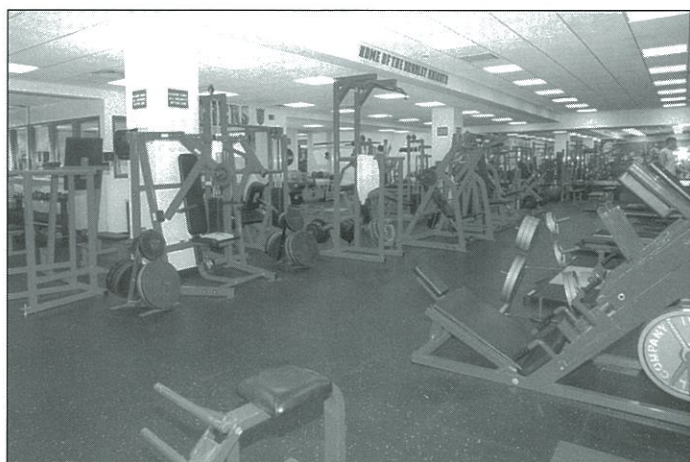

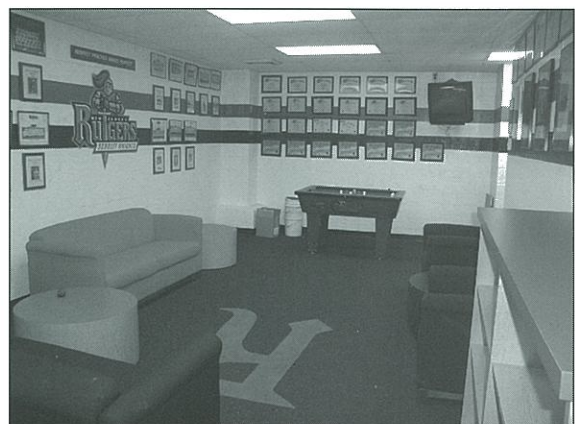


THE FREDERICK E. GRUNINGER/ CLASS OF '53 BASEBALL COMPLEX

The Rutgers baseball team plays in Piscataway, New Jersey directly behind the Louis Brown Athletic Center. The on-field facilities include a practice diamond and two full length batting cages as well as three practice pitching mounds. Newly-installed dugouts and permanent seating for 800 accentuate the field.



RU baseball also features indoor practice facilities that include three 70-foot batting cages and pitching mounds. The Louis Brown Athletic Center, aka the RAC, is also home to a 3,500 square foot weight room in which the Rutgers baseball trains with strength and conditioning coach Shawn Windle. This facility features state-of-the-art equipment that includes free weights, cardiovascular and rehabilitation machines.

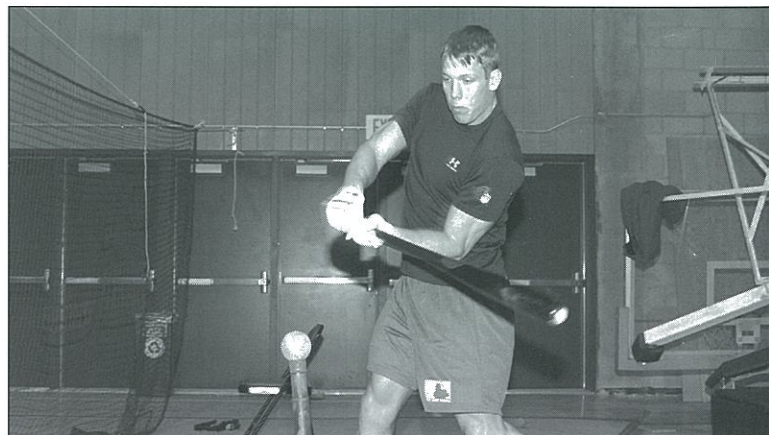


In addition, the RAC is home to the clubhouse of the baseball team where the club can prepare mentally and physically for each day. The clubhouse features couches, televisions, entertainment centers and a pool table as well as a full-time equipment staff that maintains the players' uniforms and equipment to help keep the team properly outfitted. The team locker room was recently renovated with a new carpet, furniture and oak lockers for each player.

The baseball team also utilizes a 120-yard indoor astroturf facility known as "The Bubble". "The Bubble" includes a full-length football field with 100-foot high ceilings that allow for game-like simulation. The bubble is a vital component of the preseason practice schedule when weather prohibits outdoor activity.



At right: The Rutgers Athletic Center features ample room for indoor hitting drills, utilizing three, state-of-the-art batting cages in each back corner.



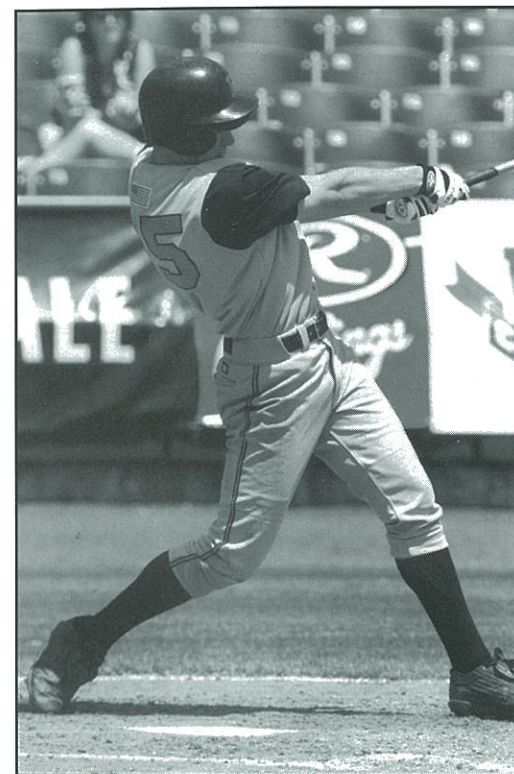
HOMEGROWN SUCCESS "NEW JERSEY'S TEAM"

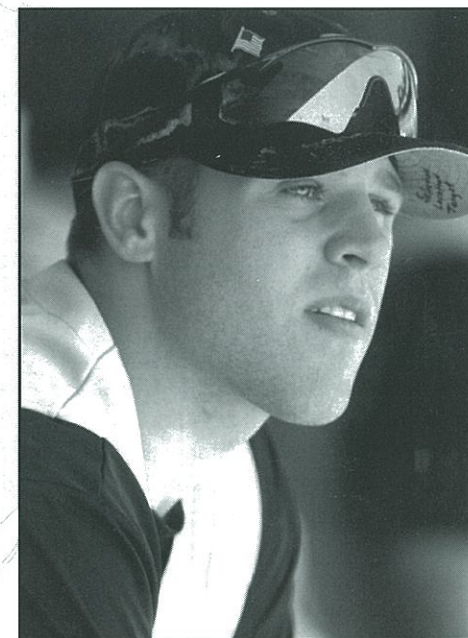

• Coach Hill feels that there is a tremendous amount of talent in New Jersey and that by obtaining the best players from the state, Rutgers will be able to compete with the rest of the nation. NJ-driven teams have enjoyed tremendous success over the years, dating back to the first stars of Rutgers, such as Joe Lynch, Darrin Winston, Noel Gluck and Glen Gardner.

• Around the state of New Jersey there has been a sense of hometown pride as many of the Jersey players turn down out-of-state scholarships to attend Rutgers. Rutgers has attracted the state's top players, including 1999 *Star Ledger* Pitcher of the Year Bobby Brownlie and 2001 honoree Jeff Frazier.

• The New-Jersey based Rutgers coaching staff thoroughly surveys the state for the top talent in each county. Their ability to attend high school and American Legion games, coupled with a focused approach to recruiting, enables the staff to uncover "hidden gems" - players who often go unnoticed by other schools but flourish at Rutgers.

• Former RU All-American Billy McCarthy, now playing professionally with the Atlanta Braves, went away to play collegiately in Virginia but could not resist the temptation to come home and play for Rutgers. In one season at Rutgers, McCarthy earned All-America honors and was a sixth-round draft pick. It is not difficult to understand how Coach Hill maintains his monopoly on the best talent in New Jersey. With first class coaches, facilities and scheduling, Rutgers is the number one place to play baseball in the Northeast.

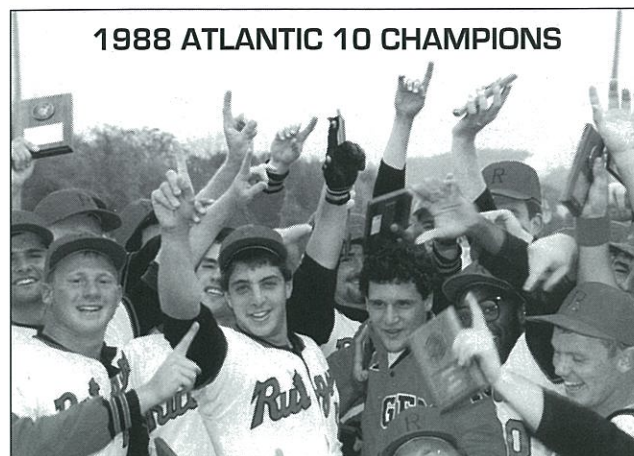

A LEGACY OF SUCCESS



1988 ATLANTIC 10 CHAMPIONS

• When Fred Hill took over the Rutgers baseball program in 1984, the Scarlet Knights were coming off a 13-22 record in 1983 and had not advanced to the postseason since the 1970 season.

• Just two years later, Hill led Rutgers to the 1986 Atlantic 10 Championship and a spot in the NCAA Tournament. Rutgers would win the next eight regular season titles and, starting in 1986, four of the next six tournament championships.

• In 1987, Rutgers posted its first-ever 30-win season, capturing 36 victories, while in 1988, the team eclipsed that mark with 38 wins, including its first NCAA Tournament victory (6-1 vs. Clemson) under Hill.

• In 1990, Rutgers posted a 37-19 mark, won the first of back-to-back A-10 Tournament titles, and came within one win of the College World Series by advancing to the final of the 1990 Northeast Regional in Waterbury, CT. After losing the opening game, 3-2, to UNC, the Scarlet Knights rattled off three-consecutive wins to advance to the finals vs. undefeated Georgia. Needing two wins to knock off the Bulldogs, Rutgers won the first, 4-3, before falling in the final, 20-9. Georgia would not lose another game on its way to the 1990 National Title.

• Despite leaving the Atlantic 10 following the 1995 season, Rutgers still owns the conference record for tournament wins (26), regular-season titles (10) and tournament titles (6).

• In 1996, Rutgers moved to the BIG EAST Conference and, just two years later, captured both the regular season (17-3) and tournament title. Rutgers repeated the feat in 2000, winning the regular season (18-5) and tournament. RU is one of only three teams, along with WVU in 1996 and Notre Dame in 2002, to win both the regular season and league tournament – but the only team to do it twice.

• From 1996 to 2001, Rutgers finished either first or second in the BIG EAST regular season standings and has finished no lower than fourth in each of its first six seasons. In 2002, RU finished fourth in the regular season, but advanced to the BIG EAST Championship game before falling to eventual College World Series participant Notre Dame, 3-2, in 10 innings in the final game.

• Rutgers has appeared in four of the last five NCAA Tournaments, serving as the No. 1 seed and host for the 2000 Regional at Upper Montclair and the No. 2 seed at the 2001 Regional in Lincoln, Nebraska, hosted by the University of Nebraska. In 2001, Rutgers advanced to the regional final, before the CWS-bound Cornhuskers rallied for a 14-10 victory in the last inning.

• In 19 seasons under Hill, Rutgers has enjoyed 17 winning campaigns and 13 seasons of 30 or more wins. In 2000 and 2001, the Scarlet Knights eclipsed the 40-win mark, including a program-best 42-17 mark in 2001.

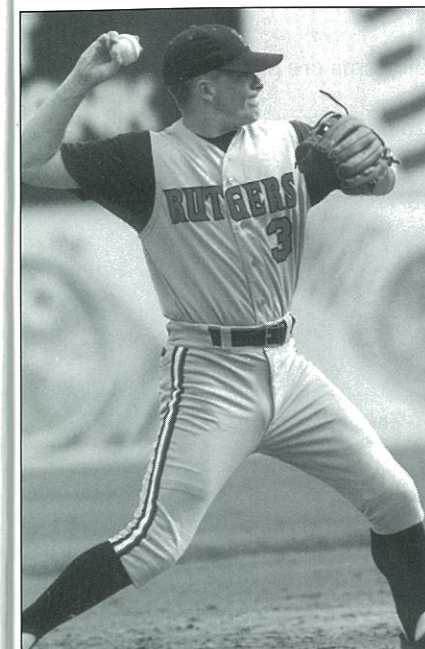
• Rutgers has been ranked in the top 25 nationally at some point during each of the last five seasons, including a high point of 14th [Baseball America] in 2000. Rutgers was ranked as high as 23rd nationally last season following two wins over the University of Miami in mid-March.

• Rutgers has had at least one All-American in each of the last seven seasons, including two in 1999 and 2000. In 2000, shortstop Darren Fenster (at left) was RU's first, First Team All-American since Jeff Torborg in 1963 and was one of 10 finalists for the Dick Howser Award, given annually to college baseball's top performer. In 2002, Rutgers' Bobby Brownlie was named one of five finalists for the Golden Spikes award, given each year to the top amateur baseball player in the nation.

• Brownlie represented the Scarlet Knights on Team USA in the summer of 2000 and established himself as the team's top hurler. He posted a 7-0 mark, including a 0.84 ERA, and allowed just 32 hits (30 singles) in 53.2 innings. He was also named the Louisville Slugger Preseason National Player of the Year in 2001.

• Rutgers' success is well-chronicled in the summer months as well. RU has sent at least one player to the Cape Cod League in each of the last six seasons, including Cape All-Stars David DeJesus (Chatham, 1999), Bobby Brownlie (Falmouth, 2000) and Val Majewski (Falmouth, 2001). Last season, senior Alberto Vasquez played with the Falmouth Commodores and this coming summer, Jeff Frazier will play for the Chatham A's.

• Rutgers has seen 45 players move onto the professional ranks during Hill's tenure. In the last five years, 20 players have left Rutgers to play professionally. In 1998, five players were drafted or signed, while in 2000, five more earned professional status, including fourth-round draft

pick David DeJesus. In 2001, Billy McCarthy was a sixth-round selection, while in 2002, Bobby Brownlie (first round, 21st overall) and Val Majewski (third round, 78th overall) were among the first 100 players selected.

• There are currently two former Scarlet Knights in the major leagues - Eric Young (Milwaukee Brewers) and Angel Echevarria (Chicago Cubs). In all, four players have reached "The Show" after playing for Hill, including Darrin Winston (Philadelphia Phillies) and Bob McDonald (Yankees, Mets, Blue Jays, Tigers).

• Young, who also played football at Rutgers, broke into the majors in 1992 and has been a starting second baseman for 10-straight seasons. He earned a spot on the 1995 NL All-Star team and has hit over .300 twice in his career. He has stolen 30 or more bases in each of the last eight seasons and has a .288 career batting average after hitting .280 for Milwaukee in 2002. Echevarria made his MLB debut in 1996 and spent the 2002 season with the Chicago Cubs, where he hit .306 in 98 at bats. His best season was 1999, when he played in 102 games and hit .288 with 11 home runs for the Colorado Rockies.

• Several current minor leaguers are well on their way up their respective organization ladders. Billy McCarthy (Atlanta Braves) earned Player of the Year honors with the Jamestown Jammers in 2001 and was one of three former RU players to earn a spot in the 2002 Carolina League All-Star game. Another Carolina League All-Star, David DeJesus (KC Royals), was called up to AA midway through the season and then played in the Arizona Fall League. Milwaukee Brewers farmhand Pete Zoccolillo enjoyed a breakthrough season at AA Hunstville and is expected to be with the Major League team in spring training.

THE BIG EAST CONFERENCE



- The BIG EAST conference is one of the most respected conferences in the country and its baseball teams are no different.
- Since 1996, the year that Rutgers joined the league, there have been 14 BIG EAST teams go on to play in the NCAA Tournament including four-consecutive appearances by Rutgers from 1998-2001.
- Where there are good teams there are good players: since 1998 the Big East has claimed 16 All-Americans- five of which played for Rutgers: Bobby Brownlie, Darren Fenster, Jake Daubert, Pete Zoccolillo and Billy McCarthy.
- The BIG EAST Conference also sends many of its baseball players to the pros; in 2002 alone, 23 Big East players were selected in the Amateur Draft. Highlighting the 2001 class were Joe Saunders from Virginia Tech and Bobby Brownlie from Rutgers, who both went in the first round. Rutgers sent four players on the first day of the draft in 2002 and two players (Brownlie, Val Majewski) were among the first 100 players selected.
- As a team Rutgers has excelled in the conference since becoming a member in 1996 by winning 2 Big East titles and going to the tournament 4 years in a row. Rutgers players have also been standouts in the Big East as R.U. has been home to 13 league leaders in various statistical categories. This conference is especially unique because of where the teams are located in relation to the level of baseball that is played, the talent is rich and the Big East has proved that it is indeed a power conference for baseball.
- In 2002, for the first time since the formation of the BIG EAST baseball conference, a team advanced to the NCAA College World Series. Notre Dame, which captured the BIG EAST Championship with a 3-2, 10-inning victory over Rutgers, upset top-ranked Florida State in the Super Regionals to earn the bid.

