year. Last season, Rutgers replaced two outfielders who left school early for the professional ranks, while this year, Hill must fill two voids once again. Leadoff hitter and center fielder Brian Ciemniecki graduated, while All-American Billy McCarthy was taken in the sixth round by the Atlanta Braves after batting a team-high and BIG EAST-leading .421 last season.

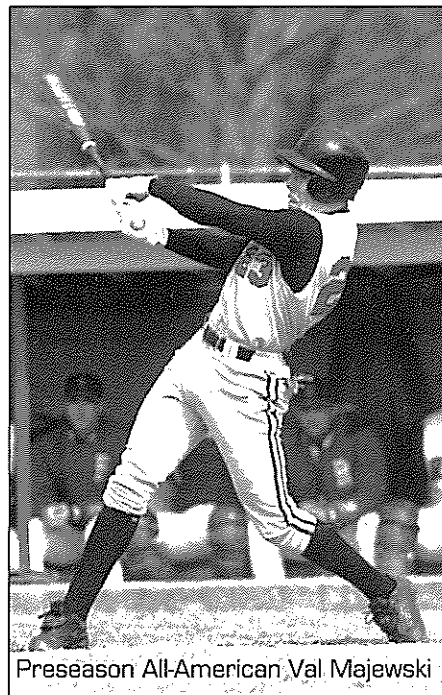
The lone holdover is junior Val Majewski, one of the nation's top offensive players. Majewski, a Preseason All-American, batted .378 last season while setting a single-season school record with 24 doubles, in addition to a team-high eight home runs and 54 RBI. Majewski, who played left field last season, will likely start in right field this year.

The left field position will likely fall to freshman Jeff Frazier, the 2001 New Jersey Player of the Year from Toms River South. Frazier hit .506 as a senior in 2001 and showed outstanding skills in the fall. He will battle with junior Leon Shade, who suffered through a disappointing 2001 season but hit .343 in 2000, as well as sophomore Nick Cerulo, who saw significant action as a defensive replacement last season.

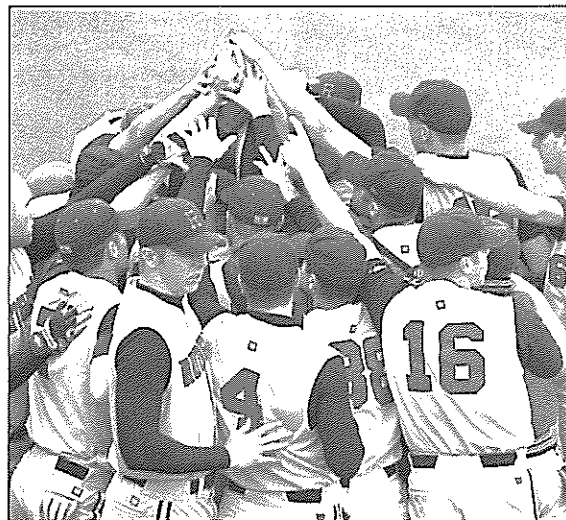
In center field, Hill will look towards sophomore Jamell Rosario, as well as Cerulo. Rosario is a five-tool prospect who batted .143 last season in limited time. He was an All-State player at St. Augustine's Prep in Vineland and should be much-improved this season.

"There will be some new people in the outfield this year, but there is also a lot of potential and talent," said Hill. "We are counting on Majewski to have another big year and we hope to see some strong

production from our other outfielders as well. Frazier looked sharp in the fall and has worked hard since the beginning of the year, while Rosario, Shade and Cerulo have all shown that they can do the job, too. Also, any one of them will compete for time as the DH spot."



Preseason All-American Val Majewski

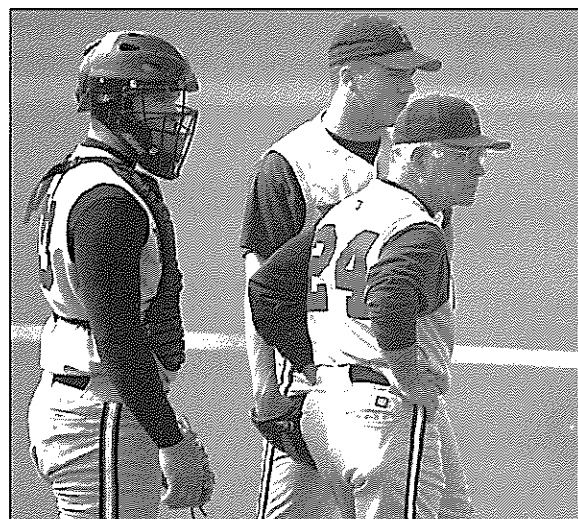


THE SCHEDULE

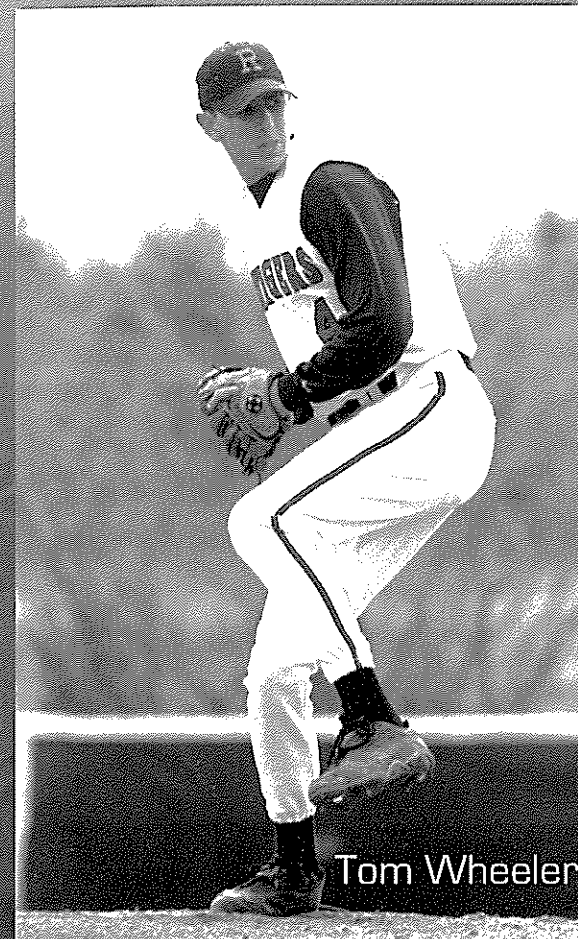
Rutgers, as always, will play a very aggressive schedule that includes 17 games against teams that competed in last year's NCAA Tournament. The Scarlet Knights will open with three games at William & Mary (Feb. 22-24) and then head to Old Dominion (March 1-3) for three more the following weekend. On March 8, RU will travel to New Orleans to face Tulane, which advanced to the College World Series last year, in a three-game series. Then, it is on to Miami (March 15-17), where Rutgers will face the defending National Champion Hurricanes, as well as Florida International, Florida Atlantic and Kansas State. The series at Mark Light Stadium should be a good one, as RU took two of three from Miami last season. From there, Rutgers will begin its traditional northern and BIG EAST schedule with a three-game series at Boston College on March 23-24.

"We are going to play some very good teams to start out season," said Hill. "As always, our goals remain the same - we want to compete early on and then put ourselves in a position to win the BIG EAST Regular Season Championship. From there, we want to win the tournament and earn a spot in the NCAA Tournament."

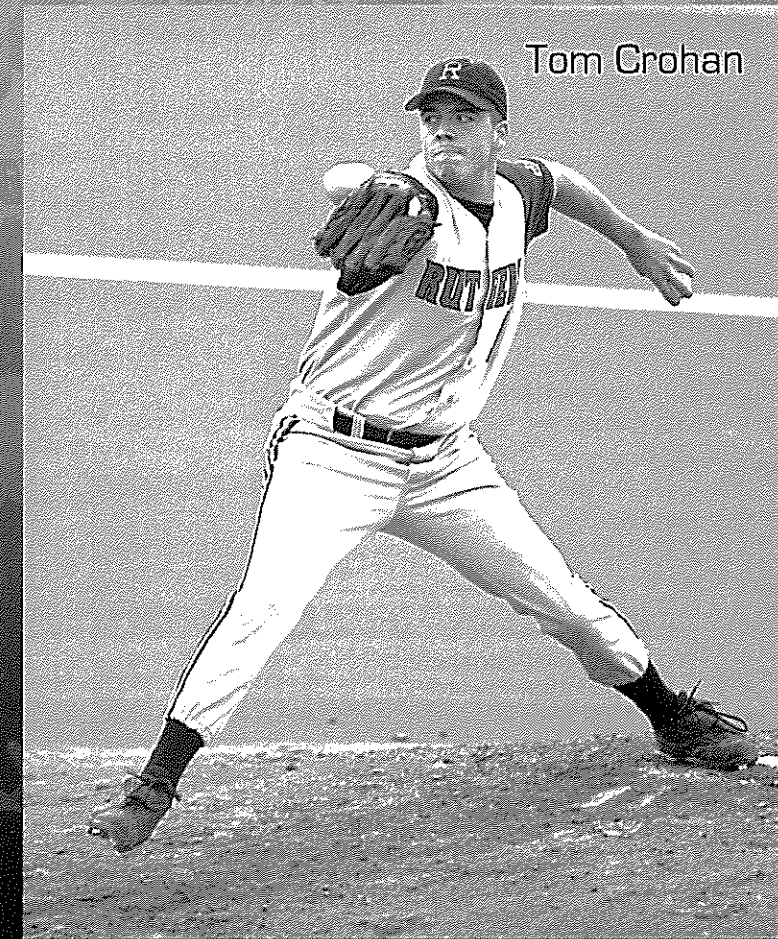

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2001 SEASON REVIEW

With the bar raised following a 40-18 record, BIG EAST Championship and No. 1 seed in the NCAA Regional at Upper Montclair, NJ, in 2000, the 2001 Rutgers University baseball team faced a daunting task, especially after losing six starters from the year before. With several inexperienced players filling in at key positions and an entirely new lineup intact, pundits were concerned about RU's fortunes heading into the season. Would they hit enough? Could they overcome the losses from last year's team? Would Bobby Brownlie and the rest of the pitching staff wilt under the pressure? All of those questions were answered quickly, as Rutgers roared out of the gates, winning its first six games, taking one from No. 1 Georgia Tech and then claiming two of three games from No. 3 Miami at Mark Light Stadium in Coral Gables.

This team was special, because it was different. In the past few years, the Rutgers University baseball team hung its hat on the skills of one or two outstanding performers. Last season, however, it derived its magic from the entire team, as each player factored at one point or another. Each game was fresh and exciting and, most importantly, someone always rose to the occasion.

A second-place finish in the BIG EAST, a program-best 42 wins and trip to the Regional Championship in Nebraska only begin to tell the story of the 2001 team. This team was built with grit and hard work and, reflecting the attitudes of its coaching staff, used a no-frills approach to take the program one step closer to Omaha.

The Rutgers University baseball team opened its season with seven wins in its first nine games, including three-game sweeps of Old Dominion and North Carolina State and a thrilling, 10-9 victory over No. 1 Georgia Tech. With six new faces in the starting lineup, Rutgers excelled with strong pitching and timely hitting.

Rutgers opened its season with a three-game sweep of Old Dominion on February 16-18. RU took the opener, 5-3, after trailing 3-0 in the first inning. Rutgers fought back again on Saturday to take a 6-2 decision and the Scarlet Knights completed the sweep on Sunday with a 5-3 victory on a two-run home run by Billy McCarthy.

The team then improved to 6-0 as they completed a three-game sweep of North Carolina State University (4-2, 8-2, 8-7). The series began with a familiar start as Rutgers was once again forced to come from behind for the fourth straight game. The Scarlet Knights rallied for three runs in the fifth as they

used a single by Wolski, an infield hit by Todd Speedy and a hit batter to claim a 3-1 lead. McCarthy singled home sophomore Tim Sweeney to take a 4-1 lead in the sixth.

Brownlie didn't need much support as he fired a complete-game five-hitter with nine strikeouts to earn his first win of the season. Brownlie (1-0) threw 115 pitches in the complete-game effort.