HEAD COACH 20TH SEASON

Fred Hill, nicknamed "Moose" by his peers and players, is entering his 20th season at Rutgers and 27th overall as a collegiate head coach. Last season, Hill guided the Scarlet Knights to 35 wins and the finals of the BIG EAST Championship, yet another successful season for a coach who has become synonymous with success in the Garden State.

Using the same principles that made him a successful high school and college coach in both football and baseball – tireless teaching of the fundamentals and a strong reliance on New Jersey recruiting – Hill has reached unprecedented levels of success, including 765 wins, 35 shy of the 800-win plateau. He has averaged 38.5 wins over the last four seasons and 32.5 in his 19 seasons at Rutgers. He is the only coach in BIG EAST history to win both the regular season and tournament championship in the same season (1998, 2000), despite only joining the conference in 1996. As a member of the Atlantic 10 from 1984 through 1996, he guided his team to seven-straight A-10 regular season championships and five tournament championships. Not only do Coach Hill's teams win championships, they also win in regular season play; he has never posted a losing league record in 26 years of collegiate coaching.

Not one to shy away from the opposition, Rutgers consistently plays among the nation's toughest schedules, highlighted annually by the team's southern swing. Games with teams such as Tulane, Georgia Tech, North Carolina State, William & Mary and Old Dominion help the Scarlet Knights prepare for a rigorous week in southern Florida, when they meet the University of Miami in an always-spirited three-game series, as well as Florida Atlantic, Florida International. By playing the top teams, RU is always ready for BIG EAST play.

Excluding the 2002 season, Rutgers has finished either first or second in BIG EAST Regular Season play in each of the past seven seasons since entering the league. A BIG EAST Tournament champion in 1998 and 2000, Rutgers came within inches of capturing the 2002 crown, falling to eventual CWS participant Notre Dame, 3-2, in 10 innings in a thrilling, winner-take-all game.

The ability to remain competitive with an All-New Jersey roster is a shining example of the teaching and coaching ability that Hill possesses. He has molded countless players into contributors and has built not only talented players, but complete teams that combine hitting, defense and pitching depth – allowing the Scarlet Knights to win several different ways. Last season, using an team comprised solely of New Jersey players, RU won five of its first six games, took two of three from Miami, and narrowly missed its fifth-straight trip to the NCAA Tournament after making appearances in 1998, 1999, 2000, and 2001 – four of Hill's nine NCAA appearances overall.

He has spent 26 years coaching collegiate baseball, seven at Montclair State and 19 at Rutgers University. In those 26 years, his teams have competed in over 1,200 games. When you add the countless practice sessions, the fall games, the clinics, the high school games, and the summer league contests you realize that Fred Hill has seen a lot of baseball and that doesn't include the previous years as a high school coach or his playing days. When you get right down to it, Coach Hill has been involved in baseball all of his life.

Despite his lifelong association with America's pastime, Hill remains as energetic as he was during his own playing days and his energy and charisma can be seen in each player involved with the program. Beyond the wins, the championships and the acclaim he has brought to two of New Jersey's finest collegiate baseball teams, Fred Hill is a tremendous role model and mentor to each person who dons a Scarlet Knight uniform. After 17 consecutive postseason appearances, nine NCAA berths and numerous league championships, Hill still holds to the same principles that made him a scholastic star at Upsala. Most importantly, he remains as enthusiastic about the game as he did when he first started coaching and remains focused on returning Rutgers to Omaha, Nebraska and the College World Series for the first time in over 50 years.

Hill began his collegiate career at Montclair State University where in 1977, he was named head baseball and football coach. In his career with Montclair State, he developed the baseball team into a Division III national power, winning 62 percent of his games and earning a trip to the Division III World Series (Hill was named Division III National Coach of the Year in 1983). For those contributions and many more to the Montclair State Athletic Department, he was elected to their Sports Hall of Fame in 1991.

Hill left Montclair State in 1984 and found himself with the daunting task of rebuilding the State University's venerable baseball program a program that was coming off a 13-22 season and had not advanced to the NCAA Tournament since 1970. Very slowly, Hill began to craft a team in his mold – one that thrived on hard work and was driven by success. In 1984, his first season at Rutgers, Hill endured a 13-21 record, one of only two losing seasons he has had. Since that 1984 season, Hill has guided Rutgers to winning seasons in 15 of the past 16 years. He has also won seven conference championships in the that time (five A-10, two BIG EAST) and has guided the Scarlet Knights to eight NCAA Tournament bids. More importantly, Hill has developed the Rutgers baseball team into one of the most well-respected and revered programs in the nation – a "northern" school that has proven, time and time again, that it is capable of competing with any team in the country.

Hill first led Rutgers to the NCAA Tournament in just his third year, including a 28-16 regular season record in 1986. The following season, Hill posted a then school-record 36 wins and in 1988, Hill set another school record by recording 38 wins with a 38-21-1 record that included another NCAA Tournament appearance and a 6-1 win over Clemson in the second round. In 1989, Hill reached the 30-win mark for the third-consecutive season, but it was not until 1990 that Rutgers put itself on the national map for good.

The 1990 season featured a future major leaguer (Angel Echevarria) and the star-power helped lead Rutgers to a 37-19 overall mark. After beating West Virginia in the A-10 finals to earn an automatic berth to the NCAA Tournament, Rutgers headed off to East Regions in Waterbury, CT. After losing a 3-2 heartbreaker to North Carolina in the opening round, Rutgers rallied back with a 15-5 victory over Connecticut in the second round before putting together a run that will forever be remembered by Scarlet Knight baseball fans. The Scarlet Knights put on a show following the win over Connecticut, rattling off three wins over Top 15 teams in a 24-hour period, including a 4-3 win over Georgia. Rutgers rallied back from the consolation bracket to meet that same Georgia team in the finals and although Rutgers dropped a 20-9 decision to the Bulldogs, the eventual National Champions, the Scarlet Knights showed everyone that they could compete with the best.

Thirty-win seasons in each of the next three years ran the total to six-straight as Hill had quickly developed Rutgers into a perennial NCAA team and a constant Atlantic-10 favorite. A 28-19 season in 1994 followed by a 28-29 season in 1995, closed out the Atlantic-10 chapter as Rutgers moved into the BIG EAST Conference. Just three seasons later, Rutgers was crowned the Regular Season and BIG EAST

Champion in 1998 and then finished second in 1999 and earned the school's first-ever at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament, a sign that Rutgers had developed a national-level reputation. That success continued to grow in 2000, as another league championship and a trip to the NCAA Championship highlighted a tremendous year. Then in 2001 his team set a school record with 42 wins and its fourth consecutive NCAA Tournament berth. All of this has also set the stage for even greater expectations and hope in 2002.

Not one to take individual credit for some lofty achievements, Hill credits his assistants, both current and former, as people who have had as much to do with Rutgers' success as anyone. Time and time again, Hill cites his players' desire to work hard and become the best they can be, which trickles down from the head coach to his players.

He has seen several of his players go on to play professionally and the list of his former players who now coach the game is too long to recite. His legacy and aggressive coaching style is well-known and still growing throughout New Jersey and beyond.

He has seen some of his former players become among the highest draft picks in school history, including twelve in the past four seasons. In 1996, he became one of just a few coaches in history to see two of his former pupils achieve the highest level of success in two different sports. Former Scarlet Knight Eric Young was selected to play in the 1996 All-Star Game after an outstanding season at second base for the Colorado Rockies. In football, Sam Mills, a linebacker for Hill at Montclair State, developed into a perennial Pro Bowler with the Carolina Panthers. In his 26 seasons, Fred Hill has amassed 765 career wins and boasts a .622 winning percentage. He has won 617 of those games at Rutgers in 18 seasons and has a .622 winning percentage "On the Banks." In his 19 seasons, he has won over 30 games 13 times and as many as 28 four other times. Hill has seen 14 players earn All-America acclaim (including Billy McCarthy in '01 and Jeff Frazier in '02) and 40 others earn First Team All-Conference honors. His teams have constantly been in the national rankings for excellence in defense and pitching. In fact, in 2000, Rutgers was the only team in the nation to be ranked in the top ten nationally in both batting average and team ERA.

During his tenure, 12 players have earned All-America honors and 46 players have signed professional contracts, including 21 Scarlet Knights in the past five seasons. Currently, two former Scarlet Knights – Young and Echevarria – are on major league rosters and several others are well on their way down similar paths. Hill's teaching and coaching style develops strong players and even stronger people.

As a collegiate star at Upsala, Hill earned an unbelievable 11 varsity letters. Four letters came in baseball, where he led the team in batting twice. Four more came in football, where he led the team in rushing four times and was named the football team's Most Valuable Back three times. Three more letters came in basketball, where he was voted Most Improved Player his senior year. Chosen as a Small College All-American following his final football season, Hill was honored by his alma mater in 1992 as a distinguished alumnus who has achieved excellence in his chosen profession. Following his outstanding collegiate career, Hill moved onto a professional career in the Washington Senators organization before beginning his storied coaching career.

He began his coaching career as freshman baseball coach at Upsala while also playing semi-pro baseball for the East Orange Soverals. His next move was to Clifford Scott High School, where he was an assistant baseball coach for five years and head coach for another six. During those six years, Hill led the Scotties to a 94-58 record, two state sectional championships, and also served time as an assistant football coach. He moved on to coach the Pequannock High School football team for four years and then returned to Upsala as an assistant baseball coach for three more seasons.

The tremendously successful and decorated head coach is just as dedicated to his family. He lives in Verona, NJ with his wife Evelyn and has six children: Nancy, Fred, Linda, Jim, Tracey, and Karen. He and Evelyn also have five grandchildren: Jessica, Danielle, Brian, James and Natalie. A coaching-rich family, Fred's brother Brian, currently an assistant with the Charlotte Hornets, has held NBA head coaching positions with the Orlando Magic and the Vancouver Grizzlies in the NBA and his son, Fred, is an assistant coach with the Villanova University men's basketball team.

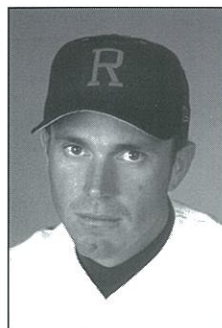

GLEN GARDNER ASSISTANT COACH 13TH SEASON

Entering his 11th season of coaching at Rutgers, Glen Gardner is one of the finest student-athletes in Rutgers' sports history. Nationally-recognized for his hitting instruction and his results at Rutgers, Gardner is the hitting and outfield coach and also assists Coach Hill in the day-to-day responsibilities of the program. Coach Gardner has also become an outstanding recruiter, and Rutgers has brought in some of the finest recruiting classes in the BIG EAST over the past few seasons, helping to elevate Rutgers to national prominence.

Gardner's success as a coach is best exhibited by the success of his players. In each of the past five seasons, Rutgers has posted a team batting average over .310 and several of its players have been ranked among the nation's best. Darren Fenster (.433) and Joe B. Cirone (.405) finished in the top 40 nationally in 2000, while Billy McCarthy (.423) accomplished the feat in 2001.

His strengths are his easy going nature and his ability to communicate with the players. His infectious, unyielding work ethic sets a standard for everyone in the program, and his rewards come when his pupils match and eclipse his numerous Scarlet Knight hitting records.

One of the most prolific hitters in Rutgers' history, Gardner was a two-time All-American selection and, in 1997, he was elected to the Rutgers Olympic Sports Hall of Fame - an honor given to only the finest student-athletes in Rutgers sports history.

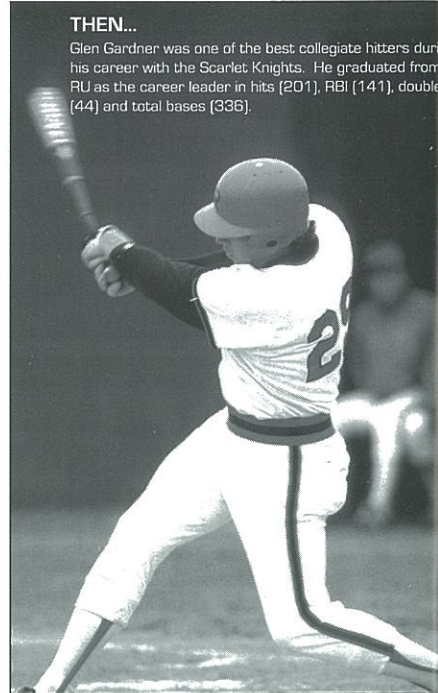
In his three seasons as an outfielder, he compiled a career .356 batting average with 23 home runs and 141 RBI. All three numbers rank among the Rutgers all-time top 10. After his junior year in 1987, the San Diego Padres drafted him in the 13th round,

but he opted to stay at RU and was selected by Atlanta the following year. Gardner advanced to Burlington, Iowa [Class A] in the Atlanta Braves organization before being struck in the eye by a batted ball, which ended a promising professional career.

Under Gardner's tutelage, several Scarlet Knights have had outstanding seasons. Gardner has worked diligently to develop the Scarlet Knight offense and he has seen several of his pupils continue on to the professional level. In the past four years, Rutgers has sent ten hitters onto the professional ranks,

including sixth-round pick Billy McCarthy (Braves) last season, fourth-round pick David DeJesus (Royals) the season before and Midwest League All-Star Pete Zoccolillo (Brewers) in 1999.

Gardner is single and resides in Point Pleasant, NJ. He played scholastically at Immaculata High School in Somerville and was named one of the top New Jersey players of the 1980's by the Star Ledger sports staff.

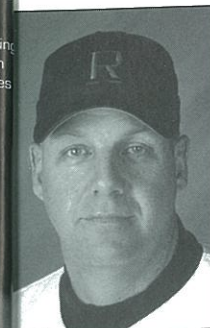

Gardner once collected 15-straight hits as a senior at Immaculata High School in 1985, as part of a 73-hit effort during that season. He also played alongside current Houston Astros first baseman Jeff Bagwell on the Chatham A's in the Cape Cod League, where Gardner was among the top in the league in hitting, home runs, and RBI in 1987.

TOM BAXTER ASSISTANT COACH 14TH SEASON

One of the most recognized coaches in New Jersey, Tom Baxter is now in his 13th season as pitching coach with the Scarlet Knights. Baxter is also a tremendous asset to the program in recruiting, especially in the South Jersey and Shore areas.

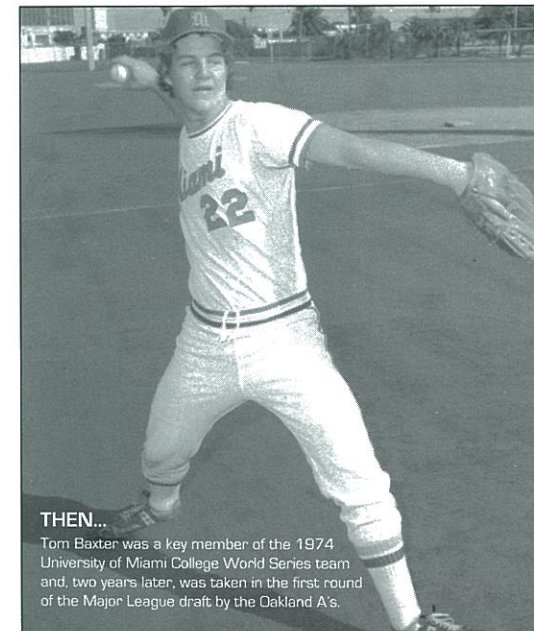
His success with the Scarlet Knight pitchers is impressive. Last season, Baxter guided a pitching staff with just two seniors to a 3.82 team ERA, which ranked 18th nationally. He also helped two players into the professional ranks - Buddy Gallagher (Rockies) and Eric Brown (Cubs). In 2000, he led the Scarlet Knight pitching staff to a 3.50 ERA, which ranked seventh in the nation while in 1996, the team's 3.53 mark was 18th best. Relief pitcher Bill Malloy was the first to go for Rutgers in the Major League draft from that 1996 team, selected by the San Francisco Giants in the eighth round. Junior left-hander Scott Madison, a third-team All-American, was selected in the 12th round of the draft by the Tampa Bay Devil Rays. Two seasons later, in 1998, Baxter sent two more pitchers - Mike Mundy and Keith Connolly - onto the professional ranks. In all, Baxter has helped 12 pitchers towards professional careers since 1990.

A tremendously successful high school and collegiate pitcher, Baxter's strength lies in his ability to relate his experiences to his current pitchers. He was drafted by the New York Mets in the sixth round of the 1973 Major League Baseball draft, but accepted a full scholarship to the University of Miami, following a 16-0, All-State senior season at Bayonne (NJ) High School. He was also voted by the Star Ledger sports staff as one of the top high school players in New Jersey during the 1970's after a standout HS career.

In his freshman season at Miami, he helped lead the Hurricanes to the 1974 College World Series with an 8-3 record. In 1976, he was drafted by the Oakland A's in the first round of the draft. His career started off impressively with a no-hitter in his first career start, but a shoulder injury ended his professional career after just two seasons.

Baxter joined Rutgers after an extremely successful career as a head baseball coach in Hudson County. In 1984, he began a three-year stint at Dickinson High School in Jersey City before moving on to Marist. He led Marist to the 1988 Parochial B State Championship before joining the staff at Rutgers.

Tom and his wife, Terri, reside in Pt. Pleasant, NJ and have three children, T.J. (17), Mary Kate (15) and Claire (9).

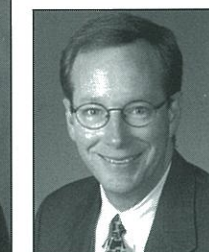


DEAN CROWELL ATHLETIC TRAINER

Rutgers always has good, young talent and 2002 was no exception. Jeff Frazier became the first freshman position player to start a season opener since Darren Fenster in 1997 and hit .356 with 13 home runs, a freshman and single-season record, en route to First Team Freshman All-America honors. Egbert made his mark on the mound, posting a 3-1 record. He also fared well in the BIG EAST Tournament, limiting nationally-ranked Notre Dame to just two runs while earning a no-decision in the championship game.

RUTGERS BASEBALL

2003 OUTLOOK

The 2003 Scarlet Knights welcome 16 newcomers to a team that won 35 games last season and advanced to the finals of the BIG EAST Championship before losing to Notre Dame, 3-2, in 10 innings. Returning, however, are several key everyday starters, including preseason All-BIG EAST pick Jeff Frazier. Frazier (.356) set a single-season school record for home runs in 2002 (13) and was named to the Baseball America Freshman All-America team. Frazier leads a group of six returning position starters – a group that will be counted upon to compensate for some of the freshness on the team's pitching staff.

"We had a lot of turnover from last season's team after graduation and the draft," said head coach Fred Hill. "We have added a great group of newcomers who have all worked hard during the fall and in preseason to prepare itself for the adjustment to college baseball. There is no doubt that they will experience some growing pains as the season progresses, but the talent and work ethic will allow for a quick adjustment."

While a bevy of newcomers will dot the Scarlet Knights' roster in 2003, the returning players are noteworthy as well.

well. Hard-nosed junior Nick Cerulo will return to his starting spot in centerfield. Cerulo opened the 2002 season as the fourth outfielder, but won the starting job about 10 games in and hit .322 the rest of the way. He provides good defense, is a solid contact hitter and owns above-average speed on the base paths. Hitting ninth last season, Cerulo was an effective table-setter at the bottom of the order.

The left field position remains open heading into the season; a pair of returning players have the inside track. Senior Leon Shade batted .387 last season in 17 games, including six starts in left field and will factor into the mix. His main competition comes from junior Jamell Rosario, a five-tool player who saw action in 27 games last season, making 10 starts.

OUTFIELD

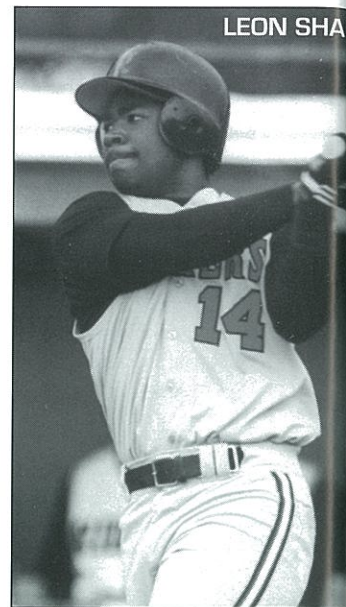
In years past, Rutgers' strength has lied in its pitching staff and while that might prove truthful again in 2003, the ability of the returning outfielders is a known commodity. Frazier, who patrolled left field last season, will shift to right field, replacing Val Majewski, who signed with the Baltimore Orioles after his selection in the third round of the MLB draft. Frazier saw significant time in right field this summer with the Danbury Westerners of the NECBL and spent the entire fall season at that position as well.

Several newcomers may also crack the lineup if they prove their mettle as the season progresses. One member of the group – John DeFendis – brings impressive credentials to Rutgers. A product of Xavier Brothers High School in NYC, DeFendis was the NY Gatorade Player of the Year and a 42nd round draft pick of the Colorado Rockies. Another talented newcomer, Jeff Grose, was the Home News Tribune Player of the Year and could work his way towards playing time. David Williams, a product of Pope John XXIII in Sparta, may red-shirt to gain strength but has shown outstanding potential at the plate.

"We could use a number of different combinations in the outfield," said Hill. "Frazier and Cerulo are the only ones returning with significant playing time from last season, so the competition will be strong. Each player brings certain qualities with them and we just need to decide which combination will work best in certain situations."

INFIELD

The infield returns two everyday starters from last season – Sam Normane and Graig Badger – as well as Matt Wolski, a three-year starter whose return following back surgery last season will add tremendous stability and talent to the lineup. Normane hit .307 last season as one of only four players to start all 57 games. While his power numbers were down (2 home runs), Normane was one of the team's top clutch hitters, batting .424 with runners in scoring position, and the hottest hitter in the BIG EAST Tournament. In addition to his steady productivity at the plate in the middle of the lineup, Normane is also above-average defensively.

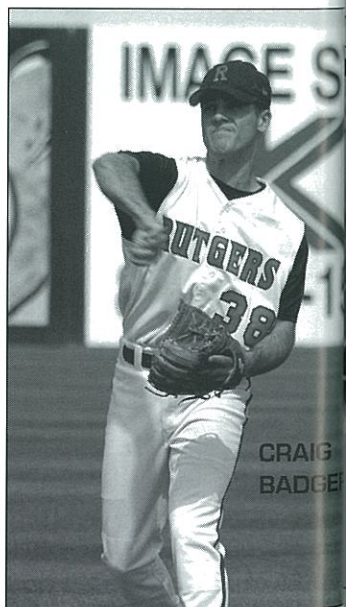

The second base situation provides a welcomed problem for Hill, as Badger and Wolski return. Hill's charge will be to find room in the lineup for both players this season and the duo could form one of the league's top 1-2 punches at the top of the lineup.

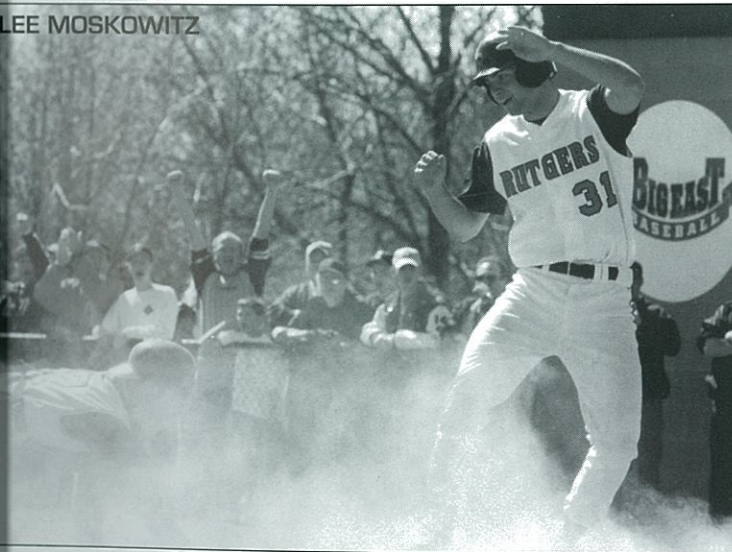
Badger hit .289 last season, primarily from the leadoff spot, but posted a .413 on-base percentage when you factor in his team-high 37 walks. An adept bunter (seven bunt base-hits) and heady base runner (12 stolen bases in 15 attempts), Badger is at his best on the basepaths.

Wolski hit over .340 in each of his previous two full seasons (2000, 2001), but was limited to just two games last season before back surgery in May. Entering the season healthy, he looks to regain the form that made him such a key component of the 2001 team that won a school-record 42 games. A strong defender and team leader, Wolski's plate discipline and bat control make him a natural for the second spot in the order.

Adding to the second base mix is sophomore Cory Rodriguez, who batted .356 last season in a myriad of roles – second base, third base and designated hitter. Rodriguez is a strong hitter and solid defender who is bound to find his way into the lineup. He may compete at third base with junior Vinny Esposito, who appears to have the inside track on the starting job at the hot corner. A converted outfielder, Esposito is another hard-nosed player who showed some left-handed power in limited time last season.

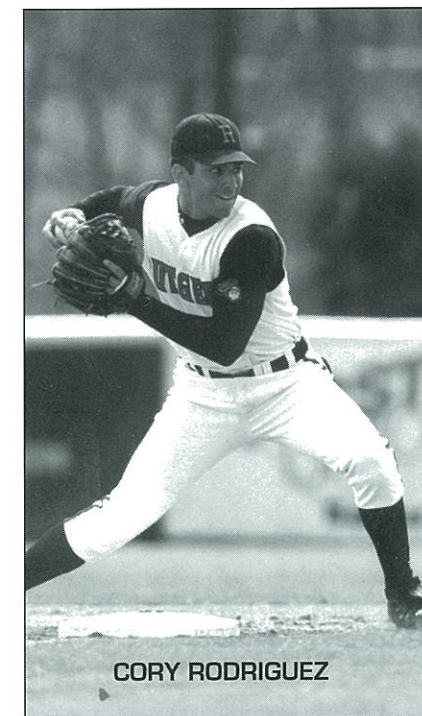

The shortstop position falls to sophomore Jason Grover, who will replace Tim Sweeney, drafted by the Montreal Expos last June. Grover is a sure-handed fielder whose added size and strength will augment his offensive game. He played in just nine games last season, but performed well in fall practices, earning the nod.

The infield features several others who may push for playing time. The most likely candidate is junior Rich Canuso, who drew rave reviews in the fall for his increased performance. A big, strong hitter with raw power, Canuso's extra-base ability will afford him the opportunity for ample playing time. A quartet of freshmen – SS Mike Bionde, 3B Chris Lillis, 3B Aaron Richard and 1B Steve Hook – adds depth and further options.

"We have some really talented infielders," said Hill. "Not to sound redundant, but we could do some different things with our

infield alignment. We have confidence in everyone's ability and the guys who are playing well will see their names in the lineup."

CATCHER

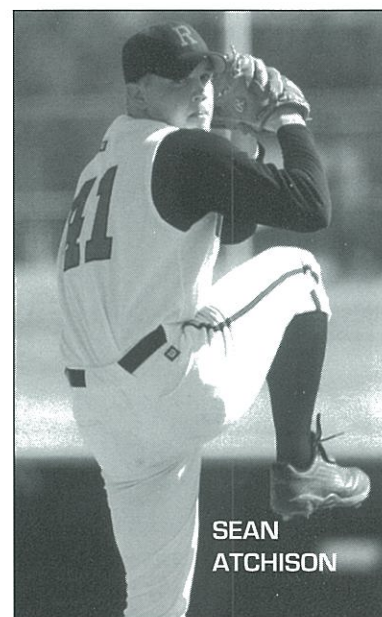
Senior Alberto Vasquez has the starting catching job locked up after a strong 2002 campaign. Vasquez hit .259 last season, but handled the pitching staff well and threw well from behind the plate. As one of four potential seniors in the lineup, Vasquez's leadership abilities will come in handy.

When in need of a rest, Hill can turn to sophomore Lee Moskowitz. Moskowitz batted .286 last season with three home runs in just 28 at bats, showing good power. In addition, despite his positional constraints, Moskowitz is also one of the team's fastest runners, which will help his chances for playing time. Fellow sophomore Colin Gaynor, a transfer from Northeastern University, will compete for playing time as well. Gaynor batted .239 as a true freshman last season. He could also see time at first base, in the outfield, or at designated hitter. True freshman Jeff Miller gives Hill yet another option.

PITCHING

The pitching staff suffered two last minute blows, as senior Bobby Brownlie decided to forego his senior year to pursue a professional career and David Santiago shut it down after enduring a second surgery on his right arm. With those two departures, the role of "staff ace" falls to sophomore Jack Egbert, who posted a 3-1 mark with a 2.85 ERA in non-conference action last season. Egbert provided a glimpse of his 2003 potential in last season's BIG EAST Tournament championship game, limiting nationally-ranked Notre Dame to just two runs in 5.2 innings of work.

Junior college transfer Shaun Parker, a left-handed pitcher, is experienced and is likely to grab one of the other starting roles. Parker was 13-4 in two seasons at Mercer County College and fared well this summer with the Riverpoint (RI) Royals of the NECBL. Sophomore Tom Malafronte and freshman Jim Jansen have the inside track on the third starter role, although nothing is firmly set.

The key to the season may be the ability of Hill, along with pitching coach Tom Baxter, to manage a staff that has just two returning pitchers (Egbert and senior Sean Atchison) with more than 10 innings of Division I experience. Atchison is the wild-card of the group; he excelled in a starting role in 2001 (2-0, 1.17) but struggled through a tough 2002 campaign. Sophomores Aaron Kalb and Dave Caffrey will also see significant innings this season after pitching just 8.1 combined innings last season.

The long list of newcomers who could see mound time include Lilis, OJ DeChristofano (A First Team NJ All-Stater in 2002), Grose, Matt Pustay (the NJ State Prep Player of the Year), Josh Greenstein, Eric Dial and Bobby Acampora. Steve Healing, a promising hurler from Brick, will red-shirt following "Tommy John" surgery.

"The pitching staff lacks experience, so we could take some lumps, but we have a lot of arms and will ask everyone to be ready," said Hill. "Beyond (Egbert) and (Atchison), there is quite a bit of inexperience. Our job will be to prepare them to compete at this level."

THE SCHEDULE

Rutgers opens its season with a three-game series at Old Dominion, followed by a trip to the Music City Challenge in Nashville, TN, pre-set tournament that includes games with Vanderbilt, Middle Tennessee State, Lipscomb. The third weekend series is set for Georgia Tech, the top-ranked team in Baseball America preseason top 25 poll, while the following weekend begins a 12-trip to Florida, which includes a three-game series at Miami, individual games with Florida Atlantic and Florida International, and a two-game set with Harvard.

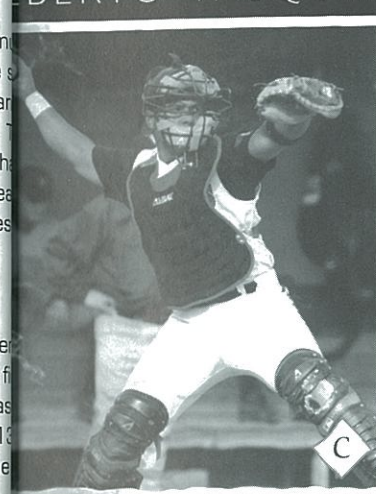
"The beginning of our season can't be much tougher," said Hill. "We have had some success early on the past couple of years and would like to continue that this season. The bottom line, however, is to play teams that will help us prepare for the BIG EAST season and our schedule this year accomplishes that."

The remainder of the schedule features meetings with every league opponent, as well as non-conference matchups with perennial foes such as Princeton, Delaware and Monmouth. RU's first home game falls on April 1 (vs. Rider), 21 games into the season. The Scarlet Knights' first home BIG EAST weekend, April 12-13, features in-state rival Seton Hall, while other teams visiting the Class of '53 Complex this year include St. John's (April 17), Virginia Tech (April 26-27) and Notre Dame (May 10-11). For the fourth-consecutive season, the BIG EAST Baseball Championships, reduced to a four-team field for the second-straight year, will be held at Commerce Bank Ballpark in Bridgewater, NJ, home of the Somerset Patriots, from May 22-24, with the first round of NCAA play scheduled for the ensuing weekend.