Game two saw RU with dominant pitching for the fifth straight game as Crohan and Gallagher, along with senior Jimmy Wilson, limited North

Carolina State to just four hits. The Scarlet Knights pounded out a season high 14 hits led by McCarthy, who collected three hits and three RBI to lead Rutgers to an 8-2 win. Rutgers broke a 2-2 tie with four runs in the seventh, while Gallagher and Wilson fired four shutout innings of relief to seal the win.

Game three saw a see-saw battle all the way to the ninth when junior Mike Popowski drove a single through a drawn-in infield to break a 7-7 tie and lift Rutgers to an 8-7 win and a sweep of the three-game series.

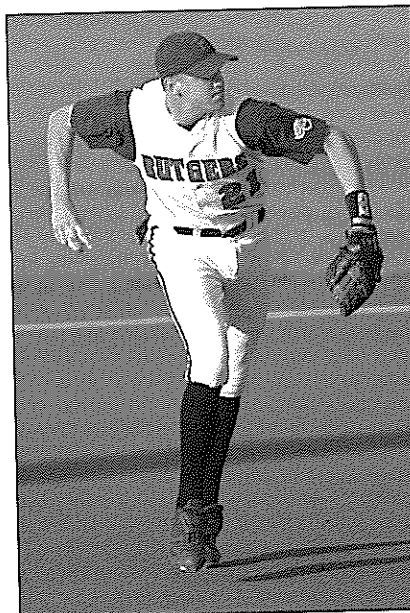
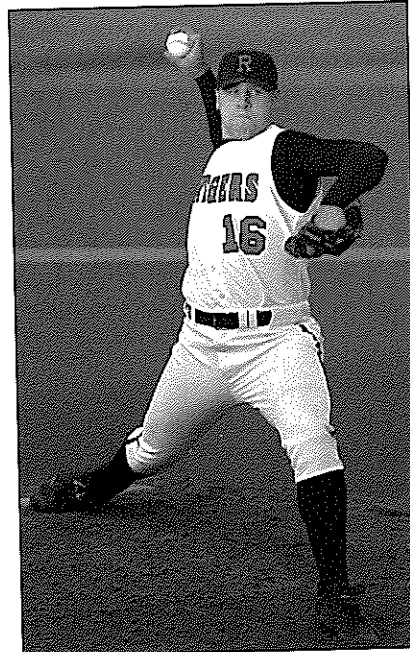
Rutgers claimed its first victory over a #1 ranked opponent since March 17, 1987, as it took the second game of a three game series with #1 Georgia Tech, 10-9. The Scarlet Knights dropped a heartbreaker in game one, 2-1 in 10 innings, and lost the final game on Sunday 13-1.

Game two was led by nine-hole hitter Tim Sweeney who hit a two-run home run in the second and a three-run triple in the third to lead Rutgers to a 10-9 win over top-ranked Georgia Tech. Sweeney's two-out, bases-clearing triple highlighted a five-

run third for Rutgers, as the Scarlet Knights built an 8-3, third inning lead before holding on behind 4.1 innings of one-run relief from Gallagher.

On the heels of its best-ever start, the Scarlet Knights promptly walked into Mark Light Stadium for a three-game series with No. 3 Miami and won two of three games, becoming the first team since Florida State in 1998 to accomplish such a feat.

An extra-inning win on Friday night, thanks to an RBI double from

Alberto Vasquez and a victory on Sunday pushed RU's record to 9-3 and closed its toughest stretch of action.

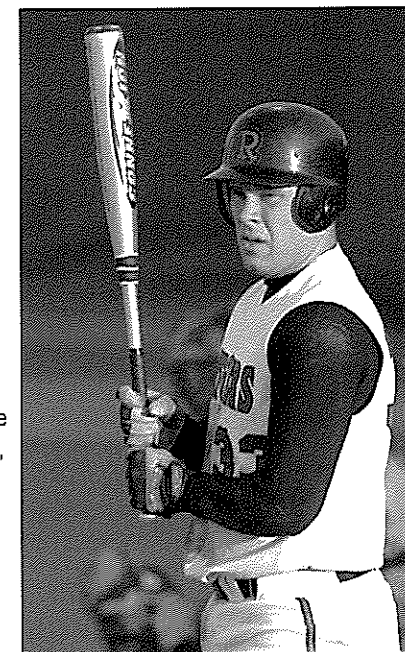
The following night, Rutgers traveled up to Boca Raton, FL to face Illinois State and came away with a 10-1 win. Tom Wheeler scattered eight hits over eight innings and Rutgers scored five runs in the third and seventh to capture the win. Senior Jeff Marciniak delivered a three-run double to cap the third inning scoring as Wheeler cruised to his first win of the season.

The next night, RU traveled back to Boca Raton for a matchup with Florida Atlantic. The Scarlet Knights suffered a heart-breaking loss, as Florida Atlantic rallied for two runs in the bottom of the ninth to steal a 5-4 win. The next evening, Rutgers returned to action in Miami, this time facing Florida International at its new field. In the final game of its annual Florida trip, RU dropped a 3-0 contest to #28 Florida International. FIU scored all of its runs in the second inning against RU starter Jason Bergmann, who was making his first start of the season.

The team packed its bags in Miami, owning a 10-5 mark, and headed to Morgantown, WV for the start of BIG EAST play - a three-game series with the Mountaineers. Despite arriving in Morgantown on Thursday afternoon, rain and cold conditions forced back-to-back cancellations, delaying the games for two days.

The two teams finally got on the field on Sunday, for a single game beginning at 3:00 p.m. A controversial lineup card caught the attention in the early part of the game, but in the final inning, Marciniak punched a two-out single to right with two outs in the ninth to drive in two runs and lead Rutgers to a 7-6 victory over West Virginia in the BIG EAST opener for both schools. Trailing 6-5 in the ninth, McCarthy began the rally with a one-out walk and moved to third on a single by Popowski. After

a strikeout produced the inning's second out, Marciniak stung a 1-1 pitch into right field, scoring McCarthy and freshman Graig Badger, who entered as a pinch runner. In the bottom of the inning, WVU put the tying run on second, but Brown closed the game with two groundouts



to earn his third save.

Brownlie started the game on the mound for Rutgers, throwing one strike, but was "removed" from the game when WVU head coach Greg Van Zant argued that Brownlie was not listed on the original lineup card. Gallagher (listed) began to warm up, but he was not allowed to pitch either, forcing RU head coach Fred Hill to take Crohan off the bench and place him in the game. The pitching switches delayed the game 22 minutes in the bottom of the first inning.

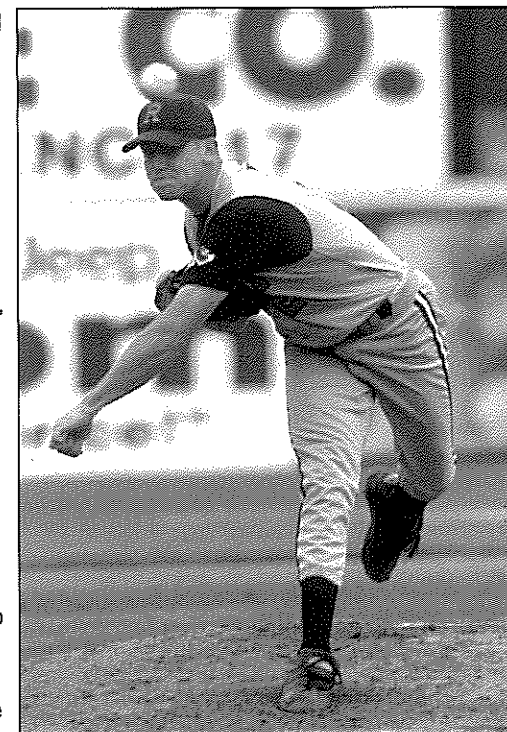
The next day, RU and WVU played a doubleheader and thanks to the lineup situation, the Scarlet Knights had Brownlie and Gallagher ready to work in back-to-back games. The duo produced outstanding results, as RU won the first game, 2-0 and took the second, 2-1. The first game also produced a remarkable milestone, as head coach Fred Hill won his 700th career game.

After 22 games on the road, RU finally returned home on Friday, March 23, for a doubleheader with in-state and BIG EAST-rival Seton Hall. After losing the opener, 8-5, a three-run home run from McCarthy and a strong pitching performance from Wheeler lifted Rutgers to a 7-3, game two win. Seton Hall jumped out to a 2-0 lead after two, but Rutgers slowly chipped away before McCarthy's blast in the fifth.

Two days later, Rutgers traveled to Norwich, CT, the site of its 1998 BIG EAST Championship, to face Connecticut in another BIG EAST doubleheader. Once again, RU split, losing the first game, 3-1, before winning the second, 7-4. In the opener, Brownlie was

drilled in the hand with a line drive that ultimately fractured his right thumb and forced him from the game. Gallagher picked up the slack in the second game, however, to secure the split.

Mid-week wins over St. Francis (9-2), Princeton (3-1) and St. Peter's (6-0) pushed RU's record to 18-7 heading into a three-game series at Georgetown. The games, which



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were played at Shirley Povich Field in Bethesda, MD, resulted in three wins which moved the Scarlet Knights to 21-7 overall and 8-2 in the BIG EAST, good for first place.

Back to midweek action, RU knocked off Rider (11-1) and Monmouth behind the hitting of McCarthy and strong pitching from Bergmann and David Santiago. A 15-3 win over Fairleigh Dickinson on April 5 extended RU's winning streak to season-high 10 games heading into a weekend showdown with No. 6 Notre Dame in Piscataway.

The Irish took all three games in the series, overtaking RU for first place in the league standings. The losses dropped RU to 8-5 in the conference and all the way to third place, tightening the race for the top four spots in the conference. RU got back on track with a 3-0 win over Rider, thanks to a brilliant, complete-game effort from David Santiago, and readied for a pair of doubleheaders with Villanova and Virginia Tech.

Gallagher and Wheeler tossed complete-games and the Rutgers offense, led by Majewski and McCarthy posted 23 runs and 26 hits to key a doubleheader sweep of Villanova. RU won the first game, 9-1, and took the second, 14-0, as Majewski was a combined 4-for-7 with three doubles and nine RBI, while McCarthy was 4-for-8 with a double, triple and six RBI.

The next day, RU opened with an 11-3 win over Virginia Tech, as Crohan pitched a complete game for his fourth win of the season and Popowski drilled two home runs with five RBI. The second game, however, resulted in a 14-7 win for the Hokies.

On Saturday, April 14, playing its fifth game in three days, sophomore Sean Atchison scattered seven hits and allowed just one run over seven innings to lead RU to a 10-1 win over Wagner College and, after a three-day break, Rutgers came out firing and captured its 30th win of the season with a 20-2 victory over Columbia. The Scarlet Knights scored eight runs in the first, highlighted by a three-run home run from McCarthy, and received four shutout innings from Wilson, who earned the win.

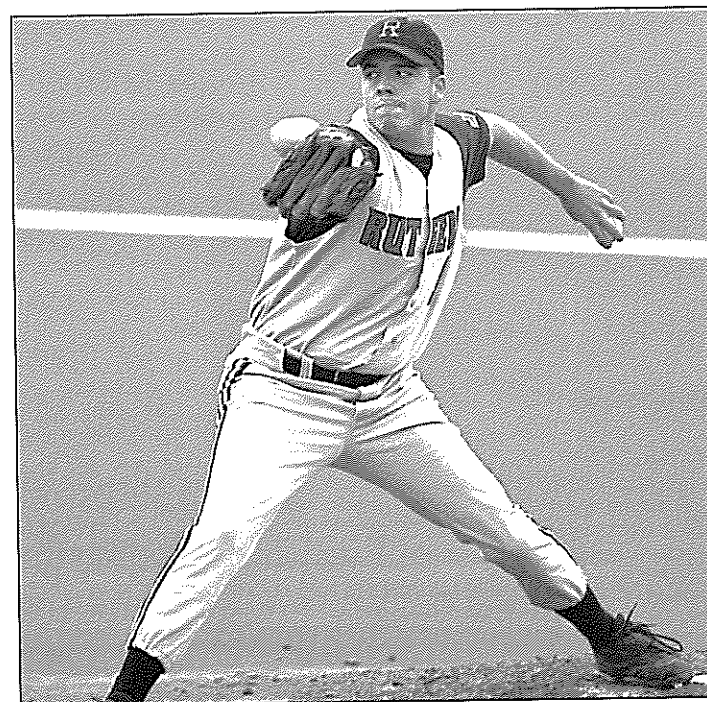
The Columbia win led to an important BIG EAST series with Boston College on April 21-22. Making his first start in nearly a month (since being injured on March 25), Brownlie showed little

rust, firing a complete-game four hitter to lead Rutgers to a 5-2 opening game win over Boston College. In the second game, however, BC's Chris Gannon limited Rutgers to just eight hits and two runs in a 4-2 Boston College win. After the split on Saturday, RU needed a big win on Sunday. The Scarlet Knights turned to Crohan, who allowed just two runs in 5.2 innings while Wheeler shut the door with 3.1 shutout innings of relief in a 4-2 victory. Rutgers did all of its scoring in the fifth, plating four runs with two outs, highlighted by a two-run home run from Majewski, to seal the win. The win pushed RU's record to 32-12 overall and 13-7 in BIG EAST play.

Rutgers returned to midweek action on Tuesday, April 24 and welcomed Iona to Piscataway for a single-game. Rutgers built a 9-0 lead in the third inning, allowed Iona to take an 11-9 lead, and ultimately rallied for three runs in the seventh without a hit to secure a 12-11 win. Ciemniecki hit an inside-the-park, three-run home run in the third to give the Scarlet Knights a 9-0 lead, while the Gaels fought back with 11 unanswered runs before Popowski's two-run sacrifice fly in the seventh gave RU the win.

The win over Iona caused some anxious moments, but provided a solid test heading into a big, three-game road series at Pittsburgh on April 28-29. In the opener, Brownlie fired a complete-game, two-hit shutout with a career-high 10 strikeouts and Speedy delivered a key, two-run single to lead the Scarlet Knights to a 4-0, game one win. In the second game, Pittsburgh reached Gallagher for three, first-inning runs en route to an 8-0 win.

Once again needing a big Sunday performance, Rutgers turned to Wheeler, who pitched seven shutout innings, allowing just five hits, and Steve Normane, who drove in two runs with a walk and home run in his first BIG EAST start to fuel a 6-0 win. In the game, Wheeler extended his shutout string to 19.1

innings, while RU improved to 15-8 in the conference and moved into sole possession of second place.

A mid-week win over a tough, Delaware team was enhanced by another great pitching effort from Crohan, who allowed just two unearned runs in six innings of work. McCarthy broke the game open with a two-out two run double in the third and Brown pitched 2.1 shutout innings for another save. RU then followed with an 11-8 win over Lafayette in its non-league finale.

In that game, Popowski drilled a two-run home run in the first inning and finished the game with four RBI, while Santiago improved to 5-0 with six strong innings of work. The win improved RU's record to 37-13, meaning the team would need a three-game sweep of St. John's to finish the regular season with 40 wins.

In the opener vs. St. John's (a team fighting desperately for a playoff spot), Brownlie was again magnificent in a 2-1 Rutgers win. He fired a complete-game five-hitter and used two quick runs in the first to secure the win, which clinched Rutgers a spot in the four-team BIG EAST Championship. The game was not without its drama, as Brownlie took a shutout into the fourth, until Charlie Bilezikjian led off with a single and Chris Fallon doubled to put runners at second and third with no outs. Brownlie batted back and struck out Eric Potts before allowing a sacrifice

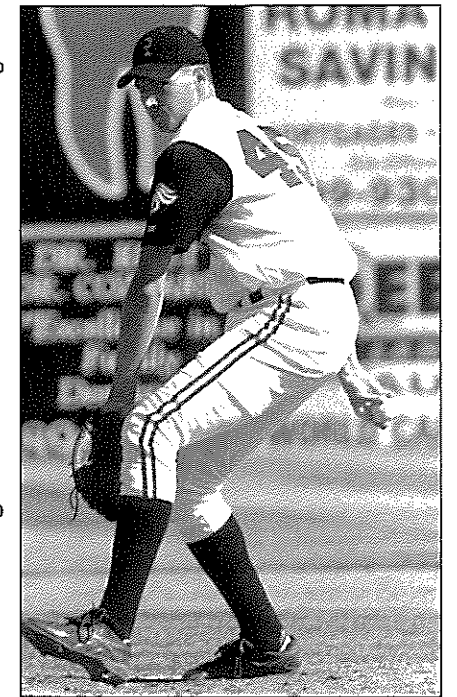
fly to Jason Kane, which narrowed the gap to 2-1. He then struck out JP Cirigliano to end the inning. After a perfect fifth, Brownlie ran into more trouble in the sixth. A pair of infield errors with one out put runners at first and third, but Brownlie worked out with an infield lineout and a grounder. In the seventh, SJU put two more runners on base, using a single and hit batter to stage a late threat. Brownlie ended the game by striking out Mike Rozema.

The second game was an 18-9 win, as Wolski was 4-for-6 with a career-high seven RBI in the contest. He had a two-out, two-run single in the second, a two-out three-run home run in the third (which gave RU the lead) and a two-run single in the seventh to lead an 18-hit attack. That win clinched second-place for the Scarlet Knights, the sixth-straight season that RU has finished second or better in the BIG EAST standings.

McCarthy saved two runs with a diving catch in the sixth inning and drove in the winning run with a double to center in the bottom of the ninth to lift Rutgers to a 6-5, comeback win over St. John's in the regular season finale for both schools. Rutgers was behind 5-4 in the eighth, but tied the game on a two-out, RBI double by Sweeney, while Wilson earned the win on Senior Day, pitching 3.1 innings of one-hit, shutout relief. With the win, RU finished the regular season with a 40-13 record, the first time it has ever won 40 games in the regular season.

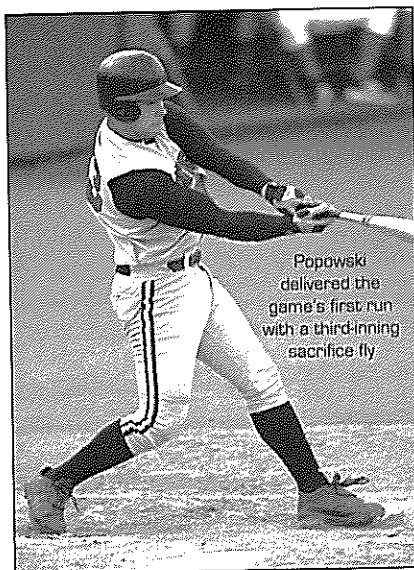
As the No. 2 seed in the BIG EAST Tournament, Rutgers seemed primed to make a run at its second-straight BIG EAST Championship. In the opening round, Rutgers was set to face in-state rival Seton Hall, with Brownlie fully healthy and ready to go. In front of a BIG EAST-record crowd of 2,010, Rutgers struggled against BJ Benik, who took a shutout into the ninth inning before a two-run shot from Popowski ended his bid. Seton Hall reached Brownlie for four runs (three earned) and a 4-2 win, which sent the Scarlet Knights sprawling into the losers' bracket after just one game for the first time since 1997.

A little more bad luck the following day greeted the Scarlet Knights. Set to face top-seeded Notre Dame, the Scarlet Knights were faced with the task of solving All-American Aaron Heilman and his 13-0 mark. The Irish's slick decision to hold Heilman out of the opener backfired in a 4-3, Virginia Tech win, so Rutgers faced Heilman on the brink of elimination. With a steady mist falling, Rutgers' offense remained silent, as Heilman dealt a 6-2 loss, thus eliminating RU in two-straight games.



2001 NCAA TOURNAMENT AT LINCOLN, NE

A quiet weekend was not what Rutgers expected, but a renewed energy filled the team on Monday, May 21, the date of the NCAA Selection show. A 40-win regular season, six wins over ranked teams and an 18-8 conference mark were impressive credentials, but were they impressive enough to get the Scarlet Knights into the tournament? That question was answered about 15 minutes into the show, as Rutgers' name flashed on the TV screen as the second-seed in the NCAA Regional in Lincoln, Nebraska. Rutgers, as the No. 2 seed, would face No. 3 BYU in the opening round game. A long, arduous trek to the Midwest did little to distract Rutgers, which looked crisp in a pre-tournament workout and focused in pre-game drills.

With Brownlie matched up against BYU ace Nate Fernley (16-3), everyone in the crowd of 1,595 expected a pitching duel, which is exactly what they received.

After squandering a ninth-inning lead, Rutgers scored a run of its own in the bottom of the ninth to defeat BYU, 4-3. RU took a 3-2 lead into the ninth, but BYU tied the game with a two-out single, only to see RU reclaim the lead in the bottom of the inning.

Nursing a 3-2 lead

in the ninth, Brownlie allowed a one-out single to Michael Wirrick, who was replaced at first by pinch-runner Cameron Coughlan. Coughlan then stole second and moved over to third on a groundout, putting the tying run 90 feet away with two outs and BYU's ninth-place hitter due up. After evening the count at 1-1, Brownlie threw a curveball high in the zone, which Tyler Perry slapped into right field to tie the game at 3-3.

In the bottom of the inning, RU rallied as Matt Wolski reached on a one-out walk, his second of the game, and moved over to third on a key double to left by Majewski. BYU head coach Vance Law then elected to walk McCarthy intentionally, loading the bases with one out for Popowski. Popowski hit a grounder towards short, which was mishandled by Seth King, allowing Wolski to score and end the game.

After stranding three runners in the second, RU took a 2-0 lead in the third. Wolski was hit by a pitch to start the inning and, after a flyout by Majewski, advanced to second on a balk. McCarthy then singled to left, which moved Wolski over to third with one out. Popowski delivered a sacrifice fly to center, scoring Wolski and Speedy came through with a single to

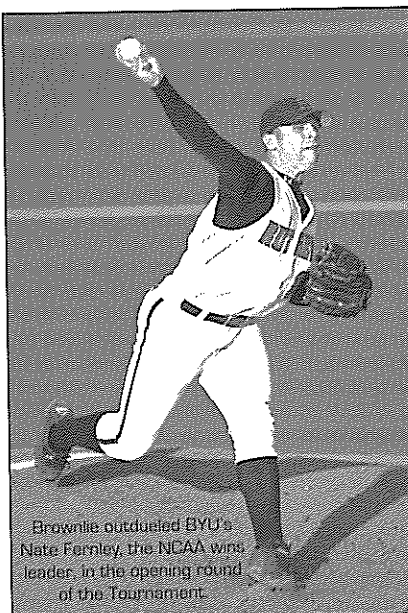
center, scoring McCarthy.

Brownlie, who cruised through the six innings, lost his shutout in the seventh, when BYU tied the game at 2-2 on a home run by Jeff Hiestand and an RBI single from Lars Birkeland. Rutgers, however, reclaimed the lead in the bottom of the seventh. Cierniecki dumped a single to center to open the frame. Wolski then dropped down a sacrifice bunt, which Warrick threw into right field, moving Cierniecki to third and Wolski to second. Majewski then drilled a sac fly to deep left, scoring Cierniecki for a 3-2 lead.