"We have a chance to be really good this year, if all the pieces come together," said Hill. "Between the returning players and newcomers, we have a great base of talent. Any time you introduce so many young players into a league as competitive as the BIG EAST, there are going to be some growing pains. If we can keep those to a minimum, we should be just fine."

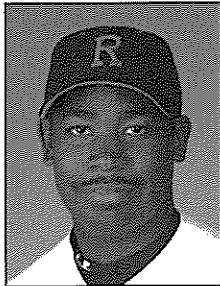
Rodriguez was the first to join, finding his way into the ROTC program last spring. Entering his first season of collegiate baseball and joining the ROTC might seem daunting, but Rodriguez handled the double duty with ease.

"I was going to go to West Point initially, so I wanted to try it out here and not worry about going into the Army," said Rodriguez. "The program here is very flexible and the atmosphere is great."

Rosario also had a prior interest, after being recruited by the Naval Academy during a stellar scholastic career in Vineland, NJ. Rodriguez's leap into the ROTC world paved the way for Rosario, who switched his major to criminal justice and soon realized the benefit of an ROTC experience.

"This provides me with a big head start on a career in criminal justice," said Rosario. "It will open a lot of doors down the road."

Rodriguez and Rosario are two of about 120 students in the Army ROTC program, which includes about 15 student-athletes. The ROTC is constantly looking for more student-athlete involvement - and this duo is proof-positive that the experience can be a mutually beneficial one.

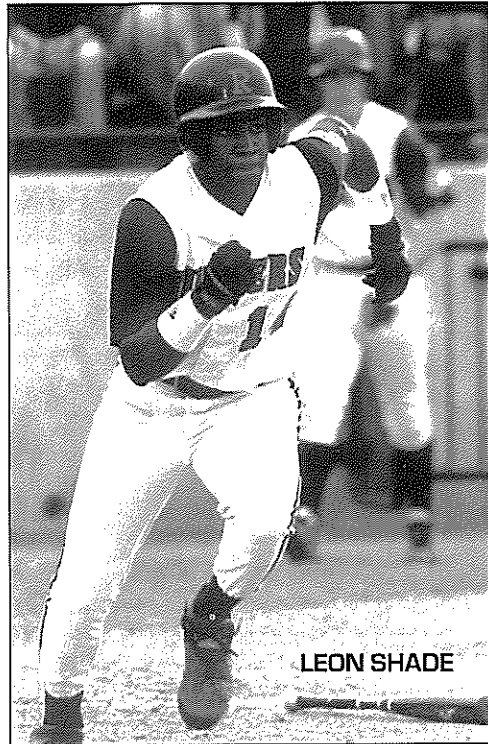

Taking some summer classes to get a jump on his college career, Shade was about three weeks away from beginning the fall semester when his mother, Clare, received a phone call from RU head coach Fred Hill, saying that Shade had been admitted to Rutgers and could begin taking classes in the fall. Without hesitation, Shade packed his belongings again and returned to the Garden State.

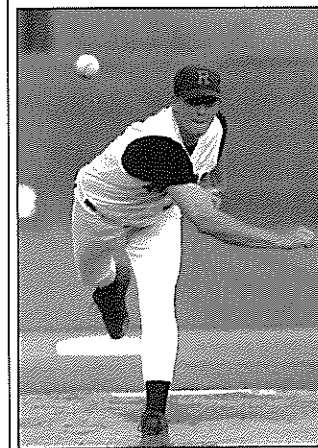
"I had made friends (at WVU) and hated to start all over again, but I knew I needed to come home," said Shade. "Rutgers was where I wanted to be in the first place. There was really no hesitation on my part. It was already August and we were less than a month away from starting classes in the fall, so there was no reason to think (Coach Hill) would call at that point."

After sitting out the 1999 season to concentrate on academics, Shade has played three seasons with the Scarlet Knights and, in May, will graduate with a degree in Labor Studies. He regained his fourth year of eligibility through hard work, completing 75% of his degree requirements by the end of the spring, 2002 semester.

Considering Rutgers' success vs. the Mountaineers during Shade's career (11-0 since 1999), it is safe to say that he made the right decision.

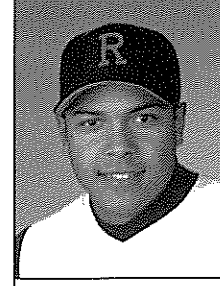
SURGERY ENDS SANTIAGO'S CAREER

Right-handed pitcher David Santiago left the Rutgers baseball team in early February after absorbing another setback following arm surgery over the summer. After enduring two surgeries during his collegiate career, he appeared unlikely to be healthy in time for the 2003 season. Santiago underwent a second shoulder reconstruction surgery on July 10, 2002.

A small consolation, Santiago's last appearance in a Scarlet Knight uniform was easily his best. Starting

the third game of the BIG EAST Tournament, facing elimination after an opening-round loss to Notre Dame, Santiago worked 7.1 brilliant innings, holding the Hokies to just two runs in a 6-2 win, which advanced Rutgers to the finals of the tournament. Santiago allowed eight hits and just one walk in the game, striking out four to even his record at 2-2. The win afforded Rutgers a rematch with Notre Dame and after a 4-3 RU win, the Irish captured the 2002 BIG EAST title with a 3-2, 10-inning victory in the winner-take-all contest.

Santiago pitched 129 innings in his career, allowing 137 hits and 52 earned runs (3.62 ERA). He finished with a 9-4 career record, including a 5-0 mark in 2001. As a freshman in 1999, Santiago appeared in a career-high 22 games, all in relief, and earned two saves while posting a 4.45 ERA.

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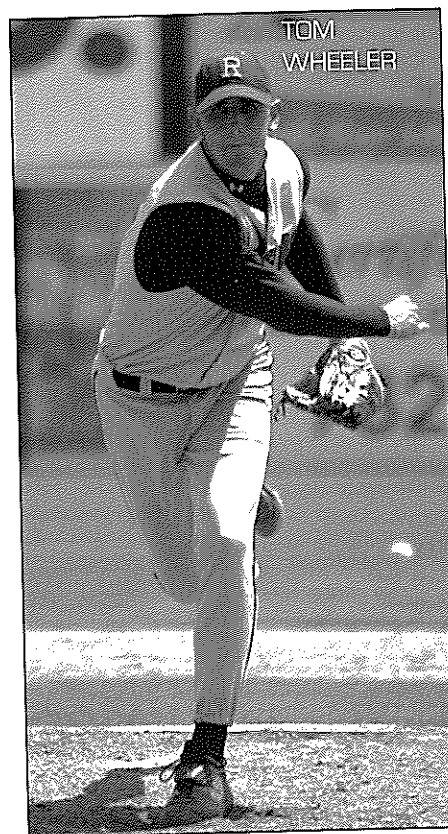
SEASON REVIEW



Bobby Brownlie and Val Majewski were among the first 80 players selected in the Major League Baseball draft and represented the two highest draft picks under head coach Fred Hill. Brownlie, the 21st overall selection of the Chicago Cubs, was the first RU player chosen in the first round since Jeff Torborg in 1963. Majewski, a recruited walk-on, was a third-round selection of the Baltimore Orioles and developed into one of the best pure hitters in college baseball.

2002 SEASON REVIEW

One day after taking nationally-ranked Notre Dame to the finals of the BIG EAST Tournament, the NCAA Division I Baseball Committee announced the 64-team field for the 2002 Division I Baseball Championship and, for the first time in four years, failed to include Rutgers University. The Scarlet Knights, who missed the tournament for the first time since 1997, ended their 2002 season with a 35-22 mark, which included two wins over Miami and Notre Dame and a trip to the finals of the BIG EAST Baseball Championship.

Rutgers began its season with an 8-4 record, including two wins over defending National Champion Miami, before losing seven of its next eight games, including five-straight in BIG EAST play. The Scarlet Knights then clawed back to win 13 of their next 15 games and finished with a 20-8 run.

"It's tough to know that we were so close to getting an automatic bid just two days ago and now our season is over," said fifth-year senior Ryan Molchan. "We played evenly with Notre Dame, had some good early-season wins and thought we were worthy of a chance to continue our season."

In the BIG EAST Tournament, Rutgers dropped the opener, 8-3, to top-seeded Notre Dame, but battled back with three-straight wins, including a win over Notre Dame, and fell in the final, 3-2, to the Irish in 10 innings.

"It was disappointing to not be included," said head coach Fred Hill. "The BIG EAST Conference is a strong conference and there is a lot of parity in our league. I think our team was playing well at the end and deserving of a bid. Our exclusion will take nothing away from the effort our teams made to fight back in the conference and in the BIG EAST Tournament."

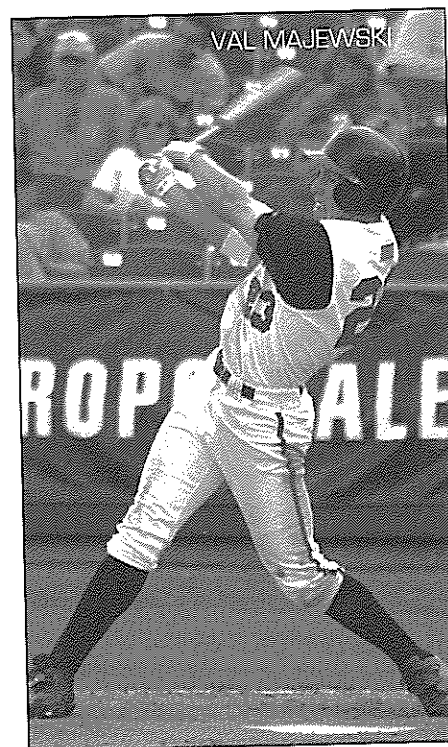
Considered one of several bubble teams, Rutgers was left out of the mix. Georgia [30-27] lost seven straight and 11 of 12

entering the NCAA Tournament, but earned a No. 2 seed. Miami, which posted a 30-26 mark, did so with three wins over NY Tech [27-25] on the final weekend of the season and earned a No. 3 seed.

"Our kids did a nice job coming back in the BIG EAST Tournament and I thought we had some other quality wins during the season," added Hill. "It's a tough way to end the year, but we have to move forward and start thinking about next year."

Rutgers was led offensively by its corner outfielders, freshman Jeff Frazier and junior Val Majewski. Frazier led the team in home runs (13) and RBI (54), setting a single-season record for home runs in a season. Majewski batted a team-high .364 with 11 home runs and 51 RBI, hitting .556 in the BIG EAST Tournament. As a team, RU hit .298 and used strong contributions from sophomore CF Nick Cerulo (.322) and junior Steve Normane (.307).

The pitching staff was strong once again, posting a 3.98 ERA that was among the best in the conference. Leading the way was senior Tom Wheeler, who won a team-high nine games and posted a 3.40 ERA. He finished his career with a 25-7 record, making him the second-winningest pitcher in school history, one win behind Darrin Winston, who won 26 from 1985-88.

Fellow senior Tom Crohan was 5-4, and helped RU beat Notre Dame, 4-3, in the championship round of the BIG EAST Tournament, forcing a winner-take-all game. Freshman Jack Egbert (3-1, 2.85) and junior David Santiago (2-2, 3.72) pitched well in mid-week action and also did a tremendous job in the BIG EAST Tournament. Santiago beat Virginia Tech, 6-2, in the third round, while Egbert, making his first start against a conference opponent, held the Irish to two runs in 5.2 innings in the title game.

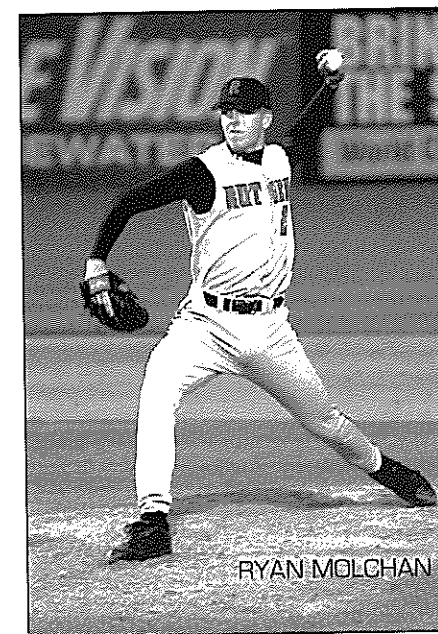

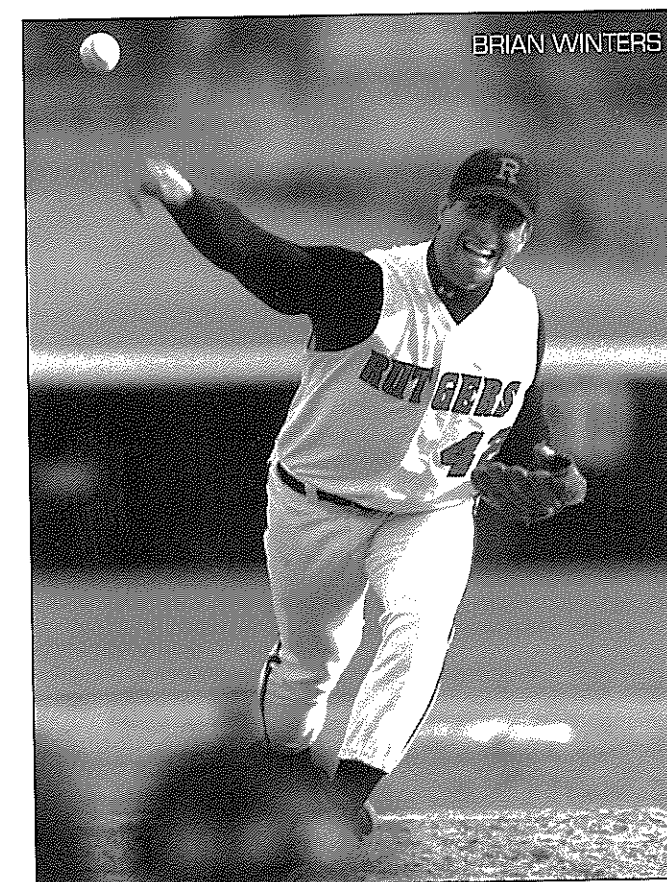

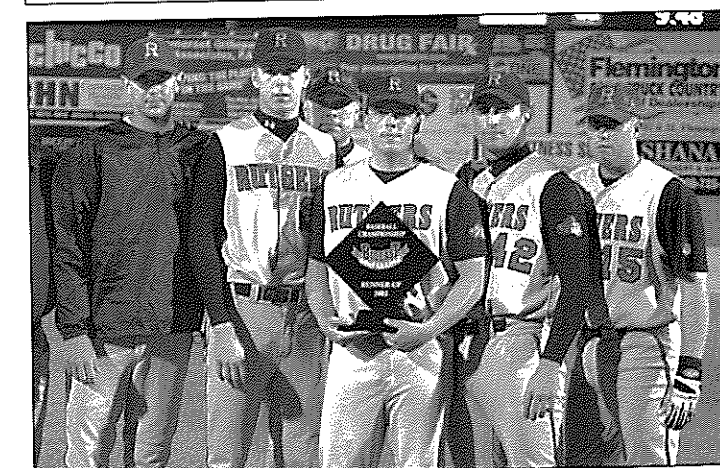

The bullpen was one of the team's strengths, as senior Ryan Molchan tied the single-season save record with nine, while winning three games and posting a team-best 1.93 ERA. He allowed just seven earned runs in 32.2 innings. Junior Brian Winters (2-1, 2.42, 2 saves) was brilliant in a set-up role and did not allow an earned run over his final 12 appearances, spanning 14.1 innings.

Rutgers won 35 games for the fourth-straight year and won 30 or more for the 13th time in 19 seasons under head coach Fred Hill.

RICHARD L. McCORMICK

President of the University



Dr. Richard L. McCormick, 54, assumed office as the 19th President of Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, on December 1, 2002. Dr. McCormick was previously President of the University of Washington, where he was credited with recruiting and retaining outstanding faculty and implementing highly effective teaching, research, and funding initiatives. Educated as a historian, Dr. McCormick has enjoyed a distinguished career as a valued faculty member, respected scholar, and consummate university administrator.