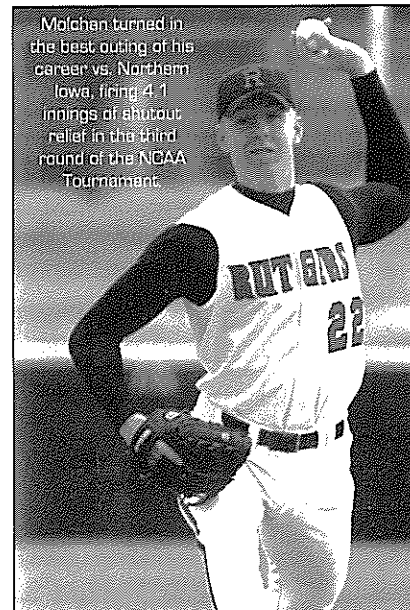
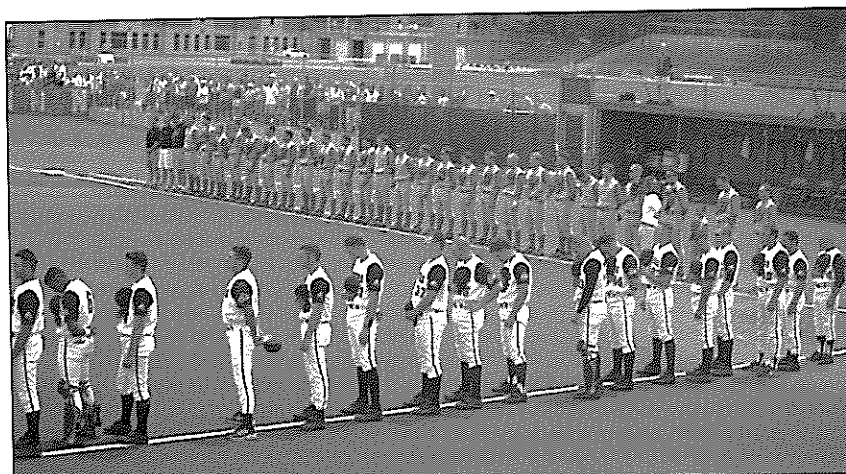
The win propelled Rutgers into a winners' bracket matchup with top-seeded Nebraska on its home turf, in front of over 4,800 screaming fans. The energy in the stadium had little effect on Rutgers, which scored three runs in the first and quieted the crowd very quickly.

Rutgers jumped on Nebraska starter Jamie Rodrigue in the top of the first, scoring three runs and chasing him from the game after just seven hitters. Cierniecki dumped a hustling double into center field to start the inning and, after advancing to third on a flyout by Wolski, scored on an RBI single from Majewski. With Majewski on first, McCarthy crunched a double to the fence in right-center, scoring Majewski. Back-to-back walks to Popowski and Marciniak loaded the bases for Lillis, who laced a single to center, scoring McCarthy and sending Rodrigue to the showers. R.D. Spiehs entered the game and induced an inning-ending 4-6-3 double play to escape further damage.

In the bottom of the inning, Nebraska leadoff hitter John Cole homered down the line in right off Crohan, his 8th of the

Molchan turned in the best outing of his career vs. Northern Iowa, firing 4.1 innings of shutout relief in the third round of the NCAA Tournament.

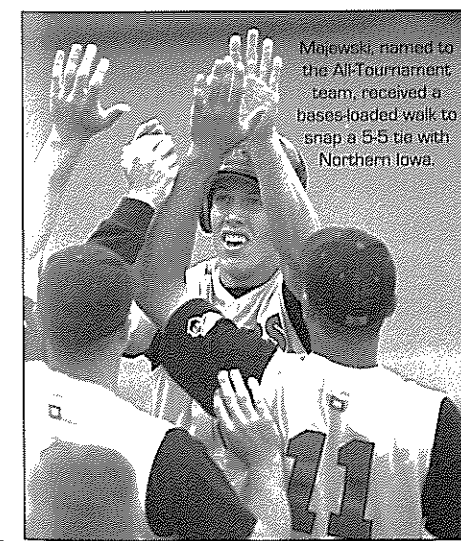
outs, as McCarthy walked, stole second and scored on a single by Popowski. UN reliever Thom Ott then closed out the game with a groundball to the mound, recording his 11th save and handing Rutgers a disappointing loss.

Just 50 minutes later, Rutgers was back on the field, facing Northern Iowa (which defeated BYU 10-1 earlier in the day) in an elimination game. In that game, Molchan pitched 4.1 innings of shutout relief and Majewski received a bases-loaded walk in the eighth to snap a 5-5 tie and lift Rutgers to a 6-5 win, thus eliminating the Panthers and setting up a rematch with Nebraska in the regional championship.

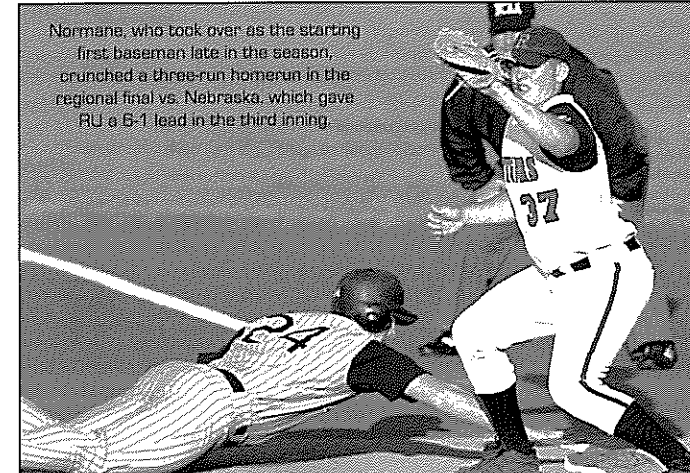
Nebraska, undefeated in tournament play, needed to dispose of Rutgers just once to advance, while the Scarlet Knights needed back-to-back wins against the nation's third-ranked team, in front of its home crowd. With 4,600 screaming, red-clad fans in attendance, Rutgers jumped out of the gates on the Huskers once again, scoring three runs in the first on a two-run single by Popowski and a two-out single from Lillis. Leading 3-1

in the third, the Scarlet Knights increased its lead to 6-1 on a three-run home run to right from Normane, his third of the season.

Nebraska added another run in the fifth against Gallagher, who started despite pitching 1.2 innings the previous day, to close the gap to 6-2, but McCarthy homered in the bottom of the frame to increase

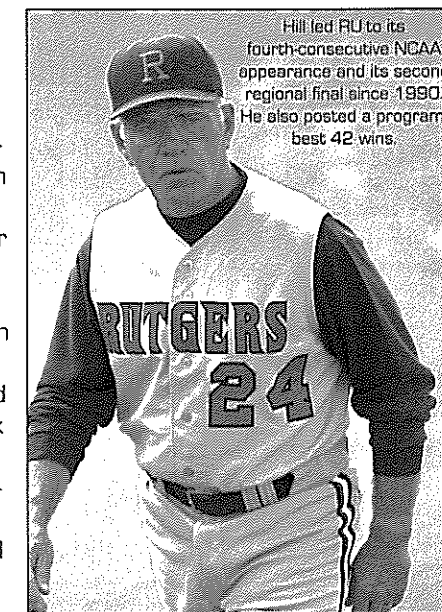
the lead to 7-2. In the top of the sixth, Nebraska rallied back with two more runs before an explosion over the final three frames ended the Scarlet Knights' season.

With one more run in the sixth on a Wolski RBI single and two more in the seventh, RU held a 10-7 lead heading into the eighth. Nebraska tacked on a run in the eighth to close the gap to 10-8 and, after holding Rutgers scoreless in the bottom of the inning, scored six

more in the ninth in crushing fashion. Within a strike of forcing a winner-take-all game, Rutgers fell, 14-10, to Nebraska, which celebrated their two, nail-biting victories over the Scarlet Knights. Molchan, the hero in RU's win over Northern Iowa, ran out of gas and endured some bad luck in the ninth to pick up the loss. It was a devastating, and disappointing, end to a season which was marked by spirited play from start to finish.

Adrian Fiala, the color commentator for Nebraska's radio station may have said it best: "Northeast baseball is not that highly regarded but when you talk about that, you better leave Rutgers out of the conversation. These guys are as tough as anyone Nebraska has played this year. These guys are big-time college baseball players."

That comment said it all. For 59 games, Rutgers battled the best in the nation. They played 11 games against teams ranked No. 1 nationally at one point in the season and backed down from no one. Right to the end, to the last pitch, Rutgers continued its ascent into the national scene and, despite the heartbreaking loss in Nebraska, moved one step closer to the prize.



Hill led RU to its fourth consecutive NCAA appearance and its second regional final since 1990. He also posted a program-best 42 wins.

FRANCIS L. LAWRENCE

University President

Dr. Francis L. Lawrence, the eighteenth president of Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, came to Rutgers in the fall of 1990 from Tulane University, where he was the chief academic officer. At Tulane he had also held the positions of Acting Dean of Newcomb College, Deputy Provost, and Dean of the Graduate School. At Rutgers, President Lawrence has led the university in returning to its roots as a student-centered research university with increased access and support for women and minorities. At the same

time, he has led the university in a major thrust to achieve the highest levels of academic excellence in scholarship and instruction.

Over the past decade, the number of first-year undergraduate applications to Rutgers has increased by 31% to 29,000. Reflecting the diversity of New Jersey, first-year minority enrollment grew by 41% in the ten years ending with fall 2000 and minority graduates comprised 33% of the total baccalaureates awarded in 2000. U.S. News and World Report ranks the Newark campus as the most diverse in its national university category and has done so for each of the first four years for which it provided such a ranking. Rutgers' excellence is attracting more students of the highest quality; for example, average composite SAT scores among first-year students this year are 17 points higher than in 1996.

Rutgers' outstanding faculty continue to garner recognition as among the very best in the nation. Among its peers in the Association of American Universities (AAU), Rutgers ranks 11th in total faculty memberships in the National Academy of Sciences, the National Academy of Engineering, the Institute of Medicine, and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. In recent years our faculty have earned MacArthur awards, Pulitzer prizes, Guggenheim Fellowships, and National Medals of Science, among other prestigious national and international awards.

Rutgers researchers are at the forefront of discoveries that are revolutionizing computing and telecommunications, advancing rehabilitative and prosthetic technologies, leading to new understanding of brain function and new treatments for neurological disorders, and offering critical tools for unlocking the secrets of biological systems in pharmaceutical and medical research. At the same time, research and program initiatives in the arts and sciences and in education are thriving. Rutgers faculty are making significant discoveries about early hominid origins and behavior, mounting innovative programs that advance public discourse on matters of race, ethnicity and culture, and fostering research, teaching, and outreach to reform the teaching and learning of mathematics in the nation's schools.

The university is increasingly active in technology transfer and has had great success in transferring the outcomes of research to industry. Over the past ten years, Rutgers increased its annual number of U.S. patent applications sixfold, from 20 in 1991 to 119 in 2000. In 1999, among public AAU institutions, Rutgers was 6th in licenses and options yielding income, 11th in U.S. patents issued, 4th in U.S. patents issued among public institutions without medical schools, and in 1998 and 1999 combined, was 3rd in start-up companies formed.

Rutgers' finances are also prospering. Sponsored research has grown in the past decade from \$94.6 million in 1991 to \$185.8 million in 2000. Growth in the university's budget from \$735.1 million in 1991 to \$1.3 billion in 2000 is partially attributable to major growth in the percentage of total revenues garnered from increased federal grants and contracts. The rise in federal funding reflects the ever-increasing competitiveness of Rutgers' faculty.

Private sources of funding are also increasing rapidly. Private giving has risen from \$27.6 million in 1991 to \$86.1 million in 2000. Last year's total represented a 42% increase over the previous year's total. The university's endowment has grown from \$125.6 million in 1991 to \$384.3 million in 2000. Generous private gifts have helped to position Rutgers as a major resource in some of the most important academic research and policy areas in the nation.

Corporate and foundation support has also been significant. Notable recent examples include \$1.8 million from the Ford Foundation in FY2000 for a wide variety of projects, including the Institute for Women's Leadership; and \$1 million from the Carnegie Corporation for the Center for Early Education Research at the Graduate School of Education and the Center for Global Change and Governance.

Much of Rutgers' recent success can be attributed to its ambitious, comprehensive strategic plan, A New Vision for Excellence, a product of the President's work with faculty leaders. The plan, adopted in 1995, charts a course to bring Rutgers into the very top ranks of North America's major public research universities by 2010. The themes of the plan include excellence in learning, research, and service; the importance of diversity, access, and affordability; responsiveness to emerging community, state, and societal demands; the need for interdisciplinary approaches, international perspectives, and inter-campus collaboration; the essential nature of partnerships with government, business, and the schools to accomplish our strategic goals; and the integral part that information technology will play in academic endeavors. In order to stimulate planning in the top priority areas of the strategic plan, Rutgers reallocated funds from administrative savings to academic purposes, generating a \$4 million annual revolving fund to be awarded competitively to innovative, multidisciplinary projects that have the potential for attracting partnerships in industry, government, and philanthropy. In this way Rutgers ensures that small investments are parlayed into major projects that address cutting edge scientific research and policy issues. In its first five years, the program leveraged \$20 million to generate \$275 million in external support for more than 125 new research and academic projects. A complementary program, Reinvest in Rutgers, funded in part by modest improvements in state support, is injecting much-needed funding into our core academic enterprise. This program has provided \$30.2 million to support new faculty hiring, enhance student honors programs, increase student scholarships and fellowships, and expand key libraries and electronic communications.