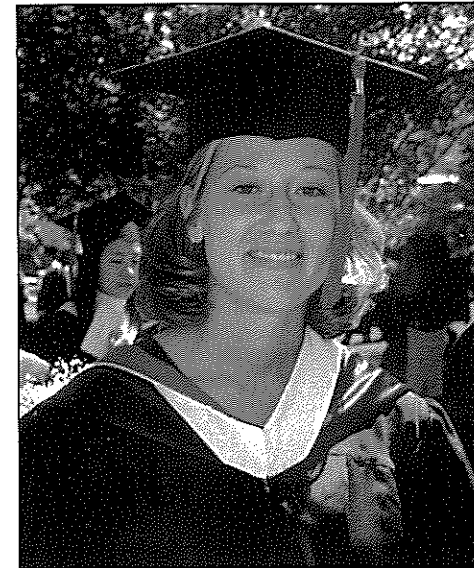
After earning his B.A. in American Studies from Amherst College in 1969 and his Ph.D. in History from Yale University in 1976, Dr. McCormick began his career in academe as an Assistant Professor of History at Rutgers-New Brunswick. He rose through the ranks at Rutgers to become Professor of History (1985), Chair of the Department of History (1987-1989), and Dean of Arts and Sciences (1989-1992). From Rutgers, Dr. McCormick moved in 1992 to the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where he served as Executive Vice Chancellor and Provost and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs until 1995 when he became President of the University of Washington.

The author of three books and numerous articles, Dr. McCormick is a recognized scholar of American political history. In 1985, Dr. McCormick held a prestigious John Simon Guggenheim Foundation Fellowship as well as a Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars Fellowship.

Born in New Brunswick, New Jersey, and a graduate of Piscataway High School, Dr. McCormick is the son of Richard P. McCormick, an eminent Professor of History at Rutgers, whose career at the university spans decades and after whom the McCormick residence hall located on the Busch campus is named. Dr. McCormick's mother, Katheryne McCormick, enjoyed a long and successful career as an administrator at Rutgers.

Dr. McCormick is married to Dr. Suzanne Lebsock, a Professor in the University of Washington's Department of History, whose fields of scholarship and teaching include the history of women, United States social history, and the history of the South. Dr. Lebsock also held a Guggenheim Fellowship and recently held a MacArthur Foundation Fellowship, sometimes called a "genius" award. Prior to joining the faculty of the University of Washington in 1995, she was a Professor of History at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill from 1993 to 1995. She advanced from Assistant Professor to Professor at Rutgers between 1977 and 1993, and was Acting Director of Women's Studies at Rutgers from 1986 to 1987.

Dr. McCormick and Dr. Lebsock have two children, Betsy and Michael.



History

Rutgers began its history in 1766 as Queen's College, the eighth institution of higher education to be founded in the American colonies. It became Rutgers College in 1825, honoring Colonel Henry Rutgers, a former trustee and Revolutionary War veteran. The University of Newark merged with Rutgers in 1946 and the College of South Jersey in Camden was incorporated into Rutgers in 1950. Legislative acts in 1945 and 1956 designated all its divisions as The State University of New Jersey. Rutgers is the only university in the nation to have been a colonial college, a land-grant college and a state university.

Rutgers Today

With 29 degree-granting divisions, Rutgers is New Jersey's only comprehensive public research university and a member of the prestigious Association of American Universities (AAU), a select group of 63 public and private research institutions. Under the leadership of President Francis L. Lawrence, Rutgers has embarked on an ambitious course to reach its goal of becoming one of the nation's premier public research universities by the year 2010.

Several years ago, in an exceptionally collaborative process, some 250 members of the faculty and administration developed proposals that support growth areas identified in the university's broad-ranging strategic plan, "A New Vision for Excellence." The initiatives seek to meet the present and future needs of the state for a highly skilled work force that will require access to lifelong edu-

cation; to address needs for scientific and technological advances to stimulate the economy and provide New Jersey industries with a competitive edge; and to fulfill the service needs of the citizens of the state in an increasingly diverse democratic society.

The strategic plan, which capitalizes on the university's diverse strengths, moved forward during the 1999-2000 academic year under the stewardship of the Committee for the Future. The university has invested \$20 million over five years to support the development of more than 100 innovative, multidisciplinary programs on all three campuses. These resources have provided excellent leverage; to date more than \$174 million in external funding has been generated by these projects. Twelve implementation committees, representing business, cognitive science and neuroscience, creative arts, education, engineering, environmental studies, information science and technology, international studies, liberal arts and sciences, life sciences and agriculture, public policy and law, and women's scholarship and leadership, are continuing to generate and support new initiatives that will enhance Rutgers' leadership as a major research university.

Work on the communications infrastructure being built through RUNet 2000 will continue throughout the year, with the digging of trenches and the installation of internal building wiring and external cabling to link Rutgers' campuses. Believed to be the largest project of its kind at any American university, the four-year effort provides data, video and voice services to approximately 260 Rutgers buildings.

Over the past two years, RUNet 2000 wiring had been completed in more than 50 academic buildings and residence halls on the university's Busch, College Avenue, Douglass, Livingston, and Newark campuses.

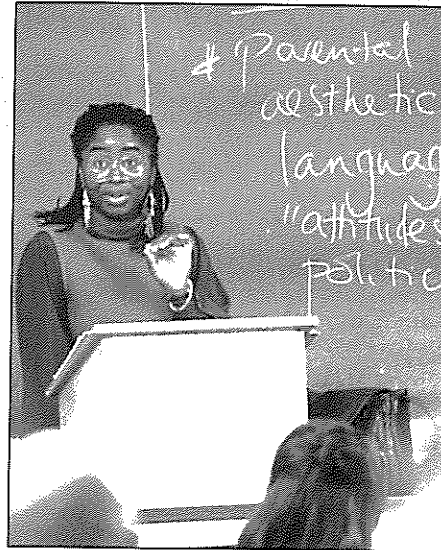

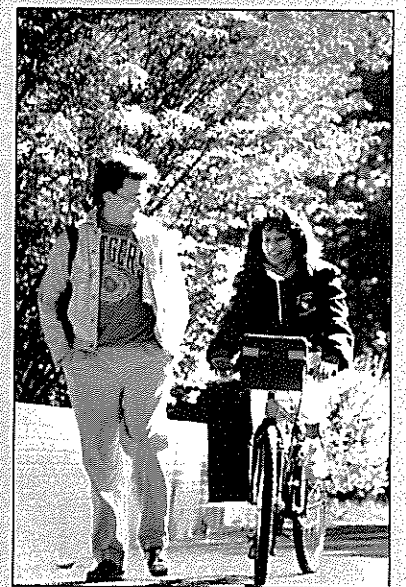
Financial Aid

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI

Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, has produced numerous alumni who have achieved high levels of success in their chosen fields. All told, Rutgers has over 250,000 living alumni around the world, 150,000 of whom presently live in New Jersey.

2002 INDUCTEES

Judge Abraham Abuchowski CCAS '70, GSNB '75
A brilliant and innovative researcher recognized for his ability to blend scientific knowledge with business acumen. He is a pioneer in developing drugs to treat metabolic diseases such as "bubble boy syndrome" and leukemia. In 1983, Dr. Abuchowski founded Enzon, Inc., which became the first New Jersey biotechnology company to receive Food and Drug Administration approval for Adagen, the first successful treatment for bubble boy syndrome. Enzon also developed Oncaspar, which is used to treat children with acute lymphoblastic leukemia. Dr. Abuchowski served Enzon as chairman and CEO, helping it mature into a fully integrated pharmaceutical company. In 1996, he left Enzon to start New Paradigm Consulting, Inc. His numerous honors include New Jersey Entrepreneur of the Year, Inc. Magazine's Entrepreneur Business Leader of the Year, and awards from the Public Health Service, the National Organization for Rare Disorders and the Leukemia Society of America.

Arthur R. Brown, Jr. GSNB '77
Has dedicated his professional life to the ideal of preserving agriculture and farms. He served as a county agricultural agent with Rutgers Cooperative Extension for several years before being named New Jersey's Secretary of Agriculture in 1982 by Gov. Tom Keen. He was reappointed to that post by Gov. Jim Florio and Gov. Christie Whitman, serving nearly 20 years. Many important programs bear Mr. Brown's innovative touch, such as the Jersey Fresh marketing program, which has become a model for nearly every other state in the country. He was instrumental in establishing the Garden State Trust Fund to ensure the preservation of a million acres of farmland, open space and historic properties into the new millennium.

James G. Cullen RC '64
One of the nation's foremost experts on telecommunications policy and regulatory affairs. Assured the success of the Bell Atlantic-NYNEX merger. He joined New Jersey Bell in 1954, eventually rising to director for corporate planning at AT&T, then president of Bell Atlantic Enterprises, New Jersey Bell, and the Bell Atlantic Corp. He retired as Bell Atlantic president and COO in 2000 after playing a leading role in its successful merger with GTE and the creation of Verizon. The former co-chairman of Gov. Jim Florio's New Jersey Quality Education Commission now chairs the national steering committee for the Rutgers Campaign: Creating the Future Today. In addition to serving on the boards of Johnson & Johnson, Prudential, and Agilent, he has been a member of the executive committee of the New Jersey Performing Arts Center and a trustee of the Newark Museum.



Janet Evanovich DC '65
South River native Janet Schneider Evanovich has remained true to her Garden State roots with her immensely popular comedy-crime novels featuring bounty hunter Stephanie Plum. The Plum novels, which include the best-selling *Four to Score and Seven Up*, have been described as part Indiana Jones, part "Moonlighting," and part *Midnight Run*. The eighth installment in the series, *Hard Eight*, was published in June 2002. Her literary

endeavors have engendered a family business, Evanovich, Inc., which includes her husband, Peter Evanovich, a mathematician with a doctorate from Rutgers, and their son and daughter. Mrs. Evanovich was awarded the Dilys Award by the Independent Mystery Booksellers Association and the Crime Writers Association's John Creasey Memorial Dagger.

C. Reed Funk GSNB '62
The former Utah farm boy, who became the world's leading turf-grass breeder and researcher, joined Cook College as an instructor in 1956, earned his doctorate in agronomy, and led one of the world's most productive turf grass-breeding programs for 34 years. Grasses he has developed are so well-known and favored that they grow in the White House Rose Garden and at Yankee Stadium. "Manhattan" perennial ryegrass and "Rebel" tall fescue are among the key commercial varieties for which he holds eight plant patents and 50 U.S. Plant Variety Protection Certificates. Mr. Funk contributed to the revolutionary discovery that grass-dwelling fungi

called endophytes can produce and stimulate plants to produce natural pesticides. His many honors include induction into the New Jersey Inventors Hall of Fame, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Distinguished Service Award for Agricultural Research, and fellowship in the American Society of Agronomy and the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Louis Lasagna RC '43
Researcher, educator, ethicist, and prolific author, Louis Lasagna is so widely esteemed for his studies of the safety and efficacy of medicines that he is acknowledged as the "father of clinical pharmacology." His 1954 paper on the placebo response was cited by *The Lancet* as one of the landmark papers of the twentieth century. His intimate involvement in all aspects of the U.S. drug approval system spans four decades and includes chairmanship of the National Committee to Review Current Procedures for Approval of New Drugs for Cancer and AIDS, under the aegis of the President's Cancer Panel. Currently, Dr. Lasagna is dean of Tufts' Sackler School of Graduate Biomedical Sciences. He has written about ethical issues facing doctors and researchers, including the books *Life, Death, and the Doctor* and *The Doctors' Dilemmas*. New graduates at several medical schools swear to an updated version of the Hippocratic Oath proposed by Dr. Lasagna in 1962. His numerous honors include the Modern Medicine Distinguished Achievement Award. In 1993, he received the Rutgers Medal, the university's highest award.

James O'Brien RC '57
One of the world's foremost meteorologists and oceanographers, and an expert on El Niño. After graduating from Rutgers College, he was commissioned a U.S. Air Force officer assigned to meteorology. Within a decade, he had his doctorate and was a full professor at Florida State University, where he directs the Center for Ocean-Atmospheric Prediction Studies and is a Robert G. Lawton Distinguished Professor of Meteorology and Oceanography. One of the first scientists to recognize the role of tropical oceans in the El Niño/Southern Oscillation phenomenon. His many honors include the Sverdrup Gold Medal in Air-Sea Interaction, and he is a Fellow of the American and Royal Meteorological societies and the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Robert Pinsky RC '62
Robert Pinsky is America's poet. For decades now, his poems have appeared regularly in such magazines as *The New Yorker* and *The New Republic*. He is widely anthologized, and has received dozens of prestigious citations, including awards from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Guggenheim Foundation, and the American Academy of Arts and Letters. He recently completed a three-year appointment as United States Poet Laureate and Consultant in Poetry to the Library of Congress. He founded and currently heads the Favorite Poem Project at Boston University. His first book of verse, *Sadness and Happiness*, was published in 1975, when he was 35 years old. Five volumes of his poems have followed: *An Explanation of America* (1980); *History of My Heart* (1984); *The Want Bone* (1990); *The Figured Wheel: New and Collected Poems 1966-1996* (1996); and *Jersey Rain* (2000). The Figured Wheel was nominated for the Pulitzer Prize in Poetry and was awarded the Ambassador Book Award in Poetry of the English Speaking Union.

Sylvia B. Pressler NLaw '58
The highest-ranking jurist in the Appellate Division of the Superior Court of New Jersey, where she presides over 34 appellate judges. Judge Pressler graduated with high honors in her law school class, went into private practice, then became a hearing examiner for the New Jersey Division on Civil Rights. In 1991, the New Jersey Supreme Court, which calls on her to join its deliberations when there is a vacancy, named her to a commission to examine the state's system for disciplining lawyers. Last year, she was asked to sit on the state Supreme Court's Commission on the Rules of Professional Conduct. She also chairs the court's Civil Practice Committee. She is a life member of the American Law Institute, longtime chair of the New Jersey Supreme Court's Civil Practice Committee, and an officer in the Chief Judges Conference of the Judicial Division of the American Bar Association.

Thomas A. Renyi RC '67, GSM '68
Chairman and CEO of The Bank of New York Company, Inc. and The Bank of New York, the nation's oldest bank. Mr. Renyi has been credited with the company's consistent increase in profits and with its transformation from a traditional commercial bank to a premier global financial services company. Joined the bank's management development program in 1971 after serving as a first lieutenant in military intelligence with the U.S. Army in Vietnam. In 1992, he was elected president and a director of the company, and vice chairman and a director of the bank. He was appointed CEO of the bank in 1996 and of the company in 1997, and to his current position in 1998. Mr. Renyi is a member of the university's Board of Governors, the Rutgers Foundation Board of Overseers, and the Faculty of Management's Board of Advisors, and he is a past member of the Board of Trustees. In addition, he is a member of the New York Botanical Garden's Board of Managers and the Board of Directors of Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts, Inc.

Eduardo C. Robreno CLaw '78
At just 15 years old, Eduardo C. Robreno fled his native Cuba in 1951 because he was afraid of being jailed for his anti-Castro views. After growing up with foster parents in Florida and Massachusetts, he graduated from college and earned his law degree. Following service as a trial attorney with the Justice Department's Antitrust Division, he practiced for 11 years with two Philadelphia law firms. Judge Robreno now sits on the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania and is one of the nation's leading Latino-American jurists. He is the first Cuban-American on any federal court and the first Latino on the federal bench in Pennsylvania. Judge Robreno also serves as an adjunct professor at Rutgers' School of Law-Camden. He is a founding member and past board member of the Hispanic Bar Association of Pennsylvania, and has been a Fellow of the American Law Institute, which helps shape law in all 50 states. In 2000, the Rutgers Black Law Students Association gave him its Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Champions for Social Justice and Equality Award.

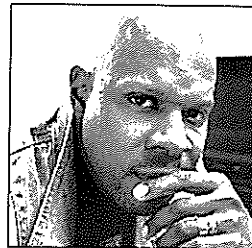

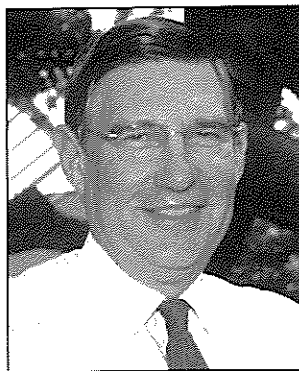

ROBERT E. MULCAHY III

Director of Athletics



Innovation and achievement have been the hallmarks of Robert Mulcahy's tenure as Director of Athletics at Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey. Since coming to Rutgers in 1998, Mulcahy has been the guiding force in the overall growth and development of the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics. He is committed to the ideal that Rutgers Athletics will provide a meaningful experience for its student athletes.

Mulcahy's vision for Rutgers Athletics has led the division to unprecedented growth and accomplishment. Wide-ranging improvements in facilities have allowed the division to function at greater efficiency, thus enabling opportunity for greater success for Rutgers student athletes, both in the classroom and on the playing field.

With a strategic plan now in place, Mulcahy has brought reality to this vision. He has been responsible for raising the division's endowment by nearly \$4 million, and was instrumental in developing and securing outside revenue totaling \$20 million, resulting in the improvement of a number of facilities.

Capital projects from this funding have resulted in expanded media facilities and a modern, state-of-the-art academic support laboratory in the Louis Brown Athletic Center. Other improvements to the RAC include an expanded weight training facility in addition to new office space for coaches and administrators, which have allowed the senior athletic administration to become centrally located in that facility for the first time. Future priorities include the enhancement of the Hale Center at Rutgers Stadium and further upgrading the Louis Brown Athletic Center.

Mulcahy has also placed much emphasis in the area of academic support, which has been reflected by significant gains in the classroom. The department remains committed to its goals of exceeding the grade point averages and graduation rates of the general student population. Increased academic support has included the addition of full-time personnel, computer labs and tutorial services. Programs such as the comprehensive RU Strong/LifeSkills have been bolstered to help ensure a positive and meaningful experience for the Rutgers student-athlete.

Under Mulcahy's leadership, Rutgers student-athletes are standouts in the community as well. Among the many projects they organized and participated in were the Student Athlete Advisory Committee annual holiday toy drive, a University-wide Blood Drive, reading programs at area schools, and visits to area hospitals.

The Annual Report, which chronicles the division's achievements and was produced for the first time ever following the 1998-99 academic year under Mulcahy's direction, includes the cumulative grade point averages of each varsity team.

The Division continues to be a leader in its commitment to gender equity, and has increased funding for scholarships and facility improvements in that area.

Mulcahy has also overseen the institution of a comprehensive marketing and promotion plan to further increase corporate revenue and enhance the overall image of the athletic program. Corporate sponsorship has risen each year during Mulcahy's administration, and will continue to grow as Rutgers Athletics continues its partnership with one of the nation's leading firms, Nelligan Sports Marketing.

All the while, the Rutgers athletic program continues to grow and improve on the field of play. This past season, the Rutgers men's and women's soccer teams advanced to the NCAA Sweet 16, and the forecast is bright for both the football program, led by head coach Greg Schiano, and the men's basketball program, which reached post-season play under the direction of first-year head coach Gary Waters this past season.

In the 2001-2002 season, the Rutgers men's programs finished third (out of 14 schools) in the BIG EAST Commissioner's Trophy standings, while the Rutgers women's teams finished seventh – just five points out of second place in a hotly-contested race.

Other highlights under Mulcahy's watch have included the outstanding performance of the women's basketball team, which advanced to the 2000 NCAA Final Four and 1999 NCAA Elite Eight.

The Scarlet Knights' baseball team won the 2000 BIG EAST Conference championship and has made consecutive appearances in the NCAA Tournament four of the past five seasons, and advanced to the championship game of its 2001 NCAA Regional before falling to eventual College World Series participant Nebraska.

Mulcahy came to Rutgers on April 15, 1998, after an extraordinary 19-year tenure as President and CEO of the New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority. Under Mulcahy's leadership, the NJSEA developed into the nation's premier sports and entertainment venue. Among his noteworthy achievements at the Meadowlands included establishing New Jersey as the home of the finest college athletic competition in the country, including the creation of the Kickoff Classic Football Game, attracting the Army-Navy game to the facility on three occasions, and hosting eight NCAA Men's Basketball Eastern Regionals and the last Final Four ever to be held in an Arena in 1996. Mulcahy led the negotiations that resulted in the NHL's Devils, the NFL's Jets, and Major League Soccer's MetroStars calling the Meadowlands their home.

Mulcahy's leadership at the NJSEA helped develop legislation which led to its overseeing the reconstruction of Rutgers Stadium and building new soccer, lacrosse and track and field facilities.

The Sports and Exposition Authority matured from primarily a horse racing and professional football business into a statewide engine for sports, entertainment and exposition development during Mulcahy's tenure. By the end of his tenure at the Meadowlands, the Sports Complex was hosting 600 events a year, drawing seven million visitors annually to such attractions as the Giants, Jets, Devils, Nets, and horse racing, as well as a wide variety of family shows and concerts.

Mulcahy's lifelong passion for scholastic and college athletics, and his undying commitment to public service, has not gone unnoticed. The New York Times described his tenure with the NJSEA as one of "quiet fervor and foresight, establishing the Meadowlands as one of the nation's leading sports and entertainment complexes." The Newark Star Ledger hailed the holding of the NCAA Final Four (an event that was co-hosted by Rutgers) in New Jersey as "the miracle of the Meadowlands."

Among his many professional affiliations, Mulcahy serves on the Board of the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame, is Chair of its Awards Committee, is an honorary member of the American Football Coaches' Association, and serves on the Boards of several business and charitable corporations.

Mulcahy, a graduate of Villanova University (AB in History, 1958), has received several awards from his alma mater, including the Medal of Excellence from the College of Arts and Sciences, the Alumni Medal, and the James "Jumbo" Elliot Achievement Award. Among other honors, his most prized awards include the Knight of St. Gregory medal, received from Pope John Paul II, and the Ellis Island Medal of Honor.

Bob and his wife Terry have relocated to Basking Ridge after 37 years in Mendham. They are the parents of seven children, including the youngest, Deidre, who is presently a senior at Rutgers. The Mulcahys also have 11 grandchildren.

"Our goal continues to be graduating well-rounded student athletes who can use the lessons learned in the classroom and on the field to become leaders in society. WHY SCARLET? WHY KNIGHTS?



WHY SCARLET?

Rutgers was a pioneer in establishing a college color, and a pioneer in using a color on the field of sport.

The color scarlet was first proposed in the campus newspaper, The Targum, in May, 1869. It was adopted shortly thereafter. This color was chosen because it is a striking color and because a good scarlet ribbon could be easily obtained. From the time of its choice by the students, scarlet has been the Rutgers color.

College and university colors and coats of arms were not unusual in the old world but had been little-used in the new world. They came into large and vivid use only when athletics began to take rigorous hold in this country.

In the historic first collegiate football game on November 6, 1869, the Princeton team members watched the Rutgers men don turbans and kerchiefs as close to scarlet as possible for team identification.

Even without scarlet shirts, the headgear alone had added another "first," the custom of wearing caps of a team's college, one long-copied over the years of football uniform development.

Sports lore at Rutgers has also known terms such as "Scarlet Scourge" and the lasting "Upstream Rutgers!" from the first "big-time" grid venture under George Foster Sanford.

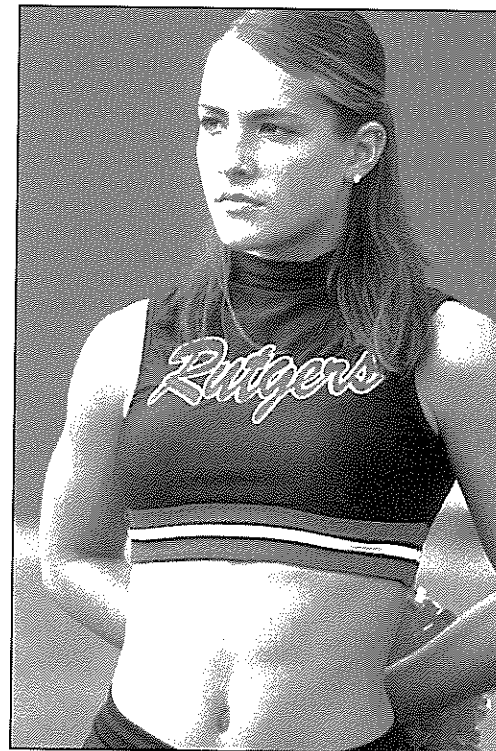
Through the years, scarlet has become embodied in the literature and songs of the college. Scarlet is identified with its sons and daughters, and is highly emblematic of the college itself.

WHY KNIGHTS?

Since its days when the school was officially known as Queen's College, the athletic teams were referred to as the Queensmen. Officially serving as mascot figure for several football seasons beginning in 1925 was a giant, colorfully felt-covered, costumed representation of an earlier campus symbol, the "Chanticleer." Though a fighting bird of the kind with which other colleges have found success, to some it bore the connotation of "chicken." It is also a little-known fact that the New Brunswick-based broadcast station, WCTC, which serves as the flagship station of Rutgers athletics, had its call letters derived from the word "ChanTiCleeR." Chanticleer remained as the mascot and Queensmen as the nickname for some 30 years.

In the early 1950's, in the hope of spurring both the all-around good athletic promise and RU fighting spirit, a campus-wide selection process changed the mascot to that of a Knight.

By 1955, the Scarlet Knight had become the new Rutgers mascot. The Scarlet-garbed knight, riding a spirited white charger, came to represent a new era - the rejuvenation of first class football "On the Banks."

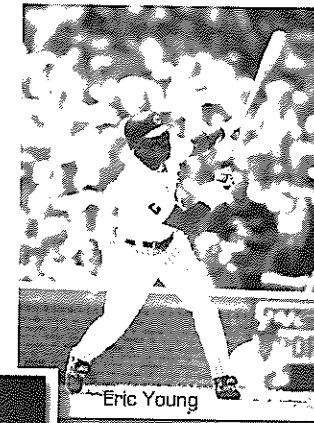

DOUG ALONGI 1993 ABCA THIRD TEAM

Alongi was one of two All-Americans on the 1993 squad, which was one of Rutgers' finest. He helped lead RU to a school record in wins (38) while finishing with a .371 batting average, nine home runs, 39 stolen bases and 143 total bases. He set RU single-season records with his stolen bases (39) and total bases (146). His nine HRs places him 10th on the all-time single-season list. Alongi also recorded 18 doubles and six triples, ranking him fourth and second on those single-season lists, respectively. Alongi made just one error in right field and led all RU outfielders with 14 assists. Alongi also claimed Atlantic 10 Player of the Year honors as well as ECAC and NJCBA recognition.



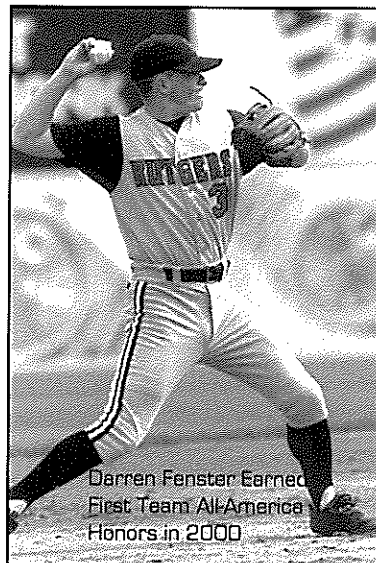
BOBBY BROWNLIE 2000 LOUISVILLE SLUGGER FRESHMAN 2000 COLLEGIATE BASEBALL SECOND TEAM 2000 BASEBALL AMERICA FRESHMAN

One of college baseball's biggest surprises in 2000, Bobby Brownlie arrived on the scene and emerged as one of the top young players in the nation. In 2000, Brownlie posted a 10-1 record, including a perfect 7-0 mark in the BIG EAST. He fired eight complete games and posted an ERA of just 2.55, fourth-best among all freshmen in the country. He was on the mound when Rutgers clinched the 2000 BIG EAST Regular Season Championship, outdueling Notre Dame's Aaron Heilman for the crown. He then collected two wins in the BIG EAST Tournament, including a 1-0, complete-game shutout of Seton Hall in the title contest. He closed his season with a 4-3 win over Army in the opening round of the NCAA Championship, running his win streak to 10 games and tying the single-season win mark at Rutgers. His 89 strikeouts established a new school record, while allowing just a .247 opponent batting average.

JAKE DAUBERT 1998 LOUISVILLE SLUGGER FRESHMAN ALL-AMERICAN

Jake Daubert enjoyed a fine offensive season in 1998, batting .368 in his inaugural college season. In addition, he set or tied eight Rutgers records, the most impressive being the single-season RBI mark, which he eclipsed by knocking in 64 runs. Daubert was named Rutgers first BIG EAST Rookie of the Year and, at the end of the season, was named to the Louisville Slugger/TPX Freshman All-America squad.

Darren Fenster Earned First Team All-America Honors in 2000

2000- Fenster, a two-time All-American, became the first RU player to achieve First Team honors since Jeff Torborg in 1963. Fenster led Rutgers in hitting for the second-straight season, posting a .433 average, which included a new school-record 101 hits in a season. Along the way, Fenster also set the school mark for career hits with 315, becoming the first RU player to reach the 300-hit mark. In addition to his 101 hits and .433 average, Fenster scored 59 runs, drove in 55, collected 23 doubles and hit a career-high four home runs. He also led the team with 182 assists at shortstop, committing just 10 errors.

1999- Fenster, known initially for his defensive work at shortstop, enjoyed a breakthrough offensive season in 1999, leading the team in batting with .424 average, including a .505 mark in conference action. Batting in the second spot in the order, Fenster provided stability to the Rutgers offense, which ended the season ranked seventh in the nation in team batting average. Fenster's .424 mark was the sixth-best single-season mark in Rutgers history and his .505 BIG EAST average was the best in 12 seasons. A model of consistency, Fenster hit safely in 50 of 56 starts, collecting 37 multiple hit games. He also continued to play flawlessly in the field, stabilizing the defense from his shortstop position for the third year in a row.

JEFF FRAZIER 2002 BASEBALL AMERICA FRESHMAN FIRST TEAM

The 2001 Star Ledger (N.J.) High School Player of the Year, Frazier's adjustment to the college game came quickly. He was the first true freshman since Darren Fenster in 1997 to start the season opener and proceeded to start all 57 games in left field for the Scarlet Knights. After an 0-for-3 effort in the season opener, Frazier was 7-for-14 over his next three games and was hitting as high as .424 through the first 17 games of the season. After dipping to a season-low .353 on April 14, Frazier went on a seven-game tear from April 17 through April 26, raising his average to .392. He was 15-for-24 (.625) with seven home runs, 14 runs scored and 22 RBI during that span.

GLEN GARDNER 1986 ABCA/BASEBALL AMERICA 1987 COLLEGIATE BASEBALL THIRD-TEAM

Now a coach with the Scarlet Knights, Gardner was one of the most outstanding outfielders in Rutgers' history and one of two Scarlet Knights to be chosen as two-time All-Americans. A 1986 Baseball America Freshman All-America, Gardner was second on the team in hitting that year with a .398 batting average while leading RU in hits (70), RBI (45), home runs (6), total bases (102), slugging percentage (.580), and on-base percentage (.470).

In 1987, Gardner followed his impressive debut by collecting Collegiate Baseball All-America honors. Gardner led the team in hitting at .368 despite missing 13 games with a hand injury. He finished second on the team in HRs (8) and RBI (45). Gardner also earned his second-consecutive Atlantic 10 and NJ honors as well as being named to the NCAA East Region first-team.

PETE HALL 1961 AACBC SECOND TEAM 1962 AACBC SECOND-TEAM

Hall is another Scarlet Knight to garner multiple All-America honors. In 1961, the third baseman from Bound Brook led the Scarlet Knights in hitting at .397, runs (21), hits (31), RBI (30) doubles (6), home runs (4), and made just five errors while starting in every game.



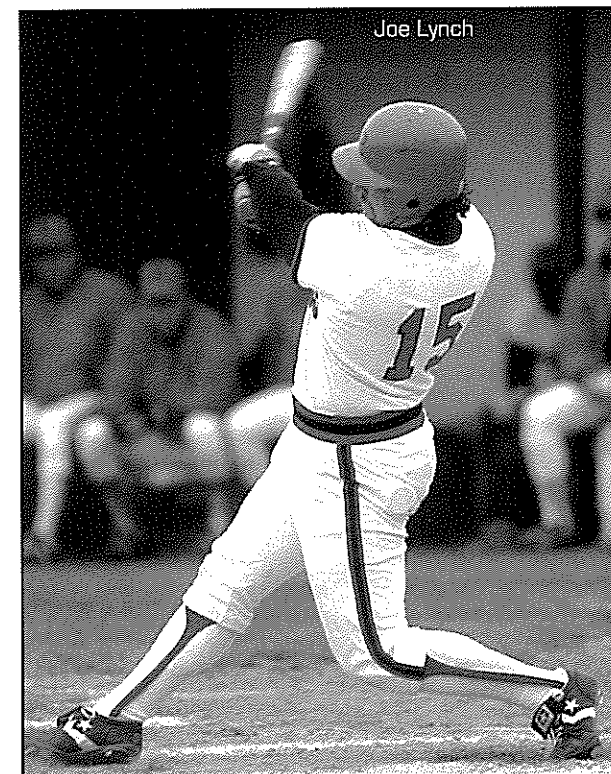

MIKE HIGGINS 1993 ABCA THIRD-TEAM

The Scarlet catcher battled Doug Alongi in almost every offensive category while captaining Rutgers during the 1993 season. He was second in hitting with a .370 average, he drove in 56 runs, then a school record, tied Alongi for team honors with nine HRs and led the Scarlet Knights in doubles (20). His 39 walks and 20 doubles were both second on the all-time season record at that time.