Among the most important offshoots of the strategic plan are the new academic programs that bring the results of our faculty's scholarship into the classroom to enrich the education of Rutgers students, preparing a new generation to conquer the challenges of tomorrow. Twenty-five new degree programs have been approved at the undergraduate and graduate levels, including biomedical engineering, genetics and microbiology, cell biology and neuroscience, information technology and informatics, public health, and visual arts. We can also point to 40 new centers and institutes to address critically important interdisciplinary scientific research and policy issues. Rutgers has gained worldwide recognition in fields such as biomedical engineering, information technology and informatics, cell biology, neuroscience, and genetics.

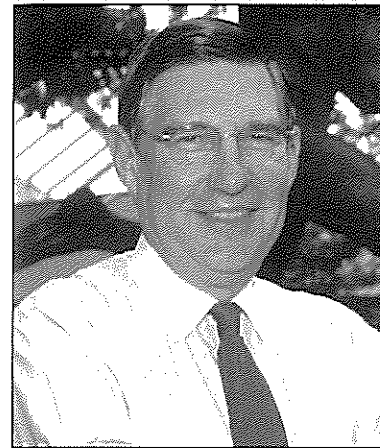
The strategic planning process also articulated the need for an advanced information technology infrastructure. To enhance communications on our campuses, Rutgers has launched RUNet 2000, a \$100 million, multi-year project to establish a comprehensive network for data, video, and voice communications. To enhance communications externally, Rutgers is a charter member of Internet2. In addition, our ambitious statewide networking project, Rutgers Regional Network, made possible through the grant of two strands of fiber optic cable by the Regional Consortium for Electronic Toll Collection and the State of New Jersey, will complement the broader emerging statewide network, NJEDGE.Net, which Rutgers has also helped to design and launch.

Rutgers formally celebrates the launch of the public phase of its major fund-raising campaign, "Creating the Future Today," during fall 2001. The \$500 million campaign is designed to support the goals of the university's strategic plan and provide funds for student scholarships and financial aid. More than half that amount was raised in the silent phase of the campaign before its announcement in April, 2001.

A magnificent example of such support has come to Rutgers through the generosity and estate planning of two Rutgers alumni, the late Willard H. Sahloff (RC'30) and the late Margaret Burnett Sahloff Beldon who attended Douglass College. Together, the couple left more than \$7 million to help students pay for their Rutgers education. Other leadership gifts in FY2001 included the donation to the School of Engineering of \$3.9 million in computer software and licenses from Cadence Design Systems of San Jose, California, and software and licenses valued at \$1.2 million by Synopsis Inc. of Mountain View, California. These contributions have made a decisive difference in the educational excellence of the School of Engineering and the real-world skills of our students in computer and electrical engineering.

In New Jersey, Dr. Lawrence has chaired the New Jersey Presidents' Council and served on the Quality Education Commission, the New Jersey Commission on Higher Education, the Governor's Panel to Restructure Higher Education, the New Jersey Commission on Science and Technology, and the New Jersey-Israel Commission, among others. In 2000, he received the CURE Award for leadership in support of the effort to find a remedy for spinal cord injury.

Dr. Lawrence received his bachelor's degree from St. Louis University and earned a Ph.D. in French Classical Literature from Tulane University. An internationally known scholar, he has received an award from the French government in recognition of academic excellence. Dr. Lawrence and his wife, Mary Kay, have four children and twelve grandchildren.



ROBERT E. MULCAHY III

Director of Athletics

A successful and innovative administrator throughout his tenure in sports management and development, the common thread in the career of Robert E. Mulcahy III has been his undying commitment to excellence.

Now in his fourth year as Director of Athletics at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, Mulcahy has already made a significant impact as

administrator of one of the nation's largest intercollegiate athletic programs. He remains committed to the ideal that Rutgers athletics will provide a meaningful experience for its student-athletes, a strong support system for a representative coaching staff, and a program in which the entire University community can take great pride in.

Under his leadership, the Division is in the process of implementing a Strategic Plan to guide Rutgers to the forefront in one of the most exciting and challenging eras in college athletics. Already, the on-going divisional reorganization has enabled the administrative and support staff to operate at greater efficiency. Mulcahy has ably led Rutgers athletics during its present period of growth and transition, which has included coaching hires in four of the department's most visible programs.

In his first three years as Director of Athletics, Mulcahy has been a guiding force in significant improvements in a number of critical areas. The athletic department's endowment, which totaled \$15.8 million at the conclusion of the 2000-01 academic year, is expected to exceed \$19 million in this academic year. He has been instrumental in developing and securing outside revenue totaling \$13 million, which has resulted in enhancement of a number of facilities. Capital projects from this funding have resulted in expanded media facilities and a modern, state-of-the-art academic support laboratory in the Louis Brown Athletic Center. Other improvements to the RAC include an expanded weight training facility in addition to new office space for coaches and administrators, which have allowed the senior athletic administration to become centrally located in that facility for the first time.

Mulcahy has also placed much emphasis in the area of academic support, which has been reflected by significant gains in the classroom. The department remains committed to its goals of exceeding the grade point averages and graduation rates of the general student population. Increased academic support has included the addition of full-time personnel, computer labs and tutorial services. Programs such as the comprehensive RU Strong/LifeSkills have been bolstered to help ensure a positive and meaningful experience for the Rutgers student-athlete. The Annual Report, which chronicles the division's achievements and was produced for the first time ever following the 1998-99 academic year under Mulcahy's direction, includes the cumulative grade point averages of each varsity team.

The Division continues to be a leader in its commitment to gender equality, and has increased funding for scholarships and facility improvements in that area.

Mulcahy has also overseen the institution of a comprehensive marketing and promotion plan to further increase corporate revenue and enhance the overall image of the athletic program. Corporate sponsorship has risen each year during Mulcahy's administration, and will continue to grow as Rutgers Athletics continues its partnership with one of the nation's leading firms, Nelligan Sports Marketing.

All the while, the Rutgers athletic program continues to grow and improve on the field of play. Highlights under Mulcahy's watch have included

the outstanding performance of the women's basketball team, which advanced to the NCAA Tournament again last year after appearances in the 2000 NCAA Final Four and 1999 NCAA Elite Eight. Hopes are high for both the football program, led by new head coach Greg Schiano, and the men's basketball program, which is under the direction of first-year head coach Gary Waters.

Improvement is already evident in programs such as women's soccer, headed by second-year head coach Glenn Crooks, as well as several other Olympic sports programs. The Scarlet Knights' baseball team (the 2000 BIG EAST Conference champions) has made four consecutive appearances in the NCAA Tournament, and advanced to the championship game of their 2001 NCAA Regional before falling to eventual College World Series participant Nebraska.

Mulcahy came to Rutgers on April 15, 1998, after an extraordinary 19-year tenure as President and CEO of the New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority. Under Mulcahy's leadership, the NJSEA developed into the nation's premier sports and entertainment venue. Among his noteworthy achievements at the Meadowlands included establishing New Jersey as the home of the finest college athletic competition in the country, including the creation of the Kickoff Classic Football Game, attracting the Army-Navy game to the facility on three occasions, and hosting eight NCAA Men's Basketball Eastern Regionals and the last Final Four ever to be held in an Arena in 1996. Mulcahy led the negotiations that resulted in the NHL's Devils, the NFL's Jets, and Major League Soccer's MetroStars calling the Meadowlands their home.

Mulcahy's leadership at the NJSEA helped develop legislation which led to it overseeing the reconstruction of Rutgers Stadium and building new soccer, lacrosse and track and field facilities.

The Sports and Exposition Authority matured from primarily a horse racing and professional football business into a statewide engine for sports, entertainment and exposition development during Mulcahy's tenure. By the end of his tenure at the Meadowlands, the Sports Complex was hosting 600 events a year, drawing seven million visitors annually to such attractions as the Giants, Jets, Devils, Nets, and horse racing, as well as a wide variety of family shows and concerts.

Mulcahy's lifelong passion for scholastic and college athletics, and his undying commitment to public service, has not gone unnoticed. The New York Times described his tenure with the NJSEA as one of "quiet fervor and foresight, establishing the Meadowlands as one of the nation's leading sports and entertainment complexes." The Newark Star Ledger hailed the holding of the NCAA Final Four (an event that was co-hosted by Rutgers) in New Jersey as "the miracle of the Meadowlands."

Among his many professional affiliations, Mulcahy serves on the Board of the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame, is Chair of its Awards Committee, is an honorary member of the American Football Coaches' Association, and serves on the Boards of several business and charitable corporations.

Mulcahy, a graduate of Villanova University (AB in History, 1958), has received several awards from his alma mater, including the Medal of Excellence from the College of Arts and Sciences, the Alumni Medal, and the James "Jumbo" Elliot Achievement Award. Among other honors, his most prized awards include the Knight of St. Gregory medal, received from Pope John Paul II, and the Ellis Island Medal of Honor.

Bob and his wife Terry have relocated to Basking Ridge after 37 years in Mendham. They are the parents of seven children, including the youngest, Deidra, who is presently a junior at Rutgers. The Mulcahy's also have 10 grandchildren.

History

Rutgers began its history in 1766 as Queen's College, the eighth institution of higher education to be founded in the American colonies. It became Rutgers College in 1825, honoring Colonel Henry Rutgers, a former trustee and Revolutionary War veteran. The University of Newark merged with Rutgers in 1946 and the College of South Jersey in Camden was incorporated into Rutgers in 1950. Legislative acts in 1945 and 1956 designated all its divisions as The State University of New Jersey. Rutgers is the only university in the nation to have been a colonial college, a land-grant college and a state university.

Rutgers Today

With 29 degree-granting divisions, Rutgers is New Jersey's only comprehensive public research university and a member of the prestigious Association of American Universities (AAU), a select group of 61 public and private research institutions. Under the leadership of President Francis L. Lawrence, Rutgers has embarked on an ambitious course to reach its goal of becoming one of the nation's premier public research universities by the year 2010.

Five years ago, in an exceptionally collaborative process, some 250 members of the faculty and administration developed proposals that support growth areas identified in the university's broad-ranging strategic plan, "A New Vision for Excellence." The initiatives seek to meet the present and future needs of the state for a highly skilled work force that will require access to lifelong education;

to address needs for scientific and technological advances to stimulate the economy and provide New Jersey industries with a competitive edge; and to fulfill the service needs of the citizens of the state in an increasingly diverse democratic society.

The strategic plan, which capitalizes on the university's diverse strengths, moved forward during the 1999-2000 academic year under the stewardship of the Committee for the Future. The university has invested \$20 million over five years to support the development of more than 100 innovative, multidisciplinary programs on all three campuses. These resources have provided excellent leverage; to date more than \$174 million in external funding has been generated by these projects. Twelve implementation committees, representing business, cognitive science and neuroscience, creative arts, education, engineering, environmental studies, information science and technology, international studies, liberal arts and sciences, life sciences and agriculture, public policy and law, and women's scholarship and leadership, are continuing to generate and support new initiatives that will enhance Rutgers' leadership as a major research university.

Work on the communications infrastructure being built through RUNet 2000 will continue throughout the year, with the digging of trenches and the installation of internal building wiring and external cabling to link Rutgers' campuses. Believed to be the largest project of its kind at any American university, the four-year effort provides data, video and voice services to approximately 260 Rutgers buildings.

As of this June, RUNet 2000 wiring had been completed in 12 academic buildings and 27 residence halls on the university's Busch, College Avenue, Douglass, Livingston, and Newark campuses. By the start of the next academic year, wiring is expected to be completed in an additional 16 buildings and 23 residence halls.