DID YOU KNOW?

Rutgers has had at least one All-American performer in each of the last seven seasons, including two in 1999 and 2000.

JIM KOHL 1990 ABCA THIRD-TEAM

Relief ace extraordinaire, Jim Kohl was one of the keys to Rutgers' run in the East Region, where it finished one game shy of the College World Series. Kohl finished with a perfect 8-0 record and three saves while appearing in 22 games and starting just two. Even more impressive may be his team low 1.85 ERA or the fact that he walked just eight batters in 39.0 innings. In the 1990 tournament, where Rutgers went 4-2, he recorded 8.2 innings of scoreless relief.

JOE LYNCH 1986 ABCA THIRD-TEAM

As a designated hitter, Lynch was third on the Scarlet with a .364 average. He also smacked 3 HRs and drove in 30 runs. A captain in 1986, Lynch had 55 hits with 11 doubles and two triples. His .470 on base percentage tied for team honors as well. Lynch also collected All-District II, Atlantic 10 and All East honors.

SCOTT MADISON 1996 ABCA THIRD-TEAM

After missing all of 1995 due to elbow surgery, Madison returned to the mound and made an impact by beating some of America's top teams on his way to an 8-3 record and a 2.33 ERA which was ranked 15th in the country. Madison earned first team All-BIG EAST honors and was the most dominant pitcher in the conference from the beginning of the season to the end. He finished 1996 with eight complete games and a school-record four shutouts. His 92.2 innings was the second-highest total in school history. Madison finished his career with a .722 (17-5) winning percentage which ranks eighth all-time. He owns Rutgers records for shutouts in a season with four.

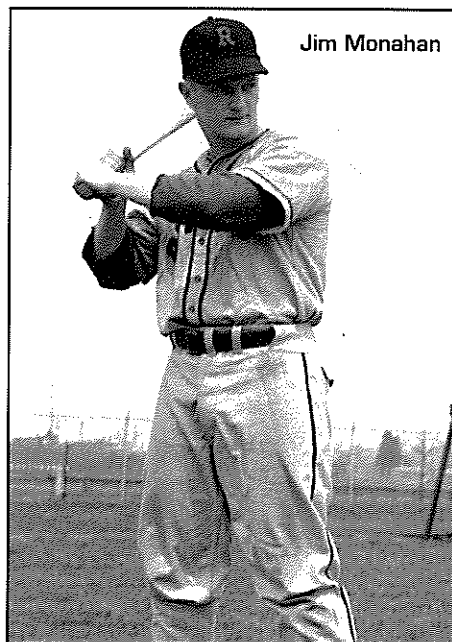

Billy McCarthy, from Washington Township, NJ, transferred to Rutgers in 2000 after two highly-successful seasons at Radford University. The move "back home" proved to be a beneficial decision for both RU and McCarthy. The junior right fielder batted a team-high .421 (20th best in the country) and added seven home runs, 21 doubles, 56 runs, 11 stolen bases and a team-high 65 RBI while playing exceptional defense and providing an all-out hustling style of play. His .421 average led the BIG EAST Conference. A First Team All-BIG EAST pick, McCarthy earned All-Tournament honors after an outstanding showing in the NCAA Regional in Lincoln, NE. At season's end, he was selected in the sixth round by the Atlanta Braves (195th overall) and signed a contract to play professionally.

The Scarlet left fielder led the team with a .400 batting average, 26 hits and 17 stolen bases. He was second on the team in home runs with 2 and RBI with 18. Appearing in all 17 games, he made just three errors. He was also a member of the 1950 College World Series team.

MIKE O'BRIEN

1997 LOUISVILLE SLUGGER FRESHMAN ALL-AMERICA

A designated hitter/first baseman, Mike O'Brien was named to the Louisville Slugger Freshman All-America team, as announced by Collegiate Baseball.

O'Brien appeared in 38 games for the Scarlet Knights starting 31. He batted .302 with 11 doubles, six home runs and 36 RBI. His six home runs was the most by an RU freshman since Angel Echevarria hit nine in 1990. He hit a robust .348 against the BIG EAST and was named to the BIG EAST All-Rookie team.

HARDING PETERSON
1950 AACBC FIRST-TEAM

Catcher Harding Peterson was the lone All-America choice from RU's 1950 College World Series team. Known for his defensive ability, he made just two errors behind the dish in 27 games. He hit a respectable .276 while driving in 23 runs which tied for second on the team.

JEFF TORBORG
1963 AACBC FIRST-TEAM

A 1963 All-America choice, he set the school record for batting average (.537). His slugging percentage that year (1.032) is also a single-season standard. He led the 1963 Scarlet Knight team with 21 RBI and six home runs. In his three-year career, Torborg batted .390 and set the career slugging percentage mark at .684. In his career, the Scarlet Knights were 40-13-1.

RAY VAN CLEEF
1951 AACBC FIRST-TEAM

Centerfielder Ray Van Cleef was chosen by American Association of College Baseball Coaches following his senior season where he batted .378, scored 22 runs and smacked two triples - all team-highs. He made just one error in center while playing in all 23 games. In 1950, Van Cleef paced the Scarlet with a lofty .404 average, 44 hits, 15 extra-base hits, 35 runs and 18 stolen bases. He was a first-team District II choice and the MVP of National Baseball Tournament.

Zoccolillo, one of three players to earn All-America honors in two-consecutive seasons, was named to the 1998 NCBWA Third Team, 1999 NCBWA Third Team and Rawlings/ABCA Second Team during his final two seasons. In 1998, Zoccolillo was the team's top offensive threat, slugging a club record 12 home runs while knocking in 59 runs and batting .387. He followed up his outstanding 1998 season with a record-breaking 1999, setting 10 school records and two BIG EAST marks while leading Rutgers to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances. He left the Rutgers baseball program as the all-time leader in eight offensive categories and the single-season leader in two others.

RUTGERS 1950 COLLEGE WORLD SERIES GAME-BY-GAME RECAP

The Scarlet Knights opened play on Thursday, June 15 in the opening game of the tournament against defending national champion Texas (22-5)... Texas took a 2-0 lead in the second on Frank Womack's two-run homer, and Murray Wall pitched six shutout innings before giving up a run in the seventh... Trailing 2-1, Rutgers rallied to take the lead in the eighth, scoring three runs off Wall on three walks, two singles and an error... Wall walked home a run, and Rutgers first baseman Bob Suba stole home for another... Suba finished the game with three stolen bases, as Rutgers set a College World Series record with a total of seven for the game... Herman Hering steadied after giving up the early home run, and although he walked seven and struck out only one, he also allowed only three hits in going the distance for the win... Ray Van Cleef paced the attack, going three for four, as Rutgers won, 4-2.

Saturday, June 17, Rutgers faced Wisconsin in a second-round winner's bracket matchup before only 955 fans in steady drizzle... Tom Forster pitched a complete-game six-hitter, and Van Cleef went four-for-five with a double and a run scored to pace the Scarlet 5-3 win, and a 2-and-0 record in the tournament...

On Monday, June 19, Rutgers met Washington State in the winner's bracket final... The game was a terrific pitcher's duel between Al Willenbrock for Rutgers and Rod Keogh for the Cougars... Willenbrock gave up an early home run to Ted Tappe of the Cougars, but the Scarlet tied it in the fourth on a triple by Jim Monahan and an infield out... That would prove to be the only hit off Keogh, but he walked eight and was frequently in trouble... In the seventh, Rutgers loaded the bases, with Willenbrock up... without warning, (Rutgers later said it was not a called play), the runner on third tried to steal home and was tagged out... As he broke, the runner on second started toward third, then hesitated, and was eventually run down and tagged out to complete an unusual double play, killing the potential rally... In the top of the ninth, Washington State

loaded the bases with no outs... Don Paul grounded sharply to third baseman Steve Kalapos, who threw home for the force there... catcher Hardy Peterson then threw to first to double Paul, and Suba, the first baseman, then spotted Gordon Brunswick, the runner at second, trying to make a surprise dash to home... Suba threw back to Peterson, who tagged Brunswick to complete the triple play... It was the second of three triple plays in the CWS... In the top of the 10th, Washington State finally broke through on an outfield error, hit batter and a two-run double by Terry Carroll to take a 3-1 lead, and Keogh completed his one hitter by retiring the side in the bottom of the 10th... Washington State improved to 3-0, and Rutgers fell to 2-1... Van Cleef, after going seven-for-nine in the first two games was held to 0-for-5...

On Wednesday, June 21, Rutgers came back from its one-hit outing to blow out Wisconsin 16-2...The Scarlet collected 11 hits, including two apiece by four different players, and the Badgers unraveled, committing seven errors... [Van Cleef was 1-for-6]... Herman Hering turned in his second complete game win of the tournament, scattering eight hits, and also contributed a triple and a single to the 11-hit attack... Wisconsin was eliminated at 2-2, and Rutgers joined Texas and Washington State at 3-1 [Texas had beaten the Cougars, 12-1, on Tuesday]. Washington State drew the bye into the championship game, and Rutgers faced Texas for the second time, on Thursday, June 22.. The Scarlet went with second-round winner Tom Foster, but Texas knocked him out early, scoring three in the second, and five in the fourth on their way to a 15-9 win... Charlie Gorin went the distance for Texas, despite allowing 12 hits and nine runs, as the Longhorns out-hit Rutgers, 15-12...Texas went on to win the title over Washington State the next night, 3-0, while Rutgers finished third at 3-2... finishing the season at 17-4-1...Van Cleef was 2-for-4 in the final game to finish the CWS at .417 on 10-for-24, and was named the Most Outstanding Player.

RUTGERS HALL OF FAME

One of the oldest traditions at Rutgers University, the Scarlet Knight Baseball program has been successful for over 129 years. There have been 20 All-Americans, 12 trips to the NCAA Tournament and one trip to the College World Series. With all of this illustrious history, you can image that there have been several "Special" players on "The Banks." Nine of those players have been selected to the Rutgers University Olympic Sports Hall of Fame which honors the best of the best in Rutgers' Sports. The baseball program has been represented in each of the last four years - Eric Young (1999), Darrin Winston (2000), Matt Bolger (2001) and Jim Monahan (2002).

Glen Gardner '91

Gardner, one of the most prolific hitters in Rutgers baseball history, was elected after a stellar three-year career (1986-88), which saw him earn two All-America awards as well as collect a host of offensive records. Gardner, one of New Jersey's top all-time athletes, came to Rutgers from Immaculata High School, where he was a first-team All-State choice in both football and baseball. Following his freshman season, Gardner was named Freshman All-America by Baseball America. He was drafted after his sophomore season by the San Diego Padres in the 13th round of the Major League Baseball Amateur draft. He chose to stay at Rutgers for his junior season and that year set nine single-season offensive records and earned All-America honors from Collegiate Baseball. He was a three-time Atlantic 10 choice and a three-time New Jersey College Baseball Association honoree. Following his junior season, Gardner was drafted by the Atlanta Braves and he began a professional career in that organization. He ended his career as the Rutgers all-time leader in six offensive categories and ranked in the top 10 in four others.

Pete Hall '62

Hall is one of only two Scarlet Knights to twice earn All-American honors (1961 and 1962) in baseball. During his three letter-winning years (1960-62), the Scarlet Knights were 40-14-1. The former third baseman holds fifth place on the career batting average chart (.384) and second place on the career slugging average chart (.612) in the Scarlet Knight record book. Hall was a 1961 draft pick of the New York Yankees. Hall was the Upstream Award winner in 1962. In 1961, he led the team in hitting (.397), runs (21), hits (31), RBI (30) and made just five errors in starting every game.

Harding Peterson '50

Peterson, the backstop for the 1950 Rutgers College World Series team, was a second-team All-America selection by the American Baseball Coaches Association and a first-team District II choice that year, as well. Known for his defensive ability, Peterson made just two errors in 27 games in 1950 while hitting .276 (27-98), with 21 runs, 23 RBI (second on team), 4 doubles and 2 triples. His best season as a collegian was in 1948, when he hit for a .312 average (10-32) with 7 RBI and 3 doubles. In his three varsity seasons, Peterson led his teams to a combined 57-16-2 record, highlighted by a third-place finish in the 1950 College World Series. Following his career at Rutgers, Peterson signed as free agent with Pittsburgh Pirates in 1950 but had his career interrupted by Korean War service. Following the war, Peterson played four years with Pirates until a broken arm in a home plate collision hastened his retirement. A well-respected baseball man, Peterson spent over 30 years with the Pirates, including stints as a player (4 years), manager (9 years), farm

director and scouting director. He was named VP for player personnel in 1976 and named executive VP in 1979 and is possibly best known for the trade of C Manny Sanguillen to Oakland A's for manager Chuck Tanner in 1976. His dealings helped bring the Pirates their World Series Championship in 1979. Peterson also spent two years with the Yankees - and was a Co-General Manager in 1990 and two more years with San Diego as a scout.



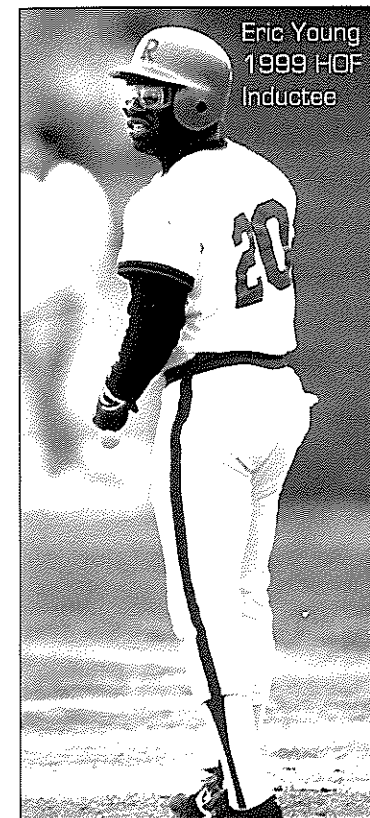
Jeff Torborg '63

Jeff Torborg was a 1963 All-American and set the school record for season batting average (.537) that year, which was the national leading average for 100 at bats and under. His .537 average was the highest ever recorded up to that time and since then, only two college players have hit for a better average. His slugging percentage that year (1.032) is also a single-season standard. In 1963, he led the team

with 21 RBI and six home runs. A draft choice of the Los Angeles Dodgers, he played 10 seasons in the major, seven with the Dodgers and three with the California Angels. He caught three no-hitters, a perfect game with Sandy Koufax and another no-hitter with Bill Singer of the Dodgers and Nolan Ryan of the Angels; and was the backstop in Don Drysdale's record fifth straight shutout in 1968. He was a successful manager with the Chicago White Sox, the Cleveland Indians and the New York Mets, winning the Baseball Writer's Association, Associated Press, United Press International and The Sporting News Manager of the Year award. In his three-year career from 1961-63, the Westfield, NJ native batted .390. His number (#10) was retired in 1992. He still holds the career slugging percentage mark of .684. During his career, the Knights were 15-4-1, 14-4 and 11-5 for a three-year mark of 40-13-1 (.741 winning percentage).

Ray Van Cleef '52

Van Cleef was a two-time All-American in baseball, garnering first-team accolades from the American Association of College Baseball Coaches in 1950 and 1951. In the process, he became the first Eastern player to repeat as an All-American. A veteran of two NCAA Tournaments, he was the starting centerfielder on the 1950 Rutgers team which advanced to the College World Series. He batted .458 (11-24) in the series en route to MVP honors, while leading the Knights to a co-runner-up finish. Van Cleef batted .404 that season, his junior year, and followed it up with a .378 mark in 1951. He currently ranks second in career batting average at Rutgers. He set the Rutgers single season record for triples with seven in 1950 and stands second in career triples with 13. Van Cleef is also third in career slugging percentage with a .606 mark. The Knights were 50-21-2 his three varsity years. He also won three letters in basketball and one in soccer.



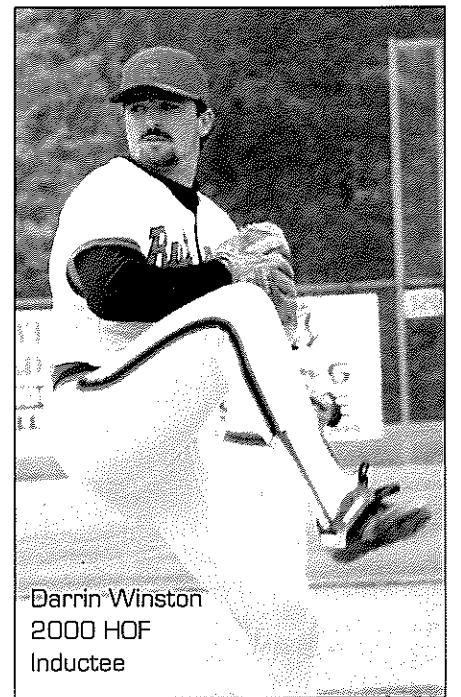

Eric Young '89

Eric Young was a two-sport standout (football, baseball) at Rutgers, earning three letters in baseball (1987-89). Young batted over .300 in each of his three seasons, including a career high .337 as a senior in 1989. During his career on the diamond, Young was a two-time Atlantic-10 All-Conference selection and led Rutgers to an Atlantic-10 Championship and NCAA berth in 1988. Young graduated from Rutgers as the career runs, triples and stolen base leader, setting a then single-season mark with 28 thefts in 1989. At the conclusion of his Rutgers career, Young was the recipient of the Courser Award in 1989 and was selected by the Los Angeles Dodgers in the 1989 amateur draft. Young made his major league debut with the Colorado Rockies in 1993 and was selected to the 1995 All-Star game. A nine-year major league veteran with a .289 career average, Young is the starting second baseman for the Chicago Cubs.

Darrin Winston

Darrin Winston received his nod in 2000. Winston was a four-year letterwinner at Rutgers from 1985-88, and concluded his career as one of Rutgers' all-time winningest pitchers. A left-hander, Winston was a three-time team MVP, and led the Scarlet Knights to two berths in the NCAA Tournament, as well as the 1988 Atlantic 10 Championship. He was an all-region selection in 1988 after posting a 10-4 record with a 3.74 ERA, and was the MVP of the A-10 Tournament that year. At the time of his induction, Winston was the Rutgers leader in several statistical categories, including career wins (26), career innings pitched (278), career strikeouts (176), career complete-games (8), and single-season wins (10). Originally from Woodbridge, NJ, Winston was drafted by the Montreal Expos and later pitched in the major leagues for the Philadelphia Phillies. He is currently a member of the Somerset Patriots of the Atlantic League.

Matt Bolger, Head Coach

Matt Bolger spent 22 years at the head coach of the Scarlet Knights baseball team, compiling a record of 288-245-7 during his career. A 2001 Olympic Sports Hall of Fame Inductee, Bolger led Rutgers to three NCAA Tournaments in a five-year span from 1966-1970, and posted his best season in 1961, when the Scarlet Knights finished with a 15-4-1 record. A two-time Coach of the Year honoree by the New Jersey Collegiate Baseball Association, Bolger mentored several major league draft picks, including former first-round pick Jeff Torborg. A past President of the American Association of College Baseball Coaches, Bolger is a member of the AACBC Hall of Fame, as well as the Newark Hall of Fame and the St. Benedict's Prep Hall of Fame. Bolger, who coached at Rutgers from 1961 through 1983, was the school's all-time winningest coach in any sport at the time of his retirement.

Jim Monahan ('52)

Jim Monahan was a key member of the 1950 Rutgers baseball team which advanced to the College World Series for the first and only time in school history. Monahan was among the offensive leaders in five categories in 1950, while his best season came in 1952. That year, Monahan earned First Team All-East and First Team All-America honors after hitting .400 with a team-high 17 stolen bases and 18 RBI, second-best on the team. Rutgers enjoyed a 41-19-1 record during his four seasons, including a 17-4-1 mark during that memorable 1950 campaign.

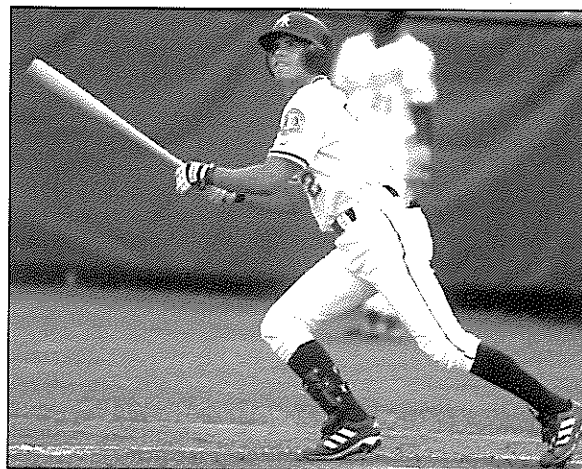

DEJESUS EARNS ROYALS' TOP HONOR

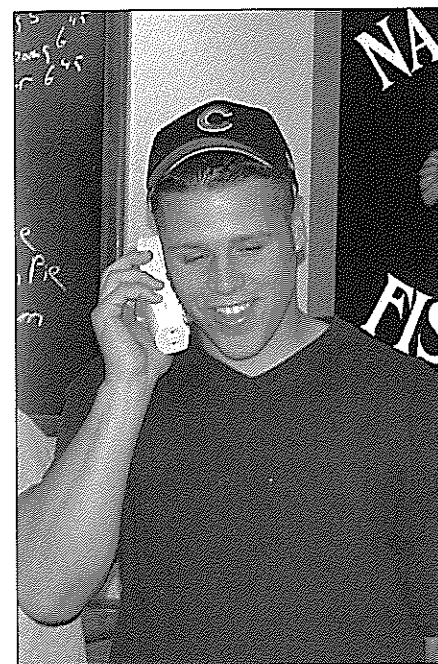
Former Rutgers standout David DeJesus was selected as the Royals' Minor League Player of the Year for 2002, following a season in which he hit a combined .288 with 76 runs scored and 56 RBI for Class-A Wilmington (DE) and Double-A Wichita (KS).

DeJesus' honor is especially impressive considering he missed the 2000 and 2001 seasons with various injuries, making 2002 his first professional campaign. In addition to adjusting to professional baseball, DeJesus also faced the challenge of returning to form following a two-year layoff - challenges he dismissed with ease. He was the fourth-round pick in 2000 and can play all three outfield positions, although he spent the majority of his summer patrolling center.

DeJesus started the season in the Carolina League with Wilmington and hit .296 with 22 doubles, six triples, four home runs and 41 RBI from the leadoff spot. After starting in the Carolina League All-Star game, DeJesus was promoted to Wichita, where he rebounded from a slow start to hit .253 in 25 games with the Wranglers.

Within three years, Brownlie matured from a good, local high school player into the best player in the country on the collegiate level. On June 4, 2002, gathered with family and friends, Brownlie was selected in the first round, 21st overall, by the Chicago Cubs in the Major League Baseball First Year Player Draft.

Brownlie grew up a mere five miles from Rutgers University and, coming out of Edison High School as the top pitcher in New Jersey, he wasted little time choosing Rutgers. Despite overtures from southern schools and the chance to play professionally - he was a 26th round pick of the Colorado Rockies - Brownlie stood firm on his decision to play for RU head coach Fred Hill and his Scarlet Knights.

The reasons Brownlie cited - closeness to family, strong tradition and comfort - have become the recruiting pitch for all coaches seeking to entice in-state talent. A veteran of Coach Hill's baseball camp as a youngster, Brownlie never wavered on his decision to attend the State University.

"Coming out of high school, I wasn't ready to go away to school and I knew that I would be happy and comfortable at Rutgers," said Brownlie.

His meteoric rise to national prominence began in 2000, when he posted a 10-1 record as a freshman and led Rutgers to its best record (40-18), a BIG EAST Championship and a No. 1 seed in the first-ever NCAA Regional hosted by Rutgers. He was the Most Outstanding Player in the BIG EAST Tournament, beating Seton Hall, 1-0, in the title game and then added another win in the NCAA Tournament for good measure. A successful summer in the Cape Cod League, where he earned the McNeece Award as the league's top pro prospect changed his status forever.

As a sophomore, he was rated the fourth-best prospect in the country and supported the hype with a 6-3 record for the Scarlet Knights, but a 7-0 mark with a 0.84 ERA for Team USA, earning

When Bob Mulcahy was introduced as Rutgers' Director of Athletics in 1998, he spoke passionately about the importance of keeping New Jersey's top athletes at home. No longer did Mulcahy want to see in-state high school stars, in any sport, leave New Jersey for their college careers. The initiative was directed to all teams, although no one demonstrates it better than the Rutgers University baseball team and there is no better spokesperson than Edison's Bobby Brownlie.

the unofficial title of the team's best pitcher. An appearance on the cover of the 2002 Baseball America College Baseball Preview and the pressure associated with that did little to affect Brownlie, who opened the 2002 season with a three-hitter vs. William & Mary.

After shutting out defending National Champion Miami for seven innings in mid-March, Brownlie developed tendonitis in his pitching arm. Battling questions about his health all spring and dealing the draft placed tremendous pressure on him, but he handled it all with grace and dignity.

All his hard work paid off about 20 minutes into the draft, when the Chicago Cubs announced, via a conference call, that they had selected Brownlie with their first pick in the draft. The roar of family, friends and teammates made it all worthwhile.

"The hard part is over now," said Brownlie shortly after hearing his name called. "It's like a weight was lifted off my shoulders. It was really special - I can't put it into words right now. To be here with family and friends makes it even more special."

"I know that [the Cubs] give their young pitchers a chance to perform. They want to put a winner on the field and I am happy that I was chosen by an organization that really wants to have a winner."

Brownlie will soon sign his first contract and begin his professional career, hoping to quickly work his way to Wrigley Field and join a young staff that already includes two of the league's top young arms in Mark Prior and Kerry Wood. The added incentive includes trying to provide the die-hard Cubs fans with their first World Championship since 1908.

"We could have a pretty nasty staff in a couple of years," said Brownlie.

After sitting out the fall to continue negotiations with the Cubs, Brownlie made a difficult decision in January, forfeiting his final season of collegiate eligibility to continue his pursuit of a dream that began in his backyard and continued through his years at Rutgers - to pitch in the major leagues.

It's been a whirlwind three years for Brownlie and his family. As a relatively unknown local product, Brownlie vaulted Rutgers University into the national spotlight in a way that very few student-athletes had ever done before. It was special for Brownlie to play at Rutgers, so close to home. It was just as special for Rutgers and the state of New Jersey, however, to know that one of its own is on his way to the big leagues, but it took a path through Rutgers to get there.



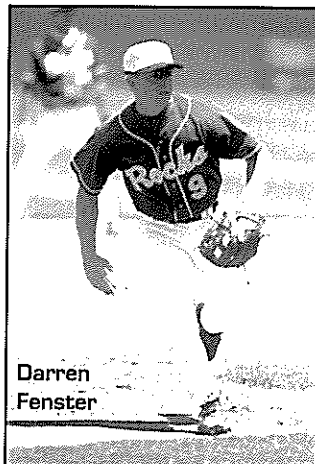

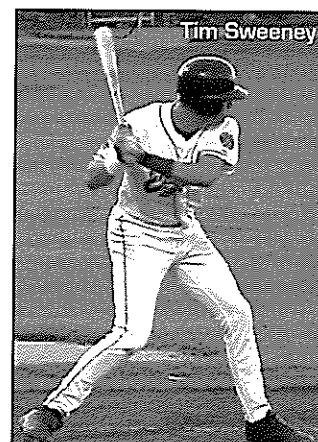

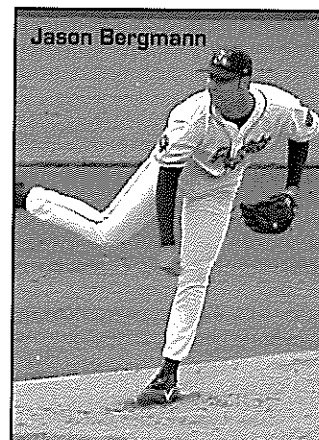

TIM SWEENEY - Hit .186 in 45 games with the Vermont Expos of the NY-Penn League after being drafted by the Expos this past June.

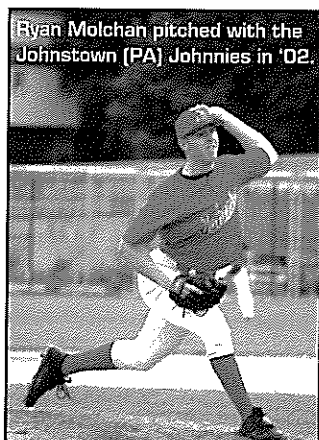

As The BIG EAST Conference enters the 2003 season, only the 24th in its history, it takes pride in its long list of accomplishments. Providing opportunities to excel amongst the nation's best, both athletically and academically, continues to be its mission.

There was plenty of evidence of that mission being accomplished during the 2001-02 season. The BIG EAST had undefeated national champions in football and women's basketball, 32 student-athletes who earned Academic All-America honors, and two student-athletes who were named the national player of the year in their sports.

Miami won the Rose Bowl to cap a perfect 12-0 season for its fifth national title and second for the league. The Connecticut women's basketball team garnered its third national title with a record-setting 39-0 mark. That national championship gave the Conference a three-peat in women's basketball following the Huskies' second title in 2000 and Notre Dame's crown in 2001. BIG EAST teams have won 10 national championships since 1995 in six different sports.

UConn's Sue Bird was the consensus women's basketball player of the year and Erin Elbe of Georgetown was honored with the women's lacrosse player of the year award. The Notre Dame baseball team became the first conference team to play in the College World Series. The BIG EAST was the only conference to have eight teams compete in the NCAA Women's Soccer Championship.

The BIG EAST has always been able to boast that some of its best students are also some of its best athletes. Notre Dame softball standout Jarrah Myers, the 2001-02 BIG EAST/Aéropostale Female Scholar-Athlete of the Year, was honored as the Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All-American Team Member of the Year in addition to earning All-America honors for her accomplishments on the diamond.

For three of the last eight years, a BIG EAST student-athlete has won the Honda-Broderick Cup as Collegiate Woman of the Year. Notre Dame soccer player Cindy Daws won in 1997-98. She followed Connecticut basketball players Rebecca Lobo ('94-95) and Jennifer Rizzotti ('95-96).

BIG EAST student-athletes have continued their success after leaving the classrooms and playing fields. Former Connecticut women's basketball standout Dr. Leigh Curl was inducted into the Verizon Academic All-America Hall of Fame in 1999. Former Georgetown men's basketball star Dikembe Mutombo was named a winner of the President's Service Award, the highest honor in the U.S. for volunteer service.

Whether it's the student-athletes or the league as a whole, moving forward successfully and exploring new horizons have been the norm rather than the exception for the conference that opened its doors in 1979.

Most recently the league welcomed Virginia Tech as its 14th full member in 2000-01. In the spring of 2001, the BIG EAST added women's lacrosse to its growing list of sports and the inaugural women's golf championship will be held in the spring of 2003.

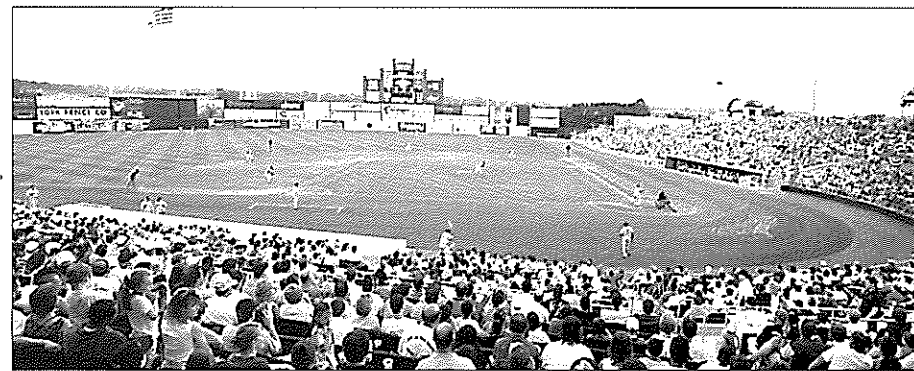

The BIG EAST Baseball Championship, now in its 18th season, will be held in New Jersey for the fourth-straight year. The 2002 Championship will be held at Commerce Bank Ballpark in Bridgewater, NJ for the third-straight year. Two seasons ago, Rutgers captured its second championship in three years with a 1-0 win over Seton Hall, giving Garden State baseball fans an "All Jersey" final, while last season, Seton Hall picked up the championship with a win over Virginia Tech. This season, the tournament field has been reduced to four teams for the second-straight year, as Rutgers sets its sights on a third conference crown.