DOUG ALONGI
1993 ABCA THIRD TEAM

Alongi was one of two All-Americans on the 1993 squad, which was one of Rutgers' finest. He helped lead RU to a school record in wins (38) while finishing with a .371 batting average, nine home runs, 39 stolen bases and 143 total bases. He set RU single-season records with his stolen bases (39) and total bases (146). His nine HRs places him 10th on the all-time single-season list. Alongi also recorded 18 doubles and six triples, ranking him fourth and second on those single-season lists, respectively. Alongi made just one error in right field and led all RU outfielders with 14 assists. Alongi also claimed Atlantic 10 Player of the Year honors as well as ECAC and NJCBA recognition.

BOBBY BROWNLIE

One of college baseball's biggest surprises in 2000, Bobby Brownlie arrived on the scene and emerged as one of the top young players in the nation. In 2000, Brownlie posted a 10-1 record, including a perfect 7-0 mark in the BIG EAST. He fired eight complete games and posted an ERA of just 2.55, fourth-best among all freshmen in the country. He was on the mound when Rutgers clinched the 2000 BIG EAST Regular Season Championship, outdueling Notre Dame's Aaron Heilman for the crown. He then collected two wins in the BIG EAST Tournament, including a 1-0, complete-game shutout of Seton Hall in the title contest. He closed his season with a 4-3 win over Army in the opening round of the NCAA Championship, running his win streak to 10 games and tying the single-season win mark at Rutgers. His 89 strikeouts established a new school record, while allowing just a .247 opponent batting average.

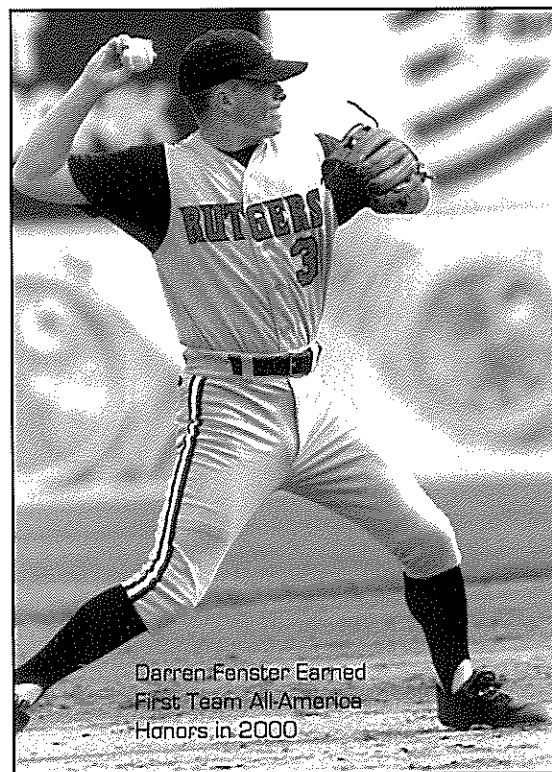
JAKE DAUBERT
1998 LOUISVILLE SLUGGER FRESHMAN ALL-AMERICAN

Jake Daubert enjoyed a fine offensive season in 1998, batting .368 in his inaugural college season. In addition, he set or tied eight Rutgers records, the most impressive being the single-season RBI mark, which he eclipsed by knocking in 64 runs. Daubert was named Rutgers first BIG EAST Rookie of the Year and, at the end of the season, was named to the Louisville Slugger/TPX Freshman All-America squad.

2000- Fenster, a two-time All-American, became the first RU player to achieve First Team honors since Jeff Torborg in 1963. Fenster led Rutgers in hitting for the second-straight season, posting a .433 average, which included a new school-record 101 hits in a season. Along the way, Fenster also set the school mark for career hits with 315, becoming the first RU player to reach the 300-hit mark. In addition to his 101 hits and .433 average, Fenster scored 59 runs, drove in 55, collected 23 doubles and hit a career-high four home runs. He also led the team with 182 assists at shortstop, committing just 10 errors.

1999- Fenster, known initially for his defensive work at shortstop, enjoyed a breakthrough offensive season in 1999, leading the team in batting with .424 average, including a .505 mark in conference action. Batting in the second spot in the order, Fenster provided stability to the Rutgers offense, which ended the season ranked seventh in the nation in team batting average. Fenster's .424 mark was the sixth-best single-season mark in Rutgers history and his .505 BIG EAST average was the best in 12 seasons. A model of consistency, Fenster hit safely in 50 of 56 starts, collecting 37 multiple hit games. He also continued to play flawlessly in the field, stabilizing the defense from his shortstop position for the third year in a row.

GLEN GARDNER
1986 ABCA/BASEBALL AMERICA
1987 COLLEGIATE BASEBALL THIRD-TEAM

Now a coach with the Scarlet Knights, Gardner was one of the most outstanding outfielders in Rutgers' history and one of two Scarlet Knights to be chosen as two-time All-Americans. A 1986 Baseball America Freshman All-America, Gardner was second on the team in hitting that year with a .398 batting average while leading RU in hits (70), RBI (45), home runs (6), total bases (102), slugging percentage (.580), and on-base percentage (.470).

In 1987, Gardner followed his impressive debut by collecting Collegiate Baseball All-America honors. Gardner led the team in hitting at .368 despite missing 13 games with a hand injury. He finished second on the team in HRs (8) and RBI (45). Gardner also earned his second-consecutive Atlantic 10 and NJ honors as well as being named to the NCAA East Region first-team.

PETE HALL
1961 AACBC SECOND TEAM
1962 AACBC SECOND-TEAM

Hall is another Scarlet Knight to garner multiple All-America honors. In 1961, the third baseman from Bound Brook led the Scarlet Knights in hitting at .397, runs (21), hits (31), RBI (30) doubles (6), home runs (4), and made just five errors while starting in every game.



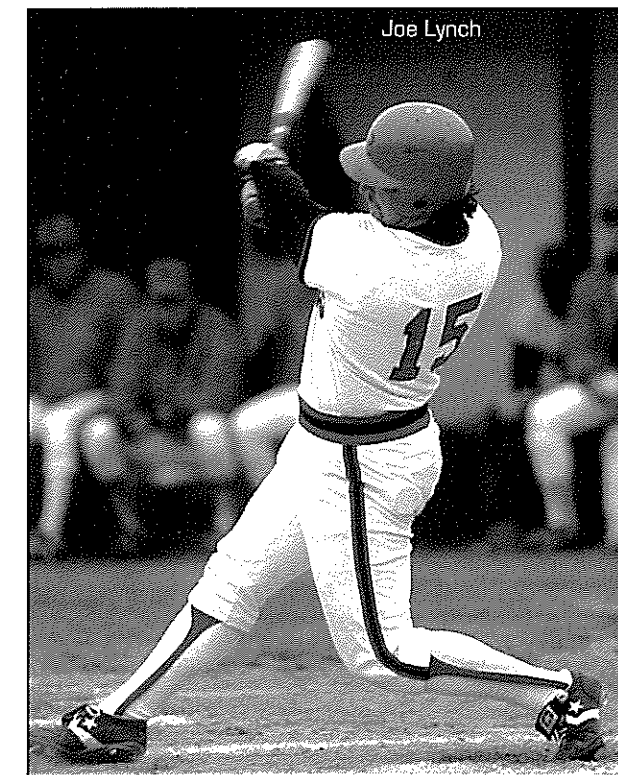

He was second in hitting with a .370 average, he drove in 56 runs, then a school record, tied Alongi for team honors with nine HRs and led the Scarlet Knights in doubles (20). His 39 walks and 20 doubles were both second on the all-time season record at that time.

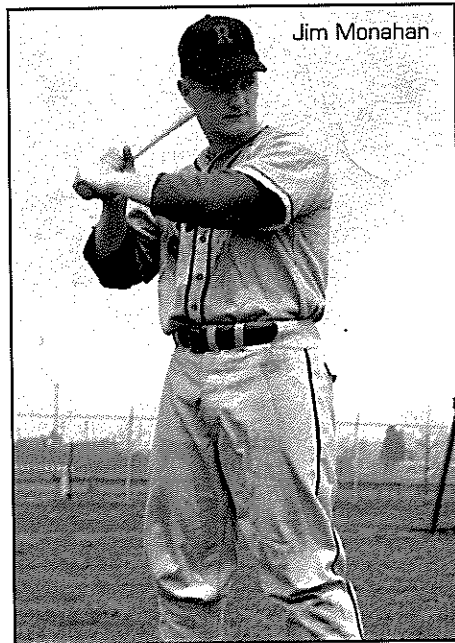
Relief ace extraordinaire, Jim Kohl was one of the keys to Rutgers' run in the East Region, where it finished one game shy of the College World Series. Kohl finished with a perfect 8-0 record and three saves while appearing in 22 games and starting just two. Even more impressive may be his team low 1.85 ERA or the fact that he walked just eight batters in 39.0 innings. In the 1990 tournament, where Rutgers went 4-2, he recorded 8.2 innings of scoreless relief.

JOE LYNCH
1986 ABCA THIRD-TEAM

As a designated hitter, Lynch was third on the Scarlet with a .364 average. He also smacked 3 HRs and drove in 30 runs. A captain in 1986, Lynch had 55 hits with 11 doubles and two triples. His .470 on base percent age tied for team honors as well. Lynch also collected All-District II, Atlantic 10 and All East honors.

SCOTT MADISON
1996 ABCA THIRD-TEAM

After missing all of 1995 due to elbow surgery, Madison returned to the mound and made an impact by beating some of America's top teams on his way to an 8-3 record and a 2.33 ERA which was ranked 15th in the country. Madison earned first team All-BIG EAST honors and was the most dominant pitcher in the conference from the beginning of the season to the end. He finished 1996 with eight complete games and a school-record four shutouts. His 92.2 innings was the second-highest total in school history. Madison finished his career with a .722 (17-5) winning percentage which ranks eighth all-time. He owns Rutgers records for shutouts in a season with four.

Billy McCarthy, from Washington Township, NJ, transferred to Rutgers in 2000 after two highly-successful seasons at Radford University. The move "back home" proved to be a beneficial decision for both RU and McCarthy. The junior right fielder batted a team-high .421 (20th best in the country) and added seven home runs, 21 doubles, 56 runs, 11 stolen bases and a team-high 65 RBI while playing exceptional defense and providing an all-out hustling style of play. His .421 average led the BIG EAST Conference. A First Team All-BIG EAST pick, McCarthy earned All-Tournament honors after an outstanding showing in the NCAA Regional in Lincoln, NE. At season's end, he was selected in the sixth round by the Atlanta Braves (195th overall) and signed a contract to play professionally.

JAMES MONAHAN
1952 AACBC FIRST-TEAM

The Scarlet left fielder led the team with a .400 batting average, 26 hits and 17 stolen bases. He was second on the team in home runs with 2 and RBI with 18. Appearing in all 17 games, he made just three errors. He was also a member of the 1950 College World Series team.

MIKE O'BRIEN
1997 LOUISVILLE SLUGGER FRESHMAN ALL-AMERICA

A designated hitter/first baseman, Mike O'Brien was named to the Louisville Slugger Freshman All-America team, as announced by Collegiate Baseball.

O'Brien appeared in 38 games for the Scarlet Knights starting 31. He batted .302 with 11 doubles, six home runs and 36 RBI. His six home runs was the most by an RU freshman since Angel Echevarria hit nine in 1990. He hit a robust .348 against the BIG EAST and was named to the BIG EAST All-Rookie team.

HARDING PETERSON
1950 AACBC FIRST-TEAM

Catcher Harding Peterson was the lone All-America choice from RU's 1950 College World Series team. Known for his defensive ability, he made just two errors behind the dish in 27 games. He hit a respectable .276 while driving in 23 runs which tied for second on the team.

JEFF TORBORG
1963 AACBC FIRST-TEAM

A 1963 All-America choice, he set the school record for batting average (.537). His slugging percentage that year (1.032) is also a single-season standard. He led the 1963 Scarlet Knight team with 21 RBI and six home runs. In his three-year career, Torborg batted .390 and set the career slugging percentage mark at .684. In his career, the Scarlet Knights were 40-13-1.

RAY VAN CLEEF
1951 AACBC FIRST-TEAM

Centerfielder Ray Van Cleef was chosen by American Association of College Baseball Coaches following his senior season where he batted .378, scored 22 runs and smacked two triples - all team-highs. He made just one error in center while playing in all 23 games. In 1950, Van Cleef paced the Scarlet with a lofty .404 average, 44 hits, 15 extra-base hits, 35 runs and 18 stolen bases. He was a first-team District II choice and the MVP of National Baseball Tournament.

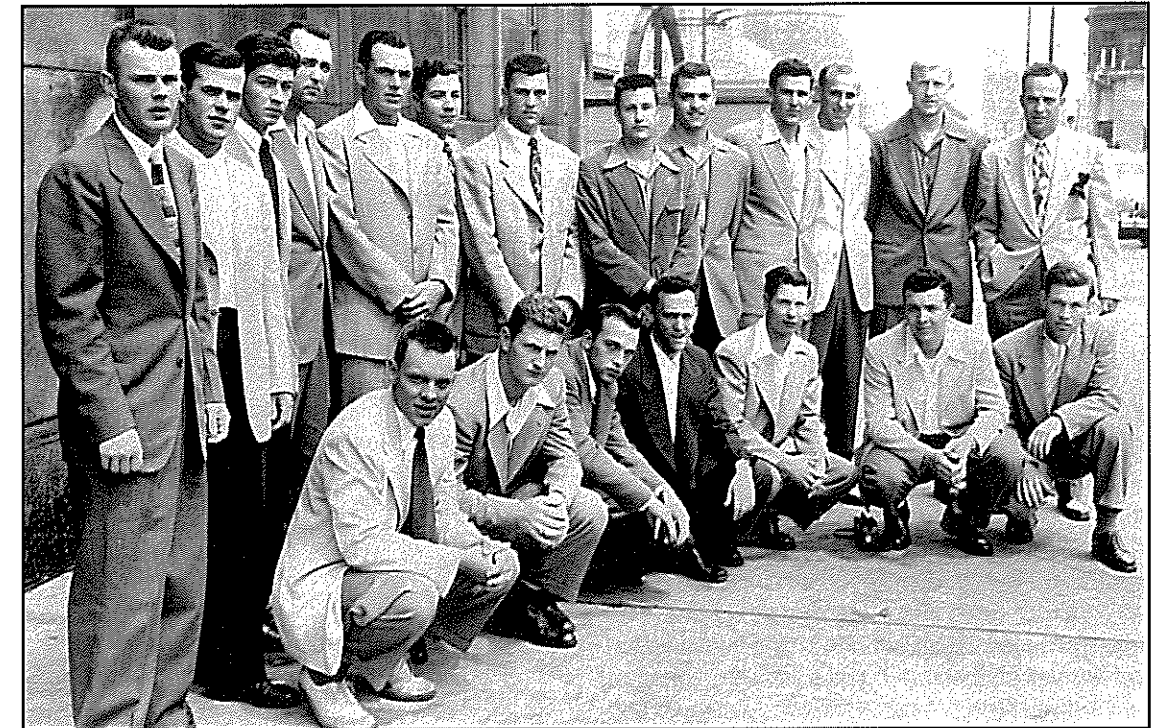

Zoccolillo, one of three players to earn All-America honors in two consecutive seasons, was named to the 1998 NCBWA Third Team, 1999 NCBWA Third Team and Rawlings/ABCA Second Team during his final two seasons. In 1998, Zoccolillo was the team's top offensive threat, slugging a club record 12 home runs while knocking in 59 runs and batting .387. He followed up his outstanding 1998 season with a record-breaking 1999, setting 10 school records and two BIG EAST marks while leading Rutgers to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances. He left the Rutgers baseball program as the all-time leader in eight offensive categories and the single-season leader in two others.

RUTGERS 1950 COLLEGE WORLD SERIES GAME-BY-GAME RECAP

The Scarlet Knights opened play on Thursday, June 15 in the opening game of the tournament against defending national champion Texas (22-5)... Texas took a 2-0 lead in the second on Frank Womack's two-run homer, and Murray Wall pitched six shutout innings before giving up a run in the seventh... Trailing 2-1, Rutgers rallied to take the lead in the eighth, scoring three runs off Wall on three walks, two singles and an error... Wall walked home a run, and Rutgers first baseman Bob Suba stole home for another... Suba finished the game with three stolen bases, as Rutgers set a College World Series record with a total of seven for the game... Herman Hering steadied after giving up the early home run, and although he walked seven and struck out only one, he also allowed only three hits in going the distance for the win... Ray Van Cleef paced the attack, going three for four, as Rutgers won, 4-2.

Saturday, June 17, Rutgers faced Wisconsin in a second-round winner's bracket matchup before only 955 fans in steady drizzle... Tom Forster pitched a complete-game six-hitter, and Van Cleef went four-for-five with a double and a run scored to pace the Scarlet 5-3 win, and a 2-and-0 record in the tournament.

On Monday, June 19, Rutgers met Washington State in the winner's bracket final... The game was a terrific pitcher's duel between Al Willenbrock for Rutgers and Rod Keogh for the Cougars... Willenbrock gave up an early home run to Ted Tappe of the Cougars, but the Scarlet tied it in the fourth on a triple by Jim Monahan and an infield out... That would prove to be the only hit off Keogh, but he walked eight and was frequently in trouble... In the seventh, Rutgers loaded the bases, with Willenbrock up... without warning, (Rutgers later said it was not a called play), the runner on third tried to steal home and was tagged out... As he broke, the runner on second started toward third, then hesitated, and was eventually run down and tagged out to complete an unusual double play, killing the potential rally... In the top of the ninth, Washington State

loaded the bases with no outs... Don Paul grounded sharply to third baseman Steve Kalapos, who threw home for the force there... catcher Hardy Peterson then threw to first to double Paul, and Suba, the first baseman, then spotted Gordon Brunswick, the runner at second, trying to make a surprise dash to home... Suba threw back to Peterson, who tagged Brunswick to complete the triple play... It was the second of three triple plays in the CWS... In the top of the 10th, Washington State finally broke through on an outfield error, hit batter and a two-run double by Terry Carroll to take a 3-1 lead, and Keogh completed his one hitter by retiring the side in the bottom of the 10th... Washington State improved to 3-0, and Rutgers fell to 2-1... Van Cleef, after going seven-for-nine in the first two games was held to 0-for-5...

On Wednesday, June 21, Rutgers came back from its one-hit outing to blow out Wisconsin 16-2... The Scarlet collected 11 hits, including two apiece by four different players, and the Badgers unraveled, committing seven errors... (Van Cleef was 1-for-6)... Herman Hering turned in his second complete game win of the tournament, scattering eight hits, and also contributed a triple and a single to the 11-hit attack... Wisconsin was eliminated at 2-2, and Rutgers joined Texas and Washington State at 3-1 (Texas had beaten the Cougars, 12-1, on Tuesday). Washington State drew the bye into the championship game, and Rutgers faced Texas for the second time, on Thursday, June 22... The Scarlet went with second-round winner Tom Foster, but Texas knocked him out early, scoring three in the second, and five in the fourth on their way to a 15-9 win... Charlie Gorin went the distance for Texas, despite allowing 12 hits and nine runs, as the Longhorns out-hit Rutgers, 15-12... Texas went on to win the title over Washington State the next night, 3-0, while Rutgers finished third at 3-2... finishing the season at 17-4-1... Van Cleef was 2-for-4 in the final game to finish the CWS at .417 on 10-for-24, and was named the Most Outstanding Player.

RUTGERS HALL OF FAME

One of the oldest traditions at Rutgers University, the Scarlet Knight Baseball program has been successful for over 129 years. There have been 18 All-Americans, 12 trips to the NCAA Tournament and one trip to the College World Series. With all of this illustrious history, you can image that there have been several "Special" players on "The Banks." Seven of those players have been selected to the Rutgers University Olympic Sports Hall of Fame which honors the best of the best in Rutgers' Sports. The baseball program has been represented in each of the last three years - Eric Young (1999), Darrin Winston (2000) and Matt Bolger (2001).

Glen Gardner '91

Gardner, one of the most prolific hitters in Rutgers baseball history, was elected after a stellar three-year career (1986-88), which saw him earn two All-America awards as well as collect a host of offensive records. Gardner, one of New Jersey's top all-time athletes, came to Rutgers from Immaculata High School, where he was a first-team All-State choice in both football and baseball. Following his freshman season, Gardner was named Freshman All-America by Baseball America. He was drafted after his sophomore season by the San Diego Padres in the 13th round of the Major League Baseball Amateur draft. He chose to stay at Rutgers for his junior season and that year set nine single-season offensive records and earned All-America honors from Collegiate Baseball. He was a three-time Atlantic 10 choice and a three-time New Jersey College Baseball Association honoree. Following his junior season, Gardner was drafted by the Atlanta Braves and he began a professional career in that organization. He ended his career as the Rutgers all-time leader in six offensive categories and ranked in the top 10 in four others.

Pete Hall '62

Hall is one of only two Scarlet Knights to twice earn All-American honors (1961 and 1962) in baseball. During his three letter-winning years (1960-62), the Scarlet Knights were 40-14-1. The former third baseman holds fifth place on the career batting average chart (.384) and second place on the career slugging average chart (.612) in the Scarlet Knight record book. Hall was a 1961 draft pick of the New York Yankees. Hall was the Upstream Award winner in 1962. In 1961, he led the team in hitting (.397), runs (21), hits (31), RBI (30) and made just five errors in starting every game.

Harding Peterson '50

Peterson, the backstop for the 1950 Rutgers College World Series team, was a second-team All-America selection by the American Baseball Coaches Association and a first-team District II choice that year, as well. Known for his defensive ability, Peterson made just two errors in 27 games in 1950 while hitting .276 (27-98), with 21 runs, 23 RBI (second on team), 4 doubles and 2 triples. His best season as a collegian was in 1948, when he hit for a .312 average (10-32) with 7 RBI and 3 doubles. In his three varsity seasons, Peterson led his teams

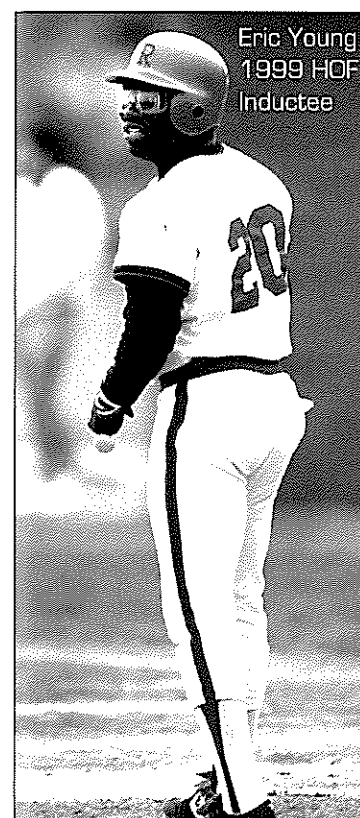
to a combined 57-16-2 record, highlighted by a third-place finish in the 1950 College World Series. Following his career at Rutgers, Peterson signed as free agent with Pittsburgh Pirates in 1950 but had his career interrupted by Korean War service. Following the war, Peterson played four years with Pirates until a broken arm in a home plate collision hastened his retirement. A well-respected baseball man, Peterson spent over 30 years with the Pirates, including stints as a player (4 years), manager (9 years), farm director and scouting director. He was named VP for player personnel in 1976 and named executive VP in 1979 and is possibly best known for the trade of C Manny Sanguillen to Oakland A's for manager Chuck Tanner in 1976. His dealings helped bring the Pirates their World Series Championship in 1979. Peterson also spent two years with the Yankees - and was a Co-General Manager in 1990 and two more years with San Diego as a scout.

Jeff Torborg '63

Jeff Torborg was a 1963 All-American and set the school record for season batting average (.537) that year, which was the national leading average for 100 at bats and under. His .537 average was the highest ever recorded up to that time and since then, only two college players have hit for a better average. His slugging percentage that year (1.032) is also a single-season standard. In 1963, he led the team with 21 RBI and six home runs. A draft choice of the Los Angeles Dodgers, he played 10 seasons in the major, seven with the Dodgers and three with the California Angels. He caught three no-hitters, a perfect game with Sandy Koufax and another no-hitter with Bill Singer of the Dodgers and Nolan Ryan of the Angels; and was the backstop in Don Drysdale's record fifth straight shutout in 1968. He was a successful manager with the Chicago White Sox, the Cleveland Indians and the New York Mets, winning the Baseball Writer's Association, Associated Press, United Press International and The Sporting News Manager of the Year award. In his three-year career from 1961-63, the Westfield, NJ native batted .390, his number (#10) was retired in 1992. He still holds the career slugging percentage mark of .684. During his career, the Knights were 15-4-1, 14-4 and 11-5 for a three-year mark of 40-13-1 (.741 winning percentage).

Ray Van Cleef '52

Van Cleef was a two-time All-American in baseball, garnering first-team accolades from the American Association of College Baseball Coaches in 1950 and 1951. In the process, he became the first Eastern player to repeat as an All-American. A veteran of two NCAA Tournaments, he was the starting centerfielder on the 1950 Rutgers team which advanced to the College World Series. He batted .458 (11-24) in the series en route to MVP honors, while leading the Knights to a co-runner-up finish. Van Cleef batted .404 that season, his junior year, and followed it up with a .378 mark in 1951. He currently ranks second in career batting average at Rutgers. He set the Rutgers single season record for triples with seven in 1950 and stands second in career triples with 13. Van Cleef is also third in career slugging percentage with a .606 mark. The Knights were 50-21-2 his three varsity years. He also won three letters in basketball and one in soccer.



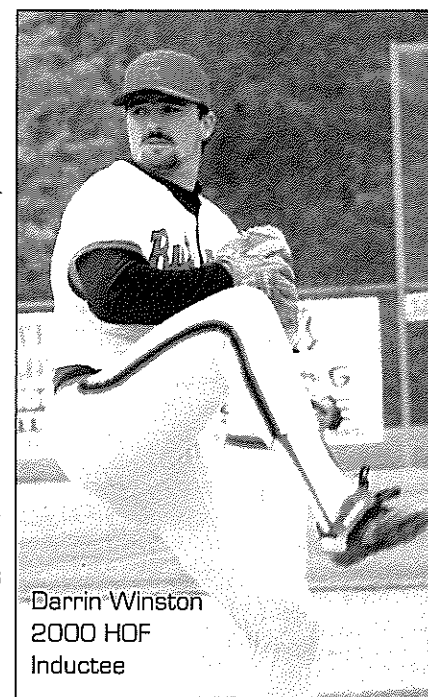

Eric Young '89

Eric Young was a two-sport standout (football, baseball) at Rutgers, earning three letters in baseball (1987-89). Young batted over .300 in each of his three seasons, including a career high .337 as a senior in 1989. During his career on the diamond, Young was a two-time Atlantic-10 All-Conference selection and led Rutgers to an Atlantic-10 Championship and NCAA berth in 1988. Young graduated from Rutgers as the career runs, triples and stolen base leader, setting a then single-season mark with 28 thefts in 1989. At the conclusion of his Rutgers career, Young was the recipient of the Coursen Award in 1989 and was selected by the Los Angeles Dodgers in the 1989 amateur draft. Young made his major league debut with the Colorado Rockies in 1993 and was selected to the 1995 All-Star game. A nine-year major league veteran with a .289 career average, Young is the starting second baseman for the Chicago Cubs.

Darrin Winston

Darrin Winston received his nod in 2000. Winston was a four-year letterwinner at Rutgers from 1985-88, and concluded his career as one of Rutgers' all-time winningest pitchers. A left-hander, Winston was a three-time team MVP, and led the Scarlet Knights to two berths in the NCAA Tournament, as well as the 1988 Atlantic 10 Championship. He was an all-region selection in 1988 after posting a 10-4 record with a 3.74 ERA, and was the MVP of the A-10 Tournament that year. At the time of his induction, Winston was the Rutgers leader in several statistical categories, including career wins (26), career innings pitched (278), career strikeouts (176), career complete-games (8), and single-season wins (10). Originally from Woodbridge, NJ, Winston was drafted by the Montreal Expos and later pitched in the major leagues for the Philadelphia Phillies. He is currently a member of the Somerset Patriots of the Atlantic League.



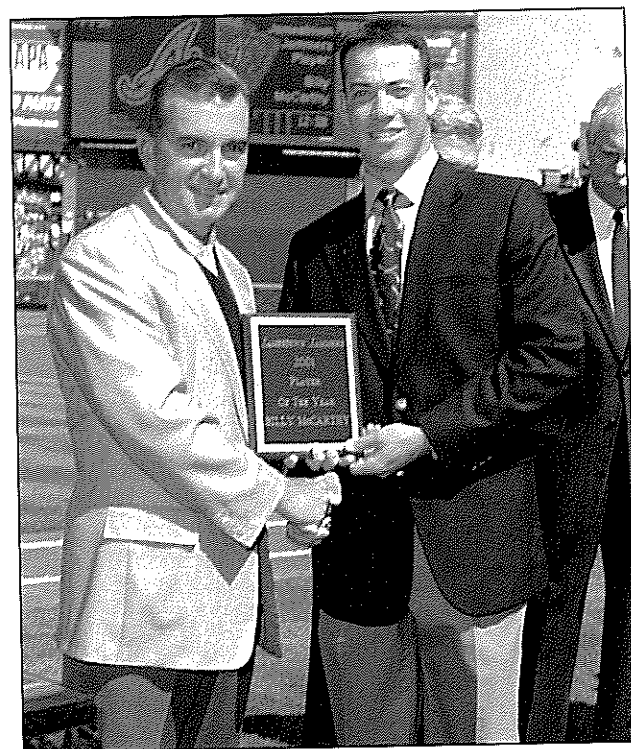

Matt Bolger, Head Coach

Matt Bolger spent 22 years at the head coach of the Scarlet Knights baseball team, compiling a record of 288-245-7 during his career. A 2001 Olympic Sports Hall of Fame Inductee, Bolger led Rutgers to three NCAA Tournaments in a five-year span from 1966-1970, and posted his best season in 1961, when the Scarlet Knights finished with a 15-4-1 record. A two-time Coach of the Year honoree by the New Jersey Collegiate Baseball Association, Bolger mentored several major league draft picks, including former first-round pick Jeff Torborg. A past President of the American Association of College Baseball Coaches, Bolger is a member of the AACBC Hall of Fame, as well as the Newark Hall of Fame and the St. Benedict's Prep Hall of Fame. Bolger, who coached at Rutgers from 1961 through 1983, was the school's all-time winningest coach in any sport at the time of his retirement.

DID YOU KNOW?

Billy McCarthy, a 2001 All-American at Rutgers, was drafted in the sixth round by the Atlanta Braves (195th overall). McCarthy was the second player in as many years to be picked among the top 200 players, joining 2000 draftee David DeJesus, who was taken in the fourth round by the Kansas City Royals. McCarthy got his professional career off to a stellar start with the Jamestown Jammers (NY-Penn League). McCarthy batted .295 with team-highs in hits (84), doubles (17) and RBI (39) en route to Player of the Year honors.

TO GO OR NOT TO GO?

It's a choice every high school baseball player dreams of - do I sign a professional contract or do I accept a college scholarship? The dilemma is an enchanting one for any aspiring baseball player, but it can also be a confusing and pressure-packed one as well. As a 17 or 18-year-old, making those types of decisions can be a source of major stress.

Several players at Rutgers have had to deal with this problem over the past few years. Back in 1997, two of RU's top recruits, David DeJesus and Mike O'Brien, were chosen in the amateur draft, but opted for college. In 1999, current junior Bobby Brownlie turned down a deal with the Colorado Rockies as their 26th-round pick, while in 2000 and 2001, two RU recruits - Charlie Frazier and Mike Hrynio - opted for the pros. Every year it seems, there is someone on Rutgers' list of incoming freshmen that must deal with this topic. To those who have gone through the process, the concerns are evident. "Where will I develop more?" becomes the question of the day.

"Here at Rutgers, there is not an organizational theory on hitting like you find in professional baseball," said Darren Fenster, a 12th-round pick of the Kansas City Royals in 2000. "With most pro teams, there is one organizational hitting instructor who wants everyone to do a certain thing the same way, which may emphasize the Charlie Lau approach, for example."

"At Rutgers, Coach Hill and 'Beef' take what you bring as a freshman and work with it. They don't change you into something completely new and make you start from scratch."

For DeJesus, being a 43rd-round pick of the NY Mets was an attractive option out of Manalapan High School, but when you consider that just three years later he was taken in the fourth round by the Royals, the advancements he made are clearly evident.

"At Rutgers, you get much more one-on-one attention," said DeJesus. "You can basically come in and hit at any time you want, throughout the entire year. Here, there is so much more repetition and things really get nailed in. Things become second nature."

Coach Hill has coached a lot of future pros in his career at Rutgers and none may be more impressive than Eric Young, a football recruit who joined the baseball team and has since developed into one of the top run producers in the majors. Young attributes much of his development to the attitude and hard work of Coach Hill.

"I was a very raw player when I arrived at Rutgers and got by, for the most part, on my athletic ability and some skill," said Young. "Working with Coach Hill made me a better player because he stresses fundamentals so much on a daily basis that it becomes a way of life. By the time I left Rutgers and finally started my pro career, I had improved so much through his teaching style."

"Most of the guys who come and play at Rutgers aren't draft picks but three years later, they are top 10 or top 20-round picks," added Fenster. "That happens because he knows how to get the most out of his players and he knows what it takes to play at the next level. You aren't going to find a coach who is more successful at developing players than Coach Hill. He helped me in every single aspect of the game."

While the financial aspect comes into play as much as anything, the scholarship opportunity at Rutgers can be just as inviting. The opportunity to

earn college credits, develop physically and mentally and compete in the BIG EAST muddies the decision-making process. The opportunity to hit with wooden bats in the pros might also be intriguing, but all Rutgers players participate in wooden bat summer leagues, giving each student-athlete the chance to "test the waters".

"The BIG EAST teams and the teams we face down south are quite similar," said Fenster. "We are seeing players in different stages in their careers. When I was a freshman, I was in awe by guys like Seton Hall's Jason Grilli, but you realize very quickly that you can play with them. You find yourself, in college, facing a pitcher who has had three years to develop, as opposed to a kid out of high school in the minors who might throw hard but is not that polished. At times, college pitching is more in line with the type of challenges you will face in the high minors. The pitching you face in college is better than you will face in the low-level minors on a consistent basis."

Another consideration is the physical development, which is sometimes impeded by the rigors of professional baseball. At Rutgers, the strength and conditioning staff, as well as the sports medicine staff, work with each player to help them grow stronger and manage their diets properly. Those two ingredients add to the performance on the field.

"During the minor league season you play every day and survive on fast food and peanut butter and jelly sandwiches," joked Billy McCarthy, who played three seasons in college (two at Radford, one at Rutgers) before moving onto the Atlanta

Braves system this summer. "When I got to the minors, I did so with a lot of confidence having played at Rutgers, which helped me with the transition more than anything else. Every day I was here, I learned something new that helped me this summer with Jamestown. Coming to Rutgers was one of the best decisions I ever made."

The true problem lies in the fact that no matter what a particular player chooses, there is no real way to ever know which one was better. Once it's made, there is no looking back.

"I don't think I'd be any further along if I had gone to the pros out of high school," said DeJesus. You end up spending a couple of years in the low minors, such as the Gulf Coast League, and then you advance up the ladder and end up meeting up with the college picks in Class A ball. It's probably different for each person and there is really no way to tell, but I know I benefitted from playing three years in college."

Rutgers' long-list of recent draftees can attest to the impact playing at Rutgers has had on their professional careers. The decision to attend Rutgers and compete in the BIG EAST and against some of the nation's top teams, is a tough opportunity to turn down. The same can be said for the world of professional baseball, which is why the debate will continue to move forward. At least high school recruits can be confident that by attending Rutgers, they will receive some of the best coaching the world of college baseball has to offer.

"I haven't learned half as much in my two years in professional baseball as I learned playing [at Rutgers]. You would think it would be the opposite because the focus is always on baseball in the minors, but I wish there were coaches in our organization who were like 'Moose' and 'Beef.'"
